# 2005 MARYLAND WATER POLO

## HEAD COACH CARL SALYER

*First season at Maryland • Maryland '04*



Carl Salyer, a former water polo player at UCLA and assistant coach at the Naval Academy, is in his first season as the head coach for water polo at the University of Maryland.

Salyer, a southern California native, comes to Maryland after serving as an assistant coach at Navy since 1999. Salyer helped guide the Midshipmen to the 2000 and 2003 NCAA Final Four and a 25-8 final record last season.

"The University of Maryland is lucky to have Carl Salyer to help guide its water polo program to prominence," said associate athletics director Shawn Flynn. "We have somebody with a tremendous amount of experience and local ties, which will benefit our student-athletes and program."

Prior to his time at Navy, Salyer spent five years working with the Naval Academy Aquatic Club. He guided the Navy AC 18 & Under women's team to the National Junior Olympic Championship in August of 2000 and coached the U.S. Men's National Youth "B" Team in the summer of 2002. He also guided the Navy AC to back-to-back championships at the Maui Invitational. His coaching experience on the club level has helped place many men and women in Division I programs.

"I am excited to be part of an athletic program with the success that Maryland has had," Salyer said. "I look forward to building the water polo program to the same level of success."

As a player, Salyer competed at Golden West (Calif.) Community College for two seasons and at perennial national power UCLA for one. Salyer recently earned a degree in kinesiology from the University of Maryland.

## ASSISTANT COACH ADRIAN RAWN

*First season at Maryland • Maryland '04*



Adrian Rawn is in his first season as assistant coach at the University of Maryland. He joins the Terps after spending the last year as the assistant men's water polo coach at Johns Hopkins.

Rawn was a four-year high school All-American in both swimming and water polo at Greenwich High School in Greenwich, Conn. He won the gold at the 2000 Pan-American Games in Barquisimeto, Venezuela, as a member of the 21-and-Under U.S. National Team.

Rawn was a four-year starter for the Naval Academy from 1999-2003, and he played under Maryland head coach Carl Salyer, who was an assistant with the Midshipmen at the time. He helped lead the team to the Final Four in 2000, and he was named All-East First Team from 2000-2003. Rawn was also a member of the Navy varsity swim team for two years.

Rawn spent his summers from 1998-2001 as the swimming and water polo coach at Innis Arden Golf Club in Greenwich, Conn. From 2001-2003, he was a spring water polo coach for U.S. Naval Academy Clinics in Annapolis.

Rawn earned his bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Maryland in 2004, and he is currently seeking his Masters in curriculum and instruction.

## SEASON OUTLOOK

*Terps enter sophomore season with new direction.*

The Maryland women's water polo team is ready for a fresh start.

After going 0-12 last year in the program's inaugural season, the team has a new coach and a new outlook.

"Nobody has any fun when they go 0-12," said first-year head coach **Carl Salyer**.

"My first goal is that [the players] are challenged and that we compete and train at the Division-I level, but also make it an experience where they feel like they're learning, they're having some fun and they're getting better every game we play at the game of water polo. If we can finish this season with them feeling like they've accomplished more as individuals and as a team than they thought was possible, I'll consider that a success."

The Terps took advantage of a non-traditional fall schedule, twice traveling to Bucknell for three games. Maryland competed against its Collegiate Water Polo Association Southern Division rival Bucknell, as well as several top-level club teams.

Salyer said everyone involved, from the team to the opponents to the spectators, noticed the vast improvements the Terps made from one game to the next, and he said he believes the team will greatly benefit from the six exhibition games, which are half of the total games Maryland played all of last season.

"Water polo is basically a game of experience, and the experience was a great one," Salyer said. "I went up there not in an effort to win games; I went up there to get everybody

playing time, get everybody some experience....The goal was to get everybody time, try to bring everybody along as quickly as we can and to hopefully get a lot of those things that a new program has to learn and develop out here in the non-traditional fall season so we hopefully have a little bit of a head start going into the spring season."

The fall season served as much for the players to get that experience in the water as it did to allow Salyer to get to know his new team, and so far, he's liked what he's seen.

"They have a great attitude, they're very coachable, they want to learn, they want to play hard," he said. "They've been working hard, and they've done everything that I've asked of them. I've been very pleased and very proud of what they've done to this point. I expect that we're going to have a real good season."

Despite losing the top two scorers from 2004, Meghan Graves and Laura Nolan, who accounted for almost 50 percent of the Terps' goals, Salyer is not overly concerned.

