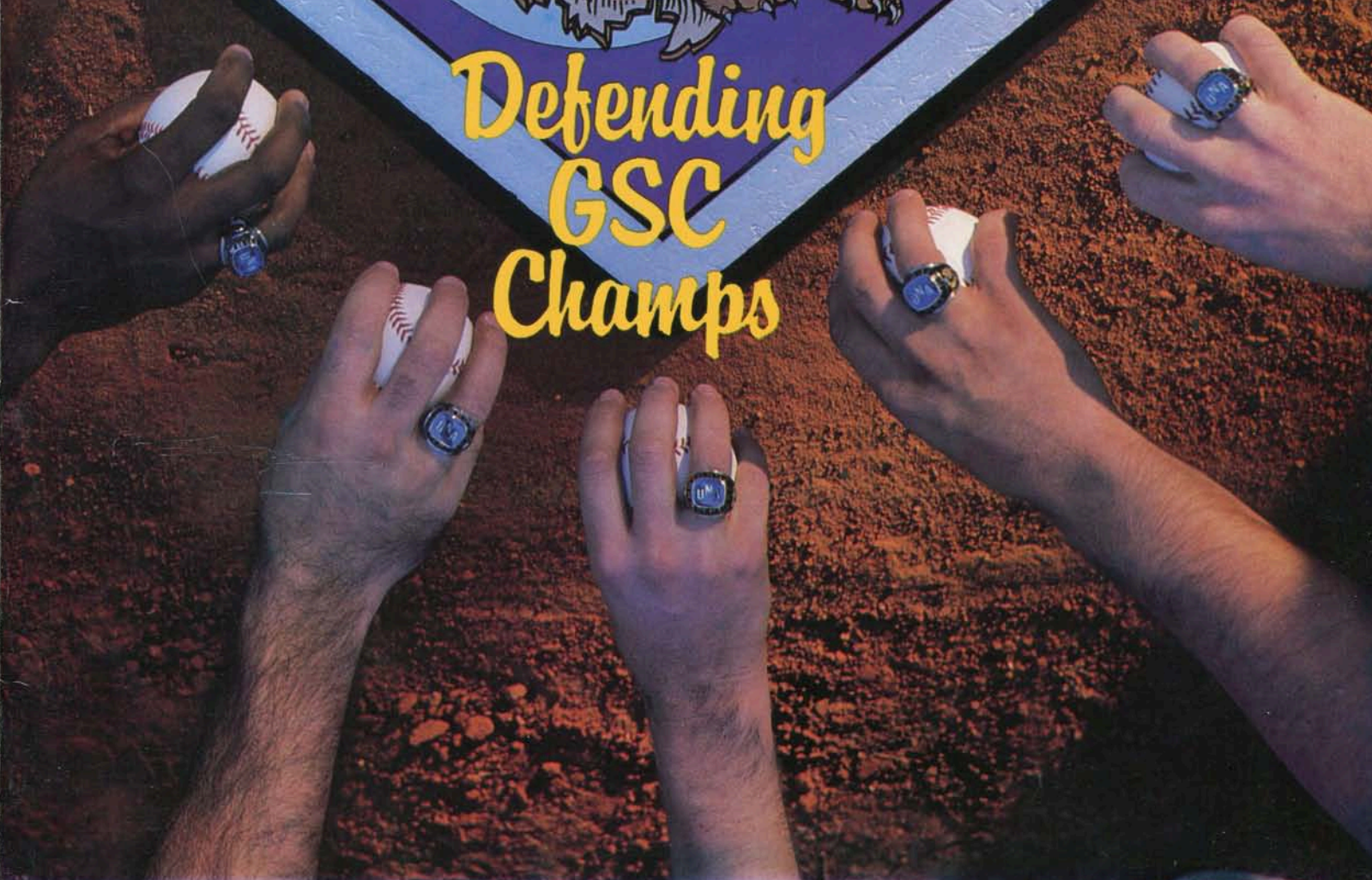

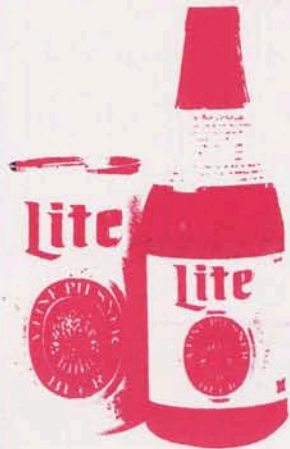

The University of North Alabama

UNA TODAY

The University of North Alabama, established in 1872 as the first state teachers' college south of the Ohio River, has developed into a regional university providing quality educational opportunities for students from the three-state region of Alabama, Tennessee and Mississippi.

