BILL MAZE

Head Coach • 9th Year



In his ninth year with the UC Davis women's tennis team, Bill Maze continues a strong Aggie tradition of winning. UC Davis visited the NCAA D-II Championships in each of his first eight seasons, advancing to the quarterfinals five times.

Under Maze, the Aggies have gone 112-65, including a 36-4 mark in conference matches. Since joining the California Collegiate Athletic Association in 1999, UC Davis has captured the league title three times.

In 2001, the Aggies went 19-8, including an 8-0 ledger in CCAA matches. The win total equaled that of the 1999 squad – the most of any Maze-coached team at UC Davis. For his part, Maze earned CCAA Coach of the Year for a third consecutive season.

Maze came to UC Davis from nearby University of the Pacific in Stockton, where he was the head coach of the women's team for five years. At Pacific, he took an unranked team that had finished sixth in the Big West Conference to a second-place conference finish four of the five years he was there.

The Tigers also ended the 1994-95 year ranked 34th nationally in the Division I poll. That finish earned Maze honors as the Big West Conference's Co-Coach of the Year.

Previous to his coaching years, he was the Director of Tennis at the Harbor Bay Club in Alameda from 1985-90. He also played the pro circuit from 1978-84.

Maze earned his B.S. in economics from Stanford University in 1978. Under the tutelage of Cardinal Coach Dick Gould, he was a three-time All-American, playing No. 1 doubles with John McEnroe as a senior.

DARYL LEE

Head Coach • 11th Year



Excellence in athletics and academics is the hallmark of Daryl Lee's tenure at UC Davis. During his first decade as head coach of the men's program, Lee has led his team to six appearances at the NCAA Division II Championships. Furthermore, four of his teams have had the highest cumulative grade point average among all UC Davis men's teams. Maintaining a healthy balance between athletics and academics is a philosophy that Lee embraces.

During Lee's tenure, the Aggies have compiled an overall record of 90-85, playing a schedule that features nationally-ranked Division I programs such as Santa Clara, Sacramento State and the University of the Pacific. Against Division II opponents, the Aggies have compiled a 57-22 record. Lee's teams have finished in the ITA Top 20 nationally in six of their seasons, and in two of those years attained top 10 rankings. In addition, Lee has coached 10 players to All-American status.

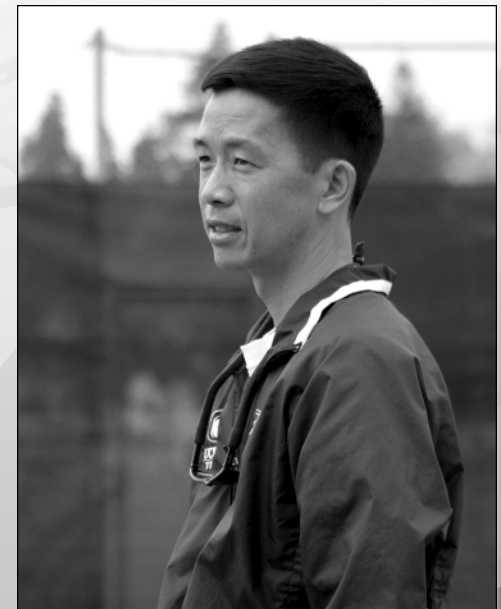
A two-time West Region Coach of the Year, Lee began his coaching career in 1991 as the men's assistant at Sacramento State. After one year he was promoted to women's coach until coming to UC Davis in the fall of 1993.

Besides leading the Aggies, Lee has been the coach of several northern California junior teams during the last three summers. In 1999 he coached at the Maze Cup. Also, in 1999 and 2000 he coached the 14-and-under zonals team, and in 2001, he coached the 16-and-under zonals team. Last summer he guided the Junior Davis Cup team.

Lee graduated from Stanford in 1987 with a degree in psychology and finished his master's degree in counseling at Cal State Sacramento in 1993.

One season removed from one of the finest careers in Aggie tennis history, Greg Lee joins the coaching staff as an assistant to Daryl Lee.

As a senior in 2003, Lee earned his third ITA All-America award in singles – the only U.S.-born player in Division II to earn such honors last year – and captured CoSIDA Academic All-America accolades. He also was named ITA West Region Senior Player of the Year and won the ITA West Region Arthur Ashe Award For Leadership.

