## Supporting UNC Field Hockey

The University of North Carolina has a long-term agreement with Nike, which provides UNC teams with shoes, apparel, equipment bags and other products. The contract, signed in 1994 and again in 1997, was extended for a period of eight more years beginning in July 2002. In addition to Nike products, the agreement provides \$100,000 annually to the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund for undergraduate teaching and \$100,000 annually to the UNC athletic department to reward Olympic sport programs and coaches for academic and athletic excellence.

## To reach the Tar Heels' Francis E. Henry Stadium:

**From the Raleigh/Durham International Airport and points east of Chapel Hill:** Take I-40 West to exit 273-B. Get on Highway 54 West toward Chapel Hill. Follow Highway 54 for approximately three miles. After passing under the 15-501 overpass, the road will go up a hill. At the top of the hill, take a left at the light onto Country Club Road. Take the first right onto Ridge Road. Henry Stadium will be on the right, across from Boshamer Stadium, the baseball field.

**From points north of Chapel Hill:** Follow I-85 South to Durham. At exit 174, stay in the left-hand lane to get on 15-501 South. Stay on 15-501 South to Chapel Hill. Exit 15-501 at the Highway 54 junction, following signs for the UNC campus. Proceed up the hill and take a left at the light onto Country Club Road. Take the first right onto Ridge Road. Henry Stadium will be on the right, across from Boshamer Stadium, the baseball field.

**From points west of Chapel Hill:** Take I-85 North to I-40 East. Follow I-40 to exit 270, 15-501 South. Stay on 15-501 South into Chapel Hill. Exit at the Highway 54 junction, following signs for the UNC campus. Proceed up the hill and take a left at the light onto Country Club Road. Take the first right onto Ridge Road. Henry Stadium will be on the right, across from Boshamer Stadium, the baseball field.

**From points south of Chapel Hill:** Take I-77 North to I-85 North. Follow I-85 North to I-40 East. Follow I-40 East to exit 270, 15-501 South. Stay on 15-501 South into Chapel Hill. Exit at the Highway 54 junction, following signs for the UNC campus. Proceed up the hill and take a left at the light onto Country Club Road. Take the first right onto Ridge Road. Henry Stadium will be on the right, across from Boshamer Stadium, the baseball field.

# Coach Karen Shelton



It took just one visit to Chapel Hill, more than two decades ago, to convince Karen Shelton that she never wanted to leave. "When I saw the campus and the facilities and met the team," Shelton says, "I knew I could build a program here." Shelton took over in 1981 and has led the Tar Heels to national prominence, in the form of four NCAA Championships, six NCAA runner-up finishes, 14 Atlantic Coast Conference titles and 20 winning seasons. With a 3-1 victory over Wake Forest on Oct. 27, 1998, Shelton notched the 300th win of her career, all at UNC. She hit the 350-win mark on Oct. 25, 2001, when the Tar Heels earned a 3-0 win over Virginia.

After 22 seasons in Chapel Hill, Shelton's career record stands at 360-101-9, a .776 winning percentage. She has been named National Coach of the Year three times and ACC Coach of the Year six times.

"Karen has built a program our school is very proud of, both for the team's success on the field and for the way it represents our university," says UNC athletic director Dick Baddour.

Not only has she built a strong program, she was a driving force behind construction of Francis E. Henry Stadium, which was dedicated as the home of the Tar Heels in the spring of 1999. With a capacity of 1,086, Henry Stadium also includes meeting rooms and locker rooms, and is one of the finest facilities of its kind.

In addition to achieving on the collegiate level, Shelton's players have excelled in national team play. The 2003 U.S. National Team includes seven former UNC players and a total of 15 have been team members over the last decade. At least one of Shelton's former players has been on every U.S. National Team since 1989.

Born Nov. 14, 1957, in Honolulu, Hawaii, Shelton spent the first 10 years of her life on Army bases from Aberdeen, Md., to El Paso, Texas. (Her late father, James, was a lieutenant colonel.) With four brothers and two sisters, Shelton was never at a loss for playmates and enthusiastically participated in whatever sport the day would bring. She was in fifth

grade when her father retired and the family moved to Pennsylvania. Shelton also played basketball and lacrosse and competed in track, but growing up in the cradle of the sport of field hockey, that was the game she grew to love.

At West Chester State College, Shelton played on three national championship field hockey teams and one national championship lacrosse team. Three times she was named field hockey's national player of the year, a streak that has never been equaled and has been approached only by two-time winner Cindy Werley, a UNC player from 1993-97. Shelton earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1979, then spent one year as assistant coach at Franklin & Marshall College and also taught and coached at Middle Township High School in New Jersey.

She was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1977-84 and started for the team that won a bronze medal, the nation's highest finish in Olympic competition, in Los Angeles in 1984. Her international experience also includes the 1979 and 1983 World Cup competition and American Cup tournaments in 1982 and 1983. She was U.S. Field Hockey's Athlete of the Year in 1983 and in 1989, she was inducted into the USFHA Hall of Fame for her achievements as a player. In 1999, she was named the Delaware County Field Hockey Athlete of the Millennium by the Delaware County Daily Times.

Away from field hockey, Shelton enjoys reading and spending time at the beach. She is married to Willie Scroggs, a senior associate athletic director at UNC who coached the Carolina men's lacrosse team from 1979-90. Their son, William, is 13 and, not surprisingly, loves sports. Besides attending UNC games, he plays basketball, football and lacrosse and runs cross country. During the summers, the family makes up a threesome on local golf courses.

Even in the offseason, however, field hockey is never far from Shelton's mind. In the summers of 1999 and 2000, she coached the Southern Charm to the championship of the United Airlines Field Hockey League, the USFHA elite summer program. She served as assistant coach in 2001, 2002 and 2003, as the Charm took three more crowns.

