The sport of field hockey has been played by teams representing the University of North Carolina since the 1940s. Eight women's sports, including field hockey, were officially elevated to varsity status in 1971 when Carolina became a charter member of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW). These sports were under the supervision of the Physical Education Department until October of 1974, when they came under the direction of the UNC Department of Athletics.

Since 1971, the program has compiled an impressive overall record of 463-151-19.

The 1971 field hockey team, coached by Beth Ross, tied Duke 1-1, then posted a 3-0 win over a team comprised of UNC physical education majors. A second intercollegiate game, against East Carolina, was rained out.

Chip Johnson guided the 1972 squad to a 3-7-1 ledger, then Ann Gregory directed the program for the next three years. During Gregory's tenure the Tar Heels posted their first winning records, going 4-3-2 in 1974 and 4-2-1 in 1975.

Dolly Hunter coached UNC to a 54-27-3 record from 1976 through 1980. The Tar Heels won AIAW state championships four straight years from 1977 through 1980, earning an invitation to the AIAW Southern Region II tournament each year. The 1978 squad notched the program's highest finish in the event, placing second.

In 1981, the last season before the NCAA began sponsoring championships for women's sports, first-year head coach Karen Shelton guided Carolina to another second place finish in the AIAW Southern Region II.

Since that season, the program has gained national prominence and is recognized as one of the country's field hockey powers. The Tar Heels have participated in NCAA Tournament play 22 times in the last 23 years and have advanced to the NCAA Final Four a total of 12 times.

Carolina captured its first NCAA Championship in 1989, defeating Old Dominion 2-1 on penalty strokes. In 1995, Shelton and the Tar Heels won title number two, 5-1 over Maryland, and finished the season 24-0. The '96 team, with a 23-1 record, won the program's third title. And in 1997, Carolina claimed a third straight championship and a fourth overall with a 3-2 win over Old Dominion in Storrs, Conn.

UNC's first All-America honoree was Mary Sentementes in 1983. She repeated in 1984, becoming the first of 11 Tar Heel field hockey players to earn first-team All-America honors more than once. Kate Barber, Jana Toepel and Cindy Werley were three-time first-team picks. A total of 26 players have earned first-team All-America honors on 40 occasions.

Leslie Lyness received the 1989 Honda Sports Award for field hockey as the nation's most outstanding collegiate player and later become the first UNC field hockey player to have her jersey, No. 7, retired. Cindy Werley, won the Honda Award in 1996 and '97 and saw her No. 13 jersey retired in 1998.

Six Tar Heels – Leslie Lyness (1989), Amy Cox (1992), Barbara Hansen (1994), Kate Barber (1995), Cindy Werley (1996, '97) and Kristen McCann (2000) – have been voted Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year. In 2004, the ACC began awarding separate awards for offense and defense and Rachel Dawson was voted ACC Defensive Player of the Year. In 2003, Dawson became the fourth Tar Heel to earn ACC Freshman of the Year honors, following Stephanie Walsh (1990),

Barber (1994) and Meredith Keller (1999). A total of 48 Tar Heels have earned All-ACC honors on 81 occasions.

In the 22 years of ACC Tournament competition, UNC has captured the championship 15 times. Nine Tar Heels have earned MVP honors on 13 occasions – most recently Kelsey Keeran in 2004 – and 29 players have been named to the All-ACC Tournament team on a total of 47 occasions.

Karen Shelton has been voted national coach of the year three times, in 1994, '95 and '96. Seven times she has been named ACC Coach of the Year, most recently in 2004. She collected her 300th career victory on Oct. 27, 1999, when the Tar Heels beat Wake Forest 3-1 on Senior Day in Chapel Hill. Shelton has compiled a 397-109-9 career record in her 24 seasons at North Carolina.