"I know that they were big parts of the program last year, not only in the pool playing but also leadership-wise out of the pool, but that's part of the nature of being a collegiate program," he said. "You're always going to be graduating players, and that gives the other players a chance to learn and develop and grow into those leadership roles. I see several players taking part in the leadership not only in the pool but outside the pool."

They include fifth-year senior **Elyse Corwin**, who was named team captain, and her sister, junior goalie **Marissa Corwin**. Elyse was third on the team with six goals last year and tied for fourth in steals with 16.

"She's one of the leaders already, taking charge outside of the pool as well as in, and will be somebody who plays real significant minutes and helps us along," Salyer said.

Marissa saw the most minutes in goal and excelled at that position, tallying more than 100 saves.

"She's just a stud," Salyer said. "To have a good, solid goalie is a nice place to start when building a team. She's already made some fantastic plays and she's got a great attitude. The team really enjoys playing in front of her, and I think that's the key for a goalie."

Salyer also will rely on senior **Colleen McShane** and juniors **Allison Kuzniar** and **Rebecca Kadushin**. Despite playing in only four games last year, McShane scored four goals and tallied 13 steals. Kuzniar was second on the team in steals with 18, and she scored five goals.



"Allison will probably be our number one two-meter set person, or center back, which is very similar to center in basketball," Salyer said. "She'll be posting up for the team in front of the goal. That's probably the most physical of all the positions in water polo, and she's already doing a great job."

Kadushin played 11 of the Terps' 12 games in 2004, and this year looks to be the team's top two-meter defender.

"She's tough, she's never-say-die, she'll take a beating and keep on going," Salyer said.

The Terps' regular season boasts a complete schedule this year, with seven league games, as well as five invitational tournaments. Maryland will host the Terrapin Invite Feb. 25-26.

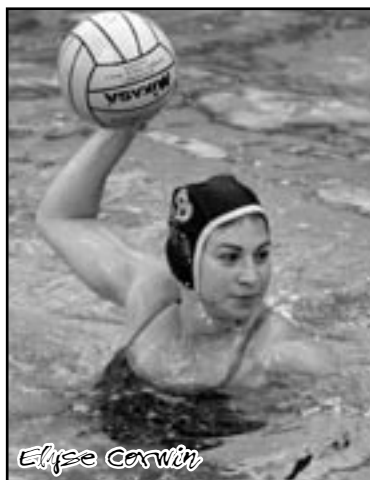
In addition, despite the 2005 season being only the program's second at varsity status, Salyer has scheduled an Alumni Game for March 12, hoping that former club players will return and become involved.

"Maryland has a long history in water polo with the club program that preceded the program when it turned varsity," Salyer said. "Back in the '90s, they had a lot of success. They were nationally competitive on the club level before a lot of teams went varsity....I want to try to include those players as much as possible and make them feel a part of this program as much as possible."

Salyer comes to Maryland after five years as an assistant coach at Navy. He helped lead the Midshipmen to two NCAA Final Four appearances and a 25-8 record last season. He inherits a winless program, but he looks forward to turning the team around.

"I just felt like it was a tremendous opportunity to really build a program that was something special, and I thought that the support was here and the opportunity was here to be real successful," he said.

The Terps' regular season begins Feb. 12-13 at the Princeton Invite. Maryland's first home games are Feb. 25-26 at the Terrapin Invite, with the first conference games March 5 against Princeton and Salem International in Salem, W.Va. The Terps also have a home game March 30 against George Washington, and they host a league weekend April 8-9. The CWPA Southern Division Championship is April 23-24 in Lewisburg, Pa., and the Eastern Championship is April 29-May 1 in Bloomington, Ind.

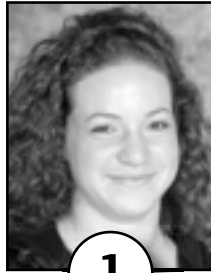
## ATALIE ABRANOVIC

## 2004 SEASON REVIEW

*A look at the Terps' inaugural season.*

In the program's inaugural season as a Division I sport at the University of Maryland, the women's water polo team went winless, posting a record of 0-12, and finished fifth at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Southern Division Championships.

Women's water polo, which had been recognized by the CRC as a club sport since 1986, was elevated to varsity status in July 2003. Former Maryland swimmer Scot Budde led the team as the Terps' first head coach, and several former members of the club team joined the squad.

The Terps' lost their first-ever game 8-1 to Southern Division rival George Washington on March 3 at the CRC Natorium. Senior **Elyse Corwin** scored the first goal in program history with six seconds left in the game.

Maryland dropped its next game to division foe Villanova, 9-3, three days later. Corwin notched her second goal of the season, and seniors Kelly Haisfield and Laura Nolan also scored. Junior goalie **Marissa Corwin** had 13 saves and led the team with five steals.

