THE OPENING KICK

REWRITING THE RECORD BOOKS

- ▶ QB **Taulia Tagovailoa** returns for the 2023 season already as one of the most accomplished quarterbacks and players in Maryland football history. Tagovailoa stands as Maryland's record holder in every major career and single-season passing category.
- ▶ Tagovailoa has helped ascend the Terps passing game to new heights during his three-year career. The quarterback has set Maryland career records for passing yards (7,879), passing touchdowns (51), total touchdowns (59), completions (665), completion percentage (67.4), 300-yard passing games (12), passing efficiency (146.2) and total offense (8,067). His current career completion percentage is the best of any Big Ten quarterback all-time.
- ▶ In 2021, Tagovailoa set single-season Maryland records for passing yards (3,860), passing touchdowns (26), completions (328), completion percentage (69.2) and 300-yard passing games (seven). His passing yards number is the sixth-best mark of any Big Ten quarterback all-time.

THE ROMAN EMPIRE

- ▶ A College Football News Freshman All-American last season, RB **Roman Hemby** was one of the best running backs in the nation, standing top six in the Big Ten in both rushing touchdowns (10) and yards per carry (5.26). Hemby totaled 989 rushing yards, the 12th-most in program history and second-most ever by a Maryland freshman, on 188 carries and caught 33 passes for 298 yards in 2022.
- ▶ Hemby stood third among all FBS freshmen in yards from scrimmage with 1,287 (989 rushing, 298 receiving), only trailing Ole Miss' Quinshon Judkins (1,697) and Ohio's Sieh Bangura (1,304). Against SMU, Hemby became the first Terrapin in the last 25 years to have 150+ rushing yards and 50+ receiving in a game (151 rushing, 62 receiving).
- ▶ The Edgewood, MD native had three rushes over 50 yards this past season, tied for the eighth-most in the nation and third-most in the Big Ten (Donovan Edwards, Michigan & Nicholas Singleton, Penn State). His two rushes over 70 yards was tied with 11 other players for the most in the FBS.
- ▶ In 2023, Hemby aims to join LaMont Jordan (1999-00) and Rick Badanjek (1984-85) as the only Terps to record 10+ rushing touchdowns in multiple seasons. Only three Big Ten players have accomplished that feat in their freshman and sophomore seasons over the last 15 years – Wisconsin's Braelon Allen and Jonathan Taylor, and Indiana's Stevie Scott III.

RETURNING PRODUCTION

- ▶ Maryland returns seven players that earned All-Big Ten recognition a season ago as the foundation of the 2023 team. This group is headlined by Second Team All-Big Ten selection QB **Taulia Tagovailoa** and also includes TE **Corey Dyches**, OL **Delmar Glaze** and RB **Roman Hemby** on offense and LB **Jaishawn Barham**, S **Beau Brade** and P **Colton Spangler** on defense and special teams.

A SUCCESSFUL 2022

- ▶ The Terps enter 2023 coming off their most successful season in years in 2022, going 8-5, the most wins for the program in a single season since 2010. Maryland won four Big Ten games for the first time since their first year in the conference in 2014.
- ▶ With a Duke's Mayo Bowl win, the Terps won bowl games in back-to-back seasons for the first time since winning the Peach Bowl after the 2002 season and Gator Bowl following the 2003 season.

ON THE OFFENSE: BY THE NUMBERS

1

Over the last two seasons, Maryland tight ends have combined for 144 receptions, 1,498 yards and 15 touchdowns, the **most** receptions, receiving yards and second-most touchdowns of any tight end unit in the Big Ten over this time span. Last season, All-Big Ten performer TE **Corey Dyches** ranked third among all Big Ten tight ends in receptions (39) and receiving yards (494).

QB **Taulia Tagovailoa** currently has the **fifth**-best career completion percentage in Big Ten history at 67.4 (665-for-987), only trailing Northwestern's Dan Persa (72.7), Ohio State's Dwayne Haskins (70.0), Ohio State's CJ Stroud (69.7) and Wisconsin's Scott Tolzien (68.1).

Last year, Maryland had **nine** different players record at least 150 receiving yards and a touchdown catch, tied with Alabama for second most in the FBS (USC – 10). Returning from that group is WR **Jeshaun Jones** (557 yards, four touchdowns), TE **Corey Dyches** (494 yards, three touchdowns), WR **Tai Felton** (309 yards, two touchdowns), RB **Roman Hemby** (298 yards, one touchdown) and WR **Octavian Smith Jr.** (157 yards, two touchdowns).

QB **Taulia Tagovailoa** has **12** 300-yard passing games in his career, the most in program history. In 2021, Tagovailoa set the single-season program record for 300-yard games with seven in 2021.

QB **Taulia Tagovailoa** increased his combined completion percentage on third and fourth down from 51.5 in 2021 to 67.4 last year, the third-largest increase (+15.9) in the FBS (min. 50 attempts each season). It was the biggest such year-to-year improvement by a Big Ten player since Maryland's Perry Hills from 2015 to 2016 (37.5 → 63.5; +26.0).

QB **Taulia Tagovailoa** has thrown at least one touchdown pass in **26**-of-29 games as a Terp, including 17-straight from October 30, 2020 to December 27, 2021. Tagovailoa has seven games of at least three passing touchdowns, most recently a career-best four at Charlotte (9/17/22).

70

Over the course of his career, Maryland is 8-0 when WR **Jeshaun Jones** has **70** or more yards receiving. Jones' 152 yards in the regular season finale against Rutgers last season were the most by a Terrapin since DJ Moore's 210 against Northwestern in 2017. Jones also led the Terps with 79 receiving yards in the Duke's Mayo Bowl win over #23 NC State.

4,952

The Maryland wide receiving corps has totaled **4,952** receiving yards in their careers entering the 2023 season. This is led by transfer WR **Tyrese Chambers**, who has tallied 146 receptions for 2,429 yards over his collegiate career at Sacred Heart and Florida International. Maryland returns sixth year WR **Jeshaun Jones**, who has accumulated 95 receptions for 1,250 yards as a Terp and led the team last season with 44 receptions for 557 yards.

ON THE DEFENSE/SPECIAL TEAMS: BY THE NUMBERS

3

P **Colton Spangler** is returning for the 2023 season as one of the best Maryland punters of all time. Spangler stands **third** all-time in program history with a 43.0 career punting average, narrowly trailing long-time NFL punters Brooks Barnard (43.7) and Adam Podlesh (43.1). Spangler broke the single season program record with a 45.5 punting average in 2021 and stands 12th all-time in program history with 6,063 career punting yards. Last season, Spangler stood 16th in the nation with a 45.0 yard punting average (2,567 yards on 57 punts).

4

Maryland allowed a 102.8 QB rating to opposing passers in the second half of games last year, the **fourth** best in the FBS. In 2021, the Terps ranked 105th in that category (147.4).

9

S **Beau Brade** was the **ninth**-highest rated safety in pass coverage among all Power Five defenders with over 600 snaps at that position last season, earning an 84.4 grade via Pro Football Focus. Brade named among 10 highly regarded NFL prospects deserving more hype by On3 recently.

44

Maryland had **44** different players start a game (offense or defense) last season, the seventh-most of any school in the FBS and the most in the Big Ten. The Terps have had 18 different players start on the offensive side of the ball and 26 on defense. Returners OL **DJ Glaze**, RB **Roman Hemby**, S **Beau Brade** and S **Dante Trader Jr.** started all 13 games.

58

LB **Jaishawn Barham** led all Big Ten freshmen with **58** tackles over 12 games played in his first season as a Terp. He was one of only three Maryland players (Brade, Trader) to start every game played on the defensive side of the ball. The linebacker posted five or more tackles in seven different games in 2022. He was named a Football Writers Association of America Freshman All-American, the first ever Terp on the defensive side of the ball to earn that distinction since the award started in 2001.

132

The Maryland defense has gone **132** minutes without allowing a touchdown dating back to the 12:36 mark of the fourth quarter against No. 2 Ohio State on November 19. The Terps didn't allow a touchdown in the final two games of the season against Rutgers and #23 NC State.

OFFSEASON NOTES AND NUGGETS

THE 2023 CLASS

► Maryland brings in a signing class of 25 freshmen into the fold for the 2023 season. The class is highlighted by four four-star ESPN300 selections – Edge **Neco Avery**, LB **Dylan Gooden**, LB **Michael Harris** and TE **Rico Walker**. The Terps signed two of the top seven players from the state of Maryland (Gooden, Avery) and nine of the top 35 players from the state. Additionally, the Terps bring in the top-two rated wide receivers from Maryland (**Ezekiel Avit**, **Ryan Manning**) and the top-two rated tight end from the state (Avery, **AJ Szymanski**).

► The Terps then added 14 additional walk on freshmen this summer to bring the total number to 39.

THE TRANSFERS

► Maryland welcomes a transfer group that features two All-Conference honorees, a program receiving record holder, and three four-star recruits out of high school. In total, this class of transfers has played in 149 games, won conference championships, appeared in the College Football Playoff and features additions at wide receiver, defensive back and offensive and defensive line. **See page 19 for full details on the transfer class.**

NEW COACHES

► Maryland head coach **Michael Locksley** added four new coaches to the staff during the offseason.

► **Josh Gattis**, who worked alongside Locksley at Alabama in 2018, spent the 2022 season as the Offensive Coordinator at Miami before spending the prior three seasons as the Offensive Coordinator at Michigan, was hired as the Offensive Coordinator. Gattis was the 2021 Broyles Award winner, given to the top assistant coach in the country.

► **Kevin Sumlin**, a veteran coach of over 30 years, who was the head coach at the University of Houston (2008-11), Texas A&M University (2012-17) and the University of Arizona (2018-20), was named Associate Head Coach/Co-Offensive Coordinator/Tight Ends Coach.

► **Latrell Scott**, who possesses over 20 years of collegiate coaching experience, including eight seasons as a head coach at the FCS and Division II levels at Richmond, Virginia State and Norfolk State will be the Terps running backs coach.

► **Zac Spavital** comes to Maryland as the safeties coach after four seasons as the defensive coordinator for Texas State. In 18 years as a defensive coach for Texas State, Texas Tech, Houston and Oklahoma, Spavital has overseen defenses that have six times finished top-25 in turnovers forced, twice finishing in the top-10.