In 2002, the ACC celebrated its 50th anniversary by naming the top 50 players in the history of each conference sport. The field hockey list included 20 UNC players, more than any other school. Tar Heels recognized as being among the top 50 players in ACC history were Kate Barber (1994-97), Lori Bruney (1984-87), Bashi Buba (1975-78), Jennifer Clark (1988-91), Amy Cox (1989-92), Joy Driscoll (1994-97), Maryellen Falcone (1984-87), Barbara Hansen (1991-94), Laurel Hershey (1987-90), Louise Hines (1982-85), Judith Jonckheer (1984-85), Carrie Lingo (1999-2002), Leslie Lyness (1986-89), Kristen McCann (1997-2000), Nancy Pelligreen (1995-98), Mary Sentementes (1981-84), Peggy Storrar (1990-93), Jana Toepel (1997-2000), Cindy Werley (1993-94, 1996-97), and Jana Withrow (1994-97).

The UNC field hockey program dedicated its current home, Francis E. Henry Stadium, on April 24, 1999. One of the nation's finest facilities, the stadium includes top-of-the-line locker rooms, offices and meeting space for the field hockey and women's lacrosse teams and grandstand seating for 1,086, plenty of space for fans to watch as the Tar Heels continue to make history.

Tar Heels Earn Spots in USFHA Hall of Fame

In 2004, Leslie Lyness and Laurel Hershey Martin became the first former UNC players inducted into the U.S. Field Hockey Association Hall of Fame. The two were among seven members in the Class of 2004, the fourth group of inductees to the Hall, which was established in 1986.

Also among the Hall's members is UNC coach Karen Shelton, a 1989 inductee. Hall of Fame honorees are selected based on a point system that takes into account each year an athlete competed on the U.S. National Team. Additional points are earned for selection to Olympic, Pan American Games or World Cup teams.

"I'm very proud of Leslie and Laurel," Shelton said. "I consider them two of our all-time greats at UNC and in the sport. It's fitting they're the first of what we hope will be many more Tar Heels inducted into the Hall of Fame."

Both Lyness and Martin were members of the U.S. National Team from 1990-96, earning a bronze medal at the 1994 World Cup and representing the U.S. at the 1996 Olympic Games.



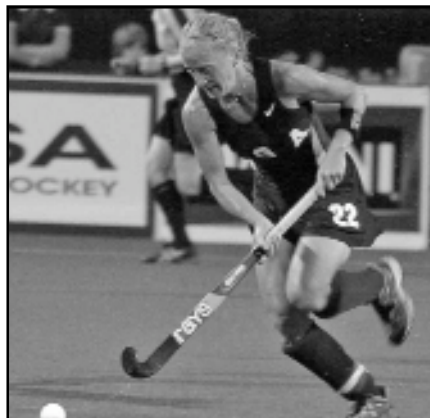

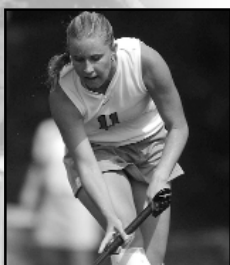

1989: Carolina's First Crown

After waiting through eight consecutive NCAA tournament appearances, seven consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference championships and two straight trips to the final four, it's almost no surprise the 1989 University of North Carolina field hockey team took all of regulation, three overtimes and penalty strokes to capture the program's first national championship, 2-1 over Old Dominion.

Peggy Anthon put UNC up on a goal with 10:56 remaining, but ODU tied the game with just over six minutes to play. In the first NCAA tournament game in which penalty strokes were required to decide the championship, Tar Heel goalie Evelien Spee clinched the victory and championship for the Heels by scoring on Carolina's fifth and final attempt.

The victory in Springfield, Mass., capped a 20-2 season that included an undefeated ACC regular season and a conference title.

Anthon, Laurel Hershey, Imke Lempers and Leslie Lyness earned spots on the All-NCAA Tournament.

1995: A Perfect Season

The North Carolina field hockey team completed the finest season in Tar Heel history in 1995, capturing the program's second national championship with an overpowering 5-1 victory over Maryland in Winston-Salem, N.C. The victory capped a dominant season that saw Carolina go 24-0 overall and 8-0 in the ACC.

Maryland had been a familiar opponent during the 1995 campaign, as the two teams faced off four times throughout the season. The first three meetings went down to the wire, with Carolina prevailing in overtime in each. But in front of a partisan crowd of over 3,000, the Tar Heels proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that they were the nation's number one team.

