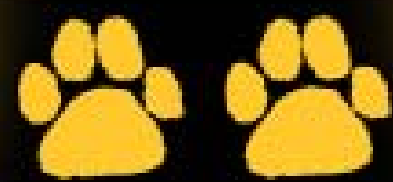

OUTLOOK

For the second straight year, the UMBC baseball team will open its season against a national field when it faces No. 10-ranked N.C. State, West Virginia, and Indiana at the Caravelle Resort's Baseball at the Beach tournament, hosted by Coastal Carolina. Despite having a young squad, head coach Bob Mumma sees the opening weekend as a chance to show the talent that the Retriever possess this year.

"We have a really young, but exciting ball club," the second-year head coach said. "The guys have been working tremendously hard throughout the fall and winter and are one of the closer groups we've had in a while here.

"We lost ten seniors, so we knew this was going to be a big [recruiting] class, but we're excited for these young, talented guys to figure out how to play at this level." Despite the youth and inexperience for the Retrievers – they welcomed 16 newcomers to campus this season – Mumma is optimistic that his players have the talent and work ethic to improve and show that they belong.

"Our position players are especially young, but they are a hard-working group, and as a coaching staff we're just trying to help them develop," said Mumma, a member of the UMBC Athletics' Hall of Fame. "If everyone stays healthy, we should be much improved defensively, and we'll certainly have more depth on the mound." With all of the new faces on campus, in combination with the Retrievers' recent results, the America East coaches voted UMBC to finish sixth in the six-team conference for 2013. Though not surprised by the preseason vote, coach Mumma sees this year as different from previous seasons, and notes the revamped schedule as an opportunity for the Retrievers to make some headway in the league.

"Getting away from the four games in two days will really help us not only in the conference, but it will also help us in the mid-week games," the Retrievers' all-time homerun leader stated. "Our pitching should remain fresher, and we'll have the ability to compete in every game we play.

"Also, with getting to play every conference opponent in a home-and-home series, the format will produce a true league champion and post-season tournament which I think we should compete for."

This season, 21 of the Retrievers' 33 players are either freshman or sophomores with Mumma expecting six of the nine starting positions to be occupied by underclassmen. This high number does not worry Mumma, however, as he is confident in the leadership the upperclassmen can provide, as well as the experience many of the sophomores gained last year when they were pressed into action.

"Last year was a great learning experience for our team as a whole," Mumma explained. "But this season we have the same staff in tact, plus the addition of Coach Williams, and I look for everyone to keep making strides forward."

Pitching

No area of the Retrievers' roster personifies the team breakdown as a whole more than the pitching staff. Ten of UMBC's 16 newcomers will work off the mound this season, but a trio of returnees will provide experience and stability to a staff which will rely on the newfound depth.

Juniors Shane Vlasic, Mac Gill, and Jon Cohn will anchor the staff for the Retrievers

ers in 2013. Last season Vlasic and Gill racked up valuable innings for the Black and Gold, throwing 69.1 and 53.2 innings, the most and third-most on the team, respectively.

"Those guys threw a lot of innings for us last year and really learned how to compete at this level," said coach Mumma. "They've shown improvement in the offseason, and we hope that this translates into them throwing more strikes this year."

Supporting this trio is a large, young, and talented group of freshmen and transfers. With freshman Denis Mikush expected to compete for a weekend starting job and classmates Mike Gomez and Riley Stephenson likely to eat up valuable innings, Mumma is confident in the newcomers' abilities heading into opening day.

"There's always a little bit of a question mark with the new guys because they haven't been here for too long, but we know they have the stuff, so now it's up to them to show it on this stage."

Catching

After ending the 2012 season with only one healthy catcher, the Retrievers enter the new season with options behind the plate. Joining senior captain Jason Allinder in the catching duties, freshman Manny Colon and junior transfer Brandan Coluccio give Coach Mumma flexibility in his lineup.

"We're going to be solid behind the dish this season," said Coach Mumma, a former Retriever catcher himself (1990-92). "With our depth, we'll be able to keep everyone fresh and ready to play when needed."

Infield

Around the infield, the Retrievers will utilize an assortment of returnees. Sophomore Anthony Gatto moves to first base this season after earning a spot on the conference All-Rookie Team last year while playing mostly in the outfield. A versatile athlete, Gatto played in 42 games for the Retrievers last season, hitting .303 with 47 hits, including a team-best 12 doubles. Across the diamond, redshirt freshman Mark Esposito, a transfer from Marshall, will man the hot corner.

"Anthony [Gatto] has a solid feel for the position and with his abilities at the plate, we expect him to take another step forward," Mumma said of his first baseman. "On the other corner, Mark [Esposito] has a plus arm and a plus glove to go with great range and after having a year to get healthy and take in the game, he will be a major asset for us."

Up the middle, sophomores Jake Barnes and Vince Corbi will compete for the second base position while freshman Kevin Lachance is poised to start at short.

"Barnes and Corbi have battled and shown that they are both worthy of significant playing time this season," said Mumma. "They've both built chemistry with Kevin [Lachance], so I'm confident in either pairing so whoever is providing the best combination of offense and defense will get the nod."

In addition to the new faces that will be taking the field at the infield positions this season, UMBC welcomed former professional ballplayer and longtime coach Larry Williams to the staff during the fall. The former middle infielder has worked specifically with the Retrievers on infield defense as well as assisting with hitting, bunting and base-running instruction.

"With the changes to the bats, the game has shifted a little bit back towards small ball," Coach Mumma said. "I think we've found a guy [Coach Williams] that can really specialize in that and teach those skills to our guys."

Outfield

While the Retrievers' starting outfielders are all returning letter-winners, only Tom Gilchrist saw the majority of his action catching flyballs in 2012. The senior played in 43 ball games a year ago, hitting four round-trippers. Projected to start in center, Gilchrist is expected to lead the outfield this season.

"Tom [Gilchrist] had a great end of the fall season," said Coach Mumma. "He has tremendous speed and range, and at the plate he has as much power as anyone in the America East and will be a big factor in our offense this season."

