STORYLINE

- No. 6/6 Maryland (24-3, 13-2) will travel to Rutgers (16-11, 7-8) for a 3 p.m. matchup Sunday on ESPN2.
- Most recently, Maryland topped Michigan, 76-56, Wednesday night in College Park. The Wolverines led 30-29 at half, then the Terps went on a 16-4 run midway through the third quarter to seal the way. They had just one turnover in the third quarter. Brionna Jones led the way with 20 points, eight rebounds, Kristen Confroy scored 14 points and Brene Moseley scored 13. Kiara Leslie added 10 off the bench.
- Redshirt senior Brene Moseley is at 962 career points and 397 career assists heading into Sunday's game. Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough have played in 99 straight games. Walker-Kimbrough is at 97 career three-pointers made.
- The Terrapins were projected as a top 10 seed in the NCAA Tournament Monday night.
- Sunday's matchup is the 33rd all-time between Maryland and Rutgers, with the Terps owning the series 21-11. Head coach Brenda Frese is 3-1 all-time vs. Rutgers after Maryland won both meetings last year. The Terps won 71-59 at the RAC last Jan. 15 and then won 80-69 in College Park on Feb. 10. Malina Howard scored 15 points and Walker-Kimbrough added 17 in that College Park matchup.
- The Terps are second in the nation in rebounding (+15.6), scoring margin (+25.3), field goal percentage (.502) and three-point field goal percentage (.418). They are fourth in scoring (84.8) and fifth in assists (19.1). Jones leads the country in FG percentage (.669) and Walker-Kimbrough leads the country in three-point FG percentage (.573). She and Confroy are Nos. 1 and 2 in the Big Ten in three-point percentage. (More on page 7).
- Jones and Walker-Kimbrough were named to the Naismith Midseason List and the Wooden Late Season Top 20. Moseley is one of 10 candidates for the Nancy Lieberman Award, which is given to the nation's top point guard, and Confroy was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team.
- Maryland was picked to win the Big Ten this year by both the coaches and the conference's media panel. Walker-Kimbrough and Jones were named to the Preseason All-Big Ten Team. Maryland returns three starters and 10 letterwinners from last year's Big Ten champion squad. The Terrapins also welcome two McDonald's All-Americans in freshmen Brianna Fraser and Kiah Gillespie to the lineup.

► 2015-16 SEASON OUTLOOK

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The 2014-15 Terrapins experienced unprecedented success for the program - a perfect 21-0 run through the Big Ten for the conference regular season and tournament titles, a school-record 28-game win streak, and the program's second straight Final Four appearance.

A year later, the Terps enter their second season in their new league with a blend of familiar and new faces.

"There's a lot of tremendous, positive energy around our program and there's no doubt that stems from the success we've had - especially making it to back to back Final Fours," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I was really happy for the team last season, because even though they'd been to the Final Four the previous season, nobody really considered us contenders last year. They can be extremely proud of what they accomplished. I was also really happy for our staff that worked so hard and had us so well prepared. It was the third different staff I've been to a Final Four with and they've all been terrific."

Heading into this season, Maryland fans will no longer see one mainstay in the Terrapins' lineup - All-Big Ten guard Laurin Mincy. The Terps will look to returning leading scorers Brionna Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough, as well as four seniors and a strong sophomore class, to help achieve high goals.

"This season starts off somewhat similar - with some new staff members and some curiosity about how our team will evolve," Frese said. "We'll certainly look a little different - for the first time in five years, people won't see Laurin Mincy on our team. What I think is really good is that change should eliminate complacency. We should be a motivated group. One of the real keys to our success the past few years has been the incredible consistency of effort our team has given in every phase - on the court and off. I can't compliment them enough on their commitment and I hear it all the time from people that work with them."

"I'm excited to work with this team and see how we can all grow together. We have some good parts that we'll figure out how to use best. In Brionna Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough, we have two juniors that have really blossomed and are coming off valuable experiences with USA Basketball. I don't think there's any doubt that they will be very important pieces to our puzzle."

New Faces

The Terrapins welcome their 10th top 10 recruiting class under Frese this season in forward Brianna Fraser (Brooklyn, N.Y.) and forward Kiah Gillespie (Meriden, Conn.).

"Our freshmen have a chance to really help us over the years," Frese said. "Both have a lot of attributes that can make them really successful. The biggest thing in this age of instant gratification is being patient with players as they grow. Hopefully, we can do a great job of helping them along their way and challenging them to keep pushing to get better."

"Kiah sort of fits what you're seeing in the NBA these days with forwards that can face the basket and do a variety of things. She can be a tough match-up and not only can she score, but she's unselfish and can find teammates. She's going to be a lot of fun to play with. Bri has some tremendous moves around the basket. She can be really crafty with ball fakes and finishes. She also can block some shots, which will be nice to have around the rim."

In June, junior guard Iesha Small decided to transfer to Maryland from Baylor. Small was a 2013 McDonald's All-American from Miami, Fla.

"Leshia will have to sit out a year, but we're already feeling her presence on and off the court. My first goal with her is to help her get her swag back and understand how good she can be. We've already seen some of it in practice. Once we get that confidence flowing, the rest will come. Personality-wise, she has been an amazing addition. She has brought so much fun to our team and her teammates love her. I'm really excited to help her have a great experience here."

Point Guards

The Terrapins will have two experienced point guard in Brene Moseley and Chloe Pavlech available to run the floor this year. Sophomore Kristen Confroy saw minutes at the point guard spot last year as well, and even attended Point Guard College this summer.

Pavlech started in 31 games as a freshman and Moseley has seen action in 106 games, both earning valuable experience throughout their careers.