Using an outstanding penalty corner and a superb second half performance Carolina rolled to a four-goal victory. Susannah Schott led the way with a hat trick, and the team's lone senior, captain Kim Schroll, added four assists. The two were

joined on the NCAA-All Tournament team by Nancy Pelligreen, Kate Barber, Chrissy Utter and Jana Withrow.

1996: Another Year at the Top

The 1996 championship game pitted Princeton against Carolina after the Tigers upset Old Dominion in the semifinals to prevent a third contest of the year between UNC and ODU. The Tar Heels dominated play throughout the game on the way to a 3-0 victory on goals by Susannah Schott, Nancy Pelligreen and Ashley Hanson.

Fifteen of the team's 23 victories during the season came against ranked opponents, including five wins over top 10 programs. The Tar Heels outscored opponents 101-21 on the year, giving up more than two goals in a single game only once all season.

Pelligreen, Kate Barber, Joy Driscoll were named to the All-NCAA Tournament.

1997: Three in a Row

After winning back-to-back championships in the previous two seasons, the Carolina field hockey program could call itself a true dynasty. The 1997 team cemented that position by defeating Old Dominion for the crown.

The game was the third meeting of the season between the two teams, with each team claiming a one-goal victory on the other's home field. The final, played in Storrs, Conn., began with ODU taking a 1-0 lead. Senior Cindy Werley evened the score for the Tar Heels, and junior Nancy Pelligreen added a goal to give UNC a 2-1 lead heading into halftime.

In the second half Carolina recorded the last of three unanswered goals when Joy Driscoll scored to put UNC up 3-1. Old Dominion would score once more, but the Heels held on to win their third consecutive NCAA championship, 3-2.

Driscoll was joined on the All-NCAA Tournament by Kate Barber, Nancy Pelligreen and Cindy Werley.

