» TIPOFF

A trip to Los Angeles for a match against UCLA signals the end of non-conference play for the UC Davis Men's Basketball Team. With tip off scheduled for 2 P.M. at Pauley Pavilion, the game Wednesday will be the second of a three-game road trip for UC Davis.

The Aggies have gone 7-4 through its first 11 games and following the contest with UCLA, the Aggies will have a road game to open up Big West play against Hawaii (Dec. 29) before returning back to the University Credit Union Center to open up the new calendar year against UC Irvine (Jan. 5).

Aggies are coming off a 68-79 loss at Eastern Washington.

Even after being limited offensively in their most recent game, the Aggies still possess the 45th scoring offense in the country (80.3 points per game).

Elijah Pepper was recently honored as the Big West Player of the Week, a first for the Aggies in the 2022-23 season. He recorded consecutive 20+ point scoring games on the week with the highlight being a 21 point effort in a win against Holy Names.

The Aggies have played UCLA four times in history with the Bruins winning all four times.

UC Davis trails the all-time series 0-4, with the most recent matchup dating back on December 17, 2011, a game that saw UCLA win by a score of 82-39.

» PLAYER SNAPSHOTS

#0 KANE MILLING: A 6'4" guard in his second season with the Aggies after arriving from Nevada, Milling provides the Aggies with length, big-time shooting, and versatility.

#1 JOAQUIN STRONG: A physical and skilled 6'7 wing from Playa Del Rey, Calif., Strong played AAU with the Compton Magic and is one of two true freshman on the team.

#2 TY JOHNSON: A transfer from Loyola Chicago, was a defensive specialist for a Rambler's team that made the NCAA Tournament. Jumps into a much bigger role with the Aggies to operate as the lead guard for Jim Les.

#4 CHRISTIAN ANIGWE: After battling through injury all last season, Anigwe is healthy and is the lone senior on the 22-23 squad. The leading rebounder for the Aggies last year with 5.7, while also averaging a hair under double figures in points with 9.9, Anigwe is set to be a force inside for the Aggies all season.

#5 ROBBY BEASLEY III: A transfer from Montana who averaged 10.5 points per game last season, Beasley III will eat up major minutes and be called upon to be a floor spacer and scorer for the Aggies.

#10 LEO DEBRUHL: A sophomore from Seattle, Wash., seeing action in 21 games last season as a reserve, will look to take the next step in his growth to being a quality rotation member for Coach Les.

#11 JAC MANI: 6'9 forward from Beverly Hills, Calif., Mani is one of two true freshman on the team.

#13 SAM MANU: A physical 6'7 forward from Taiwan who didn't move to the United States until 2017, Manu is a junior college transfer from San Mateo who will provide versatility to the Aggies.

#15 DEANDRE HENRY: A transfer from Nevada who appeared in 33 games over two season, Henry will provide UC Davis with immediate size and depth to the front court.

#20 NIKO ROCAK: Transfer from UCSB, the 6'9 Rocak is set to be a rotational piece with his ability to play down low, while also stretching out defenses with his pop ability.

#22 SIONE LOSÉ: Redshirting last year, Lose is a player who has grown a lot from a year ago and will provide the Aggies length at the guard position with his pesky defense.

#23 PATRICK LAMBHEY: A junior from Granite Bay, Lambey will look to make an impact in second year with the team after not seeing action a year ago.

#24 ADE ADEBAYO: Physical guard in his fourth year with the Aggies, Adebayo is looking to expand his offensive game to catch up with his elite defensive makeup.

#40 ELIJAH PEPPER: Coming off consecutive All-Big West Second Team selections and a 2022-23 preseason Big West Coaches' Team honor, Pepper returns as the leading scorer for UC Davis after averaging a career high 15.1 points per game last season. A physical guard who plays both ways and hits the glass hard after averaging 5.4 rebounds last season, Pepper is the clear focal point and leader for Jim Les' squad.

#55 FRANCESCO BORRA: Playing in 18 games last season and clocking in at 6'11", Borra holds the distinction as the tallest Aggie. The interior force will look to keep developing as a player this season.

SEASON NOTES

- Pepper the lone 20 point scorer in the conference, is the only player to be in the top-10 in both scoring and rebounding in the Big West as he is also bringing down 6.6 rebounds per game.
- Not far behind Pepper is teammate Ty Johnson who is averaging 16.5 points per game, good for fourth in the Big West.
- A theme all season, the Aggies are the 5th in the nation in free throw attempts per game, averaging 27.4 shots from the line.
- Aggies have been rebounding with the best of them all season, and has proven to be a key determinant in their ability to secure victories.
- When out rebounding their opponents, the Aggies are 7-1.
- Ranked as a top-10 rebounding team in the nation in margin (+9.7), defensive rebounds (29.45), and total rebounds per game (42.45) the Ags have paired this with their offensive pace to be one of the most versatile teams in the country.
- In what is the biggest challenge to date for the Aggies, the Bruins will be the first ranked opponent UC Davis has faced this year.
- UCLA will also be the second time that UC Davis has taken on a fellow UC school, with their last match being a 75-65 win against Berkeley on opening night.

