Recognized as one of the nation's top lacrosse coaches, Greg Cannella is in his 25th year at the helm of the University of Massachusetts program in 2018–19. A veteran presence on the sidelines in Amherst, Cannella is currently the second-longest tenured head coach across all Division I schools and has the fifth-most years as a Division I head coach among all current program leaders nationally.

Cannella's long-standing success on the UMass men's lacrosse sidelines earned the 1988 University of Massachusetts grad-

uate his 200th head coaching win at Drexel on March 31, 2018. With the milestone victory, Cannella became only the 10th active coach to reach 200 head coaching victories at the NCAA Division I level.

Combined with the success of Cannella's mentor, former UMass head coach Richard F. Garber (1955-90), Massachusetts is the only program with one head coach in the 300-Win Club (Garber) and another in the 200-Win Club (Cannella) where both individuals earned all of their victories at the same institution.

During his extended tenure, Cannella already guided his Minutemen to nine NCAA Tournaments, claimed eight New England Championships, won five conference titles and led the Minutemen to the program's first-ever No. 1 national ranking. He was named the CAA Coach of the Year in 2011, 2012 and 2018, his fifth, sixth and seventh conference coach of the year honors, earned the New England Coach of the Year five times and was named the ECAC Coach of the Year on four occasions.

In 2006, Cannella was chosen as the USILA National Coach of the Year after he led UMass to its first-ever lacrosse NCAA Championship Game appearance. Massachusetts is still one of only two New England schools to ever reached the title game.

Through the 2018 season, Cannella's guidance of the Minutemen to the 2006 NCAA Championship Game etched the program into the record books as one of only 17 institutions to ever appear in the NCAA Championship Game. Massachusetts is one of only two teams from New England to ever reach the NCAA finale.

Cannella took the reigns of the UMass lacrosse program in November, 1994 with a great understanding of the program's storied history. He was a two-time letterwinner for legendary team leader and the Father of New England lacrosse, Richard F. Garber, in 1986 and 1987, and an assistant coach for two seasons with the Minutemen prior to taking over as the head coach.

Under Cannella's tutelage, UMass enjoys many of the program's highest levels of success on and off the field. With a history as one of the top teams in New England, the reputation of UMass lacrosse spreads across the country due in part to his leadership.

Since taking over as head coach, the team continually created success as a whole and among individual players. Cannella's teams produced three Tewaaraton finalists, 47 USILA All-America selections, 106 All-New England picks, 87 all-conference honorees and nine positional league players of the year. For the work accomplished by Minutemen in the classroom, the program sports 14 Academic All-Americans, 46 New England Scholar-Athletes and 35 academic all-conference picks.

Over the last 18 completed seasons, UMass has been one of the most successful programs in the country thanks in part to the friendly confines of Garber Field. During that span, Cannella has led UMass to a 92-39 record at Garber while the Minutemen are 166-104 since the beginning of 2001, with seven seasons featuring 12 or more wins.

The 2018 campaign marked another successful chapter in the history of the program, during which Cannella led UMass to 12 victories, the CAA regular season and tournament championships and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. The former attackman coordinated an offense that was among the most precise in the nation, as Massachusetts ranked in the top 25 nationally for goals, assists and points per game, shot percentage and scoring margin.

During 2017, Massachusetts reached the CAA Championship Game for the fourth time in the program's short tenure as a member of the conference. The Minutemen learned from its tough start to the year with seven wins in the last 11 games, including a 13-12 CAA Semifinal Round triumph over No. 14 nationally-ranked Hofstra for the title game berth.

Cannella guided the team to its third CAA Championship Game appearance over five seasons in the league as the squad fell one game shy of earning an NCAA Tournament bid in 2015. Following the season, Ryan Izzo tallied USILA All-America for the second consecutive campaign and became the 11th Minuteman under Cannella's tutelage to earn multiple all-America laurels from the USILA

Cannella led a young Minuteman squad featuring 24 underclassmen among 37 total players to a 7-6 record during 2014. UMass earned wins over a pair of nationally ranked programs in No. 5 Penn State and No. 14 Ohio State during the year, before it ended the season receiving votes in the national polls. Following the end of the campaign, freshman Nick Mariano took in the CAA Rookie of the Year Award while he was honored on the All-CAA listing alongside teammates Kyle Karaska and Connor Mooney. Cannella was also inducted into the National Junior College Athletic Association Hall of Fame for his accomplishments within the game of lacrosse spanning nearly 30 years as a competitor and coach.

Two of the most historic campaigns in the program's history have occurred under Cannella's watch. The 2006 squad became the first-ever New England-based team to reach the NCAA Championship Game, while the 2012 squad went undefeated during the regular-season with a program-best 15 wins and a No. 1 national ranking.

The 2006 season was one of the best for any athletic program at UMass. As an unseeded team, the Minutemen had the most difficult path to a lacrosse championship game in history, beating the second, third and fourth-ranked teams in the nation. UMass topped No. 2 seed Maryland, 8-5 in the semifinals after advancing to its first Final Four with a stunning 11-10 overtime win against Hofstra on May 20, 2006. The difficult comeback saw the Minutemen rally from a 10-5 deficit with 8:03 left in the fourth quarter as UMass won its quarterfinal game at Stony Brook.

During the 2006 campaign, Cannella also had a personal milestone as he recorded his 100th career win after a 12-7 victory at Harvard on March 11.

Individually, that season saw UMass produce two First-Team USILA All-Americans for the first time in school history with Sean Morris on attack and Jack Reid on defense. Jake Deane was also named an honorable mention All-American. For the second year in a row, Morris was named a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy as the top player in all of NCAA Division I college lacrosse.

