1964 Prospectus

The success of the 1964 edition of the Florence State Lions depends greatly upon the adaptability of the majority of the returning lettermen, mostly juniors and sophomores, to the new Winged-T offense. There is only one senior in the backfield and four on the line.

Position Outlook

END—Two junior lettermen return here with proven experience. They are Ray Hester and Don Allison. However, sophomore Ronnie Ellison is a real sharpie on offense and could turn into a brilliant performer.

TACKLE—Three junior lettermen provide good experience at this position. Paul Cooper, Lester Dawson and Jim Carringer all have good size and speed.

GUARD—The guard position has many uncertainties. Even though there are three monogram winners at this position, dependability relies on junior Don Creasy and seniors Butch Wear and Ken Townley. Townley was not in school in 1963 but was the Most Valuable Lineman in 1962.

CENTER—Probably the strongest position on the team with three experienced returnees. With two senior lettermen here in Jim Blair and Most Valuable Lineman of 1963 Tommy Wyatt, no problem should exist. Sophomore Cecil Thompson, also a letterman, can be counted on in the event of any crisis.

QUARTERBACK—Since changing to the Winged-T offense this season, the quarterback slot has become most important to the performance of the Lions. Two very talented lettermen will compete for the starting nod. Last year's Most Valuable Back, Doyle Hill, a junior, has a reputation for his passing ability. However, sophomore Johnny Bailey is pressing closely and has the potential to be among the best in the conference.

TAILBACK—The mysterious position on the club. Who will come through to man this vital position? Sophomore letterman Dave Kirk, a standout as a freshman in 1962, could return this season after an absence last year and do a terrific job. Another sophomore letterman who could capture the unclaimed position is Ray Quinn, a fullback in 1963.

FULLBACK—Fullback is in good shape for there are four lettermen returning here. Included are senior Ronny Davis, junior H. L. Robinson, and sophomores Gilmore Brannon and Lewis Dyer. All have the size and speed to make this position a real asset to the Lion backfield.

WINGBACK—There should be no problem here. Back again is all ACC Ernest Breland, a junior, and Barry Jones, also a junior. Both are lettermen.

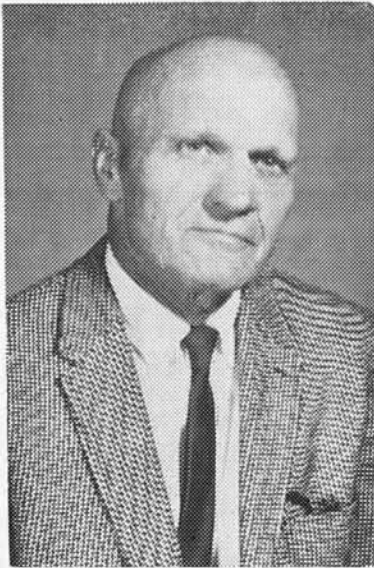

Athletic Director

H. A. (Eddie) Flowers, an avid sports fan and a dedicated teacher, is director of the athletic department at Florence State. Flowers became Athletic Director in 1948. Since then a full athletic program has been established at the college.

In 1949 Coach Flowers led in the movement to re-institute football at FSC. At that time Hal Self and George Weeks were secured to head the grid-iron Lions and for a decade and a half FSC has compiled and impressive 87-50-5 record.

In 1960 Florence State joined the Alabama Collegiate Conference. In 1960 and 1961 the Lions took the ACC grid crown and in 1962 and 1963 tied with Jacksonville State for top honors. Although FSC has never lost a

conference game, the Lions have had two ties with the only conference crown winner, Jacksonville State. One tie in each of the seasons of 1962 and 1963 are the only blemishes in ACC competition.

Working closely with the Athletic Committee, administration, and individual coaches, Flowers had developed an outstanding overall program. Florence State participates in intercollegiate football, basketball, baseball, tennis, track, golf and small bore rifle competition.

Flowers also is chairman of the physical education department at FSC. In this capacity he shares the college's pride in the fact that it has supplied almost 100 outstanding coaches to the high schools of the North Alabama area.

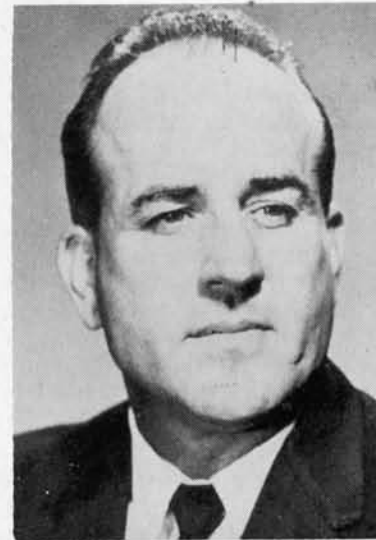

Head Football Coach



Coach Hal Self came to Florence State in 1949 as Head Football Coach. In the 15 years since, his teams have enjoyed 12 winning seasons and have compiled an impressive overall record of 87 wins, 50 losses, and 5 ties.