SCORING IN BUNCHES

- As it currently stands, the Aggies are the No. 1 scoring offense in the Big West, averaging a staggering 80.3 points per game.
- Possessing the conference leading scorer Elijah Pepper, the Aggies are also paced by transfer, Ty Johnson.
- Johnson is averaging 16.5 points per game, good for fourth in the Big West.
- Pepper and Johnson's career high's this year of 32 points are first among individual Big West game highs
- The Aggies have three different members among the top-20 scorers in the conference.
- Pace has been harped on all year, and a huge reason for the ability to generate points at such an elite rate (Aggies rank 20th in pace per CBB Ref).
- While an incredibly difficult number to

maintain, the Aggies have never averaged 75 or more points in the Division 1 era.

- Albeit only an 11 game sample, the Aggies are averaging 12.5 more points per game compared to a year ago.

1000 POINT MILESTONE

- Elijah Pepper scored 17 points against Milwaukee and eclipsed the 1,000 career points scored mark.
- He became the 25th Aggie in history to reach the spectacular feat and just the 10th in the Division 1 Era for Aggie Basketball.
- Elijah surpassed former Aggie, Ezra Manjon, and is now tied with Dominic Calegari as the 8th highest scoring Aggie in the Division 1 Era.
- He enters the contest against UCLA with 1,106 points and trails the 19th ranked Alan Steed by just one point.

100 YEARS IN THE MAKING

- In the season opener at Cal, UC Davis downed its counterpart to the west, 75-65. The win was the first for the Aggies over the Golden Bears in program history. Three Aggies recorded double-digits in scoring as Christian Anigwe led the charge with a career-high 21 points. Newcomer Ty Johnson tallied 17 points and pulled down eight boards. The two UC schools first met in the 1917-18 season, as Cal boasted a 33-0 record against the Ags. The victory marked the second straight season UCD had taken down a Pac-12 foe, defeating Oregon State last season, 71-64.

- UC Davis' teams lead their conferences in many academic metrics, including Academic Progress Rate (APR) and Graduation Success Rate (GSR).

- UC Davis Athletics also sets the national standard in preparing student-athletes to launch successfully into jobs and graduate school opportunities through its innovative Aggie EVO System.

AT A GLANCE

- Led by recently nominated Pac-12 Player of the Week and Wooden Award Watch List Member Jaime Jaquez Jr., the Bruins are winners of their last seven games.

- Entering the week, the Bruins are ranked No. 13 in the Associated Press poll and even higher on other outlets.

- Sporting a starting five that usually consists of Tyger Cambell, Amari Bailey, Adem Bona, Jaylen Clark and Jaquez Jr., the Bruins own the 13th best scoring margin in the nation (+18.1).

- Clocking in as the 46th ranked scoring offense, the Bruins are known for converting their looks at an elite rate (15th in the nation in field goal percentage), and taking care of the basketball (8th in the nation in assist/turnover ratio).

- The Bruins boast four double figure scorers with Jaquez Jr. spearheading the group, averaging 17.3 points per game.

- The initiator for UCLA is veteran, Tyger Campbell who is averaging 13 points per game but leads the Bruins in assists with 51 total on the season.

- Jaylen Clark is the second leading scorer for UCLA and he has 29 steals so far in the 2022-23 season, and has recorded four steals in three straight games. His efforts on this side of the ball is a big reason for UCLA being ranked 41st in the nation in scoring defense. The Bruins limit their opponents to just 62.2 points per game.

MR. 300

- Jim Les reached the 300 career win mark last year on Nov. 12, 2021 in an 84-76 home win over Eastern Washington and continues the season with 318 career wins and counting with his last win coming against Holy Names.

- Les compiled the first 154 wins of his career at Bradley, his alma mater. He has 164 wins at UC Davis since 2011.

ELIJAH PEPPER EARNS PRESEASON ALL-

BIG WEST HONORS

- UC Davis junior guard Elijah Pepper was named to the 2022-23 All-Big West Men's Basketball Preseason Coaches' Team.

- Pepper is coming off consecutive All-Big West Second Team selections as he led the Aggies with a career-high 15.1 points per game. The Selah, Wash. native was fifth in the conference in scoring, second in steals, and second in threes per game at 1.6 and 2.3, respectively.

- The 6-4 guard boasted 20 double-digit scoring performances and averaged a career-high 5.4 rebounds per contest. Pepper has increased his scoring output every season and enters the season averaging 12.2 points and 5.2 boards per game with 119 made three-pointers.

- Pepper has been consistent throughout his days as an Aggie and figures to reach the 1,000 career points mark in the near future.

- UC Davis was selected to finish sixth in the preseason coaches' poll with 54 points and was tabbed by ESPN as the "Surprise Team" of the Big West in large part to Pepper's two-way play.

