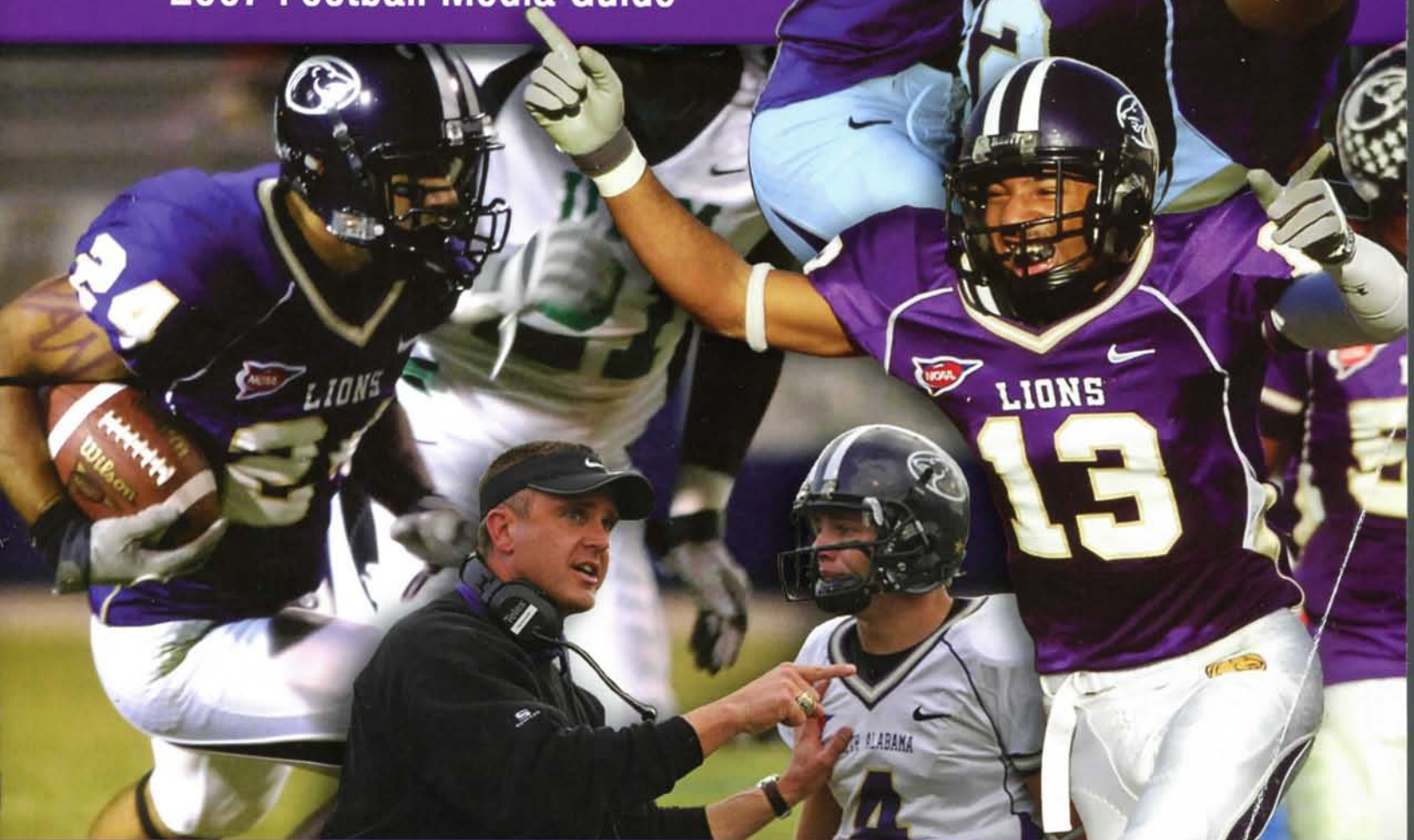

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH ALABAMA

The University of North Alabama, established in 1830 as LaGrange College, became, in 1872, the first state-supported teachers college south of the Ohio River and one of the first co-ed colleges in the nation. UNA has developed into a regional university providing quality educational opportunities for students from the three-state region of Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee.

North Alabama's academic role has expanded through the years. Bachelor's degrees are offered in majors in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, education and nursing and allied health. Pre-Professional preparation for medicine, dentistry, optometry, podiatry, pharmacy, law, agriculture and forestry, engineering, veterinary medicine, medical technology and other allied health professions is offered. Various master's degrees are offered in the arts and sciences, education and business fields.

North Alabama was the first major university to offer a four-year degree program in commercial music. Majors have interned in record industry offices in Nashville, New York, Los Angeles, London, Stockholm, and nearby Muscle Shoals. That program has since been expanded with the development of the UNA Entertainment Industry Center and the addition of an entertainment industry management major. UNA is one of 11 schools nationwide offering an undergraduate degree in industrial hygiene. Foreign language, nursing, business, and science students also have opportunities to study abroad.

Numerous faculty and staff members hold positions of distinction in various national, regional and state professional organizations. Many have written books and/or published articles in newspaper, magazines and professional journals. The *Journal of Legal Economics* is published at UNA.

Various centers have been established at North Alabama to serve its constituency. Operated by faculty and staff, they give undergraduate and graduate students opportunities for research and public services.

These centers include the Occupational and Environmental Health Laboratory. Its scientific research has attracted national and international attention in the health field. The Geographic Research Center, in cooperation with the National Geographic Society, has increased the profile of geography in the state and has opened doors for students to have hands-on participation in mapping and



demographics research for various governmental agencies. Science faculty and students teach and study marine biology-related courses at Dauphin Island Sealab near Mobile, Alabama.

North Alabama also houses the Northwest Alabama Education Research and Inservice Center, which provides inservice training for elementary and secondary educators in a six-county region. UNA has the only state university-operated kindergarten and grammar school, which affords education students a professional development laboratory experience in teaching.

Serving a nine-County region, the Small Business Development Center provides information, counseling and assistance to small businesses or to people planning to start small businesses. The Rare and Endangered Species Research Center personnel are conducting research on several endangered species in the region. The Wellness Research and Service Center studies and develops wellness, exercise, nutrition, stress management, health education counseling and environmental support programs.

The University of North Alabama works closely with various southern universities and many local, state and federal agencies on a myriad of projects and activities.

Supporting the faculty are the extensive resources of the Collier Library system, which is also a federal records depository. It is computerized and linked into various library loan research networks. Collier

Library also houses several collections, including the television and film scripts and other works of actors Dr. George Lindsey and Dr. Ernest Borgnine.

UNA has developed a national following in recent years with the development of the George Lindsey/UNA Television and Film Festival, which attracts several industry luminaries to campus.

UNA students excel in academics, student activities and athletics. Often they are recognized nationally for their achievements in specific areas. In recent years, football and basketball teams have won national championships.

UNA is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The colleges of business, education and nursing are nationally accredited, while several departments in the College of Arts and Sciences are nationally accredited.

The University of North Alabama's alumni are equally successful. Among them are a Pulitzer Prize winner for literature and one for editorial cartooning, two Alabama governors, a Texas governor, numerous members of the U.S. Congress, thousands of educators, national business and industry CEOs and internationally-renowned sculptor, a *National Geographic* photographer and special assistant to the President of the United States.

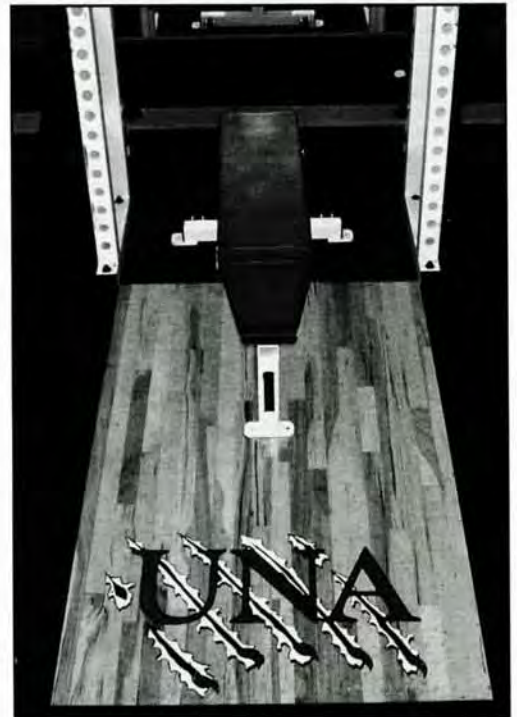

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

UNA Student-Athlete Academic Support Program

The student-athlete academic support program was established to assist student-athletes maintain focus on the proper balance of academic and athletic excellence.

Purpose:

The broad based program has been designed to insure that each student-athlete is provided the opportunity to excel in the classroom as well as in their sport. The program promotes initiative, independence and success in achieving educational, personal and social goals. There is an underlying emphasis on the development of the total person, who at the end of their collegiate career, is prepared to enter and excel in the career of their choice.

University and Department Services:

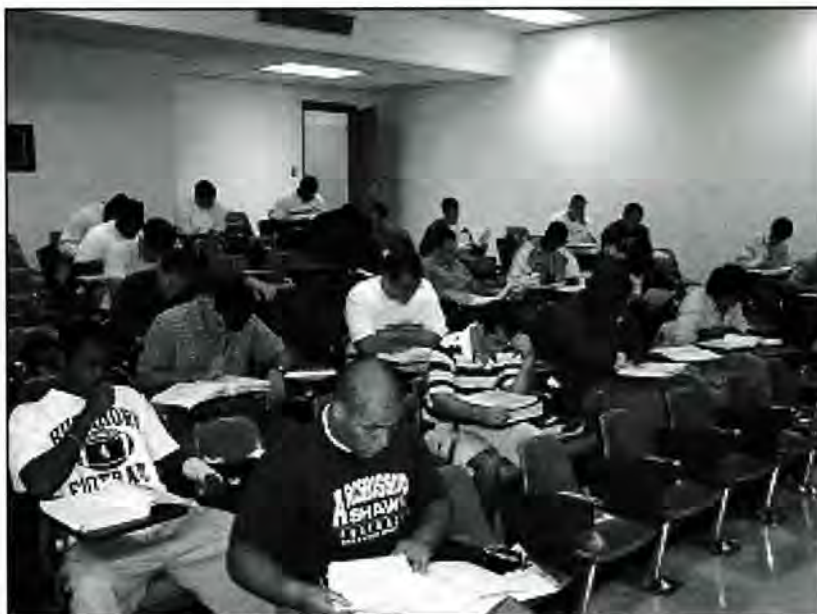
** The University of North Alabama is a comprehensive regional institution that prides itself on a strong teaching environment which includes:*

- Committed full-time professors
- Access to individual instruction
- Strong academic and career advising
- Abundant computer access
- An Academic Resource Center staffed by academic support professionals
- Free tutoring
- Assistance for those student's with learning disabilities

** Lion Athletics provides additional academic support through the direction of Sherry Kennemer (Senior Women's Administrator) and the active involvement of the entire coaching staff. Areas of additional support include:*

- A structured study lab program which offers student-athletes a controlled, structured setting where quiet studying and work can be performed. These study labs are monitored by all full-time Head and Assistant Coaches, the Senior Women's Administrator and the Director of Athletics (part-time coaches, graduate assistant coaches and student coaches are not allowed to monitor the study labs).
- Several programs offer additional study labs at the discretion of the head coach.
- Supplemental advising concerning NCAA regulations

- Class scheduling and registration
- Admissions tracking
- Progress in class performance is tracked two to three times per semester. Areas of need and appropriate assistance are identified.
- Assistance in adding and dropping courses



Study Labs:

Lion Athletics provides a structured study lab program which offers student-athletes a controlled, structured setting where quiet studying and work can be performed. These study labs are monitored by all full-time Head and Assistant Coaches, the Senior Women's Administrator and the Director of Athletics (part-time coaches, graduate assistant coaches and student coaches are not allowed to monitor the study labs). The study labs are held Monday through Thursday 7:30 – 8:45 a.m..

*** Who has access to study labs?**

- All incoming freshman (three days per week)
- All transfer student-athletes with a cumulative GPA under 2.75 (three days a week)
- All transfer student-athletes with a cumulative GPA over 2.75 (one day a week)
- Coaches may require attendance by any or all student-athletes whose cumulative GPA exceeds the minimal requirements.

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

** At the completion of the first semester of attendance at UNA:*

- Cumulative GPA equal to or greater than 2.75 – the student-athlete has the choice to attend or not attend the study labs.
- Cumulative GPA between 2.30 and 2.74 – the student-athlete attends the study lab two days per week.
- Cumulative GPA between 2.0 and 2.29 – the student-athlete attends the study lab three days per week.
- Cumulative GPA below 2.0 – the student-athlete attends the study lab four days per week.

** Basic study lab regulations:*

- Arrive on time – preferably early
- Be productive
- Work quietly

** Consequences of inappropriate behavior:*

- The head coach is directly responsible and accountable for the behavior of the student-athletes in the study lab.
- Inappropriate behavior in the study lab will provide consequences determined on a case by case basis and may include suspension from practice and/or competition.

Lion Athletics Academic Policies:

All student-athletes have an expectation to attend all classes. Lion athletics regards class attendance as paramount in ensuring academic success. Student-athletes are expected to attend every class meeting unless authorized team travel, serious injury/illness or emergency prevent attendance. This expectation includes classes which do not have a mandatory attendance policy.

All student-athletes are expected to proactively work with professors concerning missed classes and assignments caused by travel to away competitions.

Lion athletics follows the Universities academic code of conduct and reinforces that code with additional expectations.

All members of the university community are expected to be honorable and observe standards of conduct appropriate to a community of scholars. Students are expected to behave in an ethical manner. Individuals who disregard the core values of truth and honesty bring disrespect to themselves and the university.

It is in the best interest of the entire university community to sanction any individual who chooses not to accept the principles of academic honesty by committing acts such as cheating, plagiarism or misrepresentation. Offenses are reported to the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost for referral to the University Student Judicial System for disposition.

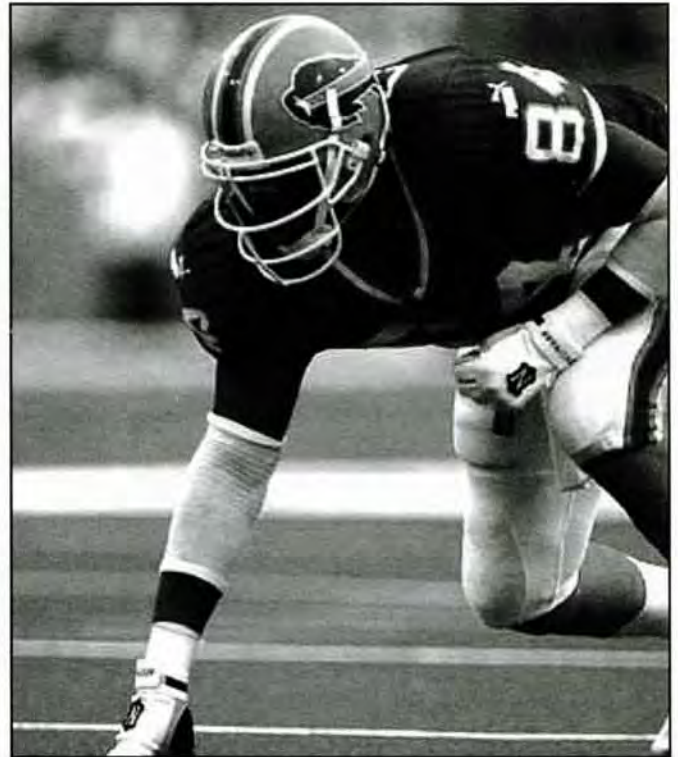

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: All requests for press, photo and broadcasting credentials for North Alabama's home football games should be made in advance (not on game day) by contacting the UNA Sports Information Office at (256) 765-4595. Passes will be mailed in advance if time permits, otherwise they will be left at gate B at Braly Municipal Stadium on the day of the game. Press parking credentials are also available upon request on a limited basis.

Credentials are issued for authorized press and workers only and do not include family members or other non-working personnel. Any violation will result in forfeiture of the issued credentials and restrictions on any future credentials.

PRESS BOX: The Braly Municipal Stadium press box is a modern facility providing comfortable viewing space for all areas of the media. The press box is to be occupied by certified working press, coaches, scouts, photographers, statisticians, support personnel, Gulf South Conference and University of North Alabama personnel working in an official capacity.

Working press is defined as official representatives of daily or weekly newspapers which publish on a regular basis,

official representatives of licensed television and radio stations which broadcast to the general public on a regular schedule and official representatives of magazines or periodicals who are covering the game for inclusion in a published article. Members of the working press are those persons described above who are on assignment to cover the game in whole or in part.

Press credentials must be shown before anyone will gain admittance to the press box or press box elevator.

- 1) Main press area for writers
- 2) Radio booths, Coaches booths, clock and scoreboard operation and public address. Sky Boxes
- 3) All television and filmers

GAME SERVICES: Media representatives covering a University of North Alabama home football game will receive game programs, media guides, pre-game notes and complete half-time and final statistics. A complete play-by-play of each game will also be distributed. Refreshments will be provided beginning approximately one hour prior to kickoff.

INTERVIEWS: All requests for interviews with UNA student-athletes should be made through the Sports Information Office by calling (256) 765-4595. UNA athletes are also routinely available for interviews following practice sessions and the UNA locker room will be open at all games, following a mandatory 10-minute cooling-off period.

LIONS FOOTBALL PROGRAM SELECTED "BEST IN THE NATION"

The 2006 University of North Alabama football game program was chosen as the "Best in the Nation" in Division B by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Division B includes all NCAA Division II and NAIA Division I schools.

The 2006 UNA football program series also received an award for having the "Best cover in the Nation."

COSIDA AWARDS: The University of North Alabama football media guide has been honored by the College Sports Information Directors of America in 17 of the last 21 years.

The 1999 media guide was judged as the "Best in the Nation" by CoSIDA in Division B, which includes all NCAA Division II and NAIA Division I schools.

The 1984 media guide was judged "Third in the Nation," with the football brochure judged fourth in 1986, third in 1987, second in 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1991, sixth in 1992 and 1993, third in 1994 and "Best in the Nation" in 1995. The 2003 UNA guide was judged fourth in the nation.

In all UNA has received more than 75 awards from COSIDA since 1984 for its athletic publications.

2007 FOOTBALL SEASON PREVIEW

With more than 40 lettermen and 13 starters back from a team that reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2006, the University of North Alabama football team hopes to again make a run at another Gulf South Conference championship and an NCAA Division II championship in 2007.

UNA went 11-1 last season, won its eight GSC championship and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs for the third time in the last four seasons.

The Lions lost a wealth of talent from that team - including All-American receiver and kick returner Anthony Merritt, All-American center JoJo Bates and six other first-team All-GSC picks.

The good news for the Lions is that UNA returns 13 starters, led by All-GSC performers Covington Wright (TE), Lyle Atkinson (P), Michael Johnson (LB) and Yuta Fukuda (PK).

UNA head coach Mark Hudspeth, the 2006 GSC Coach of the Year, said the Lions kicking game could be as good as it has ever been, and the team has strength on both the offensive and defensive lines.

With quarterback A.J. Milwee back after posting an 11-1 record as a starter last season, the Lions could be a team to be reckoned with.

"We have holes to fill but we also have a lot of talent back and a talented group of signees coming in," said Hudspeth. "If we can put up similar offensive and defensive numbers to what we did last season, we should have a chance to compete at the highest level in the GSC and Division II."

That may be a tall order since UNA averaged an impressive 33 points and 379 total yards per game last season on offense, while holding opponents to 13.8 points per outing. But with outstanding returnees leading the way at several key positions, UNA should again be a team to watch on the national scene.

"Depth at wide receiver and in the defensive secondary are two big question marks and we will need our signees to step up at both positions," Hudspeth said.

The Lions will look to junior quarterback A.J. Milwee (5-10, 175) of Boaz, Ala., to direct the offense again in 2006. He threw for 2,039 yards and 16 touchdowns last season and rushed for eight more TDs.

Although Milwee missed most of spring practice due to an injury, he has two seasons experience in the UNA offense and has played in six NCAA playoff games over the last two years.