UNIVERSITY OF MASSACHUSETTS LACROSSE COACHING STAFF

During the 2012 regular season UMass continued to win games, in dramatic fashion and through a relentless fury of goal scoring and a stifling defense. As each week of the regular-season went on, the Minutemen climbed in the national polls. On April 16, 2012 it became official, the Minutemen were the No. 1 team in the country, marking the first time a UMass athletic program held the top spot in the country since the 1995-96 NCAA Final Four men's basketball team. 8

Cannella led the Minutemen to an undefeated regular-season, the program's first-ever CAA Tournament Title and a trip to the NCAA Tournament for the 19th time in the history of the Minutemen.

Individually, UMass produced six USILA All-Americans, including Will Manny being selected to the first-team. Manny also earned CAA Player of the Year, New England Player of the Year and was a finalist for the Tewaaraton Award. Cannella was recognized as the CAA Coach of the Year and the New England Coach of the Year.

Other milestone seasons for Cannella include 2005 and 2003, where the Minutemen won 13 games and made an NCAA Tournament appearance in each campaign.

The 2005 season saw the Minutemen tie the then-school record for wins with a 13-3 overall mark. UMass advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals for the 10th time in program history while winning the ECAC and New England Championships. The season was historic as UMass knocked off Syracuse twice in a three-week span, including a 16-15 win in the NCAA Tournament First Round to end the Orange's 22-year run of reaching the semifinals. Cannella continued to coach some of the nation's top players as attackman Sean Morris was selected as UMass' first-ever finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy.

The 2003 UMass squad also tied the previous school record with 13 victories, advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals for only the fifth time in school history and was ranked as high as No. 3 in the country, the then-highest ranking for the Minutemen.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Cannella spent four years as an assistant coach at Stony Brook (1988-92). He masterminded the offense and served as the recruiting coordinator on John Espey's staff. He earned a master's degree in liberal studies while at Stony Brook.

Cannella earned a bachelor's degree in physical education while playing at Massachusetts from 1986-87. He was a two-year starter for the Minutemen and a member of two NCAA Tournament teams. Cannella scored 64 points (33 goals, 31 assists) in his UMass career.

Before playing at UMass, Cannella spent one year at Nassau (N.Y.) Community College, where he was a first team All-America selection and led Nassau to the 1985 Junior College National Title.

A native of Lynbrook, N.Y., Cannella played for three years at Lynbrook High School. One of the most prolific scorers in Lynbrook history, Cannella was a high school All-America selection and still ranks among Lynbrook's all-time leading scorers.

Cannella served as the President of the New England Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association in 1998, 1999 and 2000, and served as the Vice President in 1997. Cannella is currently the chairman of the annual NEILA Scholar Athlete Team, which he started in 1999. He has also served on the NCAA Championships Regional Advisory Committee that selected the teams for the NCAA Tournament in 1997, 1998 1999, 2002, 2003 and 2004. Cannella was a regional voter in the USILA/ STX weekly poll from 1997-2001 and has served as a USILA regional voter for all-American selection since 2003. He now serves on the prestigious committee to help select the Tewaaraton Award, a honor given to the nation's top player.

Cannella is a native of Rockville Centre, N.Y. He and his wife, Laurie, reside in Hadley with their son, Vance, and daughter, Virginia.

UNIVERSITY OF MASSACHUSETTS LACROSSE COACHING STAFF

DOC SCHNEIDER ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH 10TH SEASON MASSACHUSETTS '09

Schneider begins his ninth season on the University of Massachusetts coaching staff and his first on the sidelines as the associate head coach in 2017-18.

Schneider is in his third campaign as the offensive coach after he served as a volunteer assistant during 2014-15, following five years as an assistant coach from 2010-14 and four more as a starting goalkeeper for the Minutemen prior to that. In addition to his work on the offensive side of the ball, Schneider will continue to tutor the UMass goalies.

After four years between the pipes from 2006-09, Schneider joined the coaching staff as an assistant ahead of the 2010 season. He maintained his role working on the defensive side of the game through the 2014 season, after which he chose to pursue an opportunity outside of the coaching realm. However, Schneider rejoined the staff as a volunteer coach prior to the 2015 season. The 2016 campaign will mark his 11th consecutive year with the program and seventh as a coach.

Schneider's tutelage of the offense in 2017 helped the squad earn its way to the CAA Championship Game. Led by All-CAA First Team midfielder Dan Muller, UMass posted 134 goals on the season and posted wins in seven of its final 11 contests. The attack saved its best effort for the postseason as the Minutemen put in a season-best goals total against No. 14 Hofstra during the CAA Semifinal Round for the 13-12 victory over the Pride.

Schneider worked with the offense while he served as a full-time volunteer in 2015 and simultaneously assisted in all aspects of on- and off-field preparations. Prior to the most recent season, Schneider was responsible for various components of the direction of the defense and goalie units during the 2010-14 campaigns.

Through Schneider's tutelage during his tenure as the defensive coordinator, three-year starter Tim McCormack developed into a USILA All-American and First Team All-New England selection at goalie in 2012. Schneider simultaneously coached the Minutemen defense, including the man-down unit, which featured all-America selections Jake Smith (2012-13), Tom Celentani (2012) and Diogo Godoi (2010).

As a student-athlete at Massachusetts, Schneider was a fouryear starter from 2006-09, racking up the second-most saves in program history (753). Schneider owned a 7.98 goals-against average and .611 save percentage for his career while earning 34 victories in net. A 2009 USILA All-American and Tewaaraton Award finalist, the Massapequa, New York, native, also received all-New England honors on four occasions, competed in the USILA North-South All Star Game and was named the ECAC Goalie of the Year as a senior.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Schneider was the highest drafted goalie in Major League Lacrosse during 2009, when he eventually helped the Toronto Nationals win the MLL Championship alongside former Minuteman Jeff Zywicki. In the championship game, Schneider backstopped the Nationals with 12 saves after he picked up the semifinal victory over Long Island.