PRO TERPS

► Maryland had five Terps selected in the 2023 NFL Draft, the most for the program since 2009. DB **Deonte Banks** was selected by the New York Giants in the first round, DB **Jakorian Bennett** was selected by the Las Vegas Raiders in the fourth round, K **Chad Ryland** was taken by the New England Patriots in the fourth round, OL **Jaelyn Duncan** was chosen by the Tennessee Titans in the sixth round and OL **Spencer Anderson** was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the seventh round.

► In addition, four Terps were picked up as undrafted free agents. OL **Johari Branch** by the Los Angeles Chargers, WR **Jacob Copeland** by the Tennessee Titans, WR **Dontay Demus Jr.** by the Baltimore Ravens and WR **Rakim Jarrett** by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

SCRIPT TERPS

► Maryland football will wear the iconic Script Terps uniforms full time in 2023. Maryland donned the Script Terps uniforms originally starting in 1982 with the primarily red helmet, and wore that exclusively during the 1980's. From 2001-10, the team wore the white helmet with the red Script Terp writing on the sides. Since Coach Locksley's return in 2019, Maryland has worn the Script Terps uniform at least once each season.

HEAD COACH MICHAEL LOCKSLEY

Towson '92 • 15th Year at Maryland, 5th as Head Coach



Michael Locksley returned home to become the University of Maryland's 37th head football coach in December 2018. Locksley, a Washington, D.C. native with deep personal and professional connections to the area, has 30 years of coaching experience and 2023 will be his 15th season with the Terps over three separate stints at Maryland.

The winner of the 2018 Broyles Award, given to the nation's top assistant coach, Locksley spent three years working under Nick Saban at the University of Alabama before taking the head coaching job at Maryland. He served as the Crimson Tide's co-offensive coordinator and won a national championship in 2017 before being promoted to offensive coordinator in 2018 and helping Alabama return to the College Football Playoff.

Maryland has made major strides since Locksley took over the program. The Terps have posted back-to-back winning seasons in 2021 and 2022, a first for the football program since 2013-14. Locksley has also guided Maryland to bowl wins in each of the last two years, the first time Maryland has accomplished the feat since winning the Peach Bowl (2002) and Gator Bowl (2003) nearly 20 years ago.

During the 2022 season, Locksley propelled the Terps to an 8-5 record and a win over No. 23 N.C. State in the Duke's Mayo Bowl. It marked the most wins for the Terps in a single season since 2010. Thirteen Terps garnered All-Big Ten recognition, highlighted by kicker Chad Ryland and quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa being named Second Team All-Conference.

In 2021, Locksley led the Terps to their first winning season in seven years. The season was capped off with a 54-10 win over Virginia Tech in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. Maryland's 54 points in the game marked the most ever for a Terrapin team in a bowl game and it was the most points ever scored by any team in Pinstripe Bowl history.

Maryland's potent offensive attack was on full display in 2021, setting numerous school records, including the single-season marks for total yards (5,740) and passing yards (3,960).

Under Locksley's tutelage, Tagovailoa has developed into one of the best quarterbacks in the country. The Locksley and Tagovailoa connection has elevated Maryland's passing game to heights it has never seen before. Tagovailoa set seven single-season Maryland records in 2021, including program best marks for passing yards (3,860), completions (328), completion percentage (69.2) and passing touchdowns (26 – ties school record). At the conclusion of the

2022 season, Tagovailoa owns eight Maryland career passing records, including most passing yards, passing touchdowns and most completions.

Locksley, known for his strong recruiting skills, was listed as a top-25 recruiter in the nation three different times (2003, 2005, 2006) and was a finalist for 2007 recruiter of the year by Rivals.com. He also engineered top-10 recruiting classes during each of his two seasons (2003-04) as running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Florida.

Locksley has signed 37 four or five star recruits over his coaching career (according to 247sports), 23 of which came from the DMV area, in addition to coaching 114 NFL Draft selections. Among Locksley's successful signings to Maryland were future NFL stars Vernon Davis, Shawne Merriman, LaMont Jordan, D'Qwell Jackson, EJ Henderson, Yannick Ngakoue and Stefon Diggs.

Alabama's Locksley-led offense averaged 45.6 points and 522.0 yards per game in 2018. The Tide set school records for points scored (684), single-season total offense (7,830 yards) and passing yards (4,854) in a season. Alabama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa threw for 3,966 yards and a school-record 43 touchdowns in 2018.

In 2017, Locksley coached the Alabama wide receivers, who combined to catch 128 passes for 2,059 yards and 19 touchdowns led by First Team All-SEC selection Calvin Ridley. Ridley hauled in 63 passes for 967 yards and five touchdowns in his junior season. Locksley spent the 2016 season on the Crimson Tide's staff as an offensive analyst.

Prior to Alabama, Locksley served as Maryland's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2012-15. He was named the Terps interim head coach for the final six games of the 2015 season.

During his time as Maryland's offensive coordinator, the Terrapins produced balanced and effective results. Locksley's attack was led by quarterback C.J. Brown, who became Maryland's all-time leader in touchdowns responsible (58) after totaling 13 passing touchdowns and eight rushing touchdowns in 2014. Locksley also mentored wide receiver, Stefon Diggs, who hauled in 62 passes for 792 yards and five touchdowns en route to second team All-Big Ten honors. Diggs is now an NFL superstar for the Buffalo Bills.

In 2013, Locksley guided an offense that eclipsed 5,000 yards (5,160) for only the fourth time in program history and the first time since 2003. The passing game excelled that season, totaling 3,231 yards for the third-highest total in school history.

JOSH GATTIS

Offensive Coordinator
Wake Forest '06
First Year at Maryland

Josh Gattis was named Maryland's Offensive Coordinator in March of 2023. Gattis, who won the Broyles Award in 2021 as the nation's top assistant coach, brings over 13 years of coaching experience with him to the Terps.

In addition to winning the nation's top assistant honor in 2021, Gattis mentored a Biletnikoff Award winner, multiple All-Americans and all-conference players. He has been a part of four conference championship-winning teams and has coached in multiple College Football Playoff games.

Gattis arrives in College Park after spending the 2022 season as the Offensive Coordinator at the University of Miami. Prior to his stint in Coral Gables, Gattis spent the previous three seasons (2019-21) at Michigan as the Wolverines Offensive Coordinator.

In 2021, Gattis was recognized with the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach after guiding Michigan to its first-ever appearance in the College Football Playoff. Gattis' offense was one of the nation's top-performing units, ranking No. 16 nationally in scoring offense, No. 25 in total offense, No. 15 in rushing offense, No. 16 in third down conversion and No. 24 in red zone offense. Michigan won the 2021 Big Ten title and garnered a bid in the College Football Playoff in Gattis' final season in Ann Arbor.

In 2020, Gattis' unit averaged 28.3 points and 381.8 yards per game. The Wolverines gained over 350 yards of offense in four of six contests and went over 450 yards of offense three times. Running back Hassan Haskins averaged more than six yards per carry (No. 24 in NCAA), while four players averaged 10-plus yards or better per reception – including receivers Ronnie Bell (15.4 yards per catch) and Cornelius Johnson (15.9).

In his first season at Michigan, Gattis led the Wolverines offense to a 5,000-yard season (5,220 yards), averaging more than 400 yards of offense per game. The Wolverines averaged 31.7 points and 401.5 yards per contest buoyed by a stretch which saw Michigan out-gain and out-score four league opponents and Notre Dame by a combined +1,101 yards and +114 points. Thirteen different Wolverines were named All-Big Ten on offense under Gattis.

Gattis coached wide receivers Nico Collins (37 catches, 729 yards, seven touchdowns) and Bell (48 catches, 758 yards, one touchdown) to career-best seasons along with quarterback Shea Patterson. Collins' 19.7 yard-per-catch average led the Big Ten Wide receiver Donovan Peoples-Jones (six touchdowns) was also a big end zone factor, and five pass-catchers registered at least 25 receptions each. Patterson became the third Michigan quarterback to throw for

3,000 yards in a season (3,061), throwing for the third-most yards (384) and the second-most touchdowns (five) in a single game during the course of the year. U-M had two rushers over 600 yards in Zach Charbonnet (726 yards, 11 TDs) and Haskins (637 yards, 4 TDs) and Charbonnet's 11 rushing scores were a freshman record at Michigan.

Prior to his arrival in Ann Arbor, Gattis worked alongside Locksley as the co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at the University of Alabama in 2018. He and Locksley helped the Crimson Tide reach the College Football Playoff National Championship Game and mentored All-American receiver Jerry Jeudy, the 2018 Biletnikoff Award winner, who caught 68 passes for 1,315 yards (19.3 avg.) and 14 touchdowns. In addition, Gattis and Locksley developed Jaylen Waddle, who earned first team All-American honors by Pro Football Focus. The Crimson Tide had four receivers and a tight end surpass 500 yards receiving on the year.

Prior to his position with the Crimson Tide, Gattis spent four seasons as the wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator at Penn State (2014-17). He also led the program's offensive recruiting efforts, helping the Nittany Lions ink four straight top-25 recruiting classes, including a pair of top-15 classes. Gattis was selected as the 2015 Big Ten Recruiter of the Year by Scout.com for his efforts. On the field, he tutored All-Big Ten receivers DaeSean Hamilton (2014, '17) and Chris Godwin (2015-16).

Gattis spent two years as wide receivers coach at the Vanderbilt University (2012-13) before moving into the Big Ten Conference. During his time with the Commodores, Gattis coached Jordan Matthews to All-America honors twice. Matthews ended his career as the SEC's leader in receptions and receiving yards while also setting the single-season mark receptions with 107 in 2013.

He spent the 2011 season at Western Michigan as the wide receivers coach, mentoring Jordan White to consensus All-American honors. White led the NCAA in receptions with 140 for 1,911 yards during the 2011 season and broke numerous Mid-American Conference receiving marks. Gattis began his coaching career as an offensive graduate assistant coach at North Carolina in 2010.

