STORYLINE

- The fourth-ranked Terrapins (32-2) are the No. 1 seed in the Spokane region. They earned a top seed for the fourth time in school history and third under Brenda Frese (1989, 2008, 2009). Maryland will take on fourth-seeded Duke (23-10) Saturday at 4:30 p.m. ET in the Sweet Sixteen in Spokane. Wash.
- This marks Maryland's 23rd appearance in the NCAA Tournament and 11th in Frese's 13 seasons. The Terrapins are 39-21 (.650) all-time in the NCAA Tournament and 27-9 (.750) under Frese. She has led the Terrapins to seven Sweet Sixteens, five Elite Eights, two Final Fours and the 2006 NCAA title. (Tournament history on page 28).
- Maryland won its 26th straight game Monday with an 85-70 win over Princeton in the NCAA Second Round in College Park. Laurin Mincy went 9-11 from the field and 6-7 from outside the arc for 27 points. Lexie Brown added 23 points, Tierney Pfirman had 11 off the bench and Brionna Jones scored 10 almost all in the second half. Maryland led by four at halftime and used a 17-2 run to start the second half to pull away.
- Maryland finished the season 18-0 in conference play and is the first team to do so since Purdue went 16-0 in 1998-99. Ohio State went 18-0 in the 1984-85 season. This is the first team in Maryland men's or women's basketball history to go undefeated in conference play. The Terrapins won the Big Ten title outright in their first year in the league.
- The Terps have won 26 straight games, dating back to Dec. 3. The current streak broke the longest streak in school history of 24, which spanned the end of the 2005-06 NCAA Championship season through the beginning of the 2006-07 season.
- Four Terrapins earned All-Big Ten honors earlier this month. Lexie Brown and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough were named to the All-Big Ten First Team by both the coaches and the media, while Laurin Mincy and Brionna Jones made the All-Big Ten Second Team as voted by the media. Jones was named to the coaches' First Team. Brown was also named to the five-player All-Big Ten Defensive Team, as well as one of 10 semifinalists for the Naismith Player of the Year award. Malina Howard earned a Big Ten Sportsmanship Award.
- Maryland ended the 2013-14 season ranked No. 11 in the final Associated Press poll and No. 4 in the USA Today Top 25 Coaches poll. They made a remarkable run to the program's fourth NCAA Final Four and second under Brenda Frese. Along the way, they handled top-seeded Tennessee, 73-62 and then beat No. 4 Louisville, 76-73, on its home court in front of a sellout crowd to go to the Final Four.

> 2014-15SEASON OUTLOOK

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The 2013-14 Terrapins experienced the thrill of the lifetime - a magical run to the NCAA Final Four. The Terps committed to each other before the NCAA Tournament and banded together to make one of the most special runs in school history.

A year later, the Terps will be faced with losing arguably the most valuable player in program history and a senior class that was more than dependable, all while changing conferences to the Big Ten.

"The first things that will probably come to people's minds are that Alyssa Thomas graduated and we lost two other senior starters as well," head coach Brenda Frese said. "How do we make up for that? How do we grow as a team, so we can sustain the standard we've set? The answers to those questions will reveal themselves as the season unfolds.

My mind goes back a little to the year after Kristi Toliver and Marissa Coleman graduated. We had a very raw group of players who weren't ready yet for the responsibility of helping us win every time we took the floor. That's because we had just spent a lot of years watching great players carry us in all kinds of situations."

The difference now is that the 2014-15 Terrapins have played on the nation's biggest stage and made huge contributions to get Maryland back to the Final Four.

"The difference with this team is I think we have players that have already shown that they are ready for that responsibility," Frese said. "Last season, what allowed us to make a run is we had players around Alyssa really emerge as the season developed. Our second, third and fourth leading scorers were freshmen. We started a freshman (Lexie Brown) at point guard and a freshman in the post (Brionna Jones), and the freshman that didn't start (Shatori Walker-Kimbrough)

played minutes similar to a starter. Then you look at a player like Laurin Mincy, who will be a fifth year senior who has shown the ability to assert herself in big games. Brene Moseley has done that as well for us. We do have players that can score the ball, which is what we've always built our best teams around."

Terps Go B1G

After 37 years in the ACC, the Terrapins will now compete in another strong conference - the Big Ten. While there are many unknowns as the Terps head into a new era, Frese knows they will face them together.

"The other question that will come up is 'What will it be like playing in the Big Ten?' The answer to that one is 'We'll all find out together'. I think the conference race will be pretty competitive. I'll be surprised if any one team dominates the league. I think there will be a lot of teams that on a given night can get a win. What's going to be a lot of fun for our players is that we'll be going into road arenas that have better fan support that what we're used to seeing."

New Faces

The Terrapins will welcome three freshmen - Kristen Confroy (Solon, Ohio), Aja Ellison (Voorhees, N.J.) and Kiara Leslie (Holly Springs, N.C.) - to the lineup.

"Our three true freshmen are each at different points in their progression right now," Frese said. "They've each been here since the middle of the summer and they've already been immersed academically. Basketball-wise, Kiara Leslie and Aja Ellison are both coming back from injuries that made them miss their senior years of basketball. Kristen Confroy has a unique experience in that this is the first time she's played only one sport. In high school, she was a star soccer and softball player as well.

Health-wise, I would say Kiara is ahead of Aja in terms of being ready to go

100 percent. We've seen each of them in workouts and they all have something to offer. Kiara is a really powerful player and can elevate. Aja elevates well, too and Kristen has given us indications that she'll be able to make shots for us."

Point Guards

Sophomore point guard Lexie Brown stepped up early in the season last year to establish herself as an impact player. Her performance in the Terps' run to the Final Four gives her experience that is irreplaceable. Redshirt junior Brene Moseley and junior Chloe Pavlech also gave strong performances to give the Terrapins invaluable depth.

"We're really fortunate that we have three good options at the point guard position," Frese said. "Lexie Brown became our starter early on last season and made the ACC All-Freshmen team. She became 'Big Shot Brown' for us in moments and was critical to our run to the Final Four. She's a highly intelligent young lady and when you combine that with growing up in an NBA family, she has intangibles that others in our sport never will.

Brene Moseley has had an amazing offseason. She's really grown as a leader, which is something coaches love to see. We are all very proud of her and how she is maturing.

Injuries have wreaked havoc with her. She missed her senior season of high school with an ACL, then played here her freshman season. Then she missed her sophomore season with another ACL. So entering last season, she had missed two of the previous three seasons with injuries. That can make it tough to find consistency again, especially when you want it as badly as Brene does. I'm expecting a good season from her this year and we need her.

Chloe Pavlech showed us her freshman season that she could do the job, leading us to the NCAA Sweet 16 as our starting point guard. We threw her into the fire when our other point guard options got hurt. There was a bit of irony in her sophomore season, because she didn't stay healthy during the first part of the season and she wasn't able to play for a while. So Chloe has had two different sagas in two seasons. Obviously, we're hoping she has a really strong junior season for us. I really enjoy coaching Chloe for a lot of reasons. She is really bright, a great communicator and she can connect with people."

Wings

The Terrapins have experience and depth at the wing position as well. Redshirt senior Laurin Mincy - the Terps' lone senior - found her stride at the end of last season just in time to help the Terrapins in the NCAA Tournament after an injury. Sophomore Shatori Walker-Kimbrough came up big for the Terps in multiple moments. Redshirt freshman A'Lexus Harrison will also find her way into the mix this season.

"At the top of the list of our wing players are probably Laurin Mincy and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough," Frese said. "They've each given us some really quality minutes on the perimeter. When we recruited Shatori, we did it with the idea that she could be a difference-maker for us and I think she confirmed that last season. We really want to grow her and Lexie Brown as one of the best young backcourts in the country.

I love versatile players and some of our point guards can slide over to this spot as well. Kristen Confroy will be a valuable contributor here as well and it will be interesting to see if she can be sort of a combo guard for us.

Laurin will likely get the first crack at filling the three spot. We'll certainly adjust what we do to fit her qualities. She's had a good summer and I really want her to come out with confidence. She deserves to have a really good senior season.

We have some other players that can possibly bounce between the three and four spots for us. Tierney Pfirman has played the three for us and done it well. Kiara Leslie and A'Lexus Harrison may be able to get minutes here as they develop. And in her freshman season, when we were down to six available players, Malina Howard actually played some here for us, so we do have options."

Frontcourt

The Terps' biggest strength the last few years has been dominating inside - on the glass and scoring in the paint. They led the ACC, and the nation for most of the year, in rebounding and points in the paint.

"We were thrilled last season with the emergence of Brionna Jones as a reliable presence in the middle. Coming off an ACL in high school, she exceeded our expectations with her conditioning, production, feel for the game and her work ethic. She is a really driven young lady and has some of the best hands we've ever had here in our program. She catches everything that she gets her hands on.

Malina Howard is someone we'll really be looking to for leadership and to make a difference on the court for us. I thought she was going to get off to a fast start for us last season, but a hamstring injury really slowed things down. She can shoot the ball well and is a legit threat at the high post.

Tierney Pfirman can be a very dynamic player in our front court. She has some qualities that a lot of players at this spot don't have, in that she can play like a guard. She can grab the rebound and start the break. She can fire passes the length of the court. And she has the patented 'Tierney-Turnaround' jumper that she has a knack for hitting. I really want her to break out and become a consistent threat for us.

