QUICK HITTERS

- The 45-12 Terps are in the midst of their best season ever in the 131 years of Maryland baseball, dating to its first year in 1893. The 45 wins are the most ever in program history, surpassing the previous high of 42 in 2015.
- Maryland is making its second consecutive tournament appearance, fifth since 2014, and eighth in program history. Maryland has previously captured regional titles on two occasions (2015, 2014).
- The Terps are hosting an NCAA Regional for the first time ever. At Bob "Turtle" Smith Stadium, the Terps are 24-2, their most home wins in school history.
- Maryland won its first-ever Big Ten Regular Season Championship this year, its first conference title in 51 years since the Terps won the ACC in 1971.
- Maryland has hit a school-record 123 home runs, which ranks second to Tennessee in the nation. Eight of nine members for the everyday lineup have 9+ home runs.

STORYLINES

The Rotation

- Ryan Ramsey, Jason Savacool, and Nick Dean have combined to be one of the most formidable weekend rotations in the entire country.
- Ramsey threw one of the greatest games in college baseball history as he pitched the 20th nine-inning perfect game (34th overall) in college baseball history against Northwestern on (4/29). It was Maryland's second perfect game in school history (Dick Reitz, April 10, 1959 vs. Johns Hopkins) and its first no-hitter since Jake Stinnet against UMass on March 1, 2014. He struck out 10 Wildcats and threw 118 pitches.
- Ramsey leads the Big Ten and ranks fifth in the nation with 10 wins. He's 15th in the country in hits allowed per nine innings (6.14). Ramsey's 13 strikeout performance against the Cornell was a career-high. He has been named Big Ten Pitcher of the Week twice this season.
- Savacool, with eight wins, leads the Big Ten in innings pitched with 99.2 and also leads the Big Ten in strikeouts with 116 punchouts so far this year, that ranks 15th in the nation. Savacool, who started the season in the Sunday starter role, has bounced around before settling in on Friday's late in the season.
- Dean has had a very strong season, accumulating a 0.93 ERA in his first three starts against Baylor, Campbell, and Michigan. Dean's start against Campbell was his best of the season as he outdueled the nation's leader in wins, Thomas Harrington. Dean starred against Rutgers two weeks ago, going six innings while surrendering just three hits and two runs while striking out a season-high nine strikeouts to help the Terps clinch a key road Big Ten series win.

Big Ten Awards

- The Terps took home the most Big Ten awards of any team in the conference as Chris Alleyne earned Big Ten Player of the Year, Rob Vaughn took home Coach of the Year, six players earned All-Big Ten First Team, one player earned Second Team honors, and three earned Third Team plaudits.
- Alleyne, Nick Lorusso, Kevin Keister, Jason Savacool and Ryan Ramsey earned First Team All-Big Ten honors at their respective position with Matt Shaw earning the at-large spot.
- Luke Shliger earned the at-large selection for the second team, while Maxwell Costes, Nick Dean, and Troy Schreffler Jr earned spots on the third team.

Costes Crushing It

- Senior leader and All-Big Ten performer Maxwell Costes is batting .287 this season and is currently third in the Big Ten in home runs with 15. Costes now has 39 career home runs, good for second-most all-time in program history. Costes now trails only Paul Schager's 43 which was hit between 1984-87.
- Costes has also been hit by 66 pitches in his career, good for second all-time in Maryland baseball history. He trails Kyle Convissar's 67 hit by pitch mark, set between 2011-14.

Postseason Terps

- Last season, Maryland won two games in the ECU Regional, advancing to the Greenville Regional final before falling to East Carolina.
- The Terps were helped by breakout performances from Bobby Zmarzlak, Ryan Ramsey, and Troy Schreffler Jr.
- Zmarzlak went 4-4 with four home runs, four RBIs, and four runs scored against Charlotte in Maryland's 16-0 victory.
- Filling in for an injured Chris Alleyne, Schreffler Jr. collected three hits and two RBIs in the Terps' 9-6 loss against ECU.
- Ramsey made his first career against Charlotte after spending his two previous season coming out of the bullpen. The southpaw dazzled, going eight full innings, striking out four and surrendering just one run, allowing Maryland to secure the 2-1 victory and advance a regional final.