The Gourman Report, which ranks the nation's universities, selected UNA as one of the better schools in Alabama. Of the 26 schools rated in the state, UNA was ranked first behind Alabama's five doctoral degree-granting institutions.

Using the Gourman criteria, UNA, if located in any of the other 53 U.S. territories or states, would rank first in five states, second in 12, third in 13, fourth in 10 and fifth in one. Gourman ranked UNA first among Gulf South Conference schools.

UNA's academic role has expanded through the years. Bachelor's degrees are offered in majors in various areas of arts and sciences, business, education and nursing. Pre-professional preparation for medicine, dentistry, optometry, podiatry, pharmacy, law, agriculture and forestry, engineering, veterinary medicine, medical technology and other allied health professions is offered. Various master's degrees are offered in the education and business fields.

UNA is the first major university to offer a four-year degree program in commercial music. Majors have interned in record industry offices in Nashville, Memphis, New York, Los Angeles, London and nearby Muscle Shoals. UNA is one of 11 schools nationwide offering an undergraduate degree in industrial hygiene. Foreign language, nursing and science students also have opportunities to study abroad.

Various centers have been established at UNA to serve its constituency. Operated by faculty and staff, they give undergraduate and graduate students excellent opportunities for research and public service.

UNA works closely with various southern universities and many local, state and federal agencies on a myriad of projects and activities.

Supporting the faculty are the extensive resources of the Collier Library system, a federal records depository. It is computerized and tied into various library loan and research networks.

UNA students excel in academics, student activities and athletics. Often they are recognized nationally for their achievements in specific areas.

UNA's alumni are equally successful. Among them are a Pulitzer Prize winner for literature, two Alabama governors, a Texas governor, numerous U.S. Congressmen, thousands of educators, and a special assistant to the President of the United States on economic affairs.



Other alumni include a Chase Manhattan Bank vice-president, the author (first cousin of Mark Twain) of a Civil War novel and the first Western novel, a Hollywood movie executive, network television actors and actresses, a National Football League Rookie of the Year and the first Jim Thorpe winner (for most valuable player), numerous doctors and lawyers and an

Alabama Public Service Commission president.

Also included in the list are hit songwriters and record producers, an internationally-renowned sculptor, a nationally-recognized portrait artist, more than 30 professional football and baseball players, numerous ministers and many businessmen and industrialists.



INTERIM PRESIDENT Robert L. Potts

On November 15, the UNA Board of Trustees announced the appointment of Robert L. Potts as the interim president of the university.

Potts, a Harvard Law School graduate, has served as general counsel of the University of Alabama system since 1984. From 1973 to 1983, he served as the attorney for UNA.

In accepting the position, Potts said, "My decision to serve as interim president was prompted by my commitment to aca-

demical excellence and my desire to serve an educational institution whose growth and progress is so vital to northwest Alabama and the entire state, as well as the tri-state region."

Potts, 45 graduated from Coffee High School in Florence, attended Newbold College in England and received a B.A. degree cum laude from Southern Missionary College in Collegedale, Tenn.

He attained a Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree from the University of Alabama School of Law in 1969. There he graduated third in his class and served as Alabama Editor of The Alabama Law Review. Following a judicial clerkship, he received a Master of Laws (LL.M.) degree from Harvard University in 1971.

He has taught at Boston University Law School, the University of Alabama and UNA.

Prior to joining the University of Alabama system, he was a partner in the law firm of Potts & Young in Florence.

The Huntsville, Ala., native has served on the boards of trustees of Alabama State University in Montgomery and Oakwood College in Huntsville.

Presently, Potts is president of The Alabama Higher Education Loan Corporation and a member of the Board of Managers of the National Conference of Bar Examiners. He has served as chairman of the Alabama Board of Bar Examiners.

Potts and his wife Irene are the parents of two children.

