Bob Mumma was promoted to head baseball coach at UMBC, Director of Athletics Dr. Charles Brown announced in June 2011.

"Bob Mumma bleeds black and gold," Dr. Brown said. "He was an outstanding student-athlete for the Retrievers, earning All-Conference honors and national recognition as an Academic All-American. After playing professionally in the White Sox organization, he came back to UMBC and has been a dedicated assistant coach. He deserves an opportunity to skipper the Retrievers. I am looking forward to seeing him lead our baseball program back to prominence."

After a stellar collegiate career at UMBC and two seasons of professional baseball, Mumma returned to his alma mater in the fall of 1996 and has served as the Retrievers' assistant baseball coach for the past 15 seasons.

Mumma succeeds John Jancuska, who coached the Retrievers from 1978-2011. Tom Rider (1967-75) and Hal Sparks (1976-77) are the only other coaches to pilot the UMBC baseball team in the program's 45 years of varsity competition.

"I am extremely excited to have this opportunity," Mumma said. "Other than trying to be a Major League player, it was my dream to be a head coach, and once I got into coaching, this was where I wanted to be a head coach. I am very thankful to Dr. Brown for the opportunity to become the fourth head coach in UMBC history, and to Coach Jancuska for being a great mentor for 15 years in the coaching arena. Our goal now is put together a solid campaign and become perennial powers in the America East."

The Rising Sun, Md., native competed as a catcher at UMBC from 1990-92. In his freshman campaign, Mumma slugged 14 home runs and hit .339, earning a place on the Coppertone Freshman All-America squad. The following season, he hit .395 with 15 round-trippers and 53 RBIs, earning Player of the Year honors from the East Coast Conference. He was also named to the ECAC, All-East Region and East Coast Conference first teams. Mumma capped his collegiate career by hitting .346 with 13 home runs and 53 RBIs in 1992, as the Retrievers earned an at-large bid and competed in their first NCAA Division I tournament.

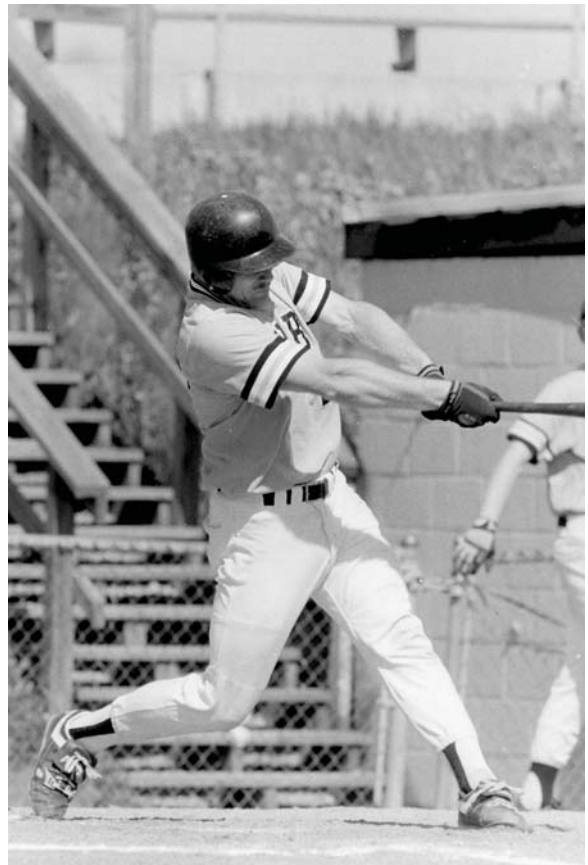
Mumma earned East Coast Conference First Team honors in 1992 and was also named to the GTE Academic All-America squad.

He was drafted in the 13th round by the Chicago White Sox in June 1992 and signed a professional contract with the club. The backstop completed his economics degree in May 1993 and played for two years in the White Sox system.

Mumma is the Retrievers' all-time leader in home runs (42), is tied for second in RBIs (152) and ranks among the top 10 in six other offensive categories. He was selected to the UMBC Athletics Hall of Fame in 1997 and currently serves on the school's Hall of Fame selection committee.

Prior to becoming a full-time assistant coach in September 2005, Mumma served as an academic counselor in the UMBC Athletics EXCELL program, working with all of the university's student-athletes.

Mumma, who received his MBA from the University of Baltimore in the spring of 2000, resides in Elkridge, Md., with his wife, Kristy Hartman-Mumma, a 1999 UMBC alumnae who served as UMBC's head field hockey coach from 2000-05.

TIM O'BRIEN

Tim O'Brien returns for his fourth season and will be working with the infield and team defense after spending three years working with the pitching staff.

Under O'Brien's tutelage, the Retrievers decreased their team ERA over two runs per game. Austin Drewyer ranked second in NCAA Division I in fewest walks per nine innings while the entire staff ranked 49th. Drewyer and Mike Mitchell ranked among the country's leaders in complete games, ranking ninth and 42nd, respectively. O'Brien's work with the staff included a more rigorous fitness program and the benefits paid dividends with a single pitcher not missing time due to injury in 2011.

The Niagara University alum spent time as an associate scout for the Florida Marlins and Baltimore Orioles from 1993 to 2005. O'Brien won numerous awards as head coach of Long Reach High School in Columbia, Md., from 1997-2008, including Coach of the Year by *The Baltimore Sun* and *The Washington Post* and Regional Coach of the Year by the American Baseball Coaches' Association. While at Long Reach, he served as president of the Maryland State Baseball Coaches' Association.

O'Brien spent the 2010 summer as pitching coach for the USA Women's National Team and was previously the pitching coach for the Men's Champion's Program that earned gold medals for USA Baseball in the Pan-American Games in 2007 in Guatemala and in Puerto Rico in 2008. In his time at UMBC, O'Brien helped former UMBC standout Dan Blewett recover from Tommy John surgery to become the Retrievers' most recent professional player.

O'Brien is currently a teacher at Long Reach, and lives with his wife, Mary Beth, in Columbia, Md. Both of their sons, Robbie, who is a civil engineer in Baltimore, and Kevin, who is an accountant in Virginia, played collegiate baseball.



LIAM BOWEN

Liam Bowen was named assistant baseball coach at UMBC in September 2011.

