• The defending national champion Tar Heels are the No. 2 seed in the West Region and play No. 15 Lipscomb, champion of the Atlantic Sun Conference, on Friday, March 16th, in Charlotte, N.C.

• Gametime is approximately 30 minutes after the conclusion of the game between No. 7 seed Texas A&M and No. 10 Providence, which tips at 12:15 p.m.

• Carolina's first round game will be televised on CBS.

• Carolina is 25-10. That includes 11-7 in the ACC regular season and 3-1 in the ACC Tournament.

• Carolina is 13-7 away from Chapel Hill – 7-5 on the road and 6-2 at neutral sites.

• Carolina went 13-9 against teams in the 2018 NCAA Tournament field. The Tar Heels went 2-0 against Syracuse; 2-1 vs. Duke, 1-0 vs. Bucknell, Arkansas, Michigan, Davidson, Tennessee and Ohio State; 1-1 vs. Clemson, NC State and Miami; 0-1 vs. Michigan State, Florida State and Virginia Tech; and 0-2 vs. Virginia.

• UNC's strength of schedule (NCAA and KenPom) was the most difficult in the nation.

CAROLINA IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

• The 2018 NCAA Tournament is Carolina's 49th appearance, second most all-time (57 Kentucky).

• Carolina has won the NCAA Tournament championship six times (third most behind UCLA with 11 and Kentucky with eight). UNC has won the title in 1957, 1982, 1993, 2005, 2009 and 2017.

• The Tar Heels have played in the championship game 11 times (6-5), finishing as runners-up in 1946, 1968, 1977, 1981 and 2016.

• Carolina is 123-45 in the NCAA Tournament. UNC is second in wins, one behind Kentucky (124).

• Carolina has played in a record 20 Final Fours. The Tar Heels are attempting to reach a third

straight Final Four for the second time in school history (1967, 1968, 1969 under Dean Smith).

• Carolina is the only school to reach the Final Four in each of the last eight decades (1940s to 2010s).

• Carolina played in San Antonio, site of this year's Final Four, in 1998 and 2008. The Tar Heels also played in San Antonio in the NCAA Tournament in 2014.

• Carolina has the second-highest winning percentage in NCAA Tournament history. The Tar Heels have won 73.2 percent of their games.

• Carolina's 42 NCAA Tournament wins in the last 14 years are nine more than any other school.

• Carolina has won 11 of its last 12 NCAA Tournament games over the last two seasons, losing to Villanova in the 2016 national championship game and beating Gonzaga for the title in 2017.

• Last year, Carolina became one of three schools to win the NCAA title one year after losing in the national championship game and the only school to accomplish that twice (UNC in 1982, Duke in 1991 and Kentucky in 1998).

• Carolina is attempting to become the first team to repeat as champion since Florida in 2006-07 and the first to play in three consecutive national title games since Kentucky in 1996-97-98.

• This is Carolina's ninth time as a No. 2 seed (1981, 1983, 1985, 1988, 1989, 1995, 2001, 2011 and 2018). The Tar Heels are 22-8 as a No. 2 seed, previously advancing to the Final Four as a second seed in 1981 and 1995.

• UNC is 6-0 vs. No. 15 seeds. The Tar Heels last played a No. 15 in 2011 in Charlotte when they beat Long Island University.

• Since the field expanded to at least 64 teams in 1985, the Tar Heels are 29-1 in first round games (only loss was in 1999 as a No. 3 seed to No. 14 Weber State).

• This is the seventh time UNC is playing in the West Region (1978, 1981, 1986, 1988, 1999, 2015 and 2018).

• Joel Berry II and Theo Pinson have played in 13 NCAA Tournament wins and 15 NCAA Tournament games. UNC records are 19 games and 16 wins by Pat Sullivan (1991, 1992, 1993 and 1995).

• Berry was the Most Outstanding Player of the 2017 Final Four. He is one of five Tar Heels to win Most Outstanding Player honors at a Final Four (James Worthy in 1982, Donald Williams in 1993, Sean May in 2005 and Wayne Ellington in 2009). He is the second Tar Heel (with Williams in 1994

and 1995) to play in additional NCAA Tournament games after winning MOP honors.

- Luke Maye was the Most Outstanding Player of the 2017 NCAA South Regional after UNC beat Butler in the Sweet 16 and Kentucky in the Elite Eight to advance to the Final Four. Maye was UNC's first non-starter to win regional MOP honors.

ROY WILLIAMS IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Won NCAA championships at UNC in 2005, 2009 and 2017 and led KU and Carolina to runnerup finishes in 1991, 2003 and 2016.

- Won the NCAA championship for the third time by beating No. 1 seed Gonzaga, 71-65.

- Led Carolina to the national title game for the second straight year.

- Became the sixth coach to win three or more NCAA titles with John Wooden (10), Mike Krzyzewski (5), Jim Calhoun (3), Bob Knight (3) and Adolph Rupp (3).

- Became the first coach to win three NCAA titles at his alma mater.

- Became the third coach in history to take teams to six national championship games with John Wooden (10) and Mike Krzyzewski (9).

- Led Carolina to the Final Four for the ninth time in his head coaching career (five at Carolina, four at Kansas).

- Second all-time in NCAA Tournament victories with 76 and games with 100.

- Fourth all-time in Final Fours with nine (four at Kansas and five at UNC) behind only John Wooden, Mike Krzyzewski and Dean Smith.

- Led Carolina and Kansas to 12 No. 1 NCAA Tournament seeds, second-most all-time.

- Won 11 more NCAA Tournament games (51) in the last 16 years than any coach in the country.

- Is 27-0 in NCAA Tournament first round games, the best record in opening round play in NCAA Tournament history. Adolph Rupp won at least a game in his first 13 NCAA appearances, the second-best figure behind Williams.

- Williams is 18-9 in the second round, including 9-4 at Carolina.

- Reached the Sweet 16 in 18 of 27 NCAA Tournament appearances – nine at Carolina (2005, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2017) and nine at Kansas (1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2001, 2002 and 2003).

- Williams is 13-5 in the Sweet 16, including 8-1 at Carolina.

- Reached the Elite 8 13 times, including eight times in the previous 14 years at Carolina. Is 9-4 in regional finals – 5-3 at UNC and 4-1 at Kansas.

- This is the sixth time Williams' teams have been seeded No. 2 (in 1990, 1993, 1996 and 2003 at Kansas and 2011 and 2018 at Carolina). KU advanced to the Final Four as a two in 1993 and 2003. Carolina advanced to the East Regional final in 2011.

2017 NCAA CHAMPIONS

- Carolina won its sixth NCAA championship (third in the last 13 years) with a 71-65 win over Gonzaga on April 3, 2017, in the University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.

- Carolina won the national championship with a 103-64 win over No. 16 seed Texas Southern, a 72-65 win over No. 8 seed Arkansas, a 92-80 win over No. 4 seed Butler, a 75-73 win over No. 2 seed Kentucky, a 77-76 win over No. 3 seed Oregon and a 71-65 win over No. 1 seed Gonzaga.

- Junior point guard Joel Berry II was the Final Four's Most Outstanding Player. Berry scored a game-high 22 points and had six assists, two steals and a blocked shot in the national championship game vs. Gonzaga and had 11 points and two assists vs. Oregon in the semifinal.

- Berry became the first player since Hall of Famer

Bill Walton in 1972 and 1973 to score 20 or more points in consecutive national championship games (Berry had 20 in 2016 vs. Villanova).

- Berry became the first Tar Heel in history and the first player since Butler's Shelvin Mack in 2010-11 to earn All-Final Four team honors in consecutive years.

- Berry joined James Worthy as the only Tar Heels to win ACC Tournament MVP and Final Four MVP honors. Worthy won both in 1982; Berry won the ACC Tournament MVP in 2016.

- Berry became the sixth player to win both Final Four MVP and ACC Tournament MVP honors in their career. Duke's Christian Laettner is the only other player to do that in separate seasons (Final Four in 1991, ACC in 1992). Duke's Art Heyman (1963), Worthy (1982), Duke's Shane Battier (2001) and Duke's Kyle Singler (2010) won them in the same season.

- Kennedy Meeks and Justin Jackson joined Berry on the All-Final Four team.

- Carolina averaged 81.7 points and allowed only 70.5 points in its six NCAA Tournament games. Only one opponent scored 80 points (Butler).

- Carolina held four of its six NCAA Tourney opponents under 75 points.

- 2017 was the first year UNC played six NCAA Tournament games and held the opponents under 44 percent shooting from the floor in every game. Carolina held its six opponents to 39.6 percent shooting from the floor, including Texas Southern (.367), Arkansas (.433), Butler (.435), Kentucky (.415), Oregon (.379) and Gonzaga (.339).

- Justin Jackson led UNC in scoring in the 2017 NCAA Tournament with 117 points (19.5 per game). That was the third-most points and third-highest average in a six-game NCAA Tournament series by a Tar Heel.

- Luke Maye was the South Regional MVP after scoring a career-high 16 points with 12 rebounds in the Sweet 16 win over Butler and a career-high 17 points and the game-winning shot with 0.3 seconds to play in the win over Kentucky in the regional final.

- Berry and Jackson joined Maye on the All-South Regional team.

- Carolina won four NCAA Tournament games by seven points or less, the first team to do that since Arizona in 1997. Only five teams have done that since the field expanded to 64 and 68 teams in 1985.

- Carolina's 75-73 win over Kentucky in the regional final and its 77-76 win over Oregon in the national semifinal marked the first time UNC won consecu-

tive NCAA games by two points or less since 1969 when it defeated Duquesne, 79-78, in the East semifinal and Davidson, 87-85, in the East final.

- Carolina won three games in the 2017 NCAA Tournament when it shot under 40 percent from the floor. Prior to 2017, UNC was 6-17 in NCAA Tourney games when shooting under 40 percent and four of those six wins came prior to 1968.

ROY'S DEFENSE WINS CHAMPIONSHIPS

- Roy Williams has led UNC to NCAA championships in 2005, 2009 and 2017. Carolina has held its six Final Four opponents in those respective years to a combined field goal shooting of 35.9 percent. That includes:

- Michigan State and Illinois combined to score 141 points in the 2005 Final Four; Villanova and Michigan State combined to score 141 points in the 2009 Final Four; Oregon and Gonzaga combined to score 141 points in the 2017 Final Four.
- Syracuse and Villanova combined to score 143 points in the 2016 Final Four in which UNC lost in the title game by three points on a last-second three-pointer.
- Carolina allowed those six Final Four opponents to score just 70.5 points per game (high of 76 by Oregon in the 2017 semifinal).
- Michigan State and Illinois shot a combined 36.1 percent from the floor in the 2005 Final Four; Villanova and Michigan State shot 35.8 percent in 2009; Oregon and the Zags shot 35.9 percent in 2017.
- Gonzaga's field goal percentage of .339 was the Zags' lowest of the season and just the third time under 40 percent all year; Oregon's field goal percentage of .379 was the Ducks' lowest in 34 games; Kentucky's field goal percentage of .415 in the regional final was the Cats' lowest in 15 games.

CAROLINA IN CHARLOTTE

- Carolina is 33-1 in NCAA Tournament games played in the state of North Carolina.
- Carolina is 173-18 in games played in the city of Charlotte, including 11-0 in the NCAA Tournament (4-0 in the Spectrum Center).

- UNC beat Washington State and Louisville in the 2008 East Regional, and Long Island University and Washington in the 2011 East first and second rounds.
- The Tar Heels have won 36 of their last 39 games played in Charlotte.
- UNC is 12-0 in the Spectrum Center. That includes wins over Sacred Heart and Winthrop in the Preseason NIT Tipoff in 2006-07, three ACC Tournament wins and two NCAA regional wins in 2007-08, two NCAA Tournament wins in 2010-11 and three regular-season wins over Davidson (including earlier this season on 12/1/17).

CAROLINA-LIPSCOMB

- The Tar Heels beat Lipscomb, 80-66, in the Smith Center on 11/12/2010, in the only previous meeting between the two schools.
- Tyler Zeller led five Tar Heels in double figures with 15 points, John Henson had 10 points, 17 rebounds and seven blocks, and Harrison Barnes scored 14 in his college debut.

