STORYLINE

• Maryland (8-1) will host Siena (3-3) Monday at 7 p.m. as part of a five-game homestand. The Terps have won six in a row heading into Monday's matchup.

• This will be the first meeting between the Terrapins and the Saints.

• In Wednesday's matchup vs. Ohio State in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge, Alyssa Thomas led Maryland to a 67-55 victory with her eighth straight double-double. She scored 25 points and grabbed 12 rebounds, while sophomore Tierney Pfirman added a career-high 10 boards. All 10 Terrapins that saw action scored. Maryland is the only team in either conference to remain unbeaten in the Challenge and is 7-0 since it started in 2007.

• Alyssa Thomas was named a Preseason AP All-American yet again this year. She was voted Preseason ACC Player of the Year by both the Blue Ribbon Panel and the league's coaches. Freshman Lexie Brown was voted to the Blue Ribbon Panel's ACC Newcomer Watch List. Thomas was also named to the Wade Watch List and the Wooden Award Preseason Top 30. She and Mincy were both named to the Naismith 50-player Early Season Watch List.

• Thomas is No. 6 on Maryland's scoring list with 1,844 points. She needs 404 points to break Crystal Langhorne's record of 2,247. She is No. 6 on the all-time rebounding list with 955 career boards and is just the seventh Terp to break the 900-mark. She is No. 4 in the Maryland record books in field goals attempted with 1,483 and recently surpassed Vicky Bullett. Marissa Coleman holds the record with 1,603. Alicia DeV Vaughn has played in 111 straight games as a Terrapin and has not missed one.

• Last year, Thomas led the ACC in points (18.8), rebounds (10.3) and assists (5.3) and was the only player in the country to rank in the top 50 in all three stats. The Terps were No. 3 in the country in field goal percentage (.471) and No. 6 in assists per game (17.6).

• The Terrapins ended their challenging 2012-13 season with a 26-8 overall record. They went 14-4 in ACC play and finished tied for second in the league. The Terrapins went to their 10th Sweet Sixteen in school history and fifth in head coach Brenda Frese's 11 postseasons.

► 2013-14 SEASON OUTLOOK

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The 2012-13 Terrapins learned a lot of lessons last year. They learned about toughness, togetherness, dealing with adversity and always fighting, no matter what the circumstances may be. Dealt four season-ending injuries, Maryland had six available players in some cases. While 2013-14 should be a completely different story, those lessons will stay with the Terrapins.

"I said at our banquet last season, in its own way, that was one of the most special seasons I've had as a coach," head coach Brenda Frese said. "We asked a lot of a small group of players and they gave us everything they had to give. The staff was incredible during a season that challenged us with a lot of adversity. We improvised continuously as things changed. We barely practiced on the court for much of the season. And through it all, we tried to keep playing Maryland basketball the way we want to play it. There were some limitations, but for the most part, I think we did that. I was really proud of them all."

"There was a brief stretch at the start of last season that nobody outside the program could fully appreciate. It was an incredible testament to our staff holding things together. We'd just lost two players to ACLs, we were shifting players around and everything was discombobulated. We lost a road game at St. Joe's. Then we had our third player go down with an ACL. There was so much going on, yet we got through it and smoothed things out- even with more challenges on the horizon. That's one of those times that really tests everyone on our team and it showed the character that's within this program. It makes me feel really good as the leader."

"I think we all learned last year that no matter what adversity strikes, when we hold together, we can accomplish amazing things together. I also got confirmation as a coach for what I believed- you never give your players excuses for reasons

to fail or lower their standards. I've seen coaches go through stuff and right away they're crying the blues. It gives their players an out. I was not going to do that no matter what and we are all so proud of how we continued to fight."

This year, the Terrapins have every reason to believe they can build off the 2012-13 Sweet Sixteen appearance and top-two finish in ACC play. With 10 letter-winners returning, four of five starters and four talented freshmen, so far, all lights are green for the Terps.

"I'm really excited about this group," Frese said. "We're going to play the brand of basketball that we love, which is attractive to fans and makes it fun for our players. The biggest difference will be going from as few as six available players at one point last season to now having 14. Already, just the sound of practice and workouts is much louder. We're going to have a variety of players that each bring different qualities to our team. We should be able to really move Alyssa Thomas around a lot on the floor this year, whereas last season, we simply couldn't do that."

"Maybe for my first time as a head coach, we will have competition at almost every position. We've never had that before. And however it plays out, we're going to have firepower to bring into the game at different times.

New Faces

Four freshmen - Lexie Brown (Suwanee, Ga.), A'Lexus Harrison (Baltimore, Md.), Brionna Jones (Havre de Grace, Md.) and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough (Aliquippa, Pa.). The quad makes up the nation's fourth-ranked recruiting class and Frese's fifth top five class in her 11 years.

"We felt like this freshman class was an important one for us, because they get one year to play with our seniors and then help us transition into the next phase," Frese said. "They've each already shown us reasons to be excited about their

futures. Our fans are going to love them. They'll each bring some different dimensions to our team. That being said, every player we've ever had here at Maryland has their share of ups and downs as freshmen. It's really challenging, making the move from high school to high major basketball and college life. The great thing is we have terrific built-in support."

"Lexie Brown can really shoot the ball and get on a roll. She's not afraid of big moments and wants the ball in pressure situations. Lexie arrives with a pedigree that most others don't have when it comes to growing up around basketball."

"Shatori Walker-Kimbrough has been working her tail off since the day she arrived early this summer. I don't think we've had a two guard with her combination of ability and length. She's thin, but she's wiry strong. She's also a terrific competitor. And really, this is the first time she's been full-time basketball. In high school, she also played volleyball and was a terrific jumper on the track team."

