DID YOU KNOW?

- Paul Bowling will become the first true freshman to start at center in a season opener at Troy since at least 1982 (records prior are incomplete)
- ✗ ... At the FBS level, only five true freshmen played more than 100 snaps at center last season, and only three had more than 300 snaps
- Troy is 24-0 since 2015 when rushing for 200-plus yards in a game ... the Trojans are 52-2 since joining the Sun Belt in 2004
- ✗ Troy is celebrating its 25th season as an FBS member in 2025 ... during its run at the highest level of college football, Troy has won eight conference titles and six bowl games

In the case of an adverse weather situation please seek immediate shelter.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Food, drink containers, bottles, artificial noise makers, cans, thermo-bottles, ice bags, ice chests, umbrellas, strollers, video cameras, large flags, weapons or any object deemed HAZARDOUS by stadium management. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect patrons entering the stadium for the purpose of fan safety. All purses, backpacks or other bags must fit within the assigned seating area for each patron. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect all bags and to prohibit oversize bags from admission to the stadium.

PROHIBITED BEHAVIOR

Examples of prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, throwing of objects of any kind; demonstrating unruly behavior; attempting to enter the field of play; engaging in behavior that endangers the safety of student-athletes, coaches, officials or other guests; removing stadium turf; and/or taunting public service officials. Consequences for guests exhibiting prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, loss of ticket buying privileges, ejection from the stadium, and/or arrest.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Alcohol is sold within the venue. Only those who are of age and have proper identification are permitted to purchase alcohol. No outside alcohol is permitted. Beer will be available to purchase at five locations throughout Veterans Memorial Stadium (2 West Concourse, 2 North Plaza, 1 East Concourse).

Upon providing proper identification at the point of sale, a band will be placed on the customer's wrist, identifying that individual is of legal drinking age.

Customers are permitted to purchase no more than two beers at a time.

Beer sales will be halted at the end of the third quarter.

Sodexo Food Services, law enforcement personnel, and game management officials reserve to the right to refuse the sale of alcohol to anyone.

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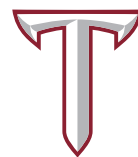
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PEYTON HIGGINS

CHIP ON HIS SHOULDER

Faith. Trust. And a chip on his shoulder.

These are three things that have defined Peyton Higgins' football career.

Growing up in Florence, Alabama, football wasn't just something he played — it was woven into the very fabric of his family. His father, Darrell, was his coach at Mars Hill Bible School, a program that transformed from a struggling startup to a state powerhouse during Peyton's years there.

"We never really butt heads," Higgins said. "He's like one of my best friends, really. He'll probably be the best man in my wedding. He's just awesome."

It's not every football player who describes his head coach in those terms, but for the Higgins family, trust runs deep.

Before the Higgins family arrived, Mars Hill's football program had barely found its footing, recording back-to-back 1-9 seasons. However, the Higgins family stepped in and turned the program around. They won state championships in Peyton's sophomore and senior years and finished runner-up his junior season.

"It was awesome to kind of be a part of that building process with him," Higgins said. "When he told me we were moving, I was really mad at him. I didn't want to go. But I had to trust him, and that just grew our relationship even closer. Him being my coach, me trusting him, him motivating me when I had a bad game... it was just special."

By the time he graduated, Higgins had etched his name into Alabama high school football history. He finished with 100 career touchdowns and nearly 9,000 all-purpose yards. He set state records with nine career kickoff returns for touchdowns and

once took five to the house in a single season. He was named to the Alabama Sports Writers Association Super All-State Team and selected as the 2A Back of the Year. However, the experience means more than the accolades.

"Just seeing where Mars Hill was before and then being part of taking it to championships — it showed me what it means to rebuild, to trust the process, and to lead," he said.

That lesson would serve him well at Troy. As a member of Troy's Football Leadership Council, Higgins has grown into more than just a reliable slot receiver. He sees himself as a bridge between veterans and younger players, drawing on lessons from Mars Hill's transformation to help Troy stay on the rise.

"I've carried those lessons over," Higgins said. "Being part of a program that had to rebuild, that had to grow — it showed me how important leadership is. Now I just try to influence the younger guys, keep us moving in the right direction. I think we're headed there."

For Higgins, his senior season isn't just about catches or yards. It's about savoring every moment: the locker room jokes, the grind of practice, the nights under the lights at Veterans Memorial Stadium.

"I'm trying not to just focus on the games," he said. "I want to enjoy the whole journey — the practices, the time with my teammates, everything that comes with it."

Even though Higgins is now several hours away from Florence, his connection to family hasn't wavered. His dad still checks in almost daily, usually over the phone, and rarely misses a game.

"He'll fly out right after his own game on Friday night if he has to," Higgins said. "If it's in Troy, he'll drive all the way back that same night. My whole family comes to the games. They're very supportive, and they're very excited for my senior year."

As the undersized wide receiver steps on the field, he has a chip on his shoulder, especially after Coach Parker thought he might have been a kicker.

"When I first met Coach Parker, he thought I was a kicker," Higgins recalled with a laugh. "That made me really mad, and it just fueled me even more. I've always had people doubt me because of my size, but that just pushes me to work harder."

At the end of the day, he's not worried about doubters. He's savoring every moment and chasing something bigger.

"More than anything," Higgins said, "I just want to win for Troy."

FROM THE COOK ISLANDS TO THE GRIDIRON

Matt Henry didn't grow up dreaming of touchdowns. In fact, there were long stretches of his childhood when he didn't dream at all; he was too busy surviving. Bounced between relatives, dismissed by schools, and eventually sent thousands of miles away to the Cook Islands as a last-ditch wake-up call, Henry's story is not about easy redemption. It's about grit, cultural grounding, and the unlikely way sport turned chaos into clarity.

A Rough Beginning

Matt Henry was born in New Zealand and raised by his mother after his parents split. Those early years were marked by instability. His mother, struggling with postpartum depression, was frequently in and out of the hospital. Without a stable home or role models, Matt spiraled.

"I was a bad kid," he said. "My family didn't want to take me in because I was always getting in trouble at school and hanging out with the wrong people."

