The UConn volleyball program will look to continue its success after a 2007 season which saw the Huskies advance to the BIG EAST Tournament for the second consecutive season with an overall record of 19-11, an identical record from the 2006 season.

"As we approach our 2008 season, we are continuing to raise the bar for our program," said head coach **Holly Strauss-O'Brien**. "We have put together a challenging non-conference schedule that will prepare us for our BIG EAST Conference competition and move us towards our goal of making the NCAA Tournament."

The 2008 squad is made up of 14 student-athletes, including four newcomers to the program. Lone senior, **Megan Frey** (Chaska, Minn.), will lead the pack along with junior **Jessica Isaac** (Erlanger, Ky.) as co-captains for the year. The Huskies' nine returners will use their experience and leadership to guide the program to its third straight BIG EAST Conference Tournament.

Although the void left by graduating middle hitter and 2007 BIG EAST Conference First Team selection Sadé Chambers will be hard to fill, two-time BIG EAST Conference Freshman of the Week, **Rebecca Murray** (Carmel, Ind.), and the rest of the Huskies will look to make another powerful run to the top of the BIG EAST Conference standings.

"With a solid core of returning players we have to be consistent in living and executing our standards and expectations everyday," said Strauss-O'Brien. "When our goal is to try to do our best and when our focus is on preparation, sacrifice and effort, instead of numbers on the scoreboard, then we will put ourselves in a winning position."

Middle Hitters

In the 2007 season, UConn's middle hitters combined for 492 kills of the team's total kill mark of 1,605 along with a 1.79 kills per game average. Frey, who came off the bench in 2007 to pick up 33 kills and a .266 hitting percentage for the Huskies, will be the team's only senior. She will use her knowledge and experience to lead the Huskies to new heights this season.

"Megan is a diligent worker who has grown tremendously over the last three years," said Strauss-O'Brien. "Meg's versatility, combined with her experience, will contribute to the team's daily successes and achievements."

Murray will help the Huskies look to improve their front line attack with youth and athleticism. Murray recorded 269 kills in 101 games played last season, recording the best numbers for middle hitters on the UConn roster. Her tally of 98 total blocks, including 87 block assists, led the program.

"Although young, Rebecca gained a lot of match experience last season," said Strauss-O'Brien. "We look for Rebecca to continue to build off of her freshman year and develop a greater leadership role for us this season. She has really worked and improved on her transition game this past spring and we anticipate her to be a consistent and terminating force for us this season."

Lorelle Schaub (New Brighton, Minn.) will also look for more playing time this year as she sat out the 2007 season due to a shoulder injury. Her presence on the court is much needed as she is one of the veteran's on the team.

"After taking a medical red shirt last season due to shoulder surgery, Lorelle is physically ready to compete for a position in the middle this year," said Strauss-O'Brien. "Lo has the ability to dominate at the net both defensively and offensively."

PrepVolleyball Senior Ace Top 250 recruit **Allie Nickel** (Pittsford, N.Y.) will look to use her versatility and strength to her advantage and step in to contribute almost immediately to the Huskies' front line.

"Allie loves competition and works hard," said Strauss-O'Brien. "Her height, combined with her work ethic, will add tremendous depth and competition in the middle position."

Outside Hitters/Right Side Hitters

UConn's strong and consistent offense in 2007 came from powerful, yet youthful, hitters, led by a fierce competitor in 2008 graduate and 2007 BIG EAST First Team selection, Sadé Chambers. Chambers led the team with 368 kills, a 3.47 kills per game average and 408.5 total points. Filling the void of the Huskies' Most Valuable Player of the 2007 season will be junior **Kate Seabaugh** (St. Louis, Mo.). Seabaugh picked up 267 kills in 98 games played in 2007. She averaged 2.72 kills per game, while adding 20 service aces and 206 digs. Her strength and power on the outside should widen out the net for the UConn offensive.

"Over the past few years, Kate has matured and grown as a volleyball player and competitor," said Strauss-O'Brien. "We look to Kate to continue to be a primary passer and become a steady and reliable offensive player for us. Kate will bring great intensity and match experience to the floor this season."

Devon Farrell (Lafayette, Calif.) returns to the lineup after seeing time off the bench in 54 games last season. Farrell, picked up 57 kills, 51 digs and 11 blocks in 2007, providing solid performances for the Huskies when needed.

"This off season, Devon has worked to improve her overall game," said Strauss-O'Brien. "We need Dev to be an aggressive, dependable attacker and continue to develop court awareness. Her vibrant energy and selflessness will play an integral part of our team's success."

During the 2007 season, **Chauntay Mickens** (Germantown, Md.) recorded 72 kills in 49 games played off the bench, using her experience to lead the UConn hitters. A transfer in 2007 from the University of Dayton, Mickens 14 digs and 12 blocks and will look to improve her numbers in 2008.

"We need Chauntay to be an efficient and terminating attacker," said Strauss-O'Brien. "She is full of potential and has all the tools necessary to be a threatening force for us on the left side."

Sophomore **Lauren Lamberti** (Cary, Ill.) has used valuable time in the off season to become a stronger player at the net, as she uses her freshman year with the Huskies as a starting point for a successful career with the UConn volleyball program. In 2007, Lamberti recorded 278 kills in 106 games played, while averaging 2.62 kills and 0.63 blocks per game.

"Over the past year, Lauren has been working really hard in the weight room and on the court," said Strauss-O'Brien. "She has made significant improvements in physical strength and her defensive game. This season, we expect Berti to be Berti - play hard every point, every game, every day."