"A'lexus Harrison is going to be a really fun player to watch develop over her four years here at Maryland. She has an athletic ability that is off the chart. Now our job is to help her get the rest of her game to that same level."

"Brionna Jones has been limited by returning from injury this preseason, but we have been able to put her in certain segments of workouts and practices. She is a true low post player and is really strong. We've already seen flashes of what she'll eventually be able to do for us. She's also another player who has fully embraced our basketball performance program and we've already seen the changes in her body."

Point Guards

Sophomore Chloe Pavlech stepped up in the point guard role for the Terrapins last year and drew the admiration of fans and coaches around the country. With redshirt sophomore Brene Moseley healthy and with the addition of freshman Lexie Brown, the point guard position is one where the Terrapins will have a plethora of depth.

"We should have three players capable of running the team on the floor this season. Chloe got more experience last season than I think even she expected and she really did well. She's a pretty consistent kid and I know what to expect from her," Frese said.

"Brene Moseley did some really good things for us as a freshman, including delivering big shots at big moments. She was kind of the first scoring point guard we've had here since Kristi Toliver. We were expecting more from her as a sophomore, but that got cut short by injury. So, we'll see where Brene is at coming back. Because we have a little depth, I won't have to ask too much too soon."

"It feels like Lexie Brown has been a part of our program for a long time, because she committed before her sophomore season of high school, but she hasn't played a game for us yet. We're excited she's finally here and what she can do for us. Her challenge will be adapting to the college game, learning her teammates and learning what we run. The great thing is that she's capable of all that."

Wings

As the story goes for the Terrapins this year, options are flowing at nearly every position, including the wing. With the nation's most versatile player in Alyssa Thomas, Coach Frese has more than enough weapons at her disposal.

"We're going to have some options on the wing that allow us to do different things. Of course, it all starts with Alyssa Thomas, who will go down as one of the best to ever play here. Katie Rutan did some really good things for us last season and is someone that has fully bought into our Basketball Performance program. She's had an amazing offseason," Frese said.

"Sequoia Austin became a rotation player for us last season. For a kid that came in as a walk-on, she's been more than we could have ever asked in every way possible. She's just a tremendous person and means so much to our program. Tierney Pfirman, like Alyssa, could be listed as a guard or a forward, because she's versatile. She was starting at the two guard spot last season after Laurin Mincy went down and had some really good games. I thought Tierney and Alyssa played well together. We're hoping both Tierney and Laurin can get back to their best form on the court, because they can each really play."

"Shatori Walker-Kimbrough is the new face at this position and her potential is

tremendous. She can score and she can be disruptive defensively. She's going to be a really good player for us."

Frontcourt

The Terps' biggest strength the last few was dominating inside - on the glass and scoring in the paint. They led the ACC, and the nation for most of the year, in rebounding with over 44 rebounds a game. They finished on the glass as well, averaging over 37 points a game inside.

"Alicia DeVaughn returns for her senior season and we all know how hungry she is to have a great year," Frese said. "She worked hard this offseason to keep developing her game. We know she brings a level of toughness to our team and she's a terrific teammate. Malina Howard had a tremendous offseason and looks great so far in fall workouts. She's continuing the process of transforming her body - she's faster, quicker, more agile and more confident. Her work ethic is second to none. I expect a good season out of her."

"A'lexus Harrison will be like an undersized forward for us. She brings great energy and her athletic ability allows her to play a lot bigger than her size. She's very fast and will be a tough match-up for some folks. She's a player I really think has a chance to grow in our program. Brionna Jones will give us a true, low-post presence. She's strong and can take care of herself when the game gets physical. We'll see what her knee allows her to do as the season progresses, but eventually, she's going to help us. When the ball hits her hands, she catches it and she can finish around the basket. Those are essential qualities for a low post player."

Staff

Frese is fortunate enough to bring back her staff of Tina Langley, Marlin Chinn and David Adkins back for a fifth year all together. In their four years together, they've gone 102-34 (.750) with three NCAA tournament appearances, an Elite Eight appearance, a Sweet Sixteen and an ACC Championship.

Frese welcomes two not-so-new faces to the staff. Libby Ellis is a 2012 graduate from Maryland that worked all four years as a student manager and director of operations intern. She spent last season as the assistant to the recruiting coordinator and has been promoted to director of operations. Winston Gandy was a practice player that was always looking to learn. A 2013 graduate of Maryland, he has been hired as the assistant to the recruiting coordinator.

"We have a few new faces on our support staff. Libby Ellis is our new director of operations. Libby loves this program and has really grown up with it. She came to camp here, then became a manager, then got an entry level staff position and now she's our director of operations. She keeps moving her way up and she's one of those people that everybody loves," Frese said.

"We also added Winston Gandy as our assistant to the recruiting coordinator. Like Libby, Winston is really sharp and a go-getter. He was a scout guy, practice player for us while he was a student here. He was so good and such a hard worker, that we had to find a way to keep him around. He's the kind of guy that will work endless hours and do whatever is asked of him. We're really glad we have him on staff."

"We Will"

Frese and her staff have developed the tradition of choosing a team theme for each season. After the 2010-11 season, Frese and the staff felt like their young Terrapins didn't finish games, so they developed the theme of, "Fight to Finish," for the 2011-12 season. Last year, the staff wanted to push the team to have everyone working their hardest in all aspects of life, on and off the court, so they chose the theme, "All in to W.I.N." The W.I.N. stood for What's Important Now. Now, Frese and her staff have chosen the theme of, "We Will."

"We're playing on the Under Armour theme of 'I will', which is so prevalent," Frese said. "It's all about the 'we' in our team. We will hold each other accountable. We will be disciplined. We will prevail. We will fight each and every play for each other."