"We have two experienced players in Chloe and Brene and they each bring something different to our team," Frese said. "They will both play and how much will likely be determined game by game. It's nice to have two senior point guards, because at this point there shouldn't be a lot of mystery. They're familiar with what we need on the floor and I know them well as players and people."

Wings

Maryland has one of the most dangerous wings in the country in Shatori Walker-Kimbrough. The junior earned All-Big Ten First Team honors last season and led Big Ten guards in field goal percentage (.513).

"Any perimeter with Shatori Walker-Kimbrough is going to be a strong one, so that's a great starting point," Frese said. "I smile every time I think back to where she was when we first saw her, prior to her junior season of high school. We could see the potential and she's really achieving it. That's really cool, because not everybody can do that. What separates Shatori is her inner drive, which is really relentless. She wants to be great and she's well on her way."

Outside of Walker-Kimbrough, the Terrapins have sophomores Kiara Leslie and Kristen Confroy ready to build on strong rookie campaigns. Senior Tierney Pfirman and freshman Kiah Gillespie will also see time on the perimeter.

"We have a lot of other options at the wing and we'll see who steps up. Anybody that knows me can tell you I'm partial to people that can score," Frese said. "Kiara Leslie had a strong finish to last season and hopefully she keeps trending up. Kristen Confroy showed last season she can give us big contributions. Tierney Pfirman has played inside and out for us in her previous three years and she has a tremendous feel for the game. Kiah Gillespie could play some here. We're definitely going to have some options."

Frontcourt

The Terps' biggest strength the last few years has been dominating inside - on the glass and scoring in the paint. They led the Big Ten in field goal percentage and dominated the glass more than any other team in the league, averaging a +10.6 on the boards.

"Bri Jones is a tremendous person to build around," Frese said. "She's another one that I am extremely proud of when I consider how she's developed here at Maryland. She wasn't the most highly-touted recruit, but by her sophomore year, she's selected to play for USA Basketball and has two Final Fours to her name. Her and Shatori have quite a resume already."

Outside of Jones, the Terrapins have another experienced, talented post player in senior Malina Howard.

"Depending on what kind of look or match-ups, we can play different people with Bri. Our fans already know Malina Howard well and she and Bri are a terrific tandem. This is another spot that a versatile forward like Tierney or Kiah Gillespie can really add a different dimension. Both of them are good with the ball and can score and start breaks."

"Aja Ellison has been working hard to get better and if we have a foot race, I'm pretty sure Aja will be the first one down the court. We've been challenging her to keep growing and see how far she can go. She's been a wonderful personality to have around."

Staff

Frese encourages all members of the Maryland basketball family to achieve their goals, and the Terrapins are proud to send associate head coach Tina Langley and Marlin Chinn off to head coaching opportunities. Langley is the new head coach at Rice University and Chinn is at Florida International University.

In their places, Frese welcomes Bett Shelby and Terry Nooner as new assistant coaches. Shelby takes over as the new recruiting coordinator and comes from Virginia Tech. Nooner, who played at Kansas, will coach the post players. Most recently, Nooner was at Alabama.

Frese returns assistant coach Shay Robinson, who in his first season, played an integral role in the Terrapins' success.

Frese also welcomes Audrey Cunningham as the Director of Recruiting Operations, Matthew Schiff as the Director of Player Personnel and Recruiting Operations and Patrick Estes as the Assistant Director of Basketball Performance.

"We have some new faces all around our staff and we've spent a lot of time together already," Frese said. "We've been busy not only practicing and meeting, but also traveling all over for recruiting. I like what we've brought on board. I think our players do too, which is most important. I'm also really excited about Patrick Estes who's in charge of our Basketball Performance. He's a star in the making and he's already impacting our team, which is great to see."

PR1DE

Frese and her staff have developed the tradition of choosing a team theme for each season. After the 2010-11 season, Frese and the staff felt like their young Terrapins didn't finish out games, so they developed the theme of, "Fight to Finish," for the 2011-12 season. In 2012-13, the staff wanted to push the team to have everyone working their hardest in all aspects of life, on and off the court, so they chose the theme, "All in to W.I.N." The W.I.N. stood for What's Important Now. Most recently, the Terrapins used the theme "United We Can" for the 2014-15 season.

This year's theme is PR1DE.

"This year's theme is playing off the word PRIDE, which gets a lot of play around here with the whole idea of 'Maryland Pride,'" Frese said. "We've broken the word up into five concepts that are huge for team and individual success - Process, Relentless, 1%, Discipline, Every day. If we can master those five things, we'll do really well. We did a pretty good job of it last season and those qualities really carried us through."

- Jones and Walker-Kimbrough were named to the Naismith Midseason List and the Wooden Late Season Top 20. Moseley is one of 10 candidates for the Nancy Lieberman Award, which is given to the nation's top point guard, and Confroy was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team.
- Malina Howard was named one of 30 candidates for the Senior CLASS Award last month. The award celebrates senior student-athletes who excel on and off the court.
- Three of Maryland's incoming players from the top-ranked class of 2016 were named McDonald's All-Americans - Kaila Charles, Destiny Slocum and Blair Watson. Frese has brought in 21 McDonald's All-Americans to Maryland in her 14 years in College Park. Current Terrapins Howard, Small, Gillespie and Fraser were all McDonald's All-Americans.
- Maryland was picked to win the Big Ten this year by both the coaches and the conference's media panel. Shatori Walker-Kimbrough and Brionna Jones were named to the Preseason All-Big Ten Team. Maryland returns three starters and 10 letterwinners from last year's Big Ten champion squad. The Terrapins also welcome three McDonald's All-Americans in freshmen Brianna Fraser and Kiah Gillespie, as well as junior Ieshia Small, a transfer from Baylor.
- Maryland returns 10 of 12 letterwinners from the 2014-15 Big Ten champion and Final Four squad, as well as three of five starters.
- Maryland ended the 2014-15 season ranked No. 4 in both the final Associated Press poll and the USA Today Top 25 Coaches poll. The Terrapins won a program-record 28 straight games, went 21-0 to sweep the Big Ten regular season and tournament titles, and went to their second straight Final Four. The Final Four appearance is their third under head coach Brenda Frese and sixth in program history (1 AIAW, 5 NCAA).
- Brionna Jones and Shatori Walker-Kimbrough earned All-Big Ten honors last season. Walker-

