## STORYLINES

- No. 12/12 Maryland (7-1, 3-0) will play at No. 23/24 Michigan State (8-0, 3-0) Thursday at 5 p.m. in East Lansing.
- Maryland held off No. 19/18 Indiana, 84-80, Monday night in College Park. Diamond Miller and Ashley Owusu both put up 20 points and Chloe Bibby added 15. The Terrapins jumped out to a 10-0 lead and led by 12 at half-time. Indiana clawed back in and cut the lead to two in the third quarter, but 18 of Miller's points in the second half helped hold them off.
- The Terrapins welcomed graduate transfer Alaysia Styles to the roster last week. She graduated with her degree from Cal at the end of the fall 2020 semester. Styles, a 6-3 forward from San Diego, played three seasons at California. In her junior season, she averaged 8.4 points, 2.8 rebounds and started in 30 games for the Golden Bears.
- The Terps own the series at 13-2. Maryland has won the last two straight meetings. Last year, the Terps won 94-53 in College Park on Feb. 3. Brenda Frese is 14-3 vs. Michigan State in her career.
- The Terrapins are averaging 95.6 points per game through eight games. The NCAA Division I scoring record is 96.7 points per game by Providence in 1991. Maryland's team scoring record was 89.6 points per game by the 1977-78 team. No other team in program history averaged over 90 points per game.
- The University of Maryland women's basketball program is celebrating its 50th varsity season in 2020-21, and will honor the program's rich tradition and history throughout the year. Maryland played its first full varsity season in 1971-72, under the leadership of pioneer Dottie McKnight. During its storied history, the program has won 1,036 games, amassed 43 winning seasons, won 22 conference championships, made 37 postseason appearances and captured the 2006 National Championship.
- Head coach Brenda Frese is in her 19th season in College Park. She's led the Terrapins to a record of 493-129 (.793), 12 conference titles, 15 NCAA Tournament appearances in 17 postseasons, three Final Fours, six Elite Eights, six Sweet Sixteens and the 2006 NCAA Championship.

- Frese is closing in on 500 wins at Maryland. With win No. 500, she will become the winningest coach in Maryland basketball history. Hall of Fame women's basketball head coach Chris Weller won 499 games in her 27 seasons (1975-02).

# ► 2020-21 SEASON OUTLOOK

**COLLEGE PARK, Md.** - The 2020-21 Maryland women's basketball team is an exciting mix of a few experienced veterans, sophomores looking to take the next step and new faces to the program. Though the Terrapins have small numbers at just 10 players, the squad is one head coach Brenda Frese calls her most talented. With a roster filled with hard workers and student-athletes ready for the opportunity, head coach Brenda Frese and her staff will have 10 Terrapins ready to make the most of their minutes on the court.

The Terrapins were picked to finish second in the Big Ten by both the league's head coaches and the media panel. Both groups picked Ashley Owusu, last year's Big Ten Freshman of the Year, to the All-Big Ten Preseason team. With eight of 10 Terrapins 6-1 or taller, this is one of Frese's tallest teams.

"I'm kind of starting the season with no big picture expectations, just appreciating every day we have together," Frese said. "We saw last year how things can get shut down real quick. We just have to be grateful for what we get. We don't have a lot of players on our roster, but I like the quality. I expect this team to be one of our most competitive teams. Everyone can score. I hope we can grow as the season unfolds. We'll be counting on some new players to hit the ground running. Our sophomores are going to be critical to our success. They showed a lot of promise last season so it's reasonable to expect them to continue their upward trend. We have a chance to be a very good team."

The Terrapins enter every practice, every workout, every game with the same mentality - grateful for another day together and a chance to play.

"We are truly entering the unknown," Frese said. "None of us have attempted to play during a pandemic. The virus is an opponent every day. We're doing our best to be smart and stick to the guidelines. We can only take each day as it

comes. We've preached for many years to our team to control the controllables. That's all we can really do. I really have to applaud the discipline that our team has shown. No matter what comes along, we'll do our best to deal with it. We'll see where it all ends up."