Thomas and Laurin Mincy were both voted to the Naismith Early Season Watch list in November. Lexie Brown was named to the ACC's Newcomer Watch List.
- Last year, Brenda Frese was voted ACC Coach of the Year by the league's head coaches for the first time in her career. She's been named Coach of the Year in every conference she's coached in - the ACC, the Big Ten and the MAC. She and Nebraska head coach Connie Yori are the only coaches in the country to be named Coach of the Year in three leagues, as well as named National Coach of the Year.
- Brenda Frese signed a multi-year extension earlier this month which will keep her at Maryland through at least 2021. With rollovers, she could be on the Maryland sidelines through 2025. Now in her 12th season at Maryland, Frese increased the program's winning percentage by 10 percent (currently over 74 percent from 64 percent). She's brought the program its first national championship, four Elite Eights and nine NCAA Tournament appearances in her 11 postseasons. Frese has also brought in nine top 15 recruiting classes and brought home two ACC titles.
- The Terps are again one of the nation's tallest teams with their average height just over 6-1. Eight of the team's 14 players are over the 6-0 mark. Six are 6-2 or taller.

Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team, especially over the last decade.

- The Terps are 453-126 (.782) all time in College Park, dating back to the inaugural 1971-72 season.
- Maryland is 160-31 (.838) all time in Comcast Center.
- The Terps are also 160-31 (.838) at home under Brenda Frese, whose first season in College Park was the inaugural season of Comcast Center. They went 15-1 (.938) at home in 2012-13.
- The Terrapins are 102-6 (.944) all-time in non-conference games in Comcast Center.
- The Terps own one of the longest home win streaks in ACC history. They won 48 straight home games starting Nov. 9, 2007 with a 76-52 season-opening win over Princeton. The streak ended on Jan. 21, 2010 with an 80-77 loss to Miami.

Milestones, Streaks, etc.

- Thomas is No. 6 on Maryland's scoring list with 1,844 points. She needs 404 points to break Crystal Langhorne's record of 2,247. She is No. 6 on the all-time rebounding list with 955 career boards and is just the seventh Terp to break the 900-mark. She is No. 4 in the Maryland record books in field goals attempted with 1,483 and recently surpassed Vicky Bullett. Marissa Coleman holds the record with 1,603. Alicia DeVaughn has played in 111 straight games as a Terrapin and has not missed one.
- The Terrapins have won the battle on the boards in 7 of 9 games this year. They outrebounded their opponents in 32 of 34 games last year, and have won the battle on the boards in 72 of 80 games since the beginning of the 2011-12 season, and 100 of 111 games, dating back to the 2010-11 season.
- The Terps have won 102 of 108 non-conference games since moving into Comcast Center.
- Maryland has won at least 20 games in nine straight seasons.
- Senior Alyssa Thomas has scored in double digits in 98 of 109 games in her career and the last seven straight.
- Alicia DeVaughn has played in 111 consecutive games since she began her Terrapin career and has not missed a game.

2013-14 Maryland Women's Basketball

Glass Cleaners

- The Terps will look to still be one of the most dominant rebounding teams in the country, just as they have been the last few years. So far this year, they've outrebounded their opponents, 418-282 and own a margin of +15.1.
- They led the ACC in rebounding in each of the last three seasons, dating back to the 2010-11 season. They outrebounded their opponents last year 1503-1037 for the second-best rebounding margin in the nation (+13.7). They were second only to Liberty (+16.9).
- The Terps are averaging 14.7 offensive boards per game so far this year. They averaged 15.4 offensive rebounds per game in 2012-13.
- Of their 1,098 missed shots last year, the Terps grabbed 525 offensive boards, which means they grabbed an offensive board on 47.8 percent of their missed shots.
- This year, they've grabbed a rebound on 286 of their opponents' 347 missed shots, which is over 82 percent. Of their opponents' 1,293 missed shots last year, the Terps grabbed 978 defensive boards, which means they grabbed the rebound on 75.6 percent of their opponents' missed shots.
- Maryland outrebounded opponents 1631-1167 in its 36 games in 2011-12 for a margin of +12.9, which was second in the country to Liberty's +15.6. They won the battle on the boards in 33 of 36 games.
- The Terrapins ended the 2010-11 season No. 5 in the NCAA in rebounding margin (+12.1).

Pound It Inside

- The Terrapins beat their opponents in the paint in 2012-13, 1302-795. That's 37.2 points in the paint per game for the Terrapins to their opponents' 22.7. This year, they've outscored them inside 344-220 (38.2 to 24.4).
- The Terps outscored their opponents in the paint in 2011-12 1,264-843, for an average of 37.2 to 24.8.

All Hands on Deck

- The Terps had four or more players in double figures in six of nine games this year.
- With 14 players available to head coach Brenda Frese, 13 have seen time this year, 10 have played in every game and 10 are averaging 12.0 minutes or more.
- Ten Terrapins are averaging over 5.0 points per game.

Terps in the Polls

Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country. The Terrapins have been ranked for 59 straight weeks, dating back to the preseason poll of the 2010-11 season.

- Maryland ended the 2012-13 season ranked No. 12 in the final Associated Press poll and No. 11 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' poll.
- The Terps made their first appearance in the AP Top 5 on Dec. 12, 2011 for the first time since they ended the 2008-09 season ranked No. 3.
- This marks the 147th week head coach Brenda Frese has had a team ranked in her career.

Terps vs. Ranked Team Under Frese

Since Brenda Frese took over in 2002-03, Maryland has 47 wins over Top 25 teams, including eight two seasons ago and four last year.