Kimbrough was named to the First Team by both the coaches and the media panel. She averaged 13.3 points per game and led all Big Ten guards in field goal percentage (.513). Jones was named to the media panel's Second Team and the coaches' First Team. She picked up 14 doubles-doubles last season, while averaging 12.4 points and 8.9 rebounds per game.

Walker-Kimbrough was named the Spokane Regional Most Outstanding Player, after she averaged 14.0 points with 4.8 rebounds in the Terrapins' run to the Final Four. Jones made the Spokane Regional All-Tournament Team. She averaged 14.0 points with 10.3 rebounds in the run.

Head coach Brenda Frese and her staff signed the No. 1 recruiting class in the country in November. Kaila Charles (Glendale, Md.), Stephanie Jones (Havre de Grace, Md.), Sarah Myers (Cumming, Ga.), Destiny Slocum (Meridian, Idaho), Jenna Staiti (Cumming, Ga.) and Blair Watson (Nutley, N.J.) make up the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation, as ranked by ESPN, Blue Star Basketball and Collegiate Girls Basketball Report. All six were named McDonalds All-American nominees. (*Page 6 for more*)

Brenda Frese signed a multi-year extension in November 2014 which will keep her at Maryland through at least 2021. With rollovers, she could be on the Maryland sidelines through 2025. She's brought the program its first national championship, three Final Fours, six Elite Eights and 11 NCAA Tournament appearances in her 13 postseasons. Frese has also brought in 11 top 15 recruiting classes and brought home five conference titles.

The Terps are again one of the nation's tallest teams with their average height at 6-0. Nine of the team's 13 players are over the 6-0 mark.

Milestones, Streaks, etc.

- Walker-Kimbrough became the 30th player in Maryland history to reach the 1,000-career point mark on Dec. 11. Moseley became the 18th player to reach 300-career assists that same night.
- Brionna Jones became the 31st player in program history to reach the 1,000-career point mark on Jan. 30. She is No. 2 in the Maryland record books in career field goal percentage (.629), which is behind only Crystal Langhorne (.662).
- Walker-Kimbrough has scored in double figures in 26 of 27 games this season. She is also leading the Maryland record books with her career three-point field goal percentage of 46.4 percent (97-209).
- Coming into Sunday's game, Walker-Kimbrough and Jones have played in 99 straight games, every game of their careers.
- Brene Moseley currently has 962 career points and 397 career assists.

Pound It Inside

- Through 27 games, the Terrapins have beaten their opponents inside, 978-658 (36.2 to 24.4).
- They have scored 40 points in the paint in 14 of 27 games, including a season-high 50 at Ohio State on Feb. 8.
- The Terps scored 40 or more points inside last year in 10 out of 37 games. They scored a season-high 54 points in the paint vs. Wagner and at Coppin State. They outscored their opponents inside, 1,276-1,010 (34.5 to 27.3).

Total Team Effort

- Maryland had at least five players in double figures in five of 27 games so far this year, including six in

double figures twice.

- The Terps' bench is outscoring opponents' benches, 893-337 (33.1 to 12.5) through 27 games.
- Last year, Maryland's bench outscored opponents' benches 748-437 (20.2 to 11.8) through 37 games.
- Nine Terps are averaging over 12.0 minutes per game.

Maryland in the B1G

In its first season in the Big Ten, Maryland won the regular season with a perfect 18-0 record, then finished it off with the Big Ten tournament title. The Terrapins won 10 tournament titles and three regular season titles in their 37 years in the ACC.

- The Terps are 78-31 (.716) all-time against their Big Ten opponents.
- Prior to the Jan. 2 loss to Ohio State, the Terps had won 31 straight games against Big Ten teams, dating back to 2007. The last loss to a Big Ten opponent was when the third-ranked Terps fell at No. 4 Rutgers, 68-60, on Dec. 3, 2007.

Since joining the Big Ten before the 2014-15 season, the Terrapins are 34-2 (.944) vs. their conference opponents.

In the 14 years under Frese, the Terps are 46-6 (.885) against their Big Ten opponents.

Frese is 58-12 (.829) all-time vs. Big Ten opponents, which includes her time at Minnesota (01-02) and at Ball State (1999-01).

Maryland is 20-3 (.870) against Big Ten teams at home in XFINITY Center. All are under Frese. The first two losses were against Penn State on Dec. 4, 2002 and Ohio State in the NCAA Second Round in 2003.

In her one season coaching in the Big Ten, Frese led Minnesota to a record of 22-8 overall, 11-5 in Big Ten play and an NCAA Tournament berth. She was named AP National Coach of the Year in April 2002.

Glass Cleaners

The Terps are one of the most dominant rebounding teams in the country, just as they have been the last few years. They've led their conference in rebounding margin the last six years straight - since the 2009-10 season.