Gattis played collegiately at Wake Forest, where he earned his bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006. He was an All-Atlantic Coast Conference safety in 2005 and 2006. Gattis was a fifth-round pick of the Jacksonville Jaguars in the 2007 NFL Draft. He spent part of the 2007 season with Jacksonville before moving on to play for the Chicago Bears during the 2007 and 2008 seasons.

BRIAN WILLIAMS

**Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Line
Florida A&M
Fifth Year at Maryland**

Brian Williams joined the Maryland coaching staff in 2019 and was promoted to Defensive Coordinator in February 2022. He also serves as the Terrapins defensive line coach.

Williams, who was on Head Coach Michael Locksley's first staff at Maryland, served as the Terps outside linebackers coach in 2019, the defensive line coach in 2020 and was elevated to co-defensive coordinator in 2021.

Maryland's defense improved dramatically in 2022 under Williams, allowing the least amount of points and touchdowns since 2010 and the least amount of rushing yards and total yards per game since 2012. The defense didn't allow a touchdown in the final 132 minutes played.

CB Deonte Banks, CB Jakorian Bennett, S Beau Brade, LB Jaishawn Barham and DL Ami Finau all earned All-Big Ten honors, while Banks and Bennett were selected in the first four rounds of the NFL Draft.

Previously at UAB, Georgia and Florida State, Williams is regarded as one of the best recruiters in the nation. He was dubbed as the top recruiter in the Big Ten and sixth best recruiter nationally by 247Sports after the 2021 recruiting cycle. Since Williams' arrival, the Terps have had three consecutive top-35 classes, including the No. 18 class nationally in 2021. Williams was the lead recruiter on current Terps Demeioun Robinson, Ruben Hyppolite II, Darrell Jackson and Taizse Johnson.

During Williams' time in College Park, he has mentored All-Big Ten performers Sam Okuayinonu, Ami Finau, Mosiah Nasili-Kite and current Cincinnati Bengal Keandre Jones.

In 2021, Williams guided Okuayinonu to a career year where he earned Third Team All-Big Ten honors after leading the Terrapins and standing 12th in the Big Ten with six sacks (all solo). The defensive lineman also led the team with 8.5 tackles for loss. Finau also earned Big Ten plaudits under Williams after a season where he had several impressive games for the Terps, including posting a career-high 11 tackles to go along with a sack and forced fumble at Michigan State.

Williams served as the primary play caller for the Terps final two games this past season - wins over Rutgers and Virginia Tech. With Williams on the headset, the Terps allowed just 26 total points in those two games, which were the two lowest point totals allowed by the Maryland defense against Power Five teams all season. Maryland only allowed 298 yards of total offense per game over those two, totaled six sacks, held Rutgers and Virginia Tech 8-of-29 on third down and forced two turnovers, including returning a fumble for a touchdown against the Hokies.

Maryland's defensive line saw drastic improvement under Williams in 2020, led by All-Big Ten performer Mosiah Nasili-Kite, who led the Big Ten and ranked 23rd nationally in 2020 with 0.80 sacks per game, recording four. In just five games, Maryland had more sacks than it did in nine Big Ten games the year prior, tallying 14 in 2020, the second-best per game mark in the Big Ten, averaging 2.60 per game. Three different defensive linemen: Nasili-Kite, Ami Finau and Sam Okuayinonu all recorded at least a half sack.

As the head of the outside linebacker unit in 2019, Williams coached graduate transfer Keandre Jones to a career year, where he earned All-Big Ten plaudits. Jones led Maryland and ranked 27th in the nation (seventh in the Big Ten) with 15.0 tackles for loss and led the Terps with seven sacks, three forced fumbles and three quarterback hits, while recording 74 tackles (49 solo).

Williams helped lead UAB to a Conference USA Championship and the program's first ever 11-win season in 2018 under Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Bill Clark.

Under Williams guidance, redshirt senior Chris Woolbright earned all-conference honors after leading the Blazers with 83 tackles and two interceptions while tallying 13.5 tackles for loss.

In 2017, Williams helped lead the Blazers to a successful campaign which was highlighted by the development of senior Tevin Crews.

Crews stayed at UAB during the program's two-year hiatus and once he was back on the field, Williams coached him to career numbers and All-Conference USA accolades.

Crews was the only player in Conference USA to rank in the top 10 in both tackles per game (7.8) and tackles for loss (12.0). He finished the season with a career-high and team-best 102 tackles to go along with his 12 TFLs, three sacks, three pass breakups, one interception and one forced fumble.

Williams also developed sophomore Fitzgerald Mofor into one of UAB's most consistent players as Mofor started all 13 games for the Blazers and finished third on the team with 71 tackles. Meanwhile, true freshman Thomas Johnston gained valuable experience in playing all 13 games and finishing the season with 32 tackles.

Overall, Williams helped UAB return from a two-year hiatus in 2017 to set the program record for FBS wins (8), Conference USA wins (6) and finished with a perfect 6-0 record at home for the first time ever. The Blazers' appearance in the Bahamas Bowl was just the second bowl game in program history.

Although 2017 was Williams' first year coaching games at UAB, he joined the Blazers coaching staff in January of 2016 to help bring the program back.

Prior to UAB, Williams was at the University of Georgia in 2015 as the player relations director for the Bulldogs' defense. Before that, he was on staff at Florida State for two years as a defensive analyst and was a part of the Seminoles' 29-game winning streak which included winning the 2013 National Championship.

The Florida State defense finished the 2013 season allowing just 12.1 points against, anchored by linebackers Telvin Smith and Reggie Northrup. Smith led the team with 90 tackles and 9.5 TFL. Williams contributed to FSU's defense that ranked second in total defense, first in passing defense and third in rushing defense.

Williams had a very successful high school coaching career before jumping to the collegiate level. His first coaching stop was at

After one year in Georgia, Williams moved back to Tallahassee to begin a three-year stint at Godby High School as the Defensive Coordinator. Williams helped Godby win the Florida state title in 2012 as the Cougars finished with an overall record of 15-1.

Williams played high school ball at Miami Carol under legendary Florida coach Walt Frazier. He earned a scholarship at Albany State University in Georgia and then transferred to Florida A&M where he finished his college degree.

Williams is married to the former Diasha Walker.

Kevin Sumlin, a veteran coach of over 30 years, arrives at Maryland after serving one year as the Head Coach and General Manager for the Houston Gamblers of the United States Football League (USFL). Sumlin has been a head coach at the Division I level for 13 seasons.

Sumlin's head coaching history at the college ranks includes stops at the University of Houston (2008-11), Texas A&M University (2012-17) and the University of Arizona (2018-20).

At Texas A&M, Sumlin compiled a 51-26 record including three bowl victories in six seasons and a top-five end of season ranking and Cotton Bowl win in 2012. At Houston, Sumlin amassed a 35-17 record in four seasons. In his 10 seasons as a head coach prior to Arizona, Sumlin compiled an 86-43 record and his teams played in bowl games in nine of those 10 seasons.

During his time at Texas A&M, Sumlin averaged over eight victories per season and won at least seven games each year. His 44 wins over his first five seasons in College Station marked the second-fastest coaching start in school history, behind only R.C. Slocum's 49 wins from 1989-93. Sumlin was the first Aggie head coach to lead his first six teams to a bowl game. In addition, Sumlin guided Johnny Manziel to a stellar freshman season that saw him throw for 3,419 yards and 24 TDs, while running for 1,181 yards and 19 TDs en route to winning the 2012 Heisman Trophy.

Despite his defensive background as a linebacker at Purdue in the mid-1980s, it was Sumlin's offenses that were his calling card as a head coach in the SEC. In his six seasons at Texas A&M, his offenses led the conference in passing, scoring and total offense twice. His 2012 offense became the first to break the 7,000-yard plateau in total offense with 7,261 yards, and his 2013 unit was just a yard shy of the milestone.

Sumlin has been named a finalist for the AFCA's National Coach of the Year Award (2011) and for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year (2009). He's coached in 16 bowl games, including all four traditional New Year's Day games.

In his 10 seasons as a head coach, Sumlin's offenses have averaged more than 400 yards of total offense every season, including more than 500 yards five times. His teams have scored more than 500 points five times, including an incredible 690 points in 2011.

Sumlin's record against non-conference teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 was a perfect 5-0 (wins over No. 22 Louisiana Tech and No. 11 Oklahoma in 2012, No. 22 Duke in 2013, No. 15 Arizona State in 2015 and No. 16 UCLA in 2016). His Aggies defeated at least one AP Top 25 opponent away from Kyle Field in each of his first five seasons, and his 12 victories over Top 25 teams rank among the most in college football.

Among those wins over ranked opponents were three road victories over teams ranked in the top 10 of the AP Poll -- 29-24 over No. 1 Alabama in 2012, 52-29 over No. 9 South Carolina in the 2014 season-opener and 41-38 over No. 3 Auburn in 2014. Sumlin is the only Aggie head coach to post more than two AP top 10 road wins.

The Aggies' success on the field coincided with the team's continued upward trend in the classroom. The Texas A&M football team's 2013-14 multi-year Academic Progress Rate of 974 was an all-time high for the school, and the 2014-15 APR was 967. The Aggies also finished the 2015-16 school year with an overall team GPA above 2.70 and had more

than 30 players named to the Athletics Director Honor Roll (requires a 3.0 GPA or higher) both semesters.

Sumlin was hired at Texas A&M after a successful stint as head coach at the University of Houston. His final Cougar squad set a school record with 13 victories (12 prior to Sumlin's departure to Texas A&M) in 2011 and notched the program's highest finish in the Bowl Championship Series standings. He was named the Region 5 Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association that year and was one of five finalists for the AFCA's National Coach of the Year award. Sumlin guided the Cougars to berths in the 2011 Ticket Center Bowl and the 2008 and 2009 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowls.

His final season in Houston was one of the finest in the history of the Cougar football program. Sumlin's Cougars raced through the regular season with a perfect 12-0 record before falling in the Conference-USA Championship to Southern Miss. The Cougars led the nation in passing, total and scoring offense and featured the nation's leader in passing and total offense, quarterback Case Keenum. UH set NCAA FBS team records for total offense and passing yards.

His lone team to not reach a bowl was in 2010. Houston entered the season with high expectations but injuries to their top two quarterbacks, including Keenum, contributed to a 5-7 campaign.

