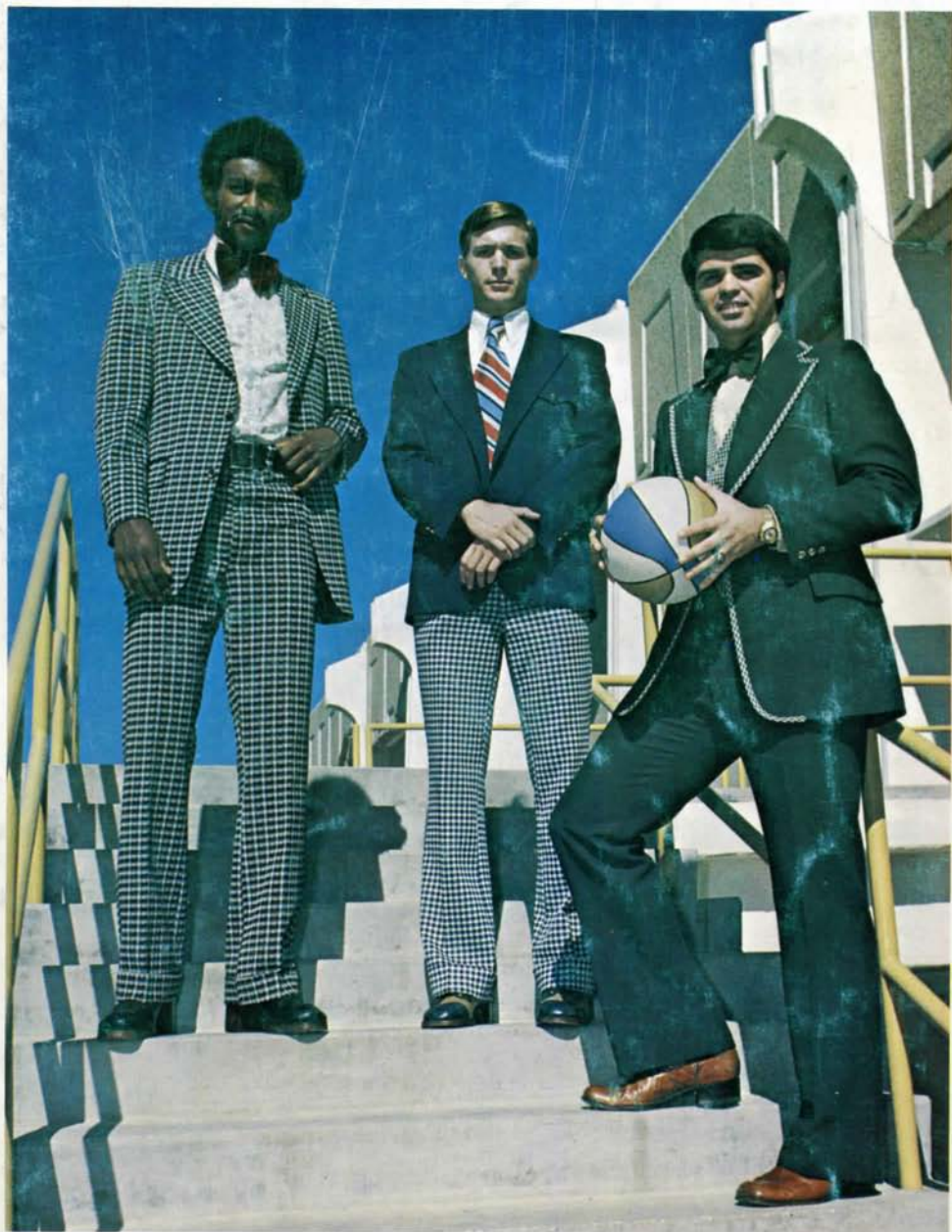

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HEAD COACH BILL JONES

BILL JONES

Head Basketball Coach

Among the youngest head coaches in collegiate circles, Jones' philosophy when it comes to basketball is not detailed or elaborate but what's more important it is sound.

"I believe the game should be exciting not only to the spectators but to the players also," Jones said. "In other words, basketball should be fun for the participants, which isn't to exclude work, but it should never reach the point where it becomes a grind. It's a sad thing to see a young man with worlds of talent waste himself simply because he is unable to hit upon a combination that will jell for himself, his teammates and his coaches," Jones offered.

"I like to feel that basketball does play an important role in the lives of our players, but I am interested in them as people. I want them to strive for a complete college life and function socially and academically as well as athletically. I want to look at our graduating seniors and be able to say that they've done a good job for the university as a basketball player and an athlete and that we have done a good job for them in helping them mature."

Jones, a straight talker who gets to the point but also a man who gives the other fellow every consideration, came to Florence State as an enthusiastic assistant coach for the 1970-71 season.

His presence was strongly felt and he helped direct the Lions to a 17-7 campaign, their best in 11 years.

A host of individual and team records were established during that big season.

Jones remained an assistant for the 1971-72 season and Florence State posted an 11-12 overall record.

He was named head coach in February, 1972, succeeding veteran mentor Ed Billingham, who is now Director of Men's Intramurals. Immediately, Jones went to work to construct a club with championship potential.

In his first try, he barely missed bringing a Gulf South Conference title to Florence. His Lions reeled off eight straight league victories before losing and finished with an 11-3 GSC record, only one game off the championship pace set by Southeastern Louisiana.

Not too many observers felt that Jones, in his first year, would come so close to winning the crown. Overall, the Lions were 13-9 and earned a berth in the NAIA District 27 tournament in Jackson, Miss. They lost to powerful Alcorn A & M in the opening round.

Jones is a native of Guntersville and a graduate of Snead Junior College in Boaz and Jacksonville State University. The 6-5 Jones starred on the hardwoods for two years at Snead, then inked a scholarship with Jacksonville where he developed into an All-Conference guard.

In 1966, he set a Gamecock record for most field goals scored in a season (200) and sacked the most free throws in succession (31) over a six-game span. He still owns that mark.

While at Jax, he was also one of the Gamecocks' best righthanded baseball pitchers and upon graduation inked a pro contract with the Pittsburgh Pirate organization.

He went through spring training with the Bucs, but later accepted a position with the Internal Revenue Service.

During the basketball season of 1969-70, former Snead coach Emmett Plunkett, who had tutored Jones, became ill and required surgery. Plunkett asked his former standout player to guide the team in his absence and Jones accepted. At the time the Parsons were nursing a 2-7 record but with Jones at the helm, they finished fourth in their conference with a 14-11 overall mark.

