Head Coach Anson Dorrance

Head Coach Anson Dorrance is in his 33rd season as the Tar Heels' head coach. His teams have an all-time record of 718-39-24 (.935). Under Dorrance, UNC has won 20 NCAA Tournament championships, one AIAW Tournament championship, 20 ACC regular-season championships, 20 ACC Tournament championships, appeared in 29 NCAA Tournaments and advanced to 25 of 29 NCAA College Cups.



During his tenure, Dorrance's teams are 147-12-4 (.914) in ACC regular-season games, 58-0-4 (.968) in ACC Tournament matches and 108-8-1 (.927) in NCAA Tournament games. UNC is 304-15-7 in home games in its history and 414-24-17 in games played on the road and at neutral sites.

Under Dorrance, UNC has won 93.5 percent of its games overall, 91.4 percent of its ACC regular season games, 96.8 percent of its ACC Tournament games, 92.7 percent of its NCAA Tournament games, 94.3 percent of its home games and 92.9 percent of its road and neutral site games.

In 781 games, the Tar Heels have outscored their opponents 3,097 to 386, a margin of 2,711 goals.

UNC TAKES TO THE ROAD TO MEET 2010 NCAA SEMIFINALIST OHIO STATE: The top-ranked North Carolina women's soccer team (3-0) returns to the pitch Sunday for the first time in seven days when it plays 18th-ranked Ohio State (4-1) at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium in Columbus, Ohio at 6 p.m.

Carolina has started the season 3-0 for the first time since 2009. Ohio State has gone 4-1 so far this season including a 1-0 win at West Virginia last Thursday. Ohio State's only loss this year came at Missouri 1-0 in the third game of the season.

A MATCHUP WITH ANOTHER FINAL 4 TEAM: Sunday's matchup will be the second time this season in the first four games that UNC will have faced a team which reached the 2010 NCAA College Cup.

Carolina played 2010 NCAA champion on August 26, beating the Fighting Irish 2-1 in overtime. A year ago, Ohio State reached its first ever College Cup before falling to Notre Dame 1-0 in the semifinals.

Carolina will meet a third 2010 NCAA semifinalist when the Tar Heels play at Boston College on October 20.

ANSON VERUS A CAROLINA ALUMNA: Sunday's game will feature a coaching matchup between 33-year Tar Heel head coach Anson Dorrance and one of his former players, Lori Walker, who mentors Ohio State, having taken the Buckeyes to the 2010 Final Four. Walker is in her 15th season as head coach of the Buckeyes.

The Tar Heels are 2-0 against Ohio State with Walker, UNC '94, as head coach. Carolina won at Columbus 2-0 in 2001 and the Tar Heels beat the Buckeyes 5-0 in 2007 at the Duke adidas Classic in Durham.

Sunday's game will also mark the second straight game in which the Dorrance has coached against a former player. Last Sunday UNC defeated Houston 6-1. The Cougars are coached by Susan Bush, who played at UNC from 1999-2002.

After Notre Dame tied the score on Jazmin Hall's first career goal in the 71st minute, the game went to overtime where the Tar Heels had all the momentum. Eventually the Tar Heels cashed in as Jones scored her first game-winning goal since October 31, 2010 in a 2-0 victory over Wake Forest.

Midfielder Amber Brooks stole a pass at midfield to set up the game winner. Brooks fed Kealia Ohai on the left side and Ohai found Jones unmarked at the top of the penalty box. Jones' 22-yard shot went into the lower left cor

ner to lift the Tar Heels to victory at 95:25.

The game was virtually statistically even with Notre Dame holding an edge in shots 11-9 and corner kicks 5-2. The difference came in the goalkeeping box where UNC's Hannah Daly made a career high seven saves while Sarah Voigt had two saves for the Fighting Irish.

The win broke a three-game losing streak for the Tar Heels against the Fighting Irish in games played at Fetzer Field. Notre Dame had won their last three visits to Fetzer in 2007, 2008 and 2010. The last Carolina win over the Irish at Fetzer came on September 13, 1998, a 5-1 tar Heel triumph.

JONES EARNS FOUR PLAYER OF THE WEEK AWARDS: After recording a goal and an assist against Notre Dame and assisting on the first goal in a win over Houston, senior forward Courtney Jones was named this week as the National Player of the Week by Soccer America, the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and SoccerNewsNet.

