SPRING OUTLOOK

The Maryland Terrapins will have a dramatically different look in 2009.

Rosters change from year to year in college football, but ninth-year head coach **Ralph Friedgen** will have to replace his largest senior class.

With 30 seniors having exhausted their eligibility, Friedgen and his coaching staff will have to find replacements for a productive group as 23 of those players started at least one game last year. The senior class also appeared in a bowl game in each of the last three seasons.

But the cupboard is not bare.

Maryland returns 39 letterwinners, including 10 starters (six on offense and four on defense) and a host of talented, young players from a team which went 8-5, including four wins over ranked teams and a victory in the Rody's Humanitarian Bowl.

Senior quarterback **Chris Turner**, entering his third year as a starter, junior running back **Da'Rel Scott** and sophomore wide receiver **Torrey Smith** headline the offense.

Scott, a 2008 first team All-Atlantic Coast Conference choice, rushed for 1,133 yards, the seventh-highest single-season total in school history, while Smith set the ACC single-season record for kickoff return yards (1,089) and had 24 catches for 336 yards.

The Terps will need to rebuild an offensive line which lost five of its top seven contributors from last season.

Maryland enters its second season under the system of assistant head coach/offensive coordinator **James Franklin**.

"Offensively, they're continuing to learn the scheme and terminology, but hopefully there will be a carryover from last year," Friedgen said. "There's always a learning curve, but we should be able to take it to the next level this season."

Junior linebacker **Alex Wujciak**, who will sit out the spring after having off-season knee surgery, headlines the defense which welcomes new coordinator **Don Brown**.

Brown, who runs an attacking 4-3 defense, came on board after last season. He replaced Chris Cosh, who returned to Kansas State to work under Bill Snyder.

Brown will lean on some veterans.

Wujciak ranked second in the Atlantic Coast Conference in tackles (133) last season. Seniors **Anthony Wiseman**, **Nolan Carroll**, **Terrell Skinner** and **Jamari McCollough** each played significant roles last season and give Brown leadership in the secondary.

"The defense is a little bit different than the offense this spring," Friedgen said of the new scheme. "We've got to get our basics in. We don't need to have everything in at the end of the spring. Don's done a good job of projecting where he wants to be and what he wants to do. We'll keep assessing that as we move along."

Friedgen is anxious to see the new defense.

"It's a different defense," Friedgen said. "We're going to press people more. It's a little different concept than what we've been doing, but I'm excited about it."

One goal for the spring and beyond is to build leadership on a team which has just 14 seniors. In addition, among the 85 scholarship players (including the incoming class), 61 of them have at least three years of eligibility remaining.

"We have some outstanding young men in the program," Friedgen said. "But we need to identify our leaders and put them in leadership roles. Any team is only as good as its leadership. We need to develop that."

Despite the youth, Friedgen is excited about his prospects for this team.

"I think we have a good group of kids," Friedgen. "I like our work ethic. They're excited about playing football, excited about the opportunities that exist. It's up to us to keep it fun and exciting. We have a long way to go, but the talent is there."

NOTES

• **James Franklin** was named the eventual successor to head coach **Ralph Friedgen** in February. Franklin, 37, has spent the better part of this decade on the Maryland staff. He served as the wide receivers coach from 2000 to 2004, which spanned Friedgen's first four seasons. During that time, Franklin established himself as one of the nation's top recruiters. Rivals.com ranked Franklin as one of the nation's top 25 recruiters for two of those first four years and tapped him again this past season.

• **Don Brown** (defensive coordinator/cornerbacks) and **Charles Bankins** (special teams/tight ends) are the newest members of the coaching staff. Brown, who replaced three-year coordinator Chris Cosh, came on board in January. He served as head coach of UMass-Amherst the last five years which included a trip to the 2006 NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) title game. During his tenure, UMass maintained one of the top defensive units in the nation. The Minutemen finished among the top 20 in total defense in three of his five seasons (third in 2005; 20th in 2006; 14th in 2007). Bankins, who was hired in February and replaced Danny Pearman, has experience coaching offense and special teams at the collegiate and professional levels, most recently serving as an assistant at the University of Richmond, which captured the 2008 FCS title.

• Maryland was among the best in the nation last season playing ranked opponents. The Terps went 4-1 vs. ranked foes (AP poll) with wins vs. No. 23 Cal, No. 20 Clemson, No. 21 Wake Forest and No. 17 UNC. The Terps were one of only five teams in the nation (also Florida, Oklahoma, USC and Texas) to beat at least four Top 25 teams. The other four all finished in the top five of the final polls.

• The Terps will face eight teams (Cal, Rutgers, Clemson, Wake Forest, NC State, Virginia Tech, Florida State and Boston College) in 2009 which played in bowl games last season and another (James Madison) which reached the FCS playoffs.

• The Terps' 10 returning starters (six offense/four defense) are the second-fewest in the Friedgen era. Heading into the 2004 season, Maryland had nine starters (five offense/four defense) back from the previous campaign.

• The Terps welcome five scholarship newcomers to the roster this spring. Joining the team are DL **De'Onte Arnett**, DL **Zachariah Kerr**, DL **Cody Blue**, LB **Darin Drakeford** and LB **Avery Murray**. Arnett, Drakeford and Murray were members of the 2009 recruiting class who enrolled in January. Blue and Kerr signed last season, but attended prep school last fall.

• **Chris Turner** is on track to become the first three-year starting quarterback since Brian Cummings (1995-97).

OFFENSE QUARTERBACK

Entering the Spring of 2007, **Chris Turner** was barely in the mix when discussing the potential starting quarterback.

Fast forward two years and Turner has a firm grasp on the starting job.

The senior, who has started the last two seasons despite not opening the year as the top signal-caller, has a chance to end his career as one of the most prolific quarterbacks in school history.

Turner will enter 2009 ranked seventh on the Maryland career passing yards list (4,474), fourth on the career completion percentage chart (59.7) and 11th in passing efficiency (125.76).

"I think you're going to really see Chris grow as a quarterback this year," Friedgen said. "He's improved the last two years, but he can get better."

Turner completed nearly 60 percent of his passes for 2,516 yards last season, the fifth-highest single-season total in school history. He also threw 13 touchdown passes to go with 11 interceptions.

The Simi Valley, Calif., native has generally been at his best against the top competition. He led the Terps to a 4-1 mark against Top 25 teams last season and has been on the winning side six of the seven times he has been on the field against a ranked opponent (AP poll).

All those numbers are impressive, but Friedgen knows there is some room for improvement.

"I'd like to see him get better in the running game (by getting us in the right play) and improve his touchdown-to-interception ratio," Friedgen said. "Then I'd like to see the normal maturation of a quarterback as far as being able to look off the defense and being able to read coverages and go to the right receiver."

Turner should have plenty of opportunity to hone his skills in the spring, as he and **Jamarr Robinson** are the lone quarterbacks on the roster.

"Jamarr's going to get a chance this spring," Friedgen said. "He's mobile and has a strong arm. He has the makings of a good quarterback. He has to know the offense better and be able to read coverages better."