Blast From The Regional Past

- Maryland has won two regionals in program history in 2014 and 2015. The Terps toppled South Carolina on the road in 2014 before traveling to UCLA and defeated the top overall seed Bruins in 2015. The Terps fell in the Super Regionals in both seasons to Virginia.
- Five future major leaguers (Brandon Lowe, LaMonte Wade Jr., Kevin Smith, Mike Shawaryn, and Jose Cuas) were all key members the 2015 squad that was Maryland's previous record holder for wins in a season (42).
- Assistant coach Anthony Papio was the starting right fielder on both regional champion teams. Head coach Rob Vaughn was the hitting coach and assistant coach Matt Swope served as the Director of Ops for both teams.

Series Histories vs. Regional Opponents

- Maryland is just 57-101-1 all-time against Wake Forest dating back to their time in the ACC together.
- These will be the first ever matchups between UConn and Long Island.
- Wake Forest pitching coach Corey Muscara previously served as the pitching coach at Maryland from 2018-2021.

ROB VAUGHN
HEAD COACH | KANSAS STATE '11 | NINTH YEAR OVERALL
FIFTH YEAR AS HEAD COACH AT MARYLAND | 138-94 (.595)

Rob Vaughn is in his fifth season as Maryland's head coach after being named to the post in June of 2017. Vaughn, the eighth head coach in school

history, is in his 10th season overall at Maryland after five years as an assistant, most recently as associate head coach.

Vaughn – the youngest head coach in all of "Power Five" baseball and the eighth-youngest amongst Division I baseball – has coached a wealth of talent throughout his time in College Park. His 2021 squad is packed with talent that has received preseason honors from Baseball America, D1Baseball, Perfect Game, Collegiate Baseball, and multiple other outlets across the nation.

The skipper's 2021 squad was Vaughn's most successful as head coach. Maryland advanced to its first NCAA Tournament since 2017 – Vaughn's final season as an assistant – and finished second place in the Big Ten (30-18 overall), the Terps' best conference finish in over 40 years (1980).

Maryland's second-half stretch was among the best in all of the 2021 college baseball season. In the midst of a 44-game regular season Big Ten-only schedule, Vaughn's Terrapins caught fire from March 29 to May 21, going 20-5 in that time, the best 25-game stretch in program history. Over the final 22 regular season games, Maryland's 18-4 record was the best among all Power Five programs in that span.

Culminating its season in the NCAA Greenville Regional Final, Vaughn's squad fought off adversity throughout the duration of the season. Injuries to standout starters Chris Alleynne, Randy Bednar, Maxwell Costes, Nick Dean, and Matt Shaw inhibited the ability to put a healthy starting nine on the field throughout the year, but Vaughn's squad made the late-season push necessary to make the seventh NCAA Tournament in program history.

Vaughn's 2021 squad was nearly unbeatable at home – posting a 16-4 record at Bob "Turtle" Smith Stadium and winning 12 consecutive home contests at one point. The Terps' home winning streak tied the longest home winning streak among Power Five teams in 2021, tying Arizona's mark of 12, while also setting the second-longest home winning streak in the history of the program.

The development of All-Americans Benjamin Cowles and Matt Shaw, as well as All-Big Ten honorees Chris Alleynne and Ryan Ramsey, was also critical in Vaughn's fourth season at the helm.

At the helm of the program for his most unique season yet, Vaughn led his 2020 team to a 10-5 record before the season was

cut short due to COVID-19. Despite not having the chance to play in a conference matchup, several players started off their springs with eye-popping numbers.

Despite the modified format of Major League Baseball during the summer of 2020, four of Vaughn's former pupils made the 60-man expanded Big League rosters to begin MLB's season. Brandon Lowe's breakout season with the World Series Runner-Up Rays vaulted him into league MVP discussion, while Mike Shawaryn, LaMonte Wade, and Kevin Smith trained and/or played at the MLB level in 2020.

Vaughn's 2019 club saw a five-win improvement from 24 to 29 wins as the Terps advanced to the Big Ten Tournament. Maryland had a program record six student-athletes earn All-Big Ten honors, including Big Ten Freshman of the Year Maxwell Costes. The skipper also saw two of his former players flourish professionally, with Brandon Lowe (2013-15) finishing second in American League Rookie of the Year voting and LaMonte Wade (2013-15) earning his first major league call up.