Junior quarterback Dusty Goodwin (6-1, 206) of Demopolis, Ala., also gained valuable experience last season before being injured.

He threw for 301 yards and six touchdowns, completing 30 of 40 passes. With Milwee and Goodwin missing significant portions of spring drills, red-shirt freshman Ret Tolleson of Bremen, Ga., got extensive work with the Lions' first string and should also see action this season.

Behind the quarterback, sophomore Tim

Hicks (5-9, 180) of Millry, Ala., should lead the way in the running game. He rushed for 484 yards on 83 rushes last season and scored seven touchdowns as a freshman. Hicks is the Lions only returning running back but has a chance to be among the best in the GSC, according to Hudspeth.

UNA's receiving corp in 2007 will be minus all-time leading receiver Marcus Lewis and All-American Anthony Merritt, as well as veterans Patrick Wilson and Lonnell Dewalt. UNA does return a big-play threat in Jason Messing 6-1, 200, SR) of Knoxville, Tenn., who has 81 catches for 1,383 yards and 17 touchdowns over the last two years. Also back are Trey Gorman (6-0, 170, JR) of Gardendale, Joemal Campbell (6-1, 170, SR) of Holly Springs, Miss., and Reggie Hubbard (6-2, 177, SR) of Russellville, Ala. Gorman had 12 catches for 236 yards and two touchdowns last season, including an 83-yarder

against Ouachta Baptist. Campbell, who also played on the UNA men's basketball team in 2006-07, had nine catches for 93 yards. Hubbard, a three-year veteran, had six catches for 33 yards and one score.

At tight end, UNA returns a solid one-two punch. All-GSC selection Covington Wright (6-6, 260, JR) is back after making four catches for 43 yards and one touchdown.

Back-up Brandon Alldredge (6-1, 208, JR) of Alexandria, Ala., is also back after gaining valuable experience last season.

The offensive line has experience and depth and could be the real strength of the UNA offense. Tez Thigpen (6-2, 300, SR) of Holly Springs, Miss., and Michael Hathorn (6-4, 280, JR) of Corinth, Miss., will start at the tackles, with Robert Kakuska (6-5, 275, SR) of Roswell, N.M., moving over from the defensive line to provide depth.

J.D. Whited (6-3, 293, SR) of Oneonta, Ala., and Eric Richardson (6-2, 275, SO) of Florence are slated to start at the guard positions, with Luke Chenault (6-2, 270, SO) of Moulton, Ala., and Phil Lowery (6-4, 314, JR) of Hatton, Ala., as back-ups. Samuel Hathorn (6-3, 275, JR) of Corinth, Miss., reports back as the starting center but Mike Horton (6-1, 240, JR) of Florence should battle him for playing time.

Defensively, UNA returns six starters from a unit that ranked ninth in Division II in scoring defense. Although four first-team All-GSC performers from last season are gone, the Lions return their leading tackler in Michael Johnson (6-, 230, SO) of Panama City, Fla. He had 87 tackles last season, including 6.5 tackles for loss to spearhead UNA's defensive attack. The team's top two pass defenders are also back in Bobby Brooks, III (6-0, 190, JR) of Hoover, Ala., and Craig Fox (6-0, 185, SR) of Kentwood, La. Brooks led the Lions with four interceptions for 104 yards last season and Fox added three picks for 40 yards and one touchdown.

The defensive line has the most depth of any position at UNA. Team captain Derrick Chatman (5-11, 245, JR) of Florence and Eric Denson (6-1, 285, SR) of Brandon, Miss. lead the way at the tackle spots, and Tim Hunt (6-5, 274, SR) of Mobile, Ala., returns after missing the 2006 season. He was an All-Southeast Region pick as a junior. Also battling for playing time will be transfer James Hall (6-4, 238, SR) of Amite, La., Chris Perkins (6-2, 290) from Itawamba Community College and D'Arcy Coleman (5-11, 285, JR) of Mississippi Delta Community College.

At the end positions, Montrell Craft (6-2, 250, SO) of Millington, Tenn., Antron Dillon (6-4, 235, JR) of Hammond, La., Dee Pittman

(6-4, 230, SO) of Pensacola, Fla., and Zach Taylor (6-4, 230, FR) of Madison, Ala., all had impressive springs and will see extensive playing time. University of Miami-Ohio transfer Trenaine Sills (6-1, 255) should also play into the mix at the end.

The linebacker position will have a revamped lineup led by Johnson at the starting middle linebacker position. Senior Jonathan Douglas (5-10, 190, SR) of Cumming, Ga., will enter fall camp as a starter at the Sam position. Junior college transfers Neal Mitchell Jr. of Northeast Mississippi and Kerry Orr of Itawamba will battle for playing time. Senior Vince Cary (6-1, 230, SR) of Alpharetta, Ga., sophomore Marcell Craft (6-1, 255, SO) of Millington, Tenn., and Mississippi Delta transfer Leroy Collins could also battle for playing time. A wealth of freshman linebackers, including Caleb Anderson of East Limestone and Hilliard Foster of Wetumpka, will be counted on for depth.

The defensive backfield returns three starters in Fox, Brooks and Keldrick Docher. Docher, a 5-10, 170, SR, from Weir, Miss., finished fourth on the team in tackles a year ago with 56 stops. He had one interception and three tackles for loss. Fox had 42 tackles and Brooks had 41.

Vincent Jackson (5-9, 160, JR) of Demopolis and Chad Daniel (5-10, 170, FR) of Sipse, Ala., will battle for the other spot. Junior college signees Kelvin Carter (5-10, 185) of Mississippi Delta and Tony Osborn (5-10, 180) of Itawamba should also battle for playing time at the corner position. E.J. Riggins (5-9, 180, SO) of Birmingham, Ala., and freshman signee Harrison Bryant (6-0, 210) of Troy, Ala., will be counted on to add depth to the safety position.

The UNA special teams should be solid with the return of starting kicker Yuta Fukuda (5-7, 170, SR) of Gumma-Machi, Japan, and starting All-GSC punter Lyle Atkinson (6-2, 160, SR) of Guin, Ala.

Fukuda, a two-year starter for the Lions, made 12 of 17 field goals last season and connected on 36 of 40 extra point attempts. He led UNA in scoring with 72 points.

Scott Shurden (5-8, 160, SR) of Noxapater, Miss., should also compete for playing time as a kicker. He made his only field goal attempt and nine of 11 PATs last season.

UNA led the GSC in punting and kickoff coverage last season.

Jonathan Garcia (6-3, 220, SO) of Orange Park, Fla., will handle the long snapping duties.

The Lions open the 2007 season at home against Tusculum on Sept. 8 in their only non-conference game of the season. UNA then faces a nine-game conference schedule, with home games against Southern Arkansas, Ouachita Baptist, Delta State, West Georgia and West Alabama. The Lions will play road games at Harding, Arkansas Tech, Arkansas-

Monticello and Valdosta State.

"We are excited about playing six home games" said Hudspeth. "It is the first time that we have had that luxury. Braly Stadium is a great home field advantage, especially when you average over 10,000 per game as we did last season.

"The "Lion Walk" has also turned into a great tradition for our fans and a great motivator for our players," he said.

"I believe that the GSC race will be just as tough as we expect, with a few of the bottom teams in the conference being more competitive," Hudspeth said.

"It will be a challenge every week because defending champs always seem to get everyone's best shot."

In five seasons as head football coach at the University of North Alabama, Mark Hudspeth has helped revive the Lion program and put UNA back on the map as a perennial force in the Gulf South Conference and the NCAA Division II.

In his first five seasons at UNA, Hudspeth has posted the best record of any previous Lion head coach in their first five years - leading the Lions to a 44-17 mark, two Gulf South Conference titles and three NCAA Division II playoff appearances.

Last season Hudspeth led UNA to an 11-1 record, a GSC title and a spot in the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs. He was selected Gulf South Conference Coach of the Year for the second time

by his peers and was also selected Region 2 Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

In 2005, Hudspeth led a UNA squad that went 11-3 and reached the semifinals of the Division II playoffs for the second time in three years. Along the way the Lions broke 44 school and six Gulf South Conference records, with four Lions earning All-American honors. Lion receiver Anthony Merritt was also a national finalist for the Harlon Hill Trophy and Lion offensive lineman Lance Ancar won the Rimington Trophy as the top center in Division II.

In just his second season as a collegiate head coach in 2003, Hudspeth fashioned one of the most dramatic turnarounds in NCAA Division II football history and led UNA within one game of playing for the national championship. Hudspeth became the seventh head football coach in UNA history in 2002 and inherited a program that had won three previous national championships and had been the winningest school in the state of Alabama in the 1980s and 1990s, but was riding a three-year losing streak.

The Lions went 4-7 in Hudspeth's first season, then kicked into high gear in 2003 with a 13-1 record and advanced to the NCAA Division II semifinals. Hudspeth's 2003 Lions won the school's seventh Gulf South Conference championship and became the first team in school history to win 11 regular-season games. For his efforts, Hudspeth was named GSC Coach of the Year in just his second season as a collegiate head coach. He was also selected NCAA Division II Region 2 Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association and was named National Coach of the Year by American Football Quarterly, Football Gazette and by CollegeSportsReport.com.

The Lions also had a school-record 13 players selected for the All-Gulf South Conference team, five players received All-American honors and and Lion quarterback Will Hall won the Harlon Hill Trophy as NCAA Division II Player of the Year. In 2003 the Lions broke 37 school records, three Gulf South Conference records and two NCAA Division II National records. In 2004 UNA spent eight weeks in the Division II Top 25 before finishing the season at 5-5. UNA climbed as high as No. 6 in the nation in the polls.

Previous Coaching Experience:

* Prior to coming to UNA he was the offensive coordinator at the United States Naval Academy in 2001.

* He served as the offensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coach at Delta State University from 1999-2000. He helped lead the Statesmen to a Gulf South Conference Championship as well as an NCAA Division II National Championship in 2000. His offense broke 21 school records, 12 Gulf South Conference records, and six NCAA Division II records that year. The offense was led by Conerly Trophy winner Josh Bright.

* In 1998-99, he was the defensive back coach and the strength and conditioning coach at the University of Central Arkansas.

* Hudspeth served as the head coach at Winston Academy in Louisville, Mississippi from 1996 to 1998. He led Winston Academy to a 25-1 record over two seasons including an undefeated record in the regular season (20-0) and the conference (12-0). In 1997 he won the state championship with a perfect 14-0 record and his team led the state in scoring that year. He was named Mississippi Coach of the Year in 1997. He won conference championships in 1996 and 1997.

* In 1994-95 Hudspeth served as the wide receiver/tight ends coach and then the running back coach at Nicholls State University. He helped lead the team to a no. 5 ranking in NCAA I-AA in rushing.

* Hudspeth was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Central Arkansas from 1992-93. He was the wide receiver and quarterback coach and assistant strength coach. He helped lead the Bears to an Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference Championship with a 9-2-1 record. They reached the semifinals of the NAIA playoffs.

Playing Experience: He was a four-year letterman at Delta State University from 1987-91. He was the starting free safety in 1990 and led the team in interceptions. In 1991 he was the starting quarterback.

Education: Received his Master of Science in Education degree from Central Arkansas in 1993. He received his Bachelor of Science in Education degree from Delta State University in 1992.

Personal: Born on November 10, 1968 in Montgomery, Alabama. Has one son, Gunner (11), and one daughter, Carley (8).

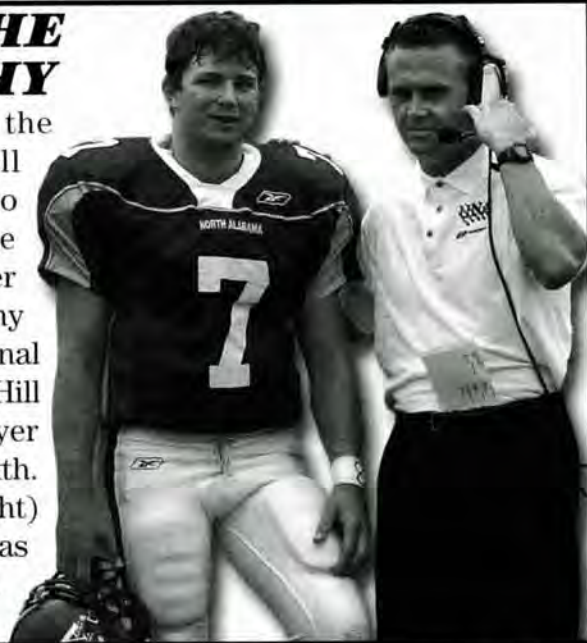

Assistant Coach Offensive Coordinator

Kenny Edenfield is in his sixth season as offensive coordinator at UNA where over the last five years he has helped direct one of the most productive offenses in the NCAA Division II.

The Lions have broken scores of school records and ranked among the offensive leaders in both the Gulf South Conference and Division II.

Edenfield has helped lead UNA to two conference championships and three NCAA playoff berths in his five years at the school - including an overall 44-17 record.

He and safeties coach Chris Willis are the only Lion assistants who have been on Mark Hudspeth's staff every season since he came

to UNA in 2002.

In 2006 UNA went 11-1, won the Gulf South Conference Championship and advanced to the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs behind an offense that 33.5 points and 379.2 yards per game. Four Lions earned All-GSC honors on offense, including Harlon Hill Trophy candidate Anthony Merritt.

In 2005 he directed a UNA offense that paved the way to an 11-3 season. The Lions broke 28 offensive records and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs. From that squad, six Lions earned All-Gulf South Conference honors on offense and three were All-Americans - including Merritt who was a Hill Trophy finalist. UNA averaged 31.2 points and 411 yards per game in 2005.

In 2003 he guided a UNA offense that helped lead the Lions to a 13-1 record, a Gulf South Conference title and a spot in the Division II playoff semifinals.

Along the way the UNA offense broke 11 school team records and 20 individual records, while producing six All-Gulf South Conference selections and the Harlon Hill Trophy winner in quarterback Will Hall.

In 2003, the Lion offense ranked 16th nationally in total offense at 446.3, was fifth in scoring offense (38.8) and 22nd in passing offense (267.0). Individually, UNA's Hall led the nation in passing efficiency with a 173.3 rating.

In Edenfield's first season at UNA the Lion offense broke seven team and 13 individual records, while ranking 13th nationally in passing offense, 24th in total offense and 29th in scoring offense.

The Lions averaged 141.9 rushing yards, 271.3 passing yards and 413.2 total yards per game, while scoring 30.7 points per contest in 2002.

Edenfield spent the 2001 season as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at the University of Tulsa.

The 41-year-old Edenfield was assistant football coach at Southwest Mississippi Community College for two years before being promoted

to head coach for his remaining two years with the program. He led the Bears to a 16-6 record over his two years as head coach and to their first playoff appearance since 1958 - going 7-3 and 9-3.

He was head coach at Dr Phillips High School in Orlando, Florida from 1995 to 1997. He led his first team to a 7-3 record, which was the first winning season at the school in six years. The next year they went 9-3 and reached the quarterfinals of the state playoffs with Edenfield named Central Florida Coach of the Year. He also led Dr. Phillips to its first ever district and conference championships.

In 1993, Edenfield was the quarterbacks and receivers coach at Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, Louisiana, and in 1994, he was the team's play caller.

His coaching career began at Jackson High School (La.) in 1989 and continued with a three-year stint at Apopka High School (Fla.) from 1990-92. Edenfield was a three-year letterman at Troy State University from 1986 to 1988. He was a member of the 1986 NCAA semifinal team and the 1987 NCAA Division II Championship team.

He played at Silliman High School in Clinton, Louisiana.

Edenfield received his Bachelor's Degree in Math Education from Troy State University in 1989. He received his diploma from Silliman High School in Clinton, Louisiana.

A native of Clinton, La., he was born on December 8, 1965. He and his wife Pamela have a son K.D. (14) and daughters Caitlin (11), Christina (9) and Kiley (5).

Veteran collegiate coach and former UCLA standout Karl Morgan enters his third season as the defensive coordinator at the University of North Alabama this fall.

Over the last two seasons Morgan has helped lead UNA to a combined 24-4 record that includes a Gulf South Conference Championship and two NCAA playoff berths.

In 2006 UNA was 11-1, won the GSC title and reached the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs. The Lion defense ranked ninth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just

13.8 points per game. Five Lion defenders earned All-GSC honors.

In 2005 Morgan's defense at UNA ranked among the NCAA Division II national leaders in every category and helped the Lions post an 11-3 record and reach the semifinals of the Division II playoffs. The UNA defense recovered 20 fumbles and intercepted 21 passes as the Lions had a +19 turnover margin.

Four UNA defenders received All-Gulf South Conference honors following the season, with defensive back Blake Farris named to four All-America teams. Farris and defensive lineman Lee Vickers both signed with National Football League teams following the season.

Morgan filled the spot left open when Charles Anthony resigned as defensive coordinator following the 2003 season.

This season will mark the first time in six years that North Alabama will have the same defensive coordinator in back-to-back seasons.

Prior to coming to North Alabama, Morgan most recently coached at Hampton University (Va.) and Alcorn State University (Miss.). Morgan also spent four seasons as the defensive line coach at Arkansas State University. Prior to his appointment with the Indians, he was the defensive line coach at Purdue University.

Morgan got his start in coaching as the head football coach at Central Catholic High School in Morgan City, Louisiana from 1989 to 1992. He then entered the college ranks and served as the defensive line coach at Nicholls State University from 1993 to 1994.

During the 1995 season, Morgan was the defensive line coach at Southern University.

His defensive line was part of a unit that helped to lead the Jaguars to a 11-1 record en route to the Black College National Championship.

During his playing days, the Houma, Louisiana native was a noseguard at UCLA and was a four-year letterwinner with the Bruins. He was the defensive captain of the 1983 Rose Bowl championship team. During his career with the Bruins, Morgan recorded 35 tackles for loss and 17 quarterback sacks. He was a two-time recipient of the Henry R. "Red" Sanders Trophy for Most Valuable Defensive Player at UCLA. Morgan earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology from UCLA in 1984.

Morgan played professional football with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League in 1983. He was also drafted by the Arizona Wranglers of the United States Football League. He then played with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the National Football League from 1984 to 1986 and also played with the Houston Oilers in 1986. In 1992 he played Arena football with the Cincinnati Rockers.

Alan Arrington enters his second season as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at UNA after 12 seasons as an assistant coach at Northwest Mississippi Community College.

Last season he helped lead UNA to an 11-1 record that included a Gulf South Conference championship and a spot in the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs. Center JoJo Bates earned All-GSC, All-Southeast Region and

All-America honors and tackle Andrew Reid was also an All-GSC and all-region pick.

Arrington began his coaching career as a student assistant coach at Northwest Mississippi and went on to a position as a student assistant on the football staff at Ole Miss under Billy Brewer.

Arrington returned to Northwest in 1994 as the offensive line coach. While there he was also athletic dorm supervisor and was the school's head softball coach from 1998-2001.

In 2001 he was elevated to the position of offensive coordinator at Northwest and held that position through the 2005 season.

While at Northwest he helped lead the Rangers to three Mississippi Junior College State Championships and the school won 75 percent of its games (84-28).

In five of his seasons at Northwest the Rangers ranked in the top six nationally in total offense, including leading the nation in 1999 and 2000.

Three times during his career (1995, 2002, 2004) he was selected for the MACIC North All-Star coaching staff.

Northwest produced eight All-Americans and two National Academic honorees during his time there. During his time as offensive coordinator, the Rangers sent 11 players on to Division I programs and nine to Division II programs. A total of 12 of his offensive linemen moved on to Division I programs during his tenure at Northwest.

He is a native of Oxford, Miss., and is married to the former Gail Perkins of Batesville, Miss.

Sean Cannon enters his second season as the linebackers and strength and conditioning coach at North Alabama.

Last season he helped lead UNA to an 11-1 record that included a Gulf South Conference championship and a spot in the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs. A pair of Lion linebackers, Donald Tharpe and Michael Johnson, earned All-GSC honors following the season.

Cannon served as defensive coordinator at New Mexico Military Institute in 2005 and brought nine years of collegiate coaching experience to UNA.

Prior to going to New Mexico Military Institute, Cannon was the defensive coordinator at Delta State for two seasons. Cannon also

served as the Defensive Line and Strength and Conditioning Coach while at Delta State.

