Nike Supports UNC Athletics

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Nike Inc. signed a new 10-year contract for Nike to be the exclusive supplier of athletic footwear, apparel and accessory products to the Tar Heels effective July 1, 2008. The current contract with Nike comes up for renewal with the beginning of the 2018-19 school year at North Carolina. Nike provides the athletic department with shoes, uniforms, coaching gear, balls and other equipment. In addition to the apparel and equipment, which constitutes the majority of the value of the contract, Nike gives the University \$2 million for the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund. Chancellor Carol Folt has directed the funds to faculty support. Nike also provides support for team tours, travel and the hosting regular-season tournaments in several sports, including the 2018 Janis Hape Dowd Nike Cup to be held at Koury Natatorium from in the first weekend of February in 2018. The athletic department also received \$1 million for signing the contract, with those funds having been used to overhaul lighting and sound at the Dean E. Smith Center, adjacent to Koury Natatorium.

From Points West:

Take I-85 North toward Durham. Exit just past Burlington onto NC 54 East (Exit #148, Chapel Hill Exit). Follow NC 54 for approximately 20 miles to Carrboro. Pass Carrboro Plaza on the right and stay on NC 54 for about 4 miles to the next stoplight, Manning Drive. Turn left on Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

From Points East:

Take I-40 West toward Chapel Hill. Exit at NC 54 West (Exit #273 A) and follow for approximately 4 miles. Once in Chapel Hill, continue to follow signs for NC 54 West, which means you will have to exit right under first overpass. At the top of the exit turn right at light. Follow NC 54 West/15-501 South until the 2nd stoplight. Turn right onto Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

From Points South:

Take US 15-50 North toward Chapel Hill. Exit right onto US 15-501 Bypass in Chapel Hill. Turn left at first stoplight onto Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

TAR HEELS

Bubba Cunningham, Director of Athletics



Shortly after beginning his tenure as Carolina's athletics director, Lawrence R. (Bubba) Cunningham helped create a new mission statement: "We educate and inspire through athletics." And that's just what UNC has done during his six years in Chapel Hill.

Since Cunningham officially began his duties on November 14, 2011, Carolina has inspired in a myriad of ways. Among his many accomplishments are the implementation of a strategic plan for Carolina athletics; a partnership with Disney to enhance customer service and organizational practices; the development of the Student-Athlete Academic Initiative Working Group; a compliance review by an outside firm; a new student-athlete degree completion program entitled Complete Carolina; a master plan for

UNC's athletic facilities; and creation of The Rammys - an innovative end-of-the-year awards show popular with Carolina's student-athletes and staff.

Cunningham, who is the President of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 2017-18, has Carolina positioned to have a voice in the on-going conversation about the future, whether it is in the state university system, the Atlantic Coast Conference or at the NCAA level. Cunningham is in his sixth year on the ACC Television Committee and has served on numerous NCAA committees over the last two decades.

In his first full year in Chapel Hill, Cunningham led a planning committee that worked with Dr. Paul Friga, associate professor of strategy and entrepreneurship at Carolina's Kenan-Flagler School of Business, to develop Carolina's strategic plan. From that process was the creation of the mission statement and the four core values for Carolina Athletics- Responsibility, Innovation, Service and Excellence. The strategic plan will be updated again in 2017-18 after a blue ribbon committee worked on it in the last school year.

Soon after the strategic plan was announced, Cunningham joined with provost James W. Dean and other University officials to develop the Student-Athlete Academic Initiative Working Group, which was launched in fall 2013. That group spent several months developing a comprehensive approach to assessing and enhancing how the University provides academic support to student-athletes. The group has implemented a rigorous and transparent set of processes and metrics as part of an ongoing initiative. The objective is to ensure proper alignment with the University's academic mission, a goal that is consistent with Cunningham's strategic plan for the Department of Athletics.

In 2014, Cunningham announced the creation of Complete Carolina, an enhanced degree-completion program that honors former student-athletes' scholarships for life. The program provides financial support for degree completion, as well as academic advising and career counseling, to former student-athletes who return to complete their degrees at any time.

On the field, Carolina has achieved outstanding success under Cunningham's leadership. In each of his six seasons, the Tar Heels have finished in the top 15 of the Learfield Director's Cup, including five top-10 finishes. During that same period, the number of UNC student-athletes on the ACC Academic Honor Roll has steadily increased and reached a University record 385 in 2016-17.

The University of North Carolina finished fifth in the final 2016-17 Learfield Directors' Cup standings, the Tar Heels' 11th top-five and 20th top-10 finish in the 24-year history of the award. It marks the 18th time UNC was the highest-ranked Atlantic Coast Conference program in the year-end standings. The Learfield Directors' Cup measures NCAA post-season competitive success and awards points to a maximum of 10 men's and 10 women's programs per school. UNC compiled 1,154 points last year, led by men's basketball, which earned 100 points as NCAA champion, and field hockey and men's tennis, which both finished second in the nation and earned 90 points. The 1,154 points are UNC's fourth highest total (behind 2009, 2007 and 2011) in the current point system which began 15

years ago. Four other UNC teams finished in the top five in the NCAA - men's and women's soccer both tied for third and women's lacrosse and women's tennis both tied for fifth place. Women's golf, men's lacrosse and volleyball placed ninth to give the Tar Heels 10 teams in the top 10. Four other teams - women's swimming and diving, baseball, softball and men's golf - had top-20 performances. Twenty-five of Carolina's 28 sports advanced to NCAA Championship competition.

In addition, UNC won four ACC Championships in 2016-17, equaling Virginia Tech for the most in the league. Carolina's conference titles came in men's lacrosse, volleyball, women's tennis and women's lacrosse. UNC has now won 270 ACC crowns in its history.

The UNC women's athletics program captured the 2013 Capital One Cup, which is awarded to the best men's and women's Division I athletics programs in the country. For winning its first Capital One Cup, the Tar Heels earned \$200,000 toward student-athlete scholarships and a spot at the annual ESPY Awards show in Los Angeles.

Carolina student-athletes have excelled in the classroom as well. During the 2016-17 academic calendar, 385 student-athletes made the ACC Academic Honor Roll, which requires a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 for the year. It was the fourth-consecutive year more than 300 UNC student-athletes have earned the honor. That total was the most in school history.

Cunningham is in his 16th year as a Division I director of athletics. He came to Chapel Hill after spending the previous six years as the director of athletics at the University of Tulsa. He also was the AD for three years from 2002-2005 at Ball State University. He was honored as the 2008-09 FBS Central Region Athletics Director of the Year, an award presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.

At Tulsa, Cunningham guided the Golden Hurricane through its initial move to Conference USA and spearheaded a \$60 million athletics initiative. Tulsa won 34 league championships in his tenure, more than any other school in Conference USA and the football program played in five bowl games in his last six years.

At Ball State, Cunningham led a program with 19 intercollegiate sports and a budget of \$12.4 million. In his final year, Ball State completed a \$12 million campaign to renovate the football stadium. In raising those funds, Cunningham secured the largest single gift in Ball State athletics history.

From 1988-2002, Cunningham worked in the athletics department at the University of Notre Dame. He served as Notre Dame's associate athletics director for finance and facilities from 1995-2000 and was the associate director of athletics for external affairs from 2000-02.

Cunningham earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration, both from Notre Dame, in 1984 and 1988, respectively. He played on the Irish golf team in 1982-83.

Cunningham is a member of the USTA Athletic Director Advisory Group. He is a former member of NACDA's Executive Committee, and was on the Board of Directors of the Alzheimers Association of Oklahoma and the Folds of Honor Foundation Board. Cunningham also served on the Gatorade National Advisory Board and has been a featured speaker at numerous NACDA and I-A institute conferences.

Born in Flint, Mich., and raised in Naples, Fla., Cunningham and his wife, Tina, have four children: Matthew, Michael, John and Sarah.

Rich DeSelm, Head Coach

One of the nation's top collegiate head coaches, Rich DeSelm is now in his 11th year as the head swimming coach at the University of North Carolina after serving for one year as the chief assistant and head coach designate under former mentor Frank Comfort. Every year, DeSelm is leading his alma mater to new heights in the swimming pool and the classroom.

DeSelm was named a U.S. Swimming National Team coach for the calendar year 2014, the highest honor U.S. Swimming can bestow on a coach, and he earned the honor again in 2016. In 2017, U.S. Swimming named DeSelm to its National Team coaching staff for the third time in four years for his work with open water swimmers Ashley Twichell and Chip Peterson and 100-meter butterflyer Hellen Moffitt.

The program has made great strides under DeSelm's tutelage in the past 10 years. DeSelm had been a highly successful head coach at Davidson College and a long-time assistant at perennial Top 10 program Florida before he assumed the full-time head coaching duties at Carolina on July 1, 2007.

This past summer, DeSelm was named an assistant coach for the U.S. open water swimming team which competed at the World Aquatics Championships in Budapest, Hungary. DeSelm personally coached two of the U.S. team members at North Carolina Aquatic Club. Ashley Twichell won a gold medal in five-kilometer open water swimming and a silver in the five-kilometer open water relay. Chip Peterson, a 2010 UNC alumnus, was fifth in the 25-kilometer men's open water race. Twichell was also a U.S. national champion this past spring.

DeSelm also had two of his swimmers named to the U.S. Team which competed at the 2017 World University Games in Chinese Taipei. Caroline Baldwin won the 50-meter freestyle at the event and Hellen Moffitt claimed gold in the 100-meter butterfly. The two swimmers also combined to win two silver and a bronze in relay events.

The 2016-17 Tar Heel teams placed 41 swimmers and divers on the ACC Academic Honor Roll and five individuals on the All-ACC Academic Teams. The Tar Heel men set seven school records in short course events, the UNC women established 10 short course records (including in four of five relays) and nine University long course records fell last summer. Both Tar Heel squads earned College Swimming Coaches Association of America Scholar All-America Team status in each semester of 2016-17 as well.

Carolina had another highly successful season in 2015-16 when both teams claimed 7-3 dual meet records against the most difficult schedule in school history and each team claimed a third place finish in the ACC Championships. UNC swimmers set a dozen new school short course and long course records over the course of the season. Forty-five Tar Heels were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. Thirty UNC swimmers competed in the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials.

In the 2014-15 season both teams returned to the Top 20 of the NCAA Championships with the men taking 18th and the women 19th. In a deep ACC league, UNC took top four finishes on both sides of the ledger. At the NCAA Championships, 12 of Carolina's 13 entries in the women's meet earned All-America honors as did seven of the nine entries in the men's championships. The two teams combined to establish 17 new short course school records.

The Tar Heels also had an outstanding 2013-14 season. Meredith Hoover earned first-team All-America honors for the second straight year to lead individual honors by the squad. The women finished 19th nationally and moved up to second in the ACC. The men had another solid campaign and finished third in the ACC. The teams combined for an 18-4 dual meet mark. During the course of the year the women set eight new school short course records and the men established seven University marks. A total of 48 swimmers and divers were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, the most in the history of the Carolina aquatics program.

In 2012-13, DeSelm led the Tar Heels to another brilliant season in the pool. Both teams finished in the top three at the ACC championships and UNC had the men's and women's ACC swimmers of the year in the same season for the first time since 1996 when Tom Luchsinger and Cari Blalock won the awards. The women's 12th place finish at the NCAA Championships was the highest placing in 11 seasons. Eleven Tar Heels earned All-America honors at the NCAA Championships. UNC set 13 short course school records and seven long course Uni-

versity marks. During the summer months, Stephanie Peacock won a pair of medals at the World University Games and Tom Luchsinger won the U.S. national title in the 200-meter butterfly, the first Tar Heel man to win a U.S. title since 1996. Luchsinger was also the first UNC man to swim for the U.S. at the World Championships since 1998. DeSelm was also named the ACC Women's Swimming Coach of the Year for the second year in a row, the first back-to-back designation for a Tar Heel head coach since Frank Comfort in 2001 and 2002. In December 2012, Peacock set NCAA records in the 1000-yard freestyle and 1650-yard freestyle under DeSelm's tutelage.

In 2011-12, DeSelm led Carolina to one of its most successful combined seasons in history. Forty-eight Tar Heels qualified for the 2012 Olympic Trials, UNC swimmers combined to set 24 records, the Tar Heel men finished in the Top 15 for the third straight year and the Carolina women placed 19th at the NCAA meet. After a 14th-place finish at the 2012 NCAA meet, UNC's men achieved back-to-back-to-back NCAA Top 15 finishes for the first time since three straight from 1956-58. The 19th-place finish by the UNC women was the team's best finish since 2003. In August 2012, Peacock and Luchsinger were named to the U.S. National Team.

In 2011-12, DeSelm was named ACC Women's Coach of the Year and Peacock swept the ACC Swimmer of the Year honor and the most outstanding performer award at the ACC Championships. Peacock won the NCAA championship in the 1650-yard freestyle in an NCAA record time and she placed third in the 500-yard freestyle. It was the first NCAA championship for a UNC woman since 2003 (Jessi Perquet in the 200-yard freestyle) and Steve Cebertowicz finished sixth in both the 50- and 100-yard freestyles at the NCAA meet, the first time a Tar Heel man has made the championship final in both events since Pete Worthen in 1965.

