CREDENTIALS >>

All requests for working press, radio, television, photography or scouting credentials should be mailed or faxed on letterhead to Sports Information Director Adam Quisenberry or Sports Information Assistant Tiffanie Hatley at least one week prior to the match. Season credential requests should be sent at least two weeks prior to the first game.

Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. Admission to the match is by pass only.

Accreditation Guidelines >>

- ▶ Only full-time, salaried employees intending to provide actual game coverage may receive credentials.
- ▶ A requesting media agency must represent a collective, organizational editorial voice, not simply the offerings of a single individual.
- ▶ Membership in a writer's association does not automatically qualify an agency for credentials.
- ▶ A media agency may assign one of its credentials to its online entity.

▶ An online entity, not associated with a traditional media agency, may qualify for one credential, subject to the following conditions:

1. An online entity may receive a credential only if its own full-time staff writes a majority of that site's material.
2. Online entities that focus primarily on University of Houston Athletics and sponsor message boards or chat rooms, may receive credentials provided they adhere to a policy that requires that a posted message or opinion is identified with the actual name and city of the individual posting the message.
3. Any online service that is recognized as an outlet intended primarily for the purpose of delivering news related to the recruitment of student-athletes will not qualify for credentials.
4. Online entities will not receive photography credentials.
5. Online entities (other than those identified above) registering 20,000 legitimate unique users per month in each of the past 12 months will be given first consideration.

When the University of Houston tennis team returns to action in the spring, the roster will look similar, with two newcomers in the books. The Cougars welcome Laura Ring, a transfer from Texas Tech, and Alix Young, a freshman from Easthampton, Mass.

Six letterwinners including seniors, Jordan McCombs, Vicky Simpson and Lynley Wasson, junior Neila Starratt and sophomores Lucy Forward and Joanna Kacprzyk will be returning for the 2008-09 season.

Head coach John Severance will be left with the task of continuing the Cougars' winning record and winning the Conference USA Championships.

"My goals for the season are always the same, I want to win the conference tournament," Severance said. "I want to be in the national rankings week-in and week-out. Those are challenges I want to overcome to get to an NCAA tournament bid, whether we get there as an at large team or we get there through an automatic bid from winning the conference tournament."

**SINGLES**

Last season, the Cougars went 85-67 in singles play. At the one spot, Forward won the most matches, finishing 7-15 on the year. Overall, Simpson finished at .680, winning 17 of her 25 matches. Wasson also finished with high marks, finishing 16-8 overall. Wasson won 11 of 16 matches in the four spot.

"Our singles lineup is the deepest lineup we've ever had since I've been her," Severance said. "This season, I expect our four through six spots to finish higher than last season. I also expect one through three to do much better. I don't know where our players will be playing, but at this point, I could stick in any of the eight girls in the six singles spots and we would be pretty solid."



three to six spot, but she will need to continue to work hard and become more consistent."

A new name to the roster, Young, will be great contender for the one through three spot this season.

"As a freshman, Alix should place in a top three spot. She is very competitive and has the talent to step up," Severance said.

Kacprzyk is another competitive player who will see a lot of action in singles play. Kacprzyk did not play in the fall of 2007-08 season.

"Joanna played singles and doubles last year, but she is making huge steps forward. I expect her to contribute in both singles and doubles, but a strong fit for singles," Severance said.

**DOUBLES**

Last season, the Cougars struggled in doubles, however, still finished with a winning record of 44-34 (.564). Kacprzyk and Wasson were the big winners for doubles finishing 9-1 at the No. 2 spot. McCombs and Forward were also in the mix, finishing 9-6 (.600) at the No. 1 spot.

"We are looking better for our doubles teams," Severance said. "The quality of play today is much better than any of the other doubles played last season. This is very encouraging for us. I expect to see Jordan play at the No. 1 doubles spot. She can teach whomever she is playing with. I expect her to win a lot of matches in doubles. Lynley is another senior that I expect to go out and win a lot of matches. She has worked on her ball movement and is very consistent."

A new face thrown into the mix of doubles play will be Laura Ring, a Texas Tech transfer.

"She is very fit, athletic and a positive person," Severance said. "We need players like her on our team. She has a lot of spunk and energy. I anticipate her to play high in doubles, but she will need to unlearn a lot of what she learned



Coming back for her fourth season, and the first to finish four years under Severance, is Simpson, who won .680 of her matches last season, and finished 10-5 at the No. 5 spot.