CRAIG MCDONALD ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

SIXTH SEASON ALBANY '08

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse assistant coach Craig McDonald recently completed his third season on the Minuteman sidelines in 2017 with the team's second CAA Championship Game appearance during his tenure. McDonald teaches the defensive side of the game and works with the UMass goalie unit as well.

McDonald's defense clamped down on the opposition in 2017 and only allowed 10.07 goals per game while the squad ranked in the top-20 nationally for caused turnovers in each contest, with an average of 7.87 per game. Close defenseman Isaac Paparo, a CAA All-Conference selection, emerged as a leader on the field with a program-record 33 caused turnovers (2.20 per game; sixth-most nationally).

An up-and-down 2015 saw McDonald help the Minutemen earn a berth in to the CAA Championship, where the side advanced by host and No. 1 seed Fairfield, 9-8, for a spot in the finale. Under McDonald's tutelage, short-stick defensive midfielder Ryan Izzo earned his second career USILA All-America honor while close defenseman Kyle Karaska secured CAA First Team All-Conference.

McDonald spent the 2012-14 seasons at Rutgers, where he coached the defense and also served as the team's recruiting coordinator.

In 2013, McDonald mentored Big East Goalie of the Year Kris Alleyne while the squad pulled in four all-conference selections following the 2014 campaign. Prior to working with the Rutgers men's lacrosse program, McDonald was on-staff at Siena to help the team win the Mid-American Athletic Conference and advance to the 2011 NCAA Tournament.

McDonald joined the collegiate coaching ranks in 2008 when he was named an assistant at Union College under 1999 National Lacrosse Hall of Fame inductee Paul Wehrum. While at Union College, McDonald filled roles as the defensive and recruiting coordinator. In 2010, under McDonald's tutelage, the Dutchmen ranked second among all NCAA Division III programs for scoring defense and fifth for man-down defense while goalie Sean Aaron earned the lowest goals-against average nationally at 5.69 given up per game.

McDonald played four seasons at Albany from 2005-08, totaling three all-conference selections as a starter on close defense for the Great Danes. The native of Geneva, N.Y., helped the squad make NCAA Tournament appearances in 2005 and 2007 while the program won 41 games during his playing tenure, an average of more than 10 victories per season.

DAVE FRABONI VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH FIRST SEASON SPRINGFIELD '13

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse and head coach Greg Cannella welcomed Dave Fraboni to the program as a volunteer assistant coach ahead of the Fall, 2018 training schedule.

Fraboni arrived in Amherst after he worked with the Bucknell men's lacrosse program as a volunteer. While at Bucknell he tutored the goalies and assisted with offensive strategies and planning.

Prior to joining Bucknell, Fraboni spent the past four seasons as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator at the Coast Guard Academy. There, he executed and planned offensive strategies, coordinated recruiting and organized and analyzed game and practice film.

Before joining the Bears, Fraboni spent one season as an assistant coach at Saint Michael's College. During his time with the Purple Knights, he served as the offensive coordinator and also coordinated faceoff and wing strategies and also worked with the goalies.

A four-year member of the powerhouse Springfield lacrosse team, Fraboni appeared in 21 games at midfield. During his career, the Pride won the Pilgrim League tournament and qualified for the NCAA Division III Championship each year.

While in college, Fraboni worked for Springfield's Peak Lacrosse Camp, where he coached players ranging from youth to rising high school seniors.

Fraboni graduated from Springfield in 2013 with a bachelor's degree in general studies with a sports studies concentration and a minor in coaching. He later obtained his master's degree in sport coaching from the University of Denver in 2017.

TRANSITION POINTS

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse...