In September 2011, U.S. Swimming named DeSelm to the National Team staff. This came on the heels of his first-ever international head coaching assignment in August 2011 when he piloted the ship for the U.S. men's team at the World University Games in Shenzhen, China. Two Tar Heel student-athletes mentored by DeSelm won bronze medals at the those Games — Tyler Harris in the 400-meter individual medley and Stephanie Peacock in the 400-meter freestyle.

The 2010-11 season was also a magnificent one under DeSelm's tutelage. The men and women both took second in the conference championships with the women achieving their highest point total in four years. The women garnered their third successive NCAA Top 25 finish while the men finished 14th at NAAs, the highest team finish in 18 years. UNC's women won five individual titles and two relay championships at the ACC meet and the men won five individual crowns. Altogether, UNC rewrote the short course record book for both teams with nine new school records on the women's side and 12 on the men's ledger. Five school records fell during the long course season in summer 2011. Individually, Tyler Harris placed third in the 400 IM at the NCAA meet, the highest individual placing by a UNC man since 1966. Joe Kinderwater copped first-team All-America honors in the 1650-yard freestyle and became only the third men's swimmer in Carolina history to win first-team honors all four years of his collegiate career. The men's 800-yard freestyle relay garnered first-team All-America accolades, the first Tar Heel relay to do so in 18 seasons.

DeSelm's men's dual meet record in seven seasons (1993-2000) was 26-40. His women's teams were 21-44-1. He was the Southern States Coach of the Year for men's swimming in 1995, and he received the honor for women's swimming each year from 1997 to 2000. During his tenure, the men's teams won three Southern States Championships, and the women's teams won four. Davidson placed in the top 10 at the Eastern College Athletic Conference Championships seven times in eight years. DeSelm coached 22 all-conference performers, including 11 individual event winners.

Carly Smith, Layne Brodie and Tyler Harris each won a pair of individual ACC titles and Tommy Wyher captured the men's 100-yard backstroke at the ACC meet, becoming only the 20th individual in ACC history to win the same event four years in a row. Tyler Harris was named the ACC Men's Swimming Scholar-Athlete of the Year, following in the footsteps of Chip Peterson who won the award a year earlier.

DeSelm has been an elite coach at every level during 40 years of collegiate coaching. As an assistant coach at North Carolina (1978-93) and Florida (2000-06), he assisted on teams that won 16 conference championships and placed in the Top 25 on 37 occasions at the NCAA Championships, including 21 Top 10 finishes. As a head coach at Davidson his teams won seven conference championships and placed in the Top 10 of the ECAC Championships seven times in eight years.

A team captain, first-team All-America and long-time assistant coach at Carolina, DeSelm earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from UNC in 1978. He went on to earn a master's degree from Duke in 1988 in liberal studies. He swam at Carolina from 1974-78 as a distance freestyler. He was the captain of coach Frank Comfort's first team in 1978 when he was the squad's most valuable swimmer. In 1976, DeSelm was a first-team All-America selection in the 800-yard freestyle relay.

DeSelm served as head coach designate in 2006-07, and became the head coach when Frank Comfort retired on June 30, 2007. DeSelm had previously worked as Comfort's No. 1 assistant for 15 seasons from 1978-93, years in which the program competed spectacularly in both conference and national competitions. In DeSelm's sole year as the head coach designate, Carolina's women claimed the ACC title for the first time in five



years and both the men and women improved their NCAA finishes from the previous campaign. Sixteen swimmers and divers were named to the 2007 All-ACC Teams.

In his first year at the helm of the Carolina program in 2007-08, DeSelm coached the Tar Heels to second-place finishes at the ACC Championships.

The men's second-place finish was their highest placing since 2001. For the first time since 2004, three Tar Heel men achieved All-America honors. Tyler Harris won the ACC title and set a UNC record in the 400 IM. Joe Kinderwater claimed the ACC championship and first-team All-America honors in the 1650 freestyle. He set school records in the 1000 and 1650 freestyles while making the finals of the 2008 Olympic Trials in the 1500-meter freestyle. Junior Whitney Sprague continued her record-setting career with ACC championships in the 500 and 1650 freestyles. She placed second in the NCAA Championships in the 1650 freestyle. The Tar



Coach DeSelm was a long-time assistant coach for the Tar Heels from 1978-93.

Heel program went to another level during DeSelm's second year at UNC in 2008-09. Carolina sent nine women and five men to the 2009 NCAA Championships with the women finishing 20th, Carolina's best placing since 2003. Sprague was the NCAA runnerup for the second year in a row in the 1650 freestyle while breaking the ACC record in the event. Katura Harvey placed seventh at the NCAA meet in the 1650 and broke the ACC record in the 500 freestyle. Layne Brodie was named ACC Freshman-of-the-Year, the first Tar Heel to win the award since Jessi Perruquet in 2003. She broke UNC records in three events and conference records in the 100 and 200-yard breaststrokes. On the men's side, Tyler Harris broke the 200-yard IM and 400-yard IM school records. Kinderwater placed eighth at NAAs in the 1650-yard freestyle where he was named first-team All-America and broke the UNC record. Kinderwater also placed fourth at World Championships Trials in the 1500-meter freestyle in 2009. Junior Chip Peterson broke the 500-yard freestyle school record. Sophomore Tommy Wyher captured a pair of ACC titles and set league records in the 100 fly and 100 back and a school record in the 200 back.

Both Tar Heel teams had banner campaigns in 2009-10. The Tar Heel men finished second at the ACC Championships with 656.5 points, the most points UNC had scored in the meet since 2000. Carolina's 15th-place NCAA finish was its best since 1996. Carolina captured an ACC relay title for the first time in 12 years. Three Tar Heels — Joe Kinderwater, Tommy Wyher and Tyler Harris — earned first-team All-America honors for UNC, the most in a single year since 1993. Nine UNC swimmers overall earned first-team or honorable mention All-America accolades, the most since 1996. Eight UNC performers were named All-ACC, the most since 1997. UNC swimmers eclipsed nine school records during the school year. Senior Chip Peterson was named the ACC Scholar-Athlete-of-the-Year and a CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America. He became the first Tar Heel men's swimmer since 1965 to win the Patterson Medal as the school's outstanding senior athlete. The women's squad improved their point total at ACCs for the second straight year, scoring 642.5 points, the most since 2007. For the second straight year UNC placed 20th at the NCAA Championships and the Tar Heels had relays score for the first time since 2003. Altogether, UNC swimmers established seven school records, including three relay marks. Laura Moriarty won three individual ACC championships, the most by a UNC women's swimmer since Richelle Fox won three titles in 1998. Moriarty earned first-team All-America honors and she was one of seven Tar Heels overall who earned All-America accolades.

DeSelm was an assistant at Carolina from 1978 to 1993. In his 15 years of coaching at Carolina, the Tar Heels won 14 ACC championships, including nine by the women and five by the men. The women had seven Top 10 and 14 Top 20 NCAA finishes, while the men finished in the national Top 25 on 10 occasions.

While at Florida, DeSelm helped recruit and coach men's and women's teams that were consistently among the best in the country. Each year from 2001 through 2006, both the men's and women's swimming teams finished the season in the Top 10 nationally, posting seven top five finishes along the way. The Gators earned more

than 300 All-America honors in his six years in Gainesville, including a school-record 26 citations by Carlos Jayme, who DeSelm helped mentor from 2000-2004. Jayme was the 2001 Southeastern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year and the school record holder in the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard freestyle. DeSelm also assisted in the training of Brazilian Olympian Gabriel Mangabiera, who finished fifth in the 100-meter butterfly at the 2004 Olympic Games.

DeSelm led Davidson College to four women's and three men's titles at the Southern States Championships and he earned five coach-of-the-year awards. Mary Shell Brosche won three consecutive Southern States swimmer-of-the-year awards under his tutelage. The Wildcats placed in the Top 10 of the ECAC meet seven times in eight years.

He coached a pair of Tar Heels to berths in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics. Yann deFabrique, a first-team All-America at Carolina, was the 1993 French national champion in the 400-meter freestyle. David Monasterio, a first-team All-America at UNC in the 200-yard freestyle and 200-yard butterfly, swam on the 1992 Puerto Rican Olympic Team.

Other notable UNC swimmers coached by DeSelm as an assistant from 1979-93 included Sue Walsh, Barb Harris, Polly Winde, James Hamrick, Carrie Szulc, John Davis, Gary Gauch, Melissa Douse and Sarah Perroni. Walsh and Winde were members of the 1983 United States Team in the Pan American Games. While DeSelm was an assistant at Carolina, Walsh won 11 individual national titles and Harris also won an individual title and UNC's women's 200-yard medley relay team also won a national crown.

DeSelm was the assistant manager for the U.S. team at the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia, and the 2004 FINA Short Course World Championships. He was the head manager for U.S. teams at the 1997 and 1999 Pan Pacific Championships and the 1995 Pan American Games.

DeSelm and his wife, Tracy, a physician, have two children, Grant, 21 years old, was a football and lacrosse player at Chapel Hill High School, graduating in 2014. He is now a senior at the University of Georgia. Claire, 19 years old, graduated from Chapel Hill High School in 2016. She is a sophomore at the University of Notre Dame where she is a member of the women's swimming team. DeSelm is a native of Knoxville, Tenn., and attended high school there and in Jacksonville, Fla., where he graduated from The Bolles School in 1974.

Abel Sanchez, Diving Coach

Diving Coach Abel Sanchez



Abel Sánchez, a 2000 Summer Olympics participant and three-time All-America at the University of Michigan, enters his fifth year as the diving coach at the University of North Carolina. In the first four years of his tenure at Carolina, Sanchez has transformed Carolina's diving contingent into one of the best in the nation while achieving the highest honors in school history.

The divers Sánchez has recruited to Carolina continue to excel at an exceptional level. At the 2017 U.S. Diving Nationals in August, Greg Duncan reached the finals of one-meter and three-meter diving, taking second and first places, respectively. Sean Burston was also a finalist in three-meter diving and Bryan Allen was a finalist in 10-meter platform diving.

Sánchez led the largest ever diving contingent to the NCAA Championships in Carolina history in 2017 as Elissa Dawson, Maria Lohman, Jack Nyquist, Sean Burston and Bryan Allen all qualified. Dawson earned honorable mention All-America honors in three-meter diving. Dawson and Nyquist were both named All-ACC Divers in 2017 and Dawson was named by U.S. Diving to the Elite National Level Diving Unit. She was named ACC women's diver of the week six times in 2016-17.

Sánchez has done a brilliant job in recruiting new divers into the program and in making sure they improve after they arrive here. The numbers in the latter regard do not lie. He was rewarded for his efforts by being named the 2016 ACC Women's Diving Coach of the Year.

The 2015-16 school year was a fantastic one for Tar Heel diving. UNC qualified four divers for the NCAA Championships - Elissa Dawson, Maria Lohman, Jack Nyquist and Ozzie Moyer. Dawson placed ninth in three-meter and platform diving at the NCAA Championships and became only the second UNC women's diver in history to earn All-America honors in two different years. Nyquist placed sixth in three-meter diving at NAAs and in the process became the first Tar Heel men's diver in 59 years to be named a first-team All-America.

Dawson had three top four finishes in the ACC Championships, topped by a runnerup placing in three-meter diving. She went on to be named ACC Women's Diver of the Year for 2015-16. Nyquist was the runnerup in both the one-meter and three-meter ACC diving events. Carolina divers also did a tremendous job in the summer of 2016 led by Dawson's seventh place finish in three-meter diving at the U.S. Olympic Trials.

Those accomplishments came on the heels of a tremendous 2014-15 season for the diving group. For the third time in school history, UNC qualified two men for the NCAA national championships, the most recent time being Ryan Funderburk and Jon Fox in 2006. It was also the first time UNC had qualified two women for the NCAA nationals. Both Jack Nyquist and Ryan Fox went to the men's national meet while Elissa Dawson joined Michole Timm at the national meet for women.

Nyquist earned All-America honors in both one- and three-meter diving, the first Tar Heel diver to be an All-America in two different events since 1948. On the women's side, Dawson was an All-America in 10-meter platform diving and Timm on the three-meter board. No Tar Heel women's diver had been named an All-America in 23 years. In addition, all three Tar Heel women's diving records were shattered in 2014-15.

Nyquist was named to the U.S. team which competed at the World University Games in Russia in 2015. He was the first UNC diver in history to represent the U.S. in an international event.

In his first year as Carolina's diving coach Sanchez saw his competitors reached new heights. Freshman Jack Nyquist was a finalist in two events at the ACC Championships, making the awards podium in the one-meter event. Nyquist went on to earn honorable mention All-America honors in three-meter diving at the NCAA Championships. Nyquist also set the school record in one-meter diving as a freshman.

That was only the beginning for the Tar Heel diving program which excelled at an even higher level during the summer of 2014. At U.S. Diving Nationals in Knoxville, Tenn. in August 2014, the Tar Heel women finished third as a team and the Tar Heel men placed ninth. As a combined team, Carolina finished fifth. The Tar Heels accomplished all this with only four divers competing at U.S. Nationals - Ozzie Moyer, Michole Timm, Jack Nyquist and Elissa Dawson. Nyquist finalized in two events on the men's side while Dawson was a finalist in three events and Timm in one for the women. Nyquist took fourth place in men's three-meter synchronized diving and was fifth in the men's three-meter competition. Moyer also qualified for U.S. Nationals. Dawson also excelled for the Tar Heels at U.S. Diving Nationals. She placed third in three-meter diving and sixth in one-meter diving. Earlier in the summer, Dawson won the Junior National championship in three-meter synchronized diving and was a finalist in one-meter, three-meter and platform diving. Timm also competed at U.S.