Bowen comes to Baltimore after working as the pitching coach for Lincoln Memorial during the 2011 season. The team's ERA fell from 7.67 the year before to 5.42 in 2011.

Before joining the Division II school, Bowen worked at St. Mary's (Md.) for four seasons, where the team's ERA dropped from 7.25 in 2006 to 4.60 in 2009.

"Liam has a great record as a pitching coach," Mumma said. "He comes highly recommended and will be a tremendous help to our pitching staff. Plus he gets to return to the area where he grew up, so it's a great fit."

Bowen earned a Bachelor's degree in history from Macalester College in Minnesota in 2006. In 2004 he was named to the All-Conference team and also selected as the team's most valuable player.

With a new head coach on the bench for first time since 1977, the UMBC baseball team was picked to finish sixth in the America East this season, the conference office announced. The poll, which is conducted by the head coaches in the America East, tabbed Stony Brook as the favorite to win the league in 2012.

The Seawolves received four of the six first place votes, with Maine receiving the remaining two votes, and taking second in the preseason poll. The Black Bears were followed by Albany, Binghamton, Hartford and UMBC to round out the conference in order.

Entering his first year as the head man for the Retrievers, longtime assistant and former UMBC catcher, Bob Mumma is excited for his first year in charge. "Sure there is a little more responsibility that comes with being the head guy, but I've been waiting for this opportunity and I'm excited for the challenge," coach Mumma said. "I look forward to influencing these young men both on and off the field, and I demand the best from them both on the field and in the classroom."



Senior Luke DiBlasi

Though this is his first year as the head coach, Mumma brings plenty of experience to a young Retriever squad. A three-year starter at UMBC, Mumma is the school's all-time leader in homeruns (42) and is among the top ten in seven other categories.

Following his time in Baltimore, Mumma was selected in the 13th round by the Chicago White Sox, where he spent two years in their organization. The Rising Sun, Md. native then returned back to campus to become an assistant coach, a title he held for 15 years under mentor and former coach John Jancuska.

In addition to his own experience, Mumma can rely on three experienced captains, seniors Josh Dick and Curtis Schickner, and sophomore Rob McCabe, to help lead his squad. In their first three years in Baltimore, Dick and Schickner have combined to make 135 appearances for the Retrievers.

A year ago, McCabe saw action in 45 games as a freshman, and was named to the America East All-Rookie squad.

"There's no doubt that we lost a lot with Rick [Phillips] and [Austin] Drewyer graduating, but this presents a great opportunity for our seniors to step up," said coach Mumma. "Offensively, I think we have a chance to be a very good ball club."

Pitching

With the loss of Drewyer to graduation and the departure of Sean Swetnam, the Retrievers are left with just John Cohn, Luke DiBlasi and Mike Mitchell as starters with experience. DiBlasi, a senior, is the most seasoned of the trio, having made four starts and a total of 18 appearances

in 2011. He recorded two of the Retrievers' ten wins a year ago.

The incoming freshman class brings with it six pitchers who will attempt to crack the weekend rotation and have an impact on a slimmed down Retriever pitching staff.

In addition to the group of freshman joining UMBC, coach Mumma welcomes pitching coach Liam Bowen to campus. With Bowen's track record of turning pitching staffs around, Mumma is excited to see the effect on his pitchers this season.

"Coach Bowen is great at helping pitchers develop their mechanics and teaching them how to pitch," said coach Mumma. "I expect our guys with some experience to step up and lead by example."

Catching

Sophomore tri-captain Rob McCabe and junior Jason Allinder return for the Retrievers to complete the battery. Allinder will be the primary starter behind the plate, which according to Mumma, will give the Retrievers more flexibility overall, especially with McCabe's versatility. The sophomore from Philadelphia could also see team in the outfield in a move to keep his bat in the everyday lineup.

"In order to keep Rob fresh for the entire season, they'll [Allinder and McCabe] be rotating at catcher," coach Mumma said. "They're both tremendously athletic and we want to get them both in the lineup as much as possible."

Infield

Senior Curtis Schickner anchors both a veteran, yet unexperienced infield. Starting in 39 of the Retrievers' 47 games in 2011, Schickner had a slight drop at the plate as a junior. He'll look to recapture his form from sophomore year when he hit .259 and drove in 23 RBI.

Across the



diamond, two-year starter Max Himmelstein mans first base for the Retrievers. The career .312 hitter, collected 53 hits a year ago, including 12 doubles, while scoring 24 runs and driving in 31 more.

"Look for those two guys [Schickner and Himmelstein] to provide the stability for our ballclub," said coach Mumma. "They will solidify our infield, and in turn, our entire team."

While UMBC has experience at the corners, the Retrievers will look to a raw combination of talent up the middle.

Freshmen Jake Barnes, Vince Corbi and Ian Glassman will vie for the two primary double-play spots.

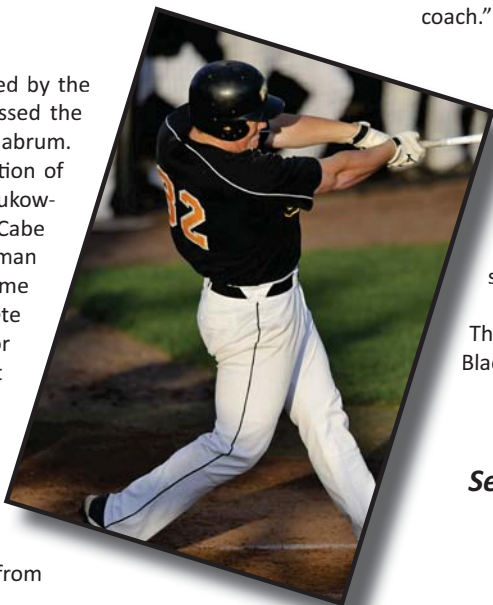
"The group of incoming freshman knows how to win," coach Mumma said. "Building on their previous experiences, they now expect to win."

"I am extremely excited to have this opportunity," Mumma said. "Other than trying to be a Major League player, it was my dream to be a head coach, and once I got into coaching, this was where I wanted to be a head coach."

Outfield

UMBC's outfield will be bolstered by the return of Tom Gilchrist who missed the entire 2011 season with a torn labrum. He will be joined by a combination of teammates, notably Brian Klukowicz and Rob McCabe, when McCabe is not behind the plate. Freshman Anthony Gatto will also see some time in the outfield to complete the rotation. Now in his junior year, Klukowicz will be a guy that Mumma counts on for leadership and production.

