Throughout its 100 year history, the University of Massachusetts Lowell has excelled at providing innovative, responsive programs that meet both the needs of its students for a quality education and the needs of regional businesses for skilled practitioners and managers.

Formed through the merger of a technical institute and a teacher's college, the University is part of the five-campus University of Massachusetts system. The academic experience at UMass Lowell offers students comprehensive, broad-based programs characterized by a continuing effort to break down traditional barriers

between disciplines, and between the classroom and the "real world."

Courses typically involve a practical component which can range from the political science team that competed nationally in a United Nations Model Assembly; to the music business majors who went to a recording industry conference in California; to the civil engineering students who helped the city of Lowell inventory and replace all of its street signs.

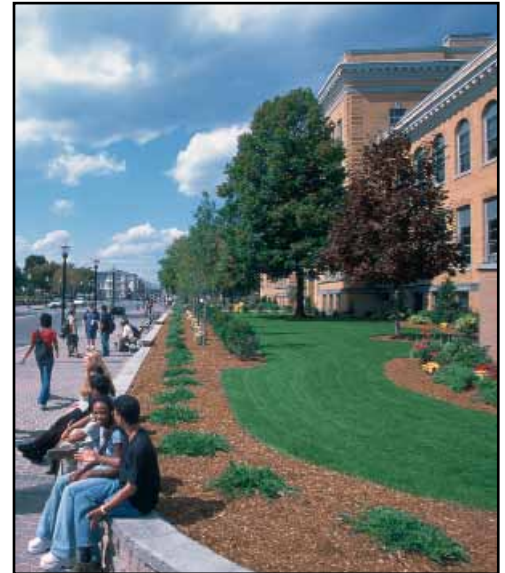
Members of the faculty are respected researchers who value their commitment to teaching and extend the learning experience beyond the classroom. Undergraduates participate in funded research and college policy committees, and senior faculty are involved in student projects such as building and racing a solar-powered car. Strong links with local businesses, educational systems, and health care providers benefit students through an increasing number of internships, part-time jobs, and grants. In short, students graduate with the hands-on experience and practical problem-solving skills for which employers are looking.

UMass Lowell offers 82 different undergraduate concentrations, including recent popular choices like meteorology, sound recording technology, exercise physiology, criminal justice, and plastics engineering. Most courses incorporate some kind of practical component that gives students hands-on experience in their field. Support services ranging from the University-wide Honors Program to multimedia computer labs to academic tutoring ensure that all students have access to the programs and services that help them succeed. The Graduate School enrolls nearly 3,000 students in 30 master's degree and 11 doctoral programs.

UMass Lowell's 7,316 undergraduate students are ethnically, culturally, and economically diverse. Students are active in a wide variety of community service activities, including athletics-based programs for local high school students; the Assistive Technology Program in which students create and modify devices for the disabled; and volunteer work at local shelters and community programs.

There are more than

100 campus organizations to choose from: academic, recreational, and special interest groups; the women's center; marching band; the student newspaper; an FM radio station covering a 20-mile radius; and the Off-Broadway Players. Campus-wide events include University Week and Spring Carnival, and resident hall associations sponsor social and recreational events.



University Avenue

The University's three campuses, spread over 100 acres on both sides of the Merrimack River, include classroom and laboratory buildings, two libraries, a student center, two gymnasiums, multiple dining halls, a Center for the Performing Arts, an art gallery, and numerous residence halls. State-of-the-art laboratories include such special-interest facilities as the six Sound Recording Technology Program studios; an interactive video lab (one of three in the country) that enables nursing students to simulate medical emergencies; and a manufacturing lab where engineering and management students team up to produce microelectronic components.

In 1998, the University's collaborative relationship with the city of Lowell resulted in the completion of the nearby Paul E. Tsongas Hockey Arena and the on-campus Edward A. LeLacheur Baseball Stadium. The latter is shared by UMass Lowell and the Lowell Spinners, a class A affiliate of the Boston Red Sox.

These projects and the University's Campus Recreation Center, which opened in the Fall of 2002, are located in the city's Northern Canal area where campus and community meet. Other collaborative projects in this area include a three-mile river walk/canal walk system, and the mixed-use renovation of the 18-acre Lawrence Mills complex.

UMass Lowell Athletics: 2009-10 in Review

The River Hawks' usual bevy of awards and accomplishments did not fall short in 2009-10. An impressive combination of Northeast-10 Conference awards, championships, an NCAA Champion, academic recognition and continued service to the greater Lowell community helped the River Hawks truly soar with pride this past year, continuing to build new traditions and achievements into UMass Lowell's rich athletic history.

FALL

UMass Lowell kicked off the season with a top ranking in the Northeast-10 Conference Preseason Coaches' Poll. Despite finishing the regular season third in the Conference, they made it farther than any other team, reaching their third consecutive NCAA Division II Tournament Championship game. They eventually fell to 16-time champion Bloomsburg, 3-2.

Junior forward and leading scorer Sammy Macy was named 2010 Northeast-10 Player of the Year for her 57-point showing during the season. She tallied 25 goals and seven assists and was selected as a Longstreth/NFHCA First Team All-American and tabbed to the NCAA Championship All-Tournament Team.

Macy was joined on the NFHCA All-America First Team by teammates Laura Sullivan and Ashley Smith, who anchored the River Hawk defensive corps through the season. Junior Katie Enaire finished the season just behind Macy with 51 points (22g, 7a) and was named to the Second Team.

The standard of the men's cross country team has grown steadily through the decade, and a goal of winning at least three trophies per season is not far fetched. Two out of three, however, isn't bad either. In 2006, UMass Lowell became the first Division II or III college to capture the New England Championship – the classic 98-year-old race each October in Franklin Park – for the first time. In 2010, the River Hawks won their third title in four years, defeating the likes of UMass, Providence and New Hampshire.

The River Hawks fell short of the Northeast-10 title, despite naming seven runners to the Conference all-star teams, but regrouped to capture the NCAA East Region title with five All-East Region runners in the top 12 places.