RECAPPING THE ACC TOURNAMENT

- Carolina avenged its last two regular-season losses with wins over Duke and Miami and beat Syracuse for the seventh time in a row, before falling to No. 1 ranked Virginia in the championship game.
- Carolina played in the finals for a record 35th time (Duke is second with 32; NC State is third with 17).
- The win over Duke in the semifinal was Carolina's 100th in ACC Tournament play. Duke won its 100th in the quarterfinals. No other school has more than 71 wins.
- Senior guard Joel Berry II tied the UNC record for ACC Tournament wins played in with 10. Eric Montross and Derrick Phelps played in 10 wins from 1991-94. Berry played in three wins in 2015, three wins in 2016, one in 2017 and three in 2018.
- Berry became the first Tar Heel to play in 13 ACC Tournament games (previous high was 12 by Montross, who is the analyst on the Tar Heel Sports Network).
- Berry made 10 three-pointers in the four games, giving him 22 for his career, tied for second with Wayne Ellington behind Marcus Paige (27).

- Berry was one of five Tar Heels to average in double figures in scoring, even though UNC scored 74.2 per game, almost eight points below their season average (82.0).
- Theo Pinson led UNC at 13.3 points per game – he scored 16 against Syracuse and a career-high 25 vs. Miami, before scoring eight against Duke and four in the final vs. Virginia.
- Maye was Carolina's second-leading scorer over the four games at 13.0 per game, but he led UNC in both the semifinal vs. Duke (17) and the championship game vs. UVA (20).
- Kenny Williams was the only Tar Heel to score in double figures in all four games (including team-high 17 vs. Syracuse). Williams averaged 12.5 points and shot a team-high 54.1 percent from the floor (20 of 37).
- Carolina shot only 41.1 percent from the floor in the four games, but reached the finals in large measure due to its defense in the first three games. UNC held its four opponents to 37.6 percent from the floor (season-low .317 by Syracuse, .371 by Miami, .407 by Duke and .420 by Virginia).
- UNC made the same number of three-pointers (29) as it allowed in the four games.
- Syracuse, Miami and Duke combined to shoot 30.8 percent from three-point range; Virginia was 9 of 17 (.529) in the championship game.
- Roy Williams is 25-12 in ACC Tournament play. He is third in ACC Tourney wins behind Mike Krzyzewski (62) and Dean Smith (58).
- Williams is fifth in ACC Tournament winning percentage (.676). The top five winning percentages by coach in ACC Tournament history are either Carolina or Duke coaches (Bubas, Krzyzewski, Smith, UNC's Bill Guthridge and Williams).
- It was the second time in four seasons UNC reached the championship game by winning three times (also 2015, lost to Notre Dame in the final).

• Maye and Berry received the third- and fourth-most votes for All-ACC honors behind ACC Player of the Marvin Bagley III (Duke) and Jerome Robinson (Boston College).

• Maye is the ACC's Most Improved Player. He is the second Tar Heel to win the award in the five years it has been given (Marcus Paige in 2014). UNC is the only school with two Most Improved Player awards.

• Berry and Maye earned All-District honors from the NABC and USBWA.

• Maye is a second-team CoSIDA Academic All-America. Maye is the 15th Tar Heel to earn Aca-demic All-America honors. He is the third in the last eight years (Tyler Zeller in 2011 and 2012; Marcus Paige in 2014, 2015 and 2016).

• Maye is the 2018 winner of the Skip Prosser Award as the ACC's top scholar-athlete in men's bas-ketball. Maye is the third Tar Heel to win the Prosser Award in the last eight years (Tyler Zeller in 2011 and 2012; Paige in 2015 and 2016).

• Maye is the fourth player to win first-team All-ACC honors and the Prosser Award in the same season (with Miami's Jack McClinton in 2009, UNC's Tyler Zeller in 2012 and Duke's Mason Plumlee in 2013). Marcus Paige won both, but in different seasons.

TWENTY AND 25 WINS AGAIN

• Carolina's win over Duke in the ACC Tournament semifinals was the 25th win of the season. This is the 38th season in which the Tar Heels have won 25 or more games.

• This is the 23rd time Roy Williams' teams have won 25 or more games (12 times at Kansas and 11 at UNC).

• UNC has won at least 25 games in seven of the last eight seasons (24 in 2014).

• UNC has won at least 20 games for the 60th time and the 14th time in 15 seasons under Williams.

• Williams' teams have won 20 or more games in 28 of his 30 seasons as a head coach and 19 or more in all 30.

• This is the 14th consecutive season UNC has won at least 20 games.

NOTEWORTHY

• Joel Berry II is 15th in UNC career scoring with 1,778 points, second in three-pointers made (262) and attempted (707), 10th in free throw percentage (.830) and tied for 13th in assists (446).

• Berry set a UNC record with the win over Duke in the ACC semifinals. It was Berry's 60th ACC win (50 regular season and 10 Tournament). The previous school record was 59 set from 2014-17 by Nate Britt and Isaiah Hicks.

• Berry, Phil Ford and Marcus Paige are the only players in the top 15 all-time at UNC in scoring and assists.

• Berry has 398 rebounds. With two more rebounds, he will join Walter Davis as the only Tar Heels with 1,700 points, 400 rebounds and 400 assists.

• Only two opponents have shot 50 percent from the floor this season – Miami (.548) in its win in Chapel Hill and NC State (.547) in Carolina's win in Raleigh.

• Theo Pinson has raised his scoring average to 10.3 points, and is the fifth Tar Heel to average in double figures. This would be the first time since 2008-09 five Tar Heels averaged double figures (has happened in seven seasons prior to this year).

• Carolina leads the nation in rebounds per game (42.5), is second in rebound margin (10.0), tied for fourth in assists (18.2) and fourth in offensive rebounds (14.2).

• Carolina is among the nation's top rebounding teams again, despite playing with no starter taller than Luke Maye, who stands 6-8.

- Luke Maye (17.2) and Joel Berry II (17.1) lead Carolina in scoring. No Tar Heel pair has averaged 17 points in a season since Michael Jordan (19.6) and Sam Perkins (17.6) in 1984.
- Maye (17.2 points/10.1 rebounds) is on pace to become the sixth Tar Heel to average a double-double in the last 40 years with Brice Johnson (2016), John Henson (2011), Tyler Hansbrough (2008), Sean May (2005) and Antawn Jamison (1998).
- Maye is the first Tar Heel to have two 30-point/15-rebound games in the same season since Mitch Kupchak in 1976. Maye, Kupchak, Lennie Rosenbluth and Billy Cunningham are the only players to accomplish that multiple times in the same season.
- Maye leads UNC in blocked shots with 38. At 6-8, Maye would the shortest Tar Heel to lead the team in blocks since Danny Green (6-5) in 2006.

- Three Tar Heels have scored 30 or more points this season – Luke Maye (33 at NC State, 32 vs. NC State and 31 vs. Boston College), Cameron Johnson (32 at Clemson) and Joel Berry II (31 vs. Miami).

- Virginia Tech (12), NC State (15) and Clemson (15) made 42 three-pointers in beating UNC in three straight games in January. Those three opponents made 42 of 90 threes (.467). Over the next 12 games, the opponents have shot 35.5 percent (71 for 200) from three-point range in nine UNC wins and 45.3 percent (29 for 64) in the three Tar Heel losses (Miami, at Duke and Virginia).
- The opponents have shot 50 percent or better from three-point range in four of the last five Tar Heel losses, including the ACC Tournament championship game vs. Virginia.
- Virginia Tech shot 40 percent from three, and Michigan State, Wofford, Florida State, Virginia in Charlottesville and Duke in Durham all shot under 40 percent in their wins over UNC.

Which Final Four MVP scored a UNC-record 134 points in a six-game NCAA Tournament series? Sean May averaged 22.3 points in six wins en route to the title in 2005.

Which player scored the most points in any NCAA Tournament? Lennie Rosenbluth, 142 in five games (28.4 per) in 1957.

Which two teams hold the NCAA record for wins in a season without a loss? 1957 North Carolina and 1976 Indiana both went 32-0.

Who is the last Tar Heel to score 30 or more points in an NCAA Tournament game? Tyler Zeller scored 32 against LIU in the 2011 first round in Charlotte.

Who is the last Tar Heel to grab 20 rebounds in an NCAA Tournament game? Zeller had 22 boards against Ohio in the 2012 Sweet 16 in St. Louis.

Who is the last non-starter to have a double-double in the NCAA Tournament? Luke Maye had 16 points and 12 rebounds vs. Butler in the 2017 Sweet 16 in Memphis.

Which Tar Heels have won NCAA championships and NBA championships? James Worthy, Michael Jordan and Danny Green.

Which coaches rank second and third, respectively in all-time NCAA Tournament wins? Roy Williams is second with 76 and Dean Smith is third with 65.

In which cities has Carolina won NCAA championships? New Orleans twice (1982, 1993), Detroit, Mich. (2009), Glendale, Ariz. (2017), Kansas City, Mo. (1957) and St. Louis, Mo. (2005).

In which city has Carolina won more NCAA Tournament games than any other city? Charlotte. UNC is 11-0 in NCAA games in Charlotte and 33-1 in the state.

What school has been a No. 1 seed the most times since the NCAA began seeding the field in 1979? Carolina – 16 times. Kansas is second with 14.

How many wins does Carolina have as either a No. 1 or No. 2 seed? 83– 61 as a No. 1 and 22 as a No. 2. That's more wins as just those two seeds than every school in the country has ever won in the NCAA Tournament except Kentucky, Duke, UCLA and Kansas.

Which Tar Heel holds the school record and is ninth in NCAA Tournament history in most three-pointers in a game without a miss? Hubert Davis was 5 for 5 against Eastern Michigan in 1991.

Which Tar Heel set the freshman scoring record in 1977 for a Final Four game? Mike O'Koren with 31 points in the semifinals vs. UNLV (since broken by Mark Aguirre of DePaul in 1979 and Carmel Anthony of Syracuse in 2003).

Which Tar Heels have won ACC Player of the Year honors and a national championship in the same season? Lennie Rosenbluth in 1957, Ty Lawson in 2009 and Justin Jackson in 2017.

Who are the only Tar Heels to start in three Final Fours? Bill Bunting and Rusty Clark in 1967, 1968 and 1969 and Ed Cota in 1997, 1998 and 2000.

Which Tar Heels had two of the five-highest single-game field goal percentages in Final Four history? Sean May vs. Illinois in the 2005 national championship (made 10 of 11, .909) and Kennedy Meeks vs. Oregon in the 2017 semifinals (made 11 of 13, .846).

Which Tar Heel is the most recent player to score 25 or more points in both the national semifinal and national championship games? Donald Williams – 25 vs. Kansas and 25 vs. Michigan in New Orleans in 1993.

Which coach has the most NCAA Tournament wins in the previous 16 years? Roy Williams – 51 wins at Kansas and North Carolina from 2002-17, 11 more than any other coach.

Which Tar Heels are the only players to earn All-NCAA Regional honors three times? J.R. Reid (1987, 1988 and 1989), Ed Cota (1997, 1998 and 2000) and Tyler Hansbrough (2007, 2008 and 2009)

Who is the only Tar Heel to be named NCAA Regional MVP as a non-starter? Luke Maye, 2017 NCAA South Regional

Which six Tar Heels started in two national championship games? Jimmy Black, Sam Perkins and James Worthy in 1981 and 1982; Joel Berry II, Justin Jackson and Kennedy Meeks in 2016 and 2017

Who is the only Tar Heel to earn All-Final Four team honors twice? Joel Berry II in 2016 and 2017

Who made the winning free throws in the 1957 NCAA title game against Kansas? Joe Quigg with six seconds to play in triple overtime.

Which Tar Heel made the game-winning shot in the 1982 national championship game vs. Georgetown? Michael Jordan.

Who scored the winning basket in the 2005 national final vs. Illinois? Marvin Williams on a tip-in with 1:26 left to break a 70-all tie in a 75-70 UNC win.

Which Tar Heels held the record (since broken) for the highest three-point percentage in a Final Four game? Donald Williams and Wayne Ellington. Williams was 5 for 7 (.714) against both Kansas and Michigan in 1993; Ellington was 5 for 7 against Villanova in 2009.

Who holds the Final Four record record for most points in a national semifinal? Al Wood – 39 against Virginia in 1981.

Which player tied his career scoring high in the 2017 semifinal win over Oregon? Kennedy Meeks, who had 25 points and 14 rebounds vs. the Ducks.

How many points did Carolina allow in its two Final Four wins in the 2005, 2009 and 2017 national championship seasons? 141 by Michigan State and Illinois in 2005, 141 by Villanova and Michigan State in 2009 and 141 by Oregon and Gonzaga in 2017.

