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AGGIE FIELD - HOME OF UC DAVIS SOCCER

One of the finest playing surfaces in Northern California, Aggie Field has been the home to the UC Davis men's and women's soccer teams since 1985, and the Aggie women's lacrosse team since 1997. Built with primarily volunteer time materials, Aggie Field is a product of the community's dedication to the sport of soccer.

The stadium bleachers, which have a capacity of 1,200 spectators, are the result of a 10-year project that reached completion in 1997. There are 65 nameplates affixed to the seat backs to recognize major stadium contributors. Additionally, an electronic scoreboard and high-fidelity sound system has been added to the facility.

Furthermore, new restrooms and concessions were added to the baseball/soccer complex during the 2001-02 year. In the summer of 2005, the field was resurfaced with a Bermuda hybrid and a new irrigation system was installed. Mark Lucas, who had previously worked at Cal, returned to UC Davis to supervise this project.

Aggie Field was among those facilities invited to submit invitations to become practice facilities for the 1994 World Cup.

2005 SEASON PREVIEW

Start with a collegiate soccer program that graduated six senior starters, including the school's all-time leading scorer. Throw in a schedule that opens with three members of the Pacific-10 Conference, and a league slate that features a participant from last season's NCAA College Cup title game. Then add to this the notion that almost half of the 27 student-athletes on the roster are either true freshmen or redshirt freshmen.

While this sounds more like a scenario that Twilight Zone narrator Rod Serling would have "submitted for approval", it is the very situation that UC Davis head men's soccer coach Dwayne Shaffer faces as he approaches the start of the 2005 season. Yet Shaffer, now in his ninth year at the Aggie helm, could not be more confident that his program is ready to take two big steps forward.

In 2004, the university's second year of its four-year reclassification period to NCAA Division I status, the Aggies won six contests against an almost entirely D-I schedule. Additionally, the emerging program played Stanford and Oregon State to 1-1 ties, and took 2004 national runner-up UC Santa Barbara into the waning moments of overtime.

"Last year, I thought we were as competitive as we could possibly be," said the veteran coach. "Our game plan was to keep the game close for as

long we could, then give ourselves an opportunity to win it. I thought we were in a position to win almost every game we played."

"This year, my goal is not to be 'just competitive'. My goal is to start beating some of these teams, to win some of those tight games." Shaffer said. "We need to start winning some of these games as we build our program. Our student-athletes need to realize that it's okay to win, that it should be expected. That's the approach I have."

Shaffer has good reason for his optimism, too. The Aggies finished 8-0-1 in the subsequent spring season, allowing just one goal in the nine games. Oddly, it was the departure of the strong senior class that allowed for such success in the offseason.

"A lot of the returning student-athletes had to wait behind the seniors for their opportunity to play," Shaffer said. "This past spring, with the seniors graduated, players like Hunter Maloney, Ahmad Hatife, Dylan Curtis and Derek Shaffer all were given opportunities to really prove themselves. They all did an exceptional job."

Besides displaying their apparent defensive prowess, the spring squad also developed a level of game readiness to offset the losses in experience that were brought about by graduation.

"The biggest thing that came out of our spring was our leadership," said Shaffer. "Our strength will be in our leadership and communication within our defense."

The team's depth is also an enormous asset, according to the coach. "That's one thing I've already noticed in our preseason training. In the past, there was a pretty big gap between the level of play of our best player to our 27th player. Now, that gap has narrowed so much that it makes the training sessions much more competitive. Now we have student-athletes on our second team who could be starters."

DEFENSE & GOALKEEPERS

Local product Charles Warne will return for his third year in the program, and his second as the starting goalkeeper. Warne recorded 75 saves in 17 starts as a sophomore, posting a pair of shut-out victories along the way. He will be pushed for time in net by redshirt freshman Derek Shaffer and sophomore Brian Wickers.

Paul Cain started all 18 games at left back as a true freshman, and will return to that role this season. Junior Russ Brown amassed 11 starts at right back last year, but has moved to a central position where his style and experience are better

served. Hunter Maloney, who saw time in seven games last season, will also provide leadership in the backfield.

"Russell is very vocal and Hunter is the same way. He is very good in the air and a tough player, but he's also a leader," said Shaffer. "They are always coaching their teammates, which is extremely important."