The next day, the Terps dropped two games. In the first match, they lost to division rival Princeton, 17-7. Nolan gave Maryland an early lead when she scored 50 seconds into the game, but the No. 19 Tigers were too much for the inexperienced Terps to handle. Elyse Corwin added two more goals to her team-leading tally, while senior Meghan Graves and junior **Colleen McShane** also scored twice.

In the afternoon game, The Terps fell to division foe Bucknell, 11-3. McShane again scored twice and added a team-best five steals in the loss. Nolan had Maryland's other goal.

After a two-and-a-half week hiatus, the Terps returned to the pool in Washington, D.C., for a rematch against George Washington, but could not exact revenge, falling to the Colonials, 16-4. The Terps got goals from Nolan, Graves, sophomore **Allison Kuzniar** and senior **Sarah Wahba**.

Two days later, the Terps traveled to Villanova, Pa., and lost to the Wildcats for the second time, 14-6. Maryland and Villanova alternated goals at the start of the first quarter, with Nolan, Corwin and Kuzniar each scoring for the Terps. The score was tied, 3-3, at the end of the first quarter, but the Wildcats pulled away with a 4-0 run to start the second, before Kuzniar scored her second goal of the game with 23 seconds left in the half. Graves and Corwin each scored in the second half.

The next day, the Terps were in Princeton, N.J., for two games of league play. They fell to the Tigers, 12-1, before losing to Bucknell, 15-7. Kuzniar, scored Maryland's only goal of the first game, but the Terps got a much stronger offensive performance against the Bison. Graves notched a hat trick, scoring three times. Nolan scored twice, and Kuzniar and junior **Juli Jordan** each also added a goal.

Three weeks later, the Terps were back in Villanova, Pa., for the CWPA Southern Division Championships as the fifth seed. Maryland dropped its first game, 9-4, to fourth-seeded Villanova. The Terps' took early 1-0 and 2-1 leads on goals by Wahba and Nolan, but a 4-0 Wildcat run put host Villanova ahead for good. Wahba scored her second goal of the game in the fourth quarter, and Marissa Corwin notched her first goal of the season.

Next up was top-seeded Princeton, who shut out the Terps, 11-0, in the first half and won the game, 15-2. Nolan and Graves scored Maryland's two goals. In the final game of the evening, the Terps lost to third-seeded Bucknell, 17-3. Graves scored twice and Nolan once for Maryland.

The next day, the Terps again took on Villanova in the fourth-place game, but again fell to the Wildcats, 13-2, to finish fifth in the division. Villanova blanked Maryland, 7-0, in the first half before Haisfield scored the Terps' first goal of the game in the third quarter. Marissa Corwin had the Terps' other goal.

Nolan and Graves led the team with 10 goals apiece in 2004. Elyse Corwin was third with six goals, followed by Kuzniar with five. Marissa Corwin led the team with 21 steals, followed by Kuzniar with 18, Haisfield with 17 and Elyse Corwin and Nolan with 16. Marissa Corwin saw the most minutes in goal and had 103 saves.

## ALL ABOUT WATER POLO

*What you need to know about the sport of water polo.*

### AN INTRODUCTION TO RULES AND STRATEGY IN WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is excluded for a penalty. In addition, there are several misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

The standard course for a Water Polo game is 30 x 20 meters, but non-championship games may be played in a pool not less than 20 x 10 meters. The pool should be all deep, with championship games played in a minimum depth of 2 meters. Goals are positioned at each end of the course. Each team has seven players. Six are field players and one goalkeeper, who guards a .9-meter high by 3-meter wide goal at the end of the field of play.

The object of the game is to throw a ball into the opponent's goal and to prevent members of the opposing team from scoring on your goal.

The ball is advanced by throwing it or swimming with it. The major restrictions are that a player cannot touch the ball with both hands at the same time (the goalkeeper is an exception to this rule) or strike the ball with a closed fist.

Each contest consists of four seven-minute quarters. The offensive team has 35 seconds of actual playing time to take a shot at the goal, or else it loses possession of the ball. "Shot clocks" indicate the number of seconds remaining before a team will lose possession.

The two-meter line, visible on each side of the pool, delineates the distance from the goal. The offensive team may not pass this line unless preceded by or accompanied by the ball.

The four-meter line is a second mark visible along the side of the pool. Should an offensive player who has possession of the ball and is moving towards the goal be fouled inside this line, she may be awarded a penalty shot from the four-meter line. A penalty shot is awarded by the referee. The offensive player faces the goalkeeper across four meters of water. When the whistle sounds and the referee makes a hand signal, the player takes a shot at the goal.