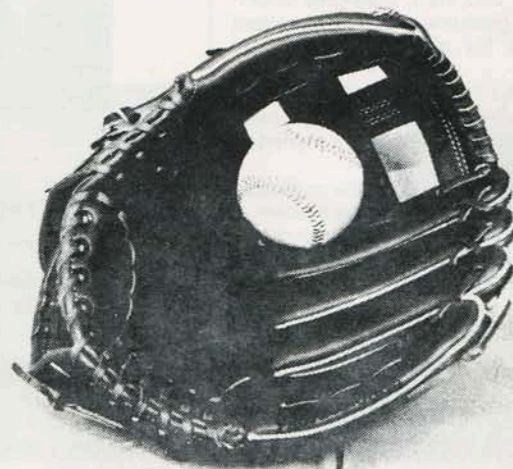

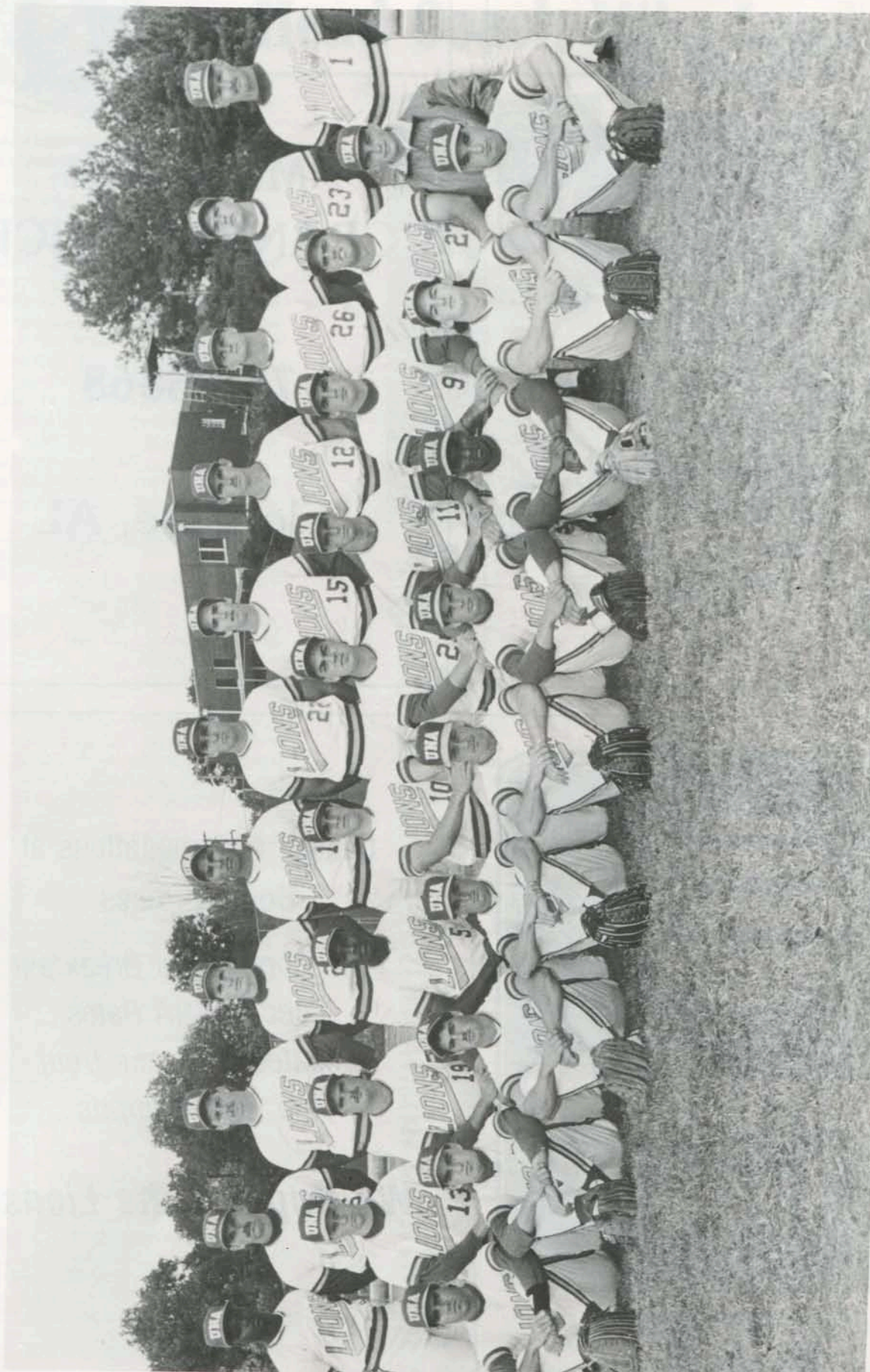

Head Coach Mike Lane

Mike Lane has transformed the University of North Alabama baseball program into one of the nation's most consistent winners in just six years at a school that hadn't produced a winning season in seven years prior to his arrival.

Lane has won 221 games, averaged almost 37 wins per season, won 40 games or more three times, won two Gulf South Conference championships and taken the Lions to four NCAA regionals since his arrival in 1983. He now has UNA primed to continue that success story in 1990.

Lane led his first UNA squad to a 28-24-1 record and the first Gulf South Conference baseball championship in school history in 1984.

In 1985, the Lions went 46-11-1, finished the regular-season ranked No. 2 nationally in Division II and played in the NCAA Central Region Tournament for the second straight year.

A No. 17 national ranking and a 34-16-1 record awaited in 1986

That was followed with a 40-13-1 mark in 1987 for the second most wins in school history. The Lions also had a 21-2-1 record at home for the best home record ever at UNA.

A fifth straight winning season came in 1988 with a 29-16-1 mark, then UNA jumped back into the national picture with a 44-11 finish in 1989 that included the GSC championship and another NCAA playoff berth.