- The Terps won 10 games over ranked teams in the 2005-06 season, including six over top 10 opponents and four over top five teams.
- Under Frese, Maryland has beaten 16 top ten teams, most recently No. 5 Duke on Feb. 19, 2012 and

- Maryland has five wins over No. 1 teams in its history, including two in Frese's time. The Terrapins beat No. 1 North Carolina twice in the 2005-06 season.

Maryland in the ACC

Maryland is in its 36th season as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Terps became a member of in 1977-78 - the first year the ACC had women's basketball. They won the first ACC Tournament in 1978.

- The Terps are 287-212 (.575) all-time in ACC games.
- Under Frese, Maryland is 106-58 in ACC games (.646), including 87-31 (.737) in the last eight years.
- In the last five years, the Terps are 65-25 (.722) in league games.
- Maryland is 59-24 (.711) in ACC games at home in Comcast Center. All are under Frese.

Double-Doubles

Three Terrapins have notched double-doubles in their careers for a total of 53 all together.

- Laurin Mincy notched her first, and only, with 21 points and 12 rebounds in the Terps' Sweet Sixteen win over Texas A&M in March 2012.
- Alicia DeVaughn had three last year. She has five in her career.
- Alyssa Thomas added her eighth straight with 25 points and 12 rebounds vs. Ohio State Wednesday.
- Thomas notched the program's second triple-double with 11 points, 12 rebounds and 11 assists vs. George Mason on Dec. 8, 2012. Marissa Coleman had the first with 15 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists vs. UCSB on Dec. 2, 2006.
- Thomas is the first in school history - male or female - to record two triple-doubles. She notched the first in ACC Tournament history with 32 points, 13 rebounds, 10 assists vs. Wake Forest on March 8, 2013.

Thomas Shines

2011 ACC Rookie of the Year Alyssa Thomas had a phenomenal freshman season, leading the team and the ACC in many statistical categories. As a sophomore, she picked up right where she left off en route to being named 2012 ACC Player of the Year and a WBCA All-American. As a junior, she upped her game in more areas, including assists and rebounds and was voted ACC Player of the Year by the Blue Ribbon Panel. She's the first Terrapin to earn the league's top individual honor twice.

- Thomas improved her game in assists and rebounds. She averaged 8.0 boards per game as a sophomore and averaged 10.3 as a junior, as well as 3.2 assists two years ago to 5.3 last year. In 2011-12, she dished 113 assists total and had 181 last season.
- Thomas was voted ACC Preseason Player of the Year by the Blue Ribbon Panel last October.
- Thomas is the second sophomore ever to win ACC Player of the Year, after Duke's Alana Beard did in 2002. Thomas is the fourth Terrapin and third in five years - Vicky Bullett won in 1989, Crystal Langhorne earned it in 2008 and Kristi Toliver was honored in 2009.
- Thomas is the seventh Terrapin to be named a WBCA All-American and first Maryland sophomore. She earned the honor again in 2013 and became the third player in Terps history to be honored in multiple years.
- Thomas was named ACC Tournament MVP in 2012. She is just the seventh player and first underclassman ever to be named Player of the Year and MVP in the same season.
- She had 17 points and 10 rebounds to hit 1000-point mark vs. Navy in the first round of the NCAA tournament. She became 27th Maryland player to break the mark. Thomas is the second-fastest Terrapin to reach the landmark, as she needed only 63 games, while Crystal Langhorne did it in 60.
- She started off her career in the ACC with five double-doubles in her first six ACC games.
- She earned a new Maryland record for Rookie of the Week awards with seven in 2010-11. Previously, Crystal Langhorne and Marissa Coleman were tied with five each.
- She was named to the All-ACC Second Team as a freshman. She was the first freshman to make the Second Team or better since Coleman made the Second Team in 2005.

Mincy Makes Improvements

After recovering from an ACL tear in her left knee suffered as a senior in high school, Laurin Mincy made huge strides in her game in 2011-12 to become an All-ACC Honorable Mention honoree. She tore her right ACL at No. 19 Nebraska on Nov. 28 and sat out the rest of last season.

- Mincy was voted to the Preseason All-ACC Team last October.
- Mincy missed her senior season at University High School in Newark, N.J. due to her injury.
- She saw action in 31 of 32 games and made one start as a freshman. She averaged 16.4 minutes per game and 4.9 points per contest.
- As a sophomore, she averaged 13.1 points per game - an 8.2 improvement. She upped her field goal percentage from .382 as a freshman to .436 last year, and her three-point field goal percentage from .274 to .400.

Attendance Continues to Soar

For the past seven seasons, the Terps have set school records and ranked in the top 10 nationally in overall attendance, home and away. Maryland has played before 100,000 fans in seven consecutive seasons - all

under head coach Brenda Frese. Over the last six years, the Terps have ranked at least sixth nationally in home attendance.

- All 10 of the ACC's top attendances belong to Maryland and all have come under Brenda Frese.
- 15,853 fans came to the Duke game on Feb. 24, 2013 - the seventh-largest attendance in ACC history. The Terps own all 10 of the ACC's top attendance records.
- In 2012-13, 81,821 fans came to see the Terps play at Comcast Center - more than any other ACC school. Maryland's average attendance of 5,114 led the ACC and was top 20 in the nation.

Overtime is Our Time

The phrase, "Overtime is our time!" became one of the catch phrases from the Terps' 2006 title run. That 2005-06 team went 6-0 in overtime games and won the national title in extra time vs. Duke.

