THE SERIES WITH DELAWARE

Playing the Blue Hens twice before in Newark, UAlbany and Delaware each have one win in the all-time series. Delaware owns the most recent victory, topping the Great Danes, 38-7, on Sept. 27, 2008. On the other hand, UAlbany's 17-10 upset victory over the Blue Hens on Sept. 16, 2006 is considered one of the best wins in program history. UAlbany's Rashad Barksdale intercepted Super Bowl MVP Joe Flacco's pass in the end zone with 39 seconds left to save the victory in front of Delaware's crowd of 22,016.

THE COACH: Bob Ford ranks first among active NCAA Division I FCS coaches with 265 career victories and is also fourth on the all-time FCS chart. Ford, the architect of the UAlbany program, has led the Great Danes to a 256-163 record in his 41st varsity season. Under his direction, the Great Danes have moved from the club level in 1970 to its present NCAA Division I FCS status. At the team's media day on Aug. 13th, Ford announced that his 44th season at the helm in 2013 will

UALBANY QUICK HITS

- In 2012, UAlbany (9-2, 7-1) won its sixth NEC title (2002, 2003, 2007, 2008, 2011, 2012), sharing it with Wagner (9-4, 7-1). The Seahawks earned the automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.
- The Great Danes were ranked as high as No. 18 in the FCS Coaches Poll and No. 20 in the Sports Network Top-25 before falling out of both polls after losing to Wagner (11/3).
- UAlbany received votes in both the 2013 Preseason Sports Network Poll (13) and the FCS Coaches Poll (5).
- UAlbany tied the program's Division I record for wins in a season in 2012, and also won nine FCS games in a regular season for the first time.
- Nine Great Danes earned All-NEC honors, including six first-teamers – Kadeem Williams (1st team, OL) is the only one returning for this season.
- UAlbany shared the NEC title in its final two seasons in the league. In 2011, the Danes received their first NCAA FCS Playoff berth and advanced to the NCAAAs for the first time since 1977.
- In 14 seasons in the NEC, the Great Danes accrued a 78-24 record in league play.
- Moving to a brand new stadium in 2013 (Bob Ford Field), UAlbany closed a 43-year chapter at University Field. The Danes recorded a 135-67-1 mark on their home gridiron.
- Including 2012, the Great Danes have reached the eight-win plateau five times in the FCS era.
- Senior Ryan Kirchner finished his career as UAlbany's all-time leading receiver with 172 career catches.
- Tailback Drew Smith closed his career as the program's all-time leading point scorer (270), touchdown scorer (45), and tied for most rushing touchdowns scored (40). He signed a free agent contract with the Buffalo Bills following the season.
- UAlbany is in its 41st season of varsity football, owning a 256-164 record in the span.
- The Great Danes have registered seven consecutive winning seasons for the first time in the program's history (2006-12).
- Head Coach Bob Ford, who announced that he will retire following this season, ranks fourth among the FCS all-time leaders in career victories and is first among active NCAA Division I FCS coaches with 265 career victories. He is also the longest active tenured coach in all of college football.
- In 45 seasons as a head coach (41 at UAlbany, 4 at St. Lawrence) Bob Ford owns a 265-185-1 record.
- The Great Danes are in their inaugural season in the Colonial Athletic Association -- one of the strongest conferences in the FCS.

total of 214 passing yards and one touchdown. Tight end Brian Parker had a career day as Fiacchi's top receiver, recording eight receptions for 71-yards. Senior wide receiver Kevin Chillis was also a go-to option with six receptions, 22-receiving-yards and a touchdown catch. On the ground, Omar Osbourne carried the ball 17 times, netting 59 rushing yards. Defensively, the Great Danes were led by Christian Dorsey's eight tackles, while Alex Helmer and Michael Nicastro logged seven apiece.

SCOUTING THE BLUE HENS

2013 Record: 4-2, 1-1 CAA

Head Coach: Dave Brock (1st season at Delaware) (4-2/Same)

THE COACH: Dave Brock, a native of Moorestown, N.J. and a veteran of 22 collegiate seasons as an assistant coach, became just the fifth head coach of the Blue Hens since 1940 when he was hired in January 2013. Brock replaced K.C. Keeler, who led the Blue Hens for the last 11 seasons. Brock, 46, came to Delaware after serving one season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under coach Kyle Flood at Rutgers University. In 2012, Rutgers posted a 9-4 record, won a share of the Big East title, and advanced to the Russell Athletic Bowl. Prior to Rutgers, Brock coached at Boston College, Kansas State, North Carolina, Temple, Hofstra, Salisbury State, and Western Connecticut State.

DELAWARE OVERVIEW: The Delaware football program has produced six national championships, five national runner-up finishes, 20 NCAA Tournament appearances, 20 Lambert Cup trophies, three College Football Hall of Fame head coaches, and numerous All-Americans and National Football League players. This season, the Blue Hens own a 4-2 overall record and 1-1 mark in CAA play with wins over Jacksonville (51-35), Delaware State (42-21), Wagner (49-9), and CAA-foe James Madison (29-22), who ranked #14 at the time. Delaware's losses came to Navy (51-7) and their most recent opponent #23 Maine (62-28). Offensively, the Blue Hens are led by senior running back Andrew Pierce who has carried the ball 92 times and has totaled 404 rushing yards and three touchdowns. Junior quarterback Trent Hurley has been the most efficient starting quarterback in the CAA, completing 101-of-151 passes with 14 touchdown tosses. His top target, junior Michael Johnson has made 26 receptions for 519 yards and five touchdowns. Defensively, Patrick Callaway leads the team with 57 tackles, two interceptions, and one fumble recovery.

DELAWARE'S LAST TIME OUT: The Blue Hens will look to rebound from last week's 62-28 loss at No. 23 Maine. The Black Bears jumped out to a 27-8 lead after one quarter, tacked on 28 straight points to start the second half, and cruised to the victory as Delaware had its two-game win streak snapped. Leading Delaware, freshman Jalen Randolph ran for a career-high 137 yards and one touchdown and true freshman Wes Hills picked up 27 yards and scored on a three-yard burst late in the final stanza. In addition, All-American Andrew Pierce ran for 62 yards and became just the third player in UD history to reach 4,000 career yards. Quarterback Trent Hurley completed 11 of 23 passes for 120 yards with Rob Jones catching five passes for 67 yards and Michael Johnson catching three passes for 48 yards, including a 22-yard scoring pass from Hurley in the first quarter. Defensively for Delaware, linebacker Patrick Callaway posted a game-high 14 tackles and cornerback Jordan Thomas returned a blocked extra point attempt for a defensive two-point conversion in the first quarter -- the first in Delaware history.

be his last. More than 100 of Bob Ford's assistant coaches are currently working in the professional, college and high school ranks.

UALBANY OVERVIEW: After winning back-to-back championships in the Northeast Conference, the Great Danes are in their first season competing in the CAA. Through six weeks of competition, UAlbany owns a 1-5 record, overcoming Colgate 37-34 in week two for the lone victory of the season. Offensively, the Great Danes are led by junior quarterback Will Fiacchi (110-195-4) who has thrown five touchdowns with an average of 213.7 passing yards per game. Senior Kevin Chillis has served as Fiacchi's top receiver, making 30 catches for 329 yards and four touchdowns. On the ground, junior Omar Osbourne ranks third in the CAA and leads the squad with 137 carries and 658 rushing yards (109.7/game), while crossing the goal line six times this fall. Defensively, TJ Idowu and Christian Dorsey lead the team with 42 and 35 tackles, respectively.

LAST TIME OUT: In front of a sell-out crowd of 25,201 at Bridgeforth Stadium in Harrisonburg, Va., UAlbany fell 40-13 to the hosting James Madison University Dukes Saturday afternoon in CAA play. JMU improved to 4-2 overall and 1-1 in conference play, while the Great Danes dropped to 1-5 on the season and 0-2 in the CAA. On target all afternoon, junior quarterback Will Fiacchi completed 26-of-43 passes for a

TOP CROWDS

Until now, never before had the Great Danes played in front of 20,000+ fans multiple times in a single season, let alone in back-to-back weeks. In week six, UAlbany played in front of the largest audience in program history with a capacity crowd of 25,201 at James Madison (10/5/13). The week prior, Old Dominion's sold out venue of 20,118 marked the fifth-largest crowd in program history. UAlbany has a 1-4 record in games played with 20,000+ in attendance. The lone win came over Delaware on Sept. 16, 2006 (17-10).

THIRD QUARTER DOMINANCE

UAlbany's third quarter at James Madison served as a highlight for both the game as well as the season, as the Great Danes outscored the Dukes 10-0. In the quarter, UAlbany totaled 107 yards of offense, while holding the Dukes to 55. Using trickery, the Great Danes avoided a quick three-and-out in their first possession of the second half. With

4th-and-2, the Great Danes faked a punt and Kevin Chillis rushed seven yards for a first down. A pass interference call on third down gave UAlbany another first down on the JMU-30 before driving all the way to the two-yard line with five rushes by Omar Osbourne. Facing 4th-and-goal, the Danes went for it, but unfortunately Will Fiacchi's pass to Cole King was dropped in the back of the end zone with under 6:00 minutes remaining in the third. While the Danes didn't score on the play, the defense made quick work of JMU, forcing a three-and-out punt. UAlbany took over on the JMU-46 with 4:47 remaining in the third. Completing two 10+ yard passes to Brian Parker and a 16-yard pass to Jameel Gay, Fiacchi led the Great Danes to the seven-yard line. Two short rushes by Ryan Spelman led to Fiacchi's five-yard touchdown pass to Kevin Chillis. Chillis caught the ball at the one and stretched across the corner of the goal line. Going for two, Fiacchi found Chillis in the same location, making the score 26-11 with 2:05 left in the third. Momentum continued to stay on the side of the visitors. With JMU's drive starting on the 10, UAlbany's defense stepped up again, pushing the Dukes backward to the six-yard line on Tim Kologrivov and Michael Nicastro's shared tackle. On the next play, Kologrivov pressured Michael Birdsong in the end zone, and an intentional grounding penalty awarded UAlbany two points for the safety (26-13).