Robinson, who has not seen action at quarterback with the varsity during his career, will try to solidify the No. 2 job and prepare to hit the field in the fall.

"He'll have a chance to push Chris and get 50 percent of the reps this spring," Franklin said. "We should be able to get a good evaluation of him."

OL Scott Burley 4V 6-5, 335

- A two-time all-league performer; Played in 39 career games, including 24 starts (18 at left tackle/six at right tackle).

TE Dan Gronkowski 3V 6-6, 255

- A three-year starter who was an honorable mention All-ACC performer in 2008; played in 41 career games, including 29 starts, all over his last three seasons.

WR Darrius Heyward-Bey 3V 6-2, 206

- A two-time All-ACC performer and honorable mention All-America choice in 2007; Ranks second in school history in career receiving yards (2,089), and third in receptions (138).

The sophomore did have a chance to play in both junior varsity games last season, so he was able to gain some valuable game experience.

RUNNING BACK

With their top three tailbacks and fullbacks returning from last season, the Terrapins have plenty of depth in the offensive backfield.

At this time last season, the Terps were looking to replace two of the top running backs in school history in Keon Latimore and Lance Ball. But after the emergence of **Da'Rel Scott** and **Davin Meggett** last season, as well as the solid play of **Morgan Green** down the stretch, has Maryland boasting one of the most talented backfields in the ACC.

"It's definitely one of our deepest positions," Friedgen said.

Scott is coming off one of the most best seasons in recent memory. He earned first team All-ACC honors after rushing for 1,133 rushing yards, the eighth-highest single-season total in school history. He also scored eight touchdowns and earned MVP honors of the Roady's Humanitarian Bowl by rushing for 174 yards.

Meggett was a pleasant surprise last season. As a true freshman, he secured the No. 2 tailback role in the preseason when Green was hampered with an injury.

The product of Clinton, Md., went on to rush for 457 yards, the most by a true freshman since Lamont Jordan posted 689 in 1997.

"Davin is a high character kid and is a good complement to Da'Rel," Franklin said.

Green, one of the strongest players on the team, came on at the end of last season, rushing for a career-high 72 yards in the bowl game. He has struggled with injuries the last two seasons, but has the talent of a No. 1 back.

Even with the depth, the staff would like to see the backs improve with and without the ball.

"There are definitely areas we can get better, especially in the passing game and being able to break more tackles," Friedgen said.

Gary Douglas, who shined on the scout team last year, will be added to the tailback mix this spring.

"We've got a legitimate four-deep at tailback which creates good competition," Franklin said. "That's what we want. Gary showed some ability in the bowl practices"

The veteran of the backfield is senior **Cory Jackson**, who has been the starting fullback since the end of his true freshman season. He's one of the toughest players on the team and has been a team leader the last three years.

Jackson will sit out the spring while rehabbing from off-season knee surgery, so junior **Haroon Brown** and sophomore **Taylor Watson** will see increased time.

"Haroon and Taylor will have an opportunity to get reps this spring and take the load off Cory," Friedgen said.

Brown has played in 17 games in his career, while Watson saw action in five last season.

Speedy junior **Dan Bonato**, freshman **Andrew Braxton** and sophomore **Paul Lariviere** (out for the spring) give the Terps depth in the backfield.

WIDE RECEIVER

Despite the loss of the Darrius Heyward-Bey, one of the top wide receivers in school history and a potential first-round NFL Draft choice, as well as Danny Oquendo and Isaiah Williams, Maryland has a chance to have one of the most potent wide-receiving corps in the ACC with a group that has size, speed and athleticism.

Sophomore **Torrey Smith** is the lone returning starter, but **Ronnie Tyler**, **Emani Lee Odai** and **Adrian Cannon** were significant contributors last season.

But, there are a number of talented youngsters, including **Quintin McCree**, **Tony Logan**, **Kevin Dorsey** and **Kerry Boykins**, who are expected to make the position competitive this spring.

In addition, veteran **LaQuan Williams**, who sat out most of last season with a foot injury (and will miss the spring), gives the Terps a veteran presence. He had a breakout 2007 campaign, but played just three games last season.

The future looks bright with no seniors and just three juniors among the team's top nine wide receivers.

Smith burst onto the scene last season when he took over as the starter at X receiver for the final six games.

He spent all season as the kick returner, setting the ACC single season record for yards (1,089) and posted 16 of his 24 catches over the last six games.

He also averaged a school-record 21.3 yards each time he touched the ball last season.

Smith's 14.0 yards per catch ranked second in the ACC among freshmen with at least 20 receptions.

The Terps are hoping for even bigger things from Smith this season as he emerges as one of the team leaders.

"Torrey is one of the most well-respected players on the team," Franklin said. "He always has a smile on his face and he works hard every day."

Lee-Odai, a junior, opens the spring opposite Smith, first on the depth chart at Z receiver.

One of the fastest players on the team, Lee-Odai has played in 21 games over the last two seasons and will be counted on for increased production in the fall.

Tyler is expected to step in for Oquendo at the F (or slot) receiver position. Tyler ranked sixth on the team in receptions (20) last season, making a number of acrobatic catches, especially on third down.

Boykins, a redshirt freshman, was impressive on the scout team last fall.

"We have tremendous expectations for Ronnie and Kerry," Franklin said. "They both have good speed and toughness. We have two quality players at that spot."

Cannon and Dorsey open the spring behind Smith.

Cannon played in all 13 games last season and helped the Terps in the bowl win over Nevada, hauling in a 59-yard TD pass from Chris Turner.

Dorsey sat out last season after having foot surgery, but has looked healthy heading into the spring.

"Adrian gives us some experience at the wide-receiver position," Friedgen said. "Dorsey did well in winter workouts and we're hoping he stays healthy because he has a chance to be a very good player for us."

Webb Dulin and **Eric Powell** will provide depth at the wide-receiver position this spring.

OFFENSIVE LINE/ TIGHT END

After losing five of its top seven performers up front from a year ago, the Maryland offensive staff will have a busy spring.

Gone are three-year starting center Edwin Williams, two-year starting left guard Jaimie Thomas and two-year starting tackle Scott Burley. Jack Griffin and Dane Randolph also completed their eligibility.

In all, those five players combined to start 115 games and help the team reach three bowl games in the last four years.

Bruce Campbell and **Phil Costa** are the lone returning starters. Campbell started the last six games at left tackle last season, while Costa has played at left and right guard in his career. Costa, who started 12 games at right guard in 2008, will take over as the starting center this year.

Junior **Paul Pinegar** is the only other lineman to see any significant time in his career. Pinegar has played in 12 games at tackle over the last two years. He enters the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at right tackle, but will have to battle for that spot.

"Bruce and Phil are veteran guys who are both battle tested," Franklin said. "After them we're a little less experienced, but we have just as much talent as last year. Those guys just haven't been on the field yet."

Sophomore **Lamar Young** and redshirt freshman **Justin Lewis** will open the spring atop the depth chart at left and right guard, respectively.

Young saw brief action in three games last season and Lewis nearly saw time, but retained his redshirt.

Sophomore **Andrew Gonnella** is just behind Young on the depth chart.