The seven-meter line marks a point when fouls are committed beyond seven meters, the player fouled may either take a free throw or a direct shot on goal if taken immediately, without faking.

The mid-field mark indicates the center of the field of play. To start each quarter, the ball is placed on the center line and the teams race from their respective goal lines for possession. After a goal, the teams line up on the center line, each in their respective sides, to restart play.

Fouls play an important part in the strategy of water polo. Much of the team's effort will often go into inducing its opponents to commit fouls. There are three kinds of fouls: ordinary, exclusion and penalty.

### ORDINARY FOULS ARE ASSESSED FOR:

- Touching the ball with two hands, if a field player;
- Taking the ball underwater when tackled;
- Impeding the progress of an opponent without the ball;
- Pushing off an opponent;
- Splashing;
- Failing to shoot at the goal within 35 seconds of gaining possession or failure to advance the ball.

For ordinary fouls, the opposing team receives the ball at the point of the foul or at the spot of the ball or from the location of the ball if it is further from the defending team's goal. If the foul was committed inside the two-meter line, the free throw must be taken from the two-meter line. The player taking the free throw has approximately three seconds to put the ball into play. If the ball is not put in play within this amount of time, the team may be charged with delay of game and the opposing team may be awarded the ball.

### EXCLUSION FOULS ARE ASSESSED FOR:

- Intentional kicking or striking an opponent or making disproportionate movements with that intent;
- Interfering with a free throw;
- To impede or push off an opponent before a free throw, goal throw, corner throw or penalty throw is taken;
- Committing an act of misconduct by using foul language or violent or persistent foul play which is unacceptable within the Spirit of the Rules and which is likely to bring the game into disrepute;
- Refusing obedience or to show disrespect to an official or referee;
- Holding, sinking, or pulling back an opponent not holding the ball;
- Committing an overly aggressive ordinary foul;
- Committing an act of brutality.

An exclusion foul is punished by the award of a free throw to the opposing team and the exclusion of the player who committed the foul. The excluded player must move to the re-entry area, nearest to the player's own goal line (located near the team bench side of the pool), without leaving the pool or interfering with play. The excluded player, or a substitution, shall be permitted to return after 20 seconds of actual playing time, from the time of the foul, or after a goal has been scored, or after a change of possession. A player is removed from the remainder of the game with substitution after committing three exclusion fouls.

An act of brutality is defined as kicking or striking or attempting to strike or kick an opponent or official with malicious intent. The offending player is removed from the remainder of the game without substitution, leaving the team of the offending player with one less player than the opponent.

An exclusion leaves one team shorthanded, seven players to six. Many goals are scored during ejections. The game strategy of many teams is to induce the defensive team to commit exclusion fouls. Rather than taking shots on the goal, some teams will patiently work for an exclusion, so as to be able to attack the goal with a one man advantage. When that happens, most teams will go into a "zone defense", whereby each player covers a pre-assigned section of water rather than a particular offensive player.

### **PENALTY FOULS ARE ASSESSED FOR:**

- A defending player to commit any foul within the 4 meter area but for which a goal would probably have resulted;
- For a defending player to commit an act of brutality within the 4 meter area;
- For an excluded player to intentionally interfere with play;
- For an excluded player or a substitute to re-enter improperly during the last minute of the game;
- For the coach of the team not in possession of the ball to request a time out.

A penalty foul is punished by the award of a penalty throw to the opposing team. A penalty throw is a direct shot at the goal and shall be taken by any player of the team to which it is awarded, except the goalkeeper, from any point on the opponents' four meter line.

Much of the action in front of the goal consists of the offensive team passing the ball to the center forward, who plays a position between the two goal posts and the opponents two- and four-meter lines. The object is to draw exclusion fouls that will give the offensive team a six-against-five advantage. Most goals in water polo are scored in this situation.

A "fast break" occurs when a team receives the ball and sprints down the pool at top speed, hoping to score before the defenders can get organized and set up a zone. Fast breaks also tend to produce exclusion penalties; when faced an advantage or with a scoring threat, many defenders will simply pull back the offensive player by the legs or swimsuit.

Goals are scored when the ball completely passes between the front of the goal posts. It need not slam into the back of the net, although the usual shot sails into the goal at tremendous speeds, sometimes exceeding 50 miles an hour.

### **POSITIONS**

#### *Drivers*

Drivers are field players who specialize in driving skills and quick shooting techniques. Drivers must be extremely fast swimmers and have above-average hand-eye coordination. They also focus considerable attention to defensive play.