She has served as director of Olympic development camps on the Carolina campus and helped bring the U.S. National Team to Chapel Hill for training in 1994. That summer, UNC played host to both the men's and women's national teams from Great Britain as well as the Jamaican women's squad. In 1996, Chapel Hill was Great Britain's pre-Olympic training site. Shelton currently serves on the USFHA Coaching Committee.

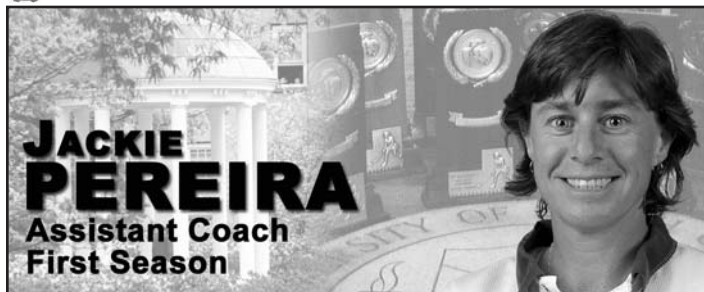
A very visible ambassador for UNC and its athletic programs, Shelton was inducted into the Order of the Golden Fleece, a campus honor society, in March of 2002. She has been a guest lecturer at UNC's Kenan-Flagler Business School, where she speaks to undergraduate and graduate students about team building and team dynamics.

Jackie Pereira, a three-time Olympian for her native Australia, is in her first year as a North Carolina assistant coach. One of the sport's legendary players, she was a member of the Australian National Team from 1986-96, playing on Olympic teams in 1988, '92 and '96. Australia won gold in '88 and '96.

As a member of Australia's national team, Pereira scored 109 goals in 175 international games and was the first Australian woman to total 100 career goals and at one point had scored more goals than any woman in the history of international field hockey. In 1988 and '89 she was named to the World Eleven Team, recognizing her as one of the 11 best players in the world.

She was inducted into the Australian Hall of Fame in 1998 and has received the Order of Australian Medal, presented by the Queen of England, for her services to field hockey.

In 2000, she was a member of the Olympic Torch Relay leading up to the Sydney Games. A hockey field in her hometown of Willetton, Western Australia, has been named in her honor, as was a street in the Olympic Village in Sydney, Jacqueline Pereira Avenue.



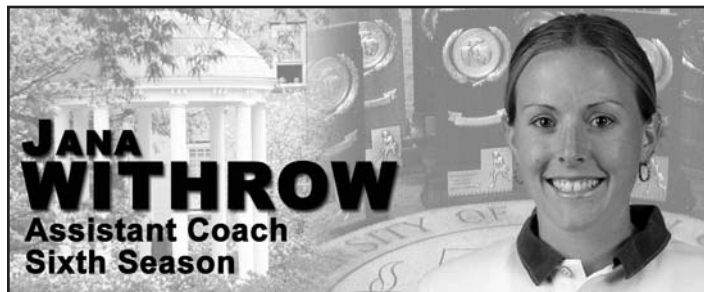
Cindy Werley, the most decorated player in the history of UNC field hockey, is in her first year as an assistant coach at her alma mater.

Werley was the recipient of the Honda Award as field hockey's Player of the Year in 1997 and '98. She is just the second player to win the honor more than once, following Carolina head coach Karen Shelton, who won it three times. Carolina jersey No. 13 has been retired in Werley's honor.

A three-time All-America selection, she took the 1995 season off from collegiate competition to prepare for the 1996 Olympic Games, where she represented the U.S. Upon returning to UNC for her junior season, she helped the Tar Heels to ACC and NCAA titles in 1996 and '97 and was named ACC Player of the Year both seasons. Three times, she earned All-ACC, All-ACC Tournament and All-NCAA Tournament honors.

Werley still holds the Carolina records for career goals (84) and points (212) and the single-season records for goals (36 in 1997) and points (87 in 1997).

Werley has spent the past four years as an assistant coach at Duke. Prior to that, she coached at Louisville for one season.



Following a stellar career as UNC's goalkeeper, Jana Withrow is in her sixth season as a Tar Heel assistant coach. A two-time All-America selection, Withrow helped Carolina to NCAA titles in 1995, '96 and '97.

In the 1996 championship game against Princeton, she earned a 3-0 shutout. Her goals allowed average that season was 0.61, the best in the nation.

Her 46 career shutouts still stand as a UNC and Atlantic Coast Conference record. Her 14 shutouts and goals against average of 0.43 in 1994 both are tied for the school and ACC records.

Withrow earned All-America and All-ACC honors in her junior and senior years and was named All-ACC 1995-97. She earned a spot on the All-NCAA Tournament team as a sophomore in 1995.

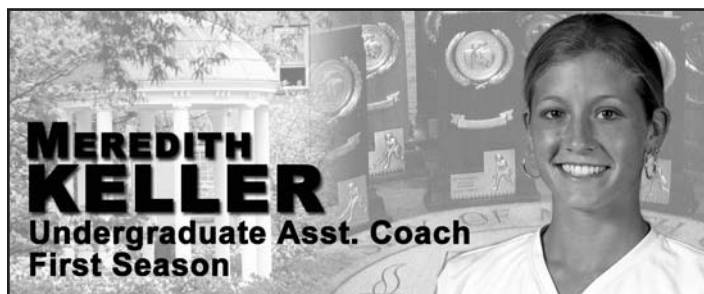
A former member of the U.S. National Team, Withrow earned her UNC degree in 1998. She is a native of Hockessin, Del., and attended Alexis I. DuPont High School.



Shelley Johnson, a former field hockey standout at the University of Michigan, is in her first year as a member of the Tar Heel staff.