- Maryland is 15-2 (.882) in overtime games in head coach Brenda Frese's 11 years.
- In the 2007-08 season, Frese was not on the sidelines for two of the Terps' overtime games. She missed a 97-86 double overtime loss at North Carolina on Jan. 26, 2008 and a 74-71 win at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008, due to her pregnancy with her sons.
- The Terps' only overtime loss with Frese on the sidelines was a 95-91 loss at Florida State on Jan. 16, 2005.

Terps Welcome Three to Class of 2014

Head coach Brenda Frese and her staff signed the 11th top 15 class in her 11 years this November.

- Guard Kristen Confroy (Solon, Ohio), forward Aja Ellison (Burlington, N.J.) and guard Kiara Leslie (Holly Springs, N.C.) all signed on to play for Maryland as part of the class of 2014.
- Confroy is ranked as a top 50 player and is averaged 17.9 points, 4.2 assists, 5.8 rebounds and 3.3 steals per game through her three years.
- Ellison is ranked No. 45 overall by numerous sites. She averages a double-double with 10 points and 12 rebounds. She is coached by her father, Pervis Ellison, who was named Final Four MVP in 1986.
- Leslie is ranked No. 52 overall and earned a scout's grade of 96. Older brother, C.J. Leslie, played at NC State.

Team Tyler

In September 2010, Brenda Frese's two-year old son, Tyler Thomas, was diagnosed with leukemia. He started treatments immediately at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore and has been clear from leukemia cells since shortly after.

- In 2010-11, some starters from the 2006 national championship team - Marissa Coleman, Shay Doron, Laura Harper and Kristi Toliver - got together and formed the Team Tyler Foundation.
- The Team Tyler Foundation raises money for leukemia research and patients at Hopkins.
- The Terps joined Apple Ford Lincoln to present the third annual Team Tyler Day game Feb. 24, 2013 vs. Duke, along with the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, and the There Goes My Hero Foundation.
- The There Goes My Hero foundation, which is based out of Bel Air, Md., works to expand the bone marrow donor registry and find matches for all those diagnosed with leukemia through many support programs. At the Team Tyler game, the There Goes My Hero foundation was there to register donors.

Maryland Among ACC's Best Last Ten Years

Maryland has been one of the top programs in the ACC over the past 10 seasons.

- With 286 wins since 2002, Maryland is third among all ACC schools in wins.
- The Terrapins have finished in the top four of the ACC in seven of the last eight years.
- The Terps captured the 2009 ACC regular-season title and the 2009 and 2012 ACC Tournament championships.

Fear the Turtle!

Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country:

- Maryland's bid to the 2013 NCAA Tournament marked its 10th straight postseason appearance. Nine of those 10 were NCAA Tournament bids.
- The Terps have averaged 26.8 wins per season the last 10 years, including nine consecutive 20-win seasons from 2004-2013.
- Frese has led the Terps to four 30-win seasons. 2005-06 marked the first 30-win season for the program, as the Terrapins went 34-4 and won the 2006 NCAA title. The Terps won 30 games in 2007-08 when they went 33-4 and in 2008-09 when they went 31-5. Last year, the Terps notched the program's fourth 30-win season with their record of 31-5.
- The Terrapins have won at least one postseason game (NCAA, or WNIT) in each of the last 10 seasons.
- The Terps have advanced to the NCAA SWEET 16 five times in the last 10 years.
- Maryland earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament in 2008 and 2009 and a No. 2 seed in 2006, 2007 and 2012.

There was no better fit for the University of Maryland women's basketball program than head coach Brenda Frese. The 2002 Associated Press (AP) National Coach of the Year arrived in College Park with great expectations and has not disappointed. Reviving a once-prominent women's basketball program back to the national stage, her high work rate and positive attitude has resulted in two ACC titles, 11-straight top 15 recruiting classes and a National Championship in 2006. Frese has balanced that strong work ethic with a fun and family-friendly environment, also becoming a wife and a mother of twin boys, giving birth to them in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. With the birth of her twins in February of 2008, she becomes one of only six coaches to win a national championship and be a parent.

Now in her 12th season at Maryland, Frese has guided Maryland to a National Championship in 2006, 10 winning seasons, nine-straight 20-win seasons, four 30-win campaigns and nine trips to the NCAA Tournament. She signed a four-year extension in August 2011.

In 2006-07, Maryland also received its first-ever No. 1 preseason national ranking, remaining in the top spot in the polls for 10-consecutive weeks.

"This has been an incredible journey and winning the national championship in 2006 was just the beginning," Frese said. "My coaching staff and I had the belief we could win a national championship here at Maryland. With all the administrative support, the first-class facilities - we knew we could build something great. We did not set any timetables, but what we have achieved so far ... it's beyond expectations."

Former Athletics Director Deborah A. Yow courted the 2002 AP National Coach of the Year because of Frese's reputation for making amazing turnarounds and her relentless work ethic in recruiting. Described as dynamic, overachieving, determined and enthusiastic, the 43-year old coach is one of college basketball's stars. Standing atop the podium in Boston in 2006, Frese became the fifth-youngest coach (age 35) in NCAA history to win a national title and only the ninth to win in her first trip to the Final Four.

Frese has built the team's success around recruiting, hard work and a positive atmosphere. The instant she arrived on campus, she determinedly worked the recruiting trails in an effort to reclaim the elite status Maryland once had in the 1980s. Success came quickly and early. Before she even coached a game in the newly-constructed Comcast Center, she received commitments from a pair of high school All-Americans, including Shay Doron, who went on to become a three-time All-ACC pick and a WNBA Draft selection. In all, 26 high school All-Americans have donned a Maryland uniform under Frese's reign.

All 10 of Frese's recruiting classes at Maryland have been ranked in the top-15, including nine rated in the top-10 and five in the top five. The landmark signings of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman were rated No. 2 in the country, while the class of Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver was ranked No. 4 - the core of the Terps' national championship team. Her 2010 batch of Terrapins included three high school All-Americans and a No. 2 national ranking.