"Lamar runs real well and Andrew is a hard-nosed, tough guy," Franklin said.

Sophomores **Joe Faiella** and **Maurice Hampton** are also reserves at guard, though neither has been on the field.

Junior **Danny Edwards** will back up Costa at center. Edwards is in his fourth year in the program and played in two games as a reserve last season.

There should be a battle for time at tackle.

Redshirt freshmen **R.J. Dill** and **Justin Gilbert** are listed behind Campbell at left tackle.

"R.J. is a tall, physical presence and Justin tested well in the spring," Franklin said.

Pinegar will battle with sophomores **Tyler Bowen** and **Stephen St. John** at right tackle.

Bowen has battled foot injuries the last two seasons, but hopes to see time in the spring. He's shown promise during practice.

Other veterans who are expected the push for time on the O-line include **Bearthur Johnson**, **Kyle Sappington**, **Matt Harraka** and **John Dillon**.

The tight-end position will see a transition with three-year starter Dan Gronkowski departed. He capped off his Terrapin career by earning honorable mention All-ACC honors last season. He had a career-high 29 receptions, which ranked third on the team.

Senior **Tommy Galt** enters the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at tight end, though **Lansford Watson** will certainly see significant time.

Galt and Watson each played in 13 games in 2008, with the latter posting 10 receptions for 115 yards.

"Tommy came on at the end of last season," Franklin said. "He tested well in the spring and may have the best hands on the team."

A pair of redshirt freshmen - **Matt Furstenburg** and **Devonte Campbell** - will battle for time at the F tight-end position, which is similar to the H-back role.

Furstenburg played in two games on special teams last season before being sidelined with an ankle injury.

Campbell was impressive in his redshirt season, showing good pass-catching ability.

"Matt and Devonte are athletic guys who can run routes and be adequate blockers," Friedgen said.

Redshirt freshman **Ryan Schlothauer** will add depth at tight end.

DEFENSE DEFENSIVE LINE

With the departure of Jeremy Navarre, Mack Frost Olugbemi Otolajaja, Dean Muhtadi and Trey Covington, the Terrapins lost a ton of production on the defensive line.

Navarre and Covington combined to start 91 games over the last four years, while Otolajaja and Muhtadi were mainstays on the line last year.

"Despite the loss of some guys, I think we have a chance to be bigger and stronger than last year," Friedgen said.

After an injury-plagued 2008, senior **Travis Ivey** seems to be emerging as the leader of this group.

"Travis had a good winter," Friedgen said. "He's really taking on a leadership role. He's starting to mature into the player we thought he could be."

Ivey injured his foot in the preseason last year. He missed the first three games last year, but it took him a while to get on track. He capped off the year with a career-high five tackles in the win over Nevada in the Humanitarian Bowl

Ivey opens the spring atop the depth chart at defensive tackle.

Sophomore **Dion Armstrong**, who started three games last season, will be alongside Ivey at nose tackle.

A.J. Francis, who nearly played as a true freshman last season, give the Terps another big body on the interior of the line.

Ian Davidson, **Joe Vellano** and **Zachariah Kerr** will also push for time.

Davidson has not played but is in his third year in the program, while Vellano redshirted as a true freshman last year with a shoulder injury.

Kerr just joined the team this semester. He was a highly-touted recruit who attended Fork Union Military Academy last fall. He has a low center of gravity and should be helpful in stopping the running game.

Defensive end features a mixture of veterans and youngsters.

One side features sophomore **Derek Drummond** and freshmen **Masengo Kabongo** and **De'Onte Arnett**.

Drummond, who enters the spring No. 1 on the depth chart, played the old LEO position (defensive end/outside linebacker) last season.

Kabongo and Arnett were both highly recruited players. Kabongo sat out last season as a redshirt.

The other defensive end position, or anchor in Brown's scheme, will be manned by senior **Jared Harrell**.

He'll be backed up by senior **Deege Galt**. Freshmen **Carl Russell** and **Cody Blue** could also see time there.

• A two-year starter at Sam linebacker; One of the team's most athletic defenders and top special teams players; Posted 161 tackles his final two seasons.

DB Kevin Barnes 4V 6-1, 188

• A two-year starter; One of the top cornerbacks in the ACC his final two years; Played in 43 career games, including 21 starts.

DB Jeff Allen 4V 6-1, 190

• Started all 13 games at strong safety last season; Ranked fifth on the team in tackles (66); Played in every game (50) during his four seasons.

Harrell played in all 13 games, including two starts, at LEO last season. He chipped in five tackles for loss.

"We should have some good battles along the defensive line and competition breeds success," Brown said. "Lots of guys are going to get looks."

Sophomores **Chris Rhodes** and **Obum Akinyili** are in their third year in the program and will push the first- and second-team players for time.

LINEBACKER

With the loss of Dave Philistin, Moise Fokou, Chase Bullcock and Rick Costa, the Terps will have to replace plenty of experience at linebacker.

That group combined to play in 144 games, including 54 starts. The Terps will start the spring with just one linebacker - **Adrian Moten** - who has played in a game at that position.

With **Alex Wujciak** and **Ben Pooler** missing the spring while rehabbing from knee injuries, the LB two-deep currently features three freshmen, junior **Drew Gloster**, who has moved from tight end, and special-teams performer **Hakeem Sule**.

"We're young at linebacker, but we have ability," Friedgen said. "The young guys are going to have a chance to get stronger and get ready for the fall. They should have plenty of reps this spring."

Moten, a junior, has played in 23 career games and has been very productive. His 74 career tackles are third among players on the current roster, while his 7.0 sacks lead the team.

Moten can play all three linebacker positions, but is penciled in as the starter at Sam.

Gloster, who was not eligible last season, made the move to linebacker in December during bowl practice.

He's athletic, and at close to 250 pounds, has the size to man the middle.

Hartsfield moves into the starting spot at Will linebacker. He enrolled early last season and nearly played as a true freshman, but the staff was able to hold his redshirt.

Drakeford and Murray both entered school this semester and will be thrown into the mix right away.

"Murray tested well in the spring, benching 360 pounds, which is pretty good for a freshman," Friedgen said.

Drakeford will back up Moten, and Murray will see time behind Gloster.

Sule will serve as Hartsfield's backup.

Wujciak, a second team All-ACC performer last season and the second-leading tackler in the league, is expected to at full strength for fall camp.

Pooler is also expected back in full health. He hurt his knee in the only game he appeared in last season.

Other linebackers who will fill roles include juniors **Stephen Hargett** and **Louis Berman**, and sophomore **Herbert Law**.

SECONDARY

The Terps will have to replace half the starters in the secondary from a year ago, but they do have five other players who saw plenty of action last season.

Senior **Terrell Skinner**, a hard-hitting free safety who should be in the discussion for all-league honors at the end of the season, headlines the secondary. He is the second-leading returning tackler (63) on the team behind Wujciak.

Senior cornerback **Anthony Wiseman** is the other returning starter. He led the team and ranked fourth in the ACC in pass breakups (0.77 pg).

At 6-foot-1, 200 pounds, **Nolan Carroll** gives the Terps a physical presence at cornerback. He struggled with ankle woes last season, missing three games.