FSU Preview

1973-74

In an attempt to draw a clear picture of Florence State University's outlook for the 1973-74 basketball edition, one has to review last season's outcome and discuss the players lost by graduation.

The Lions, in coach Bill Jones' second year in command, finished runnerup in the Gulf South Conference in a nip-and-tuck race with Southeastern Louisiana. Florence State missed the championship by one game as it posted an 11-3 league mark compared to a 12-2 standard forged by the den of Lions from Hammond, La.

Florence State defeated Southeastern soundly early in the season, 76-53, but lost down the stretch, 89-75. Southeastern's only other setback was to Tennessee-Martin while FSU suffered two other GSC losses to Tennessee-Martin and Delta State.

Missing from that team are five seniors who combined to score well over half the total points tallied for the season by the entire squad.

Included are Jimmy Jones, the leading point-maker and No. 2 rebounder; Charles Cunningham, runnerup in scoring and tops in rebounds; and Louis Conner, third in scoring. Jones and Cunningham were All-Gulf South Conference performers, and Jones, who returned to his alma mater Belgreen High as head coach, received recognition by the NAIA as honorable mention All-America. Jones barely missed joining Florence State's coveted list of career 1,000-point scorers.

The two other seniors who played a lot of basketball for the Lions in their four years were Jay Stejskal and Doug Curry.

Returning to bolster this season's team is a trio of two-year lettermen, senior David King and juniors Larry Kowalski and Mike McCulloch. King averaged 7.5 points last year, Kowalski, 5.7, and McCulloch, 10.7. McCulloch, 6-6, was third in rebounds with an average of 8.9.

Earning monograms last season for the first time were junior Jack Johnson, 6-8, and sophomore Willie West, 6-3.

"We are naturally turning to these returnees for leadership," Coach Jones said. "They have been with us for awhile, they should be fully aware of what our coaching staff expects from them and frankly I believe that these young men are dedicated enough that they want to be associated with a winning team...and that they would like nothing better than to be at the front of the pack."

King was the type player last season who could come off the bench and perk up a sagging quintet while McCulloch and Kowalski were steady, consistent hoopsters.

West provided plenty of fireworks for the Lion offense as a freshman out of Headland High School and he's a solid bet to develop into one of the finest players in the Gulf South Conference. Johnson is a big man with good moves who could add much to FSU plans this year.

Larry Brown, a 6-5 junior, was with the junior varsity last season and is a capable player. Mike Morgan, 6-8, played with the varsity in 1970-71, dropped out of school and returned for a redshirt season in 1972-73. Heading into his senior year, he appears to be primed for a banner season.

Mike Whitaker, 6-1, and Pat Stanley, 6-4, were redshirts last year and are making a determined push for playing time. Mike Stafford, 6-0, and Harold Humphrey, 6-4, were also with the JV's last round and picked up some valuable experience that should enable them to contribute strongly to the varsity.

A pair of junior college transfers from Kansas, 6-7 Coleman Crawford and 6-5 Donell Brundidge, will figure heavily in the scheme of the new Lion outfit. Both came to Florence with excellent credentials and should add muscle under the boards.

"Although they are newcomers to our system and style of play, they are catching on rapidly and should be ready to help us right from the start," Coach Jones noted.

In looking at the varsity squad as a whole, Jones said the group has shown more enthusiasm and spirit than any team with which he has been associated as a coach.

"It is already evident that they've established personal as well as team goals," he said, "and at this point they're making great strides toward achieving those goals."

Jones believes this team has more speed and quickness than the previous club which has to be a big plus factor.

Jones also expects the degree of competition to be greater than ever since the five seniors must be replaced and at one time or another all were starters.

"Until we approach tip-off time for our first game, I would have to say that all positions are wide open," Jones offered.

As for the Gulf South Conference race, Jones expects defending champion Southeastern to be strong again.

"They lost only one player off last year's squad," he noted, "and they have some outstanding talent. Although we haven't seen Northwestern play, everyone I have talked with who is familiar with them expect them to be among the better clubs."

Within the Eastern Division, which is composed of Florence State, Jacksonville, Troy, Livingston and Tennessee-Martin, Jones looks for Jacksonville State (17-9 last season) to make a good showing.

Southern Mississippi and Union University, Florence opponents outside the Gulf South, are anticipating big seasons.

RANDALL BEAN

Assistant Coach



Also a Guntersville native and a graduate of Snead Junior College and Jacksonville State, Bean joined the Florence Staff during the summer of 1972 as assistant basketball coach.

An All-State center at Marshall County High of Guntersville, Bean inked a scholarship with Snead and was the Parson's leading rebounder. He earned junior college All-American honors before signing with Jacksonville State for the 1965-66 season.

After graduation in 1968, he went to Weaver Junior High in Calhoun County as basketball coach then returned to Marshall County where he directed the junior varsity to a 30-8 record in two seasons. He also assisted the varsity in both basketball and football.

Bean is married to the former Patricia Wilkens of Homewood and they are the parents of a daughter, Heather Lynn, 2 1/2.

CHARLES CUNNINGHAM

Graduate Assistant

Although Charles played at Florence State only two seasons after transferring from Snead where he was a junior college standout, he still managed to crack the Lion record book.

He owns the school mark for most rebounds in a single game (23 against Lambuth, Dec., 1971, and St. Bernard, Feb., 1972) and tied Dabbs Earnest for best rebound average for a season (296 in 1971-72 for 12.9).