A native of Houston, she graduated with distinction from Michigan in 1997 and earned a master's in education in 1999. She played for the Wolverines in 1996 and '97, earning All-Big Ten and all-region honors as a senior, when she led the team in assists. She served as an administrative assistant on the Michigan staff in '99 and was an assistant coach at Duke from 2000-01.

Her younger sister Stephanie is a senior on the UM field hockey team.



Meredith Keller finished an outstanding career as a player for the Tar Heels in 2002 and will serve as a student assistant coach in 2003 while finishing her undergraduate degree in communication studies.

A native of Greenville, Del., and the third member of her family to play field hockey at UNC, Keller started all 87 games of her career at Carolina. She earned ACC Rookie of the Year honors as a freshman. As a senior, she was named second-team All-America and earned spots on the All-ACC, All-ACC Tournament and All-South Region teams.

Keller is a member of the 2003 U.S. Under-23 Team.

# Athletics Administration

Director of Athletics

Dick Baddour, a 1966 graduate of the University of North Carolina, was named Director of Athletics on June 25, 1997. In his six years as director, the UNC Department of Athletics has undergone a number of changes, yet remains one of the premiere programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference and in the nation.

The Goldsboro, N.C., native heads a program that with 28 varsity sports is the largest in the ACC. Carolina prides itself on a strong overall athletic program and finished eighth in the 2002-03 Director's Cup, a measure of NCAA postseason success. The Tar Heels, inaugural winners of the Cup in 1994, have finished among the top eight teams eight times in the competition's 10 years.

Baddour is in his 37th year of continuous service to the university. He graduated from UNC in 1966 and was appointed Assistant Dean of Men in 1967. He served as Assistant Dean of Admissions and Assistant Dean of the UNC School of Law and also earned a Master of Arts degree in education prior to joining the athletic department in 1986.

In 2001, he received the Distinguished Service Medal from the UNC General Alumni Association.

Active in Chapel Hill community affairs, he is a past president of the Public School Foundation and has served on the Parks and Recreation Commission. He and his wife, Lynda, have two sons, Allen and David, and a daughter, Jennifer.



**Dr. Beth Miller**  
Sr. Associate Director of Athletics

Beth Miller is in her 19th year supervising the 26-sport Olympic program and serves as UNC's Senior Woman Administrator. She is a 1968 alumna of Appalachian State University with a B.S. degree in health and physical education. She has a master's from ASU and earned a Doctor of Arts degree in physical education at Middle Tennessee State in 1974.

From 1969-72, she served as the head volleyball and basketball coach at Appalachian State. She became head volleyball coach at UNC in 1975 and led the Tar Heels to four consecutive ACC titles from 1980-83 and five postseason tournament appearances. She also coached softball at Carolina from 1978-79.

In 1979, she was named Athletic Business Manager. She retired from coaching volleyball after 1983, but continued to handle all financial affairs for the department through 1987.

Miller currently serves on a number of Atlantic Coast Conference committees, including those for women's basketball, wrestling and officiating. She chairs the committees for women's golf and volleyball. She also serves on UNC's Housing Advisory Board.

A native of Landis, N.C., she has supervised UNC's highly successful Olympic Sports program since 1985.

## Academic Support

The Academic Support Program assists student-athletes in exploring their interests and abilities, enjoying a broad educational experience, and reaching or exceeding their academic goals.

Located primarily in the Pope Academic Support Center, the program opened its doors in 1986. It is equipped with study facilities, tutorial rooms, a computer lab, a 128-seat auditorium and counselors' offices. At the center, students meet with staff to discuss course selection, major exploration, academic progress and academic eligibility.

During the 2002-03 academic year, 257 Carolina student-athletes made the ACC Academic Honor Roll, which requires a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 for the year. In the fall of 2002, 148 student-athletes made the Dean's List, and 137 did so in the spring of 2003.

"Our young people are students first and athletes second and that will always be the case at the University," says Athletic Director Dick Baddour. "That is a credit to our coaches, administrators and support staff, but most of all, our student-athletes. Their accomplishments in the classroom are very impressive."

The Academic Support Program serves approximately 750 student-athletes. The Academic Support Center is open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. during the week and from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Sundays. Visitors are welcome to tour the facility during afternoon hours.

## Community and Campus Involvement

UNC field hockey players participate in all facets of campus life, from community service to honor societies. The team is heavily involved with Carolina ACT (Athletes Coming Together), in which upperclassmen mentor freshman student-athletes. Field hockey players also are involved

with Carolina Outreach, which sponsors community service activities. Several Tar Heels have coached local youth field hockey teams and the team helps keep Chapel Hill beautiful by picking up roadside trash twice a year.

## Strength and Conditioning

The field hockey team trains in an 8,000-square-foot facility in Kenan Field House. Besides its free and Olympic weights, the center features a performance lab where specialized aerobic equipment is used for conditioning and for monitoring rehabilitation progress.

Under the direction of Greg Gatz, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Olympic Sports, the field hockey team uses modern strength, flexibility and conditioning methods in a year-round cycle. This training produces athletes who are prepared to compete successfully, and to do so safely.

## Medical Care

The Tar Heels receive excellent care from one of the country's best sports medicine staffs. Dr. Tim Taft, Director of Sports Medicine, oversees a comprehensive program designed to keep student-athletes healthy and to rehabilitate any injuries quickly and successfully. Dr. Tom Brickner is the physician who works directly with the field hockey team.

A member of the athletic training staff is present at all games and practices to ensure that any injuries receive prompt and proper care. Head athletic trainer Meredith Petschauer oversees care for the field hockey team and is assisted by graduate student trainers Megan Pate and Kevin Bunn and undergraduate student trainer Erin Coleman.

