NOTE

The Comet, 12/3/48, pg. 4 has a story on the first year, including Coach Ropp asking his players one day in practice to "fight hard". The next day, while practicing, as the center stooped over the ball, a .44 revolver fell out of his hip pocket. When Coach Ropp asked the player for an explanation, the player answered with, 'Didn't you tell us just yesterday that you wanted us to get in that line and fight hard? Well, I just wanted to be prepared.' Coach Ropp then explained what fight hard meant in football terms. An abridged version of this story is recounted as well in The Comet, 4/25/58, pg. 3 and The Comet, 4/29/49, pg. 5.

Ropp said that he only had one man on the team who had ever played football, most of his team had never seen a game.