## Team Chemistry

This group of Terrapins came together in a strange situation - one in which they couldn't actually be together for months. After losing teammates to graduation and transfers, Frese and the staff kept the returning Terrapins connected through weekly Zoom calls while they were all home.

Frese and the staff recruited Chloe Bibby, Katie Benzan and Taisiya Kozlova through Zoom calls. Bibby and Kozlova committed without ever stepping foot on campus or meeting a teammate or staff member in person.

Throughout the summer, the Terps kept up their Zoom calls. They had guest speakers such as ESPN's Holly Rowe, former Maryland staffers and current NBA assistants David Adkins and Ryan Richman and A'ja Wilson. They played games and even did a virtual escape room.

"I never knew Zoom and a pandemic could contribute to chemistry, but so far, this group has been a tight unit," Frese said. "They are highly competitive in practice. I like how they look out for each other. We have a nice blend of youth and experience. We have some good voices on the team that understand we keep our standards high."

## Guards

The Terrapins have multiple options at the point guard position, with veteran redshirt junior Channise Lewis back from a knee injury, sophomore

Ashley Owusu and incoming senior Katie Benzan, an All-Ivy League First team honoree. Lewis will look to run the floor after averaging 5.0 assists in her first two years. Owusu will look to build on her freshman season, in which she was second on the Maryland roster in scoring at 12.0 points per game, and second in the Big Ten with 5.4 assists per game. She was voted to the All-Big Ten Second Team at the end of the season. In her three years at Harvard, Benzan averaged 13.7 points per game and .395 from outside the arc.

"Ashley Owusu and Katie Benzan will have the ball in their hands a lot this season," Frese said. "They're different styles and sizes, but they should complement each other. Our fans are familiar with what Ashley can do on the court. Katie is a dynamic guard that can really knock down shots and find her teammates. She brings a terrific voice to our team. We get Channise Lewis back after missing a year with injury. We're working her back into the mix. We'll need her at times to calm things down like she's done in the past for us. Zoe Young still isn't cleared to play. She had an additional procedure on her knee that we think has helped."

## Wings

Maryland has the most depth at the wing position with multiple players with a variety of strengths to contribute. Their wings can rebound, shoot and drive with the best in the country. The wing position will start with Diamond Miller, Faith Masonius, Angel Reese, Chloe Bibby and Taisiya Kozlova.

Miller and Masonius are coming off of strong freshman seasons, in which both contributed to the Terrapins 17-game win streak.

Reese is the No. 2 freshman in the country and averaged 18 points, 20 rebounds and five assists per game for her career.

Bibby is the only Terrapin with Final Four experience. She played in 88 career games over three years at Mississippi State and averaged 9.1 points and 4.8 boards per game over the last two seasons.

Kozlova is the youngest Terp. She spent a year at Elevation Prep Academy in Florida. She put up 13.0 points, 2.0 rebounds and 2.3 steals per game in her first season in the U.S.

"I really loved the way Diamond Miller finished last season. She was hitting her stride and playing really confidently," Frese said. "She really adds a terrific dimension and elevates our team. She worked hard on her game in the offseason- even during the pandemic. I'm certain she's going to have a strong season. We have some versatile players that can help us in multiple areas. Faith Masonius can play inside and out for us. She can handle the ball and go at her defender. She's confident in her shot. And one of the things I love about her is she connects the different pieces when she's on the floor. She knows how to play the game.

"Tai Kozlova is a freshman for us and a long way from her home in Russia. Tai was a late addition to our program and we felt really lucky she was available. She has legit size and length. We could also see Chloe Bibby and Angel Reese on the perimeter when we really want to space the floor. Chloe really shoots the ball well and Angel can really attack. It's great to have options."

## Front Court

The Terps will look to continue to be a dominant inside team after leading the league and being among the best in the NCAA in rebounding. Mimi Collins, Reese, Bibby and Masonius will be counted on to get on the glass.