Nationals, making the finals in the three-meter event.

Sánchez came to Chapel Hill from the University of New Mexico where he had served as the diving coach since October 2004.

At New Mexico, he was the 2011 and 2012 Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year. He coached six Mountain West Conference champions, two NCAA All-Americans, 37 MWC finalists and three performers who won MWC Diver of the Year accolades. He coached divers who were either finalists or medalists at the World University Games, the Commonwealth Games, the Canadian Nationals and the Russian Nationals.

In 2012-13, Sánchez coached a diving squad that included six All-Mountain West Conference performers on the one-meter, three-meter and platform events. All six divers qualified for the 2013 NCAA Zone "E" Diving Championships. His divers set the highest scores in the Mountain West Conference for the season. Michole Timm qualified for the NCAA National Championship.

A standout diver in Ann Arbor as a collegian at the University of Michigan, Sánchez was a four-time All-America (twice first team, twice honorable mention) and an Academic All-America. He placed in the Top 10 at the NCAA Championships twice, finishing as high as fourth. Sánchez was also a five-time All-Big Ten Conference honoree. He won two silver medals at the conference championships in his career and helped Michigan to four consecutive Big 10 titles and a national championship for the Maize and Blue in 1995.

He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in communications in 1995 from the U of M. He also holds a master's degree in architecture from New Mexico that was earned in 2011.

After his collegiate career ended, Sánchez continued to dive, training with Olympic coaches Kenny Armstrong and Jay Lerew and Olympian and world champion Janet Ely-Lagourgue.

Sánchez went on to represent Peru, his father's home country, on three-meter springboard and platform at the 2000 Olympic games in Sydney. Sánchez qualified for the Olympics after claiming silver medals on one-meter and three-meter springboards and the 10-meter platform at the South American Championships. He was an eight-time finalist at the U.S. Diving Nationals, and a five-time finalist in the FINA Grand Prix circuit.

Sánchez joined the Lobos after coaching the Mission Viejo (Calif.) Nadadores Diving Team. Previously he served as a member of coaching staffs at Team Orlando Diving (Fla.), L'Equipe Diving (Irvine, Calif.) and The Woodlands Diving Academy (Texas).

Sánchez, a Holland, Mich., native, is married to Leanne and the couple has two daughters, Bryze (12) and Maizie (10), and a son, Rio (7).

Christy Garth, Assistant Coach



Christy Garth is now in her 10th season as an assistant coach for the Carolina men's and women's swimming teams. Garth was added as the fifth full-time member of the Carolina swimming coaching staff in September 2008. She is a long-time Tar Heel, having captained Carolina teams that won ACC titles in the 1990s. In fact, she swam on four Carolina teams which won ACC crowns when she was an undergraduate.

As a Tar Heel alumna, she has been a key conduit with UNC's alumni base and much of the success of the lobby/entrance way area at Koury Natatorium, including the Blue Dolphin Hall of Honor is due to Garth's tireless efforts. She worked hand-in-hand with alumnus and donor Greg Sanchez and Sue Walsh of the Educational Foundation to make the project a reality.

Aided by the excellent efforts of Garth, the 2016-17 Tar Heel teams placed 41 swimmers and divers on the ACC Academic Honor Roll and five individuals on the All-ACC Academic Teams. The Tar Heel men set seven school records in short course events, the UNC women established 10 short course University records (including in four of five relays) and nine University long course records fell last summer. Both Tar Heel squads earned College Swimming Coaches Association of America Scholar All-America Team status in each semester of 2016-17 as well.

During the 2016-17 campaign, Garth helped lead the Tar Heels to a pair of 7-3 dual meet finishes while competing against the most difficult schedule in UNC history. Carolina finished third at both ACC meets and the women were 18th at the NCAA Championships. The Tar Heels set 12 school records in short course and long course events in 2015-16.

The previous year, Garth was a key coaching contributor as UNC placed 18th in the NCAA men's meet and 19th in the women's meet. Carolina also set 17 school short course records during the 2014-15 campaign.

Garth made key contributions to the stroke group as the Tar Heels placed in the top three of both ACC championships in 2013-14. Along the way, Carolina swimmers set 15 school short course records, including in six relay events.

Tar Heel teams have flourished under Garth's keen coaching skills. From 2008-10, she coached the distance group with head coach Rich DeSelm. During the 2009-10 season, she worked with a middle distance group that qualified Evan Reed and Hank Browning for the NCAA Championships.

During the very successful 2012-13 campaign, Garth coached the middle distance group. She directly coached three of the four members of the women's unit that broke the ACC record in the 400-yard freestyle relay - Ally Hardesty, Lauren Earp and Danielle Siverling. That relay earned an automatic NCAA qualification. Two individuals in Garth's group qualified for the NCAA meet - Earp and Siverling. That 2013 squad finished 12th at the NCAA Championships and broke multiple team records.

Garth, a 1996 alumnus of Carolina and a four-year letter winner on the Carolina women's swimming team, always brings excitement, experience and depth to the coaching staff. Garth worked in the past with then associate head coach Mike Litzinger leading the stroke group. She has served in that capacity since 2012 and worked with a slew of NCAA qualifiers and U.S. National Team members.



Garth has been a key part of Carolina's successful summer program that led to nearly 50 qualifiers for the 2012 U.S. Olympic Trials and another 30 for the 2016 Olympic Trials.

Garth was a decorated swimmer at Carolina during her four-year tenure. She was an All-ACC selection four successive years from 1993-96 and was part of four ACC championship teams while a collegian.

Garth was a two-year team captain in 1994-95 and 1995-96 and the winner of the program's Hill Carrow Spirit Award in both of those seasons. She qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials in 2000 and was an Olympic torchbearer in 2002 when the Winter Games were in Salt Lake City.

Her collegiate coaching experience includes two seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Maryland in the early 2000s. She also served as an interim assistant coach for women's swimming at the University of Michigan during the 2000-01 school year. While at Michigan, Garth also coached at prestigious Club Wolverine for two seasons.

Garth has worked in a variety of sports-related jobs. Directly out of college, she worked for the United States Golf Association as the U.S. Women's Open director's assistant. Following that, she worked on production crews for ABC Sports from 1996-98. Garth also worked for NBC during the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games as part of the production crew. From 2001-03, she worked for SpeedoUSA as an accounts manager before she began coaching at the University of Maryland. Prior to coming to UNC in 2008, Garth was the head swim coach at Duchesne Academy in Houston, Texas.

Garth studied political science and communication studies at North Carolina. Today, she continues to swim and was honored as a Top 10 Master's swimmer in 2009.

Garth is married to Trey Blazer, a physician at Duke Medical Center. The couple has two children. Callie Ann Blazer was born on December 29, 2011. Little brother, Colton James Blazer, joined the family on May 11, 2014.

Garth has served as the director of the Rich DeSelm Swim Camp since 2014.

Duncan Sherrard, Assistant Coach



One of the most enthusiastic and brilliant upcoming coaches in the collegiate ranks, Duncan Sherrard is now in his third year as an assistant coach at the University of North Carolina.

Sherrard, the former head swimming coach at Florida Southern College and a multiple-honored All-America swimmer at the University of Florida, joined head coach Rich DeSelm's staff as an assistant coach at the University of North Carolina on June 8, 2015. Sherrard had swum at

UF when DeSelm was a long-time assistant coach for the Gators.

In the summer of 2017, Sherrard served as an assistant coach for the U.S. women's swimming team which competed at the 2017 World University Games in Taoyuan City, Chinese Taipei. Two Tar Heel swimmers competed in the competition. Caroline Baldwin won the gold medal in the 50-meter freestyle and Hellen Moffitt earned gold in the 100-meter butterfly. Baldwin and Moffitt both swam on the 400-meter medley relay which won a silver medal and Baldwin was a member of the U.S. team which won the bronze medal in the 400-meter freestyle relay.

Aided by the excellent coaching efforts of Sherrard, the 2016-17 Tar Heel teams placed 41 swimmers and divers on the ACC Academic Honor Roll and five individuals on the All-ACC Academic Teams. The Tar Heel men set seven school records in short course events, the UNC women established 10 short course University records (including in four of five relays) and nine University long course records fell last summer. Both Tar Heel squads earned College Swimming Coaches Association of America Scholar All-America Team status in each semester of 2016-17 as well.

In his first season working with the Tar Heels, Sherrard helped lead UNC to 7-3 dual-meet records for both men and women as Carolina faced the most challenging dual-meet schedule in Tar Heel history, including non-conference opponents Georgia, Indiana, Tennessee and Texas. Both Carolina teams placed third in the ACC Championships. Twelve school records were broken during the course of the season and 30 UNC swimmers qualified for the 2016 Olympic Trials. He was also the primary coach for senior Sam Lewis who raced to the ACC title in the 100-yard butterfly.

Sherrard, who earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Florida in 2002 and a M.Ed. in educational leadership and higher education administration from Florida Atlantic in 2009, had been the head coach at



Florida Southern in Lakeland since 2009 before becoming a Tar Heel. Simultaneously, he had served as the owner and head swim coach at Lakeland Area Swimming. Prior to going to FSC, he was an assistant swimming coach at Indian River State College in Ft. Pierce, Fla., from 2006-09.

"Our team members and coaches are extremely excited to have Duncan on our staff at UNC. I have known Duncan and his wife, Diane, since they were swimmers at Florida when I joined the coaching staff there in 2000. Duncan was a hard worker and tough racer as a swimmer and he

has transferred those personal qualities into his coaching," says UNC head coach Rich DeSelm. "Duncan has proven that he can lead, motivate and coach swimmers to improvements, championships and great careers. His head coaching experience enhances our efforts in administration, recruiting, coaching and nurturing our team members here."

Sherrard came to Chapel Hill after a distinguished tenure at Florida Southern where he was named the Sunshine State Conference Men's Coach of the Year three times. He led the Moccasins to Sunshine State Conference titles each of his last three years there (2013-15). In both 2013 and 2014, Florida Southern finished as the NCAA Division II runner-up after grabbing third place in 2012. His women's team also excelled as it finished in the Top 10 of the NCAA Division II Championships four years in a row from 2011-14 while the men were in the Top 10 five successive seasons (2011-15).

Thirty-three different Moccasin swimmers accounted for 278 All-America honors during his tenure, including nine NCAA champions (eight individual swimmers and four national champion relay teams).

The team broke NCAA Division II records in two individual events and



Sean Quinn, Assistant Coach

Sean Quinn was promoted to the position of full-time assistant swimming coach at the University of North Carolina during the summer of 2016 by Tar Heel head coach Rich DeSelm.

Quinn has been a part of the UNC swimming program since 1999 as a student-athlete, volunteer coach, part-time assistant coach and the head coach of the North Carolina Aquatic Club, a U.S. Swimming club program based in Chapel Hill that trains at UNC's Koury Natatorium.

Quinn excelled as the NCAC head coach and was named in September 2015 as the North Carolina Swimming Coach of the Year, an award named in honor of Franke Belle.

In 2017, U.S. Swimming named Quinn to its National Team coaching staff for his work with 100-yard butterfly Hellen Moffitt. Aided by the excellent coaching efforts of Quinn, the 2016-17 Tar Heel teams placed 41 swimmers and divers on the ACC Academic Honor Roll and five individuals on the All-ACC Academic Teams. The Tar Heel men set seven school records in short course events, the UNC women established 10 short course University records (including in four of five relays) and nine University long course records fell last summer. Both Tar Heel squads earned College Swimming Coaches Association of America Scholar All-America Team status in each semester of 2016-17 as well.

A former Tar Heel school record holder in the 200-yard breaststroke, 100-meter breaststroke and 200-meter breaststroke, Quinn completed his seventh year as a part-time assistant coach for the Carolina swimming program in 2015-16 following six years in which he served as one of the program's volunteer coaches. He served as a staff coach for the NCAC from 2003 to 2010 when he was named the club's head coach.

"We are extremely excited to name Sean Quinn to our staff," DeSelm said at the time of his hiring in 2016. "As the head coach of our club team, North Carolina Aquatic Club, for the past six years, Sean has demonstrated outstanding leadership and coaching abilities. His transition should be an easy one because, for 13 years, Sean has also been coaching our college swimmers on a part-time basis.

"The team knows and respects him and will benefit from his impact, now on a full-time basis. Sean is an outstanding coach, knows and loves UNC, is a fantastic representative of our school and program and will bring a great deal of knowledge and passion to the team, in practice and recruiting. He is a seasoned administrator and will be a great asset in that aspect of the job. We look forward to Sean moving into this new role with us."

Over the years, Quinn worked to build NCAC into one of the top age

three relays. Sherrard also coached student-athletes to the 2012 Olympic Games and to the 2011 and 2013 FINA World Championships. FSC was also honored with a pair of Elite 89 winners at the 2012 women's and 2013 men's NCAA Division II Championships, given to the student-athletes competing at the meet with the highest grade point averages.