Junior captain Rob McCabe will transition from catching to flank Gilchrist on one corner while sophomore Ian Glassman picks up his glove after serving primarily as the club's designated hitter last season. Glassman finished his rookie season with a .295 average and 30 runs scored, the third-highest on the team, batting from the lead-off spot.

"Rob [McCabe] is a two-time captain and is a great leader for our team and will play anywhere we ask him to," Coach Mumma stated. "Ian [Glassman], meanwhile, had a solid rookie campaign, and we're looking for him to take the next step and add power at the plate."

One of the things that most excites Mumma this season is the quality depth that the Retrievers possess. Junior D.J. Smith is expected to platoon in multiple positions after showing his versatility in the field and ability at the plate. He is just one of a group of four or five guys that Mumma believes will push the starters for playing time and at-bats.

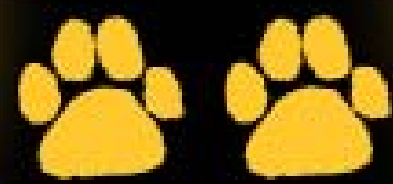


"We have a lot of guys that bring plenty of quality off the bench," said Coach Mumma. "D.J. Smith is a guy that is skilled in many areas, and we're going to need to find a way to get him in the game."

Following the trip to South Carolina, UMBC returns to the Mid-Atlantic region for away games against CAA foes Delaware and Towson before playing a home-and-home series with Mount St. Mary's on Mar. 9-10.

Bob Mumma was promoted to head baseball coach at UMBC, Director of Athletics Dr. Charles Brown announced in June 2011.

"Bob Mumma bleeds black and gold," Dr. Brown said. "He was an outstanding student-athlete for the Retrievers, earning All-Conference honors and national recognition as an Academic All-American. After playing professionally in the White Sox organization, he came back to UMBC and has been a dedicated assistant coach. He deserves an opportunity to skipper the Retrievers. I am looking forward to seeing him lead our baseball program back to prominence."

After a stellar collegiate career at UMBC and two seasons of professional baseball, Mumma returned to his alma mater in the fall of 1996 and has served as the Retrievers' assistant baseball coach for the past 15 seasons.

This past season, Mumma's first as the Retrievers' head coach, UMBC posted a 10-42 record, recording wins over Army and Navy as well as a victory over perennially ranked Tulane in New Orleans.

Mumma succeeded John Jancuska, who coached the Retrievers from 1978-2011. Tom Rider (1967-75) and Hal Sparks (1976-77) are the only other coaches to pilot the UMBC baseball team in the program's 45 years of varsity competition.

"I am extremely excited to have this opportunity," Mumma said. "Other than trying to be a Major League player, it was my dream to be a head coach, and once I got into coaching, this was where I wanted to be a head coach. I am very thankful to Dr. Brown for the opportunity to become the fourth head coach in UMBC history, and to Coach Jancuska for being a great mentor for 15 years in the coaching arena. Our goal now is put together a solid campaign and become perennial powers in the America East."

The Rising Sun, Md., native competed as a catcher at UMBC from 1990-92. In his freshman campaign, Mumma slugged 14 home runs and hit .339, earning a place on the Coppertone Freshman All-America squad. The following season, he hit .395 with 15 round-trippers and 53 RBIs, earning Player of the Year honors from the East Coast Conference. He was also named to the ECAC, All-East Region and East Coast Conference first teams. Mumma capped his collegiate career by hitting .346 with 13 home runs and 53 RBIs in 1992, as the Retrievers earned an at-large bid and competed in their first NCAA Division I tournament.

Mumma earned East Coast Conference First Team honors in 1992 and was also named to the GTE Academic All-America squad.

He was drafted in the 13th round by the Chicago White Sox in June 1992 and signed a professional contract with the club. The backstop completed his economics degree in May 1993 and played for two years in the White Sox system.

Mumma is the Retrievers' all-time leader in home runs

(42), is tied for second in RBIs (152) and ranks among the top 10 in six other offensive categories. He was selected to the UMBC Athletics Hall of Fame in 1997 and currently serves on the school's Hall of Fame selection committee.

Prior to becoming a full-time assistant coach in September 2005, Mumma served as an academic counselor in the UMBC Athletics EXCELL program, working with all of the university's student-athletes.

Mumma, who received his MBA from the University of Baltimore in the spring of 2000, resides in Elkridge, Md., with his wife, Kristy Hartman-Mumma, a 1999 UMBC alumnae who served as UMBC's head field hockey coach from 2000-05.

LIAM BOWEN
ASSISTANT COACH • SECOND SEASON
MACALESTER '06

Liam Bowen was named assistant baseball coach at UMBC in September 2011.

Bowen came to Baltimore after working as the pitching coach for Lincoln Memorial during the 2011 season. The team's ERA fell from 7.67 the year before to 5.42 in 2011.

Before joining the Division II school, Bowen worked at St. Mary's College (Md.) for four seasons, where the team's ERA dropped from 7.25 in 2006 to 4.60 in 2009.

"Liam has a great record as a pitching coach," Mumma said. "He comes highly recommended and will be a tremendous help to our pitching staff. Plus he gets to return to the area where he grew up, so it's a great fit."

Bowen earned a Bachelor's degree in history from Macalester College in Minnesota in 2006. He was named All-Conference and also selected as the team's most valuable player in 2004.

VOL. ASSISTANT COACH • FIFTH SEASON
NIAGARA '80

Tim O'Brien returns for his fifth season and will be working with the infield and team defense after spending three years working with the pitching staff.

Under O'Brien's tutelage, the Retrievers decreased their team ERA over two runs per game. Austin Drewyer ranked second in NCAA Division I in fewest walks per nine innings while the entire staff ranked 49th. Drewyer and Mike Mitchell ranked among the country's leaders in complete games, ranking ninth and 42nd, respectively. O'Brien's work with the staff included a more rigorous fitness program and the benefits paid dividends with not a single pitcher missing time due to injury in 2011.