UMass Lowell moved on to the NCAA Championship for the 10th straight year, where they finished 16th behind junior Angus MacDonald, who placed 26th among scoring runners and 37th overall to earn All-American honors. MacDonald also received the NE-10 Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award for cross country, presented to one student-athlete per conference sport for excellence in the classroom and the field of play.

While the men's cross country team excelled, so did the women's, which finished runner-up at both the Northeast-10 Conference Championship as well as the NCAA East Region Championship and moved on to the NCAA Championship for the seventh straight year.

Four River Hawks were cited to the All-Conference teams, led by junior Lyra Clark and senior Haley Catarius, who finished second and fourth at the NE-10 meet. Clark, junior Sarah Bonomo and freshman Kelly Walton placed among the top 15 runners at the NCAA East Region Championship – each earning All-East Region honors – to lead UMass Lowell to a second-place showing at the NCAA East Region Championship.

At the NCAA Championship, the River Hawks placed 23rd behind Clark, who placed 116th overall (97th among scoring runners) in a field of 184.

In a year full of milestones, the women's soccer team enjoyed arguably its best season, in which it advanced to the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament semifinal and the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in five years.

The River Hawks ran into hard luck in the postseason, falling on an overtime goal in the NE-10 Tournament semifinal at Franklin Pierce, then drawing 0-0

with Merrimack (2 OT) in the NCAA Tournament first round before losing on penalty kicks, 4-3.

Still, the season was not without its highlights. Senior G Jamie Gillis and senior defender Kathleen Strazzere became the program's first-ever All-Americans as both were named to the NSCAA First and Second Team, respectively. Gillis was named the NE-10 Goalkeeper of the Year for the second straight year and Strazzere the Co-Defensive Player of the Year, leading eight River Hawks on the

All-Conference teams. Additionally, Head Coach Elie Monteiro was named the NE-10 Coach of the Year for the second time in five years.

Gillis, with help from the defense, shattered a slew of records, but the one that stood out among the rest was for consecutive shutout minutes – 1,333 – which set an NCAA Division II record and bested the previous mark of 1,192 set in 1997.

In what will be remembered as the team's greatest season in recent history, UMass Lowell won its first ever Northeast-10 Tournament Championship and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2005.

After finishing the regular season with a 19-9 clip (11-4 NE-10), the River Hawks stormed through the NE-10 Tournament on their home court. In the Championship game versus Adelphi, NE-10 Tournament MVP Nichole Rondeau compiled 33 assists and nine digs to propel UMass Lowell to victory in five sets.

After falling in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, the River Hawks received several post-season honors. Karen McNulty was named the NE-10 Coach of the Year, Sarah Coscia earned a spot on the All-Conference First-Team and Elsa LeGrand was named to the Third-Team. In addition, Coscia was placed on the AVCA Division II All-East Region Team.

It was an unexpected season, to say the least, for the men's soccer team which limped to a 4-12-0 season following an appearance in the 2008 NCAA Tournament quarterfinal. Though 14 players and five starters returned for the 2010 season, UMass Lowell's outcome in 2009 was a surprise.

The season started bright with a 3-2 double overtime triumph over 2008 NCAA finalist Dowling College while other victories came at the expense of Assumption, New Haven and Saint Rose. Notable was the fact that UMass Lowell lost seven matches by one goal.

Among the highlights, three River Hawks – seniors Jhony Valencia and Ryan Richards, and junior Stephen Potcner – were named to the Northeast-10 All-Conference Third Team.

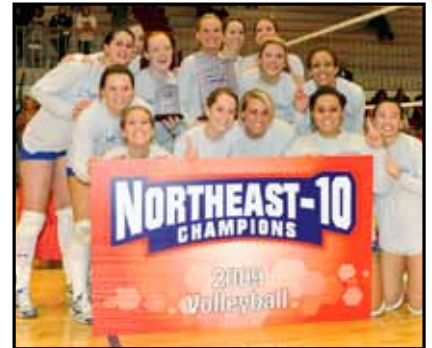
WINTER

The 2009-10 men's basketball team followed up a spectacular turnaround season in 2008-09 with its second consecutive 20-win season, finishing the year at 20-12. Despite finishing the regular season seventh in the NE-10, the squad brought home the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament championship with a thrilling postseason run and victory over Adelphi in the championship game on its home court.

They earned hard-fought victories over NE-10 foes Merrimack and Bentley during their late-season surge and gave eventual regular season champion Stonehill its first conference-loss of the season in January.

Two guards, Kevin Carr and Kyle Caiola became the 34th and 35th members, respectively, of the UMass Lowell 1,000 Point Club, while Caiola also racked up personal accolades all season, as well. He was named NABC First Team All-East Region and NE-10 All-Conference Second Team. Caiola was named NE-10 Tournament Most Outstanding Player and was a conference and national leader in free throw percentage (.899) throughout the year.

In a vastly improved season from a year ago, the women's basketball team shrugged off its preseason prediction (10th in the Northeast-10 Conference preseason poll) and turned an 8-19 record in 2009 into a 16-11 record and a 12-10 showing in the NE-10 (tied for sixth).

With the seventh seed for the NE-10 Tournament, the River Hawks were stunned by No. 10 American International, 63-59, in the first round.

There were plenty of milestones along the way, including the play of freshman Bianca Simmons, who was named the NE-10 Co-Freshman of the Year as she compiled averages of a team-high 13.0 points along with 4.8 rebounds while shooting .842 from the free throw line.

Head Coach Kathy O'Neil, celebrating her 25th season, earned the 400th win of her career when the River Hawks defeated Stonehill 80-69 on Feb. 6. Additionally, UMass Lowell continued to turn aside non-conference opponents with a 4-0 clip last year.

Despite falling short of the lofty preseason expectations, UMass Lowell hockey still enjoyed a successful 2009-10 campaign. The River Hawks finished the regular season in a tie for third place in Hockey East, their highest finish since 1995-96, before falling in three games at Maine in the conference playoffs.

