DID YOU KNOW?

- Troy is celebrating its 25th season as an FBS member in 2025 ... during its run at the highest level of college football, Troy has won eight conference titles and six bowl games
- Eight plays (out of 107) or 7.5 percent of the plays have accounted for 45.5 percent of the yards
- Troy has had a 1,000-yard rusher in three straight seasons; the Trojans are the only Sun Belt school with a current multi-year 1,000-yard rusher streak
- T.J. Thompson's interception return for a touchdown at Clemson was Troy's first defensive score against a P4 team since 2011 at Arkansas
- Troy is 25-0 since 2015 when rushing for 200plus yards in a game ... the Trojans are 53-2 since joining the Sun Belt in 2004
- Tae Meadows rushed for 186 yards and a touchdown on 23 carries in the opener ... it ranked as the 19th most yards in a game in program history and the third-most in a season opener in program history



EMERGENCY INFORMATION

If a situation arises which requires evacuation of Veterans Memorial Stadium, we request your cooperation and assistance to exit the facility in an orderly manner. Once an evacuation announcement has been given please proceed to the nearest stairway or exit. Outside the stadium follow the directions of the event staff and do not attempt to re-enter the stadium. In the case of an adverse weather situation please seek immediate shelter.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Food, drink containers, bottles, artificial noise makers, cans, thermo-bottles, ice bags, ice chests, umbrellas, strollers, video cameras, large flags, weapons or any object deemed HAZARDOUS by stadium management. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect patrons entering the stadium for the purpose of fan safety. All purses, backpacks or other bags must fit within the assigned seating area for each patron. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect all bags and to prohibit oversize bags from admission to the stadium.

PROHIBITED BEHAVIOR

Examples of prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, throwing of objects of any kind; demonstrating unruly behavior; attempting to enter the field of play; engaging in behavior that endangers the safety of student-athletes, coaches, officials or other guests; removing stadium turf; and/or taunting public service officials. Consequences for guests exhibiting prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, loss of ticket buying privileges, ejection from the stadium, and/or arrest.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Alcohol is sold within the venue. Only those who are of age and have proper identification are permitted to purchase alcohol. No outside alcohol is permitted. Beer will be available to purchase at five locations throughout Veterans Memorial Stadium (2 West Concourse, 2 North Plaza, 1 East Concourse).

Upon providing proper identification at the point of sale, a band will be placed on the customer's wrist, identifying that individual is of legal drinking age.


Customers are permitted to purchase no more than two beers at a time.





SPOKEN THROUGH ACTIONS

Patience isn't always the most common trait that you see in a college student-athlete. For most athletes, the sport demands urgency—plays are belted, movements are quick, and you have to be ready. However, for Troy defensive lineman Julian Peterson, patience has been the quiet foundation of his career.

Now a senior, Peterson has seen the slow climb from a redshirt year with no snaps in 2021 to becoming one of the Trojans' key faces on the defensive line. His story is not defined by instant success but by the calm, steady progress that comes from waiting his turn and doing things the right way.

"I guess just kind of being patient, really," Peterson said. "That's something my folks really taught me. You know, you have patience, good things come from it. I just kind of kept my head down, worked hard, just waited my turn."

That patience paid off. Last season, Peterson started the final seven games at defensive tackle and graded out as Troy's best run defender in the front seven, according to Pro Football Focus. He posted 25 tackles, 5.0 tackles for loss, and 2.5 sacks, making his presence felt in critical Sun Belt matchups against Louisiana, Coastal Carolina, and rival South Alabama.

Off the field, Peterson is categorized as a leadby-example kind of guy. He is not much for screaming and yelling. He simply just wants to put his nose down and grind to be the best version of himself for his team.

"I guess you could say I'm kind of a leader, but not much of a vocal guy," Peterson said. "I just lead by action and try to set a good example for everybody else."

That demeanor has deep roots. Growing up in Pinson Valley, Alabama, he redshirted his first year at Troy, barely saw the field as a freshman, and was primarily a special teams contributor as a sophomore. Many players would have looked elsewhere in an era of quick transfers and instant gratification. Peterson staved.

Part of that was comfort. Peterson describes how the program "felt like home" and was close enough for his parents to make the two-and-a-half-hour drive to games.

Another part was culture. The locker room—especially the group of guys on the defense that are referred to as the "Back Street"—gave him a sense of belonging. Plus, now Peterson's younger brother has joined the defensive squad as well.

"We kind of really almost like the same person," Peterson said with a laugh, referencing his younger brother, who is a Troy corner that shares an apartment with him. "He's just a smaller version of me."

That calm personality carries off the field, too. Peterson spends free time drawing, listening to music, or working on cars with his brother. He admits game days bring out a different side, though.