- Head coach Greg Cannella is in his 25th season as the program leader in 2019. He has been the head
 coach at UMass since the 1995 campaign. It is his 27th year coaching with the program overall, including
 two years as an assistant coach in 1993 and 1994, while he also played two seasons with the program in
 1986 and 1987.
- Assistant coaches Doc Schneider (10th season) and Craig McDonald (fifth) return in their respective roles. Schneider guides the offense and works with the goalies. McDonald oversees the defense.
- Head coach Greg Cannella earned career head coaching victory No. 200 with the 11-10 win at Drexel on Sat., March 31, 2018. Entering play against Harvard, Cannella is 208-145 at the helm of the program. He is the 10th active NCAA Division I coach with 200 or more wins.
- Head coach Greg Cannella is one of the most tenured program leaders in NCAA Division I men's lacrosse.
 Cannella ranks second among all active Division I head coaches for consecutive seasons coached at their current institution and fifth for total years of head coaching experience.
- Reached the NCAA Tournament for the 20th time in program history and second as the CAA's automatic
 qualifier during 2018. The team won at least one NCAA game in seven of its appearances, including five of
 Cannella's nine completed berths (1997, '02, '03, '05, '06).
- Appeared in the team's seventh-ever appearance in the CAA Championship field during its ninth season
 as a member of the league. UMass also won the title in 2012 and played for it in 2011, 2015 and 2017. With
 the 2018 CAA Championship, Massachusetts is now one of only three CAA teams with multiple conference
 titles since UMass joined the league prior to the 2010 season (Towson, 4; Delaware, 2).
- Is tied for the second-most appearances in the CAA Tournament since UMass joined the league prior to the 2010 season. In that span, Towson holds the most (8), followed by Drexel and the Minutemen (7).
 Massachusetts is second for the most CAA Championship Game appearances in that same span (5), behind only Towson (6).
- Freshman attack Gabriel Procyk recorded five points on four goals and an assist during his collegiate
 debut against Army. His lone assist came on the final UMass tally when Chris Connolly tied the game with
 one second to play in the fourth quarter. He is the only Minutemen to score five or more points in his
 collegiate debut since at least the 2000 season.
- Goalie Sean Sconone tied his career high with 20 saves versus #13 Ohio State. The 20 saves mark the most since Sconone had as many against Fairfield in an 11-4 win on April 21, 2018. Prior to that, current associate head coach Doc Schneider made 21 stops against Hobart in a 7-6 (OT) win on April 11, 2009.
- Then-sophomore Jeff Trainor made his first start at midfield against No. 11 Yale and posted a thenseason-best four points via a goal and three assists. In his 14 starts on the season, Trainor owned 45 points (24 goals, 21 assists). Trainor ranks first among active Minutemen with 80 points, an average of 2.4 per game played (33).
- Senior faceoff specialist Noah Rak reset the program record for career groundballs against Towson on April 14, 2018. Rak surpassed the team record of 240 when he scooped up his third groundball of the game with one minute, nine seconds remaining to play. He ended his career with 278, including a single-season career best of 138 as a senior. Jeff Seals previously held the top spot in the record book (240; 1997-2001).
- Senior faceoff specialist Noah Rak surpassed the program record for career faceoff victories during the game at Drexel on March 31, 2018. He completed his career with a 506-of-887 (.570) ledger. The program record for faceoff victories was previously held by Dane Collins (423; 2003-06).
- Won 12 CAA year-end awards across 10 members of the program in 2018, including Player of the Year (Isaac Paparo), Rookie of the Year (Chris Connolly) and Coach of the Year (Greg Cannella). Six Minutemen collected All-CAA First Team in Buddy Carr, Paparo, Noah Rak, Shane Rinkus, Jeff Trainor and Luc Valenza. One also took home All-CAA Second Team (Sean Sconone) while Chris Connolly and Kevin Tobin earned CAA All-Rookie Team.
- Ranked first in the CAA in a number of categories, including goals (11.59), assists (7.41), points (19.00), man-up goals (22), shots (37.53), shots on goal (23.65), groundballs (28.88), caused turnovers (7.94) and faceoffs won (233).
- Led all CAA teams during conference play in points (17.60), assists (7.00), shot percentage (.333), shots on goal (20.80), caused turnovers (7.60), goals-against average (6.40), saves (12.00) and save percentage (.652), and tied for first in goals per game (10.60) and man-up goals (6).
- Created 135 caused turnovers over the 17-game season, an average of 7.94 per contest. It also placed UMass 13th in the nation for caused turnovers per game. The efforts are led by the most disruptive Minuteman, CAA Player of the Year Isaac Paparo (tied-24th, 1.47 per game).
- Ranked first among CAA teams with 11 individuals above the double-digit points threshold at the end of the 2018 season. It included Buddy Carr (64), Jeff Trainor (50), Chris Connolly (50), Devin Spencer (23), Jake Lisauskas (23), Kevin Tobin (19), Ben Spencer (15), Jesse Leung (13), Isaac Paparo (13), Billy Philpott (12) and Noah Rak (10). It put UMass ahead of its next-closest CAA competition in F airfield (8), Towson (8) and Drexel (7).

STAYING POWER

Head coach Greg Cannella reached career win No. 200 during 2018 in the midst of his 25th season at the helm of the Minuteman program, one of the longest tenured coaches active in Division I men's lacrosse. He is the secondlongest tenured head coach at one institution and fifth nationally in terms of total years spent as a Division I head coach. Cannella began his time as the leader of the team ahead of the 1995 season and, since then, won 10 or more games during seven campaigns. He guided the Minutemen to nine NCAA Tournament appearances and currently stands at 208-145 overall (58.9 win percentage).

- Tom Brady is drafted by the New England Patriots (2000)
- Major League Lacrosse plays its inaugural game (2001)

The only current coach with a longer tenure at one institution is Notre Dame's Kevin Corrigan (31st season).

Mount St. Mary's head coach Tom Gravante was hired before the 1995 season. but missed all of 2005 due to illness and the team's official records attributes the 2005 season head coaching record to interim program leader Nick DeFelice. Due to that, 2019 tallies as Gravante's 24th year with the Mount.

UMASS PICKED TO REPEAT AS CAA CHAMPIONS

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse was selected for the top spot in the CAA Coaches Preseason Poll with five of the six first-place votes and 25 total points. Towson (21), Delaware (14), Hofstra (14), Drexel (11) and Fairfield (5) followed Massachusetts in-order.

FOUR CHOSEN FOR PRESEASON ALL-CAA

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse seniors Isaac Paparo and Sean Sconone, junior Jeff Trainor and sophomore Chris Connolly earned recognition on the 2019 Preseason All-CAA Team. In addition, Paparo was the CAA Preseason Co-Player of the Year alongside Towson short-stick defensive midfielder Zach Goodrich.

PAPARO, TRAINOR NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse senior close defenseman Isaac Paparo and junior midfielder Jeff Trainor totaled Inside Lacrosse All-America honors ahead of the 2019 season. Paparo took home a spot on the third team while Trainor earned honorable mention as Massachusetts was one of only two CAA teams with student-athletes chosen for Inside Lacrosse Preseason All-America, joined by Towson, which garnered two awards as well.

Paparo, the 2018 CAA Player of the Year, led the Massachusetts defense as the Minutemen captured the CAA crown and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. The 5-foot-7 longpole from Westport, Connecticut, posted 45 groundballs, 25 caused turnover and 13 points on five goals and eight assists. In addition to his player of the year recognition, Paparo was a USILA and Inside Lacrosse All-America choice and was a All-CAA First Team and NEILA All-Region Second

Trainor notched one of the nation's best seasons by a midfielder, and one of the most point-filled in the history of UMass men's lacrosse, during 2018. Then a sophomore, Trainor tallied 50 points via 28 goals and 22 assists and had 17 groundballs alongside five caused turnovers. His 50 points ranked as the most by a midfielder since Tim Soudan had as many in 1990. Trainor also claimed USILA All-America in 2018 alongside NEILA All-Region First Team and All-CAA First Team

GORILLAS IN THE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Massachusetts made its 20th all-time appearance in the NCAA Tournament field and its first since the 2012 season during 2018. It was head coach **Greg Cannella's** ninth NCAA berth as the program leader and 12th overall, including one as an assistant coach with the program (1993) and two as a player (1986, '87). UMass owns nine NCAA tournament game wins in its history and participated in the quarterfinal round in 1976, '77, '79, '81, '86, '89, '97, '02, '03, '05 and '06.