Kiara Leslie, A'Lexus Harrison and Aja Ellison all have a chance to develop and earn time here. They each bring stuff that can help us, but none of them have played at this level yet. So we'll see what happens when the lights come on. All three can run and jump and make us a more athletic team."

Staff

Frese is fortunate enough to bring back associate head coach Tina Langley for the seventh season and assistant coach Marlin Chinn for the sixth year. This summer, they hired Shay Robinson as an assistant and welcomed back Danielle Hemerka as the director of scouting and player development and Joe Schoen as the director of video.

Robinson, a graduate of the Air Force Academy, ran the EDGE Basketball Training Facility in Orlando, as well as had coaching stops at Air Force and at Kansas most recently.

Hemerka was with the Terrapins as the assistant to the recruiting coordinator from 2009-2012. She spent two years as an assistant coach at American and one at Saint Francis (Pa.), before she returned to the Terps this summer.

Schoen was an intern on the Terps' video staff for the 2012-13 season and is a graduate of James Madison. He spent last season as the video director for the Colorado women's basketball program.

"I'm excited about this coaching staff," Frese said. "I like all the people surrounding me and we've had a very positive vibe. We had to replace some folks who advanced and got hired at other places, but that's just a byproduct of winning. I know that comes with this territory. So far, I'm really happy with the people we've brought in. And equally important, I think our players are too."

"United We Can"

Frese and her staff have developed the tradition of choosing a team theme for each season. After the 2010-11 season, Frese and the staff felt like their young Terrapins didn't finish out games, so they developed the theme of, "Fight to Finish," for the 2011-12 season. In 2012-13, the staff wanted to push the team to have everyone working their hardest in all aspects of life, on and off the court, so they chose the theme, "All in to W.I.N." The W.I.N. stood for What's Important Now.

"Each year we come up with a team theme, which is actually a lot of fun for us to create," Frese said. "This year's is 'United We Can', which I think speaks to the togetherness we have on our team right now. We think if this group really buys in and believes in each other, we can have another really good season.

Some of our previous season themes were 'Fight to Finish', which was about continuing to battle until the very end of everything. And last year was 'We Will', which was a play off of the Under Armour 'I Will' ad campaign. It seemed appropriate and it was another way of emphasizing how important it was for us to work together. And actually, once we truly started to do that, we made a run to the Final Four. So let's hope this year's theme works out as well."

Lexie Brown added 23 points, Tierney Pfirman had 11 off the bench and Brionna Jones scored 10 - almost all in the second half. Maryland led by four at halftime and used a 17-2 run to start the second half to pull away.
- Maryland finished the season 18-0 in conference play and is the first team to do so since Purdue went 16-0 in 1998-99. Ohio State went 18-0 in the 1984-85 season. This is the first team in Maryland men's or women's basketball history to go undefeated in conference play. The Terrapins won the Big Ten title outright in their first year in the league.
- The Terps have won 26 straight games, dating back to Dec. 3. The current streak broke the longest streak in school history of 24, which spanned the end of the 2005-06 NCAA Championship season through the beginning of the 2006-07 season.

Storylines

- Over the last four years, three-time All-American Alyssa Thomas led Maryland in scoring, rebounds, assists and steals. Now, Brown, Walker-Kimbrough and Mincy lead the Terps in scoring, Jones leads in rebounds, and Brown also leads in assists and steals to lead one of the most balanced teams in the country.
- Maryland ended the 2013-14 season ranked No. 11 in the final Associated Press poll and No. 4 in the USA Today Top 25 Coaches poll. They made a remarkable run to the program's fourth NCAA Final Four and second under head coach Brenda Frese. Along the way, they handled top-seeded Tennessee, 73-62 and then beat No. 4 Louisville, 76-73, on its home court in front of a sellout crowd to go to the Final Four.
- Lexie Brown was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team last year and was the 14th Terrapin in Brenda Frese's 13 seasons to earn the honor. She was second on the team in scoring with 10.1 points per game and led the team in assists with 4.3 per contest. Brown was fourth among all players in the ACC in assists and third in assist/turnover ratio (1.9).
- Brown was also named to the Louisville Regional All-Tournament team. She averaged 15.6 points per game in the NCAA Tournament run, with 4.6 assists. She shot 45.5% from the field, over 30% from outside the arc and 79.2% from the foul line in the Terps' five NCAA Tournament games.
- The Terrapins' returners played a huge roll in the run to the Final Four. In addition to Brown's contributions,

Laurin Mincy was the Terps' third leading scorer in the tournament with 9.0 points and 3.0 rebounds per game with nine steals. Walker-Kimbrough added 6.4 points and 10 steals in five games.

- Brenda Frese signed a multi-year extension in November 2014 which will keep her at Maryland through at least 2021. With rollovers, she could be on the Maryland sidelines through 2025. She's brought the program its first national championship, two Final Fours, five Elite Eights and 10 NCAA Tournament appearances in her 12 postseasons. Frese has also brought in 10 top 15 recruiting classes and brought home three conference titles.
- The Terps are again one of the nation's tallest teams with their average height at 6-0. Seven of the team's 12 players are over the 6-0 mark.

Milestones, Streaks, etc.

- Laurin Mincy has scored in double figures in 24 of 34 games this season.
- Lexie Brown has hit double figures in 25 of 33 games this year.
- Twelve of Jones' 13 double-doubles this year have come in conference or postseason play.
- Maryland has won 30 straight games against Big Ten teams, dating back to 2007.
- The Terps have won 26 straight games since the beginning of December, which is a new program record. Maryland won a school-record 24-straight games from the end of the 2005-2006 season through the beginning of the 2006-07 season.

Stolen Away

- The Terps are averaging more steals this year than they have in the last 12 years. Through 34 games, they have 295 steals, for 8.7 per game. They nabbed a season-high 24 vs. Wagner on Nov. 16.
- Under Frese, the Terrapins have averaged over 10 steals a game just once her first season when they averaged 10.1 in 2002-03.
- The Terps have forced 573 turnovers in 34 games and have scored 667 (19.6 per game) points off of them.

Pound It Inside

- The Terps have scored 40 or more points inside this year in 10 out of 34 games. They scored a seasonhigh 54 points in the paint vs. Wagner and at Coppin State. They've outscored their opponents inside, 1,204-906 (35.4 to 26.6).
- Last year, they outscored opponents inside 1,520-987 (43.4 to 28.2).
- The Terps scored 40 or more points inside last year in 16 of 35 games. They scored a season-high 60 points in the paint at Georgia Tech on Feb. 23.

Total Team Effort

- Over the last four years, three-time All-American Alyssa Thomas led Maryland in scoring, rebounds, assists and steals. Now, Brown, Walker-Kimbrough and Mincy lead the Terps in scoring, Jones leads in rebounds, and Brown leads in assists and steals.
- Maryland has had at least five players in double figures in eight games this year. Seven players hit double figures on Nov. 14 vs. Mount St. Mary's.

- The Terrapins have had seven different leading scorers this year.
- Maryland's bench has scored opponents' benches 710-420 (20.9 to 12.4) through 34 games.
- Nine Terps are averaging 10 minutes per game.
- The Terps had four or more players in double figures in 19 of 35 games last year.
- Maryland's bench outscored it's opponent's bench last year, 1,157 to 664, which is 33.1 points per game to the opponents' 19.0. Maryland's bench put up 40 or more points in 14 of 35 games.

Terps in the Polls

Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country. The Terrapins have been ranked in 94 straight Associated Press polls, dating back to the preseason poll of the 2010-11 season.

- Maryland has been ranked for 153 weeks in the last 10 seasons, with 129 of those weeks in the AP top 10 and 60 in the AP top 5.
- The Terps appeared in the AP Top 5 on Jan. 26, 2015 for the first time since March 12, 2012.
- This marks the 191st week head coach Brenda Frese has had a team ranked in her career.

Terps vs. Ranked Team Under Frese

Since Brenda Frese took over in 2002-03, Maryland has 58 wins over Associated Press top 25 teams, including nine this year. The Terps won at No. 12 Nebraska, 75-47, on Jan. 3, at No. 23 Minnesota, 77-73, on Jan. 11, at No. 22 Rutgers, 71-59, on Jan. 15, vs. No. 20 Iowa, 93-88, on Feb. 1, vs. No. 19 Nebraska, 59-47, on Feb. 8, at No. 25 Northwestern, 69-48, on March 1, and over Northwestern again, 74-63, on March 7. Most recently, Maryland beat

undefeated No. 13 Princeton 85-70 on March 23 in the NCAA Second Round.

- The Terps won a school-record 10 games over ranked teams in the 2005-06 season, including six over top 10 opponents and four over top five teams.
- Under Frese, Maryland has 20 wins over AP top 10 teams, most recently a 76-63 win over No. 4 Louisville in the NCAA Elite Eight.
- Maryland has five wins over No. 1 teams in its history, including two in Frese's time. The Terrapins beat No. 1 North Carolina twice in the 2005-06 season.

Maryland in the B1G

In its first season in the Big Ten, Maryland won the regular season with a perfect 18-0 record, then finished it off with the Big Ten tournament title. The Terrapins won 10 tournament titles and three regular season titles in their 37 years in the ACC.