"We know Brian is a great hitter, but he has really turned into a solid defensive guy as well and we expect big things from him," said coach Mumma.



UMBC begins its 2012 campaign on Fri., Feb. 24 when the Retrievers travel to Winston Salem, N.C. for the Wake Forest Invitational where they will take on Georgetown and host Wake Forest on the tournament's first day. Game one, against the Hoyas, is scheduled for a 2 p.m. start time, with the first pitch against the Demon Deacons set for 6 p.m. UMBC then takes on Georgetown again on Saturday, before concluding the weekend series against Cincinnati on Sunday.

The Retrievers' first home game is slated for Fri., Mar. 1 when the Black and Gold opens a series with Army.

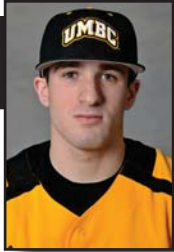

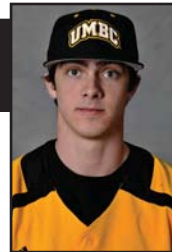

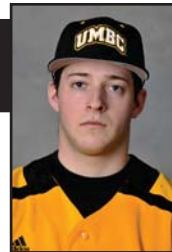

- Three schools (Boston U., New Hampshire, Vermont) ranked among the nation's best in Graduation Success Rate (GSR), with scores of 94 or better. Nearly one-third of all America East teams had perfect GSR scores.
- Thirty programs from America East schools received Academic Progress Rate (APR) public recognition awards from the NCAA for finishing among the top 10 percent in the nation.
- Seventeen student-athletes received a total of 19 National Academic All-America honors.

ATHLETICS...

- Every America East school won a conference championship or regular-season title for the first time since 2005-06.
- Boston University won its sixth straight America East Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup and 11th overall to surpass Delaware for the most Cups in conference history.
- Twenty-nine America East student-athletes earned All-America recognition, including one each in men's basketball and men's and women's soccer, five in men's lacrosse, two each in women's lacrosse, baseball and field hockey and 15 in cross country/track & field.
- America East was second among all men's lacrosse automatic-qualifying conferences in RPI.
- Albany was the final undefeated women's lacrosse team in Division I, with an 18-0 record, before losing to national champion Northwestern in the NCAA quarterfinals.

- Stony Brook placed seventh as a team at the NCAA Women's Cross Country Championship.

- After winning its first America East baseball championship since 2006, Maine beat FIU in an NCAA Regional game to give America East an NCAA win in each of the last three seasons.
- Sven Vloedgraven of Binghamton was selected to the NCAA Tennis Singles Championship for the second-straight year. He is the only America East student-athlete to have played in the event.

LEADERSHIP...

- For the second straight year, America East partnered with Newman's Own Foundation to encourage community service among students through the NOF Campus Community Challenge. Nine grants of \$7,500 to \$25,000 were awarded to honor and support student groups engaged in philanthropy and community service. In total, more than \$100,000 was given to America East student groups. Top selections were:

Student-athletes from America East schools partnered with CFES Scholars at participating schools for a community service project, ranging from beautifying school property to collecting food and shoes for charity drives.
- Members of the America East Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), with at least one representative from each of the nine America East schools, volunteered their time to clean up and paint at the Heading Home Family Shelter in Boston as part of "Make a Difference Day."
- University at Albany women's lacrosse standout Nikki Branchini was selected the 2011 America East Woman of the Year for a distinguished career in the areas of academic achievement, athletics excellence, service and leadership.
- Student-athletes who competed in the America East Swimming & Diving Championship and University at Albany's men's basketball team were named the 2011 America East Sportsmanship Award winners.
- Five America East institutions are ranked among the top 105 national universities according to the U.S News and World Report America's Best College Guide and UMBC was recognized as the top "Up-and-Coming" university in the country for the second straight year.

IN THE PROS...

- Several former America East athletes have made a positive impact in the professional ranks. Some of those include:
 - Former Hartford men's basketball star Vin Baker and three-time America East Player of the Year Reggie Lewis, who captained the Boston Celtics at the time of his premature death, combined to make five NBA All-Star appearances during their careers.  - Hartford grad Jeff Bagwell belted 448 home runs in 15 seasons with the Houston Astros and was named the National League Rookie of the Year in 1991 and MVP in 1994.
 - Carlos Pena, the 1998 Baseball Scholar-Athlete at Northeastern, earned American League Comeback Player of the Year honors in 2007, won an American League Gold Glove at first base in 2008, made his first All-Star appearance in 2009 and finished with a league-leading 39 home runs. Min-

nesota Twins' Joe Nathan, a former Academic All-American at Stony Brook, has been an All-Star four times and won the Rollins Relief Man Award in 2009. Former Binghamton pitcher Scott Diamond made his major league debut for the Twins on July 18, 2011. Multiple other former standouts are playing in the minor and independent leagues.

- Four former America East men's lacrosse standouts were named Major League Lacrosse All-Stars in 2011.
- Several men's soccer standouts have played professionally, both in the United States and abroad. Boston University graduate Andy Dorman played four seasons with the New England Revolution in MLS and has spent the last five years in the Scottish and English Premier Leagues. Two-time America East Goalkeeper of the Year Bouna Coundoul from Albany has played six seasons in MLS with the Colorado Rapids and New York Red Bulls and has 32 career shutouts. Steward Ceus (Albany), Samuel Appiah (Boston University) and Levi Houapeu (UMBC) were drafted by Colorado, Houston and Philadelphia, respectively, each of the last three years.
- Boston University's Mara Osher and Casey Brown became the first America East women's soccer players to get selected in the Women's Professional Soccer Draft in 2010.

THIS IS UMBC ATHLETICS

In 2010-11, UMBC Athletics celebrated its 25th anniversary of competing in NCAA Division I athletics. Since that first fall of 1986, the growth of Retriever Athletics has been remarkable—from the quadrupling of staff size to the creation and/or renovation of all athletic facilities. Alma maters and fight songs have been penned and performed, spirit groups created and flourished, attendance records smashed and championships celebrated. Thirteen of UMBC's varsity programs have won conference titles and 10 have competed in NCAA Tournaments. The Retrievers commemorated the 25th Division I season by welcoming a new logo—one which displays the characteristics of pride and determination. The current group of 400 student-athletes and the thousands of alumni that came before them maintain those traits on the athletic fields, in the classrooms and our communities and well beyond.