#### *Goalkeepers*

The goalkeeper, or goalie, is the only player permitted to take the ball in both hands or punch it, so long as they are within their own four-meter line. They patrol the three-meter long goal area and are called upon to make "saves" to prevent an opponent from scoring. Within the four-meter area, the goalie is permitted to stand during play. They are not allowed to go beyond the half-distance line but are allowed to shoot at the opponent's goal, as long as they do so from their half of the pool.

#### *Center Forward (Two-Meter Man or Hole Set)*

The center forward is the offensive player who takes position directly in front of the opponent's goal, between the two-meter and five-meter lines. The best hole players have above-average size, great leg strength, excellent passing abilities and are skilled in specialized goal scoring. They are similar to centers in basketball in that, in a sense, they "post up," looking for a pass that enables them to get a close-in shot at the goal. The center forwards are always closely guarded.

#### *Two Meter Defense*

The Two-meter defender's primary job is to guard the two-meter man or hole set in front of the goal. This player usually guards the biggest player on the other team, and the position requires agility to constantly "front" the hole man to avoid a pass. At the same time, the two-meter defender must be careful not to foul the hole man within three seconds of a foul committed on the perimeter of the pool, or face an ejection. The play at the two meter position is usually the most physical in the pool, and 90% of the positioning happens under water as both the hole set and two-meter defender grab and pull their way to maintain position.

#### *Utility player*

More teams are training utility players who play all positions in the pool. Like a halfback in soccer, the utility players are usually the strongest shooters on the team, and will switch with other positions when he or she sees an opportunity to score. Utility players are most effective when they drive in and play hole set and quickly score against a defender who is inexperienced in that position.

# THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND

## The Campus

By virtually every measure of quality, the University of Maryland has gained national recognition as one of the fastest-rising comprehensive research institutions in the country. The momentum of recent years has poised the university to move it into the top ranks of higher education and take leadership in shaping the research university of the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

The university has enjoyed a decade of momentum in all of the areas that affect quality. The average high school GPA of entering students has zoomed from 3.01 to nearly 3.90, and the average SATs are now more than 1270. The student body is a model of diversity, with minorities making up more than 32 percent of all students, and at least one graduate and undergraduate student from every state in the nation.

The university has 67 graduate and undergraduate programs ranked in the Top 25 by *U.S. News and World Report*, up from just one program in 1991.

Sponsored research and outreach has nearly tripled in the same 10-year period, exceeding \$350 million last year. Private giving also has increased, and the university last year concluded its first campaign by topping its \$350 million goal by more than \$100 million. Alumni Association membership has been growing at an average rate of 10 percent a year since 1992.

One of the largest research universities in the United States, Fall 2002 enrollment was 25,240 undergraduate and 9,561 graduate students. There are 94 undergraduate programs, 89 master's programs, 70 doctoral programs and one first professional degree program. More than 100 centers and institutes are engaged in research and outreach.

Faculty at the University of Maryland, in all fields of knowledge, are engaged at the highest levels of national and international concern. The university's location near the center of federal policy-making and international political and economic activity enables it to play an active role in research and analysis of public policy.

Maryland is one of 30 public universities in the prestigious 63-member Association of American Universities and the only public institution in the Maryland-D.C. area with membership in the nation's most distinguished honor society, Phi Beta Kappa.

## DID YOU KNOW?



In 1991, Maryland had one program listed among Top 25 entrants in the U.S. News & World Report Rankings. Maryland now has 67 programs ranked among the nation's elite, and the university is ranked 18th nationally among public universities.



A report card published in *Technology Review* rated the top U.S. universities in their quest for intellectual property, commercial partners and profits. Smith School of Business No. 8 in information technology, No. 6 in faculty research and No. 7 in entrepreneurship.



In the only undergraduate program rankings released by *U.S. News & World Report*—business and engineering—both the Robert H. Smith School of Business (No. 18) and A. James Clark School of Engineering (No. 24) were ranked among the top 25. The university also ranked in the top 25 for its learning communities (3rd), first-year experience (12th) and service learning programs (24th).



## DR. C.D. MOTE

*University President  
California '59  
Seventh Year*

As the 19th president of the University of Maryland, C. D. "Dan" Mote Jr. has presided since 1998 over a university that is claiming a well-earned position in the top echelon of research universities in the nation. An internationally-respected researcher

and member of the National Academy of Engineering, Dr. Mote is Glenn L. Martin Institute Professor of Engineering. He serves on the Technology Council of Maryland, is co-chair of the Potomac Conference of the Greater Washington Board of Trade and heads its Technology Transfer Committee.

Under President Mote's leadership, Maryland has received national and international notice for innovative undergraduate education opportunities, high-impact research and academic programs, outstanding performing arts, and athletes and athletic teams competitive with the best in the nation.