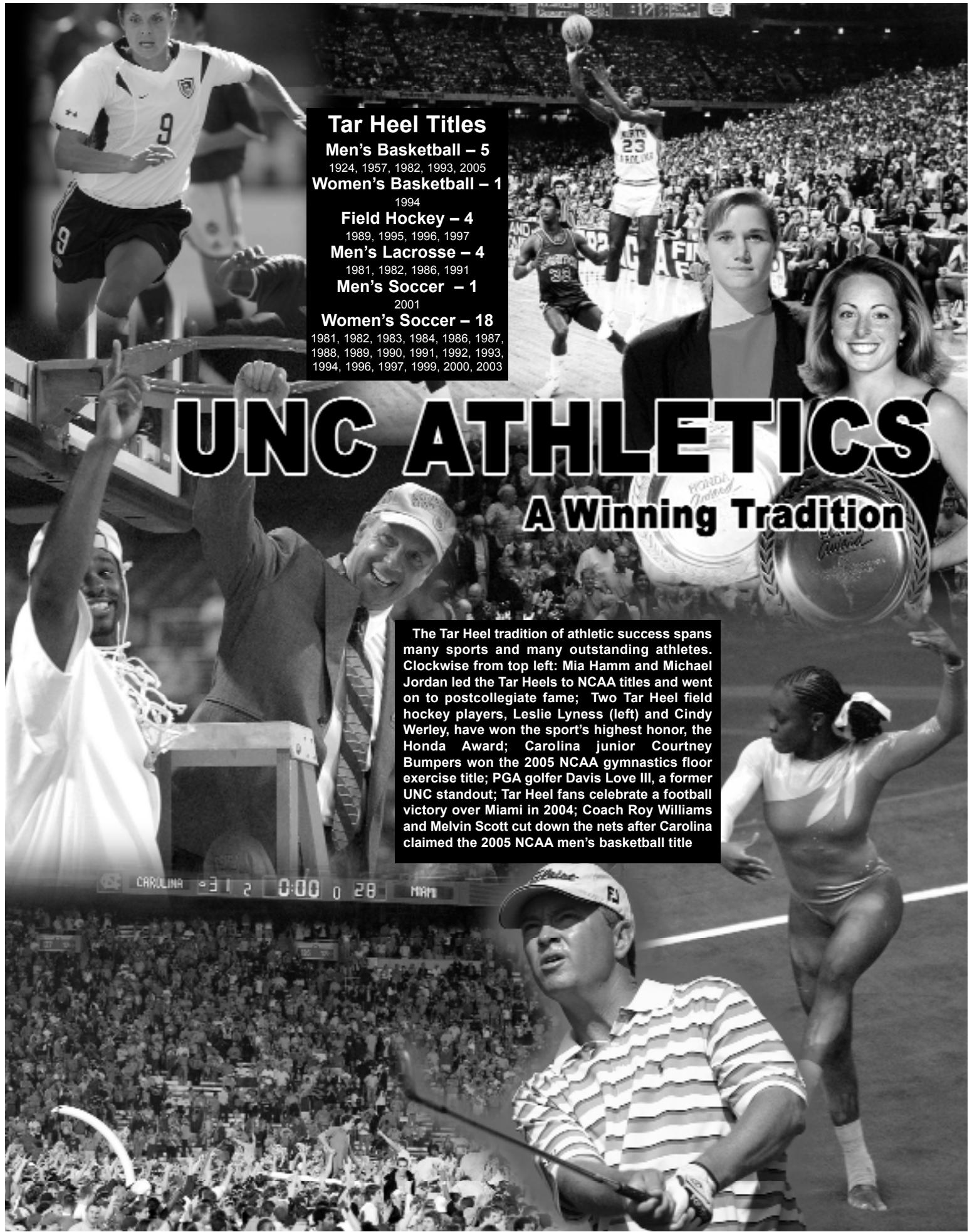

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA

- Now in its third century, UNC offers bachelor's, master's, doctoral and professional degrees in academic areas critical to North Carolina's future: business, dentistry, education, law, medicine, nursing, public health and social work, among others. Offerings include 71 bachelor's, 110 master's and 77 doctorate degree programs.

- In fall 2004, Carolina enrolled more than 26,800 students from all 100 North Carolina counties, the other 49 states and more than 100 other countries. Eighty-two percent of Carolina's undergraduates come from North Carolina. Those students learn from a 3,100-member faculty. Many of those faculty members hold or have held major posts in virtually every national scholarly or professional organization and have earned election to the most prestigious academic academies and organizations.

- Carolina's more than 243,000 alumni live in all 50 states and in 146 countries. Notable alumni include writers Thomas Wolfe, Shelby Foote, Russell Banks and Jill McCorkle; athletes Michael Jordan, Vince Carter, Antawn Jamison, Mia Hamm, Marion Jones and Davis Love III; and journalists Alan Murray, Roger Mudd, Charles Kuralt, Stuart Scott and Tom Wicker.

Others include former White House Chief of Staff Erskine Bowles; former White House Communications Director Don Baer; former U.S. Sen. John Edwards (now director of UNC's new Center on Poverty, Work and Opportunity); Bill Harrison, chairman and chief executive officer of JPMorgan Chase & Co.; Sallie L. Krawcheck, chief financial officer and head of strategy for Citigroup Inc.; Ken Thompson, chairman and chief executive officer of Wachovia Corp.; Dr. Mary Sue Coleman, a biochemist and former Carolina vice chancellor and now the University of Michigan president; Dr. Elson Floyd, former Carolina executive vice chancellor and now president of the University of Missouri system; U.S. President James Polk; geneticist Francis Collins; actors Jack Palance, George Grizzard and Andy Griffith, as well as actresses Louise Fletcher and Sharon Lawrence; editorial cartoonist Jeff MacNelly; Hugh McColl, retired chairman and chief executive officer of Bank of America Corp.; and fashion designer Alexander Julian.

CAROLINA FIELD HOCKEY: the university of north carolina



Through its teaching, research and public service, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is an educational and economic beacon for the people of North Carolina and beyond.

• History

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill was the nation's first state university to open its doors and the only public university to award degrees in the 18th century.

Authorized by the N.C. Constitution in 1776, the university was chartered by the N.C. General Assembly Dec. 11, 1789, the same year George Washington first was inaugurated as president.

The cornerstone was laid for Old East, the nation's first state university building, Oct. 12, 1793. Hinton James, the first student, arrived from Wilmington, N.C., Feb. 12, 1795.

• Location

The 729-acre central campus includes the two oldest state university buildings, Old East and Person Hall. Old East and Playmakers Theatre, an 1852 Greek-revival building are National Historic Landmarks.