Sherrard's tutelage at Indian River State was also key to the teams' success there as they won the 2007 and 2008 women's and men's National Junior College Athletic Association crowns. Over two years, the school produced 76 national championship swimmers and established 29 national records.

Sherrard also served as head coach for Buchholz High School in Gainesville from 2004-06 and was an age group swim coach with Gator Swim Club from 2002-05.

He was a decorated collegiate swimmer at Florida where he swam from 1998-2002. He was a 14-time NCAA All-America his final three years and was named Southeastern Conference first-team selection each of those seasons. He captained the Gators as a senior in 2001-02.

Sherrard is married to Diane Tennison Sherrard, a six-time NCAA All-America swimmer at the University of Florida. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in sports management in 2003 and a Master of Science in sports management in 2004, both from UF. Diane is employed by the UNC Educational Foundation as development associate for scholarship and legacy gifts. The Sherrards have two children, Reagan Sherrard, 10, and Nathan Sherrard, eight. Sherrard is a life-long Chicago Cubs fan and an avid runner.



group programs in the country, boasting multiple Nationals, Junior Nationals and Olympic Trials qualifiers. In September 2014, he achieved one of the highest coaching honors when U.S. Swimming named him a National Team coach for the first time. He went on to earn similar honors in 2015, 2016 and 2017 from U.S. Swimming. Prior to becoming the overall head coach in 2010, Quinn was the head age group coach for the North Carolina Aquatic Club. He was selected as a North Carolina Zone Team coach in 2009. Quinn helped coach the North Carolina team to a third-place finish in that competition in Orlando, Fla.

A native of Lancaster, S.C., and 1999 alumnus of Lancaster High School, Quinn was a three-time All-America selection as a Tar Heel swimmer, earning those honors in 2000, 2002 and 2003. His best NCAA finish was an eighth place in the 200-yard breaststroke as a freshman in 2000. He also finished 10th in the 200 breaststroke at the NCAA Championships in 2002.

Quinn, a tri-captain of the 2002-03 Tar Heel team, won a silver medal in the 200-meter breaststroke at the 2003 Pan American Games in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. He finished fifth in the 200-meter breaststroke at the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trials. He was offered a slot on the United States Team at the 2002 Short Course World Championships in Moscow. During his freshman year at UNC, he competed in the Short Course World Championships in Athens, Greece. Before enrolling at Carolina,

he swam in the 1999 U.S. Junior World Championships in Barcelona on a U.S. team coached by former Tar Heel head mentor Frank Comfort.

Quinn won ACC individual championships in the 200-yard breaststroke in 2000 and 2003. Until 2014, he held the Tar Heel school record in the 200-yard breaststroke at 1:56.39. He held the Tar Heel record in the 200-meter breaststroke at 2:14.92 set at the 2002 U.S. National Championships until it was broken last summer by current Tar Heel captain Michael McBryan. A four-time All-ACC selection, Quinn swam for the Mecklenburg Aquatic Club while in high school and was coached there by

Pat Hogan. Quinn was named Carolina's most outstanding swimmer in 2000 and 2002 and the team's most valuable swimmer in 2003. His sister Kathleen swam for four years at UNC and was a tri-captain of the 2004-05 women's team.

Quinn graduated from Carolina with a Bachelor of Arts degree in communication studies.

Born May 20, 1981, Quinn is married to Beth Colacurcio Quinn, herself a former UNC swimmer. They have a daughter, Alice, 5 years old. Son Henry will celebrate his second birthday on December 8, 2017.

Michael Baric, Assistant Coach

Michael Baric, a North Carolina native and graduate of the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, was named a full-time assistant swimming coach at the University of North Carolina. Tar Heel head coach Rich DeSelm announced the hire, effectively immediately, on Friday, October 13, 2017.

Baric, who also earned a graduate degree from the University of Florida, became the sixth full-time member of Coach DeSelm's staff, join-

ing diving coach Abel Sanchez as well as assistant swimming coaches Duncan Sherrard, Christy Garth and Sean Quinn. Baric's hire marked the first time in UNC swimming and diving history that Carolina has been fully staffed on a full-time basis.

Baric has served Tar Heel swimming and diving as an administrative assistant and operations assistant since 2016. Prior to that he was a manager for the swimming and diving programs at the University of Florida while pursuing a master of science degree in sport management.

He earned his Bachelor of Arts & Sciences degree in May 2014 from the University of North Carolina at Wilmington which he attended from 2010-14. Baric majored in history and minored in psychology.

He was a member of the Seahawks' swimming and diving team from 2010-14. He was the captain of the Seahawks' men's swimming team from 2012-14 and also served as an intern in the athletic department there in his senior year.

Baric, a native of Raleigh, was a much-decorated swimmer at UNCW. After earning an athletic scholarship to swim in Wilmington, he was named the team's rookie of the year in 2010-11, awarded to the squad's top performing freshman. During his time at UNCW, he set school records in the 100-yard backstroke, 200-yard breaststroke and 200-yard individual medley. He won All-Colonial Athletic Association honors on 11 occasions and was a CAA scholar-athlete award recipient four straight years from 2011-14.

In 2013-14, he won the Seahawk Award for character, leadership and commitment to the swimming team at the University.

From 2011-16, Baric earned valuable experience coaching with club teams in both North Carolina and Florida, working with the Marlins of Raleigh and the Gator Swim Club in Gainesville, Fla.

Baric continued to train after graduating from UNCW. In the process, he earned an invitation to swim in the 2016 U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials after training with Wolfpack Elite Swim Club as a post-graduate in Raleigh, N.C. After attending UF, he moved back to the Triangle in 2016 and began his work with the Tar Heel program as an administrative assistant in the fall of 2016.

The University of North Carolina's proud swimming and diving heritage predates America's entry into World War II. On January 23, 1939, Tar Heel swimmers and divers participated in the school's first varsity intercollegiate swimming and diving meet against the University of Virginia at historic Bowman Gray Pool on the UNC campus, an edifice which served as UNC's home from 1939-86 and still is in use on the Tar Heels' iconic campus in Chapel Hill.

Since 1939, Carolina's men's teams have posted a cumulative dual-meet record of 587-204-1, a winning percentage of .742. Carolina teams have captured 14 Southern Conference team championships and 17 Atlantic Coast Conference team titles, while posting a 60-3 (.952) Southern Conference dual-meet mark and a 279-74-1 (.790) record in ACC dual meets. On 44 occasions, UNC men's teams have finished amongst the Top 30 teams at the NCAA Championships. Carolina swimmers have also won four individual NCAA championships in the history of the program.

Carolina had women's swimming teams in the early 1970s competing in Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) competitions as part of the UNC physical education department with multiple individuals earning All-America honors. The women's swimming and diving program was fully elevated to varsity status and taken under the aegis of the intercollegiate athletic program in the 1974-75 school year, awarding athletic grants-in-aid that same year. In 43 years, Carolina teams have compiled a 343-81-1 dual-meet record, a winning percentage of .808. Carolina has won 16 ACC championships and never finished lower than fourth place in the league championships, taking the top spot on 16 occasions, second

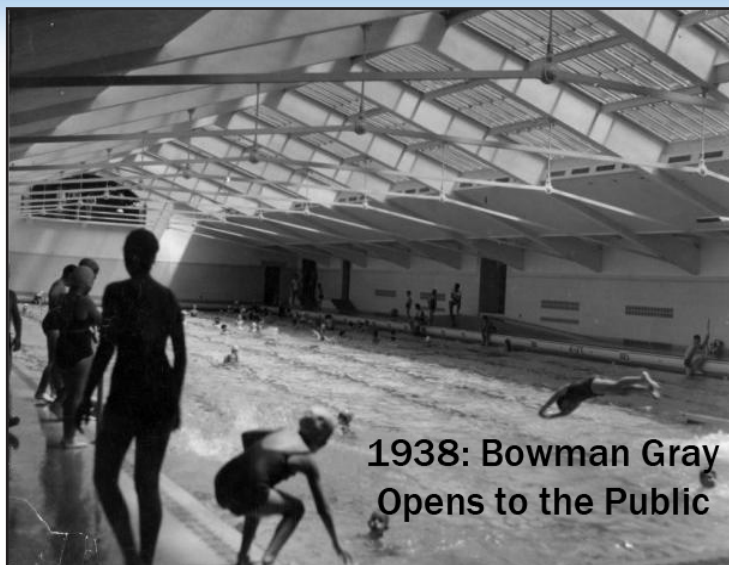
place on 18 occasions, third place on four occasions and in fourth place one time.

UNC's record in ACC dual meets is a gaudy 167-32, a winning percentage of .839. Thirty-eight of UNC's 43 women's teams have finished the season ranked in the national Top 30, including 13 straight years from 1976-88 and 10 straight years from 1995 through 2004. The only times Carolina has missed finishing in the Top 30 were in 1975, 1989, 2005, 2006 and 2008. UNC women's swimmers have also won 16 individual national collegiate championships and produced one national championship relay team. Carolina's most recent national championship came in 2012 when Stephanie Peacock won the 1650-yard freestyle and broke Janet Evans' 22-year-old NCAA record in the event.

Roots of the Program Under Dr. Richard Jamerson

While these records demonstrate decades of excellence, one of the program's most important years was 1938. That year marked the completion of historic Bowman Gray Pool and the arrival of Carolina's first varsity coach on campus. Without those events the Tar Heel swimming program would not exist as we know it today. UNC commemorated the 75th anniversary year of UNC men's swimming and diving in a gala ceremony on October 25, 2013. Carolina began its swimming program with a meet against Virginia on January 23, 1939 at Bowman Gray Pool and 75 years and two days later the Tar Heels and Cavaliers met again in the three-quarters of a century anniversary year at Koury Natatorium with a Tar Heel victory.

Bowman Gray Pool was completed on March 25, 1938, but the first meet was not held until almost a full year later after schedules were arranged to bring out-

side teams from other universities to compete in Chapel Hill. The pool was a gift to the University from Mrs. Bowman Gray, Sr., in the memory of her two sons, Bowman Gray, Jr., and Gordon Gray.

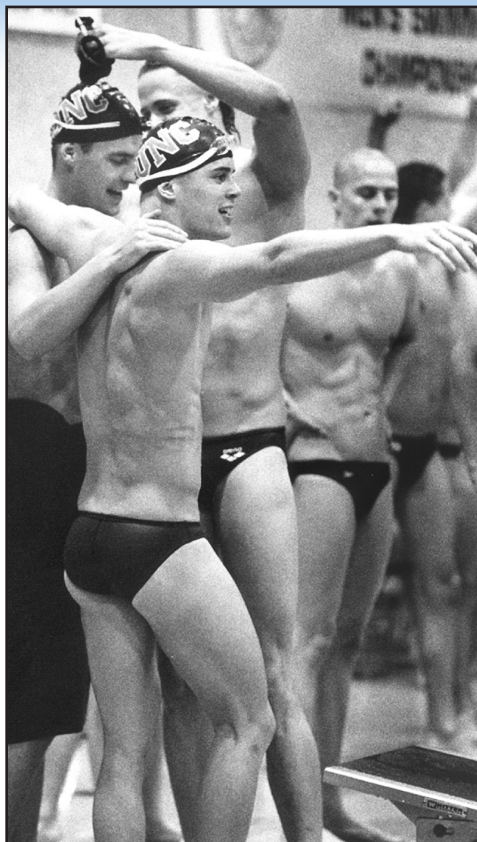
Bowman Gray Pool served as home to the Carolina swimming and diving program from 1938 until the fall of 1986 when the Tar Heels moved into their current home, the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium, which is part of the Dean E. Smith Center complex on the UNC campus. Bowman Gray Pool

and Koury Natatorium are the only homes the Tar Heel swimming and diving program have ever known in what is now approaching 80 years of collegiate competition. Koury Natatorium was named for long-time UNC donor and Burlington, N.C. businessman, Maurice J. Koury.

Dr. Richard E. Jamerson came to UNC in 1938 from Oberlin College in Ohio to take the helm as head coach of the fledgling Tar Heel team. Dr. Jamerson, one of the top coaches in collegiate swimming at the time, served as head coach of the Tar Heel program for 11 years. Five of his squads went undefeated and 10 of his teams won Southern Conference championships.

The annual awards given to Carolina's most valuable, most outstanding and most improved swimmers bear Jamerson's name, as does the timing system at the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium.

Ralph Casey Continues the Tradition

Jamerson turned over the coaching reins to his long-time assistant coach, Ralph Casey, on a full-time basis in 1952. Casey had served as interim head coach in 1949 and as co-head coach with his brother, Willis Casey, in 1946. Willis Casey also coached the 1945 Tar Heel team on his own when Jamerson was on sabbatical from the University.

Ralph Casey guided the Tar Heels to

additional championship glory during his tenure from 1949 to 1957. Two of Casey's teams won Southern Conference titles and another two teams won ACC crowns after UNC became a charter member of the new league in 1953 after its departure from the Southern Conference. Under his direction, the 1955 squad finished fifth in the nation, the 1953 team tied for fifth nationally, the 1957 squad was sixth at the NCAA Championships and the 1949 team took ninth place, giving Casey a quartet of Top 10 teams in his nine seasons as head coach.