The 2006 team advanced the furthest in program history with its trip to the NCAA Championship Game. It remains one of only two New England-based program to ever reach the NCAA title match.

WHEELING & DEALING

Chris Connolly handed out a career-high-tying five assists and added a pair of goals for a single-game personal best seven points against Army on Feb. 9, 2019.

Connolly is the only Minuteman in the last five-plus seasons with five or more assists in a single game (2014-present). It includes a five-assist outing at Fairfield in 2018. The last Minuteman with five or more assists in a game prior to Connolly was **Will Manny** (six at Hofstra, April 20, 2013).

AN ESTABLISHED CONNECTION

Sophomore attack **Chris Connolly** and freshman position-mate **Gabriel Procyk** previously competed together at Trinity-Pawling High School in Pawling, New York, during 2016-17.

In the season-opener against Army, Connolly assisted Procyk on three of his four goals, while Procyk found Connolly open for the game-tying tally with one second left in the fourth quarter. The Trinity-Pawling grads accounted for 12 of the team's 19 points on the game (6-6-12).

Against No. 13 Ohio State, Connolly handed out both his assists to Procyk, who had three total goals on the game. Procyk's other goal was unassisted.

At Harvard, Procyk's lone assist came on a feed to Connolly that opened scoring in the second quarter.

WELCOME TO THE GORILLAS

Freshman attack **Gabriel Procyk** started and posted five points on four goals and one assist during the season-opener against Army, his first collegiate game. It is the most by a rookie in his UMass debut in at least the last 20 seasons. He is second on the team in points through five games with 15 via 12 goals and three assists.

THE THINGS HE CARRIES

Sophomore attack and 2018 CAA Rookie of the Year **Chris Connolly** is a type 1 diabetic. Diagnosed at nine years old, Connolly is an advocate for the American Diabetes Association (ADA). He traveled to Washington, D.C., in 2015 for the organization's Call to Congress event and helped pass a Congressional bill totaling \$1.3 billion in support of diabetic care.

In his second year starting on attack, Connolly leads the team with 18 points through five games (seven goals, 11 assists). In 22 career games played, he owns 68 points (32 goals, 36 assists).

CUTTINELLA BREAKS THROUGH

After he was held without a point through the first four games, midfielder **Kevin Cutinella** posted four points on two goals and two assists in the win over Albany on Tues., March 5, 2019. He split his goals and assists across the third (2) and fourth (2) quarters as UMass stretched its lead from 6-3 midway through the game to the 14-8 final margin.

Cutinella is in his first active season with the squad after he missed his freshman year in 2018 due to injury.

CANNELLA REACHES 200 CAREER WINS

Greg Cannella reached 200 head coaching victories in his career, all earned as the leader of the University of Massachusetts program, with the 11-10 comeback win at Drexel. Cannella is ninth among active head coaches in career wins (207). North Carolina's Joe Breschi ranks four behind Cannella through games on Tues., March 6, 2019.

With Cannella surpassing 200th career wins, UMass becomes the only NCAA Division I program with one head coach in the 300-wins club (**Dick Garber**, 300; 1955-90) and another in the 200-win club, with all victories coming at that one institution.

PHIL-POTTING THE SCORE SHEET

Redshirt junior two-way midfielder **Billy Philpott** owns a pair of hat tricks in his career, one as a redshirt sophomore in 2018 and another as a redshirt junior in 2019.

Playing as short-stick defensive midfielder in 2018, Philpott tallied a hat trick on three shots against Hofstra on April 27, 2018. It was the first recorded hat trick by a short-stick defensive midfielder in program history. Philpott became the eighth active Minuteman with at least one hat trick and the seventh with one during the 2018 season following the feat.

Philpott tallied his second career hat trick with another three-goal outing, completed during the 14-8 win over Albany on March 5, 2019. Philpott serves as a two-way midfielder and starts on the first-line offensive midfield in 2019.

GOALS FROM LONGPOLES

UMass men's lacrosse sported two long-pole players on the 2019 roster with goals in their respective careers in long-stick midfielder **Dan O'Brien** (1) and close defensemen **Isaac Paparo** (8).

Despite his position on the defensive side of the field, Paparo currently ranks sixth among active Minutemen with 21 points via his nine goals and 12 assists.

BEN SPENCER MANS-UP

Ben Spencer leads UMass men's lacrosse with 17 career man-up goals. The next-most by a UMass player is five by **Jeff Trainor**.

Spencer's most successful year playing on the man-up came in 2017 with eight goals during his sophomore season, which put Spencer first in the CAA for man-up goals and ranked him tied for fourth nationally. He scored his eight man-up tallies in only 15 games, tied for the second-fewest games with as many or more man-up goals across the country.

Spencer also had three man-up goals as a freshman in 2016 and four as a junior in 2018, and he sports two EMGs through five games in 2019.

Junior midfielder **Jeff Trainor** leads the team with 85 career points through 35 games on 45 goals and 40 assists.

Trainor started his career with 22 points via 10 goals and 12 assists as a rookie playing primarily on the second line midfield in 2017.

After starting 2018 on the second line midfield, Trainor spent the majority of the season working on the first line and finished with 50 points via 28 goals and 22 assists. His 50 points made him the highest-scoring midfielder in team history since **Tim Soudan** had as many in 1990.

Trainor again operates on the first and second line midfields in 2019 and is third among Minutemen with 13 points on seven goals and six assists through five games played.