Vaughn was instrumental in Costes' breakout season, in which the freshman hit 15 home runs en route to freshman All-American and Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Outfielder Randy Bednar (.288/.362/.531, 12 HR, 55 RBI) and AJ Lee (.317/.443/.497), 7 HR, 36 RBI, 10 steals) both transformed their games in Vaughn's second season at the helm.

The Texas native has also upped Maryland's recruiting during his time as the head coach. After leading the Terps to their highest ranked recruiting classes as an assistant, Vaughn set a new standard in 2019, as the Terps' 2020 class was named the seventh best in the nation by D1Baseball.com, the best ranking in program history.

Including 2019 draftees Hunter Parsons and AJ Lee, along with 2018 draftees Nick Dunn and Marty Costes, Vaughn has coached 29 players who have been drafted or signed professional contracts in his time as a coach.

Maryland won 30 games in each five of Vaughn's seasons as an assistant, a school-record streak. The Terps won a program-record 42 games in 2015, and the top three winningest seasons in Maryland history (2015, 2014, 2017) have all come with Vaughn on staff. The Terps have won eight NCAA Tournament games with Vaughn in College Park after winning just one in the entirety of the program's history.

Vaughn's player development ability has paid dividends for Maryland's position players throughout his coaching career. He has helped produce four All-Americans (Maxwell Costes, Nick Dunn, Brandon Lowe, Kevin Martir), five freshman All-Americans, 12 all-conference selections and 13 draft picks. He helped Lowe become Maryland's highest drafted position player in 13 years when he was taken 87th overall in 2015.

In his first season as head coach, Vaughn helped Dunn become one of the best second basemen in the country. The Sunbury, Pa., native was named a second-team All-American by Baseball America and was selected in the fifth round of the 2018 MLB Draft.

Vaughn also helped Marty Costes rise from an unheralded recruit to a two-time draft pick and first-team All-Big Ten selection (2017).

As the leader of Maryland's offense, Vaughn has promoted an exciting offensive style that has utilized both speed and power. In 2017, the Terps hit 67 home runs and stole 101 bases, both marks that ranked in the top-35 in the nation.

After serving as assistant head coach for two seasons, Vaughn was promoted to associate head coach in July of 2016.

As the head of Maryland's recruiting efforts, Vaughn helped orchestrate the then highest ranked class in Maryland history in 2015. D1Baseball.com gave the Terps their best rating in history (17), while Baseball America (22) and Collegiate Baseball Newspaper (27) also gave the class stellar marks.

Vaughn's development of Anthony Papio paid dividends for the Terps as the Maryland native finished his career with the second most triples in Maryland history (9) and the third most in a single season in 2016 (4).

The 2015 season saw Vaughn's offense put up huge power numbers. Maryland slugged 52 home runs, a 33 home run jump from 2014. Six Terps notched five home runs or more with Cuas leading the charge with 11. The Terps also put up more doubles (114) and triples (19) than in 2014. Maryland's slugging percentage jumped from .359 to .405. This offensive helped the Terps win a school record 42 games and capture their second straight NCAA Regional title.

Lowe staked his claim as one of the best hitters in the nation under Vaughn. The second baseman was named a second team All-American by D1Baseball.com and earned First Team All-Big Ten honors after a season that saw him bat .331 with a team-high 58 runs and 53 RBIs. Lowe also hit nine home runs, notched a team-high 18 doubles and four triples. Lowe ranked in the top-15 of the Big Ten in all major offensive categories and earned Big Ten Player of the Week on one occasion. Lowe was also named to the midseason USA Baseball Golden Spikes Award watch list. The award is given to the best amateur baseball player in the country.

Martir became one of the best offensive catchers in the country in 2015, earning third team All-American honors. Martir ranked seventh in the Big Ten with a .342 average, eighth in doubles (17), eighth in slugging (.502) and second in OBP (.441). Martir also notched 45 RBIs and hit seven home runs. Cuas earned second team All-Big Ten honors after another season under Vaughn's tutelage. His 11 home runs and 53 RBIs ranked third in the Big Ten.