Collins sat out the 2019-20 season due to NCAA Transfer rules. She played her freshman season at Tennessee, where she averaged 5.5 points and 3.4 rebounds while appearing in all 32 games for the Lady Vols. Collins started the final four games of the season, averaging 9.0 points and 2.3 rebounds in those contests.

"Angel Reese is highly competitive and should be a big contributor for us. Everyone knows how much I value rebounding and Angel should be strong in that department," Frese said. "She doesn't back down. Mimi Collins is ready to play after sitting out her transfer year. Mimi brings a physical presence and some size in the post that we probably haven't had in a bit. She did some really good things for our scout team last season and now I want to see her carry that over. Chloe Bibby and Faith Masonius can also give us cover in the paint. All of our posts can stretch the floor and be a threat to shoot the ball. That's a nice wrinkle to add to our attack."

## Staff

The Terrapins will see some staff consistency and a new face to the sidelines in 2020-21. Associate head coach Karen Blair enters her third season at Maryland. She was promoted to her current title in September and was named the WBCA's Assistant Coach of the Year in March.

Kaitlynn Fratz enters her third season as an assistant. Lindsey Spann was promoted to assistant coach this summer after serving as the Director of Recruiting Operations for a season.

Joe Glowacki is in his fifth year on staff and second as the Terrapins' Director of Video.

Frese hired Jessica Imhof to work as the program's Director of Scouting and Player Development. Most recently, Imhof worked at North Carolina.

"We only have one real new face on staff, Jessica Imhof, who fills the Director of Scouting and Player Development position," Frese said. "Sean Ehlbeck was in that spot last season, but he got hired as an assistant. We were really happy for Sean and we're excited to bring Jessica aboard. Lindsey Spann has moved up to be an assistant coach for us. We liked what we saw from Lindsey last season and she has a lot to offer. She's really bright and has experience playing at this level. She's also a local, so she knows the area. I'm excited to see how she can grow as a coach."

- Last season, the Terrapins won 17 straight games to end the 2019-20 season. They won at No. 24 Michigan, 77-49, on Jan. 12, to start the streak. In that stretch, Maryland beat opponents by an average of 25.3 points per game. The Terrapins scored 83.5 points per game in that stretch and held opponents to 58.2 points per game. On the defensive end, the Terps forced 11.2 steals and 20.3 turnovers per contest in the win streak.
- The Terps won the Big Ten regular season title and won their fourth Big Ten championship in six years last year. Owusu was the first freshman to earn Big Ten Tournament Most Outstanding Player honors. She led the team in scoring in the three-game run with 15.3 points, 8.0 assists and 5.7 boards per game.
- Maryland earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament for the 10th straight season.
- The Terps have earned a record of 111-14 (.888) in Big Ten play, including their 16-2 record in the Big Ten Tournament. They are 122-18 (.871) against Big Ten opponents in the 19 years under Brenda Frese. Since joining the league in 2014, Maryland is 49-4 (.925) against Big Ten teams at home in XFINITY Center.
- Brenda Frese signed a multi-year extension in November 2015 which will keep her at Maryland through at least 2025. She's brought the program its first national championship, three Final Fours, six Elite Eights and 15 NCAA Tournament appearances in her 17 postseasons. Frese has also brought in 14 top 15 recruiting classes and brought home 10 conference titles.

## Milestones, Streaks, Etc.

- The Terrapins hit a Big Ten-record 21 three-pointers on Dec. 3 vs. Towson. The previous record was 19, set by Iowa in 2015 and Minnesota in 2016.
- The Terrapins' 115 points vs. No. 14 Arkansas on Nov. 29 are the most-ever for a Big Ten team over a ranked opponent.
- The Terps' and Arkansas' combined 211 points in the Nov. 29 matchup set a program record.

- Head coach Brenda Frese earned her 500th career with an 81-63 victory at Nebraska on Jan. 8, 2019. She owns a record of 550-159 (.776) over her 22-year coaching career.