During his time as the defensive line coach with the Statesmen, Delta State produced nine All-Gulf South Conference defensive linemen. Eight defensive players were selected All-GSC during his time as defensive coordinator.

In 2003 he coached the GSC Defensive Player of the Year and 2004 National Football League draft pick Anthony Maddox (Jacksonville Jaguars). In 2000 Delta State led the GSC in total defense and the Statesmen ranked first in rushing defense in 2000 and 2003.

DSU went 14-1 in 2000 and won the NCAA Division II National Championship, with Cannon as the defensive line coach.

In his one season at New Mexico Military Institute the team went from one win in the previous season to six in 2005 - marking the school's first winning season in six years.

Cannon earned two letters as a defensive tackle at DSU in 1995 and 1996. Prior to attending DSU, Cannon played two seasons at Northeast Mississippi Community College.

Cannon earned a bachelor of education from DSU in 1997 and a master of education from DSU in 1998.

A native of Calhoun City, Miss., Cannon is married to the former Julia Gaston of Mendenhall, Miss., and they have a son, Wade (4), and a daughter, Jenna.

Chris Willis is in his sixth season on the UNA staff and will coach safeties in 2006.

Willis has helped lead UNA to two conference championships and three NCAA playoff berths in his five years at the school - including an overall 44-17 record.

He and offensive coordinator Kenny Edenfield are the only Lion assistants who have been on Mark Hudspeth's staff every season since he came to UNA in 2002.

In his first season with UNA he coached tight ends before moving to running backs in his second season. He also served as UNA's recruiting coordinator from 2002 to 2005.

In 2003, while helping lead the Lions to a 13-1 record that included a Gulf South Conference title and an NCAA playoff appearance, Willis coached a tandem of All-GSC runningbacks in Demarcus Blount and Randy Vickers.

In 2004 he moved to defense and coached the safeties, which is his current position. That season he coached All-GSC and Academic All-GSC performer Jay Snipes.

North Alabama went 11-3 in 2005 and again reached the semifinals of the Division II playoffs. The Lion defense ranked among the Division II national leaders in every category, including ranking 18th in scoring defense and total defense. The Lions also picked off 21 passes and ranked ninth nationally in turnover margin.

Last season UNA was 11-1, won a GSC title and advanced to the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs. On that team, Willis coached All-GSC and All-South Region pick Derrell Ashford.

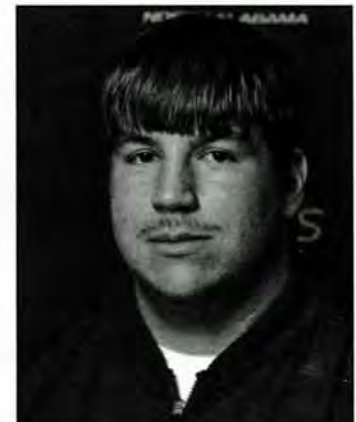

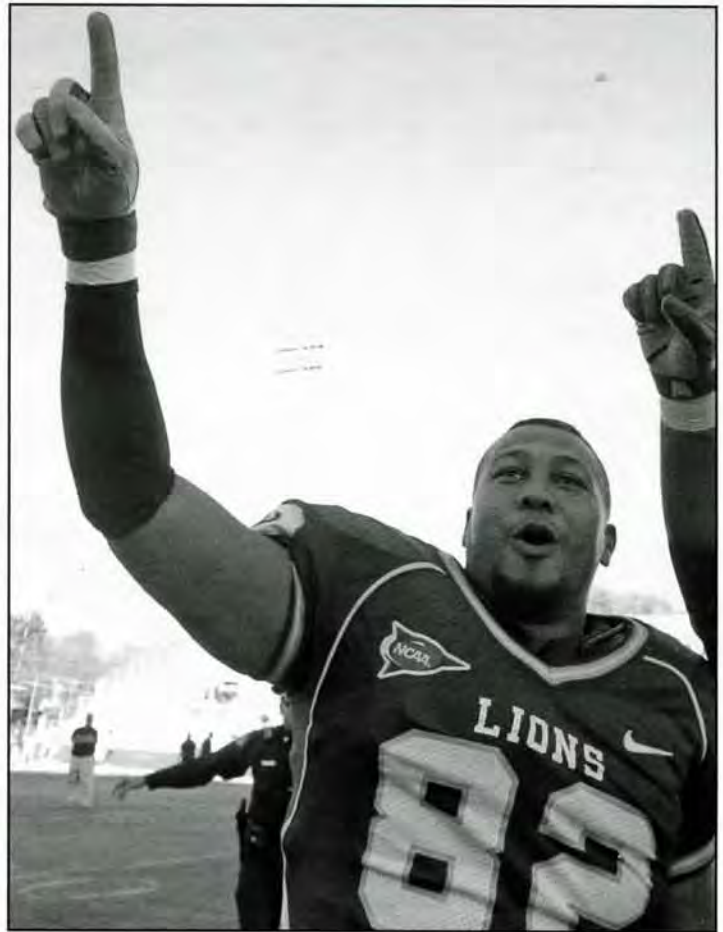

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT AND BOARD

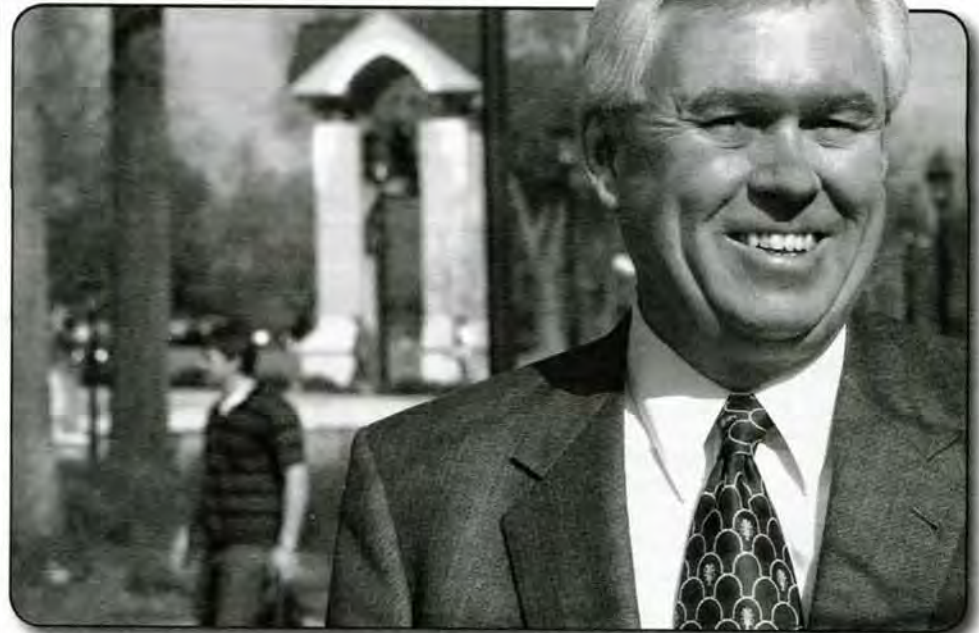
President William G. Cale, Jr.

Athletic Trainer Josh Penny

Former University of North Alabama graduate assistant trainer Josh Penny is in his fifth year as head athletic trainer with the Lions.



Penny, a 1999 graduate of the University of West Alabama, served as a graduate assistant at UNA from 1999-2002 before going to work at Health South. He returned to UNA to replace Phil Cross, who resigned at the end of May, 2003 after 27 years at the school, including the last 14 as head trainer.

Penny, who is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association, worked as an athletic trainer in Health South's High School Outreach Program in 2002-03. He also served as an assistant trainer at the Kelly Tires Blue-Gray Game All-Star Football Classic from 1999-2001.

Sports Information Director Jeff Hodges

Jeff Hodges is in his 25th year as sports information director at the University of North Alabama, where, since 1991 he has helped promote five national championship teams, two Harlon Hill Trophy winners, and worked at both the Summer and Winter Olympic Games.



In July of 1997 he was honored by the College Sports Information Directors of America as the 1997 recipient of the Warren Berg Award, presented annually to a college division member who has made an outstanding contribution to the field of college sports information, and, who

by his or her activities outside the field, has brought dignity and prestige to the profession.

In addition to becoming the youngest recipient ever of the Berg Award at age 36, Hodges was also inducted into the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1997.

He was also honored by UNA as an Alumni of the Year for 2001.

In February of 2002 he served as Venue Press Chief for Ski Jumping at Utah Olympic Park at the Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City. Hodges was also the Venue Press Chief at the 2001 U.S. Nordic Ski Festival in Park City, Utah.

At the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta, Hodges served as Venue Press Chief for volleyball at the Omni, where he supervised all press operations for both the men and women's volleyball competition.

Hodges had previously served as press officer for the U.S. Olympic Committee at the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival in North Carolina, the 1993 U.S. Olympic Festival in San Antonio, Texas, and the XVII Olympic Winter Games in Lillehammer, Norway in 1994.

He has served as media coordinator for the NCAA Division II Football Championship Game since 1986 and has served as chairman of the National Harlon Hill Award Committee, which presents the NCAA Division II College Football Player of the Year Award, since its creation in 1986.

In 1995 he successfully promoted the first defensive player to win the trophy in the award's history, in UNA linebacker Ronald McKinnon.

During Hodges time at UNA, the school's athletic publications have received more than 70 national awards from CoSIDA, including 22 "Best in the Nation" awards.

In 1995, Hodges was appointed to the Honors Court (selection committee) of the College Football Hall of Fame, and in 1996 he was named to the selection committee for the United States Olympic Committee's SportsMan, SportsWoman and Team of the Year.

Among his numerous involvements within CoSIDA, Hodges is currently on the CoSIDA Board of Directors as the national secretary for the organization, and he served a previous three-year term on the CoSIDA Board from 1992-95. He had also previously served as chairman of the CoSIDA Olympic Liaison Committee from 1995-2002.

A 1982 graduate of UNA with a B.S. degree in Journalism and History, Hodges was a two-year letterman on the Lions' tennis team, and was a member of the 1981 Gulf South Conference championship tennis squad.

Following his graduation, he worked for six months as a sports writer at the Florence Times Daily newspaper before being hired as the full-time SID at UNA in July of 1983.

Braly Municipal Stadium is recognized across the nation as one of the top college football facilities in the NCAA Division II.

The 14,215 seat stadium has been the site of numerous University of North Alabama football victories and has served as host for 24 of UNA's NCAA playoff games. In all but eight of the NCAA playoff games that UNA has participated in, the Lions and Braly Municipal Stadium, have been chosen as the host. One of those was at a pre-determined site - the 1985 Division II Championship Game in McAllen, Tex.

But twenty one years ago, Braly Municipal Stadium began hosting the NCAA Division II Championship Game as well, and will host it for a record 22nd consecutive year this December.

Since the Division II title game was created in 1972, no city had served as the host for more than five years until the Shoals area and Braly Stadium did it from 1986 to 1996, with the current contract extending to 2009.

Renovated in 1980, and again in 1998, the stadium now seats 14,215 and has a playing surface to rival any in the country. The Purdue Prescription Turf's foundation is comprised of sand which enables the field to withstand six inches of rain at one time without altering the footing.

In addition Braly Municipal Stadium features two modern dressing rooms, a \$175,000 scoreboard, concession stands, restrooms and a renovated three-level press box. The first level can hold up to 50 sports writers in the press room. The second level houses coaching staffs from both schools, the public address announcer, the clock operator and both home and visiting radio crews., in addition to two sky boxes . The third floor is used by television and film crews.

In 1996, the Lions tied an NCAA Division II record when UNA's home winning streak reached 28 games, and UNA has gone 207-103-8 in 57 seasons at Braly Stadium.

Another of the UNA football facilities is the Flowers Hall Annex, which provides almost 18,000 square feet of space for the Lions' football program, with coaches' offices, equipment rooms and indoor practice facility, a modern weight room and more.

Spacious dressing rooms, a sauna, walk-in whirlpool and an expanded training room and other extras give UNA plenty of room to supervise the care of its student athletes.

The UNA athletic facilities have kept pace with the Lions' athletic program as UNA continues to prove it has one of the premier programs in the country.

This December, for the 22nd consecutive year, the Shoals area will host the NCAA Division II National Championship Football Game at Braly Municipal Stadium in Florence, with the University of North Alabama serving as the host institution.

It is the longest period that the game has remained at one site since its inception in 1973.

An additional audience watched on ESPN as the game was carried on nationwide television by the sports network.

The championship game moved to the Shoals in 1986 after five years in McAllen, Texas, where it was known as the Palm Bowl.

With the move to the Shoals, the game was renamed simply the NCAA Division II National Championship Game, emphasizing that the game is more than a bowl game - it is a national championship contest.

The NCAA has had 33 Division II football championships, beginning with the Camelia Bowl in Sacramento, California, in 1973. Since then, the game has been played in six locations under five different names.

Since 1992, UNA has played an incredible 63 games against nationally ranked opponents, and has a 38-24-1 record in those games.

UNA has played 35 of those games against Top 10 teams going 21-14 in those games.

Current UNA head coach Mark Hudspeth is 14-6 against nationally ranked teams.

In the 1990s UNA won 18 straight games against nationally ranked teams at home, dating from a 14-12 loss to third ranked Jacksonville State in the 1992 playoffs to a 1999 season-opening 28-21 loss to Pittsburg State.

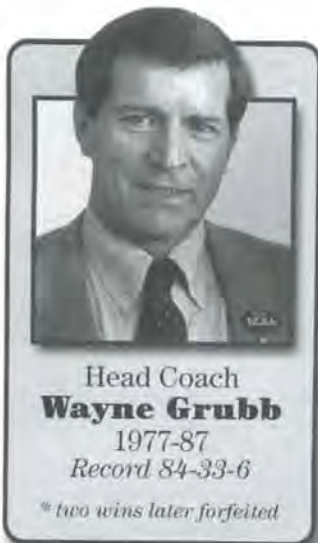

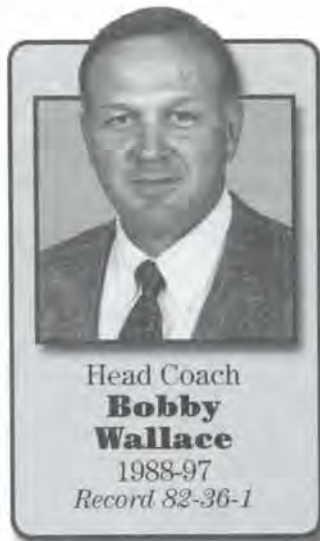

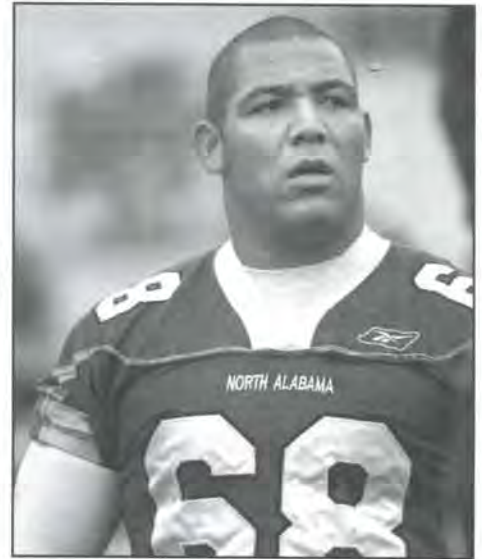

LION ALL-AMERICANS

1953 - HARLON HILL (End)

HARLON HILL became UNA's first All-American in 1953 when he was chosen for the NAIA All-America squad...Caught 12 passes for 246 yards and four touchdowns as a senior...Had 54 career catches in 34 games for 1,020 yards, 19 touchdowns and an 18.8 yard average per catch...Was National Football League Rookie of the Year in 1954 for the Chicago Bears...Was first recipient of the Jim Thorpe Trophy as NFL Most Valuable Player in 1955...An All-Pro selection in 1954, 55 and 56 and a Pro-Bowl participant in 1955, 56 and 57...Captain of the West squad in 1956 Pro-Bowl...Held Chicago career marks for most passes caught (226) and yardage gained (4,616)...also shared club record for touchdowns in a single game with four...Caught 40 career TD passes...Voted into the NAIA-Helms Foundation Hall of Fame in 1956 and into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in 1976...Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team as selected by the Times Daily in 1988...Selected to the UNA All-Decade Team for 1949-58...Inducted into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in its initial class in 1990...Has the NCAA Division II Player of the Year award named in his honor - The Harlon Hill Trophy...Received his B.S. degree in Secondary Education from UNA in 1955 and his Master's in 1969...Wore number 45...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1955 - WILLIAM "BRUB" HAMILTON (Back)

BRUB HAMILTON was named to the *Associated Press All-America third team and to the Williamson System's Mid-Bracket All-America team* after he ranked third in the nation in total offense as a senior with 1,369 yards...Rushed 168 times for 761 yards and completed 47 of 105 passes for 608 yards...Also handled the punting chores, kicking 35 times for a 37.2 yard average per kick...Had longest run from scrimmage in school history (94 yards) and the longest punt return (85 yards)...A native of Athens, Ala., Hamilton lettered four years for the Lions...Selected to the UNA All-Decade team for 1949-58...Received his B.S. degree in Physical Education in 1957...Wore number 28...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1955 - WENDELL TAYLOR (Back)

WENDELL TAYLOR was named to the *NAIA-Helms Foundation All-America team* after rushing for 1,021 yards on 196 carries to become the school's first 1,000 yard rusher in a single season...Rushed for 13 TDs...Scored 21 TDs and had 1,985 yards rushing over his junior and senior seasons...Remained UNA's career rushing leader until 1971...Held single-season rushing mark of 964 yards on 166 carries and scored 13 TDs in 1954 before breaking his own mark the next season...Among his top career games were seven games of 100 yards rushing or more, including four in 1954 and three in 1955...Had 211 yards on 34 carries against East Tennessee State in 1954 for a career high...Selected as a permanent team captain in 1955...During his four years with the Lions, the teams had a combined 29-7-1 record and were a perfect 12-0 against state rivals Livingston, Jacksonville State and Troy State...A native of Bridgeport, Ala., Taylor was nicknamed "Whirlaway"...Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team as selected by the Times Daily in 1988...Selected for the UNA All-Decade team for 1949-58...Inducted into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992 in the third induction class...Received his B.S. degree in Marketing from UNA in 1956...Wore number 35...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1956 - MAX BURLESON (Back)

MAX BURLESON earned NAIA All-America honors as a sophomore in 1956...An accomplished passer who played both quarterback and halfback for UNA...Rushed for 296 yards in 1957 on 66 carries and passed for 168 yards...Completed 40-of-70 passes for 563 yards and four touchdowns as a senior in 1959, while rushing for 356 yards...A three-year football letterman in 1956, 1957, and 1959...Also lettered in basketball and baseball...Later played professional baseball...Was one of the most successful high school football and baseball coaches in the state of Alabama at Johnson and Lee High schools in Huntsville...A native of Hackleburg, Ala., Burleson died in 1984...Selected to the UNA All-Decade team for 1949-58...Inducted into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame as part of the second induction class in 1991...Wore number 23...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1956 - HAL SISSON (Offensive Lineman)

HAL SISSON was chosen for *NAIA Helms Foundation All-America* honors after three seasons in which he played end, guard, and tackle for the Lions...Sisson blocked for four All-American backs at UNA...A native of Haleyville, Sisson lettered in 1954, 1955, and 1956...Was the first offensive lineman ever chosen for All-American acclaim at the school...Named to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team as Selected by the Times Daily in 1988

and was a member of the All-Decade team for 1949-58...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1957 - JACK REDWINE (Back)

JACK REDWINE was an *Associated Press Little All-American* as a junior in 1957...Led team with 1,438 yards of total offense...Rushed for 808 yards in 1957 and scored 14 career touchdowns...Passed for 10 TDs...A 6-foot-2, 173-pound native of Cherokee, Ala., Redwine's 1,438 yard total was only six yards shy of leading all college football, finishing second to Washington State's Bon Newman with 1,444 yards...Rushed for 192 yards against Livingston in 1957 and had 180 against Jacksonville State in 1956...Lettered in football, basketball, baseball, and golf for the Lions...Selected to the UNA All-Decade team for 1949-58...Inducted into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992 as part of the third induction class...Wore number 41...

