TAR HEELS HOST USC IN HOME OPENER

The University of North Carolina men's basketball team, fresh off its 2004 Maui Invitational championship, will play its home opener on Sunday night Nov. 28 when it hosts Southern California in the Smith Center at 7:30 p.m.

The Tar Heels defeated Brigham Young, Tennessee and Iowa in the Lahaina Civic Center last week to win their second Maui Invitational title in the last six seasons.

Carolina is 87-7 all-time in home openers, including winning 71 of its last 73. UNC has lost home openers in 1911-12, 1912-13, 1913-

14, 1918-19, 1928-29, 1999-2000 and 2001-02.

Head coach Roy Williams won his first season-opener as UNC's head coach last season with a 90-64 win over Old Dominion on Nov. 22.

The game will be nationally televised by Fox Sports Net, Carolina's fourth consecutive nationally-televised game (including the three wins in Maui last week).

Southern California head coach Henry Bibby is a native of Franklinton, N.C., approximately 30 miles from Chapel Hill. The Trojans return four starters from last season.

The UNC traveling party departed Maui for North Carolina on Thanksgiving night and returned to Chapel Hill at approximately 5:45 p.m. EST on Friday.

The Tar Heels practiced almost immediately that evening, following with another practice on Saturday to prepare for Sunday's game with Southern California.

Two days after playing USC, Carolina hits the road again for a Dec. 1 game at Indiana in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge. The team will return home early the next morning and have two days to prepare for the Dec. 4 noon tip-off with Kentucky in the Smith Center.

The Tar Heels will then get a breather from game action to concentrate on fall semester final exams, playing just one game between Dec. 4 and Dec. 19.

TAR HEELS WIN 2004 MAUI INVITATIONAL

LAHAINA, MAUI, HAWAII -- Carolina won its second Maui Invitational championship when it defeated the University of Iowa on Nov. 24 in the Lahaina Civic Center, 106-92.

UNC blitzed the rest of the tournament field with a high-tempo attack that averaged 95.3 points per game. Carolina won its three contests by an average of 21.0 ppg vs. Brigham Young, Tennessee and Iowa.

Junior point guard Raymond Felton was named MVP of the Maui Invitational after averaging 9.3 points and 8.3 assists in the three wins. He played 33 minutes in the semifinal vs. Tennessee and 28 minutes in the title tilt vs. Iowa despite a painful sprained left wrist, suffered less than eight minutes into the game with the Volunteers.

Junior Rashad McCants was named to the all-tournament team after hitting 23 of 39 shots (59.0 percent) in the three wins and leading the Tar Heels by averaging 20.7 ppg.

The Tar Heels shot 51.0 percent from the floor in Maui.

Carolina has reached the finals in each of its four appearances in the EA Sports Maui Invitational, winning the title during in Nov. of 1999 and 2004. UNC has won six straight games in the event.

With an overall record of 10-2 in the event, Carolina has more wins in the Maui Invitational than any other school in the history of the event.

GAME #4 (NOV. 24, 2004) CAROLINA 106 IOWA 92

LAHAINA, MAUI, HAWAII -- Raymond Felton was named the 2004 Maui Invitational MVP after leading the Tar Heels to the tournament championship at the Lahaina Civic Center with a 106-92 win over Iowa. Felton had 13 points, five rebounds, nine assists and one turnover in the title game.

Rashad McCants was also named to the all-tournament team after scoring 22 points against the Hawkeyes. Jawad Williams scored 18 points and Sean May added 16 points and six assists for UNC.

The Tar Heels shot 57.9 percent in the first half, taking a 59-40 lead into the break. Iowa shot 65.4 percent in the second half, including hitting seven three-pointers. UNC forced 22

Hawkeye turnovers and outscored Iowa 48-24 in the paint.