- As a program, Maryland has earned a record of 1,036-431 (.706) and is the 12th NCAA Division I team to reach 1,000 wins.

## 50 Seasons of Excellence

The University of Maryland women's basketball program will celebrate its 50th varsity season in 2020-21, and will honor the program's rich tradition and history throughout the year.

- The program first became a varsity sport in the 1971-72 season. Led by Dottie McKnight, that first team of Terrapins went 12-2 on the year. McKnight was head coach for four seasons, earning a record of 44-17 (.721).
- Hall of Fame coach Chris Weller took over in 1975 and led the Terrapins for 27 seasons, along the way winning eight ACC Tournament titles. She took the Terps to three Final Fours (1978, 1982, 1989) and earned a record of 499-286 (.636).
- Brenda Frese became the third coach in Maryland women's basketball history in April 2002.
- In 49 seasons played, Maryland has notched 43 winning seasons.
- The University of Maryland hosted the first-ever televised women's basketball game on Jan. 26, 1975 vs. Immaculata. It was broadcast to 70 percent of the country in 28 major markets.
- Maryland became the 12th school in NCAA Division I history to reach 1,000 program wins on March 9, 2019.

## Terps in the Polls

Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country. The Terrapins have been ranked in 201 straight Associated Press polls, dating back to the preseason poll of the 2010-11 season. That mark is behind just Baylor (326 weeks) and Connecticut (516 weeks).

- Overall, the Terps have been ranked in 515 AP polls.
- Maryland has been ranked for 252 weeks in the last 17 seasons, with 193 of those weeks in the AP top 10 and 89 in the AP top 5.
- Brenda Frese has had a team ranked in 303 weeks in her career.

## Terps vs. Ranked Teams Under Frese

Since Brenda Frese took over in 2002-03, Maryland has 78 wins over Associated Press top 25 teams, including 11 in the 2014-15 season, which set a new school record.

- Most recently, No. 14 Maryland beat No. 19 Indiana, 84-80 in College Park on Jan. 4.
- Maryland had seven wins over ranked teams in 2019-20.
- In 2014-15, the Terps won at No. 12 Nebraska, 75-47, on Jan. 3, at No. 23 Minnesota, 77-73, on Jan. 11, at No. 22 Rutgers, 71-59, on Jan. 15, vs. No. 20 Iowa, 93-88, on Feb. 1, vs. No. 19 Nebraska, 59-47, on Feb. 8, at No. 25 Northwestern, 69-48, on March 1, over Northwestern again, 74-63, on March 7, against No. 13 Princeton in the NCAA Second Round and over No. 16 Duke, 65-55, in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. Most recently, Maryland beat No. 6 Tennessee, 58-48, in the Elite Eight on March 30.
- The Terps won 10 games over ranked teams in the 2005-06 season, including six over top 10 opponents

and four over top five teams.

- The Terrapins are 77-61 against ranked teams over the last 17 years, all under Brenda Frese. Twenty-one of those wins were on the road and 21 were at neutral sites.

- Under Frese, Maryland has 23 wins over AP top 10 teams, most recently a 85-61 win at No. 10 South Carolina.

- Maryland has five wins over No. 1 teams in its history, including two in Frese's time. The Terrapins beat No. 1 North Carolina twice in the 2005-06 season.

## Maryland in the B1G

- The Terps are 153-44 (.777) all-time against their Big Ten opponents.

- Since joining the Big Ten in 2014-15, the Terrapins are 111-14 (.888) vs. their conference opponents, including their 16-2 record in the Big Ten Tournament.

- In the 18 years under Frese, the Terps are 122-18 (.871) against their Big Ten opponents.

- Frese is 135-23 (.854) all-time vs. Big Ten opponents, which includes her time at Minnesota and at Ball State.

- Since joining the league in 2014, Maryland is 49-4 (.925) against Big Ten teams at home in XFINITY Center.

- With their 70-57 win at Ohio State's Value City Arena on Jan. 24, 2019, the Terrapins have won in every Big Ten arena since joining the league in the 2014-15 season.