"I guess I'm always excited just to be on the field, just share the field with my guys," he said. "Saturdays are a chance to let loose and just be who I really am."

Peterson's evolution into a starter wasn't flashy, and the legacy that he wants to leave is quite simple.

"I just kind of want to be a good example for the younger guys,"
Peterson said. "Once we leave, the next group comes in. They need to see somebody in front of them showing how it's done."

In a sport built on intensity, Peterson is proof that patience and a calm demeanor can be powerful. He honestly just loves being at The Vet on Saturdays alongside his younger brother and teammates, who have become brothers as well.

THE JOB IS NEVER FINISHED

Senior tight end Ethan Conner opened the 2024 season with a strong performance, hauling in six catches for 50 yards against lowa on the national stage. Then an injury struck.

"I was feeling really good about the season last year, and I felt like I was healthy and ready to go," Conner said. "Then injuries struck, and I was just trying to stay as positive as I could while trying to rehab and get back on the field."

Conner worked his way back to play against Georgia Southern, recording three receptions for 47 yards. But it was just the latest in a string of setbacks for the Columbus, Miss., native.

"I was just like, 'man, another injury?" Conner said. "I feel like God has a timing for everything, but I couldn't believe there was another injury."

Despite the frustration, Conner credited his teammates and coaches for keeping him in the right headspace.

"The coaches and players did an amazing job of trying to keep me in the right headspace," Conner said. "We're big on family here, and being in a place where you feel like the family is behind you is very important and special."

Conner said the adversity has helped him grow as a leader.

"I try to stay positive for the guys around me and do anything to help them out," Conner said. "Whether that's going over a game plan or helping the young guys, I try to continue being a voice and a leader. I'm still here and I'm still involved as a part of this team."

Conner said he draws inspiration from both his family and the Troy program.

"Family is number one," Conner said.
"My parents, little brother and siblings have inspired me since I was little.
Going to work with the guys here and the coaching staff is huge. You don't have any choice but to want to get better."

After an offseason of steady work, Conner said his focus is still on improving.


"I feel like I've grown in areas I was weak in this offseason," he said. "I still have steps to keep taking and keep growing. The job's never finished. It's about looking at the small things and trying to see what I can build on."

Although Conner has NFL aspirations, he said his mindset is centered on this season.

"I want to go to the NFL, but right now I'm focusing on this season," Conner said. "I'm focusing on the guys in this locker room and this coaching staff, and I'll let God handle the rest. It's about taking it one day at a time."

Conner wasted no time making an impact in 2025, catching a touchdown in the Trojans' season-opening win over Nicholls.

"I'm really excited for my senior season," Conner said. "I feel really good and I'm ready to go."

MORE THAN A GAME

Devin Lafayette doesn't just play football, he plays with purpose. Beneath the helmet and shoulder pads is a story forged in adversity, resilience and a love that defied bloodlines.

From a childhood spent in the foster care system to the grueling road back from a devastating injury, Lafayette's journey is a testament to the power of perseverance and the people who stood by him when they didn't have to.

A Childhood Rewritten

Before he was an all-conference safety or a defensive leader at Troy, Lafayette was a kid searching for stability. He doesn't remember much about the early days—he was just a toddler when he and his older brother, Tyrone, were placed into foster care.

"My brother remembers more than I do," Lafayette said. "He's older, and I was around three years old."

Eventually, the two brothers were fostered by Sheila and Willie Bowden.

"I call them my auntie and uncle, but they're the ones who raised us," he says. "They took us in around 2009 and gave us everything we needed: structure, support, and love."

Devin was surrounded by a new family. The Bowden's children, Willie and Shanika, became like a brother and sister to him. It wasn't the life he was born into, but it was one that shaped him, built on firm guidance and unconditional support.

"As I've gotten older, I understand how much they really did for us," he said. "Taking in two boys that weren't theirs couldn't have been easy, but they raised us like we were their own. I'll always owe them for that."

Sports quickly became a significant part of Devin's identity. He tried basketball at first, but as his family lovingly pointed out, that wasn't quite his sport.

"I was a chunky little kid," he said. "Basketball didn't stick, but once I started football around age nine, everything changed."

By high school, Lafayette had found his calling. After a sophomore-year growth spurt, he blossomed into a dynamic defensive player. The college offers started rolling in. He began his career at Northern Illinois, where he made an immediate impact, earning All-MAC honors as a freshman. His future looked bright.

The Injury That Changed Everything

But then, it all came crashing down in a moment that would test his mental and physical strength like never before.

It was the first game of the 2021 season, on the road against Georgia Tech. Just before halftime, a routine play turned catastrophic.