The last time a Tar Heel player won a national player of the week award was September 22, 2010 when Alyssa Rich captured the NSCAA award after scoring four goals and recording an assist in wins over Middle Tennessee and Florida.

Jones was also named the ACC Player of the Week after the Carolina Nike Classic, sharing that award with Duke's Kelly Cobb.

TEAM OF THE WEEK SELECTIONS: Senior forward Courtney Jones and junior midfielder Amber Brooks both earned national team of the week designations for their play in the 2011 Carolina Nike Classic.

Jones earned honors August 30 as a CollegeSoccer360.com Primetime Performer of the Week and she also earned mention on the Soccer America Team of the Week.

Brooks, who had three assists on the weekend, was named to the national team of the week tapped by Top Drawer Soccer.

A WIN OVER NO. 1: Carolina's 2-1 overtime victory over Notre Dame was its first victory over a No. 1-ranked team since it defeated Stanford 1-0 on December 6, 2010 in the NCAA championship game at College Station, Texas.

LARGEST HOME CROWD IN 13 YEARS: Carolina defeated Notre Dame 2-1 in overtime on August 26 before a crowd of 5,236 at Fetzer Field on the UNC campus.

That was the largest UNC home crowd in 13 years and the fourth largest crowd to ever watch the Tar Heels play at Fetzer Field.

The only larger crowds at Fetzer Field for UNC women's soccer have been 7,212 on December 1, 1995 when Notre Dame beat Carolina 1-0 in the NCAA Tournament semifinals; 6,024 on September 13, 1998 when UNC beat Notre Dame 5-1 in the Carolina Nike Classic; and 5,721, 1993 when UNC defeated

George Mason 6-0 in the NCAA championship game. That latter game also marked Mia Hamm's collegiate finale.

PREMI STRIKES AGAIN: After scoring only one goal in her first two seasons combined as a Tar Heel, Rane Premji scored her second goal of the 2011 season in only two games when she scored in the 20th minute of Carolina's 2-1 victory over Notre Dame on August 26.

DALY'S CAREER NIGHT VERUS NOTRE DAME: Junior goalkeeper Hannah Daly recorded a career high seven saves in Carolina's 2-1 victory over Notre Dame on August 26. That total exceeded by two her previous career high of five which came at Nebraska on August 19.

Daly exceeded her career high in the first half alone as she saved six Notre Dame shots in the first half. Six of Notre Dame's seven first half shots were on goal.

Daly surrendered a goal in the 71st minute that allowed Notre Dame to tie the game but her seventh and final save with 4:02 to go proved to be her most amazing stop of the night as she dove to her left to stop what appeared to be a sure goal by Adriana Leon of the Irish.

AN OVERTIME WIN FOR THE TAR HEELS: Carolina's 2-1 overtime win over Notre Dame on August 26 was its first overtime victory since the Tar Heels beat Virginia 1-0 on October 8, 2010 in Charlottesville, Va.

The victory improved Carolina's all-time overtime record to 30-6-23. The Tar Heels have an all-time winning percentage of 70.3 percent in overtime games.

OFFENSE RISES UP AGAINST HOUSTON: North Carolina had its top offensive explosion of the season against Houston on August 28. The 6-1 win over the Cougars was highlighted by six different players scoring their first goals of the 2011 season. The goal scorers were Megan Brigman, Kealia Ohai, Kelly McFarlane, Rachel Wood, Emmalie Pfankuch and Brooke Elby.

BULLET POINT HIGHLIGHTS IN WIN OVER COUGARS: There were multiple firsts and career highs recorded by Tar Heel players in their win over Houston on August 28.

- Sophomore Kelly McFarlane and freshman Brooke Elby both scored the first goals of their careers.

- Juniors Megan Brigman and Rachel Wood both recorded a career high three points in a game with a goal and an assist.

- Sophomore Kelly McFarlane matched her career high for points in a game with three. She also had three points versus Missouri on August 29, 2010.

- Junior midfielder Amber Brooks had two assists, the first multi-assist game of her career.

- Sophomore Meg Morris and junior Megan Brigman both recorded their second career assists.

- UNC played 23 players in the game with the minimum number of minutes played being 11.

TOP OFFENSIVE OUTPUT IN ALMOST A YEAR: UNC's six goals against Houston were the most scored by the Tar Heels since a 7-1 victory over Middle Tennessee on September 17, 2010.