The Niagara University alum spent time as an associate scout for the Florida Marlins and Baltimore Orioles from 1993 to 2005. O'Brien won numerous awards as head coach of Long Reach High School in Columbia, Md., from 1997-2008, including Coach of the Year by The Baltimore Sun and The Washington Post and Regional Coach of the Year by the American Baseball Coaches' Association. While at Long Reach, he served as president of the Maryland State Baseball Coaches' Association.

O'Brien spent the 2010 summer as pitching coach for the USA Women's National Team and was previously the pitching coach for the Men's Champion's Program that earned gold medals for USA Baseball in the Pan-American Games in 2007 in Guatemala and in Puerto Rico in 2008. In his time at UMBC, O'Brien helped former UMBC standout Dan Blewett recover from Tommy John surgery to become the Retrievers' most recent professional player.

O'Brien is currently a teacher at Long Reach, and lives with his wife, Mary Beth, in Columbia, Md. Both of their sons, Robbie, who is a civil engineer in Baltimore, and Kevin, who is an accountant in Virginia, played collegiate baseball.



LARRY WILLIAMS
ASSISTANT COACH • FIRST SEASON

Former professional baseball player and longtime coach Larry Williams joined the UMBC baseball staff in October 2012. Williams played professionally with the Pittsburgh Pirates organization from 1970-1975 before entering into the coaching and scouting field where he has worked ever since.

"We're very excited to add Larry to our staff," coach Bob Mumma said. "He's been involved in baseball, both playing and coaching, for a very long time and at a variety of levels. I expect he'll be able to add a new dimension to our staff."

Williams played middle infield for the Pirates' minor league teams and will work specifically with the Retrievers' infield defense, in addition to helping with hitting, bunting, and base running instruction.

"The staff last year did a great job, but anytime you can get a guy with Larry's talents, it will help," said coach Mumma. "With the changes to the bats, the game has shifted a little bit back towards small ball and I think we've found a guy that can really specialize in that and teach those skills."

After his playing career finished, Williams immediately got into coaching while studying at Geneva College and then continuing on coaching at the University of Pittsburgh. Following a brief stint in the private sector, Williams returned to the diamond, working as a scout for the Pirates from 1980-1987.

During this time, Williams served on the board of directors for a construction firm and in 1998 took the head coaching position at nearby Northeast High School in Anne Arundel County. In 2003, Williams began working with the BATT Academy LLC and is now a managing partner for the private athletic performance and baseball development academy.

Williams returned to the scouting world in 2007 when he took a job with the Chicago Cubs to serve as an associate scout.

"I retired a couple of years ago, but I've been around the game my whole life and I missed coaching," Williams said. "I had a couple of different offers, but UMBC presented a unique situation and a nice challenge and with the right people in place that really want to take the program to a new level."

Williams and his wife Pat have two grown children, Anthony and Lauren, and currently reside in Pasadena, Md.

ABOUT AMERICA EAST...

Now in its fourth decade of operation, America East has evolved into one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences with a commitment to broad-based, competitive athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity and missions of the member institutions.

Progressive in its approach to its more than 3,400 student-athletes, America East recognizes champions in each of its 20 sports: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball. America East also conducts the nation's most comprehensive academic recognition program for student-athletes and partners.

With a geographic footprint covering the Mid-Atlantic to Northeast regions of the United States, America East strives to develop champions in academics, athletics and leadership at its nine member institutions: University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, UMBC, University of New Hampshire, Stony Brook University and University of Vermont.

America East has experienced unprecedented success in recent years on the playing surface, in the classroom and throughout its member institutions' communities. Starting with the 2007-08 academic year, the conference has seen 25 teams win NCAA games, produced two individual national champions and had 120 student-athletes earn All-America recognition. In the classroom, hundreds of student-athletes have earned national or regional academic honors while America East's Academic Progress Rate has improved every year since 2004-05 and ranks among the top three conference's in the country. America East has also sponsored programs aimed at improving its members' communities, partnering with Newman's Own Foundation for the Campus Community Challenge each of the past three years as well as teaming up with College For Every Student on student service projects each of the past two years. Under the leadership of new commissioner Amy Huchthausen, America East is positioned for even more success in the years ahead.

2011-12 was a banner year for America East. Four of the conference's champions combined for nine NCAA wins, the most ever for the league in a single year. Those nine wins included six by Stony Brook in the NCAA Baseball Championship as the Seawolves became the first America East team to reach the College World Series since the conference started sponsoring the sport in 1990 and ended the year ranked seventh nationally. Additionally, University of Vermont beat Lamar in the first round of the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, earning the conference's first NCAA win since 2005 and seventh overall, while Boston University's women's soccer team beat Harvard in the first round of the NCAA Championship and finished the season ranked 17th nationally. Boston U.'s softball team became the first America East team to earn a No. 3 seed for the NCAA tournament and beat Iona in NCAA regional play, earning America East's sixth tournament win since 2007. On top of the NCAA success in team sports, Stony Brook's Lucy Van Dalen became the conference's third-ever national champion, winning the mile at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championship. Other highlights from the year included a third-place finish in field hockey conference RPI, Boston University winning the closest Commissioner's Cup race in conference history, finishing just two points ahead of Albany and 30 student-athletes receiving All-America recognition.

Off the field, America East posted the third-highest APR in the country, trailing only the Ivy and Patriot Leagues, and 31 of its teams received NCAA public recognition awards. Additionally, 17 student-athletes received national academic hon-

ors. For the third straight year, America East partnered with Newman's Own Foundation to encourage community service among students through the NOF Campus Community Challenge, which awarded over \$100,000 in grants to support student groups engaged in philanthropy and community service in America East communities. America East also partnered with College for Every Student (CFES), a national non-profit that helps underserved kids attend college, on a national service month.

LEADERSHIP...