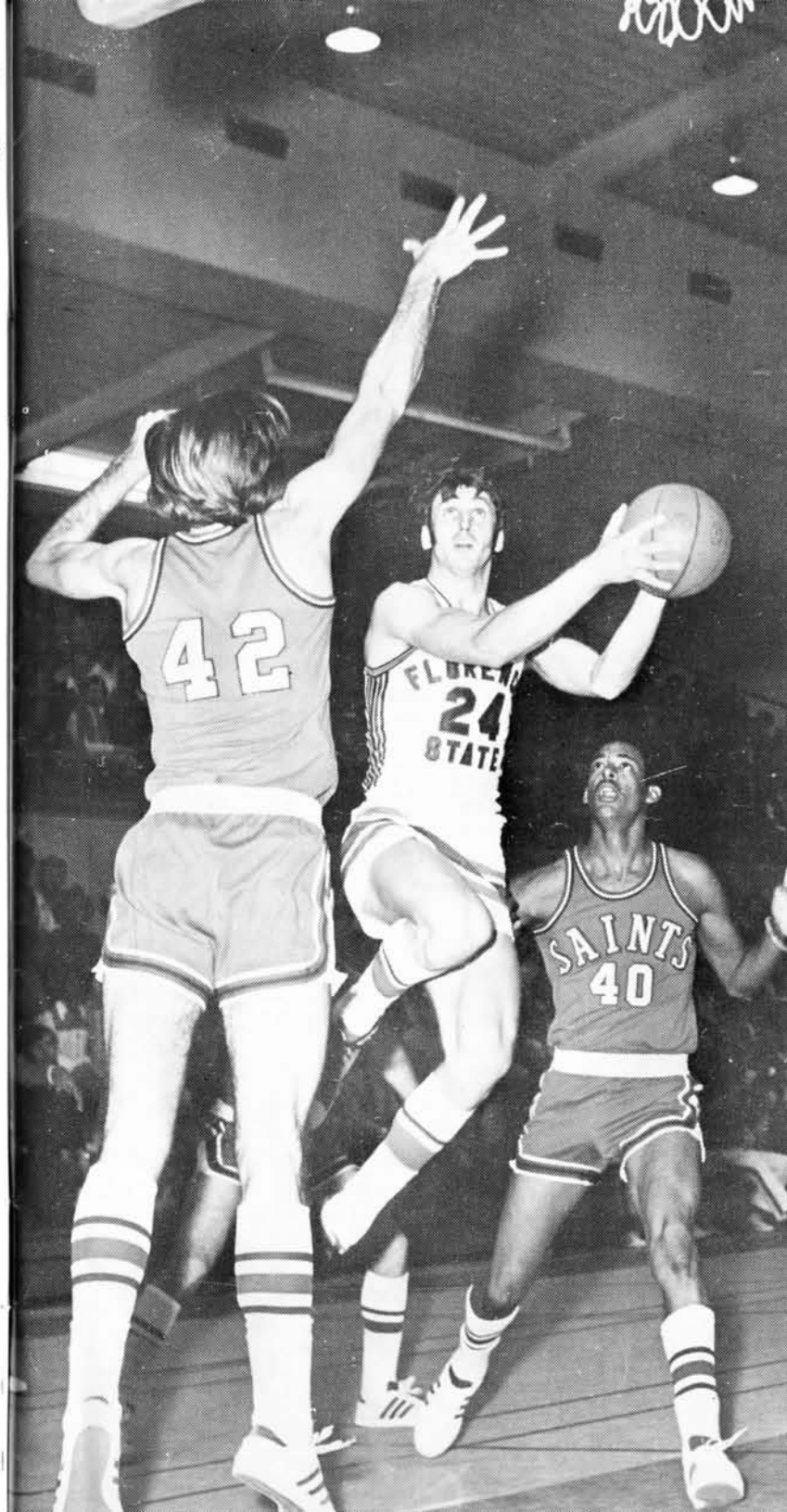
Charles, an All Gulf-South Conference selection, was not only tough under the boards but scored his share of the points as well.

In 1971-72 he pumped in 335 to finish runnerup for the season. His average was 14.6 and his high game was 26 points.

Last season in helping the Lions to an 11-3 GSC record, Charles tallied 322 points

for a 15.3 average and again was second in scoring.

His rebound totals of 296 and 264 were tops both years.



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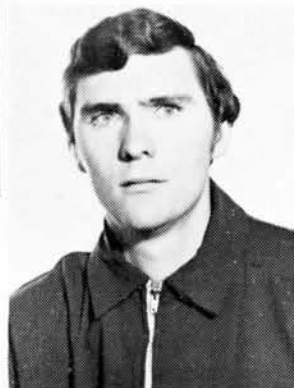
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David King

Senior - Physical Education - Tuscumbia, Ala.



A two-year letterman and one of only two seniors on the entire squad, David is being counted on to provide his share of the leadership this season. He played in 16 games last year and was in double figures four times. David jumped off to a good start, scoring 65 of his 110 total points in the first four outings. His high game was 21 points in the Lions' 79-78 overtime victory against Troy State. David has exceptional hands and jumps and rebounds extremely well for his size. He combines a hard, shifty drive with a consistent long shot and is a threat from almost anywhere on the court. He has the ability to spot openings quickly and is a good passer as evidenced by his 40 assists last season. Besides being the most valuable player on Deshler High's team his senior year and a member of the All Quad-Cities club, David was a member of the honor society. He has his sights on a career in coaching and teaching. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm King of Tuscumbia.

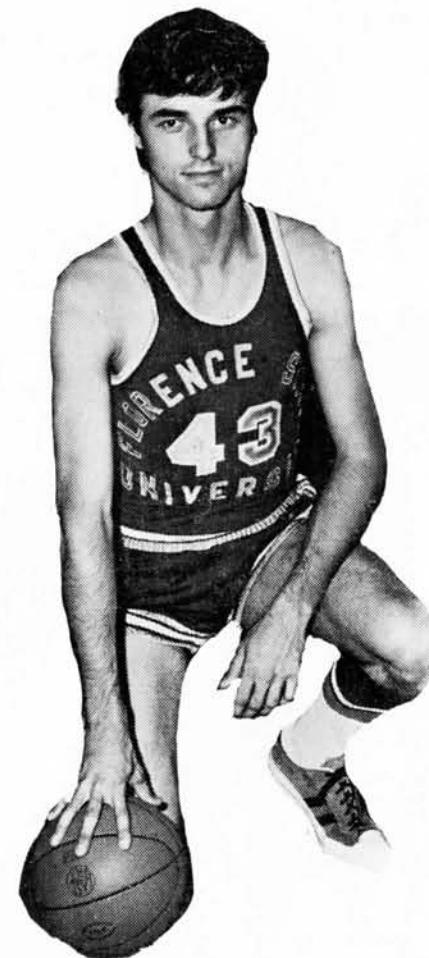
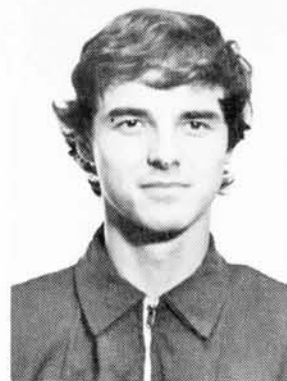

Mike played in seven varsity games in 1970-71 as a freshman. After seeing action in the first five games of the 1971-72 campaign and scoring 44 points, he dropped out of school for personal reasons. He returned last year with an excellent attitude and following a redshirt season, Mike appears geared to make a big contribution to this year's team. In fact, coaches expect him to be in the middle of the fight for a starting position. Although possessing an unorthodox jump shot, he hits for a good percentage. An accurate passer, Mike is continually aware of an open teammate. He is also an aggressive defender and gets to the ball quickly. Mike was selected All-Mid Ohio for two years at North Union High School in Richwood and made first team All-District his senior season. He was also honorable mention All-State. After graduation, Mike hopes to enter the field of business administration. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Charles Morgan of Richwood and a brother, Dana, is a freshman basketball player at Otterbein College in Westerville, Ohio.

