1963 Prospectus

Sophomores may well hold the key to the success for the 1963 football Lions. There is only one senior in the backfield and four on the line. With only three juniors in the backfield and three on the line it is easy to see that there will be a shortage of experienced personnel.

Position Outlook

END—Sophomores are the key here. The only older head is David Thomas, a senior who has a good pair of hands but is at his best on defense. Don Allison seems to be the leading contender for a starting berth at the end opposite Thomas. Ray Hester, however, is not to be sold short. Also in the running is Gary Johnson who is short on experience.

TACKLE—Here also sophomores seem to be of utmost importance. Almost assured of starting assignments are seniors Ken Daniel and Elmer Knight. Behind them, however, there could be a mad scramble for the necessary depth-providing slots. Paul Cooper is perhaps the most experienced of the three sophomores. Lester Dawson and Jimmy Carringer will be called upon heavily.

GUARD—This could be the biggest headache for Coaches Self and Weeks. The only proven performer at guard is Bucky Beaver, a senior with 3 letters. Junior Butch Wear and sophomore Don Creasy will probably battle it out on the other side of the line. Red-shirted freshmen Ken Rutland and Jimmy Roberts also could be valuable with game experience.

CENTER—Although there are only two men with any experience at all at this position, it should be well handled. Jim Blair and Tommy Wyatt, both juniors, are real work horses and should have little trouble with the center of the line.

QUARTERBACK—No lettermen return to this position. There are, however, some fine looking prospects. At the end of spring training Gilmore Brannon was leading the pack of hopefuls. Behind Brannon is freshman Lewis Dyer, a promising redshirt from last fall, and sophomore Leland Dishman, a transfer from Austin Peay State College.

TAILBACK—This is a vital position in Florence State's single wing offense. Senior Steve Logan will probably get the starting nod. Behind him are transfer Doyle Hill and Dave Kirk, both sophomores. Both Hill and Logan are known at FSC for their passing abilities and both run well.

FULLBACK—There should be no problem here. With lettermen Gus Garrard and H. L. Robinson returning, plus a transfer from the University of Alabama, Ronny Davis, this position should have plenty of strength and depth.

WINGBACK—Returning at wingback is last year's leading pass receiver, Ernest Breland, who is only a sophomore. With him will be Butch Toner, a junior with plenty of experience.

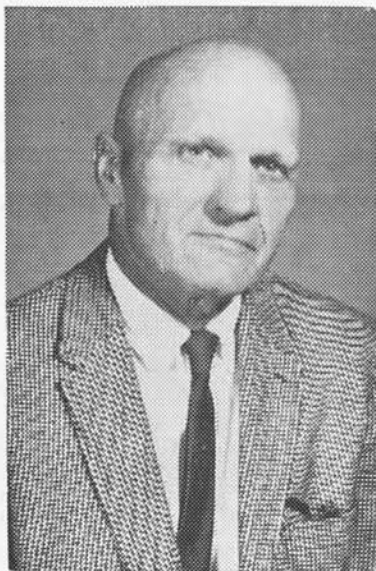

H. A. FLOWERS
Athletic Director

H. A. (Eddie) Flowers, an avid sports fan and a dedicated teacher, heads the Athletic Department at Florence State. In 1948 Mr. Flowers gave up coaching to take the full time responsibilities of Director of Athletics and since that time the athletic program at FSC has grown by leaps and bounds.

Mr. Flowers graduated from Auburn University in 1926 and came to Florence in 1929. He was head basketball coach from 1945 to 1948, running up a total of 31 wins against only 14 losses while enjoying three winning seasons.

Flowers was a leader in the movement which resulted in the re-establishment of football at FSC in 1949. At that time Hal Self and George Weeks were

brought in to coach the Lion gridders. In those 14 years of football Florence State has run up 84 wins with 45 losses and three ties. In 1960 Florence State joined the Alabama Collegiate Conference. In 1960 and 1961 the Lions took the ACC grid crown and in 1962 tied with Jacksonville State for top honors. Florence has yet to lose an ACC football game, with the only blemish a 7-7 tie with Jacksonville State in 1962.

Mr. Flowers has worked diligently to develop fine athletic teams which participate in intercollegiate football, basketball, baseball, tennis, golf, track, and rifle competition.

Mr. Flowers is also chairman of the physical education department at FSC. In this capacity he shares the college's pride in the large number of outstanding coaches, more than 80, that it has supplied to the high schools of the North Alabama area.

HENRY H. SELF
Head Football Coach

Coach Hal Self came to Florence State in 1949 when football was re-established. Since that time his gridiron teams have enjoyed 12 winning seasons and have an overall record of 84-45-3.

Coach Self is known for his successful use of the single wing offense which he learned from Frank Thomas while playing at the University of Alabama. In 1945 Self quarterbacked the Crimson Tide to a perfect season, climaxed by a 34-14 win over Southern California in the Rose Bowl. For his fine performance during the 1945 season he received the Jacobs Trophy, given to the best blocker in the Southeastern Conference.

Upon graduation from Alabama in 1946 Self became head football coach at Athens High School where he enjoyed great success. He came to Florence from Athens High School. Self is married to the former Shirley Williams of Decatur, and is the father of two boys and a girl. Between football seasons he enjoys gardening and golf.

GEORGE E. WEEKS
Line Coach

Coach George Weeks came to Florence State with Hal Self in 1949 and together they have consistently produced winning teams.

Weeks played his college football at the University of Alabama where he was an end. He played in Alabama's 29-21 victory over Texas A & M in the 1942 Cotton Bowl.