Frese's recruiting classes have lived up to their billing and her pupils have earned numerous accolades.

In 2012, Alyssa Thomas became the first Maryland sophomore to be named a WBCA All-American, and was also named to the AP All-American First Team and the USBWA All-American Team. The first Terp in 17 years to garner All-American nods in 2006, Langhorne was a three-time AP and USBWA All-American, the program's first multiple All-American. She was selected a WBCA All-American in 2007, the first in school history since 1989, and then again received the accolade in 2008.

Toliver repeated Langhorne's AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American "trifecta" in 2008. The legendary point guard, however, became the first Terp in school history to be named to the AP's All-America First Team as a senior in 2009 - to go along with another set of WBCA and USBWA All-American laurels. Coleman, Toliver's classmate, also earned AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American honors at the conclusion of her illustrious senior campaign in 2009.

Frese's players have also received numerous ACC honors. Most recently, Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year as a sophomore in 2012. She is just the second sophomore in the history of ACC women's basketball to earn the league's most prestigious honor and went on to win the ACC Tournament MVP honor that year. Thomas garnered the league's top honor in her junior season as well. In her final season, Langhorne was selected the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Terp to win the award in nearly 20 years. Toliver followed suit in 2009 - the third Terp ever to win the award. In 2005, Langhorne became the program's first ACC Rookie of the Year since 1991. Coleman followed in her footsteps by nabbing the honor during the Terps' championship campaign in 2006. Center Lynetta Kizer and Thomas made it four Terps in six years to be named the league's top freshman when they won in 2009 and 2011.

In all, 28 Terps have received All-ACC citations in Frese's 11 years, including a school-record four in 2008 when Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver and Harper were selected and in 2012 when Thomas, Tianna Hawkins, Laurin Mincy and Lynetta Kizer were honored. Six Terps have been First Team ACC selections 10 times in Frese's tenure. Langhorne became Maryland's first three-time, first team all-conference selection and the first to be named All-ACC four times. Coleman joined Langhorne as the lone Terps to ever be selected to an All-ACC team four times, stamping her three second-team honors with a first-team selection in 2009. In fact, of Maryland's six players all-time to be selected All-ACC three times or more, five of them were recruited by Frese (Doron, Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver, Thomas).

Numerous Terps have also garnered national recognition under Frese. Toliver became the first Terrapin to earn the highest point guard honor in the country, winning the Nancy Leiberman Award in 2008, after being a finalist the previous year. Several have earned spots on national player of the year candidate lists, making history in the fall of 2006. That year, for the first time ever, four players from the same team were selected preseason candidates for the WBCA's prestigious Wade Trophy

when Doron, Coleman, Langhorne and Toliver were put on the Watch List. All five starters were tabbed preseason honorees for the Naismith Award, also a first in the history of the award.

Maryland has rewritten several records over the last eight seasons. In 2007-08, the Terps became the first team in NCAA history to have four active players with at least 1,000 points on the same roster. That year, school records were broken for most home wins (21), which is also believed to be an NCAA record. The team opened the 2006-07 campaign winning 18-straight games, setting the program record for best start to a season. Maryland ended the 2008-09 campaign having won a school-record 36-straight home games, thanks to undefeated home marks in two successive seasons, and 40-consecutive non-conference games at the Comcast Center. In the 2009-10 season the Terrapins extended that streak to 48, a Maryland men's and women's basketball record.

In 2005-06, the team's 34 wins set a school record, shattering the previous mark of 29. The championship squad also set new standards for highest road winning percentage (.900), points (3,166), field goal attempts (2,363), 3-point field goals (216), 3-point attempts (540), free throws (690), free throw attempts (924), team free throw percentage (.747), rebounds (1,720) and blocked shots (195).

Numerous individual records have also fallen in recent years. Among the most notable are the career scoring and rebounding records, which Langhorne shattered, becoming the first-ever Terrapin to score 2,000 points and to grab 1,000 rebounds - an elite list of which Coleman later joined.

Maryland's rise into the upper-echelon of, not only the ACC, but in the country, has bolstered the excitement surrounding the team. Over the last ten years, the program has ranked in the top-25 in the nation in attendance, including top-10 rankings in five of the last 10 seasons. In 2007, Maryland recorded the nation's largest one-season improvement in home attendance, averaging 9,533 fans in 16 games, almost double the average from the previous season (4,183) - with more than 150,000 people making their way through the Comcast Center turnstiles, a school-record. By the end of the '07 campaign, the Terps were sixth in the nation in average attendance and fourth in overall attendance, as 241,280 spectators filled the stands at home and on the road to watch the Terps play in 34 games. In 2008, Maryland hosted over 160,000 fans in 21 games and was ranked eighth in the nation in average attendance that year, followed by a No. 6 ranking in 2009 (133,336 in 15 games).

One of the highlights of the 2006-07 campaign was the announcement of two sellout games in Comcast Center, the first- and second-ever in the young facility. The stands were filled to capacity when the Terps hosted North Carolina on Jan. 28, 2007, breaking the ACC's single-game record, the first women's basketball sellout since 1992. The record was matched in the regular-season finale on Feb. 18, 2007, when Duke came to College Park.

Maryland owns all 10 of the conference's top-10 single-game attendances, nine coming since Frese has roamed the sidelines.

In the classroom, the Terps have also been all-star students. 24 of Frese's Terps have been named to the ACC Honor Roll, while five have received Academic All-American nods by ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA.

Tina LANGLEY

Associate Head Coach • 6th year • West Alabama '96

Tina Langley is in her sixth season at Maryland and 16th in coaching overall. She was promoted to associate head coach in the summer of 2011.