FACTS & FIGURES

- ◆ Rashad McCants has connected on 13 of 23 three-point field goal attempts (56.5 percent) and averaging 20.5 points per game this season.
- ◆ Carolina is shooting 47.5 percent from the floor as a team. Three Tar Heels are shooting at least 50.0 percent (minimum 25 attempts) — Sean May (51.3), Rashad McCants (56.6) and Jawad Williams (57.1).
- ◆ Carolina has forced 89 turnovers in four games this season, an average of 22.3 per game.
- ◆ Quentin Thomas is the first scholarship Tar Heel from California (Oakland) since Scott Williams (1986-90).
- ◆ The Nov. 19 game against Santa Clara broke a streak of 65 straight starts by Raymond Felton. It was the first game he hasn't started in his Tar Heel career. In fact, it was the first game in Felton's career at any level in which he did not play.
- ◆ Carolina's preseason ranking of fourth by the

AP was their highest preseason mark since it was also fourth prior to the 1997-98 season.

◆ Marvin Williams was selected the ACC Preseason Rookie of the Year for 2004-05. Five Tar Heels have won the postseason version of that award, with the last being Joseph Forte in 2000.

◆ Carolina's 82.1 ppg average last year was the team's highest since 1994-95.

◆ Last season, Raymond Felton averaged 12.7 ppg in UNC losses and 10.8 ppg in UNC wins.

◆ The addition of Marvin Williams to this year's team means "Williams" is the most popular surname in Carolina basketball history. Six Tar Heels have shared that name, and they've all played in the past 15 years—Marvin, Donald, Jawad, Scott Williams (1986-90), Scott Williams (1998-99) and Shammond. That surge has pushed Williams past Smith, which is in second place with five examples—Larry, James, Kenny, Mike, and Ranzino. It wouldn't be too hard to find a coach for a Williams vs. Smith battle — Roy Williams and Dean Smith.

◆ Only five players in Carolina history have made the Maui Invitational All-Tournament team—Rick Fox (1989), Jeff McInnis (1995), Brendan Haywood (1999), Ed Cota (1999), and Joseph Forte (1999). Of those, only Forte was the tournament MVP.

◆ Opponents shot at least 44 percent from the field against Carolina in the past three seasons. Prior to that stretch, they hadn't accomplished shooting 44 percent in even one season since 1989-90. Tar Heel opponents are hitting 41.4 percent of their shots this season.

◆ Prior to last season, the number of three-pointers attempted by Carolina as a team had increased each season since the 1998-99 campaign. Last year, that figure dropped from 822 to 555.

◆ Quentin Thomas is the 20th player to wear number 11 at Carolina. That ties that jersey with number 31 as the second-most popular number in Tar Heel history. The most frequently worn? Number 20, which was worn by 21 different players (the last was Steve Bucknall) before

BREAKING DOWN THE SCHEDULE

◆ A look at UNC's opponents this season ◆

- The Tar Heels could face up to 13 teams that were in the 2004 NCAA Tournament field (including possible matchups at the Maui Invitational).
- 21 Carolina games will be nationally televised, not including the postseason.
- Carolina vs. Kentucky (Dec. 4) is the fifth game in a six-game series between the two winningest programs in history.

being retired in honor of George Glamack.

CAROLINA VS. USC

Carolina has never lost to Southern California, winning all six meetings between the two teams to lead the series 6-0.

The last meeting between UNC and USC came on Nov. 22, 1999, in the opening round of the Maui Invitational with Carolina winning, 82-65. The Tar Heels went on to win the '99 Maui Invitational, a tournament they also won on Nov. 24 with a 106-92 win over Iowa.

In the 1999-2000 game, freshman Joseph Forte set a then-UNC record with 24 points in his first college game. Rashad McCants broke that record two seasons later when he scored 28 in his first game vs. Penn State on Nov. 18, 2002, in the Smith Center.

FELTON RETURNS TO ACTION

UNC point guard Raymond Felton returned to the starting lineup in Maui this week vs. BYU and Tennessee after sitting out Friday's season-opener in Oakland vs. Santa Clara at the Pete Newell Classic. Felton was declared ineligible for one regular-season game by the NCAA for Felton's participation in a non-certified summer league basketball game in Raleigh.