Senior Gabe Garcia spent his first three Aggie seasons as a midfielder and attacker, but has joined the defensive unit this year, much to the delight of the team and coaches. "We moved Gabe to right back this spring and he has really blossomed into a very good player," Shaffer said. "He's a hard, tough and tenacious player who is much better when he's facing the game than when his back is to the game. As soon as we started playing him in back, we started getting better and better."

UC Davis also welcomes two key freshmen to the defense. Jordan Vanderpoorten played for SoCal United and Arsenal FC, two of the top-rated clubs in the nation. Jake Mogelson hails from Santa Rosa United, which won the US Club and Super Y national championships.

Matt Slagle, a sophomore from California HS in San Ramon, will also vie for time in the Aggie backfield.

MIDFIELDERS

Shaffer's midfield also has an interesting mixture of veterans and promising newcomers. Steven Ernst, who started 18 games as a redshirt freshman in 2003 and saw action in 13 contests last season, is perhaps the elder statesman of the unit. Mariano Arrua, who was invited to the U.S. Under-20 National Team training camp two years ago, also ranks among the most experienced of the bunch. He logged 31 games, including three starts, during his first two years.

Sophomores Bertin Loyola and Sule Anibaba gained a full year in an Aggie uniform in 2004. They were each among the seven UC Davis players to score a goal last season. Julien Cerutti also made his UC Davis debut a year ago, starting three games.

Additionally, the midfield will likely boast a number of fresh faces seeing significant playing time this year. Hatife redshirted the 2004 season but established himself as a key contributor in the central midfield. Juan Hernandez and Aaron Glucksman both come to the program from the same SoCal United club as Vanderpoorten. Another freshman, Taylor Aungst, arrives from Mission Viejo Pateadores, another renowned club



program from Cal South territory.

"The recruiting class we brought in has a couple of players who played in national championship games at the youth level," said Shaffer. "They come from winning programs and they know how to win. They've played in big games, so their composure is good. The skill level is important, obviously, but they also have some of the intangibles from playing in the big games."

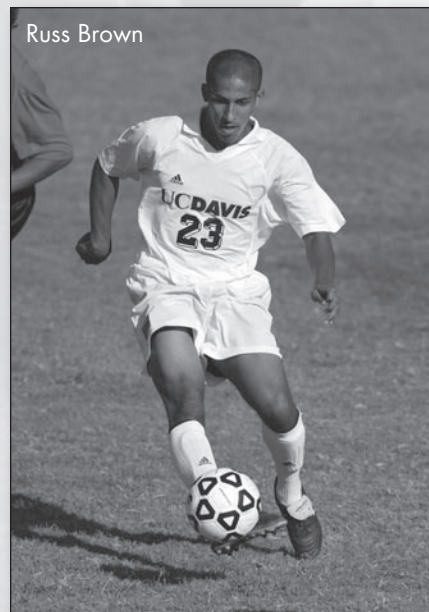
Shaffer also added young talent from the Cal North clubs as Fern Vargas (Modesto) and Paul Marcoux (Mountain View) will also look to contribute in the midfield. Dan Campbell, a freshman from Benicia, was also school record-holder in the high jump at Benicia HS.

FORWARDS

The UC Davis front line is perhaps the most revamped from the previous year, as Shaffer fields a versatile attack to contrast from the relatively one-dimensional offense of 2004. With a formidable defense already in place, this area will be the key to the program's rise among the Division I ranks.

"We have a group of young men who are quick and fast, and able to put pressure on our opponents. Last season, Ryan Shaw did all of that

DWAYNE SHAFFER

Head Coach
9th Year

Shaffer is in his ninth year at the helm of the Aggies, 18th overall as a collegiate coach and 14th as a head coach. In his eight years at UC Davis, he has guided the Aggies to six winning campaigns, including five straight from 1999 to 2003, and has averaged 11 wins per campaign, compiling an overall mark of 88-57-12 (.599).

Shaffer's overall coaching record stands at 147-82-23 in 14 seasons, including one year at Dayton and four at Santa Rosa Junior College.

In 2003, Shaffer led UC Davis to a 10-5-4 mark after going 1-1-3 to begin the season. UC Davis posted six straight shutouts midway through the year to highlight the campaign. This past summer he was also a Region IV Olympic Development Program staff member, working with the 1987 boys age group.