Langley made an instant impact her first season with the Terps. She served a crucial role in helping to lead the Terps to their first ACC Championship in 20 seasons and helped secure one of the nation's top recruiting classes for 2010. In her first five years in College Park, Langley has helped the Terrapins to a 133-39 (.773) record, two Elite Eights, four NCAA Tournament appearances and two ACC championships. In three of her first four years, she worked with the Terps' post game and helped them become the top rebounding team in not only the ACC, but in the nation. Their +12.9 on the boards in 2011-12 was No. 2 in the NCAA, second only to Liberty.

As Coach Frese's top assistant, Langley's responsibilities include coordinating the Terps' recruiting efforts, assisting in player development, scouting, and on the court coaching.

"Tina jumped right in and made a huge impact for us. Her work ethic is nothing short of stellar, she has an excellent demeanor with our student-athletes, and she has an exceptional ability to take on many roles and responsibilities," said head coach Brenda Frese, "She possesses all the characteristics we need in a coach to make a positive impact on our recruiting efforts, player development, and our program as a whole. I'm looking forward to working by her side again this season."

In addition to her passion, determination, and work ethic, Langley has significant coaching experience. She had coaching stints at Toledo, Clemson and Georgia. She has been instrumental in recruiting, game preparation and floor management in each of her stops.

Langley spent five seasons at the University of Toledo, beginning her coaching career with the Rockets as a graduate assistant coach in 1998-99, before moving up to recruiting coordinator and eventual associate head coach during the 2002-03 campaign. She helped the Rockets reach the postseason three times, including two NCAA Tournament appearances. During her tenure, Toledo also won three Mid-American Conference regular season titles (1999, 2001, 2003) and two conference tournament crowns (1999 and 2001).

At Toledo, Langley was responsible for all facets of the program, including recruiting, scouting of opponents and coordinating the team's academic efforts. She helped to sign two nationally ranked classes, the Rockets accumulated a 101-38 record (.679) during her time.

Langley then joined the staff at Clemson in 2003, under head coach Jim Davis. In her two years with the Tigers, the team advanced to the 2004 WNIT while also orchestrating a CU-record six-signee class, which was ranked in the top 30 nationally in just her first season.

After her stop at Clemson, Langley was hired at the University of Georgia as the recruiting coordinator. Langley left coaching for a couple years and earned her second master's in Community Counseling from the University of Alabama, specializing in college mental health. She was named the Most Outstanding Graduate Student in 2008.

Langley played basketball and volleyball for two seasons at Beville State Junior College before transferring to the University of West Alabama, where she lettered twice in basketball as a guard/forward. She graduated from UWA with a degree in special education in 1996, and earned her first master's degree in Recreation and Leisure with an emphasis in recreation administration from the University of Toledo. Langley resides in Laurel, Md.



Marlin CHINN

Assistant Coach • 5th year • Hampton '92

Marlin Chinn joined Brenda Frese's coaching staff in June 2009 following a successful four-year stint at Seton Hall, where he spent three seasons as the Pirates' top assistant and recruiting coordinator.

In his first four years in College Park, he's helped lead the Terrapins to a 102-31 (.767) record, three top-four ACC finishes, three NCAA Tournament appearances, an Elite Eight finish, a Sweet Sixteen and an ACC title. In 2012, Chinn was named one of College Insider's Top 10 Women's Basketball assistant coaches.

"We have always been about family first here at Maryland and it's pretty special to bring Marlin back home," Frese said. "This is where he wants to be and he already knows why Maryland is an incredible place. As we got to know each other, we quickly found Marlin shares common traits with us - loyalty, work ethic, care and concern for people and he is a tremendous recruiter. We feel as though Marlin will help us continue to set the bar high for excellence here at Maryland. We're excited to welcome him to our family."

In Chinn's second season on Phyllis Mangina's staff at Seton Hall, the Pirates posted their first winning record in Big East play in six years en route to a 13-win improvement from the previous season. During his tenure at Seton Hall, Chinn helped secure a top-30 national recruiting class in 2007, recruited a pair of All-Big East Rookie Team selections as well as recruiting and coaching two All-Big East performers.

The Archbishop Carroll High School alum previously spent seven seasons at Mount St. Mary's from 1998-2005, serving as top assistant for The Mount. There, he recruited five Northeast Conference All-Rookie Team choices, including the 2005 NEC Rookie of the Year. Chinn helped lead Mount St. Mary's to a pair of NEC regular-season titles in 1999 and 2001.

Prior to landing on the college scene, Chinn served as assistant men's high school coach locally at Theodore Roosevelt High School (1997-98) and Archbishop Carroll High School (1994-97).

Chinn is a member of both the Black Coaches Association (BCA) and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA). He was recently selected into the 2007 BCA Achieving Coaching Excellence (ACE) for ethnic minority male and female basketball coach's class.

In spring 2011, Chinn served on a panel of the nation's top assistants at the A Step Up: Chicago 2011 event.

A 1992 graduate of Hampton University, Chinn is familiar with the area and is a native of Washington, D.C. Chinn graduated from Hampton with a B.S. in accounting. Chinn served as president of the National Association of Black Accountants in 1992. Chinn currently resides in Largo, Md.



David ADKINS

Assistant Coach • 5th year • Radford '89

David Adkins is in his fifth season at Maryland, joining the Terrapins in June 2009 after a successful career in the high school ranks working with some of the best players in the country. He has helped more than 50 players earn college scholarships, including 41 Division I scholarships.

In his first four years in College Park, he's helped lead the Terrapins to a 102-31 (.767) record, three top-four ACC finishes, three NCAA Tournament appearances, an Elite Eight finish, a Sweet Sixteen and an ACC title.