For the second straight year, America East partnered with Newman's Own Foundation to encourage community service among students through the NOF Campus Community Challenge. Nine grants of \$7,500 to \$25,000 were awarded to honor and support student groups engaged in philanthropy and community service. In total, more than \$100,000 was given to America East student groups. Top selections were: University at Albany, The Giving Circle (\$25,000) Binghamton University, Boys and Girls Clubs (\$15,000) Boston University, Community Servings, Inc. (\$10,000) University of New Hampshire, Girl Scouts (\$10,000)

America East and College for Every Student (CFES), a national non-profit that helps underserved kids attend college, held a on April 9. Student-athletes from America East schools partnered with CFES Scholars at participating schools for a community service project, ranging from beautifying school property to collecting food and shoes for charity drives.

Members of the America East Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), with at least one representative from each of the nine America East schools, volunteered their time to clean up and paint at the Heading Home Family Shelter in Boston as part of "Make a Difference Day."

University at Albany women's lacrosse standout Nikki Branchini was selected the 2011 America East Woman of the Year for a distinguished career in the areas of academic achievement, athletics excellence, service and leadership.

Student-athletes who competed in the America East Swimming & Diving Championship and University at Albany's men's basketball team were named the 2011 America East Sportsmanship Award winners.

Five America East institutions are ranked among the top 105 national universities according to the U.S. News and World Report America's Best College Guide and UMBC was recognized as the top "Up-and-Coming" university in the country for the second straight year.

IN THE PROS...

Several former America East athletes have made a positive impact in the professional ranks. Some of those include:

- Former Hartford men's basketball star Vin Baker and three-time America East Player of the Year Reggie Lewis, who captained the Boston Celtics at the time of his premature death, combined to make five NBA All-Star appearances during their careers. Three-time America East Player of the Year Malik Rose played 13 seasons with five teams and contributed to a pair of championships with the San Antonio Spurs.
- Three-time All-America East selection Jose Juan Barea has played four seasons with the Dallas Mavericks and was a key member of their 2011 NBA Championship-winning team.
- Two-time Player of Year Marqus Blakely signed a three-year contract with the Houston Rockets in April of 2011.
- Current Hartford women's basketball coach Jennifer Rizzotti (Hartford) played five seasons in the WNBA, while two-time America East Player of the Year Cindy Blodgett (Maine) played four.
- Hartford grad Jeff Bagwell belted 448 home runs in 15 seasons with the Houston Astros and was named the National League Rookie of the Year in 1991 and MVP in 1994.
- Carlos Pena, the 1998 Baseball Scholar-Athlete at Northeastern, earned American League Comeback Player of

the Year honors in 2007, won an American League Gold Glove at first base in 2008, made his first All-Star appearance in 2009 and finished with a league-leading 39 home runs. Minnesota Twins' Joe Nathan, a former Academic All-American at Stony Brook, has been an All-Star four times and won the Rollands Relief Man Award in 2009. Former Binghamton pitcher Scott Diamond made his major league debut for the Twins on July 18, 2011. Multiple other former standouts are playing in the minor and independent leagues.

Four former America East men's lacrosse standouts were named Major League Lacrosse All-Stars in 2011.

Several men's soccer standouts have played professionally, both in the United States and abroad. Boston University graduate Andy Dorman played four seasons with the New England Revolution in MLS and has spent the last five years in the Scottish and English Premier Leagues. Two-time America East Goalkeeper of the Year Bouna Coundoul from Albany has played six seasons in MLS with the Colorado Rapids and New York Red Bulls and has 32 career shutouts. Steward Ceus (Albany), Samuel Appiah (Boston University) and Levi Houapeu (UMBC) were drafted by Colorado, Houston and Philadelphia, respectively, each of the last three years.

Boston University's Mara Osher and Casey Brown became the first America East women's soccer players to get selected in the Women's Professional Soccer Draft in 2010.

THIS IS UMBC ATHLETICS

In 2010-11, UMBC Athletics celebrated its 25th anniversary of competing in NCAA Division I athletics. Since that first fall of 1986, the growth of Retriever Athletics has been remarkable—from the quadrupling of staff size to the creation and/or renovation of all athletic facilities. Alma maters and fight songs have been penned and performed, spirit groups created and flourished, attendance records smashed and championships celebrated.

In 2011-12...

Track and field alum Cleopatra Borel competed in the 2012 Summer Olympics in London, her third consecutive Games. The former NCAA shot put champion also competed for her native country, Trinidad and Tobago, in both the 2004 Games in Athens and the 2008 Games in Beijing.

The men's soccer team finished 25th nationally in attendance, drawing nearly 1,000 fans per game to Retriever Soccer Park and for the second consecutive year, UMBC hosted a nationally-televised game on Fox Soccer Channel.

Lacrosse alums Brendan Munderf, Drew Westervelt and Peet Poillon earned MLL All-Star recognition in the summers of 2011 and 2012.



In the fall of 2011, UMBC's student-athletes posted a record-setting semester in the classroom, with sixty-two percent (209) of the student-athletes recording a grade-point average of 3.00 or better. The combined GPA of the department set a new record at 3.03

Baseball team captain Curtis Schickner was named Vice Chair of the NCAA's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

Volleyball's Iman Kennedy and basketball's Michelle Kurowski were one of ten national finalists, respectively, for the Arthur Ashe, Jr. Sports Scholar Award and the Lowe's Senior Class Award.



WELCOME TO UMBC

UMBC is a dynamic public research university integrating teaching, research and service to benefit the citizens of Maryland. As an Honors University, the campus offers academically talented students a strong undergraduate liberal arts foundation that prepares them for graduate and professional study, entry into the workforce, and community service and leadership.

- For the second year in a row, U.S. News & World Report America's Best Colleges Guide named UMBC #1 in up-and-coming national universities, a list that includes Clemson University, Drexel University, Arizona State University, the University of California San Diego and Rice University. UMBC also is on a list of the top national universities "where the faculty has an unusual commitment to undergraduate teaching," a list that includes such schools as Princeton, Brown, Yale and Stanford universities.