PARKER HAS CAREER OUTING

Junior tight end Brian Parker had the best performance of his career in last week's outing at James Madison. Parker made a career-high eight receptions for a total of 71 yards. The week prior, Parker also turned heads with a 55-yard touchdown reception at Old Dominion. Amidst a breakout year, Parker has totaled 14 receptions and 177 yards in five games after missing the clash at Duquesne. Entering this season, Parker had totaled just five catches for 151 yards in 19 games played from 2011-12.

FIACCHI NEARS 300 COMPLETIONS

Against Central Connecticut (9/21), Will Fiacchi became the sixth quarterback in program history to pass for over 3,000 career yards. Fiacchi (298-505-9, 15 TD) has currently thrown for 3,438 yards in just his second season as a starter, and ranks fourth all-time – just 126 yards away from third-place (Ryan Roeder – 3,564). He has also completed the third-most passes in program history with 298.

OSBOURNE COVERS GROUND

Junior running back Omar Osbourne has recorded four 100+ rushing yard performances in his career, including back-to-back games in 2013. Against Colgate, Osbourne totaled 256 yards on 35 carries, while totaling 119 yards with two touchdowns against CCSU. Averaging 109.7 rushing yards per game, Osbourne ranks third in the CAA.

OSBOURNE AMONG TOP SCORERS

With 98 points scored in his career, Omar Osbourne is now tied with Jaan Laap (1990-93) for 22nd all-time in the program's archives. This season, the Syracuse, N.Y. native has scored six rushing touchdowns.

MARTIN KICKS OFF A SOLID ROOKIE CAMPAIGN

Averaging 41.2 yards per punt in his rookie season, redshirt freshman Jonathan Martin ranks fifth in the CAA. Through six games, Martin has punted 29 times for a total of 1,196 yards, dropping seven inside the 20-yard line and one for a touchback. Martin has also booted three for over 50 yards, including a 73-yarder vs. CCSU that was downed at the 15. The booming kick ties for the sixth-longest punt in program history.

KING CLIMBS INTO TOP-10

With 86-career reception (1,392 yards), senior Cole King is tied for 9th all-time in UAlbany's archives. At Old Dominion, King had his best performance of the season with five receptions for a total of 73 yards. He is six receptions away from moving into eighth place.

CHILLIS BREAKS 1,000 RECEIVING YARDS

Senior wide receiver Kevin Chillis recorded his first career 100-yard receiving game against Duquesne in week one (8/31), making a career-high nine receptions, totaling 135 yards (T-15th all-time) and two

touchdowns. He then repeated the feat against Colgate (9/7), recording 115 receiving yards and a touchdown with five catches. With six receptions for 22 yards and a touchdown at James Madison (10/5), Chillis reached the 1,000-yard milestone, and became the 13th player in program history to do so. Ranking eighth in the CAA, Chillis is averaging 54.8 yards and 5.0 receptions per game.

LAPORTA VIES FOR CAMPBELL TROPHY

Eric LaPorta, a senior center for UAlbany, has been named a semifinalist for the prestigious William V. Campbell Trophy, announced by the National Football Foundation. LaPorta is one of 170 candidates vying for the award honoring the nation's top scholar-athlete. LaPorta, a native of Yorktown Heights, N.Y., is a three-year starter for the Great Danes and 2013 team captain. After beginning his career as a walk-on, LaPorta was named to the 2012 Capital One Academic All-District Football Team and helped UAlbany win back-to-back Northeast Conference titles. As a dual major in criminal justice and history, LaPorta graduated magna cum laude with a 3.57 cumulative grade point average and is currently enrolled in UAlbany's Master of Science In Secondary Education program for social studies with a 3.65 GPA. LaPorta is one of three athletes from the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) in the semifinalist stage.

OSBOURNE NAMED CAA OFFENSIVE POW

Junior running back Omar Osbourne was named the CAA Offensive Player of the Week on Sept. 9th for his performance in the team's victory over Colgate. Osbourne, a native of Syracuse, N.Y., finished with a career- and game-high 252 yards on the ground, including a pair of touchdowns, to lead the Great Danes to their second win in as many years over the Raiders. The junior, whose 252 yards on 35 carries marks the third-best rushing performance in program history, turned in his career-high rushing total in the first half alone as UAlbany moved to 1-1 on the season with Saturday's 37-34 win. Osbourne gave the Great Danes their first lead of the season (7-0) with a 5-yard touchdown rush on their opening drive. Out of the half-time break, Osbourne struck again, rushing for 15-yards into the end zone on a 4th-and-1 situation, stretching the lead to 30-14. After the Great Dane defense made the key play of the game, stopping a 4th-and-goal attempt on the 1-yard line, Osbourne led the Danes to a 99-yard scoring drive. He rushed four times in the possession, including a 36-yarder that set up another UAlbany touchdown, putting the game out of reach (37-27, 1:34 4th).

WEEK ONE SUMMARY – DUQUESNE

UAlbany comes off a season-opening 35-24 loss at Duquesne in which the Great Danes never held a lead. The Danes totaled 421 yards of offense, including a DI program-record 354 passing yards. Junior quarterback Will Fiacchi completed a program record 27-of-45 passes with one interception and two touchdown tosses to senior Kevin Chillis. Chillis logged a team-high nine receptions, while Presley Beauvais (41 yards) and Cole King (31 yards) each had four. On the ground, Omar Osbourne carried the ball 21 times for a total of 79 yards and one touchdown. Defensively, Alex Helmer's career-high 11 tackles, including eight unassisted, led the Danes. While UAlbany's kicking game was an area of concern coming into the contest, punter Jonathan Martin and kicker Tom O'Riordan served as a highlight. Martin punted four times, averaging 48.8 yards, including two over 50-yards and two that pinned the Dukes within the 20-yard line. Also making his debut donning purple and gold, O'Riordan was 1-for-1 for field goals and 3-for-3 for point-after attempts.

WEEK TWO -- COLGATE

Using Omar Osbourne's historic running performance and a few key defensive plays, UAlbany overcame the hosting Colgate University Raiders, 37-34, Saturday night at Andy Kerr Stadium. With the victory, the Great Danes improved to 1-1 on the season, while the Raiders fell to 0-2. The biggest defensive play of the contest came with 4:26 remaining in the ball game. Colgate faced fourth-and-goal on the one-yard line, trailing by three, 30-27, and chose to take a gamble. Going for it with a run play, the Great Danes' defensive line suffocated the attempt and gave UAlbany possession on a turnover of downs. The Danes then drove 99-yards down the gridiron on the back of Osbourne's four carries, including a 36-yarder, as well as Presley Beauvais' drive-capping 45-yard touchdown scamper. With Tom O'Riordan's point-after attempt sailing through the uprights, the Great Danes held a 37-27 lead with 1:34 remaining. While Colgate did answer with a touchdown of their own with 18 seconds remaining, UAlbany handled the on-sides kick with ease, securing their first win of the 2013 season. Topping his career-high in the first half alone, junior running back Omar Osbourne rushed for 252 yards with 35 carries, marking the third-best rushing performance in program history. Osbourne also crossed the goal line twice and totaled 260 all-purpose yards. Beauvais totaled 59 yards with six carries, while wildcat quarterback Jake Meek rushed the ball four times, totaling 27 yards. Senior wide receiver Kevin Chillis also racked up the yards, recording his second straight 100+ receiving game, connecting with Will Fiacchi five times for 112 yards and a touchdown. Fiacchi totaled

ABOUT UALBANY ATHLETICS

UAlbany's intercollegiate athletics program excels at the NCAA Division I level, producing competitive teams, successful coaches, and outstanding student-athletes recognized for their accomplishments both on the field and in the classroom. The University sponsors 19 varsity sports for men and women. Club sports, an intramural program, and recreational opportunities are also offered.

As a member of the America East Conference, 17 of the school's 19 varsity teams are eligible for conference championships and NCAA post-season competition. Women's golf is an associate member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, and football, a Division I FCS program, enters its first year as an associate member of the Colonial Athletic Association in 2013 after competing in the Northeast Conference for the past 14 seasons.

UAlbany has won 66 conference championships and produced 27 NCAA Tournament teams since moving to Division I. Celebrating the school's most successful year in Division I history in 2012-13, UAlbany won a record nine conference championships, while making four NCAA Tournament appearances. The Great Danes also won the America East Commissioner's Cup for the second time in school history, as field hockey, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's indoor track & field, women's indoor track & field, men's outdoor track & field, women's outdoor track & field, and men's lacrosse captured conference titles. Football also won its sixth NEC championship and had two players sign NFL Free Agent contracts.

180 passing yards, completing 13-of-24 attempts with just one interception. Defensively, junior Christian Dorsey finished with a career-high 12 tackles, including nine unassisted, as well as forced a fumble.

WEEK THREE- RHODE ISLAND

The Great Danes lost an overtime heartbreaker to Rhode Island last Saturday, 19-13, in front of a sold-out crowd in the inaugural game at Bob Ford Field and first CAA clash. After falling behind early, UAlbany scored 13 points in the third quarter, tying up the ballgame on Jake Meek's 17-yard run as time expired in the stanza. With a 1:35 remaining in the fourth, URI missed a field goal and the game went to overtime. The Rams scored a touchdown on their possession, but missed the extra point, giving the Great Danes a chance to steal the victory. However, URI recorded a sack on third-down and knocked down the fourth-down end zone pass, ending the game. Omar Osbourne led the team with 96 rushing yards and a touchdown on 22 carries. Jameel Gay record 96 receiving yards with seven receptions, while Will Fiacchi completed 17 of 36 passes with one interception. Defensively, Christian Dorsey led the squad with 14 tackles.