"They ran some rub routes – drags across the middle – and I collided with my teammate," Lafayette said. "My momentum kept going, but my foot was planted. That's when it happened."

The result was a clean break in his lower leg. The pain was immediate and excruciating.

"I grabbed my leg and couldn't move it. When the trainers got there and lifted it, I could feel the bone shifting. I'll never forget that feeling."

He spent three days in Atlanta's Grady Memorial Hospital, undergoing surgery and learning to walk on crutches. But the physical pain was just the beginning. The mental toll was far worse.

"That was probably the hardest year of my life," he admits. "I went from being one of the top players to not even knowing if I'd play again. My backup came in and earned first team all-conference, that could've been me. All those thoughts, all that doubt ... it hits you hard."

Lafayette struggled academically that year. He battled through depression and identity loss. Without the game that had defined him, he found himself adrift.

But even then, he wasn't alone.

"I leaned a lot on my auntie. She was always there. I also had some really good teammates,

Nate Valcarcel, Daveren Rayner and Myles McGee. We lived together, and they helped me through it. They didn't let me fall too far."

A Second Chance at Troy

The road to recovery was long. Even after returning to the field the following season, Lafayette never quite felt like himself again. The physical reminders of his injury, particularly persistent knee pain and quad tendonitis, lingered

"I had surgery through the top of my quad, and they had to move my kneecap around," Lafayette said. "Even after a full year, I was still limping sometimes. I could play, but I wasn't the

By the time the 2023 season rolled around, Lafayette was finally healthy, not just in body, but in mind. He became a leader on Troy's defense, the player teammates turned to in high-pressure moments; he finished the season as Troy's highest-rated defensive player by Pro Football Focus.

"This year, I'm all about leadership," he said.
"How do I bring guys along? How do we
win together? I want us to win a Sun Belt
Championship. I want us to beat South Alabama.
I want to get our Belt back."

His goals are ambitious, but they're driven by something more profound than competition. Lafayette plays for the people who believed in him long before the national rankings and highlight reels.

"My why is my family," he said simply. "My auntie and uncle didn't have to take us in. They didn't have to love us like they did. But they did, and I'll always play for them."

Now 24 years old, Lafayette reflects on everything that's brought him to this point. The foster care system. The injury. The rehab. The doubts. The grind.

"It's been a journey, no doubt," he said. "But I know where I came from, and I know where I'm going."

FAITH... FAMILY... FOOTBALL

For senior offensive lineman Garner Langlo, football has always been more than a game. His journey has tested his faith, but with the support of his family, he has persevered.

"This is my first year here, but Troy's always kind of felt like home – this program accepted me with no problem," Langlo said.

Langlo began his collegiate career at Auburn, where Rivals and 247Sports ranked him as a top-50 interior lineman and top-100 prospect in Florida. He redshirted in 2021 and did not see game action in two seasons.

After stepping away from football for two years, Langlo worked a 9-to-5 job but felt something was missing. He returned to the game in April 2024 by entering the NCAA transfer portal.

"How am I going to tell someone not to quit one day when I walked away from that opportunity? So I put myself back in it," Langlo said. "It all ties back to doing it for my brother next to me."

Langlo transferred to Appalachian State, where he played in 10 games in 2024, logging snaps at three offensive line positions. He allowed just one sack in 273 pass-blocking snaps.

Seeking a final destination for his last year of eligibility, Langlo re-entered the transfer portal in December 2024. That search led him to Troy.

"I knew I wanted to stay in the Sun Belt, so why not play for the best team in the Sun Belt," Langlo said.

Langlo said his decision was guided by faith and family.

"I have the best support system back home – my mom and dad are ten toes down behind me," he said. "I'm very fortunate. Family's important, and they care about that here. This is a family program."

As for his motivation?

"Family, respect and my last name ... Langlo," he said. "I won't be known as 'that guy.' I want to be known as a dude."

When he's not on the field, Langlo enjoys hunting, fishing and spending time outdoors.

Now playing out his final year of eligibility, Langlo said post-graduation plans can wait. For now, his focus remains on football and finishing his college career strong.

IF AT FIRST YOU DON'T SUCCEED... TRY, TRY AGAIN

Adversity is something everyone deals with, but for AZ Williams, it's his faith that has helped him to overcome it.

Williams battled with two ACL tears, once in his final year of high school and again in his freshman year of college. Growing up in a religious family as the son of a pastor, he relies on Christ to overcome his challenges.

"My faith has made me into a completely different person," Williams said. "You just grow and grow and grow and then look back as time goes by, I see how much I've changed and didn't even realize it."