- UMBC President Freeman A. Hrabowski, III, was named one of "The 10 Best College Presidents" in the U.S. by Time Magazine in 2009 and one of the "100 Most Influential People in the World" in 2012. Also in 2012, Hrabowski was among the inaugural recipients of the U.S. News & World Report STEM Solutions Leadership Hall of Fame Award. In 2011, he received both the TIAA-CREF Theodore M. Hesburgh Award for Leadership Award, recognized by many as the nation's highest awards among higher education leaders. Also in 2011, he was named one of seven Top American Leaders by The Washington Post and the Harvard Kennedy School's Center for Public Leadership.

- UMBC is one of 50 public institutions in the United States recognized by The Princeton Review as a "Best Value College," offering a combination of educational excellence and affordability. UMBC was also included in Kiplinger's Top 100 "Best Values in Public Colleges 2010-11," a ranking based on academic quality and affordable education. UMBC is ranked among schools such as University of North Carolina, University of Virginia and Binghamton University.

- Baltimore was ranked seventh in a new study of large U.S. cities that are the best places to attend college, as compiled by an economics research team.

- Approximately 77% of students at UMBC receive some financial aid in the form of scholarships, loans and grants.

- UMBC is one of the country's most environmentally-responsible colleges according to The Princeton Review and was included in its "Guide to 286 Green Colleges."

- The university's Alex. Brown Center for Entrepreneurship received \$2 million from the Kauffman Foundation to build entrepreneurship education across the campus. The mission of the Kauffman Campuses Initiative is to catalyze entrepreneurship programs outside of business and engineering schools. The award acknowledges the success of UMBC's Alex. Brown Center for Entrepreneurship, created six years ago through a gift of \$1 million from the Alex. Brown Foundation to develop a leading university entrepreneurship center for the Baltimore region.

- The Shriver Center's Choice Program has become a national model for effectively serving youth and families in at-risk environments. A community-based intervention program administered by UMBC's Shriver Center, Choice has provided intensive supervision and family support to almost 20,000 children throughout Maryland since 1989.

- The university is fourth among U.S. research universities in the production of IT degrees and certificates, according to the most recent data from the Department of Education. The data also shows that UMBC ranks second among U.S. research universities in undergraduate IT degrees awarded, and it is the largest producer among those universities of IT graduates in Maryland, DC and Virginia.

- The Rise of American Research Universities, a book ranking university research achievement on a per-capita basis, found that UMBC scholars in the arts and humanities ranked 13th among all public campuses in the nation in prestigious awards.

- UMBC ranks second among U.S. universities in NASA funding. The university's NASA-funded centers are the Joint Center for Earth Systems Technology, the Goddard Earth Systems and Technology Center and the Center for Research and Exploration in Space Science and Technology.

- UMBC has a comprehensive recycling program and also donates various office/classroom furniture and athletic equipment to charitable organizations.

During the 2011-12 academic year, UMBC Athletics volunteered over 5,000 hours of its time in countless programs and outreach events. They helped to raise over \$15,000 for various charities and reach out to about 20,000 local youth. The Retrievers are excited about the future development of the program and expanding its outreach initiatives.

UMBC LIFE

UMBC is not the school your parents remember. The central core of academic buildings is still bristling with academic energy, but is now accompanied by a host of new facilities, including the seven-story Albin O. Kuhn Library, the Engineering and Computer Science Building, the Physics Building, the Public Policy Building, the Arts and Humanities Building, techcenter@UMBC on a satellite South Campus, and the high-tech bwtech@UMBC Research and Technology Park.



Sweeping changes have occurred in the campus' social scene, highlighted by the University Commons. The 36-million dollar structure opened in January 2003 and has been the hub for UMBC student life, featuring a food court, restaurant, bank, bookstore, performance space, high-speed wireless internet access and game room that features eight pool tables, video games, pinball and air hockey, as well as a number of flat-screen TVs, making it a popular spot to hang out.



UMBC's Shriver Center serves as a national model of how colleges and universities can have a direct and positive impact on communities across the country. The Center places 1,000 UMBC students each year in internships and co-op positions throughout Maryland and the U.S., as well as in dozens of international settings.

Just as UMBC students are active participants in their education, they don't sit on the sidelines when it comes to campus life. Intercollegiate Division-I sports is an outlet for many students; others participate in club or intramural sports. There are more than 180 student groups on campus, expressing the extraordinary cultural diversity of the UMBC student body.

UMBC ADMINISTRATION

DR. FREEMAN A. HRABOWSKI, III PRESIDENT

Freeman A. Hrabowski, III, has served as President of UMBC since May 1992. He joined the university in 1987, serving first as Vice Provost, then as Executive Vice President.

Born in 1950 in Birmingham, Ala., Dr. Hrabowski graduated at 19 from Hampton Institute with highest honors in mathematics, and he received his M.A. (mathematics) and Ph.D. (higher education administration/statistics) from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign at age 24.

In 2008, he was named one of *America's Best Leaders* by *U.S. News & World Report*, which in 2009, 2010, and 2011 ranked UMBC the #1 "Up and Coming" university in the nation. In 2011, *U.S. News* also ranked UMBC 4th nationally for "Best Undergraduate Teaching" – tied with Yale. *TIME* magazine named him one of *America's 10 Best College Presidents* in 2009, and one of the "100 Most Influential People in the World" in 2012. In 2011, he received both the *TIAA-CREF Theodore M. Hesburgh Award for Leadership Excellence* and the *Carnegie Corporation of New York's Academic Leadership Award*, recognized by many as the nation's highest awards among higher education leaders. Also in 2011, he was named one of seven *Top American Leaders* by *The Washington Post* and the Harvard Kennedy School's Center for Public Leadership. In 2012, he was among the inaugural recipients of the *U.S. News & World Report STEM Solutions Leadership Hall of Fame Award*.

Dr. Hrabowski serves as a consultant to the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the National Academies, and universities and school systems nationally. He is a member of numerous boards, including the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, France-Merrick Foundation, Marguerite Casey Foundation (Chair), The Urban Institute, McCormick & Company, and the Baltimore Equitable Society. He served previously on the boards of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Maryland Humanities Council (member and Chair).