- The Terrapins are currently No. 2 in the country with their rebounding margin of +15.6.
- Last year, they outrebounded their opponents, 1,561-1,170 for a margin of +10.6), which led the Big Ten and was seventh in the NCAA.

Terps in the Polls

Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country. The Terrapins have been ranked in 109 straight Associated Press polls, dating back to the preseason poll of the 2010-11 season.

- Maryland has been ranked for 168 weeks in the last 11 seasons, with 144 of those weeks in the AP top 10 and 66 in the AP top 5.
- The Terps appeared in the AP Top 5 on Jan. 26, 2015 for the first time since March 12, 2012.
- Brenda Frese has had a team ranked in 206 weeks in her career.

Terps vs. Ranked Teams Under Frese

Since Brenda Frese took over in 2002-03, Maryland has 62 wins over Associated Press top 25 teams, including 11 last year, which set a new school record.

- Most recently, the Terrapins beat No. 20 Syracuse, 82-64 on Dec. 2 and topped No. 17 Michigan State, 85-76, on Feb. 5.
- Last year, the Terps won at No. 12 Nebraska, 75-47, on Jan. 3, at No. 23 Minnesota, 77-73, on Jan. 11, at No. 22 Rutgers, 71-59, on Jan. 15, vs. No. 20 Iowa, 93-88, on Feb. 1, vs. No. 19 Nebraska, 59-47, on Feb.

8, at No. 25 Northwestern, 69-48, on March 1, over Northwestern again, 74-63, on March 7, against No. 13 Princeton in the NCAA Second Round and over No. 16 Duke, 65-55, in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. Most recently, Maryland beat No. 6 Tennessee, 58-48, in the Elite Eight on March 30.

- The Terps won 10 games over ranked teams in the 2005-06 season, including six over top 10 opponents and four over top five teams.

- Under Frese, Maryland has 21 wins over AP top 10 teams, most recently a 58-48 win over No. 6 Tennessee in the Elite Eight on March 30.

- Maryland has five wins over No. 1 teams in its history, including two in Frese's time. The Terrapins beat No. 1 North Carolina twice in the 2005-06 season.

Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team, especially over the last decade.

- The Terps are 496-128 (.795) all time in College Park, dating back to the inaugural 1971-72 season.

- Maryland is 203-33 (.860) at home under Brenda Frese, whose first season in College Park was the inaugural season of XFINITY Center. That is among the top 10 toughest places to play in the country.

- The Terrapins are 123-6 (.953) all-time in non-conference games in XFINITY Center.

- Prior to Jan. 2, Maryland had won 28 straight home games since a 94-46 win over Pittsburgh on Feb. 6, 2014. The Terps went 17-0 at home last season.

- The Terps won 48 straight home games starting Nov. 9, 2007 with a 76-52 season-opening win over Princeton. The streak ended on Jan. 21, 2010 with an 80-77 loss to Miami.

Overtime is Our Time

The phrase, "Overtime is our time!" became one of the catch phrases from the Terps' 2006 NCAA title run. That 2005-06 team went 6-0 in overtime games and won the national title in extra time vs. Duke.

- Maryland is 15-2 (.882) in overtime games in head coach Brenda Frese's 14 years.

- In the 2007-08 season, Frese was not on the sidelines for two of the Terps' overtime games. She missed a 97-86 double overtime loss at North Carolina on Jan. 26, 2008 and a 74-71 win at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008, due to her pregnancy with her sons.

- The Terps' only overtime loss with Frese on the sidelines was a 95-91 loss at Florida State on Jan. 16, 2005.

USA! USA! USA!

- Juniors Shatori Walker-Kimbrough and Brionna Jones both played for USA Basketball this summer. Jones was selected to the World University Games Team and Walker-Kimbrough was on the Pan American Games Team.

- Jones and the WWUG Team won gold in Gwangju, South Korea. She averaged 7.7 points, 4.8 rebounds with five steals in the six-game tournament.

- Walker-Kimbrough and the Pan American Team took silver in Toronto. She averaged 10.2 points, 2.6 rebounds with nine steals and seven assists through the five-game the tournament. She started the final three games.

- Nine of Brenda Frese's players at Maryland have won gold with USA Basketball.

Family Ties

- Head coach Brenda Frese and her younger sister, Marsha, are the only two sister head coaches in Division I. Marsha is in her third year as head coach at

UMKC and was an assistant under Brenda at Ball State, Minnesota and for two years at Maryland.

- Aja Ellison's dad is 1989 NBA No. 1 overall draft pick Pervis Ellison, who also won a national championship at Louisville. Her mother, Timi, ran track at Maryland.

- Kiara Leslie's older brother, C.J., played at NC State from 2010-13 and now plays professionally in Korea.

- Malina Howard's younger sister, Marisa, is a sophomore post player at Division II Goldey-Beacom.

- Brionna Jones' older brother, Jarred, plays at Loyola (Md.), and her sister, Stephanie, will join her at Maryland next fall.

Terps In the Pros

- Fourteen Terrapins have been drafted since the start of the WNBA in 1997, including 10 under Brenda Frese.

- Six of Frese's players have gone on to be drafted in the top 10, including: Crystal Langhorne (2008, 6th overall), Laura Harper (2008, 10th overall), Marissa Coleman (2009, 2nd overall), Kristi Toliver (2009, 3rd overall), Tianna Hawkins (2013, 6th overall) and Alyssa Thomas (2014, 4th overall).

- Four former Terps have been named WNBA All-Stars - Vicky Bullett (1999), Crystal Langhorne (2011, 2013), Kristi Toliver (2013) and Marissa Coleman (2015).