In 2009, Sumlin was a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award after leading the Cougars to a 10-4 record, which included wins over No. 5 Oklahoma State in Stillwater, Okla., and BCS conference teams Texas Tech and Mississippi State. Statistically, UH led the nation in passing (433.7), total (563.4) and scoring offense (42.2). Houston also became just the third team in NCAA history to post a 5,000-yard passer and three 1,000-yard receivers in one season.

Taking over the reins of the UH program in December 2007, Sumlin guided the Cougars to an 8-5 record in 2008 and became the first UH coach in 28 years to lead his team to a bowl victory, as Houston topped Air Force 34-28 in the Armed Forces Bowl. He was one of only 10 first-year Football Bowl Subdivision coaches to guide his team to a bowl game and one of only six to win the bowl contest.

Sumlin went to Houston after seven seasons as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator in the Big 12. He spent five seasons at the University of Oklahoma under head coach Bob Stoops, where he served as both the co-offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach (2006-07) and special teams coordinator/tight ends coach (2003-05).

Before his arrival in Norman, Sumlin spent two seasons at Texas A&M under head coach R.C. Slocum, where he served as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach for the Aggies (2001-2002).

During his previous stint in Aggieland, Sumlin coached several of the top receivers in school history, including Bethel Johnson, Terrence Murphy and Jamaar Taylor, who still rank in the top 10 in career catches and receiving yards.

Early in the 2002 season, Slocum promoted Sumlin to offensive play caller after the Aggie offense struggled in the first three games of the season. With Sumlin calling the plays, the Aggie offense flourished, averaging 33.0 points and 419 yards per game for the remainder of the season after posting just 16.0 points and 286 yards per game previously. A highlight of the season included a 30-26 win over top-ranked Oklahoma with the Aggies gaining 404 total yards to key the victory.

Sumlin's coaching career has also seen stops at his alma mater Purdue (1998-2001), Minnesota (1993-97) and Wyoming (1991-92).

Purdue's 1998 receivers set school records with 377 receptions for 4,208 yards and 43 touchdowns. The Boilermakers' Chris Daniels set a Big Ten record with 121 catches and recorded another Big Ten record with 21 receptions in one game.

In addition to Stoops and Slocum, Sumlin served as an assistant coach under Joe Tiller at Purdue and Wyoming, Jim Wacker at Minnesota, Glen Mason at Minnesota and Mike Price at Washington State.

Sumlin has coached in 16 bowl games, including all four traditional New Year's Day games.

A four-year letterman as a linebacker at Purdue from 1983-86, Sumlin finished his career as one of the top tacklers in Boilermaker history. He was named to Sports Illustrated's All-America walk-on list as a freshman after leading Purdue with 91 tackles.

He earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors as a senior, while ranking fifth in the league with 114 tackles, and helped lead Purdue to the Peach Bowl.

The Indianapolis native graduated from Purdue in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in both criminology and criminal justice. Sumlin has four children: daughters Courtney and Shelby, and sons Jackson and Joey.

James Thomas Jr. joined the Terrapin coaching staff in February 2022 as the Special Teams Coordinator and Outside Linebackers coach.

Maryland's special teams unit improved tremendously under Thomas Jr. in 2022, as Thomas oversaw All-Big Ten kicker Chad Ryland and All-Big Ten punter Colton Spangler. Ryland broke the Big Ten record for most consecutive field goal makes (24) and Spangler, who was 16th in the nation in punting average (45.0).

Thomas spent the 2021 season as a Special Teams quality control analyst for the Terps before briefly joining the University of Florida's staff in a quality control role working with the Gators cornerbacks.

Prior to Maryland, Thomas Jr. served two seasons (2019-20) as co-defensive coordinator, special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach at Angelo State University. Under his guidance, the Rams defense was one of the top-performing units among Division II schools, ranking third nationally in scoring defense (14.8 PPG), fifth in

defensive pass efficiency (93.17), and 10th in interceptions (17).

Thomas Jr. also spent three seasons at Clarion University (2016-18), where he served as the Golden Eagles defensive coordinator. In 2018, Clarion's defense ranked sixth in interceptions, eighth in takeaways and 14th in red zone defense.

A native of Orlando, Fla., Thomas Jr. started his career at Western New Mexico in 2010, where he coached the receivers his first two seasons (2010-11), and served as special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach (2012-13), and defensive coordinator (2014-15).

Thomas Jr. is a graduate of Graceland University, where he played cornerback from 2004-08 and earned his degree in physical education and health in 2009. He also has a master's degree in educational leadership from Western New Mexico.

Thomas Jr. and his wife, Razanna, have three children; Jayla, Titan and Reilly.

Henry Baker is entering his third season as Maryland's cornerbacks coach in 2022. Baker was a four-year letter winner and two-year starter at defensive back from 1994-97 at Maryland, where he earned his bachelor's degree in sociology in 2003.

Baker has helped develop 2023 NFL Draft selections Deonte Banks (first round) and Jakorian Bennett (third round).

In 2022, Banks registered nine pass break-ups and an interception, while not allowing a reception of over 30 yards when targeted during his redshirt junior season in 2022. According to Pro Football Focus, Banks allowed only a 43.3-percent completion percentage when targeted by opposing offenses (26-for-60), the 18th-best mark in the nation and second-best in the Big Ten.

Bennett had a stellar senior season for the Terps in 2022, ranking tied for third in the Big Ten in pass break-ups (11) and tied for fifth in passes defended (13). A Reese's Senior Bowl participant, Bennett led all FBS players in passes defended since the beginning of the 2021 season with 29.

In 2021, Baker oversaw a cornerback unit that saw Jakorian Bennett lead the Big Ten and stand second among all Power Five players in pass breakups with 1.3 per game. Bennett earned All-Big Ten accolades for his efforts under Baker in 2021.

In his first year at the helm of the Maryland secondary, Baker led one of the best pass defenses in the Big Ten, allowing only 200.0 yards per game, the third best mark in the conference and 25th best in the country. Baker's oversaw a unit that allowed 71 fewer yards per game than in 2019 and held four of five opponents under 215 yards passing.

Baker saw two members of the secondary, S Nick Cross and CB Tarheeb Still earn All-Big Ten accolades after the duo combined for 43 tackles (32 solo), 11 pass breakups and an interception. In his first year as a Terp, Still shined under Baker, being named a Freshman All-American by The Athletic after he led the country with two pass breakups per game.

Baker returned to Maryland after serving as assis-

tant defensive backs coach for the New York Giants in 2019 after a brief second stint at Rutgers as the cornerbacks coach and passing game coordinator. Baker spent the 2018 season at the University of North Carolina as cornerbacks coach and also held the same position during his first stint with the Scarlet Knights in 2017.

Prior to joining Rutgers' staff, Baker spent six seasons (2011-16) as the cornerback coach at the University of Delaware, where he was also the special teams coordinator in 2012. In 2016, the Blue Hens' defense ranked No. 19 nationally in fewest passing yards allowed per game (181.5), No. 21 in interceptions (15) and first overall as a team in fewest penalties per game (3.64).

The previous season, Delaware ranked third in the Colonial Athletic Association and 22nd in the country in scoring defense (20.5 points-per-game) and was fifth in the conference in total defense (329.2 yards-per-game). During the 2014 season, Delaware ranked fourth in the CAA in passing defense, allowing just 197.2 yards a game.

Baker arrived at Delaware after serving as defensive backs coach at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) in 2010. The Warriors allowed only 194.0 passing yards a game.

Prior to his one-year stint at ESU, Baker served two seasons (2008-09) at Maryland, which included the 2009 Rowdy Humanitarian Bowl championship team that finished with an 8-5 record. He was the interim inside linebackers coach for the Terrapins' bowl game and worked with the secondary, linebackers and special teams during his time in College Park.

Baker previously served as Maryland's recruiting intern in 2001. He began his coaching career in 2003 at the school where he played high school football, Eastside High in Paterson, N.J. Baker's time at Eastside included an appearance in the New Jersey Group IV Section 1 state championship game. He coached at South Miami (Fla.) High School in 2007 before becoming a collegiate coach.

Baker also has pro football experience. He was with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2003, and competed in the Arena Football League with the New Jersey Red Dogs and Carolina Cobras, and the AFL2 with the Norfolk

Braswell brings five seasons of NFL experience to Maryland, spending 2014-18 in the AFC North, as an Assistant Offensive Line and Quality Control Coach for the Cleveland Browns and Cincinnati Bengals.

In 2022, Braswell oversaw three offensive linemen that are currently on NFL rosters, with Jaelyn Duncan getting drafted by the Tennessee Titans, Spencer Anderson getting selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers and Johari Branch being signed by the Los Angeles Chargers. Braswell's unit blocked for the fourth-ranked offense in the Big Ten, averaging 401.5 yards per game.

In his first season as offensive line coach in 2021, Braswell led a unit that blocked one of the best passing units in the country, protecting QB Taulia Tagovailoa to a record-setting season, breaking the Maryland program records for passing yards (3,860), completions (328), completion percentage (69.2) and passing touchdowns (26 – ties school record).

Tackles Spencer Anderson and Jaelyn Duncan both earned All-Big Ten accolades under Braswell while blocking for the 13th-ranked pass offense in the nation. Anderson was the highest graded pass blocking tackle in the Big Ten by Pro Football Focus, earning a 86.6 grade during the season. Braswell also oversaw the rise of Delmar Glaze, who started the last five games of the season and rated as the fourth best pass blocking tackle in the Big Ten with a 82.9 grade.

The Bengals made the playoffs in each of the two seasons that Braswell worked in Cincinnati as the Assistant Offensive Line and Quality Control Coach and won the AFC North in 2015, putting together an impressive 22-9-1 record over those two years.

The Georgia native also spent the spring and summer of 2010 with the Steelers and spent part of 2013 working with the Bengals as part of the NFL's Bill Walsh Minority Internship coaching program.

Braswell served as a volunteer analyst for the Terps during the 2020 season, working with the offensive line. Prior to that, he coached in the XFL, serving as the Offensive Line Coach for the St. Louis Battlehawks.