In both 1949 and 1957, the bookends of Casey's successful tenure as head coach of the Carolina program, UNC hosted the NCAA Division I Men's Swimming and Diving Championships at Bowman Gray Pool. The 1949 championships marked the first time any NCAA championship event in any sport on the collegiate level had been held in the southern part of the United States. However, a visit to Bowman Gray Pool today would lead one to believe that it would have been difficult to host an NCAA Championship in the tiny facility. Somehow UNC pulled it off, not once, but twice, and both times with aplomb.

Pat Earey took over as UNC's head coach in 1958 and continued the remarkable swimming success experienced by the UNC squad in Chapel Hill. His teams won a sterling .711 percentage of their dual meets, and they captured five ACC championships before he retired from coaching in 1974.

Women's Swimming & Diving Added to Program

With the addition of women's swimming and diving as a full-level varsity and scholarship granting sport in 1974-75 by the athletic department, the program had split head coaches for the only time in its history as Paul Doty, who was then Carolina's head men's lacrosse coach, coached the men for one season and Maxine Forrest coached the women the same season.

Jim Wood was then brought in to coach both teams and, after an outstanding two-year coaching run, he returned to a successful club coaching career in New Jersey where he now coaches the Berkeley Aquatic Club. Wood was responsible for recruiting some of the most amazing swimmers in UNC history, a group which fueled the early success Carolina had at the national

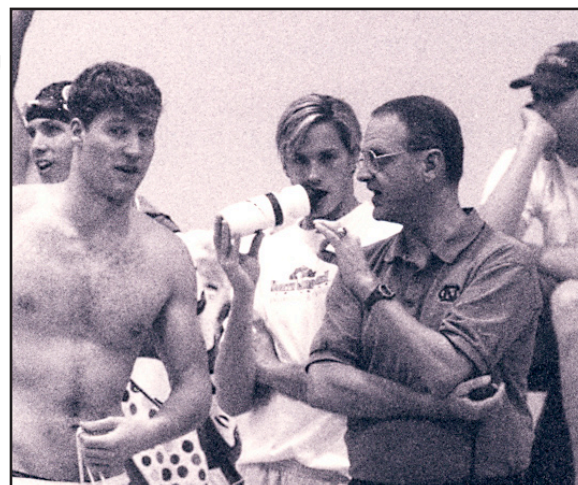

AIAW level in the late 1970s.

The program's next head coach, Frank Comfort, was hired away from NCAA Division III power Johns Hopkins to take command of both the men's and women's teams in Chapel Hill in 1977. Comfort arrived in Chapel Hill after having just led the Blue Jays' men's squad to an NCAA Division III national championship in 1977 after attaining runner-up finishes in both 1975 and 1976.

Comfort continued Carolina's swimming success over his 30-year tenure in Chapel Hill. His men's teams won over 71 percent of their dual meets and the women's teams captured over 83 percent of their dual meets under his tutelage. His 1983 men's squad captured the school's first ACC title in the sport in 19 years and the 1988 and 1989 teams won back-to-back

league crowns for the first time since 1963 and 1964.

With six titles in a row, the 1993 through 1998 men's teams became the first UNC teams since 1956-59 to capture as many as four ACC crowns in a row. The men also made decided progress on the national level. The 1993 team finished 14th, the best Tar Heel national finish since 1967, and the 1996 team had an outstanding 15th-place standing.

The women finished in the Top 25 in the nation in 25 of the 30 seasons during Comfort's tenure and Carolina won 16 of the 29 ACC championships contested during Comfort's tutelage of the program. His women's team's won 55.2 percent of the ACC championships decided during his coaching tenure while the rest of the league split up the other 44.8 percent during that time span. On 11 of the other 13 occasions when UNC did not claim the title, the Tar Heels were conference runners-up, an amazing string of consistency.

Comfort's swimmers also did extremely well in the classroom. His final year was the 20th school year in a row that Carolina's swimming and diving contingent placed at least 21 members on the ACC Academic Honor Roll as 41 were named to the academic list in 2006-07. Beginning with the 1987-88 school year and continuing through the end of Comfort's tenure, UNC swimming and diving placed 21, 21, 22, 23, 24, 23, 24, 25, 25, 27, 33, 30, 38, 43, 37, 35, 23, 34, 33 and 41 individuals on the ACC Academic Honor Roll.

The Tar Heels have continued their academic prowess in Coach Rich DeSelm's 10 years as head coach as 34 individuals were tapped for the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2007-08, 38 more made the list in 2008-09, another 38 earned such honors in 2009-10, 32 made the list in 2010-11, another 40 were selected in 2011-12 and

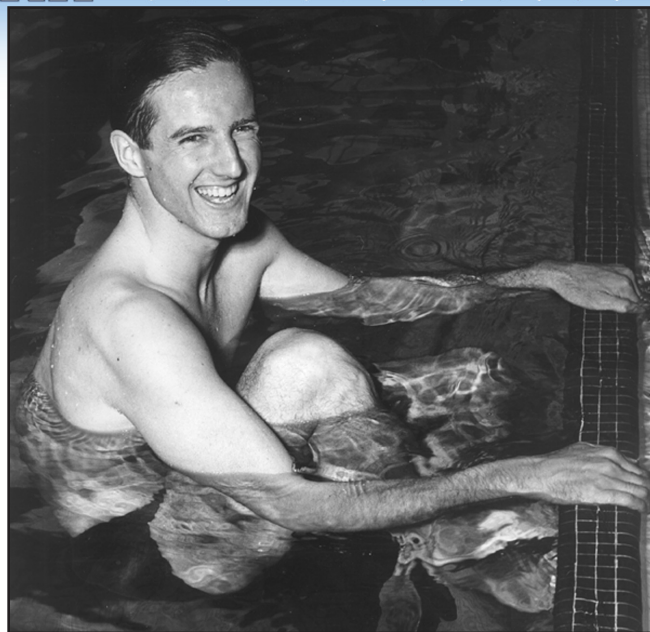
36 Tar Heels were on the Honor Roll in 2012-13. In 2013-14, a program record 45 individuals made the ACC Academic Honor Roll and another 38 selections made the list in 2014-15. UNC matched its program record of 45 ACC Academic Honor Roll selections in 2015-16. Forty-one Tar Heel swimmers and divers made the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2016-17.

At the end of the 2006-07 school year Comfort retired from coaching after 30 years at Carolina and nine years previous to that at Johns Hopkins University. At the time of his retirement, no coach in collegiate history had won more dual meets in their career than Comfort did as he finished with 578 victories. While setting the record, Comfort broke the previous mark held by legendary Yale coach, Robert J. H. Kiphuth, the head mentor of the Bulldog program for 42 years. Carolina's swimming success since the program's inception cannot be credited only to the outstanding coaches who have directed Carolina's swimming fortunes. The program has also been distinguished by a long string of outstanding swimmers and divers.

A Who's Who of Great Talent

Eight Tar Heel swimmers have been honored as recipients of the Patterson Medal as the school's outstanding senior student-athlete, an amazing number for the sport given Carolina's rich athletic heritage in so many other sports, particularly men's basketball and women's soccer, which have both produced multiple Patterson Medal winners. Among those eight recipients are three outstanding women who have won the school's highest athletic award, including the first woman to ever win the award when there was a single combined award for men and women.

Jamerson's early teams were full of stars. They included Denny Hammond of Atlanta, Ga., who in 1942 established a national intercollegiate backstroke record; George Whitner of Jacksonville, Fla., who established a national freshman breaststroke mark in 1942; and Buddy Crone of

Goldsboro, N.C., who was the head varsity cheerleader at Carolina and the winner of a national junior Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) diving title. The AAU oversaw the organization for Olympic sports in the U.S. prior to the reorganization by specific sports in the 1970s.

Several Tar Heels in the early era of the North Carolina swimming program won the Southern Conference's Most Valuable Swimmer recognition, including Fleming Stone in 1940, Denny Hammond in 1943,

Dick Twining in 1948, Jimmy Thomas in 1949, 1950 and 1951 and Donnie Evans, who was the co-winner with Jimmy Thomas in 1951.

Another one of the outstanding student-athletes in early Carolina swimming and diving history was the remarkable Norm Sper (1947-50). Sper both swam on the team and was an outstanding diver for Carolina. He accomplished all this while also serving as Carolina's head cheerleader during the Charlie Justice football era on campus (1946-49). He paired with the

head cheerleader at Duke University to begin the Victory Bell tradition in football between the two schools which continues to this day.

Sper is one of only three men in the program's illustrious history to be named a first-team All-America during each of his four years in school, the others being Eric Ericson from 1981-84 and Joe Kinderwater from 2008-11. In 1949, Sper won the National Amateur Athletic Union men's platform diving championship in Los Angeles, Calif.

Sper's tremendous diving feat was equaled in 1950 by one of the greatest of all Carolina athletes, Sara Wakefield. Born in Charlotte, N.C., Wakefield grew up in Palm Beach, Fla., At age 22, Wakefield won the 1950 women's one-meter AAU national diving championship in her hometown of Palm Beach with a score of 133.90 points. The win came during Wakefield's senior year at Carolina. Don Draper served as Wakefield's diving coach at UNC. Wakefield, while at Carolina, also won the Southeastern AAU championship in 1950 in Atlanta, and the Florida state title and national junior championship in 1949.

The Greatest Swimmer In Southern History

Jimmy Thomas, the Patterson Medal recipient in 1951, was a versatile swimmer who won two AAU national individual medley championships and one AAU national backstroke crown during his career. He established 10 American records, four NCAA standards and seven Southern Conference marks while a swimmer at UNC from 1947-51.

In 1950, Thomas, considered by many to be the top swimmer in Southern history, became the first swimmer in NCAA annals

to be named an All-America in four different individual events in the same year. He completed his career having never lost a race in conference competition in the 220- and 440-yard freestyle events. At the 1949 NCAA Championships in Bowman Gray Pool, Thomas was the meet's top individual point scorer, with his best finish being a second place in the 150-yard backstroke.

Buddy Baarcke, who passed away in 2016, who was a contemporary of Thomas while at Carolina, set a world record in the 100-yard butterfly in 1954. He was the first swimmer in history to go under one minute in the 100-yard distance of three different strokes — butterfly, backstroke and freestyle — and he won gold and bronze medals at the 1955 Pan American Games in Mexico City, Mexico. Other top men's swimmers of the first two decades of Carolina swimming included 1955 NCAA 200-yard butterfly champion Phil Drake; Charlie Krepp, who won NCAA titles in the 100- and 200-yard backstrokes while swimming in the 1957 NCAA Championships at Carolina's Bowman Gray Pool; Harrison Merrill, the 1965 Patterson Medal recipient who was a three-time All-America and the winner of seven individual ACC titles; and

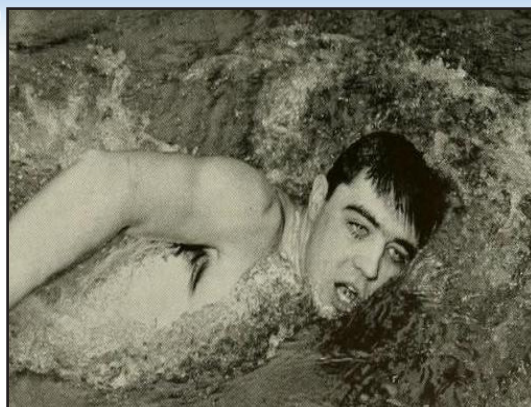

History of UNC Swimming & Diving



Harrison Merrill was a phenomenal swimmer at Carolina in the mid-1960s, a three-time All-America and winner of the 1965 Patterson Medal.

1966 NCAA 100-yard butterfly titlist Phil Riker, who was also a member of the 1964 U.S. Olympic Team in Tokyo where he placed fourth in the 200-meter butterfly.

Olympic Gold Medalist Thompson Mann

Arguably the finest men's swimmer in Carolina history was Thompson Mann. A three-year All-America selection, Mann was a 1964 Olympic gold medalist as the leadoff swimmer on the United States' victorious 4x100-meter medley relay squad. He set a world record at the Tokyo Olympic Games in the 100-meter backstroke during that race and was the first person to ever smash the one-minute standard at that distance, clocking a time of 59.8 seconds.

Other outstanding men's swimmers at Carolina have included Ken Ireland, a

backstroke who was the Most Valuable Swimmer at the 1979 ACC Championships and a first-team All-America in both 1979 and 1980; Eric Ericson who, like Norm Sper, was a four-year first-team All-America, as well as the 1984 ACC Championships Most Outstanding Swimmer and winner of seven ACC individual titles during his career; and Chris Stevenson, a multi-faceted swimmer who competed in the 1984 Olympic Games as a dual citizen of Greece and the U.S. and was the Most Outstanding Swimmer at the 1986 ACC Championships.

The list continues with the incredibly gifted John Davis, who twice was the ACC Championships most valuable performer, was the 1990 post-season ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year, and who also set the ACC record for career individual men's championships with 11 out of a possible 12; David Monasterio, who was the ACC post-season Swimmer-of-the-Year in 1991, a two-year first-team All-America, a three-time medalist swimming for Puerto Rico in the 1991 Pan American Games in Havana, Cuba and a member of the 1992 Puerto Rican Olympic Team.