The American Society of Landscape Architects selected the Carolina campus as one of the most beautifully landscaped spots in the country. That listing is among the praise affirming the charm of mighty oaks, majestic quadrangles, brick sidewalks and other landscaping synonymous with UNC.

Today, the campus is undergoing an unprecedented physical transformation made possible in part by North Carolinians' overwhelming approval of the \$3.1 billion bond referendum for higher education. The referendum, approved in November 2000, was the nation's largest higher education bond package.

The bonds mean \$510 million for renovations, repairs and new buildings so 21st century students at Carolina can learn in a 21st century environment. Also guided by a visionary master plan for growth now rapidly coming to life, the university is investing another \$800-plus million from non-state sources, including private gifts and overhead receipts from faculty research grants, for other buildings essential to excellence. The resulting \$1.3 billion capital construction program is among the largest underway at any major American university.

Recently completed projects include the renovation of Memorial Hall, which anchors the university's planned arts common and is now a comfortable, elegant venue for the performing arts; the Rams Head Center, a linchpin in the campus master plan that combines a 700-space parking deck, dining and student recreation facilities, and innovative sustainability practices; and the renovated Health Sciences Library, which features 140 comput-

er workstations and technology that will encourage collaboration among scientists and educators in Chapel Hill and beyond.

This fall, groundbreakings will include the North Carolina Cancer Hospital, a \$180 million facility being built by the UNC Health Care System that was approved by the North Carolina General Assembly and Gov. Mike Easley in 2004.

UNC anchors one corner of the famed Research Triangle Park, which has played a vital role in nurturing the economic development of North Carolina.

• Recent Rankings

Several national publications regularly publish rankings that listed Carolina prominently in categories ranging from academic quality to affordability to diversity to public service to international presence. Recent highlights include:

- Fifth best public university in U.S. News & World Report's annual "Best Colleges" guidebook.
- Second among public campuses and 19th overall in "Great Schools, Great Prices," based on academic quality, net cost of attendance and average student debt.



- Kenan-Flagler Business School: tied for sixth among undergraduate programs.

- Fourth among public universities in "The Top American Research Universities," produced in December 2004 by the Lombardi Program on Measuring University Performance at the University of Florida.

- First among the 100 best public colleges combining great academics and affordable tuitions as ranked by Kiplinger's Personal Finance. Carolina has been first four consecutive times.

- A "best value" among 81 schools chosen for "America's Best Value Colleges, 2006 Edition" by The Princeton Review/Random House for outstanding academics, relatively low costs, and generous financial aid packages.

- First for the top entrepreneurial campus and fifth "most connected" according to The Princeton Review and Forbes.com. UNC has an undergraduate business degree offering with a concentration in entrepreneurship in the Kenan-Flagler Business School, a new minor in entrepreneurship in the College of Arts and Sciences, and a new campuswide Carolina Entrepreneurial Initiative. In 2000, UNC became the nation's largest university requiring undergraduates to own laptop computers. With more than 850 wireless access points, UNC provides wireless connectivity in classrooms, labs, libraries, residence halls and quadrangles.

- First among public research universities, for the second consecutive year, recording the highest rate of undergraduates studying abroad in 2002-2003; Seventh among all research universities for the total number of undergraduates going abroad, according to an annual report published by the Institute of International Education.

- “Hottest” for health careers, according to the Kaplan/Newsweek 2005 “How to Get into College” guide, based on admissions trends and interviews with a broad array of educators, admissions officers, students and other longtime observers of the admissions process. An article in the guide says UNC's diverse offerings in the health disciplines - all in the same place - are helping attract prospective students.

- One of the nation's top universities in fostering social responsibility and public service, according to The Princeton Review and Campus Compact. Carolina appears in a book, “Colleges With a Conscience: 81 Great Schools With Outstanding Community Involvement.” Based on admissions practices, scholarships rewarding community service and support for service-learning programs.

• **Students**

Recent freshman classes at Carolina have set new standards of excellence as measured by the rigorous coursework students have taken in high school, as well as their grades and SAT scores. In 2004, the university's incoming freshmen continued that trend. And the most academically qualified incoming class ever is headed to Carolina in fall 2005 with an average SAT score of 1301, up 14 points over last year's class. Admitted freshmen hail from every North Carolina county, each of the nation's 50 states and 44 other countries.