Eventually, his father, who had moved to Australia, won custody. But the real turning point came when Matt moved in with his uncle, Junior Ioane.

"That was probably the most secure I ever felt in my life," he said. "Before that, I thought every house was just temporary."

His father's household was ruled by discipline.

"I thought I could walk all over him like I did with other people. Nope," Henry said.

He was put into school and introduced to rugby. It was his first real outlet.

"Rugby was the first thing I actually liked," he added. "It gave me something to chase."

His dedication paid off; he earned a spot on a state representative team, but then a serious wrist injury derailed everything, and his progress stalled. With no rugby to anchor him, he began slipping into old patterns. That's when his family stepped in with a bold move: they sent him to the Cook Islands.

A Cultural Reset

"They told me I was going on holiday," Henry said. "Next thing I know, my grandma enrolls me in school."

What was pitched as a break became a six-month cultural intervention. On the remote island, reachable only by a boat that comes every six months, Henry had no distractions, no luxuries and no way out.

"It was the most humbling experience of my life," he said.

He helped his grandmother make coconut oil to sell to tourists and locals. They ate what they caught or grew.

"There was no money, no internet, just work. I husked coconuts, grated them, made oil; that was our income. That was life."

It grounded him. But like any teenager, boredom crept back in, and he started acting out again. He stole his grandmother's moped and roamed the island. His dad found out and brought him back to Australia.

Second Shot

Henry returned physically transformed – taller, heavier, stronger – but rusty from nearly a year off the field.

"I really fell off," he said.

Then came football. A cousin encouraged him to attend a local combine in 2019.

"I fell in love with football, way more than rugby."

He didn't grow up watching the game and still doesn't watch much beyond big games. But he had the tools: size, power, speed and hunger. That combination led him to a junior college in New Mexico. The transition was brutal.

"I called my mom crying the first week. They had us doing military drills. I'd never seen anything like it," Henry said.

But he stayed. By his second year, he was starting every game and his performance earned him a shot at Troy and Division I ball.

Family, Faith and the Bigger Picture

Henry's relationship with his stepmom, Mata, is central to his life now.

"She watches all my games, even if she doesn't always understand football," he said.

This fall, she'll get to experience it firsthand. Matt is flying his stepmom in for Troy's game at Clemson and his two younger brothers, Jamayne and Tariki, will join her to see his final home game at Troy.

"They've never seen me play in person. I want them to feel that atmosphere," he said.

Henry's journey from an angry, displaced kid in New Zealand to a focused, determined athlete on the edge of a potential pro career is nothing short of extraordinary.

"I'm blessed," he said. "I give all the glory to God. I've been through so much adversity. It's crazy to think how I got here."

From the islands to the gridiron, Matt Henry's story isn't finished, but it's already proof that redemption doesn't start with a miracle. It starts with a choice. And sometimes, with a coconut.

ALL ROADS LEAD TO FAMILY

For senior defensive tackle Casey Fua'au, family is everything. It's the reason he chose Troy and the foundation of the person he is today.

"My biggest motivation is my family and everything they've poured into me to get to the point I am today," Fua'au said. "My mom paid for a lot of things and drove me hours to go to camps outside of the city."

The Clarksville, Tenn., native has one particularly strong family tie: his cousin Matt Henry. While looking for a transfer destination, Fua'au visited Troy with Henry, who is now the Trojans' starting right guard. The pair committed together.

"[Henry] pushes me to be a better player because he's one of the main players that has a big effect on our team," Fua'au said. "I strive to compete with him a lot, and he just makes me better as a player."

Although Fua'au started playing football in middle school, he said he didn't take it seriously until late in high school. After a short stint with no playing time at New Mexico Military Institute, he transferred to Allan Hancock College in Santa Maria, California.

While playing offensive line, he started 10 of 11 games and earned Second Team All-National Northern League honors. He also discovered more about his Samoan heritage.

"We had a lot of Samoans on the team, and that helped me embrace my culture and where I come from because there weren't many Samoans in Tennessee," Fua'au said. "Our culture is very family-oriented, and Polynesians always treat each other like family. I feel like when I got there, we all bonded and became like brothers."

Fua'au said those lessons about culture and unity carry over to the gridiron.

"Brotherhood and camaraderie really help the team a lot," he said. "Whenever you get on the field and it's you going against the people in front of you, brotherhood drives you because you're playing for something bigger than just yourself."

Despite playing primarily on the offensive line – including last season against Southern Miss as part of a special teams unit that didn't allow a blocked kick – Fua'au has transitioned to defensive tackle. He credits the Troy coaching staff for guiding him through the switch.

"Coach Manning really helped me develop in the way that defensive linemen are supposed to move and react," Fua'au said. "I was slow at first, and I didn't really understand much about playing defensive line. Going

through everything day-to-day and having all the other players help me out and coach me up is really helping me become better at the position I'm playing now."

During his time at college, Fua'au said he's grown a lot in maturity and responsibility.

"I feel like I've gotten a lot more responsible," he said. "I used to be irresponsible and I wasn't doing the things I had to do in the classroom, and I thought I might not play football again. I went on to Allan Hancock and then got the opportunity to come to Troy, and I've done a lot better with responsibility and doing the things that I need to do."

After a strong offseason, Fua'au earned a spot on the depth chart and looks to play a key role for the Trojans in 2025.

LET LOOSE

For Taleeq Robbins, the road to Troy wasn't straight. It was winding, marked by setbacks, lessons and the kind of growth that only comes from perseverance.

A Philadelphia native, Robbins has traveled across programs and states, learning about the game, about life and, most importantly, about himself. Now in his senior year with the Troy Trojans, he carries a new mindset — one rooted in resilience, openness and the belief that everything he has endured has prepared him for this moment.

Robbins' journey began with a promising high school career, where he ranked among the top defensive tackles in Pennsylvania. His size and athleticism caught the eyes of recruiters, and his potential seemed boundless. But football wasn't always his first love. Before the gridiron, Robbins was a basketball player. He only decided to stick with football after a push from his father.

