## Supporting UNC Women's Golf

The University of North Carolina has a long-term agreement with Nike, which provides UNC teams with shoes, apparel, equipment bags and other products. The contract, signed in 1994 and again in 1997, was extended for a period of eight more years beginning in July 2002. In addition to Nike products, the agreement provides \$100,000 annually to the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund for undergraduate teaching and \$100,000 annually to the UNC athletic department to reward Olympic sport programs and coaches for academic and athletic excellence.

# FRANKLIN STREET TRUST TAR HEEL INVITATIONAL

One of the top collegiate women's golf tournaments in the nation, the Franklin Street Trust Tar Heel Invitational, is an annual event that takes place each fall at UNC's Finley Golf Course. Since its inception in 1976, the Tar Heel has brought some of the nation's premier women's golf programs to Chapel Hill to compete in the three-day intercollegiate event.

Carolina got the tournament off to a roaring start by winning the inaugural Tar Heel in 1976. Former UNC Coach Dot Gunnells' squads captured five Tar Heel championships in 1976, 1979, 1985, 1991 and 1992. Duke won last year's Tar Heel with an 894 team total while Blue Devil, Kristina Engstrom, captured individual medalist honors with a 219 total.

The Franklin Street Trust Tar Heel Invitational will be played at Finley Golf Course on October 4-6. Finley, designed by internationally

renowned architect Tom Fazio, features a par 72, 6,181-yard layout. The Tar Heels would like to thank the Finley Golf Course staff, especially Golf Course Superintendent Ross Fowler and Director of Golf Johnny Cake. The Tar Heels would also like to thank the steering committee of this year's tournament, most notably Rex Teaney of Franklin Street Trust, Ellen Culler, the tournament director, and Michael Beale of the Sports Marketing Office.

In addition to host North Carolina, this year's participants include Duke, Florida State, Furman, Kentucky, Memphis, NC State, Ohio State, Oklahoma State, South Carolina, South Florida, Tulane, UNC Greensboro, UNC Wilmington and Wake Forest.

# 2002-03 PREVIEW

The University of North Carolina women's golf team is set for what appears to be a most productive fall and spring tournament series. With the onset of her 10th year of coaching Tar Heel head coach Sally Austin notes that her team is primed for success.

"We are going to be deeper and stronger, top to bottom," says Austin. "The players that are returning are playing well and are pumped and excited about the fall. These woman are coming here to win and play hard, and I think they are going to have a whole different mind set."

The season begins in late September with a trip to the ACC/SEC Challenge in Destin, Fla. Carolina will host the annual Franklin Street Trust Tar Heel Invitational, which will include preseason top 10 golf programs Duke, Oklahoma State and Ohio State. Carolina then participates in the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship in Knoxville, Tenn., the Lady Paladin Invitational in Greenville, S.C. and concludes the fall campaign at the Pine Needles Intercollegiate in Southern Pines, N.C.

The spring season tees off in mid March at the Lady Gamecock Classic in Columbia, S.C. The Tar Heels then travel to the Bryan

National Collegiate in Brown Summit, N.C., and the Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic in Athens, Ga. The pinnacle of the Tar Heel season comes in mid April when they travel to the ACC Championships in Clemmons, N.C., followed by the NCAA Regionals in mid May and then the NCAA Championships.

The Carolina women's golf team is blessed with quality athletes. The 2002-03 squad is anchored by two talented and confident seniors – Meghan Adams of Dover,

Del., and Abby Spector of Waterville, Maine. Coach Austin states, "I have the expectation that I want all my players to be leaders. But I certainly expect a lot from the seniors. Abby and Meghan set a good exam-

ple and if every player on the team works as hard as Meghan Adams we will be really good."

Coach Austin has added some new faces to the squad. They include freshmen Beth Marushak of Northampton, Pa., and Josie Shinn of Pinehurst, N.C., and junior transfer Meaghan Francella of Port Chester, N.Y.

"Beth is a good junior player and I think she has a lot of potential," notes Austin. "She's not nearly as good as she can be." Moreover, states Austin, "I really like Josie's game. She needs a little more distance; yet, she has a great short game and a great temperament. She's as tough as nails."

Austin notes that transfer Meaghan Francella, who qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur, "is going to help us tremendously." The remaining cast of Tar Heels include juniors Ashley Prange and Stacy Hilton and sophomore Romi Irons.

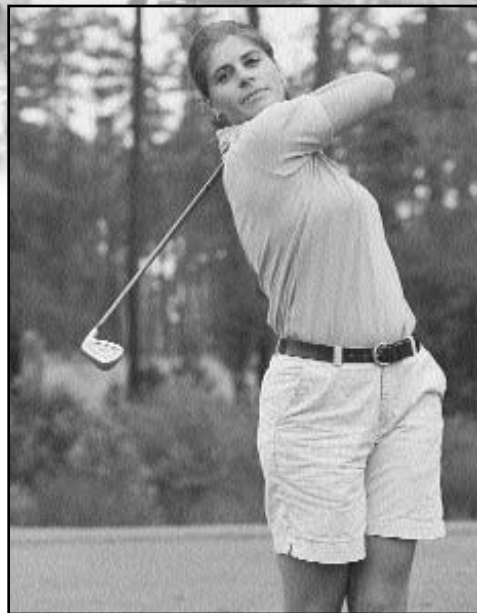
Awaiting the Carolina team is not only one of the finest golf courses in the Southeast; there is also a magnificent training facility. Finley Golf Course is two years removed from renovations and has received rave reviews for its competitive nature and overall beauty. Moreover, the Chapman Center, the golf training facility, is now complete and available to the student-athlete year round.

"This facility is beginning to attract some of the top players in the country because the top players in the country want to come somewhere they can practice all the time," states Coach Austin. "We want to be the kind of team that attracts winners."

The renovated Finley Golf Course and the Chapman Center only help to accentuate Sally Austin's coaching style. "I stress the fundamentals and work on the players' weaknesses by encouraging them to play a lot. I want them to improve in the aspect of course management. I want them to think ahead and I want to help them understand the importance of being able to hit different shots in varying situations. And, we, as a team, are going to focus on the positives."

How will Carolina fair in the ACC? "I think we will play really well. I think we can beat Duke," says Austin. "Duke has set the standard in the ACC and they are certainly the best team in the conference and probably the best team in the country again. But, we are getting there and I've got players now that can play with any of their players."

"The bottom line is I am very excited about the season," says Austin. "I think it is going to launch a whole new era of golf here at Carolina. The players want to win and it is so exiting."

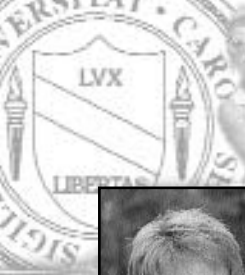

# HEAD COACH SALLY AUSTIN



As a member of the first varsity team at the University of North Carolina 28 seasons ago, Sally Austin had already established herself as one of the founding figures of Tar Heel women's golf as an undergraduate. Entering her 10th year as the head coach at Carolina, Austin is well on her way toward continuing the Tar Heel women's golf legacy and making its third decade of existence among the finest in the program's history.

In Austin's nine seasons as head coach, Carolina has finished in the top 25 at the NCAA Championships three times.