Playing football at Stanhope Elmore High School in Millbrook, Ala., Williams accounted for 41 tackles, four interceptions and three turnovers during his senior year. When he suffered his first ACL injury, it was his defensive coordinator and former Troy linebacker Hunter Adams who helped motivate him to keep going.

"He was always hyped and always positive, no matter the outcome," Williams said. "When we found out I tore my ACL, he hugged me and always made sure I knew the doors to the weight room and his office were open to me."

After finishing his time with the Mustangs, Williams attended UAB and did not play football his freshman year while battling another ACL injury. When he chose to come to the wiregrass to play for the Men of Troy, Adams was one of the first to congratulate him.

"When I enrolled at Troy, he got excited. Still to this day, when I see him, I go up and hug his neck." Williams said. "He's been one of the biggest positive influences for me."

Returning to football was not an easy decision, though. He would not have done it without the encouragement of his family.

"After my second injury, I was kind of giving up on myself. Williams said. "It was my grandmother who said, 'You don't want to live with regret, and if something is meant for you, then you'll find out. You just have to trust God to show you.' and I take that very seriously."

Now a senior, Williams is grateful for the support he has received from his teammates and coaches.

"When I first got here, I kept asking myself 'Do I still have it?', and just being around the guys in the locker room gave me confidence," Williams said. "I've made friends here for a lifetime. It's just the way football works. These guys will meet my kids one day. They're friends I'll have forever."

As his career has progressed, Williams has learned the importance of mental health and making sure to help his younger teammates through that.

"Football players go through a lot,"
Williams said. "Sometimes we try
to hold things in because it can feel
embarrassing to talk about what we're
going through. I try to be a guy people
can talk to about what they're feeling
or going through, both physically and
mentally."

Williams hopes to pursue a career in strength training and helping others better their performances in the weight room. Something that Williams originally was not a fan of himself.

"I was not a weight room type of guy, but when I got serious about it, I was able to get mentally right and focus more on the game," Williams said. "I think that's a good route for me."

The senior has not seen action in his first couple of years in the bandit position, but he continues to push himself to be the best he can be and help his teammates both on and off the field. He's continued to display to others the biggest thing that can help them succeed: faith.

From its roots as a college to train educators for Alabama's public schools, Troy University has grown into a dynamic, international university with an emphasis on academic excellence, technological advancement, outreach and research.

At the heart of TROY's mission is a student-centered philosophy that harkens back to the University's 1887 founding motto: "Educate the mind to think, the body to act and the heart to feel." With an average student to teacher ratio of 19 to 1, students benefit from a setting where they are known not by a number but by name. That personalized attention helps to ensure that students are prepared with the skills and tools necessary to be successful in the global marketplace.

TROY's educational value and excellence has been recognized by national publications and websites such as Forbes magazine, U.S. News & World Report, Niche, and the Princeton Review among others. In 2024, TROY was named among the best colleges and universities in the Southern United States by the Princeton Review for the 20th consecutive year. TROY has also been consistently recognized for its service to the military by publications such as G.I. Jobs magazine, Military Times and Military Advanced Education.

Troy University's recognition as a "best value" university has been enhanced in recent years with major capital improvements, new academic programs and an emphasis on research and innovation.

In 2023, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved an instructional role change for TROY, designating the University as a doctoral institution and allowing for the addition of other doctoral degree options. In 2025, TROY has added a Ph.D. in Criminology and a concentration in Global Healthcare Leadership in the Global Leadership Ph.D. program. Those new options join the University's portfolio of doctoral degree programs that include the Doctor of Nursing Practice and the Ph.D. in Sport Management.

"This role change benefits not only Troy University, but the entire state," said Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., Chancellor. "We have shown that we can recruit, retain and graduate students at the doctoral level. Ultimately, this change in instructional role will benefit the state of Alabama and the Wiregrass in particular in terms of opportunities for potential students as well as employers in the area."

An increased focus on research opportunities for both faculty and students has been at the forefront of TROY's mission of academic excellence. In 2025, TROY was designated as a Carnegie Research University,



a new designation created to recognize research efforts at smaller institutions. To qualify as an RCU, an institution must spend at least \$2.5 million on research and development on average in a single year. TROY is among 218 institutions to receive the designation.

"Achieving Carnegie Research University status is a remarkable recognition of TROY's commitment to advancing research and development," said Dr. Kerry Palmer, Senior Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs. "This designation highlights the strides we've made in securing substantial funding for groundbreaking initiatives, positioning us alongside the nation's top research institutions."

In fall 2024, TROY cut the ribbon on the Center for Materials and Manufacturing Sciences, the University's building dedicated solely to research.

"This building reflects the future. I'm proud that Troy University stands on the threshold of this next level of growth," Dr. Hawkins said during the ribbon-cutting ceremony. "The next level of maturation occurs when you are fully engaged in the forming of solutions to major problems, and that's what this building represents. This building is not just a building—it is the future."