"I wanted to quit the first week," Robbins said. "I wasn't necessarily used to putting my hand in the dirt. But my dad told me, 'Never quit anything you start. Always finish it to the best of your ability.' That stuck with me."

That lesson carried Robbins through the transitions ahead that included Ole Miss, Northeast Mississippi and Houston. At Houston, he saw playing time, including four starts in 2023, but his next season never materialized. It wasn't ability that held him

back, but battles off the field.

"It wasn't even about the on-the-field stuff," Robbins said. "It was mainly the mental aspect and off-the-field issues that kept me from being out there. But all of that was a learning experience for me. I've had to learn to be consistent in my mentality — not just when things are good, but when life hits the lows, too."

A self-described quiet person, Robbins admits he sometimes came across as distant. At times, he bottled up struggles, believing that was what it meant to "be a man." Looking back, he sees how that approach held him back.

"You can't just shut the world out," Robbins said. "You've got to have someone to talk to, to lean on."

That realization makes his arrival at Troy feel different. For the first time in his career, Robbins said, he has found a place where he feels both supported and challenged. He credits Troy coaches, including defensive line coach Justin Manning, head coach Gerad Parker, strength coach Darl Bauer and defensive coordinator Dontae Wright for creating an environment of trust and accountability.

"They've been open in a way where it doesn't feel forced," Robbins said. "It's like talking to your mom or dad. They keep it real with you, but you know it's coming from a place of family. That's what's made the difference for me here."

As Robbins enters his senior season, he's determined to play freely and without the weight of second-guessing or carrying the baggage of the past.

"I just want to let loose," Robbins said. "I've been bottled up before, trying to force things. Now I'm more comfortable, and I feel like everything will fall into place."

With NFL aspirations in sight, Robbins approaches this final collegiate season with urgency but also gratitude. He sees it as both the culmination of years of work and the beginning of what comes next.

"I don't want to just say I was part of something," Robbins said. "I want to be a force for Troy. I want to win, and I want to help bring that to this program and this community. I feel like it's time for a breakthrough."

For Robbins, that breakthrough isn't just about tackles or stats. It's about embodying the lessons he has carried with him at every stop — and finally unleashing the player, and person, he always knew he could be.

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TRAY TAYLOR

SIZE ISN'T EVERYTHING

Troy football is known for pairing its' smashmouth offensive identity with a bone-crushing defensive intensity. That culture is built and maintained by the players and coaches who don the Power-T throughout the fall. One of the integral parts of this year's offensive engine is wide receiver Tray Taylor.

Standing at 5-foot-8 Taylor doesn't fit the prototypical physical profile many envision at the wideout position. While some view his height as a detriment, Taylor uses it as a motivator, a chip on his shoulder.

"I'm a small guy that's been counted out a lot and really came from nothing – just a work ethic guy," Taylor said.

Before enrolling at Troy, his collegiate career began at Tyler Junior College. Having little to no interest heading into his sophomore season, Taylor embraced the chip on his shoulder. On his way to becoming a three-star athlete, he earned Second-Team JUCO All-American, First-Team All-SWJCFC wide receiver and Second-Team All-SWJCFC return specialist Honors as a sophomore.

After being tabbed as ESPN's seventh-best JUCO receiver, Taylor decided to transfer to Coastal Carolina University for his junior season. As a Chanticleer, Taylor accumulated 262 yards and a touchdown on 18 catches, while also proving to be a weapon in the return game by averaging 14.1 and 13.5 YPR, respectively, on punt and kickoff return opportunities.

Flash forward to the present day, where Taylor is a senior and has found his home in Cardinal. Throughout his career, his mindset has proven to be stronger than any physical muscle that can be tested. A mindset Taylor refers to as "getting it out of the mud."

"Whatever I set my mind to or if there's something I want to chase, I go get it," Taylor said.

Every day, the Trojan football team is reminded of its reason to keep going, or its "why," before embarking on its journey. While each player's reason is different, there are core messages that connect each of their reasoning. As for Taylor and many of his teammates, it's deeper than themselves.

"We really didn't have someone make it far coming out from the area or just in our family in general," Taylor said. "Me doing the stuff that I'm doing, it's not me doing it. It's basically them doing it because that's what I do it for."

Football is a game of lessons for many, including Taylor. The journey is relatable to life in that there is something to learn from every win, just as there is from every loss. Taylor, like many other athletes, did not have a linear path to success but continued to put in the work.

"Everything that you're going through or that you want is not going to be as easy as you thought it would be or how people make it seem – you're going to have a different path," Taylor said.

Off the field, Tray Taylor is a reserved person who enjoys playing video games and spending time with his friends. In his free time, Taylor describes himself as an introvert with some common interests.

"I really like to be in nature or bowl when I have free time, or just be around guys I know," Taylor said.

In today's day and age, mental health is vital – especially for student-athletes. Under the pressure of performing at the Division I level come unpredictable challenges. Finding different ways to embrace those challenges is what creates the light at the end of the tunnel.

"My interests keep me grounded, even when life gets hard, I know what I can run to and what soothes my mind," Taylor said.

Post-graduation, the wideout aspires to continue his playing career. Taylor also has plans to pursue a career in photography as well as obtaining his CDL.

UNIVERSITY™

From its roots as a college to train educators for Alabama's public schools, Troy University has grown into a dynamic, international university with an emphasis on academic excellence, technological advancement, outreach and research.

At the heart of TROY's mission is a student-centered philosophy that harkens back to the University's 1887 founding motto: "Educate the mind to think, the body to act and the heart to feel." With an average student to teacher ratio of 19 to 1, students benefit from a setting where they are known not by a number but by name. That personalized attention helps to ensure that students are prepared with the skills and tools necessary to be successful in the global marketplace.

TROY's educational value and excellence has been recognized by national publications and websites such as Forbes magazine, U.S. News & World Report, Niche, and the Princeton Review among others. In 2024, TROY was named among the best colleges and universities in the Southern United States by the Princeton Review for the 20th consecutive year. TROY has also been consistently recognized for its service to the military by publications such as G.I. Jobs magazine, Military Times and Military Advanced Education.

Troy University's recognition as a "best value" university has been enhanced in recent years with major capital improvements, new academic programs and an emphasis on research and innovation.