Over the course of the season, Carter Hutton broke program records for career shutouts (10), career goals against average (2.33) and single season save percentage (.928).

UMass Lowell received several post-season honors as Hutton and Jeremy Dehner were named Hockey East Second Team All-Stars. Hutton was also named the Bauer Goaltending Champion and a New England Hockey Writers All-Star.

Ben Holmstrom was honored as the HE Best Defensive Forward and received the NEHW Frank Jones Award, the first River Hawk to earn both honors in the same season since Doug Nolan (1998-99).

Also notable was the departure of seniors Hutton (Adirondack), Holmstrom (Adirondack) and Nick Schaus (Worcester), who signed NHL contracts; as well as Jeremy Dehner (Norfolk) and Nevin Hamilton (Providence) to the AHL.

UMass Lowell's tradition of the cross country season feeding into the indoor and outdoor track and field season remained steadfast as ever with the crowning two relay teams and two individuals as All-Americans.

Junior Angus MacDonald was the catalyst as he led the men's distance medley relay team to All-American honors (eighth, 10:15.51) for the fifth time in six years and then went on to capture individual All-American status in the mile (eighth, 4:15.04). Freshman Evan White earned UMass Lowell's highest place at the NCAAs when he placed fourth in the 200 meter dash (21.65).

Also joining the list of All-Americans was Jeff Wundt, who ran legs in the distance medley (alongside MacDonald, sophomore Danny Wang and senior Tim Guerin) and 4X400 meter relay, which placed seventh in 3:15.11. Joining him in the 4X400 was junior Donte Brown, senior Robert Liekweg and freshman Craig Bennett.

At the New England Championship, UMass Lowell placed fourth among Division II and III schools (eighth overall) behind its distance medley relay team, which won the title in 9:53.97. A mile on the DMR team, MacDonald also earned All-New England status in the 3,000 meters as the runner-up in 8:20.97, while junior Cory Murray placed fourth in the shot put (52' 4.5").

The River Hawks placed third at the Northeast-10 Championship and crowned two titlists in Murray (shot put, a school record 55' 2.25") and White (200 meters, 21.91).

UMass Lowell's two days at the NCAA Championship signified accomplishment but also served as a showcase for several underclasswomen. The accomplishment part was highlighted by senior Jacqui Barrett, who led the shot put with a distance of 49' 4.25" until the final throw of the competition when Kelly Ash of Ashland University won with a toss of 51' 1.0".

Barrett was one of two River Hawks to earn All-American honors as senior Haley Catarius placed eighth in 2:13.28 in the 800 meters. Catarius also ran a leg on UMass Lowell's 4X400 meter relay team which placed ninth in 3:52.53. Joining her was freshman Shannon Cunningham and sophomores Nicole Giaquinto and Amy Delgado.

The aforementioned each took home All-New England honors: Catarius in the 800 meters (second), Barrett in the shot put (second), as well as sophomore Ashley Zielinski in the 55 meter hurdles (8.22) and 200 meters (seventh); Cunningham (fourth) and Giaquinto (eighth) in the 400 meters.

The previous week, UMass Lowell captured the NE-10 title for the sixth time and won four titles led by Catarius (500 meters), Barrett (shot put), sophomore Chrissy Silvar (pole vault) and the 4X400 meter relay.

SPRING

For senior shot putter Jacqui Barrett, the spring 2010 was one for the ages as she captured the NCAA Championship in the shot put to become UMass Lowell's third-ever female – and second in five years – to win an NCAA title.

After placing second at the NCAA indoor championship, Barrett led the

nation virtually the entire season (49 feet, 11.75 inches) and won the title on her first throw of the competition, a school-record 50' 8.25", and surpassed Heather Oldham's previous school-record of 50' 8.0" by a mere quarter inch.

Barrett had plenty of company at the NCAAs as senior Haley Catarius placed 10th in the 800 meters (2:10.63), and led the 4X400 meter relay team to 12th in 3:48.15. Joining her was freshman Shannon Cunningham and sophomores Nicole Giaquinto and Amy Delgado.

The NCAA title was one of three trophies that Barrett won in the spring. She also took home the New England Championship, setting a meet record with a throw of 47' 9.25". Additionally, the 4X400 meter relay team of Catarius, Cunningham, Giaquinto and Delgado captured the New England title in 3:47.80. Giaquinto (4X400, 4X100) and sophomore Ashley Zielinski (4X100, 100 meter dash) earned All-New England honors in two events.

UMass Lowell was the runner-up at the Northeast-10 Championship as Barrett (shot put, 49' 11.0", an NE-10 record) and Cunningham (400 meter dash, 56.35, also an NE-10 record) each walked away with individual titles.

UMass Lowell's first outdoor meet of the season – the Disney Classic in Orlando, Fla. – gave a hint of things to come in the spring season as four athletes earned NCAA qualification. Three of those athletes – Ruben Sanca, Doug Caves and Tim Guerin – secured their places at the NCAA Championship as Sanca won All-American honors in the 5,000 and 10,000 meters, and Caves in the 400 meter dash to wrap magnificent careers.

Despite finishing a disappointing fifth at the Northeast-10 Conference Championship due to minor injuries and bad timing, UMass Lowell regrouped the following week and placed second – among all three divisions – at the New England Championship behind only the University of Rhode Island.

Caves gave one of the great single-day men's efforts in the program's history as he earned All-New England in four events, winning the 400 meters, placing runner-up in the 200 and the 4X100 meter relay, and finishing fourth in the 4X400 relay. In all, 10 athletes in 14 events earned All-New England status and Sanca was named the USTFCCA East Region Athlete of the Year.

Under first year head coach Sean Cotter, the UMass Lowell softball program bounced back from a 10-31-1 showing in 2009 with a 23-27 season, more than doubling their output from last year, and a Northeast-10 Conference Tournament berth.