The Lions have a remarkable 111-30-2 record at home in Lane's six years at the school.

After receiving his B.S. degree from Kearney State College in Nebraska in 1974 in Administration and Physical Education, Lane served as an assistant at Georgia Southern University in 1976 and 1977 and received his Masters' degree in Education.

In 1978, Lane went to Yavapai Junior College as an assistant and helped lead the school to a runner-up spot in the national championships.

In 1979, he became head coach at Cochise Community College in Arizona and took a squad that had had four consecutive losing seasons and made two trips to the Arizona Junior College Playoffs. Lane's last four squads at Cochise won 24 games or more.

Since his arrival at UNA, Lane has twice been named GSC Coach of the Year - in 1984 and 1989. He has produced 15 first-team All-GSC performers and five All-Americans, in addition to numerous players who have gone on to compete in professional baseball.

Student Assistant Coach

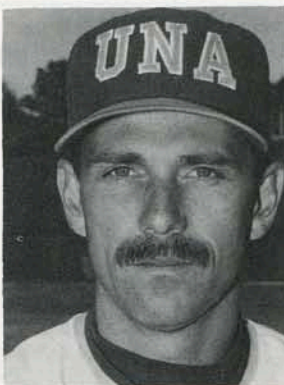
In his second year as a student assistant coach with the Lions, Mike Keehn has a wealth of playing and coaching experience and played a key role in helping the Lions to one of the best seasons in school history in 1989.

An infielder at Kearney State College, where he earned honorable mention All-America honors, Keehn was drafted and signed by the Texas Rangers organization.

After a stint in the minor leagues, he went to coach at Kansas City, Kan., Community College from 1985-88. He helped direct KCCC to a 120-36 record over those three seasons with two Jayhawk Conference championships and two district runner-up finishes.

In 1988 he came to North Alabama and in his first season with the Lions he helped was a part of his third straight championship team as UNA went 44-11 and won the Gulf South Conference crown. The Lions then advanced to the NCAA regionals for the fourth time in six years.

Keehn received his B.A. in education with a double major in Physical Education and Business from Kearney State.

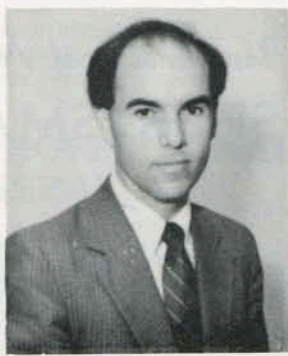

1990 Lion Baseball

LIGHTS, CAMERAS, ACTION . . .

University of North Alabama baseball has come a long way in its six seasons under Mike Lane and will take even greater strides entering the 1990 season.

Now UNA baseball has it all - lights, cameras and plenty of action.

For the first time the Lions and University Field will host night baseball this season with the installation of a new lighting system.

There is also a new scoreboard so Lion fans can track the squad's success.

Improvements to the field, dugouts and grandstand have been made as well.

Those improvements are a direct result of the type program Lane has established at North Alabama.

In 1984, in the Lions first season under Lane, UNA won its first Gulf South Conference baseball crown in school history.

The following season the Lions finished second in the NCAA rankings, posting 46 wins, and made their second straight NCAA appearance.

In 1987 UNA went 40-13 and reached the regionals for the third time in four years.

Then last season, with a 44-11 mark, UNA not only played in its fourth regional, but played host for the first time at University Field as record crowds jammed the three-day event.

That ability to host was the result of the vast improvements that University Field has undergone over the last six years.

LIONS ON TELEVISION

UNA baseball also has great visibility with the Mike Lane Baseball Show.

The show is an hour-long feature that airs weekly throughout north Alabama, southern Tennessee and northwest Mississippi and includes highlights of Lion home games, interviews with UNA players and coaches, teaching clinics and more.

The Lane Show is one of the few weekly televised shows in collegiate baseball.

AND PLENTY OF ACTION

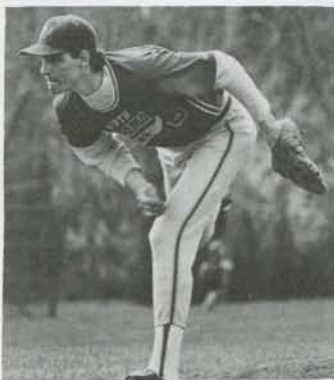
And with the lights and cameras, there is plenty of action with North Alabama baseball.

The Lions have averaged 37 wins per season under Mike Lane and have won an incredible 78 percent of their games at University Field with a 106-28-2 record. And virtually every school baseball record, both team and individual, has been established over the last six seasons - including what was then a national stolen base mark of 260 in 1985.

Numerous Lions have advanced to the professional ranks and the program continues to gain national attention.