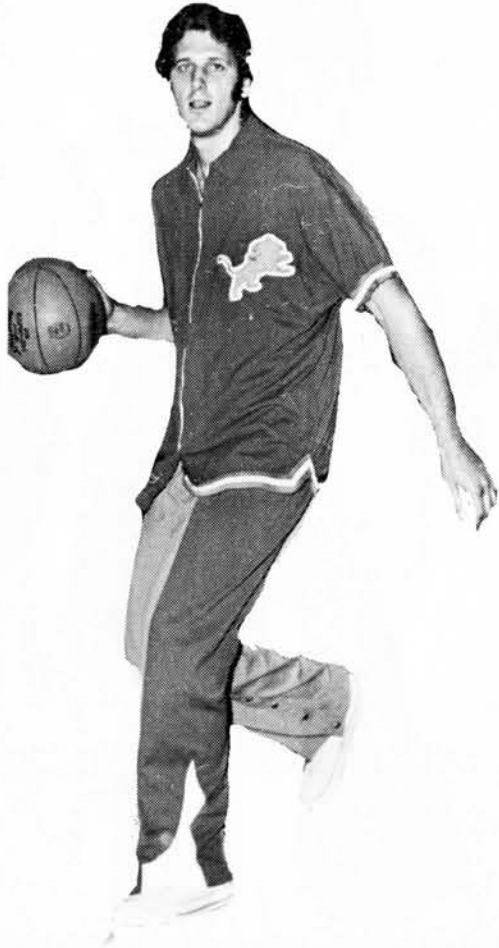
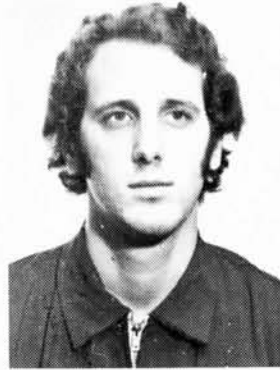

As a rookie, he participated in 21 of 23 games and scored 88 points and pulled off 89 rebounds. Larry got in 18 of 21 games last season, pushing 103 points through the hoops and grabbing 76 rebounds. He is working for his third letter and should give the Lions plenty of muscle under the boards. A real battler, Larry enjoys a scrap for the basketball, especially under the offensive nets. He is a fighter for positioning in tight quarters and many of his points will come off rebounds. His high game last season was 13 points against David Lipscomb. 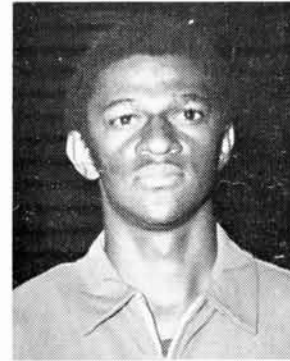

As a sophomore, Mike began to realize some of his potential. He pumped in 225 points in 21 games to finish as the No. four scorer on the team and his 188 rebounds last season was third best. Hitting in double figures in 13 games, his best night came in a narrow 78-74 victory over Jacksonville State when he ripped the cords for 23 markers. Mike earned a letter as a freshman by playing in 18 games and he is expected to be among the team leaders this year. He has excellent moves for a big man and possesses a good long-range jump shot. He is also a rugged defender and has blocked numerous shots in his two seasons with the Lions. He plays to win. Mike was an outstanding hoopster under Jack Tucker at Russellville High and was named the best senior athlete. Mike is working toward a minor in economics to go with his business management major and he is undecided on a career. He is married and his wife's name is Rita Diane.

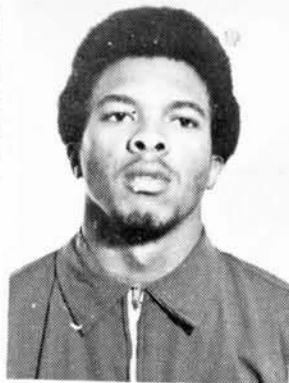

One of the most celebrated basketballers to ink a Florence State scholarship in years, Willie did anything but disappoint his coaches and Lion fans in his rookie campaign.

In an effort to acquaint him with the Florence State cage system, head coach Bill Jones worked Willie into the lineup gradually and this apparently paid off. Willie saw little action in the first four games but he stayed busy learning the Lion offensive and defensive tactics and preparing for his chance.

During a six-game spurt, Willie waxed hot and scored in double figures each time, pouring through 112 of his total 194 points. His high for the year was 26 points in FSU's 73-56 victory over Southeastern Louisiana, which eventually captured the Gulf South Conference championship. At one time, Willie was shooting at a blazing percentage and finished the year with a .543 reading, not bad for a man who fires consistently from the outside. Willie, who starred in the annual high school all-star game at the University of Alabama, nixed four Southeastern Conference offers to attend Florence State. A complete player, Willie moves well inside and has a hot hand outside the key. The former Headland High standout is also a scrappy defender.

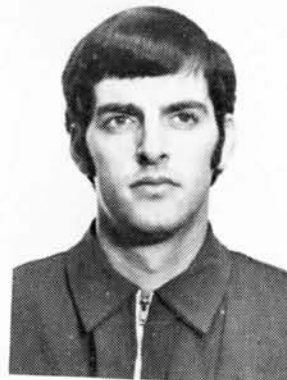

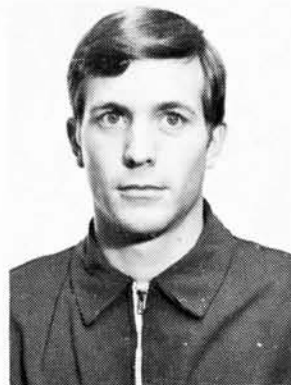

Sophomore - Biology - Decatur, Ala.