In 2023, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved an instructional role change for TROY, designating the University as a doctoral institution and allowing for the addition of other doctoral degree options. In 2025, TROY has added a Ph.D. in Criminology and a concentration in Global Healthcare Leadership in the Global Leadership Ph.D. program. Those new options join the University's portfolio of doctoral degree programs that include the Doctor of Nursing Practice and the Ph.D. in Sport Management.

"This role change benefits not only Troy University, but the entire state," said Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., Chancellor. "We have shown that we can recruit, retain and graduate students at the doctoral level. Ultimately, this change in instructional role will benefit the state of Alabama and the Wiregrass in particular in terms of opportunities for potential students as well as employers in the area."

An increased focus on research opportunities for both faculty and students has been at the forefront of TROY's mission of academic excellence. In 2025, TROY was designated as a Carnegie Research University,



a new designation created to recognize research efforts at smaller institutions. To qualify as an RCU, an institution must spend at least \$2.5 million on research and development on average in a single year. TROY is among 218 institutions to receive the designation.

"Achieving Carnegie Research University status is a remarkable recognition of TROY's commitment to advancing research and development," said Dr. Kerry Palmer, Senior Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs. "This designation highlights the strides we've made in securing substantial funding for groundbreaking initiatives, positioning us alongside the nation's top research institutions."

In fall 2024, TROY cut the ribbon on the Center for Materials and Manufacturing Sciences, the University's building dedicated solely to research.

"This building reflects the future. I'm proud that Troy University stands on the threshold of this next level of growth," Dr. Hawkins said during the ribbon-cutting ceremony. "The next level of maturation occurs when you are fully engaged in the forming of solutions to major problems, and that's what this building represents. This building is not just a building—it is the future."

TROY also officially opened the new home to the College of Health Sciences in May, cutting the ribbon on Jones Hall. Named in honor of Billy Jones, a Troy University alumnus and president of Crowne Management, LLC, Jones Hall includes modern classrooms, collaborative spaces and lab space featuring cutting-edge technology.

In addition, TROY advanced its commitment to research and innovation in March as it launched the new College of Science and Engineering and a new degree program in electrical and electronics engineering. On March 14, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved the addition of the Bachelor of Science in Electrical and Electronics Engineering (BSEEE). This new program provides a cutting-edge curriculum that integrates theory, hands-on learning and industry-driven innovation.

The new College of Science and Engineering was part of a broader reorganization of the University's college structure. Programs that were previously part of the College of Arts and Sciences, including history, philosophy, anthropology, sociology, criminology, political science and the Army and Air Force ROTC programs, were reassigned to other colleges.

The College of Communication and Fine Arts was renamed the College of Arts and Humanities and

absorbed the Department of History and Philosophy. The College of Education became the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences and took on the Department of Anthropology, Sociology and Criminology, the Department of Political Science and both the Army and Air Force ROTC programs.

In 2025, the University also launched a business-first approach to artificial intelligence with the opening of the Sorrell College of Business Center for Artificial Intelligence Research and Education on TROY's Montgomery Campus. The Center seeks to equip business professionals, executives and organizations with the knowledge to evaluate AI opportunities, implement machine learning models and manage AI-driven transformation.

Research-based programs – including academic programs — will be available to Alabama business, industry and government organizations to meet the growing demand for AI expertise in executive leadership, workforce development and organizational management.

TROY also offers a vast exposure to the historical and cultural arts. On the Montgomery Campus, students, faculty and the general public can visit the Rosa Parks Museum, which celebrates the legacy of the late Civil Rights leader whose refusal to give up her seat on a city bus to a white male led to Montgomery Bus Boycott. On Dec. 1, 2025, the museum will celebrate its 25th anniversary.

On the Troy Campus, the Janice Hawkins Cultural Arts Parks, named for the University's First Lady, is home to an amphitheater, walking trails and a collection of outdoor sculpture, including 200 terracotta warriors by the late sculptor Huo Bao Zhu. The park is also home to the International Arts Center, which includes the Huo Bao Zhu Gallery, the Fred Nall Hollis Museum, and Warriors Unearthed, an interpretive center explaining the significance and design of the terracotta warrior exhibit. The center is also home to studio and classroom space for the University's Graphic Design program.

TROY's College of Arts and Humanities is home to degree programs in the performing and fine arts and provides more than 200 public performances and artistic presentations each year to an audience of more than 250,000 people.

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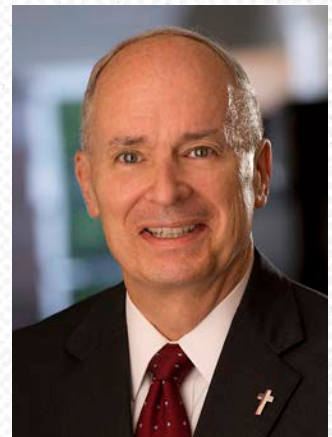
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DR. JACK HAWKINS, JR.

UNIVERSITY CHANCELLOR

36TH YEAR

UNIVERSITY OF MONTEVALLO, '67

Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., a native of Mobile, Alabama, was named Chancellor of Troy University Sept. 1, 1989. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Montevallo and his doctorate from the University of Alabama. Dr. Hawkins is the longest-serving chief executive officer of a public university in the United States.

Upon completion of his bachelor's degree in 1967, Hawkins was commissioned a lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and served as a platoon leader during the Vietnam War. For his combat duty, he received the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and a citation from the Korean Marine Corps.

Hawkins has overseen an era of change and growth at TROY, as he led the merger of the worldwide Troy State University System into the unified Troy University, an initiative called "One Great University." More than \$375 million has been invested in capital improvements by the Hawkins Administration, including new academic buildings on each of TROY's Alabama campuses. Chancellor Hawkins served as the catalyst for the University's evolution to an international institution, as TROY has attracted record numbers of students from other nations and established teaching sites around the world. During his tenure, academic standards for admission have been increased, new degree programs were established in all academic colleges, and intercollegiate athletics joined the highest level of NCAA competition.

Hawkins' professional background includes his service as an assistant dean at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (1971-1979) and as president of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind in Talladega (1979-1989).