"Vicky is a fierce competitor and someone who should end her senior year on a solid note," Severance said.

Starratt will be a great competitor for both singles and doubles play. The lone junior will fight to compete in the three to six spot. Last season, Starratt finished 9-10, just below .500. In the No. 3 spot, she finished 6-8, and in the No. 4 spot she took two matches.

"Neila has great work ethic. Last year she played mostly No. 3 singles," Severance said. "This year, I think she can play anywhere from the

**SCHEDULE**

The Cougars will start the season on the road before returning to their own John E. Hoff Courts on Feb. 5 to compete against Montana State. The home schedule includes five consecutive match-ups against Sam Houston State (Feb. 18), Memphis (Feb. 20), Tulane (Feb. 22), McNeese State (March 7) and East Tennessee State (March 9). The Cougars will return home once again for five more matches in a row including Tulsa (March 29), SMU and Prairie View, which are both played on April 10.

"We are playing a lot of teams we've never played before," Severance said. "I've never played ten of these schools. So going to different places and playing different teams, is exciting because you are not in the same rut as playing home or away with Texas or Louisiana schools all the time. That gets a little boring."

On the road, new opponents have been added to the schedule. To start off the 2009 season, the Cougars will be on the road for their first five matches, which include three matches in Oregon; Portland State (Jan. 23), Idaho (Jan. 24), Oregon (Jan. 25). Houston will travel to Nacogdoches on Jan. 31 to compete against Stephen F. Austin and Louisiana Tech. On Feb. 6, Houston will travel to Shreveport, La., to compete against Grambling State and Centenary College. In Natchitoches, La., the Cougars will play Northwestern on Feb. 14 and Southern Miss on Feb. 15. After a long stretch at home, the tennis team will travel to Hammond, La., to compete against Southeastern Louisiana (March 13). Houston will play Idaho State in Pocatello, Idaho. In the final road matches of the season, the Cougars will travel to Bozeman, Mont., to play Montana State (March 20), Montana (March 21) and Utah State (March 22).

The Conference USA Championships, hosted by Rice will be held April 16-18.

"Our conference is in the top five in the country," Severance said. "With the influx of private schools and a couple of teams that have been there for awhile its makes it a very difficult conference. The fact that we've been competing with schools and competing for a conference title the last four years says quite a bit. It's unfortunate that we can't have more teams get higher ranked. I think it's going to happen this year. I think there could be at least six teams in Conference USA ranked inside the top 75, that's a pretty strong conference."

**HEAD COACH JOHN SEVERANCE, ASSISTANT COACH JO KEENE AND SENIORS**

John Severance embarks on his fifth season as head coach of the University of Houston tennis team and his eighth season with the program after spending three seasons as an assistant coach.

Last season, Severance led the Cougars to the Quarterfinals at the Conference USA Championships, which were held at the John E. Hoff Courts. The Cougars lost to No. 64 Rice, 4-3.

In 2008, Severance finished the season with his fourth-consecutive winning record completing the 2008 season 16-11. With the wins, Severance has increased his overall record to 66-35, ranking him third on Houston's all-time coaching records and leaving him just five wins shy of second-place coach Daryl Gralka.

Severance also ranks second in program history with a winning percentage of .653.

The Cougars beat one of five ranked teams, defeating No. 38 Louisville, 4-3, on March 22, 2008. Houston also won nine of their 12 home games.

Under Severance's guidance departing senior, Leila Salek won 18 of 24 singles matches, earning her spot on the 2007-08 All-Conference USA Second Team.

"Our philosophy is simple. We want to recruit good kids and develop them in the classroom and on the court. If an athlete is wanting to improve her tennis game, and is willing to work hard, Houston is the place for her. We not only develop these players on the court, we also train these girls with tennis specific weights, and a conditioning program (ACT), Advanced Circuit Training," Severance said.



In the 2006-07 season, Houston went 13-9, as Severance marked a milestone of 50 wins in just his first three seasons, the fastest of any Cougars' women's tennis coach. The Cougars, under Severance, have produced five All-Conference honorees and the 2007 C-USA Newcomer of the Year.