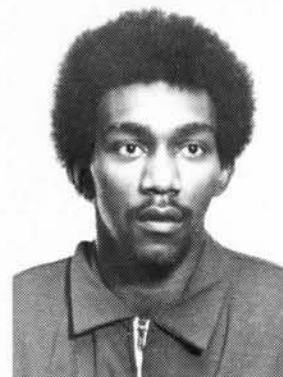

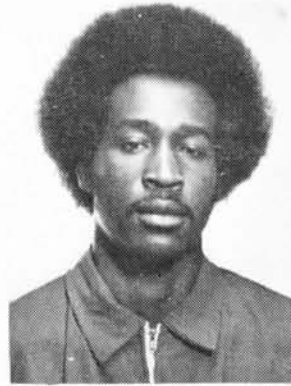

Junior - Physical Education - Niagara Falls, N. Y.

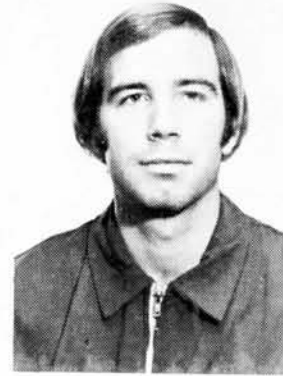

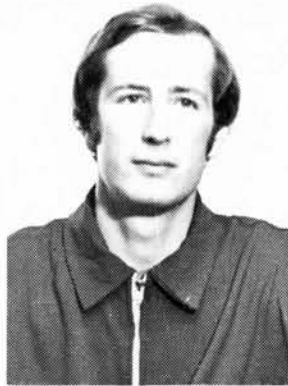

Sophomore - Physical Education - Anderson, Ind.



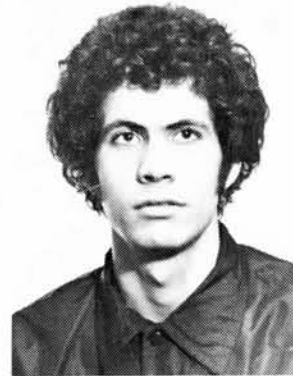

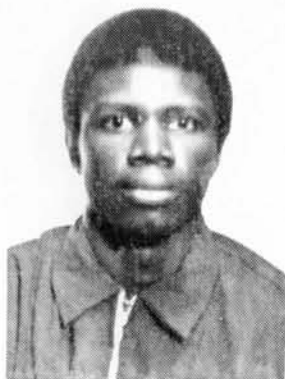

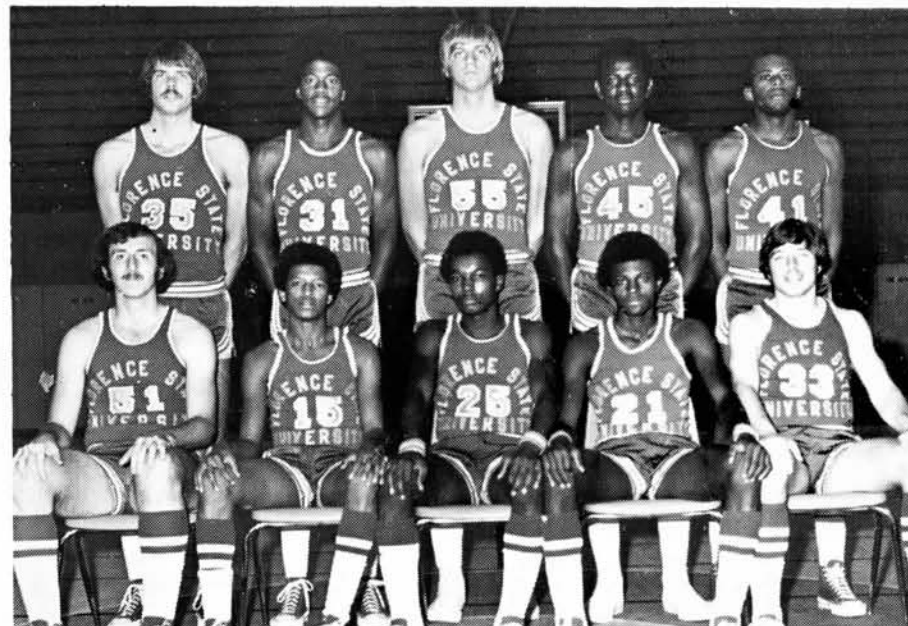

He was also voted the best senior athlete at Muscle Shoals in 1971 and served as president of the honor society. 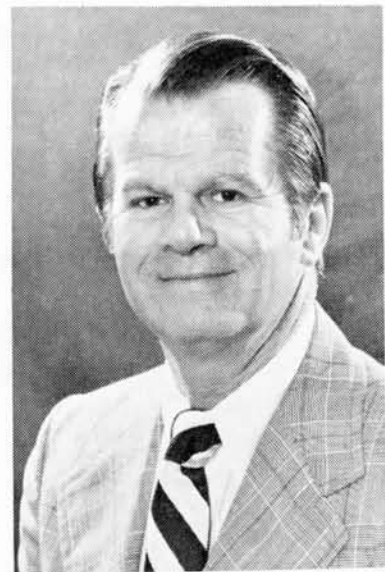

Despite a strenuous and demanding schedule, he still finds time for informal discussions with students and often takes coffee breaks with them in the cafeteria of the Student Union Building.

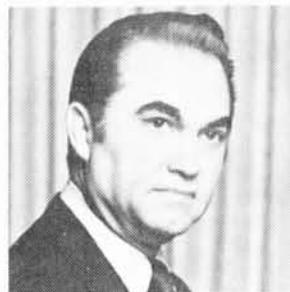
One of his first moves was to establish an "open door" policy and a student wishing to confront the president surprisingly learned that seeking an official appointment wasn't necessary.

"My first concern, my ultimate goal," he said, "is to graduate students here who can compete anywhere in this country with young people from other institutions of higher learning. I intend for them to be prepared to make significant contributions to society and their fellowman wherever they go and in whatever field they choose."

A native of Headland, Dr. Guillot graduated from Dothan High School and attended Livingston University. He received his BS degree from Auburn University, his Juris Doctor degree from the University of Alabama and his Chartered Life Underwriters degree from the American College of Life Underwriters.