Incoming freshmen will include 43 new Morehead Scholars: 24 of North Carolina's most dynamic young leaders and the rest from 14 other states and England. Among the largest and most competitive scholarships at U.S. colleges and universities, the Morehead Awards cover all expenses for four years of undergraduate study, including summer enrichment experiences. The program, now more than a half-century old, is modeled after the Rhodes Scholarships to Oxford University in England.

The newest Tar Heels who will enter Carolina this fall will include 22 Robertson Scholars. Along with 20 others who will matriculate at Duke University, they are part of the fifth class of this unique scholarship program, created by a \$24 million gift from Julian and Josie Robertson. The full-tuition scholarship allows each student to spend a semester in residence at the other campus. The scholarships bring together two of the nation's finest universities and help foster enhanced collaboration between both campuses.

• **Faculty**

Dr. Oliver Smithies, Excellence Professor of pathology and laboratory medicine, was one of two recipients of the 2005 March of Dimes Prize in Developmental Biology for his role in developing gene targeting. Smithies helped develop a technique that gives scientists around the world the ability to alter particular genes in cultured cells and transfer those targeted genes to laboratory mice. Gene targeting



allows them to design and produce “knockout” mice to study how the disabled gene works and to create animal models of human diseases. Smithies also won the 2001 Albert Lasker Award for Basic Medical Research, the nation's most distinguished honor for outstanding contributions to basic medical research. The Lasker Awards have often been called “America's Nobels,” and more than 60 researchers who won a Lasker went on to receive the Nobel Prize.

Two faculty members last spring were elected fellows of the prestigious American Academy of Arts and Sciences in recognition of major contributions to their fields. They are Drs. Jack D. Griffith, Kenan Distinguished Professor of Microbiology and Immunology and member of the UNC Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center; and Joseph M. DeSimone, W.R. Kenan, Jr. Distinguished Professor of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering at UNC and N.C. State University. The academy is considered the nation's oldest and most illustrious learned society. Griffin's melding of electron microscopy methods with biochemical tools revealed important insights into genetic diseases. His 1999 co-discovery that the ends of chromosomes are tied in firmly knotted loops provided insights into cancer and aging. DeSimone holds more than 100 U.S. patents and is renowned for discovering revolutionary ways to use carbon dioxide in place of conventional organic solvents for environmentally responsible manufacturing, cleaning and processing. Earlier this year, he was elected to membership in the National Academy of Engineering. Griffith and DeSimone bring to 27 the total number of Carolina faculty members elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Assistant Professor Lisa Pearce of the Department of Sociology was named a William T. Grant Scholar. Pearce, a fellow of the Carolina Population Center, will use the funds to study the role of religion in the shaping of self-image, aspirations, and achievement in youth.

Two distinguished professors at Carolina have been selected for prestigious Guggenheim Fellowship awards. Drs. Donald J. Raleigh, Jay Richard Judson distinguished professor of history, and Gerald J. Postema, Cary C. Boshamer professor of philosophy and law are 2005 recipients. Fellows are selected by the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation and recognized for distinguished individual achievement and exceptional promise for future accomplishment.

Dr. Wei Wang, assistant professor of computer science, was named one of five recipients of the first Microsoft New Faculty Fellowship Awards. The honors, given by Microsoft Research, recognize and support early-career faculty members who demonstrate exceptional talent for novel computer research and thought leadership in their disciplines. Each fellow will receive a grant to pursue innovative research.

• **Educational and Cultural Resources**

From the Ackland Art Museum to the Morehead Planetarium and Science Center to the North Carolina Botanical Garden, Carolina offers a vast array of educational and cultural opportunities.

The Ackland exhibits from a permanent collection of more than 15,000 works of art, particularly rich in Old Master paintings and sculptures by artists including Degas, Rubens and Pissarro; Indian miniatures; Japanese paintings; and North Carolina folk art. Astronomy enthusiasts and schoolchildren from across North Carolina enjoy the Morehead Planetarium and Science Center, which offers original productions such as the multimedia presentation of “Magic Tree House Space Mission” based on the children's series. Besides its displays of native and unusual plants and its nature trails, the North Carolina Botanical Garden offers art exhibits, nature walks and courses on topics ranging from home gardening to botanical illustration.