In 1985, he was honored by the University of Montevallo as Distinguished Alumnus of the Year, and was the recipient of the 2003 All-American Football Foundation's "Top College President" Award. In 2005 he was inducted into the Hall of Fame of Murphy High School in Mobile, Alabama. In 2007 he was recognized as the "Alabama Citizen of the Year" by the Alabama Broadcasters Association. In 2011, Dr. Hawkins was recognized with the Chief Executive Leadership Award presented by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) and as the March of Dimes River Region Citizen of the Year. In 2012 he received the Distinguished Public Service Award from the Secretary

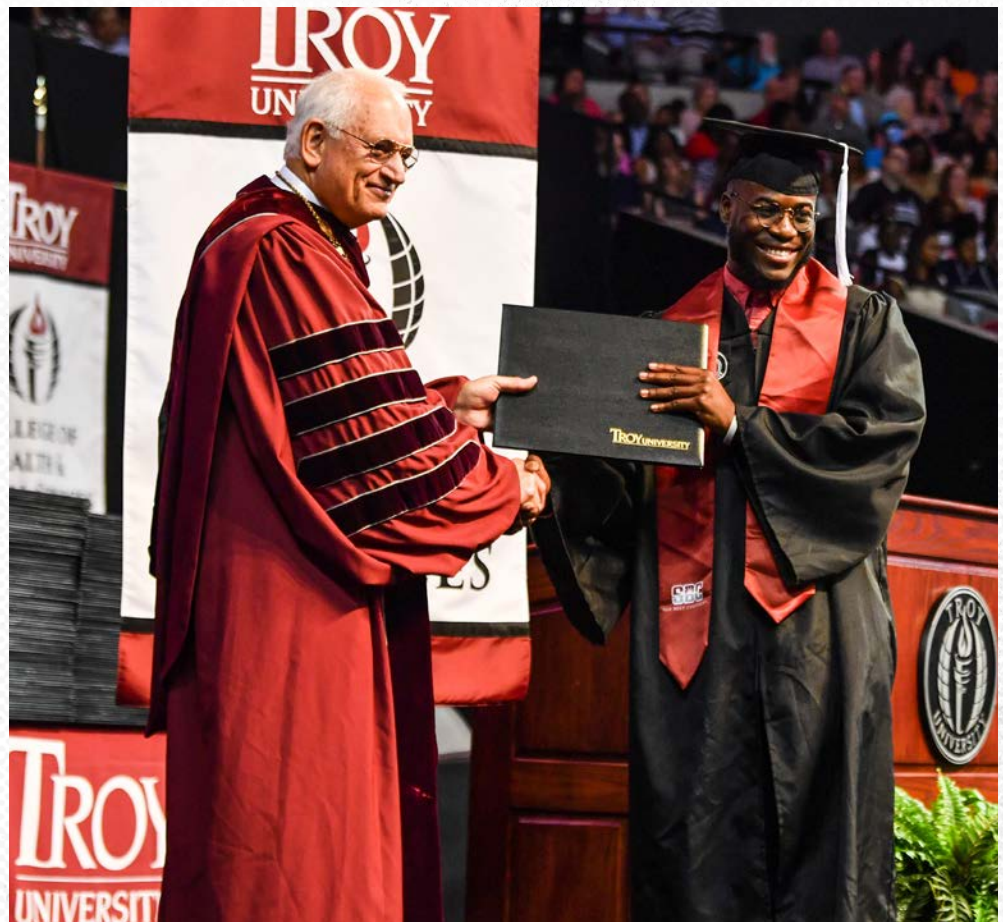
of the Air Force for his service on the Air University Board of Visitors from 2004-2012. In 2014 he was one of nine university presidents/chancellors worldwide—and the only one in North America—to receive the World Confucius Institute's Individual Performance Excellence Award. In October 2016 Dr. Hawkins was inducted into the Alabama Academy of Honor. In 2024, Dr. Hawkins was the recipient of the Armed Forces Merit Award, presented by the Football Writers Association of America.

Three buildings are named in his honor: the "Jack and Janice Hawkins Chapel" at the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the "Hawkins-Adams-Long Hall of Honor" and "Jack Hawkins, Jr. Hall" which serves the College of Education of Troy University. Hawkins was profiled as part of two books published in 2004: "Above and Beyond: Former Marines Conquer the Civilian World" by Rudy Socha and Carolyn Darrow and "The Entrepreneurial College President" by James L. Fisher and James V. Koch.

Hawkins serves on the board of directors of the Daniel Foundation, the Bennie Adkins Foundation, Business Council of Alabama, the American Village Trust, College Football Playoff Board of Managers,

and Troy Bank and Trust Company. He has served as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Disabled, Board of Visitors of Marine Corps University, Better Business Bureau of Central Alabama, and past President of the Sun Belt Conference. He has also served on the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), as Chairman of the Council of University Presidents in Alabama, as President of the Southland Football League, as chairman of the Air University Board of Visitors, as a trustee of Talladega College, the Helen Keller Eye Research Foundation, and the American Foundation for the Blind. He is a member of the Troy Rotary Club.

Dr. Hawkins is married to Janice Hawkins, and they have two daughters, Katie, a former officer in the USAF who is married to Air Force Col. Dan Beall; and Kelly, an attorney and member of the Troy University faculty who is married to Adam Godwin, a former professional baseball player and a member of the Troy University baseball staff. Dr. and Mrs. Hawkins are the proud grandparents of Noah and Ellyotte, who live in Maryland, and Micah Mae and Griffey Jack, who live in Troy.