"We've got more experience back there than what we've had in the past," Friedgen said.

Cameron Chism, **Michael Carter**, **Trenton Hughes** and **Brandon Jackson-Mills** will all be fighting for time at cornerback.

Chism saw time there, as well as on special teams, as a true freshman last season.

Carter and Hughes, both entering their third season with the team, saw a limited number of snaps at cornerback.

"Cornerback is a priority," Brown said. "We're looking for guys who can do that."

The Terps look to be extremely deep at safety.

Junior **Antwine Perez**, a transfer from USC, played quite a bit last season, seeing action at safety, outside linebacker and on special teams. He is a punishing tackler and will enter the spring behind Skinner at free safety.

Senior **Jamari McCollough** was the Terps' all-purpose defensive back last season. He has played each of the safety positions and cornerback.

McCollough had a team-best four picks last season and will look to take over for the departed Jeff Allen at strong safety.

Sophomore **Kenny Tate** is behind McCollough to open the spring.

Tate, one of the top wide-receiver recruits from the 2008 class, will remain at safety. He moved there during the 2008 preseason and played in all 13 games last season.

"We gave him the option to move," Friedgen said. "We talked about it and Kenny felt like staying at safety was his best option right now."

Sophomore **Austin Walker**, who was a special teams contributor last season, is also a backup at free safety.

Veteran **Richard Taylor** hopes to give the Terps a boost at cornerback in the fall. Taylor, a sixth-year player, received clearance on a medical redshirt earlier in the spring.

Taylor has played in 23 career games as a reserve cornerback and special-teams performer. He'll sit out the spring while recovering from off-season knee surgery.

Junior **Dominique Herald**, a special-teams player and reserve safety the last two seasons, will also sit out the spring while recovering from a knee injury.

Youngsters **Anthony Green**, **Eugene Skinner** and **Mike Salvatico** give the Terps some needed depth at cornerback and safety.

SPECIAL TEAMS

New special teams coordinator **Charles Bankins** will need to replace three of his prime performers from a year ago, but he does return an all-league punter and an ACC record-holding kickoff return specialist.

Maryland has maintained a strong punting game in Friedgen's tenure. Junior **Travis Baltz**, a two-year starter, earned first team All-ACC honors after averaging a league-best 41.1 yards per punt. It marked the seventh time in the last eight seasons the Terps had an all-conference punter.

Ted Townsley is a very capable backup to Baltz. He has not competed in a regular-season game, but has a strong leg and has performed well in scrimmages over the last two years.

Torrey Smith was not only a standout at wideout, but he also made history on special teams. Smith averaged 25.9 yards per return last season en route to breaking the ACC single-season kickoff return yards record (1,089).

The Terps will have to replace three-year starting punt returner Danny Oquendo, place-kicker Obi Egekeze and long-snapper Andrew Schmitt.

Sophomore **Tony Logan** will get an opportunity as the punt returner. He replaced Oquendo in the Humanitarian Bowl and played well. **Kenny Tate** served as the backup to Oquendo last season and is No. 2 on the depth chart entering the spring.

The place-kicking job is fairly wide open with the departure of Egekeze, who kicked 32 career field goals (tied for seventh in school history) and scored 164 points (10th in school history).

Sophomore **Nick Wallace**, senior **David May** and sophomore **Mike Barbour** will all have a chance to make their cases this spring.

Wallace is the only one of the three to kick in a college game. He connected on 11 of 13 field goals two years ago at Indiana (Pa.).

May has served as a reserve place-kicker and kickoff specialist the last three years.

Maryland has not had a punt blocked in the last 111 games (the longest active streak in the nation).

Schmitt has a lot to do with that record. He was the long-snapper for the last 50 games.

Sophomore **Tim Downs**, Schmitt's backup last season, enters the spring atop the depth chart at long-snapper.

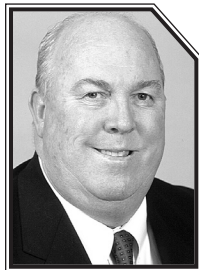

HEAD COACH

RALPH FRIEDGEN

Ralph Friedgen is in his ninth year as head coach at the University of Maryland with a reputation as one of the top offensive minds in college football.

Friedgen has lifted the Terrapins to unprecedented heights in his tenure, taking the team to six bowl games, including a pair of New Year's Day appearances, and a school record three straight bowl victories. Prior to Friedgen's arrival, Maryland had just one bowl game appearance in the previous 15 seasons.

There has also been extraordinary fan support in his tenure, with the top four average single-season home attendance marks occurring in the last eight years. In addition, 20 of the top 25 crowds in the history of Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium have taken place since 2001.

He is the 33rd head coach in school history and ranks fourth in Maryland annals in career winning percentage (.640). Friedgen also has the ninth-best winning percentage in Atlantic Coast Conference history.

After spending two years as head coach and offensive coordinator, Friedgen relinquished that difficult dual role after the 2007 season with the hiring of James Franklin.

Friedgen has been able to refocus on being the CEO of the football program.

The Terps continued to flourish last season, posting at least eight victories for the fifth time in the past eight years and collecting the fourth bowl win under Friedgen.

Once again the Terps were in the hunt for an ACC crown finishing within a game of reaching the league title game.

The team was at its best playing against the top competition, winning four of five games versus Top 25 teams (Associated Press poll).

Maryland was one of just five teams in the country to defeat at least four ranked teams last season. The other four programs (Florida, USC, Oklahoma and Texas) all ended the year ranked in the Top 5 of the final AP poll.

In his first season as offensive coordinator since becoming head coach, he directed the team to a 9-4 record, marking the fourth nine-win campaign in the previous six seasons and 13th in school history. The Terps culminated the 2006 season with a convincing 24-7 victory over Purdue in the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen led the team to another bowl appearance that year despite having to persevere through numerous injuries as only three offensive players started all 13 games. In all there were 17 members of the two-deep which missed at least one game.

In spite of the injuries, Friedgen had the Terps at their best against the toughest competition as Maryland defeated a pair of top 10 teams in 2007. In 115 years of football, the Terps had never defeated two Top 10 teams in the same season.

The wins over No. 10 Rutgers and No. 8 Boston College put the Terps among elite company nationally as well. Maryland was one of only four teams in the country (also LSU, Kentucky and Illinois) to defeat two Top 10 teams during the 2007 campaign.

A long-time successful assistant coach at Georgia Tech, where he was credited with overseeing one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks, Friedgen continues to build a new level of pride and glory to his alma mater's football program, guiding the Terps to a 64-36 record, including an ACC title and a pair of second-place finishes.

Not only were his 50 wins after six seasons more than those of Terps legend Jerry Claiborne, they also fall just shy of the all-time ACC mark of 51, set by Clemson's Danny Ford in the early 1980s. In addition, in his first three seasons at the helm of the Terrapin program, Friedgen became the first coach in conference lore to lead a team to three-straight seasons of 10 wins or more, while his 36 wins in his first four years ranked him in the top 10 in NCAA history, surpassing the fourth-year marks of coaches such as Frank Leahy and Joe Paterno.