In 1998-99 the Tar Heels tied for ninth at the NCAA East Regional, barely missing the cut for the NCAA Championships. In 1999-00, Carolina finished 17th at the NCAA East Regional and missed the cut for the NAAs. However, senior Marcy Newton, an All-ACC performer, honorable mention All-America and later U.S. Women's Amateur champion, advanced as an individual participant. In 2000-01 Carolina tied for 15th place at the NCAA East Regional which was played in Chapel Hill and in 2001-02 the Tar Heels finished 16th at the NCAA East Regional.

The 15th-place finish in 1997-98 marked UNC's seventh top 25 finish in 10 years. The 1997 team finished third at the ACC Tournament and tied for 10th at the NCAA East Regional, missing the cut for NAAs. The 1996 squad also missed the cut for NAAs as the Heels finished 12th at the NCAA East Regional and third at the ACC Championships. The 1995 team finished eighth at the NCAA Championships while the '94 squad tied for 16th.

A native of Raeford, N.C., Austin took over head coaching duties of the women's golf team after the 1992-93 season. Austin replaced long-time Tar Heel coach Dot Gunnells after serving as an assistant to Gunnells since 1983.

In addition to her tenure as assistant coach, Austin was a member of the Tar Heels' first varsity program in 1973-74. Her father played an instrumental role in helping pioneer that first team. Before his daughter entered UNC, Jake Austin approached then athletic director Homer Rice about starting a team. Rice seemed receptive to the idea, and upon Austin's arrival, sent out a "recruiting notice" to students who might be interested in playing. Three other students besides Austin



responded to Rice's request. One of those who responded was M i n d y

Moore, a future president of the LPGA.

Moore and Austin played together for four years from the team's inception until graduation. Austin captured the 1974-75 UNC-CH Invitational individual title. By the time the two were seniors, they had led the team to a spot as one of the top 20 teams in the country. They accomplished this feat with Coach Gunnells at the helm.

Upon graduation from North Carolina in 1977 with a bachelor of science degree

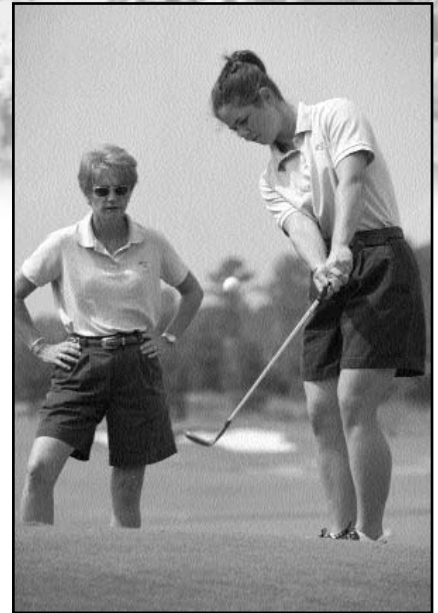
in business administration, Austin continued her pursuit of golf. The winner of the 1979 North Carolina Women's Amateur Championship, Austin won events on the Women's Professional Golf Tour and the Futures Tour. She received her LPGA Tour card in 1987.

In addition to the one-year LPGA experience, Austin also played for five years on mini-tours across the country (1980-85), two years on the Asian Tour (1984-85) and one year on the WPGA European Tour (1986).

Austin has been a golf instructor at the Pine Needles Schools in Pinehurst since 1978, where she has worked under the supervision of Peggy Kirk Bell.

She also was a golf instructor from 1986-89 at the Ben Sutton Golf Schools and from 1989-94 at the Craft-Zavichas Schools. Austin holds an LPGA Class A Teaching Certification. In 1999, she was named the LPGA SE Section Coach of the Year.

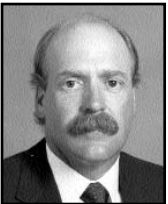

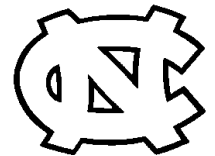

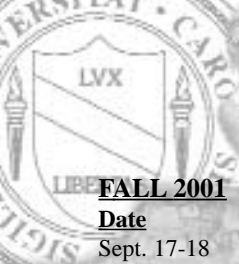

### 2001-02 HIGHLIGHTS

- Ashley Prange, a sophomore from Noblesville, Ind. and two-year starter for the Heels, was selected to the 2002 All-ACC team and carded five top 10 and nine top 30 finishes last year. During the spring campaign, she posted a fourth-place finish at the Lady Gamecock Classic, tied for seventh place at the ACC Championship and tied for eighth at the Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic. During the fall of 2001, Prange tied for sixth place at the Franklin Street Trust Tar Heel Invitational and tied for seventh place at the Dodge ACC/SEC Invitational Shootout.
- Abby Spector, a junior from Waterville, Maine, posted two top 10 and five top 30 finishes this year. Spector tallied a fifth-place finish at the Franklin Street Trust Tar Heel Invitational and tied for eighth place at the Liz Murphey Collegiate Classic. Beth Lever, a senior from Kiawah Island, S.C., played in all of Carolina's tournaments and carded five top 25 finishes. Lever finished 11th at the Mason Rudolph Championships and tied for 19th place at the Lady Paladin Invitational. Shelley McKeivitt, a senior from Reading Berkshire, England, tallied two top 10 and three top 25 finishes. McKeivitt tied for seventh place at the Dodge ACC/SEC Invitational Shootout and tied for ninth at the Franklin Street Trust Tar Heel Invitational. Meghan Adams, a junior transfer from Dover, Del., played in seven tournaments and posted one top 20 finish as she tied for 14th place at the ACC Championship. Romi Irons, a freshman from Dublin, Ohio, played in five tournaments this year, including one as an individual. Irons' top finish was a tie for 25th place at the ACC Championship.

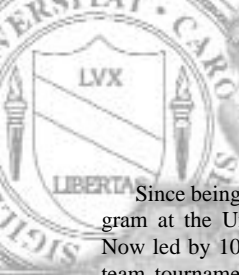

# HISTORY

Since being elevated to varsity sport status in 1974, the women's golf program at the University of North Carolina has experienced much success. Now led by 10th-year head coach Sally Austin, the Tar Heels have won 31 team tournament championships, 36 individual tournament championships and finished in the top 25 nationally 15 times in the program's history.

Austin continues to cultivate the tradition established by longtime head coach Dot Gunnells, who guided the UNC program for 18 seasons, as the Carolina women's golf program thrives in its fourth decade.

Six Tar Heels have been named All-America on seven occasions, with Katie Peterson being the only two-time honoree: Linda Mescan (third-team, 1982), Page Marsh (third-team, 1983), Peterson (third team, 1988 and first-team, 1989), Donna Andrews (second-team, 1989), Kimberly Byham (first-team, 1993) and Marcy Newton (second-team, 1999).

In addition, eight Carolina golfers have been named to All-Atlantic Coast Conference teams on 12 occasions over the years: Page Marsh (1985), Debbie Doniger (1992), Kimberly Byham (1992 and 1993), Jessica Wood (1993), Kelly McCall (1996 and 1997), Marcy Newton (1997, 1999 and 2000), Megan Morgan (1998) and Ashley Prange (2002).

Gunnells, who retired in 1993, was named ACC Coach of the Year after the 1984-85 season. Marcy Newton was chosen as the ACC Rookie of the Year in 1997.

## Evolution of a Program

The 1970s found the Tar Heel program in a building stage. Players such as Sally Austin and Stephanie Kornegay led the women's team to 14 tournament titles between 1974 and 1980.