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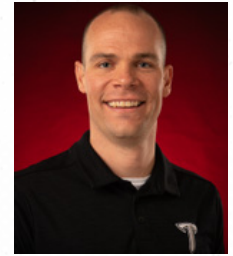
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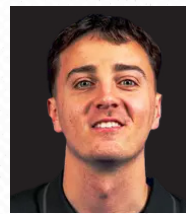
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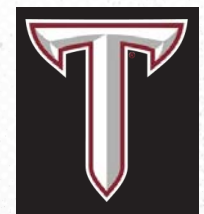

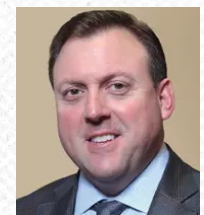
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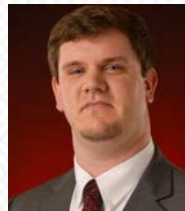
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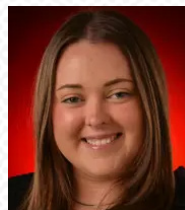
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HEAD COACH GERAD PARKER

Gerad Parker returns for his second season as Troy's head coach in 2025 following a run as one of the nation's top offensive coordinators, including the 2023 season at Notre Dame.

In his first season at Troy, the Trojans produced the first 1,000-yard rushing and receiving duo in more than a decade and just the third in program history as Damien Taylor rushed for 1,010 yards and Devonte Ross recorded 1,043 receiving yards; Troy's first since 2012.

Parker guided Troy to one of the best months of November in the country, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and ranked as the nation's 19th-best offense and 25th-best defense that month.

His first season saw him inherit one of the most inexperienced teams in the country and then the loss of his starting quarterback after just 11 quarters of play. Troy's 12 players in their final year of eligibility were the fewest in the country, while Troy's 46 scholarship newcomers ranked as the third most nationally.

Ross finished the regular season fifth nationally with 11 touchdown catches and 15th in receiving yards. Additionally, Troy was one of the most efficient teams in the country, ranking second in the red zone and fifth on third downs.

Ten Trojans landed on All-Sun Belt Teams, highlighted by Ross' inclusion thrice, as a first team receiver and all-purpose selection and as the return specialist on the second team. Eight of Troy's 10 All-SBC picks had remaining eligibility.

The Trojans landed the Sun Belt's top recruiting class in Dec. 2024, signing 15 players with an 83.54 average per industry leader On3.

Parker led a Notre Dame offense in 2023 that ranked eighth nationally, averaging 39.1 points per game, in addition to ranking 12th in passing efficiency and 29th in total offense. Audric Estime was one of the nation's

elite running backs, ranking third in rushing touchdowns (18), eighth in rushing yards per game (111.8) and ninth in rushing yards (1,341).

Behind Parker's offense, the Fighting Irish posted a 9-3 record against one of the nation's most challenging schedules, including four straight games against ranked opponents. Offensive tackle Joe Alt was a consensus All-America selection, while Estime was named to the Associated Press All-America Team.



Notre Dame's offense increased production across the board in Parker's lone season calling the plays in South Bend. The Irish improved their scoring by more than a touchdown per game, in addition to seeing increases in yards per game, passing yards per game, yards per play and red zone scoring.

In his first season at Notre Dame, Parker coached the Irish tight ends and helped guide Michael Mayer to a consensus All-America season, as Mayer finished his career as the most prolific pass catching end in school history. Mayer led the Irish with 67 catches for 809 yards and nine touchdowns in 2022, finishing his time at Notre Dame first on the program charts for tight end catches (180), receiving yards (2,099) and touchdowns (18).

Parker joined the Notre Dame staff following two seasons with former Troy head coach Neal Brown at West Virginia, where he was the offensive coordinator and receivers coach.

In his final season with the Mountaineers, WVU knocked off Texas and No. 15 Virginia Tech en route to an appearance in the Guaranteed Rate Bowl. In 2020, despite having to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic, West Virginia had one of the most improved offenses in the nation in terms of total yards, showing gains of more than 60 yards rushing per game, almost 30 yards passing a game, more than 90 yards of total offense and almost seven more points a game.

The offensive line had a productive year, with Leddie Brown rushing for 1,010 yards and nine touchdowns and Jarret Doege throwing for more than 2,500 yards and 14 touchdowns.

As Penn State's receivers coach and passing game coordinator in 2019, the Nittany Lions' offense averaged 35.8 points per game, ranking 15th nationally. Additionally, Penn State ranked 21st in red zone offense (90.4) and averaged 13.3 yards per completion, ranking No. 33 nationally.

Parker spent two years on the football staff at Duke (2017-18). During the 2018 season, his wide receivers accounted for 2,252 passing yards of the Blue Devils' 3,199 total offensive yards (70.4%).

He served his first year as the football operations assistant working with the offense in 2017. The Blue Devils offense had three All-ACC selections and, for the first time in program history, had three players with 500 or more rushing yards and a quarterback throw for more than 2,500 yards. Parker spent the spring as the running backs coach at Cincinnati before heading to Duke.

Prior to that, Parker spent four seasons at Purdue, where he coached the tight ends (2013-14) and wide receivers (2015-16). He was the recruiting coordinator and served as the interim head coach for the final six weeks of the 2016 season.

Parker spent two years as the wide receivers coach at Marshall (2011-12). The Thundering Herd led the nation in passing offense, averaging 365.1 yards per game. Receiver Tommy Shuler led the country and set the school record for receptions (110), ranking 18th nationally in yards per game (94.8).

Parker spent three seasons at UT-Martin as the running backs coach (2008), wide receivers coach (2009-10) and the passing game coordinator and recruiting coordinator (2010). He started his coaching career at Raceland High School in Raceland, Kentucky, and spent the 2007 season as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky.

Parker earned two degrees from Kentucky, his bachelor's degree in business management in 2003 and his master's in education in 2005. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Wildcats, where he was a Southeastern Conference Scholar Athlete Honor Roll selection (2002-03) and CoSIDA Academic All-District IV Second Team honoree (2004).

A native of Louisa, Kentucky, Parker played at Lawrence County High School and set state receiving records with 238 catches, 4,814 yards and 52 touchdowns.

He and his wife, Kandi, have three daughters, Kolbi, Gwyneth and Rosalyn, and a son, Oliver.

Trojan great Gary Banks begins his fifth season on the Troy staff in 2024 and fourth coaching the Trojan receivers after coaching the outside receivers in 2021. Banks won a pair of Sun Belt titles and played in two bowl games during his playing career for the Trojans before going on to a career in the NFL.