In addition, Dr. Hrabowski has been elected to the American Academy of Arts & Sciences (effective October 2001), named the 1999 Marylander of the Year by the editors of *The Baltimore Sun* and received the BETA Award (Baltimore's Extraordinary Technology Advocate), The Henry A. Rosenberg, Sr. Distinguished Citizen Award (Boy Scouts of America, Baltimore Council), The Andrew White Medal (Loyola College of Maryland), The Hatikvah Award (The Jewish National Fund), The Educator Achievement Award (NSF), The Outstanding Science Educator (Eli Lilly & Company), The Golden Torch Academic Visionary Award (National Society of Black Engineers), the Reginald H. Jones Distinguished Service Award (National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering) and The U.S. Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics and Engineering Mentoring (awarded to Dr. Hrabowski's university in recognition of the nationally acclaimed multi-million-dollar Meyerhoff Scholars Program for gifted African-American undergraduates in science and engineering).

Dr. Hrabowski also was instrumental in the formation of the Governor's Academy for Mathematics, Science and Technology. He is co-author of the book, "Beating the Odds," which focuses on parenting and high-achieving African-American males in science, published by Oxford University Press in 1998; he co-authored a second book, "Overcoming the Odds," on successful African-American young women in science, published by Oxford University Press in early 2002. Also a child-leader in the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. Hrabowski was prominently featured in Spike Lee's 1997 documentary, *Four Little Girls*, on the racially motivated bombing in 1963 of Birmingham's Sixteenth Street Baptist Church.

DR. CHARLES BROWN ASSOCIATE VICE PRESIDENT & DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION

UMBC's Dr. Charles Brown was promoted to Associate Vice President & Director of Athletics, Physical Education and Recreation, President Dr. Freeman Hrabowski announced on Friday, June 17, 2011.

"We are all very proud of Dr. Brown's stellar career as Director of Athletics over the past two decades," Dr. Hrabowski said. "He has led the program with both enthusiasm and integrity, and, most importantly, our student-athletes are succeeding athletically and academically."

The Brooklyn, N.Y., native will begin his 23rd year at UMBC this September and is the longest-tenured AD in the state of Maryland. He has transformed UMBC Athletics from a struggling Division-I program to one which has fared quite well regionally and nationally for the past decade.

Dr. Brown has championed UMBC Athletics' enhanced profile by positioning the Retrievers within appropriate levels of competition. One of his first tasks was to move UMBC into a Division-I conference, which he completed in 1988-89, his first year with the university, as the Retrievers joined the East Coast Conference. UMBC won the league's President's Cup in its second conference season, but the league folded shortly thereafter. Dr. Brown was able to move UMBC into the Big South Conference the following year (1992) and successfully positioned UMBC into a much better geographic fit when the Retrievers joined the Northeast Conference in 1998. He also helped to initiate the ECAC (Men's) Lacrosse League in 1999, and most recently, Dr. Brown engineered UMBC Athletics' move to a strong and improving mid-major conference, the America East Conference, in 2003.



Over the past 11 years, Retriever teams have won 48 league championships and made 30 appearances in NCAA Championship competition. In all five years of league play in the NEC, UMBC was awarded the Commissioner's Cup, symbolic of the conference's top overall program. In 2002 UMBC produced its first national champion, as Cleopatra Borel won the shot put at the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships.

UMBC has adjusted well to life in the America East Conference with a fourth-place or higher finish in the conference's Commissioner's Cup race in five of the last seven years. The athletic department just experienced its most celebrated year-long period in school history with the school's first-ever men's and women's basketball conference titles and NCAA Tournament appearances, sweeps in back-to-back years in the America East men's and women's swimming and diving championships, a conference title and NCAA appearance by men's tennis and an NCAA Tournament win over Maryland and a third straight national tournament appearance by the men's lacrosse team.

UMBC's student-athletes have excelled in the classroom as well as the playing fields. In the last 12 years, 31 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America status, and more than 62 percent of Retriever student-athletes are earning 3.0 or higher grade-point averages. Moreover UMBC's student-athletes graduate at a rate which is more than 10 percent higher than the university rate and the Retrievers' NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) and Graduation Success Rate (GSR) are also considerably above the national averages.

Dr. Brown has increased the full-time faculty and staff of the athletic department from 23 full-time employees at his arrival to 63 currently. There were only 13 full-time coaches (nine head, four assistant) upon Dr. Brown's arrival; now there are 32 (14 head, 18 assistant) to ensure the Retrievers' success on and off the playing fields. New positions were created in Marketing and Promotions, Fund Raising, Facilities and Operations, Business Administration, Community Outreach Strength and Conditioning, Athletic Communications, Sports Medicine and Academic Services. He also initiated the UMBC Dance Team, the Down and Dirty Dawg Band and the newly reinstated cheerleading squad.

Dramatic increases in the department's entrepreneurial efforts have been implemented to support UMBC's student-athletes. UMBC Athletics received \$5,403 in gifts in the first year of Dr. Brown's tenure. In contrast, over the last several years, UMBC Athletics has brought in an average of \$1.25 million per year via fundraising, corporate sponsorships and other entrepreneurial efforts.

Starting from scratch in the 1990s, Dr. Brown developed a club sport program which has evolved into a 25-sport, 750-student program today.

In the area of community service, UMBC student-athletes currently donate more than 1,000 hours of time per year to mentor local elementary and middle school students, and coaches make hundreds of appearances in the community throughout the year. The program was recognized by *The NCAA News* as one of the finest in the country.

Dr. Brown has improved the visibility of UMBC in many ways. In the spring of 1995, he made a bold move as he brought the first and second rounds of the NCAA Men's Basketball Championships to the Baltimore Arena. Sellout crowds put Baltimore in the national spotlight for one glorious March week. In the spring of 1998, UMBC hosted the Women's Lacrosse National Championships at UMBC Stadium, drawing record crowds and kudos from the national media. Dr. Brown also led the successful bid to bring the Men's Lacrosse National Championships to M&T Bank Stadium in 2003, 2004 and 2007, where all existing attendance records were shattered.