Vaughn also helped Kevin Smith become Maryland's third Freshman All-American in the last two seasons. Smith notched a .273 average with 55 runs scored and 35 RBIs. He recorded 14 doubles and hit seven home runs. Smith was named a Freshman All-American by Perfect Game and D1Baseball.com and also was a member of the 2015 Big Ten All-Tournament Team. He was also Big Ten Freshman of the Week on one occasion.

Vaughn also oversaw the late season offensive explosion of junior LaMonte Wade, who was named the most outstanding player of the Los Angeles Regional after hitting two home runs to help the Terps overcome top overall seed UCLA. Wade finished his injury impacted season with a .335 average and a .468 slugging percentage.

In 2014, Vaughn helped the Terps become one of the most dangerous offensive teams in the country over the final two months. Beginning in May, Maryland hit .294 as a team with a .399 slugging percentage en route to a NCAA Super Regional berth and the first 40-win season in school history. During that span, the Terps belted out 47 extra-base hits in 19 games including eight home runs.

Vaughn oversaw the development and emergence of second baseman Brandon Lowe. After missing the 2013 season with a knee injury, Lowe finished second in the ACC in hitting (.348) and on-base percentage (.464), led the team in slugging (.464) and tied for the team lead in RBI (42). Lowe earned freshman All-American honors from Baseball America, Louisville Slugger, NCBWA and Perfect Game becoming the first Maryland player, along with pitcher Mike Shawaryn, to earn All-American status since 2002 as well as earning third team All-ACC honors.

The native of Humble, Texas, believes in an aggressive offensive approach built around speed and applying pressure to opposing defenses. After totaling 94 stolen bases in 2013, a mark that ranked second in the Atlantic Coast Conference and 30th nationally, Maryland totaled 85 stolen bases in 2014, which ranked second in the ACC and 32nd nationally.


Over the two seasons, Maryland's aggressive offensive approach on the base paths was spearheaded by White. During the 2014 season, White swiped a team-high 25 stolen bases after

stealing a Maryland single-season record with 39 in 2013, which led the ACC and tied for fourth nationally. For his career, White totaled 86 stolen bases to set a Maryland record.

Under Vaughn's tutelage, White also earned All-ACC honors in his final two seasons in College Park. As Maryland's table setter, White hit .290 in 2014 with a .400 OBP and scored a team-high 49 runs en route to being selected in the 21st round of the 2014 MLB Draft by the Chicago Cubs.

In addition, Schmit had a career year in 2014 finishing second on the team in batting average (.309), OBP (.413) and slugging (.420), and led the club in doubles (18). Schmit was drafted in the 26th round of the 2014 MLB Draft by the Minnesota Twins.

In 2013, his first season in College Park, the Terps saw their batting average jump 11 points in 2013 from the 2012 season along with increases in several other offensive categories. Along with the jump in batting average, the Terps saw an increase in slugging percentage, and an 18-point increase in on-base percentage (.358 to .376). The Terps also recorded 118 doubles, an increase of 20 from the season before, 11 shy of the program record.

Before coming to Maryland, Vaughn spent the 2011-2012 seasons as a volunteer assistant coach at Kansas State, where he coached the catchers, hitters and was in charge of base-running instruction.

A native of Humble, Texas, Vaughn began his coaching career in 2010 after spending two seasons in the Chicago White Sox organization. Vaughn served as student assistant coach before being

elevated to a volunteer assistant coach prior to the 2011 season. In that capacity, Vaughn worked with the catchers, served as the first base coach, assisted with hitting and pitching instruction, and oversaw all on-campus recruiting activities.

Vaughn is no stranger to building tradition as he helped Kansas State reach the NCAA tournament for the first time in school history in 2009 as a player, then saw it reach the post season for the third straight year in 2011 as a coach. While at K-State, he helped tutor three top-10 round picks in the MLB Draft in Jason King, Nick Martini and Jared King, while helping three other hitters achieve draft status that were previously undrafted. As a player at Kansas State, Vaughn caught the Big 12 Pitcher of the Year, All-American and fourth round pick, AJ Morris. In addition, Vaughn also caught Brad Hutt, the career wins leader at K-State, as well as James Allen, who is the all-time leader in saves for the Wildcats.