Lee posted a 26-5 singles mark and a 27-7 doubles record (mostly with Paul Dilloway) to bring his career win totals to 70 singles and 77 doubles victories. Furthermore, he won the Colby E. “Babe” Slater Award as UC Davis’ outstanding male athlete of the year.

Lee made the CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII first team three times, and captured an Arthur Ashe, Jr. Minority Sports Scholar Award and National Scholar-Athlete honors in 2002. Last year, he was the only American-born D-II player to possess a world ranking.

In 2003, Lee finished tied for third in the year-end NorCal singles rankings. Additionally, he and fellow assistant coach Andrew Csordas ranked fifth in doubles.

Lee graduated last spring with a bachelor’s degree in computer science.

Assistant Coach • 4th Year



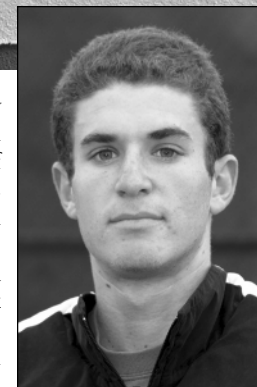
Csordas enters his fourth season on the coaching staff, assisting Coach Lee with all aspects of the program.

Csordas played for UC Davis from 1994 to 1998 where he was twice named All-American in singles and once in doubles. He captured three Rolex West Region doubles championships – two with Jonathan Chan and one with Bryan Golledge – along with one singles title. He and Chan finished fifth at the 1996 Rolex National Championships. A year later, he teamed with Golledge to repeat the finish at nationals. As a freshman in 1995, Csordas captured the deciding match in the Aggies’ 5-4 win over Northwood (Mich.) in the first round of the NCAA Championships.

Csordas completed his master’s degree in bio systems engineering at the University of Hawai’i and is now working on his Ph.D at UC Davis in that field. He and former assistant coach Mike Stange paired up for a No. 8 ranking in the Northern California men’s open doubles division in 2002.

WOMEN'S TENNIS ONLY

In 1998, five former members of the Northern California Athletic Conference, including UC Davis, joined with seven schools in Southern California and Arizona to form a newly expanded California Collegiate Athletic Association. UC San Diego joined the conference in 2000-01, replacing UC Riverside which moved to NCAA Division I status.

The expanded league offers championships in 13 sports, including women's tennis.

In its first year of its transition to Division I, UC Davis will compete in the CCAA but will not be eligible for national or conference postseason play. The Aggies will begin Big West Conference play in 2004. (See pages 32-35 for more details).

TRANSITION TO DIVISION I



On March 11, 2003, UC Davis made a historic move in its storied intercollegiate athletics history when it announced that it would reclassify from NCAA Division II to NCAA Division I status and join the Big West Conference. The announcement came after much discussion by campus administrators, faculty, staff and students, as well as alumni and the local community.

Additionally, UC Davis undergraduate students passed the Campus Expansion Initiative, which will help fund the Aggies' growing athletics grant-in-aid program. UC Davis begins a four-year transition to Division I this fall, will start some competition in the Big West in 2004-05 and is scheduled for full Division I certification beginning in 2007-08.

UC Davis will compete in the Big West Conference in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track & field and women's volleyball. Foot-

ball and women's rowing will continue to compete as an independent, men's and women's water polo will remain in the Western Water Polo Association and women's lacrosse will continue play in the Mountain Pacific Lacrosse League.

Women's gymnastics and men's wrestling – already classified as Division I programs – will continue their participation in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation and Pacific-10 Conference, respectively.



Below are excerpts from the official campus release announcing the historic move to Division I:

UC DAVIS TO JOIN BIG WEST CONFERENCE

The University of California, Davis, will join the Big West Conference, moving from Division II to Division I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

"After much thought and discussion, I have decided that UC Davis will accept the invitation to join the Big West Conference, a conference that includes our sister campuses of UC Irvine, UC Riverside and UC Santa Barbara," UC Davis Chancellor Larry Vanderhoef announced today (March 11, 2003).

"This step is necessary to preserve and improve the program we have. We are seeking, in an evolving landscape, firm ground upon which to continue and to enhance a program that is centered around the student-athlete and the teacher-coach."

Vanderhoef said that the Division I Big West Conference offers a better academic, philosophical and competitive "fit" than does Division II, where schools average 4,000 students compared to UC Davis' 22,000 undergrads and where former D-I competitors are dropping sports or moving to Division I. Eligibility rules are also more stringent at the Division I level than at Division II and are expected to become even stronger in the next few years.