By the beginning of the 1980s, Gunnells had developed a program that was known throughout the collegiate ranks for its overall outstanding play. The Tar Heels were led by a host of talented players with Linda Mescan, a third-team All-America in 1981-82, and Page Marsh, a third-team All-America in 1982-83, leading the way. Carolina golfers won eight team tournament championships and 11 individual titles from 1980 to 1986.

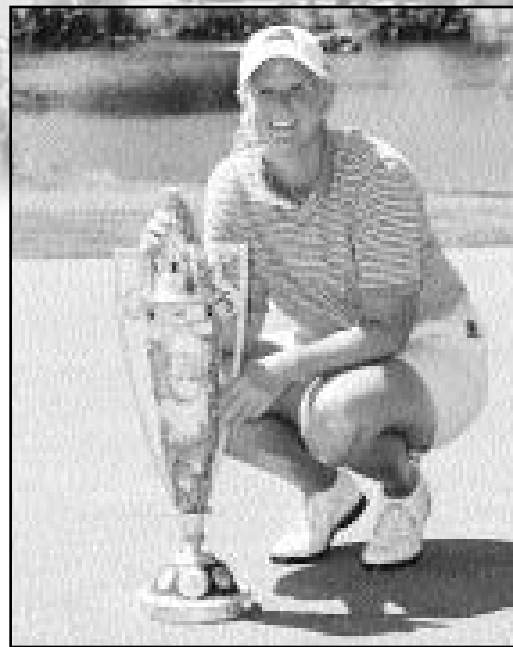
The 1988-89 season was perhaps the Tar Heels' finest overall campaign. That year found the Tar Heels with a strong starting five which included two players named All-America at the conclusion of the season, Katie Peterson and Donna Andrews. In addition, Gunnells was named East Region Coach of the Year for 1988-89. Carolina seized five tournament titles out of the 10 tournaments it entered and went on to the best-ever national finish for a UNC women's golf team, eighth-place in the NCAA Championships held at Stanford University.

The 1990s continued to bring great women's golf success to Chapel Hill. Since 1988-89, three other Carolina teams have finished eighth at NAAs. The 1991-92, 1992-93 and 1994-95 squads all finished in eighth place at the NCAA Championships.

The 1991 team finished 25th in the nation for the first of five straight top-25 finishes. The 1992 Tar Heels finished eighth at the NCAA Championships, becoming the school's first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference title-winning team. Led by Debbie Doniger and Kimberly Byham, Carolina defeated Florida

State by two strokes to capture the ACC title. Dongier also won the ACC individual crown in '92.

In 1992-93 the Tar Heels were a senior-dominated team led by Byham who won the Tar Heel Invitational and finished second at the ACC Tournament. Byham went on to win the NCAA East Regional at Baton Rouge, La., and was named the Tar Heels' second-ever first-team All-America. Head Coach Dot Gunnells was named the National Coach of the Year and was inducted into the National Golf Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Carolina placed second at the 1993 ACC Championships and again finished eighth at the NCAA Tournament. That marked the third time Carolina had placed eighth at NAAs in a five-year span.

## Enter Austin as Head Coach

The 1993-94 squad, Sally Austin's first as the Carolina head coach, picked up right where its predecessors had left off. The '94 Tar Heels finished second at the ACC Championships before going on to finish 16th at the NCAA Championships. That was the Tar Heels' fourth consecutive top 25 finish and the fifth in six years. Staci Aber was named to the 1993-94 NGCA All-Scholar team.

The 1994-95 team earned UNC its fourth top 10 NCAA finish in six years. Austin led Carolina to an eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championships, tying the highest-ever finish by UNC. Sophomore Kelly McCall was the Tar Heels' top finisher in four of six spring tournaments. McCall won the first individual title of her collegiate career, the 1995 Duke Invitational, in a playoff with Wake Forest's Stephanie Neill.

The 1995-96 team posted a third-place finish at the ACC Championships and finished 12th at the NCAA East Regional. McCall, an All-ACC performer, carded a fourth-place finish at the Tar Heel Invitational and a seventh-place finish at the ACC Championships. Rachel Poston garnered GTE Academic All-America honors and was named to the District III At-Large team in the University division.

The 1996-97 squad finished third at the ACC Championships and tied for 10th at the NCAA East Regional. McCall and Marcy Newton were selected to the All-ACC team and Newton was named the ACC Rookie of the Year. The Tar Heels carded seven top three finishes in their 10 tournaments, winning the first tournament of the spring campaign, the Fripp Island

Intercollegiate. Two Tar Heels won three individual titles as McCall was victorious twice and Newton once.

The 1997-98 team finished 15th at the NCAA Championships after placing third at the ACC Tournament. Carolina won the Betsy Rawls Longhorn Classic and Megan Morgan was selected to the All-ACC team.

The 1998-99 team tied for ninth place at the NCAA East Regional. The Heels won their first tournament of the year, the Lady Seminole Invitational, and Marcy Newton won the Fripp Island Intercollegiate. Newton was selected to the All-ACC team and also named second-team All-America.

The 1999-00 squad carded a third-place finish at the ACC Championships and finished 17th at the NCAA East Regional. Marcy Newton, an All-ACC performer and honorable mention All-America, advanced on to the NCAA Championships as an individual. Newton captured the third individual title of her career winning the Bryan National Collegiate and posted nine top 15 finishes in 11 tournaments.

The 2000-01 team finished in fourth place at the ACC Championships. Carolina tied for 15th at the NCAA East Regional, one of seven teams unable to complete 54 holes in the rain-shortened event.

The 2001-02 squad posted three top five finishes as sophomore Ashley Prange was selected to the All-ACC team. The Tar Heels finished fifth at the ACC Championships and placed 16th at the NCAA East Regional.

In the wake of the highly successful Tar Heel teams of the mid- and late-1980s, Carolina's squads in the '90s and the new century have certainly continued a tradition worthy of one of the finest collegiate women's golf programs in the nation.

## Carolina's Greatest Golfers

Along with their many accomplishments in overall competition, six Tar Heels have also received All-America recognition.

Linda Mescan was the first to earn All-America honors, garnering third-team recognition in 1981-82. Mescan captured three individual championships in her four years in Chapel Hill. She led her team to a pair of team championships in the 1981-82 season, captured the Duke Fall Invitational individually that same year and was named third-team All-America by the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Region II at the end of the season.

Mescan's teammate, Page Marsh, received the same honor after the 1982-83 season. She captured the Pat Bradley Intercollegiate and Duke Spring Invitational championships and placed 19th in the NAAs as an individual entrant on her way to being named the second Tar Heel All-America. Her career capped four years that saw her win three individual championships.

Katie Peterson was Carolina's next All-America as she was named to the third team after the 1987-88 campaign. At the completion of the 1988-89 season, two seniors, Peterson and Donna Andrews, were the next Tar Heels to be named All-America. Peterson captured three individual titles on her way to becoming the first first-team All-America in UNC history after the 1988-89 season. She won five individual championships in her four years at Carolina

and also helped her team to an eighth-place finish in the NCAA Championships in 1989, a tournament in which she finished 11th. She is the only five-time individual medalist in Tar Heel history and the only two-time All-America.