"The future of the state depends on this university," says Mote. "It is the State of Maryland's most important asset." As president, Dan Mote has been determined to make that asset even greater by nourishing a culture of excellence and civility across the campus, strengthening the university's connections with its various stakeholders, building partnerships with State and national corporations and federal agencies and achieving distinction as an institution where discovery takes place every day and everywhere. The university's progress can be seen in all areas, from its nationally-ranked programs to its success in building external partnerships to its state-of-the-art facilities.

## Quality Programs

Over the past decade, the quality of Maryland's programs and reputation has climbed steadily. In 2003, the University of Maryland moved up to 17th place among public universities in U.S. News & World Report rankings, up from 30th in 1998. We currently have 44 graduate and undergraduate programs and units ranked in the top 15 by *U.S. News & World Report*, up from 5 in 1995.

While our academic successes have spread across the board, the university has emerged as a true powerhouse in business, computer science, earth sciences, engineering, environmental policy, education and journalism. Maryland is one of only 10 public and private universities that have their programs in computer science, mathematics, physics, and engineering each ranked in the top 20. Our College of Education is ranked in the top 20 nationally and 5 of its programs are in the top 10.

## Athletic Excellence

Mote sees athletics as an integral part of the university experience. Indeed athletic success more often than not reflects academic success, he notes. For example, all four of the teams that played in the 2002 NCAA basketball Final Four, including Maryland, are members of the prestigious Association of American Universities, the organization that comprises the leading research and academic universities in North America. "That's no accident," Mote says. "Institutions that are committed to excellence tend to be excellent in every endeavor. Our successes in football, basketball, lacrosse and other sports reflects our culture of quality as much as our successes in engineering, business, education and journalism."

## Faculty Stature

Dr. Mote believes a university's quality is built by its faculty, and under his leadership, Maryland continues to attract the best faculty available. The university recruited a Nobel Laureate in Physics in 2001 and three more Pulitzer Prize winners (to join three already on the faculty). More than 30 of our faculty are members of the national academies, the highest professional recognition attainable.

## DEBORAH A. YOW

*Athletics Director • 11th Year at Maryland*



Deborah A. Yow is in the 11th year of her outstanding tenure as director of athletics at the University of Maryland, a tenure that has seen unprecedented success and achievement in Maryland athletics. Each year has brought about continued improvement and accomplishment in Terrapin athletics. In Yow's 10 years at Maryland, the Terrapins have won a remarkable **nine NCAA national championships** and **graduated its student athletes at an enviable rate** as Maryland athletics has soared to sustained new heights.

The comprehensive success of Terrapin athletics under Debbie Yow's leadership is a clear and compelling testimony of her values of **excellence, teamwork and accountability**.

Likewise, her election to the presidency of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics four years ago is an indication of the wide respect with which she is regarded among its 6,100 members representing 1,600 colleges and universities in the U.S. and Canada. She was singled out by *Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal* as one of the leading administrators in the U.S. and she received the Carl Maddox Sport Management Award presented by the United States Sports Academy for excellence in athletics administration. Yow was selected to serve on the U.S. Department of Education's Commission on Opportunities in Athletics to review the status of Federal Title IX regulations. She has served as the chair of the Atlantic Coast Conference Committee on Television for 2003 through 2004. The committee, comprised of the ACC's athletics directors, is charged with overseeing the league's TV contracts and dealing with issues related to television. Yow led the committee during the recent, very successful renegotiation of comprehensive, multiyear ACC football and basketball contracts with ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 and syndication entities. Additionally, she has represented intercollegiate athletics with presentations in a number of prominent settings such as the Harvard University School of Law conference on "Shaping the Future of Collegiate Athletics" and the *Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal* "National Forum on the Direction of

Intercollegiate Athletics." She was also recently inducted into the State of Maryland Women's Hall of Fame.

Yow, who has served on the NCAA Management Council and the NCAA Division I Budget Committee, is a strong and steady voice on behalf of intercollegiate athletics in America.

Since taking over as AD at Maryland in 1994, she and her staff have:

- Transformed Terrapin athletics into a responsive, goal-oriented organization.
- Balanced all 10 of the department's annual budgets (the first balanced budgets in the 10 years prior to her arrival). The budget has now reached \$43 million annually and the multi-million dollar accumulated operating debt which her administration inherited has been eradicated.
- Greatly enhanced the academic support services provided for student-athletes, with an enviable exhausted eligibility graduation rate of approximately 85 percent for student athletes at Maryland.
- Led the Terrapins to a national all-sports ranking in the upper 10 percent of all NCAA Division I institutions.
- Significantly expanded marketing and fund-raising efforts on behalf of Terrapin athletics. As a result, private gifts to athletics have increased over 350 percent and corporate sponsorship revenues have increased by over 300 percent during her tenure at Maryland.
- Continued to dramatically improve venues and facilities for the department's 27 teams. The Comcast Center for men's and women's basketball and other sports that use the facility is a prime example of the dramatic upgrade of athletic facilities.
- Implemented a strategic management model.
- Developed a comprehensive Internet strategy with management, marketing and fund-raising applications.
- Significantly improved customer care in every area of Maryland athletics.