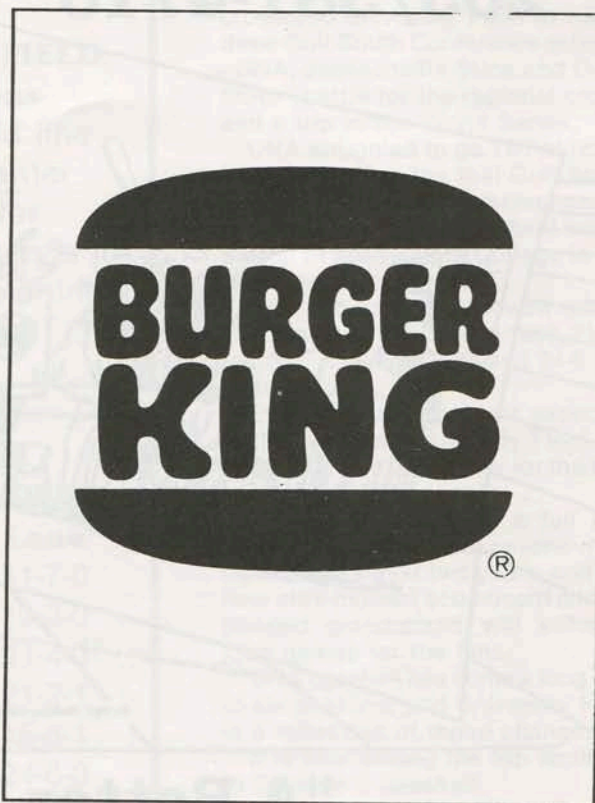

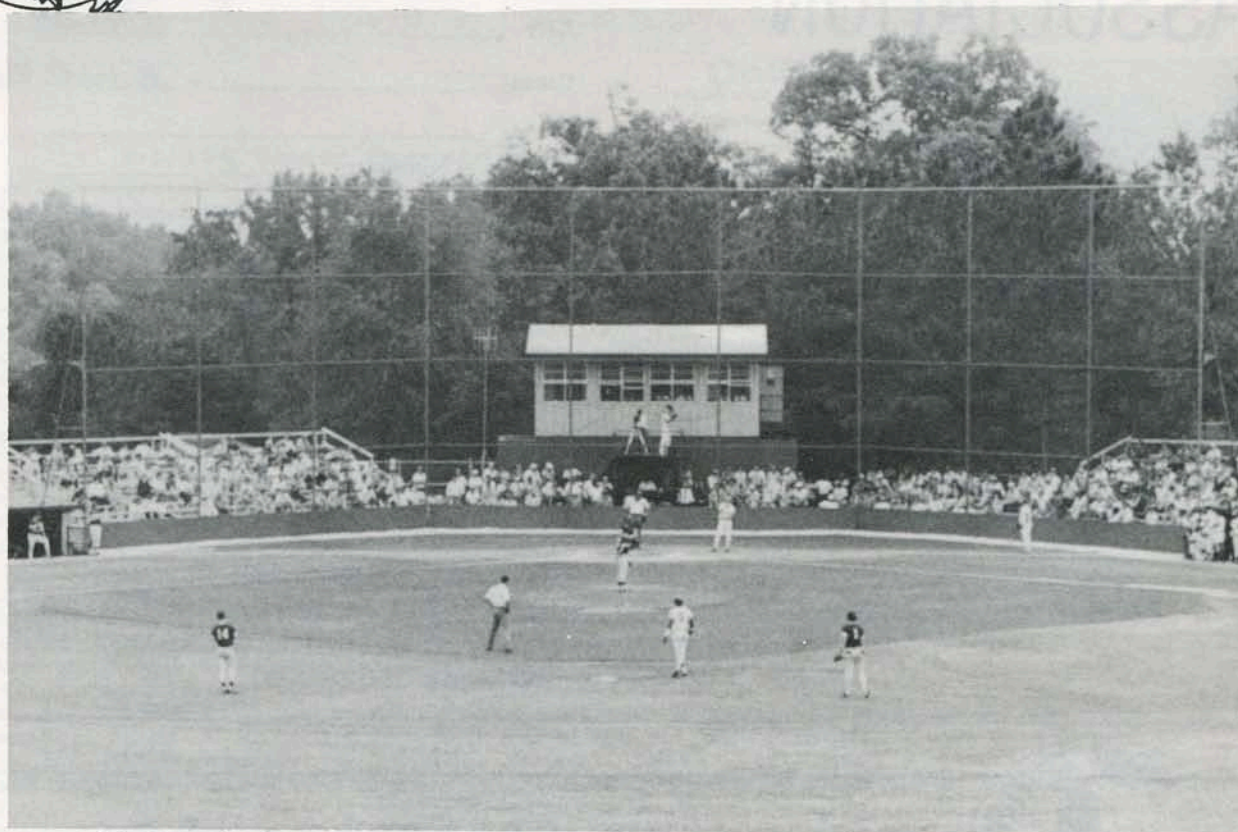

Since Mike Lane's arrival at the University of North Alabama in 1983, University Field has taken on an entirely different look, with overwhelming results.