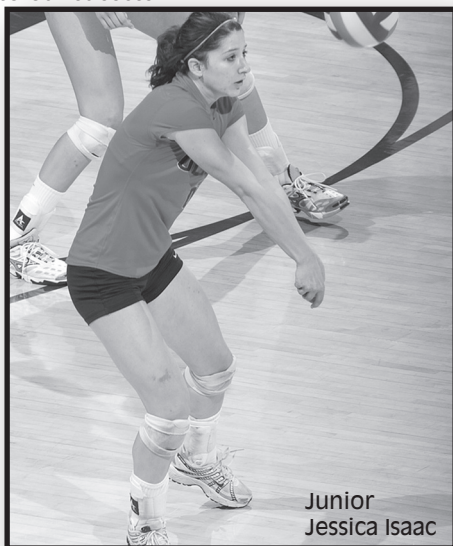
Another PrepVolleyball.com Senior Aces Top 250 selection, **Jordan Kirk** (Plano, Texas), will come into the UConn program and make an immediate impact both offensively and defensively for the Huskies. A Texas Girls Coaches Association (TGCA) All-State selection, Kirk was also a participant in the 2004 USA Volleyball High Performance A2 Camp.

"Jordan is a high energy, versatile player, with high-end potential," said Strauss-O'Brien. "She has a natural feel for blocking and plays hard and high. We look to Jordan to raise the level of play in our gym."

Defensive Specialist/Libero

The Huskies' defensive unit is filled with both experience and youth this season. Isaac will lead the way as she has the past two seasons as the Huskies' libero. In 2007, Isaac recorded 533 digs to surpass the 1,000-dig mark as just a sophomore. Averaging 5.03 digs per game, she played in 106 games for the Huskies while adding 37 service aces and 37 assists.

"Jessica's standards are high and she works daily to strive for excellence," said Strauss-O'Brien. "We expect Jess to have a great junior year. She has grown tremendously as a leader, an athlete and as a person. Her defense, ball control and passing are vital to our success."

Margot Deméré (Encinitas, Calif.) earned the 2007 Most Improved Award from her team after she came off the bench for the Huskies in 2007 and recorded 107 digs in 72 games played. This season she will look to contribute more to the team's defense with a strong back line.

"Margot has made important gains throughout this past year," said Strauss-O'Brien. "Her passing played a large role for us last season and we expect Margot to continue to grow as a defensive player and compete for a position."

Challenging Deméré for a spot on the court will be freshman **Hannah Corell** (Lancaster, Wisc.). Corell led her 17-Red Team to the Junior Olympics in the National Division in 2007 in Minneapolis, Minn. and will look to provide depth for the Huskies on the defensive end of the game.

"Hannah loves the game of volleyball," said Strauss-O'Brien. "She is a fiery competitor and will compete for a defensive position on the floor."

Setter

The Huskies' lone setter in 2007 Bridget Denson-Dorman led UConn to the top half of the BIG EAST in assists with 1,488 team assists and a per game average of 14.04. Denson-Dorman recorded 1,324 on the year to lead the Huskies before leaving UConn after the 2008 spring semester.

To fill the void left by Denson-Dorman, the Huskies will look for freshman **Annie Luhrsen** (Wheaton, Ill.) to come in and play a major role for the UConn program. Luhrsen, a two-time

Chicago Sun Times All-Area and *Champaign News Gazette* All-State selection as well as a *Chicago Tribune* All-State honoree, should make an immediate impact for the Huskies with her knowledge of the game and her hard work ethic. As a member of the 2008 USA Volleyball Junior National Team, she will be determined to continue her successful volleyball career with the Huskies.

"Annie is full of toughness, heart and guts," said Strauss-O'Brien. "We look to her to command an exciting offense this season and to lead through her competitive edge and tenacious work ethic."

The Schedule

The Huskies have a very competitive 2008 schedule that will include two teams from the 2007 Final CSTV/AVCA Division I Coaches' Top 25 Poll along with two teams who received votes for that poll.

"As we approach our 2008 season, we are continuing to raise the bar for our program," said Strauss-O'Brien. "We have to put together a challenging non-conference schedule that will prepare us for our BIG EAST Conference competition and move us towards the NCAA Tournament."

The Huskies will open the season at the Northern Illinois University Invite in Dekalb, Ill. on Aug. 29 and will face the NU Huskies along with Cleveland State and Chicago State.

UConn will next travel to Albany, N.Y. for the UAlbany Classic on Sept. 5-6. The Huskies will take on Wright State, Buffalo and host, Albany. The following weekend, UConn will head out to East Lansing, Mich. for the Michigan State Showcase. The Spartans finished the 2007 season ranked 20th in the nation, according to the coaches' top 15 poll and posted an overall record of 21-14. The Huskies will also face Wisconsin-Milwaukee as well as Florida A&M at the showcase as UConn has set a very competitive out of conference schedule.

The Huskies finally return to Storrs, Conn. to host non-conference opponent Fairfield in a 7:00 p.m. match on Sept. 17. The Fairfield match will begin a six-game home stand for the Huskies with the following weekend of Sept. 19-20 being the UConn Toyota Classic, in which UConn will play host to Cornell, Maine and Temple in Gampel Pavilion.

Finishing out the month of September will be the opening of BIG EAST Conference play, as UConn will host Louisville on Sept. 26 at 7:00 p.m. and Cincinnati at 2:00 p.m. on Sept. 28. Louisville also received votes in the final coaches' poll of 2007.

UConn will begin October on the road, as the Huskies travel to both Syracuse and Marquette for BIG EAST matches during the first weekend of the month. University of Hartford will play in Gampel Pavilion on Oct. 8 in a non-league battle before the Huskies host Rutgers in conference action on Oct. 12 at 2:00 p.m. Sacred Heart will make the in-state trip to visit the Huskies in Storrs for a weekday match-up on Oct. 15.