- Since their first year in the Big Ten, the Terps are 89-0 when holding their league opponents to 70 points or less. The Terrapins are also 96-6 when they score 70 points or more.

- In her one season at Minnesota, Frese led the Gophers to a record of 22-8 overall, 11-5 in Big Ten play and an NCAA Tournament berth. She was named AP National Coach of the Year in April 2002.

## Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team, especially over the last decade.

- The Terps are 559-136 (.804) all time in College Park, dating back to the inaugural 1971-72 season.

- Maryland is 266-41 (.866) at home under Brenda Frese, whose first season in College Park was the inaugural season of XFINITY Center. That is among the top 10 toughest places to play in the country.

- The Terrapins are 152-11 (.933) all-time in non-conference games in XFINITY Center.

- Prior to Jan. 2, 2016, Maryland had won 28 straight home games since a 94-46 win over Pittsburgh on Feb. 6, 2014.

- The Terps won 48 straight home games starting Nov. 9, 2007 with a 76-52 season-opening win over Princeton. The streak ended on Jan. 21, 2010 with an 80-77 loss to Miami.

## Overtime is Our Time

The phrase, "Overtime is our time!" became one of the catch phrases from the Terps' 2006 NCAA title run. That 2005-06 team went 6-0 in overtime games and won the national title in extra time vs. Duke.

- The Terrapins currently have the longest active streak in the country without an overtime game at 254 straight games. Their last overtime game was a 92-81 win over Wake Forest in the ACC Tournament Quarterfinals on March 8, 2013.

- Maryland is 15-2 (.882) in overtime games in head coach Brenda Frese's 19 years.

- In the 2007-08 season, Frese was not on the sidelines for two of the Terps' overtime games. She missed a 97-86 double overtime loss at North Carolina on Jan. 26, 2008 and a 74-71 win at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008, due to her pregnancy with her sons.

- The Terps' only overtime loss with Frese on the sidelines was a 95-91 loss at Florida State on Jan.

## Frese Welcomes Top Ten Class

Frese and her staff signed two top recruits that make up the second No. 9 class in the country. Shyanne Sellers (Aurora, Ohio) and Emma Chardon (Geneva, Switzerland) are both rising talents. Sellers is ranked No. 22 overall by ESPN and Chardon, a top European player. • Chardon averaged 18.4 points, 11.3 rebounds and shot 53.7 percent from the floor in the FIBA U-16 championships in 2016. Last year, she ranked she put up 15.8 points, 11.8 rebounds and shot 51.8 percent in the FIBA U-18 Championships. Chardon made the Swiss Senior National Team at age 15. • Sellers is the No. 22 recruit in the class of 2021, according to ESPN. She averaged 21.9 points, 10.6 rebounds and 4.6 assists last season while leading her Aurora High School team to the Division I district semifinals. They also won their second straight Suburban League American Division championship.

## Next Level

Over the last few years, seven members of Frese's team have made the jump to become head coaches or work in the NBA. • Kristi Toliver was named to the Wizards' staff as an assistant coach/player development staff member in 2019. • Five-year assistant coach David Adkins came to Maryland after becoming a highly-respected development coach at the high school level. In 2014, he was hired by the Washington Wizards as their assistant coach for player development. • Former practice player and intern Ryan Richman was hired as the Wizards' assistant coach prior to last season. • Former practice player and intern Winston Gandy spent three seasons as the Coordinator of Player Development for the Wizards before taking an assistant coaching job with the women's program

at Rice.

• In April 2015, associate head coach Tina Langley accepted the head coaching position at Rice. In the summer of 2017, she hired former Maryland practice player and coordinator of recruiting operations Winston Gandy as an assistant coach.

• Maryland's bid to the 2019 NCAA Tournament marked its 16th straight postseason appearance. Fifteen of those 16 were NCAA Tournament bids.

• The Terps have averaged 28.7 wins per season the last 15 years, and have 15 consecutive 20-win seasons from 2004-2019.