LONE SENIOR

- While people from the outside looking in are focused on how the new Aggies will perform this season, lost in it all is lone senior, Christian Anigwe. While Pepper may serve as the main scorer on most nights, Anigwe is set to be a huge part of the Aggie rotation. After battling all of last season with nagging injuries, his leadership and presence on the floor could be a big factor for UC Davis this season. Coach Les praised Anigwe's toughness for being able to play through pain all of the 2021-22 season and the hope is that fully healthy, he can prove he is a force to be reckoned with and unlock another level of play with his ability to step outside and create mismatches.

DEPTH AND SIZE

- The addition of seven new players is a major storyline for UC Davis basketball, addressing depth and possessing players with the ability to play both inside and out is what Coach Les looks to build on this season. After only having three players 6'7 or taller last season, UC Davis now rosters seven players who carry this distinction. In an always competitive Big West Conference that at times relies on running traditional lineups featuring two bigs, Les prioritized bringing in new faces that will allow the Aggies to throw out lineups that

With returners Elijah Pepper, Ade Adebayo, Leo DeBruhl, Kane Milling, and Sione Losé, there is plenty of skill and versatility among the crop to play in three and even four-guard sets with confidence. The additions of Robby Beasley III who has proven himself as a scorer and floor spacer and Ty Johnson with his defensive prowess and NCAA Tournament experience also provides UC Davis with plug and play guys who will be ready to make an impact right away.

EUROPE TRIP AT THE RIGHT TIME

- The Aggies took a 10-day trip overseas and got to experience the trip of a lifetime while also being able to pick up 10 very important, extra practices that the Aggies are hoping will

translate to more wins throughout the course of the season for team with 7 new faces.

- The Aggies have been preparing for the last four years and had planned to take the trip two years ago before the COVID-19 pandemic forced it to be postponed.

- From a basketball perspective, the trip couldn't come at a better time for Les' Aggies. UC Davis features eight returners and will be integrating seven newcomers.

- "There isn't a better time in my opinion," Les said. "Not only will it be great team and culture building off the floor but also a great opportunity to get a jump start on the season this summer with basically a brand new team."

• This capital investment, unlike any project in department history, further strengthens ICA's commitment towards developing an environment that encourages student-athletes' personal growth, academic, athletic and positive post-graduate success.

• Thanks to a generous donation from its largest supporters, Bruce and Diane Edwards, the facility will bear the name "Edwards Family Athletics Center."

• "This facility is a resource unmatched by conference peers when comparing support services for student-athletes," UC Davis Senior Associate Athletics Director Liz Martin said. "Internally, with our great development staff and externally, as supporters with a variety of interests, came together to create this one-stop-shop. I particularly appreciate how many people understood the vision of the Edwards Family Athletics Center and stepped up to the next level with their donations to achieve such an impressive facility."

• The Paul and Nancy Sallaberry Sports Performance Center is the biggest space within the new facility, providing a greater number of student-athletes and teams with the ability to work out at more convenient times. Compared to the current weight room located at Toomey Field, the new training area is nearly four times larger in size.

• In addition, to team meeting rooms that will

provide ample areas for teams to study and prepare for games, the Bruce and Marie West Auditorium will seat 140 individuals and is available for student-athletes, coaches and UC Davis students to organize large gatherings.

• The Edwards Family Athletics Center features technology throughout the entire building that allows coaches to use these meeting rooms, or the auditorium, as a second office.

• The Klein Family Educational and Professional Success Center provides additional quiet space for student-athletes to study for exams, work on class projects or enjoy a break from their daily class and workout schedules. This area includes offices for Aggie EVO leaders, opportunities for student-athletes to network, participate in Aggie EVO-related programming, conduct mock interviews and continue preparing for a successful launch upon graduation.

• Centrally located to allow maximum efficiency and collaboration with strength and conditioning staff, the Muir Family Sports Medicine Center will become the new home for athletic trainers, doctors and unit leadership. One of the largest areas of the building will feature hot and cold tubs — a common tool for recovery — to help sports medicine and strength staff implement modern and more effective injury prevention and recovery plans.

• Every team will have the opportunity to train on Bob Biggs Field — a natural grass area located adjacent to the building and named for the UC Davis alumnus and legendary football coach. This new field will eliminate the need for student-athletes to travel across campus and practice on natural grass and help them create the most time-efficient schedule each week.

• In addition to support staff, football, basketball, lacrosse and field hockey coaches will permanently move to the Edwards Family Athletics Center. Conveniently located near the site of practice and competition, this new office complex provides opportunities for everyone to showcase UC Davis Athletics' points of pride to recruits and additional areas to conduct player or team meetings and prep for games.

• During the facility's construction, a full renovation of the Bob Foster Team Center was also completed to maximize available space within the building's footprint. The "new" Foster Center includes updated locker rooms, offices, a football lounge, and equipment space for football, lacrosse and field hockey.