Next Level

- Over the last few years, multiple members of Frese's staff have made the jump to become head coaches or work in the NBA.

- Last April, associate head coach Tina Langley accepted the head coaching position at Rice. Two days later, assistant coach Marlin Chinm was named the head coach at Florida International.

- Five-year assistant coach David Adkins came to Maryland after becoming a highly-respected development coach at the high school level. In 2014, he was hired by the Washington Wizards as their assistant coach for player development.

- Former practice player and coordinator of recruiting operations Winston Gandy was also hired by the Wizards last summer, as a development assistant.

- Former practice player and intern Ryan Richman was hired as the Wizards' assistant video coordinator prior to the 2013-14 season.

Terps in the Classroom

The Terrapins have a 100 percent graduation rate in the 14 years under Brenda Frese.

- Three current Terrapins - Malina Howard, Brene Moseley and Chloe Pavlech - all graduated in May 2015 and are doing postgraduate work this year.

- Howard graduated with her Kinesiology degree in just three years and is currently working on her pre-medical school requirements. She intends to become a cardiologist. Howard was the recipient of the Elite 89 Award last year, an award given to the student-athlete with the highest GPA at the Final Four.

- Moseley earned her degree in American Studies and is studying English this year.

- Chloe Pavlech also graduated in three years with her degree in Journalism from the prestigious Philip Merrill College of Journalism. She is working on her master's degree in Journalism.

- Kristen Confroy and Brionna Jones are also studying to become doctors. Confroy is a Physiology and Neurobiology major and Jones is a Kinesiology major.

Terrapins Partner With Team IMPACT

- The Maryland women's basketball team partnered with Team IMPACT, a national organization based in

- The Terrapins drafted Ashlyn, a 5-year old girl from Annapolis, Md., on Oct. 24, officially signing her on as a member of the team. Ashlyn deals with multiple diagnoses that complicate her daily life.

- Ashlyn was born with a heart defect called Supraventricular Tachycardia (SVT), which consists of an extremely sped up heart rate. Ashlyn also deals with muscular dystrophy, cyclic vomiting syndrome and asthma.

- Ashlyn has spent time with the Terrapins over the last few months, watching movies and accompanying them to many functions.

- Team IMPACT children are drafted onto college athletic teams local to where they live and, in effect, become official members of the team from Draft Day through Graduation.

- Established in 2011, Team IMPACT has already matched over 700 children with collegiate teams at over 300 institutions in 43 states, improving the quality of life of hundreds of courageous children and touching the lives of over 20,000 student athletes.

Maryland Signs No. 1 Recruiting Class

Head coach Brenda Frese and her staff signed the No. 1 recruiting class in the country in November. Kaila Charles (Glendale, Md.), Stephanie Jones (Havre de Grace, Md.), Sarah Myers (Cumming, Ga.), Destiny Slocum (Meridian, Idaho), Jenna Staiti (Cumming, Ga.) and Blair Watson (Nutley, N.J.) make up the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation, as ranked by ESPN, Blue Star Basketball and Collegiate Girls Basketball Report.

- Charles, Slocum and Watson were named to the McDonald's All-American Game. Maryland and Stanford are the only schools with three honorees. Frese has brought in 21 McDonald's All-Americans to Maryland in her 14 years in College Park.

- This is the 11th top 10 recruiting class signed by Frese in her 14 years under Maryland. Twice, Frese brought in the No. 2 recruiting class, back in 2007 and 2010.

- Four of the six newest Terrapins are ranked in ESPN's Top 30. Maryland is the only school with more than two players among the Top 50.

- Kaila Charles (Glendale, Md./Riverdale Baptist), a 5-11 forward, was named the No. 25 overall player by both ESPN and the Collegiate Girls Report and No. 21 by the All Star Girls Report. She averaged 22 points and 10 rebounds as a junior.

- Stephanie Jones (Havre de Grace, Md./Aberdeen HS), a 6-2 forward, is the younger sister of current Terrapin, Brionna Jones. She was named the No. 51 overall player by both ESPN and the Collegiate Girls Report and No. 35 by the All Star Girls Report. Jones averaged 19.5 points and 12 rebounds as a junior last year.

- Sarah Myers (Cumming, Ga./South Forsyth HS), a 5-10 guard, was the No. 92 overall player by the All Star Girls Report and a four-year starter at South Forsyth. She averaged 21.0 points per game as a junior last season.

- Destiny Slocum (Meridian, Idaho/Mountain View HS), a 5-7 point guard, is the No. 7 overall player by both ESPN, All Star Girls Report and the Collegiate Girls Report. She averaged 25.1 points, 5.6 assists, 5.3 rebounds and 2.9 steals as a junior. This summer, she was the point guard for the U.S. Under-19 team and helped lead Team USA to a gold medal in Moscow in the FIBA World Championships.

- Jenna Staiti (Cumming, Ga./West Forsyth HS), a 6-6 center, was named the No. 17 overall player by both ESPN and the Collegiate Girls Report and the No. 1 player in the state of Georgia. Staiti averaged 29 points, 16 rebounds, while shooting 71 percent from the field in her junior season.

- Blair Watson (Nutley, N.J./Nutley HS), a 6-0 wing, was named the No. 28 overall player by both ESPN and the Collegiate Girls Report and No. 24 by the All Star Girls Report. Watson averages over 23.0 points and four three-pointers a game.

- Maryland's bid to the 2015 NCAA Tournament marked its 12th straight postseason appearance. Eleven of those 12 were NCAA Tournament bids.

- The Terps have averaged 29.0 wins per season the last 11 years, and have 12 consecutive 20-win seasons from 2004-2015.