• Frese has led the Terps to seven 30-win seasons. 2005-06 marked the first 30-win season for the program, as the Terrapins went 34-4 and won the 2006 NCAA title. The Terps won 30 games in 2007-08 when they went 33-4 and in 2008-09 when they went 31-5. In 2012-13, the Terps notched the program's fourth 30-win season with their record of 31-5. Maryland posted three straight 30-win seasons in 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17.

# BrendaFRESE

**550-159 (22nd year)/493-129 (19th year at Maryland)**

There was no better fit for the University of Maryland women's basketball program than head coach Brenda Frese. The 2002 Associated Press (AP) National Coach of the Year arrived in College Park with great expectations and has not disappointed. Reviving a once-prominent women's basketball program back to the national stage, her high work rate and positive attitude has resulted in three Final Fours, 16 top 15 recruiting classes and a National Championship in 2006. Frese has balanced that strong work ethic with a fun and family-friendly environment, also becoming a wife and a mother of twin boys, giving birth to them in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. With the birth of her twins in February of 2008, she becomes one of only six coaches to win a national championship and be a parent.

Now in her 19th season at Maryland, Frese has guided Maryland to a National Championship in 2006, three Final Fours, 17 winning seasons, 16-straight 20-win seasons, seven 30-win campaigns and 15 trips to the NCAA Tournament. In 2013, she signed an extension through at least 2025.

Frese and her staff led the Terrapins to an unprecedented level of success in their first year in the Big Ten in 2015. After losing five seniors, including three starters and a three-time All-American, Maryland led the league in scoring with 80.2 points per game, en route to a perfect 18-0 conference record in a new league and a 24-game win streak over three months. The Terrapins were the first team to go undefeated in conference play since Purdue went 16-0 in 1998-99 and Ohio State went 18-0 in 1984-85. The Terps were the first Maryland team, men's or women's, to stay perfect in conference play. Frese was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the second time in her career.

Former Athletics Director Deborah A. Yow courted the 2002 AP National Coach of the Year because of Frese's reputation for making amazing turnarounds and her relentless work ethic in recruiting. Described as dynamic, overachieving, determined and enthusiastic, the 48-year old coach is one of college basketball's stars. Standing atop the podium in Boston in 2006, Frese became the fifth-youngest coach (age 35) in NCAA history to win a national title and only the ninth to win in her first trip to the Final Four.

Frese has built the team's success around recruiting, hard work and a positive atmosphere. The instant she arrived on campus, she determinedly worked the recruiting trails in an effort to reclaim the elite status Maryland once had in the 1980s. Success came quickly and early. Before she even coached a game in the newly-constructed XFINITY Center, she received commitments from a pair of high school All-Americans, including Shay Doron, who went on to become a three-time All-ACC pick and a WNBA Draft selection. In all, 24 high school All-Americans have donned a Maryland uniform under Frese's reign.

Fifteen of Frese's recruiting classes at Maryland have been ranked in the top-15, including 13 rated in the top-10 and eight in the top five. The landmark signings of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman were rated No. 2 in the country, while the class of Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver was ranked No. 4 - the core of the Terps' national championship team. Her 2010 batch of Terrapins included three high school All-Americans and a No. 2 national ranking. She brought in three straight top-five classes between 2017, 2018 and 2019.

Frese's recruiting classes have lived up to their

billing and her pupils have earned numerous accolades. In 2012, Alyssa Thomas became the first Maryland sophomore to be named a WBCA All-American, and was also named to the AP All-American First Team and the USBWA All-American Team. The first Terp in 17 years to garner All-American nods in 2006, Langhorne was a three-time AP and USBWA All-American, the program's first multiple All-American. She was selected a WBCA All-American in 2007, the first in school history since 1989, and then again received the accolade in 2008.