Swimming alongside Monasterio were the likes of James Hamrick, who was a first-team All-America both his junior and senior years, a Chapel Hill native and the son of a former Carolina swimming team captain and ACC champion, Harvey Hamrick; and Yann deFabrique, who swam for France in the 1992 and 1996 Olympics, placing as high as 14th in the 400-meter freestyle in 1992 in Barcelona. deFabrique went on to win three medals for the French squad in the 1993 World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y., and two medals for France at the 1995 World University Games in Fukuoka, Japan.

Two 1997 alumni, Steve Bonack and Jeff Weiss, also added their names to the list of great swimmers at Carolina. Both were All-America breaststrokers at UNC. Trevor Runberg, '98, was a gifted UNC swimmer for four years, being named ACC post-season Co-Swimmer of the Year in 1996

and earning a spot on the U.S. team that competed at the World Championships in 1998 in Perth, Australia.

In 1999, the top senior swimmers included Tucker Shade, a three-time ACC champion in the 100-yard butterfly and a four-time All-America selection, and Ted Brisson, the former ACC record holder in the 100-yard backstroke and a two-time College Sports Information Directors of America/Verizon Academic All-America selection. Shade held the ACC record in the 100-yard butterfly for 11 years before it broken by UNC's Tommy Wyher in 2009.

In the past two decades, Carolina has produced the likes of Sean Quinn, two-time ACC champion and three-time All-America in the 200-yard breaststroke and current assistant coach at UNC, as well as Yuri Suguiyama, a 2004 first-team All-America and a back-to-back ACC champion in the 200-yard freestyle in 2003 and 2004. Both swimmers went into the coaching profession – Quinn at UNC and as head coach of the North Carolina Aquatic Club and Suguiyama at the Nation's Capital Swim Club in Maryland, where he coached Olympic champion Katie Ledecky, and now at the University of California. A contemporary of Quinn and Suguiyama was Canada native Eric Poitras, who won the ACC championship in three-meter diving in 2004 and was named

the ACC Championships diving MVP the same year. Poitras accomplished his MVP feat exactly one decade after Joe Craft had done so in 1994. When he had won the award, Craft became UNC's first diving MVP in the conference since 1958.

More recent Tar Heel standouts include Hank Browning, who won back-to-back ACC championships in the 200-yard freestyle in 2006 and 2007, as well as Chip

Peterson, a multiple world champion in open water swimming, a member of the U.S. Swimming Open Water National Team for most of the past decade and a first-team All-America in 2007. Peterson won the ACC title in the 1650-yard freestyle as a senior and captured the Patterson Medal as the University's outstanding senior men's athlete in 2009-10. He has continued his open water career following

graduation and was most recently named a member of the U.S. National Teams in the sport four straight years from 2014-17. He had one of the best summers of his career in open water swimming in 2015, winning the gold medal at 10 kilometers in the Pan American Games in Toronto. In 2017, he represented the U.S. Team in the World Aquatics Championships in Budapest where he was coached by Tar Heel mentor Rich DeSelm.

The 2011 crop of Tar Heel seniors included incomparable talents like Tyler Harris, Joe Kinderwater and Tommy Wyher. Harris, a Richmond, Va., native finished third in the 400-yard individual medley at the 2011 NCAA Championships, UNC's best individual NCAA finish since Phil Riker won an NCAA title in 1966 in the 200-yard butterfly. Harris won two ACC titles as a senior and rewrote the Tar Heel record book in the 200 and 400 IMs, both long course and short course. In the summer of 2011, he finished second in the 200-meter IM at the U.S. Swimming Nationals, took the bronze medal in the 400-meter IM at the World University Games and was named to the U.S. Team for the 2011 Pan American Games in Mexico. Harris was named to the 2011 U.S. Swimming National Team along with Tar Heel teammate Tom Luchsinger, a 2013 alumnus. Harris was also a U.S. Olympic Trials finalist in 2012.

Kinderwater's fifth-place finish in the 1650-yard freestyle at the 2008 NCAA Championships began a streak of four successive Top 8 NCAA finishes in the event for the Lancaster, Pa., native. His freshman year finish was the best individual placing by a Tar Heel men's swimmer in 15 years. The following summer, he went on to be a finalist in the 1500-meter freestyle at the 2008 Olympic Trials. Kinderwater was named in 2009 as a member of both the U.S. National Team and the U.S. Open Water National Team. Kinderwater joined Norm Sper (1947-50) and Eric Ericson (1981-84) as the only three four-time first-team All-Americans in UNC history. He owns Carolina records in the 1000 and 1650 freestyles.

In both 2009 and 2010, Tommy Wyher captured attention by winning ACC championships in the 100-yard butterfly and

Carolina's ACC Top 50 Honorees

Eleven University of North Carolina men's swimmers and 22 Tar Heel women's swimmers headlined the list of the 50 greatest Atlantic Coast Conference men's and women's swimmers and divers of all time, announced in September 2002 by the ACC. The team encompassed the first 50 years of conference action from 1953-2002.

As part of its 50th anniversary celebration, the ACC recognized the all-time greatest athletes in conference history in each sport. With 33 of the top 100 swimmers in conference history, UNC's total stood at the top of the list among ACC schools.

UNC's total number of 279 ACC Top 50 selections in all sports led all league schools. North Carolina swimmer Sue Walsh was recognized as one of the 50 greatest women's athletes in ACC history.

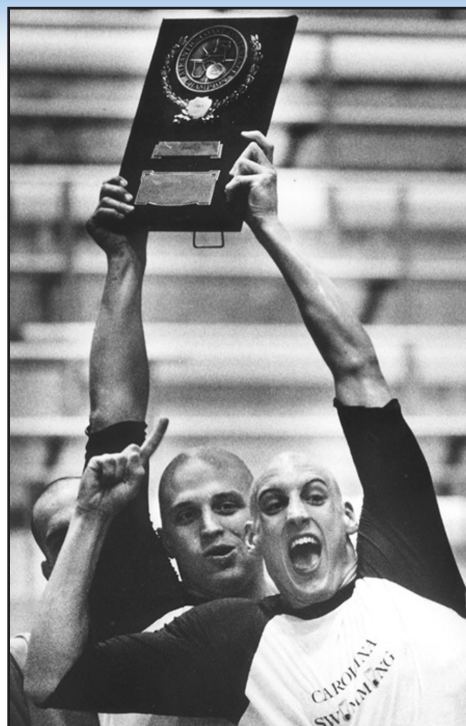

Co-captains Mark Welker and Tim Sutton lift the ACC championship trophy in 1983, UNC's first league title in 19 years.

100-yard backstroke on the same day, setting ACC records in both events in the process. He ended up sweeping four ACC titles in the 100 back, becoming only the 20th swimmer in ACC history to win the same event all four years. In 2010, he made first-team All-America when he finished fifth at the NCAA meet in the 100-yard butterfly. Wyher closed his career with two ACC records and the school mark in the 200 back.

Carolina's 2012 Senior Class was another accomplished one. The class helped lead UNC to NCAA finishes of 15th in 2010, 14th in 2011 and 14th in 2012 under UNC head coach Rich DeSelm. That marked the first time since 1956-58 that Carolina had posted three straight national Top 15 finishes. As a senior in 2012, Milwaukee native Steve Cebertowicz posted Top 6 NCAA finishes in both the 50- and 100-yard freestyles. No Tar Heel had pulled off the double of first-team All-America accolades in those two events since Pete Worthen in 1965. Worthen was Carolina's premier sprint freestyler on Top 10 teams in the 1960s. He unfortunately passed away in 2016.

The most recent accomplished men's standout was Tom Luchsinger, the 2013 post-season ACC Swimmer of the Year. He was the first Tar Heel to win the award since 1996. In 2013, Luchsinger won the U.S. Swimming national championship in the 200-meter butterfly, Carolina's first U.S. national champion since 1996 and only the fifth time a Tar Heel had won an event at

U.S.S. nationals. He swam for the U.S. in the 2013 World Aquatics Championships, the first Tar Heel to do so since 1998 when Trevor Runberg did so.

The 2016 men's senior class was again an impressive one as it rewrote the Tar Heel record book in every single relay. It was led by first-team All-America Sam Lewis butterfly and backstroke, the 2016 ACC champion in the 100-yard butterfly.

Talented Women Since the Inception of the Program

In 1976, Ann Marshall, the first female swimmer to receive an athletic scholarship at UNC, captured Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) national championships in the 200-yard backstroke and 200-yard freestyle. Marshall, a 1972 Olympian in the Munich games at only age 14, was followed to campus a year later by Bonny Brown, who in 1980 became the first female recipient of the Patterson Medal as UNC's outstanding senior student-athlete. Brown was a gold medalist at the 1975 Pan American Games in Mexico City and, a year later, she established the American record in the 100-meter freestyle. In 1977, she won the AIAW national championship in the 100-yard individual medley and later that summer she was a gold medalist for the U.S. Team at the World University Games.

Hot on the heels of Brown came the incomparable Sue Walsh. The greatest swimmer ever to spend most of his or her competitive career swimming in the state of North Carolina, Walsh won 10 national collegiate individual championships and was on one national championship relay

squad as a collegian. She was named the Most Outstanding Swimmer at the ACC Championships three times and was an American record holder in the 50- and 100-yard backstrokes and the 100-meter backstroke. Walsh won the Patterson Medal as UNC's outstanding senior student-athlete in 1984, edging out basketball great Sam Perkins in the process. In 1983, she was named the North Carolina Athlete-of-the-Year for all professional and amateur sports by the Greensboro News & Record.

Walsh was joined on the U.S.'s 1982 World Championships and 1983 Pan American Games teams by Tar Heel teammate Polly Winde, an individual medleyist and breaststroker extraordinaire, who also had a standout Carolina career. Winde finished second in the 400-yard individual medley at the 1984 NCAA meet and is married to former Tar Heel baseball star B.J. Surhoff, an MLB standout for two decades, primarily with the Baltimore Orioles and Atlanta Braves. Winde was inducted into the Maryland Swimming Hall of Fame, which also includes UNC swimmer and U.S. Olympian Wendy Weinberg, Class of 1980, and former Tar Heel head coach Frank Comfort. In the fall of 2017, Winde was inducted into the prestigious Maryland Sports Hall of Fame.

Other outstanding swimmers of the early 1980s included Barb Harris, the 1982 NCAA champion in the 50-yard butterfly, and Amy Pless and Cami Berizzi, who combined with Walsh and Harris to win the

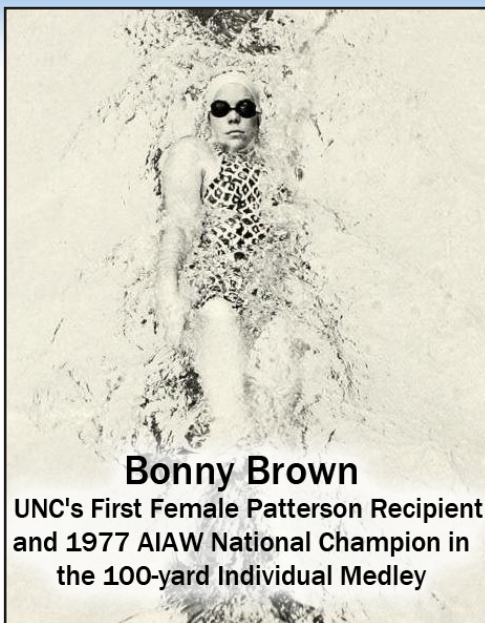

Bonny Brown was a national champion in 1977 and the first female Patterson Medal recipient in 1980.

AIAW national championship in the 200-yard medley relay in 1981. From 1981-84, UNC finished third twice, fifth once and sixth once in the national meet.

The ACC Most Outstanding Swimmers

Several Tar Heel women have been named the Most Outstanding Swimmer at the ACC Championships, including Cindy Shirey in 1979, Gayle Hegel in 1980, Sue Walsh in 1981, 1983 and 1984, Susan O'Brien in 1985 and 1988, Melissa Douse in 1992, Kari Haag in 1995, Chrissy Miller in 1996 and 1998, Richelle Fox in 1997 and Stephanie Peacock in 2012.

Another top swimmer for Carolina was Melanie Buddemeyer, a two-time first-team All-America. Buddemeyer is one of just 13 women's swimmers in ACC history to sweep an individual event all four years of her eligibility. Buddemeyer accomplished the feat in two events, winning titles in both the 100- and 200-yard butterfly events in 1985, 1986, 1987 and 1989. Also duplicated that feat were Walsh in the 100- and

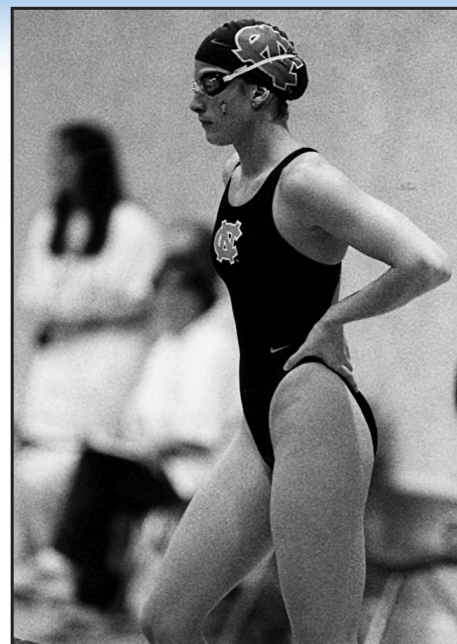
200-yard backstrokes (1981-84), Polly Winde in the 400-yard individual medley (1983-86) and Christy Watkins in the 50-yard freestyle from 2000-03.