In 2010-11...

- The men's soccer team won the America East Conference championship before a wildly enthusiastic home crowd. Pete Carangi's squad knocked off No. 10 and host Princeton, 2-1, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and battled No. 9 William and Mary to a scoreless draw in the second round in Williamsburg. Earlier in the season, UMBC hosted a Fox Soccer nationally televised game and drew a record 2,751 fans on Homecoming weekend. The Retrievers finished the season at No. 25 (of 204) in the RPI rankings.
- The men's swimming and diving teams repeated as conference champions, while the women recaptured the title in a meet hosted by UMBC at the Germantown Indoor Swim Center. The men have hoisted the trophy in all eight of their America East Conference seasons. Junior Abbey McKenney was named Most Outstanding Swimmer after winning all three individual events and two relays and breaking six school records.
- The UMBC women's basketball team won its first-ever America East Conference regular-season title, racking up a school Division I-record 20 victories. Phil Stern's squad advanced to the WNIT, where it led host Florida at intermission before falling to the Gators. Junior Michelle Kurowski, who earned her undergraduate degree in May, was the conference's Scholar-Athlete, and the team was recognized on the WBCA Academic Top 25 Team Honor Roll for the second year in a row. The Retrievers' 3.374 grade-point average ranked 20th among NCAA Division I schools during the 2010-11 academic year.
- The women's lacrosse team upset six-time defending champ Boston University and reached the America East title game for the second consecutive season. Kelly Berger's squad posted a record of 11-7, which included victories over nationally ranked Towson.
- After winning four America East titles and finishing as runners-up in three other sports, UMBC finished in third place in the America East Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup standings, equaling the school's best-ever finish in eight seasons in the conference.
- Swimmer Keilan Freeman and track and field's Dominic Devaud repeated as Academic All-Americans in 2011. Freeman won the 2011 MACDA Division I Post-Graduate Scholarship and will attend graduate school at Stanford University.
- Of the 77 UMBC student-athletes that graduated in May, 53 were recognized on the America East Academic Honor Roll, with 29 earning Commissioner's Honor Roll status for earning a 3.5 GPA or higher during their competition season.
- Lacrosse alumni Brendan Mundorf, Drew Westervelt and Peet Poillon earned MLL All-Star recognition in the summer of 2011. All three players compete with the Denver Outlaws, along with another former Retriever, Terry Kimener.
- In professional soccer, UMBC Hall of Famer Giuliano Celenza announced his retirement from the MISL's Baltimore Blast after 11 years with the team. He was a two-time All-League selection. Former Retriever defender Billy Nelson continues his lengthy career with the hometown franchise. On the diamond, former baseball standout Zach Clark is in his sixth season in the Baltimore Orioles' system.
- A state-of-the-art lighting system was installed at UMBC Soccer Stadium, giving the Retrievers' men's and women's soccer programs the ability to play games under the lights on its plush Bermuda grass complex.
- UMBC Athletics renamed its 3,000-square foot varsity weight room as the Michael S. Knapp Varsity Weight Room and has completed Phase I of renovations. Some of the improvements made to the facility included demolition, repair and painting of the existing walls, the addition of a new ceiling, an expanded office complex, an improved ventilation system, new rubberized floors and the purchase of new equipment.

- For the second year in a row, *U.S. News & World Report America's Best Colleges Guide* named UMBC #1 in up-and-coming national universities, a list that includes Clemson University, Drexel University, Arizona State University, the University of California San Diego and Rice University. UMBC also is on a list of the top national universities "where the faculty has an unusual commitment to undergraduate teaching," a list that includes such schools as Princeton, Brown, Yale and Stanford universities.

- UMBC President Freeman A. Hrabowski, III, was named one of "The 10 Best College Presidents" in the U.S. by *Time Magazine* in 2009. This achievement follows his inclusion to the prestigious *U.S. News & World Report* "America's Best Leaders 2008" list. A collaborative effort between *U.S. News* and Harvard's Center for Public Leadership, the Best Leaders awards recognize ability to set direction, achieve results and cultivate a culture of growth.

- UMBC is one of 50 public institutions in the United States recognized by *The Princeton Review* as a "Best Value College," offering a combination of educational excellence and affordability. UMBC was also included in Kiplinger's Top 100 "Best Values in Public Colleges 2010-11," a ranking based on academic quality and affordable education. UMBC is ranked among schools such as University of North Carolina, University of Virginia and Binghamton University.

- Baltimore was ranked seventh in a new study of large U.S. cities that are the best places to attend college, as compiled by an economics research team.

- Approximately 77% of students at UMBC receive some financial aid in the form of scholarships, loans and grants.

- UMBC is one of the country's most environmentally-responsible colleges according to *The Princeton Review* and was included in its "Guide to 286 Green Colleges."

- The university's Alex. Brown Center for Entrepreneurship received \$2 million from the Kauffman Foundation to build entrepreneurship education across the campus. The mission of the Kauffman Campuses Initiative is to catalyze entrepreneurship programs outside of business and engineering schools. The award acknowledges the success of UMBC's Alex. Brown Center for Entrepreneurship, created six years ago through a gift of \$1 million from the Alex. Brown Foundation to develop a leading university entrepreneurship center for the Baltimore region.

- The Shriver Center's Choice Program has become a national model for effectively serving youth and families in at-risk environments. A community-based intervention program administered by UMBC's Shriver Center, Choice has provided intensive supervision and family support to almost 20,000 children throughout Maryland since 1989. The program has been replicated in Hartford, Conn., Providence, R.I., San Diego, and Syracuse, N.Y. Choice youth have an impressive 84% success rate while being served by the program.

- The university is fourth among U.S. research universities in the production of IT degrees and certificates, according to the most recent data from the Department of Education. The data also shows that UMBC ranks second among U.S. research universities in undergraduate IT degrees awarded, and it is the largest producer among those universities of IT graduates in Maryland, DC and Virginia.

- The Rise of American Research Universities, a book ranking university research achievement on a per-capita basis, found that UMBC scholars in the arts and humanities ranked 13th among all public campuses in the nation in prestigious awards.