Now-junior **Devin Spencer** tallied his first, second and third as a Minuteman against Harvard (2/24), No. 11 Yale (2/27) and Drexel (3/31) in 2018.

Jeff Trainor added his name to the list with four goals at Brown (3/24), three at Delaware (4/6) and four more over Towson (4/14). He recorded his first of 2019 with three goals at No. 4 Yale (3/2).

Ben Spencer tallied two during the 2017 season and one in 2018 while **Chris Connolly** became the fourth Minuteman with a hat trick following his four-goal game over Sacred Heart on Feb. 13, 2018, added another with his six-tally outing over Hartford and posted his third with three goal against Towson in the CAA Championship Game. He is the current leader among Minutemen with four hat tricks following his five-goal ledger at Harvard on Feb. 23, 2019.

Billy Philpott, a short-stick defensive midfield, totaled three goals in the win over Hofstra (4/27) for the first known hat trick by a SSDM in program history. He posed the second of his career in the 14-8 win over Albany on March 5, 2019.

Gabriel Procyk added his name to the list during his first collegiate game with four goals and an assist. He then posted a three-goal outing against No. 13 Ohio State for his second collegiate hat trick in as many games played. Procyk added a third in the win at Albany on March 5, 2019).

MEYERS THE X FACTOR

Tom Meyers reset his single-game career highs with 21 faceoffs won, 25 faceoffs taken and 13 groundballs against Army in the 2019 season-opener. Meyers won at least 75 percent of the faceoffs in each of the four quarters, including a 9-of-10 first quarter and all four in the third quarter. He was also 3-of-4 in the second and 5-of-6 in the fourth.

Meyers added a pair of games with 26 faceoffs taken at Yale and Albany while he also tied his career high for groundballs in the win over the Great Danes.

20-20 VISION

Senior goalie **Sean Sconone** posted a career-high-tying 20 saves against No. 13 Ohio State on Sat., Feb. 16. It marked Sconone's second career game with 20 stops as he previously hit the 2-0 mark at Fairfield on April 21, 2018.

PAPARO FOR THE COURSE

Isaac Paparo again opened a season with a five-groundball, three-caused turnover outing against Army on Feb. 9, 2019. He previously did the same against Army during the 2018 opener.

For his career, Paparo owns seven games with five or more groundballs and 14 with at least three caused turnovers.

His defensive success over the entirety of the 2018 season reflects a continuation of his sophomore year output, which included 46 groundballs and a program-record 33 caused turnovers. Five games into the 2019 season, Paparo holds the most caused turnovers (78) and the groundballs (136) among active Minutemen.

The Major League Lacrosse Charlotte Hounds franchise selected then-senior faceoff specialist **Noah Rak** in the fourth round with the 30th overall pick of the 2018 MLL Collegiate Draft. Rak was one of only two CAA student-athletes picked and he was joined by Hofstra goalie Jack Concannon (Florida Launch, fourth round, 34th overall). Rak was the 27th Minuteman selected in the MLL draft all-time.

LOYALTY ABOVE ALL

Former head coach **Dick Garber** and current program leader **Greg Cannella** are two of only 16 head coaches in the history of Division I men's lacrosse with 200 or more wins at one school. Maryland head coaches Jack Faber & Al Heagy served as cocoaches at Maryland from 1931-63 and share 225 wins. Massachusetts is one of only three programs with two coaches on the list, including Maryland and Syracuse.

HOME IS WHERE THE HEART IS

Garber Field has proven to be one of the toughest home field advantages in all of college lacrosse as UMass has posted an 92-39 record (70.2 win percentage) at Garber since the beginning of 2001.

The squad won at least four home games in 13 of the last 17 seasons, including a program-record 10 victories in 2003 and another nine wins in Amherst during the 2012 campaign.

The Minutemen played their first five home games of 2015 at McGuirk Stadium due to winter weather-related damage to the playing surface at Garber. They went 2-3 at McGuirk in 2015 and 1-1 at Garber Field following their return against Drexel (4/18) and Delaware (4/24).

ALPHAS OF THE TROOP

Seniors **Isaac Paparo**, **Anthony Reale** and **Sean Sconone** lead the team as tri-captains in 2019.

Paparo started his career at long-stick midfield before he transitioned into close defense five games into the 2017 season. Paparo was only the fourth junior elected captain during head coach **Greg Cannella's** tenure in 2018. The honor was previously bestowed on **Ryan Izzo** during his junior year in 2014, **Tim McCormack** in 2011 and **Buddy Hoffman** in 1995.

Reale owns 32 career appearances, including 14 as a short-stick defensive midfielder in 2018. He is the younger brother of **Joe Reale** (2006-09), who was a

team captain for head coach **Greg Cannella** during the 2009 season.

Sconone played in 13 games and made 10 starts during 2018, and backstopped the team to the CAA Championship as the tournament's Most Outstanding Player. In 30 career games played, Sconone owns a 9.63 goals-against average and .577 save percentage.

"GARBER'S GORILLAS" EXPLAINED

For the past 50 years, the University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse team has held the unofficial nickname of "Gorillas." In 1965, UMass took in its first high-profile recruit, **Kevin O'Connor**, from New York. His girlfriend, poking a bit of fun at the relatively diminutive size of the Minutemen players at the time, drew a picture of a gorilla donning a lacrosse helmet with a stick in its hand. The art major and members of the team made stickers of the newly adopted moniker and put them everywhere, including their helmets. Thus, the nickname, "Garber's Gorillas" and style of play, "Gorilla Lacrosse" were born.

(ROAD) WARRIORS, COME OUT TO PLAY

UMass men's lacrosse is 2-1 on the road in 2019 with wins at Harvard, 12-9, and at Albany, 14-8. It comes on the heels of a successful 2018 on the road.