Sophomore P/DP Elyssa Boris broke the program record for single season home runs with 12, surpassing the previous mark of nine set by Stacey Lajoie in 2006. The 12 home runs also tied her for first among NE-10 leaders. She also threw a no-hitter in a 7-0 victory over Minnesota-Crookston on Mar. 16 in Cocoa Beach, Fla., and was named to the NE-10 All-Conference Second Team.

Joining her with postseason honors was freshman 2B Krista MacKenzie, who was named to the NE-10 All-Rookie Team as she batted a team-best .413 batting average (fifth in the NE-10), 31 runs and 23 RBIs.

The 2010 baseball season looked bright after a seven-game win streak in Florida granted the club an 11-5 start. However, a mid-season lull, which included a six-game losing skid, forced the River Hawks into a race for the Northeast-10 playoffs. Despite winning eight of their final nine games, UMass Lowell missed the NE-10 Tournament due to a tie-breaker with Merrimack.

Among the season's highlights, River Hawk hitters broke a pair of program records in a 29-3 victory over the defending Division II National Champion Lynn University on Mar. 15. Jared Notargiacomo became the first player to hit two grand slams in the same game and Luke Wallace collected a program-best seven hits.

Honors were quick to follow at season's end as five players were selected to the NE-10 All-Conference Teams, led by First Team selection Cam Kneeland and Third Team picks Wallace, J.T. Leary and Dustin Ramey and All-Rookie selection Garrett Cole.

Since being restored to varsity status effective the 2005 season, the golf program has consistently improved each season and has been represented in the NCAA Tournament six straight years, including the last three as a team.

The 2009-10 season saw the program continue to rank among the East Region's best during the regular season, evidenced by a No. 8 ranking in the final East Region poll. Though it finished 14th at the NCAA East-Atlantic Super Regional, the River Hawks took fifth among the 10 East Region schools in the field.

UMass Lowell finished a disappointing seventh at the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament, but it continued its representation on the NE-10 all-star team as senior Matt Twomey placed in a tie for sixth individually.

The Facilities: A Commitment to River Hawk Athletics

Among the many things on which the UMass Lowell Department of Athletics prides itself is its facilities.

There is the palatial 6,500-seat Paul E. Tsongas Arena, home of the River Hawk Division I ice hockey program; the 4,700-seat Edward A. LeLacheur Park home of the baseball team; the Cushing Field Complex, which houses the soccer, field hockey and track and field teams; and River View Field, home of the UML softball team.

The Tsongas Center at UMass Lowell

A joint venture with the City of Lowell and the University led to the construction and completion in 1998 of the Paul E. Tsongas Arena and the Edward A. LeLacheur Park on the University's north campus.

Opened and dedicated on Jan. 27, 1998, the Arena proudly bears the name of the late Senator Paul E.

Tsongas, a Lowell native. The 6,500-seat arena is home to the NCAA Division I UML ice hockey team, as well as a wide variety of concerts, family shows and other sporting events.

In 2010, the University purchased the Arena from the city of Lowell and renamed it the Tsongas Center at UMass Lowell.

Costello Athletic Center

Most recently, the University turned its attention to the Costello Athletic Center, home of the UML volleyball and women's and men's basketball teams as well as the winter refuge for the baseball and softball teams.

Built in 1964, the CAC underwent many renovations over the summer of 2006, including the installation of a new hardwood playing surface; new collapsible bleachers in several areas, including the east end of the court; and new banners at either end of the court celebrating the University's many championships.

Additionally, a new sound system was installed with speakers to be added above the balcony level as well as attractive acoustic panels on the ceiling to improve sound.

Among the minor changes has been a new curtain separating the main floor and the auxiliary gymnasium, as well as new blinds on the windows above the balcony level.

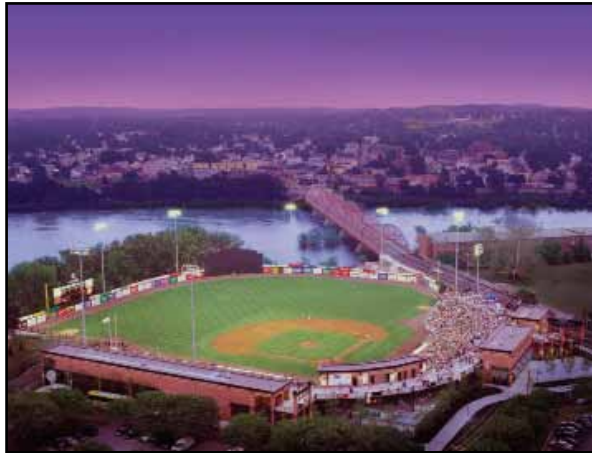
Along with the main and auxiliary basketball courts, this three-floor facility also contains a swimming pool, training facilities and the main offices for the athletic department staff.

The weight room, located in the basement, contains the latest equipment and a wide variety of free weights suitable for training and is exclusive to UML student-athletes.

Cushing Field Complex

Adjacent to the Costello Athletic Center is the Cushing Field Complex, named after the Lester H. Cushing, former athletic

director and chair of the Department of Languages at Lowell Technological Institute for 49 years.



Edward A. LeLacheur Park

The complex was constructed in 2000-01 and features an artificial field and bleacher stadium for field hockey and football, a competitive track and field complex and a natural grass soccer field.

In the summer of 2007, a state-of-the-art pressbox was added to the soccer field, complete with a radio/webcast booth and outlets to enable for live internet scoring.

Edward A. LeLacheur Park

A 4,767-seat natural grass facility, LeLacheur Park is home to the UML baseball team as well as the Lowell Spinners, the Class 'A' affiliate of the 2004 and 2007 World Series Champion Boston Red Sox. It is among the most attractive, most beautifully manicured

minor league ballparks in the country.

Completed in 1998, LeLacheur Park has served as site of the NCAA Tournament Division II Northeast Region Baseball Championship from 1998-2003, as well as the Northeast-10 Tournament from 2001-07.

River View Field

Located on the University's south campus, River View Field serves as the home of the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament champion UML softball team and has also been the site of the NE-10 Tournament in recent years. Situated on the banks of the Merrimack River, River View Field is regarded as one of the premier softball complexes in New England.