Which game did Carolina set the single-game NCAA Tournament scoring record (since broken)? 1988 West second round vs. Loyola Marymount. The Tar Heels scored 123 points and shot 79.0 percent from the floor. Both were NCAA Tournament records that have since been surpassed. The points are now fourth most and the FG percentage is second highest.

Which Tar Heel has the school record for most double-doubles in NCAA Tournament history? Antawn Jamison with eight, all in points and rebounds.

Which Tar Heel has the school record for most points-assists double-doubles in NCAA Tournament history? Kendall Marshall with three.

Which teams are the only ones in ACC history to win the ACC regular season outright, the ACC Tournament and advance to the Final Four in three consecutive seasons? The 1967, 1968 and 1969 Tar Heels.

What national championship game scoring records did the Tar Heels set in the first half against Michigan State in 2009? UNC scored 55 points and led by 21 points, both records for the title game. Final Four MOP Wayne Ellington scored 17 points in that first half.

Marcus Paige's game-tying three-pointer against Villanova in the 2016 national championship game set what title-game record? Paige's double-clutch three with 4.1 seconds to play made UNC 11 for 17 from three-point range, a percentage of .647 that is the highest in the national championship game.

Carolina ranks where in all-time NCAA Tourney wins and Final Fours? Second with 123, one behind Kentucky. UNC has played in a record 20 Final Fours.

- Became the third coach in history to take teams to six national championship games with John Wooden (10) and Mike Krzyzewski (9).
- Led Carolina to the Final Four for the ninth time in his head coaching career (five at Carolina, four at Kansas).
- Second all-time in NCAA Tournament victories with 76 and games with 100.
- Fourth all-time in Final Fours with nine (four at Kansas and five at UNC) behind only John Wooden, Mike Krzyzewski and Dean Smith.
- Led Carolina and Kansas to 12 No. 1 NCAA Tournament seeds, second-most all-time.
- The 2018 NCAA Tournament is the sixth time his teams are a No. 2 seed (1-1 in 1990, 4-1 in 1993, 3-1 in 1996 and 5-1 in 2003 at Kansas; and 3-1 in 2011 at UNC).
- His teams reached the Final Four in 1993 and 2003 as a No. 2 seed, beating the No. 1 seed in the Elite Eight both times (Indiana in 1993, Arizona in 2003).
- Won 11 more NCAA Tournament games (51) in the last 16 years than any coach in the country.
- Carolina's 42 NCAA Tournament wins in the last 14 years are nine more than any other school.
- Reached the Elite 8 for the 13th time as a head coach, including eight times in 14 years at Carolina. Is 9-4 in regional finals – 5-3 at UNC and 4-1 at Kansas.
- Reached the Sweet 16 for the 18th time in 27 NCAA Tournament appearances – nine at Carolina (2005, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2017) and nine at Kansas (1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2001, 2002 and 2003).
- Williams is 18-9 in the second round, including 9-4 at Carolina.
- Williams is 13-5 in the Sweet 16, including 8-1 at Carolina.
- Is 27-0 in NCAA Tournament first round games, the best record in opening-round play in NCAA Tournament history. Adolph Rupp won at least a game in his first 13 NCAA appearances, the second-best figure behind Williams.

career he led UNC in rebounding) • Attempted a career-high 23 shots from the floor and scored 28 points (21 in the second half) in the loss at [Florida State](#) • Hit the game-winner on a runner from the left wing with 11 seconds to play in the 73-69 win over [Wake Forest](#) • Led all scorers with 21 points in the win at [#20 Tennessee](#) • Scored 13 second-half points against the Vols • Game-high 27 points (15 in the second half) and had four assists at [Davidson](#) • Had 17 points, five rebounds, four assists and two blocked shots in the win over [Michigan](#) • Game-high 29 points at [Stanford](#) • Broke his right hand on October 22 • Missed two exhibitions and the regular-season opener vs. Northern Iowa.

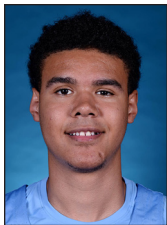

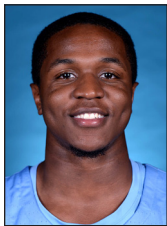

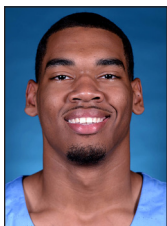

2017-18 GAME RECAPS

UNC 86, UNI 69 (NOV. 10)

- Luke Maye had a career-high 26 points and 10 rebounds to lead Carolina to an 86-69 win over Northern Iowa.
- Carolina played without Final Four MOP Joel Berry II (broken hand) and Cameron Johnson (sprained neck).
- Six of the 13 Tar Heels who played were freshmen making their collegiate debuts. The six combined to score 36 points, led by Garrison Brooks' 14 and Sterling Manley's nine.
- Brooks had 14 points and six rebounds in his first college game and start. The 14 points were the most by a freshman in the season's first game since Harrison Barnes had 14 against Lipscomb on 11/12/10.
- UNC's seven turnovers were the fewest in a season opener since 11/14/1997 when the Tar Heels committed seven against Middle Tennessee State in Bill Guthridge's first game as head coach.

UNC 93, BUCKNELL 81 (NOV. 15)

- Maye led UNC in scoring for the second time in as many games with 20 points, Theo Pinson scored a career-high 19 and had six assists, Berry returned to the lineup and had six assists, and Manley had a double-double in just 17 minutes to lead UNC to a 93-81 win over Patriot League champion Bucknell.
- Carolina out-rebounded Bucknell by 19, including a 16-7 edge in offensive rebounds (Manley had as many offensive rebounds as Bucknell – 7).
- Pinson scored a career-high 19 points and made a career-best nine free throws in 10 attempts.
- Manley had 16 points and 13 rebounds (seven offensive) in just 17 minutes. He was 6 for 10 from the floor and 4 of 5 from the free throw line.
- No other player in Roy Williams' 15 years as UNC's head coach finished a game with 13 or more rebounds in as few as 17 minutes.
- The win was Roy Williams' 400th win as Carolina's head coach. Williams became the only coach in NCAA history to win 400 games at two schools.

UNC 96 at STANFORD 72 (NOV. 20)

- Carolina won its 10th consecutive game against Pac-12 opponents.
- Kenny Williams scored a career-high 20 points and made a career-high six three-pointers.
- Williams scored all 20 of his points in the first 9:03 as UNC built a 26-11 lead. He scored UNC's first 14 points on four threes and a layup to give UNC a 14-11 lead at the 14:28 mark.
- Williams made six threes in the first half. That was the most threes ever by a Tar Heel in a first half and equaled the second-most threes in a half by a Tar Heel. They were the most in a half since Wayne Ellington made seven in the second half vs. Miami in 2009.
- Berry scored a game-high 29 points (18 in the first half, 11 in the second).

UNC 102, PORTLAND 78 (NOV. 23)

- Carolina made one of its first nine three-point attempts, then sank nine of its next 15 three-point attempts to finish 10 for 24.
- Carolina made its first nine field goal attempts over the first five minutes to begin the second half. All five starters made at least one field goal and the Tar Heels out-scored the Pilots, 20-8, during that run.
- Maye led Carolina with 20 points and 10 rebounds. Pinson had 11 points, nine rebounds and seven assists.
- Williams played a nearly-flawless game with 17 points on 7 of 12 shooting from the floor and added three offensive rebounds, three assists, no turnovers and three steals.

UNC 87, ARKANSAS 68 (NOV. 24)

- Maye had career highs in points (28), three-pointers (4), rebounds (16) and assists (five). It was the first time a Tar Heel scored 28 points, had 16 rebounds and five assists since Mitch Kupchak had 30/17/5 vs. Mercer on 2/4/76.
- Carolina led 74-58 (+16) with 6:44 to play. Arkansas went on a 10-0 run to cut the lead to six with 3:32 to play. From that point, the Tar Heels closed the game on a 13-0 run to win by 19.
- Carolina held the Razorbacks without a point on its last nine possessions (seven field goal attempts and two turnovers).
- Maye became the first Tar Heel to lead in scoring, rebounds and assists since Reggie Bullock vs. Maryland in the 2013 ACC Tournament and the first to have 20+ points, 10+ rebounds and five assists since Bullock against Florida

State on 3/3/13.

- Williams scored 19 points and grabbed a career-high eight rebounds.

MICHIGAN STATE 63, UNC 45 (NOV. 25)

- Carolina set school records for lowest field goal percentage and lowest three-point percentage in the finals of the "Victory" bracket in the PK80 Invitational.
- The Tar Heels held the fourth-ranked Spartans to 40 percent from the floor and forced 24 MSU turnovers, but UNC was just 15 of 61 from the floor and 1 of 18 from beyond the arc.
- The 15 field goals were the fewest by UNC in the Roy Williams Era and the 45 points matched the second-lowest output in the last 15 years.
- Carolina entered the game having made 17 of its last 31 (.548) from three-point range, but managed only a Berry buzzer-beater just before halftime.
- MSU's rebound margin of 16 was the largest against UNC since Butler out-rebounded the Tar Heels, 57-40, on 11/24/14.

UNC 86, MICHIGAN 71 (NOV. 29)

- The Tar Heels improved to 10-9 in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge, including 10-5 under Roy Williams.
- Carolina had assists on 17 of its first 21 field goals and finished with a season-high 24 assists (on 34 hoops).
- Carolina shot 64.5 percent from the floor (20x31) in the first half.
- Carolina shot a season-high 54.8 percent from the floor for the game, the fourth time in five games UNC has shot 50 percent or better.
- Maye scored 25-plus points for the third time in the first seven games with a game-high 27.
- Pinson led UNC in rebounds with seven and assists with six.

UNC 85 at DAVIDSON 75 (DEC. 1)

- Berry scored a game-high 27 points and had four assists and only one turnover and Maye had 24 points and a career-high 17 rebounds.
- Carolina grabbed 54 rebounds, had a rebound margin of 31, and scored 25 second-chance points.
- Sophomore Brandon Robinson scored a career-high eight points, all in the first half.
- Berry and Maye scored 20-plus points in the same game for the first time.
- Carolina improved to 173-18 in Charlotte, including 12-0 in the Spectrum Center.

CAROLINA 97, TULANE 73 (DEC. 3)

- Carolina shot 65.5 percent from the floor (38 of 58).
- It was UNC's highest FG percentage since shooting 67.7 percent against Arkansas in the 2008 NCAA Tournament second round in Raleigh.
- UNC shot 67.9 percent from the floor in the first half (19 of 28).
- It was the first time UNC shot 60 percent from the floor in both halves since 2/21/15 vs. Georgia Tech
- Maye led UNC with 22 points, 10 rebounds, four assists and a career-high four blocked shots.
- Williams scored all 13 of his points in the first half.
- Freshman Brandon Huffman set season highs in points (9), rebounds (6) and blocks (2).

UNC 104, WESTERN CAROLINA 61 (DEC. 6)

- Carolina scored a season-high 104 points and the 43-point margin of victory was the largest to date this season.
- The Tar Heel shot a school-record 72.7 percent from three-point range, making 16 of 22 from behind the arc. That was a single-game record for at least 20 three-point attempts (previous 17 of 25, 68.0 percent, vs. Florida State on 1/25/1995).
- UNC made 16 threes, tying the most in the Roy Williams Era (vs. Maryland, 2/3/2009) and the second-most in any game in UNC history.
- Six different Tar Heels made multiple threes (4 by Jalek Felton, 3 by Williams and Platek, 2 by Berry, Maye and Robinson).
- UNC had a season-high 31 assists, the second-most in the Roy Williams Era (first time with 30 or more since 12/16/15 vs. Tulane), and finished with 31 assists on 37 field goals.
- Felton scored a season-high 15 points (first time leading UNC in scoring) and was a season-best 4 for 4 from three-point range. Felton also had a season-high five assists.

- Platek made three 3FGs and had three assists and finished with 11 points, his second game in double figures in scoring.