Before his time with the Browns and Bengals, Braswell coached at Morehouse College, an NCAA Division II school in Atlanta, Ga. From 2008-13, he served as the Offensive Line Coach and Run Game Coordinator. He also coached the field goal and extra point teams, and he developed and installed strength programs for athletes at the school.

Braswell graduated from Hampton (Va.) University, where he played center and tackle on the football team.

University of Maryland football head coach Michael Locksley announced the hiring of Gunter Brewer as the Terrapins wide receiver coach in February of 2022.

Brewer has coached some of the best wide receivers to play the game over the last 25 years, including a pair of Biletnikoff Award winners in Randy Moss and Justin Blackmon, and Biletnikoff finalist Dez Bryant.

In 2022, Brewer oversaw a wide receiving corp that saw six different receivers catch a touchdown and help a passing offense that ranked third in the Big Ten. Jacob Copeland, Dontay Demus Jr. and Rakim Jarrett are all on NFL rosters this summer after spending 2022 with Brewer.

A veteran with over 30 years of coaching experience in both the collegiate and professional ranks, Brewer most recently served as the wide receivers coach at Louisville for the past three seasons.

At Louisville, Brewer guided Tutu Atwell to All-American and First Team All-ACC plaudits in 2019. Atwell set Louisville program records for receiving yards in a season, recording 1,276 yards, while tying the school mark with 12 touchdowns. He was the first Cardinal wide receiver to record over 1,000 yards in a season since 2007.

Before his time at Louisville, Brewer was the wide receivers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2018, working with a unit that featured veteran wide receivers Alshon Jeffrey and Nelson Agholor. Under Brewer's direction, Jeffrey recorded his highest receiving yardage (843) and reception totals (65) in a single season since 2014. Agholor recorded career highs in receptions (64) and yards after the catch (350). In 2018, Philadelphia registered the seventh-ranked passing offense and the eight-rated team passer rating in the NFL.

Brewer was the Co-Offensive Coordinator/Wide Receivers Coach at North Carolina from 2012-17, where he coached four of the top five wide receivers in career receptions at UNC. He helped UNC set the school record for passing yards five times during his stint as the Tar Heels threw for more than 3,500 yards each season from 2012-16. The Tar Heels led the NCAA in yards per play (7.3) and ranked ninth in scoring offense (school-record 40.7 points per game) en route to the program's first-ever appearance in the ACC Championship Game during the 2015 season.

In 2015, Mack Hollins had an NCAA-leading 24.8 receiving average, and went on to set the school career record with 20.6 yards per reception. Hollins also finished third in

Tar Heels history with 20 receiving touchdowns, posting a career-high eight receiving touchdowns in back-to-back seasons from 2014-15.

Prior to his return to Chapel Hill, Brewer served one season as the associate head coach/passing game coordinator at Ole Miss (2011) and spent six seasons in various capacities at Oklahoma State (co-offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach, 2009-10; co-offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach, 2008; wide receivers coach, 2005-07).

With the Cowboys, Brewer's term in Stillwater included five bowl appearances and the program's first Big 12 South Championship in 2010. Brewer recruited and served as the position coach for Blackmon, a unanimous First-Team All-American who won the Biletnikoff Award presented to the nation's top receiver. Blackmon finished the 2010 season as the national leader in receiving yards per game and was second in receptions per game. His 1,782 receiving yards were the most ever for a sophomore in NCAA history, and he set another NCAA record with 12 consecutive games with at least 100 yards receiving and a touchdown.

Brewer's work with the Cowboy wide receivers was key in OSU finishing the 2010 season ranked second in the nation in passing offense and third in the nation in both total offense and scoring offense.

With Brewer as co-offensive coordinator, the Cowboys offense produced a pair of first-team All-Americans in Bryant and running back Kendall Hunter, to go with first-round NFL Draft picks in lineman Russell Okung and tight end Brandon Pettigrew.

In 2008, Brewer's offensive unit finished top-10 nationally in rushing, total offense, scoring and pass efficiency. He was also the position coach for quarterback Zac Robinson, who was a finalist for the Manning Award and ranked fifth nationally in pass efficiency and 18th in total offense.

Brewer coached Biletnikoff semifinalist Adarius Bowman to consecutive 1,000-yard receiving seasons in 2006 and 2007, while D'Juan Woods was a 2005 all-Big 12 pick and ended his career as OSU's third all-time leading receiver in both receptions and yards.

Brewer was the wide receivers coach and associate offensive coordinator at Marshall from 1996-99. Brewer coached Moss – the third Biletnikoff Award finalist – to stardom while helping the Thundering Herd to a 50-4 record over that time, including a perfect 13-0 mark and No. 10 final national ranking in 1999.

Scott possesses over 20 years of collegiate coaching experience, including eight seasons as a head coach at the FCS and Division II levels at Richmond, Virginia State and Norfolk State. The coaching veteran was most recently the Passing Game Coordinator/Tight Ends/Inside Receivers Coach at East Carolina for two seasons.

Scott possesses a 46-43 record as head coach, including a 19-3 record at Virginia State in 2013-14. The Trojan's won their first outright CIAA championship since 1996 and recorded the program's first-ever NCAA playoff appearance and victory during the 2014 Division II Championships, earning Scott CIAA Coach of the Year honors.

In 2013, Scott earned Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID) College Division State Co-Coach of the Year and the Touchdown Club of Richmond's state Division II/III Coach of the Year accolades after guiding the Trojans to a 9-1 overall record and perfect 7-0 CIAA ledger, which also included a team-first Top 25 ranking in the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) weekly poll.

At East Carolina, Scott played a crucial role in the Pirates having a top-25 offense in 2022 by averaging 461.1 yards per game. His passing offense averaged 290.5 yards per game, the 16th-best mark in the country. In his two years in Greenville, East Carolina won 15 games and eclipsed 400 yards of offense in 16 different games, including 500-plus yards in eight different games.

At Norfolk State from 2015-20, Scott led NSU to its best season in eight years by winning five games against a 2019 schedule that featured a pair of FBS opponents. Scott oversaw an offensive unit that turned in its most prolific performance in the school's Division I history by averaging 28.9 points per game, while rank-

ing second and third in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference in passing and rushing, respectively. Scott had 56 players earn All-MEAC recognition while at Norfolk State.

Before serving as a head coach for eight years, Scott held collegiate assistant coaching positions at Western Carolina (2001), Virginia Military Institute (2002-04), Richmond (2005-07), Tennessee (2008), Virginia (2009) and James Madison (2012) – all on the offensive side of the ball. Scott began his coaching career at the prep school level at Fork Union Military Academy in 1999.

A Richmond native with deep Virginia ties, Scott was a three-year starter at tight end during his playing days at Hampton University and was part of one CIAA championship team and two additional MEAC title winning squads. He also was part of a Pirates team that qualified for the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

Scott is married to the former Brandi Bradby of New Kent, Virginia, and the couple has one son, Chase Latrell.

Murray State '04
First Year at Maryland

Zac Spavital was hired as Maryland's safeties coach in March of 2023.

Spavital comes to Maryland after four seasons as the defensive coordinator for Texas State. In 18 years as a defensive coach for Texas State, Texas Tech, Houston and Oklahoma, Spavital has overseen defenses that have six times finished top-25 in turnovers forced, twice finishing in the top-10. A 2022 Broyles Award nominee, Spavital guided a defensive unit that improved 56 spots in the national rankings from 2021 to 2022 in total defense and set FBS program records in tackles for loss and nearing the record in sacks and turnovers gained.

Spavital has been part of nine bowl teams during his coaching career and helped lead Oklahoma to two Big 12 Championships in 2006-07, making the Fiesta Bowl in each season.

In 2022, Spavital coached defensive lineman Levi Bell to Third Team All-American plaudits as he totaled a career-high 66 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 5.0 sacks and 7 quarterback hurries in 12 games. His 13.5 TFLs were an FBS program record for a single season and ninth-most ever by a Bobcat. Spavital's rushing defense only allowed 116.2 yards per game this past year, a top-25 mark in the nation.

Caeveon Patton and Jordan Revels both earned All-Sun Belt honors under Spavital's tutelage in 2021. Patton played in 11 games and recorded 51 tackles, including 21 solo stops, four tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, and three quarterback hurries in 2021, while Revels recorded 59 tackles, including 29 solo stops, 7.5 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, and seven quarterback hurries in 12 games.

Texas State ranked 47th in forced turnovers (15) and No. 25 in forced fumbles (8) in 2020. The Bobcats ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference after surrendering just 199.3 passing yards per game in 2019.

His defense produced a pair of All-Sun Belt Conference defensive players, Jarron Morris and Nico Ezidore, in 2020. Morris was a Second-Team selection as a defensive back, while Ezidore earned Third-Team honors as a defensive lineman.

Texas State boasted five All-Sun Belt Conference players in 2019. Heading the list were First-Team linebacker Bryan London II, who ended his career as Texas State's all-time leading tackler, and Third-Team linebacker Nik Daniels. In addition, defensive tackle Caeveon Patton, cornerback Jarron Morris, and Khambriail Winters were Honorable Mention selections.

Zac Spavital went to Texas State after serving as a co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Texas Tech in 2018. It was Spavital's fourth season as linebackers coach for the Red Raiders.

He helped transform Texas Tech into one of the nation's top turnover-causing teams in 2017. The Red Raiders ranked sixth nationally in forced turnovers (29), fourth in fumble recoveries (15) and eighth in defensive touchdowns (4). The defensive output helped Texas Tech lead the Big 2 and rank 13th nationally with a plus-11 turnover margin, the highest margin for the Red Raiders since 1997.

One of his linebackers Dakota Allen was a two-time All-Big 12 selection, earning First-Team honors in 2018 and Second-Team in 2017. Allen recorded 73 tackles and recovering two fumbles in 2018 after leading Tech with 102 tackles and picking off a pair of passes.

Another linebacker, Jordyn Brooks was named Honorable Mention All-Big 12 after leading the Red Raiders in tackles for the second

time in three years in 2018 (84). He became the first freshman to lead Texas Tech in tackles during the school's Big 12 era (86) in 2016.

Brooks garnered All-Big 12 honorable mention accolades and was named to the True Freshmen All-America Team by 247Sports.com in 2016 after finishing fifth among freshmen nationally in solo tackles per game (5.1).