Campus Recreation Center

The newly constructed Campus Recreation Center caters to the needs of the student-athlete. This two-story, 80,000 square foot facility offers a variety of fitness and fun activities.

The CRC contains three basketball courts with a one-eighth seamless rubber compound running track overlooking the courts from the second floor. Adjacent to the basketball courts are two racquetball courts in addition to a squash court.

Additionally, there is a 6,500-square foot dual-level fitness area that contains a variety of cardiovascular equipment, free weights and selectorized machines. Multipurpose studios offer space for aerobic and fitness classes, and a wellness room provides information and help on how to eat and exercise better.

Locker rooms offer a sauna for relaxation, and pool and tennis tables give students a chance to unwind in the atrium.

Head Coach Greg Herenda



Greg Herenda, the seventh coach in UMass Lowell history, enters his third season as head coach of the River Hawks, bringing over 20 years of experience at all NCAA levels to the program. For his efforts turning around the UMass Lowell program in 2008-09, Herenda was named Northeast-10 Coach of the Year and National Association of Basketball Coaches East Region Coach of the Year.

Herenda followed up his stellar first year with the 2010 NE-10 Conference Tournament Championship during the 2009-10 season. The #7 River Hawks

stormed through the post-season, defeating #2 Bentley and #3 Merrimack on the road before hosting #9 Adelphi at home and eventually earning a 73-58 victory and the 2010 title. The win sealed their second consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament, despite falling to Merrimack in the first round.

In his first season at the helm, 2008-09, Herenda led UMass Lowell to a spectacular 21-8 (16-6 NE-10/second) campaign. Under his guidance, the River Hawks experienced a complete program turnaround and earned a No. 2 seed in the NE-10 Conference Tournament and a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament after a two-year absence. He coached players Kyle Caiola and Max Kerman to post-season honors, also, as they earned NE-10 Freshman of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year, respectively.

Off the court, Herenda has encouraged and facilitated his team's participation in the community through involvement with the Lowell Boys and Girls Club, Saints Medical Center, the Lowell YMCA and the Lowell Transitional Living Center.

Herenda's coaching career has brought him to the Big East, Ivy League, Patriot League and Conference USA through the years, and his teams have gone on to the NCAA Tournament and NIT Tournament, as well as won conference titles.

In his last three head coaching jobs, Herenda has improved his teams' win total by an average of 9.33 wins in his first year with each of the programs.

While at Division III Cabrini College, Herenda guided the Cavaliers and previously, Elgin Community College in Elgin, IL, to remarkable turnaround seasons. In 2007-08, Cabrini posted a 12-14 mark (9-7 Pennsylvania Athletic Conference/fifth), up from a 5-20 overall clip (4-14/ninth) in 2006-07. Similarly, Elgin C.C. boasted an 18-11 record in 2006-07 once Herenda stepped in, improving on their previous season's record of 6-18.

Previously, Herenda spent five years as the associate head coach at East Carolina University (2000-05) under Head Coach Bill Herrion, currently the head coach at New Hampshire. He also served as an assistant at Yale (1997-99), Seton Hall (1994-97) and Holy Cross (1989-94), following a four-year spell at his alma mater Merrimack (1985-89).

During his two years with the (then) Chiefs, Herenda played a large role in recruiting the ULowell team that won the 1988 NCAA Division II Championship, including All-American guard Bobby Licare and All-New England standout Gavin Cummings. Herenda's younger brother, Billy, played for the Chiefs from 1984-88.

Among the many highlights in his coaching career, Herenda helped lead Holy Cross to great success from 1989-94. The 1992-93 Crusader squad posted a record of 23-7 (12-2 conference) and captured the Patriot League Tournament championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament where it suffered a 94-64 loss to Arkansas.

Additionally, Holy Cross's 1989-90 team captured the Metro-Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) North regular season championship and went on to earn an NIT bid where it lost at Rutgers (87-78).

Herenda's three-year stay at Seton Hall was highlighted by a 16-14 finish and an NIT appearance in 1994-95. Among his recruits were Shaheen Holloway, former McDonald's All-America Game Most Valuable Player and a three-time Big East Conference all star;

as well as Rimantas Kaukenas, both who led SHU to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in 2000.

During his four-year stay as a coach at Merrimack, Herenda helped guide the Warriors (22-10, 13-5 NE-10) to the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Division II Championship in 1989. The 1985-86 Warriors compiled a 19-9 clip (9-5 NE-8) and advanced to the NE-8 Tournament final.

Herenda served as a lead analyst and color commentator for YES Network’s Ivy League basketball telecasts.

The 2005-06 ECC team went 18-11 overall, won the Skyway Conference championship and reached the Region IV District B Junior College Championship game for the first time in school history.

A four-year player at Merrimack College, Herenda led the Warriors to a 17-10 finish (13-5 NE-8) in 1981-82 and a 14-13 clip (8-11 NE-8) in 1982-83. He still holds the school record for assists in a game (22) and shares the record for the single season average (9.0). He graduated in 1983 with degree in business administration and marketing.

A graduate of St. Peter’s Prep High School, Herenda played for legendary coach Jerome Halligan.

Herenda and his wife, Jillene, have one son, Trey (8). He is a native of North Bergen, NJ.

Associate Head Coach Marc Kuntz



A native of Monroe, Conn., Marc Kuntz is in his sixth season at UMass Lowell, and is responsible for recruiting, scouting, player development, community and alumni outreach. Kuntz was promoted from Assistant Coach to Associate Head Coach in August 2010 after five seasons with the River Hawks.

A graduate of Xavier University, Kuntz came to UML following a one-year stint as head coach at Wilmington (OH) College. Previously, he served as an assistant at Wilmington (2003-04), Norwich University (2000-03) and as a

manager during his undergraduate days at Xavier University (1996-2000).