WEEK FOUR -- CCSU

Despite a touchdown lead heading into the fourth quarter, the University at Albany football team suffered its second straight home loss at Bob Ford Field Saturday night, as the visiting Central Connecticut State Blue Devils scored 10 unanswered points in the final stanza to steal a 20-17 victory. CCSU's Steven Calitri hit a 40-yard field goal with 17 seconds remaining after driving 61-yards down the gridiron, improving the Blue Devils' record to 1-3 on the season, while the Great Danes also fell to 1-3 overall. UAlbany tried to respond quickly in the closing seconds, throwing a 40-yard Hail Mary pass as time expired. Jameel Gay caught Will Fiacchi's toss but he was brought down at the 10-yard line, ending the game. Leading UAlbany's strong running attack, Omar Osbourne earned his second 100+ yard rushing game of the season, totaling 119 yards with two touchdowns. Also leading the Great Dane offense, Fiacchi finished with 140 passing yards on 12 completions in 21 attempts. Gay totaled 50 receiving yards on two catches. Defensively, Cody Greenhagen led the Great Danes with eight tackles, including one for a loss.

WEEK FIVE- OLD DOMINION

Taking on a Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) transition team for the first time in program history Saturday night at S.B. Ballard Stadium, UAlbany battled Old Dominion University in front of a sell-out crowd of 20,118. While the Great Danes scored a touchdown on their first drive of the game -- a 55-yard pass from Will Fiacchi to tight end Brian Parker -- the Monarchs responded with a controlling offensive surge, overcoming UAlbany 66-10. Led by the 2012 Walter Payton Award winner -- the FCS version of the Heisman Trophy -- junior quarterback Taylor Heinicke led the Monarchs with 365 passing yards and two touchdowns, completing 28-of-33 passes. In all, ODU totaled 614 yards of total offense and had 36 first downs. For the Great Danes, Fiacchi threw for 221 yards and a touchdown, as he completed 15-of-26 passes. Senior Cole King served as the top target, recording five catches for a total of 73 yards. On the ground, junior Omar Osbourne carried the ball 10 times, netting 49 yards, while freshman Andre Martin rushed 11 times for 27 total yards. UAlbany finished with 325 yards of total offense. Defensively, TJ Idowu and Michael Nicastro both broke double-digits, recording 12 and 10 tackles, respectively.

UAlbany AT A GLANCE

THE OFFENSE: While UAlbany lost eight all-conference players from 2012, there are plenty of strong pieces remaining, including a solid offensive contingent. Quarterback Will Fiacchi returns after an impressive redshirt sophomore campaign in 2012, starting all 11 games and accumulating 2,156 passing yards. The Great Danes have added depth at the quarterback position this fall with Guilderland native Ryan Smith, and wildcat quarterbacks Jake Meek and Ryan Spelman. Running back Omar Osbourne looks to fill the shoes of Drew Smith, who rewrote the UAlbany record book last season. While Smith often powered his way up the middle, Osbourne (2012: 503 yds-108 carries-5 TDs) is best at weaving his way through traffic with a good deal of acceleration. The Great Danes also have a number of experienced linemen protecting the pocket in Kadeem Williams, Eric LaPorta, and Adam Pasnik, as well as a deep selection of outstanding receivers down field -- Cole King, Kevin Chillis, and Jameel Gay. The Danes also look to tight end Brian Parker and fullbacks Pat O'Connor and Nic Ketter as other options for first downs.

THE DEFENSE: Defensively, UAlbany has had the task of replacing four solid linebackers in Chris Wilk, Dave Plungas, Jon Morgan, and Chris Bouchard. The Great Danes have looked to Christian Dorsey and Jake Dwyer to step up, while Alex Helmer (2012: 36 tackles, 1 sack) returns after playing a majority of the snaps at the outside linebacker position. Defensive end Andrew Smith (2012: 28 tackles) and defensive tackle Tim Kologrivov (2012: 24 tackles) serve as the group's veterans on the line, while seniors Tramaine Wilson (2012: 11 tackles, 3 interceptions) and Randall Extantus (2012: 40 tackles, 6 pbu) are a presence at the safety

and cornerback positions, respectively. In 2012, UAlbany's rushing defense ranked first in the NEC and 14th in the nation (117.91 yds/game), second in the league in scoring defense (22.73 pts/game), and third in total defense (340.45 yds/game).

THE SPECIALISTS: With the graduation of kicker Sean Kenny and punter Paul Layton, who is currently first on Temple's two-deep as a graduate student, the Great Danes have filled the void with fresh faces. Jonathan Martin, a redshirt freshman from Delmar, N.Y. has taken over punting duties and currently ranks fifth in the CAA, averaging 41.2 yards per punt, while redshirt sophomore Tom O'Riordan has won the place kicking starting spot.

TRIPLE THREAT

UAlbany and Towson are the only teams in the CAA to have a trio of players record a 300-yard passing performance, 200-yard rushing performance, and a 100-yard receiving performance this season. Quarterback Will Fiacchi totaled 346 yards at Duquesne (8/31), running back Omar Osbourne rushed for 252 yards at Colgate (9/7), and wide receiver Kevin Chillis received over 100-yards in both outings. In addition, Fiacchi and Osbourne also own the top single-game performances in the conference for passing and rushing, respectively.

THE ROLE OF THE UNDERDOG

In their first season in the CAA, the Great Danes embrace the role of the underdog. UAlbany, who had 35 scholarships as a member of the NEC, has moved up to 54 scholarships for the 2013 season. While it is more, it is still well under the 63 limit that a majority of the CAA programs are at. UAlbany looks to average 57 scholarships across the next two seasons in order to play an FBS opponent in 2015 and have that game count in the opposition's bowl eligibility.

NEARING 100 DIVISION I WINS

Since becoming a Division I FCS program in 1999, UAlbany owns a 98-63 overall record – just two victories away from the century mark.

FIACCHI'S RECORD-BREAKING OUTING

Junior quarterback Will Fiacchi's opening day performance at Duquesne (8/31) was one for the record book. His 27 completions and 45 passing attempts both broke UAlbany single-game program records, while his 346 passing yards ranks second all-time for a single game in program history. It also marked just the fourth 300+ passing game by a Great Dane quarterback and the first since Dan DiLella tossed 306 yards against Monmouth on Nov. 12, 2011. In just his second season as a starter, Fiacchi ranks fourth all-time on UAlbany's career passing yards list with 3,438 yards.

300 vs. 300

Marking just the second time in UAlbany program history, both starting quarterbacks totaled over 300 passing yards in the Great Danes' week one contest at Duquesne. Will Fiacchi (27-45-1) totaled 346 passing yards, while the Dukes' Dillon Buechel (21-28-0) finished with 309 yards. The only other time this has happened in the Great Dane archives was in UAlbany's 42-40 win over Southern Connecticut State on Nov. 15, 1997. Joe Savino (19-36-1) totaled a still standing program record 398 passing yards, while the Owls' Kevin Dickinson (20-40-0) threw for 366 yards.

FULL SEAWOLF CIRCLE

The UAlbany football program played its very first varsity game against rival Stony Brook on Sept. 22, 1973. With Coach Ford on the sideline, the Great Danes trounced the Seawolves, 69-6, at University Field, marking Ford's first of 255 varsity victories. Announcing his retirement following this season, Ford has an opportunity to make Stony Brook his last career-win. In addition, Ford's counterpart at SBU, Chuck Priore, was a three-time letterwinner at UAlbany (1982), and was also an assistant under Ford from 1983-86. UAlbany travels to take on the Seawolves in the 2013 season-finale on Nov. 23rd.

DANES PICKED 10TH IN CAA PRESEASON POLL

At the conference media day in Baltimore, the CAA announced the preseason all-conference teams and the predicted order of finish. The Great Danes were picked 10th in the preseason poll, while Villanova was chosen as the league's preseason favorite in a vote of the conference's 11 head coaches and communications personnel. UAlbany did not have anyone named to the preseason all-conference team.

1974 TEAM INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME

The 1974 UAlbany football team was inducted into the University at Albany Athletics Hall of Fame on Sept. 20th. Headed by Coach Ford, '74 team is the only squad in program history with an undefeated record, going 9-0. Current UAlbany linebackers coach Don Mion was a member of that team and set the record for tackles in a single game during that year. He recorded 24 tackles against Alfred on Sept. 28, 1974. The '74 team was inducted alongside two other athletes – Todd Cetnar (Basketball, 1996-2000) and Alissa Gibbs (Volleyball, 1999-2002).

CAPTAINS ANNOUNCED

The team elected junior Will Fiacchi and seniors Kadeem Williams, Eric LaPorta and Randall Exantus as captains for the 2013 season.

- Fiacchi, a native of Marcellus, N.Y., started all 11 games at quarterback in 2012 and set a record for completed passes in a regular season. Fiacchi completed 188-of-309 passes with just five interceptions, while connecting for 11 touchdowns. Fiacchi also threw for 2,156 yards, good for third all-time at UAlbany. In his first season in the pocket, Fiacchi averaged 196.0 passing yards per game with 127.96 pass efficiency.

- Williams, a 6-7, 310 pound offensive lineman from Jersey City is a two-time first-team All-Northeast Conference award winner as well as a 2012 College Sports Madness second-team All-America honoree. Last season, Williams helped UAlbany to the league's top-ranked scoring offense (34.1), and limited opponent sacks to just 1.45 per game, starting all 11 games at left tackle. He was also named a Preseason All-American by Phil Steele's College Football Preview this summer.