1967 - DON CORNELIUS (Quarterback)

DON CORNELIUS was an *Associated Press Little All-American* selection after fabulous career as UNA quarterback...Still holds several school records including most career passing yards at 4,309 and most yards passing in a season at 1,686...Had 5,226 yards of total offense, rushed for 33 touchdowns and passed for 22 TDs...Was responsible for all 22 TDs scored by squad in 1966, passing for 12 and rushing for 10...Cornelius came to play for the Lions after a stellar career at Lee High School in Huntsville, Ala...Broke into the starting lineup in 1964 as a freshman and held the spot for four years...Selected to the UNA All-Decade team for 1959-1968...Wore number 10...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1968 - RICKY LINDSEY (Receiver)

RICKY LINDSEY was chosen for the *Associated Press Little All-American* honors after snagging 149 career passes for 1,611 yards during his career...Caught 12 touchdown passes and had 10 receptions in a single game...Caught 52 passes in one season which still stands as the school record...A native of Sheffield, Ala., Lindsey signed with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL...He teamed with Don Cornelius and Phil Logan for one of the top passing combinations in school history...Started at flanker from 1966-68 and was coached by former UNA great Harlon Hill...Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team in 1988 and was a member of the UNA All-Decade Team for 1959-69...Inducted into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992 as part of the third induction class...Also played baseball for the Lions and coached the UNA baseball team from 1973-74...Received his B.S. degree in Physical Education in 1969 and his Master's in Administration and Supervision in 1975...Wore number 22...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1975 - ROGER RALPH (Receiver)

ROGER RALPH was named to the *Associated Press All-American* squad after a tremendous senior season...Was GSC's leading receiver with 48 for 767 yards...Was Gulf South Conference Offensive Player of the Year...A native of Arab, Ala., Ralph caught 4 TDs in one game for a school record and had 1,932 career receiving yards for another record...Had 122 career catches...767 yards in 1975 was single-season mark...Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team as selected by the Times Daily in 1988...Also named to the UNA All-Decade team for 1969-78...Wore number 20...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1982 - DON SMITH (Offensive Lineman)

DON SMITH was voted first team *Kodak All-American* and second team *Associated Press Little All-American* after a stellar senior season as UNA's center...Played all three offensive line positions during his career and was long-snapper...Also an Academic All-America selection by the College Sports Information Directors of America...Played on UNA's first Gulf South Conference championship team in 1980 as team went 10-2...A native of Huntsville, Ala., Smith played on UNA squads with a combined 31-12 record from 1979-82...Only the second UNA offensive lineman ever chosen for All-American honors...Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team as selected by the Times Daily in 1988 and was named to the Gulf South Conference Team of the Decade for the 1980's...Selected for UNA All-Decade team for 1979-88...Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95...Wore number 51...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1984 - DARYL SMITH (Defensive Back)

DARYL SMITH was chosen first team All-American by the *American*

Football Coaches Associated and Kodak, the *Associated Press* and the *Football News* as a senior and was the first UNA player selected for the annual Blue-Gray Football Classic All-Star game and the Senior Bowl... Had 43 tackles, three interceptions, eight pass breakups, and two blocked kicks as senior... Had nine career interceptions and 132 tackles... Broke-up 27 passes... Had eight blocked kicks, including five punts, two extra points and one field goal... Had blocked punts in consecutive NCAA Division II playoff games against Virginia Union and Central State in 1983... Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team by the Times Daily in 1988 and was selected to the UNA All-Decade team for 1979-88... One of the three Lion defensive backs selected to the Gulf South Conference Team of the Decade for the 1980's... Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95... The highlight of his National Football League career was playing in Super Bowl XXIV with the Cincinnati Bengals... A native of Opelika, Ala... Wore number 31... He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1985 - BRUCE JONES (Defensive Back)

BRUCE JONES was UNA's second consensus All-America pick at cornerback in two years when he was named to the first-team All-America squad by the *American Football Coaches Association and Kodak*, the *Associated Press* and the *Football News*... A native of Courtland, Ala., Jones blocked six kicks, including five punts in 1985 to help lead UNA to a 12-2 record and a runner-up spot in the NCAA Division II... Scored five touchdowns during his career in the UNA secondary and made 164 tackles... Also had 10 interceptions which he returned for 172 yards... Team finished second nationally in pass defense, allowing 96.6 yards per game, second in scoring defense, allowing 7.5 points per game and fourth in total defense, allowing 198.7 yards per game... Selected to the "First Forty Years" All-Time UNA Football Team by the Times Daily in 1988 and to the UNA All-Decade team for 1979-88... One of three UNA defensive backs selected to the Gulf South Conference Team of the Decade for the 1980's... Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95... Inducted into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996... A four-year letterman and a starter from 1982-85... Wore number 40... He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1985 - JAMES KNOWLES (Place-Kicker)

JAMES KNOWLES was chosen as a first-team All-America kicker by the *Football News* after he converted on 32-of-35 extra point attempts and 18-of-26 field goal attempts in 1985 and led UNA in scoring with 86 points... A native of Montevallo, Ala., Knowles was UNA's starting place-kicker for four seasons and established an NCAA Division II record for points scored by kicking in a career (regular-season) with 263, which has since been broken... Set 12 school, nine Gulf South Conference and one NCAA record during his career... Ranked fourth in Division II history for career field goals with 45 (regular-season) when he closed his career in 1985... School and GSC records included career points scored (292), career points by a kicker (292), most extra points made and attempted in a career (139-149), most points by kicking in a season (86 in 1985), most field goals made in a season (18 in 1985) and most field goals attempted in a season (26 in 1984 and 1985)... Also set school mark for consecutive PATs made (62), most extra points made in a season (46), most extra points made in a game (7 vs. Valdosta State in 1982 and West Georgia in 1983) and longest field goal made (51 yards vs. Livingston in 1985)... UNA compiled a 37-7-4 record during Knowles four years as a kicker for the "First Forty Years" All-time UNA Football Team as selected by the Times Daily in 1988 and was named to the UNA All-Decade team for 1979-88... Chosen for the Gulf South Conference Team of the Decade for the 1980's... Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95... Selected for the NCAA Division II "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1973-97... Selected for the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998... Wore number 28... He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1987 - WENDELL PHILLIPS (Defensive Back)

WENDELL PHILLIPS earned first-team All-America honors from the *Football News* in 1987 after finishing his senior season as the second leading tackler on the UNA squad with 81 stops from his safety position... Phillips finished his career at UNA with 263 tackles and 14 interceptions that he returned for 182 yards and one touchdown... Also recovered six fumbles and broke up 19 passes in his career... Finished second on team in tackles as a junior in 1986 with 89 tackles... Had 60 tackles (25 solo) as a sophomore and 33 stops (19 solo) as a freshman... He continued the tradition of great Lion defensive backs, becoming the fourth DB in four years to earn major acclaim... Phillips started in secondary as a freshman with Daryl Smith and Bruce Jones, who were

named All-Americans, and Lewis Billups, who played in both the Blue-Gray Game and Senior Bowl and was the highest NFL draft choice ever from the Gulf South Conference... Helped lead UNA to the NCAA Division II National Championship Game as a sophomore in 1985 as a starter on one of the best defensive units ever assembled in Division II... One of the hardest hitters in UNA history... Also earned first-team All-Gulf South Conference honors as a senior... UNA had a 30-13-4 on-field record during his four years on the squad... Selected for the "First Forty Years" All-time UNA Football Team as selected by the Times Daily in 1988 and for the UNA Team of the Decade for 1979-88... A native of Leighton, Ala. Wore number 37... He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1989, 1990 - JAMES DAVIS (Linebacker)

JAMES DAVIS was the first Lion player to achieve first-team All-America status in two different seasons... He was chosen for the first-team All-America status in two different seasons... He was chosen for the first-team of the *Football Gazette* All-America team in 1989 and was a first-team selection for the *Kodak-American Football Coaches Association team*, the *Associated Press* Little All-America team and the *Football Gazette* All-America team in 1990... He closed his career as the leading tackler in UNA and Gulf South history with 528 total stops... He made 147 tackles in 1990 to become the first Lion to ever make more than 100 tackles in three different seasons... During 1990 he was named Gulf South Conference Defensive Player of the Week three times and was the National Division II Defensive Player of the Week twice and Regional Defensive Player of the Week another time by the *Football Gazette* and *USA Today*... He was named state Small College Athlete of the Year by the Alabama Sports Writers Association in 1990... He was a two-time All-GSC and two-time Academic All-GSC selection in 1989 and 1990... Davis also won the National Phi Beta Lambda Impromptu Speaking Competition in 1990 at the National Leadership Conference in Washington, D.C... He also received the Gulf South Conference Commissioner's Trophy as the top male student-athlete in the league in 1990-91... In 1989 he tied his own school record for tackles in a season with 156... Following the 1989 season he was selected to the GSC Team of the Decade for the 1980s and was the only active player chosen for the squad... Holds school single-game tackle mark with 24 in the 1988 season-opener against Alabama A&M... Intercepted nine passes in his career and was a three-year starter... Made 10 or more tackles in a game nine times as a sophomore, in all 11 games his junior season and in eight games as a senior... Made six career quarterback sacks... Was an Honorable Mention All-America pick by the *Football News* in 1988... Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95... A native of Clanton, Ala... Wore number 20... He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1989 - SEDRIC BARNETT (Defensive Back)

SEDRIC BARNETT was chosen second-team All-American by the *Football Gazette* in 1989... Made 44 tackles with 30 primary stops... Recovered four fumbles, caused one, intercepted five passes and broke-up nine... Returned the interceptions for 11 yards and added one quarterback sack... Made 135 career tackles and pulled in seven interceptions from 1986-89... A first-team All-Gulf South Conference pick in 1989... Started three years for the Lions... A native of Florence... Wore number 31, the second UNA All-American defensive back to wear that number...

1990 - MIKE NORD (Offensive Line)

MIKE NORD transferred to UNA from the University of Kentucky prior to his senior season and was a first-team *Associated Press* All-American selection in 1990 for the Lions... The team went 8-3 and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs... At 6-feet-7, 290 pounds, Nord started all 11 games for UNA in 1990 as the team led the Gulf South Conference in scoring offense and total offense... He was selected to the Senior Bowl and became the third Lion to ever participate in the game... He was also the first Lion to play in the East-West Shrine All-Star Game... He became the third offensive lineman in UNA football history to achieve first-team All-America status and his selection, along with James Davis to the AP, Kodak and Football Gazette teams and Bennie Jennings to the Football Gazette squad, marked the first time three Lions were named first-team All-American in the same season... He was second-team All-GSC selection... A native of Louisville, Ky... Wore number 70...

1990 - BENNIE JENNINGS (Tight End)

BENNIE JENNINGS was named to the first-team of the *Football Gazette* All-America squad as a senior after making 29 catches for 456 yards and four touchdowns... A three-time All-Gulf South Conference pick - as a freshman,

sophomore and senior, Jennings closed his career at UNA with 61 catches for 980 yards...A four-year letterman and starter for the Lions, Jennings played defense for most of his junior year after being projected as a pre-season All-American at tight end...But in 1990 he switched back to offense and lived up to that All-American billing as he helped take UNA to an 8-3 record and a spot in the Division II playoffs...A native of Fayetteville, Tenn...Wore number 86...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1991 - JOHN CRITTENDEN (Punter)

JOHN CRITTENDEN was selected for the second-team of the *Associated Press* All-America team and the first-team of the *Football Gazette* All-America squad as a junior in 1991...He became the first Lion punter ever to take first or second-team All-America honors...He finished second in NCAA Division II in punting with a 43.2 average on 49 punts...In his first game as a Lion punter against Central Missouri State, he set school records for the longest punt and the best punting average in a game...His first punt as a Lion went 80 yards and he averaged 52.0 yards per punt in the game...His 43.2 average also set the UNA single season record and he just missed the Gulf South Conference record for a season at 43.5 set by Jacksonville State's Greg Lowery in 1982...He also was a first-team All-GSC pick by the league's coaches...In 1992 he was also first-team All-GSC as a senior, averaging 42.6 yards per kick on 47 punts to again lead the league...His 42.9 yard average on 96 career punts also set the UNA career record...Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95...Punted bare-footed...He is a native of Carrollton, Miss...Wore number 6...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...

1991, 1992 - HARVEY SUMMERHILL (Defensive Back)

HARVEY SUMMERHILL, a native of Tusculumbia, became UNA's second two-time All-American...He was named to the second-team of the *Football Gazette* All-America squad as a junior in 1991 and was a consensus All-America pick as a senior in 1992 when he was selected by *Kodak* and the *American Football Coaches Association*, the *Associated Press*, the *Football Gazette* and the *C.M. Frank* All-America teams...He was selected first-team All-Gulf South Conference by the league's coaches in 1990, 1991 and 1992, making him just the second Lion football player to ever be a three-time first-team All-GSC pick...During his four-year career as a starter with the Lions, he made 312 tackles and 171 primary stops...He had 12 interceptions and 22 pass-breakups...He made 73 tackles in his senior season with 51 primary stops and two interceptions as UNA led the league in scoring defense and total defense and advanced to the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs...Summerhill's selection continued the tradition of Lion All-American defensive backs, making him the fifth UNA defensive back in an eight-year period to be named first or second-team All-American - joining Darryl Smith, Bruce Jones, Wendell Phillips and Sedric Barnett...Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95...Wore number 5...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...Named to Gulf South Conference Team of the 1990s.

1992, 1993 - TYRONE RUSH (Running Back)

TYRONE RUSH was selected first-team All-American by the *Football Gazette* in 1992, following his junior season in which he rushed for 1,364 yards and six touchdowns...He led the Gulf South Conference in rushing and was selected first-team All-GSC for the second time in his career...He finished sixth in the voting for the Harlon Hill Trophy as the NCAA Division II College Player of the Year and was the top finisher among underclassmen...He averaged 113.7 yards per game and 6.2 yards per carry in helping UNA to lead the GSC in rushing offense and advance to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Division II playoffs...Selected GSC Offensive Player of the Year...Set school records by rushing for 100 yards or more in eight games in 1992 and in five consecutive games...He was just the fourth Lion to ever rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and he broke UNA's single-season rushing mark with his 1,364 yards...He also broke the regular-season mark with 1,136 yards...

In 1993 he was selected first-team All-American by the *Associated Press*, *Kodak*, the *Football Gazette* and the *NCAA Division II Sports Information Directors*... He was selected as the runner-up for the Harlon Hill Trophy as the NCAA Division II Player of the Year after helping the Lions go 14-0 and win the Gulf South Conference and NCAA Division II National Championships... He was first-team All-GSC and was the GSC Offensive Player of the Year for the second straight year after leading the league in rushing and scoring...Set a UNA single season mark with 1,466 yards, scoring 17 touchdowns on 237 attempts...Named first-team All-South Region and was selected to play

in the inaugural Snow Bowl NCAA Division II All-Star Game in Fargo, N.D... Named National Player of the Week against Delta State in 1993 after rushing for a school-record 248 yards on 22 carries against the Statesmen...Other school and GSC marks set in 1993 included points scored in a season (116), rushing touchdowns in a season (19) and touchdowns scored in a season (19)...Finished his career with 4,421 yards to become UNA's and the GSC's all-time leading rusher...had 791 carries, scored 36 touchdowns rushing and had a 5.4-yard average per carry in his career...Set UNA all-purpose yardage career mark as well with 6,020 yards, almost 2,000 more than the Troy Nelson in second place...His 37 career TDs scored tied the school record and his career rushes and TDs rushing were school records...His 4,421 career total yards ranks second at UNA and his 21 career 100-yard rushing games set a school mark...Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95...A native of Philadelphia, Miss...Wore number 26...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...Named to Gulf South Conference Team of the 1990s.

1993, 1994, 1995 - RONALD MCKINNON

(Linebacker)

RONALD MCKINNON was selected first-team All-American by the *NCAA Division II Sports Information Directors*, the *Football Gazette* and *C.M. Frank* as a sophomore in 1993, and was a third-team pick by the *Associated Press*...Selected first-team All-GSC for the second straight season...Led UNA with 175 tackles, including 106 primary stops...Added five caused fumbles, three pass break-ups, three quarterback pressures, three tackles for loss, three interceptions and one blocked kick...Helped the Lions go 14-0, winning the GSC and NCAA Division II National Championships...A first-team All-South Region pick...Selected as the GSC's Defensive Player of the Week against Valdosta State, with 17 tackles and two interceptions in the game that gave UNA the GSC championship, and was *Football Gazette/USA Today* Division II Player of the Week with 17 tackles in UNA's national championship win over Indiana-Pennsylvania...Selected GSC Freshman of the Year in 1992...

Selected first-team All-American in 1994 by the *American Football Coaches Association*, the *Associated Press*, the *Football Gazette*, the *Division II Sports Information Directors* and *C.M. Frank*...Selected NCAA Division II National Player of the Year by CNN College Football Preview and Danny Sheridan, *Football Gazette* National Defensive Back of the Year and C.M. Frank Small University Defensive Player of the Year...Named GSC Defensive Player of the Week vs. Youngstown State and was *Football Gazette* National Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the National Championship Game...His interception deep in UNA territory with just over two minutes left preserved a 16-10 Lion win over Texas A&M-Kingsville in the championship contest...Led the Lions in tackles for a third straight year with 159 stops, including 110 primary stops...The Lions went 13-1 in 1994 and won their second consecutive Gulf South Conference and NCAA Division II National championships...

In 1995 McKinnon became just the fifth three-time consensus first-team All-American in Division II history and was selected the winner of the Harlon Hill Trophy as NCAA Division II National Player of the Year, becoming the first defensive player to win the award...Also selected *Football Gazette* National Player of the Year, *Football Gazette* Defensive Back of the Year, first-team *CoSIDA* NCAA Division II All-American, first-team *Associated Press* Little All-American, first-team *American Football Coaches Association* All-American, first-team *Football Gazette* All-American, first-team *American Football Quarterly* NCAA Division II All-American and first-team *C.M. Frank* All-American...Became just the third player in Gulf South Conference history to be first-team All-GSC four straight years...Also selected Gulf South Conference Defensive Player of the Year for the second straight year, was first-team *CoSIDA* NCAA Division II All-South Region, participated in the 1995 Snow Bowl NCAA Division II All-Star Game and was selected as the East Defensive Most Valuable Player...Gulf South Conference Defensive Player of the Week vs. Alabama A&M on Sept. 9 and vs. Valdosta State on Oct. 28, *Football Gazette* Division II Regional Defensive Player of the Week vs. Carson-Newman on Nov. 25, *Football Gazette* Division II National Defensive Player of the Week vs. Ferris State on Dec. 2, *Football Gazette* Division II National Defensive Player of the Week vs. Pittsburg State on Dec. 9, permanent team captain and UNA's Defensive Most Valuable Defensive Player...Closed his career as the leading tackler in school and GSC history with 621 total stops and 407 primary stops...Had 29 career tackles for loss, seven sacks, 11 interceptions and recovered five fumbles...As a senior he had 139 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, four interceptions and four sacks...The Lions went 14-0 in 1995...Played on teams with a combined 48-5-1 record that included three straight GSC championships and three straight NCAA Divi-

sion II National Championships...The Lions defense led Division II in rushing and scoring defense and was second in total defense...UNA led the GSC in all four defensive categories...A four-year starter, missing just one start, due to injury, in 54 career games...Named to the Gulf South Conference "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95...Selected the "GSC Defensive Player of the Quarter Century" for 1971-95...Selected for the NCAA Division II "Team of the Quarter Century" for 1973-97...Signed as a free agent with the Arizona Cardinals following his senior season...A native of Elba, Ala...Wore number 44...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...Named Alabama Sports Writers Association State Professional Athlete of the Year for 1998...Named to Gulf South Conference Team of the 1990s.