A member of Xavier's class of 2000, Kuntz was a student manager under the late Skip Prosser for three years while receiving his degree in sports management. While at Xavier, he worked with current and former NBA players James Posey (New Orleans Hornets), Torraye Braggs (formerly Houston Rockets) and David West (New Orleans Hornets).

Upon graduation, Kuntz moved on to Norwich where he served under Paul Booth as the recruiting coordinator. Having brought in two recruiting classes, he was integral in helping the Cadets emerge from a 6-18 record in 2001-02 to a 14-12 clip in 2002-03, which marked the first winning season at Norwich in six years.

Kuntz then served as an assistant to Will Rey at Wilmington for one season before inheriting the head coaching reins in 2004-05. After a 1-25 finish in 2003-04, he guided the Quakers to a much-improved 10-16 clip in 2004-05 (6-12 in the Ohio Athletic Conference, eighth place). Last year, with Kuntz's recruits, the Quakers finished with a 20-7 record and established a school record for wins in a season.

"Marc is my right hand man and a vital part of our program. He is a great recruiter and is an excellent teacher of the game," head coach Greg Herenda said. "He continues to help me in so many ways. What he brings to my staff is immeasurable. I am very lucky to have him on my staff."

An active clinician on the summer camp circuit, Kuntz was an instructor at the renowned Five Star Basketball Camp from 2000-2005. He has also served as an instructor at Hoop Mountain and Eastern Invitational basketball camps.

Kuntz lives in Lowell, Mass.



Assistant Coach Tom Glynn



Glynn is the former Assistant Boys Basketball Coach at Arlington High School in Arlington, Mass. He was responsible for scouting, conditioning and on-floor coaching for the varsity team that advanced to the state tournament. Prior to Arlington, he also served as the Assistant Boys Basketball Coach at the Cambridge School of Weston, where he helped lead his team to consecutive 20-win seasons.

Glynn has worked with the Rising Star, Hoop Mountain, Bentley University, Boston College and Providence College basketball camps in the past, as well as a physical education and health teacher in the Lexington, Mass. school district. He served as the

Multi-Sport Program Director for the Lexington Recreation Department, as well.

Glynn received his Bachelor's Degree in physical education from Springfield College in 2006 and went on to earn his Master's in secondary education from Salem State College.

"Tom is a very balanced young coach that can help us on the court, in the weight room and on the Boston recruiting trails, as well," Herenda said.

He graduated from Waltham High School, where he played three years of varsity basketball and served as team captain as a senior. The demonstrated leader was also named Greater Boston League and Daily News Tribune All-Star for his efforts on the court.

He went on to play a post-graduate year at Tilton School, where he again served as team captain and helped his team advance to NEPSAC Class B Semifinals and earned Lakes Region All-Star accolades.

At UMass Lowell, Glynn will be responsible for on-court coaching, recruiting and scouting, as well as overseeing the River Hawks' weight training program and academic support.

Graduate Assistant Jen Valente



Valente is familiar to the UMass Lowell basketball family, as she graduated from the University in May 2010 and was a four-year standout for the women's basketball team and President of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

She is currently enrolled in the University's Master's program, pursuing plans to become a teacher. Valente hails from Prospect, Conn. and was a three-year varsity star at Woodland Regional High School.

As a River Hawk, Valente served as team captain during her senior year and finished her career with 91 appearances and 52 starts. She amassed 791 points (8.7 ppg) and 362 rebounds (4.0 rpg) as a forward for the River Hawks. She also received the Women's Basketball Student-Athlete Award for her efforts on the court and in the classroom.

As a member of the coaching staff, Valente will be responsible primarily for academic support, as well as coordinating community service and contributing with scouting and on-floor coaching.

"I am very excited to have Jen join our staff," Herenda said. "As a player, Jen always played with great passion and intelligence. I know she will bring those qualities to our program, as well."

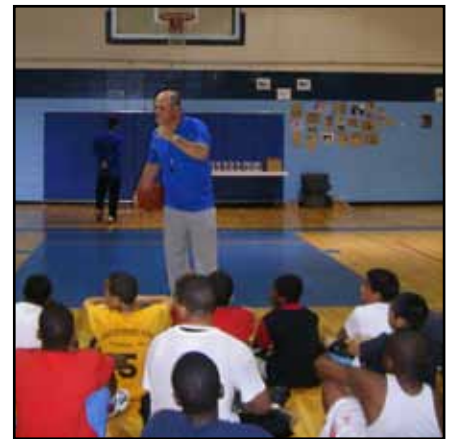

2010-11 River Hawk Basketball:

Young River Hawks Ready to Soar

Returning six members of its 2010 Northeast-10 Championship team and welcoming eight new faces into the ranks, the 2010-11 UMass Lowell Men's Basketball squad is counting down the seconds until the first tipoff of the year, ready to turn their potential and promise into results.

"Although we have a young team, we do have returning players that gained invaluable experience over the last two years," said Head Coach **Greg Herenda**, who is returning for his third year at the helm of the UMass Lowell program. "We have players back that have been involved with a great deal of success and now it's their turn to take the reigns. I'm excited to see how the chemistry unfolds as the season progresses."

The troops will get their first test on Saturday, Nov. 13 at 2:00 p.m. when they kick off the UMass Lowell Tip-Off Classic Tournament at home in Costello Gymnasium. The River Hawks will take on the Eagles of Post University before finishing the weekend with a tilt against the Felician Golden Falcons at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday.

"This year's team has exceptional quickness, athleticism and length, but the thing I like most about them is that they truly enjoy playing the game," Herenda said. "On top of that, they are an extremely hardworking group of guys who have a very high level of energy. I have said from day one that our success will evolve from our work ethic and I just love how hard these guys work every time they hit the floor."

They will begin their quest to defend their NE-10 Tournament Title by opening their conference schedule on Wednesday, Nov. 17 when they host Saint Michael's College at 7:30 p.m.