UNC 78 at TENNESSEE 73 (DEC.17)

- Carolina overcame a nine-point second half deficit and out-scored the 20th-ranked Volunteers 16-7 over the final five minutes to win its third road game of the season.
- It was the 12th time a Roy Williams-UNC team has played an AP top-20, non-ACC opponent on the road. The Tar Heels are 5-7 in those games with wins at No. 19 Connecticut on 2/13/2005, No. 10 Kentucky on 12/3/2005, No. 17 Arizona on 1/27/2007, No. 1 Michigan State on 12/4/2013 and No. 20 Tennessee on 12/17/17.
- Berry led four Tar Heels in double figures with 21 points, 13 of which came in the second half.
- Williams hit a go-ahead three-pointer with 32.7 seconds to play.
- The Tar Heels led for only 89 seconds, including the final 32.7 seconds.
- Manley and Brooks combined for 19 points and 16 rebounds, including nine offensive rebounds.
- Tennessee led several times by nine points (latest with 17:41 to play). That was the largest deficit UNC overcame to win a game (until the Duke game on 2/8). Last year, UNC overcame a 15-point Volunteer lead to win.
- Pinson matched his career high with eight assists and had nine rebounds. He made 4 for 4 from the free throw line in the final 16 seconds.
- Pinson was one of four Tar Heels with eight or more rebounds (Maye, Brooks and Manley all had eight).
- Carolina committed a dozen turnovers in the first half, but only four in the second.
- Tennessee led 59-53 with 10:25 to play. From that point, UT made three of its final 18 field goals and committed three turnovers.

WOFFORD 79, CAROLINA 75 (DEC. 20)

- Fletcher Magee scored 16 of his game-high 27 points in the second half and Cameron Jackson had 18 points, nine rebounds, six blocks, three assists and three steals to lead Wofford to a 79-75 win at the Smith Center.
- Carolina came into the game No. 1 in the nation in the NCAA's RPI.
- Berry led UNC with 23 points and Maye had 17 points and 14 rebounds, but the duo was 11 for 32 from the floor.
- It was the first time Carolina lost at home as a top-5 ranked team against an unranked opponent since losing to Boston College on 1/4/2009. The Tar Heels were No. 1 in the nation in that game.
- It was the first time a top-5 UNC team lost to an unranked opponent since 12/12/15, when No. 3 UNC lost at Texas.
- The loss snapped UNC's 23-game home winning streak and UNC's 22-game home winning streak against non-conference opponents. The 23-game streak tied the fifth-longest in school history.
- It was UNC's first home loss since 2/17/16 to Duke and the first loss at home to a non-ACC opponent since 12/3/14 against Iowa.
- It was just the 16th loss to a non-ACC team in the Smith Center in 214 games.
- Wofford out-scored UNC 16-8 in points off turnovers.
- Carolina shot 36.4 percent from the floor, its lowest since shooting 24.6 against Michigan State.
- Cameron Johnson made his Tar Heel debut and scored 10 points in 17 minutes. He made a career-high seven free throws.

UNC 86, OHIO STATE 72 (DEC. 23)

- Carolina improved to 3-1 in the CBS Sports Classic and 16-2 in New Orleans.
- Carolina became the fifth school to play 3,000 games (with Kansas, Oregon State, Washington State and Duke).
- Seven players made a three-pointer. It was the first time seven Tar Heels made 3FGs since 11/21/2012 vs. Chaminade.
- Carolina made 13 threes, including nine in 16 attempts in the first half when UNC out-scored the Buckeyes, 41-27.
- The Buckeyes did not have an offensive rebound until the 10:00 mark of the second half.
- Pinson tied his career high with 19 points and set a career high with 10 made free throws (in 10 attempts).
- Felton tied season highs with four three-pointers and a team-high five assists. He scored nine of his 12 points in the first half. He hit three consecutive three-pointers (nine straight UNC points) in a span of one minute and 35 seconds.

CAROLINA 73, WAKE FOREST 69 (DEC. 30)

- The Tar Heels closed on an 8-0 run to beat the Deacons, 73-69, in the ACC opener for both teams.
- Berry (16 points) hit a runner with 11 seconds to play for the lead and Williams iced the win with two free throws.
- Carolina held the Deacs without a point on their last four possessions.
- Carolina shot 39.7 percent from the floor. It was the first time since the 2017 national championship game the Tar Heels won when shooting under 40 percent from the floor.
- Wake Forest out-scored UNC 13-4 in points off turnovers.
- Maye led UNC with 17 points and 15 rebounds.

FLORIDA STATE 81, UNC 80 (JAN. 3)

- The loss snapped a seven-game win streak over FSU and was UNC's first in four games in Tallahassee.
- It was the closest margin of defeat by the Tar Heels against Florida State. It was the first one-point loss since a 74-73 Duke win on 2/17/16.
- Berry scored 28 points. He was 10 for 23 from the floor. The 23 field goal attempts were a career high and equaled the most ever by a Tar Heel in a game coached by Roy Williams.
- Berry missed a 10-footer in the lane with just under five seconds to play that could have given Carolina the lead.
- Florida State shot 54.5 percent from the floor in the first half and led 51-40 at the break.
- Williams scored 16 of his 18 points in the first half. Williams made 4 of 5 from three-point range in the first half, but was 0 for 6 from distance in the second.

VIRGINIA 61, UNC 49 (JAN. 6)

- Carolina scored 49 points, shot 29.6 percent from the floor and committed a season-high 19 turnovers that led to 25 points for the Cavaliers, the most an opponent has scored in three seasons.
- The loss was the fifth in as many games in Charlottesville for the Tar Heels.
- It marked the first time in the ACC era that UNC scored less than 50 points in consecutive games against an ACC opponent. Last year, in the second-to-last game in the regular season, the eventual national champions scored just 43 points in a 53-43 loss to Virginia.
- Carolina had season lows in fastbreak points (0), second-chance points (12), points off turnovers (3) and points in the paint (14).
- The 25 points off turnovers were the most by an opponent since Harvard scored 29 in the first round of the 2015 NCAA Tournament.
- Carolina made eight two-point field goals (fewest in the Roy Williams era), eight three-pointers and nine free throws.
- The Tar Heels trailed by only six points with 7:10 to play, but the Cavaliers out-scored UNC 7-1 (a Maye free throw) the rest of the game.
- Berry (17 points) and Williams (11) scored in double figures for Carolina.

UNC 96, BOSTON COLLEGE 66 (JAN. 9)

- It was UNC's 400th win in the Smith Center (now 400-69 in all games, 202-53 against the ACC).
- The Tar Heels came into the game ranked third in the country in rebounds and rebound margin and out-rebounded the Eagles 58-23.
- The 58 rebounds, 23 offensive rebounds and +35 rebound margin were season highs.
- Carolina grabbed 23 offensive rebounds; the Eagles had 15 defensive rebounds.
- Carolina scored 24 second-chance points, most since it scored 25 at Davidson on 12/1.
- Carolina had first-half scoring runs of 16-0 and 10-0 and a second-half run of 13-0.
- Carolina started with a different lineup for the first time since the second game of the season. Johnson made his first start as a Tar Heel (he started 34 games at Pitt).
- Maye had career highs in points (32), rebounds (18), field goals (13) and field goal attempts (20) and tied his career high with four three-pointers.
- The 32 points were the most by a Tar Heel in the Smith Center since Wayne Ellington had 34 against Maryland on 2/3/09.
- Johnson had his second career double-double with 14 points and 11 rebounds and he added five assists with no turnovers. He tied his career high with 11 rebounds.

UNC 69, NOTRE DAME 68 (JAN. 13)

- Berry made two free throws with 7.1 seconds to play and Notre Dame missed two shots, including one at the buzzer, in UNC's one-point road win.
- Notre Dame went ahead 66-60 with 5:58 to play after back-to-back three-pointers by Nikola Djogo, but the Tar

Heels held the Irish without another field goal.

- UNC out-scored Notre Dame, 9-2, over the final 5:57.
- Carolina held Notre Dame to just 34.8 percent shooting from the floor.
- Notre Dame grabbed 20 offensive boards, which led to eight more possessions than UNC.
- Maye led UNC with 18 points, 11 rebounds, three assists, three steals (tied his career high) and no turnovers.
- Pinson had 13 points, seven rebounds, four assists and no turnovers.

UNC 87, CLEMSON 79 (JAN. 16)

- Carolina extended its NCAA-record home winning streak over Clemson to 59 games. That is 23 games longer than the next-longest active streak (Marquette over Milwaukee).
- The Tar Heels shot 65 percent from the floor in the second half.
- All five Tar Heel starters scored in double figures for the first time this season.
- Clemson's 56 points in the second half were the most in a half against UNC this year. But the Tigers' 23 points in the first 20 minutes were the lowest in any half by an opponent.
- Carolina had 23 assists on 26 field goals (UNC assisted on 88 percent of its field goals).
- UNC's 15 made three-pointers equaled the fifth most in any game in UNC history and were the second most this season (16 vs. WCU).
- Carolina attempted 31 three-pointers, second most in the Roy Williams era.
- UNC shot 48.4 percent from three-point range, second highest in school history for at least 31 attempts.
- The Tar Heels took 31 of their 51 field goal attempts from three-point range. It was the first time in the Roy Williams era the Tar Heels attempted more three-point shots than two pointers (and did so by 11).
- It was the first time Carolina attempted more threes than twos since 3/18/03 vs. DePaul in the NIT. UNC took 28 threes and 27 twos.
- Clemson shot 61.3 percent from the floor in the second half. The Tigers missed their first attempt of the second half, then made 15 in a row, before finishing three for their final 15.
- Johnson tied his career high with six three-pointers and led UNC in scoring for the first time with a game-high 21 points. Johnson made six three against Syracuse at Pitt last year and made six threes against UNC at the Smith Center on 1/31/17.
- Pinson scored 12 points and led UNC with a game-high seven rebounds, a game-high six assists and a game-high three blocks.
- Berry did not make a field goal in the first half (0-5 FG, 0-2 3FG), but went four for seven from three-point range in the second half and finished with 17 points.

UNC 80, GEORGIA TECH 66 (JAN. 20)

- Carolina out-rebounded the Yellow Jackets, 46-25, including a 19-6 edge on the offensive boards.
- The Tar Heels scored a season-high 26 second-chance points (Tech had four).
- Carolina scored 22 more second-chance points than Tech, its largest scoring margin in that category this season (previous was 25-5 vs. Davidson).
- Pinson scored 11 points, tied his career high with 10 rebounds, and added four assists and three steals.
- Maye had a team-high 17 points and a game-high 11 rebounds.
- Berry was 3 for 17 from the floor, but made a career-high nine free throws (in 10 attempts) and tied his career high with eight rebounds.
- Manley tied his ACC scoring high (9).

VIRGINIA TECH 80, UNC 69 (JAN. 22)

- Carolina led 30-24, but the Hokies out-scored UNC, 15-2, to end the first half.
- UNC was 10 for 31 from three-point range. It was the second time in three games UNC attempted a season-high 31 three-pointers, the second-most in the Roy Williams era.
- Seven Hokies made three-pointers.
- Carolina was 5 for 5 from the free throw line, season lows for makes and attempts.
- UNC did not attempt a free throw in the second half until there was 3:35 left in the game.
- The Hokies out-rebounded UNC, 36-35. It was the third time this season the opponents had more rebounds.
- Berry and Maye both scored a game-high 23 points, but no other Tar Heel scored more than five points.
- Pinson tied his career high with eight assists, but took only two shots from the floor and two free throws and finished with four points.
- It was the first time this season UNC lost when Pinson had

five or more assists and the second time in 15 games when Pinson had more assists than turnovers.

- Carolina scored a season-low two points off turnovers, was out-scored 32-26 in the paint, and 11-4 on the break.

NC STATE 95, UNC 91 (OT) (JAN. 27)

- The overtime loss ended a 15-game win streak at home against ACC opponents, a 16-game streak when scoring 90 or more points and a 20-game streak when leading at the half.
- It was only the fifth time in 140 games under Roy Williams the Tar Heels lost when scoring 90 points.
- Carolina came into the game 15-0 when leading at the half and 8-0 when shooting 50 percent from the floor this year. UNC led 41-38 at the half and shot 52.8 percent for the game.
- It was just the sixth time in 203 games under Roy Williams the Tar Heel shot 50 percent from the floor in a loss.
- Carolina shot a season-low 55.0 percent from the free throw line The Tar Heels were 11 of 20, including 9 of 17 in the second half and overtime.
- NC State's Allerik Freeman became the first UNC opponent to ever go 7 for 7 from three-point range. Geoff Brewer of Florida State (2/24/95) and Jordan Swing of UAB (12/1/12) were 5 for 5, which were the previous best games by percentage against UNC.
- NC State made 15 three-pointers, the most by an opponent in the first 22 games. State's three-point percentage (.500) was also the highest.
- NC State scored 22 second-chance points and 22 points off turnovers.
- Three NC State players scored 20 or more points, the first time an opponent did that since Duke in 2010.
- Maye led all scorers with 31 points and added 11 rebounds.
- Pinson had career highs in points (22), rebounds (15), field goals (10) and field goal attempts (16). It was Pinson's second double-double in the last three games and third of his career.
- It was the first game this season Berry, Johnson and Williams did not make a three-pointer. The trio was 0 for 9 from behind the arc.