In 2002, Shaffer guided the Aggies to a 13-5-1 mark to encore a year in which his team posted a 13-7-1 record and a first-place finish in the CCAA North Division. UC Davis reached the CCAA Championship game before falling to Cal State Dominguez Hills, 1-0. The Aggies ended the 2001 season playing their best soccer of the year, winning eight of the final 10 games, including a 3-2 double-overtime victory over Grand Canyon in the CCAA Championship semifinals.

Shaffer led UC Davis to a landmark season in 1999 as the Aggies won a school-record 16 games and reached the NCAA Quarterfinals for the first time since 1976. For his part, Shaffer was named CCAA Coach of the Year and National Soccer Coaches Association of America West Region Coach of the Year.

Shaffer brings a wealth of experience to the program, having served as the head coach at the University of Dayton before joining the Aggies. He guided the Flyers to a 7-10-1 record while competing in the Atlantic-10 Conference. He also served as the head assistant at Clemson University for three seasons (1993-95) and as a head coach at Santa Rosa Junior College for four seasons (1989-92).

While at Clemson, the Tigers were 47-18-3 and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Division I Tournament in both 1993 and 1995. Twice they were ranked No.1 in the nation and entered the 1995 season as the preseason No.1.

His four-year record at Santa Rosa was 52-15-10 and his teams advanced to the state JC playoffs all four seasons, including a spot in 1991 Final Four. He was named Camino Norte Conference Coach of the Year in 1991.

Prior to coaching, Shaffer enjoyed a successful stint as a player. His collegiate career began at Santa Rosa JC, where he earned all-conference honors in 1984 and helped lead the team to two conference championships. Following his two seasons at Santa Rosa, Shaffer moved to Chico State where the Wildcats finished 29-9-2 during his two-year stay.

Shaffer earned his bachelor's degree and his master's in physical education with a teaching/coaching emphasis from Chico State. He and his wife, Lara, are the parents of daughters Shay (5) and Skye (4).



FELIPE RESTREPO

Assistant Coach
5th Year

Restrepo begins his fifth season as an assistant coach with the Aggies with primary duties of training, team management and recruiting. Restrepo also worked closely with the goalkeepers during his first three seasons.

In addition to his duties with UC Davis, Restrepo is also the head coach for the Davis Impact girls soccer team, which was a Northern California State Cup semifinalist. In 2004 he was a Region IV Olympic Development Program staff member, working with the 1988 boys age group. Restrepo also served as an assistant coach for the Davis High School girls team, which captured the Monticello Empire League title last season. He holds a United State Soccer Federation national "A" coaching license.

In his first season with the Aggies, he helped guide the program to the California Collegiate Athletic Association North Division title in 2001 and a berth in the championship match of the CCAA tournament. The Aggies finished 13-7-1 that season with a No.22 national ranking.

Prior to arriving at UC Davis, Restrepo spent three years as an assistant coach at Cal State Monterey Bay while completing his master's degree in education. He also served as the boy's head coach at York HS in Monterey, where he earned 1999-2000 Coach of the Year honors.

Restrepo was a four-year letterwinner at UC Davis from his midfielder position. He started 52 of his final 55 games and was a second-team All-Northern California Athletic Conference performer as a junior.

A 1998 graduate of UC Davis, Restrepo has a bachelor's degree in human development, a master's in education and is currently in the doctoral program at UC Davis in educational psychology. In 2002, he married another former Aggie soccer player, Mandi Berman.



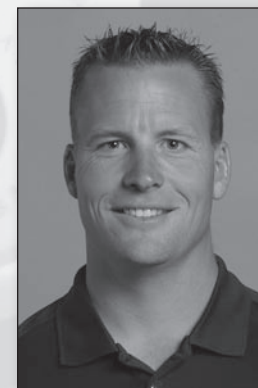
JASON HOTALING

SHAFFER at UC DAVIS

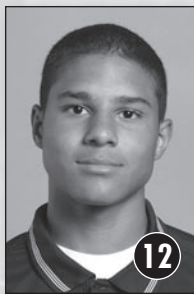

work himself," Shaffer said. "Now we have four or five student-athletes who show the same abilities to run at people and get behind a defense."