## Field Hockey's Academic Excellence

UNC field hockey student-athletes' achievement in the classroom meets the same high standards as their performance on the field. For the 2002-03 school year, eight players were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, which requires a 3.0 or better grade point average. Five were named to the Dean's List.

## Home of the Tar Heels

In April of 1999, the North Carolina field hockey and women's lacrosse programs dedicated their new home, Francis E. Henry Stadium.

Inside the Tar Heels' spacious field hockey locker room, each player has her own full-length locker, with ample storage space and a plaque bearing her name and number. Next door is a film and meeting room with computers, a big-screen TV and a kitchen area. The coaches' locker room provides another place for reviewing film. The building's entranceway houses a sizeable trophy case, which accommodates the Tar Heels' four NCAA Championship trophies and leaves plenty of space left for those yet to be won.

The stands seat 1,086 fans and also house a concessions stand, rest-rooms, and sports medicine and storage areas.

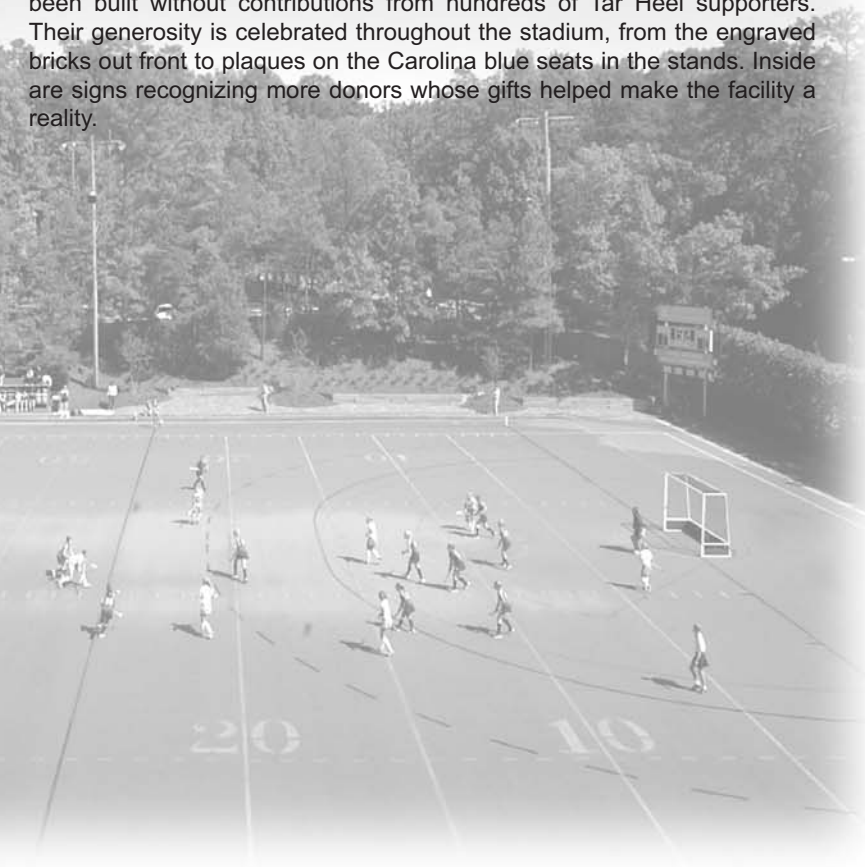

# Program History

CAROLINA FIELD HOCKEY

The sport of field hockey has been played by teams representing the University of North Carolina since the 1940s. Eight women's sports, including field hockey, were officially elevated to varsity status in 1971 when Carolina became a charter member of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW). These sports were under the supervision of the Physical Education Department until October of 1974, when they came under the direction of the UNC Department of Athletics.

Since 1971, the program has compiled an impressive overall record of 426-143-19.

The 1971 field hockey team, coached by Beth Ross, tied Duke 1-1, then posted a 3-0 win over a team comprised of UNC physical education majors. A second intercollegiate game, against East Carolina, was rained out.

Chip Johnson guided the 1972 squad to a 3-7-1 ledger, then Ann Gregory directed the program for the next three years. During Gregory's tenure the Tar Heels posted their first winning records, going 4-3-2 in 1974 and 4-2-1 in 1975.

Carolina was coached by Dolly Hunter from 1976 through 1980 and during that span the program went 54-27-3. The Tar Heels won AIAW state championships four straight years from 1977 through 1980, earning an invitation to the AIAW Southern Region II tournament each year. The 1978 squad notched the program's highest finish in the event, placing second.

In 1981, the last season before the NCAA began sponsoring championships for women's sports, first-year head coach Karen Shelton guided Carolina to another second place finish in the AIAW Southern Region II.

Since that season, the program has gained national prominence and is recognized as one of the country's field hockey powers. The Tar Heels have participated in NCAA Tournament play 19 times in the last 20 years and have advanced to the NCAA Final Four a total of 12 times, including 10 of the past 14 seasons.

Carolina captured its first NCAA Championship in 1989, defeating Old Dominion 2-1 on penalty strokes. In 1995, Shelton and the Tar Heels won title number two, 5-1 over Maryland, and finished the season 24-0. The '96 team, with a 23-1 record, won the program's third title. And in 1997, Carolina claimed a third straight championship and a fourth overall with a 3-2 win over Old Dominion in Storrs, Conn.

Carolina's first All-America honoree was Mary Sentementes in 1983. She repeated in 1984, becoming the first of 10 Tar Heel field hockey players to earn first-team All-America honors more than once. Kate Barber, Jana Toepel and Cindy Werley were three-time first-team picks.

Leslie Lyness received the 1989 Honda Sports Award for field hockey as the nation's most outstanding collegiate player and later become the first UNC field hockey player to have her jersey, No. 7, retired. Cindy Werley, won the Honda Award in 1996 and '97 and saw her No. 13 jersey retired in 1998.