TROY also officially opened the new home to the College of Health Sciences in May, cutting the ribbon on Jones Hall. Named in honor of Billy Jones, a Troy University alumnus and president of Crowne Management, LLC, Jones Hall includes modern classrooms, collaborative spaces and lab space featuring cutting-edge technology.

In addition, TROY advanced its commitment to research and innovation in March as it launched the new College of Science and Engineering and a new degree program in electrical and electronics engineering. On March 14, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved the addition of the Bachelor of Science in Electrical and Electronics Engineering (BSEEE). This new program provides a cutting-edge curriculum that integrates theory, hands-on learning and industry-driven innovation.

The new College of Science and Engineering was part of a broader reorganization of the University's college structure. Programs that were previously part of the College of Arts and Sciences, including history, philosophy, anthropology, sociology, criminology, political science and the Army and Air Force ROTC programs, were reassigned to other colleges.

The College of Communication and Fine Arts was renamed the College of Arts and Humanities and

absorbed the Department of History and Philosophy. The College of Education became the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences and took on the Department of Anthropology, Sociology and Criminology, the Department of Political Science and both the Army and Air Force ROTC programs.

In 2025, the University also launched a business-first approach to artificial intelligence with the opening of the Sorrell College of Business Center for Artificial Intelligence Research and Education on TROY's Montgomery Campus. The Center seeks to equip business professionals, executives and organizations with the knowledge to evaluate Al opportunities, implement machine learning models and manage Al-driven transformation.

Research-based programs – including academic programs — will be available to Alabama business, industry and government organizations to meet the growing demand for Al expertise in executive leadership, workforce development and organizational management.

TROY also offers a vast exposure to the historical and cultural arts. On the Montgomery Campus, students, faculty and the general public can visit the Rosa Parks Museum, which celebrates the legacy of the late Civil Rights leader whose refusal to give up her seat on a city bus to a white male led to Montgomery Bus Boycott. On Dec. 1, 2025, the museum will celebrate its 25th anniversary.

On the Troy Campus, the Janice Hawkins Cultural Arts Parks, named for the University's First Lady, is home to an amphitheater, walking trails and a collection of outdoor sculpture, including 200 terracotta warriors by the late sculptor Huo Bao Zhu. The park is also home to the International Arts Center, which includes the Huo Bao Zhu Gallery, the Fred Nall Hollis Museum, and Warriors Unearthed, an interpretive center explaining the significance and design of the terracotta warrior exhibit. The center is also home to studio and classroom space for the University's Graphic Design program.

TROY's College of Arts and Humanities is home to degree programs in the performing and fine arts and provides more than 200 public performances and artistic presentations each year to an audience of more than 250,000 people.

Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., a native of Mobile, Alabama, was named Chancellor of Troy University Sept. 1, 1989. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Montevallo and his doctorate from the University of Alabama. Dr. Hawkins is the longest-serving chief executive officer of a public university in the United States.

Upon completion of his bachelor's degree in 1967, Hawkins was commissioned a lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and served as a platoon leader during the Vietnam War. For his combat duty, he received the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and a citation from the Korean Marine Corps.

Hawkins has overseen an era of change and growth at TROY, as he led the merger of the worldwide Troy State University System into the unified Troy University, an initiative called "One Great University." More than \$375 million has been invested in capital improvements by the Hawkins Administration, including new academic buildings on each of TROY's Alabama campuses. Chancellor Hawkins served as the catalyst for the University's evolution to an international institution, as TROY has attracted record numbers of students from other nations and established teaching sites around the world. During his tenure, academic standards for admission have been increased, new degree programs were established in all academic colleges, and intercollegiate athletics joined the highest level of NCAA competition.

Hawkins' professional background includes his service as an assistant dean at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (1971-1979) and as president of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind in Talladega (1979-1989).

In 1985, he was honored by the University of Montevallo as Distinguished Alumnus of the Year, and was the recipient of the 2003 All-American Football Foundation's "Top College President" Award. In 2005 he was inducted into the Hall of Fame of Murphy High School in Mobile, Alabama. In 2007 he was recognized as the "Alabama Citizen of the Year" by the Alabama Broadcasters Association. In 2011, Dr. Hawkins was recognized with the Chief Executive Leadership Award presented by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) and as the March of Dimes River Region Citizen of the Year. In 2012 he received the Distinguished Public Service Award from the Secretary


of the Air Force for his service on the Air University Board of Visitors from 2004-2012. In 2014 he was one of nine university presidents/chancellors worldwide—and the only one in North America—to receive the World Confucius Institute's Individual Performance Excellence Award. In October 2016 Dr. Hawkins was inducted into the Alabama Academy of Honor. In 2024, Dr. Hawkins was the recipient of the Armed Forces Merit Award, presented by the Football Writers Association of America.