ADY'S FIRST CAREER START: UNC senior goalkeeper Adelaide Gay earned her first career start against Houston August 28. Gay responded with a stellar performance, earning her first career goalie decision at UNC. She went all 90 minutes and made three saves and allowing only one goal.

TAR HEELS OPEN SEASON WITH WIN AT NEBRASKA: Head coach Anson Dorrance took his Tar Heels on the road for their season opener Friday, August 19 with the Tar Heels emerging with a hard fought 2-1 win over Nebraska in Lincoln, Neb. The game marked the first ever athletic event in Nebraska history as a member of the Big 10 Conference.

The game drew 2,319 fans to Nebraska Soccer Field, more than doubling the previous record crowd at the facility which was 1,021 on August 26, 2005 when the Cornhuskers hosted

the University of Minnesota.

UNC outshot the Cornhuskers 19-7 in the game and had an 11-3 edge in corner kicks. Carolina led in shots on goal 10-6. Emma Stevens made seven saves for the Cornhuskers while going the whole way while Hannah Daly made five saves for the Tar Heels.

The Tar Heels got on the board at the 1:34 mark when Maria Lubrano punched home a rebound after Kealia Ohai's initial shot was saved by Stevens.

Nebraska tied the game in the 49th minute on an empty net goal by Jordan Jackson but the Tar Heels netted the game-winner on a goal by midfielder Raneer Premji at 76:33. The junior midfielder punched home a rebound after Courtney Jones' initial shot was saved by Stevens.

PREMI'S SECOND CAREER GOAL LIFTS TAR HEELS: Junior midfielder Raneer Premji scored the game-winning goal for the Tar Heels in their 2-1 win over Nebraska in their season opener on August 19. The goal came in the 77th minute and was only the second tally of Premji's career.

The first two Premji career goals have been key tallies and game-winning efforts. Her first goal came on October 14, 2010 at Fetzer Field when she scored in the 87th minute to lift UNC past Florida State 1-0.

Premji scored her third career goal against Notre Dame on August 26. Ironically, all three of Premji's career goals have been assisted by Courtney Jones.

LUBRANO RETURNS IN STYLE: Redshirt junior midfielder Maria Lubrano started the Nebraska game on August 19, 2011. It was her first action since December 6, 2009 when she played 33 minutes in Carolina's NCAA championship game win over Stanford 1-0.

Lubrano sat out 2010 with a hip injury but she earned the start at center forward against the Cornhuskers and scored just 1:34 into the match to put the Tar Heels up 1-0.

It was Lubrano's first start since November 21, 2009 in the NCAA Tournament third round against Maryland. The goal was the first for the High Point, N.C. native since she scored against Maryland on November 1, 2009. It was Lubrano's third career goal.

DALY SETS CAREER HIGH FOR SAVES IN A GAME VERSUS HUSKERS: Junior goalkeeper Hannah Daly recorded five saves in Carolina's 2-1 victory over Nebraska on August 19, 2011.

The five saves were a career high for Daly. She previously had three in a 2-1 win over Duke in 2009 and also in three games in 2010 — a 3-0 win over NC State, a 5-3 win over Duke and a 4-2 victory over Virginia Tech. Daly has since broken her career high by recording seven saves against Notre Dame on August 26.

With the Nebraska game tied at 1-1 in the second half, Daly saved a penalty kick by Morgan Marlborough at 59:39. She also saved one-on-one opportunities in the penalty area by Marlborough at 73:37 and by Molly Thomas at 82:01 as the Tar Heels went on for a 2-1 victory.

JONES STANDS TALL ON UNC ALL-TIME SCORING CHARTS: Senior forward Courtney

Jones from Danville, Calif. has moved into the Top 40 of both the career points and goals charts at Carolina.

Jones currently has 89 career points which puts her in a tie with Jo Boobas (1983-86) for 38th place in UNC history. Anne Morrell (2001-04) ranks 37th with 90 points.

Jones has scored 31 goals in her career and is tied with Jo Boobas (1983-86) and Anne Morrell (2001-04) for 29th place. Elizabeth Guess (2003-06) and Yael Averbuch (2005-08) are tied for 27th place in UNC history with 32 goals each.

DUNN NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA: North Carolina sophomore forward/midfielder Crystal Dunn of Rockville Centre, N.Y., was named to the preseason All-America Team announced by Soccer America Magazine.