Coach Self learned his trade from one of the master teachers of the single wing art, playing at the University of Alabama under the great Frank Thomas. Coach Self quarterbacked the Crimson Tide to a resounding 34-14 win over Southern California in the 1945 Rose Bowl game.

In 1945 Self was called by many the best blocker in college football. He was the man who

opened up the gaps for All-American Harry Gilmer. For his fine performance during the 1945 season he received the Jacobs Trophy, given to the best blocker in the Southeastern Conference.

Self graduated in 1946 and took a job as head football coach at Athens High School, leaving that position to come to Florence in 1949 when Florence State resumed football after a lapse of 21 years.

Self is married to the former Shirley Williams of Decatur, and is the father of two boys and a girl.



GEORGE E. WEEKS

Line Coach



The developer of Florence State's line since 1949 has been big former professional football star George Weeks.

Many a star Florence lineman has benefited from the able coaching and careful guidance given by Coach Weeks. Probably the best example of his coaching is Harlon Hill, who went directly into the tough pro ranks from Florence State. Hill was Rookie of the Year and a member of the All-Pro Team in 1954. He starred for years for the Chicago Bears, and later as a flanker with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Weeks played his college football at the University of Alabama where he was an end. He played in Alabama's 29-21 victory over Texas A & M in the 1942 Cotton Bowl.

After graduating from Alabama in 1942, Weeks signed with the Brooklyn Football Dodgers, with whom he enjoyed several fine seasons as a defensive sideback.

During World War II Weeks was a captain in the Army, serving as a special services officer and winning high esteem for his work with service personnel.



REINSTITUTION OF FOOTBALL

AT FLORENCE STATE

Football was re-established at Florence State College in 1949, after an absence of 21 years.

Dr. E. B. Norton had become president at Florence State a year earlier. He was convinced that the college had an obligation to supply well-trained athletic coaches to the public schools of North Alabama, and that in order to do so a complete athletic program should be an integral part of the over-all Florence State program.

Henry H. (Hal) Self, head football coach at Athens High School, was chosen to be head coach of the newly formed gridiron Lions. George E. Weeks was named assistant coach.

The over-all record speaks well of the coaching team's abilities. In fifteen years of football Florence State has compiled 87 victories and 50 defeats with five ties. There have been only three losing seasons, one in 1949, one in 1958, and one in 1963. The 1949 and 1958 seasons both showed records of 4-5, and the 1963 season finished at 3-5-2.

In 1960, the four state-supported colleges—Florence State, Jacksonville State, Livingston State, and Troy State—formed the Alabama Collegiate Conference. The Lions won the conference crown in 1960 and 1961. They shared the crown with Jacksonville State in 1962 and 1963. The only two blemishes on the Lions' record in 12 conference games since the formation of the ACC are a 7-7 tie with Jacksonville State in the 1962 season and a 0-0 tie with Jacksonville in 1963.

THE COLLEGE

Florence State College is a linear descendant of LaGrange College, established in 1830 under the first college charter granted by the state of Alabama.

In 1855, LaGrange College was incorporated as Wesleyan University and, in 1872, was established as State Normal School, the first such institution in the South. It was one of the first institutions in the nation to admit women on a co-educational basis.

In 1929 it became a State Teacher's College with a four-year curriculum in elementary education. In 1939 it was authorized to prepare teachers for the secondary schools, and in 1947 came the decision to grant the A.B. and B.S. degrees in fields other than education.

In 1957 a Master of Arts degree program was established and the name was changed from Florence State Teachers College to Florence State College, reflecting more accurately the multipurpose nature of the institution.

Since World War II Florence State has been growing steadily, and enrollment is expected to exceed 2000 this fall.