The consensus national coach of the year in 2001 after leading Maryland to its first ACC Championship since 1985, Friedgen and company have returned Maryland to prominence on the national scene. The Terrapins have won more games (64) in the eight seasons under Friedgen than they had in the 14 years prior to his arrival (55).

Long overlooked as a head-coaching candidate, the 1970 Maryland graduate was tapped as the Terps' head football coach following the 2000 season, and he wasted no time in returning the program to the glory days it achieved when Friedgen was an assistant to Bobby Ross in the 1980s.

Eight years ago, in his first season as the Terps' grid boss, Maryland won its first seven games and eventually halted Florida State's reign as perennial ACC champion, earning the league's automatic berth in the Bowl Championship Series' FedEx Orange Bowl. By winning the ACC title that season, Friedgen became the first mentor in league history to win the championship in his first year as a head coach.

In 2002, despite a 1-2 start and without 19 seniors from the previous year, the Terps made their way back to a major bowl game, winning 10 of their last 11 games and finishing in a tie for second in the ACC. The 2003 campaign provided a bit of déjà vu for Friedgen and the Terrapins as they again started 1-2, and again ran off 10 wins in their final 11 games to earn a second New Year's bowl bid in three years.

By winning 11 games in 2002, Friedgen became just the second coach in school history to hit that mark, matching Claiborne's 11-win campaign in 1976.

The 2006 team started 3-2 before reeling off a five-game winning streak, which placed them in the midst of the ACC Atlantic Division race. The Terps lost to eventual champion Wake Forest on the final game of the regular season, but Maryland was a force in the league race throughout the year, enabling it to earn the fourth slot among ACC postseason bids and a trip to Orlando, Fla., for the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen's teams have had some impressive performances in their most recent five bowl appearances. The Terps posted lopsided victories over Tennessee (30-3) in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and over West Virginia (41-7) in the Toyota Gator Bowl. In all, Maryland has out-scored its last five bowl opponents, 151-73.

His offensive success notwithstanding, Friedgen's teams at Maryland have been solid on defense, ranking among the nation's leaders annually while producing the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year in three of the last eight seasons (E.J. Henderson in 2001 and 2002; D'Qwell Jackson in 2005).

Named the winner of the Frank Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country in 1999 while at Tech, Friedgen brought 32 years of assistant coaching experience (including 21 as an offensive coordinator either in college or the NFL) with him in his return to College Park.

The 62-year-old Friedgen (pronounced FREE-jun) owns the rare distinction of coordinating the offense for both a collegiate national champion (Georgia Tech in 1990) and a Super Bowl team (San Diego in 1994).

Friedgen spent 20 seasons with the aforementioned Ross in coaching stops at The Citadel, Maryland, Georgia Tech and the NFL's San Diego Chargers. He returned to Tech in 1997, where he served another successful stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under good friend George O'Leary, now the head coach at the University of Central Florida.

A 1970 graduate of Maryland, where he earned a degree in physical education, Friedgen launched his coaching career as a graduate assistant before heading off to a series of jobs that included The Citadel (1973-79), William & Mary (1980) and Murray State (1981).

In 1982, he returned to Maryland as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Ross, with Friedgen's tenure lasting until 1986. During that stretch, the Terps captured three consecutive ACC championships (1983-85) and played in four bowl games. All told, the Terrapins were 39-15-1 from 1982-86 and won two bowl games (the Sun Bowl in 1984 and the Cherry Bowl in 1985). It is the type of success Friedgen has reinstalled in his current group of Terrapins.

The Ross-Friedgen connection began in 1973, when Ross hired the former Maryland offensive guard as defensive line coach at The Citadel. Friedgen spent seven seasons at The Citadel, the last three as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. He then worked one season (1980) as offensive coordinator at William & Mary and one season (1981) as assistant head coach at Murray State before Ross tapped him to be his offensive coordinator at Maryland in 1982.

During his five-year stay at Maryland under Ross, Friedgen was instrumental in the development of future pro quarterbacks Boomer Esiason, Frank Reich and Stan Gelbaugh, all of whom spent at least 10 seasons in the National Football League. Esiason played professionally from 1984-97, Reich from 1985-98 and Gelbaugh from 1986-95.

Friedgen followed Ross to Georgia Tech in 1987, becoming the Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the next five seasons, including the 1990 campaign when Tech, unranked in the preseason, captured the national championship with an 11-0-1 record. The national title came just two years after the Jackets had posted back-to-back seasons of three wins or less.

When Ross was named head coach of the San Diego Chargers in 1992, he tapped Friedgen to serve as running game coordinator for two seasons (1992-93) before elevating him to offensive coordinator in 1994, when the Chargers advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history. During his time with the Chargers, Friedgen helped a club that had not made the playoffs in a decade reach postseason play three times in five seasons.

Known for developing balanced offensive attacks with multiple looks, Tech was one of only two teams in the country in 1999 to average at least 200 yards rushing and 200 yards passing. Tech also accomplished the feat under Friedgen's guidance in 1990, '91 and '98. The 1999 team, with Joe Hamilton at quarterback, set 59 school records, rewriting many marks established by the 1990 national championship team, which was led by another Friedgen pupil, Shawn Jones (1989-92). Friedgen was a finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 1998 when the Ramblin' Wreck set a then-school record with 50 touchdowns.

The first Maryland alum since Bob Ward (1967-68) to serve as the Terps' head football coach, Friedgen originally came to Maryland as a quarterback in the mid-'60s and spent most of his career as an offensive lineman, lettering in 1966 and '68 and capturing Academic All-ACC honors. He was a two-time winner of the George C. Cook Memorial Award (1968-69) for having the highest academic average on the football team.

Friedgen's coaching roots run deep. His father, also named Ralph (though not a "Sr."), was a high school coach for more than 30 years and masterminded, among other teams, the 1964 Westchester County (N.Y.) High School team that went undefeated and averaged 44 points per game running what was then an unusual multiple offense. It was an offense run by a 190-pound quarterback later recruited by Maryland who shared his name. Maybe as a sign of things to come, the younger Ralph called all of his team's offensive plays from his junior year on.

Friedgen and his wife, the former Gloria Spina, have three daughters: Kelley, Kristina and Katie. Gloria is the Coordinator of Alumni Affairs and Outreach for the College of Health and Human Performance at Maryland while both serve on that college's Board of Visitors. Kelley is in her first year at Merck and Co.; Kristina graduated from Maryland in 2008 after majoring in theater; and Katie is her third year at Maryland, majoring in art.

Friedgen was honored for his dedication to his family in June of 2007 when he named father of the year by the Washington D.C. Father's Day Council.

2009 RECRUITING CLASS

With 30 seniors gone from last year's team, the Maryland football program had holes to fill on both sides of the ball.

Head coach **Ralph Friedgen** and his staff addressed those needs in February by landing a nationally-ranked recruiting class. The Terps signed 24 student-athletes to national letters-of-intent.

The class, ranked No. 26 nationally by Rivals.com and 27th by Scout.com, was highlighted by four All-Americans, 21 student-athletes ranked among the top 100 nationally at their respective position and 12 who received all-state honors during their career.