A complete list of the great Carolina swimmers must include Sarah Perroni, Class of '93. A three-year first-team All-America, Perroni finished fourth in the 50-yard freestyle at the 1993 NCAA Championships, won a pair of medals at the 1993 World University Games and participated on the American Team at the 1993 Pan Pacific Championships in Kobe, Japan. She also swam in the Short Course World Championships in December 1993 in Mallorca, Spain and was a member of the U.S. Swimming Resident National Team training in Colorado Springs, Colo., for two years.

Another great Tar Heel sprinter was Jessi Perquet who swam at Carolina from 2001-04. Perquet was the winner of multiple individual and relay ACC championships and she was the 2003 NCAA co-champion in the 200-yard freestyle. Perquet was the ACC post-season Swimmer-of-the-Year in 2003 and was named to the Top 50 ACC women's swimmers of all-time.

Another tremendous freestyler was Kari Haag, who graduated from Carolina in 1996. Haag was the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year in both 1995 and 1996 and she came close to winning UNC's first national title in 11 years in 1995 when she finished second at the NAAs in the 200-yard freestyle. Haag is married to Brad Woodall, a former star pitcher for the Tar Heel baseball team who spent several years in the major leagues with the Atlanta Braves, Chicago Cubs and Milwaukee Brewers. Richelle Depold Fox, a transfer from UCLA who was married to U.S. Olympic gold medalist David Fox while she was in college and he was serving as an assistant coach to Frank Comfort, was the 1997 and 1998 ACC post-season Women's Swimmer-of-the-Year. She had six top eight finishes in championship finals at the 1997 and 1998 NCAA meets, including a

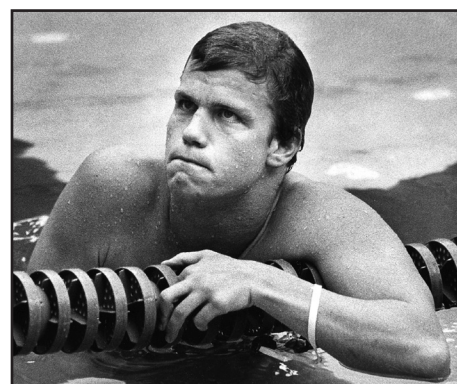
pair of second-place finishes in the 100-yard butterfly. She reached the championship final of every event she swam at the NCAA meet in both seasons. Fox was named to the U.S. squad for the 1999 Pan Pacific Championships. She was joined on that team which competed in Sydney, Australia by Kari Haag and by Molly Freedman,

later a standout butterfly at UNC.

Besides Perquet, the most recent two decades has featured the likes of Katie Hathaway, Erika Acuff, Christy Watkins and Whitney Sprague. Acuff won a slew of ACC titles at Carolina from 1997-2001 and went on to a spectacular master's swimming career, repeatedly breaking UNC long course standards since 2008. At age 33, Acuff, who married fellow Tar Heel swimmer Kevin Erndl, was named to the American Team for the 2011 Pan American Games in Mexico. Hathaway was a multiple ACC champion and first-team All-America and winner of the Patterson Medal in 2002. Watkins won four successive ACC titles in the 50 free from 2000-03 and three straight conference crowns in the 100 back (2000-02). She broke Sue Walsh's 17-year-old ACC record in the 100 back in 2000. Whitney Sprague was one of the greatest distance swimmers in UNC

history, holding ACC standards in the 500, 1000 and 1650 freestyles during her tenure at UNC. Sprague finished third in the 1650 at NCAAs in 2007 and then posted second-place finishes in both 2008 and 2009. Her 500-yard freestyle ACC record was broken by Tar Heel freshman Stephanie Peacock in 2011.

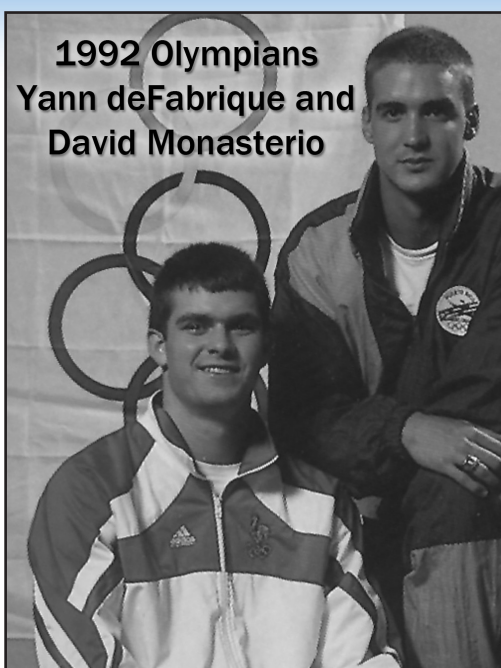
Peacock had one of the greatest seasons in UNC history in 2011-12, sweeping ACC post-season Swimmer of the Year and Most Outstanding Swimmer at the ACC Championships honors. Peacock set ACC records in the 500, 1000 and 1650 freestyles and won ACC titles in the 200, 500 and 1650 freestyles. At the 2012

NCAA Championships in Auburn, Ala., she won Carolina's first individual NCAA championship in nine years as she captured the title in the 1650-yard freestyle in 15:38.79, breaking the 22-year-old NCAA record held by Olympic gold medalist Janet Evans. Peacock bettered NCAA records in the 1000-yard and 1650-yard freestyle at the Ohio State Invitational in December 2012 and again broke her 1000-yard mark in March 2014. She missed the second half of her junior year due to illness but returned to compete for the U.S. in the 2013 World University Games, winning gold and a silver medals. At the 2015 World University Games Peacock won a bronze medal in 10-kilometer open water swimming in South Korea. She finished third in the 800-meter freestyle at the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials.

In 2013, Cari Blalock, who specialized in IM and butterfly, won ACC post-season Swimmer of the Year honors as a Tar Heel claimed the prize a second straight year. Teammate Meredith Hoover earned back-to-back first-team All-America honors in the 200-yard butterfly in 2013 and 2014. Danielle Siverling was the top senior on the 2015 team, winning ACC championships and first-team All-America honors during her career in middle distance freestyle events.

Tar Heels On International Teams

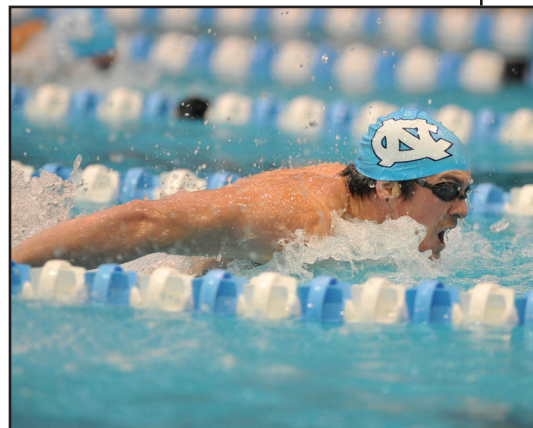
UNC swimmers have also been fixtures competing in international and Olympic-related competitions. That has especially been true since the mid-1970s. Starting with Bonny Brown's appearance in the 1977 World University Games in Sofia, Bulgaria, other Tar Heels invited to that biannual competition have been Barb Harris and Gayle Hegel in 1979 at Mexico City, Mexico; Sue Walsh in 1981 at Bucharest, Romania; Eric Ericson and Sue Walsh in 1983 at Edmonton, Canada; Melanie Buddemeyer in 1985 at Kobe, Japan; Melanie Buddemeyer and Susan O'Brien in 1987 at Zagreb, Yugoslavia; Sarah Perroni, James Hamrick, Yann deFabrique and individual medley standout Carrie Szulc in 1993 at Buffalo, N.Y.; Yann deFabrique, Kari Haag and Trevor Runberg in 1995 at Fukuoka, Japan; Jessi Perruquet and Jessie Brosch in Daegu, South Korea in 2003, and Whitney Sprague and Stephanie Eisenring in 2009 in Belgrade, Serbia. Sprague won the gold medal in the 800-meter freestyle at the 2009 event. Perruquet won two silver medals at the 2003 World University Games. Haag won a gold medal at the 1995 World University Games as a member of the U.S.'s 800-meter freestyle relay squad, while Yann deFabrique won three medals at



1992 Olympians Yann deFabrique and David Monasterio represented France and Puerto Rico in Barcelona at the 1992 Olympic Games. They were both All-America swimmers at Carolina.

the 1993 World University Games and two more medals at the 1995 World University Games. Buddemeyer and O'Brien also swam together at Brisbane, Australia in August 1987 at the Pan Pacific Games.

UNC was represented by head coach Rich DeSelm at the 2011 World University Games in Shenzhen, China. He served as head coach of the U.S. men's team there. Carolina swimmers Tyler Harris and Stephanie Peacock won bronze medals at the 2011 WUGs in the 400-meter individual medley and 400-meter freestyle, respectively. In 2013, Carolina had two undergraduate swimmers, Stephanie Peacock and Tom Luchsinger, named to the U.S. National Team. Both earned spots on the U.S. Team that competed in the World University Games in Kazan, Russia from

July 6-17, 2013. Peacock won two medals there while Luchsinger was upgraded to the U.S. Team at the World Championships in June 2013 where he was a finalist in the 200-meter butterfly.

In September 2014, Tar Heels Ben Coley and Chip Peterson were named to the U.S. National Team while Rich DeSelm, Mike Litzinger and Sean Quinn were all honored as U.S. National Team coaches. At the same time, UNC junior Emma Nunn was named to the U.S. Team which competed in the 2015 World University Games in Gwangju City, South Korea. She competed there along with Tar Heel diver Jack Nyquist, the first diver in UNC history ever named to a National Team. Stephanie Peacock also competed as a post-graduate student, winning a bronze medal in open water swimming.

At the 2017 World University Games in Taoyuan City, Chinese Taipei, UNC assistant coach Duncan Sherrard was an assistant for the U.S. women's team while 2017 graduate Hellen Moffitt and 2017-18 rising senior Caroline Baldwin won gold medals for the U.S. Moffitt won a gold medal in the 100-meter butterfly and had a silver medal in the 400-meter medley re-

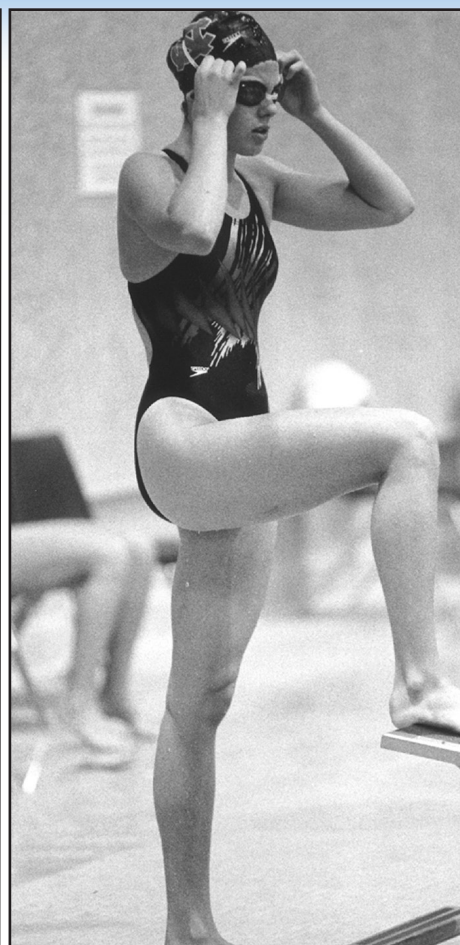
lay. Baldwin won her gold medal in the 50-meter freestyle and won silver in the 400-meter medley relay and bronze in the 400-meter freestyle relay. Moffitt as well as UNC coaches Rich DeSelm and Sean Quinn went on to be named to the U.S. Swimming 2017 National Team.

In August 1987, UNC had a participant in the Pan American Games in Indianapolis in the person of Tony Monasterio, representing his native Puerto Rico. Tony Monasterio was followed to the same competition four years later by his younger brother David Monasterio, who swam splendidly in the 1991 event at Havana, Cuba. Sean Quinn represented the U.S. at the 2003 Pan American Games in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, where he won the silver medal in the 200-meter breaststroke. At the 2007 Pan American Games in Brazil, Chip Peterson won the gold medal in the 1500-meter freestyle and the silver medal in 10 kilometer open water swimming.

Two Tar Heels competed in the 2011 Pan American Games in Guadalajara, Mexico. 2011 graduate Tyler Harris made the men's team and 2001 alumna Erika Acuff Erndl competed for the U.S. women at age 33. Tom Luchsinger turned down an opportunity to compete for the U.S. team because of his academic commitments at UNC that fall. UNC's Chip Peterson returned to the Pan American Games in 2015 for the competition in Toronto, Canada where he won the gold medal in 10-meter open water swimming.