He has spearheaded the university's rapid enhancement of athletic and recreational facilities during his tenure. Lights were added to UMBC Stadium in 1992, and the region's finest outdoor aquatic complex was unveiled in the summer of 1996. Just a few months later, UMBC added a national-class track and field complex and replaced its main stadium field with an all-weather artificial surface. In the fall of 1999, the department moved into the Retriever Activities Center, which doubled the size of its existing indoor facility and provided all students with the top of the line recreational facilities. Baseball's Alumni Field was improved during Dr. Brown's tenure with the addition of permanent seating and was later renamed The Baseball Factory Field at UMBC in a dedication ceremony following the addition of lights to the field in 2005. UMBC Soccer Stadium was constructed in 1999 and a new Bermuda grass surface - the only one of its kind in the conference - was dedicated in 2006. Chairback seating and a video display scoreboard were added to the arena in 2000. Lights were added to the tennis complex in 2005 and the courts were resurfaced and outfitted with Retriever wind screens. Field turf was added to the stadium in 2005 and a new \$5 million stadium locker room complex was completed in the spring of 2008.

Dr. Brown's impact has been felt beyond The Loop, as well. He has served two terms as president of the Maryland Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and served a term on the NCAA Division-I Championships/Competition Cabinet, where he influenced other directors to increase student-athlete participation in NCAA Championship competition. Dr. Brown is also currently on the board of the Howard County tennis patrons.

He is the fourth person to hold the position of athletic director on a permanent basis in the 41-year history of UMBC. W. Richard Mentzer served from 1966-68, followed by E. Richard Watts, Jr., who directed the program from 1968-1985. Rick Hartzell led UMBC into Division I athletics in the fall of 1985, prior to Dr. Brown's arrival in June of 1989.

Currently residing in Ellicott City, Md., with his wife, Linda, Dr. Brown, received his bachelor of science degree from Long Island University in 1967 and earned a master of science from Brooklyn College in 1969 and a Doctorate in Physical Education from Springfield College in 1980. The couple has two daughters, Melissa, an attorney, and Michelle, an elementary school teacher, and the Browns have four grandchildren.

UMBC ADMINISTRATION

DR. NANCY YOUNG VICE PRESIDENT FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS

Nancy Young has served as the Vice President for Student Affairs at UMBC since July 2007. In addition to Athletics, her responsibilities include oversight of the departments of Career Services, Residential Life, University Health Services, University Counseling Services, Student Judicial Programs, Transportation Services, Student Life, Off-Campus and Transfer Student Services and the operations of The Commons (student center).

Prior to being appointed as the Vice President for Student Affairs, Dr. Young was the Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs and Director of Housing Operations. With prior experience in Orientation, Campus Activities, and Housing at Southern Methodist University, McDaniel, University of Maryland College Park and the Ohio State University, Dr. Young has over 25 years experience in the field of Student Affairs. Dr. Young is a graduate of the Ohio State University and the University of Maryland, College Park.



DR. MARVIN MANDELL NCAA FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE

Marvin Mandell is a Professor of Policy Sciences and UMBC's FAR for the past eight years. Last summer, Dr. Mandell was selected to head the America East Conference's group of faculty athletic representatives. Marvin Mandell (Public Policy) will assume the presidency of the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration (NASPAA) at their 2008 Annual Conference this month. He received his Ph.D. from Northwestern University, and has also taught at Syracuse and Johns Hopkins.

RETRIEVER FACILITIES

Originally opened in 1973, the Retriever Activities Center, seats 4,024 for athletic events, and has hosted a number of prominent events throughout the years, including an international volleyball match between the USA and Peru, numerous collegiate conference championships and the Maryland Public Secondary Schools Association Championships in girls' basketball.

In the spring of 2004, UMBC Athletics began renovations to the Retriever Activities Center in its continuous effort to bring top-notch facilities to its student-athletes. The \$2.4 million construction plan was set out to provide newly renovated varsity locker rooms for the men's and women's basketball and swimming and diving teams, along with a new state of the art media center, sports medicine training room, Student-Athlete Academic Center and outdoor Tennis Complex.

The RAC seats 4,024 for athletic events, and has hosted a number of prominent events throughout the years, including an international volleyball match between the USA and Peru, numerous collegiate conference championships and the Maryland Public Secondary Schools Association Championships in girls' basketball. In addition, the RAC has been the site of concerts for such artists as Stain'd, Good Charlotte, Bush, Snoop Dogg and N.E.R.D.



RETRIEVER FACILITIES

UMBC Stadium was built in 1976 with a seating capacity of 4,500. Lights were added in 1992, and in 1996 a world-class track and field complex was introduced. The Jim Pfrogner Press Box (named for UMBC's long-time track and field coach) was refurbished in 2000, and it features two roof-top broadcast booths and wireless internet capabilities. In spring 2005, UMBC Stadium's Deso-Turf surface was replaced by Sportexe's Momentum 51 synthetic turf, an infill system consisting of 70-percent ground rubber and 30-percent kiln-dried sand, at a cost of more than \$800,000. UMBC hosted its first game on the new turf on national television (ESPNU). The stadium recently received a new \$5 million locker room complex, which was completed in the spring of 2008 and houses all of UMBC's outdoor sports, in addition to a new scoreboard which arrived in the summer of 2011.

The Baseball Factory Field at UMBC (capacity 1,000), located within the Stadium Complex, has permanent seating and a press box behind home plate. Recently, lights and a new warning track surrounding the field were added, along with refurbishments to the dugouts and infield. Night spring games have become popular among students and the local community. The UMBC Softball Stadium (capacity 500), just beyond the Baseball Factory Field's right field fence, also features a press box and bleacher seats.