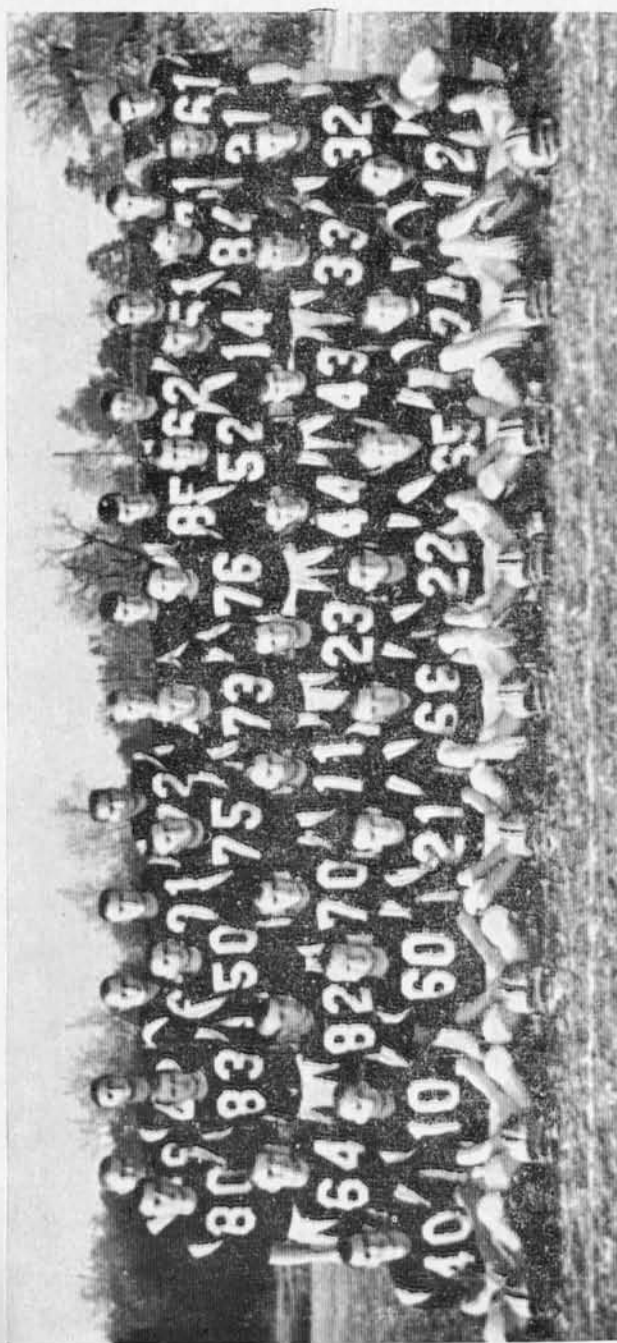

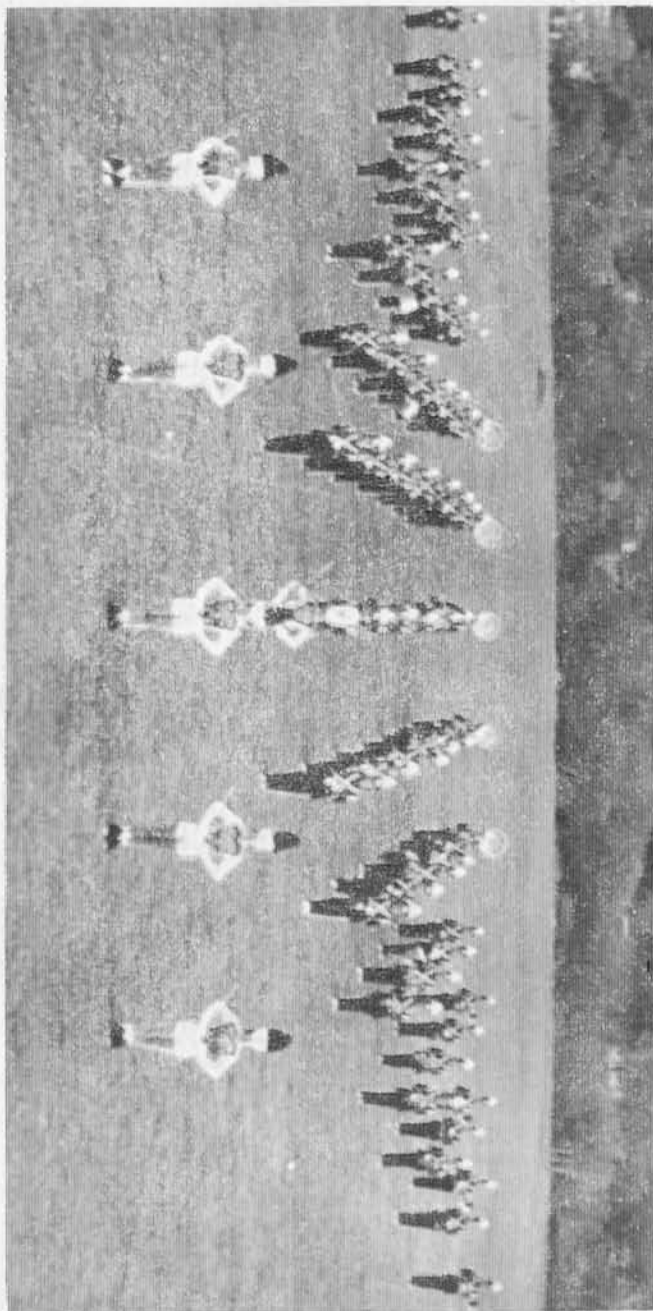