Carolina Olympians of the past five decades years have included Ann Marshall in 1972, Wendy Weinberg and Janis Hape in 1976, Sue Walsh in 1980, Chris Stevenson in 1984, David Monasterio and Yann deFabrique in 1992, Yann deFabrique in 1996 and Yi-Khy Saw in 2004. Yann deFabrique also competed for France in the 1994 World Championships in Rome, while Trevor Runberg swam for the American team at the 1998 World Championships, Brad Hamilton swam for Jamaica in the 2009 and 2011 World Championships and Tom Luchsinger for the U.S. side in 2013.

Chip Peterson and Joe Kinderwater swam in the 2008, 2009 and 2010 World Open Water Championships for the United States. Both were fixtures on the U.S. National Open Water Swimming Team for several years. Peterson, now in medical school

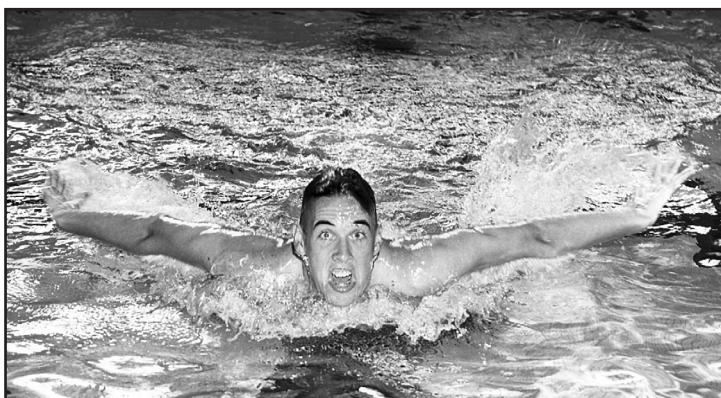


Kari Haag was one of the best middle distance freestylers in UNC history. In 1995, she was the NCAA runner-up in the 200 free.

at UNC, was named to the U.S. Open Water National Team again during four straight years from 2013 through 2017. He finished fifth in 25 kilometer open water swimming at the 2017 World Championships.

Notes About Carolina Swimming Team Awards: The

Most Valuable, Most Outstanding and Most Improved Awards for both the men's and women's teams are all named for Richard E. Jamerson, who founded the University of North Carolina swimming program in 1938-39 as its first head coach. The Hill Carrow Spirit Award is presented annually in honor of former Tar Heel swimmer Hill Carrow, Class of 1977, to the swimmer on each team who exhibits the most school spirit. The Bruce Webster Memorial Award is presented annually to the most dedicated member of the men's team. The award

honors former Tar Heel swimmer Bruce Webster, Class of 1981, who passed away in 1983. The Athletic Director's Scholar-Athlete Awards, begun in 1986, are presented annually by the UNC Athletic Director to the top student-athlete in each of UNC's 28 varsity sports. The Andrea Erben Memorial Award is given each year to the most dedicated swimmer on the women's team and honors Andrea Erben, a Tar Heel swimmer who passed away following her sophomore year in 2003. The Class of 1940 Blue Dolphin Award is given in honor of the senior class which founded UNC's swimming program in 1938-39 and is awarded to an individual who has made exceptional overall contributions to the Carolina swimming program. The Osterneck Family Award is given annually in memory of the Osterneck Family of Durham, N.C., to the swimming program's unsung heroes. It is dedicated in the loving memory of Bob Osterneck, Rhoda Osterneck, and her late mother, Minnie Pitkus. The David McInnis Diving Awards honor David McInnis, Class of 1957, and winner twice of the John A. Futchenberg Award as the ACC's top diver. It is awarded each year to the outstanding diver on each UNC squad. Improved diving awards were also established in his name. The Pat and Mary Louise Service Awards honor UNC head swimming coach Pat Earey (1957-74) and his wife Mary Louise.

The latest additions to the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium add to the facility's reputation as one of the finest aquatics facilities in the United States.

Koury Natatorium, the home of the Carolina swimming and diving programs, opened in 1986 and has undergone a significant series of improvements over the past several years with the intent of keeping it one of the most modern aquatic facilities in the nation.

A gift from the Tom Kean family of new starting blocks for the 2012-13 season was one of the most recent improvement to the facility.

The previous school year an entire redesign of the facility's entryway directly across from the main entrance to the Dean E. Smith Center was finished. The addition of trophy cases and memorabilia displays honoring the new UNC Blue Dolphin Society provide a Hall of Honor effect that greatly enhances the natatorium's main foyer. Dedication for the new memorabilia area took place on November 5, 2011. The project was completely financed by fund-raising organized UNC swimming alumni and boosters.

Other recent additions have included the dedication of the Frank R. Comfort record boards in September 2008. The record boards came about in the form of a gift from Tom and Janet Kean, long-time supporters of the program. The Mike Keel Memorial Banners were put in place in October 2009 in honor of the late Mike Keel, the father of former Tar Heel swimmer Katie Keel. The banners were financed through fund-raising from alumni and a gift from the Keel family.

In addition, the locker rooms for the two teams have been redesigned. The coaches' offices were entirely redecorated. The Carolina athletic department also purchased new starting blocks and invested in significant improvements to the timing system. Alumni-raised funds were also directed to improve the overall training facilities and equipment for the program's student-athletes.

A state-of-the-art, top-notch scoreboard and message board system was installed in the fall of 2006. A redesign of the team meeting room was also completed recently. The pool was also taken down in the summer of 2015, resulting in a maintenance project that has restored the Natatorium's original beauty and greatly improved the pool's filtration system.

It was after 48 seasons of intercollegiate swimming and diving competition in historic Bowman Gray Pool that the Tar Heel men's and women's swimming and diving teams moved into their new home in October 1986 with the opening of Koury Natatorium.

Now in its 32nd season of use, Koury Natatorium has gained a reputation as one of the finest pools in the nation. Several top-flight competitions have been staged here, with one of the showcase events being U.S. Swimming's Senior Short Course National Championships from March 21-25, 1989. Koury Natatorium served as the host of the U.S. Master's Swimming Short Course National Championships in May 1992.

Koury Natatorium has hosted multiple Atlantic Coast Conference Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Championships. Those meets were held in 1987, 1989, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2000, 2003, 2007 and 2010. Since that time, ACC Championships have been held at off campus sites.

Other top meets held at Koury Natatorium have included the 1988 and 1991 NCAA Southeast Regional Diving Championships, North Carolina High School Athletic Association men's and women's championship meets and U.S. Swimming North Carolina-Virginia all-star meets. U.S. Swimming held its annual elite training camp at Koury Natatorium shortly after its opening in 1986.

Another highlight in Koury Natatorium's history was the swimming and water polo competition at U.S. Olympic Festival 1987, an event then staged in non-Olympic years by the U.S. Olympic Committee. Swimming competition played to overflow crowds all three nights and the water polo competition also set Festival attendance standards for that sport. The crowds for swimming were so large that temporary bleachers had to be set up on the pool deck to accommodate the crowd.

The natatorium was officially dedicated in ceremonies on October 2, 1987, an event which drew a capacity crowd of UNC athletic partisans, swimming enthusiasts and statewide dignitaries, including the Lieutenant Governor, Robert Jordan, who gave the official address dedicating the facility.

The first competition in the facility actually took place almost a year before the Dedication Day when on October 31, 1986, UNC hosted the Tar Heel Invitational. The first dual meet competition was on November 10, 1986 when UNC's women defeated NC State 171-96.

The pool itself measures 50 meters in length by 25 yards in width. There are two moveable bulkheads. At its most shallow point, the pool measures seven feet in depth while the pool is 18 feet at its deepest point. The pool also features continuous flow gutters and has one of the most

advanced lighting systems of any swimming facility in the country. The gallery area provides seating for approximately 2,000 fans and are usually packed for the annual Nike Cup and dual meets versus Duke, Virginia and NC State.

The acoustical system at the natatorium is outstanding. Six speakers serve the gallery area and six more serve the pool deck, which underwent an elaborate tiling project immediately after the Olympic Festival in 1987. In excess of 2,300 individual acoustical tiles are installed in the ceiling.

The pool, which features underwater speakers and observation booths, holds one million gallons of water, quadrupling the water capacity of Bowman Gray Pool, which held about 250,000 gallons. There are no water jets in the pool, eliminating the problems caused by water currents. Sliding glass windows on both sides provide for better ventilation during the summer.

Each Carolina team has a locker room that affords two lockers for each team member. A team meeting room adjoins the deck and is named for former UNC swimming coach Ralph Casey. There is also a separate locker room for the UNC coaches and locker room facilities for visiting teams, recreational swimming and officials.

The locker rooms and meeting room are located directly across the hall-

way from the athletic training room of the Smith Center, which is under the direction of a top notch athletic training staff led by UNC certified athletic trainer Sally Mays, who heads the swimming and diving staff.

The natatorium also contains outstanding facilities for diving with platform diving facilities at several levels having been added during the summer of 2001 to the already existing one-meter and three-meter springboards. The diving area also includes a separate scoreboard and message board.

There is a second scoreboard and message board on the swimming end of the facility. The original scoreboard system was named for the late Dick Jamerson, the founder of the UNC swimming program in 1938 and its first head coach. The original system was dedicated December 2, 1986 at a dual meet against Duke with Coach Jamerson's widow, Anna Jamerson, in attendance for the ceremonies. A new scoreboard and timing system was installed in the fall of 2006 in time for the Tar Heels' home opener against Georgia.

Also located on the deck level adjacent to the pool are the swimming coaches' offices with a reception area and offices for the Tar Heel coaches. The offices of the North Carolina Aquatic Club are also located adjacent to the Koury Natatorium pool deck.

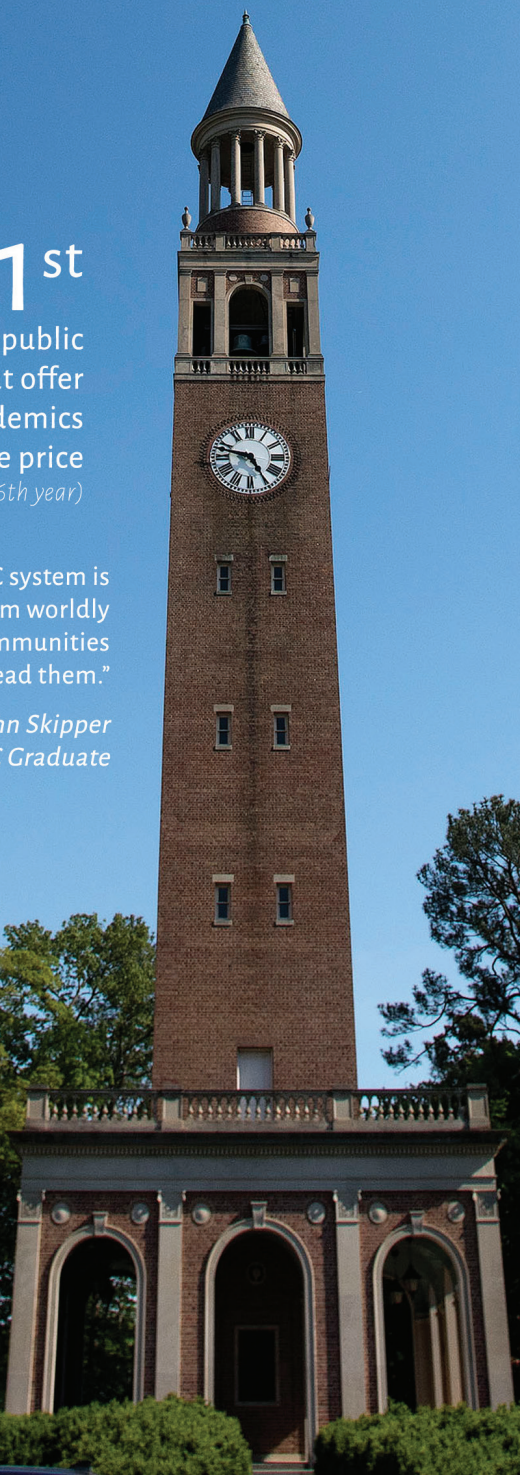

ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM for STUDENT-ATHLETES

The Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes (ASPSA) reports directly to the Office of the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost and is uniquely positioned to collaborate with faculty, the Department of Athletics and the campus community to support student-athletes as they excel in the classroom and compete in athletics. The ASPSA helps student-athletes explore their academic interests and abilities as well as provides numerous academic services including tutoring, secondary academic and career advising, assistance with University and NCAA eligibility, and coordination of academic honors and awards. In addition to the Director/Assistant Provost, the ASPSA staff includes 12 academic counselors, three learning specialists, and an office manager.

ASPSA staff members work together to guide and support student-athletes throughout their career at Carolina, beginning with an introduction to academics at UNC during the recruiting process through graduation and beyond. All incoming student-athletes, as well as those in need of more intensive academic support, participate in the My Academic Plan (MAP) program. Academic counselors and learning specialists work with each student-athlete to customize his or her MAP based on academic preparedness, course schedule, and individual need.

LOUDERMILK CENTER
FOR EXCELLENCE



The Academic Support Program is housed in the Loudermilk Center for Excellence, a 150,000-square-foot facility that serves all of Carolina's nearly 800 student-athletes across 28 varsity sports. The Loudermilk Center's largest feature is the John W. Pope Student-Athlete Academic Support Center. This facility provides classrooms for teaching and tutoring, study lounges, office space and a computer lab.

The floor also includes offices for the Student-Athlete Development program, which guides students in personal development, leadership development and career development.