Six Tar Heels – Leslie Lyness (1989), Amy Cox (1992), Barbara Hansen (1994), Kate Barber (1995), Cindy Werley (1996, '97) and Kristen McCann (2000) – have been voted Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year. UNC players earned ACC Rookie of the Year honors in 1990 (Stephanie Walsh), 1994 (Barber) and 1999 (Meredith Keller). A



Now in her 23rd season as UNC's head coach, Karen Shelton has led the Tar Heels to four NCAA Championships and total of 12 final fours. Carolina has been part of the NCAA title game nine times.

total of 44 Tar Heels have earned All-ACC honors on 75 occasions.

In the 20 years since the inaugural ACC Tournament, Carolina has captured the championship 14 times. Eight Tar Heels have earned tournament MVP honors on 12 occasions and 25 players have been named to the All-ACC Tournament team on a total of 41 occasions.

Karen Shelton has been voted national coach of the year three times, in 1994, '95 and '96. Six times she has been named ACC Coach of the Year, most recently in 2000. She collected her 300th career victory on Oct. 27, 1999, when the Tar Heels beat Wake Forest 3-1 on Senior Day in Chapel Hill. Shelton has compiled a 360-101-9 career record in her 22 seasons at North Carolina.

In 2002, the ACC celebrated its 50th anniversary by naming the top 50 players in the history of each conference sport. The field hockey list included 20 UNC players, more than any other school. Tar Heels recognized as being among the top 50 players in ACC history were Kate Barber (1994-97), Lori Bruney (1984-87), Bashi Buba (1975-78), Jennifer Clark (1988-91), Amy Cox (1989-92), Joy Driscoll (1994-97), Maryellen Falcone (1984-87), Barbara Hansen (1991-94), Laurel Hershey (1987-90), Louise Hines (1982-85), Judith Jonckheer (1984-85),

The UNC field hockey program dedicated its current home, Francis E. Henry Stadium, on April 24, 1999. One of the nation's finest facilities, the stadium includes top-of-the-line locker rooms, offices and meeting space for the field hockey and women's lacrosse teams and grandstand seating for 1,086, plenty of space for fans to watch as the Tar Heels continue to make history.

# The ACC

As a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, North Carolina competes in one of the country's top field hockey leagues. ACC teams have won eight NCAA titles (four by UNC, three by Maryland and one by Wake Forest) and at least one ACC team has played in the national championship game in 13 of the last 16 years. ACC teams have made a total of 22 final four appearances in the NCAA Tournament's 22-year history, with three teams—UNC, Maryland and Wake Forest—reaching the semifinals in 2000.



Five of the ACC's nine schools sponsor field hockey. Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia and Wake Forest play one regular-season ACC game against each of the others, with several also meeting in nonconference contests. All five battle for the conference crown in the annual ACC Tournament, scheduled this year for Nov. 6, 7 and 9 at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville, Va.

The Atlantic Coast Conference conducts championships in 25 sports and includes nine schools. Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, Virginia and Wake Forest have been members since the league was founded in 1953. Georgia Tech joined in 1978 and Florida State in 1991. Two more members, Miami and Virginia Tech, will join the league in 2004.

## 1989: Carolina's First Crown

After waiting through eight consecutive NCAA tournament appearances, seven consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference championships and two straight trips to the final four, it's almost no surprise the 1989 University of North Carolina field hockey team took all of regulation, three overtimes and penalty strokes to capture the program's first national championship, 2-1 over Old Dominion.

Peggy Anthon put UNC up on a goal with 10:56 remaining, but ODU tied the game with just over six minutes to play. In the first NCAA tournament game in which penalty strokes were required to decide the championship, Tar Heel goalie Evelien Spee clinched the victory and championship for the Heels by scoring on Carolina's fifth and final attempt.

The win capped a 20-2 season that included an undefeated ACC regular season and a conference title.



## 1995: A Perfect Season

The North Carolina field hockey team completed the finest season in Tar Heel history in 1995, capturing the program's second national championship with an overpowering 5-1 victory over Maryland in Winston-Salem, N.C. The victory capped a dominant season that saw Carolina go 24-0, 8-0 in the ACC.

Maryland had been a familiar opponent during the 1995 campaign, as the two teams faced off four times throughout the season. The first three meetings went down to the wire, with Carolina prevailing in overtime in each. But in front of a partisan crowd of over 3,000, the Tar Heels proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that they were the nation's number one team.

Using an outstanding penalty corner and a superb second half performance Carolina rolled to a four goal victory. Susannah Schott led the way with a hat trick, with the team's lone senior, captain Kim Schroll, adding four assists. The two were joined on the all tournament team by Nancy Pelligreen, Kate Barber, Christy Utter and Jana Withrow.

## 1996: Another Year at the Top

The 1996 championship game pitted the upstart Princeton Tigers against the Heels, Princeton having upset Old Dominion in the semifinals to prevent a third contest of the year between the UNC and ODU. The Tar Heels dominated play throughout the game on the way to a 3-0 victory. Susannah Schott, Nancy Pelligreen and Ashley Hanson scored for UNC.

Fifteen of the team's 23 victories during the season came against ranked opponents, including five wins over top 10 programs. The Heels outscored opponents 101-21 on the year, giving up more than two goals in a single game only once all season.



## 1997: Three in a Row

After winning back-to-back championships in the previous two seasons, the Carolina field hockey program could call itself a true dynasty. The 1997 team cemented that position by defeating Old Dominion for the crown.