The Huskies will spend two straight weekends on the road, traveling to ranked opponent St. John's on Oct. 18 for a 2:00 p.m. BIG EAST battle. St. John's finished the 2007 season ranked 13th on the coaches' poll. The following day, the Huskies will travel to Long Island for a non-conference match before going to both Pittsburgh and West Virginia on Oct. 24 and 26 for BIG EAST matches. UConn will cap off the month of October with a home contest against conference opponent Seton Hall on October 31 at 8:00 p.m.

BIG EAST opponent, Villanova, will come to Storrs on Nov. 2 before Georgetown and South Florida travel up north the following weekend for conference matches. The Huskies will honor their senior class prior to the Nov. 9 2:00 p.m. contest as they wrap-up the year with their last home match of the season. UConn will finish their regular season schedule with a trip to DePaul on Nov. 14 followed by the last regular season contest match at Notre Dame on Nov. 16.

"Our ultimate goal is to have a great season and we believe that if we stay on the path that we have made for this program these past few years, there will be some great honors waiting for us at the end of the season," said Strauss-O'Brien.

Head Coach ♦ Fourth Season ♦ 53-35 Overall Record
North Carolina '03 ♦ Connecticut '05

Holly Strauss-O'Brien, enters her fourth season as head coach for the Connecticut women's volleyball program as she became the sixth head coach in the program's 32-year history. In three seasons, Strauss-O'Brien has turned UConn volleyball into a fierce competitor in the tough BIG EAST Conference as her team has clinched a spot in the BIG EAST Conference Tournament for the past two straight years.

In 2006, Strauss-O'Brien guided UConn to its first BIG EAST Tournament appearance since 2002 and finished with a 19-11 overall record and an 8-6 finish in BIG EAST play. The Huskies entered the BIG EAST tournament as the seventh seed and fell to the highly talented Louisville program 3-1.

In 2007, Strauss-O'Brien led the Huskies to the BIG EAST Tournament for the second consecutive year, after finishing the regular season in a three-

way tie in sixth place with an identical record from a year before.

Not only has Strauss-O'Brien's leadership led the Huskies to successful performances on the court, but it has allowed the program to develop off the court as well. Eight team members earned Director of Athletics Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll status, while seven members were named BIG EAST Academic All-Stars for their achievements in the classroom.

"The program is rapidly laying down the foundation for future success on the court and in the classrooms," said Strauss-O'Brien. "Our program is full of change...an exciting change."

Under the direction of Strauss-O'Brien, the Huskies have posted a 53-35 overall record since she took over the head coaching position, a .602 winning percentage in her short tenure at the helm of the program.

Senior Sadé Chambers earned First Team All-BIG EAST honors after the 2007 season, while Bridget Denson-Dorman, a member of Strauss-O'Brien's first recruiting class, earned a spot on the Second Team, her second straight year picking up BIG EAST honors.

At the end of the 2007 season, the UConn volleyball program honored its 2007 season with a team banquet, held on April 5, 2008. Three student-athletes received an award that night, as Margot Deméré was given the Most Improved award after having a successful freshman year campaign for the UConn program.

Jessica Isaac finished her sophomore year with a stellar season, as she surpassed the 1,000 dig mark in less than two seasons completed. Isaac earned both the Unsung Hero and Defensive Player of the Year award from her team as she led the program in digs and passing percentage all season. She ranked second in the BIG EAST in digs per game and in the UConn record books, she placed herself seventh in single season history, behind her own sixth place mark of 536, which she recorded during the 2006 season.

Sadé Chambers, after earning her BIG EAST First Team honors, was awarded both the program's Offensive Player of the Year honor as well as the distinction of Most Valuable Player. Chambers also earned the Outstanding Senior Athlete Award as classmate Julie Pickard earned a Senior Scholar Athlete Award at the 2008 UConn Club Dinner for their success both on and off the court in their last year with the Huskies.

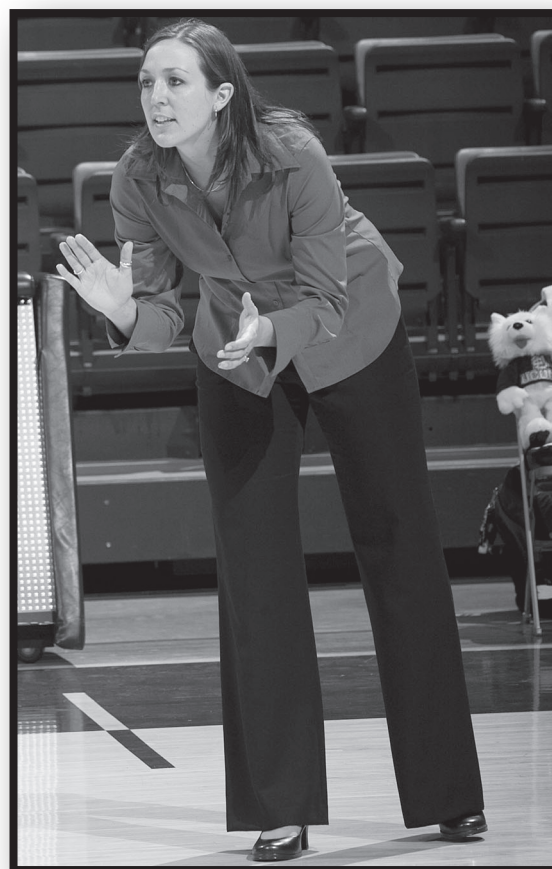
Strauss-O'Brien was named head coach in 2005 after serving as the Huskies' assistant coach. As a graduate assistant during the 2003 season, Strauss-O'Brien helped UConn to a

20-12 record, a six-match improvement over the previous year, before becoming the program's full-time assistant at the start of the 2004 campaign.

Strauss-O'Brien was appointed interim head coach midway through the 2004 season, and the team responded by winning six of their first seven matches under her leadership, closing the season with a 17-11 overall record and a 6-4 posting in the BIG EAST.