Vaughn was drafted in the 30th round in the 2009 MLB Draft and was fortunate to play and work with some of the best guys in the business. While in the White Sox organization with Bristol (Rookie), Great Falls (Rookie) and Kannapolis (Low A), Vaughn hit .228 with two doubles, five home runs and 13 RBI in 29 games between Bristol and Kannapolis in 2009. He followed that up by hitting .277 with five RBI in 19 games with Great Falls.

Vaughn is married to the former Kayleigh Strickler. The couple married in October of 2010 in Manhattan, Kan., and currently reside in Annapolis, Md. They have a son, Wyatt.

MATT SWOPE

**ASSISTANT COACH
MARYLAND '02
FIFTH SEASON**

Matt Swope is in fourth season as assistant coach/recruiting coordinator. Swope is entering his eighth season overall on staff at Maryland after serving as the Terps' director of operations for five seasons from 2013-2017.

In 2021 the Terps offense under Swope was first in home runs, total bases, stolen bases, hit by pitches, second in runs, RBI's, On-base percentage, Slugging percentage, and base on balls. Maryland also led the Big Ten in several individual categories with Ben Cowles (home runs, triples, and total bases), and Chris Alleyne (stolen bases and runs) leading the way.

2021 also saw the team post their best conference winning percentage since 1981 (.636) and best regular-season conference finish since 1980. The team won 18 of 21 games in the second half including 12 wins in a row at home where they won seven straight series to end the season. Ben Cowles was named first-team All-Big Ten before being drafted by the New York Yankees, Bubba Alleyne was named second-team All-Big Ten, Matthew Shaw was named a Freshman All-American, and along with Luke Shliger was named to the All-Big Ten Freshman Team.

Swope also worked with former Maryland star LaMonte Wade Jr. in the offseason where he helped the San Francisco Giants outfielders swing. Wade Jr. is now batting career highs in home runs, RBI's, and batting average.

In his second season as hitting coach, Swope helped five Terps achieve All-Big Ten honors including First Teamer and Freshman of the Year Maxwell Costes, Randy Bednar (Second Team), AJ Lee, Taylor Wright and Michael Pineiro (Third Team). AJ Lee was drafted by the Houston Astros in the 34th round by the Houston Astros.

Swope's recruiting efforts helped key Maryland's seventh ranked recruiting class in 2020. The class was the top ranked in Maryland history.

Two former Terps made Major League headlines in 2019 when Brandon Lowe won the American League Rookie of the Month award in April with the Tampa Bay Rays and LaMonte Wade made his debut in June with the Minnesota Twins.

Swope has been a part of the four winningest seasons in Maryland history as a player or staff member (2015, 2014, 2017, 2002). Swope has played a key role in Maryland's rise to national prominence, as the Terps captured 233 wins and advanced to three NCAA Tournaments during his time on staff.

Swope helped overhaul the Maryland baseball brand in his time as director of operations, managing a number of areas including the Terps' budget, fundraising, scheduling, travel logistics, team events, compliance, social media, equipment and apparel. He was directly involved with Maryland's locker room renovation project, the Home Field project with the architecture department and recent upgrades to Bob "Turtle" Smith Stadium.

Swope was a four-year starter and had an illustrious career in College Park from 1999-2002. Playing in the outfield for the Terps, Swope finished his career with .331 batting average, 16 home runs and 135 RBI. He is Maryland's career leader in runs (181), ranks second in hits (253) and walks (106), third in total bases (360), fifth in RBI and at bats (764), and eighth in stolen bases (44).

As a senior in 2002, Swope posted a .368 batting average with 64 runs scored, 55 RBI and 31 extra base hits to help the Terps win a then program-record 34 games. As a junior, Swope hit .328 and tallied 7 home runs and 34 RBI.

The New Carrollton, Md., native was taken in the 2002 MLB Draft by the Montreal Expos where he spent the season with their Class A affiliate Clinton Lumber Kings and their Class A Short-Season affiliate Vermont Expos.

In 2005, Swope spent the season with the Washington Wild Things of the Frontier League. Swope and the Wild Things enjoyed a successful season. The Wild Things set a Frontier League record with 63 wins, while Swope hit .309 with ten home runs. Swope had a 28-game hitting streak during the 2005 season.

Swope was nominated as the Leukemia and Lymphoma Societies Man of The Year in 2010 and has raised over \$100,000 for the LLS and Kids Vs. Cancer Foundation.