- The Terps are 65-29 (.691) all-time against their 2014-15 Big Ten opponents.
- Maryland has won 30 straight games against Big Ten teams, dating back to 2007. The last loss to a Big Ten opponent was when the third-ranked Terps fell at No. 4 Rutgers, 68-60, on Dec. 3, 2007.
- In the 13 years under Frese, the Terps are 33-4 (.892) against their new conference opponents.
- Frese is 45-10 (.818) all-time vs. Big Ten opponents, which includes her time at Minnesota (01-02) and at Ball State (99-01).
- Maryland is 14-2 (.875) against Big Ten teams at home in XFINITY Center. All are under Frese. Those two losses were against Penn State on Dec. 4, 2002 and Ohio State in the NCAA Second Round in 2003.
- In her one season coaching in the Big Ten, Frese led Minnesota to a record of 22-8 overall, 11-5 in Big Ten play and an NCAA Tournament berth. She was

Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team, especially over the last decade.

- The Terps are 483-127 (.792) all time in College Park, dating back to the inaugural 1971-72 season.
- Maryland is 190-32 (.856) at home under Brenda Frese, whose first season in College Park was the inaugural season of XFINITY Center.
- The Terrapins are 116-6 (.951) all-time in nonconference games in XFINITY Center.
- The Terps won 48 straight home games starting Nov. 9, 2007 with a 76-52 season-opening win over Princeton. The streak ended on Jan. 21, 2010 with an 80-77 loss to Miami.

Super Sophomores

Since they came to campus in June 2013, Lexie Brown, Brionna Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough have been key players to the Terrapins' success.

- Currently, the trio comprises 39.3 of Maryland's 80.2 points per game, which is 49.0 percent of the offense for the Big Ten's top scoring team.
- Lexie Brown has improved her numbers from 10.1 points per game as a rookie to 13.7 as a sophomore.
- Walker-Kimbrough has become a more consistent threat for the Terrapins, now averaging 13.2 points per game as one of the team's leading scorers, from her 9.3 per game as a freshman. Last year, she shot 47.8 percent from the field (122-255) and is shooting 51.3 percent this year (178-347).
- Brionna Jones has seen the biggest transformation of all three. She's lost close to 40 lbs since June 2013 and recovered from an ACL tear. This year, she's averaging 12.4 points per game, which is up from 6.9 last year. She's also averaging 9.0 boards per game, an improvement from 4.5 as a freshman. She's also taken more minutes on the court. Last year, she started in 14 of 35 games and played 16.2 minutes per game. This year, she's started in all 34 games and is playing over 23 minutes a game.

Mincy Returns

After recovering from an ACL tear in her left knee suffered as a senior in high school, Laurin Mincy made huge strides in her game in 2011-12 to become an All-ACC Honorable Mention honoree. She tore her right ACL on Nov. 28, 2012 and worked to get back to full strength to be a key player in the Terps' run to the Final Four.

- Mincy missed her senior season at University High School in Newark, N.J. due to her first ACL tear.
- She saw action in 31 of 32 games and made one start as a freshman. She averaged 16.4 minutes per game and 4.9 points per contest.
- As a sophomore, she averaged 13.1 points per game an 8.2 improvement. She upped her field goal percentage from .382 as a freshman to .436, and her three-point field goal percentage from .274 to .400.
- After working to get back to full strength most of last season, Mincy was the Terps' third leading scorer in the tournament with 9.0 points and 3.0 rebounds per game with nine steals in five games.
- This year, she's one of Maryland's top scorers with 13.9 points per game the highest average of her

career. She hit 1,000 career points earlier this year.

Double-Doubles

Six current Terps have double-doubles in their career and Howard, Pfirman, Jones, Leslie, Mincy and Walker-Kimbrough - have combined for 21 this year.

- Sophomore Brionna Jones picked up her first of her career last year vs. Syracuse. She has 13 this year and 14 in her career. Twelve of her 13 this year have come in conference or postseason play. Most recently, Jones had 10 points and 10 rebounds vs. No. 13 Princeton in the NCAA Second Round.
- Sophomore Shatori Walker-Kimbrough added her first career double-double with 23 points and a career-high 10 rebounds vs. American on Dec. 12.
- Junior Malina Howard came up big for the Terps in the Big Ten Championship game with her second career double-double. She scored 12 points with a career-high 12 rebounds.
- Freshman Kiara Leslie picked up her first career double-double with 11 points and 10 rebounds vs. Wagner.
- Junior Tierney Pfirman scored 16 points with 11 rebounds for the second of her career vs. Mount St. Mary's on Nov. 14. She added her first with 11 points and 10 rebounds in 10 minutes vs. Virginia Tech on March 2.
- Laurin Mincy notched her first with 21 points and 12 rebounds in the Terps' Sweet Sixteen win over Texas A&M in March 2012. She added her second with 14 points and 11 rebounds vs. Ohio State this year.

Overtime is Our Time

The phrase, "Overtime is our time!" became one of the catch phrases from the Terps' 2006 NCAA title run. That 2005-06 team went 6-0 in overtime games and won the national title in extra time vs. Duke.

- Maryland is 15-2 (.882) in overtime games in head coach Brenda Frese's 12 years.
- In the 2007-08 season, Frese was not on the sidelines for two of the Terps' overtime games. She missed a 97-86 double overtime loss at North Carolina on Jan. 26, 2008 and a 74-71 win at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008, due to her pregnancy with her sons.
- The Terps' only overtime loss with Frese on the sidelines was a 95-91 loss at Florida State on Jan. 16, 2005

Terps Welcome Top 10 Class for 2015

Head coach Brenda Frese and her staff welcome two McDonald's All-Americans who make up the 10th top 10 class in her 13 years this season.

- Forward Brianna Fraser (Brooklyn, N.Y.) and forward Kiah Gillespie (Meriden, Conn.) make up the No. 10 recruiting class in the country.
- Fraser, who is 6-3, is the No. 12 overall player by the All Star Girls Report and is the No. 15 overall recruit in the class by ESPN's Hoop Gurlz.
- Gillespie, who is 6-2, is ranked No. 14 by Prospects Nation and No. 27 by ESPN's Hoop Gurlz. She's led her team to two state titles already.

Family Ties

 Head coach Brenda Frese and her younger sister, Marsha, are the only two sister head coaches

in Division I. Marsha is in her third year as head coach at UMKC and was an assistant under Brenda at Ball State, Minnesota and for two years at Maryland.

- Many Terrapins have NBA pedigree in their background. Lexie Brown's dad is 1991 NBA Slam Dunk Champion Dee Brown, who is currently an assistant with the Sacramento Kings.
- Aja Ellison's dad is 1989 NBA No. 1 overall draft pick Pervis Ellison, who also won a national championship at Louisville. Her mother, Timi, ran track at Maryland.
- Lexie and Aja's dads played together with the Boston Celtics in the mid-1990s.
- Kiara Leslie's older brother, C.J., played at NC State from 2010-13 and now plays professionally in Korea.
- Malina Howard's younger sister, Marisa, is a freshman post player at Division II Goldey-Beacom.
- Brionna Jones' older brother, Jarred, plays at Loyola (Md.).

Next Level

- Over the last few years, multiple members of Frese's staff have made the jump to work in the NBA.
- Five-year assistant coach David Adkins came to Maryland after becoming a highly-respected development coach at the high school level. This past summer, he was hired by the Washington Wizards as their assistant coach for player development.
- Former practice player and coordinator of recruiting operations Winston Gandy was also hired by the Wizards this summer, as a development assistant.
- Former practice player and intern Ryan Richman was hired as the Wizards' assistant video coordinator prior to the 2013-14 season.

Team Tyler

In September 2010, Brenda Frese's two-year old son, Tyler Thomas, was diagnosed with leukemia. He started treatments immediately at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore and has been clear from leukemia cells since shortly after. On Dec. 3, 2013, Tyler took his last dose of chemo after three years of treatments and will go to Hopkins for a monthy checkup until May of 2015.

- In 2010-11, some starters from the 2006 national championship team - Marissa Coleman, Shay Doron, Laura Harper and Kristi Toliver - got together and formed the Team Tyler Foundation.
- The Team Tyler Foundation raises money for leukemia research and patients at Hopkins.
- This year's annual Team Tyler game was Sunday, Feb. 8 vs. Nebraska.

Fear the Turtle!

- Maryland's bid to the 2015 NCAA Tournament marked its 12th straight postseason appearance.
 Eleven of those 12 were NCAA Tournament bids.
- The Terps have averaged 27.8 wins per season the last 10 years, including 11 consecutive 20-win seasons from 2004-2015.
- Frese has led the Terps to five 30-win seasons. 2005-06 marked the first 30-win season for the program, as the Terrapins went 34-4 and won the 2006 NCAA title. The Terps won 30 games in 2007-08 when they went 33-4 and in 2008-09 when they went 31-5. In 2012-13, the Terps notched the program's fourth 30-win season with their record of 31-5.

- The Terrapins have won at least one postseason game (NCAA or WNIT) in each of the last 11 seasons.
- The Terps have advanced to the NCAA SWEET 16 seven times in the last 10 years.
- Maryland earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament in 2008, 2009 and 2015 and a No. 2 seed in 2006, 2007 and 2012.

There was no better fit for the University of Maryland women's basketball program than head coach Brenda Frese. The 2002 Associated Press (AP) National Coach of the Year arrived in College Park with great expectations and has not disappointed. Reviving a once-prominent women's basketball program back to the national stage, her high work rate and positive attitude has resulted in two Final Fours, 11-straight top 15 recruiting classes and a National Championship in 2006. Frese has balanced that strong work ethic with a fun and family-friendly environment, also becoming a wife and a mother of twin boys, giving birth to them in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. With the birth of her twins in February of 2008, she becomes one of only six coaches to win a national championship and be a parent.