- UMBC ranks second among U.S. universities in NASA funding. The university's NASA-funded centers are the Joint Center for Earth Systems Technology, the Goddard Earth Systems and Technology Center and the Center for Research and Exploration in Space Science and Technology.

- Residential Life (RL) is responsible for operating and maintaining the residential facilities as well as coordinating programs and services for approximately 3,900 students who live on campus. UMBC's Residential Life program not only provides living environments which are clean, secure, and convenient to classes, but also provides you with growth and development opportunities.

- The Student Involvement Center (SIC) is the gateway for involvement and leadership opportunities at UMBC. It is a great place for students and student organizations to access involvement, volunteerism, and leadership resources. The Office of Student Life promotes student involvement and leadership opportunities through the Student Involvement Center to build a stronger UMBC community.

- UMBC has a comprehensive recycling program and also donates various office/classroom furniture and athletic equipment to charitable organizations. The campus purchases recycled paper products, cleaning products that are Green Seal certified and Energy Star appliances. UMBC participates in the annual Recyclemania program.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The UMBC Athletics Community Outreach Program has been nationally recognized for its excellence. The men's lacrosse team's efforts with the "Ride With Pride" program earned them the 2000 Volunteer of the Year award by the Maryland Recreation and Parks Association. UMBC's role in "Ride With Pride" has been the subject of features aired by WMAR-TV and Fox Sports News over the past several years. Fox Sports News also featured a group of UMBC's student-athletes that worked with Habitat for Humanity in New Orleans in the spring of 2006 and *The NCAA News* spotlighted UMBC in its February Center Piece. In addition, the women's lacrosse team won the IWLCA 2008 Division I Team Community Awareness Award, which recognizes an entire team that has contributed significantly in its community.

The UMBC Athletics Community Outreach Program is dedicated to promoting a positive relationship between our student-athletes and communities surrounding the university. The program was developed in 1993 with the intention of encouraging young people to value and appreciate education through athletics. During the 2010-11 school year, UMBC athletes performed a total of more than 2,500 hours of community service through programs based in the Baltimore area, raised over \$20,000 for various charities and reached out to about 20,000 local youth.

BUILDING ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE THROUGH TEAM WORK

UMBC student-athletes and coaches travel to schools and organizations in the area to present a one-hour presentation to young students. Through these presentations and mini-clinics, teams emphasize the importance of doing well in school, setting goals and leading a safe and healthy lifestyle.

• **Make A Difference** mentoring program pairs a UMBC student-athlete with an elementary school student on a one-on-one basis to promote academic and personal growth. In 2010-11, we had 37 mentors at two local elementary schools who each volunteer twice a week.

• **Ride With Pride:** UMBC student-athletes assist trainers in horseback-riding lessons for children with disabilities. Horseback riding is very therapeutic for the participants, and the interaction with our athletes is very beneficial. There were 45 UMBC volunteers in 2010-11.

• **Soles4Souls:** UMBC Athletics collected and donated over 100 pairs of gently worn tennis shoes to those less fortunate.

• **College for Every Student** is a non-

profit organization committed to raising the academic aspirations and performance of underserved youth so that they can prepare for, gain access to, and succeed in college. UMBC partnered with Arbutus Middle School for the first year of this initiative and had 16 athletes mentor through CFES in 2010-11.

• **Arbutus Middle School** students and UMBC mentors volunteered at Southwestern Emergency Services in November and assisted with the organization and distribution of food and clothing to those less fortunate in our surrounding community.

• **Men's lacrosse** participated for the sixth straight year in the Great Prostate Cancer Challenge.

• For the third straight year, women's basketball participated in the Susan

G. Komen Race for the Cure to benefit breast cancer awareness and research, raising over \$6,500.

• **Dig Pink:** Volleyball sold shirts to raise money for breast cancer awareness and research, and women's lacrosse sold pink hair extensions. Together, the teams raised over \$1,000.

• **Midday Madness:** Local elementary and middle school students visit campus for the day. They get a guided tour of campus and watch the women's basketball game at noon. In 2011 there were 2,000 visiting students from 13 local schools.

• **Women's basketball** participated again in the WBCA PinkZone initiative, which raises money for the Kay Yow Cancer Fund to support breast cancer awareness and research.

• **National Girls and Women in Sports Day:** Youth girls were invited to campus on a Saturday morning. They participated in sports-related games and activities with women's soccer and volleyball and then watched the women's basketball game at noon.

• **League of Dreams** is a non-profit which provides fundamental baseball and softball skills for children with disabilities and handicaps. UMBC baseball invited League of Dreams participants and their families to a game.

• **UMBC Athletics** held a toy drive for the Children's Home of Catonsville orphanage and was able to collect toys for over 85 kids.



UMBC LIFE

UMBC is not the school your parents remember. The central core of academic buildings is still bristling with academic energy, but is now accompanied by a host of new facilities, including the seven-story Albin O. Kuhn Library, the Engineering and Computer Science Building, the Physics Building, techcenter@UMBC on a satellite South Campus, and the high-tech bwtech@UMBC Research and Technology Park. Sweeping changes have occurred in the campus' social scene, highlighted by the University Commons. The \$36 million structure opened in January 2003.



The hub for UMBC student life is the University Commons, with a food court, restaurant, bank, bookstore, performance space, high-speed wireless internet access and game room that features eight pool tables, video games, pinball and air hockey, as well as a number of flat-screen TVs, making it a popular spot to hang out.

UMBC students know that a high-quality education is essential to realizing their dreams. Whether in fine arts, science, social sciences, engineering or humanities, they set the mark high, work hard and make the most of their college experience to advance themselves toward top graduate programs and careers. Just as UMBC students are active participants in their education, they don't sit on the sidelines when it comes to campus life. Intercollegiate Division-I sports is an outlet for many students; others participate in club or intramural sports. There are more than 180 student groups on campus, expressing the extraordinary cultural diversity of the UMBC student body.



UMBC's Shriver Center serves as a national model of how colleges and universities can have a direct and positive impact on communities across the country. The Center places 1,000 UMBC students each year in internships and co-op positions throughout Maryland and the U.S., as well as in dozens of international settings.