1993 - JEFF REDCROSS (Defensive End)

JEFF REDCROSS was selected first-team All-American by the *NCAA Division II Sports Information Directors* and the *Football Gazette* in 1993, and was a second-team pick by the *Associated Press* and *C.M. Frank*...He was named the Division II National Defensive Player of the Year by the *Football Gazette* and was selected first-team All-GSC and the GSC's Defensive Player of the Year in voting by the league's head coaches...A second-team All-South Region selection...Selected GSC Defensive Player of the Week in the Lions 44-32 win at Portland State...Finished fifth on the team in tackles with 82 total stops, including 51 primary hits...Caused one fumble, recovered three, broke-up six passes, had 20 quarterback pressures, 15 tackles for loss and seven sacks for a combined 107 yards in losses...Also blocked an extra-point...The Lions went 14-0, winning the GSC and NCAA Division II National Championships...Played on teams with a combined 32-14-1 record and helped take the Lions to the NCAA playoffs in 1990, 1992 and 1993...For his career, he made 179 tackles in three seasons as a starter on defense, with 104 primary stops, 22 tackles for loss and 10 sacks...Played his freshman season at tight end...A native of Huntsville, Ala...Wore number 56...He was selected for the 50th Anniversary UNA Football Team for 1949-98...Named to Gulf South Conference Team of the 1990s.

1993 - JEFF SURBAUGH (Offensive Guard)

JEFF SURBAUGH was selected first-team All-American by the *NCAA Division II Sports Information Directors* and the *Football Gazette* in 1993, was a second-team pick by the *Associated Press* and a third-team selection by *C.M. As a junior in 2005 Merritt finished sixth in the voting for the Harlon Hill Trophy as the Division II National Player of the Year...He was named first-team All-American as a return specialist by *D2Football.com*, second-team All-American as an all-purpose back by *Daktronics*, third-team All-American as a kick returner by *CollegeSportsReport.com*, second-team as a return specialist by *Football Gazette* and also honorable mention All-American as a wide receiver by *Football Gazette*...He was first-team *Daktronics* All-Southeast Region as both a return specialist and receiver...He was first-team all-region as a return specialist by *Football Gazette* and second-team as a receiver...In his first season on offense in 2005, Merritt caught a school-record 81 passes for 942 yards and eight touchdowns...He added 23 rushing attempts for 168 yards and three touchdowns, completed his only pass attempt for 21 yards and a touchdown, returned 51 punts for 546 yards and two touchdowns and 23 kickoffs for 595 yards and one touchdown...He finished the season with 2,251 all-purpose yards...He was a two-time GSC Player of the Week and was National Player of the Week by both *D2Football.com* and *Football Gazette* after scoring four different ways in a five touchdown performance in UNA's win over Delta State...He was first-team All-GSC as both a receiver and kick returner...He broke 13 school and two GSC records and also broke Division II record for total kick returns in a season with 71...

As a senior in 2006 Merritt was again a candidate for the Harlon Hill Trophy as the Division II National Player of the Year...He was named first-team All-American as a wide receiver by the *American Football Coaches Association*, first-team All-American as an all-purpose back by *Daktronics*, second-team All-American as a kick returner, and honorable mention All-American as a receiver by *Football Gazette* and also a second-team All-American as an all-purpose back by *D2Football.com*...He caught 51 passes for 588 yards and four touchdowns and had 733 yards in returns...He was 4-of-5 passing and threw three TD passes, while also rushing for 192 yards and one score...Finished his career with 5,294 all-purpose yards and set four Division II, seven Gulf South Conference and 19 UNA records...Career numbers include 146 punt returns for 1,760 yards and six TDs, 67 kickoff returns for 1,618 yards and two TDs, 132 receptions for 1,530 yards and 12 TDs, 384 yards rushing and four TDs, four TD passes, 19 tackles and two interceptions....

Helped lead UNA to an 11-1 record and a GSC title in 2006, and 11-3 record and into the semifinals of the Division II playoffs as a junior in 2005 and to a 13-1 record and into the semifinals of the Division II playoffs as a freshman...Teams he played on had a combined 40-10 record, won two GSC titles and made three playoff appearances...A four-year letterman and starter, Merritt is a native of Columbus, Ga., and wore number 21.

2005 - CHIP LONG (Tight End)

As a senior in 2005 he was selected first-team All-American at tight end by the *Football Gazette*, second-team by *CollegeSportsReport.com* and *Daktronics* and third-team by *D2Football.com*...Long was also first-team All-Gulf South Conference, first-team *Football Gazette* All-Southeast Region and first-team *Daktronics* All-Southeast Region...In 2005 he caught 66 passes for 802 yards and five touchdowns, averaging 12.2 yards per catch...He was also 1-for-1 passing for eight yards...He caught three touchdown passes in UNA's 41-38 overtime win in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs at Central Arkansas...For his career, Long caught 97 passes for 1,225 yards and 10 touchdowns...He was a four-year letterman who also served as the Lions' long snapper...A native of Mountain Brook, Ala., he wore number 83.

2006 - JOJO BATES (Center)

As a senior Bates earned second-team All-American honors from *Daktronics* and was an honorable mention pick by *D2Football.com*...In his four years at UNA he helped lead the Lions to the NCAA Playoffs three times and the teams had a combined 40-10 record...The Lions ranked among the national leaders in scoring (33.5) and total offense (379.2) in 2006...He was chosen All-Gulf South Conference and All-Southeast Region...A native of Birmingham, Ala., he wore number 62.

ALABAMA SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Four of the most prominent figures in the history of Lion football hold membership in the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame. **Harlon Hill**, a letterman from 1950-53 who was an NALA All-American and was named Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player in the National Football League while playing with the Chicago Bears, was the school's first inductee when he was chosen for membership in 1976. Then, in 1983, **George "Goober" Lindsey**, a football letterman in 1950 and 1951 who went on to television fame on the *Andy Griffith* and *Hee Haw* shows, was selected for membership. **Hal Self** was the head coach of the Lion football team from 1949-1969. He had a 109-81-8 record. He had a combined 31-0-2 record against state rivals, Jacksonville State, Troy State, and Livingston from 1952-1963. **Bobby Wallace** was head coach of the Lions from 1988-97 and led the Lions to three NCAA Division II National Championships, three Gulf South Conference titles and six NCA playoff appearances. He was inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in 2004. Another Lion, former basketball standout Winfrey "Wimp" Sanderson, has also been inducted. **Mickey Andrews** was head coach of the Lions from 1973-76 and has been the long-time defensive coordinator at Florida State. He was inducted in 2006.

LEO III AND UNA

UNA once again boasts the only live Lion mascots in the country living on campus.

On July 22, 1974, former UNA president Dr. Robert M. Guillot brought a 35-pound lion cub to the campus and Leo spent the next 14 years "roaring" the school to victory. The original Leo died on Jan. 20, 1988, and a great outpouring of support from the Shoals community resulted in Leo II being brought to UNA in July of 1988.

Leo II lived in the compound that once housed the original Leo and grew to a weight of more than 600 pounds at eleven years of age. In 1997, Leo II was selected as the nation's "Second Best Mascot" by Sports Illustrated. He died in February of 2000.

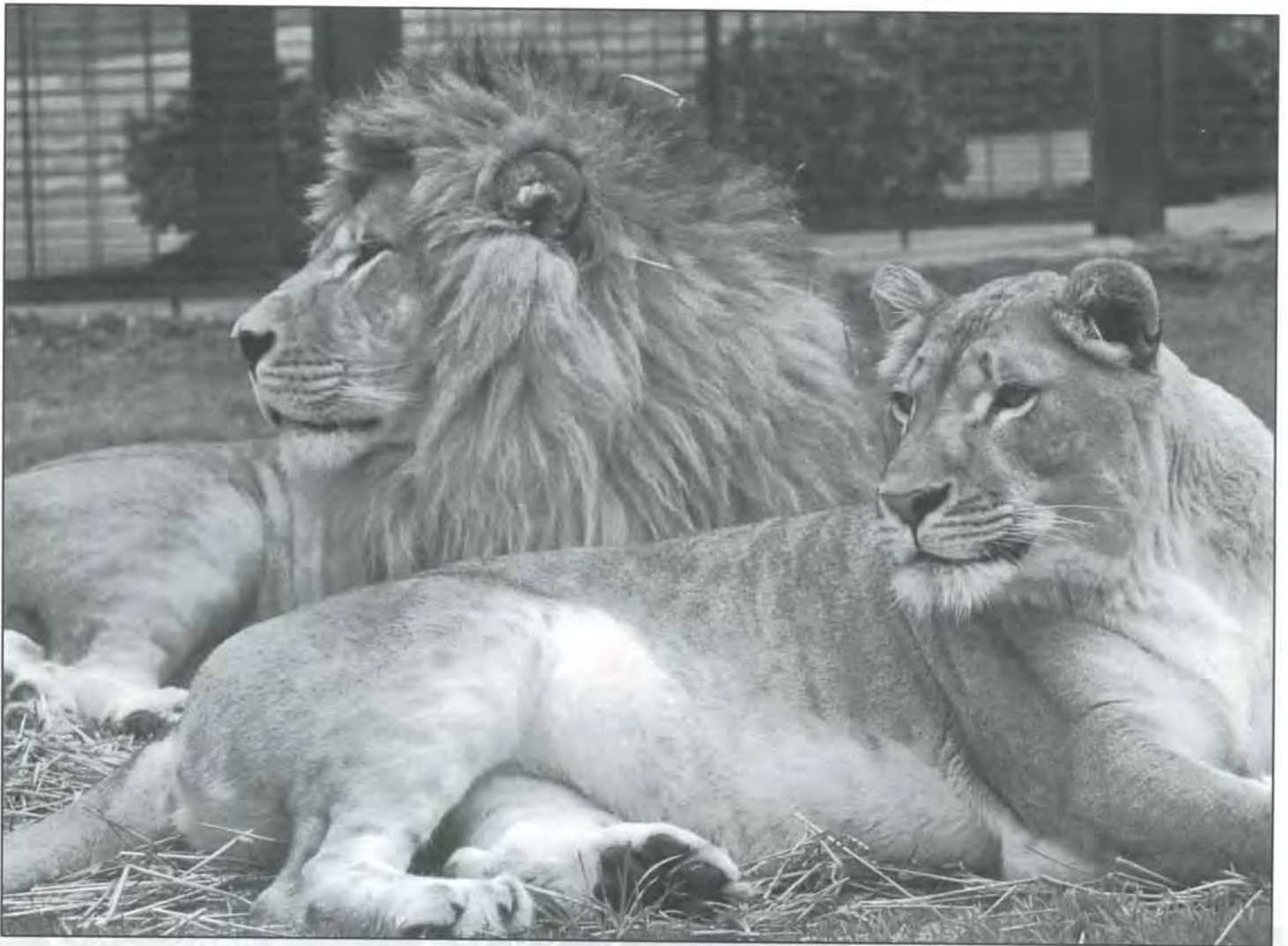
Leo III and Una, born on November 18, 2002, now reside on the campus in the 12,764 square-

As they approach their fourth birthday, the African-American lions have grown to more than one-half of their anticipated size and weight.

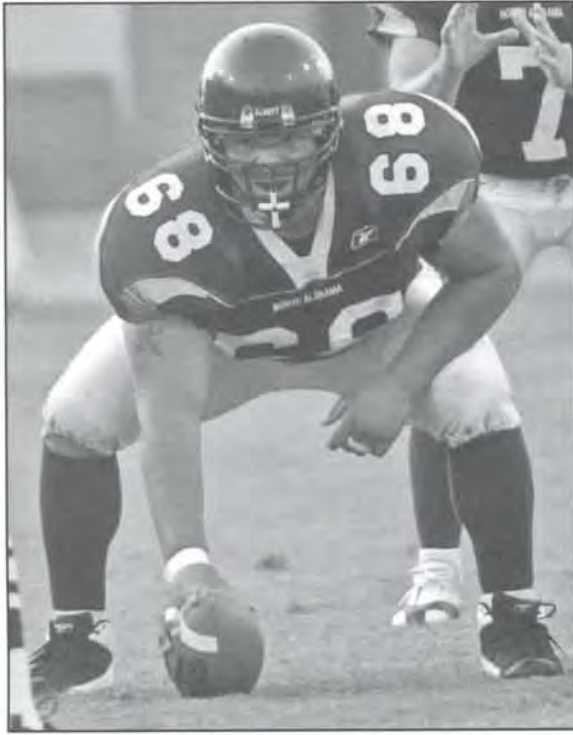
Leo III and Una are exhibited seven days a week from approximately 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. (weather conditions permitting), unless they are appearing in local venues.

Rimington Trophy



University of North Alabama senior center **Lance Ancar** of Harvey, La., was named the 2005 winner of the Dave Rimington Trophy as the top collegiate center in the NCAA Division II.



Division II Football Hall of Fame

Former University of North Alabama quarterback **Cody Gross** of Rogersville, Ala., was inducted as part of the Class of 2006 into the Division II Football Hall of Fame. He was inducted with John Randle of Texas A&M-Kingsville and Sean Landeta of Towson State. Gross had a 41-2 record as a starting quarterback and led UNA to three straight NCAA Division II National Championships from 1993-95.



HARLON HILL

A native of Killen, Ala., Harlon Hill is a prime example of the unknown small college player with tremendous talents who went on to prove his greatness in the National Football League - competing with top players in the game.

A small college All-American receiver at Florence State Teachers College (now the University of North Alabama), Hill was drafted in the 15th round of the NFL draft by the Chicago Bears - a team willing to take a chance on a player that scout Clark Shaughnessy only heard about from a man in the press box at the annual Blue-Gray Classic in Montgomery.

The Bears didn't have to wait long for the skinny boy from Florence State to make their gamble pay off, however.

In 1954, Hill caught 45 passes for 1,124 yards and 12 touchdowns and was named National Football League Rookie of the Year. The following year he caught 42 passes for 789 yards and nine touchdowns and was the recipient of the Jim Thorpe Trophy as the NFL Most Valuable Player.

In nine years in the NFL, Hill caught 233 passes for 4,717 yards and 40 touchdowns and is still regarded as one of the greatest receivers to ever play the game.

He played in the Pro Bowl in 1955, 1956 and 1957 and was an All-Pro selection in 1954, 1955 and 1956.

He spent his first eight seasons, from 1954-61, with the Bears and split his final season between the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Detroit Lions.

Hill played in relative obscurity for the Lions as an end in a powerful single-wing offense.

He caught only 54 passes in four years with the Lions but they went for 1,020 yards and a school record 19 touchdowns. He averaged 18.8 yards per catch.

Hill was inducted into the Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame in 1958, into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in 1976 and into the UNA Athletic Hall of Fame in the initial class in 1990.

Hill is now retired from his former position as principal at Brooks High School in Killen.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1953- As a senior at Florence State Teachers College (now the University of North Alabama) in 1953, Hill caught only 12 passes for a ground-oriented, single-wing attack. Hill received small college All-America acclaim as an end and was later drafted by the Chicago Bears in the 15th round of the National Football League Draft. The Bears felt they could afford to wait until the late rounds to draft Hill because they knew very little about him the other NFL clubs knew even less.

1954- As a rookie for the Chicago Bears, Hill caught 45 passes for 1,124 yards and 12 touchdowns to lead the club in all three categories. His performance also helped take the Bears from a 3-8-1 record in 1953 to an 8-4 mark in 1954. On Oct. 31 in San Fransisco, Ca., Hill caught seven passes from quarterback George Blanda for 214 yards and four touchdowns in a 31-27 win over the 49ers. Hill's fourth TD catch of the day was a game-winning 66 yarder with only 33 seconds left in the game. The four TDs in a game still stand as a Bear's club record. At the conclusion of the season, Hill was selected All-Pro, played in the Pro Bowl in Los Angeles for the West squad that won 26-19, and was chosen as the National Football League Rookie of the Year.

1955- In his second NFL season, Hill again led the Bears with 42 catches for the 789 yards and nine touchdowns and became the first recipient of the Jim Thorpe Trophy - symbolic of the National Football League's Most Valuable Player. He also captained the West in a 31-30 Pro Bowl victory and was again named All-Pro.

1956- With 47 catches for 1,128 yards and 11 touchdowns in 1956, Hill helped Chicago to a 9-2-1 record and a spot in the NFL Championship Game against the New York Giants - where they were defeated 47-7. Hill was selected All-Pro for the third consecutive season and made his third straight Pro Bowl appearance as the West won again, 19-10.

1958- A severe ankle injury blunted the speed which had made Hill the NFL's most feared deep receiver and eventually prompted a shift to defensive back.

STILL IN THE BOOKS: Harlon Hill still holds numerous receiving records for the Chicago Bears, including most 100-yard receiving games in a career with 19. Other records include, most 100-yard games in a season with seven in 1954, consecutive 100-yard games (3), most seasons with 1,000 yards receiving (2), most yards receiving in a game (214) and most touchdowns in a game (4). Hill ranks second all-time in career yards receiving with 4,616 and is second in average yards per perception at 24.98 and career touchdowns with 40.

THE HARLON HILL TROPHY

Creation of the Hill Trophy

The top player in college football each season has long been honored with the presentation of the Heisman Trophy.

An award symbolic of the best.

But while that award may have recognized the top player in NCAA football, no one playing at a school below the Division I level had ever received recognition for their accomplishments in the voting.

Players like Walter Payton, Neil Lomax, Ken O'Brein, John Stallworth and others played in the NCAA Division II, and would have never achieved recognition, had they not gone on to outstanding careers in professional football.

That began to change in 1986, however, when a group of Shoals area residents, with sponsorship of Coca-Cola, worked to establish the Harlon Hill Trophy- to be presented each year to the top player in the NCAA Division II.

The originators of the award didn't feel that accomplishments in professional football should have to be the measuring stick for talent in Division II. So the award was created to honor players whose achievements have placed them among the top players to ever play the game.

The Harlon Hill Trophy is an award that is given annually to the player selected as the "best" in Division II by the sports information directors at the 140-plus Division II schools which play football, and is presented during the week of the NCAA Division II Football Championship Game in the Shoals.

This year, the 22nd annual Harlon Hill Trophy will be presented to the Division II Player of the Year on December 14.

During the first 21 years of the Hill Trophy, more than 60 different schools have had finalists for the award, and the list of past winners includes nine running backs, ten quarterbacks, one receiver and one line-backer.

Brian Shay's 303 points in the 1998 voting stands as the highest point total received by any player. His 88 first-place votes were also the most in Hill Trophy history, as was his 185-point margin of victory.

How the Winner is Selected

Nominations for the Hill Trophy are accepted from the sports information directors at NCAA Division II football-playing institutions. The criteria stipulates that the player must have distinguished himself nationally as being among the top players in the game. The nominations are screened regionally by the National Harlon Hill Advisory Committee and the top six candidates from each region

advance to the regional ballot.

Then there are two actual votes for the Hill Trophy.

The players nominated are first voted on by the sports information directors within their respective NCAA region. There are four regions (Northeast, South, Midwest, West) with approximately the same number of schools in each region. The top two vote-getters from each of the four regions then advance to the national ballot where they are voted on by all 140-plus Division II SIDs. On both the regional and national ballots, the SIDs vote for a first, second and third basis.

The top three finishers from the national voting are then invited to the Shoals for the championship week activities and the Hill Banquet.

The Trophy

The Harlon Hill Trophy, created by Herff Jones, Inc., is 30 inches tall and weighs 63 pounds. The football is a life-size replica of a real football and sits on a solid walnut base. It is sponsored by Coca-Cola, Trustmark Construction, the City of Florence, Herff-Jones, The Marriott Shoals Hotel and Spa and Opti-Net.

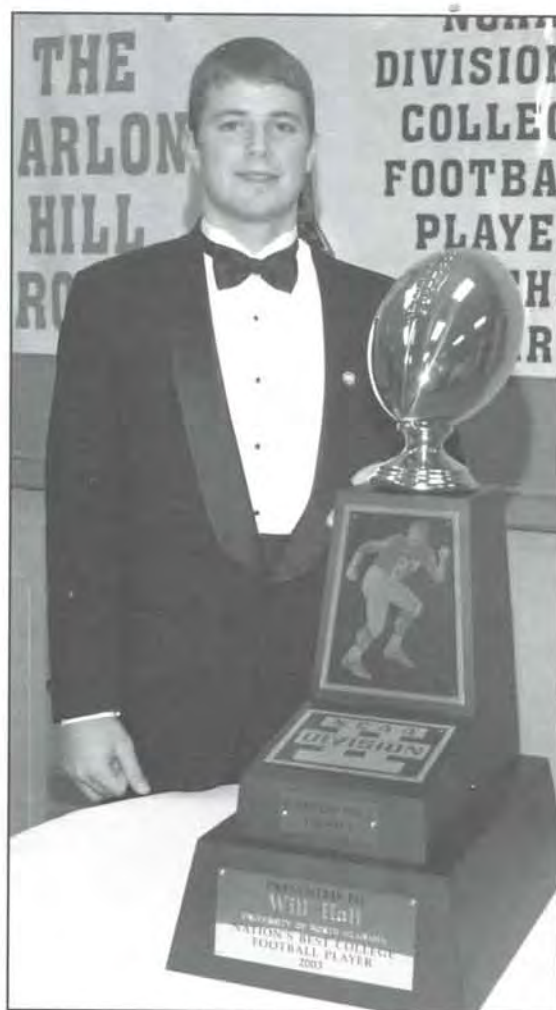

DIVISION II TEAM OF THE QUARTER CENTURY

FLORENCE, Ala. —Outstanding individual players from some of the nation's most successful collegiate programs head the list of 34 players named to the NCAA Division II Football Team of the Quarter Century.