Now in her 13th season at Maryland, Frese has guided Maryland to a National Championship in 2006, two Final Fours, 12 winning seasons, 11-straight 20-win seasons, five 30-win campaigns and 11 trips to the NCAA Tournament. In 2013, she signed an extension through at least June of 2021.

Frese and her staff led the Terrapins to an unprecedented level of success in their first year in the Big Ten in 2015. After losing five seniors, including three starters and a three-time All-American, Maryland led the league in scoring with 80.2 points per game, en route to a perfect 18-0 conference record in a new league and a 24-game win streak over three months. The Terrapins were the first team to go undefeated in conference play since Purdue went 16-0 in 1998-99 and Ohio State went 18-0 in 1984-85. The Terps were the first Maryland team, men's or women's, to stay perfect in conference play. Frese was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the second time in her career.

Former Athletics Director Deborah A. Yow courted the 2002 AP National Coach of the Year because of Frese's reputation for making amazing turnarounds and her relentless work ethic in recruiting. Described as dynamic, overachieving, determined and enthusiastic, the 44-year old coach is one of college basketball's stars. Standing atop the podium in Boston in 2006, Frese became the fifth-youngest coach (age 35) in NCAA history to win a national title and only the ninth to win in her first trip to the Final Four.

Frese has built the team's success around recruiting, hard work and a positive atmosphere. The instant she arrived on campus, she determinedly worked the recruiting trails in an effort to reclaim the elite status Maryland once had in the 1980s. Success came quickly and early. Before she even coached a game in the newly-constructed XFINITY Center, she received commitments from a pair of high school All-Americans, including Shay Doron, who went on to become a three-time All-ACC pick and a WNBA Draft selection. In all, 26 high school All-Americans have donned a Maryland uniform under Frese's reign.

All 12 of Frese's recruiting classes at Maryland have been ranked in the top-15, including nine rated in the top-10 and five in the top five. The landmark signings of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman were rated No. 2 in the country, while the class of Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver was ranked No. 4 - the core of the Terps' national championship team. Her 2010 batch of Terrapins included three high school All-Americans and a No. 2 national ranking.

Frese's recruiting classes have lived up to their billing and her pupils have earned numerous accolades. In 2012, Alyssa Thomas became the first Maryland sophomore to be named a WBCA All-American, and was also named to the AP All-American First Team and the USBWA All-American Team. The first Terp in 17 years to garner All-American nods in 2006, Langhorne was a three-time AP and USBWA All-

American, the program's first multiple All-American. She was selected a WBCA All-American in 2007, the first in school history since 1989, and then again received the accolade in 2008.

Toliver repeated Langhorne's AP, WBCA



Frese's players have also received numerous ACC honors. Most recently, Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year as a sophomore in 2012. She is just the second sophomore in the history of ACC women's basketball to earn the league's most prestigious honor and went on to win the ACC Tournament MVP honor that year. Thomas garnered the league's top honor in her junior and senior seasons as well and was just the second player in history to earn the honor three times. In her final season, Langhorne was selected the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Terp to win the award in nearly 20 years. Toliver followed suit in 2009 - the third Terp ever to win the award. In 2005, Langhorne became the program's first ACC Rookie of the Year since 1991. Coleman followed in her footsteps by nabbing the honor during the Terps' championship campaign in 2006. Center Lynetta Kizer and Thomas made it four Terps in six years to be named the league's top freshman when they won in 2009 and 2011

In all, 28 Terps have received All-ACC citations in Frese's 12 years, including a school-record four in 2008 when Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver and Harper were selected and in 2012 when Thomas, Tianna Hawkins, Laurin Mincy and Lynetta Kizer were honored. Six Terps have been First Team ACC selections 11 times in Frese's tenure. Langhorne became Maryland's first three-time, first team all-conference selection and the first to be named All-ACC four times. Coleman joined Langhorne as the lone Terps to ever be selected to an All-ACC team four times, stamping her three second-team honors with a first-team selection in 2009. Thomas was also a four-time selection and three-time first team honoree. In fact, of Maryland's six players all-time to be selected All-ACC three times or more, five of them were recruited by Frese (Doron, Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver, Thomas).

Numerous Terps have also garnered national recognition under Frese. Toliver became the first Terrapin to earn the highest point guard honor in the country, winning the Nancy Leiberman Award in 2008, after being a finalist the previous year. Several have earned spots on national player of the year candidate lists, making history in the fall of 2006. That year, for the first time ever, four players from the same team were selected preseason candidates for the WBCA's prestigious Wade Trophy when Doron, Coleman, Langhorne and Toliver were put on the Watch List. All five starters were tabbed preseason honorees for the Naismith Award, also a first in the history of the award.

Maryland has rewritten several records over the last eight seasons. In 2007-08, the Terps became the first team in NCAA history to have four active players with at least 1,000 points on the same roster. That year, school records were broken for most home wins (21), which is also believed

to be an NCAA record. The team opened the 2006-07 campaign winning 18-straight games, setting the program record for best start to a season. Maryland ended the 2008-09 campaign having won a school-record 36-straight home games, thanks to undefeated home marks in two successive seasons, and 40-consecutive non-conference games at the Comcast Center. In the 2009-10 season the Terrapins extended that streak to 48, a Maryland men's and women's basketball record

In 2005-06, the team's 34 wins set a school record, shattering the previous mark of 29. The championship squad also set new standards for highest road winning percentage (.900), points (3,166), field goal attempts (2,363), 3-point field goals (216), 3-point attempts (540), free throws (690), free throw attempts (924), team free throw percentage (.747), rebounds (1,720) and blocked shots (195).

Numerous individual records have also fallen in recent years. Among the most notable are the career scoring and rebounding records, which now own to Thomas. Langhorne shattered the previous marks, becoming the first-ever Terrapin to score 2,000 points and to grab 1,000 rebounds - an elite list of which Coleman later joined.

Maryland's rise into the upper-echelon of the country has bolstered the excitement surrounding the team. Over the last ten years, the program has ranked in the top-25 in the nation in attendance, including top-10 rankings in five of the last 10 seasons. In 2007, Maryland recorded the nation's largest one-season improvement in home attendance. averaging 9,533 fans in 16 games, almost double the average from the previous season (4,183) - with more than 150,000 people making their way through the Comcast Center turnstiles, a school-record. By the end of the '07 campaign, the Terps were sixth in the nation in average attendance and fourth in overall attendance, as 241,280 spectators filled the stands at home and on the road to watch the Terps play in 34 games. In 2008, Maryland hosted over 160,000 fans in 21 games and was ranked eighth in the nation in average attendance that year, followed by a No. 6 ranking in 2009 (133,336 in 15 games).

One of the highlights of the 2006-07 campaign was the announcement of two sellout games in Comcast Center, the first- and second-ever in the young facility. The stands were filled to capacity when the Terps hosted North Carolina on Jan. 28, 2007, breaking the ACC's single-game record, the first women's basketball sellout since 1992. The record was matched in the regular-season finale on Feb. 18, 2007, when Duke came to College Park.

Maryland owns all 10 of the conference's top-10 singlegame attendances, nine coming since Frese has roamed the

In the classroom, the Terps have also been all-star students. 24 of Frese's Terps have been named to the ACC Honor Roll, while five have received Academic All-American nods by ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA.

Tina Langley is in her sixth season at Maryland and 16th in coaching overall. She was promoted to associate head coach in the summer of 2011.

Langley made an instant impact her first season with the Terps. She served a crucial role in helping to lead the Terps to their first ACC Championship in 20 seasons and helped secure one of the nation's top recruiting classes for 2010. In her six years in College Park, Langley has helped the Terrapins to a 161-46 (.778) record, the 2014 Final Four, three Elite Eights, five NCAA Tournament appearances and two ACC championships.



In 2014, Langley and the Terrapins' coaching staff helped lead the team on a remarkable run to the Final Four. The Terps suffered a disappointing loss to North Carolina in the ACC Quarterfinals. After the extra bye week before the NCAA Tournament, the coaching staff helped the Terrapins refocus and recommit. They went on to beat the Patriot League champion Army in the NCAA First Round, then a tough Texas squad with one of the nation's best front courts in the Second Round.

In the Sweet Sixteen, the Terrapins handled top-seeded Tennessee, 73-62, behind a career-high 33 points and 13 rebounds from Alyssa Thomas, then became the first team in 20 years to win an Elite Eight game on an opponent's home court. The Terrapins beat No. 4 Louisville, 76-73, in front of 14,002 at the KFC Yum! Center, which was the Cardinals' home court.

As Coach Frese's top assistant, Langley's responsibilities include coordinating the Terps' recruiting efforts, assisting in player development, scouting, and on the court coaching.

"Tina jumped right in and made a huge impact for us. Her work ethic is nothing short of stellar, she has an excellent demeanor with our student-athletes, and she has an exceptional ability to take on many roles and responsibilities," said head coach Brenda Frese, "She possesses all the characteristics we need in a coach to make a positive impact on our recruiting efforts, player development, and our program as a whole. I'm looking forward to working by her side again this season."

In addition to her passion, determination, and work ethic, Langley has significant coaching experience. She had coaching stints at Toledo, Clemson and Georgia. She has been instrumental in recruiting, game preparation and floor management in each of her stops.