Since his arrival at Houston, the Cougars have climbed from a seventh-place finish in his first year as an assistant coach, to Top-Four C-USA finishes in two of the last three seasons. Houston's success on the courts brought the program its highest ITA national ranking since 2001, as the Cougars were ranked as high as No. 67 in 2006.

Prior to Severance's arrival, the Cougars had not finished with a winning record since 1998. Houston has steadily increased their number of wins each season under Severance and finished above the .500 mark the last four seasons, including a .800 winning percentage in 2006, the second highest in the program's 29-year history.

Over that time, Severance has helped coach eight All-Conference players, including 2002 C-USA Player of the Year and 2006 Wimbledon Second Rounder Sarah Borwell, two-time C-USA pick Kami Miller and 2007 C-USA Newcomer of the Year Leila Salek.

The transition into coaching at the collegiate level has been an easy one for Severance, who is a natural with teaching mechanics, strategy and point development.



Born in Salt Lake City, Utah, and raised in Phoenix, Ariz., Severance joined the program in 2001 after working at the Tucson Racquet and Fitness Club in Tucson, Ariz. He is a certified member of the United States Professional Tennis Association and has been given the elite rating of Professional I.

Prior to his appointment at Houston, Severance worked with the juniors in the excellence program at the Tucson Racquet and Fitness Club and in his spare time helped coach the Saint Gregory College Prep boys' and girls' tennis teams. In 2001, he helped the boys' team to a regional title and assisted the girls' team in winning the state championship.

"Being a former student-athlete, I'm trying to give my players the knowledge that I have gained since playing," Severance said. "Looking at tennis from a coach's perspective, you realize how important it is to work hard off the court in addition to putting in quality work when you are on the court. It doesn't just take a good player to win. It takes an all-around athlete."

"You can see it in the world's best players," Severance continued. "They are not at the top of their games because they change the way they play. They are the greatest because they have increased their strength and conditioning in addition to their tennis talent."

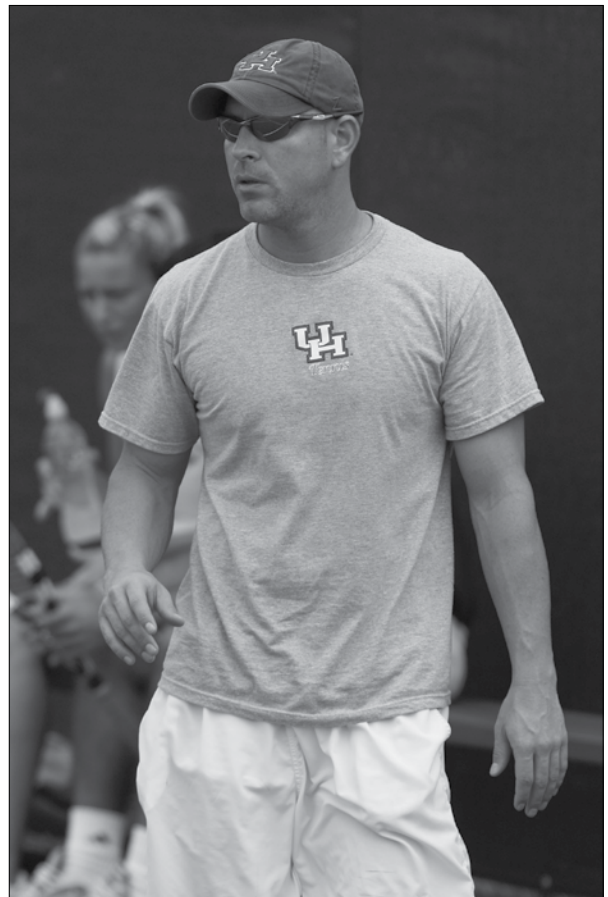
As a player, Severance enjoyed a successful career at the University of Colorado in Colorado Springs. He was one of the top players in the lineup during the 1997-98 season for the Lions. Preceding his play at CU-Colorado Springs, Severance played at Mesa Community College (1995-97). That same year he also helped his team to a No. 10 national ranking at the national tournament in Corpus Christi, Texas.

In 1999, he finished his studies at the University of Arizona and graduated with a bachelor of arts in sociology.

Severance began playing tennis after watching The French Open in 1983. That afternoon he grabbed his father's wooden racket and several old balls, walked across the street to the tennis court, and went on to teach himself how to play. He knows what it took to get himself where he is and has high hopes for his players.