Tech forced 25 turnovers during Spavital's first season in 2015 as the Red Raiders went from a minus-13 in the turnover margin prior to his Spavital arrival to a plus-2 advantage.

Spavital has been part of nine bowl teams during his coaching career. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma in 2005. Tech made a postseason appearance in the 2015 AdvoCare V100 Texas Bowl and 2017 Birmingham Bowl with Texas Tech.

Prior to joining the Red Raider staff in January 2015, Spavital spent seven seasons at Houston coaching defensive backs for the Cougars while also serving as recruiting coordinator under both Kevin Sumlin and Tony Levine.

Spavital, a native of Tulsa, Oklahoma, coached an all-conference performer in each of his final three seasons at Houston. Adrian McDonald and William Jackson both earned all-conference honors in 2014 after McDonald totaled five interceptions and three fumble recoveries to garner first-team accolades while Jackson was named to the second team.

The Cougars closed Spavital's final season in Houston ranked 19th nationally in total defense (334.6 yards per game), 11th in scoring defense (19.5) and ninth in turnovers gained (30). Houston also allowed just 136.3 rushing yards per game to rank 31st nationally.

Houston led the nation with 43 turnovers during the 2013 season to help lead the nation with a plus-25 turnover margin. Spavital's defensive backs unit accounted for 29 of Houston's 43 turnovers that season as Trevon Stewart set a Houston record with six fumble recoveries while Adrian McDonald led The American with six interceptions. Stewart and cornerback Zach McMillian, who also had five interceptions, were both named to the All-American Athletic Conference Second-Team.

In 2012, Spavital's unit produced three players with All-Conference USA honors, as D. J. Hayden was a First-Team selection, Stewart was on the league's All-Freshman Team and McMillian earned C-USA Honorable Mention honors. In addition, Stewart was on the FWAA Freshman All-America team as he led all freshmen nationally with 126 tackles. McMillian led Conference USA with five interceptions while Hayden was second with four. In all, Spavital's group accounted for 14 interceptions.

Under Spavital's leadership, Hayden became the first Houston player selected in the NFL Draft's First Round since 1997 when he was selected 12th overall by the Oakland Raiders in 2013.

Houston's defense was vastly improved in 2011 and ranked third nationally with 21 interceptions. Hayden was the Conference USA Defensive Newcomer of the Year and was a Second Team All-C-USA pick. Overall the secondary allowed 16 yards less per game through the air despite breaking in three new starters and allowed two less touchdown passes in two more games played.

During the 2010 season, Spavital's four safeties combined for 213 tackles, four interceptions, 3.5 tackles for loss and eight passes broken up.

The Cougars recorded 11 interceptions in 2009 with cornerbacks Jamal Robinson and Brandon Brinkley finishing first and second on the team. Brinkley posted four pickoffs for 108 yards was an All-Conference USA Second Team selection. Robinson sealed a victory at No. 5/6 Oklahoma State with a 26-yard return for touchdown. Brinkley finished his career ranked among the Cougars' all-time career leaders in interceptions, games played and pass breakups.

During Spavital's first season in 2008, Houston's defensive backs picked off 13 passes with the four interceptions by Brinkley and Loyce Means leading all players.

Spavital went to Houston after serving three seasons as the defensive graduate assistant on Bob Stoops' staff at Oklahoma. There, he worked with the defensive secondary and the scout team. During that span, the Sooners won a pair of Big 12 titles and made two appearances in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

Statistically, in each of his three seasons at OU, the Sooners' defense ranked at the top of the Big 12 and among the elite units in the country for total defense. Oklahoma never finished outside of the top two in total defense in the Big 12, leading the league in both 2005 and 2006, while ranking second in 2007. Nationally, the Sooners ranked 13th in total defense in 2005, 16th in 2006 and 26th in 2007.

While at Oklahoma, Spavital helped coach six All-Big 12 performers and five players who signed NFL contracts, including 2007 third-round NFL Draft pick Reggie Smith.

Before beginning his coaching career, Spavital played football at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M for two seasons before playing two years at Murray State in Kentucky. He was an All-Conference and All-Region selection and a Gridwire Scholar All-American.

Spavital graduated from Murray State in 2004 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He has two children, Leah and Hayden.



LANCE THOMPSON

Second Year at Maryland

Lance Thompson joined the Maryland football coaching staff as the Terrapins Inside Linebackers Coach in February 2022.

Thompson oversaw the rise of Jaishawn Barham in 2022, who became the first ever Maryland defender to be named a FWA Freshman All-American. Barham led all Big Ten freshmen with 58 tackles over 12 games played in his first season as a Terp. He is one of only three Maryland players (Brade, Trader) to start every game played on the defensive side of the ball. The linebacker posted five or more tackles in seven different games in 2022.

Thompson arrived in College Park with a plethora of championship level coaching experience, serving as a member of national championship staffs at Alabama, Georgia Tech and LSU. He was a member of four SEC championship coaching staffs, two ACC championship staffs and one Conference USA divisional winner.

Additionally, he either coached or recruited players who participated in eight National Championship games, winning seven of those contests (Georgia Tech, LSU twice and Alabama four times).

Thompson was ranked as the No. 1 recruiter in the nation on the Ultimate ESPN 300 recruiting power rankings for 2014 when he was coaching at Alabama, and was named Rivals National Recruiter of the Year in 2008, also with the Crimson Tide.

In his career that has spanned over 30 years, Thompson has served as an assistant coach at Georgia Tech, Alabama, LSU, UCF, Tennessee, Auburn, South Carolina and Florida Atlantic.

Thompson has coached and/or recruited several players who have been selected highly in the NFL Draft, including Julio Jones, Mark Barron, Trent Richardson, D.J. Fluker, Chance Warmack, Marco Coleman, Cornelius Griffin, Marquise Hill, Laron Landry, Tyson Jackson, Courtney Upshaw and Coleman Rudolph.

Most recently at Florida Atlantic, Thompson joined the Owls in the spring of 2019 as the team's defensive line coach and the program's recruiting coordinator. In his first year, he mentored a veteran defensive line that combined for 43 tackles for loss, 22 of which were sacks, as well as recording 28 quarterback hurries. The front line also headed up a rushing

defense that improved 50 spots nationally from 2018 to 2019, moving from 89th to 39th in the country while giving up 52.3 fewer yards per game. The team's overall scoring defense was 59 spots better, ranking 33rd, and the squad finished 19th in FBS in red zone defense as well.

In 2021, Thompson served as the Owls' linebacker coach, where he was received by an experienced group, including the team's leading tackler in Chase Lasater, who recorded 72 tackles in nine 2020 games played, and Caliph Brice, who finished his 2020 campaign with 54 tackles, good enough for third on the squad.

Thompson spent three seasons at South Carolina from 2016-18, where he worked under the direction of head coach Will Muschamp, as the assistant head coach of defense and defensive line coach. In his second season, Thompson helped groom Dante Sawyer into a second-team All-SEC selection, while senior Taylor Stallworth had his finest season for the Garnet & Black. Additionally, junior college transfer Javon Kinlaw developed into a force, proving his skill in 2018 with 38 tackles, including 10 for a loss of 40 yards.

Thompson worked at Alabama three different times, from 1999-2000, 2007-08 and 2012-14. He helped Alabama's 2013 defense to hold opponents to 13.9 points per game, the fifth-best mark in Division I college football. His Alabama recruits included Julio Jones, A.J. McCarron, Mark Barron, D.J. Fluker and Trent Richardson.

A Nick Saban disciple, Thompson worked with the coaching legend at Alabama and LSU. He was the assistant head coach in charge of recruiting and the tight ends coach when LSU won the 2003 national title. He also coached the defensive line at LSU.

Thompson also logged stints at Tennessee (2009-11), Georgia Tech (1988-98, 2001), and Central Florida, where he was defensive coordinator from 2004-06. In 2005, UCF won the Conference USA Eastern Division title. At Georgia Tech, he held various roles, including defensive line coach, defensive ends coach, tight ends coach, recruiting coordinator and director of football operations. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Yellow Jackets in 1988.

Thompson is a 1987 graduate of The Citadel, where he was a four-year letterwinner as a defensive lineman, and earned his bachelor's degree in education and mathematics.

A native of Riverdale, Ga., Thompson has three daughters

TERRAPIN NFL NEWS & NOTES

RIDIGGULOUS

- ▶ As he heads into his ninth NFL season, Stefon Diggs continues to stand as one of the top receivers in the league coming off a massive 2022 season. Last year, Diggs finished top-five in the NFL among receivers in touchdowns (11-T3rd), 40+ yard catches (6-T3rd), receptions (108-4th), receiving yards (1,429-5th) and targets (154-5th). Diggs was also a vital piece in helping the Buffalo Bills make the playoffs for the fourth consecutive season.

DRAFT SUCCESS

- ▶ Maryland has a deep history of being well represented in the National Football League, including 24 former players who are currently on NFL rosters as the 2023 season begins.
- ▶ Five Terrapins were selected in the 2023 NFL Draft (Deonte Banks, Jakorian Bennett, Chad Ryland, Jaelyn Duncan and Spencer Anderson), the most for the program since 2009.

BANK ON HIM

- ▶ Defensive back Deonte Banks was selected 24th overall in the 2023 NFL Draft by the New York Giants, becoming the 18th player in program history to be selected in the first round. Over the last six NFL Drafts, Maryland has had three first round selections (DJ Moore, Darnell Savage Jr.), the fifth most of any Big Ten program. Banks and former teammate Jakorian Bennett (No. 104 overall pick in the 2023 Draft) were the highest-drafted cornerback duo in the draft.

WRU

- ▶ Some of the best wide receivers in the country continue to be developed at Maryland with Stefon Diggs and DJ Moore standing among the upper echelon of pass catchers in the league over the past five seasons. Last year, the duo combined for 18 touchdowns and 2,317 receiving yards. Diggs signed a four-year contract extension in April of 2022 with the Bills worth \$96 million. Moore, who was traded from the Carolina Panthers to the Chicago Bears in March of 2023, has two years remaining on his three-year, \$62-million extension.
- ▶ This year, Rakim Jarrett, Dontay Demus Jr. and Jacob Copeland, a trio of highly-talented receivers from the 2022 team, are looking to make a mark as rookies. The three combined for 88 receptions, 1,080 receiving yards and six touchdowns in their final season as Terps.