CLEMSON 82, CAROLINA 78 (JAN. 30)

- Carolina rallied from a 16-point deficit to tie the game at 74 with 2:05 to play, but the Tigers scored the next five points and held off the Tar Heels, 82-78.
- Clemson snapped a 10-game losing streak to UNC. The Tar Heels had won the previous four times in Littlejohn Coliseum.
- For the second game in a row, the opponents made 15 of 30 from three-point range (NC State and Clemson).
- Thirty three-pointers is the most threes made by the opponents in consecutive games in UNC history (previous was 29 in 1989-90 – 21 by Kentucky and eight by Colorado State).
- Clemson's first seven field goals to begin the game were three-pointers as the Tigers built a 21-9 lead.
- It was the first time opponents made 50 percent of their three-point attempts in consecutive games since 2014-15, the first time opponents made at least 50 percent in consecutive games in which they attempted 20 or more three-pointers since 1992 and the first time two opponents ever accomplished that in back-to-back games when attempting at least 30 threes in a game.
- Johnson scored a career-high 32 points and Berry scored 27 for the Tar Heels. The duo combined for nine of UNC's 10 three-pointers for the game and scored 39 of Carolina's 50 second-half points.
- Johnson and Berry scored UNC's last 29 points over the final 9:37 and 34 of the last 35 points over the final 12:53.
- Johnson tied his career high with six three-pointers.
- The Tigers shot 50 percent from three and 29 percent from inside the arc (9 of 31).
- Pinson strained his left shoulder as he was fouled while going for an offensive rebound 90 seconds into the game. He left the game and was unable to return.
- Carolina shot 29.4 percent (10 of 34) from the floor in the first half and 64.3 percent (18 of 28) in the second half.
- Clemson scored 22 second-chance points, which tied NC State for the most scored against UNC all season.

UNC 96, PITT 65 (FEB. 3)

- Carolina made more three-pointers (11) than the opponents (10) for the time in five games.
- Carolina scored 22 second-chance points. NC State and Clemson had scored 22 second-chance points in the last two games.
- Carolina had a 17-4 advantage in points off turnovers.

UNC had been out-scored in points off turnovers in seven of the previous eight games.

- It was the first game this season six Tar Heels scored in double figures.
- Maye scored a game-high 26 points and tied his career high with five assists.
- Pinson led UNC with 13 rebounds tied his career high with eight assists. He scored two points but accounted for 27 points on offensive rebounds and assists (18 on eight assists and nine on six offensive rebounds).
- Williams scored 15 points, most in five games since he had 15 against Clemson on 1/16. He had averaged 4.8 points in the previous four games.
- Brooks and Manley both scored 10 points. For both players, it was their ACC scoring high.

UNC 82, DUKE 78 (FEB. 8)

- Carolina overcame a 12-point deficit in the first half with a 27-8 run and held on for an 82-78 win over No. 9 Duke.
- Berry led all scorers with 21 points and had six assists and no turnovers.
- Williams and Johnson combined for 38 points and 10 three-pointers.
- Williams tied his career high with 20 points, tied his career high with six three-pointers (both at Stanford on 11/20/17) and tied the UNC record for 3FGs against Duke (with Hubert Davis in 1992).
- Johnson had a career-high 13 rebounds in his third career double-double. He had 18 points and made four three-pointers.
- Carolina tied a school record with only two turnovers (also against Fairfield on 3/13/1997 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in Winston-Salem).
- The two turnovers were the fewest in an ACC game by UNC (previous low was three against Virginia in the 1982 ACC final and at Duke on 2/24/1979).
- Entering the game, UNC and Duke were 1-2 in the nation in rebounds per game and 1-4 in the nation in rebound margin. Carolina out-rebounded the Blue Devils, 44-38, including 28-17 in the second half.
- Carolina had 20 offensive rebounds to 11 for the Blue Devils, and out-scored Duke, 12-7, on second-chance points.
- The 44 rebounds by the Tar Heels were the most by a Duke opponent this year (39 twice).
- The 20 offensive rebounds by the Tar Heels were the most against Duke this year (16 three times).
- UNC held Duke, the nation's highest scoring team, to 29 second-half points (second-fewest in a half by Duke this year).
- It was UNC's largest comeback win of the season. Duke led 40-28 with 6:15 to play in the first half.
- Carolina attempted a season-high 33 three-pointers, the most ever by a Roy Williams team in his 15 years at Carolina. The previous high was 32 vs. Mississippi State in Maui on 11/19/2012.
- The 33 attempts were the second-most in an ACC game in UNC history.

UNC 96, NC STATE 89 (FEB. 12)

- Carolina shot 78.1 percent in the second half, its highest percentage in a half in the Roy Williams era and the highest since shooting 78.9 percent on Jan. 8, 2000 (also in the second half against NC State).
- Carolina scored 61 second-half points, its most this season and most since it scored 65 in the second half at Florida State on 1/4/2016.
- NC State went on a 19-0 run over a 6:45 span in the first half. UNC was leading 28-18 before the Pack scored the next 19 points to lead 37-28 with 3:45 to play in the half. UNC countered with a 7-0 run to close the half trailing by two points.
- Carolina out-scored the Pack 22-7 on second-chance points. State scored 22 second-chance points in its win on 1/27.
- Carolina scored 21 fastbreak points, most since the Tar Heels had 21 against Western Carolina on 12/6/17.
- Carolina scored 60 points in the paint, including 40 of the 61 points in the second half.
- Maye scored a career-high 33 points and grabbed 17 rebounds.
- Maye made 15 field goals (in 22 attempts). He is the first Tar Heel to make 15 field goals in a game in the Roy Williams era (previous was 14 by Brice Johnson at Florida State on 1/4/2016).
- Maye scored 27 points in the second half, the most since Brice Johnson had 28 in the second half at FSU on 1/4/2016.
- Williams and Pinson combined for zero points in the first half and 22 (11 apiece) in the second.

- Williams made two second-half threes, including one with 1:13 to play that gave UNC an 88-83 lead.
- NC State shot 60 percent from the floor in the second half and 54.7 for the game. That was the highest percentage by an opponent in a game this season.
- NC State attempted 13 three-pointers, three fewer than any other opponent in the first 26 games.
- Carolina has won five in a row over NC State in PNC Arena.

GAME 27: UNC 83, NOTRE DAME 66

- Carolina took a 7-5 lead with 16:09 to play in the first half and kept the lead for the rest of the game.
- UNC led 38-34 at the half and built the lead to 10 (56-46) before an 11-2 run by the Irish cut the margin to one with 9:39 remaining.
- The lead was four with just under six minutes to play when the Tar Heels went on a 13-0 run.
- The Tar Heels shot 56.7 percent from the floor in the second half. It was the fifth time in the last six games UNC shot 50 percent or better (and fourth time at least 56.7) in the second half.
- Carolina shot 53.3 percent from the floor for the game, while Notre Dame shot 37.9 percent.
- Carolina out-rebounded the Irish, 42-29, including 12-10 on the offensive glass. At Notre Dame on Jan. 13th, the Irish out-rebounded the Tar Heels, 45-37, including 20-13 on the offensive boards.
- UNC out-scored Notre Dame, 14-6 on second-chance points. At Notre Dame, the Irish out-scored UNC, 18-17.
- Berry led all scorers with 21 points.
- Pinson had his third double-double in the last eight games with 16 points, a game-high 10 rebounds and a team-high five assists.
- Maye had eight points, eight rebounds and four assists. He had back-to-back assists on baskets by Pinson that increased UNC's lead from four to nine with five minutes to play. They were the first five points in a 13-0 run that pushed UNC's lead from 67-63 to 80-63.

UNC 93, LOUISVILLE 76 (FEB. 17)

- The 93-76 win was Carolina's fifth win in as many games, was its fifth in seven games against UL, and the first ever for UNC in Louisville against the Cardinals.
- Carolina scored 90 or more points for the 10th time this season (UNC is 9-1 in those games), the fifth time in ACC play this year and the third time in the last five games (96 vs. Pitt, 96 at NC State and 93 at Louisville).
- The 17-point margin of victory was the largest over Louisville in the KFC Yum! Center (this was Louisville's 148th game in the arena, which opened in 2010). The largest previous margins of victory by an opponent over Louisville in the Yum! Center were 16 points by Virginia on 1/30/2016 (63-47) and 2/6/2017 (71-55).
- The 93 points were the most scored against Louisville in any game since UNC beat the Cardinals, 93-84, on 11/24/2013, in Uncasville, Conn.
- The 93 points were the most scored by any opponent at Louisville since Charlotte scored 106 at Freedom Hall on 2/11/2001. The previous high for an opponent in the Yum! Center was 90 by Virginia Tech in a 94-90 UL win on 2/18/2017.
- The Tar Heels shot 51.4 percent from the floor in the second half. That was the sixth time in the last seven games UNC shot 50 percent or better in the second half.
- Carolina had 22 second-chance points. That was the third time in the five-game winning streak UNC had at least 21 second-chance points.
- Berry scored a game-high 23 points, tied his career high with eight rebounds and had four assists and a key blocked shot late in the game. The block was his 25th career block.
- It was Berry's 10th 20-point game this year and the 23rd of his career.
- Berry made five three-pointers. It was the second time this year and the seventh time in his career he made five or more threes in a game.
- Maye had his 14th double-double of the season with 19 points and 13 rebounds.
- Maye made a career high four steals, which are a season high for the Tar Heels.
- Pinson had 19 points, seven rebounds and five assists. UNC is 14-1 when Pinson has five or more assists.

UNC 78, SYRACUSE 74 (FEB. 21)

- Pinson scored a career-high 23 points. It was his second career 20-point game (22 at home vs. NC State on 1/27/18).
- Pinson was 2 for 2 from three-point range, the first time this year he made multiple threes in a game. He set his career scoring high on a three-pointer with 4:50 to play that

gave UNC a 74-66 lead.

- It was the second time in the last two seasons Pinson made two three-pointers in a game. The other time was on 2/22/17 against Louisville.
- Pinson was 9 for 12 from the floor. His percentage of .750 was the highest by a Tar Heel in a game this season (min. 10 attempts).
- Berry broke a 74-all tie with a steal and coast-to-coast layup. It was the third time this year Berry scored the game-winning points in an ACC game (Wake Forest and at Notre Dame).
- Williams led UNC with a career-high tying eight rebounds. It was the first time in his career Williams led UNC in rebounds.
- Manley scored 12 points, his ACC season high. It was his fourth game in double figures this year and second time in an ACC game (10 vs. Pitt).
- Carolina had 25 assists on 29 field goals. UNC assisted on 86.2 percent of its field goals, its second-highest percentage this year (88.5 percent in home win over Clemson).

MIAMI 91, UNC 88 (FEB. 27)

- Ja'Quan Newton's game-winning three at the buzzer was the first by an opponent since Kris Jenkins of Villanova in the 2016 national championship game.
- Miami shot 54.8 percent from the floor for the game, the highest by an opponent this season, and made 11 of 22 from three-point range.
- It was the second loss this season and just the seventh in 207 games under Roy Williams that the Tar Heels lost a game when they shot 50 percent or better from the floor. UNC shot 54.4 percent vs. the Canes.
- Miami scored 20 points off UNC turnovers. In the previous three games, Notre Dame, Louisville and Syracuse combined to score 18 points off Tar Heel turnovers.
- Carolina led 18-10. That was the largest lead in a loss this season. The previous was seven points in the home loss to Wofford.
- Carolina's point per possession was 1.11 (88 points on 79 possessions), the highest in a loss this season.
- Miami's points per possession was 1.18 (91 points on 77 possessions), the highest by an opponent in any game this season.
- Berry scored a season-high 31 points. It tied his career high (at Clemson on 1/3/17).
- Berry tied his season high with five three-pointers. It was the third time this season he made five threes (at Stanford and at Louisville).
- Pinson had 12 points and a career-high 11 assists. It was his first career double-double in points-assists and the first by a Tar Heel since Joel Berry II had 11 and 11 against Appalachian State on 12/21/15.
- Johnson scored 20 points. It was his eighth career 20-point game and his third as a Tar Heel.