Jo Keene returns to the University of Houston for her fourth season as an assistant coach after an impressive collegiate career with the Cougars from 2000-02.

Keene's responsibilities include on-court coaching, academics, team travel, home tournament organization, strength and conditioning, housing, recruiting and racquet re-stringing.

"I trust Jo, and I know what to expect from her. When you have someone in the program that you can trust and you know your expectations are met, it makes things run a lot smoother and it's easier to communicate when everyone's on the same page," head coach John Severance said.

The Cougars finished 16-11 in 2008, defeating one of five ranked teams. The Cougars will enter the 2009 season winning nine of their 12 homes games last season.

Housto posted a 20-5 record in her first season in addition to an undefeated record at home. The last time the program reached those feats was during the 1989-90 season.

During her three seasons as assistant coach, Keene has helped coach three All-Conference USA selections, including fellow British native, Leila Salek to the 2007 First Team All-Conference, 2007 C-USA Newcomer of the Year and 2007-08 All-Conference USA Second Team.

Before returning to her alma mater, Keene was the head coach for both the varsity and junior varsity tennis teams at the Duchesne Academy of the Sacred Heart in Houston. She coached the team to the 2005 Division 6A District III singles, doubles and team championships. She also



succeeded in taking four players to the Texas State Championships over the 2004 and 2005 seasons.

Keene was also graphic analyst for the BBC working directly with producers during the Wimbledon Championships in 2004 and 2005.

As a player, Keene was a member of the Cougar tennis team from 2000-2002 after playing two seasons at McNeese State.

She compiled a 25-7 mark over two seasons as a Cougar, including an 8-0 career record in Conference USA action and was a C-USA Third Team selection in 2002. She was also named team MVP in her senior season of 2002 with the Cougars.

Keene ranks 10th on the single-season winning percentage list. She recorded a .781 percent in the 2001-02 season.

"I am a proud former Cougar student-athlete," said Keene. "I strive to inspire the same pride in our current team and encourage them to make the absolute most of their college experience."

Keene, a native of England, graduated from Houston in 2003 with a bachelor of arts in sociology.



**DR. RENU KHATOR**  
UH SYSTEM CHANCELLOR  
UH PRESIDENT

Renu Khator is president of the University of Houston and chancellor of the UH System - which includes the University of Houston, UH-Downtown, UH-Clear Lake and UH-Victoria, teaching centers at Sugar Land and Cinco Ranch, and KUHT, the nation's first educational television station, and KUHF, Houston's National Public Radio station.

She assumed this dual appointment in January 2008.

In her capacity as chancellor, Khator oversees a system with an annual operating budget that exceeds \$1 billion, serves more than 57,000 students and has an overall economic impact of \$3 billion on the Greater Houston area each year. All told, the system components are engaged in more than 800 community, corporate and research partnerships.

As president of the University of Houston, she is the chief executive officer of the largest and oldest of the four UH System universities. The University of Houston offers more than 300 undergraduate and graduate programs and awards 7,000 degrees each year. It is the second most ethnically diverse urban research university in the country. Its internationally recognized faculty includes and has included members of the Academy of Sciences, the National Academy of Engineering, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences as well as a Nobel Laureate and winners of the Pulitzer and Tony Awards. Each year, University of Houston students provide nearly one million hours in volunteer service and internships to the community.

Khator, who was born in Uttar Pradesh, India, earned a

bachelor's degree at the University of Kanpur. She received her master's degree and her Ph.D. in political science from Purdue University. A noted scholar in the field of global environmental policy, Khator has published five books and several articles on various aspects of this subject.

Prior to her appointment at the University of Houston, she was provost and senior vice president at the University of South Florida, capping a 22-year career at that institution.

In January 2007, she and her husband Suresh Khator - who is now a faculty member in the UH Cullen College of Engineering - were awarded the prestigious Hind Rattan (Jewel of India), given to nonresident Indians for making outstanding contributions in their field. The United States Citizenship and Immigration Services included her among its 2006 Outstanding Americans by Choice awardees. The award recognizes achievements of naturalized U.S. citizens. Also in 2006, Khator received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from Purdue University's College of Liberal Arts and the Outstanding Educator Award from the American Foundation for Greek Language and Culture for Enhancing Hellenic studies.

President Khator and Suresh have two daughters, both of whom are ophthalmologists.