Shaw scored nine goals to lead the Aggies last year, often double-teamed and targeted by opposing defenses. His departure will allow Nicholas Lind, who as a midfielder was second on the team with five goals, to step into the role as a veteran striker. He and Greg Hammond, who started five games in 2004, are the only forwards with varsity experience. However, Dylan Curtis emerged in the spring as an offensive contributor and will bolster the front line in his first full season.

Like at the other positions, the 2005 season will serve as a chance to cultivate some promising young talent. Ian Conklin led his Diablo Valley Soccer Club to the Super Y regional title. Quincy Amarikwa, who starred for Liberty HS in Bakersfield, Calif., also looks to become an impact freshman.

This front-line personnel not only possesses top athletic abilities, but provide diversity to Shaffer's offensive game. "Ian and Dylan are your classic striker/forward players, but they can also play out wide in the midfield. They can isolate players in 1-v-1 situations. If they beat that one man, they're behind the defense and in position to



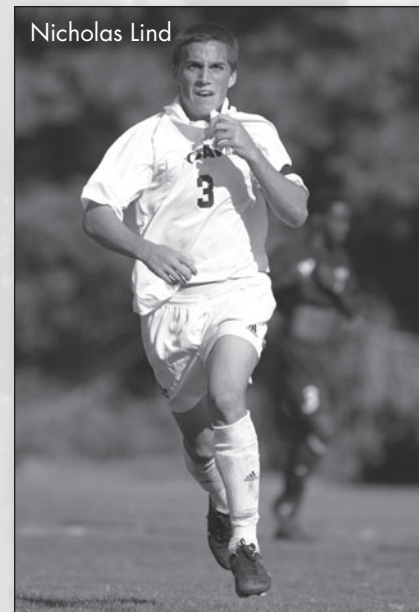

score. That gives us the ability to move guys like Nick Lind and Greg Hammond up front. They're bigger and stronger and good in the air."

"We now have five players who have the ability to do some individual stuff in the game," said Shaffer. "It will be much more difficult to defend us when we have a few players who can run at you and attack, rather than just the one."

UC Davis' success will rest on this blend of veteran wisdom and young talent. The Aggies opened with a 2-0 loss in a road scrimmage with 20th-ranked Cal on August 27. The regular season begins with home games against Oregon State and Stanford on September 1 and 4, respectively. With such a ominous start, the team's experience will prove that much more important.

"We'll rely on the returning student-athletes and their experience right out of the gates, until the freshmen get their feet wet," Shaffer said. "I feel the freshman class is physically capable of playing right away. But as a coach, I know what we're up against. They'll learn how physical and fast the games are. There are no tomorrows in college soccer."

UC Davis offers more than 100 undergraduate majors – the widest variety of any University of California campus.

ACADEMICS

UC Davis comprises three colleges (Agricultural & Environmental Sciences, Engineering, Letters & Science), five professional schools (Education, Law, Management, Medicine, Veterinary Medicine) plus the Division of Biological Sciences.

With 103 undergraduate majors and 80 graduate programs, the university offers the most expansive and diverse range of academics among any of the University of California campuses. Additionally, students also have the opportunity to combine majors or customize their field of study by creating an individual major.

For those interested in graduate degrees – whether it be a master's degree or a doctorate – UC Davis offers advising services to help students craft their education toward those goals. An estimated 86 percent of UC Davis students applying to graduate schools earn acceptance to either their first or second choices.

RANKINGS

UC Davis ranks 11th among public universities, according to *U.S. News & World Report*, and 16th by the National Research Council. Furthermore, the National Science Foundation places the university 15th in the nation in research funding, and *Money* magazine considered UC Davis as one of the West's top "best buys".

Additionally, the Gourman Report rated the genetics department at No. 1, while *U.S. News & World Report* ranked the College of Engineering as No. 13 among its peers.

COMMUNITY

With a population of approximately 60 thousand, Davis is widely known for being a safe, active and socially innovative community.

The downtown area boasts a multitude of specialty shops, restaurants, theaters and art galleries; while the city's numerous parks offer recreational opportunities for active students.

ACTIVITIES

On campus, UC Davis students can rally around the highly successful athletics department by joining the Aggie Pack spirit organization, or enjoy a first-class performance at the Robert & Magrit Mondavi Center for the Performing Arts.