"Coach Strauss-O'Brien is one of the best young coaches in volleyball and has resurrected the UConn program with vision, energy, commitment and passion," said Associate Athletic Director and Program Administrator Vaughn Williams. "There is no doubt that this program is headed in the right direction."

Prior to UConn, Strauss-O'Brien served as a coach for the Triangle Volleyball Club 17s in Durham, N.C., where she led her squad to a Regional Championship title. Strauss-O'Brien enjoyed an illustrious playing career at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. On the floor, she helped the Tar Heels put together a solid run, going 115-22 (.839) in her four seasons, including a 32-4 mark and a trip to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in 2002, while earning three tournament titles and a pair of ACC regular season crowns. Individually, Strauss-O'Brien, a two-time team captain, remains the school's career-leader in blocks per game (1.24 bpg.), while her total of 311 block assists places her second on the all-time list.

A native of Hamilton, Ontario, Strauss-O'Brien also gained interna-

tional playing experience as a member of the Canadian Junior National Team from 1996-98, making the All-Star team at the Cuba Invitational. She graduated from North Carolina with a bachelor's degree in psychology and received her master's degree in kinesiology, sport management and sociology of sport at UConn in 2005.

Strauss-O'Brien married Tim O'Brien on May 24, 2008 and they reside in Vernon, Conn.

Associate Head Coach ♦ Fourth Season

Tim O'Brien returns to the Connecticut volleyball team for his fourth season and his first season as an Associate Head Coach.

O'Brien serves as the recruiting coordinator for the Huskies, where he has made a direct impact bringing in an outstanding recruiting class in 2006 that helped the Huskies make the BIG EAST Tournament for the first time since 2002. For the 2007 season, O'Brien brought in three talented freshmen that helped continue the Huskies success in the BIG EAST Conference.

In all of his three seasons at UConn, setters have earned All-BIG EAST Second Team honors under his tutelage, including Bridget Denson-Dorman in 2006 and 2007 and Jenny Neelands in 2005. O'Brien has played an integral role in the rapid, positive change the program has undergone in only a short two years.

Aside from recruiting, he is active in organizing the offense as a technical trainer and teacher. O'Brien also works on editing video and analyzing statistics using the Data Volley program.

"Tim immediately impacted our program when he came here four years ago," said Strauss-O'Brien. "He is an excellent recruiter, trainer and teacher of the game. Tim's successful volleyball background combined with his commitment and dedication to the University of Connecticut creates an influential force daily as we strive to achieve our aspired vision of UConn volleyball."

O'Brien returned to New England after three years at Loyola University Chicago, where he served as the school's head women's volleyball coach, which included a trip to the NCAA Tournament. Prior to his promotion to head coach, O'Brien spent two seasons as an assistant and then one season as head coach of the men's volleyball team.

As the front man for Loyola's women's team, O'Brien guided the Ramblers to a 22-9 overall record and captured the Horizon League Tournament title in 2004, leading them into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2000. All told, Loyola posted an impressive 67-28 record (.705) in O'Brien's three years on the staff. He was instrumental in the tutoring of six different Loyola All-Horizon League players, one Horizon League Newcomer of the Year and the school's first All-American since 1991.

He was just as successful at the helm of the Ramblers' men's volleyball program, as his team posted a 19-8 record during the 2003 season, finished 11th in the final national rankings and came within one victory of a berth in the NCAA National Semifinals.

Prior to making the move to the Midwest, O'Brien was an assistant coach for a pair of seasons at his alma mater, Springfield College. In those two years, the Pride posted a 57-20 (.740) record, including a 31-7 mark in 2001, and captured the New England Women's and Men's Athletic Conference (NEWMAC) Championship that season. O'Brien also had a decorated career as a middle

blocker/outside hitter for four years at Springfield. During his freshman season, the Pride claimed the No. 1 ranking in the final *USA Today*/Mizuno Division III Coaches Poll, and he helped Springfield capture the Inaugural Molten Division III National Title as a sophomore. O'Brien served as team captain during the 1998 and 1999 seasons.

A native of New Bedford, Mass., O'Brien graduated from Springfield College in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in athletic training and later earned a master's degree in athletic administration from Springfield College in 2002. O'Brien and Holly Strauss-O'Brien were recently married and now reside in Vernon, Conn.

The BIG EAST Conference

The 2008-09 academic year will be the 30th for The BIG EAST Conference. While the league has gone through membership changes since its birth, it has never been stronger. This academic year will mark the conference's fourth year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed. The league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship. The student-athletes of the member schools continue to maintain the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned their share of recognition at the highest levels in 2007-08. Four women's teams advanced to their respective NCAA Final Fours: Connecticut field hockey and women's basketball, Notre Dame soccer and Syracuse lacrosse.

Individually in men's sports, Villanova's Bobby Curtis was the NCAA outdoor track champion in the 5,000 meters. Connecticut's O'Brian White won the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the highest individual honor in soccer. Two years ago, BIG EAST male and female student-athletes were Hermann Trophy winners.

In men's basketball, the BIG EAST tied its own record set in 2006 by earning eight NCAA Championship bids. BIG EAST women's teams have received eight NCAA invitations in each of the past two years. The combined 16 men's and women's berths in 2008 was an NCAA first.

The quality of BIG EAST football has never been more balanced. Six of the league's eight squads were nationally ranked in 2007. For the third straight year, the BIG EAST representative in the Bowl Championship Series won its BCS bowl game. The BIG EAST continued to produce student-athletes who were at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. Nineteen BIG EAST players were chosen to their respective ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Teams, including eight first-team selections.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida. BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 125 student-athletes have won individual national titles. The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 370 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors.