She enjoys biking, practicing yoga and writing poetry and short stories - several of which have been published.

## UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON SYSTEM BOARD OF REGENTS

The Board of Regents is the governing body of the University of Houston System (University of Houston, University of Houston-Clear Lake, University of Houston-Downtown, University of Houston-Victoria, UH System at Cinco Ranch, UH System at Sugar Land, KUHT Television, and KUHF Radio).

The Board of Regents is composed of nine voting members (chair, vice chair, secretary, and six members) and a non-voting student member. Every two years, the Governor of the State of Texas, subject to Senate confirmation, appoints three members to the Board of Regents. Each member serves a six-year term.

# DAVE MAGGARD

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS | SEVENTH YEAR

He's carried an Olympic flag and now, as one of the most respected leaders in intercollegiate athletics, Dave Maggard is in his seventh year as director of athletics for the University of Houston Athletics program.

Under his direction during the past six years, the Cougars improved their academic achievements, won more than 20 Conference USA championships and competed on a national level. In addition, donations to the Cougar Pride fundraising organization have nearly tripled and more than \$5 million has been spent to improve the UH weight room and the football, basketball, baseball, softball and track and field facilities.

Houston's football team won the 2006 C-USA championship and played in a bowl game for the fourth time in the last five seasons in 2007. The women's softball team won 40 games for the third-straight year, captured both the conference regular season tournament titles in 2007 and played host to both the NCAA Regional and Super Regional in 2008. The squads' 54 wins this past season were a UH single-season record for all sports.

The men's track and field team garnered its fifth indoor track championship in six years last season, and captured the 2004 C-USA cross-country title.

In addition, the men's basketball team enjoyed its best conference finish, produced four straight winning seasons and played in the postseason in three of the last four years, including making the semifinals of the inaugural College Basketball Invitational in 2008. The women's basketball team featured a three-time All-Conference player and won the 2004 C-USA regular season and tournament championships.

The baseball team won the 2008 C-USA Tournament title, advanced to the NCAA Super Regional Championships twice and produced the 2006 National Player of the Year. The golf team played in the NCAA Regionals twice, and the women's swimming and diving squad placed among the Top 30 teams at the last five NCAA Championships, and set a school record by winning 18 dual meets in 2006-07. The women's track and field team won both the indoor and outdoor C-USA team titles in 2005 and 2006 and featured All-American sprinter Ebonie Floyd in 2007.

Maggard came to Houston in January 2002 after serving as a consultant for the Sacramento (Calif.) Sports Commission and UC-Davis Medical Center for one and a half years.

He brought a wealth of intercollegiate athletics experience and insight as well as a history of integrity to Houston. He was the director of athletics at the University of Miami from 1991-93, where the Hurricanes won a national football championship in his first year, and was the nation's No. 2-ranked team in his second. The baseball team also finished third in the College World Series, and the women's basketball team advanced to

the 1992 NCAA Sweet 16 and won two Big East Conference championships. Two other teams, men's golf and women's tennis, captured Big East championships in their first seasons as league members.

Off the field, Maggard led the Hurricanes to unprecedented success when he established the school's first endowed scholarship fund, and created an additional \$6 million surplus in its athletics programs. In addition, 22 Hurricane student-athletes were named to the Big East All-Academic Team and three received District Academic All-America honors. Miami's football team received honorable mention academic honors by the College Football Association in 1991.

Maggard arrived at Miami after serving 19 years as athletics director at his alma mater, the University of California-Berkeley, which under his direction enjoyed success on several fronts. He created a vigorous Bear Backer fundraising organization that established endowed scholarships in 13 sports and enabled facilities to be upgraded and maintained. He also established a comprehensive academic support and a faculty mentoring programs.

The Golden Bears won 22 national championships in six different sports: water polo, rugby, swimming, tennis, crew and gymnastics. California's baseball team also finished third nationally during his tenure. Maggard was instrumental in the resurgence of Cal's football and basketball programs that yielded the school's best record and first NCAA Tournament appearance in 30 years.

He has served on the NCAA Academic Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet and the chair of the Committee on Agents and Amateurism while at Houston and served on more than 20 NCAA governing bodies while he was at Miami and California.