- Also a member of the o-line, LaPorta enters his third season as UAlbany's starting center and has excelled both academically and athletically for the Great Danes. After starting his career as a walk-on, the Yorktown Heights, N.Y. native was named to the 2012 Capital One Academic All-District Football Team and helped UAlbany win back-to-back Northeast Conference titles.

- Exantus, a cornerback from Greenlawn, N.Y., has been a consistent contributor and a vocal leader for the Danes throughout the past three seasons. Starting all 11 games, Exantus totaled 40 tackles and broke up six passes in 2012. He also played in all 12 games in 2011 and 10 in 2010.

FIACCHI'S FANTASTIC SEASON

First-year starting quarterback Will Fiacchi has surpassed all expectations last season, as he has completed more passes than any other quarterback in program history in a single regular season. Completing 188-of-309 passes with just five interceptions, Fiacchi ranks second all-time behind Dan Di Lella who set the record in 2011 with 196 com-

pletions (327 attempts). However, Di Lella had an extra game in the NCAA Tournament to set that record. In the regular season, Di Lella had 172 pass completion, a sum Fiacchi bested. Yardage wise, Fiacchi passed for 2,156 yards, ranking him third for a single season.

UALBANY FOOTBALL OFFICIALLY OPENS A NEW CHAPTER

Along with new addition Stony Brook, the Great Danes venture into the CAA for the 2013 season, joining current members Delaware, James Madison, Maine, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Richmond, Towson, Villanova, and William & Mary. UAlbany wrapped up a 14-year tenure in the Northeast Conference with six championships, including a share of the title in 2012. The Great Danes also boasted the best record the program has ever seen at the Division I FCS level, going 9-2 overall last year and also ranked as high as No. 18 in the FCS Coaches Poll and No. 20 in the Sports Network Top-25.

CAA HISTORY

In the past, UAlbany has had success over CAA members, having tallied a 7-5 all-time record entering the season. The Great Danes previously faced Delaware (1-1), Maine (4-2), Towson (2-1) and New Hampshire (0-1). The Great Danes' 17-10 upset at then-No. 11 Delaware on Sept. 16, 2006 marks one of the program's greatest wins. Last season, UAlbany also topped then-No. 23 Maine, 30-20, in Orono. UAlbany will have an opportunity to expand on its rivalry with Stony Brook this fall, having played the Seawolves 15 times in the past, accruing a record of 10-5 all-time.

WILLIAMS NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN BY PHIL STEELE

Senior Kadeem Williams was named a Preseason All-American by Phil Steele's College Football Preview. Williams, a 6-7, 310-pound offensive lineman was selected to the offense's third-team by the magazine. The Jersey City native is a two-time first-team All-Northeast Conference award winner as well as a 2012 College Sports Madness second-team All-America honoree. Last season, Williams helped UAlbany to the league's top-ranked scoring offense (34.1), and limited opponent sacks to just 1.45 per game, starting all 11 games at left tackle. Williams was also named to the Colonial Athletic Association's first team by Phil Steele's College Football Preview, while kickoff return specialist Kevin Chillis and defensive back Justinian Mason were named to the third team.

CHILLIS EARNS SPOT ON CFPA KICKOFF RETURNER AWARD WATCH LIST

College Football Performance Awards, the largest awards organization in D-I college football, recently announced its watch list for the 2013 CFPA Kickoff Returner Award and UAlbany's Kevin Chillis has earned a spot. In 2012, Chillis was a two-time Northeast Conference Special Teams Player of the Week, and ranked second on the team with 901 all-purpose yards and six touchdowns. As a junior, Chillis made 11 kickoff returns, averaging 27.5 yards per return, including a 79-yard touchdown scamper against Central Connecticut State.

MASON, WILSON NAMED TO CFPA DEFENSIVE BACK WATCH LIST

College Football Performance Awards also announced its watch list for the 2013 CFPA Defensive Back Award, and two UAlbany student-athletes earned spots on the list -- Justinian Mason and Traimaine Wilson. The preliminary watch list highlights 36 returning performers, vying for the top individual defensive back award in the Football Championship Subdivision. Mason, a senior from Mason, Ohio, started all 11 games at safety in 2012 and earned NEC Defensive Player of the Week honors once. He ranked fifth on the team with 46 tackles, including 35 solo, and picked off three passes, running them back for 99 yards and one touchdown. Unfortunately, Mason ruptured his Achilles tendon in a summer workout and will not play in the 2013 season. Wilson, a senior from Staten Island, N.Y., started nine games at safety and totaled three interceptions for 66 yards in 2012. He also made 11 tackles, helping the Great Danes win back-to-back Northeast Conference titles.

FIACCHI EARNS SPOT ON 2013 CFPA QUARTERBACK AWARD WATCH LIST

Announced this summer, UAlbany quarterback Will Fiacchi earned a spot on the 2013 CFPA FCS Quarterback Award Watch List. The preliminary watch list highlights thirty-two returning performers, vying for the top quarterback honor in the Football Championship Subdivision. In 2012, Fiacchi led UAlbany to a 9-2 overall record. He completed 188-of-309 passes for 2,156 yards. He contributed 11 passing touchdowns with only 5 interceptions, adding two touchdowns on the ground.

MORGAN, SMITH SIGN NFL FREE AGENT CONTRACTS

Shortly after the conclusion of the 2013 NFL Draft, UAlbany football players Jon Morgan and Drew Smith signed free agent contracts with the Detroit Lions and Buffalo Bills, respectively. Linebacker Jon Morgan, a two-time first-team All-NEC honoree, led UAlbany with 72 tackles, three interceptions, and two blocked kicks in UAlbany's 2012 NEC championship season. The Copiague, N.Y. native finished his career ranked eighth all-time at UAlbany with 265 career tackles. Tailback Drew Smith also boasted a historic collegiate career, finishing as UAlbany's all-time leader for touchdowns scored (45) and the co-leader for all-time rushing touchdowns (40). In four active seasons, Smith accrued 3,196 career rushing yards and 4,721 all-purpose yards, both good for second all-time. In 2012, the Schenectady, N.Y. native eclipsed the 1,000 rushing yards mark for the second time in his career and the 10th time in program history, rushing for 1,001 yards and 18 touchdowns, while totaling 1,280

AARON SMITH AND KEVIN ROSS JOIN COACHING STAFF

For the first time since 2010, the UAlbany football team has fresh faces on the coaching staff. Head Coach Bob Ford announced the additions of wide receivers coach Aaron Smith and tight ends coach Kevin Ross to the UAlbany program last April. Smith, a native of West Point, N.Y. and son of an Army colonel, brings seven years of collegiate coaching experience to UAlbany. He spent last season leading the wide receivers at Boston College and the five seasons prior as the receivers coach at Columbia University (2007-11). Smith also served as Columbia's recruiting coordinator in 2011. He started his coaching career at the United States Coast Guard Academy in 2006. Ross, a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, also comes with a military background. The son of former San Diego Chargers and Detroit Lions head coach Bobby Ross, Kevin served as Army's offensive coordinator for four seasons (2004-07) under his father's tutelage. Ross also spent time at Virginia, directing the running backs from 2000-03 and helped the Cavaliers to consecutive victories over West Virginia and Pittsburgh in the Continental Tire Bowl. Prior to accepting a position at Virginia, Ross spent two seasons overseeing wide receivers and assisting with special teams at The Citadel (1999-2000). The Lexington, Va. native also spent time working on the defensive side of the ball at Georgia Tech (1998) and Southwest Texas State University (1997).

DEFENSIVE ROLES SHIFT ON UALBANY FOOTBALL STAFF

Heading into a new chapter of UAlbany football in 2013, the Great Danes have announced a shifting of roles in the coaching staff. Mike Simpson will be stepping down from his position of defensive coordinator to focus on the development of the squad's young linebackers, while Drew Christ will move from the defensive backs coach to defensive coordinator for the upcoming season. Simpson, who enters his 28th season on UAlbany's football staff, has three decades of experience as a defensive coach. With two of those decades at the coordinator position, the Great Danes have won or shared six Northeast Conference championships (2002, 2003, 2007, 2008, 2011, 2012) and captured two Eastern Football Conference titles (1997, 1998) during his tenure. Christ, who is in his second tour as a member of Bob Ford's coaching staff, will enter his eighth season in UAlbany's program. The Bay Village, Ohio native is familiar with the defensive coordinator position, previously serving the role at the University of Rochester. Christ also spent three years as a secondary coach under Al Bagnoli at the University of Pennsylvania where the Quakers won Ivy League championships in 2002 and 2003 during his stay with the program.

FORMER GREAT DANES, SAMSON BROWN AND JIM O'NEIL, HIRED BY BUFFALO BILLS

Amidst the National Football League's coaching carousel, former UAlbany standout player and assistant coach Samson Brown as well as 2001 UAlbany assistant Jim O'Neil landed positions on the Buffalo Bills staff. Brown and O'Neil come most recently from the New York Jets organization under defensive coordinator Mike Pettine. With the hiring of new

Bills head coach Doug Marrone (formerly the head coach of Syracuse University) Buffalo announced Pettine as their new defensive coordinator on Jan. 10th. Consequently, Brown received the nod as the Bills' assistant defensive backs coach and O'Neil as the Bills' linebackers coach.

A NEW HOME

University Field had been the home of the Great Danes since Bob Ford started a club football team in 1970. In 43 seasons, UAlbany accrued a 135-67-1 record on the natural grass gridiron. With the move to the CAA, the Great Danes move to Bob Ford Field, a brand new 8,500-seat stadium with an artificial turf field, video board, and luxury suites. The Danes' old digs will become a state-of-the-art track and field venue that will be ready to host UAlbany meets next spring. UAlbany opened Bob Ford Field on Sept. 14th with a sold-out crowd of 8,500 fans and a Comcast SportsNet regional audience.