Among the additions the UNA baseball program has seen are a new modern press-box, scoreboard, lights and grand-stand - in addition to a vastly improved playing field.

And the home atmosphere of University Field has in turn proved beneficial to the Lions' play as UNA has won an incredible 78.3 percent of its games at home over the last six seasons. Since 1983-84 UNA has posted a 111-30-2 record at home, including a 24-6 mark at University Field in 1989.

Those impressive records at home have been crucial in Lane's ability to turn the Lions' program into one of the most consistent winners in the country. UNA has won 221 games since Lane's arrival for an average of 36.8 wins per season, and the Lions have participated in the NCAA playoffs in four of the last six seasons.

In 1989 UNA hosted its first NCAA baseball event and drew record

crowds to University Field to watch three Gulf South Conference schools - UNA, Jacksonville State and Delta State - battle for the regional crown and a trip to the World Series.

UNA struggled to go 11-7 at home in 1984 but won the first Gulf South Conference baseball championship in school history on the field with a sweep of Mississippi College in the championship round.

That record was followed with a 19-3 mark in 1985, 21-4 in 1986, 21-2-1 in 1987, 15-8-1 in 1988 and 24-6 last season.

Even greater things are expected in the future as University Field will begin night baseball play for the first time in the 1990 season.

The Lions also have a full tarp which has prevented several rain-outs over the last two years, and the new ultra-modern scoreboard and expanded grand-stand will enhance Lion games for the fans.

UNA baseball has come a long way in six seasons, and University Field is a reflection of those changes.

It is now among the top facilities in Division II baseball.

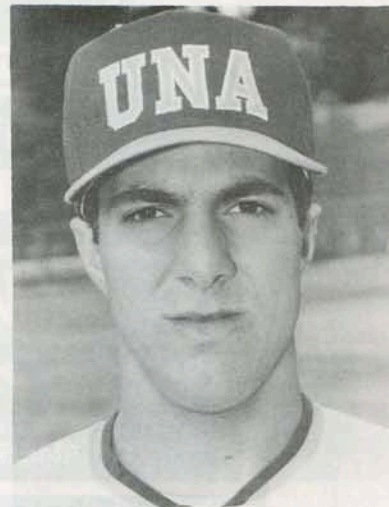

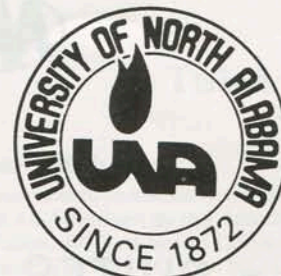

Also chosen for the All-South Central Region Tournament team. Finished 17th in the NCAA Division II in batting average. 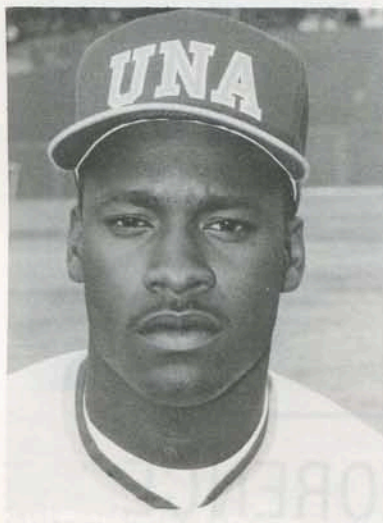

UNA: Hit .306 in 49 games last season. Had 45 hits and scored 35 runs while driving in 24. He was successful on 13 of 13 stolen base attempts and hit two home runs. The first was a two-run shot against Sienna Heights on March 2. The other was a grand-slam in a 14-5 Gulf South Conference Tournament opening win over Jacksonville State. It was one of three grand slams hit by UNA last season. Hit .294 in the GSC Tournament with five hits and eight RBI. He was named to the NCAA South Central Region All-Tournament team with three hits, two walks, two runs scored and two stolen bases. Brown had five sacrifice bunts. His only game-winning hit came in a 6-3 victory over Union. Playing primarily left field in 1989, he had an .859 fielding percentage with eight errors in 57 chances. 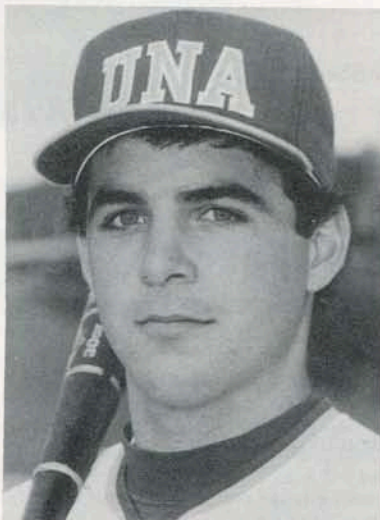
MIKE BURNS