- Frese has led the Terps to five 30-win seasons. 2005-06 marked the first 30-win season for the program, as the Terrapins went 34-4 and won the 2006 NCAA title. The Terps won 30 games in 2007-08 when they went 33-4 and in 2008-09 when they went 31-5. In 2012-13, the Terps notched the program's fourth 30-win season with their record of 31-5.

- The Terrapins have won at least one postseason game (NCAA or WNIT) in each of the last 11 seasons.

- The Terps have advanced to the NCAA SWEET 16 seven times in the last 10 years.

- Maryland earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament in 2008, 2009 and 2015 and a No. 2 seed in 2006, 2007 and 2012.

Brenda FRESE

421-136 (17th year)/364-106 (14th year at Maryland)

There was no better fit for the University of Maryland women's basketball program than head coach Brenda Frese. The 2002 Associated Press (AP) National Coach of the Year arrived in College Park with great expectations and has not disappointed. Reviving a once-prominent women's basketball program back to the national stage, her high work rate and positive attitude has resulted in three Final Fours, 12-straight top 15 recruiting classes and a National Championship in 2006. Frese has balanced that strong work ethic with a fun and family-friendly environment, also becoming a wife and a mother of twin boys, giving birth to them in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. With the birth of her twins in February of 2008, she becomes one of only six coaches to win a national championship and be a parent.

Now in her 14th season at Maryland, Frese has guided Maryland to a National Championship in 2006, three Final Fours, 13 winning seasons, 12-straight 20-win seasons, five 30-win campaigns and 11 trips to the NCAA Tournament. In 2013, she signed an extension through at least June of 2021.

Frese and her staff led the Terrapins to an unprecedented level of success in their first year in the Big Ten in 2015. After losing five seniors, including three starters and a three-time All-American, Maryland led the league in scoring with 80.2 points per game, en route to a perfect 18-0 conference record in a new league and a 24-game win streak over three months. The Terrapins were the first team to go undefeated in conference play since Purdue went 16-0 in 1998-99 and Ohio State went 18-0 in 1984-85. The Terps were the first Maryland team, men's or women's, to stay perfect in conference play. Frese was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the second time in her career.

Former Athletics Director Deborah A. Yow courted the 2002 AP National Coach of the Year because of Frese's reputation for making amazing turnarounds and her relentless work ethic in recruiting. Described as dynamic, overachieving, determined and enthusiastic, the 44-year old coach is one of college basketball's stars. Standing atop the podium in Boston in 2006, Frese became the fifth-youngest coach (age 35) in NCAA history to win a national title and only the ninth to win in her first trip to the Final Four.

Frese has built the team's success around recruiting, hard work and a positive atmosphere. The instant she arrived on campus, she determinedly worked the recruiting trails in an effort to reclaim the elite status Maryland once had in the 1980s. Success came quickly and early. Before she even coached a game in the newly-constructed XFINITY Center, she received commitments from a pair of high school All-Americans, including Shay Doron, who went on to become a three-time All-ACC pick and a WNBA Draft selection. In all, 26 high school All-Americans have donned a Maryland uniform under Frese's reign.

All 12 of Frese's recruiting classes at Maryland have been ranked in the top-15, including nine rated in the top-10 and five in the top five. The landmark signings of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman were rated No. 2 in the country, while the class of Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver was ranked No. 4 - the core of the Terps' national championship team. Her 2010 batch of Terrapins included three high school All-Americans and a No. 2 national ranking.

Frese's recruiting classes have lived up to their billing and her pupils have earned numerous accolades. In 2012, Alyssa Thomas became the first Maryland

sophomore to be named a WBCA All-American, and was also named to the AP All-American First Team and the USBWA All-American Team. The first Terp in 17 years to garner All-American nods in 2006, Langhorne was a three-time AP and USBWA All-American, the program's first multiple All-American. She was selected a WBCA All-American in 2007, the first in school history since 1989, and then again received the accolade in 2008.

Toliver repeated Langhorne's AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American "trifecta" in 2008. The legendary point guard, however, became the first Terp in school history to be named to the AP's All-America First Team as a senior in 2009 - to go along with another set of WBCA and USBWA All-American laurels. Coleman, Toliver's classmate, also earned AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American honors at the conclusion of her illustrious senior campaign in 2009.

Frese's players have also received numerous conference honors. Most recently, Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year as a sophomore in 2012. She is just the second sophomore in the history of ACC women's basketball to earn the league's most prestigious honor and went on to win the ACC Tournament MVP honor that year. Thomas garnered the league's top honor in her junior and senior seasons as well and was just the second player in history to earn the honor three times. In her final season, Langhorne was selected the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Terp to win the award in nearly 20 years. Toliver followed suit in 2009 - the third Terp ever to win the award. In 2005, Langhorne became the program's first ACC Rookie of the Year since 1991. Coleman followed in her footsteps by nabbing the honor during the Terps' championship campaign in 2006. Center Lynetta Kizer and Thomas made it four Terps in six years to be named the league's top freshman when they won in 2009 and 2011.

In all, 31 Terps have received All-Conference citations in Frese's 14 years, including a school-record four in 2008 when Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver and Harper were selected and in 2012 when Thomas, Tianna Hawkins, Laurin Mincy and Lynetta Kizer were honored. Six Terps have been First Team All-ACC selections 11 times in Frese's tenure. Langhorne became Maryland's first three-time, first team all-conference selection and the first to be named All-ACC four times. Coleman joined Langhorne as the lone Terps to ever be selected to an All-ACC team four times, stamping her three second-team honors with a first-team selection in 2009. Thomas was also a four-time selection and three-time first team honoree.