The most recent achievements of Maryland athletics are exceptional:

- Maryland was selected by *U.S. News & World Report* as one of the Top 20 athletic programs in the nation (for overall quality and competitive excellence).
  - In men's basketball, the Terps won the Atlantic Coast Conference title over Duke in the championship game in 2004 and won the NCAA National Championship in 2002. Under Coach Gary Williams, the men's basketball team has appeared in the last 11 consecutive NCAA Tournaments, one of only five programs to do so.
  - Women's basketball also won its way to the NCAA Tournament in 2004, advancing to the Second Round.
  - In football, the Terps won the 2001 Atlantic Coast Conference championship and played in the 2002 Orange Bowl, and followed with an 11-win season and a 30-3 victory over the University of Tennessee in the Peach Bowl, again followed by a 10-win season and a 41-7 win over West Virginia in the Gator Bowl on New Year's Day 2004.

As a manager and a leader, she clearly models these principles. She is the only known current AD in NCAA Division I who has hired both the National Coach of the Year in football (while at Maryland) and the National Coach of the Year in men's basketball (while at Saint Louis University). Yow is known as "a coach's AD," while also being highly organized and a strategic and proactive leader and administrator. Quite simply, Debbie Yow personifies the relational and management dynamics that are necessary to be an excellent administrator.

A successful former coach at the University of Kentucky and University of Florida, she moved into athletics administration at the University of Florida and the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, followed by a successful tenure as AD at Saint Louis University.

She has authored numerous articles and books on athletics management and human behavior, and is a respected leader in intercollegiate athletics in the United States.

Reflecting on the status of the Terrapin men's basketball program, Maryland's Director of Athletics points out, "Our men's basketball team has become one of America's premier collegiate programs under the leadership of Coach Gary Williams and his staff. We are one of only five institutions to advance to the NCAA postseason tournament in each of the last 11 years, and

the only team in the ACC to do so."

Summing up the entire athletics program, our athletics director recently stated, "We have the finest student-athletes, coaches, support staff and administrative team in America. It is because of their courage, hard work and cooperative spirit that we now have a strong, viable athletic program. I am immensely proud of each of them. I am equally proud of our Terrapin fans who buy tickets, our Terrapin Club members who faithfully support the Maryland athletic program with their donations for scholarships, and the M Club members who serve and give liberally. We are also blessed with a terrific President, Dr. Dan Mote, who has fostered a mindset of excellence across our institution. He is a strong and balanced advocate for what he calls "the three A's of the University — Academics, the Arts and Athletics." We have a great Terrapin family. That's the foundation for all of our success... and the basis for our bright future. It's a great time to be a Terp."



Additionally, Maryland is one of only six universities to win a National Championship in both basketball and football (UCLA, Michigan, Michigan State, Syracuse, Ohio State and Maryland).

- Maryland was selected as the sixth-finest athletic program in the nation by the Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics, based on criteria such as graduation rates, financial efficiency, equity effectiveness and competitive excellence.
- Hired the Associated Press National Coach of the Year, Brenda Frese, as the new women's basketball coach. In her second season at the helm, her team drew 13,250 to a regular-season game and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.
- Hired Dave Cottle, the third-winningest active men's lacrosse coach in the U.S., who guided his team to the NCAA Final Four in his second year.
- Field Hockey played for the National Championship in 2001 and continues to be a Final Four team.
- Women's Lacrosse has continued its winning ways with seven national championships from 1995-2001, with additional Final Four appearances.
- Football facilities have been significantly enhanced with team house, stadium and practice field upgrades.
- The Terrapins moved into the new \$125 million Comcast Center, housing athletic department offices and seating for 18,000 fans for basketball and other events.
- In 2003-04, 12 Maryland teams competed in NCAA postseason play, which earned Maryland a place in the Top 25 national rankings in the USSA Directors' Cup for competitive excellence.
- The productivity, morale, and the competitive and academic achievement of Terrapin athletics are exceptional and continue to gain momentum.