Following his success at California and Miami, Maggard was named as Managing Director of Sports for the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic games in 1993 and managed a staff of over 900 paid and volunteer members throughout the 1996 Olympic games. Some of his other duties included overseeing site selection, the acquisition and building of all venues, and

purchasing equipment for all competitions and training. In addition, Maggard organized 30 pre-Olympic Test events and was the primary liaison between the International Olympic Committee and Sports Federations.

Following the 1996 Olympic Games, Maggard was the Vice President of Sports Administration for Turner Sports/Time Warner, Inc. and was the Executive Vice President for the Atlanta Thrashers hockey team until 2000.

A former Olympian himself, Maggard earned one letter in football and three letters in track and field at California-Berkeley. There, he set a school record in the shot put that stood for more than 19 years and was the recipient of both the Brutus Hamilton Award for outstanding leadership in track and field and the Jake Gimbel Award as California's senior athlete exhibiting the best attitude toward athletics. An endowed scholarship in football carries his name.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education and social science in 1962, and was a teacher and coach at several Bay Area high schools while a member of the U.S. National Track Team and in training for the shot put for the 1968 Olympic Trials. There, he recorded the fifth-longest shot put mark in history to earn a spot on the USA Team. At the Olympic Games, he finished in fifth place despite being ill while he competed.

Later that year, he returned to his alma mater, and served as an assistant track and field coach before assuming the head coaching duties a year later. In 1972, he was named the school's director of athletics at age 32, making him the youngest AD in the nation.

Born Jan. 12, 1940, Maggard and his wife, Carolyn, have three children: David, Darin and Dana, and two grandchildren: Erika and Evan.

Maggard was inducted into California's Hall of Fame in 1996 and received both the U.S. Sports Academy's Carl Maddox Sports Management Award and the International Olympic Committee's Olympic Order that year. He received the General Robert Reese Nyeland Athletic Director Lifetime Achievement Award in 1997.

John A. Robinson, Jr. is in his seventh year at the University of Houston. In his capacity as deputy athletics director, he is responsible for coordinating all day-to-day administrative functions of the Athletics Department while assisting the director of athletics in supervising and providing leadership for all departmental initiatives including strategic planning, finances, academics, compliance, personnel, fundraising, facilities enhancement planning, sport supervision, scheduling for football and men's basketball and game-day management.

Robinson also oversees the following support areas: business office, corporate relations, equipment room, facilities maintenance, game day operations and special events, the Cougar Authentic Gift Shop, grounds and field maintenance, information technology, licensing, marketing and promotions, strength and conditioning, sports medicine, team travel, ticket office and video operations.

Robinson recently assisted with negotiating new airline, apparel, concessionaire and television commercial agreements. He also represents the Department on campus-wide committees.

Before coming to the UH, Robinson was an Associate Athletics Director at Villanova University. During his seven-and-a-half year tenure, he was responsible for providing leadership and supervision in the areas of sport administration, marketing and promotions, strength and conditioning, sports medicine, compliance, and operations of the university fitness centers. In addition, he served as the admission liaison for men's basketball and football and fulfilled the role of University Athletics Financial Aid Liaison.

While at Villanova, Robinson was involved in fundraising for football, men's and women's cross country/track & field, golf, men's lacrosse and men's soccer. He also was appointed the Athletics Department's coordinator for the NCAA recertification process and served as a member of the Steering Committee and the Fiscal Integrity Subcommittee during the recertification process.

Robinson was one of the primary authors of Villanova's new gender equity plan and served as the University's coordinator for the Equity in Athletics Disclosure Act (EADA). Robinson was active on the conference level where he was on both the Big East Conference Rowing and Legislative Committees.

In 2000, Robinson was one of seven college athletics administrators selected from a national pool to be an NCAA Fellow, an 18-month professional development program designed by the NCAA to assist individuals in preparation for senior level administrative positions at the institutional and conference levels.

During his career, he also served on such committees as the University Board of Academic Integrity, the University Equity Committee, the University Inclusiveness and Diversity Committee, and the Task Force for University Re-Certification.

Robinson was a student-athlete at SMU in Dallas, where he was a member of the football team, which was Southwest Conference co-champions, and played in the Sun Bowl and the Aloha Bowl. Robinson was named to the All-SWC Academic Honor Team.

Subsequently, he transferred to Columbia University in New York City, where he played football and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in economics.