UC Davis punched its ticket to the Big Dance for the first time in 2017 when the Aggies defeated UC Irvine, 50-47, in a Big West Conference Tournament championship thriller in 2017. After making its NCAA Tournament debut in Dayton, Ohio, with a 67-63 victory vs. North Carolina Central in the First Four, the Aggies advanced to the Midwest Region First Round and drew Kansas as its opponent.

Big West basketball has called Davis its home in recent seasons: In addition to its three Big West titles and three postseason appearances, UC Davis posted three 20-win seasons within a four-year timespan and turned the Pavilion into one of the strongest home court advantages among all BWC teams.

Since Jim Les became the 23rd head coach in UC Davis' history on May 5, 2011, the Aggies posted their best records as a Division I program, won every game played on Hamilton Court twice within a three-year time span, captured their first Big West Conference championship, Big West Tournament championship, and in 2017 earned the school's first NCAA Tournament berth.

Les enters his 12th season at the helm of the Aggies in 2022-23, a period during which the program has experienced unprecedented stability. Les, Associate Head Coach Kevin Nosek, and Assistant Coaches Jonathan Metzger-Jones and Kyle Vogt enter their seventh season together while Les, Nosek, and Vogt have coached together at UC Davis since the 2012-13 season.

Les achieved his 300th career win on Nov. 12, 2021 in an 84-76 home win over Eastern Washington and enters 2022-23 with 311 career wins (157 at UC Davis).

2021-22 season saw Les guide the Aggies through multiple competition pauses and more canceled games than any other Big West team to a 13-11 record and a trip to the BWC Tournament quarterfinal round.

UC Davis saw eight games lost from its schedule due to COVID-19 with the Aggies going without a game for a nine-day stretch in February and were able to play just one game between Dec. 22, 2021 and Jan. 14, 2022. That one game epitomized the 2021-22 Aggies though. Down to just seven active players and needing a game after the previous three were canceled, Les coached the Aggies to a 78-71 win over UC San Diego on Jan. 8 in an empty University Credit Union Center.

That ability to adapt and persevere continued to show up in Les' 2021-22 group as the Aggies went on a three-game win streak in February but with two weeks inbetween the second and third wins due to cancellations. That streak was part of a stretch in which UC Davis won four of five.

Under Les' tutelage, Ezra Manjon was named Big West All-Conference First Team and surpassed 1,000 career points and backcourt mate Elijah Pepper was named to the Second Team.

During the 2020-21 season, Coach Les led the program through one of the most unique and challenging situations faced by any Division I head coach.

Due to COVID-19, UC Davis paused all basketball-related competition to remain compliant with Yolo County Health orders. While other Big West teams were practicing, organizing workouts and playing games, the Aggies adjusted their in-season schedule accordingly.

Unable to use its facilities during the inaugural portion of a seven-week pause, student-athletes worked out on a one-on-one, and limited basis, once clearance was received by county health officials.

With the program adjusting its schedule each week to remain fully compliant, men's basketball returned to the court on January 22, 2021, in a road game at UC San Diego — the team's first since its December 4 home opener — which took place shortly after the program received authorization to practice as a team.

The Aggies' seven-week hiatus was the second-longest pause faced by any Division I program in the country; only three teams in the nation played fewer games than UC Davis when it faced the Tritons in its inaugural league game of the year.

Since returning to campus in the summer of 2020 for off-season workouts, throughout the entire 2020-21 academic year, the program recorded zero positive tests for COVID-19 due to Les' leadership and an uncommon level of self-discipline exhibited by student-athletes, staff members and coaches.

Once action concluded, the Aggies strengthened their national reputation as one of the top free-throw-shooting teams in the nation, and toughest defensive units to face since it held the ninth-highest turnovers-forced average (17.06 per game) and 12th-highest team free-throw-shooting percentage (.785) among all 340 Division I programs.

Throughout the 2018-19 season, no team was more dominant on defense than UC Davis. In addition to posting the lowest opponent scoring average in the league, both overall and during conference play, the Aggies set new program records in all major rebounding categories by holding opponents to season-low overall and three-point percentages.

The program's championship tradition continued in 2018 when the Aggies won their third Big West title within four years and secured another postseason berth. Once the regular season concluded, Les received Big West Coach of the Year honors for the second time in his career.

Known for its defensive prowess and intensity, UC Davis men's basketball earned a spot on college basketball's national landscape thanks to numerous team championships and elite individual honors earned throughout the Jim Les era.

Under Les' guidance, UC Davis won its first NCAA team statistical championship when the 2014-15 roster posted the highest three-point percentage among all Division I programs in the nation. Two individuals, Corey Hawkins (2014-15) and Stefan Gonzalez (2019-20), also earned individual titles when each ended their respective seasons with the No. 1 three-point percentage.

In 2015, Hawkins became the first UC Davis player in the program's Division I era named Big West Player of the Year. Three years later, TJ Shorts II became the first player in Big West history to

win its top two individual awards when he ended his first season in Davis as the league's Newcomer and Player of the Year.