The game was the third meeting of the season between the two teams, with each team claiming a one-goal victory on the other's home field. The final began with ODU taking a 1-0 lead. Senior Cindy Werley evened the score for the Tar Heels, and junior Nancy Pelligreen added a goal to give UNC a 2-1 lead heading into halftime.

In the second half Carolina recorded the last of three unanswered goals when Joy Driscoll scored to give Carolina a 3-1 lead. Old Dominion would score once more, but the Heels held on to win their third consecutive NCAA championship, 3-2.

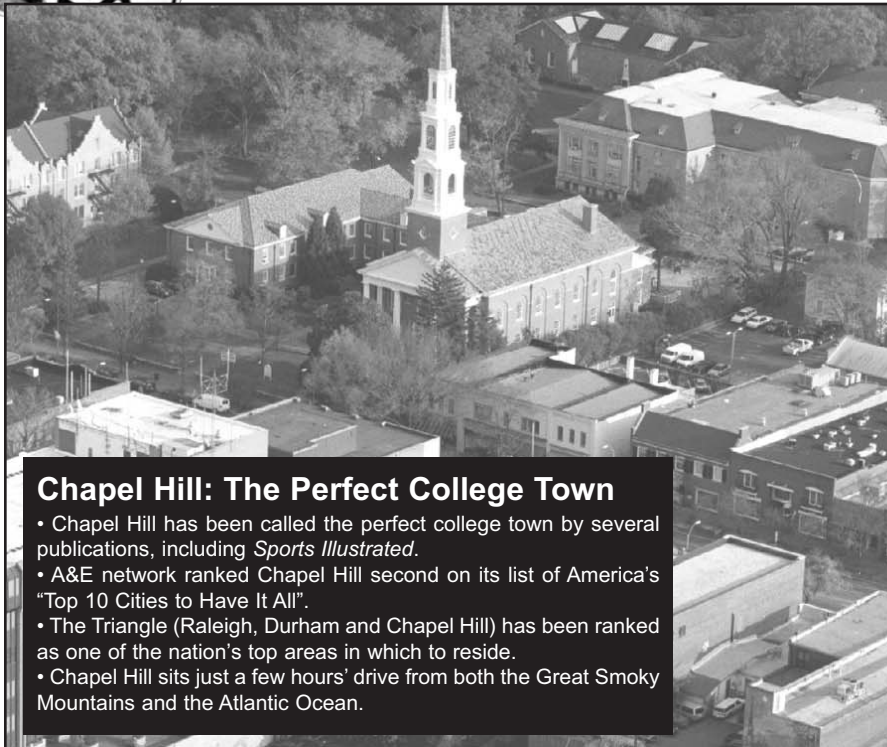

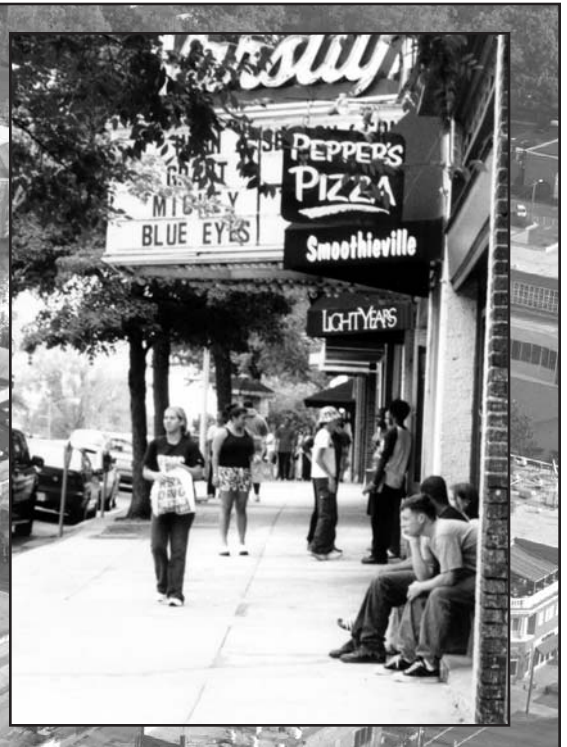
Cindy Werley (near left) led UNC to two NCAA field hockey titles and played on the 1996 U.S. Olympic team.

# The University

## History

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill was the nation's first state university to open its doors and the only public university to award degrees in the 18th century.

Authorized by the N.C. Constitution in 1776, the university was chartered by the N.C. General Assembly Dec. 11, 1789, the same year George Washington first was inaugurated as president.

The cornerstone was laid for Old East, the nation's first state university building, Oct. 12, 1793. Hinton James, the first student, arrived from Wilmington, N.C., Feb. 12, 1795.

## Location

The 729-acre central campus includes the two oldest state university buildings, Old East and Person Hall. Old East and Playmakers Theatre, an 1852 Greek-revival building are National Historic Landmarks.

The American Society of Landscape Architects selected the Carolina campus as one of the most beautifully landscaped spots in the country. That list, released in 1999 timed to the society's centennial, is among the latest praise affirming the charm of mighty oaks, majestic quadrangles, brick sidewalks and other landscaping synonymous with UNC.

Today, the campus is undergoing an unprecedented transformation made possible in part by North Carolinians' overwhelming approval of the \$3.1 billion bond referendum for higher education. The referendum, approved in November 2000, was the nation's largest higher education bond package.

The bonds are bringing Carolina \$510 million for renovations, repairs and new buildings so 21st century students can learn in a 21st century environment. Also guided by a visionary master plan for growth now coming to life, the university is investing another \$600-plus million from non-state sources, including private gifts, for other buildings essential to excellence. The resulting capital construction program is believed to be the largest underway at any major American university.