Numerous Terps have also garnered national recognition under Frese. Toliver became the first Terrapin to earn the highest point guard honor in the country, winning the Nancy Lieberman Award in 2008, after being a finalist the previous year. Several have earned spots on national player of the year candidate lists, making history in the fall of 2006. That year, for the first time ever, four players from the same team were selected preseason candidates for the WBCA's prestigious Wade Trophy when Doron, Coleman, Langhorne and Toliver were put on the Watch List. All five starters were tabbed preseason honorees for the Naismith Award, also a first in the history of the award.

Maryland has rewritten several records over the last few seasons. In 2007-08, the Terps became the first team in NCAA history to have four active players with at least 1,000 points on the same roster. That year, school records were broken for most home wins (21), which is also believed to be an NCAA record. The team opened the 2006-07 campaign winning 18-straight games, setting the program record for best start to a season. Maryland ended the 2008-09 campaign having won a school-record 36-straight home games, thanks to undefeated home marks in two successive seasons, and 40-consecutive non-conference games at the XFINITY Center. In the 2009-10 season the Terrapins extended that streak to 48, a Maryland men's and women's basketball record.

In 2005-06, the team's 34 wins set a school record, shattering the previous mark of 29. The championship squad also set new standards for highest road winning percentage (.900), points (3,166), field goal attempts (2,363), 3-point field goals (216), 3-point attempts (540), free throws (690), free throw attempts (924), team free throw percentage (.747), rebounds (1,720) and blocked shots (195).

Numerous individual records have also fallen in recent years. Among the most notable are the career scoring and rebounding records, which now own to Thomas. Langhorne shattered the previous marks, becoming the first-ever Terrapin to score 2,000 points and to grab 1,000 rebounds - an elite list of which Coleman later joined.

Maryland's rise into the upper-echelon of the country has bolstered the excitement surrounding the team. Over the last ten years, the program has ranked in the top-25 in the nation in attendance, including top-10 rankings in five of the last 10 seasons. In 2007, Maryland recorded the nation's largest one-season improvement in home attendance, averaging 9,533 fans in 16 games, almost double the average from the previous season (4,183) - with more than 150,000 people making their way through the XFINITY Center turnstiles, a school-record. By the end of the '07 campaign, the Terps were sixth in the nation in average attendance and fourth in overall attendance, as 241,280 spectators filled the stands at home and on the road to watch the Terps play in 34 games. In 2008, Maryland hosted over 160,000 fans in 21 games and was ranked eighth in the nation in average attendance that year, followed by a No. 6 ranking in 2009 (133,336 in 15 games).

One of the highlights of the 2006-07 campaign was the announcement of two sellout games in XFINITY Center, the first- and second-ever in the young facility. The stands were filled to capacity when the Terps hosted North Carolina on Jan. 28, 2007, breaking the ACC's single-game record, the first women's basketball sellout since 1992. The record was matched in the regular-season finale on Feb. 18, 2007, when Duke came to College Park.

In the classroom, the Terps have also been all-star students. Frese's Terps have earned 25 Academic All-Conference honors, while five have received Academic All-American nods by ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA.

Maryland head women's basketball coach Brenda Frese announced the hiring of assistant coach Shay Robinson in July 2014. Robinson comes to College Park after spending the previous season with the Kansas women's basketball program.

"I always want to surround our players with great people that can help them get better," Frese said. "The player development piece is something that's really important to me and it's helped us be successful. Developing our players has always been a team effort shared by our staff and it was crucial to me that Shay is terrific at it. He was endorsed by some people in the business whose opinions I really value. Shay will be working with our perimeter players and I know he's really excited about getting started with our team. It's always great when you get new ideas and new energy. He's a dynamic guy that can help us in a lot of different ways."

Robinson helped the Terrapins to quite the successful inaugural Big Ten season in his first year in College Park. He helped guide them to a record 28-game win streak, an 18-0 mark in conference play, the Big Ten regular season title and the Big Ten tournament title. The Terrapins earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, then beat undefeated Princeton, No. 16 Duke and No. 6 Tennessee en route to their second straight Final Four appearance.

Prior to coming to College Park, Robinson spent a year at Kansas and two seasons at Air Force.

Robinson served for five years as the assistant director and head instructor at EDGE Training Facility, known as the premier training facility in the state of Florida. Robinson managed daily basketball operations while performing individual and team skill development sessions, camps and clinics. His vast clientele ranged from beginning players to elite high school, college and professional athletes in the NBA and European Leagues.

A native of Greensboro, N.C., Robinson worked the coaching ranks for many years. He coached the girls' basketball team at Viera High School during the 2010-11 season, helping the squad win its first district championship while posting a 22-3 overall record. Robinson also served as an assistant coach with the boys' varsity program at Viera from 2006-09.

During the 2009-10 season, Robinson served as an assistant men's basketball coach at Brevard Community College. There, he was in charge of guard and post player development, while assisting with offensive and defensive philosophies. During his military career, Robinson received various medals and was awarded the distinguished John Levitow Award in 2002. He was also named Air Force Special Operations Command, Command Post Controller of the Year in 2002-03, before his honorable discharge in 2004.

In August 2007, Robinson earned a bachelor of science in sports and fitness with a specialization in coaching theory from the University of Central Florida. He also holds a master of science in athletic administration from Nova Southeastern University (2010). Robinson is an active member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and the Black Coaches & Administrators (BCA) organization.

Robinson is married to Tonya, who is also an Air Force veteran.