CHIG OKONK-WOW

- ▶ Chig Okonkwo starred for the Tennessee Titans last season and was named PFWA First Team All-Rookie, cementing himself as the best rookie tight end in the league. Okonkwo finished second on the Titans in receiving yards (450) and in a tie for second with three receiving touchdowns. He also averaged a monster 14.1 yards per reception on 32 catches.

DEFENSIVE STARS

- ▶ Standout safety Darnell Savage Jr. continued to excel for the Green Bay Packers, starting in 16 games and totaling 58 tackles (good for sixth on the team). Savage also recorded an interception on Jan. 1, 2023 against the Minnesota Vikings, picking off Kirk Cousins and taking it 75 yards to the house.
- ▶ 2022 third-round draft pick Nick Cross impressed in his rookie season. The safety played in 16 of 17 games, making 17 tackles and recovering one fumble. Cross finished the season with the most special teams tackles and 90.0 Pro Football Focus grade on that side of the ball.
- ▶ In his seventh professional season, Quinton Jefferson played in all 17 games and recorded 29 tackles with a career-high 5.5 sacks and two passes defended. In the offseason, Jefferson signed with the New York Jets on April 6, signing for one year and \$3.6 million.

COLLEGE PARK, MD --Behind two rushing touchdowns each by Roman Hemby and Antwain Littleton II, Maryland defeated Buffalo 31-10 in its first game of the 2022 season, the 17th consecutive home opener win for the Terps.

Hemby and Littleton combined for 148 rushing yards and Hemby registered his first-ever 100-yard rushing performance. The two touchdowns marked a career high for both redshirt freshmen.

Building off his record-setting 2021 season, Taulia Tagovailoa went 24-for-34 for 290 yards.

Rakim Jarrett had his fifth career 100-yard receiving game with 110 yards on six catches.

A pair of Terp receivers returned to action after season-ending injuries last year as Jashaun Jones had four catches for 70 yards and Dontay Demus Jr. hauled in three balls for 23 yards.

The Maryland defense was stifling all game, holding the Bulls to 268 yards while recording four sacks (two by Henry Chibueze in his Terp debut) and seven tackles for loss. Jakorian Bennett, who led the Power 5 in pass break-ups last season, had a career-high five PBUs on Saturday.

CHARLOTTE, NC -- Behind Taulia Tagovailoa's dominance, the Terps scored five touchdowns on their first five drives and rolled to a 56-21 victory over Charlotte.

Taulia Tagovailoa threw a career-best four touchdown passes and added a rushing score. Departing in the middle of the third quarter, he finished with 391 yards on 27-31 passing for the highest completion percentage in program history.

Jacob Copeland and Jashaun Jones each caught two touchdowns in the first half. The two wideouts combined for 181 yards.

Maryland's 56 points was its most since a 62-0 victory over Howard on Sept. 11, 2021. The Terps also recorded 619 total yards, the most since 675 against Minnesota game on Oct. 30, 2020.

The Terp defense buckled down after halftime, holding the 49ers to just one score in the second half.

The two teams went punch-for-punch all game with neither able to create much separation until Maryland broke the 27-27 tie when Taulia Tagovailoa connected with Corey Dyches with 7:30 left in the fourth quarter. The game featured five lead changes and three ties.

Roman Hemby was the star for the Terps on offense, finishing with a 213 total yards, including a career-high 151 on the ground on 16 carries, and a score. Taulia Tagovailoa was 17-of-23 for 214 yards with two passing touchdowns.

The Mustangs had a chance to even it up, but the Terps forced an incompletion from Tanner Mordecai with 46 seconds left to seal the game.

The Terps were boosted by several momentum-swinging plays by the defense throughout the night to keep the potent Mustang offense in check. Maryland forced two interceptions, one fumble, three turnovers on downs and one missed field goal. Beau Brade, who had the Terps' other interception, piled up a career-high 15 tackles, the most by a Terp since 2020. The Terps held the Mustangs to just seven points in the second half.

The game saw 959 yards of total offense as the Terrapins gained 439 while the Mustangs had 520.

With the win, the Terps have won five straight games, dating back to last season, for the first time since 2015-16. Maryland is also 3-0 for the second year in a row, setting up a huge showdown with No. 4 Michigan in Ann Arbor next week for FOX's Big Noon Kickoff Game.

#4 Michigan 34, Maryland 27

ANN ARBOR, MI -- Maryland battled No. 4 Michigan for four quarters before dropping a 34-27 decision before 110,225 at Michigan Stadium on Saturday. The Terps (3-1, 0-1 Big Ten) led 13-10 in the second quarter, marking the first time the Wolverines (4-0, 1-0) trailed this season.

Quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa was 20-of-30 for 207 yards with a touchdown pass. On the ground, the Terps picked up 128 yards led by Antwain Littleton II (39 yards and a rushing touchdown) and Roman Hemby (48 yards).

Rakim Jarrett and Jacob Copeland led the Terps with four receptions each. Corey Dyches had three catches for a career-high 60 receiving yards. Tai Felton scored his first-career touchdown to draw the Terps within 24-19 with 9:10 left in the fourth quarter.

Billy Edwards Jr. orchestrated a late touchdown drive to get the Terps back within eight points, but their subsequent onside kick was recovered.

Kicker Chad Ryland continued to add to his nation-leading field-goal streak, connecting on long kicks of 53 and 52 yards. He has now made 23 consecutive kicks in his career.

The Terp defense held the Wolverines to a season-low 34 points. Entering today's game, the Wolverines were averaging 55.3 points a game and had crossed the 50-point threshold in each of their three matchups.

Maryland 27, Michigan State 13

COLLEGE PARK, MD -- Behind big games from running back Antwain Littleton II and quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa, the Terps (4-1, 1-1) defeated Michigan State (2-3, 0-2) for the first time since 2016 in the first-ever game at newly-named SECU Stadium.

Tagovailoa continued his season-long dominance with yet another impressive outing, completing 32-of-41 passes for 314 yards and a score. Tagovailoa also crossed the 6,000 passing yards threshold, becoming the fastest quarterback to do so in program history. Additionally, he surpassed Terp legend Boomer Esiason (6,259) on the career passing yards list as Tagovailoa now has 6,287 in his career to stand third all-time in Maryland history. He also threw for 300 or more yards for the tenth time in his career, tying Scott Milanovich's school record of 10, set from 1992-95.

The Terps continued to be boosted by their young running backs as both Littleton II and Colby McDonald notched rushing scores on the day. Littleton finished with a career-high 120 yards on the ground to become the seventh different back under Michael Locksley to gain 100-plus yards in a game.

Maryland's special teams came up with several momentum-swinging plays including a blocked field goal by Jakorian Bennett and a 56-yard punt from Colton Spangler. The blocked field goal was Maryland's third since the start of last season, the second-most among all FBS teams in the nation. Chad Ryland connected on field goals of 43 and 51 yards, as he tied the Big Ten record for most consecutive field goals made at 24.

The Terps' defense, led by Tarheeb Still (career-high nine tackles), Beau Brade (eight tackles), and Ahmad McCullough (career-high eight tackles), held Michigan State to zero points and just 75 yards in the second half, including just eight yards in the third quarter. At one point in the half, the Spartans were forced to punt four times in a row, three of which were off three-and-outs.

Purdue 31, Maryland 29

COLLEGE PARK, MD -- Taulia Tagovailoa connected with Corey Dyches in the end zone to pull Maryland to within two points of Purdue with 35 seconds remaining, but the ensuing two-point conversion failed after the initial attempt was called back and the Terps fell in a heartbreaker, 31-29, at SECU Stadium on Saturday.

Purdue scored the go-ahead touchdown with 3:19 left in regulation and then added another touchdown with 1:20 remaining. The first of those touchdowns came on the following drive after the Terps took a 23-17 lead as Tagovailoa hit Roman Hemby on a screen pass and Hemby took it 11 yards to the house with 7:47 left in the fourth. The Maryland extra point attempt was blocked.

On the final possession, Tagovailoa orchestrated a beautiful drive down the field with 1:20 left in regulation and connected with Dyches for his second receiving score of the day. He appeared to find Rakim Jarrett in the back of the end zone on the two-point conversion, but the officials called it back on an ineligible receiver downfield penalty and the ensuing attempt was no good.

The Terps are now 4-2 overall and 1-2 in the Big Ten while Purdue moved to 4-2 and 2-1 in the conference.

Tagovailoa had another big game, completing 26-of-38 passes for 315 yards and three scores. He moved to second in career passing yards with 6,702, passing Chris Turner (6,543 from 2007-09). Scott Milanovich holds the school record with 7,301 career passing yards. His 315 yards were the 11th time he surpassed the 300-yard threshold, setting a program record.

Dyches had a career-high 106 yards receiving with two touchdowns, both in remarkable fashion. The second inched the Terps to within two points.

The defense was strong throughout the game. True freshman Jaishawn Barham had five tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Durrell Nchami had two sacks, three tackles for a loss and forced a fumble.

Overall, Maryland had a season-high five sacks and eight tackles for loss. Jakorian Bennett had an interception and racked up three pass break-ups to add to his total of 25 over the last two seasons, the most of any player in FBS football. Fa'Najae Gotoy led the Terps with seven tackles.

In allowing just 14 Purdue rushing yards, it was the second-fewest the Terps defense has allowed in a conference game since joining the Big Ten. The fewest the Terps was when Purdue rushed for just 10 yards in 2016. Overall, the 14 rushing yards are the fewest allowed by Maryland since limiting Howard to one rushing yard in 2019.

Maryland continued its season-long third quarter defensive dominance, holding Purdue scoreless and creating three turnovers in the quarter. The Terps have only allowed seven third-quarter points all year, posting its fifth third-quarter shutout on Saturday.

In scoring 27 or more points, the Terps set a school record for most consecutive games with 27 or more points in eight games in a row, dating to last season's final two games.