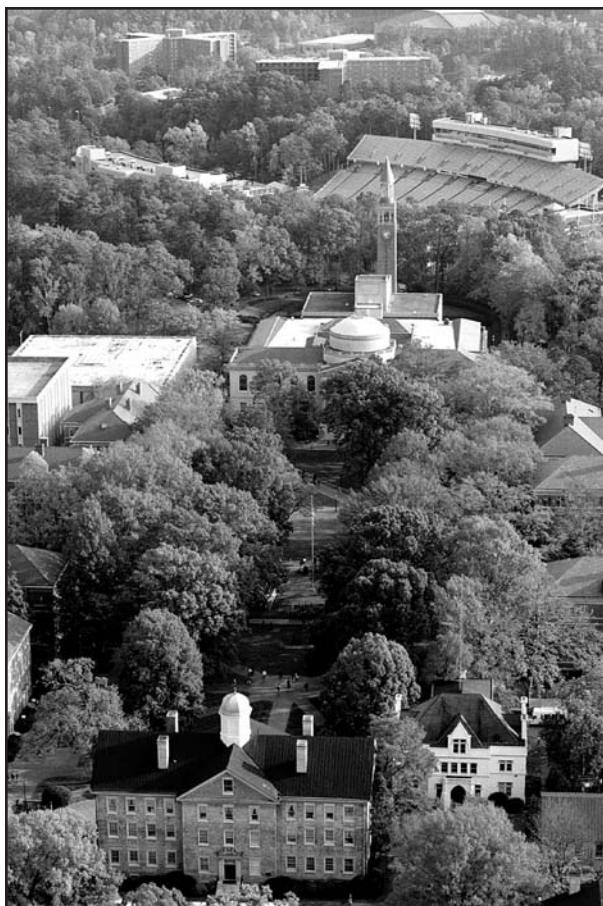

## Recent Rankings

In the U.S. News and World Report magazine's 2002 "America's Best Colleges" guide, UNC was ranked fifth among the nation's top public universities and tied for 28th overall among both public and private campuses. Among undergraduate business programs, the Kenan-Flagler Business School ranked fifth nationwide. Carolina also was mentioned for becoming the nation's first major highly selective public university to announce an end to early decision admissions.

U.S. News also ranked numerous graduate degree programs and spe-

cialty areas at UNC among the top 25 nationwide, in April 2002. The magazine rated programs in the schools of business, education, law, medicine, nursing and public health. Several schools and degree programs were in the top 10.

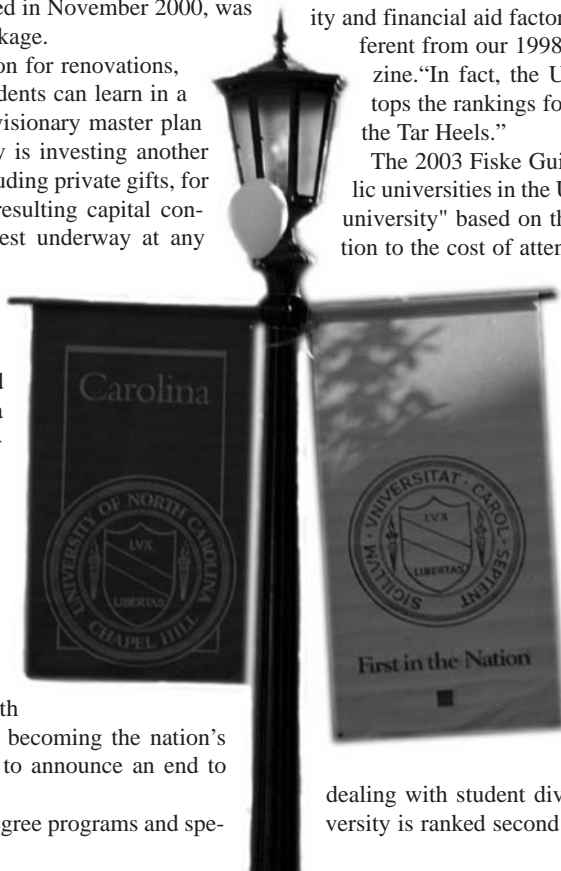
Kaplan/Newsweek's "How to Get into College" guide, in a 2003 edition, ranked Chapel Hill one of 12 "hot colleges." Wrote the editors, "... with a tough economy, the hottest schools may well be the best bargains—those offering excellent academics at affordable prices. That's why our list ... is dominated by some of the country's top public universities, like the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. ... As America's oldest public university, (Carolina) has a deep sense of tradition, and that makes students feel connected. Although tradition is important, Carolina is also thinking about the future. In the next decade, the school plans to invest at least \$245 million in genomic sciences."

"The Unofficial, Unbiased Insider's Guide to the 320 Most Interesting Colleges" listed Carolina second among the top 10 "hot and trendy" national universities, based on results of the Kaplan 2002 National Survey of High School Guidance Counselors. Carolina was second behind Harvard University among top schools.

Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine ranked UNC first among 100 best public colleges combining great academics and affordable tuitions. These rankings are based on cost, quality and financial aid factors. "Overall the rankings aren't radically different from our 1998 and 2000 surveys," according to the magazine. "In fact, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill tops the rankings for the third time – a remarkable threepeat for the Tar Heels."

The 2003 Fiske Guide to Colleges labeled UNC one of 21 public universities in the United States and Canada that are a "best buy university" based on the quality of the academic offerings in relation to the cost of attendance. "As the flagship campus of the state university system and the oldest public university in the United States, UNC-Chapel Hill has earned its place among the South's most prestigious universities," according to the guide. The guide cited UNC's nationally recognized honors program and quoted a senior: "'College town' in the dictionary should show a picture of Chapel Hill."