Felton had never missed a game at any level in his basketball career prior to the Santa Clara game. He had started all 65 games of his UNC career prior to sitting out vs. the Broncos.

Felton played one game in the Capitol Park

Summer Basketball League (also known as the Chavis League) because he thought the league was properly certified, as it had been in years past. However, the NCAA did not certify the Chavis League for 2004. It is against NCAA rules to compete in a non-certified basketball league.

Felton was informed prior to playing in a second game that the league, in fact, had not been certified for 2004. He did not play in any other games.

Following NCAA procedures, the University declared Felton ineligible and the NCAA restored his eligibility with the one-game penalty.

THOMAS STARTS FIRST COLLEGIATE GAME IN HIS HOMETOWN

Carolina freshman guard Quentin Thomas was in the starting lineup for his first college

game in his hometown of Oakland on Nov. 19 vs. Santa Clara. He had two points, three assists and three turnovers in 14 minutes of action.

Thomas is the 21st Tar Heel to start his first career game since freshmen became eligible in 1972-73 (see chart below).

Thomas is a 2004 graduate of Oakland Technical Senior High School. His high school jersey was retired at halftime of the Santa Clara game. Thomas is Carolina's first player from California since Scott Williams (Hacienda Heights) in 1986-90.

GAME #3 (NOV. 23, 2004) CAROLINA 94 TENNESSEE 81

LAHAINA, MAUI, HAWAII -- Carolina advanced to the championship game of the 2004 EA Sports Maui Invitational with a 94-81 victory over Tennessee on Nov. 23 in the Lahaina Civic Center in Maui, Hawaii.

Rashad McCants led all scorers with 27 points, including 19 in the first half. Jawad Williams had 21 points for UNC, while Melvin Scott hit three three-pointers and finished with 12 points. Sean May had nine points and 13 assists for Carolina and Raymond Felton added nine points and nine assists.

The Tar Heels shot 58.8 percent from the floor in the game, its best shooting performance in 29 games (since shooting 60.9 percent against George Mason on Dec. 7, 2003. Carolina shot 65.4 percent in the first half, a higher field goal percentage than it had in any half during the 2003-04 season.

GAME #2 (NOV. 22, 2004) CAROLINA 86 BYU 50

LAHAINA, MAUI, HAWAII -- Carolina bounced back from a season-opening loss to Santa Clara with an 86-50 win over Brigham Young in the first round of the Maui Invitational on Nov. 22.

UNC led by 30 points at halftime (48-18) and cruised to the victory.

After allowing Santa Clara to shoot 59.1 percent in the second half in Oakland on Nov. 19, the Tar Heels held BYU to a 5-for-27 effort (18.5 percent) in the first half on Monday.

The Tar Heels forced 27 turnovers in the game, holding BYU to 31.6 percent shooting from the floor in the game. Carolina held a 19-7 edge in fast break points, a 30-6 advantage in points off turnovers and a 40-16 edge in points in the paint in the win over BYU.

Sean May led UNC with 18 points and eight rebounds, while Rashad McCants (13 points), Jawad Williams (11) and Melvin Scott (10) also scored in double figures.

EXHIB. #1 (NOV. 5, 2004) CAROLINA 113 WINSTON-SALEM STATE 54

CHAPEL HILL -- Jawad Williams and junior forward Rashad McCants scored 21 points apiece to lead the University of North Carolina to a 113-54 win over Winston-Salem State on Nov. 5 at the Smith Center.

McCants scored five points in a 7-0 UNC run to open the game. Carolina never trailed and led by as many as 31 points in the opening half. The Tar Heels shot 59.4 percent from the floor in the first 20 minutes, then topped that mark by shooting 64.9 percent from the field in the second half.

After the initial 7-0 run to start the game, the Rams made it 7-3 on a three-point play. The Tar Heels then went on a 11-0 run, including seven straight points by Jawad Williams. Carolina led 52-25 at intermission, led by 13 points from Jawad Williams and nine by McCants. UNC forced 13 first-half turnovers.