The university also offers hundreds of student clubs and organizations, including cultural clubs, fraternities and sororities, faith-based organizations and the Associated Students of UC Davis student government.

For the active Aggie, students may participate in the diverse intramural sports program or join one of the 30-plus sports clubs. In 2004, the Activities & Recreation Center (ARC) opened its doors, providing the campus with its own state-of-the-art fitness venue.

In April, UC Davis hosts Picnic Day, an annual student-run open house. The popular event showcases all that the campus has to offer, attracting students, staff, faculty, parents, alumni and members of the surrounding communities.

GETTING AROUND

Nestled just southwest of Sacramento, the city of Davis rests just 15 minutes from an international airport, and contains a downtown station serviced by Greyhound and Amtrak. Centrally located in the Sacramento Valley, the town sits equally close to both the finest ski resorts and the Pacific Ocean's top beaches.

Within Davis and its neighboring towns, both Yolo and the student-operated Uni-trans bus systems offer free transportation to registered undergraduates.

The town boasts more bicycles per capita than any other city in the nation. More than 50 miles of bike paths make the entire town conducive to both riders and pedestrians.

CAMPUS LEADERSHIP

LARRY VANDERHOEF

Chancellor

Larry N. Vanderhoef was appointed chancellor of the University of California, Davis, in April 1994. He joined the campus in 1984 as executive vice chancellor and provost.

During his 10-plus years as chancellor, the campus was invited to membership in the AAU; increased its extramural awards from \$169.1 million to \$420.7 million annually, earning a National Science Foundation (NSF) research funding ranking of 14th in the U.S.; expanded classroom, lab, clinical and office space by 2 million square feet, with 1 million more to be built over the next five years; completed the transformation of an ailing county hospital to an academically distinguished and financially sound regional medical center; and made distinctive strides in recruiting a diverse and accomplished faculty and student body.

Chancellor Vanderhoef was recently honored by the *Sacramento Business Journal* as one of the 20 people who have contributed most substantially to California's capital region over the past 20 years and by the Sacramento Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce as Sacramentan of the Year.

In 2004 he led a UC Davis delegation to Iran in an effort to promote dialogue and scholar exchange, and to promote generally the notion of crossing boundaries to build greater understanding and good will - a continuing personal and professional effort.

His research interests lie in the general area of plant growth and development, and in the evolution of the land-grant universities. He has taught classes from freshman level to advanced graduate study.

Chancellor Vanderhoef has served on various national commissions addressing graduate and international education, the role of a modern land-grant university and accrediting issues.

He holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in biology from the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, and a Ph.D. in plant biochemistry from Purdue University. Previously, he held faculty positions at the University of Illinois, where he also served as a department head, and at the University of Maryland, College Park, where he was appointed provost. He was awarded honorary doctoral degrees by Purdue University and by Inje University in Korea.

VIRGINIA HINSHAW

Provost & Executive Vice Chancellor

Virginia S. Hinshaw, Ph.D. serves as the Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor of UC Davis. In that capacity, she is the campus's chief academic and financial officer and acts for the Chancellor in his absence. Hinshaw's responsibilities include oversight of the campus's \$2.2 billion budget and overall responsibility for the UC Davis Health System; campus operations, including resource management, planning and policy development; and strategic leadership in planning, coordinating and implementing academic direction and programs. Prior to joining UC Davis in 2001, she served as the Dean of the Graduate School and Vice Chancellor for Research at the University of Wisconsin, Madison.

In addition to her administrative duties, Hinshaw maintains a joint appointment in two academic departments as a Professor of Virology in the Department of Internal Medicine, School of Medicine, and in the Department of Pathology, Microbiology and Immunology, School of Veterinary Medicine at UC Davis. For over 25 years she has conducted research on viruses, primarily influenza, at different hospitals and universities, including Medical College of Virginia, University of California Berkeley, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, Harvard Medical School, and the University of Wisconsin Madison.

Hinshaw's research has increased our understanding of various aspects of influenza viruses, such as important hosts in nature, transmission among humans, lower mammals and birds, genetic changes related to disease severity, the molecular basis of cell killing, and new approaches to vaccines. Her innovative and energetic teaching style, combined with her continual advocacy for research and education, has earned her national recognition and acclaim.