Shorts II is the Aggies' third Newcomer of the Year selection and joins a list of elite talents comprised of Chima Moneke (2017) and Hawkins, who became the first Aggie in program history to earn one of the league's major awards when he was selected in 2015.

Following the Aggies' thrilling victory in the league tournament's championship game, Moneke became the first Big West Tournament Most Valuable Player in program history.

Under Les' leadership, Ezra Manjon earned another one of the BWC's major honors when officials named him Freshman of the Year in March of 2020.

In addition to Best Sixth Man awards received by Josh Fox (2015) and Siler Schneider (2017), Darius Graham collected consecutive Best Hustle Awards in 2016 and '17 and became the second player in program history to accomplish this feat (Joe Harden was the first when he earned this accolade in 2010 and '11).

Les also created a unique home court advantage throughout his tenure at UC Davis, and turned the Pavilion into one of the most challenging environments on the West Coast. From 2015-19, no mainland squad collected more home wins than the Aggies and no Big West team held a higher home win percentage.

UC Davis' historic 2017 NCAA Tournament run, which started with a come-from-behind victory against the defending league champions in the Big West Tournament, continued with another win in the NCAA First Four vs. North Carolina Central. By winning their inaugural Division I Tournament game, the Aggies drew Kansas in a Midwest Regional First Round matchup that took place at the BOK Center in Tulsa, Okla.

The 2014-15 Big West Coach of the Year led UC Davis to its first-ever Big West Conference

championship, and its inaugural postseason berth as a D-I team when the Aggies faced Stanford in the opening round of the National Invitation Tournament. That appearance capped a season that included new school records for the most overall, home, road, conference and non-conference wins.

For the first time in school history, UC Davis also ended that season as the NCAA's national three-point champions thanks to its .447 shooting percentage — the highest mark recorded by any team since the three-point line was pushed back to its current distance. Corey Hawkins, the country's No. 1 three-point shooter with his .488 percentage brought the team's first-ever individual title to Davis. Combined, the 2014-15 squad recorded the highest three-point team percentage in program history since 1994.

As the only team in the nation to hold top five three-point and overall field goal percentages on a weekly basis, the Aggies posted a +16 win differential one that historic season concluded. Not only was that differential the largest enjoyed by any Div. I team that season, it is a new Big West Conference record.

Les came to the Aggies after spending nine years as the head coach at his alma mater, Bradley University, where he won more than 150 games and led the Braves to an appearance at the 2006 NCAA Tournament's Sweet Sixteen.

In all, Les possesses 30 years of successful playing and coaching experience in both the collegiate and professional ranks.

Les is no stranger to the Sacramento area, having spent four years as a player with the Sacramento Kings, followed by three seasons as an assistant for the WNBA's Sacramento Monarchs. After a nine-year professional playing career, which included seven seasons in the National Basketball Association, Les enjoyed a successful venture into the financial world before returning to his basketball roots.

Following his three-year tenure with the Monarchs, Les returned to Bradley and was named the 12th men's basketball coach in Braves history on April 7, 2002.

In his first head coaching position, the Braves averaged more than 20 wins in five seasons from 2005 to 2010, while racking up 10 postseason wins throughout that time. Along the way, Les became the first coach in NCAA history to win games in four different postseason tournaments.

Les' coaching career has been defined by more than just wins and losses: Of the 26 seniors he has coached in his nine years with the Braves, 24 earned their degrees with the other two continuing their basketball careers overseas as professionals. Under Les' direction, Bradley set a program record for grade point average and had 11 team members earn a spot on the Bradley Athletic Director's Honor Roll during the 2009-10 academic year for posting a minimum 3.0 semester GPA during at least one of the two grading periods that year.

Inheriting a team that produced a 9-20 record during the 2001-02 season, Les laid a solid foundation for a program that re-emerged as a force in the Missouri Valley Conference. Les finished with a 152-140 record in nine seasons as Bradley's head man, having directed the Braves to the Sweet 16s of the 2006 NCAA Tournament and 2007 National Invitation Tournament, followed by runner-up finishes in the inaugural College Basketball Invitational (2008) and CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament (2009).

In 2005-06, Les' veteran Braves were able to find their stride down the stretch and play their way into the postseason picture by winning 13 of their last 17 contests, including a seven-game win streak that took the team all the way to the MVC Tournament championship game. Bradley went on to win a pair of NCAA Tournament games, defeating No. 4 seed Kansas (77-73) and fifth-seeded Pittsburgh (72-66) at the Palace of Auburn Hills to make its first Sweet 16 appearance since 1955.

Les began his college career at Cleveland State, but transferred to Bradley during the winter break of his sophomore season. Once in the Bradley fold, Les led the Braves to a 60-27 (.690) record in his 87 games, consecutive trips to the postseason (1985 NIT and 1986 NCAA Tournament) and one of the greatest seasons in the history of both Bradley and Valley men's basketball.