TAR HEELS HAVE TWO ON HERMANN TROPHY WATCH LIST: North Carolina sophomores Crystal Dunn and Kealia Ohai have both been named to the Hermann Trophy Watch List for 2011.

Both are starters in UNC's forward line. Dunn also doubles as a midfielder. She was a semifinalist for the 2010 Hermann Trophy.

The Hermann Trophy is awarded annually to the national player of the year in conjunction with the Missouri Athletic Club and the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

TAR HEELS TAP CO-CAPTAINS: A pair of UNC veterans with plenty of starting experience were elected by their teammates as co-captains of the 2011 Tar Heel team.

Senior forward Courtney Jones of Danville, Calif. and junior midfielder Amber Brooks of New Hope, Pa. were elected captains. Jones is in her fourth year as the starter at right forward for UNC while Brooks is in her third year as the starter at playmaking center midfield.

PREMI & JONES NAMED TAR HEEL PERFORMERS OF THE WEEK: Junior midfielder Raneer Premji was named the Tar Heel Performer of the Week for the week of August 14-20, 2011. Premji earned the honor after scoring the game-winning goal in the 77th minute of a 2-1 win at Nebraska.

A week later, senior forward Courtney Jones was named the Tar Heel Performer of the Week after she recorded a goal and two assists in the 2011 Carolina Nike Classic as she led Carolina to wins over No. 1 Notre Dame 2-1 and Houston 6-1.

FIVE TAR HEELS ON TOP DRAWER SOCCER LIST: Top Drawer Soccer Magazine named a preseason list of the Top 100 upperclassmen to watch in the 2011 season. UNC had five players named to the list — all in the Top 36 on the list. Junior Amber Brooks was No. 8, senior Courtney Jones No. 17, sophomore Crystal Dunn No. 23, sophomore Kealia Ohai No. 25 and sophomore Meg Morris No. 36 on the list of influential upperclassmen.

matches and 108-8-1 (.927) in NCAA Tournament games. UNC is 304-15-7 in home games in its history and 414-24-17 in games played on the road and at neutral sites.

Under Dorrance, UNC has won 93.5 percent of its games overall, 91.4 percent of its ACC regular season games, 96.8 percent of its ACC Tournament games, 92.7 percent of its NCAA Tournament games, 94.3 percent of its home games and 92.9 percent of its road and neutral site games.

In 781 games, the Tar Heels have outscored their opponents 3,097 to 386, a margin of 2,711 goals.

SERIES NOTES VERSUS OHIO STATE:

North Carolina and Ohio State will be playing for the fourth time in history on Sunday. The Tar Heels are 3-0 all-time against the Buckeyes, including a 1-0 mark in Columbus.

The teams previously played in Columbus on November 3, 2001 when the Heels beat the Buckeyes 2-0.

The other two meetings have come in the Duke Classic in Durham, N.C., with Carolina coming away with a 6-1 triumph in 1994 and a 5-0 victory in 2007.

STARTING LINEUP HEAVY ON UNDER-CLASSMEN:

UNC is a far less experienced side in 2011 than it has been in recent years. Only one senior — forward Courtney Jones — was in the starting lineup when the No. 3 Tar Heels battled Nebraska in the season opener on August 18.

The starting lineup against the Cornhuskers included Jones as well as five juniors (Hannah Daly, Megan Brigman, Ranee Premji, Amber Brooks, Maria Lubrano), three sophomores (Kealia Ohai, Kelly McFarlane, Crystal Dunn) and two freshmen (Taylor Ramirez, Satara Murray).

THE TAR HEELS' AMAZING GOAL DIFFERENTIAL:

In 781 games, the Tar Heels have outscored their opponents 3,097 to 386, a margin of 2,711 goals. UNC has averaged scoring 3.97 goals per game in the 781 games since the inception of the program in 1979.

CAROLINA'S STELLAR ACC RECORD:

Carolina has gone 47-6-1 in ACC regular-season

son matches since a 2-1 loss to Duke at Fetzer Field on October 9, 2005. The losses were to Miami in 2007, Virginia Tech, Florida State and Miami in 2009 and Boston College and Maryland in 2010 while the tie was with Florida State in 2008.