The second half featured a run of 11 straight points to give the Tar Heels an 82-40 lead with 8:42 to play and a 10-0 run that extended the margin to 92-42 with 6:22 to play.

In addition to 21 points by Jawad Williams and McCants, the Tar Heels got 15 points and three assists from Jackie Manuel, 12 points and six rebounds from David Noel, 11 points and five boards from freshman Marvin Williams and 10 points and two blocks from Sean May.

Junior guard Raymond Felton handed out 11 of Carolina's 34 assists (on 43 field goals). Senior guard Melvin Scott had six assists and no turnovers.

EXHIB. #2 (NOV. 12, 2004) CAROLINA 100 MOUNT OLIVE 69

CHAPEL HILL -- Freshman forward Marvin Williams scored 18 points and grabbed 11 rebounds and keyed a decisive 17-0 first half run with six points to lead the University of North Carolina to a 100-69 exhibition win over Mount Olive College on Nov. 12 at the Smith Center.

Marvin Williams was one of four Carolina players to score in double figures.

He was joined by Jawad Williams and Sean May with 15 points apiece and Melvin Scott with 11.

Carolina shot 52.9 percent from the floor in the first half en route to a 57-30 lead at intermission. The Trojans jumped out to a 9-4 lead behind five points from forward Sharome Holloway. Trailing 13-11 with 13 minutes to play in the half, the Tar Heels then went on the 17-0 run, holding the Trojans scoreless for nearly six minutes.

The Tar Heels also added the last nine points of the half to take a 27-point lead to the locker room.

Junior point guard Raymond Felton had four assists in 16 first-half minutes, but was held out of the second half by UNC coach Roy Williams.

UNC announced after the game that Felton will be ineligible for the Santa Clara game on Nov. 19 because he played one game in a non-certified summer league game in Raleigh, N.C.

The Tar Heels limited Mount Olive to 36.2 percent shooting from the floor. UNC also forced 28 turnovers and converted them into 30 points.

"Overall, it's a fantastic group academically, and on the court they will give us a lot of versatility," says Williams. "They will be asked to make major contributions since we are going to be losing such quality performers in this year's senior class. It's a 'nucleus' class. Our job is to build around them in the future."

FELTON, MAY McCANTS NAMED PRESEASON CANDIDATES FOR WOODEN, NAISMITH AND RUPP TROPHIES

University of North Carolina juniors Raymond Felton, Sean May and Rashad McCants are all on the list of preseason candidates for the Naismith Trophy. In all, there are 13 ACC players among the 50 nominees.

Other ACC nominees include Duke's Daniel Ewing, JJ Redick and Shelden Williams, Georgia Tech's B.J. Elder, Jarrett Jack and Luke Sshenscher, Wake Forest's Justin Gray and Chris Paul, Maryland's John Gilchrist and NC State's Julius Hodge.

The Wooden Award also has announced its preseason All-American team, composed of 50 student-athletes who are the early frontrunners for its award. Carolina joins Georgia Tech as the only two schools in the nation with three honorees. Tar Heels Felton, May and McCants are on the list.

MEDIA PICKS CAROLINA SECOND IN ACC

Wake Forest was the top pick and North Carolina was second in the media's preseason poll conducted at the ACC's preseason Operation Basketball.

The Demon Deacons received 65 of a possible 91 first-place votes and had 965 total points. Carolina had 13 first-place votes and 866 points. Georgia Tech was third with 10 first-place votes and 836 points. Duke was fourth with three first-place votes and 746 votes.

The rest of the poll was as follows: No. 5 NC State, No. 6 Maryland, No. 7 Florida State, No. 8 Virginia, No. 9 Clemson, No. 10 Virginia Tech and No. 11 Miami.

Tar Heels Sean May and Rashad McCants were named to the preseason All-ACC team, joined by Chris Paul of Wake Forest, Julius Hodge of NC State and J.J. Redick of Duke.

Paul was the preseason Player of the Year and UNC's Marvin Williams was the preseason Rookie of the Year in the conference.