The team was selected by a nationwide panel of current and former Division II sports information directors, as part of the celebration of the 25th Division II Football Championship Game, scheduled for December 13 in Florence, Ala. Any player who competed as a Division II football player between 1973-96 was eligible for consideration.

The players named to the Division II Team of the Quarter Century will be honored as part of activities at the 25th Division II Championship Game in Florence.

In addition to the individual players selected for the "Team of the Quarter Century," Texas A&M-Kingsville's (formerly Texas A&I) Johnny Bailey and Darrell Green were selected as the Division II Offensive and Defensive Players of the Quarter Century, respectively.

North Alabama's Bobby Wallace was selected as Division II Coach of the Quarter Century, while his 1995 Lion team was selected as the best Division II team of the era, going 14-0 to close a streak of three straight national championships.

Pittsburg State's 1992 38-37 overtime playoff win over North Dakota State was selected as the Game of the Quarter Century.

THE GULF SOUTH CONFERENCE

The Gulf South Conference is recognized as one of the premier Division II conferences in the nation, boasting 41 national champions in ten sports since 1970, winning 12 national crowns during the 1980's and 11 in the 1990s.

In addition, the GSC annually places teams in the championship tournaments of virtually every sport in NCAA competition.

The GSC was born in the summer of 1970 when representatives from six institutions - Delta State University, Florence State University (now North Alabama), Jacksonville State University, Livingston University, the University of Tennessee-Martin and Troy State University - convened in Birmingham, Ala., to form the Mid-South Conference, the forerunner of today's GSC.

Scheduling problems in the first year permitted competition only in football, with Jacksonville State winning the league's first championship.

In 1971, Southeastern Louisiana and Nicholls State joined the conference, bringing the membership to eight. The league also changed its name to the Gulf South Conference.

The following year, Mississippi College and Northwestern Louisiana were admitted to the conference. Northwestern withdrew two years later, followed by Southeastern Louisiana and Nicholls State in 1979.

The conference continued with seven schools until 1981, when the league's presidents voted to admit Valdosta State College. A ninth member, West Georgia College, joined in June of 1983.

The GSC continued with nine schools until the 1991-92 academic year when Troy State and Tennessee-Martin departed to pursue Division I status.

Jacksonville State departed the league following the close of the 1992-93 academic year, but the GSC has since added Lincoln Memorial (Tenn.), Alabama-Huntsville, Central Arkansas, Henderson State, the Mississippi University for Women, West Florida, Southern Arkansas, Arkansas Tech, Arkansas-Monticello, Christian Brothers, Montevallo, Harding and Ouachita Baptist to bring the membership to 18 schools. MUW then withdrew in 2003-04 and Lincoln Memorial and Central Arkansas following the 2005-06 seasons.

Banner seasons have become common for the GSC. Numerous student athletes continue to be honored on All-America and Academic All-America teams.

The GSC's first commissioner, Stan Galloway, retired in 1979 and, with the naming of Jim McCullough as commissioner, the league office moved to Birmingham from Hammond, La.

Hayden Riley was the third commissioner, serving from 1982-84, followed by Ralph McFillen from 1984-87 and Sonny Moran from 1987-1992.

The current GSC commissioner, Nathan Salant, is in his 15th year as commissioner.

IMPORTANT DATES IN UNA HISTORY

1912

The Lions played their first football game in school history against Sewanee but lost 101-0.

1928

The Lions dropped their football program after disappointing results over the first 17 years of competition.

March 30, 1949

Florence State Teachers College President Dr. E.B. Norton called a student assembly to announce that football would be renewed.

September 29, 1949

The Lions played their first game of the modern era against Jacksonville State on the road at Jacksonville. The Lions lost that game 12-7.

October 8, 1949

The Lions got their first win of the modern era, defeating Howard College 28-7 in Florence.

1952-64

The Lions went 31-0-2 against schools from the state of Alabama over this 12-year period, beginning with a 32-6 win over Livingston in 1952 and ending with a 21-7 loss to Troy State in 1964.

November 21, 1959

The Lions lost 42-7 against Vanderbilt in Nashville, in their first and only game against a Southeastern Conference opponent.

1960

The Lions won the Alabama Collegiate Conference Championship, which was the school's first conference football championship.

1969

The Lions head football coach Hal Self retired and former Lion player and assistant coach Durrell Mock was hired as the school's second head football coach.

1971

The University of North Alabama becomes a charter member of the newly formed Gulf South Conference.

November 11, 1978

UNA downs Mississippi College 30-0 at home to run its record to 7-1-1. It marked the first time a Lion football team had won as many as seven games in 17 years (since 1961).

September 6, 1980

Playing in a newly renovated Braly Municipal Stadium for the first time, UNA romped Division I-AA Middle Tennessee State 36-0. Braly had been expanded from 8,000 to 13,000 seats.

November 22, 1980

The Lions beat Jacksonville State 35-28 in Jacksonville, Ala. to win their first Gulf South Conference football title.

November 29, 1980

The Lions played their first NCAA Division II playoff game at home at Braly Stadium against Virginia Union University, with UNA taking a 17-8 win.

December 25, 1984

Daryl Smith became UNA's first player to participate in the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic.

December 7, 1985

A 34-0 win at Braly Stadium over previously undefeated Bloomsburg, Pa., lands the Lions in the NCAA Division II National Championship Game.

December 14, 1985

The Lions made their first appearance in the NCAA Division II Championship game, playing in the Palm Bowl in McAllen, Texas. The Lions lost to North Dakota State 35-7.

December 11, 1986

The first Harlon Hill Trophy, the NCAA Division II College Football Player of the Year award, was

presented in the UNA student union building to Jeff Bentrim of North Dakota State University as a part of the Division II championship week activities.

December 13, 1986

The University of North Alabama served as the host school for the NCAA Division II National Championship Game.

December 15, 1987

Bobby Wallace was hired as the fifth head coach in UNA history.

September 24, 1988

UNA downed Delta State 27-24 on the road in Cleveland in a game that was stopped twice for tornado warnings. It marked the Lions first win under new head coach Bobby Wallace.

1980's

The Lions had the winningest program in the Gulf South Conference during the 1980s, posting a 74-34-5 record.

September 1, 1990

A crowd of 14,683, the largest in school history to that date, overflowed Braly Stadium for the 1990 opener against Alabama A&M, with UNA taking a 25-0 win. It was the first official sell-out in school history.

October 4, 1993

The Lions were ranked No. 1 in the NCAA Division II poll for the first time in school history, following a 44-32 win over Portland State in Portland.

December 10, 1993

Senior Lion running back Tyrone Rush finishes as the runner-up for the Harlon Hill Trophy as the NCAA Division II Player of the Year behind New Haven running back Roger Graham.

December 11, 1993

The Lions defeated Indiana, Pa., 41-34, to claim their first NCAA Division II National Championship with an overflow crowd of 15,631.

September 10, 1994

Pride Rock is unveiled for the first time at a Lion football game and the Lions respond with a 58-13 win over Alabama A&M in front of a sell-out crowd at Braly Stadium.

November 14, 1994

The Lions have an unprecedented 12 first-team All-Gulf South Conference selections.

December 10, 1994

UNA defeats Texas A&M-Kingsville 16-10 at Braly Municipal Stadium to claim a second straight NCAA Division II National Championship in front of a sell-out crowd of 13,526.

November 11, 1995

The Lions downed West Alabama 42-10 to claim an unprecedented third straight Gulf South Conference championship, closing the season with an 8-0 GSC record. The Lions also ran their streak of regular-season GSC wins to 22 games.

December 2, 1995

UNA downed Ferris State 45-7 at Braly Stadium in the semifinals of the Division II playoffs to become the first school in the history of collegiate football on any level to win as many as 40 games in just three seasons.

December 8, 1995

UNA linebacker Ronald McKinnon became the first defensive player to win the Harlon Hill Trophy as the NCAA Division II College Football Player of the Year. The senior from Elba received the award at the Florence Conference Center in front of a sell-out crowd of almost 800.

December 9, 1995

UNA became the first school in the history of NCAA scholarship football (Division I, I-AA or II) to

win three straight national championships. The Lions dominated previously undefeated Pittsburg State 27-7 in front of an overflow crowd of 15,241.

The Lions completed their second perfect season in three years, going 14-0.

August 31, 1996

UNA's overall 23-game winning streak and 41-game winning streak against Division II schools ended on the road at Albany State in a season-opening 17-10 loss.

September 9, 1996

For the first time in almost three years, the UNA Lions were not ranked No. 1 in the NCAA Division II poll. UNA had been ranked No. 1 in every poll since Oct. 4, 1993, or in 27 straight polls. After debuting as No. 1 in the 1996 pre-season poll, UNA was dropped to ninth in the Sept. 9 poll with a 1-1 record.

September 14, 1996

The Lions tied an NCAA Division II record with their 28th consecutive home win, downing Southern Arkansas 27-9.

September 28, 1996

UNA's 23-game Gulf South Conference winning streak and 28-game home win streak were ended in a stunning 38-35 loss to previously winless Arkansas Tech.

October 11, 1997

UNA picked up its first win ever over a Division I football team, and played the longest game in school history in the process, with a 48-42 four overtime win at Southwestern Louisiana. It is one of only a handful of wins ever by NCAA Division II teams over Division I-A opponents.

UNA's Perfect Season Earns 1993 National Championship

Cody Gross stood on the sideline, apparently done for the day. His helmet was under his arm as back-up quarterback Cale Manley began hurriedly loosening up.

The University of North Alabama offense that had dominated opponents all season had lost all momentum in the second half and the Lions trailed in the 1993 NCAA Division II Championship Game 24-14 in the fourth quarter.

But suddenly a blocked punt by Israel Raybon gave UNA new life and some 11 minutes later, Gross would be lying face down in the end zone after capping a 27-point fourth quarter rally that netted the Lions a 41-34 win and the Division II National Championship.

With Raybon giving the Lions a spark, Gross was again given the chance to bring the Lions back, and did he ever.

First he fired a 24-yard touchdown pass to Demetrea Shelton to make it 24-20, then directed a 66-yard drive that ended with a seven-yard Satterfield TD run that gave UNA a 27-24 lead.

Another 78-yard touchdown drive put UNA up by 10 points but Indiana-Pennsylvania rallied to tie the game at 34-34 with just 45 seconds left.

But Gross again met the challenge, taking UNA 69 yards in six plays.

First he carried on an option run to put UNA into IUP territory, then he passed to Shelton to the Indians one-yard-line.

A one-yard dive by Gross with just 10 seconds left gave UNA the win and its first football national crown.

It was the perfect end to the first perfect season in school and Gulf South Conference history.

In all UNA would break or tie 85 school and Gulf South Conference records.

The Lion players would receive 54 individual awards, including four players who were selected first-team All-American.

It was an amazing season that saw UNA score on its first play from scrimmage, and its last.

It was a season of unprecedented accomplishments for the Lions that followed a solid run at the national championship that fell short in 1992.

UNA left little doubts about its intentions in 1993 when fullback Brian Satterfield raced 48-yards on the teams first

play from scrimmage of the season and scored against Fort Valley State.

The floodgates opened and UNA romped the Wildcats 36-14 behind Satterfield's 243 yards that included a school-record 97-yard TD run.

UNA broke or tied 85 school and Gulf South Conference records in 1993

The next week at Alabama A&M, the UNA offense again set the tone, scoring seven touchdowns in a 49-7 rout of the Bulldogs.

And with more than 1,000 total yards in the team's first two games of the season, the UNA offense was just getting warmed up as it churned out 646 yards in week three in a 58-17 mauling of the Delta State Statesmen.

All-American tailback Tyrone Rush, who would finish as the runner-up for the Harlon Hill Trophy as the Division II Player of the Year, surpassed Satterfield's

two-week-old record with 248 yards and scored three touchdowns.

That set up the first major test of the season as the Lions traveled to Portland, Ore., for a national headliner with the Portland State Vikings.

UNA entered the game ranked No. 2 nationally behind North Dakota State, while Portland State was tied for third with New Haven.

The Bison of NDSU lost to Mankato State and by kickoff time on the west coast, everyone realized the Lion-Viking match-up was for the nation's number one ranking.

Portland State struck quickly behind star quarterback Bill Matos, racing to a 14-0 lead. The Lions managed a 10-play, 67-yard drive to make it 14-7, but PSU scored again to go ahead 20-7.

Another PSU score early in the third quarter made it 26-14 and the Lions chances appeared slim. But the defense began to stiffen and Kenyatta Jones, playing in place of an injured Satterfield, began to take charge of the offense.

After UNA rallied for 10 points in the third quarter to make it 26-24, a three-yard TD run by Rush gave the Lions their first lead at 30-26 with 26 seconds left in the third quarter.

A pair of touchdowns by Jones on runs of 55 and 17 yards made it 44-26 before UNA allowed a late score and settled for a 44-32 win.

The following Monday UNA claimed the nation's top ranking for the first time in the history of the program and would hold that spot for the remainder of the season.

Mississippi College was the first to challenge UNA's No. 1 ranking and the Choctaws battled to take a 28-27 lead over UNA with 12:20 left in the game in Clinton, Miss.

A 55-yard TD run Jones and a 20-yard Jamie Stoddard field goal brought the Lions back and gave UNA a 38-28 win to go 5-0 overall and 2-0 in the GSC.

A 17-0 win over Henderson State and a 27-10 win on the road at Central Arkansas on the Bears' Homecoming gave UNA a 7-0 record entering its own Homecoming against Livingston.

That game would again shatter numerous school records as UNA rolled to a 65-15 win with 565 yards of offense.

The Lions clinched the GSC title for the first time since 1985 the following week at Valdosta State as the UNA defense

picked off five Chris Hatcher passes and helped pave the way for 21 second half points as UNA won 31-21 on the Blazers home field.

A 41-14 win at home over West Georgia closed the first perfect regular-season in school history and, by virtue of UNA's No. 1 ranking, guaranteed the Lions the home field for every Division II playoff game.

In the opening round, South Atlantic Conference champion Carson-Newman couldn't meet the challenge as UNA raced to a 21-0 lead and settled for a 38-28 win over the Eagles with 455 yards of offense.

In the quarterfinal round, unbeaten Hampton hoped to avenge a home playoff loss to UNA in 1992 by downing the Lions on their home field. But the Pirates, although hanging close in the first half, were no match for the Lions as UNA recorded a 45-20 win and moved on to the semifinals.

The Lions gained 570 yards offensively and totally stifled Hampton in the final

two periods.

Needing just one more win to reach the Division II Championship Game in had hosted since 1986, UNA faced a Texas A&M-Kingsville team that started the season 0-5 before winning seven straight. The Javelinas continued to ride that momentum against UNA, blocking a punt for a touchdown just before halftime and adding three second half touchdowns to make it 27-25 with just 2:42 left in the game.

A successful two-point conversion would likely send the game to overtime, but Louis Fikes halfback pass fell incomplete in the end zone and UNA marched on to the title game.

The championship week in the Shoals area was a true extravaganza as the community turned out in full force to urge the Lions on.

An overflow crowd of almost 16,000 was in Braly Stadium for the title game and an additional national television audience watched on ESPN.

When it was all over, Doug Porter, the

chairman of the Division II Football Committee said "Division II football will never be the same again. This day has taken NCAA Division II football to a level it has never seen before. What a great feeling it is to be a part of something like this.

"This game had all the elements of a great championship," Porter added. "The stadium was sold out, the atmosphere and enthusiasm was great and the best two teams in the country put on a great show."

Numerous awards followed for the Lions, with head coach Bobby Wallace selected as NCAA Division II Coach of the Year by Kodak, Chevrolet and the Football Gazette.

Rush, linebacker Ronald McKinnon, offensive linemen Jeff Surbaugh and defensive end Jeff Redcross were all selected first-team All-American, with Redcross chosen as the GSC Defensive Player of the Year and Rush being named the league's Offensive Player of the Year for the second straight season.

North Alabama Successfully DEFENDS its Division II National Championship

Offense won the University of North Alabama its first NCAA Division II football national championship in 1993, and so it was only appropriate that the Lions title defense should fall upon the Defense.

In 1993, runningbacks Tyrone Rush and Brian Satterfield were featured on the cover of the team's media guide, proclaiming "Double Trouble" for the Lions opponents. The Lions then went 14-0 behind an offense that shattered virtually every school and conference rushing and scoring record.

And even in the Division II National Championship Game, it was a 27-point fourth quarter by the Lions offense, including a touchdown with just 10 seconds left against Indiana-Pennsylvania, that gave UNA its first football national championship.

In 1994, linebackers Ronald McKinnon and Keith Humphrey scowled on the cover of the Lions pre-season media guide as they DEFENDED the 1993 championship trophy, making it clear to any challengers that the Lions were intent on retaining the championship.

And defend they did.

While UNA's triple-option offense rolled up record numbers through the first four games, the Lions Purple Swarm defense looked untouchable, posting three shutouts in the first four games.

By season's end, UNA was second in the nation in two defensive categories, fourth in two others, and ready to defend its championship in the Division II playoffs.

With narrow wins over Carson-Newman and Valdosta State in the first two rounds and a romp of North Dakota in the semifinals, only Texas A&M-Kingsville stood between the Lions and a share of Division II history.

The Lions found themselves in a similar situation as in 1993. Clinging to a 16-10 lead late in the fourth quarter over Texas A&M-Kingsville, the UNA defense had its back to the wall. The Javelinas were driving and chewing up the clock.

Then, almost as scripted, with just 2:22 left in the game, McKinnon stepped in front of a Wilson Scott pass at the UNA 18-yard line, tipped it twice, got it under control, and raced 27 yards in the other

direction.

Another interception by Paul Sanders in the final minute closed the door for good on the Javelinas and the Lions had their second straight championship.

Not only did North Alabama become just the third school in NCAA Division II history to win back-to-back national championships, joining Southwest Texas State (1981-82) and North Dakota State (1985-86), but also became the first school in the history of NCAA competition on any level to have won two national championships in both football and basketball. UNA claimed Division II basketball titles in 1979 and 1991.

The Lions finished 13-1 in 1994, with the only loss coming on the road to eventual I-AA national champion Youngstown State, 17-14.

UNA's record run pushed the school's winning streak against Division II opponents to 27 straight and the Lions ranked No. 1 nationally in the Division II poll for the entire season, running that streak to 17 consecutive polls in the top spot.

The Lions became just the third school to win back-to-back Gulf South Conference titles, and the team would produce an unprecedented 12 first-team All-GSC selections and seven All-Americans, with five players from the Purple Swarm named to All-America teams.

UNA opened the season with a 35-0 romp of Fort Valley State on the road,

pounding the Wildcats with 618 total yards and 494 yards rushing. Kenyatta Jones rushed for 161 yards and scored three touchdowns, while the Lion defense allowed just 41 yards rushing on 31 attempts and surrendered just 87 total yards.

Game two was a similar story. Playing at home at Braly Stadium for the first time since winning the 1993 championship, and in front of a sell-out crowd of more than 14,000, UNA raced to a 58-0 lead over Alabama A&M with 7:22 left in the third quarter. The Lion offense rushed for 333 yards and had 395 total yards, but the defense caused four turnovers and held the Bulldogs to a minus 19 yards rushing. A&M scored twice late in the game on the Lions reserves, but UNA was 2-0 with a 58-13 win.