Peterson also joined Kandi Kessler as one of only two women from Carolina to ever play on the prestigious United States Curtis Cup squad. Kessler was a member of the 1986 Curtis Cup team while Peterson was on the 1990 squad. Andrews also was tapped for All-America accolades in 1988-89. Although she only won one individual tournament title while at Carolina, the 1988 Lady Paladin Invitational, her overall consistent play earned her the recognition necessary to be voted a second-team All-America. She captured third place at the NCAA Championships in 1989, the best by a Carolina women's golfer in that prestigious event. Andrews later qualified for the LPGA Tour on her first try and placed 33rd in her first tournament. She continues to star as a touring pro on the LPGA Tour. Andrews finished in the top three in the 1992 and 1993 United States Women's Open Championships, a truly remarkable accomplishment.

Kimberly Byham was selected a first-team All-America in 1993. Byham won three individual titles during her collegiate career including the 1993 NCAA East Regional.

In 1999 Marcy Newton was selected second-team All-America and she captured three individual titles during her collegiate career. Newton was selected to the All-ACC team in 1997, 1999 and 2000 and was tabbed the '97 ACC Rookie of the Year. She was named to the 1999 first-team Golfweek Sagarin Mid-Atlantic/East District Team and went on to capture the 2000 U.S. Women's Amateur Championship.

Eight players have gone on to play on the LPGA Tour. Donna Andrews, Cathy Johnston-Forbes and Marcy Newton are still active on the Tour while the following have also played on the LPGA Tour – current Tar Heel Head Coach Sally Austin, Stephanie Kornegay, Suzy McGuire, Katie Peterson and Mindy Moore, who is currently Director of Player/Sponsor Relations for the LPGA.

The names and faces have changed throughout the years, but the commitment to success remains the same for the Carolina women's golf program.

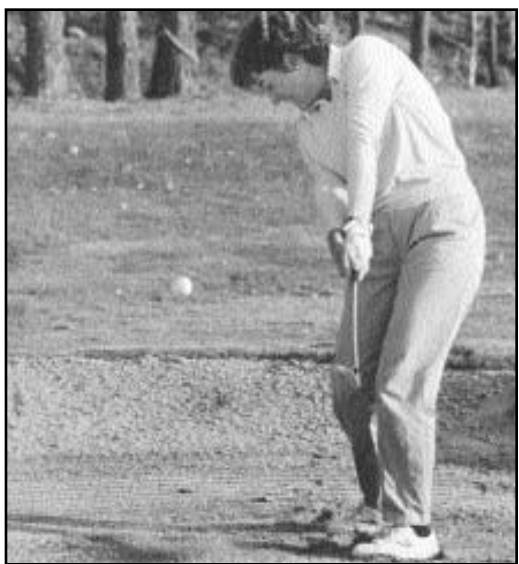

## A.E. Finley Executive Cup

The A. E. Finley Executive Cup remains an important part of the tradition of the Carolina golf program and a fixture on the schedule each year.

Formerly the Carolina Executive Cup, this tournament now carries a name to recognize an individual who has meant so much to Tar Heel Golf. In addition to providing funds for the original construction of the golf course and facilities, Finley's estate has donated money for the annual trophy given to the tournament winners and also for the annual banquet.

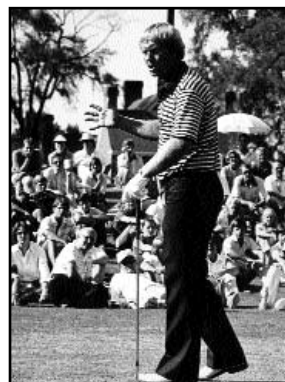
This annual tournament is an opportunity for supporters of Carolina golf to play with past and present Carolina golfers, coaches and University officials. This tournament is more than just a fund-raiser, it is a homecoming for former players to renew old acquaintances and establish new friendships.

The A. E. Finley Executive Cup, which began in 1976, provides vital funds for an endowment from which both golf teams may draw additional revenue for travel expenses. Since the men's and women's teams play national schedules, which take them all across the country to face tough competition, the A. E. Finley Executive Cup is pivotal in helping keep the Tar Heel program at the top of collegiate golf.

The appearances of golfing legend Jack Nicklaus in the 1980, '81 and

'83 events are highlights of the tournament's history, as he thrilled all spectators and contestants with a clinic he conducted after each tournament.

The inaugural Executive Cup in 1976 was played at the Country Club of North Carolina in Pinehurst, N.C. The tournament was moved to Grandfather Mountain a year later and was played there for one year (1977) before returning to the Country Club of North Carolina for two more years (1978-79). Beginning in 1980 it was played at UNC's Finley Golf Course and continued to be played there through 1990. After a four-year stint at the Governors Club (1991-94), the event returned to Finley Golf Course. It has been played there ever since, except for 1999, when it took place at The Challenge in Graham, N.C., because of renovations being made at Finley.

# ORDER OF MERIT

The Carolina Order of Merit was established in 1991 by the University of North Carolina Department of Athletics and Golf Program to annually honor former players, coaches, administrators and friends who have distinguished themselves in the game and for their overall contributions to the golf program at the University. The contributions of these individuals have been of paramount importance in the growth of the program at UNC and they are an integral part of the excellence of one of America's top collegiate golf programs.

The first two inductees, Jim Ferree and Harvie Ward, were inducted in 1991, Chuck Erickson and Bill Williamson were inducted in 1992, Bobby Galloway was inducted in 1993, Dot Gunnells and Ed Kenney were the inductees in 1994, John Inman was inducted in 1996, Davis Love III in 1997 and Roger Perry in 2001. The inductions take place at the Executive Cup Golf Tournament during the event's annual banquet. In addition to these inductees, two individuals, Peggy Kirk Bell and Andy Hacskeylo, were honored in 1995 for the many contributions they have made to Carolina's Golf Program.

## Chuck Erickson

A famous name in Carolina Athletic history is Chuck Erickson. He served as Carolina's golf coach for 23 years from 1935 till 1961, minus three years during World War II when the school fielded no team. In that span, his teams won five conference championships and had two top five NCAA finishes. Erickson coached three All-Americans including NCAA champion Harvie Ward. Erickson was also Carolina's athletic director, 1952-1968. During his tenure, the University broke from the Southern Conference and helped form the Atlantic Coast Conference. Erickson was directly responsible for the construction of UNC's own Finley Golf Course.



A native of Oak Park, Ill., Erickson graduated from Carolina in 1931 and was a star halfback on the 1928-1930 football teams. He was a recipient of the Helms Athletic Hall of Fame Award in 1970 and was inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame in 1992. Erickson passed away in 1977 after suffering a heart attack.

## Jim Ferree

Jim Ferree played on Carolina's 1951-1953 golf teams and was the 1953 Southern Conference Champion. A native of Pine Bluff, N.C., Ferree played on the PGA Tour for 11 years, 1956-1966. He currently stars on the Senior Tour, which he joined in 1981.

## Bobby Galloway

Bobby Galloway lettered for the Tar Heels in 1959 and 1960 and was captain in 1960 when Carolina won the Atlantic Coast Conference championship. That same year, Galloway was a quarterfinalist at the NCAA Championships and led the Tar Heels to a fourth-place finish.

He turned professional in 1964 and had his best PGA Tour finish in 1965 when he placed 10th at Memphis. Galloway was the Carolinas PGA Champion in 1971 and was the Carolinas Professional Golfer of the Year in 1976.