Three buildings are named in his honor: the "Jack and Janice Hawkins Chapel" at the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the "Hawkins-Adams-Long Hall of Honor" and "Jack Hawkins, Jr. Hall" which serves the College of Education of Troy University. Hawkins was profiled as part of two books published in 2004: "Above and Beyond: Former Marines Conquer the Civilian World" by Rudy Socha and Carolyn Darrow and "The Entrepreneurial College President" by James L. Fisher and James V. Koch.

Hawkins serves on the board of directors of the Daniel Foundation, the Bennie Adkins Foundation, Business Council of Alabama, the American Village Trust, College Football Playoff Board of Managers,

and Troy Bank and Trust Company. He has served as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Disabled, Board of Visitors of Marine Corps University, Better Business Bureau of Central Alabama, and past President of the Sun Belt Conference. He has also served on the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), as Chairman of the Council of University Presidents in Alabama, as President of the Southland Football League, as chairman of the Air University Board of Visitors, as a trustee of Talladega College, the Helen Keller Eye Research Foundation, and the American Foundation for the Blind. He is a member of the Troy Rotary Club.

Dr. Hawkins is married to Janice Hawkins, and they have two daughters, Katie, a former officer in the USAF who is married to Air Force Col. Dan Beall; and Kelly, an attorney and member of the Troy University faculty who is married to Adam Godwin, a former professional baseball player and a member of the Troy University baseball staff. Dr. and Mrs. Hawkins are the proud grandparents of Noah and Ellyotte, who live in Maryland, and Micah Mae and Griffey Jack, who live in Troy.

HEAD COACH GERAD PARKER

Gerad Parker returns for his second season as Troy's head coach in 2025 following a run as one of the nation's top offensive coordinators, including the 2023 season at Notre Dame.

In his first season at Troy, the Trojans produced the first 1,000-yard rushing and receiving duo in more than a decade and just the third in program history as Damien Taylor rushed for 1,010 yards and Devonte Ross recorded 1,043 receiving yards; Troy's first since 2012.

Parker guided Troy to one of the best months of November in the country, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and ranked as the nation's 19th-best offense and 25th-best defense that month.

His first season saw him inherit one of the most inexperienced teams in the country and then the loss of his starting quarterback after just 11 quarters of play. Troy's 12 players in their final year of eligibility were the fewest in the country, while Troy's 46 scholarship newcomers ranked as the third most nationally.

Ross finished the regular season fifth nationally with 11 touchdown catches and 15th in receiving yards. Additionally, Troy was one of the most efficient teams in the country, ranking second in the red zone and fifth on third downs.

Ten Trojans landed on All-Sun Belt Teams, highlighted by Ross' inclusion thrice, as a first team receiver and all-purpose selection and as the return specialist on the second team. Eight of Troy's 10 All-SBC picks had remaining eligibility.

The Trojans landed the Sun Belt's top recruiting class in Dec. 2024, signing 15 players with an 83.54 average per industry leader On3.

Parker led a Notre Dame offense in 2023 that ranked eighth nationally, averaging 39.1 points per game, in addition to ranking 12th in passing efficiency and 29th in total offense. Audric Estime was one of the nation's

elite running backs, ranking third in rushing touchdowns (18), eighth in rushing yards per game (111.8) and ninth in rushing yards (1,341).

Behind Parker's offense, the Fighting Irish posted a 9-3 record against one of the nation's most challenging schedules, including four straight games against ranked opponents. Offensive tackle Joe Alt was a consensus All-America selection, while Estime was named to the Associated Press All-America Team.



Notre Dame's offense increased production across the board in Parker's lone season calling the plays in South Bend. The Irish improved their scoring by more than a touchdown per game, in addition to seeing increases in yards per game, passing yards per game, yards per play and red zone scoring.

In his first season at Notre Dame, Parker coached the Irish tight ends and helped guide Michael Mayer to a consensus All-America season, as Mayer finished his career as the most prolific pass catching end in school history. Mayer led the Irish with 67 catches for 809 yards and nine touchdowns in 2022, finishing his time at Notre Dame first on the program charts for tight end catches (180), receiving yards (2,099) and touchdowns (18).

Parker joined the Notre Dame staff following two seasons with former Troy head coach Neal Brown at West Virginia, where he was the offensive coordinator and receivers coach.