He obtained his doctorate (J.D.) from Tulane University Law School in New Orleans and then practiced law in Texas where he is a member of the State Bar of Texas. Robinson also received a Master of Business Administration degree from Villanova University.

Robinson, his wife Tere and their daughter Gabrielle live in Houston.

**ANOTHER WINNING SEASON**

The Cougars finished the 2007-08 season under head coach John Severance with another winning season. Houston went 16-11 (0-3 C-USA) last season with a victory over No. 38 Louisville, 4-3.

Houston defeated Tyler JC, 7-0, before losing to No. 25 Texas A&M, 7-0 and Southern Miss, 4-2. After a win against Grand Canyon and two losses against ranked opponents Arizona and Arizona State, the Cougars won five consecutive matches. Those wins came from Stephen F. Austin (7-0), McNeese State (6-1), Northwestern State (6-1), Louisiana Tech (7-0), and Grambling (7-0).

UH lost three more matches against Conference USA-rival SMU, New Mexico State and Alabama. The Cougars beat Samford, 4-3 and Oral Roberts, 5-0, with two more losses against Tulsa and North Texas.

The Cougars bounced back with four-straight victories against Tarelton State, (5-2), Southern (4-0), Prairie View A&M (4-0) and UTEP in the C-USA championships before losing to Rice in the quarterfinals.

**SHUTOUT VICTORIES**

In 2008, the Cougars recorded eight shutout victories. Houston began the 2008 season on Jan. 26, beating Tyler JC, 7-0. The Cougars beat Grand Canyon, 7-0 (Feb. 8), and Stephen F. Austin, 7-0 (Feb. 13). On Feb. 22, UH celebrated two shutout victories, 7-0, against Louisiana Tech and Grambling. On April 4, the Cougars defeated Oral Roberts, 5-0. On April 12, Houston celebrated yet another back-to-back shutout against Southern, 4-0 and Prairie View A&M, 4-0.

**SINGLES**

The Cougars obtained a successful singles overall record of 85-67 in the 2007-08 season. Leila Salek finished with the most winning record of 18-6, playing at the No. 1 and No. 2 spot. Lynley Wasson also had an impressive singles record of 16-8 at the two through four spot. Jordan McCombs finished in the three through six spot with six wins. Vicky Simpson finished the season out with a winning record of 17-8. With her 68 career wins, she will look to break into the top ten record books for career singles wins.

**DOUBLES**

The Cougars finished the 2007-08 season, 44-34, in doubles play. The match-up of Joanna Kacprzyk and Lynley Wasson was the most successful last season with their record of 9-2 in the No. 2 and No. 3 spot.

Leila Salek and Vicky Simpson were also victorious with their 10-3 record at the No.2 and No. 3 spot. Lucy Forward and Jordan McCombs competed in No. 1 doubles for a record of 9-6.

**HOME SWEET HOME**

The University of Houston played host to the 2008 Conference USA Championships. This was the first C-USA Championships held at John E. Hoff Courts.

At the championships, the Cougars beat UTEP, 4-2 before losing a tough match against Rice, 4-3. No. 34 Tulsa defeated No. 50 Marshall, 4-1 to be crowned the C-USA Champions.

**COACH JOHN SEVERANCE**

In 2008, head coach John Severance finished the season with his fourth-consecutive winning record. With the wins, Severance has increased his overall record to 66-35, ranking him third on Houston's all-time coaching records, leaving him just five wins shy of second-place coach Daryl Gralka. Severance is ranked second with his winning percentage of .653.

**OFF THE COURT**

Neila Starratt was named an ITA Scholar Athlete for the second year in a row, for her outstanding performance in the classroom. ITA Scholar Athletes must have a GPA of 3.5 or higher. She was also a 2006-07 Academic MVP, announced at the 2008 University of Houston Academic Banquet.