UMBC ADMINISTRATION

DR. FREEMAN A. HRABOWSKI, III PRESIDENT

Freeman A. Hrabowski, III, has served as President of UMBC since May 1992. He joined the university in 1987, serving first as Vice Provost, then as Executive Vice President.

Born in 1950 in Birmingham, Ala., Dr. Hrabowski graduated at 19 from Hampton Institute with highest honors in mathematics, and he received his M.A. (mathematics) and Ph.D. (higher education administration/statistics) from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign at age 24.

Dr. Hrabowski serves as a consultant to the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the National Academy of Sciences, the U.S. Department of Education and universities and school systems nationally. He is a member of numerous boards, including the American Association of Colleges & Universities, the Baltimore Community Foundation, the Baltimore Equitable Society, the Casey Family Grants Program, Center Stage, Constellation Energy Group, the Education Commission of the States, the Maryland Business Roundtable for Education, McCormick & Company, Inc., the Mercantile Safe Deposit & Trust Company, the Merrick & France Foundations, the Maryland High-Technology Council, the University of Maryland Medical System and the Washington/Baltimore Regional 2012 Coalition (Olympic Regional Committee).

Examples of recent awards include election to the American Academy of Arts & Sciences (effective October 2001), being named 1999 Marylander of the Year by the editors of The Baltimore Sun and receiving the BETA Award (Baltimore's Extraordinary Technology Advocate), The Henry A. Rosenberg, Sr. Distinguished Citizen Award (Boy Scouts of America, Baltimore Council), The Andrew White Medal (Loyola College of Maryland), The Hatikvah Award (The Jewish National Fund), The Educator Achievement Award (NSF), The Outstanding Science Educator (Eli Lilly & Company), The Golden Torch Academic Visionary Award (National Society of Black Engineers), the Reginald H. Jones Distinguished Service Award (National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering) and The U.S. Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics and Engineering Mentoring (awarded to Dr. Hrabowski's university in recognition of the nationally acclaimed multi-million-dollar Meyerhoff Scholars Program for gifted African-American undergraduates in science and engineering).

Dr. Hrabowski also was instrumental in the formation of the Governor's Academy for Mathematics, Science and Technology. His research and publications focus on science and math education, with a special emphasis on issues involving minority participation. He is co-author of the book, *Beating the Odds*, which focuses on parenting and high-achieving African-American males in science, published by Oxford University Press in 1998; he co-authored a second book, *Overcoming the Odds*, on successful African-American young women in science, published by Oxford University Press in early 2002. Also a child-leader in the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. Hrabowski was prominently featured in Spike Lee's 1997 documentary, *Four Little Girls*, on the racially motivated bombing in 1963 of Birmingham's Sixteenth Street Baptist Church.

DR. CHARLES BROWN DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

UMBC's Dr. Charles Brown has been promoted to Associate Vice President & Director of Athletics, Physical Education and Recreation, President Dr. Freeman Hrabowski announced on Friday, June 17. Dr. Brown will begin his 22nd year at the helm of the Retrievers this fall.

"We are all very proud of Dr. Brown's stellar career as Director of Athletics over the past two decades," Dr. Hrabowski said. "He has led the program with both enthusiasm and integrity, and, most importantly, our student-athletes are succeeding athletically and academically."

The Brooklyn, N.Y., native will begin his 22nd year at UMBC this September and is the longest-tenured AD in the state of Maryland. He has transformed UMBC Athletics from a struggling Division-I program to one which has fared quite well regionally and nationally for the past decade.

Dr. Brown has championed UMBC Athletics' enhanced profile by positioning the Retrievers within appropriate levels of competition. One of his first tasks was to move UMBC into a Division-I conference, which he completed in 1988-89, his first year with the university, as the Retrievers joined the East Coast Conference. UMBC won the league's President's Cup in its second conference season, but the league folded shortly thereafter. Dr. Brown was able to move UMBC into the Big South Conference the following year (1992) and successfully positioned UMBC into a much better geographic fit when the Retrievers joined the Northeast Conference in 1998. He also helped to initiate the ECAC (Men's) Lacrosse League in 1999, and most recently, Dr. Brown engineered UMBC Athletics' move to a strong and improving mid-major conference, the America East Conference, in 2003.

Over the 11 years, Retriever teams have won 51 league championships and made 31 appearances in NCAA Championship competition. In all five years of league play in the NEC, UMBC was awarded the Commissioner's Cup, symbolic of the conference's top overall program. In 2002, UMBC produced its first national champion, as Cleopatra Borel won the shot put at the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships.

UMBC has adjusted well to life in the America East Conference with a third-place finish in the conference's Commissioner's Cup race in 2010-11. The athletic department recently experi-



enced its most celebrated year-long period in school history with the school's first-ever men's and women's basketball conference titles and NCAA Tournament appearances, sweeps in back-to-back years in the America East men's and women's swimming and diving championships, a conference title and NCAA appearance by men's tennis and an NCAA Tournament win over Maryland and a third straight national tournament appearance by the men's lacrosse team.

The program finished the 2006-07 year ranked 140th (top half) among all NCAA Division-I programs in the United States Sports Academy's Director's Cup. The University of Maryland, College Park (40) and the United States Naval Academy (72) were the only other institutions in the state that finished the year higher than the Retrievers.

UMBC's student-athletes have excelled in the classroom as well as the playing fields. In the last 11 years, 31 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America status, and more than 54 percent of Retriever student-athletes are earning 3.0 or higher grade-point averages. Moreover, UMBC's student-athletes graduate at a rate which is more than 10 percent higher than the university rate and the Retrievers' NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) and Graduation Success Rate (GSR) are also considerably above the national averages.

Dr. Brown has increased the full-time faculty and staff of the athletic department from 23 full-time employees at his arrival to 63 currently. There were only 13 full-time coaches (nine head, four assistant) upon Dr. Brown's arrival; now there are 32 (14 head, 18 assistant) to ensure the Retrievers' success on and off the playing fields. New positions were created in Marketing and Promotions, Fund Raising, Facilities and Operations, Business Administration, Community Outreach, Strength and Conditioning, Athletic Communications, Sports Medicine and Academic Services. He also initiated the UMBC Dance Team, the Down and Dirty Dawg Band and the newly reinstated cheerleading squad.