Six of the signees were also labeled four-star recruits by Rivals.com and/or Scout.com.

Once again the Terps kept quite a bit of talent at home as 13 members of the class hail from the Maryland/Washington, D.C. footprint. They also plucked three players from Virginia, as well as two each from Georgia, including star running back **D.J. Adams** (Norcross, Ga.), and South Carolina.

"This class fills a lot of our needs at linebacker, as well as along the offensive and defensive lines," Friedgen said. "I think we put together a very big, strong and powerful recruiting class"

DL **De'Onte Arnett** (Capitol Heights, Md.) DB **Travis Hawkins** (Gaithersburg, Md.), LB **David Mackall** (Baltimore, Md.), RB **Caleb Porzel** (Olney, Md.) and OL **Pete White** (Washington, D.C.) were each SuperPrep All-Americans and labeled four-star recruits by Rivals.com and/or Scout.com. Adams, a member of the ESPNU 150, was tabbed a four-star prospect by Rivals.

Adams, Arnett, Hawkins and Mackall were also four signees to appear on an all-state team during their career.

Others earning all-state honors included DL **Justin Anderson** (Blythewood, S.C.), QB **C.J. Brown** (Cranberry, Twp., Pa.), LB **Ryan Donohue** (Montvale, N.J.), PK/P **Nick Ferrara** (Hicksville, N.Y.), DB **Eric Franklin** (Baltimore, Md.), OL **Bennett Fulper** (Gretna, Va.), LB **Avery Murray** (Florence, S.C.) and TE **Dave Stinebaugh** (Baltimore, Md.)

In addition, the eight local products - Arnett, Hawkins, Porzel, OL **Pete DeSouza** (Silver Spring, Md.), LB **Darin Drakeford** (Washington, D.C.), DB **Avery Graham** (Clarksburg, Md.), LB **Isaiah Ross** (Greenbelt, Md.) and OL **Pete White** (Washington, D.C.) - earned All-Met selections.

Of the 21 signees ranking in the top 100 at their positions by various outlets, eight were ranked among the top 25.

According to Scout.com, Adams was No. 16 nationally among running backs and Hawkins was the 12th-best cornerback. Rivals.com has Porzel pegged as the No. 15 all-purpose back in the nation and White as the No. 5 offensive guard in the land.

The signees hail from eight states, including Maryland/Washington D.C. (13), Virginia (3), Georgia (2), South Carolina (2), North Carolina (1), New York (1), New Jersey (1) and Pennsylvania (1).

As a team, the Terps ranked high nationally among their peers at three positions. Scout.com had Maryland's linebacker crop ranked tied for No. 7 in the country, while Rivals.com had it No. 9. The Terps running back class was not large in numbers, but Adams and Porzel comprise the 12th-best class according to Scout.com and 14th-best class by Rivals.com. The defensive-end class was No. 10 according to Rivals.

According to Rivals.com, the Terps hauled in four of the top 10 players in the state of Maryland in Arnett (No. 2), Hawkins (No. 5), Mackall (No. 9) and Porzel (No. 10), and two of the top three players in Washington, D.C. with the addition of White (No. 1) and Drakeford (No. 3).

Two players not included among the 2009 signees were **Cody Blue** and **Zachariah Kerr** who each signed with the Terps last year and attended Fork Union Military Academy in the fall. They enrolled in classes in January as did Arnett, Drakeford and Murray. All five will be eligible for spring ball and have four years of eligibility remaining beginning in the fall.

This year's class size is tied for the second-largest in the Friedgen era. The Terps also had 24 signees in 2005 and inked 25 in 2007.

Maryland 14, Delaware 7

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Da'Rel Scott ran for 197 yards in his first college start and the Maryland defense forced two turnovers in a 14-7 victory over Delaware in the season opener for both teams.

Scott carried 26 times and had runs of 40, 37 and 26 yards. The 5-foot-11, 192-pound sophomore totaled 137 yards rushing last season in nine games as a backup.

The last Maryland running back to gain that much yardage on the ground was Bruce Perry, who had 237 against Wake Forest on Nov. 29, 2003.

Scott also set a Maryland record for most rushing yards in a season-opener. It also ranks 16th on the school's single-game rushing chart.

The Terps defense also chipped in, limiting Delaware to just 249 yards of total offense.

But the Terrapins missed three field goals and had trouble pulling away from Delaware, which has 14 starters back from the team that last year advanced to the Football Championship Subdivision title game.

Senior Jordan Steffy started at quarterback for the Terrapins, completing 10 of 18 passes for 115 yards with two interceptions. Junior Chris Turner came on in the fourth quarter and led the final three drives, going 1-for-3 with 11 passing yards. Junior Josh Portis also played the position, running four times for 10 yards.

The Maryland touchdowns came on a 12-yard reverse by wide receiver Darius Heyward-Bey in the second quarter and on a 14-yard run by Davin Meggett in the third quarter.

Heyward-Bey caught four passes for 70 yards, including a 36-yarder from Steffy which set up his touchdown run.

Delaware closed to 14-7 on a 1-yard run by Johnathon Smith with 5:20 left. The Blue Hens got the ball back with 3:32 left, but after Robby Schoenholt was intercepted by Terrell Skinner and Maryland ran out the clock.

Maryland limited the Blue Hens to 108 yards in the first half and led 7-0 at halftime.

MURFREESBORO, Tenn. - Joe Craddock passed for 256 yards and two touchdowns to lead Middle Tennessee State to a win over Maryland.

Craddock led MTSU on a 10-play, 80-yard drive to open the game, throwing a 5-yard touchdown pass to Sancho McDonald with 9:04 left in the quarter.

The Blue Raiders (1-1) converted a fake punt when punter David DeFatta rolled to the right and threw back to Alvin Ingle for a 28-yard completion.

Maryland answered when Da'Rel Scott dashed 63 yards on the Terrapins second play to tie the game. Scott rushed for a game-high 123 yards, following up a 197-yard performance in last week's season opener vs. Delaware.

The Blue Raiders capitalized on an interception to extend the lead to 17-7 midway through the fourth quarter.

Danny Carmichael recorded his first career interception when Maryland wide receiver Darius Heyward-Bey slipped and fell on a pattern and Chris Turner's pass landed in his hands. Carmichael returned the pick 25 yards to the Maryland 5. Phillip Tanner scored on a 1-yard run three plays later.

Maryland used a big play to pull within 17-14 with 2:15 left in the third quarter. Turner threw a short pass to Heyward-Bey, who turned it into a 80-yard touchdown. It was the second-longest reception of Heyward-Bey's career and longest completion of Turner's.

Craddock's second touchdown pass, a 53-yard strike to Malcolm Beyah with 22 seconds remaining in the third quarter, provided the final margin.

Maryland had three possessions inside the Middle Tennessee 35 in the final quarter but couldn't score.

A drive midway in the fourth quarter ended when backup quarterback Josh Portis was stopped for a loss on fourth down.

The Blue Raiders picked off two passes in the fourth quarter. Ted Riley had one at the MTSU 2 midway through the fourth quarter. Alex Suber's interception in the end zone with 2:18 remaining secured the win.