The 1985-86 squad won the MVC regular season title with a perfect 16-0 league record and it remains the last Valley team to post an undefeated conference slate. Although the Braves lost the MVC Tournament championship game at Tulsa, Bradley earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, where the Braves lost to eventual national champion Louisville in the second round. Bradley's 83-65 victory versus UTEP in the first round of the 1986 West Regional, however, was the program's first NCAA Tournament victory since 1955.

During Bradley's memorable 1985-86 season, Les averaged 14.2 points and led The Valley with 7.9 assists per game. In addition to being named MVC Player of the Year in 1986, the 5-foot-11 point guard won the Frances Pomeroy Naismith Hall of Fame Award as the nation's best player less than 6-feet-tall.

Les was inducted to the Bradley Athletics Hall of Fame on Feb. 7, 1998. He also has been inducted into the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame, the Greater Peoria Sports Hall of Fame and the Chicagoland Sports Hall of Fame. Additionally, Braves fans voted Les one of the 15 greatest players in program history during the celebration of Bradley's first 100 basketball seasons.

Following his senior season, Les was a third-round selection (70th overall) by the Atlanta Hawks during the 1986 NBA Draft and played a combined seven seasons for Utah Jazz, Los Angeles Clippers, Sacramento Kings and the Hawks. He led the NBA in 3-point field goal percentage (.461) during the 1990-91 season and he was the runner-up to Chicago's Craig Hodges in the AT&T Long Distance Shootout during the 1992 NBA All-Star Weekend.

Lenny Wilkens, Jerry Sloan and Dick Motta dot the list of coaches Les played for during his NBA career - three of the winningest coaches in NBA history.

Originally from the Chicago suburb of Niles, Ill., Les is married to the former Jodi Martineau. The Les' have three children: son Tyler and daughters Amber and Hannah.

Kevin Nosek, who brings two decades of experience as either a UC Davis assistant coach or student-athlete, is in his 21st season as a member of UC Davis men's basketball's staff. Under his tutelage, the Aggies earned three Big West championships in a four-year timespan and advanced to postseason play on three occasions.

The Davis native also helped student-athletes, Coach Les and the program navigate their way through a unique situation during the 2020-21 season when basketball-related activities were paused for seven weeks — the second-longest hiatus experienced by any Division I team in the country — to remain compliant with Yolo County Health orders and officials' response to COVID-19.

While other teams were practicing, working out and playing games, Nosek helped student-athletes focus their time and efforts on academic coursework and remaining in basketball shape to prepare for an eventual return to action, which took place on January 22, 2021, when UC Davis traveled to UC San Diego for its Big West opener.

Since returning to campus in the summer of 2020 for off-season workouts, throughout the entire 2020-21 academic year, the program recorded zero positive tests for COVID-19 — an outstanding accomplishment that was achieved due to Nosek's leadership, combined with an uncommon level of self-discipline exhibited by student-athletes, coaches and staff.

With Nosek on staff, the 2016-17 team not only earned its first berth in the NCAA Tournament, thanks to a come-from-behind victory in the championship game of the Big West Tournament (collecting the program's first tourney title in the process), but captured its first Division I postseason victory at the NCAA First Four. With their win over North Carolina Central, the Aggies advanced to the Midwest Regional First Round where they faced Kansas.

Nosek began his Aggie coaching career in 1999-2000 after competing for UC Davis all four seasons on campus as a student-athlete. After serving a three-year stint as head coach at Menlo College, Nosek returned to the Aggies in 2006-07. He assists in all aspects of the program.

Nosek, a true veteran of the men's basketball staff whose connection to the program dates back to his youth days, first served as a ball boy for Bob Hamilton's teams in the late 1980s. Since his return in 2006, he has been instrumental in helping the program complete its transition to Division I, a process that includes the program's first official D-I and Big West Conference season in 2007-08.

After starring at nearby Davis Senior High, Nosek played for UC Davis from 1996-99, highlighting his career with a NCAA Division II national championship in 1988. He enjoyed his best collegiate game during his senior year, when he hit 4 of 5 from three-point range en route to a career-high 12 points against Holy Names. Perhaps as a premonition of things to come, his teammates dubbed him "Coach Nosek" for his unrelenting diligence both on and off the court.

Nosek remained with the Aggie program as an assistant to Brian Fogel from 1999-2003. In his four seasons, the Aggies compiled a 67-23 record and qualified for the NCAA D-II West Regional (1999-2000).

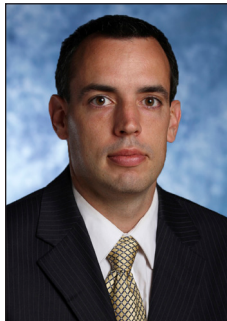
Following his first tenure at UC Davis, Nosek earned his first collegiate head-coaching role when he took the helm of the men's basketball program at Menlo College. In three seasons with the Oaks, he turned around a program that finished 4-22 his first season, to one that posted a 17-11 mark and its best record in seven years. The Oaks advanced to the Cal Pac Conference Tournament semifinal game during the 2004-05 season and reached the title game the following year.