He is married to the former Patty Shirley of Reform and they are the parents of three children, Mrs. Alan Mancuso of Atlanta, Ga.; Bobby, a sophomore at Alabama; and Shirley Lynne, a junior at Bradshaw High School.

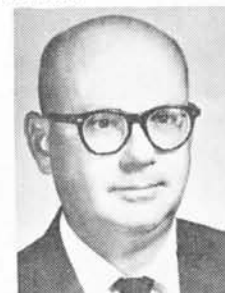

MICKEY ANDREWS

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Enjoying a rapid and phenomenal success in the collegiate ranks, Mickey Andrews accepted the dual role of head coach and athletic director at Florence State last December.

In only three short years as a head coach, he has risen to the top. He posted an overall record of 23 victories, seven losses and two ties while directing Livingston University through an unprecedented period in its athletic history.



In 1971, Livingston overpowered nine regular-season opponents, losing only to Troy State by a scant 21-20. The Tigers blasted West Liberty, West Va., 25-2 in the opening round of the NAIA playoffs and nipped Arkansas Tech 14-12 for the national championship at Legion Field in Birmingham.

Andrews' 1972 team also dropped only one game, a 17-14 heartbreaker to Delta State which ended a 16-game streak in which Livingston did not suffer defeat. The only blemish during that span had been a 14-14 tie with Western Carolina two games earlier.

Livingston again reached the NAIA playoffs and although the Tigers fought Carson-Newman to a 7-7 deadlock, they "lost" the contest due to a penetration rule that was in effect for the game.

MICKEY ANDREWS

A native of Ozark, Andrews attended Carroll High School and earned a football scholarship to the University of Alabama. He appeared in three bowl games as a defensive halfback for the Crimson Tide following the 1962-63-64 seasons. Alabama blanked Oklahoma 17-0 in the 1963 Orange Bowl.

The Tide upset a power-laden Ole Miss team, 12-7, in the historic 1964 Sugar Bowl in snow-clad New Orleans. Despite the heroics of a lame Joe Namath and a scrappy Tide defense, Alabama lost the 1965 Orange Bowl 21-17. Namath was stopped inches short of paydirt and a winning touchdown late in the game.

During Andrews' varsity association with the Tide, 'Bama won 29 games and lost only four. The 1964 squad captured the Southeastern Conference title.

Andrews spent the fall of 1965 as an assistant at Erwin High School in Birmingham. Prior to arriving in Livingston, he served on the staff of Eastern Kentucky University.

Following Livingston's win over Arkansas Tech for the national title, Andrews' famous college mentor, Paul "Bear" Bryant, praised his former pupil on his show during a televised Alabama replay.

"If Mickey Andrews isn't "Coach of the Year" they should stop giving it," Bryant said. "He certainly has my support. The job he has done at Livingston has been truly amazing."

And Andrews was 1971 "Coach of the Year" for Alabama, for District 27 of the NAIA and for the Gulf South Conference.

He is married to the former Diane Cook of Ozark and they are the parents of two children, Ronnie, 7, and Shannon, 4.

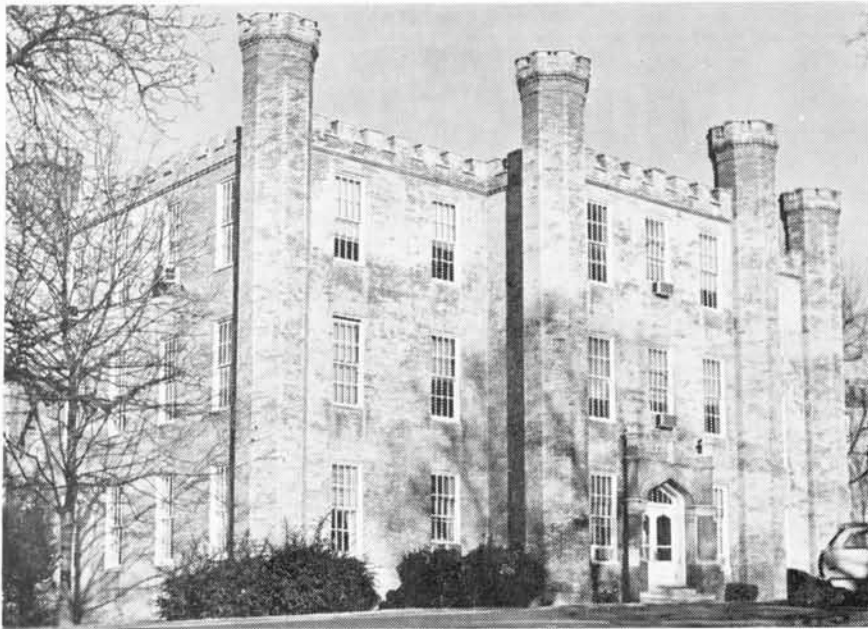

A BRIEF HISTORY OF FLORENCE STATE

Florence State University, situated in the picturesque Tennessee River Valley, is the oldest existing state-supported teacher educating institution south of the Ohio.

The university occupies a campus of 80 acres in a residential section of Florence in the Muscle Shoals area of North Alabama. Florence has a population of almost 40,000, and with the towns of Sheffield, Tusculumbia and Muscle Shoals City immediately adjacent, is a part of an urban center with a population in excess of 85,000.

The Shoals is a rich agricultural section in the heart of TVA. Power, navigation, and recreation development have also made it one of the most rapidly expanding industrial regions in the South.

The rivers, lakes, and camping sites attract sportsmen and vacationists from all over the nation.

Florence State traces its origins to LaGrange College, which was established 1830 at LaGrange, Ala., by the Methodist Church on the first college charter to be issued by the new State of Alabama.

In 1854, the president of the school, seeking to reestablish the institution on firmer footing, led most of the faculty and student body to temporary facilities in Florence, and for a few months the

name LaGrange College was borne by two schools only a few miles apart.

The original LaGrange College remained in existence until its physical facilities were destroyed by federal troops in 1863. The school at Florence was required to secure a new charter and in 1855 it was incorporated as Wesleyan University. Wesleyan Hall, erected in this period with the financial assistance of the citizens of Florence, still provides classrooms and office facilities after more than a century of education service.

With the outbreak of the Civil War, the departure of faculty and students closed the doors of Wesleyan University except to the southern and northern forces alternately finding shelter there.