BUILT FORD TOUGH

UAlbany's Bob Ford is first among active NCAA Division I FCS coaches with 265 career victories. He is also fourth on the all-time FCS chart. Ford, the architect of the UAlbany program, has a 256-163 career record in his 41st varsity season. Under his direction, the Great Danes have moved from the club level in 1970 to its present NCAA Division I FCS status. More than 100 of Bob Ford's assistant coaches are currently working in the professional, college and high school ranks. Dave Campo, a former UAlbany graduate assistant in 1973, spent 23 years in the NFL, including 18 with the Dallas Cowboys. He is currently the assistant head coach at Kansas. Dave Clawson (Bowling Green) and Pete Lembo (Ball State) are in the Mid-American Conference. Ford assistants who are Division I FCS head coaches include Al Bagnoli (Penn), Kevin Calahan (Monmouth), Walt Hameline (Wagner) and Chuck Priore (Stony Brook).

CLOSE CALLS

Including week two's nail-biter at Colgate and week four's heartbreaking loss to CCSU, UAlbany has played in 12 games decided by three points or less since the start of the 2009 season. The Great Danes were in four games decided by three points or less in the 2009 season, three in 2010, two in 2011, one in 2012, and now two in 2013. Since 1999, UAlbany has a 10-16 record in FCS games decided by three points or less.

Ford, who has been UAlbany's only head coach since the program was reinstated after a 46-year absence, was appointed on April 27, 1970. Since then, he has compiled a 41-season varsity record of 256-163 as the Great Dane mentor, while his 265 career victories rank first among active NCAA

Division I college football head coaches. His UAlbany teams own a 98-63 mark as a Division I FCS program.

Announcing that he will retire at the end of the 2013 season, Ford (265-185-1) will carry the Great Danes through UAlbany's 41st varsity season, the program's first year in the Colonial Athletic Association, and the first season at Bob Ford Field -- UAlbany's brand new \$19 million stadium.

In 2012, the Great Danes closed a 14-season chapter as an associate member of the Northeast Conference, compiling a 78-24 record in the tenure. In their last season competing in the NEC, Ford piloted UAlbany to its sixth Northeast Conference title with a 9-2 overall record and 7-1 league mark. The Great Danes ranked as high as No. 18 in the FCS Coaches Poll and No. 20 in the Sports Network Top-25, and tied the program's Division I record for wins in a season. In addition, nine Great Danes earned All-NEC honors, including six first-teamers. Senior Ryan Kirchner finished his career as UAlbany's all-time leading receiver with 172 career catches, while tailback Drew Smith closed his career as the program's all-time leading point scorer (270), touchdown scorer (45), and tied for most rushing touchdowns scored (40).

During the 2011 season, Coach Ford recorded his 250th career victory with a 38-10 win over Northeast Conference rival Duquesne, and was named the Northeast Conference Coach of the Year for the fourth time. Ford led the program to its first NCAA FCS postseason appearance, its

first NCAA appearance in football since 1977, taking on Stony Brook in the first round of the FCS Playoffs. The Great Danes earned a share of their fifth Northeast Conference championship with 31-21 victory over Sacred Heart, and reached the eight-win plateau for the fourth time as a NCAA Division I FCS program. UAlbany placed eleven players on the 2011 All-Northeast Conference squad, led by defensive end Eddie Delaney, who was just the second UAlbany defensive lineman to be recognized on three occasions during a career.

The squad finished up the 2011 season ranked on two national polls, and was receiving votes in a third. The Great Danes were voted 23rd in the Football Championship Subdivision Coaches' Poll, and 21st in the Any Given Saturday FCS Poll. UAlbany was also receiving votes in the Sports Network Media Poll.

The Great Danes, who went 6-5 overall in 2010, established a school record with their fifth consecutive winning campaign. UAlbany posted a 7-4 record and finished second in the Northeast Conference standings the previous season. UAlbany also defeated No. 20 Maine, 20-16, the first victory over a national top-20 opponent since the 2006 season.

In 2008, The Great Danes put together their second consecutive championship season with a NEC crown and a victory over Jacksonville in the Gridiron Classic. Ford's squad became the first NEC program to win the Gridiron postseason game. UAlbany finished with a 9-3 record, the most victories in a Division I FCS campaign. Ford, who was voted NEC coach of the year for the third time, led UAlbany to an undefeated league season for the second straight year. Tailback David McCarty, the school's career rushing leader, and offensive tackle Raphael Nguti were both chosen as All-Americans.

UAlbany also won the NEC championship in 2007, when Ford was named the conference's top coach. The Great Danes made their fifth postseason appearance in team history when they played Dayton for the FCS mid-major national title in the Gridiron Classic. UAlbany posted an 8-4 record, including a perfect 6-0 mark against league opposition.

Ford, who was honored at the 69th annual Maxwell Awards for recording his 200th career win at UAlbany on Nov. 5, 2005, has produced 12 All-America players and 137 all-conference selections at the FCS level. Nguti became the fourth Great Dane to be selected to the AFCA FCS All-America first team in 2008, joining J.T. Herfurth (2000), Geir Gudmundsen (2004) and Colin Disch (2006).

In 2003, UAlbany shared its second consecutive Northeast Conference crown by finishing in a tie for first place in the conference standings with a 7-4 overall mark. The Great Danes were fourth among the FCS Division I leaders in rushing, while tailback Gary Jones was named to the Associated Press All-America Team for the second time in his career.

The Great Danes put together one of their most celebrated seasons in 2002 by winning the program's first-ever Northeast Conference title and capping the year with a 24-0 upset of previously unbeaten Duquesne in the ECAC Division I-AA Football Classic. Ford, who directed his team to

an 8-4 record, was named the NEC Coach of the Year. UAlbany placed 14 players on the all-conference squad.

Ford, who has served as president of the American Football Coaches Association, marched UAlbany to a 7-2 record in its inaugural campaign as a Division I-AA program in 1999. The Great Danes garnered seven wins in 2001, and finished among the conference's top teams for the third straight year.

As a Division II program, Ford led the Great Danes to their second consecutive Eastern Football Conference championship, an EFC Atlantic Division title, and a 10-1 record in 1998. He was named the conference's coach of the year for the second straight season. Ford also received the Gordon White-Herschel Nissenson Division II Coach of the Year Award by the Metropolitan New York Football Writers Association.

Ford coached his 1997 team to a school-record 11-1 mark and an EFC championship. For his efforts, he was named the Football Gazette Division II non-scholarship national Coach of the Year, and voted the top Region I coach by GTE and the American Football Coaches Association.

At one time, Ford was the youngest head football coach in the nation, when the 26-year-old took over the reins at St. Lawrence University in 1965. In his first season, he guided the Saints to an Independent Collegiate Athletic Conference (ICAC) title. He arrived in the Capital Region five years later to start the first gridiron squad at the University since 1924.

After three seasons at the club level, the program was upgraded to varsity status in 1973, and finished with a 7-2 record. One year later, the Great Danes completed the school's only undefeated season with a 9-0 mark.

Ford's 1977 team earned a NCAA Division III playoff berth. After a season-opening loss, the Great Danes rebounded with nine consecutive victories. UAlbany defeated Hampden-Sydney in a thrilling 51-45 contest to begin the postseason before losing to eventual national champion Widener in the semifinals.

In 1978, Coach Ford's mystique grew before a national audience on ABC television. His last-minute addition of a field goal kicker direct from the soccer team paid off in a



victory over third-ranked Ithaca. Dario Arango kicked a 45-yard field goal in the last two minutes to provide a 9-6 victory.

In 1985, the Great Danes rallied from a three-touchdown deficit for a 33-21 victory over Plymouth State and the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) North championship. The '85 team, which produced one of the greatest comebacks in Ford's coaching career, boasted offensive and defensive units which were nationally ranked, and supported by five Pizza Hut and one Associated Press All-America players.

UAlbany's football program is also known for the high standards required of its coaching staff. Ford's "coaching factory" has allowed many of his assistants to earn their master's degrees while working at the collegiate level. According to a recent review, more than 100 coaches, who have started their careers under Ford's tutelage, are currently employed with 60 different high schools, colleges, and professional teams from around the nation and the world.

A starting quarterback in his senior year at Springfield College in Massachusetts, Ford was given the "Greatest Desire to Improve" Award by the school's athletic department. He received an undergraduate degree in physical education from Springfield in 1959, and later would earn his doctorate from the College in the same discipline. He gained a master's degree from St. Lawrence in educational administration in 1960.

Ford's first coaching opportunity came as an assistant at St. Lawrence in the fall of 1959. He then moved to Albright College in Pennsylvania as an assistant for four seasons, where he coached the secondary and offensive backfield, and was part of a program which produced a 21-game winning streak.

At Albright College, Ford also coached the wrestling and golf teams. He returned to Springfield in 1964 as a secondary coach, and later was named defensive coordinator at his alma mater in 1969.