Maryland 35, No. 23 California 27

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland scored touchdowns on its first three possessions en route to an upset of No. 23 California. The Golden Bears didn't reach the end zone until the closing minutes, and by then it was far too late.

Da'Rel Scott ran for 87 yards and two touchdowns before leaving with a shoulder injury. Chris Turner threw for scores and the Terps (2-1) used a relentless defense to harass the Golden Bears (2-1) from the start.

California scored three touchdowns in the final seven minutes, but it was too late. Quarterback Kevin Riley finished 33-for-58 passing for 423 yards and the three scores. The 58 passes were a school record.

The Terrapins led 21-3 early in the second quarter, 21-6 at halftime and 28-6 after three quarters.

California's Jahvid Best, who amassed 311 yards rushing in his first two games, was at minus-1 after his first five carries. He also absorbed a very hard hit on a short pass with three minutes left in the second quarter and did not return until after halftime.

Riley's 10-yard touchdown pass to Cameron Morrah with 6:55 left made it 28-13, but the Terrapins recovered the ensuing onside kick and needed only two plays to reach the end zone. Two late TDs by the California narrowed the gap, but Maryland got the onside kick after those scores, too.

After Cal failed to get a first down on its opening possession, Maryland moved 60 yards in five plays to take a 7-0 lead. Scott accounted for 44 yards rushing on the drive, including a 24-yard touchdown run.

Riley was then intercepted by Kevin Barnes, who ran 17 yards to the Cal 14. Four plays later, Scott scored from the 1 to make it 14-0.

It was 14-3 before the Terrapins moved 60 yards in a 14-play drive culminated by a 1-yard touchdown pass from Turner to Dan Gronkowski. Turner went 7-for-10 for 55 yards and converted three third downs.

Maryland went up 28-6 in the third quarter on a 27-yard touchdown pass from Turner to Darius Heyward-Bey.

Maryland 51, Eastern Michigan 24

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Wide receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey caught a 32-yard touchdown pass and ran twice for 81 yards, part of a prolific offensive showing that carried Maryland past Eastern Michigan.

Morgan Green ran for two touchdowns and Chris Turner threw for 212 yards and two TDs for the Terrapins (3-1), who scored on nine of their 13 possessions.

Kyle McMahon completed 25 of 37 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns for the Eagles. But Eastern Michigan (1-3), which had lost its previous three games against Maryland by a combined 132-19 score, was let down by a defense that forced only one punt and yielded 486 yards.

Heyward-Bey had runs of 35 and 46 yards, each of which set up a TD. He finished as the second-leading rusher for Maryland. Despite playing without injured Da'Rel Scott the Terrapins finished with 231 yards rushing.

Adrian Moten blocked a punt and had an interception to help the Terrapins go up 17-0 early in the second quarter.

After letting its lead dwindle to 24-14, Maryland scored on its first possession of the second half. Heyward-Bey ran 46 yards on the opening play, which led to Turner's 4-yard pass to tight end Dan Gronkowski in the end zone.

It was 34-17 after three quarters, and a 33-yard field goal by Obi Egekeze put the Terps up by 20 with 11:46 to go.

After EMU closed to 37-24, Heyward-Bey lateraled to Danny Oquendo, who threw a 43-yard TD pass to Isaiah Williams for a 44-24 lead.

Heyward-Bey ran 35 yards on an end around. Nine plays later, Green scored from the 1 on fourth-and-goal for a 10-0 lead.

In the second quarter, Moten picked off a McMahon pass at the Eastern Michigan 48 before Green ran around right end for a 20-yard score.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Chris Turner threw for a touchdown and Da'Rel Scott rushed for one to rally Maryland to its second straight Death Valley victory with a win over Clemson.

Maryland (4-1, 1-0 ACC) came in as a big underdog, just like in 2006 here, against the preseason favorites for the conference title. And just like two years ago, the Terps overcame a second-half deficit for the win.

Maryland trailed 17-6 in the third quarter when Darrius Heyward-Bey went 76 yards on a reverse - the longest run Clemson allowed in eight years - to give the Terps a 1st-and-goal.

Two plays later, Turner found a wide-open Torrey Smith to make it 17-13.

Still down in the final quarter, Turner got the Terps going again. He hit Danny Oquendo with passes of 11, 11 and 21 yards to get Maryland to the Clemson 1.

Scott, the ACC's leading rusher entering the game, ran in for the go-ahead score.

Clemson had one last chance, driving into Maryland territory. But Cullen Harper was stopped short on fourth-and-1 with 5:36 remaining.

Maryland didn't give the ball back, finishing off its fourth straight victory over a ranked team. It was also the Terps' third win in their past four visits to Death Valley.

The Terps were outgained by Clemson 295 to 372, with Scott finishing with 39 yards. Still, it didn't matter to the outcome, the same as in 2006.

Then, Dan Ennis kicked a 31-yard field goal as time expired in a 13-12 Maryland victory that ultimately knocked Clemson out of the ACC title game.

Star runners James Davis and C.J. Spiller combined for 193 yards and two touchdowns by halftime to build the Tigers a 17-6 lead.

Maryland's defense, which struggled early on, didn't give up a point in the second half, forcing four punts and the crunching fourth-down stop on Harper.

Davis and Spiller, the vaunted "Thunder and Lightning," got just 31 yards between them the final two quarters.

Chris Turner completed 20 of 34 passes for 223 yards, but the Terps could muster just 79 yards on the ground.

Wide receiver Ronnie Tyler was a bright spot for the Terps, posting a career-best five receptions for 56 yards.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland played so well against No. 21 Wake Forest, it was almost impossible to single out offense, defense or special teams in the most significant win of an up-and-down season.

"We finally put a full game together. I think by far it's the best we've played all year," coach Ralph Friedgen said after the Terrapins cruised to a victory.

Does the credit go to the offense, which generated 470 yards? Or a defense that handed Wake Forest its first shutout in 124 games? What about the four field goals by Obe Egekeze?

Suffice to say it was a complete effort against what was one of only two unbeaten teams in Atlantic Coast Conference play.

Chris Turner went 28-for-41 for 321 yards and a touchdown. His main target was wide receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey, who had a career-high 11 catches for 101 yards and a score.

Maryland's Da'Rel Scott finished with 73 yards rushing and threw a 9-yard touchdown pass to Heyward-Bey.

It was the fifth straight win over a Top 25 team for the Terps (5-2, 2-1). Maryland also defeated California and Clemson this season.

Wake Forest (4-2, 2-1) was in sole possession of first place before being rendered helpless by a defense that had two weeks to prepare. The Terrapins' last shutout of a ranked opponent was Sept. 24, 1955, 7-0 over top-ranked UCLA.

Riley Skinner, who came in as the league's top-ranked passer, went 14-for-30 for 127 yards and was sacked four times.

The Demon Deacons absorbed their first shutout since a 42-0 loss to Air Force in September 1998. The last time Wake Forest was blanked in an ACC game was in 1996, 52-0 at Maryland.