DUKE 74, UNC 64 (MARCH 3)

- Carolina's 64 points were its fewest since a 61-49 loss at Virginia on 1/6.
- Duke's 74 points were the third-fewest by the opponents in a UNC loss this season (61 by Virginia, 63 by Michigan State).
- Carolina led by 13 points in the second half (42-29 with 17 minutes to play). It was the largest lead in a loss this season (previous was an eight-point lead over Miami in the previous game).
- Carolina's previous largest halftime lead in a loss was three at home against NC State.
- Carolina had four players score in double figures. This was just the third loss in 17 games when four or more Tar Heels score in double figures.
- Carolina shot 37.1 percent from the floor for the game, its lowest since shooting 29.6 percent in the loss at Virginia. UNC is 2-4 this season when shooting under 40 percent.
- Duke scored 25 points on 44 possessions in the first half. The Blue Devils' points per possession of .57 was the lowest by an opponent in any half this season (previous low was .60 in the first half by Western Carolina).
- In the second half, Duke scored 49 points on 42 possessions (1.17, which was the third straight game in which the opponents had better than 1.0 points per possession in the second half).
- Carolina had a points per possession of .81 in the first half, .67 in the second and .74 for the game, its lowest since the third game of the ACC schedule at Virginia (.63).
- Duke shot 60 percent from the floor in the second half, which tied the second-highest percentage in a half by the opponents this season.
- Duke out-rebounded the Tar Heels, 46-42. UNC is 1-3 this season when it is out-rebounded (losses to Michigan State, Virginia Tech and Duke, win at Notre Dame).

- Duke was 9 for 20 from the free throw line, while the Tar Heels attempted five free throws (made four).
- The four made free throws are a season low and the five attempts tie the season low (UNC was 5 for 5 at Virginia Tech).
- UNC was 0 for 1 from the free throw line in the second half. That was the first time UNC did not make a free throw in a half since losing at Northern Iowa on 11/21/15.
- Carolina attempted 31 three-pointers (made eight). That was the fourth time this season UNC attempted at least 30 three-pointers in a game (wins over Clemson and Duke, losses to Virginia Tech and Duke).
- Duke's 16 offensive rebounds were the third most against UNC this year (20 at Notre Dame, 18 at Tennessee) and the most in a UNC loss.
- Duke's 16 second-chance points were the most by an opponent since NC State and Clemson both had 22 in consecutive wins over UNC.
- Carolina matched its season low with four bench points (previously in the loss vs. Michigan State and win over Duke).
- Johnson led UNC with 16 points, the third time he has led UNC in scoring (twice against Clemson).
- Williams shared the team lead in rebounds with eight. That is the second time in three games (at Syracuse) he tied his career high and led UNC in rebounding.
- Berry scored six points, only the fourth time this season he did not score in double figures (win over Bucknell, losses to Michigan State, NC State and Duke). He came into the game averaging 21.1 points in the last eight games since he had six at home against NC State.
- Berry was 0 for 7 from three-point range, just the third time in 30 games this season he did not connect on a three (Arkansas, home vs. NC State). He came into the game averaging a school record 2.72 threes per game. It was the most three-point attempts without a make in his career (previously five attempts twice).
- Brooks scored all four of UNC's bench points in 11 minutes.

ACC TOURNAMENT SECOND ROUND

UNC 78, SYRACUSE 59 (MARCH 7)

- It was UNC's seventh straight win over Syracuse.
- Pinson had 16 points, 11 rebounds, six assists and two steals. It was the 21st time this year and 42nd time in his career he led UNC in assists.
- Carolina shot 52.2 percent from the floor in the second half.
- Syracuse scored 59 points (fewest against UNC this season), shot 31.7 percent from the floor (lowest vs. UNC this season) and had six assists (also a season low vs. UNC).
- Syracuse had 59 points on 81 possessions, a points per possession of .73, lowest by an opponent since Western Carolina (.71) and second-lowest all year (tied with Michigan State).
- Williams led UNC with 17 points. It was the first time this year and third time in his career he led UNC in scoring (Radford and Tennessee as a sophomore). Williams played one of his finest defensive games, helping to limit All-ACC guard Tyus Battle to 4 of 21 shooting from the floor for the game and one field goal in the second half.
- Carolina had a 13-2 advantage in points off turnovers and 15-0 in fastbreak points.

ACC TOURNAMENT QUARTERFINAL

UNC 82, MIAMI 65 (MARCH 8)

- The Tar Heels did not score for the first 7:09 and spotted the Hurricanes a 14-0 lead, then out-scored Miami 82-51 the rest of the game.
- Carolina missed its first 13 shots from the floor before Woods scored on a drive and three-point play with 12:51 to play in the first half.
- Robinson gave UNC its first lead at 19-18 with a three-pointer with 5:57 left in the half.
- The game was tied at 50 with 10:31 to play before the Tar Heels closed the game by out-scoring the Canes, 32-15.
- Pinson scored a career-high 25 points and added 11 rebounds, three assists and three steals. He was 9 for 12 from the floor.
- It was the first time a Tar Heel had at least 25 points and 11 rebounds in an ACC Tournament game since Joseph Forte had 27 and 12 against Georgia Tech in the 2001 semifinals in Atlanta.
- Pinson scored 19 of his game-high 25 in the second half.
- It was Pinson's sixth double-double in the last 14 games (he had one in his first 104 games).
- Pinson was 2 for 2 from three-point range. It was the third time (at Syracuse, Miami at home and Miami again) in the last five games he made two three-pointers. He had not made multiple threes in any of UNC's first 29 games

this season.

- Carolina missed its first 13 field goal attempts (seven of which were three-point attempts), then shot 50 percent from the floor over the final 13 minutes of the first half (11 of 22) and 50 percent in the second half (18 of 36).
- Miami, which shot 54.8 percent from the floor and 50.0 percent from three in beating UNC in Chapel Hill last week, shot 37.1 percent from the floor and 31.6 from behind the arc.
- Miami scored 20 points off 13 Tar Heel turnovers in Chapel Hill; in the quarterfinal, UNC turned it over eight times and the Canes scored just five points off those turnovers.
- Johnson had 13 points, seven rebounds, five assists and no turnovers.
- Maye was 1 for 15 from the floor, but had 13 rebounds. His two points were a season-low, but it was his 17th game with 10 or more rebounds and the eighth time he grabbed 13 or more boards.
- Maye and Berry were a combined 5 of 29 from the floor. Berry scored nine of his 11 points in the second half.
- Williams scored 11 and had a career-high three blocked shots.

ACC TOURNAMENT SEMIFINAL

UNC 74, DUKE 69 (MARCH 9)

- Carolina is 35-15 in the semifinals. Duke is second with 32 wins in the semifinals.
- Roy Williams is 8-4 in the semifinals as UNC's head coach.
- The win was Carolina's first over Duke in the ACC Tournament in seven games since the 1998 finals.
- This is the first year UNC beat Duke twice in the same season since 2009 and the first time UNC has beaten the Blue Devils twice when Duke was ranked in the top 10 since that same year (Duke was No. 9 on Feb. 8th and No. 5 in Brooklyn).
- Maye led UNC with 17 points and 10 rebounds (six offensive), his 16th double-double of the season, fifth most in the Roy Williams era.
- It was the 11th time Maye led UNC in both scoring and rebounding (first time since at NC State on 2/10). UNC is 10-1 when Maye is the leading scorer and rebounder.
- Pinson had eight points, which snapped his career-long eight-game double-digit scoring streak, but he had a game-high seven assists, the 22nd time this year he led UNC in assists.
- Carolina is 17-2 when Pinson has five or more assists (seven vs. Duke) and 21-4 when he has more assists than turnovers (was 7/2 vs. Duke).
- Pinson iced the win with a pair of free throws with three seconds to play.
- Berry scored 13 points, had six assists and three steals.
- Berry had one turnover in 37 minutes. UNC is 14-0 when Berry commits one or no turnovers.
- Carolina made a season-high 11 steals. Berry and Pinson each had three and Maye made two.
- Carolina out-scored the Blue Devils, 16-0, in bench points.
- Brooks scored 10 points. It was the fifth time this season he scored in double figures and the second in an ACC game (10 vs. Pitt).
- Brooks led UNC with eight first-half points. It was the first time Brooks led UNC in scoring in any half this season.
- Williams had a career-high six assists.
- Carolina had 24 assists on 28 field goals.
- Five Tar Heels scored in double figures; UNC is now 5-0 when five players score in double figures and 25-5 when three or more accomplish that (only two scored in double figures in the loss at Virginia).
- Five Tar Heels scored in double figures; four Blue Devils scored at all.
- Duke had a 40-39 edge on the boards. It was the second time this year UNC won when being out-rebounded (win at Notre Dame).
- UNC scored 21 points off 18 Duke turnovers. It was the Tar Heels' most points off turnovers since they had 24 at Florida State on Jan. 6th.
- Duke shot 26.1 percent from three (6 of 23), lowest by a Tar Heel opponent this year.
- Duke's six three-pointers marked the second game in a row the opponents made six.
- Carolina led 72-56 after a Maye field goal with 5:33 to play. The Tar Heels did not make another field goal. Duke closed to within 72-69, before Pinson's free throws with three seconds to play.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

VIRGINIA 71, CAROLINA 63 (MARCH 10)

- Carolina played in the ACC finals for the record 35th time, but dropped to 18-17 after an eight-point loss to No. 1 ranked and top-seeded Virginia.
- It was the eighth championship game for Roy Williams in his 15 years as UNC's head coach.
- Carolina led for only 54 seconds. UNC's last lead was at 5-2.
- Carolina attempted a season-low 49 field goals; the Cavaliers attempted 50, lowest all year by the opponents.
- Carolina scored 63 points on a season-low 66 possessions, but its points per possession of .95 was well ahead of its PPP in the loss at Virginia earlier this season (.63).
- Carolina's previous low for possessions was 75 at home vs. Notre Dame.
- Virginia scored 71 points on 65 possessions (1.09), the fewest possessions by an opponent all year. The previous low number of possessions was 68 at Virginia.
- Virginia shot only 12 of 33 (.364) from two-point range, but was 9 of 17 on three-pointers (.529) and 20 of 22 (.909) from the free throw line.
- Virginia led by 10 in the first half before the Tar Heels closed the half on a 6-0 run.
- Maye scored 15 of his game-high 20 points in the first half. The third-team All-America scored half of UNC's 30 points in the first 20 minutes.
- Virginia built a nine-point lead early in the second half, but Carolina pulled with 48-46 and had the bvall with a chance to tie or tale the lead with just over 11 minutes to play.
- ACC Tournament MVP Kyle Guy then scored six of the Cavaliers' next eight points to re-establish a seven-point advantage.
- Guy was one of four Virginia players to score in double figures.
- Both teams passed the ball effectively. Carolina had 15 assists on 20 field goals and committed only nine turnovers (had 19 in Charlottesville); Virginia had 15 assists on 21 fields goals and committed four turnovers, the fewest by a Tar Heel opponent this season.
- Virginia had a 10-3 edge in points off turnovers.
- Maye tied his career high with four three-pointers.
- Pinson led UNC with eight rebounds and six assists, but was 1 for 10 from the floor.
- Berry (17) and Williams (12) also scored in double figures for the Tar Heels.
- Carolina dropped to 13-19 in games against the No. 1 team in the AP poll. That includes 1-3 in ACC Tournament finals.

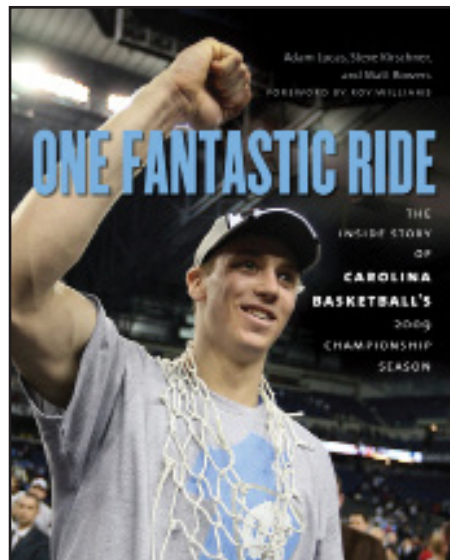
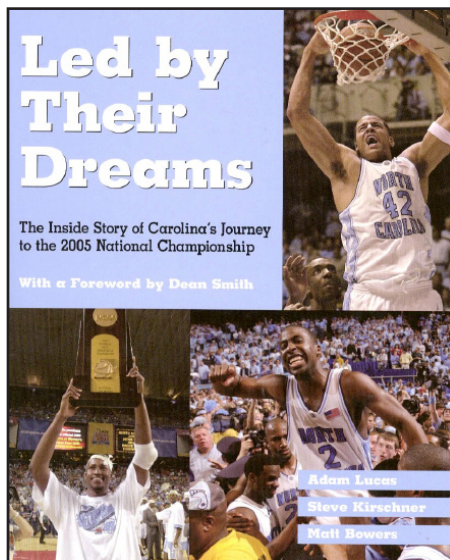

1957 NCAA CHAMPIONS

North Carolina's march toward the NCAA championship in the 1957 Final Four provided legendary head coach Frank McGuire with the defining moment of his career and the Tar Heel faithful with more than a few tense moments.