Swope received his bachelor's degree in criminology and criminal justice from the University of Maryland in 2003.



MIKE MORRISON

**ASSISTANT COACH
COASTAL CAROLINA '16
FIRST SEASON**

Mike Morrison comes to Maryland from Coastal Carolina where he served as a member of its staff for the past two seasons. Morrison was a standout pitcher for the Chanticleers from 2013-16 where he compiled an 11-4 record with a 2.93 ERA and 15 saves.

In 2016, Morrison was a key fixture on the 2016 College World Series team at Coastal Carolina where he was named a Captain. Three different outlets voted him as a First Team All-American. He started game two of the College World Series vs Arizona where he at the timeset a record for strikeouts in a National Championship game with 10, a 3-2 Coastal Carolina win.

After a stint in the Chicago White Sox organization, Morrison returned to his alma mater where he was named Director of Player Development and Scouting. Morrison took over as pitching coach in 2021 after Pitching Coach Drew Thomas stepped away during the season. Morrison was instrumental in the development of players such as Alaska Abney, Zach McCambly, and Chase Antle during his time at Coastal Carolina.

Not only did Morrison return as a coach, he went back to school to earn a pair of graduate degrees in Business Administration and Education. This comes after Morrison majored in Multi/Interdisciplinary Studies with a minor in Communications.

At Maryland, Morrison works directly with the Maryland pitching staff, grooming the vaunted weekend rotation of Nick Dean, Ryan Ramsey, and Jason Savacool.



ANTHONY PAPIO

**ASSISTANT COACH
MARYLAND '17
FIFTH SEASON**

Anthony Papio is in his first season as an assistant coach after being promoted to a fulltime role in July of 2021. Papio had been a volunteer assistant coach for the previous four seasons after assuming the role in July of 2017. Papio spent one season as a student assistant coach during the 2017 season after a five-year college playing career at Maryland.

During Papio's time as a Terp, Maryland baseball has enjoyed fantastic success. In his five seasons as a coach, the Terps have gone 131-84 including NCAA tournament berths in 2017 and 2021. Papio was a student assistant in 2017 before being elevated to volunteer assistant in 2018. Maryland's three winningest seasons in program history have included Papio as either a player or coach (2014, 2015, 2017).

In his five seasons as a coach in College Park, Papio has worked extensively with Maryland's outfielders and coordinated the Terps' running game, along with assisting with hitting instruction. Twelve Terps have been drafted during Papio's tenure. Seven players have earned All-American honors and 15 have earned All-Big Ten plaudits.

Papio was key in the development of Randy Bednar, who became one of the best outfielders in the Big Ten in 2019, earning all-conference honors. He also helped Chris Alleyne make the transition from the infield to center field, which propelled Alleyne to All-Big Ten honors in 2021.

Papio's role helping tutor Maryland's outfielders has helped Marty Costes earn selection in the 2018 MLB Draft. The former Terp star also played a key role in the development of Randy Bednar, who went from up-and-down freshman to standout sophomore, earning second-team All-Big Ten honors. As the Terps running game coach, Papio helped three Terps notched double digit steals.


In his first year as a coach, Papio helped the Terrapins win 38 games, the third-most in school history, and advance to the Winston-Salem Regional. Maryland's three winningest seasons in program history have included Papio as either a player or coach (2014, 2015, 2017). He has been involved in 212 wins over six years in College Park, the best six-year stretch in school history.

Papio served as Maryland's first base coach and was the main running game coach. His work with Maryland's baserunners saw the Terps jump from 28 steals in 2016 to 101 in 2017. Five Terrapins notched double digit steals.

An accomplished outfielder as a player, Papio helped spark the development of Marty Costes and Zack Jancarski in 2017. Jancarski set career highs in all statistical categories and became one of the best defensive outfielders in the Big Ten. Costes made a successful transition to right field under Papio and exploded offensively, earning first-team All-Big Ten honors.

Papio finished his career as the winningest player in Maryland history as the Terps captured 174 victories over his five seasons in College Park. He also played the most games in school history (230) and ranks second all-time in triples (9).

In 2016, Papio started 50 times between center and right field and batted .261 with four home runs, a team-high four triples and eight doubles. He was also an invaluable team leader who served as the Terps' de facto captain.