Langley spent five seasons at the University of Toledo, beginning her coaching career with the Rockets as a graduate assistant coach in 1998-99, before moving up to recruiting coordinator and eventual associate head coach during the 2002-03 campaign. She helped the Rockets reach the postseason three times, including two NCAA Tournament appearances. During her tenure, Toledo also won three Mid-American Conference regular season titles (1999, 2001, 2003) and two conference tournament crowns (1999 and 2001).

At Toledo, Langley was responsible for all facets of the program, including recruiting, scouting of opponents and coordinating the team's academic efforts. She helped to sign two nationally ranked classes, the Rockets accumulated a 101-38 record (.679) during her time.

Langley then joined the staff at Clemson in 2003, under head coach Jim Davis. In her two years with the Tigers, the team advanced to the 2004 WNIT while also orchestrating a CU-record six-signee class, which was ranked in the top 30 nationally in just her first season.

After her stop at Clemson, Langley was hired at the University of Georgia as the recruiting coordinator. Langley left coaching for a couple years and earned her second master's in Community Counseling from the University of Alabama, specializing in college mental health. She was named the Most Outstanding Graduate Student in 2008.

Langley played basketball and volleyball for two seasons at Bevill State Junior College before transferring to the University of West Alabama, where she lettered twice in basketball as a guard/forward. She graduated from UWA with a degree in special education in 1996, and earned her first master's degree in Recreation and Leisure with an emphasis in recreation administration from the University of Toledo. Langley resides in Laurel, Md.

MarlinCHINN

Assistant Coach • 6th year • Hampton '92

Marlin Chinn enters his sixth season as an assistant coach on Brenda Frese's coaching staff at the University of Maryland.

"We have always been about family first here at Maryland and it's pretty special to bring Marlin back home," Frese said. "This is where he wants to be and he already knows why Maryland is an incredible place. As we got to know each other, we quickly found Marlin shares common traits with us - loyalty, work ethic, care and concern for people and he is a tremendous recruiter. We feel as though Marlin will help us continue to set the bar high for excellence here at Maryland. We're excited to welcome him to our family."



In his five years in College Park, he's helped lead the Terrapins to a 130-38 (.774) overall record, the 2011-12 ACC Tournament Championship, and four NCAA Tournament berths, including the 2013-2014 Final Four. Maryland's other NCAA Tournament berths have resulted in two Elite Eight and three Sweet Sixteen appearances. Chinn has helped Maryland sign four recruiting classes that have ranked in the top-10 nationally, as well as in the recruitment and coaching of three-time ACC Player of the Year, Alyssa Thomas. In 2012, College Insiders named Chinn as of the nation's top-10 assistant coaches, after being recognized in the top-20 in 2011.

In 2013-14, Chinn and the Terrapins' coaching staff helped lead the team on a remarkable run to the NCAA Tournament Final Four. The Terps beat Patriot League champion Army in the First Round, then a tough Texas squad in the Second Round. In the Sweet Sixteen, the Terrapins handled top-seeded Tennessee, 73-62. Maryland would then become the first team in 20 years to win an Elite Eight game on an opponent's home court when they beat No. 4 Louisville, 76-73, in front of 14,002 at the KFC Yum! Center to arrive in the Final Four.

Chinn arrived at Maryland after four seasons as an assistant coach at Seton Hall University from 2005 to 2009, including the final three seasons as the program's top assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. In his second season on Phyllis Mangina's staff at Seton Hall in 2006-07, he helped the program to their first winning record in Big East play in six years and a 13-win improvement over the previous season. During his five seasons at Seton Hall, Chinn helped secure a top-30 nationally ranked recruiting class in 2007, recruited a pair of Big East All-Rookie Team selections, and recruited and coached two Big East All-Conference performers.

The Archbishop Carroll High School alum previously spent seven seasons as the top assistant coach at Mount St. Mary's University from 1998 to 2005. At the Mount, he helped lead the program to two NEC regular season championships in 1998-99 and 2000-01. 



▶ 1: MOUNT ST. MARY'S



Junior Tierney Pfirman registered her second career double-double with 16 points and 11 assists as the No. 8 Maryland women's basketball team (1-0, 0-0 B1G) defeated Mount St. Mary's 109-45 in their season opener. Seven Terrapins registered double-digit points, contributing to the all-around effort.

"I thought we had tremendous energy coming out on the tip," Head coach Brenda Frese said. "You could tell we were excited and ready to play. I though we set the tone early, and we were aggressive early on... It was a really good game for us to begin with and build on."

The Terrapins dominated in the first half, racking up a 57-24 lead while limiting The Mount to just 31 percent shooting. Maryland started the game on a 9-0 run, led by five points from sophomore Lexie Brown. A layup from freshman Kristen Confroy forced the Mount to take a timeout

Pfirman led the Terrapins' offense in the first with 14 points. She notched eight straight as Maryland increased its lead to 53-21. Senior Laurin Mincy went 5-of-5 from the free throw line and grabbed seven rebounds.

The Terps dished the ball 16 times on 21 field goals in the first half, led by Confroy's six assists.

The team picked up where it left off at the start of the second half, jumping out with a 20-5 run to extend the lead to 77-29.

Chloe Pavlech drained back-to-back threepoint shots with a little under six minutes to play to cement the Terps victory, giving them a 94-43 lead at the time.

A Brene Moseley layup with 2:13 left in the game put the Terps over the century mark for the game. This marks the first time the Terrapins have broken 100 points in a regular season opener since defeating Siena 107-66 on November 18, 2005.

The Terps closed the game on a 13-0 run over the final 2:46. Freshman Kiara Leslie led the Terps in the second half with 14 points and five rebounds. Shatori Walker-Kimbrough and Chloe Pavlech both added eight points in the half as well.

Maryland's defense held strong throughout the game, holding the Mount to 29 percent field-goal shooting and forcing 17 turnovers.

▶ 2: WAGNER

Lexie Brown scored 11 of her 13 points in the first half to lead six Maryland players in double figures as the eighth-ranked Maryland women's basketball team (2-0) cruised to a 97-24 victory over Wagner on Sunday.

Freshman Kiara Leslie had 11 points and 10 rebounds for her first career double-double, while sophomore Brionna Jones picked up the second of her career with 10 points and 10 rebounds. Malina Howard, Brene Moseley and Tierney Pfirman finished with 10 points apiece.

Wagner (0-2) was held to just seven points in the first half, which was the lowest the Terps have allowed in 13 seasons under coach Brenda Frese. The Maryland defense nabbed 24 steals on the day. Jordyn Peck led the Seahawks with seven points.

"I thought for us it was a great defensive effort today," head coach Brenda Frese said. "To be able to hold them to a program record seven points in the first half, they went scoreless the last eight minutes of the game. I thought our defense being able to change it up, utilize our depth within our team we were really able to throw a lot of looks that I thought caught them off guard."

"Our players love playing this style of play, being really active, getting into the passing lanes. I'm not sure I have ever seen us with 24 steals so when you talk about that for our aggressiveness, for teams to be uncomfortable is huge."

Brown scored seven points, Howard had four rebounds and the Terps jumped out to a 23-5 lead midway through the first half. Maryland continued to dominate with a steal and layup by Moseley that extended the lead to 49-7 at the break

Jones scored six points and Maryland increased the margin to 62-11 with 16 minutes remaining in the game. All 12 of Maryland's players scored points.

Wagner was held scoreless in the final eight minutes and shot just 3 of 25 (12 percent) from the field.

Maryland has won 110 of 116 non-conference games at home since 2002.

Sophomore Shatori Walker-Kimbrough scored 17 of her career-high 25 points in the first half to lead No. 8 Maryland to an 85-67 victory over No. 25 South Florida Wednesday night at the XFINITY Center.

Sophomore Lexie Brown added 15 points and redshirt senior Laurin Mincy had 10 for the Terrapins (3-0). Junior Malina Howard had her first career double-double with 11 points and 11 rebounds, while freshman Kristen Confroy also had 11 points off the bench for Maryland.

"A really solid win so early in the season, especially against a team that's going to be in the NCAA tournament," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I think they obviously really challenged us the entire game. Shatori was sensational and the team collectively just did a really nice job trying to make [Courtney Williams] work."

"To be able to see Shatori's night, what she was able to do was really explosive and I think she really helped to set the tone from the tip. I thought our starters were really ready to play and really made a statement early. To be able to see how aggressive Malina was, we really needed that kind of rebounding and aggressiveness. It was just a tremendous way for us to start off in the first half and grow in the second half."

Courtney Williams scored 16 points for South Florida. Alisia Jenkins finished 12 with points and Laura Ferreira had 10 for the Bulls (2-1).

South Florida fell behind by double-digits early, thanks in large part to a 9-0 Terps run to start the game. The Bulls scored eight straight points to pull within 24-20 with 9:44 left in the first half. Maryland, however, stayed in control and consecutive shots by Walker-Kimbrough increased the margin to 43-30 with 4:05 remaining.

A pair of free throws by Brene Moseley in the closing seconds gave the Terps a 50-33 lead at the break. Maryland shot 18 of 31 (58.1 percent) in the opening half.

Maryland continued to pull away in the second half and layup by Walker-Kimbrough increased the lead to 60-38 with 16:49 left in the game. South Florida could not cut into the margin and 3-pointer by Confroy gave the Terps a 75-53 lead with 7:35 remaining.

The Terps were able to overcome the Bulls' zone defense with their hot shooting. Another jumper by Howard gave the Terps an 81-63 margin with 2:26 left.

The eighth-ranked Maryland women's basketball team pushed through a tough first half and won at George Washington, 75-65, Saturday afternoon. Redshirt senior Laurin Mincy took over in the second half for 23 points, including 21 in the second period, for the win.