Dramatic increases in the department's entrepreneurial efforts have been implemented to support UMBC's student-athletes. UMBC Athletics received \$5,403 in gifts in the first year of Dr. Brown's tenure. In contrast, over the last several years, UMBC Athletics has brought in an average of \$1.25 million per year via fundraising, corporate sponsorships and other entrepreneurial efforts.

Starting from scratch in the 1990s, Dr. Brown developed a club sport program which has evolved into a 25-sport, 750-student program today.

In the area of community service, UMBC student-athletes currently donate more than 1,000 hours of time per year to mentor local elementary and middle school students, and coaches make hundreds of appearances in the community throughout the year. The program was recognized by The NCAA News as one of the finest in the country. Most recently, the Retrievers teamed with Enterprise Rent-A-Car to raise funds to purchase a MyTobii eye-controlled communication system for the use of United Cerebral Palsy of Central Maryland program participants.

Dr. Brown has improved the visibility of UMBC in many ways. In the spring of 1995, he made a bold move as he brought the first and second rounds of the NCAA Men's Basketball Championships to the Baltimore Arena. Sellout crowds put Baltimore in the national spotlight for one glorious March week. In the spring of 1998, UMBC hosted the Women's Lacrosse National Championships at UMBC Stadium, drawing record crowds and kudos from the national media. Dr. Brown also led the successful bid to bring the Men's Lacrosse National Championships to M&T Bank Stadium in 2003, 2004 and 2007, where all existing attendance records were shattered. Under Dr. Brown's leadership, UMBC now hosts five state high school championships in boys' and girls' soccer, boys' and girls' lacrosse and girls' basketball.

He has spearheaded the university's rapid enhancement of athletic and recreational facilities during his tenure. Lights were added to UMBC Stadium in 1992, and the region's finest outdoor aquatic complex was unveiled in the summer of 1996. Just a few months later, UMBC added a national-class track and field complex and replaced its main stadium field with an all-weather artificial surface. In the fall of 1999, the department moved into the Retriever Activities Center, which doubled the size of its existing indoor facility and provided all students with the top of the line in recreational facilities. Baseball's Alumni Field was improved during Dr. Brown's tenure with the addition of permanent seating and was later renamed The Baseball Factory Field at UMBC in a dedication ceremony following the addition of lights to the field in 2005. UMBC Soccer Stadium was constructed in 1999 and a new Bermuda grass surface - the only one of its kind in the conference - was dedicated in 2006. Chairback seating and a video display scoreboard were added to the arena in 2000. Lights were added to the tennis complex in 2005 and the courts were resurfaced and outfitted with Retriever wind screens. Field turf was added to the stadium in 2005 and a new \$5 million stadium locker room complex was completed in the spring of 2008. Lights were added to Retriever Soccer Park in the spring of 2010 and a new scoreboard was installed at UMBC Stadium in the fall.

Dr. Brown's impact has been felt beyond The Loop, as well. He has served two terms as president of the Maryland Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and served a term on the NCAA Division-I Championships/Competition Cabinet, where he influenced other directors to increase student-athlete participation in NCAA Championship competition. Dr. Brown is also currently on the board of the Howard County tennis patrons.

He is the fourth person to hold the position of athletic director on a permanent basis in the 41-year history of UMBC. W. Richard Mentzer served from 1966-68, followed by E. Richard Watts, Jr., who directed the program from 1968-1985. Rick Hartzell led UMBC into Division I athletics in the fall of 1985, prior to Dr. Brown's arrival in June of 1989.

Currently residing in Ellicott City, Md., with his wife, Linda, Dr. Brown, received his bachelor of science degree from Long Island University in 1967 and earned a master of science from Brooklyn College in 1969 and a Doctorate in Physical Education from Springfield College in 1980. The couple has two daughters, Melissa, an attorney, and Michelle, an elementary school teacher, and the Browns have four grandchildren.

Nancy Young has served as the Vice President for Student Affairs at UMBC since July 2007. In addition to Athletics, her responsibilities include oversight of the departments of Career Services, Residential Life, University Health Services, University Counseling Services, Student Judicial Programs, Transportation Services, Student Life, Off-Campus and Transfer Student Services and the operations of The Commons (student center).

Prior to being appointed as the Vice President for Student Affairs, Dr. Young was the Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs and Director of Housing Operations. With prior experience in Orientation, Campus Activities, and Housing at Southern Methodist University, McDaniel, University of Maryland College Park and the Ohio State University, Dr. Young has over 25 years experience in the field of Student Affairs. Dr. Young is a graduate of the Ohio State University and the University of Maryland, College Park.

NCAA FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE

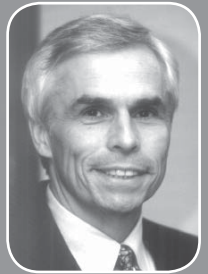

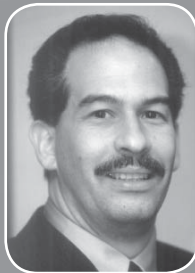

RETRIEVER FACILITIES

The Retriever Activities Center, a \$5.6 million addition to the former UMBC Fieldhouse, was completed in the fall of 1999. The "RAC" has a large multi-purpose gymnasium, a weight room, fitness studio, cardio balcony, locker rooms, the Matt Skalsky Student-Athlete Lounge, administrative offices and a beautiful new lobby with ticket booths and a pro shop.

Moreover, the RAC has a new academic center, containing dozens of PC's with ethernet connections for student-athletes to study in individual or group settings. There is also a new training room, which is more than two times the size of the former facility. The RAC Arena has brand new men's and women's basketball and swimming and diving locker room complexes and a media center at the west end. The RAC also contains an office complex, with a board room and dining facility for UMBC's administrative staff and coaches.

Originally opened in 1973, the newly named RAC Arena seats 4,024 for athletic events, and has also hosted concerts for such artists as Stain'd, Good Charlotte, Bush and N.E.R.D. over the last several years. The arena had chairback seats installed on the lower concourse and two state-of-the-art scoreboards were also added. One scoreboard has graphics display capabilities for showing highlights of the game and other promotional activities. The arena floor is surrounded by a 1/10-mile running track and also houses the UMBC Athletic Hall of Fame.