Assistant Coach • 1st year • Greensboro College '06

Maryland head women's basketball coach Brenda Frese announced the hiring of assistant coach Bett Shelby in April 2015. Shelby comes to College Park after spending the previous two seasons with the Virginia Tech women's basketball program.

"Bett Shelby is someone I've known for a few years now," Frese said. "We've crossed paths in a lot of gyms and I've watched how hard she works. If you look at any program she's been a part of, her presence has elevated the team. People that she's worked with sing her praises as a relentless competitor, which is exactly what we want at Maryland. I'm excited to help her continue to grow here and watch her become a great addition."



Shelby joined the Virginia Tech staff in May 2013. She served as recruiting coordinator, and also helped with on-court preparation, scouting and guard training. In 2015, Shelby helped the Hokies sign a top-20 recruiting class and win two ACC Tournament games for the first time in school history.

Shelby came to Blacksburg after serving as an assistant coach at Seton Hall for two seasons where she coordinated aspects of recruiting, scouted opponents and coached the guards. In 2012, Shelby helped sign a class ranked 33rd nationally by All Star Girls Report. The class featured the 19th best forward in the country as well as the 73rd best overall player in the 2012 class and a NJCAA All-American.

During the 2012-13 season, Shelby helped coach the Pirates to the most school wins since the 2008-09 season as well as the most Big East victories since the 2006-07 season. The team also claimed its first Big East Tournament win since the 2008-09 season.

Prior to Seton Hall, Shelby served on the staff at Southern Illinois where she landed a recruiting class ranked 37th nationally by ESPN HoopGurlz. In addition, the class was tabbed the No. 1 mid-major class that season by ESPN HoopGurlz. The All-Star Girls report ranked Shelby's class 57th nationally and No. 1 in the Missouri Valley Conference. The class included SIU's first Parade All-American, Top-100 player (ESPN HoopGurlz) and a top-100 transfer as named by the All-Star Girls Report.

A native of Charlotte, N.C., Shelby was an assistant coach at Tennessee Tech in 2010 and was responsible for an All-Star Girls Report Top-100 recruiting class, ranking No. 1 in the Ohio Valley Conference. Shelby also spent one season as the recruiting coordinator and assistant coach at Stetson University, helping recruit a Top-100 recruiting class according to All-Star Girls Report that ranked first in the Atlantic Sun Conference.

Shelby spent two seasons as the Director of Basketball Operations at East Carolina. During her time at ECU, the Pirates won the Conference USA title and reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 25 years.

Shelby played collegiately at UNC Wilmington during her first two seasons. She spent her junior and senior seasons at Greensboro College where she served as team captain. The team won the USA South regular-season and conference titles during her time. During her senior year, the team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with a 22-8 record.

Shelby graduated from Greensboro College with her bachelor's degree in Sports and Exercise Studies with a concentration in coaching in 2005.

Shelby's parents are Brad and Texie Shelby and her sister is Mary Shelby of Charlotte, N.C.

Terry NOONER

Assistant Coach • 1st year • Kansas '00

Maryland women's basketball head coach Brenda Frese announced the hiring of assistant coach Terry Nooner in September 2015. Nooner comes to College Park after coaching at Alabama the last two seasons. Prior to his time with the Crimson Tide, Nooner coached at his alma mater, Kansas, where he played from 1997-2000.

"Coach Nooner came highly recommended to me by quite a few people," Frese said. "I really like his background and how he's worked his way up the ladder. He played for Roy Williams at Kansas and was a team captain. That says a lot about what kind of leader he was for one of the most successful coaches in the business. He's been an assistant for different, successful women's coaches. And he started at the grassroots level, so he knows both sides of the equation. We're excited to welcome him and his family to Maryland."

In Nooner's first season at Alabama, the Tide won 14 games, playing one of the most difficult schedules in the nation. Seven of those victories came in Southeastern Conference play, which was the most league wins for the Crimson Tide in over 12 years. Alabama also had several notable victories including the first in Lexington against Kentucky since 2002, the first against Georgia since 2004, snapping a 23-game losing streak to the Lady Bulldogs, and the first in program history at Vanderbilt's Memorial Gym.

"I am honored and humbled to join the Maryland family, and am incredibly excited for the future of Maryland women's basketball," Nooner said. "Coach Frese is a premier basketball coach on any level, and she has turned the Terrapin program into a national power. I'm ready to get to work with a terrific staff and talented student-athletes. Here at Maryland, my overall goal is to help the program get better each and every day, and help bring championships back to College Park."

Nooner spent one season at his alma mater as an assistant with the women's team. He helped the Jayhawks to one of their most successful seasons, as Kansas finished with a 20-14 overall record in 2012-13. The Jayhawks advanced to the fourth NCAA Sweet 16 in program history and their first in back-to-back seasons. He returned to Lawrence after serving as an assistant for one year at Southern Illinois.

Before joining the collegiate ranks, Nooner coached high school and AAU basketball for seven years in the Kansas City area. Additionally, he served as president of KC Pro Am Inc., a nonprofit organization that provides basketball instruction, from 2007-11 and also worked at the Jewish Community Center of Greater Kansas City as a personal basketball instructor from 2006-11. Nooner's past clients include Chauncey Billups of the L.A. Clippers, and former NBA players Tyronn Lue and Billy Thomas, in addition to several college players.

Nooner was a former guard and team captain for the Kansas men's basketball team from 1997-2000. He helped the Jayhawks to a Sweet Sixteen, four NCAA Tournament appearances and three Big 12 championships.

Nooner earned two degrees from Kansas; a bachelor's degree in African and African American studies, in 2000, and a master's degree in sports administration in 2002.

He and his wife Tracy have a daughter, Tarynn, and a son, Terry Nooner III.