Last year in football, Louisville quarterback Brian Brohm, who finished his career as the BIG EAST's career passing leader, was one of the league's eight first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America team picks.

Also, Connecticut's Rebecca Lobo, one of the most heralded women's basketball players in the history of the sport, was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 2008. Lobo, a two-time BIG EAST Player of the Year, led the Huskies to the 1995 NCAA national championship.

The BIG EAST has enjoyed tremendous basketball success, especially in this decade. In 2003-04,

Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 10 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the last nine NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003. In 2007, the league conducted its first women's lacrosse championship tournament. In 2009-10, the BIG EAST will begin sponsorship of men's lacrosse, its 24th sport.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably shows a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

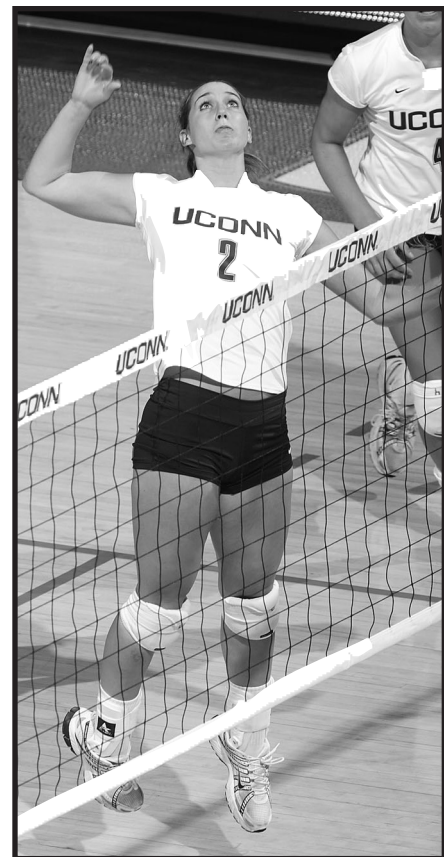
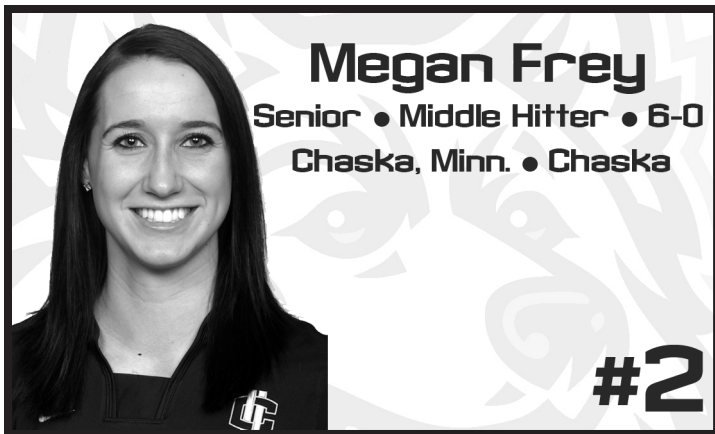
Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

For 2009-10, the BIG EAST will undergo one significant change. Tranghese has announced that he will step down from his position on June 30, 2009.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC. While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last six summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes.

**CONTINUING ON THE PATH TO GREATNESS**

The University of Connecticut volleyball team continued where it left off in 2006, receiving a berth to the BIG EAST Tournament for the second straight year and just the second time since 2002. With strong leadership, its numerous veterans combined with a handful of talented newcomers, the Huskies ended the 2007 season with the exact record as they finished with in 2006. UConn ended the year with a 19-11 overall record and an 8-6 mark in the BIG EAST Conference.

A SUCCESSFUL START

The Huskies opened the season with a 7-0 winning streak, beginning on the road against in-state rival Hartford. UConn shut out the Hawks 3-0, which was followed by another sweep of Manhattan in the Huskies' home opener that helped guide the program into invitational play at both Davidson and Saint Louis. UConn won its first four matches 3-0 and won five of its first seven matches with that mark. At the Davidson Invitational freshman **Lauren Lamberti** (Cary, Ill.) was named the tournament's MVP and earned a spot on the All-Tournament team along with **Gina Heiderman**. At the Billiken Invitational, Lamberti earned another All-Tournament Team honor as teammate **Jessica Isaac** (Erlanger, Ky.) joined the first-year starter on the All-Tournament Team.

STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

UConn prides itself on having challenging schedules, including the competitive BIG EAST Conference but also non-conference opponents and selected tournaments. The Huskies took their first loss against host Saint Louis at the competitive Billiken Invitational on Sept. 8 but bounced back as they returned to Storrs for four straight home matches, including the UConn Toyota Classic. The Huskies defeated Northeastern 3-2 in a battle to the finish before losing to the talented Pride of Hofstra 3-0 in the first match of the classic. The Hofstra match-up was the first match of the season in which the Huskies did not take a game from an opponent.

A 3-1 victory over Long Island was followed with a 3-1 loss to Middle Tennessee before the Huskies began BIG EAST play on road. The Huskies split their first two conference matches, losing 3-2 to Villanova and defeating Seton Hall 3-0. UConn ousted West Virginia in Storrs then fell three straight against some of the top programs in the league in Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and Louisville before sweeping Rutgers 3-0. UConn returned to action in Storrs as the Huskies faced 22nd ranked St. John's in league action. The Red Storm, eventual BIG EAST Tournament Champion and Regular Season Co-Champion, beat the Huskies 3-0.

UConn jumped back on track and won six of its last seven regular season matches after falling to the Red Storm, including a victory over Notre Dame, just the second time the Huskies have defeated the Irish in program history. Despite a loss to South Florida, Isaac recorded a milestone as she surpassed the 1,000-dig mark with 16 digs against the Bulls.