"That was Laurin stepping up as a senior and understanding what this team needed," head coach Brenda Frese said.

Lisa Mirarchi led the Greyhounds with 15 points, while Bri Betz-White scored 10. Loyola, however, was held to just seven field goals in the second half.



Redshirt senior Laurin Mincy scored 17 of her 23 points in the second half to lead the eighth-ranked Maryland women's basketball team to an 80-64 win over No. 23 James Madison Friday afternoon in the San Juan Shootout at the Mario Morales Coliseum in Puerto Rico.

Mincy has scored in double figures in four straight games for Maryland (6-0). Sophomore Lexie Brown added 13 points and has hit double digits in every game this season. Sophomore Brionna Jones added 10 points and redshirt junior Brene Moseley had nine off the bench.

"I thought we came out aggressive from the tip," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought our defense and rebounding really set the tone. Laurin Mincy was spectacular and she really led the way, putting the team on her back, especially in the second half. She's extremely difficult to guard."



Sophomore Brionna Jones led the Terrapins (6-1) with a career-high 23 points. Laurin Mincy added 13 points, including 11 in the second half, with a team-high five assists.

Lia Galdiera scored 33 points to tie her careerhigh for the Cougars (5-2).

"Washington State played a flawless game," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought they competed hard for 40 minutes. They did a tremendous job defensively and were really, really aggressive on us. They made it hard for us to get into any kind of rhythm offensively."

Washington State scored the opening bucket 20 seconds in, then the Terps' defense held the Cougars without a field goal for well over seven minutes. In the meantime, the Terrapins went on a 12-2 run to take the lead 12-4.

Despite an even second half, the Maryland women's basketball team (6-2) fell short vs. No. 1 Notre Dame (8-0), 92-72, Wednesday night in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge at the Allen Country War Memorial Coliseum.

Sophomore Lexie Brown and redshirt senior Laurin Mincy had 20 points each for Maryland and freshman Kristen Confroy added 14 off the bench. The Terrapins had 13 turnovers in the first half and trailed, 47-27 at the break. In the second half, they had just three turnovers and the score was tied at 45 for each team.

"You're not going to win games against great competition with those kinds of starts," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I think we did a much better job in the second half to give ourselves a chance."

Jewell Loyd led Notre Dame with 27 points.

Loyd scored eight points, two of the baskets coming on fast breaks, during a 10-0 run as the Terrapins missed 12 straight shots and the Irish opened a 21-6 lead. Maryland made just 29 percent of its shots in the first half while the Irish shot 59 percent.

Loyd added seven points during a 14-0 run in the second half that extended the lead to 70-37. She started the run with a pair of free throws, and then Michaela Mabrey hit back-to-back 3-pointers.

Kathryn Westbeld then converted three free throws and Loyd capped the spurt with an acrobatic layup while being fouled by Confroy and made the free throw to complete a three-point play.

▶ 9: TOWSON

Balanced scoring led the 10th-ranked Maryland women's basketball team past Towson, 81-52, Sunday afternoon at XFINITY Center. The Terrapins (7-2) controlled the first half with a 22-4 run, then never looked back.

Sophomore Brionna Jones led four Terrapins in double figures with her 17 points and eight rebounds. Shatori Walker-Kimbrough picked up 15 boards, five rebounds and three steals, while Tierney Pfirman scored 12 points off the bench. Freshman Kristen Confroy added 10 points.

Redshirt senior Laurin Mincy hit 1,000 career points in Sunday's game. She is the 29th Terrapin to reach the mark.

"I am really happy and thrilled for Laurin Mincy," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Obviously through the adversity of her career and being able to battle the way she has, I was really excited for her to have her 1000th point in front of home fans."

"We had a slow start and I thought Towson came out ready to play. I thought once we were able to get in a groove and settle down our transition game got going. There are definitely some things we will need to improve on, but there were a lot of positive things to see in terms of the play of the team."

Towson (3-6) started the game 5-for-7 from the field and took a 10-7 lead at the under-16 timeout. A layup by Jones at 13:23 started a 28-4 run that gave the Terps a 35-14 lead with just under five minutes to play.


Towson called back-to-back timeouts around the 12 minute mark. Pfirman had six points and two rebounds in the stretch



Sophomore Brionna Jones had a career night to lead the Terps (10-2, 1-0 B1G) with 23 points, a career-high 14 rebounds and a career-best four blocks. Sophomore Shatori Walker-Kimbrough added 18 points and nine rebounds, while Lexie Brown added 12 points, including 10 in the second half, to help seal the win.

Redshirt senior Laurin Mincy picked up her second career double-double with 14 points and 11 rebounds along with six assists and junior Tierney Pfirman added 14 points and six rebounds off the bench.

"I'm really proud of how we handled the game," head coach Brenda Frese said. "This game was a game of runs which made it really fun to watch. It was like a track meet because both teams were really up tempo and aggressive. 
Buckets by freshman Kiara Leslie and Walker-Kimbrough helped the Terrapins take a 43-40 lead into the break.



After a quick bucket by the Terps to open the game, then the Boilermakers (9-6, 2-2) went on an 8-0 run to take a six-point lead two minutes in.


A basket by Jones after a Terps timeout started Maryland on a 15-6 run to take a 17-14 lead with 11:23 to play in the first.

The lead changed five times in the first half, with the Terrapins leading 39-34 at the break.


The Gophers (14-2, 3-1) came out of halftime and took a two-point lead with 14:36 to go.


Kahleah Copper scored 16 to lead the Scarlet

Five players hit double figures as the sixthranked Maryland women's basketball team (16-2, 7-0 B1G) beat Michigan State, 85-56, in a total team effort to win its 10th straight game.

Laurin Mincy scored 17 points, Lexie Brown added 12 and seven assists. Brionna Jones also added 12 points, Shatori Walker-Kimbrough had 11 and Malina Howard notched 10.

The Terrapins opened the second half with a 10-2 run to extend their 11-point halftime lead to 47-28. The margin swelled to 24 with 14 minutes left.

"I really liked how we shared the basketball. When you talk about our lowest amount of turnovers, I just think we were extremely unselfish and made easily plays for each other offensively," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Credit Michigan State, they came in really aggressive and took it to us rebounding-wise to start the game. Once we were able to get our rhythm and our defense going in transition, I think that we were really able to break it open. Our depth tonight, to be able to send waves into the game, was really important where we could wear Michigan State down tonight. Using our depth is going to be really important for us moving forward."

Playing in its first season in the Big Ten after a 37-year run in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Maryland is the Ione unbeaten team in league play.

Aerial Powers scored 28 for the Spartans (9-10, 1-7), who have lost eight of 10.

Maryland made 50 percent of its field goal attempts and limited the Spartans to 3-for-24 shooting from beyond the arc.


Mincy, a senior guard, went 7 for 13 from the floor. She contributed a three-point play and a layup to the 10-2 spurt to start of the second half. Mincy also played a key role before halftime, collecting eight points, two assists and a steal

Maryland missed six of its first seven shots and was outrebounded 10-2 in falling behind 8-3. It was 11-7 before Jones scored five points in a 13-2 run that put the Terrapins ahead for good.

The Spartans exercised patience during most of their possessions, which slowed down the pace and helped them close to 25-22 with 5:45 left in the half.

Maryland then peeled off 10 straight points, including three straight baskets by reserve Kiara Leslie, for a 13-point cushion.

▶ 19: at Indiana



Maryland continues to cruise through its new conference.

The Terrapins won their 11th straight Sunday defeating Indiana 84-74 and remained unbeaten in Big Ten conference play (17-2, 8-0). Sophomore Brionna Jones had a double-double, 10 points and 14 rebounds for the Terrapins. Along with Jones, sophomore Lexie Brown added 21 points and fellow sophomore Shatori Walker-Kimbrough finished with 18 points. Malina Howard added 12 points. The seventh-ranked Terrapins 11-game winning streak began after losing in early December.

"We thrive off energy, feeding off of each other and celebrating each other," Brown said. "That's when we're at our best, when our bench is energized and coach B is energized and everyone is pumped up. Obviously today we didn't show (energy). It definitely wasn't the best that we've played, but top to bottom we had a lot of great moments throughout the team."

The Hoosiers led early and tied with the Terrapins five times through the 12:44 minute mark in the first half. With the game tied at 15, Maryland finished the first half outscoring Indiana 32-14, leading 47-29 at the half. Maryland made 19 of its 30 attempts, shooting 63.3 percent in the first half.

Despite competing neck and neck early, the Hoosiers (12-7, 2-6) were outrebounded by the Terrapins 23-15 at the end of the first half and only shot 26 percent from the floor making eight of 31 attempts while going 0-11 from beyond the arc.

The final 10 minutes of the first half was a turning point for Maryland and indicative of the type of basketball the Terrapins have been playing over the last 11 games. The Terrapins outrebounded Indiana 40 to 27 for the game and finished shooting 54 percent.

"I thought we shared the basketball extremely well on the offensive end and we really started getting up and down our transition game," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Lexie does a tremendous job as our floor general, Bri struggled a little bit and she still gets a double-double. Being able to have that inside-outside presence is key."

Maryland continued to stretch its lead in the second half as Indiana faced its largest deficit, 24, trailing 57-33 with 15 minutes to play in the game. But the Hoosiers put together a 26-13 run that pulled them within 11 over a 10-minute span.