UNA: Burns shattered all existing UNA season home run and runs batted in marks last season with 17 homers and 69 RBI. Was named third-team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association. Also All-GSC Western Division, All-Gulf South Conference and first-team All-South Central Region. His 17 homers smashed the mark of 11 set by J.D. Ramirez in 1987 and Jim Carlo in 1980. In just one season he has placed himself only five homers shy of the UNA career mark of 22 set by Carlo. Burns' 69 RBI was 10 better than Ramirez' mark of 59 in 1987. Burns 130 total bases also broke Ramirez' record of 120 in 1987. He also led UNA in runs scored in 1989 with 59 and in hits with 63. His 16 doubles was second on the team and he was successful on 18-of-19 stolen base attempts. Finished 10th in the NCAA Division II in runs batted in and 11th in home runs. Had a .695 slugging percentage to go with a .337 batting average. Led the Lions with nine game-winning RBI. Began the season with a 1-for-12 slump through four games, then went 21-for-37 over the next nine games with eight homers and 22 runs batted in. He was named GSC Player of the Week for April 16 with a 9-for-17 showing that included three homers and seven RBI. Against the Lions major Division I opponents (Middle Tennessee, Austin Peay, Nicholls State, McNeese State) he hit .400, going 12-for-30 with five homers and 11 RBI. Hit one of the team's three grand-slam homers of the year in a 14-5 win over Sienna Heights. Hit two homers and drove in five runs in a 6-3 win at Middle Tennessee. Had game-winning RBI in the final innings of both games of a double-header sweep at Austin Peay. Slumped late in the season, hitting just .167 in the GSC Tournament (3-for-18) and was 1-for-11 in the NCAA regional with a homer and two RBI. Had an .885 fielding percentage in his first season ever at third base with 18 errors in 156 chances. Started all 55 games, 54 at third base and one as a designated hitter. UNA: Led the Gulf South Conference in batting average and in virtually every other category when he was sidelined for the final 23 games of the year with a broken thumb. Still set UNA school records for batting average in a season at .455, slugging percentage in a season at .818 and on-base percentage in a season at .568. Set a new UNA record with a 23-game hitting streak that is still active entering the 1990 season due to the NCAA baseball rules which stipulate "a consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt." Smith was hit by a pitch against Union on April 3 in his first at-bat in the 24th game of the streak and could not return. The old UNA mark of 22 was set by Benny Hale in 1972. He also tied the Gulf South Conference record of 23 set by Daniel Hayes of West Georgia in 1984. Smith was named to the All-GSC Western Division team and was a second-team All-South Central Region pick. Had 45 hits in just 99 at bats with 25 runs batted in, 46 runs scored and 21 extra-base hits in only 32 games. Hit safely in 30 of 31 games with that lone exception an 0-for-3 performance in the eighth game of the season against Sienna Heights. Opened the year with a seven-game hitting streak. Was successful on 17 of 20 stolen base attempts. Drew 25 bases on balls and struck-out only seven times. Had two game-winning RBI and still finished as the GSC leader in triples with five, despite missing almost half the season. Had two homers against Sienna Heights and one each against Nicholls State, Livingston and Delta State. Played both outfield and shortstop and had a .917 fielding percentage with six errors in 72 chances. Hit .500 (8 of 16) against Division I opponents Middle Tennessee State, Nicholls State and McNeese State with six runs scored, and was .371 in GSC games (13 of 35) with 10 runs scored, eight runs batted in and six extra-base hits. **HIGH SCHOOL:** Played outfield at Conestoga Valley High School under Coach Edward Rand. The Buckskins were Lancaster-Lebanon League champions in 1986 and were district runner-up in the 1985 state playoffs. Chosen Offensive MVP in 1985 and was a league All-Star in 1985 and 1987. Championship Year In Review

1989 LIONS PULL TOGETHER ... PULL OUT A CHAMPIONSHIP



There were rainy days for the University of North Alabama baseball team in 1989, but the clouds couldn't overshadow the molding Mike Lane was doing with his Lion baseball squad. And when the clouds had cleared, UNA had rolled to a 44-11 record and laid claim to the Gulf South Conference baseball crown.

With a small group of returning players, Lane combined some solid newcomers to shape a team that would be the heaviest hitting club in school history. Late in the season all nine of the Lions' starters were hitting over the .320 mark.

On the mound, the team would undergo transition, but would emerge as one of the elite groups in the NCAA Division II.