The Lions opened the Gulf South Conference portion of their schedule the following week at home against Mississippi College and ripped the Choctaws 24-0 and gave up just 58 yards rushing.

The next week at Delta State UNA posted a 38-0 win to go 4-0, giving up just 51 yards rushing. Jones rushed for 106 yards and scored twice for the Lions.

An open date the following week gave the Lions time to prepare for the defending I-AA national champion Penguins of Youngstown State.

It didn't start well for the Lions, as Youngstown State took its opening possession and marched 72 yards in seven

plays to score. But that would be it for the Penguins until the fourth quarter. The UNA defense, behind the play of McKinnon and tackle Marcus Keyes, closed the door on YSU, and UNA finally tied the game late in the third quarter on a one-yard run by quarterback Cody Gross.

The Penguins went on top again early in the final period, but Gross responded with a 62-yard scoring pass to Michael Edwards to make it 14-14 with 12:59 left. The outcome was finally decided when Paul Massaro booted a 30-yard field goal with 7:33 left to give Youngstown a 17-14 lead. UNA marched back to midfield but was stopped on a fourth down try, and the Lions 18-game winning streak had stopped.

With the impressive showing against a I-AA power, UNA held its spot atop the Division II poll, however, and the quest for the Division II title continued.

First UNA romped Henderson State 41-7 on the road, then the Lions turned their attention to a powerful Central Arkansas squad for Homecoming. Everything went UNA's way in the first half as the Lions rolled to a 28-0 lead behind 112 yards rushing and 135 yards passing from Gross. But the offense failed to gain a first down in the second half and the Bears rallied for 21 points before UNA's defense closed the door on a 28-21 win.

A 50-7 rout of Livingston set up the much anticipated matchup between the No. 1 ranked Lions and the No. 2 ranked Blazers of Valdosta State. UNA brought in the premier defense in Division II to meet the most explosive offense, led by eventual Harlon Hill Trophy winner Chris Hatcher. But this one was a mismatch as UNA crushed the Blazers on a soggy field, rolling to 31-7 and 38-13 leads before settling for a 38-21 win. Hatcher and the Blazers spent most of the night on the run from UNA's Purple Swarm, as the Lions intercepted four passes, recovered two fumbles, recorded three sacks and had five tackles for loss.

A 37-25 win over West Georgia closed the regular season at 9-1, and UNA turned its attention to the Division II playoffs.

Carson-Newman was the Lions opening round opponent for the second straight year, and the Eagles and Lions battled to a scoreless tie at halftime. UNA broke on top 10-0 in the second half on a Jamie Stoddard field goal and a Jarius Hayes end-around for a touchdown, but Carson-Newman struck for two quick touchdowns and held a 13-10 lead with 11:20 left in the game. The Lions drove down to the Eagles 16-yard line, where

they faced a fourth-and-six call. Stoddard booted a 33-yard field goal to tie the game, but the Eagles were offside, and UNA's Bobby Wallace decided to take the points off the scoreboard and go for a fourth-and-one at the 11. Senior Anthony Brooks, who missed the 1993 championship drive with a knee injury, burst through the left side and went 11 yards for a game-winning touchdown as UNA downed the Eagles 17-13, and advanced to the second round.

The Valdosta State Blazers were primed for their second chance at the Lions, but the game appeared headed in the same direction as UNA held a 17-3 lead in the fourth quarter. VSU rallied for two scores and suddenly the two GSC rivals were looking at the first overtime game in either's football history. Both scored touchdowns on their opening possessions in the extra period to make it 24-24, but Keyes blocked a Blazer field goal attempt in the second overtime, setting the stage for a game-winning 17-yard field goal by Stoddard for a 27-24 Lion win.

North Central Conference champion North Dakota was no match for UNA in the semifinal as the Lion's Michael Edwards returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown and UNA built a 35-0 lead before allowing a late score.

In the championship game, UNA played on a wet field for the fourth time, but Kenyatta Jones didn't slip in the first quarter when he went 90 yards

for a touchdown on the longest run in championship game history.

A Stoddard field goal and a Gross one-yard run made it 16-3 at the half, but again the offense sputtered in the second half, and it was up to the Purple Swarm to hold the line on the national title - and it did, once again.

Closing the season with 159 tackles, McKinnon became one of the most honored athletes in school history. He was a first-team All-America selection by the Associated Press, the American Football Coaches Association, the *Football Gazette*, the Division II Sports Information Directors and C.M. Frank. He was also first-team All-GSC for the third straight year, named GSC Defensive Player of the Year, and was selected as Division II National Player of the Year by CNN's College Football Preview show, as selected by Danny Sheridan.

Joining McKinnon on the various All-America teams were linebacker Keith Humphrey, defensive linemen Israel Raybon, Marcus Hunter and Marcus Keyes, and offensive linemen Kin Taylor and Jon Thompson.

Stoddard, punter Lee Morris, defensive back Gerald Smith, tight end Jarius Hayes and split end Michael Edwards were also first-team All-GSC picks.

Head coach Bobby Wallace was named Division II National Coach of the Year by ABC and Chevrolet, the American Football Coaches Association, the *Football Gazette* and *College Sports* magazine.

NORTH ALABAMA ROLLS TO UNPRECEDENTED THIRD STRAIGHT NATIONAL TITLE

For the University of North Alabama, an unprecedented third straight NCAA Division II national championship appeared as easy as 1-2-3.

In taking two previous national titles in 1993 and 1994, the Lions had to leap some hurdles to get to the title game, then had to rely on some last minute heroics from quarterback Cody Gross and linebacker Ronald McKinnon to secure those respective titles.

The 1995 Lions would have none of that, however. They simply dominated their field of play like no other team in college football history.

And when the season finally ended with a 27-7 win over Pittsburg State, it seemed almost anticlimactic. The Lions had done what they were expected to do and ended the 1995 season with no worlds left to conquer.

As a two-time defending national champion with 45 lettermen and 19 starters returning, the Lions entered 1995 with the pressure and expectation of trying to accomplish something that no previous Division II school had done. But the Lions managed to maintain their focus each Saturday throughout the regular-season, dominating 10 straight opponents, then clobbering four more in the playoffs by a combined 138-49 score.

Not only did UNA finish the season at 14-0 with its third straight conference and national championships, but both titles put the Lions in a class by themselves.

UNA's third straight national title marked the first time in the history of NCAA scholarship football (Division I, I-AA or II) that a school had won three consecutive national championships. And with a 41-1 record over that three-year span, UNA became the first team in the history of college football on any level to win 40 or more games in just three years.

In addition, UNA's third straight GSC title marked the first time in the league's 25-year history that any school had won three straight football championships.

The Lions dominance of Division II wasn't only in the post-season either. After taking over the top spot in the Division II poll on Oct. 4, 1993, the Lions

have maintained that ranking in every Division II poll since, setting another national record with 27 consecutive No. 1 rankings over a three-year period.

Individually, the Lions were also one of the most recognized groups in college football history.

A total of 10 different UNA players were selected for various All-America teams, and linebacker Ronald McKinnon became the first defensive player in the ten-year history of the Harlon Hill Trophy to be named as the Division II College Football Player of the Year.

The Lions senior class of 1995 closed their collective careers as the winningest class in school and Gulf South Conference history, with a 48-5-1 record that included 41 consecutive wins against Division II opponents and 22 straight conference wins.

Both the Lions offense and defense were dominant in 1995, and nowhere was that better demonstrated than in the championship game.

Pittsburg State had averaged 318 yards per game during 1995, but managed just 50 yards on 15 carries in the first half against UNA, while the Lions rolled up 248 total yards in the first 30 minutes with a make-shift offensive backfield.

With starting quarterback Cody Gross sidelined for the first time since 1992 with a hip injury, senior back-up Cale Manley stepped in and directed a 76-yard, 12-

play drive on UNA's opening possession. Jermaine Roberts went the final 28 yards untouched through a huge hole for the game's first score with 8:04 left in the opening period.

The Lions also turned to third-string fullback Nate George to start when 1,000-yard rusher A.J. Lamar went down with a stomach virus.

The Lions never missed a beat, and when McKinnon pounced on a PSU fumble early in the second quarter, Gross limped onto the field to give the team an additional emotional charge that also electrified the partisan UNA crowd of 15,241.

Gross, who closed his career at UNA with a 41-2 record as a starter, completed a pass to Demetrea Shelton on his first play and led a five-play drive that was capped by a five-yard TD run by Roberts. Gross would also fire a 13-yard touchdown pass to Michael Edwards with five seconds left in the half to make it 21-0, capping a 69-yard, 11-play drive.

The only bright spot for Pittsburg State came in the final period, when Ben Peterson recovered a UNA fumble and Jeff Moreland tossed a 15-yard touchdown pass to Chris Hudson on the next play for the Gorillas only score.

UNA answered with a score of its own, with George bulling in from one yard out with 34 seconds left to make it 27-7.

Moreland was picked off four times and the Gorillas were held to 99 yards rushing and just 176 total yards by UNA's Purple Swarm defense. UNA dominated the line of scrimmage, controlling the ball for 40:13, while PSU had it just 19:47.

Jermaine Roberts led UNA's championship game effort with 107 yards on 20 carries and scored twice. Gross, in limited duty and in severe pain, completed eight of 13 passes for 102 yards and a touchdown.

McKinnon, as always, led UNA's defensive charge with 14 tackles, one tackle for a five-yard loss and recovered a fumble that led to UNA's second touchdown. He closed his career as the all-time leading tackler in school and Gulf South Conference history with 621 career tackles.

Bobby Wallace, who has been named Division II National Coach of the Year in both 1993 and 1994, was honored again in 1995 by the American Football Coaches Association, ABC and Chevrolet, CNN, American Football Quarterly and the Football Gazette.

UNA opened the 1995 season at home against an Albany State squad that had reached the Division II playoffs in 1994. At halftime, the Lions trailed 13-6 but rallied to score on their first possession of the second half and scored 28 third quarter points on the way to a 41-13 blowout of the Rams.

The Lions followed with a 49-0 thumping of Alabama A&M, a 30-0 rout of Delta State and a 41-3 win over Mississippi College to quickly move to 4-0.

An eventual playoff team, West Georgia provided the next test and trailed just 14-13 at the half, but UNA again rolled in the second half and went on to a 34-19 win.

A 28-7 win in a defensive struggle at Central Arkansas pushed UNA to 6-0 as the Lion defense scored twice. Then the Reddies of Henderson State charged into Braly Stadium, ready to end the Lions string of successes. Henderson only led once in the game, at 14-7, the Reddies would not go away and UNA managed to hold on for a 33-28 win behind 216 yards rushing from A.J. Lamar.

A 26-9 rout of Valdosta State, a 52-17 whipping of Arkansas Tech and a 42-10 victory over West Alabama closed the Lions regular-season at 10-0 and gave the Lions a full head of steam for the playoffs.

In the opening round, UNA again met Albany State, and again found itself trailing at the half, 14-10. But the Lions again scored on their opening possession of the second half and never looked back, scoring 28 second half points on the way to a 38-28 win.

Carson-Newman was then eliminated from the playoff picture for the third straight year by the Lions, although the Eagles held a 7-0 lead near the end of the first quarter. Gross rambled 90 yards, going from sideline to sideline on his way to the end zone, to tie the game, and UNA dominated the rest of the way to whip the Eagles 28-7.

Undefeated Ferris State was the Lions semifinal opponent, but the Bulldogs were no match for UNA as McKinnon dominated a head-to-head show with fellow Hill finalist Bill Love, intercepting two passes and sacking Love once.

UNA won 45-7 in a runaway, with the only down moment coming when Gross suffered a hip injury at the end of a 31-yard touchdown run on UNA's opening possession.

In claiming the Division II title, UNA gave the Gulf South Conference its fourth straight Division II football crown and sixth football championship in the last nine years.

The Lions closed 1995 with numerous streaks still intact, including 26 straight home field wins, 18 straight wins over nationally ranked Division II opponents, 12 straight NCAA playoff wins and 23 straight wins overall.

McKinnon became just the fifth player in Division II history to be a three-time consensus All-American, and was just one of 10 Lions to receive All-America honors. He was joined by linebacker Keith Humphrey, defensive linemen Israel Raybon, Marcus Keyes and Reginal Ruffin, defensive back Gerald Smith, quarterback Cody Grossm tight end Jarius Hayes and offensive linemen Jon Thompson and Michael Williams.

The ACC

No it's not the Atlantic Coast Conference. At least not for this reference. It was the Alabama Collegiate Conference, which the Lions competed in during the 1960's. The four state supported colleges - Florence State (now UNA), Troy State, Jacksonville State and Livingston (now West Alabama) - formed the ACC in 1960. The Lions won the conference football crown in 1960 and 1961 and shared the title in 1962 and 1963 with Jacksonville State. The Lions produced numerous All-ACC players throughout the 1960's but those records are incomplete.

All-Americans

The Lions have had numerous All-Americans, including an unprecedented seven players selected to various All-America teams in 1994, followed by an even more unbelievable 10 selections in 1995. UNA had four first-team picks in 1993 and also had four All-American picks last season. The school's first All-American was end Harlon Hill in 1953. In all UNA has had 52 different players chosen first, second or third-team All-American, with linebacker Ronald McKinnon becoming one of just five players in Division II history to be a three-time consensus first-team All-American. Linebackers James Davis, running back Tyrone Rush, defensive linemen Marcus Keyes and Israel Raybon, offensive guard Jon Thompson, defensive end/linebacker Reginald Ruffin and receiver/kick returner Anthony Merritt were named first-team All-American in two different seasons. Ruffin is the only Lion athlete to ever be All-American at two different positions - selected as a defensive end in 1996 and as a linebacker in 1997. Safety Harvey Summerhill and cornerback Gerald Smith were named second-team as juniors and first-team as seniors.

All-Star Games

A total of 23 Lion players have participated in post-season all-star games. Defensive back Darryl Smith played in both the Blue-Gray Classic and the Senior Bowl in 1984 and defensive back Lewis Billups followed in 1985, also playing in both games. In 1990, offensive tackle Mike Nord was selected for the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game. In 1993, running back Tyrone Rush and offensive guard Jeff Surbaugh played in the inaugural Snow Bowl/NCAA Division II All-Star Game in Fargo, N.D., followed by center Kin Taylor and defensive end Marcus Hunter in 1994, linebacker Ronald McKinnon and tight end Jarvis Hayes in 1995, defensive back Gerald Smith in 1996, linebacker Reginald Ruffin and offensive lineman Joe Washington in 1997 and tight end Bobby Collins and punter Tony Faggioni in 1998. McKinnon was selected as the East team's Defensive Most Valuable Player. In 2000 the Snow Bowl moved to Kingsville, Texas and was renamed the Cactus Bowl, and Larry Paul and Chad Sears played in the game. Tight end John Bradley played in the game in 2002, quarterback Will Hall in 2003 and defensive back Evan Oglesby in 2004. Lee Vickers and Blake Farris played in the 2005 Cactus Bowl. Also in 1995, defensive tackle Marcus Keyes played in the Blue-Gray Classic and the Senior Bowl and defensive tackle Israel Raybon played in the Blue-Gray Classic and the East-West Shrine Classic, with Raybon selected as the Gray's Defensive Most Valuable Player in the Blue-Gray game.

Beating No. 1

On November 1, 2003, UNA knocked off the No. 1 team in the nation - downing Valdosta State 17-10 in Valdosta. It was UNA's first win over a top ranked team.

Brains and Brawn

Nine different UNA football players have been selected first-team All-Gulf South Conference and Academic All-GSC as well. That list includes Dexter Rutherford, James Knowles, Steve Rogers, James Davis, Sherman Johnson, Kin Taylor, Lee Morris, Michael Williams and Jon Thompson. Former Lion offensive lineman Eddie Evans did that one better, however, being named second-team Academic All-American and All-South Region in the same season (1995). Davis, who made All-American in 1990, also won the National Impromptu Speaking competition at the national Phi Beta Lambda convention in Washington, D.C.

The Catch

One of the single most recounted plays in UNA football history. On Nov. 22, 1980, UNA and Jacksonville State were tied 28-28 with the Gulf South Conference championship on the line. UNA faced a third-and-13 situation with just 36 seconds remaining from its own 17 yard line. Quarterback Fred Riley dropped back, faked once and lofted a pass down the right sideline. Jerry Hill ran under the pass and raced to the end zone for a dramatic 83-yard score that gave UNA a 35-28 win and its first GSC football championship. As a result of the win, the Lions also received their first NCAA playoff bid in 1980 and advanced to the semifinals.

Championship Game

UNA is the host for the NCAA Division II Football Championship Game and has been since 1986. The 2007 game will mark the 22nd time the game has been played at Braly Municipal Stadium - the most at any one site since the game was created in 1973. It is the third longest consecutive period that any NCAA championship has been at one site. UNA and the Shoals area's quest for the game began in 1985 when the Lions advanced to the title game which was then played in McAllen, Tex., as the Palm Bowl. Following the game, the Shoals National Championship Committee was formed under the leadership of Grady Liles to try and bring the game to Florence and was successful in doing so. The 2007 game is scheduled for December 15.

Coaches

The University of North Alabama has produced hundreds of coaches on both the high school and collegiate level and has had numerous coaches pass through the Lion program on the way to jobs at other collegiate and professional programs. At one point, when Hal Self was near the end of his 20-year career as the Lions' head coach, he had 142 coaches in the field.

Defensive Backs

It has become the most renowned position at North Alabama over the years with a spectacular tradition. Since the GSC was formed in 1971, UNA defensive backs have been first-team All-GSC picks 25 times. Former UNA defensive backs Darryl Smith and Lewis Billups played in both the Blue-Gray Classic and the Senior Bowl and later played in Super Bowl XXIV as members of the Cincinnati Bengals. Smith, Bruce Jones, Wendell Phillips, Sedric Barnett, Harvey Summerhill, Gerald Smith, Marcus Hill, Tyrone Bell, Chad Sears, Evan Oglesby and Blake Farris received All-America acclaim as DBs at UNA. In addition, 13 Lion defensive backs have been drafted or signed by professional football teams - including Oglesby (who signed with the Buffalo Bills following the 2004 season and now plays

with the Baltimore Ravens) and Farris (who signed with the Cleveland Browns). On the GSC Team of the Decade for the 1980s, three of the four defensive backs selected for first-team honors were from UNA (Smith, Billups and Jones). On the GSC Team of the Decade for the 1990s, three defensive backs were also from UNA (Summerhill, Smith, Hill).

The Drive

The University of North Alabama won its first Division II football championship in dramatic fashion, with a last-minute drive that pulled out a 41-34 win over Indiana-Pennsylvania in the 1993 Championship Game. IUP tied the game at 34-34 on a field goal with 45 seconds left. After the kickoff, UNA took over on its own 31-yard line and marched 61 yards in six plays to win the game. First, Brian Satterfield gained two yards, then Cody Gross optioned right for 28 yards to the IUP 39. After grounding the ball to stop the clock, Gross hit freshman Demetrea Shelton with a 38-yard pass to the IUP one, and Gross then plowed in for the winning touchdown with just 10 seconds left in the game.

Forty Wins. . . in Just Three Years

North Alabama was the first program in the history of collegiate football on any level to win as many as 40 games in just three years. From 1993-95, UNA posted 14-0, 13-1 and 14-0 records for a combined 41-1 mark over the three-year span. Included in that record was three straight NCAA Division II National Championships.

Goober and Wimp

Their nicknames may not show it, but Goober and Wimp are two of the most highly regarded graduates of the University of North Alabama. George "Goober" Lindsey, star of television's "Andy Griffith Show," Mayberry R.F.D. and "Hee Haw," is a former Lion football player. Lindsey was quarterback and a two-year letterman for the Lions in 1950-51. He is one of three former Lion athletes enshrined in the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame. Another is former Lion basketball standout Winfrey "Wimp" Sanderson. A three-year letterman for the Lions from 1957-59, Sanderson scored 1,076 points and averaged 14.9 points for his career. After 20 years as an assistant basketball coach at the University of Alabama, Sanderson became head coach for the Crimson Tide in 1981. In 12 seasons, he directed Alabama to 10 NCAA events. He is also a member of the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame and retired after several years as head basketball coach at Arkansas-Little Rock.