JUDY SAKAKI

Vice Chancellor, Student Affairs

Judy Sakaki assumed her position as Vice Chancellor of the Division of Student Affairs in July 2002. Dr. Sakaki oversees programs and services that enhance the academic and personal development of students, including intercollegiate athletics.

Sakaki received her bachelor's and master's degrees from California State University, Hayward, in 1975 and 1977, respectively, and a Ph.D. from UC Berkeley in 1991. In 1994-95 she was an Executive Fellow in the Executive Leadership Development Program and the California State University. She also served as an American Council on Education Fellow during that period.

In 1995 she joined California State University, Fresno, as dean of Student Affairs, and in 1997 was appointed vice president for Student Affairs and dean of students.

Sakaki brought substantial experience with diverse student populations to the campus as well as an impressive ability to forge links between student services and academic programs. UC Davis students, and the campus community, benefit significantly from her expertise, insights, and passion for providing an optimal learning environment.



UC DAVIS ATHLETICS



GREG WARZECKA

Director of Athletics

On August 1, 1995, Greg Warzecka became the 11th director of athletics at UC Davis. In the decade-plus since, the Aggie athletics program has enjoyed unprecedented success under his guidance.

Warzecka's penchant for progress began from his first year as director when he was charged with the task of fully engaging the campus in discussions regarding whether or not UC Davis would offer athletics-related financial aid. One year later, the campus announced the launch of its first-ever grant-in-aid program.

Warzecka has also overseen UC Davis' transition into two conferences in his short tenure. In 1998, the Aggies moved from the now-defunct Northern California Athletic Conference to the powerful California Collegiate Athletic Association. Then in 2003, the UC Davis program announced that it would join the Big West Conference and thus reclassify from NCAA Division II to Division I status.

During Warzecka tenure, UC Davis captured six NACDA Division II Directors' Cups as the most outstanding overall program in the country. For his part, NACDA selected Warzecka as its A.D. of the year for the D-II West Region in 2001-02.

Furthermore, the editors of *Sports Illustrated* magazine lauded the Aggie program on three different occasions. In 1999 and 2000, *Sports Illustrated For Women* named UC Davis as the top Division II school for women athletics. One year later, SI selected UC Davis as its top D-II school for the 2001-02 year.

Before turning to administration, Warzecka had been a successful baseball coach, first as an assistant at his alma mater, UC Berkeley. He then served as head coach at San Francisco State, then at the University of Chicago, where he also served his first post as an athletics director. Warzecka returned to California in 1989 to become the A.D. at the University of Redlands, where he remained until he joined the Aggie athletics staff.

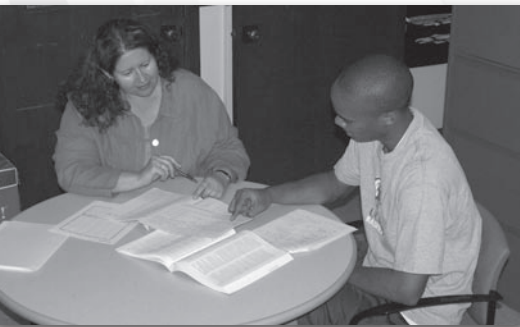
The SAGS office started in 1988 with a single staff member serving as a centralized resource for academic advising, eligibility information and campus referrals. The office has since expanded to include additional academic advisors, an athletic aid coordinator, an assistant eligibility coordinator and an administrative assistant. It is headed by Pam Gill-Fisher, senior associate director of athletics.

The SAGS office provides a range of services to student-athletes on all 26 intercollegiate athletics teams, including assistance with course and major selection as well as interpretation and clarification of eligibility rules and issues.

UC Davis student-athletes typically have a minimum of three academic advisors: an

athletic academic advisor assigned by sport, a college advisor, and a major advisor (if the student has a declared major). Although appointments with the athletic academic advisors are not mandatory at UC Davis, student-athletes might choose to see their athletic academic advisor for issues including:

- **Balancing academic and athletic expectations**
- **General education (GE) requirements**
- **Dropping/adding courses**
- **Time management/study skills**
- **Assistance completing the mandatory Academic Plan Form**
- **Study hall for student-athletes**
- **Personal issues that affect academic performance**
- **Choosing a major/career**
- **Declaring or changing a major**
- **Campus resources**
- **Exploration of opportunities beyond athletics**
- **Preparation for graduate programs**
- **Preparation and application for NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships and other national awards**

Known collectively as “The Healer of Champions”, the UC Davis athletic training staff comprises five full-time certified athletic trainers, a full-time physical therapist/certified athletic trainer and approximately 24 student athletic trainers. Together, they are responsible for providing medical care to the 800-plus student-athletes that compose UC Davis’ 26 varsity teams.