En route to post season play, **Rebecca Murray** (Carmel, Ind.) was named BIG EAST Freshman of the Week two straight weeks for her outstanding play during that time frame. The Huskies winning-streak at the

end of the season was enough to earn them a trip to Milwaukee, Wisc. for the BIG EAST Tournament at Marquette as the No. 7 seed. The Huskies finished the year tied in sixth place in the BIG EAST standings before earning the seventh seed in post season play.

POST SEASON PLAY

UConn finished the regular season with an overall record of 18-10 and an 8-6 record in the BIG EAST. The Huskies entered the 2007 BIG EAST Tournament as the seventh seeded team and faced second seeded St. John's in the first round of play. After a first game battle, which saw the Huskies fall to the Red Storm by just three points, UConn fell two straight by scores of 30-16 and 30-15 to end their run at the tournament title.

Despite an early departure from post season play, the Huskies' **Sadé Chambers** and **Bridget Denson-Dorman** earned BIG EAST end of the year honors. Denson-Dorman was selected for the All-BIG EAST Second Team for the second straight year after ending the regular season with 1,230 assists, a 12.55 per game average. Chambers earned All-BIG EAST First Team honors after leading the Huskies with 333 kills and a 3.40 kills per game tally. Chambers became the first player in a UConn jersey to make the All-BIG EAST First Team since **Jamie Hadenfeldt** in 2004.

After the BIG EAST Tournament, the Huskies traveled to Arkansas to take on the Lady Razorbacks in a non-league match-up to finish the season. UConn pulled away with a 3-2 victory to end its season with 19 wins. Chambers led the Huskies with a 25-kill performance as she surpassed the 1,000-kill mark to end her career at UConn with 1,011 kills.

HUSKIES IN THE BIG EAST

UConn finished seventh in the BIG EAST Conference with a league record of 8-6. The Huskies finished in the top-five in the conference in opponent's hitting percentage and service aces as they held competition to a .192 percentage and recorded 1.60 service aces per game. UConn finished the season third in the BIG EAST in digs as the Huskies recorded 1,666 in 106 games played, while averaging 15.72 per game.

Denson-Dorman recorded some impressive numbers for the Huskies as she finished fourth in the BIG EAST with 1,324 assists while averaging 12.49 assists per game. Isaac ended the season ninth in the conference in service aces with a 0.35 average per game and 37 total. She also finished with 533 digs and a 5.03 per game average as she picked up the second-best numbers in that category in the conference.

Denson-Dorman recorded 58 assists in the three-game match on Nov. 4 against Syracuse to mark a BIG EAST three-game match-high. The Huskies also recorded a conference record of 100 digs in the four-game match against Notre Dame on Oct. 27.

THE UCONN RECORD BOOK

Chambers, Denson-Dorman and Isaac each put their names in the UConn record book for career and single-season milestones. Chambers finished her career ninth in kills with 1,011 in four years played. She also finished her career with a .254 hitting percentage, good for a tie in the 10th place spot in the program's record book.

Denson-Dorman leaves the program in fifth place with 2,631 assists in just two seasons with the Huskies, while Isaac sits at the eighth spot in career digs with 1,069 in just two years played.

In the Huskies' single season record book, Denson-Dorman finished the 2007 season with a fourth-best tally of 1,324 assists in 106 games played as Isaac recorded 533 digs in 2007, good for the seventh spot in digs in a single-season. Isaac's mark of 536 digs in 2006, sits above her new tally at sixth place.

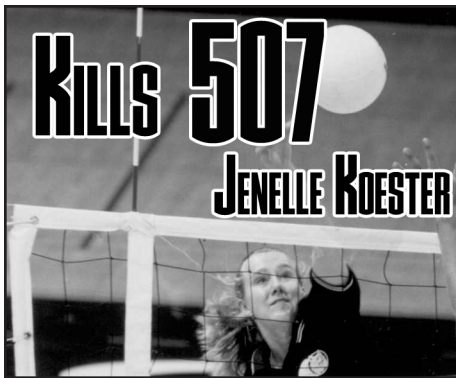

UCONN'S DOUBLE THOUSANDS

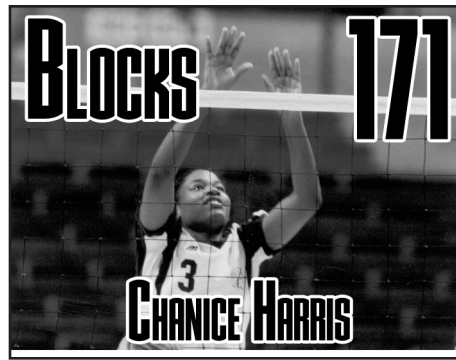
Only six players in the history of Connecticut volleyball have collected both 1,000 kills and 1,000 digs during their Husky careers, including two members of the class of 1998. *Kim Lobach* was the first to accomplish such a feat when she collected 1,189 kills and 1,332 digs from 1990-93. *Jennifer Halusek* became the second member of the elite group after just three seasons at UConn, and upon finishing her four-year career, she totaled 1,165 kills and 1,393 digs from 1993-96. *Heather Sokol* joined the group in 1996, finishing a stellar career with 1,005 kills and 1,729 digs from 1993-96. *Annette Rynn* (1995-98) became the fourth Husky to reach the milestone, accomplishing the feat as a junior in 1997, and recorded 1,508 kills and 1,722 digs by graduation. *Jenelle Koester* (1995-98) became UConn's all-time career kills leader as a junior, finishing her collegiate career with a total of 1,724, and joined this elite group when she completed her senior season with an even 1,000 digs. Most recently, *Jamie Hadenfeldt* (2001-04) joined the list her senior season, totaling 1,357 kills and 1,399 digs.