Troy has won a pair of Sun Belt championships during his four-year tenure, and four of his players have earned All-SBC honors. Banks has been tested during his Troy career having to replace the Trojans' leading receiver in three of his four seasons.

Under Banks' leadership, back-to-back Trojans have totaled at least 999 yards, with Jabre Barber hitting the mark in 2023 and Devote Ross becoming just the sixth Trojan to reach the 1,000-yard threshold when he did it in 2024.

Ross finished the regular season leading the Sun Belt and ranking fifth nationally with 11 touchdown reception; he finished the season with 76 catches for 1,043 yards, the sixth and fourth most in a season in Troy history, respectively.

Chris Boone begins his second season as Troy's outside linebackers coach in 2025 following a successful two-year run as defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Samford, where the Bulldogs won 17 games, the most by Samford in consecutive seasons since the 1991-92 campaigns.

Boone oversees both the Trojans' bandits and spear positions, which produced at a high level in his first season, led by Devin Lafayette, who was rated as Troy's top defender by Pro Football Focus. Lafayette earned All-Sun Belt honors in his first season with the program, while Phillip Lee and Jah-Mal Williams combined for 13 tackles for loss and six sacks from the bandit spot.

Lee, Williams and Lafayette all ranked among Troy's top four in coverage rating on the team, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and finished November as a top 25 defense nationally.

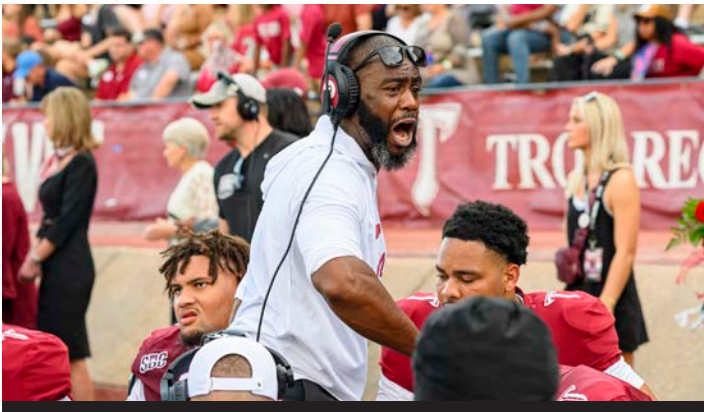

Re'quan Boyette returns for his second season as Troy's running backs coach in 2025 following two seasons at East Carolina and a 10-year career at Duke, where he was a two-time team captain as a player for the Blue Devils.

In his first season, Damien Taylor burst on to the scene as one of the nation's top running backs as he became the 11th player in program history (13th overall time) to reach the 1,000-yard mark. After rushing for 376 yards and two touchdowns in his career, Taylor finished as the Sun Belt's second-leading rusher with 1,010 yards and seven touchdowns in 2023.

Taylor ranked 12th in the country (min. 170 carries), averaging 3.99 yards after contact (third among G5 backs). Additionally, Gerald Green rushed for 545 yards and three touchdowns, as the pair combined to top the 100-yard mark seven times on the season.

Boyette coached the Pirates' outside receivers in 2022 and mentored a group that tallied 134 receptions for 1,689 yards (12.6 ypc) with 10 touchdowns before coaching ECU's running backs in 2023.

Boyette was named to the 2008 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team.

Nathan Burton returns Troy in 2025 for his second season as the Trojans' co-defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach.

In his inaugural campaign, Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss, which ranked third overall in the league, while Jordan Stringer added 7.5 from his weakside linebacker position.

The pair finished with identical tackle totals, to finish tied for 15th in the league and both earned All-Sun Belt honors. Jackson recorded 4.5 tackles for loss at South Alabama, 0.5 off the single-game record, and added four in the finale victory over Southern Miss.

Burton came to Troy with more than 16 years of coaching experience after spending last season at Kennesaw State, plus stops at Georgia Tech, Temple, NC State and Oklahoma State. Additionally, he has experience in the state coaching at West Alabama and began his career under head coach Chan Gailey, who won a National Championship at Troy, as a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech.

Former Troy offensive lineman Caleb Carbine returns to his alma mater for his second season coaching the Trojan offensive line in 2025.

Carbine had one of the most challenging coaching jobs in the country in his first season, as the Trojans deployed six different starting offensive line units over the team's first eight games of the season. Once able to field a stable unit, Carbine's offensive line gelled into one of the tops in the Group of Five.

The Trojans allowed just four sacks in November, the fewest in the Sun Belt, and the offensive line paved the way for Damien Taylor to rush for 1,010 yards, the 13th 1,000-yard season in program history.

Carbine's unit blocked for three different starting quarterbacks throughout the 2024 season and allowed for just the third 1,000-yard rushing/receiving combo in program history, as Devonte Ross joined Taylor in the 1,000-yard club.

Cooper has coordinator responsibility on his resume, serving as the defensive coordinator at Samford and Austin Peay, in addition to roles as co-defensive coordinator for three seasons at Charlotte and two seasons at Austin Peay.

At Samford, Cooper was promoted to defensive coordinator in January of 2025 season, following three seasons coaching the Bulldogs' linebackers.

The Bulldogs ranked fourth nationally in sacks, 10th in tackles for loss, ninth in first downs allowed and 11th in rushing defense during Cooper's final season in Birmingham.

In 2023 and 2024, linebacker Noah Martin landed All-American honors. Martin was also named first team All-SoCon both seasons and was a finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award, which goes to the top defensive player in all of FCS football; he was the first Bulldog since 2019 to record triple-digit tackles.

Cooper graduated from UT-Martin in 2007 with a bachelor's degree in health and human performance.

Justin Manning begins his second season as Troy's defensive line coach in 2025, following two seasons as the defensive coordinator at Tufts College and a four-year stint at Duke.

In his first season, the Trojans finished the season winning three of their final four games and ranked as a top 25 defense in November. The Trojans closed out his first season third in the Sun Belt, allowing just 143.3 rushing yards per game and led the league, allowing 122.5 rushing yards in league contests.