Regarding the many achievements of Terrapin athletics over the past 10 years, Yow says, "We are pleased, but we are not satisfied... our vision is to be one of the Top 5 programs in the nation consistently... we see no reason to settle for less."

Yow is known for her goal-oriented and proactive management style. She consistently inspires and challenges those around her to "raise our sights and sharpen our tools... to work hard and smart... to recognize that our only limitations are those that we place upon ourselves."

# ACADEMIC SUPPORT AND CAREER DEVELOPMENT

The University of Maryland is committed to providing the highest quality education to all of its students. The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics strives to provide student-athletes excellent opportunities to participate in an intercollegiate athletics program of the highest quality, with the result that their athletics participation becomes an integral and valued component of their total educational experience at the university.

Terrapin student-athletes will find that the same hard work and discipline that has earned them success in athletics competition is also required in the classroom. Balancing the significant time demands and responsibilities required to be a successful student-athlete at the highest collegiate level is no small task. Therefore, as a result of their commitment to representing the university through athletics, Terrapin student-athletes are able to utilize support programs designed to meet their specific needs.

Led by assistant athletics director Anton Goff, the mission of the Academic Support and Career Development Unit (ASCDU) is to provide quality developmental programs and need-based services that will enhance academic progress, facilitate career development, and encourage the psychosocial growth of all UM student-athletes.

The Gossett Academic Support and Career Development Center for Terrapin student-athletes, named for long-time Terp supporters Barry and Mary Gossett, is located in the Comcast Center. It features a study center that includes 25 desktop computers, a tutoring center, a classroom, a CHAMPS/Life Skills resource room and individual offices for six professional academic counselors, a director of ILP programs, an assistant program coordinator and two graduate assistants. In addition, a new academic wing was added to the Gossett football team house last Fall. It features offices for two counselors, three learning specialist, and a graduate assistant; as well as a quiet study area, 29-desk computer lab, classroom, tutor rooms and classroom/lab for the individualized learning program.

## Maryland Gameplan

The Maryland Gameplan is intended to assist graduating Terrapin student-athletes as they begin the job search process. It is distributed to more than 500 corporations and businesses across the country, in addition to being featured on the M Club website. Prospective employers are introduced to our graduating student-athletes with resume information relative to academic, career and personal achievements. The Maryland Gameplan directory is produced annually in collaboration with the M Club.



## Career Networking Night

Because career development is an ongoing process, ASCDU provides a variety of programs for student-athletes throughout the year. Professional assistance with resume-writing, interviewing skills, graduate school search and job search is readily available to all student-athletes. During the spring semester ASCDU hosts the Career Networking Night, where student-athletes can learn about career interests and career planning. Unlike typical "job fairs," the purpose of this program is to allow student-athletes to explore multiple career opportunities by speaking directly to individuals in their chosen areas of interest. Employers at the Career Networking Night recognize the marketable qualities student-athletes have gained through athletic participation. Student-athletes learn about opportunities for internships and full-time jobs.

## Student-Athlete Advisory Council

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (S.A.A.C.) plays an important role in the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. It consists of two representatives from each varsity sport and meets on a regular basis with representatives from the athletic administration. The S.A.A.C. mission is to enhance the total student-athlete experience by developing leadership skills, promoting student-athlete welfare and fostering a positive student-athlete image on the Maryland campus, local area and nationally.

## CHAMPS/Life Skills Programs

ASCDU houses the NCAA's (National Collegiate Athletic Association) Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success (C.H.A.M.P.S.) Life Skills Program. The ASCDU staff, in collaboration with various other Department of Intercollegiate Athletics' units and campus resources, strives to provide a systematic personal development program designed to reach each student-athlete based on his or her individual needs. The focus of the program is on the individual academically, athletically and emotionally, and on the changing needs and skills of that individual in the years during college and after graduation. The menu of presentations, workshops and seminars is a comprehensive and balanced system of "life learning" programs promoted for use by each varsity sport team.

- Promote ownership by the student-athletes of their academic, athletic, personal and social responsibilities
- Enhance partnerships between the NCAA, member institutions and their communities for the purpose of education

## Academic Support for Returning Athletes Program

The Academic Support for Returning Athletes Program was created in 1986 to support the academic efforts of former varsity student-athletes at the University of Maryland, College Park. In 1989, ASRAP was assigned by the President's Office to the Academic Achievements Program and enrolled 40 students that year. As a member of the National Consortium for Academics and Sports (NCAS), the University of Maryland is committed to assisting its former athletes with degree completion. A key component of the program is community outreach. Each returning student completes a "workshop" that allows the cost of tuition and fees to be exchanged for community services with youth. In 2002, ASRAP moved into the ASCDU.