The Journal of Blacks in Higher Education concluded in 2002 that Carolina ranked first among public campuses and sixth overall for success in integrating African-Americans. The evaluation rates the nation's 26 highest academically ranked universities in 13 categories or factors of racial diversity. "The university is particularly strong in the categories dealing with student diversity," according to the journal. "The university is ranked second in the percentage of total black enrollments



and first in the percentage of black freshmen. Chapel Hill also fares well in most measures of black faculty. The university has nine African-American faculty members who hold endowed chairs. That is the highest number in the United States."

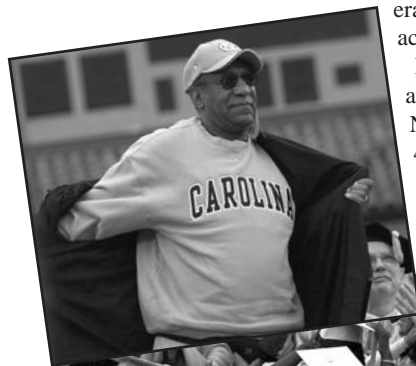
Business Week magazine listed the Kenan-Flagler Business School's master's of business administration degree program 18th in its 2002 rankings.

The Wall Street Journal ranked Kenan-Flagler 12th among MBA degree programs. Kenan-Flagler was the only Southeastern university program listed among the top 15. The 2002 ranking is based on The Wall Street Journal/Harris Interactive Business School Survey focusing on the opinions of recruiters who recruit full-time business school graduates.

The Financial Times, a London-based newspaper, has issued recent rankings listing Kenan-Flagler's MBA program 23rd among the top 100 worldwide and its executive education program 28th. Kenan-Flagler also was eighth among U.S. schools for top salary increases among alumni surveyed.

## Key Statistics

Now in its third century, UNC belongs to the select group of 61 American and two Canadian campuses forming the Association of American Universities. UNC's academic offerings span a broad range of fields and include 69 bachelor's, 111 master's and 75 doctoral degrees as well as professional degrees in dentistry, medicine, pharmacy and law. Five health schools—which, with UNC Hospitals, comprise one of the nation's most complete academic medical centers—are integrated with liberal arts, basic sciences and high-tech academic programs.



In fall 2002, Carolina enrolled about 26,000 students from all 100 North Carolina counties, the other 49 states and more than 100 other

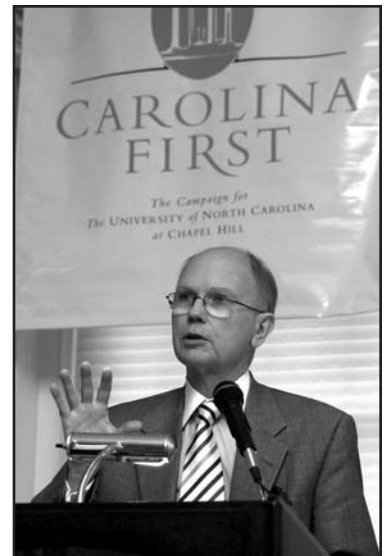


countries. Eighty-one percent of Carolina's 15,961 undergraduates were from North Carolina. Sixty-one percent of Carolina's students were undergraduates, 30 percent graduates and another 9 percent were professional degree-seekers.

Those students learn from a 3,000-member faculty. Many of those faculty members hold or have held major posts in virtually every national scholarly or professional organization and have earned election to the most prestigious academic groups.

The Carolina academic community benefits from a library with more than 5.3 million volumes and perennially ranks among the best research libraries in North America as judged by the Association of Research Libraries. The most recent association listings place Carolina 16th among 114 research libraries in North America. UNC's North Carolina Collection is the largest of its kind among state-oriented collections on campuses nationwide. And the Southern and rare book collections also are among the country's finest.

Carolina's 230,072 alumni live in all 50 states and in 141 countries around the world. Notable alumni include writers Thomas Wolfe, Shelby Foote and Jill McCorkle; athletes Michael Jordan, Vince Carter, Mia Hamm, Marion Jones and Davis Love III; and journalists Roger Mudd, Charles Kuralt, Stuart Scott and Tom Wicker. Others include former White House Chief of Staff Erskine Bowles; former White House Communications Director Don Baer; U.S. Sen. John Edwards; Bill Harrison, chief executive officer of Chase Manhattan Bank; Scott Livengood, Krispy Kreme Doughnut chairman, president and chief executive officer; Sallie L. Krawcheck, chairman and chief executive officer of Smith Barney, a division of Citigroup; U.S. President James Polk; geneticist Francis Collins; actors Jack Palance, George Grizzard and Andy Griffith, as well as actresses Louise Fletcher and Sharon Lawrence; editorial cartoonist Jeff MacNelly; corporate banker Hugh McColl; and fashion designer Alexander Julian.

## Private Support

The Carolina First Campaign, which supports the university's goal of becoming the nation's leading public university, has officially reached the \$1 billion mark in gifts and pledges toward the total goal of \$1.8 billion by 2007.

Reaching that goal is critical for the university to compete nationally for top faculty and students, invest in departments and programs and build and renovate facilities needed to educate 21st century students. The campaign focuses on five key areas: attracting and retaining the best faculty; educating students -- tomorrow's leaders; enriching the UNC experience through strategic initiatives; improving the public's health and quality of life through research; and the campus and its master plan for the future. The eight-year campaign began July 1, 1999.

The impact of gifts already has been substantial: Carolina First already has created 100 new endowed professorships -- half the total goal of 200 -- and more than 330 new undergraduate scholarships and graduate fellowships toward a target of 1,000.

In fall 2000, Chancellor James Moeser pledged to the people of North Carolina that if they passed the higher education bond referendum the university would triple their investment with private funds. The people responded overwhelmingly, and successful completion of the Carolina First campaign will fulfill that pledge. The ultimate beneficiaries will be the people of North Carolina.