Laurin Mincy scored 24 points, and No. 5 Maryland rolled to its 12th consecutive victory, remaining unbeaten in Big Ten play with a 91-65 win over Michigan on Thursday night.

The Terrapins (18-2, 9-0) scored the first 11 points and never trailed. Shatori Walker-Kimbrough had 20 points for Maryland, and Lexie Brown had 14 points and eight assists.

The Terps shot 52 percent from the field and went 16 of 21 on free throws.

Cyesha Goree led Michigan (13-7, 5-4) with 14



The Terrapins (19-2, 10-0) moved two games ahead of the second-place Hawkeyes in the Big Ten standings. Jones scored 19 points with 15 rebounds, including 17 and 10 in the second half. The sophomore has eight double-doubles this year, seven in conference play. Laurin Mincy added 15.

"Obviously, this was a tremendous game because it was between two of the best teams in the league right now," head coach Brenda Frese said. "It was back and forth, no one deserved to lose this game. We started a little slow, so we had keep our poise and composure to get us going; we did that because we were only down by one at the half. We made a conscious effort to get the ball into Brionna Jones in the second half; she was sensational and our guards were phenomenal getting the ball down low to her. There were so many contributions when you talk about Kiara Leslie off the bench, the run we made with a season high of 26 from Lexie 'Big Shot' Brown. This was just a really solid win."

Ally Disterhoft scored 22 points for Iowa (17-4, 8-2), and Melissa Dixon had 18 points.







Maryland (22-2, 13-0) responded to multiple Rutgers offensive threats to cut into the lead before Brown connected from beyond the arc to spark an 11-2 run that made it 63-50 with nine minutes left.

The victory moved the Terrapins one step closer to becoming the first team since Purdue in 1998-99 to finish with an unblemished record in Big Ten play. Maryland's last loss was against Notre Dame on Dec. 3.

Malina Howard had 15 points, Laurin Mincy added 14 and reserve freshman A'Lexus Harrison grabbed a career-high 12 rebounds for the Terrapins.

"That was just a lot of fun. Just really enjoyed seeing the work that we displayed together," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Obviously the unselfish play to be able to beat a great team like Rutgers. Just the poise and the confidence and the toughness that you had to have in this game was tremendous."

Betnijah Laney scored 22 and Kahleah Copper had 19 for the Rutgers (18-6, 9-4). The Scarlet Knights had won six straight since falling at home to the Terrapins on Jan. 15.

Rutgers made it interesting, but in the end simply could not compete with Maryland's size and depth. The Terrapins had four players score in double figures and outscored the Scarlet Knights 36-28 in the paint despite playing most of the first half without foul-plagued center Brionna Jones.

Walker-Kimbrough scored 15 points before halftime, and the Terrapins erased an early deficit to go up 37-29 at the break.



Maryland is ahead of schedule in the Big Ten.

The preseason favorites to win the league locked up a share of the regular-season title and the top seed in the conference tournament by beating Wisconsin 81-70 on Thursday night for the Terrapins' 18th straight win.

That's one big goal checked off the to-do list with three games still left in the inaugural year of Big Ten play for No. 5 Maryland (24-2, 15-0).

"Really proud of this group. It's not an easy task when you're talking about, as you can see, going on the road and playing in so many different venues, especially first in the new conference," coach Brenda Frese said, "and then being consistent to be able to get wins even when you have an off night."

Brionna Jones had 20 points and 15 rebounds, Shatori Walker-Kimbrough scored 17 points, while Lexie Brown added 15 points and seven assists for the Terrapins.

Wisconsin (8-17, 4-11) trailed by as much as 17 in the first half before hitting three 3s in the opening 5 minutes of the second half to help cut the lead. Jacki Gulczynski had two 3s during the 16-6 run after halftime.

Maryland held off Wisconsin from there, getting a lift from Jones' inside play.

"Their sagging defense kind of gave us a little trouble. Once we figured it out, we took off and our offensive game picked up and we just started getting stops," Brown said said.

Jones, a 6-foot-3 center, went 3 of 5 from the field the rest of the way to finish with her 10th double-double of the year.

The Terps benefited from a fast start, forcing five turnovers in the first 10 minutes to build a 13-point lead. Maryland pounced on virtually every mistake during that stretch, helping to build a 28-13 edge in points off turnovers for the night.

From start to finish, it was a memorable night for No. 5 Maryland.

The Terrapins scored the first 10 points against Penn State and never trailed in a 65-34 rout Monday.

Afterward, the team was presented a sparkling trophy for winning the Big Ten regular-season title.

It doesn't get much better than that.

"I'm really, really proud of this group," coach Brenda Frese said. "Going into this season there were a lot of unknowns -- young team, new conference. To be able to come out and play the way they have in these first 16 games is not easy."

Maryland (25-2, 16-0) clinched first place Saturday night when Ohio State beat Iowa.

That doesn't mean the Terps intend to coast to the finish in their inaugural Big Ten season.

With victories over visiting Indiana on Thursday and at Northwestern on Sunday, Maryland would become only the third Big Ten women's team to go unbeaten in conference play, joining Ohio State (1984-85) and Purdue in (1998-99).

"We're not done yet," guard Laurin Mincy said. Brionna Jones scored 11 of her 17 points in the decisive first half, which ended with Maryland up 35-14. After that, it was merely counting down the minutes until the trophy presentation.

It was the 19th straight victory for Maryland, its longest winning streak since a 21-game run in 1988-89.

Candice Agee led Penn State (6-21, 3-13) with 10 points and Lindsey Spann added eight, but she missed 12 of 16 shots.


Coach Coquese Washington acknowledged that the Lady Lions were no match for the deep, talented and NCAA tournament-tested Terrapins.

"They did a good job of mixing up their defenses. They're No. 5 in the country for a reason," Washington said. "They're a very good team, Brenda Frese is a very good coach and they play with a lot of confidence, especially at home. I have a high regard and a lot of respect for what they've done this year."

The Lady Lions shot 25 percent in the first half and lost for the sixth time in seven games -- a skid that includes a 77-62 defeat to Maryland earlier this month.

Mincy and Lexie Brown hit 3-pointers during the opening 10-0 spurt, and Penn State put itself in an imposing hole by missing three shots and committing three turnovers during its first six possessions.

► 28: INDIANA



With fifth-year senior Laurin Mincy leading the way, Maryland took the penultimate step in its historic march through the Big Ten.

Mincy scored a career-high 28 points in her final regular-season home game, and the fifth-ranked Terrapins topped Indiana 83-72 on Thursday night to remain unbeaten in league play.

"It speaks volumes in terms of a consistency factor, when you talk about coming out and being ready to play," head coach Brenda Frese said. "But Northwestern is a great team and it's going to be their Senior Day. They're going to be ready to play."

The only senior on the team, Mincy made half her 14 shots from the floor and went 10-for-12 at the free throw line. She played the entire 40 minutes.

Malina Howard and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough each scored 16 for the Terrapins (26-2, 17-0), who never trailed. Sophomore Lexie Brown added 14 points and seven assists.

Maryland has won 20 in a row, one short of the school single-season record set in 1988-89. The longest winning streak in school history is 24, bridging the 2006 NCAA title season and the start of the following campaign.

Mincy scored 10 of Maryland's first 22 points. The 6-foot guard had 15 by halftime to help stake the Terrapins to a 47-35 lead.

Her 3-pointer with 13:41 left made it 60-44, seemingly assuring Maryland a season-sweep of the rebuilding Hoosiers (14-14, 4-13).


Although Indiana responded with a 14-2 run fueled by deft shooting beyond the arc, two straight layups by Howard blunted the comeback. Mincy surpassed her previous career high of 25 with a long-range jumper that made it 77-64 with 2:39 remaining.

Karlee McBride led Indiana with 18 points, including 13 in the second half, and Larryn Brooks had 13. The Hoosiers were 9 for 29 from beyond the arc.

Indiana put forth an inspired effort, but was no match for a Big Ten newcomer that's taken the conference by storm.

Asked if Maryland's success caught her by surprise, Indiana coach Teri Moren replied, "Just a little bit, only because this is such a crazy game and night in, night out they have to play with a special mark on their back. They're going to get everybody's best shot. For them to stay undefeated is a makeup of a very special team."

▶ 29: at #25 Northwestern



Led by Brene Moseley's 18 points, the No. 5 Maryland women's basketball team wrapped up a perfect inaugural season in Big Ten play, beating No. 25 Northwestern, 69-48, Sunday afternoon.

"Words can't describe right now how we're feeling," said head coach Brenda Frese. "I'm so proud of this group. When you talk about making history with a team that had a lot of unknowns going into the season, with a new conference, all new teams, and they continue to separate themselves every day. It's going to be a team that I'm always going to remember; you're talking about something I've never done."

In its first season in the Big Ten, Maryland went 18-0 in conference play. The Terrapins are the third team in conference history to go undefeated in Big Ten play, and the first team since the 1998-99 season.

Brionna Jones had 14 points and 13 rebounds and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough added 11 points as the Terrapins (27-2) pulled away in the second half for their 21st straight win.

Back-to-back 3-pointers by Laurin Mincy and Chloe Pavlech put the Terrapins ahead 27-21 with 5:49 left in the first half, an advantage they maintained on their way to a 32-26 lead at the break.

Northwestern managed just one field goal and missed 11 straight shots in the first nine minutes of the second half. Maryland, meanwhile, added inside scoring to the mix on the way to a 47-33 lead with 11:29 showing.