Manning's defense ranked 14th nationally in 2023, allowing just 250.8 yards per game, 13th yielding just 145.2 yards per game through the air and fifth in first down defense (137). The Jumbos allowed 19 or fewer points in 8-of-9 games during regulation; one game went into five overtimes.

Manning graduated from North Carolina Central in 2011 with a degree in business administration and was a four-year letterwinner as a fullback with the Eagles.

In his third different stint at Troy, Sean Reagan begins his second season as the Trojans' offensive coordinator in 2025, which will be his 12th overall season at Troy. Reagan returned to Troy for a third time in 2024 following a five-year run at West Virginia under former Troy head coach Neal Brown.

Reagan's first season running the Troy offense was historic as Devonte Ross set the program's single-game record for receiving yards after recording 229 yards in Troy's victory over Florida A&M.

Additionally, Ross became just the sixth player in program history, and first since 2012, to top the 1,000-yard receiving mark, while Damien Taylor recorded the program's 13th 1,000-yard rushing season. Kevin Reihner begins his first season at Troy coaching the tight ends and tackles following one year as the senior offensive analyst at Notre Dame and three seasons as the offensive line coach at Old Dominion.

Troy's tight end play was at an elite level in 2024 with the Trojans rolling as many as four on the field the majority of the season. The unit combined for 35 catches, 375 yards and six touchdowns. All six of the touchdowns from the tight end position came in Troy's final five games of the season.

Reihner's work with the offensive tackles helped the Trojans allow just four sacks in November, the fewest in the Sun Belt, and the offensive line paved the way for Damien Taylor to rush for 1,010 yards, the 13th 1,000-yard season in program history.

Reihner began his coaching career as the offensive quality control coach at Fordham, where he helped the Rams to an 8-3 record.

He earned his bachelor's degree in engineering management from Stanford, where he helped lead the Cardinal to a pair of Rose Bowl appearances and a Fiesta Bowl berth.

Dontae Wright begins his second season as Troy's defensive coordinator and safeties coach in 2025 following four seasons on Neal Brown's staff at West Virginia, where he coached the Mountaineers' safeties.

In his first season, the Trojans finished the season winning three of their final four games and ranked as a top 25 defense in November. The Trojans closed out his first season third in the Sun Belt, allowing just 143.3 rushing yards per game and led the league, allowing 122.5 rushing yards in league contests.

Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss in his first season with the program as Wright had to replace 10 starters on defense from the 2023 squad.

Additionally, the Trojans led the Sun Belt allowing just 32 third-down conversions during league play and allowed just 13 passing touchdowns all season, the second fewest in the league and 24th fewest nationally.

West Virginia was coming off its first nine-win season since 2016, highlighted by a victory over North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl, where West Virginia yielded just 10 points to a Tar Heel team that entered the game with the nation's seventh-best offense.

The Troy University Band Program enjoys nationwide recognition as one of the finest and most comprehensive musical organizations of its kind. Troy instrumentalists not only have the opportunity to participate in the renowned "Sound of the South" Marching Band, but also have the opportunity to perform in the Symphony Band, four concert bands, jazz Ensembles, the Basketball Pep Band and various small ensembles.

The 2025 - 2026 year marked the 60th Anniversary of The "Sound of the South" Marching Band. Dr. John M. Long created the band in its current form in the fall of 1965. The "Sound of the South" Marching Band entertains audiences regularly at all Troy home games and several away games. Recent away appearances include Troy University's bowl appearances at the Silicon Valley Classic in San Jose, Calif., the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., and appearances at the New Orleans Bowl in the Louisiana Superdome and the Cure Bowl in Orlando, Florida. In fact, over the past few years, the "South of the South" Marching Band has traveled tens of thousands of miles entertaining audiences literally from coast to coast.

Additionally, the "Sound" has been featured on all major broadcast and sports networks including ESPN, Fox Sports South and USA television networks. Other honors which the "Sound of the South" has received is the representation of the State of Alabama at the Inaugural Parades of President Richard Nixon (1969 and 1973), President Ronald Reagan (1985), and President George Bush (1989). The "Sound" has also performed halftime shows with Grammy Award-winning artists Brian McKnight, Lee Greenwood, The Temptations and Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member, Chubby Checker.

The "Sound of the South" Pep Band performs at all men's and women's basketball home games. Comprised of 30 musicians from all academic disciplines, the pep band entertains the home crowd with great music and irreverent, energetic cheering. This group travels with men's and women's basketball to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, as well as the NCAA Tournaments. Membership in the basketball pep band is by audition, and it performs from Mid-October to April each academic year. The "Sound of the South" is the largest student organization on campus and

its members have produced leaders in academics, student government, and athletics, as well as other areas of campus life.

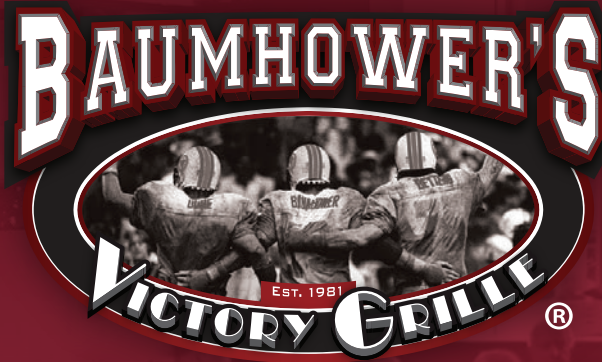

A veteran of the broadcast industry, McKnight served as the co-host of a sports talk radio show on WMSP-740 AM in Montgomery for 26 years. McKnight was selected as the 2011 recipient of the Sun Belt Conference Broadcaster of the Year award. He also works in television broadcasting, where he served as the primary play-by-play announcer for College Sports Southeast’s football, basketball and baseball coverage from 1997 until 2001. In the summer of 2025, McKnight was recognized as the Alabama Sportscaster of the Year.

Jerry Miller is entering his 33rd year with the Troy Sports Network and his 21st as the network’s color analyst. Miller spent his first 12 years providing interviews, insight and analysis from the sideline. A Troy alum and longtime supporter of the athletic program, he also serves as the color analyst for Trojan men’s basketball and baseball games. Miller is also a 2013 inductee into the Troy Baseball Hall of Fame.