The student athletic trainers serve two to three years with the program, logging in more than 1,500 hours and gaining valuable clinical education in a hands-on environment. The internship is ideal for any student interested in a graduate program in athletic training, as well as any medical or allied medical profession.

The ARC Pavilion training room contains extensive resources and equipment for the rehabilitation of injured athletes. The staff physical therapist is headquartered there as well.

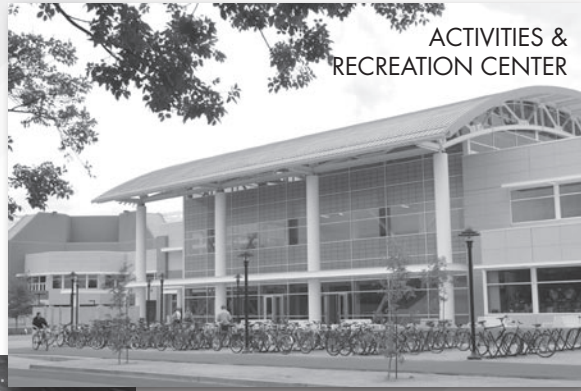

TOOMEY WEIGHT ROOM

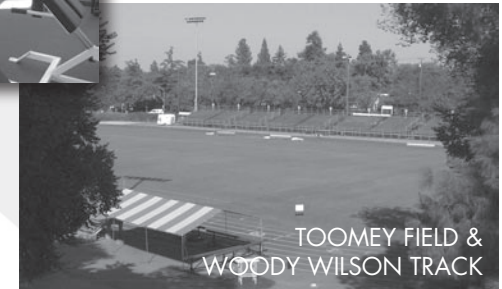

FUTURE GAMES

In the upcoming years, UC Davis Athletics will see the opening of two first-class athletics facilities. The Marya Welch Tennis Center (left), an upgrade of the existing Hickey Tennis Courts, began construction in 2004. Long-term plans for the tennis venue include grandstand seating with restroom/concessions.

Aggie football and women's lacrosse will move to a multi-purpose stadium, located adjacent to the Schaal Aquatics Center, as early as the 2006-07 academic year. Initial concept designs call for seating of 10 to 15 thousand spectators, which an eventual build-out to as many as 30,000.

TRANSITION TO DIVISION I

On March 11, 2003, UC Davis made a landmark move in its storied intercollegiate athletics history when Chancellor Larry Vanderhoef announced that the university would reclassify from

I membership in 2007-08.

UC Davis will compete in the Big West Conference in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track & field and women's volleyball. Football is a charter member of the Great West Football Conference, women's rowing is a member of the Western Independent Rowing Association, men's and women's water polo will remain in the Western Water Polo Association and women's lacrosse will continue play in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation.

NCAA Division II to NCAA Division I status and join the Big West Conference. The announcement came after much discussion by campus administrators, faculty, staff, students, alumni and local community.

Additionally, UC Davis undergraduate students passed the Campus Expansion Initiative, which will help fund the Aggies' growing athletics grant-in-aid program.

UC Davis, which began its four-year transition to Division I in the fall of 2003, will start some competition in the Big West in 2004-05 and is scheduled for full Division

Women's gymnastics and men's wrestling – already classified as Division I programs – will continue their participation in the MPSF and Pacific-10 Conference, respectively.

Good News

The light at the end of the tunnel brightened when the NCAA Division I Board of Directors approved legislation which will make Aggies eligible to win automatic berths to NCAA Championships beginning their first active year of Division I membership in 2007-08. The Big West Conference-sponsored NCAA 2003-13 passed in August of 2004.

Under previous legislation, the Aggies would have been ineligible to win any automatic berth awarded to the Big West Conference until 2009-10. For men's basketball, the wait was eight years, meaning the Aggies would not be able to win an automatic berth until 2015-16.