Battle-torn and weary, the Tar Heels faced a seemingly insurmountable challenge as they headed into the third overtime period against Kansas in the national championship game.

Having already taken three overtime periods to defeat Michigan State in the semifinals, the Tar Heels found themselves without national player of the year Lennie Rosenbluth, who had fouled out in the waning moments of regulation. They were playing a Kansas team led by Hall of Famer Wilt Chamberlain in the not so friendly confines of Kansas City, Mo.

The Tar Heels fought on without Rosenbluth and found themselves behind by one point in the final seconds of the third overtime. After a missed shot, the ball landed in the hands of junior center Joe Quigg near the top of the key. All that stood between him and the national title was Chamberlain.

Quigg drove the lane, drawing a foul from Chamberlain with six seconds remaining. After a Carolina time out, Quigg, a 72 percent free throw shooter, calmly stepped to the line and drained both shots, securing a 54-53 victory and Carolina's second national championship. Carolina finished the season a perfect 32-0 en route to the Tar Heels' first NCAA championship.

Rosenbluth had 20 points and five rebounds in the championship game and Quigg scored 10 points and garnered nine rebounds.

Carolina had its fair share of overtime experience entering the Final Four, securing an overtime victory over South Carolina and a double overtime victory over Maryland in the regular season.

That experience may have been the difference as the Tar Heels continually came through with clutch plays throughout the Final Four. In the semifinal, neither team was able to open more than a six-point lead as Michigan State tested Carolina's mettle throughout the game.

Junior forward Pete Brennan kept Carolina's championship hopes alive when he nailed a baseline jumper with three seconds remaining in the first overtime to extend the game to another period. Both teams struggled in the second overtime, scoring only one bucket each. Carolina finally pulled away in the third overtime period scoring the first six points and holding on to a 74-70 victory.

Rosenbluth was the star of the 1957 squad. His 27 points and 8.6 rebounds a game in regular season play led the Tar Heels to the ACC championship and the NCAA tournament berth. Four of the victories came over fellow Big Four and ACC team Wake Forest, with whom Carolina had developed an intense rivalry.

At the end of his senior season, Rosenbluth held on to every major Carolina basketball record except for free-throw percentage and total rebounds in a season.

The championship season was Carolina's only trip to the Final Four under the tutelage of Frank McGuire, who left in 1961 to coach in the NBA. He later went on to coach at South Carolina. In nine years, McGuire led the Tar Heels to three Top 10 finishes and six Top 20 finishes.

1982 NCAA CHAMPIONS

Every Carolina Basketball fan remembers "The Shot." It is the most famous play in Tar Heel history and one of the most famous in college athletics. It won Dean Smith his first national championship and launched Michael Jordan as the greatest player in the sport's history.

Eric "Sleepy" Floyd had just hit a jumper in the lane to give Georgetown a 62-61 lead as 61,612 fans looked on at the New Orleans Superdome. Carolina called a timeout with 32 seconds remaining. Smith instructed point guard Jimmy Black to draw the Hoya zone defense to one side of the court and look to get the ball inside to James Worthy. But Black couldn't get the ball to Worthy. Smith had designed the play so that if that happened, Black could swing the ball to an open man on the far side of the court. Black found that open man, freshman Michael Jordan.

Jordan stood 16 feet to the left of the basket. Catch-jump-shoot. No hesitation. The ball found the bottom of the net. Carolina 63, Georgetown 62. Fifteen seconds remained on the clock.

Georgetown's Fred Brown got the ball near mid-court and looked for an open teammate. He passed the ball in Floyd's direction, but instead found Worthy, who raced downcourt with the ball to seal the victory. It was appropriate that Worthy clinched the win, since he had already muscled and finessed his way through the Hoya defense en route to five dunks and 28 points.

Worthy was not intimidated by the tenacious defense of Hoya freshman center Patrick Ewing, who logged two blocked shots and three steals to go with his 23 points and 11 rebounds. Throughout the game, Worthy challenged the Hoyas frontline and hit 13 of his 17 field goal attempts.

Carolina advanced to the title game with a 68-63 semifinal victory over Houston. Sam Perkins had 25 points and 10 rebounds.

UNC began and finished the year ranked No. 1 in the country in the Associated Press poll. In fact, Carolina held the No. 1 ranking for all but five weeks in 1981-82.

The Tar Heels posted a 32-2 record, losing only to Wake Forest at home when Perkins was sick and did not play and at Virginia. Carolina did beat the Cavaliers, 47-45, in the ACC Tournament championship game in Greensboro. Worthy had 16 points and Matt Doherty had 11 points and four assists. Carolina led 34-31 at the half, but the game is most remembered for the Tar Heels using a delay game in the second half. Leading 44-43 with 7:34 to play, Carolina held the ball. Doherty

hit three free throws in the last 28 seconds to win the game.

Top-ranked and top-seeded Carolina then survived a scare from James Madison in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, beating the Dukes, 52-50, in Charlotte. A 74-69 win over Alabama and a 70-60 triumph over Villanova in Raleigh's Reynolds Coliseum sent the Tar Heels to New Orleans for the Final Four.

Senior guard Jimmy Black was one of five starters in double figures in the regional final win over Villanova. Black had 11 points and 10 assists.

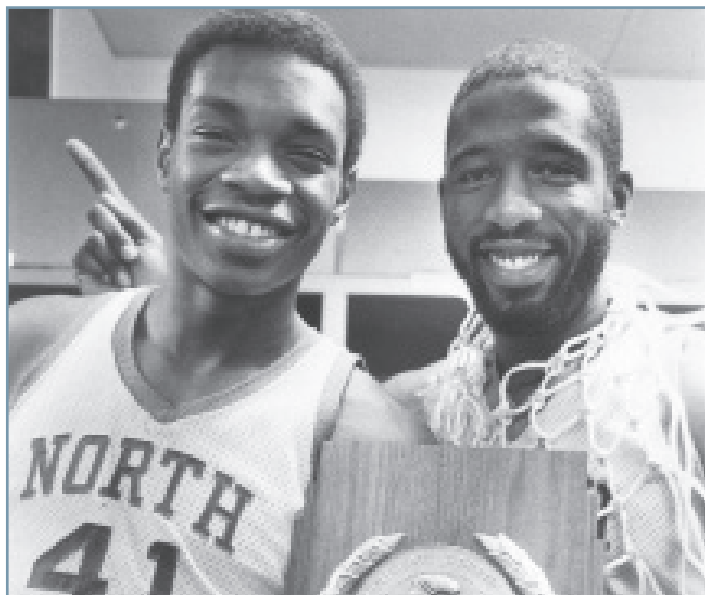
DEAN SMITH:

"We had three starters back from the year before, plus Matt Doherty, who I counted as a co-starter in 1981. Two of our best games all year were in New Orleans against Houston and Georgetown. Jordan had his best game as a freshman in the final, but Worthy was the obvious MVP. His play gets overshadowed because of Michael's shot. And Perkins was a true hero for his play against Olajuwon in the semifinals. He was sensational.

"The play was No. 1 to post up Worthy, then have Perkins come in behind him. Or you could go crosscourt to the wing for Michael and he was wide open from 17-18 feet. It looked good, I was right in line with him. Then we we put on our scramble defense. Worthy was out of position, but Jordan stopped the pass that made Fred Brown throw it away."

1993 NCAA CHAMPIONS

Dean Smith had been there before. The last time his Tar Heels walked on the Superdome floor, they walked off as NCAA champions.

Now, after a grueling ACC season that included five other Top 25 teams; after a tough road through the East Regional bracket that required an overtime victory to escape the final; after defeating a Roy Williams-coached Kansas squad that had beaten the Tar Heels just two years prior in the national semifinal—Carolina was back on the Superdome floor playing for the national championship.

The 1993 Tar Heels were ready. Center Eric Montross and senior forward George Lynch anchored the team and shooting guard Donald Williams provided the spark from the outside. Point guard Derrick Phelps ran the offense and a handful of role players brought everything together in typical Dean Smith fashion.

Michigan was ready too, though. The raucous Wolverines, led by vocal center Chris Webber and the rest of the “Fab Five,” had lost the championship game in 1992 and were hungry to redeem themselves. They won a hard-fought overtime battle against Jamal Mashburn and the Kentucky Wildcats in the national semifinal, 81-78, and were confident they would return to Ann Arbor with a championship.

The styles of the two teams couldn’t have been any farther apart. The Tar Heels were a traditional Dean Smith team — talented, disciplined and focused. The Wolverines had brought a brash, new feel to the game, famous for their black shoes, baggy shorts and playground style of play.

The teams battled back and forth throughout the game. Michigan led by 10 in the first half, but Carolina rallied for a 42-36 lead at intermission. The Wolverines built a 67-63 lead with 4:30 left to play, but the Tar Heels scored nine unanswered points to take a 72-67 lead with 1:03 to play.

Trailing by four, Williams began the 9-0 run with a three-pointer, then Phelps hit a fastbreak layup to give UNC the lead with 3:07 to play. Baskets by Lynch and Montross upped the lead to five with a minute to go.

Michigan responded with a Ray Jackson jump shot and a Chris Webber put-back to bring the Wolverines back to within 72-71 with 36 seconds to play.

Carolina junior forward Pat Sullivan was fouled with 20 seconds left and went to the line for a one-and-one. Sullivan connected on the first, but missed the second and Webber got the rebound with the Wolverines trailing 73-71.

Webber stumbled and appeared to travel, but the officials made no call. He then dribbled past halfcourt and found himself surrounded by the Tar Heels and called a timeout. However, Michigan did not have any timeouts remaining and the officials called a technical foul on the Michigan bench.

Williams hit two free throws and Carolina marched on to a 77-71 victory. It was only appropriate that Williams stood at the line at the end of the game, as he dominated the Final Four en route to Most Outstanding Player honors. Williams made five of seven three pointers and scored 25 points in both the national semifinal and championship games.

The Tar Heels finished the season 34-4, winning 18 consecutive games at one point. Carolina had even faced Michigan early on in the season at the Rainbow Classic and lost, 79-78, courtesy a last-second shot from Wolverine point guard Jalen Rose.

The 18-game win streak was snapped by a 77-75 loss to Georgia Tech in the ACC Tournament championship game. The Tar Heels played that game without Phelps, who injured his back when he was fouled from behind on a layup attempt in the ACC semifinal against Virginia.

Despite the loss to the Yellow Jackets, Carolina was No. 1 in the East Regional. Wins over East Carolina, Rhode Island and Arkansas set up a regional championship against Cincinnati in the Meadowlands. The Bearcats had played in the Final Four in 1992.

Nick Van Exel hit six three-pointers in the first half and the Bearcats built a 29-14 lead with 7:08 left in the opening half, but the Tar Heels rallied to pull within one at halftime.

In the second half, Phelps clamped down on Van Exel, limiting him to just one field goal.

Carolina led late in regulation, but Tarrance Gibson’s driving layup with 35 seconds to play tied the game. The Tar Heels had a chance to win at the buzzer, but Brian Reese’s dunk attempt after an out-of-bounds play with 0.8 seconds left ricocheted off the back iron.

Williams starred in overtime, hitting back-to-back three-pointers and the Tar Heels hung on for a 75-68 win.

Lynch was the heart and soul of the team and recorded double-doubles in each of the last four NCAA Tournament victories.

DEAN SMITH:

“We had a such great leader in George Lynch and our team had a lot of confidence. We were very poised. I know I had a lot of confidence in Derrick Phelps and Lynch. The last four games all were close games. Arkansas went down to the wire, Cincinnati we should have won in regulation, but won in overtime. Michigan was a great game with Donald Williams hitting key shots. So many of those games could have gone either way.”