Beginning in 1977, Ford was UAlbany's director of athletics for five

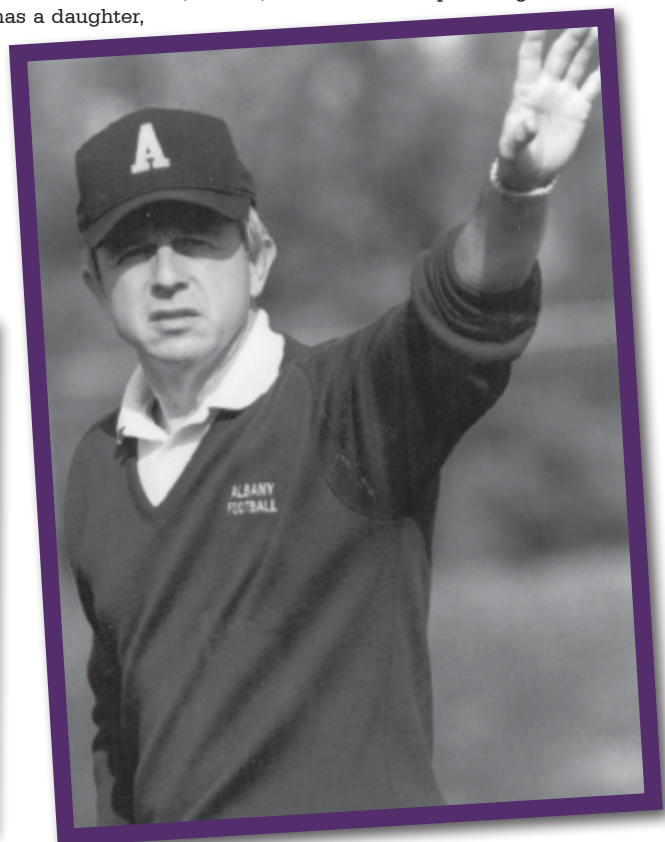
years. During that time, he managed a program which sponsored 25 varsity sports for men and women.

A 1986 inductee into the Wachusett Regional High School Hall of Fame and a 2012 inductee into the Springfield College Hall of Fame, Ford is presently active in the National Football Foundation & Hall of Fame, and serves as vice president of the NFFCHF's Capital District Chapter. He was honored by that organization in 2000 with its Service to Football Award.

Ford, 75, has been a member of the American Football Coaches Association's Board of Trustees since 1994, and presently is serving on the AFCA's Division I FCS All-America Team Selection Committee. Ford received the New York State Athletic Administrators Distinguished Service Award in 2005.

In August of 2010, Ford was recognized by the National Football Foundation Capital District Hall of Fame with its Service to Football Award. Ford was previously presented by the UAlbany Alumni Association with its Citizen of the University Award in 2007 which recognizes outstanding contributions to the University by a non-alumnus or alumna through leadership, service or a special gift.

Ford and his wife, Donna, reside in the Capital Region. He has a daughter,

PITTSBURGH - It was an uphill climb throughout Saturday afternoon's season-opener at Rooney Field for the University at Albany football team, as the Great Danes fell to Duquesne University, 35-24. UAlbany never led in the non-conference clash, falling to 0-1 on the season.

The Great Danes totaled 421 yards of offense, including 354 passing yards. Junior quarterback Will Fiacchi completed a program record 27-of-45 passes with one interception and two touchdown tosses to senior Kevin Chillis. Chillis logged a team-high nine receptions, while Presley Beauvais (41 yards) and Cole King (31 yards) each had four. Jameel Gay (64 yards) and Omar Osbourne (16) had three apiece.

On the ground, Osbourne carried the ball 21 times for a total of 79 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, Alex Helmer's career-high 11 tackles, including eight unassisted, led the Danes. Michael Nicastro also stood out with seven tackles, including 2.5 for a loss and 1.5 sacks, while Andrew Smith also had 1.5 sacks and two tackles for a loss.

While UAlbany's kicking game was an area of concern coming into the contest, punter Jonathan Martin and kicker Tom O'Riordan served as a highlight. Martin punted four times, averaging 48.8 yards, including two over 50-yards and two that pinned the Dukes within the 20-yard line. Also making his debut donning purple and gold, O'Riordan was 1-for-1 for field goals and 3-for-3 for point-after attempts.

With the Dukes winning the opening toss, the Great Danes set up to receive the 2013 season kickoff. The ball sailed into the end zone, and after a slight hesitation, Chillis carried the ball out, but was brought down at the 13-yard line. The Danes tried to rush it out of dangerous territory, but Duquesne's Aaron Reed and the defensive line suffocated the run, resulting in a safety with just 19 ticks off the clock.

With a 2-0 lead, the Dukes added a touchdown with 9:35 remaining in the first quarter, led by freshman quarterback Dillon Buechel. Buechel completed three consecutive passes, including an 81-yarder to Dave Thomas, putting the Dukes on the 2-yard line. Running back Ryan Ho took two attempts, but pushed his way across the goal line, giving Duquesne a 9-0 head start.

After each squad punted away, the Great Danes put together their first scoring drive of the season. UAlbany started its 10-play, 28-yard drive on the 50-yard line after forcing the Dukes to punt out of their end zone. The drive featured an eight-yard first down rush by quarterback Will Fiacchi, an 11-yard pass to Chillis, and a three-yard rush by Osbourne, setting up O'Riordan's 39-yard field goal with 2:09 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Dukes answered back with 3:45 left in the half, as Ho capped an eight-play, 74-yard drive with a 25-yard scamper into the end zone.

Trailing 16-3, the Great Danes cut the deficit to six with a successful hurried final drive in the closing 1:26 of the half. Starting on their own 33-yard line, Fiacchi connected an 11-yard pass to Chillis, a 21-yard pass to Cole King, and a drive-capping 35-yard touchdown pass back to Chillis, making the score 16-10 at the break.

Out of the locker rooms, the start of the second half belonged to the home team, as Duquesne marched down the gridiron with an opening nine-play, 78-yard drive. On the final play, Sean Brady made a spectacular one-handed catch at the goal line (27-yards), giving Duquesne a 23-10 lead with 11:03 to go in the third.

The Dukes quickly took possession of the football again after Sam Martello sacked Fiacchi and forced a fumble. One play later, Buechel threw a 29-yard touchdown pass to Gianni Carter, stretching the margin to 19 points, 29-10.

However, the Great Danes battled back immediately with a five-play drive, featuring a 28-yard scamper by Beauvais, and back-to-back completed passes to Chillis. The second was a 35-yard touchdown reception, making the score 29-17 with 7:56 remaining in the third quarter.

On their next drive, Duquesne settled with a 30-yard field goal with 4:35 to go in the quarter.

With time becoming a factor for the Great Danes in the final quarter, UAlbany cut the deficit to eight points, 32-24, with 6:33 remaining. The 10-play, 44-yard drive was capped by Osbourne's two-yard push across the goal line.

The Danes' defense stepped up to the challenge and forced the Dukes to punt with nearly 3:00 minutes remaining in the ball game. Taking over on the eight-yard line after a well-placed boot by Aaron Fleck, Osbourne rushed 12-yards for a first down. However, after three incomplete passes, the Great Danes' winning shot came down to 4th down. With a great deal of pressure coming from the line of scrimmage, Fiacchi's pass up the middle was picked off by Rich Piekarski and returned 25-yards to the 10-yard line.

With 1:04 on the clock, Duquesne clinched the victory with Crimmins' 22-yard field goal, making the final score, 35-24.

Buechel finished the game 21-for-28, totaling 309 passing yards and two touchdowns. Receivers Carter (103 yards) and Thomas (107 yards) both broke the 100-yard barrier to lead the Dukes, while Ho totaled 76 rushing yards and two touchdowns with 23 carries.

The Great Danes now have a 5-2 all-time record against the Dukes.

HAMILTON, N.Y. – Using Omar Osbourne's historic running performance and a few key defensive plays, the University at Albany football team overcame the hosting Colgate University Raiders, 37-34, Saturday night at Andy Kerr Stadium. With the victory, the Great Danes improve to 1-1 on the season, while the Raiders fall to 0-2.

The biggest defensive play of the game came with 4:26 remaining in the ball game. Colgate faced fourth-and-goal on the one-yard line, trailing by three, 30-27, and chose to take a gamble. Going for it with a run play, the Great Danes' defensive line suffocated the attempt and gave UAlbany possession on a turnover of downs.

The Danes then drove 99-yards down the gridiron on the back of Osbourne's four carries, including a 36-yarder, as well as Presley Beauvais' drive-capping 45-yard touchdown scamper. With Tom O'Riordan's point-after attempt sailing through the uprights, the Great Danes held a 37-27 lead with 1:34 remaining.

While Colgate did answer with a touchdown of their own with 18 seconds remaining, UAlbany handled the on-sides kick with ease, securing their first win of the 2013 season.

Topping his career-high in the first half alone, junior running back Omar Osbourne rushed for 252 yards with 35 carries, marking the third-best rushing performance in program history. Osbourne also crossed the goal line twice and totaled 260 all-purpose yards.

Beauvais totaled 59 yards with six carries, while wildcat quarterback Jake Meek rushed the ball four times, totaling 27 yards.

Senior wide receiver Kevin Chillis also racked up the yards, recording his second straight 100+ receiving game, connecting with Will Fiacchi five times for 112 yards and a touchdown.

Fiacchi totaled 180 passing yards, completing 13-of-24 attempts with just one interception.

Defensively, junior Christian Dorsey finished with a career-high 12 tackles, including nine unassisted, as well as forced a fumble. TJ Idowu and Cody Greenhagen both tallied seven tackles, while Clay Harris brought down six, and Alex Helmer tackled five, including a sack for a loss of nine yards.

After falling behind early in the season-opener at Duquesne a week ago, the Great Danes responded with a quick spark versus Colgate. On the very first play after kickoff, Tramaine Wilson picked off Gavin McCarney's pass, immediately putting momentum in the Danes' favor.

Four rushing plays later, UAlbany took its first lead of the season, 7-0, on Osbourne's five-yard touchdown rush and O'Riordan's kick.

On the next drive, Colgate marched 72 yards down the field on eight plays and looked to tie it up. However, McCarney tried to stretch the ball one-handed across the goal line, the ball knocked loose, and rolled out of the end zone, handing UAlbany possession with a touchback.

The Great Danes took advantage, using 13 plays to set up O'Riordan's 32-yard field goal for a 10-0 lead with 5:00 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The defending Patriot League champions responded with their first points of the game, capping an eight-play, 80-yard drive with John Wilkins' one-yard touchdown rush with 1:02 left in the opening stanza.