Maryland 38, Indiana 33

BLOOMINGTON, IN -- Maryland moved to 5-2 for the first time since 2016 with a 38-33 comeback victory at Indiana on Saturday at Memorial Stadium. Backup quarterback Billy Edwards Jr., engineered two scoring drives in the final seven minutes of the game, the first of which brought the Terps down the field and finished with a Roman Hemby 6-yard touchdown run with 5:35 left in the fourth quarter, putting the Terps up 31-27.

The Terps' defense came up with a huge sequence just seconds later as Mosiah Nasili-Kite recovered a fumble with 5:02 remaining to give the Terps the ball back. Hemby (107 rushing yards) secured the game with a 46-yard rush on 3rd-and-nine with less than three minutes remaining. It was Hemby's third 100-yard game of the season.

Maryland took a commanding 38-27 lead as Edwards scored on a 3-yard touchdown run with 2:11 left in the game. Edwards ran for 53 yards, all in the decisive final minutes.

Indiana added a late touchdown with 54 seconds remaining, but the Terps defense got pressure on Connor Bazalak to disrupt the two-point conversion attempt. The Terps covered up the Hoosiers' onside kick attempt to officially come away with the road victory.

Starting quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa, who suffered a fourth-quarter injury, finished with 270 passing yards on 25-of-39 with two passing touchdowns and a rushing score. He connected with Dontay Demus Jr., and CJ Dippre on scoring receptions. Jashaun Jones led the Terps with five catches for 41 yards while Jacob Copeland added 62 yards on four receptions.

The Terps finished with 442 yards of total offense.

On defense, Maryland got a big boost from interceptions by Tarheeb Still and Deonte Banks. Both picks came on Indiana's first play from scrimmage of each half. The Terps also held Indiana to just 36 rushing yards.

In scoring 38 points, the Terps added to their school record for most consecutive games with 27 or more points in nine games in a row, dating to last season's final two games.

Maryland 31, Northwestern 24

COLLEGE PARK, MD -- The Terps are bowl eligible on the earliest date in more than 20 years after a 31-24 victory over Northwestern on Homecoming at SECU Stadium. This is the second consecutive year the Terps (6-2, 3-2 Big Ten) have reached bowl eligibility.

On the first play after Northwestern scored to tie the game at 24-24, Roman Hemby broke off a career-long 75-yard touchdown run with 3:22 left to play to put the Terps ahead for good.

Beau Brade came up with a big interception on the Wildcats' ensuing drive to seal the victory. With the win, Maryland moved to 6-2 overall for the first time since the 2010 season. Northwestern is now 1-6 and 1-3 in the Big Ten.

Hemby rushed for a career-high 179 yards, his fourth-career 100-yard game, and scored three touchdowns in the Terrapins' victory. His three rushing TDs in a game are the most by a Terp since Javon Leake had three rushing TDs vs. Illinois in 2018. His rushing total was the most by a Terp since Jake Funk had 180 vs. Rutgers in 2020.

Maryland scored 17 unanswered points after falling behind 17-7 late in the second quarter to take a 24-17 lead before the Wildcats tied it.

With record-setting signal caller Taulia Tagovailoa sidelined due to injury, redshirt freshman Billy Edwards Jr., drew his first-career start at quarterback. Edwards Jr., threw for 166 yards on 18-of-28 passing and a touchdown while rushing for 66 yards.

Receiver Rakim Jarrett had a season-high eight catches with 82 receiving yards and a go-ahead touchdown grab in the third quarter. His reception total was the highest by a Terp in a game this season.

The Terp defense came up big in the third quarter yet again, getting a key interception from Dante Trader Jr. and holding the Wildcats scoreless in the period. Maryland has only allowed 10 total points in the third quarter all season, tied for the third-lowest amount in the FBS. Gereme Spraggins had a career-high eight tackles and a TFL. Jakorian Bennett, Ahmad McCullough, and Tarheeb Still each added six tackles.

In scoring 31 points, the Terps added to their school record for most consecutive games with 27 or more points in 10 consecutive games, dating to last season's final two games. They have also won 16 games in a row when scoring 30 or more points.

#2 Ohio State 43, Maryland 30

COLLEGE PARK, MD -- Maryland led No. 2 Ohio State at halftime and battled the Buckeyes to the very end as the Terps suffered a 43-30 defeat at SECU Stadium.

Deonte Banks blocked a Buckeye extra point and Jakorian Bennett returned it for two points to bring the Terps within 33-23 with 12:29 left in the fourth. The Terp offense took advantage of that momentum and drove 74 yards down the field in seven plays, highlighted by a beautiful ball from Taulia Tagovailoa to Rakim Jarrett for 49 yards – a pass that made Tagovailoa the program leader in career passing yards. The Terps faced a fourth-and-goal from the one-yard line that looked like it was going nowhere until Tagovailoa extended the play and found Jeshawn Jones in the back of the end zone, making it a 33-30 game with 9:49 left to play.

Ohio State knocked in a successful 45-yard field goal with 42 seconds remaining to bring its lead to 36-30 and then came up with a defensive score on the Terps' attempt to drive down the field for the winning touchdown.

Tagovailoa, who became Maryland's leader in career passing yards in the game, threw for 293 yards on 26-of-36 with two passing touchdowns, as he also tied the school record for passing scores in a career.

Dontay Demus Jr., had a season-best five receptions for 67 yards. C.J. Dippre set a career-high with four catches for 30 yards with a touchdown reception. The Terps had 402 of total offense.

Defensively, safeties Beau Brade and Dante Trader Jr. led the way with eight and seven tackles, respectively. Deonte Banks notched four tackles, two PBUs and a blocked extra point.

Maryland's 402 yards of total offense was the second-most allowed by Ohio State all season (Penn State 482) and the Terps were the second team to score 30 points against the Buckeyes this year as Penn State tallied 31.

In the first half, the Terps got the better of the Buckeyes on both sides of the ball, outgaining them 211-159 en route to a 13-10 advantage. Tagovailoa completed his first 11 passes of the night and finished the half 16-of-18 with 180 yards and a score. On the other side, Maryland's defense was all over the field, holding Heisman hopeful C.J. Stroud to 131 yards on just 9-of-18 passing.

Maryland 37, Rutgers 0

COLLEGE PARK, MD -- Maryland sent its 18 seniors out in style on Senior Day, dominating Rutgers 37-0 behind a three-touchdown game from Big Ten Rookie of the Year candidate Roman Hemby. The Terps recorded their first Big Ten shutout and first shutout of a conference opponent since blanking ACC foe Wake Forest in 2008.

The Terps, who finished the regular season at 7-5 and won four Big Ten games for the first time since joining the conference, will await their bowl game information, which will be announced on Sunday, Dec. 4.

Hemby ran for three touchdowns for the second time this season, scoring from one, one and eight yards. He finished with 70 yards on 19 carries.

Quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa became Maryland's all-time leader in career touchdown passes as he completed 25-of-37 for 342 yards and a score. He now has 50 career TD passes, breaking the record of 49 previously held by Scott Milanovich.

Super senior Jeshawn Jones had a career day with highs of nine catches for 152 yards to lead the way. Freshman Octavian Smith Jr. had the best day of his young career, setting personal bests in both receptions (four) and receiving yards (79). Corey Dyches snagged five receptions for 59 yards. Tai Felton tied his career-best with three catches for a new career-high 57 receiving yards.

The Maryland defense was phenomenal all-game, turning in their best performance against a Big Ten opponent ever. The Terps shutout the Scarlet Knights and held them to a measly 135 total yards. Rutgers was forced into 10 total punts and no drive went longer than 22 yards as they totaled just seven first downs. Maryland held Rutgers to 1-for-13 on third down, with the first conversion coming with under two minutes left.

In the first half, they held Rutgers to just 59 total yards and only 21 through the air. Five of Rutgers' seven possessions (excluding the one-play drive to run out the clock before halftime) were three-and-outs, with its longest drive going for just 22 yards.

Prior to Saturday, the fewest yards allowed by Maryland in a Big Ten game was holding Rutgers to 179 yards in 2018. Overall, it was the fewest yards allowed by Maryland since holding Howard to 68 on Aug. 31, 2019. Against FBS opponents, this is the fewest yards Maryland has allowed since holding Eastern Michigan to 124 in 2001.

Maryland put together 513 yards of total offense.

Maryland 16, #23 NC State 12

CHARLOTTE, NC -- Maryland came out on top in a defensive battle in Bank of America Stadium on Friday afternoon, besting No. 23 NC State 16-12 to win the Duke's Mayo Bowl. The Terps won bowl games in back-to-back seasons for the first time since winning the Peach Bowl after the 2002 season and Gator Bowl following the 2003 season.

Neither team had much luck finding the end zone as both defenses shined and the teams combined for seven field goal makes. The Terps notched the lone touchdown of the day as Octavian Smith Jr. made a terrific leaping catch in the corner of the end zone — a 19-yard score that proved to be the difference in the game.

The Wolfpack got the ball down 16-12 with 2:34 remaining, but, as they did all game, the Maryland defense came up big when needed as Jakorian Bennett, playing in his final game as a Terp, ripped the ball away from a NC State receiver to secure an interception and the victory. Bennett was named the game's MVP.

Kicker Chad Ryland connected on three field goals, coming from 45, 42 and 33 yards. It was the seventh time in his career he made three or more field goals in a game.

After his 221-yard day on 19-of-37, quarterback Taulia Tagovailoa now holds every major passing record in Maryland football history as he set the school record for total touchdowns (59) and passing completions (665) in a career.

Tai Felton posted career-highs in receptions (four) and receiving yards (69). Jashaun Jones had four catches for 79 yards while Smith Jr. snagged three balls and totaled 34 yards. Corey Dyches capped off his impressive season with a four-catch, 45-receiving yard day.

The Terps' defense was stout, limiting NC State to 296 overall yards, and just 27 rushing yards. The Wolfpack had just 93 yards in the second half. Maryland held the Wolfpack to just 5-of-18 on third-down conversions. Beau Brade led the Terps with seven tackles.

NC State was only able to muster four field goals. The last time the Terps held an opponent without a touchdown in a bowl game was the 2002 Peach Bowl, when Maryland beat Tennessee, 30-3.

The win brought the Terps to an 8-5 final record, marking the first time Maryland won eight games in a season since 2010. The Wolfpack also finished 8-5.