"David Adkins is one of the most highly-regarded player-development coaches in all of basketball and we are incredibly fortunate to have gained his services," Maryland head coach Brenda Frese said. "I first got to know David through (former Terrapin) Marissa Coleman and (former Maryland men's basketball player) Greivis Vasquez, who rave about him. He's been a big part of some incredible basketball programs and he brings tremendous energy and knowledge."

Adkins joined the Terrapins after spending 17 years as a high school assistant coach, but his coaching laurels reach far beyond the prep ranks.

Widely known in basketball circles as an elite developer of talent, Adkins has helped ripen the games of two NBA players and trained many more, two McDonald's All-Americans, three Jordan All-Americans, three Maryland Gatorade Players of the Year, four Parade All-Americans and three Washington Post Players of the Year during his time teaching the game as a high school assistant, camp counselor and in private workouts. Additionally, Adkins has trained several high-profile European professionals, including former Maryland standout Nik Caner-Medley.

Over the course of his career, he has helped ripen the games of three NBA players and many Division I athletes such as Kevin Durant (Oklahoma City Thunder), Linas Kleiza (Toronto Raptors), Greivis Vasquez (Memphis Grizzlies), Austin Freeman (Georgetown), Jeff Peterson (Arkansas) and Jerai Grant (Clemson).

Adkins, a 1989 graduate of Radford University, also served as an assistant coach for Team USA at the 2006 19-U Nike World Championships and during the 2007 Capital Classic in College Park.

He most recently coached for three years at legendary high school power DeMatha Catholic in Hyattsville, Md., helping the Stags claim two conference titles and two city titles while compiling a record of 83-20. Prior to his stint at DeMatha, Adkins spent seven seasons as an assistant at nationally-acclaimed Montrose Christian High School in Rockville, Md. During his tenure, Montrose Christian was ranked No. 1 in The Washington Post final poll in 2003, 2005 and 2006 where it finished in the USA Today Top-10 each of those years. In total, Montrose Christian finished in the top-25 of the USA Today poll in five of Adkins' seven seasons at the school.

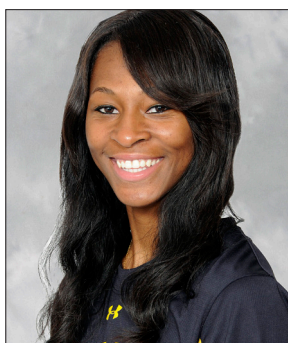

"USF is a really good team," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Obviously, we were able to show our depth. I thought our young kids were fantastic, maybe youthful bliss of not knowing what to expect. I thought they came in and they were bigtime. Our bench depth was a big reason for our success. Just two great teams - we knew it would be tough coming in here. They made a ton of runs at us and I thought we were able to keep our composure and make plays down the stretch.

Maryland used a late 15-2 surge to take a 43-28 halftime lead. The Terrapins shot just 38 percent from the field in the first half and racked up 15 team fouls.

USF rallied in the second half and pulled to 72-68 when Inga Orekhova made two free throws with 40.3 seconds remaining. Alyssa Thomas responded by making a pair free throws 20 seconds later.

As a team, Maryland shot over 82 percent (23-28) from the foul line for the game. Moseley was 8-8 from the line.

Courtney Williams had 21 points for South Florida, and Orekhova, who averaged 12.7 points last season, finished with two points.

The No. 8 Maryland women's basketball team controlled both ends of the floor from the tip Saturday in a 100-59 rout of Texas Southern in the San Juan Shootout Friday in Puerto Rico.

Preseason All-American Alyssa Thomas led Maryland (6-1) with 23 points and 10 rebounds for her sixth straight double-double in the Terps' first seven games. Freshman Shatori Walker-Kimbrough added a new career-high 17, while senior Katie Rutan notched 14, all in the second half. Senior Alicia DeV Vaughn scored 11. Point guards Brene Moseley and Lexie Brown had nine and eight assists, respectively.

Maryland controlled the game from the tip, leading by more than 20 at the break. The Tigers (3-3) chipped into the lead early in the second half, but after a timeout called by head coach Brenda Frese, the Terrapins went on a 12-0 run to answer. Maryland held TSU's Jazzmin Parker, the nation's leading scorer with 28.0 points per game, to 23 points, with just one field goal in the second half.

"Really, really glad to see our production on both ends of the floor," Frese said. "Everyone contributed and that's what you want to see at this time of year. Really proud of our point guards with 17 assists. We felt like we controlled game the whole time. Credit Texas Southern because they came out strong in the second half. I was really proud of how we responded to that."

Thomas and DeV Vaughn combined for Maryland's first seven points and a 7-2 lead. The Tigers called a timeout at 17:55 down 6-0 and came out to find a brief offensive rhythm.

A three by the Tigers' Parker at 13:43 gave them a 10-9 lead, which Walker-Kimbrough answered with a long a two to take the lead back for good. She and Thomas led an 11-0 run over the next few minutes for an eight-point lead.

Brianna Jones hit two free throws to make it 22-14 at 10:37, then the Terps went on an 18-4 run for 20-point advantage with six minutes left in the half.

Maryland led 54-30 at the break, but the Tigers came out of the break hungry and went on an 11-5 run to cut the Terps' lead to 19. A timeout by Frese at 16:34 sparked the Terps on both ends, as they went on a 12-0 run to lead by 30.

Maryland hit the 100-point mark for the first time since a 108-33 win over Delaware State on Dec. 8, 2011 in College Park.

The Terrapins shot 60 percent from the field and hit nine threes. They also controlled the glass, 42-20.