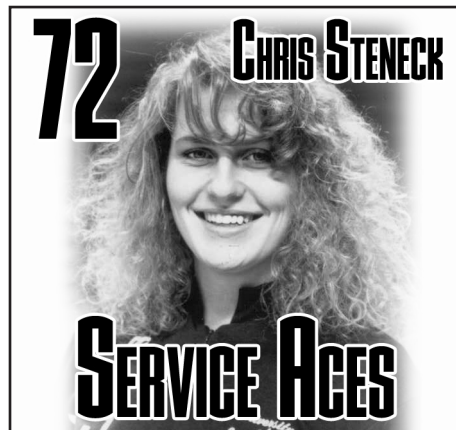

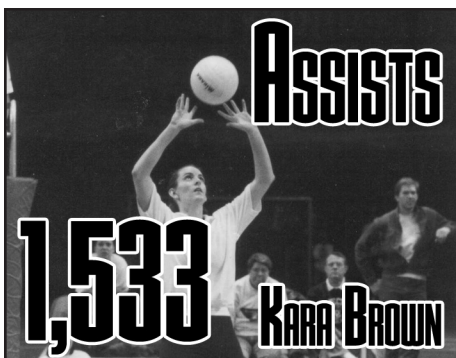

- The University grants 16 graduate degrees in more than 90 fields of study, and provides graduate professional programs in business, law, medicine, dental medicine, pharmacy and social work.



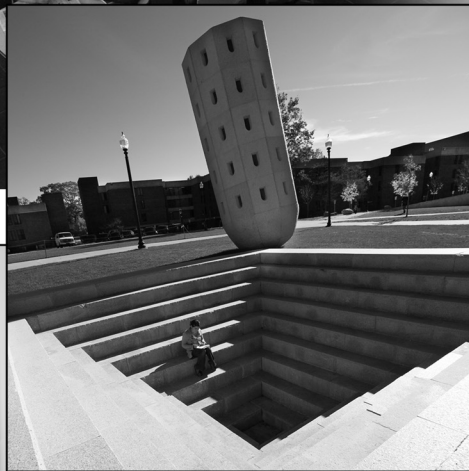
Faculty

- Faculty initiative created an unprecedented opportunity for UConn students to study at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City;
- UConn's Neag School of Education is home to the renowned National Research Center on the Gifted and Talented, and to the Accelerated Schools Project, and one of 11 schools nationwide selected for the Carnegie Corporation's prestigious Teachers for a New Era initiative.
- Our professors strive to personalize the UConn experience. Presiding over classes that average 30 students, faculty members are dedicated to their roles as teachers, student-advisors and mentors. In UConn's undergraduate summer research program, students have the opportunity to participate in original research or receive a grant to work with our renowned professors.
- Researchers in UConn's School of Medicine have successfully isolated the gene that causes the most common form of glaucoma, a breakthrough that could lead to early detection and prevention of blindness.





Student Profile

- More than 28,000 undergraduate and graduate students enrolled, representing nearly every state in the nation and more than 100 countries.
- Average SAT scores of incoming freshmen at Storrs are up 79 points since 1996 and are now 1192.
- Minority freshman enrollment at Storrs and the regional campuses has more than doubled since 1995.
- Since 1995, 928 valedictorians and salutatorians have enrolled at all campuses. In the fall of 2007, 40 percent of the freshmen entering the Storrs campus were ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school class and more than 81 percent were in the top 25 percent of their class.
- The 275 students UConn welcomed into our Honors Program in 2007 had an average SAT score of 1409, an 11-point increase compared to the preceding year.

Student Life

- UConn offers more than 400 clubs and organizations.
- UConn's Study Abroad offers 200 study-abroad programs, including travel to more than 65 countries.
- Cooperative education programs and internships integrate classroom learning and work experience in business, industry and public service.



Attractions

- In 2007, nearly 39,000 prospective students and their families launched their tours of the UConn campus from the Lodewick Visitors Center, the gateway to the University's 4,000-acre main campus. In 1995, only a third as many students visited the campus.
- Visitors may experience it all while lodging in the Nathan Hale Inn, a convenient hotel and conference facility on the UConn campus.
- Chief among UConn's dynamic academic facilities is the Homer Babbidge Library, which contains more than three million volumes. The Association of Research Libraries ranks UConn's library system the top public research library in New England.
- UConn's Jorgensen Center for the Performing Arts showcases the region's most noteworthy dramatic events. It stages professional touring attractions that range from Broadway musicals to intimate cabarets.
- The collections of the recently expanded William Benton Museum of Art, which includes 4,000 pieces; the museum includes a gallery that is exclusively dedicated to presenting human rights-oriented visual arts, as well as an outdoor meditation sculpture garden.
- The artifacts on display in UConn's Museum of Natural History further enhance the University's cultural environment.
- The J. Robert Donnelly Husky Heritage Sports Museum features photos, videos, plaques, banners, uniforms and NCAA National championship trophies of the men's and women's basketball teams and the men's soccer team.



HARRY A. GAMPTEL PAVILION (10, 167) HOME COURT OF THE HUSKIES

A spacious, state-of-the-art building, Harry A. Gampel Pavilion opened in January of 1990 and totals more than 171,000 square feet in the domed area while an additional 39,000 square feet comprise the attached Wolff-Zackin Natatorium (including a 50-meter Olympic size swimming pool).

The complex was a \$28 million project and measures 320 feet in diameter in the circular domed arena area. The brilliant aluminum dome of the Gampel Pavilion towers more than 130 feet in the air from ground level.

The main arena includes two large four-color scoreboards with complete video and graphic message capability. The "Alumni Court" main arena floor is constructed with the latest version of spring air wood.

The renovations to the lower level endzones during the summer and fall of 2002 have added another 140 seats. The current capacity of Gampel Pavilion is 10,167, making the building the largest on-campus basketball facility in New England.