Nosek's Menlo tenure included a roster that led all D-II teams in rebound defense, also ranking among the nation's leaders in rebound margin and field goal percentage defense.

After he graduated from UC Davis in June of 1999 — earning a bachelor's degree in organizational studies — Nosek received his masters in sport coaching from the United States Sports Academy shortly thereafter.

Nosek and his wife, Nicole reside in Davis. They have two daughters, Maya and Grace, and a son, Derek.

KYLE VOGT

Kyle Vogt is in his 11th season as UC Davis' assistant coach — a tenure that includes the program's most successful years after being hired in June, 2012. In his role, he assists in all areas of the program, and specializes in defensive schemes, perimeter play and development, recruiting and opponent scouting.

Through his leadership, Vogt helped the program navigate its way through a unique situation created by COVID-19: While other teams organized workouts, practiced and participated in official competition, the Aggies paused basketball-related activities to remain compliant with Yolo County Health orders. During this hiatus, Vogt helped student-athletes continue to succeed in the classroom and remain in basketball shape in case an eventual return to action took place.

After working out with players on a one-on-one basis at first, once clearance was received by Yolo County officials, Vogt and the coaching staff received a limited amount of time to prep the entire team for its inaugural Big West game, which took place seven weeks after the program's 2020-21 home opener on January 22, 2021, when the Aggies traveled to UC San Diego.

In all, the program's seven-week pause was the second-longest among all Division I programs in the nation; only three teams played fewer games than the Aggies when they returned to action against the Tritons.

Another outstanding accomplishment took place that season, due to Vogt's leadership and experience: Since returning to campus in the summer of 2020, zero positive COVID tests were recorded by student-athletes, staff member and coaches throughout the academic year.

With Vogt on the sidelines, the 2016-17 team not only won its first-ever Big West Tournament championship, earning the league's automatic NCAA Tournament bid in the process, but captured its inaugural Division I postseason win by defeating North Carolina Central in a First Four matchup.

That result allowed the Aggies to advance to the Midwest Regional First Round where they faced Kansas for the first time in school history.

Under Vogt's tutelage, UC Davis collected its third Big West championship within four years, and advanced to postseason play once again when it faced Utah in the 2017-18 National Invitation Tournament.

That appearance also marked the program's third postseason berth in the last four seasons.

Vogt brought an 11-year coaching career to UC Davis that including stops at UW Platteville (2003-04), Bradley ('04-'11) and Western Illinois ('11-'12). Vogt has been a part of five postseason teams throughout those 11 years, including Bradley's 2006 Sweet 16 run. In back-to-back years, teams Vogt coached set single-season school records for the most Division I wins - 18 at Western Illinois and 14 at UC Davis.

"I am very excited to add Kyle to our staff," said head men's basketball coach Jim Les shortly after Vogt's hiring. "He is an accomplished Division I assistant that brings with him great knowledge and enthusiasm. He will be a tremendous asset to our staff and an excellent resource for our players both on and off the floor."

A native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Vogt graduated from Lakeland College in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in marketing. An outstanding player for the Muskies, Vogt was a three-time all-conference performer and scored 1,123 points throughout his career. He is ranked No. 2 all-time with 183 three-point field goals and was amongst the Div. III national leaders in three-point percentage during both his junior and senior seasons.

Vogt and his wife, Erin, live in Davis with their three children: Jackson, Nolan and Avery.

The 2021-22 basketball season marked the sixth year Metzger-Jones has been a part of the UC Davis Basketball staff.

Joining the program in June of 2016, Metzger-Jones has been a part of many Aggie firsts. The 2016-17 season marked the Aggies first ever trip to the NCAA Tournament after capturing the 2017 Big West Tournament championship. That year was followed up by a Big West Regular season title in 2017-18, a trip to the 2018 NIT, and marked the first time in UC Davis Division 1 program history that the Aggies had back to back plus .500 winning percentage seasons, a feat that was again accomplished in 2020-21 and 2021-22.

In addition to back-to-back postseason appearances in 2017 and 2018, both seasons ended with the Aggies winning 22 or more games.

With the Aggies Metzger-Jones is tasked with coordinating staff recruiting efforts, player skill development, opponent scouting, analytics, in-game strategy, and academics.

In 2020 Metzger-Jones became an initial member of the board of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion for UC Davis Athletics. In his role with DEI he helps to provide and coordinate resources, information, and advice which contributes to a more informed and inclusive athletics department and an overall better student-athlete experience.

In 2018 Metzger-Jones was invited to participate in the inaugural Collegiate Coaches Consortium at the Final Four. This event brought together some of the leading assistant coaches in the country to meet with athletics administrators to learn and prepare for the future of college basketball.

In his time in Davis he has worked with multiple Aggies to earn prestigious awards. Head Coach Jim Les was awarded the 2018 Big West Coach Of The Year Award. TJ Shorts was named Big West MVP and Newcomer Of The Year in 2018, as well as First Team All-Conference in 2019. Chima Moneke was named First Team All-Conference and Big West Tournament MVP in 2017. Ezra Manjon, Elijah Pepper, Stefan Gonzalez, Joe Mooney, Siler Schneider, and Brynton Lemar all earned All-Big West accolades in Metzger-Jones' time with the Aggies.