And it was especially a season of unlikely heroes who responded in the clutch.

A player who began the season in the outfield, Charlie Rogers, would combine with transfer Vic Sterlacci to shutout Jacksonville State on its home field for the league title.

Designated hitter Jimmy Renteria hit a two-out, two-strike pitch in the bottom of the final inning for a grand-slam homer to beat Mississippi College 8-7.

Rusty Smith, a freshman, playing in the top Division II baseball league in the country, became an immediate starter and tied a conference record with a 23-game hitting streak and led the league in virtually every hitting category when he was injured in the 32nd game of the year.

Individual players and the team as a whole continued to rise time and time again to meet every challenge and it was the character that emerged during the season that shaped the 1989 Lions.

The Lions weren't slowed by the loss of Smith, their leading hitter, at mid-season, and then overcame the loss of All-American outfielder Dan Bock for eight games down the stretch run that included four key GSC battles.

And once the GSC playoffs began, the Lions were primed for their second conference title since Lane arrived on campus prior to the 1984 season.

The season began and ended on a rainy note as the season opener was a day late after a heavy rain storm drenched the area. But the Lion players worked on the field until 11:30 Saturday night, and were back at 5:30 Sunday to finish the job.

A few hours later Brad Hunter and Paul Ragland shutdown Mississippi Valley State 11-0 and 10-1 to get UNA off to a 2-0 start.

The Gulf South Conference opener against Delta State followed and a 6-0 shutout at the hands of the Statesmen in the opener didn't deter the Lions as they rallied for a 6-5 win in the second game and went on to a six-game winning streak.

The Lions built character as the season progressed, coming from behind again and again in close games to pull out wins and keep on rolling.

There were Mike Burns two thunderous homers at Middle Tennessee that beat the Blue Raiders 6-3 and gave Lane his 300th win as a collegiate coach. That began a nine-game stretch where Burns hit safely in 21 of 37 at bats with eight homers and 22 runs batted in.

There was Russ Cleveland's one-hitter at Livingston.

There was the emergence of sophomore Paul Ragland who finished 9-1 on the mound, beating Jacksonville State in the GSC playoffs and dowing Delta State in the NCAA regional.

In all there were more than a dozen times the Lions rallied to win in either the sixth or seventh inning in their final at bat.

And no win was more dramatic than an 8-7 win at home against Mississippi College where the Choctaws led 7-4 in the bottom of the seventh inning with two outs and two strikes on UNA designated hitter Jimmy Renteria. But Renteria slapped that final pitch just short of the scoreboard beyond the left field fence for a grand-slam and an 8-7 Lion win.

Then there was Renteria's two-run homer with two out in the bottom of the sixth to beat Belmont 4-3.

When it came time for the GSC Tournament, Dan Bock answered the call with an incredible performance. He ripped 11 hits in 16 at bats after missing eight straight games and not even taking batting practice prior to the tournament's first game. He also scored six runs and drove in four more as he hit .688 and was named GSC Player of the Week.

UNA ripped Jacksonville State 14-5 in the opener and beat Delta State 9-5 in the second game as Jon Watkins' homer put the game on ice.

In the championship round, UNA lost an 8-6 decision to JSU but rebounded to thrash the Gamecocks 9-0 in the title game.

From there it was on to the NCAA regionals and UNA's first host opportunity.

Record crowds jammed University Field despite continuous rain that forced numerous delays in play.

UNA opened with an 8-4 win over Delta State, then lost an 8-1 game to JSU that stretched over two days because of a rain delay. The Gamecocks then held off repeated challenges for an 8-5 win in the championship game and the regional crown.

In all the 1989 Lions set more than 20 school and conference records and there were plenty of honors to go around.

First was the All-GSC squad which included second baseman Mike Madej, outfielder Dan Bock, third baseman Mike Burns and pitcher Russ Cleveland. Also named to the All-GSC Western Division team were outfielder Rusty Smith and catcher Phil Evans.

Next were All-South Central Region honors as Madej, Bock and Burns were first-team selections and Watkins, Smith, Cleveland and Ragland were second-team picks.

In the South Central Regional Tournament, Madej, Bock, Ragland and Willie Brown were all-tournament picks and Madej, Bock and Burns were All-America selections by the American Baseball Coaches Association.

Madej was named second-team All-America after hitting .378 with 53 runs scored and 30 stolen bases in 32 attempts.

Bock was also a second-team selection with a .432 batting average that included 60 hits, 52 runs scored, 45 RBI and 15 extra-base hits.

Burns, who smashed all school records for homers and RBI in a season, was a third-team pick with a .337 average, 17 home runs, 69 runs batted in, 16 doubles, 59 runs scored and 63 hits.

There were plenty of honors and plenty of heroes and a league championship to be shared by all.