## Dot Gunnells

Dot Gunnells, one of the premier coaches in the country during her tenure, was the head coach of Carolina's women's team for 18 years, 1975-1993.

Gunnells was named the NCAA National Coach of the Year in 1993. That same year, she was inducted into the National Golf Coaches Association Hall of Fame and was the recipient of the National Golf Coaches Association Gladys Palmer Award for contributions to golf outside the normal coaching responsibilities.

In 1985 Gunnells was named the ACC Coach of the Year and in 1992 she was selected the Mid-Atlantic/East Region Coach of the Year. Her teams carded 11 top 25 finishes, placed eighth at the NCAA Championships three times (1989,

'92 and '93) and won the ACC Championship in 1992. She also coached five All-Americans.

## John Inman

One of Carolina's greatest men's golfers, John Inman, won the NCAA Championship in 1984 by breaking Ben Crenshaw's NCAA record with a 17-

under-par score. That score stood in the record books for 16 years until it was broken in the 2000 NCAA Championship. Inman won the 1984 Fred Haskins Award as the National Player of the Year. He was a member of the World Amateur Team that same year and won the 1984 Western Amateur. He was a three-time All-America (1982-84) and a three time All-ACC performer (1982-84) during his four-year career as a Tar Heel.



A native of Greensboro, N.C., Inman is currently the coach of Carolina's men's golf team. He turned professional in 1985 and played on the PGA Tour for 12 years (1987-1998). While playing on the PGA Tour he won the 1987 Provident Classic and the 1993 Buick Southern Open.

## Ed Kenney

Ed Kenney served as the head professional and pro shop manager of Finley Golf Course from 1949 until he retired in 1976. He also was the men's golf coach for 12 years, 1961-1972. His teams won over 71 percent of their matches and finished 12th in the 1962 NCAA Championship. His 1965 team captured the ACC Championship. Kenney also coached three ACC individual champions. He passed away in 2001.



## Davis Love III

One of Carolina's greatest men's golfers, Davis Love III, now stars on the PGA Tour. As a Tar Heel, Love was a three-time All-America and three-time All-ACC performer (1983-85). He was the ACC Champion in 1984, one of seven individual titles he captured during his career. Love was selected to the 1985 Walker Cup Team.



Love was an immediate star on the PGA Tour as he was named the 1986 PGA Rookie of the Year. Since then he has claimed 14 PGA victories including the 1997 PGA Championship. Love has been a member of the World Cup Team five times (1992-95, 1997) and is a five-time member of the Ryder Cup Team ('93, '95, '97, '99, '01) and four-time member of the Presidents Cup ('94, '96, '98, '00).

## Roger Perry

Roger Perry is a great friend and supporter of the Carolina golf program and was inducted into the Order of Merit in 2001. Perry served as chairman of Carolina's Executive Cup Golf Tournament for three years and was co-chairman of the fundraising campaign for the recent revamping of Finley Golf Course.

Perry, a real estate developer and president of East West Partners Management Company, Inc. in Chapel Hill, has served on numerous local and national fund-raising committees and charities.

Perry is a 1971 graduate from Carolina and presently resides in Raleigh.



## Harvie Ward

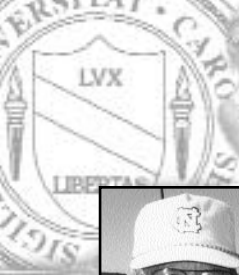
One of the most celebrated golfers in Carolina's history is Harvie Ward. A member of the Tar Heel 1947-1950 golf teams, he was Carolina's first All-America in 1949 and was the NCAA Champion that same year. Ward was the 1950 Southern Conference Champion and following graduation he won the 1952 British Amateur, the 1954 Canadian Amateur and the 1955 and 1956 U.S. Amateurs. A native of Tarboro, N.C., Ward spent much of his life as a businessman and golf pro in California and is now semi-retired and living in Pinehurst.

## Bill Williamson

Bill Williamson played on Carolina's 1951-1953 teams. He had an outstanding season his senior year as he was the runner-up in the NCAA Championships in 1953. He led the team to a second-place finish that year and was named to the All-America team.

Williamson is a former chairman of Carolina's Executive Cup Golf Tournament and is an active booster of the Tar Heel golf program. He is a businessman who resides in Charlotte.

Patterson is a 1954 graduate from the UNC School of Medicine. He is presently a physician in Danville, Va.

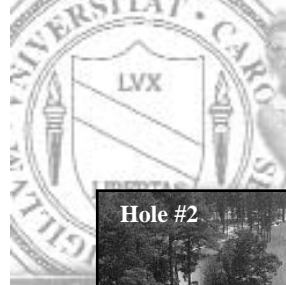

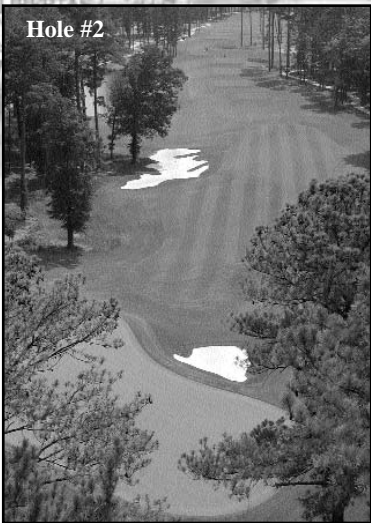
Willis, a 1931 Carolina graduate from Winston-Salem, was a long-time supporter of the golf program at UNC prior to his death.

# FINLEY GOLF COURSE



Hole #2

Finley Golf Course is once again one of the premier college facilities in the nation. Traditionally recognized as one of the most beautiful courses in the southeast, Finley recently received a facelift that makes it one of the most challenging as well.

Internationally renowned golf course designer Tom Fazio designed the New Finley Golf Course. It features a completely different layout, yet some of the best aspects of the old course were retained.

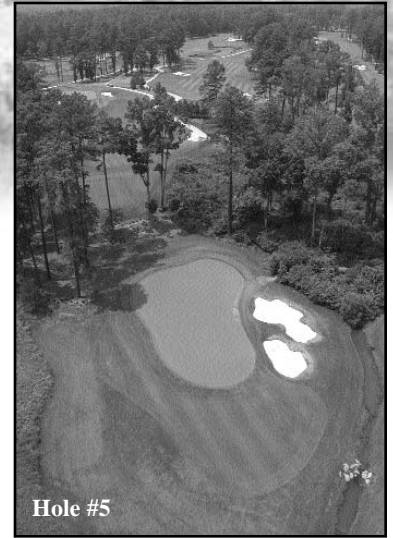
The new course features a par 72 layout with five sets of tees ranging from 4,981 yards from the forward tees to 7,187 yards from the championship markers, thus presenting a stiff challenge to the best golfers while still remaining accessible to those of all skill levels. Tees, greens and fairways were built and planted to the highest standard, while a state-of-the-art irrigation system and exceptional drainage maintains the quality of the course. In addition, the practice range was expanded and rebuilt and the clubhouse and snack shop underwent extensive renovations.

Carolina's golf teams also have a new team facility, the Chapman Golf Center which opened in November 2001. The 4,500-square-foot facility houses offices for the men's and women's golf coaches, men's and women's locker rooms, a team meeting room and a reception area. A Hall of Honor which honors former Carolina players and coaches is planned for the future. There is also a climate controlled individual teaching area with two hitting bays and a state-of-the-art teaching system. At the far end of the range adjacent to the team facility is a practice area used exclusively by the men's and women's golf teams. In addition to a practice range, there are putting and chipping greens and bunkers so the teams can hone their short games.