Retriever Soccer Park, situated adjacent to UMBC Stadium, was constructed in 1998 and has since experienced dramatic upgrades, including the installation of a Bermuda grass surface — the only one of its kind among America East Conference schools — in the spring of 2006. In the summer of 2011, a state-of-the-art lighting system was installed, giving the Retrievers' men's and women's soccer programs the ability to play games at night. The stadium, which has increased to a 2,000 seat capacity, is sponsored by Elite Tournaments, by virtue of a generous donation by former Retriever Mike Libber.

UMBC has one of the finest aquatic complexes in the Mid-Atlantic region. The indoor pool (UMBC Natatorium) was added to the RAC in 1977. Adjacent to the Natatorium is an outdoor pool complex added in 1996. In 2005, UMBC hosted the America East Conference Swimming and Diving Championships, as the Retrievers' men's team captured its eighth straight league title.

A new six-court tennis facility was completed in April of 2005. The enclosed center features lights and additional spectator seating.

SUPPORTING THE RETRIEVERS

When fans come to see the Retrievers play, they witness the excitement of Division I athletics. What they may not see is all the work that is done behind the scenes so that the student-athletes can achieve their highest potential, both on the field and in the classroom.

UMBC's Sports Medicine Department strives to provide comprehensive athletic training services to approximately 425 UMBC student-athletes. A staff of five certified athletic trainers oversees the medical care for all of the student-athletes competing in UMBC's 19 varsity sports. The services include recognition, treatment, rehabilitation, education and prevention of injuries occurring during participation in athletic activities. Each athletic trainer supervises Retriever student-athletes during practices and home events as well as road competitions.

In the winter of 2005, UMBC introduced the newly designed and built Sports Medicine Services Center. Increasing the size of the previous center nearly three-fold, the new capabilities of the Sports Medicine training room allows student-athletes to rehabilitate with greater ease.

The Academic Center for Student-Athletes (ACSA) is not only a place for student-athletes to study, it also serves as the liaison to several departments on campus. ACSA assists students with registration, financial aid and career development. It is located on the second floor of the RAC and is furnished with 15 computers, individual study carrels, tutoring space and a comprehensive resource area. Each year, UMBC Athletics sets new standards for academic excellence and the support of the ACSA has been critical to its success.

SUPPORTING THE RETRIEVERS

The Office of Marketing and Promotions implements marketing and promotions programs that will increase awareness, interest and enthusiasm for UMBC sports. The department markets to UMBC students, faculty and staff, as well as youth groups, organizations and the communities surrounding the campus. The Office of Marketing and Promotions advocates a positive game atmosphere and encourages new and old UMBC traditions.

The Office of Athletic Communications is responsible for all of the publicity needs of the athletic department. Services such as publications, statistics, electronic media productions, website maintenance and game management are provided by the Athletic Communications staff. The staff hopes that media opportunities for UMBC's student-athletes are a valuable part of their athletic and educational experience.



UMBC Strength and Conditioning provides student-athletes the latest and newest approaches to safe and successful training of their bodies. The newly renovated 3,000-square foot Michael S. Knapp Varsity Weight Room is solely dedicated to UMBC's student-athletes.

SUPPORTING THE RETRIEVERS

UMBC has a proud tradition of successful student-athletes and is currently experiencing tremendous growth. UMBC fields 19 intercollegiate athletic teams competing at the Division-I level in the America East Conference in addition to 26 club sports teams. At the heart of the Retrievers' athletic program are the more than 1,100 student-athletes representing the university on our athletic fields and in the classroom. In order for these young men and women to continue to succeed, we must increase our external support and department resources. The need for support has never been greater, largely due to the success the Retrievers have recently experienced.

With limited funding through university and state resources, the UMBC Athletic Department relies on the generosity of individuals to secure the financial backing necessary for our student-athletes to achieve the highest standards of athletic competitiveness and academic achievement. Gifts made to UMBC Athletics are managed in accordance with the University of Maryland Foundation's official policies and procedures and approved Athletic Department guidelines and are utilized to expand scholarship opportunities for student-athletes, maintain and improve physical facilities, provide academic support programming and enable UMBC to compete in the America East Conference.

Today's student-athletes face more challenges than ever. Along with the high demands of their sports - practice, training, travel, community involvement and competition - it is our student-athletes' greatest responsibility and commitment to achieve academic success. In the last five years, 20 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America status. Over the previous two semesters, more than 47% of UMBC student-athletes have earned 3.0 grade-point averages or higher. The involvement and financial support of alumni, families and fans will enable our student-athletes to build upon these standards.

Moreland, a 1983 graduate, established the school record for most points in a season with 610 and ranks second all-time with 1,728 career points in UMBC men's basketball history.



Cleopatra Borel, Interdisciplinary Studies '02, a three-time track and field NCAA All-American in the shot put and UMBC's first-ever Division-I NCAA champion, competed in the 2004, 2008, and 2012 Olympics. Borel reached the finals in her event in Athens and placed 10th in the world in the competition.



Former major league pitchers Wayne Franklin and Jay Witasick pitched collegiately at UMBC, and a host of other Retrievers have played professional baseball, including Zach Clark, who is currently pitching in the Baltimore Orioles' minor league system. Five ex-Retrievers won Major Indoor Soccer League titles with the Baltimore Blast, and Levi Houapeu was drafted by the Philadelphia Union of Major League Soccer. A solid contingent of UMBC lacrosse players star in Major League Lacrosse, including recent standouts Drew Westervelt, Brendan Mundorf, Peet Poillon and Terry Kimener.

ANNAPOLIS, BALTIMORE WASHINGTON, D.C.

UMBC's 500-acre campus is situated just 10 minutes south of Baltimore, Md., and 30 minutes from Annapolis, Md., and Washington D.C., giving the campus great proximity to all the local cultural and historic scenes. 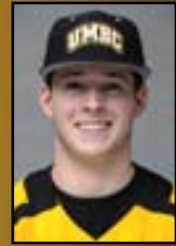

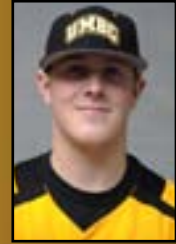