Rounding out the arena level of Gampel Pavilion are individual areas for Connecticut's Division of Athletics Sports Medicine and Athletic Performance staff.

In the past 15 seasons, the Connecticut women's volleyball team has recorded an overall record of 147-44 since beginning play in 1993 in Gampel Pavilion. During the 1993, 1994 and 1995 seasons, the Huskies split time between Gampel Pavilion and the Hugh S. Greer Field House. The 1996 season marked the first year that Connecticut played all its home matches in Gampel Pavilion.



Bruce Cohen Counseling Program for Intercollegiate Athletics

The University of Connecticut is committed to each of its student-athletes as a total person. Participation in athletics is important, but it represents only one aspect of an individual's college experience. At the University of Connecticut, academic achievement is a prime concern. Impressively, for the past five years, the Connecticut student-athlete academic retention rate has been 99.0 percent.

The University's commitment to the student-athlete is a dual one. Athletic participation is not viewed as an obstacle to the attainment of one's educational goals, rather it is seen as a complimentary activity. Each supports the other. Athletic excellence is stressed, but academic achievement is never compromised - indeed, it is given the utmost priority.

For this reason, the University recognizes the need for a support program for intercollegiate athletes. The Counseling Program for Intercollegiate Athletes (CPIA) assists the athletes in achieving their academic goals. The CPIA staff serves as liaison to the academic faculty and to the Division of Athletics.

CPIA was established in 1986 to provide comprehensive academic support to all UConn student-athletes. CPIA's staff includes a director, eight full-time counselors, three graduate assistants and a large complement of tutors. The program boasts its own Macintosh/IBM writing lab with access to the Internet, as well as reference tools in the Homer Babbidge Library. Writing tutors are available each weeknight in the CPIA office. CPIA also provides laptop computers for team use during travel to away games. Individual tutors in all subjects are readily available to student-athletes upon request.



Dr. Jeffrey Anderson Director of Sports Medicine

The Department of Sports Medicine in the University of Connecticut Division of Athletics works as an integrated multidisciplinary team whose purpose is to provide an optimal, safe environment for each of UConn's intercollegiate student-athletes to train and participate in their sport. The staff takes great pride in the individual attention paid to each student-athlete. The Sports Medicine staff is devoted to preventing injury, rapidly diagnosing and treating injury, and maximizing athletic performance. The disciplines of athletic training, strength and conditioning, sports medicine, orthopaedic sports medicine, optometry, nutrition, exercise physiology, and psychology work in concert to provide comprehensive care for each student-athlete.

The Sports Medicine team is spearheaded by UConn Director of Sports Medicine Jeffrey Anderson, M.D., and UConn Team Physician Thomas Trojan, M.D. The Orthopaedic Sports Medicine specialists for the team include Edward Collins, M.D., of the Connecticut Sports Medicine and Orthopaedic Center in Willimantic; Dr. Michael Joyce of the Orthopaedic Sports Specialists in Glastonbury; Barry Messenger, M.D., of Sports Medicine and Orthopaedic Surgery in Manchester; and Robert Arciero, M.D. of the University of Connecticut Health Center Department of Orthopaedics in Farmington.

The Department of Sports Medicine works intimately with the Departments of Kinesiology and Nutritional Sciences on the University of Connecticut campus. This working relationship affords the student-athletes with the input of several nationally recognized exercise scientists. This cooperation also keeps the sports medicine staff on the cutting edge of developments in the fields of human performance and sports nutrition. Members of the UConn sports medicine staff are actively engaged in research that directly benefits the care of each student-athlete.

The UConn Sports Medicine team is housed in state-of-the-art facilities in the Hugh S. Greer Field House and the Harry A. Gampel Pavilion, as well as a new and expanded sports medicine treatment center located in the UConn Football Facilities Building.

The Department of Sports Medicine at the University of Connecticut administers to the daily needs of over 600 male and female intercollegiate student-athletes who are competing in 24 different varsity programs.

The Department of Sports Medicine at the University of Connecticut plays a critical role in assuring that all UConn student-athletes have 24-hour access to the finest medical support and quality health care possible. Through patient care and ongoing research and education, the department continues to provide Husky teams a competitive edge from the medical perspective.



Jerry Martin Strength & Conditioning

The strength and conditioning program for the University of Connecticut volleyball student-athletes is under the supervision of UConn Strength and Conditioning Coordinator Jerry Martin. The Strength and Conditioning staff services all 24 of Connecticut's intercollegiate sports.

UConn volleyball players have the use of two different weight rooms in the Harry A. Gampel Pavilion and Hugh S. Greer Field House. In all, there are over 8,000 square feet of weight training facilities available for all UConn athletes.

The weight room in the Harry A. Gampel Pavilion is a free weight facility and supplies the Husky players areas in which to perform their power and Olympic lifts. The facility in the Greer Field House is fitted with more free weights so that the UConn players can incorporate circuit training, speed training, and heavy negative workouts into their total strength training program.

Each program can be manipulated in order to fulfill the specific needs of the individual. Specific testing is done to each player to monitor progress in strength, power, body composition, anaerobic conditioning, and flexibility. These tests provide the coaches and medical staff with an accurate athletic profile on each volleyball player.



Kristen Altieri Athletic Communications

Kristen Altieri is in her second year with the University of Connecticut athletic communications office and is the primary contact for the women's volleyball program.

She also serves as the primary media contact for baseball, women's ice hockey, women's cross country and women's track and field, while assisting with several other sports at Connecticut.

Altieri, a native of Hamden, Conn., graduated from Endicott College (Mass.) in 2005 with a bachelor's degree in sports management. She then interned at Southern Connecticut State University during the 2005-06 and 2006-07 seasons before beginning at Connecticut in July 2007.