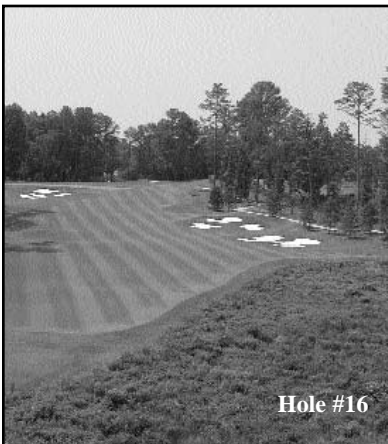
Finley Golf Course, originally designed by George Cobb and built by Raleigh businessman A. E. Finley, opened in 1949. Three holes were added in the early 1980s, also designed by Cobb, and the clubhouse underwent renovations in 1988.

Over the years, Finley has been host to many collegiate, high school and amateur competitions. Finley also plays host to the annual A. E. Finley Executive Cup Tournament and to championships conducted by the North Carolina High School Athletic Association.

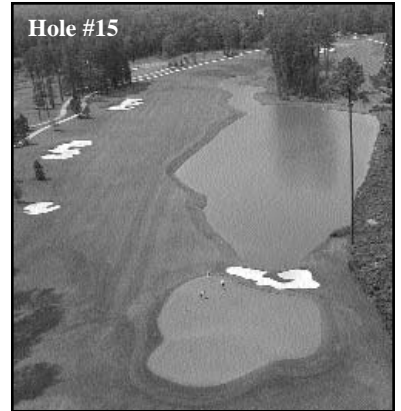
Finley Golf Course is located off Highway 54 in Chapel Hill. It is frequented by Carolina students, staff and faculty as well as many alumni of the University.

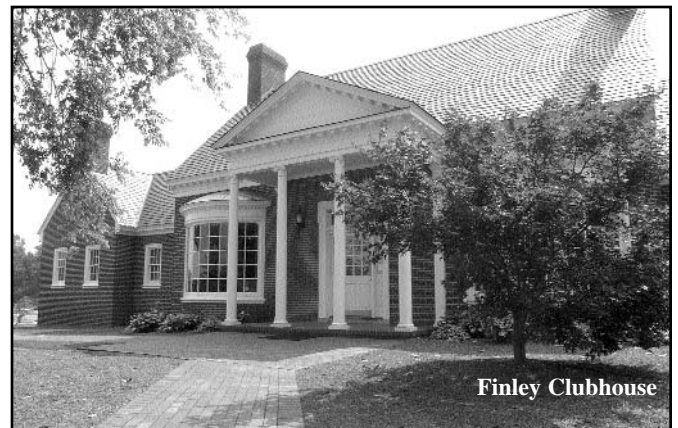

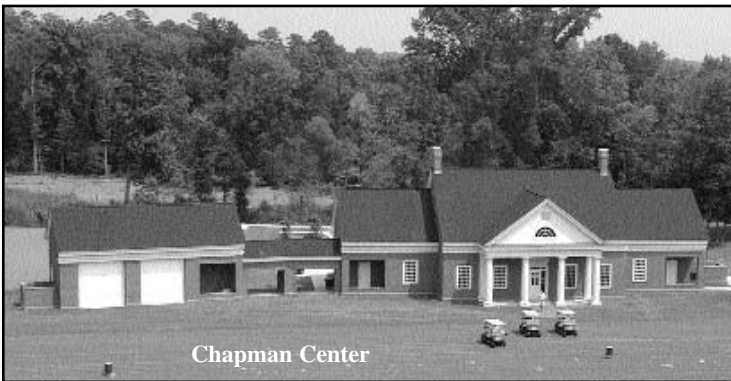

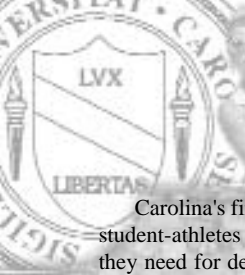

# STUDENT SERVICES

Carolina's first-rate facilities and the resources and services provided give student-athletes a wide array of benefits. Tar Heel golfers find everything they need for developing academically and athletically right on the Carolina campus.

Besides Finley Golf Course and the Chapman Center, the team has access to many other resources.

## ACADEMICS

Dedicated people like John Blanchard, Robert Mercer and the rest of the academic center staff help ensure that student athletes realize their academic potential within the demanding environment of Division I athletics.

Much of the work toward that goal takes place in the 10,000 square foot Student Athlete Development Center, located at the east end of Kenan Stadium in the Kenan Fiedlhouse. The center houses seven tutorial rooms, two conference rooms, a lecture room, computer lab, a reading lounge, seven offices and a 130-seat auditorium.

The academic support program offers structured study programs Sunday through Thursday nights, with tutors available if needed.

Many Carolina athletes have earned academic honors such as induction into Phi Beta Kappa and selection to GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

## FITNESS CENTER

Student-Athlete Development Coordinator Jeff Connors and a knowledgeable staff, including Jodi Hopkins, supervise the use of the 9,000 square foot Fitness Center located below the Development Center. A vast array of free weights, Kaiser compressed air machines and a full Nautilus line are used in tailor-made workouts designed to increase flexibility and power.

One of three fitness facilities used by Carolina athletes, the Kenan facility also features a performance lab with computerized Biocycles and a steps machine. This room is used for conditioning and monitoring rehabilitative progress.

## MEDICAL CARE

The Tar Heels also receive excellent care from one of the country's most complete sports medicine programs. Dr. Tim Taft oversees a program that includes care by Dr. Bryan Smith, nurses and interns.

Five full-time athletic trainers and physical therapists, including Rob Schneider, several graduate students and undergraduates complete the training staff.

The medical and athletic training facilities are in the Student Health Center and Fetzer Gym for easy access if treatment or advice on the care and prevention of injuries is needed.

The Carolina Athletic Department also recognizes a responsibility in educating student athletes on the physical, mental, emotional and legal issues involved in drug abuse. Accordingly, the department has established a drug

education and prevention program which is administered by the University's Student Health Services.

## CAREER PLANNING & PLACEMENT

Carolina student athletes can prepare for the future by participating in UNC's career planning and placement program.

The program combines services from the University's Career Planning and Placement Service and the Athletic Department's special activities. The departmental program includes a monthly newsletter, skills development workshops, career planning seminars and information on such topics as resume preparation and interview techniques.

## ACC HONOR ROLL INCLUDES 248 TAR HEELS

The University of North Carolina had 248 students qualify for the 2001-02 Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll, according to ACC Commissioner John Swofford. Four golf team members, Meghan Adams, Lauren Quinn, Abby Spector and Sarah Turcotte, qualified for a spot on this Honor Roll. The Honor Roll is comprised of student-athletes in a varsity sport who earned a GPA of 3.0 or higher for the school year.

## DEPARTMENT OF ATHLETICS STATEMENT ON GAMBLING

The mission of the Department of Athletics is to sponsor a broad-based athletic program that provides educational and athletic opportunities for young men and women to grow and develop. In keeping with the Department's mission and the University's commitment to educational interests, competitive athletic programs, and integrity in all areas, the Department of Athletics strongly condemns the influence of gambling on intercollegiate athletics.