In 1872, the school was established as a State Normal School, the first of its kind in the South. The admission of women students two years later placed the school among the first co-educational institutions in the U. S.

In 1929, the school became a State Teachers College. By action of the new Board of Trustees the name was changed to Florence State University effective September 1, 1968 — an action portending the continued expansion of the school's programs and purposes in its educational service to the State.

The Gulf South Conference

The Mid-South Athletic Conference, the forerunner of today's Gulf South Conference, originated during the summer of 1970.

Four Alabama schools, which had been members of the Alabama Collegiate Conference (1961-69), Florence State, Jacksonville State, Troy State and Livingston, joined with Delta State and Tennessee-Martin to comprise the charter membership of the Mid-South.

Conference competition was limited to football in the first year due to scheduling problems. Jacksonville State won the pigskin title with a 10-0 record, including a 21-7 Orange Blossom Classic bowl victory over Florida A & M in Miami.

Growing pangs necessitated expansion for the 1971 campaign. The old Gulf States Conference folded, leaving seven schools without conference affiliations. South-

eastern Louisiana, of the Gulf States, and fast-growing Nicholls State joined the ranks of the year-old Mid-South and the loop's official name was changed to Gulf South Conference, combining elements in the names of both leagues.

The first GSC football crown was shared by Livingston (9-1-0) and Troy State (6-3-0), but it was Livingston's 14-12 NAIA national championship victory over Arkansas Tech in Birmingham's Legion Field that put the GSC in the limelight.

Northwestern Louisiana, another former Gulf States associate, and Mississippi College joined the Gulf South at the league's annual summer meeting in New Orleans in 1972 to boost the conference to 10 members.

A tournament to decide the championship in basketball for 1971-72 was held at Delta State College with the host team winning the title. Florence State defeated Southeastern Louisiana in the opening round, 92-83, but lost to Delta State, 81-71, in the semifinals.

Southeastern won last season's conference race in basketball with a 12-2 record. Florence State finished runnerup at 11-3.

The 1972 football title was captured by Northwestern Louisiana with a perfect 6-0 mark and the 1973 crown went to Troy State.

Dr. Larry McGehee, president of the University of Tennessee at Martin, is leading the conference for 1973-74.

Dr. Ernest Stone of Jacksonville State University was elected to serve as president of the Gulf South in 1974-75 at the summer meeting in June in Biloxi, Miss.

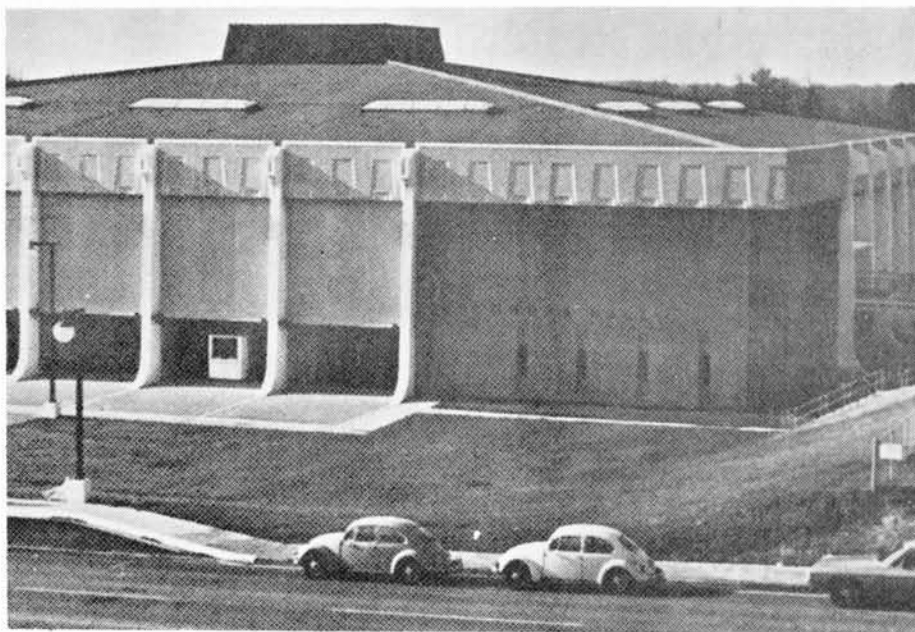

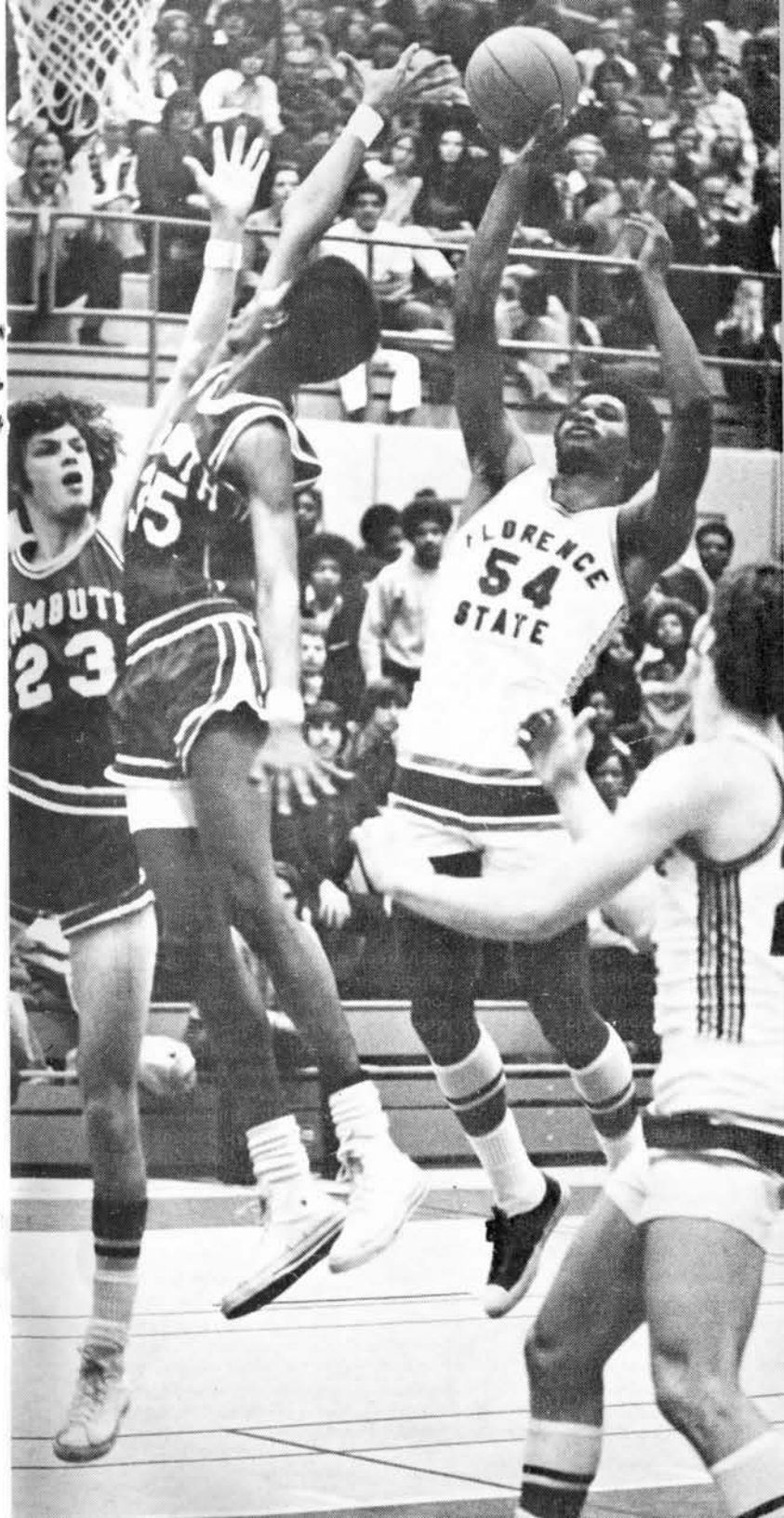
Last season the Lion basketball team performed in a true home for the first time in a 4,500-seat gymnasium which encompasses the main floor.