Toliver repeated Langhorne's AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American "trifecta" in 2008. The legendary point guard, however, became the first Terp in school history to be named to the AP's All-America First Team as a senior in 2009 - to go along with another set of WBCA and USBWA All-American laurels. Coleman, Toliver's classmate, also earned AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American honors at the conclusion of her illustrious senior campaign in 2009.

Frese's players have also received numerous conference honors. Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year as a sophomore in 2012. She is just the second sophomore in the history of ACC women's basketball to earn the league's most prestigious honor and went on to win the ACC Tournament MVP honor that year. Thomas garnered the league's top honor in her junior and senior seasons as well and was just the second player in history to earn the honor three times. In her final season, Langhorne was selected the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Terp to win the award in nearly 20 years. Toliver followed suit in 2009 - the third Terp ever to win the award. In 2005, Langhorne became the program's first ACC Rookie of the Year since 1991. Coleman followed in her footsteps by nabbing the honor during the Terps' championship campaign in 2006. Center Lynetta Kizer and Thomas made it four Terps in six years to be named the league's top freshman when they won in 2009 and 2011.

In all, 53 Terps have received All-Conference citations in Frese's years, including a school-record four in 2008 when Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver and Harper were selected and in 2012 when Thomas, Tianna Hawkins, Laurin Mincy and Lynetta Kizer were honored.

Numerous Terps have also garnered national recognition under Frese. Toliver became the first Terrapin to earn the highest point guard honor in the country, winning the Nancy Lieberman Award in 2008, after being a finalist the previous year. Several have earned spots on national player of the year candidate lists, making history in the fall of 2006. That year, for the first time ever, four players from the same team were selected preseason candidates for the WBCA's prestigious Wade Trophy when Doron, Coleman, Langhorne and Toliver were put on the Watch List. All five starters were tabbed preseason honorees for the Naismith Award, also a first in the history of the award.

Fifteen of Frese's former players were drafted into the WNBA and 10 were first round picks. Toliver won the 2016 WNBA championship with the Los Angeles Sparks and Langhorne won the 2018 title with the Seattle Storm. In 2019, five Terrapins made the WNBA Finals.

Maryland has rewritten several records over the last few seasons. In 2007-08, the Terps became the first

team in NCAA history to have four active players with at least 1,000 points on the same roster. That year, school records were broken for most home wins (21), which is also believed to be an NCAA record. The team opened the 2006-07 campaign winning 18-straight games, setting the program record for best start to a season. Maryland ended the 2008-09 campaign having won a school-record 36-straight home games, thanks to undefeated home marks in two successive seasons, and 40-consecutive non-conference games at the XFINITY Center. In the 2009-10 season the Terrapins extended that streak to 48, a Maryland men's and women's basketball record.

In 2005-06, the team's 34 wins set a school record, shattering the previous mark of 29. The championship squad also set new standards for highest road winning percentage (.900), points (3,166), field goal attempts (2,363), 3-point field goals (216), 3-point attempts (540), free throws (690), free throw attempts (924), team free throw percentage (.747), rebounds (1,720) and blocked shots (195).

Numerous individual records have also fallen in recent years. Among the most notable are the career scoring and rebounding records, which now own to Thomas. Langhorne shattered the previous marks, becoming the first-ever Terrapin to score 2,000 points and to grab 1,000 rebounds - an elite list of which Coleman later joined.

Maryland's rise into the upper-echelon of the country has bolstered the excitement surrounding the team. Over the last 17 years, the program has ranked in the top-25 in the nation in attendance, including top-10 rankings in five of the last 10 seasons. In 2007, Maryland recorded the nation's largest one-season improvement in home attendance, averaging 9,533 fans in 16 games, almost double the average from the previous season (4,183) - with more than 150,000 people making their way through the XFINITY Center turnstiles, a school-record. By the end of the '07 campaign, the Terps were sixth in the nation in average attendance and fourth in overall attendance, as 241,280 spectators filled the stands at home and on the road to watch the Terps play in 34 games. In 2008, Maryland hosted over 160,000 fans in 21 games and was ranked eighth in the nation in average attendance that year, followed by a No. 6 ranking in 2009 (133,336 in 15 games).