After graduating from Alabama in 1942 Weeks signed with the Brooklyn Football Dodgers, with whom he enjoyed several fine seasons as a defensive sideback.

During World War II Weeks was a captain in the Army, serving as a special services officer and winning high esteem for his work with service personnel.



REINSTITUTION OF FOOTBALL AT FLORENCE STATE

Football was re-established at Florence State College in 1949, after an absence of twenty-one years.

Dr. E. B. Norton had become president at Florence State a year earlier. He was convinced that the college had an obligation to supply well-trained athletic coaches to the public schools of North Alabama, and that in order to do so a complete athletic program should be an integral part of the over-all Florence State program.

Henry H. (Hal) Self, head football coach at Athens High School, was immediately chosen to be head coach of the newly formed gridiron Lions.

George E. Weeks was named assistant coach.

The overall record speaks well of the coaching team's abilities. In fourteen years of football Florence State has compiled 84 victories and 45 defeats with three ties. There have been only two losing seasons, one of which was in 1949 and the other in 1958. Both of the seasons show 4-5 records.

In 1960 the four state supported colleges—Florence State, Troy State, Jacksonville State, and Livingston State—formed the Alabama Collegiate Conference. The Lions won the conference crown in 1960 and 1961. Last year they shared the title with Jacksonville State. The only blemish on the Lions' record in nine conference games since the formation of the ACC is a 7-7 tie with Jacksonville State which came in the first game of the 1962 season.

THE COLLEGE

Florence State College is a lineal descendant of LaGrange College, established in 1830 under the first college charter granted by the state of Alabama.

In 1872, LaGrange College, by then renamed Wesleyan University, was given to the state and re-chartered as State Normal School, the first such institution in the South. It was one of the first institutions in the nation to admit women on a co-educational basis.

In 1929 it became a four year teacher's college in elementary education. In 1939 it was authorized to prepare teachers for the secondary schools, and in 1947 came the decision to grant the A.B. and B.S. degrees in fields other than education.

In 1957 a Master of Arts degree program was established, and the name was changed from Florence State Teachers College to Florence State College, since Florence State had become a general liberal arts college.

Since World War II Florence State has been growing steadily, and enrollment is expected to exceed 2000 this fall. This would show an increase of more than 1200 students during the past seven years.

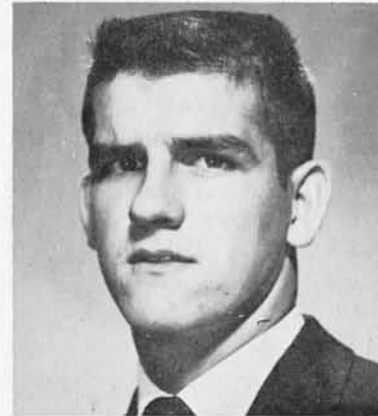

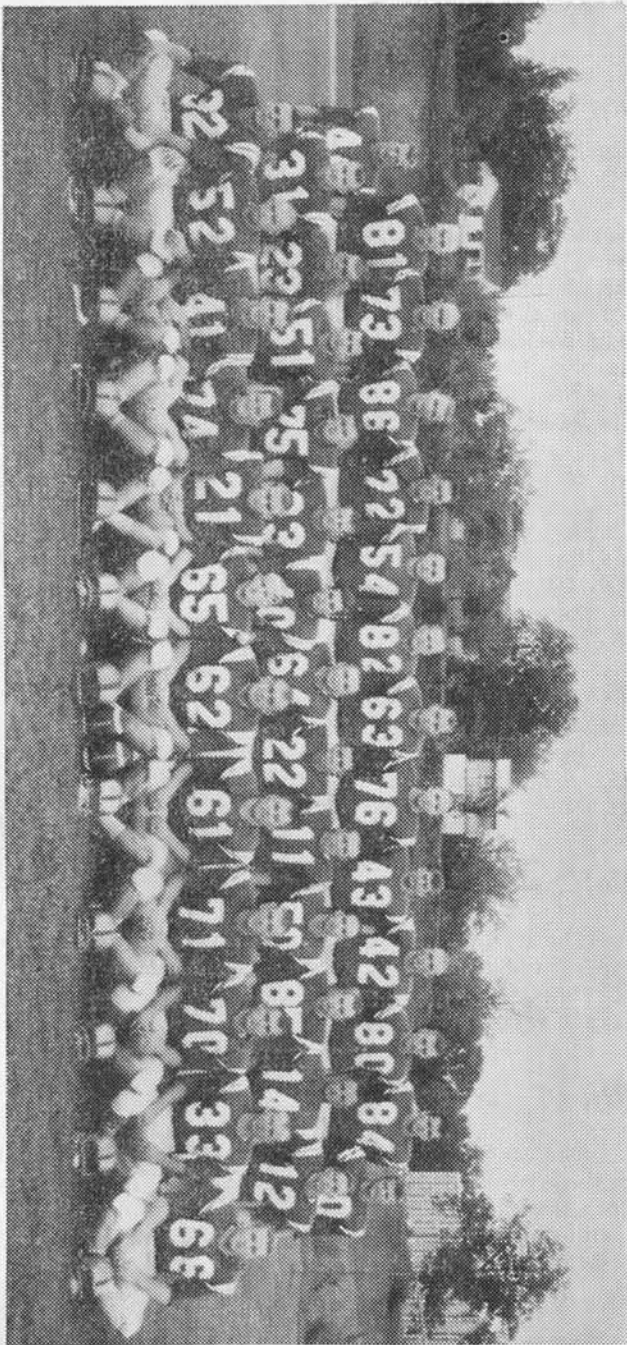
Rifle Team