The professional Atlanta Hawks and Boston Celtics clashed in an exhibition

game in Flowers Hall in October, 1972 before an overflow crowd and last October the Hawks met the Baltimore Bullets in the ultra-modern facility.

The four-level structure, named for former coach and athletic director H. A. "Eddie" Flowers, houses an Olympic size swimming pool with a seating arrangement for 300 spectators. It also has auxiliary gyms for various activities. Athletic coaches and physical education instructors have their offices in the building.

Adjacent to Flowers Hall are the football practice field, an all-weather track and the Lions' baseball park.

Hanna is associated with Stan Brock, who produces the "Wild Kingdom" television show and works closely with the Ringling Brothers Circus.

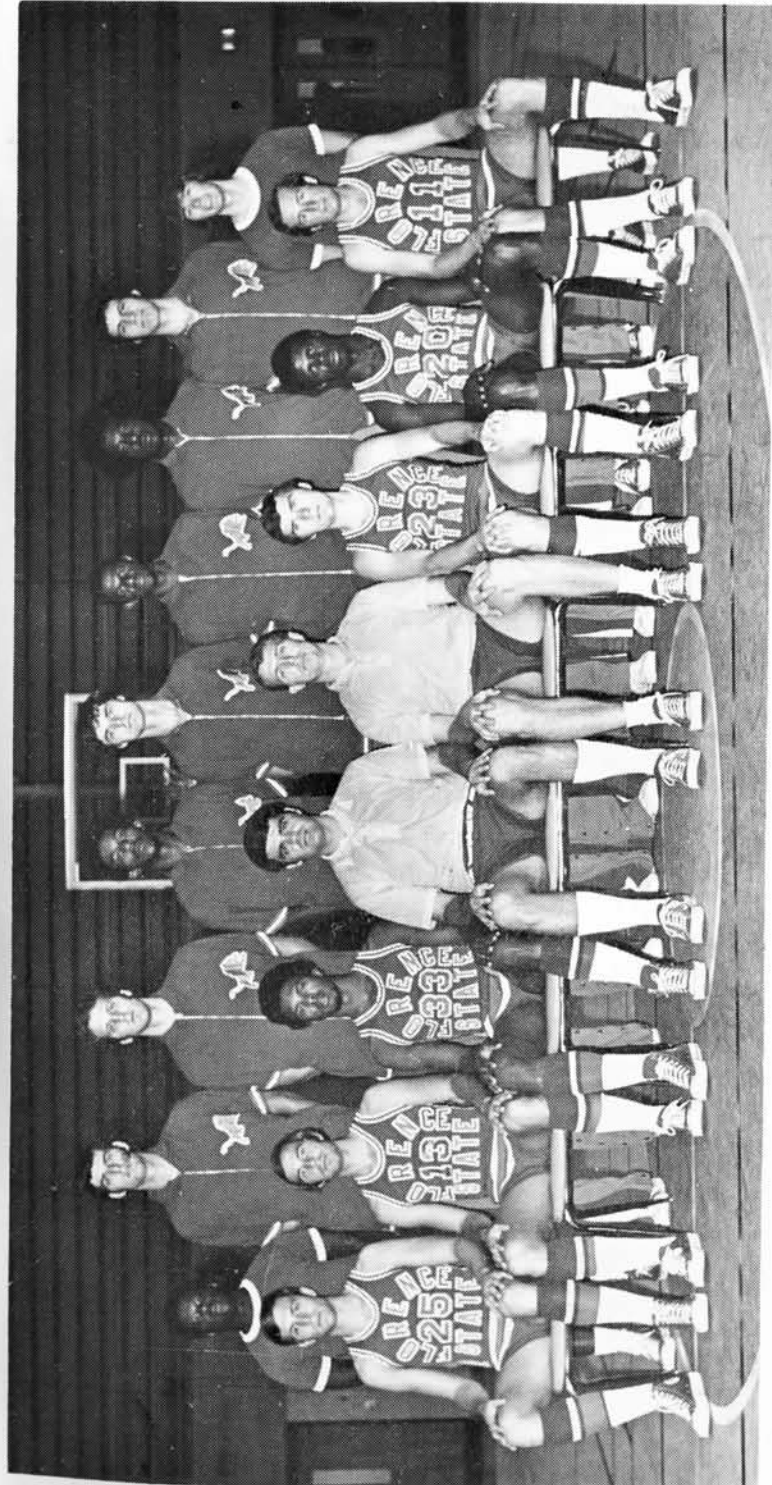
"This addition to the university community should afford an excellent and dynamic new dimension to our campus," Guillot said.