In his final season with the Mountaineers, WVU knocked off Texas and No. 15 Virginia Tech en route to an appearance in the Guaranteed Rate Bowl. In 2020, despite having to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic, West Virginia had one of the most improved offenses in the nation in terms of total yards, showing

gains of more than 60 yards rushing per game, almost 30 yards passing a game, more than 90 yards of total offense and almost seven more points a game.

The offensive line had a productive year, with Leddie Brown rushing for 1,010 yards and nine touchdowns and Jarret Doege throwing for more than 2,500 yards and 14 touchdowns.

As Penn State's receivers coach and passing game coordinator in 2019, the Nittany Lions' offense averaged 35.8 points per game, ranking 15th nationally. Additionally, Penn State ranked 21st in red zone offense (90.4) and averaged 13.3 yards per completion, ranking No. 33 nationally.

Parker spent two years on the football staff at Duke (2017-18). During the 2018 season, his wide receivers accounted for 2,252 passing yards of the Blue Devils' 3,199 total offensive yards (70.4%).

He served his first year as the football operations assistant working with the offense in 2017. The Blue Devils offense had three All-ACC selections and, for the first time in program history, had three players with 500 or more rushing yards and a quarterback throw for more than 2,500 yards. Parker spent the spring as the running backs coach at Cincinnati before heading to Duke.

Prior to that, Parker spent four seasons at Purdue, where he coached the tight ends (2013-14) and wide receivers (2015-16). He was the recruiting coordinator and served as the interim head coach for the final six weeks of the 2016 season.

Parker spent two years as the wide receivers coach at Marshall (2011-12). The Thundering Herd led the nation in passing offense, averaging 365.1 yards per game. Receiver Tommy Shuler led the country and set the school record for receptions (110), ranking 18th nationally in yards per game (94.8).

Parker spent three seasons at UT-Martin as the running backs coach (2008), wide receivers coach (2009-10) and the passing game coordinator and recruiting coordinator (2010). He started his coaching career at Raceland High School in Raceland, Kentucky, and spent the 2007 season as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky.

Parker earned two degrees from Kentucky, his bachelor's degree in business management in 2003 and his master's in education in 2005. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Wildcats, where he was a Southeastern Conference Scholar Athlete Honor Roll selection (2002-03) and CoSIDA Academic All-District IV Second Team honoree (2004).

A native of Louisa, Kentucky, Parker played at Lawrence County High School and set state receiving records with 238 catches, 4,814 yards and 52 touchdowns.

He and his wife, Kandi, have three daughters, Kolbi, Gwyneth and Rosalyn, and a son, Oliver.

Trojan great Gary Banks begins his fifth season on the Troy staff in 2024 and fourth coaching the Trojan receivers after coaching the outside receivers in 2021. Banks won a pair of Sun Belt titles and played in two bowl games during his playing career for the Trojans before going on to a career in the NFL.

Troy has won a pair of Sun Belt championships during his fouryear tenure, and four of his players have earned All-SBC honors. Banks has been tested during his Troy career having to replace the Trojans' leading receiver in three of his four seasons.

Under Banks' leadership, back-to-back Trojans have totaled at least 999 yards, with Jabre Barber hitting the mark in 2023 and Devote Ross becoming just the sixth Trojan to reach the 1,000-yard threshold when he did it in 2024.

Ross finished the regular season leading the Sun Belt and ranking fifth nationally with 11 touchdown reception; he finished the season with 76 catches for 1,043 yards, the sixth and fourth most in a season in Troy history, respectively.

Chris Boone begins his second season as Troy's outside linebackers coach in 2025 following a successful two-year run as defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Samford, where the Bulldogs won 17 games, the most by Samford in consecutive seasons since the 1991-92 campaigns.

Boone oversees both the Trojans' bandits and spear positions, which produced at a high level in his first season, led by Devin Lafayette, who was rated as Troy's top defender by Pro Football Focus. Lafayette earned All-Sun Belt honors in his first season with the program, while Phillip Lee and Jah-Mal Williams combined for 13 tackles for loss and six sacks from the bandit spot.

Lee, Williams and Lafayette all ranked among Troy's top four in coverage rating on the team, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and finished November as a top 25 defense nationally.

Re'quan Boyette returns for his second season as Troy's running backs coach in 2025 following two seasons at East Carolina and a 10-year career at Duke, where he was a two-time team captain as a player for the Blue Devils.

In his first season, Damien Taylor burst on to the scene as one of the nation's top running backs as he became the 11th player in program history (13th overall time) to reach the 1,000-yard mark. After rushing for 376 yards and two touchdowns in his career, Taylor finished as the Sun Belt's second-leading rusher with 1,010 yards and seven touchdowns in 2023.

Taylor ranked 12th in the country (min. 170 carries), averaging 3.99 yards after contact (third among G5 backs). Additionally, Gerald Green rushed for 545 yards and three touchdowns, as the pair combined to top the 100-yard mark seven times on the season.