Metzger-Jones arrived to UC Davis after spending five seasons as an assistant coach at Montana. Throughout his tenure in Missoula, the Grizzlies won three Big Sky regular season championships and advanced to postseason play on four occasions.

In addition to competing in the 2012 and 2013 NCAA Tournaments, Metzger-Jones' teams also competed in the 2015 National Invitation Tournament and 2016 College Basketball Invitational.

With Metzger-Jones on staff, Montana won 20 or more games in four of five years. Under his tutelage, 17 Grizzlies earned All-Big Sky Conference honors -- a list that includes Kareem Jamar (2013 Big Sky Conference MVP), Will Cherry (Cleveland Cavaliers), Jordan Gregory and Martin Breunig. All four players received NABC All-District recognition.

While at Montana, Metzger-Jones was tasked with recruiting, player skill development, opponent scouting, in-game strategy, scheduling, the program's fundraising efforts and player academics — an area that saw the Grizzly basketball team post its highest cumulative GPA in program history.

Before he joined the Grizzlies' staff, Metzger-Jones helped lead UC Santa Barbara to its most successful stint in program history. Over the course of his four years the Gauchos won the 2008 and 2010 Big West regular season titles, consecutive Big West Tournament championships and the program's first-ever back-to-back berths at the NCAA Tournament in 2010 and 2011. UCSB also qualified for the 2008 NIT.

While at Santa Barbara, Metzger-Jones recruited and mentored Orlando Johnson, James Nunnally and Alan Williams. Johnson and Williams received Big West MVP distinction in 2010 and 2014 respectively; all three have NBA experience.

Metzger-Jones played two seasons at Pacific, was named co-captain as a senior and etched his name in the Tigers' records book as one of the program's top 10 three-point shooters when he graduated in 2002 with a bachelor of science degree in business administration.

Afterwards, he spent three seasons playing professionally in Europe with stops in Switzerland, Denmark and Finland.

Upon his return to the United States, Metzger-Jones started his coaching career as Cal State Fullerton's director of basketball operations.

Metzger-Jones is married to the former Alison Keck. The couple has one son, Jason.

After spending 2021-22 as the Aggies' video coordinator, Justin Clareman was elevated to Director of Operations in July 2022 and enters his second season with the program in 2022-23.

As video coordinator, he created scouting, recruiting, and practice edits utilized by the coaching staff, as well as in-house analytics and statistical work. Clareman utilized Sportscode to output reports and formulas that in turn provided UC Davis coaches and players with comprehensive post-game information, as well as Clareman's own analytics used to measure offensive set points per possession, individual defensive player efficiency, and lineup plus/minus.

Clareman played a major role in the skill development of the Aggies last season, including All-Big West First Teamer Ezra Manjon and All-Big West Second Team selection Elijah Pepper.

In addition to his video and on-court work, Clareman aided former Director of Basketball Operations Ryan Oliver and Associate Head Coach Kevin Nosek on a daily basis, including travel and budgetary items, and helped oversee a team of undergraduate managers.

A 2017 economics graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Clareman served three seasons with the Tulane Green Wave while completing his master's of business administration from the New Orleans-based university. He worked with the team's director of basketball operations and aided in running Tulane summer camps, but his primary duties were creating scouting reports for the coaching staff, coded games using Sportscode Software & Synergy, and edited video of recruits.

A former All-American water polo player from Brentwood High School in Los Angeles, Clareman co-founded a basketball podcast and website called "The Bench Mob." At Tulane, he credits his time with head coach Mike Dunleavy in "learning a complex offensive scheme, with NBA-style actions and reads." Then in his final season, Clareman worked for head coach Ron Hunter, from whom he honed expertise in matchup zone defense and off-ball misdirection screen plays.

Clareman also has worked two different stints for the Wasserman Media Group, first as an intern in the summer of 2015 then more recently as an assistant trainer in the summer of 2020. In that latter post, he worked alongside acclaimed basketball trainer Olin Simplis in helping the agency's pre-draft clients hone their skills and techniques. Clareman also gained valuable industry experience as staff member for Under Armour AAU camps and as a marketing and membership engagement intern with the Detroit Pistons and Palace Sports & Entertainment.

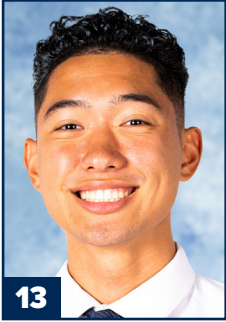

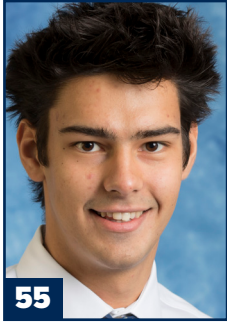