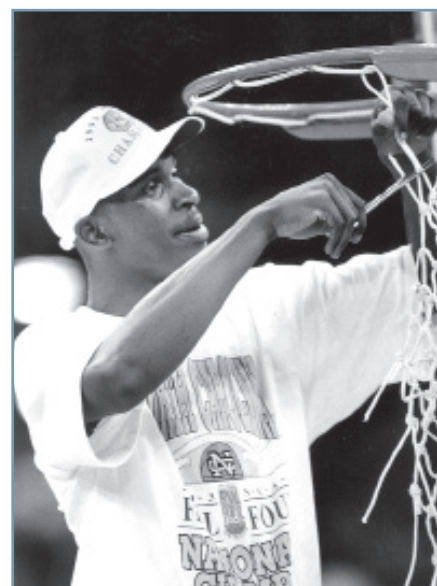

2005 NCAA CHAMPIONS

It began with an upset loss to Santa Clara and ended by beating No. 1 ranked Illinois in St. Louis. Along the way, the Tar Heels went 33-4, won the ACC regular-season title with a 14-2 record and defied the experts who said they were too selfish to win a national title.

Instead, led by seniors Jawad Williams, Jackie Manuel and Melvin Scott, and under the tutelage of second-year head coach Roy Williams, the Tar Heels became the best team in the nation. Carolina led the country in scoring and assists and held the opposition to 40 percent shooting.

Center Sean May arguably became the finest player in the country, racking up eight straight double-doubles and averaging 17.5 points and 10.7 rebounds.

Point guard Raymond Felton joined May on the All-ACC first team and won the Bob Cousy Award as the best point guard in the country. He led the ACC in assists and hit 44 percent from three-point range.

Carolina lost at Wake Forest and Duke, but clinched its first outright conference title since 1993 with a 75-73 win over the Blue Devils in the regular-season finale. May had 26 points and 24 rebounds and Marvin Williams capped a rally from nine points behind with a three-point play with 17 seconds remaining.

UNC survived a first round scare in the ACC Tournament from Clemson in large part thanks to Felton's career-high 29 points. But Georgia Tech bounced the Tar Heels from in the semifinals behind Will Bynum's 35 points.

Carolina earned a No. 1 seed and opened NCAA play against Oakland in front of a raucous crowd in Charlotte. UNC took out any lingering frustrations from the ACC Tournament in the first half, shooting 73 percent from the floor en route to a 59-33 advantage. Marvin Williams and Sean May combined for 39 points and 16 rebounds and Carolina opened its title run with a 96-68 win.

Iowa State was next in round two. Leading 36-33, UNC closed the first half with nine unanswered points. Iowa State never came within single digits in the second half. May had 24 points and 17 rebounds and Marvin Williams added 20 points and 15 boards.

Fifth-seeded Villanova gave Carolina a stern test in Syracuse in the Sweet 16. The Wildcats went to a four-guard offense and built a 21-9 lead midway through the first half behind Randy Foye's hot shooting. May scored 12 of UNC's 29 points as the Tar Heels clawed to within four at the break. UNC took the lead for good on a McCants three with 7:20 to play and extended its lead to 10 points with 3:45 remaining.

But Felton fouled out with 2:13 to play and the Wildcats pulled to within 64-62 with 40 seconds left. Scott, who took over the point, canned two free throws for a four-point lead. Villanova made one free throw and had a chance to tie, but Allen Ray was whistled for a travel with nine seconds to play.

May dominated the regional final against Wisconsin with 29 points and 12 rebounds. The game was tied at 44 at halftime, but UNC went on a 14-0 run early in the second half. McCants had a key block and three-pointer in the final three minutes to secure the win.

Michigan State led UNC by five at half-time in the national semifinals, but UNC outscored the Spartans, 54-33, in the second half to post an 87-71 win. May scored 22 and Jawad Williams had 20. The Tar Heels held Michigan State to 34 percent shooting.

No. 2-ranked Carolina squared off against top-ranked Illinois in the championship. The Illini had been ranked No. 1 since Dec. 6th. But the Tar Heels built a 40-27 halftime lead behind 14 points from McCants and eight points and six assists from Felton.

The Illini made 5 of 19 threes in the first half, but got hot and tied the game at 65-65 with 5:34 to play. Felton knocked home a long three moments later, but the game was tied again at 70 with 2:40 to play.

The Tar Heels took the lead for good with 1:27 to play as Marvin Williams tipped in a missed shot. Illinois missed a pair of three-pointers; then Felton stole a pass. Felton hit three free throws in the final seconds to give Carolina a 75-70 win and Roy Williams his first NCAA title. May, the Final Four MVP, had 26 points and 10 rebounds.

2009 NCAA CHAMPIONS



The Tar Heels began 2008-09 with lofty expectations as five starters returned from a team that won a school-record 36 games and a trip to the Final Four the previous year. Carolina was an unprecedented unanimous No. 1 pick in both the media and coaches' polls.

Injuries took an early toll on the championship hopes, however, as 2008 National Player of the Year Tyler Hansbrough, senior Marcus Ginyard and freshman Tyler Zeller all saw time on the injured list early in the season. Hansbrough would miss four games with a stress reaction in his leg and ankle sprain, Ginyard would play in only three games all year because of a stress fracture in his foot, and Zeller suffered a broken wrist in the second game that sidelined him for 23 contests.

The Tar Heels retained their top ranking through early January by winning their first 13 games, routing Kentucky and Michigan State and winning the Maui Invitational along the way. On December 18th, Hansbrough set the UNC scoring record, surpassing Phil Ford's mark against Evansville.

Carolina lost its first two games in ACC play to Boston College and Wake Forest.

The Tar Heels then won 13 of their next 14 games to capture the ACC regular-season crown with a 13-3 record. Ty Lawson knocked off Florida State with a buzzer-beating three-pointer, scored 21 second-half points in a 101-87 win at Duke, hit numerous clutch three-pointers in a close win at Miami and earned ACC Player of the Year honors. Lawson also earned first-team All-America accolades and won the Cousy Award as the top point guard in the country. He became the first point guard to be ACC Player of the Year in 31 years.

Lawson severely injured a toe two days before UNC's Senior Day win over Duke. He played in that game but was unable to play in the ACC Tournament as Florida State

knocked the Tar Heels out in the semifinals.

Carolina was a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament South Regional. Wayne Ellington began his stellar NCAA Tournament with 25 points and Carolina held Radford under 28 percent shooting from the floor as the Tar Heels overwhelmed the Highlanders 101-58 in the opening round. In the first half, Hansbrough set the ACC career scoring record, breaking the mark held by Duke's J.J. Redick.

LSU in the second round proved to be the most challenging test en route to the title. Carolina led by nine at the half, but the Tigers surged ahead by five points early in the second period. Lawson, who did not play against Radford and was a gametime decision to play against LSU, was spectacular. He scored 21 second-half points, leading Carolina to an 84-70 win. Lawson and Ellington scored 23 points apiece and Danny Green hit a key three-pointer to help UNC advance.

The Tar Heels dominated both games in the regional in Memphis, beating Gonzaga in the Sweet 16 98-77 behind Hansbrough's 24 points and 10 rebounds. In the regional final, UNC never trailed, toppling Player of the Year Blake Griffin and Oklahoma 72-60. Lawson earned regional MVP honors as Carolina shot 61.9 percent from the field in the second half against the Sooners.

The Tar Heels beat Villanova in the national semifinals, in which UNC was appearing for the third time in five years. Lawson had 22 points and eight assists and Hansbrough added his 47th career double-double with 18 points and 11 rebounds. The Tar Heels led 49-40 at the half, but the Wildcats closed to within five early in the second. That would prove to be the closest any opponent got to UNC in the second half of the last four NCAA Tournament games. Green hit a three, Lawson scored on a fast break layup and the lead shot back to double figures. That win setup a rematch with Michigan State, whom the Tar Heels beat 98-63 in December.

The championship game was all Carolina. Played in front of nearly 73,000 fans, most of whom wore Michigan State green, the Tar Heels scored 55 first-half points and led by 21 at the break, both NCAA records. Ellington scored 17 points in the opening stanza and earned Most Outstanding Player honors. Hansbrough added 18 points and Lawson dominated on both ends of the floor with 21 points, six assists and a championship game record eight steals. The game was never closer than 13 points in the second half as Carolina won, 89-72.

2017 NCAA CHAMPIONS



Three starters – point guard Joel Berry II and forwards Justin Jackson and Kennedy Meeks – returned from the 2016 team that came within seconds of winning a national championship.

The Tar Heels began the year ranked sixth in the nation and opened with seven straight wins, including a win over Wisconsin to win the Maui Jim Invitational.

Non-conference losses to Indiana and Kentucky (103-100 in Las Vegas in which Jackson scored a career-high 34 points) and a stunning ACC opening defeat at Georgia Tech dropped UNC out of the Top 10 heading into the

new year.

Carolina went 8-1 ACC play in January, highlighted by an overtime win at Clemson, a 107-56 trouncing of NC State and a 96-83 win over ninth-ranked Florida State.

The Tar Heels had four wins over Top-20 teams in their final eight regular-season games, including a 90-83 win over Duke in the regular-season finale when Berry went 5 for 5 from three-point range and scored 28 points. UNC went 14-4 in league play to win the ACC regular-season for the eighth time in the last 13 years.

UNC earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA South Regional and beat Texas Southern by 39 points in the first round. In the second round, UNC trailed Arkansas, 65-60, but out-scored the Razorbacks 12-0 over the final three minutes to win by seven. It was the largest come-from-behind win that late in a game by UNC in its NCAA Tournament history.

Berry and Jackson combined for 50 points and Luke Maye had 16 points and 12 rebounds in a 92-80 win over Butler in the Sweet 16 to set up a 1 vs. 2 seed matchup against Kentucky for the right to advance to the Final Four.

Jackson led all scorers in the regional final with 19 points, and Meeks grabbed a career-high 17 rebounds, but it was Maye, a sophomore who averaged about 13 minutes a game off the bench, who hit the winning shot and earned South Regional MVP honors.

Carolina led by five at the half, but the Cats pulled ahead by five with less than five minutes to play. The Tar Heels surged ahead by seven, but Kentucky's Malik Monk tied the game with just over seven seconds to play on a three-pointer.

Meeks quickly in-bounded the ball to Theo Pinson, who raced upcourt and pitched the ball to Maye, who sank a 19-footer with 0.3 seconds to play for a 75-73 victory. Maye finished with a career-high 17 points.

Carolina became the first team to play in 20 Final Fours. In the semifinals, the Tar Heels held on for a 77-76 win over Oregon behind 25 points and 14 rebounds by Meeks and 22 points by Jackson. UNC led the entire second half, but needed a pair of offensive rebounds by Pinson and Meeks in the last five seconds after missed free throws to secure the win.

In the championship game, UNC played

second-ranked Gonzaga, which came into the contest 37-1 on the season.

Berry had a game-high 22 points and six assists, Isaiah Hicks hit a key basket with 26 seconds to play and Meeks had an offensive rebound, block and steal in the final minute to lead UNC to the title. Carolina finished the season number one in the nation in rebounding, offensive rebounding and rebound margin, so it was appropriate that Hicks' basket came after an offensive rebound by Meeks. That basket gave UNC 20 second-chance points in the title game; the Tar Heels were 17-0 for the season when scoring 20 or more second-chance points.

The Tar Heels held their six opponents in the NCAA Tournament to 39.6 percent shooting from the floor.

Jackson earned consensus first-team All-America honors and was the ACC Player of the Year. He led the team in scoring at 18.3 points per game and set a single-season UNC record with 105 three-point field goals. Berry became the first player to score 20 or more points in consecutive national championship games (he had 20 against Villanova in 2016) since Hall of Famer Bill Walton for UCLA in 1972-73,

Jackson and freshman Tony Bradley were selected in the first round of the 2017 NBA Draft; Jackson was the 15th pick and Bradley the 28th.

Head coach Roy Williams became the first to win three national championships at his alma mater and joined John Wooden, Mike Krzyzewski, Bob Knight, Adolph Rupp and Jim Calhoun with three national titles.

ROY WILLIAMS: "One of the neatest things was how our players reacted after we had pretty much clinched the championship game victory over Gonzaga. It was a stunning moment. They had invested so much sweat, attention to detail, and love for each other that you could see the enormity of winning the championship just one year after losing in the last second. and it was overwhelming to them."

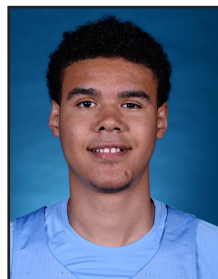

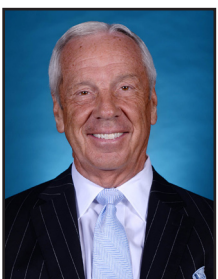