One of the highlights of the 2006-07 campaign was the announcement of two sellout games in XFINITY Center, the first- and second-ever in the young facility. The stands were filled to capacity when the Terps hosted North Carolina on Jan. 28, 2007, breaking the ACC's single-game record, the first women's basketball sellout since 1992. The record was matched in the regular-season finale on Feb. 18, 2007, when Duke came to College Park.

In the classroom, the Terps have also been all-star students. Frese's Terps have earned over 40 Academic All-Conference honors, while five have received Academic All-American nods by ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA.

## Contacts and Interviews

Contact Rose DiPaula, assistant media relations director, for weekly interviews or information regarding Maryland basketball. No interviews shall be granted on game days, until a postgame press conference.

## GAMEDAY

### Online Pressbox

Game notes, zoom recordings, photos and other information pertaining to the Maryland men's basketball team will be available all season online: [ter.ps/pressbox](http://ter.ps/pressbox).

### Credentials

Single-game credentials will be distributed this season. There will be no full-season credentials. Those wishing to attend games in-person must email Rose DiPaula at least 72 hours in advance of the game. Please include every game you wish to attend. If you wish to attend an away game, please contact Rose DiPaula at least 10 days in advance.

### Media Entrance

Approved media will enter the arena through Gate B (top of the stairs, Route 193 side in front of parking lot 4B). Media will be required to sign a document stating that they have no known COVID symptoms.

### Credential Distribution

Credentials may be picked inside the Gate B entrance 90 minutes prior to tip. Your credential will denote if you have access to the stands to film or shoot photos, or if you have access to the media section.

### Parking

Media members will be notified of parking location on a game-to-game basis via email.

### General Safety Requirements

All media members and Maryland Athletics staff members should wear masks at all times. All individuals should always maintain six-foot social distancing protocols.

### Seat Locations

Print media members are kindly asked to sit in their designated seating location in the media section. The photo/video workstation will be located in the North Suite Lobby (opposite side of benches in the 100 level concourse). A Maryland employee will direct you to your location at media check-in. The media room and floor access will be closed.

A seating chart will be posted at media check-in, and in the seating location. There will be a minimum of six feet between each chair. Seats will be clearly marked to indicate each person

and their outlet, along with info on how to access the internet, StatBroadcast and Maryland's virtual press box.

### Photographers & Videographers

All media photographers and videographers will be able to shoot from both sidelines and baselines above the lower bowl ring (with the exception of Sections 102 and 126). They will not be allowed at court level. Photographers and videographers must physically-distance themselves from each other and wear a mask at all times. A pool photographer will be available and photos can be accessed via the online press box: [ter.ps/pressbox](http://ter.ps/pressbox).

### Hours of Access

The press area will open 90 minutes prior to tipoff. We encourage all media to arrive 60-90 minutes before the game to allow spacing for other individuals being encouraged to enter one hour prior to tip. The press area will close approximately 60 minutes after the conclusion of the final post-game press conference.

### Media Materials

There will be no printed materials (except flip cards) for the 2020-21 season. Media members are encouraged to access [Maryland.statbroadcast.com](http://Maryland.statbroadcast.com) to get the most up-to-date stats throughout the game. Post-game books, quotes, photos, a recording of Maryland's virtual media availabilities and more will be available on the virtual press box at [ter.ps/pressbox](http://ter.ps/pressbox).

### Court Access

No outside media member will be granted access to court level this season. The media room will be closed. Print media will access the media section through the stands.

### Food & Drink

There will be no food provided for media in the press box this season. No outside food will be allowed into the XFINITY Center. Media will be provided a bottle of water at their media seats. Masks should only be removed when drinking.

### Postgame News Conference

All media availability will be held via Zoom following the conclusion of the games. Links to the zoom press conferences will be provided by the home and visiting team SID's. Maryland will provide a recording of the home press conference to the online pressbox, which will include Maryland Head Coach Brenda Frese and select student-athletes.