Turner had 186 yards passing in the first half, and the Terrapins limited Wake Forest to 106 yards in offense in building a 13-0 lead.

Until then, the Terrapins were rallying, relying on a defense that had allowed just 17 second-half points in four ACC games to give them time to erase a 17-point deficit.

On their first play from scrimmage in the second half, Orion Martin sacked Chris Turner, causing a fumble that Cordarow Thompson recovered for the Hokies at the Maryland 18. When three plays netted just five yards, Keys kicked a 30-yard field goal to make it 20-3 after just 2:16.

Darrius Heyward-Bey, Maryland's big-play receiver, made it interesting when he took a short slant pass on third-and-5 63 yards for a touchdown with 6:43 left in the quarter.

The Hokies forced Maryland to punt from its 44 on the next series, but Travis Baltz's kick bounced off Virginia Tech's Kam Chancellor and the Terps recovered at the Hokies 11.

Virginia Tech held, but Obe Egekeze's 27-yard field goal made it 20-13.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Playing on a wet field, facing a tough North Carolina defense and starting 82 yards from the end zone, Maryland desperately needed a score to keep alive its run of success against ranked teams.

Chris Turner made it happen, engineering a dramatic 19-play drive that produced the Terrapins with a victory over the No. 17 Tar Heels.

Obi Egekeze kicked a 26-yard field goal with 1:42 left to cap a 73-yard march that lasted nearly 9 minutes and produced the only points of the second half.

Da'Rel Scott ran for 129 yards and a touchdown and Davin Meggett had 86 rushing yards for Maryland (7-3, 4-2).

Maryland has won a school-record six straight over Top 25 teams (AP poll), beating California, Clemson, Wake Forest and North Carolina this season and Rutgers and Boston College in 2007.

The victory also kept the Terrapins unbeaten at home (6-0).

The Tar Heels (7-3, 3-3) dropped out of first place in the Coastal Division and remained winless at Maryland since 1997. North Carolina converted only one of 11 third downs and finished with only 75 yards rushing. It was their third loss by three points or fewer.

UNC quarterback Cameron Sexton went 10-for-24 for 166 yards and took the blame for an offense that produced only 11 first downs.

A back-and-forth first half, played at times in heavy rain, ended with North Carolina up 15-14.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Everette Brown had 3-1/2 sacks and forced a fumble, part of an impressive performance by the Florida State defense in a 37-3 defeat of No. 22 Maryland.

Florida State (8-3, 5-3) turned two turnovers into touchdowns in taking a 21-0 halftime lead. That was enough to ensure Maryland (7-4, 4-3) its first home loss of the season and end the Terrapins' bid to win the league's Atlantic Division.

The Terrapins are 4-0 against Top 25 teams, 3-4 against unranked teams and 0-4 at night.

Seeking to go 7-0 at home, Maryland wasted two early chances to jump on top. By the time the Terrapins finally scored in the third quarter, on a 34-yard field goal by Obi Egekeze, Florida State was ahead 24-0.

Any chance the Terrapins had of mounting a comeback ended when Da'Rel Scott lost his second fumble with 13:19 left and the Seminoles up 27-3. It was Maryland's fourth turnover - one more than in its previous three games - and FSU turned that into a 1-yard touchdown run by quarterback Christian Ponder.

Ponder went 19-for-24 for 143 yards and led the Seminoles with 81 yards rushing.

The Seminoles had six sacks, two interceptions and forced two fumbles.

Following two early Terp drives into FSU territory, the Seminoles put together a 16-play, 73-yard drive capped by a 7-yard touchdown pass from Ponder to Preston Parker. Ponder passed for 26 yards and ran for 28 more during the march.

Later in the second quarter, Brown forced a fumble by Scott and Florida State's Derek Nicholson scooped up the loose ball and ran 22 yards for a touchdown and a 14-0 lead.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. - Billy Flutie, the Boston College backup quarterback and nephew of Heisman Trophy winner Doug Flutie, threw for a 9-yard touchdown on a fake field goal to lead the 20th-ranked Eagles to a spot in the Atlantic Coast Conference championship game with a victory over Maryland.

Maryland (7-5, 4-4) fell to 4-1 against ranked teams this season and into a logjam of ACC teams seeking a bowl berth.

Chris Turner led the Terrapins on an 11-play, 70-yard drive, converting a third-and-2 with a 23-yard pass to Emani Lee-Odai and a fourth-and-3 with a 5-yard pass to Danny Oquendo. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Turner and Oquendo connected again from 13 yards out for a touchdown that made it 21-14.

BC went three and out, but Maryland's Obi Egekeze missed a 36-yard field goal attempt and Robert Francois intercepted Turner and returned it 36 yards for a touchdown to give BC a 28-14 lead with 1:42 left.

Turner connected with Smith for an 8-yard touchdown with 14 seconds left, but the onside kick attempt went out of bounds and Boston College ran out the clock.

Turner completed 33 of 57 passes for a career-high 360 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions for Maryland, which had been in contention for the conference championship until losing to Florida State last weekend.

BC took a 7-0 lead in the first when Davis hit Justin Jarvis for a 7-yard touchdown pass. Maryland tied it on its next possession, when Turner scored on a 1-yard keeper one play after hitting Torrey Smith for a 43-yard pass. Davis found Gunnell wide open in the end zone for a 45-yard touchdown that made it 14-7 with 1:05 left in the half.

BOISE, Idaho - Da'Rel Scott ran for 174 yards and two fourth-quarter touchdowns in 14 carries and Maryland held off the Nevada Wolf Pack 42-35 in the Humanitarian Bowl.

Scott's 49-yard touchdown sprint early in the fourth quarter broke a 28-all tie and his 2-yard TD gallop put the Terps up 14 points.

Colin Kaepernick kept Nevada (7-6) close, finishing 24-for-47 for a bowl-record 370 yards and three touchdowns

Scott was one of seven Terrapins benched by coach Ralph Friedgen for curfew violations. He didn't get to play on the famous blue turf here until early in the third quarter and didn't touch the ball until the 5:55 mark of the third.

Once he got going, he couldn't be stopped.

On a second-and-7 early in the fourth quarter, he broke through the Nevada line for the 49-yard score to put the Terps (8-5) up 35-28 with 12:21 left.

He became the seventh running back in Maryland history to top 1,000 yards in a season. The 174 yards was also a Maryland bowl record.

A 28-28 tie early in the fourth quarter lasted only a couple of minutes. Turner hit Torrey Smith for 26 yards on third down, and two plays later Scott ran for his seventh touchdown of the season. After Nevada failed to convert on fourth down at the Maryland 34 with 9 minutes left, Scott carried four times on the next drive for 66 yards, capped by his 2-yard score.

Kaepernick added a 15-yard touchdown run with 2:19 left, but Maryland recovered the ensuing onside kick and ran out the clock.

Turner hit third-string Adrian Cannon for a 59-yard TD on Maryland's opening drive, and found Oquendo's backup, Ronnie Tyler for a 14-yard score late in the first half to give Maryland a 28-14 lead at the break. Smith added a 99-yard kickoff return and Scott's backup, Morgan Green, added a 53-yard scoring run in the first half.