Holding a steady upper hand throughout the first half, UAlbany answered back with 14 straight points, sparked by the Great Dane defense. Dorsey stripped the ball from Wilkins and Kyle Jordan recovered. Wilkins was knocked out of the game with a knee injury on the play.

Again, UAlbany took full advantage of the Colgate miscue, as Fiacchi connected a 51-yard touchdown pass to Chillis with 8:29 to go in the half.

Forcing Colgate to punt, the Great Danes struck again on their next possession with the help of five Osbourne rushes and a 33-yard reception by Chillis. Beauvais capped the 92-yard drive with a five-yard touchdown run for a 24-7 lead with 2:44 on the clock in the second quarter.

After a defensive stop for the Raiders, Colgate made it a 10-point game, 24-14, heading into halftime as McCarney finished an eight-play, 67-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown pass to Nat Bellamy.

Out of the break, UAlbany struck again, as Osbourne rushed for 15-yards into the end zone on a fourth-and-1 situation, stretching the lead to 30-14 with 10:02 on the clock.

Still hanging around, Colgate answered with a touchdown of their own, as Jimmy DeCicco scampered 40-yards into the end zone with 3:23 left in the third quarter.

Becoming a real threat, the Raiders cut the deficit to three points after picking off Fiacchi's pass on the 16-yard line, and then rushed for another quick touchdown, making the score, 30-27 with 14:55 left in the game.

However, that is when the Danes' defense stepped up and held off the Raiders for the remainder of the way.

ALBANY, N.Y. -- Bob Ford Field opened its gates to a sellout crowd of 8,500 on the campus of the University at Albany on Saturday night. The stadium was buzzing with anticipation for the first game at the Great Danes' new home.

To the chagrin of their fans, the Great Danes could not get their coach a win to open the stadium that bears his name. UAlbany dropped a closely contested 19-13 game in overtime to the visiting Rhode Island Rams.

From the onset, the game was played close to the vest. It was an offensive struggle for both teams due to stout defensive play from both teams. The only scoring of the first half came off the right foot of Rhode Island kicker Dylan Smith, who knocked down a 45-yard field goal in the first quarter and a 36-yarder on the Rams' final drive of the first half. Quarterback Bob Bentsen was efficient in the half, going 12-for-20 with 121 yards passing.

For UAlbany, things did not come easy during the first half. They struggled to run or throw despite senior wide out Kevin Chillis electrifying the crowd with a 53-yard run. However, the drive stalled after a missed 40-yard field goal attempt.

Rhode Island went into the break with a 6-0 advantage and was poised to extend its lead. The Great Danes fumbled a punt on their own 17-yard line, leading to a short field for the Rams. Bentsen then took it in himself on a draw to give Rhode Island a 13-0 lead halfway through the third.

There was no quit in the Great Danes, who responded with a score of their own almost instantly with a seven play, 64-yard drive that resulted in a 10-yard touchdown run from last week's CAA Player of the Week, Omar Osbourne. The drive saw Fiacchi and the UAlbany offense move the ball downfield in a way not seen in the first half. The key play of the drive was a crucial 25-yard conversion to Jake Meek, who was lined up in the slot. It was the best throw of the night for Fiacchi, who sold the play action perfectly before delivering a strike on third down. The score was now 13-6 after senior defensive tackle Josh Moody would block the extra point for URI.

After forcing a three-and-out on defense, the Great Danes got the ball back and went back to work moving down the field. The highlight of the drive came on a do-or-die 4th and eight, which Fiacchi hit junior Cole King with another well thrown pass under pressure. The final play of the third quarter was the biggest offensive one. Meek took the snap, optioned to keep the ball, and took it into the end zone for a 17-yard touchdown that tied the game at 13 apiece. The drive was 10 plays, 77 yards and made it a brand new ballgame.

The tide seemed to be turning in UAlbany's favor as it stopped Rhode Island on a 4th and one and got the ball back. It looked at the time like it would be the most important play of the game. The combination of Fiacchi and Meek under center drove the Great Danes down the field and gave them a chance to take the lead. Unfortunately, Tom O'Riordan had his kick blocked. Once again, it was URI's Moody, who also forced a fumble in the game.

While it was a setback for UAlbany, the defense picked the Danes back up and got the ball back in the latter stages of the game. An interception from the Rams' Doug Martin gave Rhode Island great field position with under three minutes remaining. Fortunately for the Great Danes, kicker Dylan Smith missed a field goal, keeping the game tied and giving UAlbany another chance. Fiacchi threw up a Hail Mary in the closing seconds, but it fell short, sending the game into overtime.

Overtime began with a Rhode Island touchdown, one that would prove to be the game-winner. Justin Semmes took the ball in on a 1-yard carry before Smith missed an extra point, putting the Rams up by six. A holding penalty and a sack by the Rhode Island defense stalled another comeback attempt for the Great Danes, and UAlbany's first overtime game since 2011 ended with the first conference defeat of the year.

Junior linebacker Christian Dorsey led the defense, recording 14 tackles, including eight solo.

On offense, Meek displayed his versatility from playing slot receiver to taking snaps under center, one of which resulted in a touchdown. Coach Ford was sure to mention Meek's consistency after the game.

"I think he gives us a pretty good threat in the run game," Ford noted. "He's quick and can hit the holes."

Also on the offensive end, Fiacchi totaled 181 yards on 17 completions in 36 attempts, including 12-for-21 in the final two quarters. Osbourne finished the night with 96 rushing yards and a score.

"We had enough opportunities to win the game," Coach Ford said. "And we just didn't get it done."

ALBANY, N.Y. – Despite a touchdown lead heading into the fourth quarter, the University at Albany football team suffered its second straight home loss at Bob Ford Field Saturday night, as the visiting Central Connecticut State Blue Devils scored 10 unanswered points in the final stanza to steal a 20-17 victory.

CCSU's Steven Calitri hit a 40-yard field goal with 17 seconds remaining after driving 61-yards down the gridiron, improving the Blue Devils' record to 1-3 on the season, while the Great Danes also fell to 1-3 overall. UAlbany tried to respond quickly in the closing seconds, throwing a 40-yard Hail Mary pass as time expired. Jameel Gay caught Will Fiacchi's toss but he was brought down at the 10-yard line, ending the game.

Leading UAlbany's strong running attack, Omar Osbourne earned his second 100+ yard rushing game of the season, totaling 119 yards with two touchdowns. With 96 points scored in his career, Osbourne is now tied with Orin Griffin (1973-76) – a member of the 1974 team that was inducted into the University's Hall of Fame this week-end – for 23rd all-time in the program's archives. In a pregame ceremony, players from the 1974 squad served as honorary captains for the game.

Also leading the Great Dane offense, Fiacchi finished with 140 passing yards on 12 completions in 21 attempts. Gay totaled 50 receiving yards on two catches. Defensively, Cody Greenhagen led the Great Danes with eight tackles, including one for a loss.

UAlbany received the opening kickoff, getting a drive-opening six-yard run from Osbourne. The Great Danes went three-and-out and punted.

On CCSU's first drive, Rob Holloman converted a couple of third downs on a 13-yard catch and later a 13-yard run. Holloman kept rushing the ball up to the UAlbany six, but a combo block on second-down by Tom Bradley and Andrew Smith of Holloman and an Andrew Clements incomplection forced fourth down. Steven Calitri converted the 30-yard field goal to put the visitors up 3-0 with 8:31 left in the first quarter.

Despite punting on their next drive, UAlbany swung momentum back into their favor, as CCSU's Nick Bacarella fumbled the fair catch attempt, and Michael Nicastro recovered on the UAlbany-48. The Great Danes drove down the field, with Osbourne converting a fourth down with a four-yard run, facing 4th-and-1. The Danes rushed the ball to the 22, leading to Tom O'Riordan 39-yard field goal, tying the game at 3-3 in the closing seconds of the quarter.

Following kickoff, Aaron Berardino fumbled the ball in the backfield on the first play of the CCSU drive. Michael Smith fell on the ball in front of Berardino, giving UAlbany the ball at the CCSU 26.

After an opening three-yard gain, Jake Meek entered at quarterback and ran the ball twice in a row for a total of 14 yards. At 3rd-and-5 on the CCSU 7, Osbourne took over, powering his way into the end zone for the touchdown. O'Riordan's extra point gave UAlbany a 10-3 lead with 13:36 remaining in the second quarter.

However, CCSU responded in its next drive, converting three third-downs on a Clements 11-yard run, Holloman 13-yard reception and Denzell Jones 23-yard catch. Holloman's nine-yard reception put the Blue Devils on the one-yard line for a 4th-and-goal attempt. Clements completed a rollout pass to Tom Tarantino for the touchdown, tying the game at 10-10 after the extra point with 8:01 to go in the second quarter.

With rain starting to fall in the third quarter, UAlbany forced a three-and-out on CCSU's opening drive of the half, but were then forced to punt themselves.

The defensive battle continued, until the Great Danes used a 15-play, 78-yard drive to take a 17-10 advantage with 16 second remaining in the quarter. The Great Danes primarily used a ground attack with nine rushing plays. With 1st-and-goal on the five, Osbourne ran three times, getting to the one. On fourth down, Osbourne ran it again and converted for his second touchdown of the game to put UAlbany back in the lead. O'Riordan's extra point made it a seven-point game.

However, on the next drive CCSU tied it back up, as Hollman took the handoff and ran to his right, going 59 yards for the touchdown. Calitri's extra point made it 17-17 with 14:19 left in regulation.

After each side's next two drives were three-and-out, UAlbany had a chance to take the lead with under five minutes remaining. Osbourne took six rushes for a total of 24 yards on the drive as the team pushed to the seven-yard line. However, the field goal attempt sailed wide right, giving the ball to CCSU with 4:53 to go.