Aside from the regular conference foes, including local rival Merrimack, ranked No. 22 in the National Association of Basketball Coaches' Preseason Poll and No. 7 Bentley, as well as Adelphi (others receiving votes), the team UMass Lowell stomped in the tournament championship game, the River Hawks will also face some different non-conference opponents. In December, UMass Lowell will play host to Concordia (N.Y.) and Bridgeport, as well.

The Returnees

Although just six members of last year's team return – and none older than juniors – Herenda is not worried about any shortage of leadership or experience with these elder statesmen. "I am looking forward to all of our returnees taking the next step in every capacity," Herenda said. "From Scotty leading us at the point guard position to Robbie being asked to score the ball more and Matt being called upon to play the point forward position; Romeo will now have an opportunity to show his entire offensive package from the wing and Boch will be asked to give us a defender and rebounder that can shoot the three and pass it out of the post."

The most senior of student-athletes include juniors **Robbie Walton** and **John Corbacio**. The duo are the only players left from the 2008-09 season and joined the ranks as freshmen, welcoming in a new coach and helping to turn the program around.

Walton, who was recently named captain along with sophomores **Scotty Tavares-Taylor** and **Matt Welch** earned a starting spot in the rotation for the second half of last season, starting in 12 of the final 13 games.

"I really like the combination of Scotty, Robbie and Matt as our captains," Herenda said. "All three of them have helped us achieve success here and I know they want more of the same. As long as they continue to work hard and play hard, the rest of the team will fall in line and more leaders will evolve."

Corbacio returned from an injury last season and is expected to compete hard for increased time this year, as he has strengthened himself considerably and is a strong rebounding asset for the River Hawks. Classmate **Pete Steere** also adds experience in the frontcourt, as he joined the squad at the beginning of last season.

Tavares-Taylor will look to fill the shoes of his predecessor, leading on the floor as the point guard. The sophomore was one of only three River Hawks to see action in all 32 contests last year, and the lone returner to accomplish the feat. He finished the year with 6.5 ppg and earned starts in the final six games of the year, as well as an NE-10 All-Tournament nod for his performance down the stretch.

Fellow captain Welch is the highest-scoring returner this year, as he averaged 8.8 ppg in 12 appearances last year. The former University of New Hampshire football player joined the team halfway through the season and made an immediate impact from the first time he put on a UMass Lowell jersey. The forward is also the leading rebounder among returnees, as he averaged 3.9 a game.

Classmate **Romeo Diaz** also has the potential to be a serious weapon for the River Hawks this season. He finished the year averaging a deceptive 4.5 ppg, as the versatile guard/forward scored in double figures five times in 27 appearances. He made 12 starts on the year and kicked off his collegiate career with a 21-point, 10-rebound double-double.

"This group will now be allowed to do more and quite frankly, needs to do more, for us to continue our winning ways," Herenda said. "I am quite confident that their games will mature and so will their statistics. At the end of the day, this is their time and I am confident that they will respond in a big way."

These veterans will be asked to step up and lead by example, showing their work ethic, dedication to the team and desire for success.

The Newcomers

It doesn't seem like this large group of newcomers will be hard to motivate, though. As Herenda noted, these young men truly love the game of basketball and their enjoyment shines through in their talent and willingness to learn.

"Our freshman class will be called upon to play and contribute immediately," Herenda said. "These guys just love to play and compete and I think they will relish this opportunity. They are a very talented group that has a great combination of athleticism, talent and energy. They are fun to coach and have shown a great ability to work hard and enjoy that work, as well."

The freshmen include wings **Antonio Bivins** and **Kerry Weldon**, as well as guards **Akeem Williams** and **Chris Thompson**. Classmate **Darrell Ward** represents the class of 2014 in the front court, while recent addition **Nomso Ematarom** will add some competition to the guard position, as well.

"In a lot of ways, this class reminds me of my first recruiting class when I was an assistant here back in 1983," Herenda said. "They have gotten along really well and I feel that they belong here and will attain great success while they're here in Lowell."

In addition to the freshmen, sophomore newcomer **Dan Porter** will also compete for playing time and increase the depth of the River Hawks' back court, while the squad also welcomes junior **Heman Honore** who previously played at Newbury College.

Looking Ahead

At the end of the day, whether they are newcomers or returnees is unimportant. As long as Herenda can help his players find the spark they need, this team has the ability to surprise many people.

Although they were picked ninth in the NE-10 Preseason Coaches Poll, the numbers mean nothing to this team. In 2008-09, they were picked to finish 12th in the highly-competitive conference with a new head coach and unknown faces. That year, they finished second.

Last year, in 2009-10, they were picked to finish third and fell short, coming in tied for sixth at the end of the regular season. That number didn't bother them either, though, as they stormed through the conference tournament as a #7 seed, upsetting #2 Bentley and #3 Merrimack on the road, en route to capturing the 2010 Championship.

Once the clock starts on the first game this weekend, though, the true test will begin and Herenda and his staff will see if their batch of newcomers, paired with their dedicated group of veterans can come together to defend their title.

"The key to our team will be if we can have 14 players defend, rebound and take care of the basketball as best as possible," Herenda said. "If we do those three things, we will continue the success that this program has grown accustomed to."

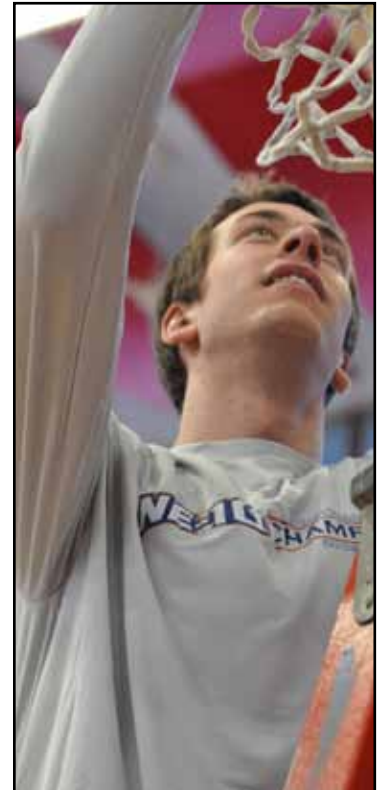

The Northeast-10 Conference



Currently in its third decade, the Northeast-10 Conference has established itself as one of the premier all-around NCAA Division II conferences in the nation.