Student gambling is a significant issue on college campuses. Student-athlete involvement in gambling has produced many tragic situations, both for student-athletes and the universities they represent. Student-athletes often compete in contests that generate interest from those involved in gambling and, possibly, organized crime. If given the opportunity, those interests will not hesitate to exploit the position student-athletes hold on college campuses. As such, the University of North Carolina is firmly opposed to all forms of gambling and bribery related to intercollegiate athletics.

To fulfill its educational obligation, the Department provides a gambling education program to all its student-athletes and departmental staff members. This statement and the educational program are reflections of the Department's commitment to keeping intercollegiate athletics free from the influences of gambling and its related activities.

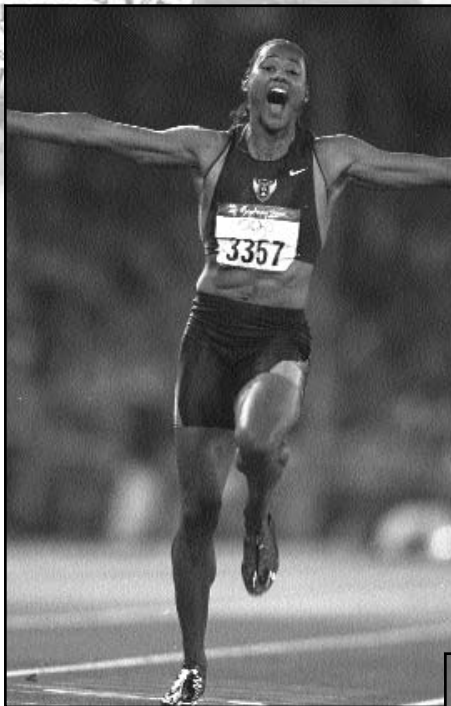

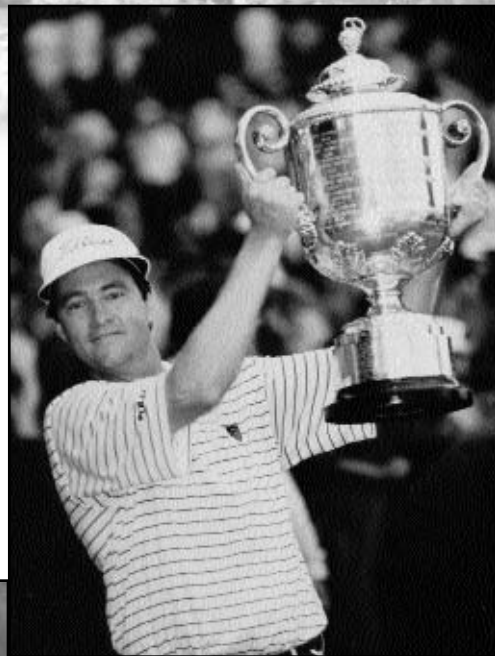

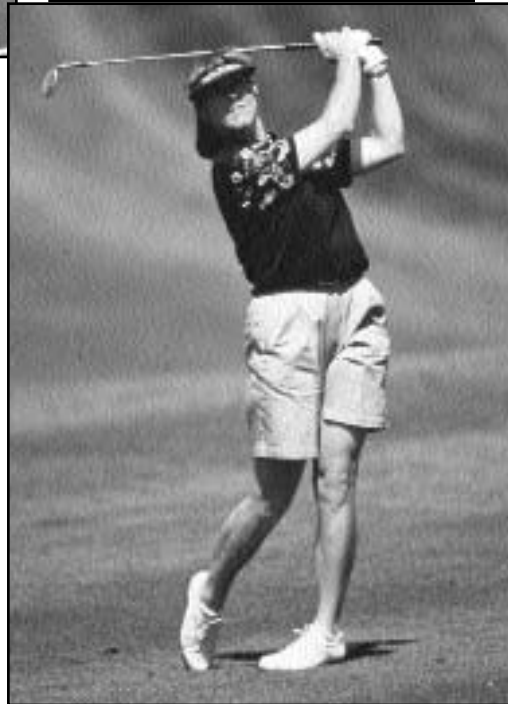
Marion Jones, the world's fastest woman, won three gold medals and two bronze medals at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