Holloman led the attack, combining for 41 yards on seven rushes and a nine-yard reception, as the Blue Devils got to the UAlbany-23. With 17 seconds left, Calitri kicked a 40-yard field goal to give CCSU a 20-17 lead.

Fiacchi tried to lead one last drive, finding Chillis for 15 yards to stop the clock at seven seconds. At midfield, Fiacchi heaved a Hail Mary pass down the near side, completing the heave to Jameel Gay for 40 yards as time expired, ending the game for a 20-17 CCSU win.

For the Blue Devils, Holloman finished with 205 total yards, including 145 on the ground. Clements passed for 140 yards, completing 13 passes in 22 attempts. Chuck Watson had 15 tackles on defense, including three for loss.

NORFOLK, Va. -- Taking on a Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) transition team for the first time in program history Saturday night at S.B. Ballard Stadium, the University at Albany football team battled Old Dominion University in front of a sell-out crowd of 20,118. While the Great Danes scored a touchdown on their first drive of the game, the Monarchs responded with a controlling offensive surge, overcoming UAlbany 66-10. With the victory, Old Dominion improved to 3-2 on the season, while UAlbany fell to 1-4 overall.

Led by the 2012 Walter Payton Award winner – the FCS version of the Heisman Trophy – junior quarterback Taylor Heinicke led the Monarchs with 365 passing yards and two touchdowns, completing 28-of-33 passes. In all, ODU totaled 614 yards of total offense and had 36 first downs.

For the Great Danes, Will Fiacchi threw for 221 yards and a touchdown, as he completed 15-of-26 passes. Senior Cole King served as the top target, recording five catches for a total of 73 yards. On the ground, junior Omar Osbourne carried the ball 10 times, netting 49 yards, while freshman Andre Martin rushed 11 times for 27 total yards. UAlbany finished with 325 yards of total offense.

Defensively, TJ Idowu and Michael Nicastro both broke double-digits, recording 12 and 10 tackles, respectively.

Entering the game with some of the top offensive numbers in the nation, Old Dominion quickly made a statement driving 66-yards in less than three minutes for a 7-0 head start. Heinicke connected an eight-yard pass to Larry Pinkard to cap the scoring drive.

The Great Danes hastily responded, tying the game, 7-7, with 8:59 remaining in the first quarter. After two third-down conversions, Fiacchi connected with tight end Brian Parker for a 55-yard touchdown reception. Catching the ball on the Great Danes' sideline, the 6-foot-4 Parker broke two tackles as he scampered over 30-yards after the grab.

However, ODU went on an offensive tear, converting five straight touchdown scoring drives leading up to halftime. Cam Boyd made it 14-7 with a two-yard rush with 6:35 remaining in the first.

As a result of some early trickery, UAlbany started its next drive with good field position after a failed ODU onside kick. However, the Great Danes' flea-flicker pass to Parker got batted skyward and into the hands of ODU's Fellonte Misher. The Monarchs then drove 67-yards on eight plays to take 21-7 advantage with 3:20 remaining in the opening quarter.

In the second stanza, ODU used only 51 ticks off the clock to find the end zone, as Heinicke capped the three-play drive with a 21-yard pass to Zach Pascal.

Looking to get back on the board, UAlbany kicked a 40-yard field goal, but the Monarchs got a hand on it and the missed attempt led to an eight-play 67-yard touchdown drive. Colby Goodwyn crossed the goal line with a five-yard rush, giving Old Dominion a 35-7 lead.

Old Dominion continued to keep momentum on its side, blocking UAlbany's punt at the 18 and recovered the pigskin at the 24-yard line. The Monarchs then used seven plays to punch in another touchdown at the four-minute mark. Heinicke's one-yard rush capped the drive, giving the Monarchs' a 42-7 halftime lead.

Out of the break, Goodwyn finished ODU's 92-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown rush.

However, the Great Danes responded with Tom O'Riordan's 36-yard field goal, making the score 49-10 with 3:09 remaining in the third quarter.

Slowing ODU's pace, UAlbany held the Monarchs to a 37-yard field goal of their own with 30 seconds on the clock, making the score 52-10 at the end of the stanza.

In the fourth, Old Dominion capped the contest with Gerard Johnson's two-yard touchdown run with 6:15 remaining, and David Washington's five-yard TD rush with 30 seconds left in the ballgame.

UAlbany was 7-for-15 on third-down conversions and were 0-for-2 on fourth-down. In the red zone, the Danes finished 1-for-3, while ODU was a perfect 9-for-9.

HARRISONBURG, Va. – In front of a sell-out crowd of 25,201 at Bridgeforth Stadium in Harrisonburg, Va., the University at Albany football team fell 40-13 to the hosting James Madison University Dukes Saturday afternoon in CAA play. JMU improved to 4-2 overall and 1-1 in conference play, while the Great Danes dropped to 1-5 on the season and 0-2 in the CAA.

On target all afternoon, junior quarterback Will Fiacchi completed 26-of-43 passes for a total of 214 passing yards and one touchdown. Tight end Brian Parker had a career day as Fiacchi's top receiver, recording eight receptions for 71-yards. Senior wide receiver Kevin Chillis was also a go-to option with six receptions, 22-receiving-yards and a touchdown catch.

On the ground, Omar Osbourne carried the ball 17 times, netting 59 rushing yards.

Defensively, the Great Danes were led by Christian Dorsey's eight tackles, while Alex Helmer and Michael Nicastro logged seven apiece.

As a team, UAlbany finished with 324 yards of total offense, while JMU recorded 460. Neither squad surrendered a fumble or interception.

After forcing the Great Danes to punt in their first possession, James Madison quickly put points on the board with a four-play, 78-yard drive. Tailback Khalid Abdullah took the handoff and rushed 38-yards into the end zone, breaking six tackles along the way to give JMU a 6-0 head start. With 11:18 on the clock in the first quarter, the Dukes went for two, but the run was stifled by the UAlbany defense.

The Great Danes immediately responded with a 10-play, 68-yard scoring drive. With third-and-seven Fiacchi found Cole King 40-yards down field along the visitor's sideline, giving UAlbany a first down on the JMU-21. Five snaps later, kicker Tom O'Riordan connected a 24-yard field goal, making the score 6-3 with 6:36 remaining in the opening quarter.

The hosting Dukes answered back with a touchdown on the next drive, using four plays to cover 78-yards in 1:10. JMU quarterback Michael Birdsong capped the drive with a 41-yard touchdown pass to Daniel Brown. However, the Dukes again missed the point-after, as the kick sailed wide right, making the score 12-3 with 5:26 left in the first quarter.

James Madison added another touchdown at the start of the second quarter, closing a 10-play, 67-yard drive with Dae-Quan Scott's three-yard rush across the goal line. With their first successful extra point, the Dukes held a 19-3 lead with 11:54 remaining in the second quarter.

Forcing UAlbany to punt, JMU took over on its own 36-yard line and drove down the gridiron with 10 plays. Birdsong zipped a pass to Brown in the back of the end zone with 6:06 left in the first half, giving the Duke a 26-3 advantage after the kick.

The Great Danes looked as though they were in line for their own successful scoring drive after a roughing the kicker penalty gave UAlbany a fresh opportunity at the UAlbany-45. The Danes drove to the 10, using an 11-yard flea flicker pass to Osbourne, a 10-yard pass to Parker, and a 10-yard scramble by Fiacchi. However, a holding penalty and a third-down sack for a loss of 10 forced a punt with just under two minutes remaining in the half.

While the Dukes were given another chance to score, the Great Dane defense displayed their best performance of the game, recording back-to-back sacks by Joe Fasano, Christian Dorsey, and Michael Nicastro. With the ball at the JMU-5, the Dukes punted out of the back of the end zone, giving UAlbany the ball with 30 seconds remaining. Fiacchi completed passes to Parker and Malachi Lawrence, but time ran out, sending the teams into the locker rooms with a 26-3 score on the board.

Out of the break, the UAlbany defense came up with a stop and set the tone for the rest of the third quarter. James Madison attempted a 44-yard field goal, but it wobbled wide left with 11:26 on the clock.

Using trickery, the Great Danes avoided a quick three-and-out in their first possession of the second half. With fourth-and-two, the Great Danes faked a punt and Chillis rushed seven yards for a first down. A pass interference call on third down gave UAlbany another first down on the JMU-30 before driving all the way to the two-yard line with five rushes by Osbourne. Facing fourth-and-goal, the Danes went for it, but unfortunately Fiacchi's pass to Cole King was dropped in the back of the end zone with under 6:00 minutes remaining in the third.

While the Danes didn't score on the play, the defense made quick work of JMU, forcing a three-and-out punt. UAlbany took over on the JMU-46 with 4:47 remaining in the third. Completing two 10+ yard passes to Parker and a 16-yard pass to Jameel Gay, Fiacchi led the Great Danes to the seven-yard line. Two short rushes by Ryan Spelman led to Fiacchi's five-yard touchdown pass to Chillis. Chillis caught the ball at the one and stretched across the corner of the goal line. Going for two, Fiacchi found Chillis in the same location, making the score 26-11 with 2:05 left in the third.

Momentum continued to stay on the side of the visitors. With JMU's drive starting on the 10, UAlbany's defense stepped up again, pushing the Dukes backward to the six-yard line on Kologrivov and Nicastro's shared tackle. On the next play, Kologrivov pressured Birdsong in the end zone, and an intentional grounding penalty awarded UAlbany two points for the safety.

UAlbany trailed 26-13 heading into the fourth quarter. However, James Madison scored two unanswered touchdowns in the final stanza to make the final 40-13 score. With 11:48 on the clock, Scott rushed one yard, capping a 10-play 86-yard drive. Lastly, with 2:10 remaining, Brown caught a two-yard pass from Birdsong after driving 55 yards down the field for the final points of the game.