CAROLINA IN SEASON OPENERS: With a 2-1 win over Nebraska on August 19, 2011, UNC won its fourth straight season opener after having lost two in a row in 2006 and 2007. The Tar Heels are 29-3-1 all-time in season openers with losses in 1983 (road), 2006 (road) and 2007 (home) and a tie in 1985 (home).

UNC IN HOME OPENERS: With a 2-1 overtime win over Notre Dame on August 26, Carolina improved its record to 30-1-2 in home openers all-time. The only loss came to South Carolina 1-0 in 2007 and the ties were against George Mason in 1985 and Stanford in 2010.

THE ALL-TIME RECORD: UNC heads into its match with Ohio State with a record of 718-39-24 overall, a winning percentage of .935.

AVERAGE RECORD PER YEAR: UNC's average record per year in its 33 years of soccer is 22.34 wins per year, 1.19 losses per year and 0.75 ties per year.

IN THE POLLS: Carolina is ranked No. 1 this week in the NSCAA coaches poll and No. 1 in the Soccer America poll. The Tar Heels are ranked No. 2 by Top Drawer Soccer.

THIRTEEN ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAS

SINCE 2005: UNC has had 13 selections for the ESPN Academic All-America first, second and third teams in the past five seasons, including three in 2009. Those 13 selections came on a total of only 15 nominations for the Academic All-America teams by the UNC Athletic Communications Office during those five years. Schools are limited to three nominations per year.

Carolina also had seven women's soccer players named Academic All-Americans from 1983-2001, giving the program 20 selections since the Academic All-America program began in 1983.

29 TOURNAMENT BIDS IN 29 YEARS:

Carolina's at-large bid to the 2010 NCAA Tournament insured that it was playing in The Big Dance for the 29th successive year. Only North Carolina and Connecticut had made the NCAA Tournament field in each of the first 26 years of tournament play. However, the Huskies did not make the tournament field in 2008 so Carolina has the distinction of being the only team to make the NCAA field in all 29 years. The Tar Heels have won 20 of the previous 29 NCAA titles.

THE TAR HEELS IN OVERTIME: UNC has an all-time record of 30-6-23 all-time in overtime games in its history.

The Tar Heels' last overtime win came against Notre Dame on August 26, 2011 at Fetzer Field.

UNC has won over 50 percent of the overtime games it has played in since the start of the program while losing only 10 percent of the games. The remainder have ended in ties. UNC's overall winning percentage (including ties) is over 70 percent.

UNC LEAD IN WPS ROSTER NUMBERS:

Carolina had 12 players compete in Women's Professional Soccer in its first year of existence in 2009 and another 17 players on rosters in 2010.

The 2011 WPS season included 15 Tar Heels on WPS rosters.

The group includes Yael Averbuch of the Western New York Flash, Jenni Branam of Sky Blue FC, Lori Chalupny of the Atlanta Beat, Whitney Engen of the Western New York Flash, Kendall Fletcher of Sky Blue FC, Ashlyn Harris of the Western New York Flash, Tobin Heath of Sky Blue FC, Meghan Klingenberg of the Boston Breakers, Allie Long of Sky Blue FC, Casey Nogueira of Sky Blue FC, Heather O'Reilly of Sky Blue FC, Lindsay Tarpley of magic.Jack, Nikki Washington of magic.Jack, Kacey White of the Atlanta Beat and Cat Whitehill of the Atlanta Beat.

Three Tar Heels — Yael Averbuch, Whitney Engen and Ashlyn Harris — were members of the Western New York Flash which defeated the Philadelphia Independence in the 2011 WPS championship game on August 27, 2011.

Western New York defeated Philadelphia 5-4 on penalty kicks after the two teams played to a 1-1 tie. Harris saved the 10th and final penalty kick of the shootout to give the Flash the victo-

ry.

ENGEN AND HARRIS REAP TOP WPS

AWARDS: Whitney Engen and Ashlyn Harris, who played together on three NCAA championship teams at UNC from 2006-09, were named the winners of the WPS defender and goalkeeper of the year awards for 2011. Both players were only in their second years in the league.

AVERBUCH PLAYS ON SECOND WPS

TITLE WINNING TEAM: Yael Averbuch, who played at UNC from 2005-08, has now been a member of two WPS championship teams in her career. She also played for Sky Blue FC when it won the title in 2009.

Other Tar Heels on that Sky Blue FC team were Heather O'Reilly, Kacey White and Jenni Branam.