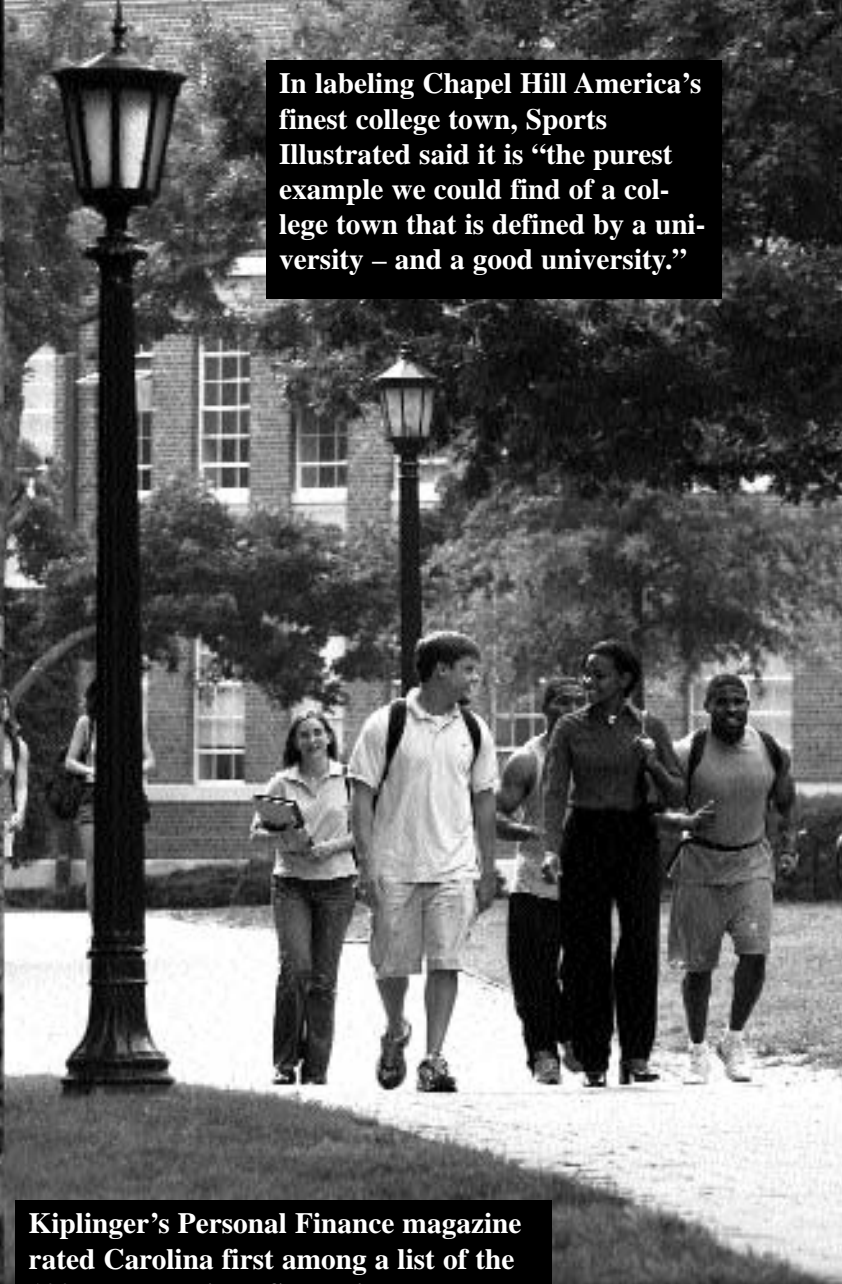
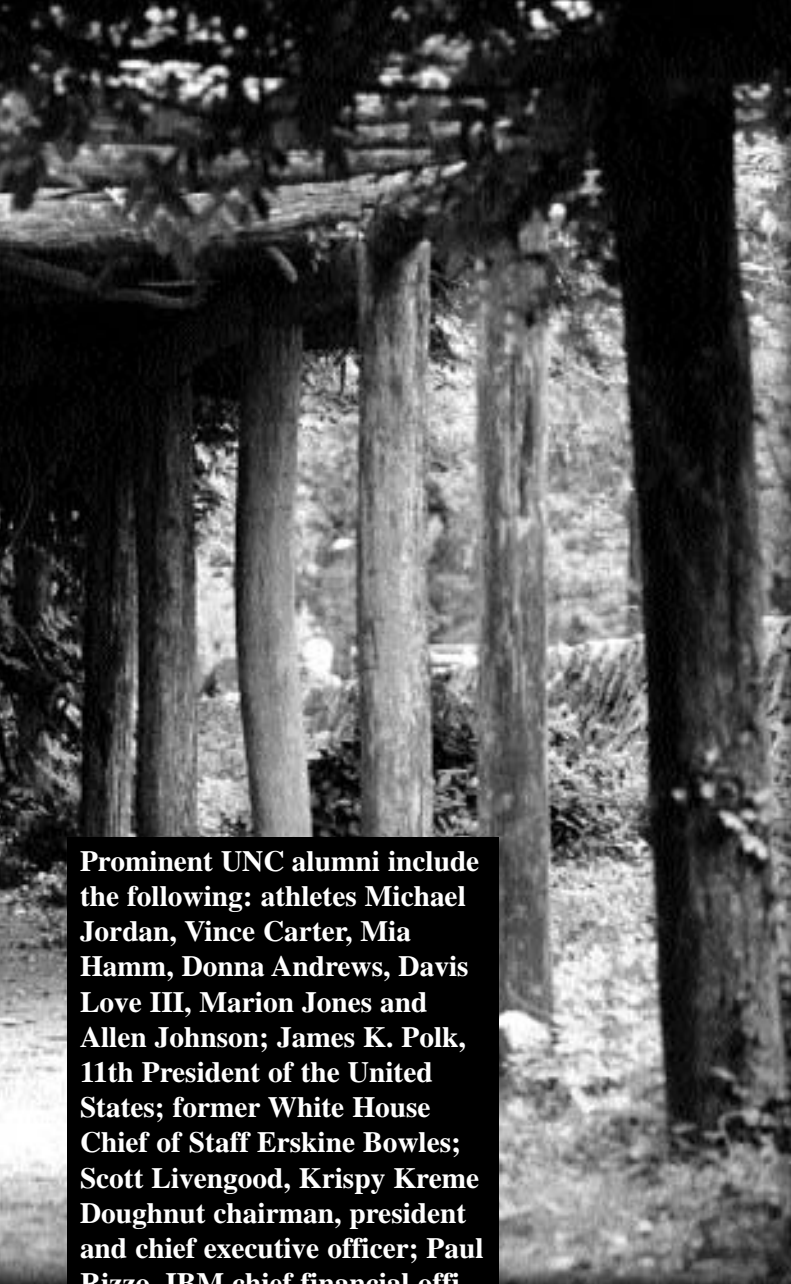


The University of North Carolina was the nation's first state university to open its doors and the only public university to award degrees in the 18th century.

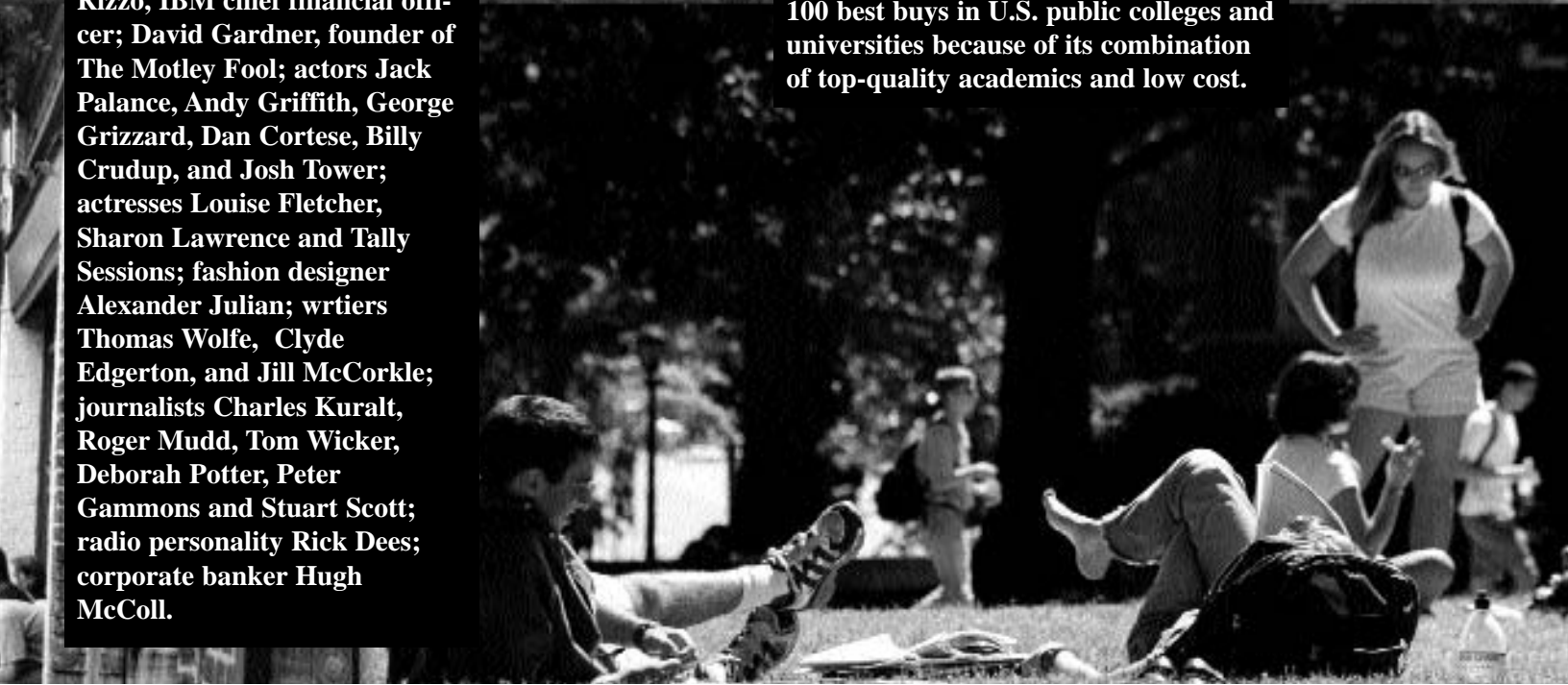