The Gulf South Conference

North Alabama is a charter member of the Gulf South Conference and was one of six schools to help create the league in 1970. UNA, Delta State and West Alabama are the only three charter members still in the league. UNA has won eight GSC football crowns, in addition to titles in basketball, women's basketball, baseball, tennis, volleyball, softball and women's cross country. The GSC is regarded as one of the toughest NCAA Division II conferences in the nation and has produced more than 41 national champions.

Since 1991 the GSC has lost Troy State, Tennessee-Martin and Jacksonville State, but they have been replaced by Central Arkansas, Henderson State, Southern Arkansas, Arkansas-Monticello, Arkansas Tech, Harding and Ouachita Baptist as well as non-football playing schools

in Lincoln Memorial, Alabama-Huntsville, the University of West Florida, Christian Brothers University, and the University of Montevallo. LMU and Central Arkansas left the GSC following 2005-06 and the league has 15 current members.

Hall of Fame

Former Lion football players George Lindsey and Harlon Hill, former Lion football coaches Hal Self, Bobby Wallace and Mickey Andrews and former Lion basketball coach Wimp Sanderson have been inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame, and Hill also holds membership in the NAIA Helms Foundation Hall of Fame. Hill became UNA's first inductee in ASHOF in 1976, followed by Lindsey in 1983, Sanderson in 1990, Self in 1996, Wallace in 2004 and Andrews in 2006. Located in Birmingham, ASHOF honors the state's sports legends.

Harlon Hill Trophy

The NCAA Division II College Football Player of the Year award is named for former Lion end Harlon Hill and presented every December in the Shoals. UNA sports information director Jeff Hodges serves as chairman of the National Harlon Hill Award Committee. Hill was an All-American end for the Lions in 1953 and was later Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player in the National Football League with the Chicago Bears.

The award was created in 1986, with North Dakota State quarterback Jeff Bentrin as its first recipient. The 2007 award will be presented on December 14 at the 22nd annual Harlon Hill Awards Banquet.

Eleven UNA players have been nominated for the Hill award: Marvin Marsh (RB) in 1986, Tommy Compton (QB) in 1988, James Davis (LB) in 1990, Tyrone Rush (RB) in 1992 and 1993, Ronald McKinnon in 1994 and 1995, Gerald Smith in 1996, Greg Manson in 1998, Will Hall in 2003 and Anthony Merritt in 2005 and 2006. Rush finished second in the voting in 1993 behind New Haven running back Roger Graham, while McKinnon won the 1995 award. He became not only the first defensive player to win the award but was the first to even finish in the top five. Hall also won the Hill Trophy in 2003, giving UNA its second National Player of the Year. Merritt finished sixth in 2005.

Since 1985, UNA has faced a Harlon Hill Trophy finalist 22 times and has come away with a 11-11 record. In 1994, UNA faced the Hill Trophy winner twice, defeating Valdosta State and Chris Hatcher both times. UNA's defense dominated Hatcher in the first meeting, a 38-21 UNA win. In the second meeting, Hatcher led VSU back from a 17-3 deficit to force the first overtime game in school history, but UNA prevailed 27-24 in two extra periods.

Indoor Football

UNA played indoors at the Alerus Center in Grand Forks, N.D., in 2003, marking the Lions second game played indoors. UNA won 37-21 at East Tennessee State in the Lions first game played inside in 1977. UNA lost at UND, 29-22.

Live Lion Tradition Continues

UNA once again boasts the only live Lion mascots in the country living on campus. On July 22, 1974, former UNA president Dr. Robert M. Guillot brought a 35-pound lion cub to the campus and Leo spent the next 14 years "roaring" the school to victory. The original Leo died on Jan. 20, 1988, and a great outpouring of support from the Shoals community resulted in Leo II being brought to UNA in July of 1988. Leo II lived in the compound that once

housed the original Leo and grew to a weight of more than 600 pounds at eleven years of age. In 1997, Leo II was selected as the nation's "Second Best Mascot" by Sports Illustrated. He died in February of 2000.

Leo III and Una, born on November 18, 2002, now reside on the campus in the 12,764 square-foot George H. Carroll Lion Habitat.

Monkey Incident

In UNA's 17-10 win over Valdosta State in 2003, as the Lions were clinching an upset of the No. 1 ranked Division II team in the fourth quarter - a guy in a monkey costume ran onto the field and attempted to tackle Lion quarterback Will Hall. The fan was arrested and UNA held on to win the game, but the national publicity fanned by the incident exceeded the publicity of UNA downing the No. 1 team. Hall even made an appearance with Dan Patrick on ESPN radio.

National Championships

The Lion football program has had the chance to play for eleven in the NCAA playoffs and won its first in 1993 with a dramatic 41-34 win over Indiana-Pennsylvania in the Championship Game at Braly Stadium. UNA followed with a second straight Division II football crown in 1994, becoming just the third school in Division II history to win back-to-back titles. Then in 1995, UNA won a third straight football championship, becoming the first school in the history of NCAA scholarship football (Division I, I-AA or II) to win three straight national championships. The UNA basketball program has won two Division II titles, in 1979 and 1991, and that makes UNA the only school in the history of NCAA competition on any level to have won two national championships in both football and basketball. Only five other NCAA schools have ever even won one championship in each sport (Michigan, Michigan State, Ohio State, Jacksonville State and Wittenberg).

In 2003, UNA added a Division II National Championship in women's volleyball - giving the school six national titles.

UNA has had teams compete in the NCAA Division II championship tournaments in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, golf, men's tennis, women's tennis and volleyball, and has had individuals compete in the national championship events in golf and women's cross country.

The Gulf South Conference has produced eight of the last 19 Division II national champions and has nine Division II football championship teams.

Off the Sidelines

That's where two West Alabama (formerly Livingston) players came from to tackle L.L. Whitten in 1952. Whitten had broken away and was running for an apparent touchdown when two Livingston players jumped off the sidelines and tackled him. The Lions led 27-6 at the time and went on to a 34-6 win when Whitten was awarded a touchdown, despite being tackled at the Tigers' 28 yard-line. Walter Henders, the current head coach at Chipley High School in Florida, was the 13th man who finally brought Whitten down. The play was even more significant because it happened two years before Alabama's Tommy Lewis made the well known off the sidelines tackle of Dickey Moegle of Rice in the Cotton Bowl.

LION PRIDE



The Pride Rock

The University of North Alabama's Pride Rock tradition began in 1994, with the rock making its first appearance at a Lion football game on Sept. 10 at Braly Stadium against Alabama A&M.

Pride Rock is a 60-pound, engraved granite stone with an actual paw print from Leo, UNA's live lion mascot. The rock is used as a motivational tool for the Lion players. It is placed just behind the north end zone at all Lion home games and the players file past and touch the rock on their way to the field. It serves as a reminder to the current Lion players of the proud tradition that has been established at the school and of all the former players who have played a part in building that tradition. It also symbolizes the pride and unity of the team and the university.

Pride Rock is also carried to all away football games.

UNA sports information director Jeff Hodges originated the idea of the Pride Rock after the home of the Pride of Lions in the movie the Lion King.

Leo's former trustee, Joe Wallace, designed the rock, and it was crafted and donated to the university by Richard Beckman of Florence Marble Works.

Webster's Ninth New Collegiate Dictionary defines pride as, 1: The quality or state of being proud; a: delight or elation arising from some act, possession, or relationship; 2: a source of pride: the best in a group or class; 3: a company of lions.

Overtime

UNA has played nine overtime games in its football history, and five of the nine were multiple overtimes. The Lions played the first overtime game in school history on November 25, 1994, against Valdosta State at Braly Stadium in the second round of the NCAA Division II playoffs. UNA led 17-3 in the fourth quarter but was forced to overtime before the Lions moved to the Blazers one-yard line on its possession. Jamie Stoddard was called on to kick a 17-yard field goal that gave the Lions a 27-24 victory.

In 1996, UNA blew a two touchdown lead in the fourth quarter and lost 34-31 to Valdosta State in three overtimes at Valdosta. In 1997, UNA played its third, and longest overtime game, defeating Division I Southwestern Louisiana 48-40 in Lafayette, La., in four overtimes. In 1999 UNA downed Henderson State 21-14 in overtime, in 2000 UNA lost 28-21 at Pittsburg State in overtime and in 2002 UNA lost 24-21 to Samford in two overtimes.

In 2005 UNA played two overtime games, both on the road at Central Arkansas. UNA lost the first match-up in double overtime to the Bears, 29-26. The Lions came back and avenged that loss with a 41-38 victory over UCA in the third round of the NCAA Division II playoffs. UNA defeated Valdosta State in overtime in 2006.

The Perfect Season(s)

That's what UNA had in 1993, and then again in 1995. The Lions went 14-0 for the first perfect season in school and Gulf South Conference history in 1993, and followed with the same perfect results in 1995. The 1993 and 1995 Lions are in a select group of just eight NCAA Division II teams to ever claim the national championship with a perfect record.

Playoffs

The Lions have been to 12 NCAA football playoffs (1980, 1983, 1985, 1990, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997, 2003, 2005, 2006) and have a 23-9 record in post-season action. UNA advanced all the way to the Division II Championship Game at the Palm Bowl in McAllen, Tex., in 1985. In 1993, 1994 and 1995, the Lions became the first team in the history of the Division II playoffs to play for the championship on their home field. UNA has hosted 24 of the 32 playoff games and the Lions boast a 71.8 winning percentage in the Division II playoffs.

Pride of Dixie

The UNA Lions are backed by the Pride of Dixie Marching Band, which performs at all Lion home games under the direction of Lloyd Jones.

Professional Football

The Lions have had numerous players drafted and signed by professional teams in the National Football League, the World Football League, the United States Football League, the Canadian Football League the Xtreme Football League, in Arena Football and Arena2.

The most prominent has been Harlon Hill, who was Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player in the NFL with the Chicago Bears. Lewis Billups and Darryl Smith played for the Cincinnati Bengals in Super Bowl XXIV, Stevie Hobbs was a team captain for the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl XXVI, and defensive tackle Shawn Lee started for the San Diego Chargers in Super Bowl XXIX.

Publications

The University of North Alabama's athletic publications have won numerous national awards, including more than 70 since 1984. Among those, the Lions football media guide has been judged among the top four in the nation in 16 of the last 19 years, including being picked Best in the Nation in 1995 and 1999. In judging by the College Sports Information Directors of America, the UNA football program also received awards in 2006 as "Best in the Nation" and "Best Cover in the Nation." The awards were presented for Division B, which includes all NCAA Division II and NAIA Division I schools.

Punt Blocking

The Lions have had some of the best kick blockers in Division II history in Bruce Jones, Daryl Smith and Israel Raybon. Jones blocked a Gulf South Conference record five punts in 1985 and had six in his career. Smith blocked a total of eight kicks during his career, and Raybon set a school record with nine career blocked kicks from 1992-95. The most famous blocked punt in school history came on Dec. 11, 1993, when sophomore Israel Raybon blocked a John McGhee punt with 12:17 left in the NCAA Division II National Championship Game and UNA trailing 24-14. He recovered the blocked kick at the IUP 28 and UNA scored three plays later. The Lions went on to score 27 points in the final period and won their first national championship, 41-34.



The Purple Swarm

North Alabama's dominant defense in 1994 and 1995 was nicknamed the Purple Swarm, because of the team's all-purple uniforms and the incredible team speed that allowed Lion defenders to swarm the football. In 1994 the Lions defense was second nationally in total defense and pass defense and was fourth in scoring and rushing defense. In 1995 UNA led the nation in rushing and scoring defense and was second in total defense. In just two years The Purple Swarm produced seven different All-Americans in linebackers Ronald McKinnon and Keith Humphrey, linemen Marcus Hunter, Israel Raybon, Marcus Keyes and Reginald Ruffin and defensive back Gerald Smith.

LION PRIDE



The UNA Lion

The University of North Alabama saw the arrival of another Lion on its campus just prior to the 1994 football season, but this one weighed a full ton more than UNA's live lion mascots. This Lion, a 2,700 pound concrete statue, was presented to the university by the UNA Sportsman's Club in honor of the school's three national championship teams (1979 and 1991 basketball, 1993 football). But no sooner than the statue went up, the Lions won a fourth title with the 1994 Division II football championship. A fifth national crown was added in 1995 and a sixth in volleyball in 2003. The Lion was purchased from the Ornamental Concrete Company in Mississippi and came from a die created in Germany. The Lion is four feet high, two feet wide and seven feet long and stands on a 3'x8' base. A plaque adorns the side of the monument in honor of UNA's NATIONAL CHAMPIONS, and lists the year and team records for each of the Lions national championship teams. With the Lions three national championships in football and two in basketball, the school is the only one in the history of NCAA competition on any level to have won two championships in both football and basketball.

The Lion stands beside Pine Street, directly in front of Flowers Hall.

The Lion has been the official mascot of all UNA teams since the school began athletic competition in the 1930s. The school has had a costume mascot for decades, and has been the only school in the country to have a live lion mascot living on campus since 1974.

Historical Marker

When the University of North Alabama football team won an unprecedented third straight NCAA Division II national championship in 1995, the Lions knew they had made history. But on April 30, 1998, the Lions got their own historical marker to prove it, when the UNA National Alumni Association, UNA Sportsman's Club and the Florence Historical Society unveiled a historical marker on Pine Street next to the UNA football practice field. Above, former Lion head coach Bobby Wallace looks at the marker during the unveiling ceremony. The marker commemorated UNA's three consecutive NCAA Division II football national championships from 1993-95, which made UNA the first school in the history of NCAA scholarship football to win three straight titles. During the course of that three-year period, the Lions also posted a 41-1 record, making UNA the first school in the history of collegiate football on any level to win as many as 40 games in just three seasons. The Lions also held a record 27 consecutive No. 1 rankings in Division II. To qualify for consideration for a historical marker, a site or event must have local, state or national significance and must have affected a specific group of people. The marker committee of the Florence Historical Society then voted on the prospective marker. The Lions posted 14-0, 13-1 and 14-0 records from 1993-95, won 41 consecutive games against NCAA Division II opponents, and suffered their only loss during the three-year period to the No. 3 ranked team in Division I-AA, Youngstown State, 17-14 in Youngstown. Another sign of the historical significance of the Lions accomplishments during that three year span was an invitation to meet with President Bill Clinton, Vice President Al Gore and members of Congress, following the 1995 season. The Lion seniors and coaches were treated to a reception on Capital Hill and later visited with President Clinton and Vice President Gore at the White House.

Rankings

The Lions have been nationally ranked in the NCAA Division II polls on numerous occasions before finally achieving a No. 1 ranking on Oct. 4, 1993 after downing Portland State on the road. The Lions then held that No. 1 ranking in Division II for the next 27 straight polls.

UNA has finished among the top 10 teams in the Division II final poll in 1980, 1983, 1985, 1993, 1994, 1995, 2003, 2005 and 2006. UNA held the No. 1 ranking at the end of the 1993, 1994 and 1995 regular-seasons, becoming the first Division II school to do that three straight years.

Hal Self

Henry "Hal" Self served as the Lions first head football coach of the modern era when the sport was revived at UNA in 1949. Over the next 21 seasons he posted a 109-81-8 record, compiling 13 winning seasons against a rugged schedule that included numerous Division I schools, and with a staff that, for the majority of that time, consisted only of Self and George Weeks. From 1952-63 Self led UNA to a combined 31-0-2 record against state rivals Livingston, Troy State and Jacksonville State. Self served 33 years at UNA as a coach, athletic director and member of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation faculty. In 1996 he was inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame.

Statistical Champions

The UNA Lions football teams have had three individual NCAA Division II national statistical champions. Place-kicker Nelson McMurrain led the nation in field goals in 1980 with 1.40 made per game. He connected on 14 of 22 attempts. Running back Clarence Johnson was the division's top scorer in 1983 with 9.6 points per game or 16 touchdowns in 10 regular-season games. Quarterback Will Hall led the nation in passing efficiency in 2003 with a 173.3 rating. In 1993, UNA won two team statistical championships as well, leading the nation in rushing (371.5) and net punting (36.8).

Team of the Decade

• GSC •

The UNA Lions dominated the Gulf South Conference Team of the Decade for the 1980s with seven first-team selections, as well as the GSC Team of the 1990s with 17.

Team of the Quarter Century

• GSC •

A total of fifteen former Lions were named to the Gulf South Conference Team of the Quarter Century, from 1971-95. Kicker James Knowles and punter John Crittenden were on the special teams, while quarterback Cody Gross, running back Tyrone Rush, tight end Jarius Hayes and linemen Don Smith and Jon Thompson were named to the offensive unit. Defensively, lineman Marcus Keyes and Israel Raybon, linebackers Ronald McKinnon, Keith Humphrey and James Davis and defensive backs Bruce Jones, Harvey Summerhill and Daryl Smith were named to the squad.

In addition, UNA's Bobby Wallace was selected Coach of the Quarter Century and UNA's Ronald McKinnon was named Defensive Player of the Quarter Century.

Team of the Quarter Century

• NCAA Division II •

As part of the celebration of the 25th Anniversary of the NCAA Division II Football Championship, a Division II "Team of the Quarter Century" was selected and included four former Lions. UNA kicker James Knowles, linebacker Ronald McKinnon, defensive lineman Israel Raybon and offensive lineman Jon Thompson were all selected for the team.

In addition, the 1995 Lion team that went 14-0 and completed a reign of three straight national championships was selected as the "Best Team" of the Quarter Century, and UNA's Bobby Wallace was named Division II "Coach of the Quarter Century."

Television

The Lions have made numerous appearances on regional or national television over the years, including a record five times in 1994, another five times in 1995 and three times in 2005.

Over the years, Lion football games have been telecast nationally by ABC, CBS, ESPN and ESPN2, and regionally by SportSouth, Midwest Sports Channel, Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast and WAAY(ABC) in Huntsville.

Three Straight

North Alabama is the only school in the history of the Gulf South Conference to win three straight outright conference football championships, taking titles in 1993, 1994 and 1995. UNA is also the only school in the history of NCAA scholarship football (Division I, I-AA or II) to have ever won three straight national championships.

Triple-Option

Former UNA head coach Bobby Wallace switched the Lions to a triple-option offense for the first time in 1992 and the results were incredible. UNA had an 83-34-1 record with the triple-option, made five NCAA playoff appearances and won three straight Gulf South Conference and NCAA Division II National Championships. UNA led the GSC in rushing four straight years and led Division II in 1993.

Victory Flame

The Victory Flame returned to the UNA campus in 1995 through the efforts of the UNA National Alumni Association. An important University symbol, the Victory Flame burned on the UNA campus from 1962 to 1986, but was extinguished with the building of the Guillot University Center. The new Victory Flame and Victory Garden stand between Bibb Graves Hall and the Memorial Amphitheatre, directly across the street from the Flame's former site. The flame is lit following every Lion victory or significant event in the life of the University. A miniature replica of the Victory Flame also stands atop the Lions football dressing room at Braly Stadium.

White House

The seniors and coaches from the 1995 Lion football team became the first NCAA Division II team to be invited to the White House to meet with President Bill Clinton, Vice President Al Gore and members of Congress. The Lions had a reception on Capital Hill, then met with the President and Vice President on the steps of the White House.

1912

That's the year of the first recorded score of a Lion football game, and it wasn't pretty. Florence State Normal School, as UNA was then known, played only one football game that season, and lost 101-0 to Sewanee. The Lions continued to play for 16 more seasons before dropping the sport in 1928 after losing twice to Marion Institute, 86-0 and 85-0.

March 30, 1949

Florence State Teachers College President Dr. E.B. Norton called a student assembly to announce that football would be renewed and that the Lions would jump headlong into collegiate competition that fall.

No. 1 vs. No. 2

A meeting between the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams in the NCAA Division II has happened twice in UNA history, with both coming in 1994. The first meeting was on November 5, with UNA ranked No. 1 at 7-1 and Gulf South Conference rival Valdosta State ranked No. 2 at 9-0. The Lions dominated the Blazers 38-21 at Braly Stadium. On December 10, UNA faced Texas A&M-Kingsville in the NCAA Division II Championship Game at Braly Stadium and won 16-10. Kingsville had ranked No. 2 in Division II in the final poll following the regular-season, while the Lions had maintained their No. 1 ranking.