The Terrapins opened a 60-39 lead as Moseley hit a 3-pointer and Walker-Kimbrough added a free throw with 6:13 to play.

Sophomore Lexie Brown scored a season-high 27 points to lead the third-ranked and top-seeded Maryland women's basketball team (28-2, 18-0 B1G) to a 70-60 win over Michigan State Friday in the Big Ten Tournament Quarterfinals at the Sears Centre.

Brown went 9-for-16 from the field and 8-for-9 from the foul line with seven steals on the day. Sophomores Brionna Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough each added nine points to help the Terrapins to their first Big Ten Tournament win.

Maryland got off to strong start to open up a 7-0 lead. The Terrapins' defense held the Spartans to just 1-for-12 shooting over the first 10 minutes of the game.

"I thought our strong start was really, really impressive," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Probably one of our best 40-minute games defensively. And then I thought offensively trying to wear them out, our depth was a huge factor when you talk about playing 10 players in the first half, being able to go 11 players through this rotation. And obviously our floor general, I thought Lexie played one of her best games. When March hits, this team gets excited in terms of raising their level of play."

Aerial Powers had 26 points and 10 rebounds, and Tori Jankoska added 19 points for the Spartans (16-15, 7-11).

Maryland led 33-24 at halftime, with Brown scoring 15 points. Michigan State shot just 8 of 29 (28.6 percent) behind 14 points by Powers.

The Terrapins took command in the second half with a 16-4 run, with a full-court press forcing three turnovers en route to a 60-41 lead with 8:23 to play.

The Spartans got no closer than 10 points the rest of the way.

Maryland shot 25-for-51 from the field (49 percent). Michigan State was 18-for-56 (32.1 percent).

The third-ranked and top-seeded Maryland women's basketball team used a total team effort and strong play from its bench to beat No. 24 Northwestern on Saturday night, sending the Terrapins to the Big Ten tournament championship game in their first season in the league.

Lexie Brown led the way with 17 points and went 6-6 at the free throw line down the stretch to seal the win. Laurin Mincy and Brene Moseley added 15 apiece as the top-seed Terrapins (29-2) face second seed lowa or third-seeded Ohio State in Sunday's title game.

"I thought Northwestern came out, showed what a great team they are with the first punch," head coach Brenda Frese said. "They were really aggressive and got us on the back of our heels. The first 10 minutes, I thought they really sped us up. I thought a big difference for us was our bench play. When you talk about we went to our bench, Lexie got in foul trouble, we were able to go to our bench and really stretch out with our defense and with our depth and I thought that was a huge turning point for where we're at "

Nia Coffey had 23 points before fouling out, while Alex Cohen added 12 for the fourth-seeded Wildcats (23-8). Coffey had 14 points as Northwestern opened an early 23-12 lead while Maryland managed just 5-for-18 (25 percent from the field) in the same span.

The Wildcats had two more 11-point leads until the Terrapins pushed back with a 22-6 run to close the half. Maryland scored 11 unanswered points in a span of 2:12 for a 34-29 lead with 38 seconds left while Kiara Leslie's buzzer-beating putback opened a 36-31 halftime lead.

Mincy and Brown hit two 3 pointers 45 seconds apart as Maryland pushed the lead to double digits. Mincy hit another with 13:38 left as the Terrapin claimed a 53-35 advantage.

Maryland then missed 17 of its next 18 shots while Northwestern launched a 15-5 surge that cut the deficit to 58-50 with 3:03 to play.

Northwestern never got closer than eight points the rest of the way.

As Lexie Brown stepped to the foul line in the closing seconds with No. 4 Maryland (30-2) clinging to a one-point lead, one thought crossed her mind.

"Don't miss," she said.

She made her free throws. A desperation heave by Ohio State hit the rim, and just like that, the celebration

Brown scored 19 points, and Maryland beat the Buckeyes 77-74 Sunday to capture the Big Ten tournament title and cap a perfect run through the conference.

The Terps will enter the NCAA Tournament with 24 straight wins and their eyes locked on the biggest prize of all after reaching the Final Four last year.

"We're happy, we're going to ride it out for a day or two, then lock back in," Shatori Walker-Kimbrough said. "We're not done yet. Two goals down, we still got one more

They made a seamless transition to the Big Ten after 37 years in the ACC, going 18-0 in conference play. No other Maryland basketball team -- men's or women's -- had gone unbeaten in league competition, and the 24 consecutive wins are a school record for a single season.

Maryland was leading by four when Cait Craft raced back on defense to strip Walker-Kimbrough as she went for a layup following a turnover by Ohio State's Kelsey Mitchell. Craft then nailed a 3 with a minute left to make it 75-74, but the Terrapins hung on.

Mitchell, who had 31 points, got called for traveling with 7 seconds left, and Brown hit two free throws to make it a three-point game.

Brown, the tournament's Most Outstanding Player, had six assists. Walker-Kimbrough added 13 points and six rebounds. Laurin Mincy scored 12, and Malina Howard chipped in with 12 points and 12 rebounds.

A 17-3 run by Maryland turned a one-point lead late in the first half into a 50-35 advantage in the second on Walker-Kimbrough's 3.

Ohio State responded with a 17-4 run to pull to 56-54 on Mitchell's 3 midway through the half.

Hart's layup pulled Ohio State within one -- 61-60 -- with 6:44 remaining. It remained tight the rest of the way, but Maryland hung on.

"They don't get rattled," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said about her team. "They don't get too high or too low. It's a game of runs, they understand it. They connect. They lock into their defense and rebounding and whatever we need to have to be successful."

The Maryland women's basketball team (31-2) beat 16th-seeded New Mexico State (22-8) 75-57 Saturday in the NCAA Tournament First Round.

Sophomore Brionna Jones led the way with 22 points and 12 rebounds for her 12th double-double of the season. Redshirt senior Laurin Mincy added 19 points and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough had 10. Maryland outrebounded New Mexico State, 45-20.

"I think we had to shake off some rust to start this game," head coach Brenda Frese said, "Credit New Mexico State, I thought they came out very active and aggressive in terms of dictating the tempo. I thought we were able to establish an inside presence really early, especially with Brionna Jones; she was a big time factor for us. I thought Laurin Mincy came out for us and made some really timely shots that we needed. I thought that our depth was able to wear them out throughout the game. It was not the most complete 40-minute game that we have played but I liked how we came out and we were able to get into a rhythm. So now, we have to get ready for Princeton."

Jones was bigger and stronger than any one player the 16th-seeded Aggies assigned to cover her, and a collapsing zone defense did little to slow her down.

Jones went seven for 10 from the floor and eight for nine at the line, finishing just two points short of matching her career high in points.

Brianna Freeman scored 15 and Sasha Weber added 14 for the Aggies, who were making their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 1988. The Western Athletic Conference champions were outrebounded 45-20 and went 5 for 21 from 3-point range.

Maryland went ahead for good at 7-6 and led by 20 with 12 minutes left.

After the Aggies turned their focus to stopping Jones in the second half, the Terrapins looked to their guards for offense. Mincy scored 13 points after halftime, sinking four of her five field-goal attempts.

Jones had 16 points in the first half to stake the Terrapins to a 42-32 lead. Her eight rebounds over the first 20 minutes matched New Mexico State's total during that span.

Jones scored 11 of Maryland's first 15 points, and the Terrapins used a 7-0 spurt to go up 22-12. It was 27-18 before Jones collected a rebound under her own basket and put back a layup to start a three-point play.

Laurin Mincy scored 27 points, and top-seeded Maryland used a second-half blitz to knock off previously unbeaten Princeton 85-70 Monday night and advance to the Sweet 16 of the women's NCAA tournament.

After leading by only 42-38 at the break, the Terrapins used a 17-2 run immediately after halftime to turn a surprisingly tight game into a rout.

"It was a tremendous game. It was fun," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Obviously, this is what you see come this time of year. I thought both groups were ready to play from the tip and both teams came out with a ton of energy. We were really able to separate ourselves in the second half. Tierney [Pfirman] was an x factor for us off of the bench and I thought the difference was our defense and rebounding in the second half."

The Terrapins (32-2) will bring a 26-game winning streak into a matchup with Duke on Saturday in Spokane, Wash. Maryland and Duke were longtime rivals in the Atlantic Coast Conference before the Terps moved to the Big Ten this season.

Lexie Brown scored 23 for the Terrapins, who will be making their fourth consecutive trip to the Sweet 16 and seventh in head coach Brenda Frese's 13 seasons at Maryland. Tierney Pfirman added 11 off the bench and Brionna Jones had 10 and 10 rebounds.

Eighth-seeded Princeton (31-1) was coming off the program's first-ever win in the NCAA tournament, on Saturday against Wisconsin-Green Bay. Blake Dietrick led Princeton with 26 points and Vanessa Smith added 15.

Princeton made 10 of its first 13 field-goal tries and led 28-24 on the Terrapins' own floor before an enthusiastic crowd that clearly favored the home team.

Outscoring Maryland 28-6 in the paint while holding Jones without a point in the first half, Princeton had several leads before falling behind at the break. With the pressure inside, the Terps opted to fire from the outside before halftime. They led 42-38 at the break.

In the second half, however, Maryland proved to be too fast, too big and, most importantly, too talented.

After the teams exchanged baskets, Mincy scored in the lane and Jones sank two free throws. Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough then made successive baskets before Mincy drilled a 3-pointer. Field goals by Brown and Malina Howard completed the run, making it 59-40 with just under 14 minutes to play.