Massachusetts was 5-2 on the road, with the two losses coming at the hands of No. 16 Army in Michie Stadium during the season-opener on Feb. 10 and No. 5 Yale in the NCAA Tournament during the season finale in 2018. The team earned road wins at Brown, Delaware, Drexel, Fairfield and UMass Lowell in between.

The five consecutive road wins was tied for the fourth-longest active streak in NCAA Division I upon its completion.

HOMEGROWN TALENT

Sixteen of the 44 players on the UMass men's lacrosse roster for the 2018 season hail from Massachusetts (36.4 percent).

This corps of Commonwealth natives includes key returnees **Billy Philpott** (short-stick defensive midfielder), **Jeff Trainor** (first-line midfield), **Kevin Tobin** (first-line midfielder) while the Massachusetts core has a decidedly young feel to it as 10 of the group is in their first or second seasons as Minutemen.

Following Massachusetts, the next-most common home states among Minutemen are New York (7), and no other has more than five UMass men's lacrosse student-athletes calling it home.

SLAYING GIANTS

Greg Cannella continues to challenge his squad with contests against nationally talented programs. In the process, Cannella guided UMass to 63 total wins versus nationally ranked foes during his tenure, including multiple in nine of the last 11 seasons.

Dating back to the 1973 season, the earliest available poll data from the USILA, the Minutemen have secured the most single-season top-20 wins as a program under Cannella with seven during 2003.

GORILLA PRIDE PASSED DOWN

Seven current men's lacrosse student-athletes are immediate relatives of University of Massachusetts graduates, including Matt Baugher, Jack Gump, Isaac Paparo, Billy Philpott, Anthony Reale, Ben Spencer and Devin Spencer.

Matt Baugher's mother, Marybeth, graduated from the University of Massachusetts.

Jack Gump's mother, Peggy, graduated from the University of Massachusetts.

Isaac Paparo's parents, Russ and Leslie, graduated from the University of Massachusetts. Russ did not compete for the team.

Billy Philpott's father, Scott, graduated from the University of Massachusetts and played for the men's lacrosse program in 1981.

Anthony Reale's older brother, Joe, was a member of the team from 2006-09, and was a captain in 2009.

Brothers **Ben** and **Devin Spencer's** father, Ted, played for the team from 1983-85 before a 13-year tenure as the coach of the Fairfield men's lacrosse program.

TRANSFERRING INTO THE TROOP

Massachusetts has four transfer student-athletes on the 2018 roster, including **Joe Bruno**, **Cameron Carpenter**, **Logan Danenza** and **Tyler Green**.

Bruno attended Endicott and was a member of the football program in 2018, but did not compete during his freshman season.

Carpenter made three appearances at Mount St. Mary's during his first collegiate season in 2017. He played just under 70 minutes as a reserve goalie and sported a 9.53 goals-against average. At UMass in 2018, he played in two games totaling 7:18 with two saves.

Danenza saw time on close defense in eight contests for High Point two years ago. He finished the season with five groundballs and two caused turnovers. He made four appearances at UMass in 2018 as a reserve with no statistics accumulated.

Green, who is in his first year with the team, played for Saint Joseph's as a freshman in 2018. He had 34 faceoff wins over eight games played for the Hawks with 18 groundballs and three caused turnovers.

WELCOME TO THE LINEUP

Three student-athletes made their first appearance with UMass men's lacrosse during the season-opener. It included freshmen **Scott Del Zotto** (midfield) and **Gabriel Procyk** (attack) and sophomore **Kevin Cutinella** (midfield). Del Zotto and Procyk also started for the squad. Three more added their names to the box score during the game against No. 13 Ohio State in sophomore faceoff specialist **Tyler Green** and freshmen midfielders **Matt Baugher** and **Matthew Hill**. Green previously played collegiately at Saint Joseph's as a freshman in 2018.

TWO-AND-A-HALF DECADES UNDER THE INFLUENCE

The 2019 season marks **Greg Cannella's** 25th as the head coach of UMass. The University of Massachusetts graduate is 208-145 overall and stands as one of the longest tenured coaches in NCAA D-I. In terms of total D-I experience, Cannella is fifth while his 25 years in Amherst place him second for longest head coaching tenure at a current school among all head coaches in D-I during the 2019 season.

ROAD TRIPPIN'

Among all Minutemen, brothers Ben and Devin Spencer trekked the furthest to play for head coach **Greg Cannella** at UMass, as the Spencers call the State of California home.

The Spencer brothers left the Gold Coast for New England and covered approximately 2,600 miles to do so. They hail from Danville, which is approximately 20 miles inland of Oakland.

Recent graduate Grant Consoletti ('17), spanned a distance of roughly 2,550 miles directly across the country from his town (Thousand Oaks) on the Pacific shoreline to the Berkshires. Consoletti was the second Minuteman to hail from California in recorded program history upon arrival and the first since **Bob Woodbury** (Van Nuys, Calif.) lettered for UMass in 1962 and 1963. The hometowns of those two are only approximately 25 miles apart.

THE BROTHERS SPENCER

Ben Spencer and Devin Spencer are the only pair of siblings on the team. Their father, Ted, also played for the program in the 1980s.

Though they are the only active pair of brothers on the team, the Spencers are far from the only siblings to play for head coach Greg Cannella. Other Gorilla brothers include...

ARE YOU MY BROTHER?

Senior midfielder Charlie O'Brien and junior long-stick midfielder Dan O'Brien are not related. Charlie is a native of Chelmsford, Mass., and attended Bishop Guertin High School in New Hampshire. Dan is a native of Lloyd Harbor, New York, who attended St. Anthony's before he took a prep year at Avon Old Farms in Connecticut. Senior **Ben Spencer** and junior **Devin Spencer** are the lone pair of brothers on the team. Sophomore Kevin Tobin will be joined by his younger brother, Mike Tobin, for 2019-20 after Mike signed his NLI with UMass.