The NE-10 is now the second largest Division II conference in the country and is comprised of 15 institutions: six from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, three each from New York and New Hampshire, and one each from Vermont, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

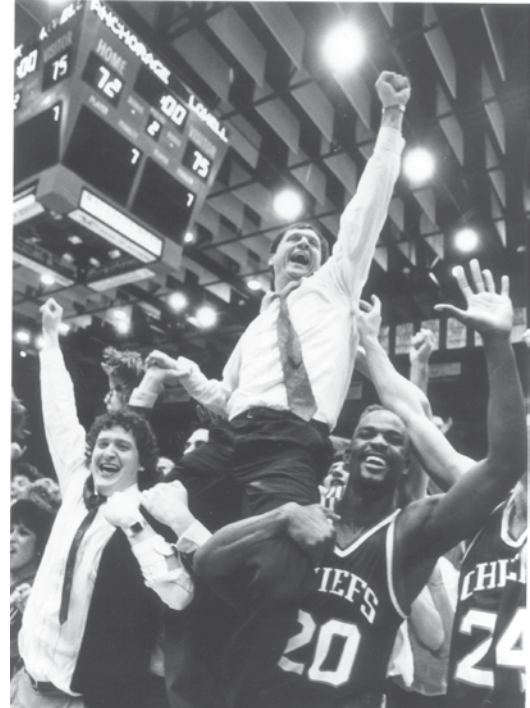
Founded in 1980 as the Northeast-7, the charter members were American International College, Assumption College, Bentley College, Bryant College, the University of Hartford, Springfield College and Stonehill College.

Saint Anselm was admitted to the conference in 1981 and Merrimack joined the fold in 1984, replacing Hartford, now a Division I institution. The conference expanded from eight to 10 teams with the addition of Quinnipiac and Saint Michael's in 1987.

Springfield left the conference for Division III following the completion of the 1994-95 academic year. The conference returned to 10 teams in 1996-97 with the addition of Le Moyne College and then expanded to 11 in 1997-98 with the inclusion of Pace University. In 1998-99, the conference reverted to 10 schools when Quinnipiac shifted its programs to Division I.

The NE-10 expanded to 15 institutions beginning with the 2000-01 academic year. The five new institutions included Franklin Pierce College, UMass Lowell, Southern New Hampshire University (formerly New Hampshire College), The College of Saint Rose and Southern Connecticut State University.

In addition, the Northeast-10 Conference sponsors 20 championships: men's and women's soccer, field hockey, volleyball, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's cross country, golf, men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, men's and women's lacrosse, football and men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field.

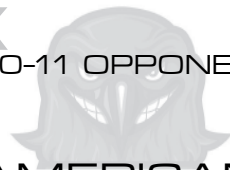

Elad Inbar, a starting forward for the River Hawks, was named the 2004 National Association of Basketball Coaches Division II Player of the Year for his efforts during his senior campaign during the 2003-04 season. He is also the program's all-time leading scorer with 2,099 points.

During that season, the River Hawks had their best finish in program history, going 28-6 on the year, capturing the Northeast-10 Regular Season and Tournament titles, winning the NCAA Tournament East Regionals and making it to the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals, before falling to Humboldt State, 89-82.



John Paganetti ['84]

John Paganetti was a standout player for the Chiefs in the early to mid-80's, came back as a coach during their 1988 DII National Championship year and still contributes to the River Hawk basketball program in many ways to this day. He was inducted into the UMass Lowell Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989, in his first year of eligibility.

He is the program's second all-time leading scorer with 2,091 points and still holds the school record for points in a game (46), most points as a freshman (540), career field goals attempted (1,720) and made (826).

A sellout crowd of more than 2,100 fans packed Costello Gym on Jan. 19, 1985 to see the University of Bridgeport's 7-foot, 7-inch center Manute Bol (#10, above, pictured with ULowell's Andy Corey, #50), who would later enjoy a 10-year career in the NBA with Washington, Philadelphia, Golden State and Miami.

The Purple Knights prevailed, 62-47, and Bol registered 21 points on 7-for-13 field goal shooting, along with 12 rebounds, but ironically, no blocked shots.

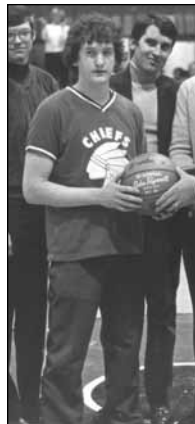

Directions to UMass Lowell

From the North

Traveling South on I-93, take Exit 46 for Route 110/113 (Methuen/Dracut). Follow either Route 110 (into Lowell, then stay on VFW Parkway along the river. Do not cross the river) or Route 113 to campus.

Once in Lowell on the 110/VFW Parkway, go to the fourth traffic light and turn right on University Avenue. Proceed to the next light and turn right again (onto Route 113 East). Go past the first two buildings on the right and Costello Gymnasium is located behind the larger parking lot.

Traveling South from New Hampshire on Route 3, take exit for Route 113 (Tyngsboro/Dunstable). Follow Route 113 East to Lowell until reaching campus.

From the South

Traveling North on I-93, go past I-495 exit and take Exit 46 for Routes 110/113 (Methuen/Dracut) and follow directions above.

Traveling North on Route 3, take exit for Route 4 (Chelmsford/Drum Hill). Enter rotary and take first exit (for Westford St.). Follow to fork (after car dealership) and bear left. Go through two traffic lights and across Rourke Bridge. Turn right at the end of bridge and follow Route 113 East to campus as above (Approx. two miles).

From the East

Traveling south on I-495, take Exit 40 for I-93 North. Follow I-93 North to exit for Routes 110/113 (Methuen/Dracut) and follow directions above.

From the West

Traveling West on I-495, take Exit 35N for Route 3 North and follow directions above.