**SENIOR FAREWELL**

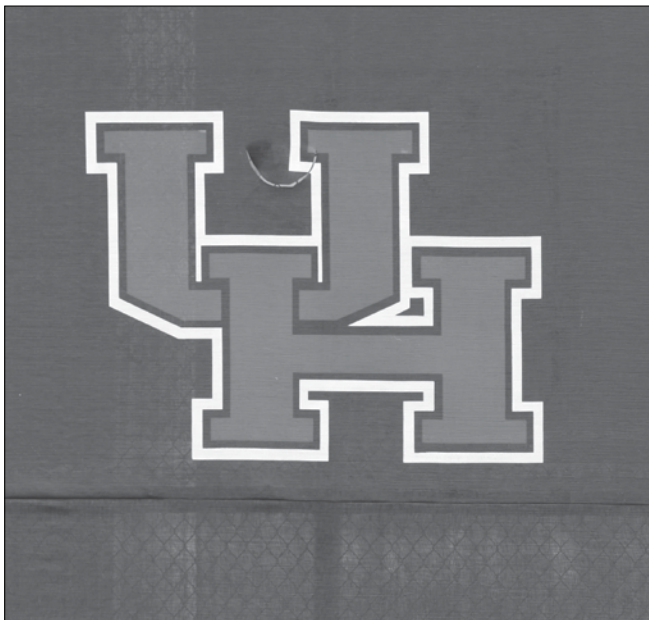

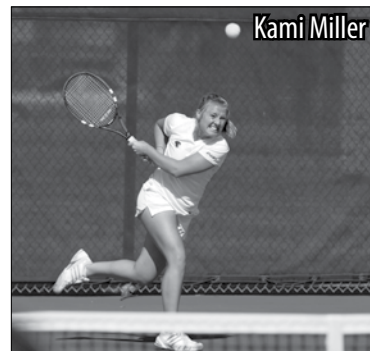

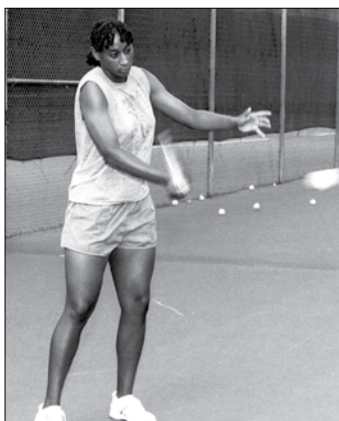

## HISTORY & RECORDS



**JOHN SEVERANCE**  
FIFTH SEASON

The University of Houston's women's tennis program began its inaugural year under the direction of head coach Karen Linden at the outset of the 1977-78 season.

In its first season of competition, Linden guided the Cougars to a 7-7 record and followed up the following season with a 12-7 mark. Since then Houston has maintained the legacy that Linden began with a 368-294-1 (.555) program record through seven coaches, in 29 years of NCAA competition, and more than 600 dual matches.

At the end of the 1993 campaign, Cathy Beene stepped down as the winningest head coach in UH history. Her record of 84-67 topped Daryl Gralka's (1979-84) 70-48-1 and Mary Nyholm (1984-86) 41-16 marks.

Stina Almgren-Mosvold became head coach in 1993 after a successful playing career as a Cougar that included an All-American honor in 1987.

During her tenure, the Cougars qualified in back-to-back NCAA Regionals and won the Conference USA Tournament title in 1998 – the first conference title in program history. Mosvold also captured C-USA Coach of the Year accolades, another first for Houston.

In 1999, Jennifer Hyde took the helm and guided the Cougars to a trio of Top 5 finishes at the C-USA Tournament (2001, 2003, 2004). Hyde also produced four All-Conference USA athletes who garnered eight citations, including the first C-USA Player of the Year for Houston in 2002 with Sarah Borwell.

Now celebrating its 32nd season as a collegiate tennis program, the Cougars are still strong competitors on the NCAA scene led by John Severance.

In 2008, Severance finished the season with his fourth-consecutive winning record. With the wins, Severance has increased his overall record to 66-35, ranking him third on Houston's all-time coaching records, leaving him just five wins shy of second-place coach Daryl Gralka.

Severance is ranked second with his winning percentage of .653.

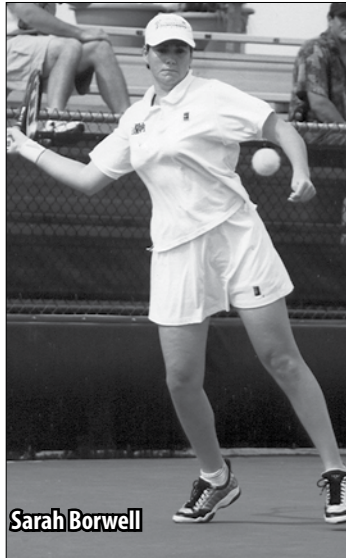