Boyette coached the Pirates' outside receivers in 2022 and mentored a group that tallied 134 receptions for 1,689 yards (12.6 ypc) with 10 touchdowns before coaching ECU's running backs in 2023.

Boyette was named to the 2008 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team.

The pair finished with identical tackle totals, to finish tied for 15th in the league and both earned All-Sun Belt honors. Jackson recorded 4.5 tackles for loss at South Alabama, 0.5 off the single-game record, and added four in the finale victory over Southern Miss.

Burton came to Troy with more than 16 years of coaching experience after spending last season at Kennesaw State, plus stops at Georgia Tech, Temple, NC State and Oklahoma State. Additionally, he has experience in the state coaching at West Alabama and began his career under head coach Chan Gailey, who won a National Championship at Troy, as a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech.

Once able to field a stable unit, Carbine's offensive line gelled into one of the tops in the Group of Five.

The Trojans allowed just four sacks in November, the fewest in the Sun Belt, and the offensive line paved the way for Damien Taylor to rush for 1,010 yards, the 13th 1,000-yard season in program history.

Carbine's unit blocked for three different starting quarterbacks throughout the 2024 season and allowed for just the third 1,000-yard rushing/receiving combo in program history, as Devonte Ross joined Taylor in the 1,000-yard club.

At Samford, Cooper was promoted to defensive coordinator in January of 2025 season, following three seasons coaching the Bulldogs' linebackers.

The Bulldogs ranked fourth nationally in sacks, 10th in tackles for loss, ninth in first downs allowed and 11th in rushing defense during Cooper's final season in Birmingham.

In 2023 and 2024, linebacker Noah Martin landed All-American honors. The Trojans closed out his first season third in the Sun Belt, allowing just 143.3 rushing yards per game and led the league, allowing 122.5 rushing yards in league contests.

Manning's defense ranked 14th nationally in 2023, allowing just 250.8 yards per game, 13th yielding just 145.2 yards per game through the air and fifth in first down defense (137). The Jumbos allowed 19 or fewer points in 8-of-9 games during regulation; one game went into five overtimes.

Manning graduated from North Carolina Central in 2011 with a degree in business administration and was a four-year letterwinner as a fullback with the Eagles.

Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss in his first season with the program as Wright had to replace 10 starters on defense from the 2023 squad.

Additionally, the Trojans led the Sun Belt allowing just 32 third-down conversions during league play and allowed just 13 passing touchdowns all season, the second fewest in the league and 24th fewest nationally.

West Virginia was coming off its first nine-win season since 2016, highlighted by a victory over North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl, where West Virginia yielded just 10 points to a Tar Heel team that entered the game with the nation's seventh-best offense.

The Troy University Band Program enjoys nationwide recognition as one of the finest and most comprehensive musical organizations of its kind.

Troy instrumentalists not only have the opportunity to participate in the renowned "Sound of the South" Marching Band, but also have the opportunity to perform in the Symphony Band, four concert bands, jazz Ensembles, the Basketball Pep Band and various small ensembles.

The 2025 - 2026 year marked the 60th Anniversary of The "Sound of the South" Marching Band. Dr. John M. Long created the band in its current form in the fall of 1965. The "Sound of the South" Marching Band entertains audiences regularly at all Troy home games and several away games. Recent away appearances include Troy University's bowl appearances at the Silicon Valley Classic in San Jose, Calif., the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., and appearances at the New Orleans Bowl in the Louisiana Superdome and the Cure Bowl in Orlando, Florida. In fact, over the past few years, the "South of the South" Marching Band has traveled tens of thousands of miles entertaining audiences literally from coast to coast.

Additionally, the "Sound" has been featured on all major broadcast and sports networks including ESPN, Fox Sports South and USA television networks. Other honors which the "Sound of the South" has received is the representation of the State of Alabama at the Inaugural Parades of President Richard Nixon (1969 and 1973), President Ronald Reagan (1985), and President George Bush (1989). The "Sound" has also performed halftime shows with Grammy Award-winning artists Brian McKnight, Lee Greenwood, The Temptations and Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member, Chubby Checker.

The "Sound of the South" Pep Band performs at all men's and women's basketball home games. Comprised of 30 musicians from all academic disciplines, the pep band entertains the home crowd with great music and irreverent, energetic cheering. This group travels with men's and women's basketball to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, as well as the NCAA Tournaments. Membership in the basketball pep band is by audition, and it performs from Mid-October to April each academic year.

The "Sound of the South" is the largest student organization on campus and


its members have produced leaders in academics, student government, and athletics, as well as other areas of campus life.