Because the campus's current conference - the Division II California Collegiate Athletic Conference - offers competition for just 13 of the campus's 25 sports, UC Davis must compete in two divisions and six conferences. Two teams - wrestling and women's gymnastics - already compete at the Division I level.

The Big West conference would permit competition in 17 sports, but not football. UC Davis' football team would continue to compete as an independent but at the Division I-AA level.

Big West schools include the UC Irvine, Riverside and Santa Barbara campuses, as well as Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, University of the Pacific, University of Idaho, Utah State and the California State University Fullerton, Northridge and Long Beach campuses.

"Our formula for academic and athletic success at UC Davis can work within the Big West Conference and Division I athletics," said UC Davis Director of Athletics Greg Warzecka. "We will not change our model, but we might very well be able to play a leadership role in Division I in such a way that other institutions will look at how we organize, administer and fund our 25-sport intercollegiate athletics program."

ACADEMIC VALUES:

Vanderhoef said that specific recommendations from another Academic Senate committee and from the Academic Federation, as well as "seven inviolate principles" enumerated on the student-initiative ballot, would lead to policies that "will preserve the academic values that have guided our athletic program for decades."

In reaching his decision, Vanderhoef said he weighed "the many opinions, reports and facts that relate to this issue, including input from the Academic Senate, the Academic Federation, a vote by our undergraduate students, individual conversations, many written communications, and the various data sets that speak simply to where we are now and where we would be in the Big West Conference."

Groups formally voting on the issue included undergraduates, who approved the fee initiative 4,638 to 3,929; the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, voting 38 to 1 in favor; the Academic Senate, voting 556 to 271 in opposition; the Athletic Administrative Advisory Committee (which includes faculty and students), voting 11-2, with one abstention, in favor.

The views of the long-time teacher-coaches were also weighed, Vanderhoef said.

"We have in our ranks many who lived with, built and espoused the virtues of Division II athletics," Vanderhoef said. "They are proud of their accomplishments, not the least of which is a significantly higher graduation rate for our athletes than for the campus at large - about 85 percent compared to 75 percent. Yet these teacher-coaches have come to know that we cannot preserve what we have if we stand still. They conclude that, of all the changes we could make, the affiliation with the Big West Conference, a group of universities very much like ourselves, is necessary and comes just in time."

UC Irvine Chancellor Ralph Cicerone, UC Riverside Chancellor France Cordova and UC Santa Barbara Chancellor Henry Yang in a March 4 letter encouraged Vanderhoef to consider UC Davis' addition to the Big West Conference. "(We) are committed to Division I athletics programs that are based on very high ideals that focus on student-athletes. . . . The Big West Conference is an excellent home for such programs," they wrote.

The three chancellors noted that the conference is "strongly California-centered," which makes it possible for student-athletes to travel to away games and matches "without sacrificing great lengths of time away from campus and classes." And such travel is relatively inexpensive, they added.

"The affiliation with the Big West Conference is a principled step in seeking to preserve the core values of a program that has been a model for the nation," Vanderhoef concluded in announcing his decision. "This is not about seeking 'bigger' or about 'growing the business.' Rather, this is about continuing to make available to our students another broad set of opportunities for participation in a meaningful out-of-class experience.

"This move to the Division I Big West Conference is the best and correct move for UC Davis. It is, in fact, our only responsible action."

Schaal Aquatic Center will begin its first year of operation for swimming & diving and water polo.

Additionally, the Marya Welch Tennis Center will expand to 16 courts.

- Considered Division I for scheduling against opponents.

UC Davis Facilities

The Activities & Recreation Center (ARC), located adjacent to Recreation Hall, opens in spring of 2004. Rec Hall becomes more predominantly an event center, serving Aggie basketball and volleyball, as well as entertainment opportunities. Women's gymnastics will continue to compete at Recreation Hall, but will move its practice facility to Hickey Gymnasium.

UC Davis Facilities

The multi-use stadium opens on the northwest corner of campus, serving Aggie football and women's lacrosse, as well as other community events. Toomey Field becomes exclusively a track & field venue.

- Attendance at the NCAA Convention.

2007-08

- All Big West Conference teams – except for men's basketball – become eligible for the conference's automatic berth in the NCAA Championships.

2015-16

- Men's basketball becomes eligible for the Big West's automatic berth in the NCAA Championships.