Professional theater also has a permanent place at Carolina through the PlayMakers Repertory Company, which performs in the Paul Green Theatre. The Carolina Union Performing Arts Series brings national and international dance, theatre and musical performances to campus.

The Sonja Haynes Stone Center for Black Culture and History opened in 2004, becoming one of the few such facilities nationwide combining cultural programs, research, community service, teaching and learning under one roof.



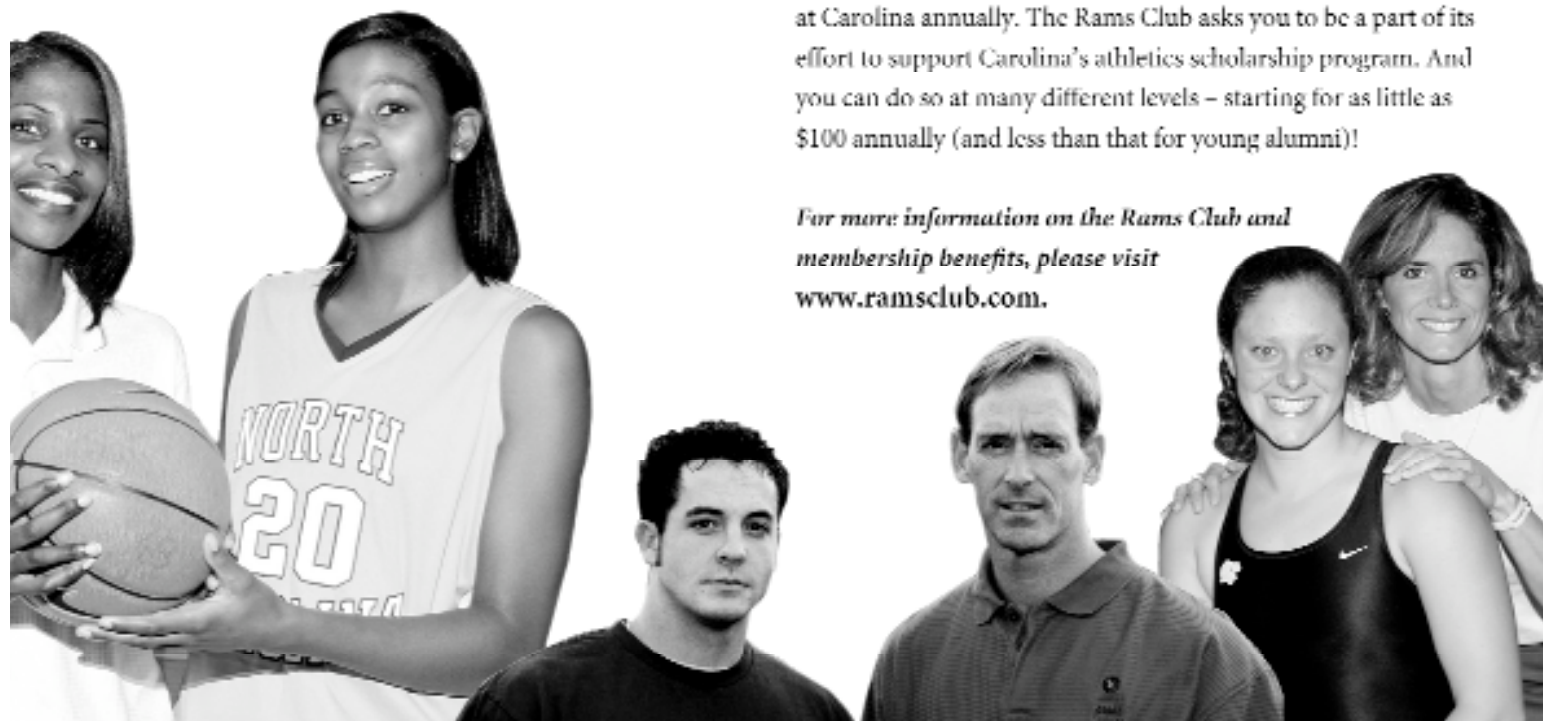