PAPARO TABBED TO ISRAEL NATIONAL TEAM

Junior close defenseman Isaac Paparo was chosen for Israel Lacrosse's 2018 FIL World Championship. One of only seven defensemen selected to the roster, Paparo took the opportunity to represent his Jewish heritage with participation in the tournament From July 12-21, 2018, in Netanya, Israel. He won FIL World Championship President's Team and the squad finished seventh of 46th participating nations.

Over his three completed seasons as a Minuteman, Paparo collected 118 groundballs alongside 64 caused turnovers, including a program-record 33 created as a sophomore last season. He won USILA All-America, CAA Player of the Year and All-CAA First Team in 2018.

The Israel Nation Team roster was composed of Israeli players, as well as members of the Jewish Diaspora, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL). In conjunction with the Israel Lacrosse Tzedakah Program, each player competed in honor of a charity of their choosing.

MADDEN MOVED INTO COACHING ROLE

Shane Madden is in his second season filling a role as an undergraduate volunteer assistant following two years as a competitor with the team.

As a freshman in 2016, Madden won a CAA Commissioner's Academic Award and scored one goal on his only shot taken over three games played as a reserve on midfield or attack. He did not see the field as a sophomore in 2017 due to injury, medically retired from competition and shifted into his current role following the season.

Madden is a graduate of Trinity-Pawling High School in Pawling, N.Y.. He captained the Trinity-Pawling squad as a senior in 2015 and provided 32 points via 19 goals and 13 assists and received All-Founders League in his first year (2014), when he contributed 19 points on 14 goals and five assists.

REID NAMED TO US LACROSSE HALL OF FAME CONNECTICUT CHAPTER

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse alumnus Jack Reid (2003-06) received induction into the US Lacrosse Hall of Fame - Connecticut Chapter during a Sat., Nov. 17 ceremony in Stratford, Connecticut.

Reid started all four of his seasons at Massachusetts and posted career totals including 215 groundballs and 71 caused turnovers during his 63 appearances and 59 starts. He increased his groundball totals over each of his four seasons with 33 as a freshman, 53 during his sophomore year, 57 as a junior and 72 as senior in 2006. Caused turnovers were only tracked during his junior and senior seasons when Reid posted 36 and 35, respectively.

With Reid anchoring the defense, Massachusetts reached the NCAA Championship Game in 2006 while the squad also made NCAA Quarterfinal Round appearances in 2003 and 2005. The Glastonbury, Conn., native won a plethora of awards throughout his four-year career, which included USILA All-America from 2004-06, Tewaaraton Award nominations in 2005 and 2006, the ECAC Defensive Player of the Year Award in 2006 and four NEILA All-Region accolades.

SCHNEIDER NAMED IMLCA ASSISTANT COACH OF THE YEAR

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse associate head coach **Doc Schneider** earned the 2018 Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IMLCA) Assistant Coach of the Year Award, as announced by the organization at its annual hall of fame banquet in Baltimore. Schneider completed his ninth season on-staff at Massachusetts in 2017-18, and helped head coach **Greg Cannella**, fellow associate head coach **Craig McDonald** and the Minutemen to the 2018 CAA Championship and a berth in the NCAA Tournament.

A dedicated member of the UMass men's lacrosse family, Schneider is in his fourth campaign as the team's offensive instructor, following six years as an assistant coach from 2010-14, and four more as a starting goal-keeper for the Minutemen prior to that. In addition to his work on the offensive side of the ball, Schneider continues to tutor the UMass goalies alongside McDonald.

Schneider's high-octane offensive style of play was on display throughout the 2018 campaign, when Massachusetts ranked among the nation's leaders in points, goals and assists per game, scoring margin and shot percentage. Spearheaded by All-CAA standouts Buddy Carr and Jeff Trainor, and CAA Rookie of the Year Chris Connolly, Massachusetts ranked either first or second across the league in every offensive metric.

CANNELLA INDUCTED INTO US LACROSSE HALL OF FAME WESTERN MASSACHUSETTS CHAPTER

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse head coach **Greg Cannella** earned placement into the United States Lacrosse Hall of Fame Western Massachusetts Chapter during a ceremony on Jan. 23, 2019 at the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. Cannella was inducted for his long-time contributions to the game in Western Massachusetts, including as a player (1986, '87), assistant coach (1992, '93) and head coach (1994 - present) of the UMass program.

Cannella, a 1988 University of Massachusetts graduate, is in his 25th season as the program's head coach and his 29th overall with the program include two years spent as an assistant coach (1993, '94) and two as a letterman (1986, '87). Under his guidance, Massachusetts owns nine NCAA Tournament appearances, eight New England Championships and is 208-145 (.589).

A veteran presence on the sidelines at Garber Field, Cannella loyalty to the University of Massachusetts lacrosse program currently ranks him as the second-longest tenured head coach across all Division I schools, while Cannella holds the fifth-most years as a Division I head coach among all current program leaders nationally.

Combined with the success of Cannella's mentor, former UMass head coach **Richard F. Garber** (1955-90), Massachusetts is the only program with one head coach in the 300-Win Club (Garber) and another in the 200-Win Club (Cannella), where both individuals earned all of their victories at the same institution.

Cannella is the latest in a line of UMass men's lacrosse alumni inducted into the US Lacrosse Hall of Fame Western Massachusetts Chapter. The list includes former letterwinners **Norm Smith** and **Jeff Spooner** (2017), **Ted Garber** (2016) and **Richard F. Garber** (2015).

MANNY JOINS PLL'S ARCHERS LACROSSE CLUB

University of Massachusetts men's lacrosse alumnus **Will Manny** joined the recently-launched Premier Lacrosse League (PLL) as a member of the Archers Lacrosse Club. The league begins its season on June 1 at Gillette Stadium in Boston, Mass.

Manny (2010-13) ranks fifth in the history of UMass men's lacrosse with 201 career points on 107 goals and 94 assists.