In the spring of 2004, UMBC Athletics began renovations to the Retriever Activities Center in its continuous effort to bring top-notch facilities to its student-athletes. The \$2.4 million construction plan was set out to provide newly renovated varsity locker rooms for the men's and women's basketball and swimming and diving teams, along with a new state of the art media center, sports medicine training room, Student-Athlete Academic Center and outdoor Tennis Complex.



The RAC Arena has hosted many prominent sporting events over the years, including an international volleyball match between the USA and Peru, numerous collegiate conference championships and the Maryland Public Secondary Schools Association Championships in girls' basketball.



RETRIEVER FACILITIES

The Baseball Factory Field at UMBC (capacity 1,000), located within the Stadium Complex, has permanent seating and a press box behind home plate. Recently lights and a new warning track surrounding the field were added, along with refurbishments to the dugouts and in-field. Night spring games have become popular among students and the local community.

The softball diamond (capacity 500), just beyond the Baseball Factory Field's right field fence, also features a press box and bleacher seats.



A new six-court tennis facility was completed in April of 2005. The enclosed center features lights and additional spectator seating. Two additional courts are to be added shortly.

UMBC has one of the finest aquatic complexes in the Mid-Atlantic region. The indoor pool (UMBC Natatorium) was added to the RAC in 1977. Adjacent to the Natatorium is an outdoor pool complex added in 1996. In 2005 UMBC hosted the America East Conference Swimming and Diving Championships, as the Retrievers' men's team captured its eighth straight league title.



Retriever Soccer Park, situated adjacent to UMBC Stadium, was constructed in 1998. The complex has experienced dramatic upgrades over the past several years. A Bermuda grass surface was installed in the spring of 2006 and is the only one of its kind among America East Conference schools. In the summer of 2011, a state-of-the-art lighting system was installed, giving the Retrievers' men's and women's soccer programs the ability to play games at night. Additional seating has also been added along the sideline and behind the north goal to bring the capacity to 2,000. The field is sponsored by Elite Tournaments, by virtue of a generous donation by former Retriever Mike Libber.

In Spring 2005, UMBC Stadium's Deso-Turf surface was replaced by Sportex's Momentum 51 synthetic turf at a cost of more than \$800,000. Momentum 51 synthetic turf is an infill system, consisting of 70 percent ground rubber and 30 percent kiln-dried sand. Other facilities which have utilized this product include the Baltimore Ravens' M&T Bank Stadium, the University of Southern Mississippi's M.M. Roberts Stadium, and the University of California's Memorial Stadium. UMBC hosted its first game on the new turf on national television (ESPN).

UMBC Stadium was built in 1976 with a seating capacity of 4,500. Lights were added in 1992, and in 1996 a world-class track and field complex was added. The Jim Pfrogner Press Box (named for UMBC's long-time track and field coach) was refurbished in 2000, and it features two roof-top broadcast booths and wireless internet capabilities. The stadium is recently received a new \$5 million locker room complex, which was completed in Spring 2008. The new complex houses all of UMBC's outdoor teams.

SUPPORTING THE RETRIEVERS

When fans come to see the Retrievers play, they witness the excitement of Division I athletics. What they may not see is all the work that is done behind the scenes so that the student-athletes can achieve their highest potential, both on the field and in the classroom.

THE SPORTS MEDICINE DEPARTMENT

UMBC's Sports Medicine Department strives to provide comprehensive athletic training services to approximately 425 UMBC student-athletes. A staff of five certified athletic trainers oversees the medical care for all of the student-athletes competing in UMBC's 19 varsity sports. The services include recognition, treatment, rehabilitation, education and prevention of injuries occurring during participation in athletic activities. Each athletic trainer supervises Retriever student-athletes during practices and home events as well as road competitions. In the winter of 2005, UMBC introduced the newly designed and built Sports Medicine Services Center. Increasing the size of the previous center nearly three-fold, the new capabilities of the Sports Medicine training room allows student-athletes to rehabilitate with greater ease.

Orthopaedic Team Physician: Dr. W. Hugh Baugher has served as UMBC's team physician for 26 years. He previously provided team physician services to the Baltimore Orioles, Baltimore Thunder and various national amateur and NCAA events. Dr. Baugher specializes in the shoulder, hand, wrist, knee, sports medicine and arthroscopy.

UMBC STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

UMBC Strength and Conditioning provides student-athletes the latest and newest approaches to safe and successful training of their bodies. The newly renovated 3,000-square foot Michael S. Knapp Varsity Weight Room is solely dedicated to UMBC's student-athletes, and a major fundraising campaign is underway to refurbish the complex.

SUPPORTING THE RETRIEVERS

ACSA

The Academic Center for Student-Athletes (ACSA) is not only a place for student-athletes to study, it also serves as the liaison to several departments on campus. ACSA assists students with registration, financial aid and career development. It is located on the second floor of the RAC and is furnished with 15 computers, individual study carrels, tutoring space and a comprehensive resource area. Each year, UMBC Athletics sets new standards for academic excellence and the support of the ACSA has been critical to its success.

ATHLETIC COMMUNICATIONS

The Office of Athletic Communications is responsible for all of the publicity needs of the athletic department. Services such as publications, statistics, electronic media productions, website maintenance and game management are provided by the Athletic Communications staff. The staff hopes that media opportunities for UMBC's student-athletes are a valuable part of their athletic and educational experience.

MARKETING AND PROMOTIONS

The Office of Marketing and Promotions implements marketing and promotions programs that will increase awareness, interest and enthusiasm for UMBC sports. The department markets to UMBC students, faculty and staff, as well as youth groups, organizations and the communities surrounding the campus. The Office of Marketing and Promotions advocates a positive game atmosphere and encourages new and old UMBC traditions.

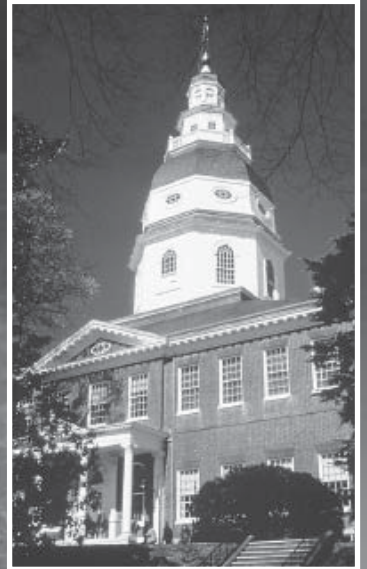
