TAR HEELS BATTLE TO FINISH BUT FALL IN 2018 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP GAME: The University of North Carolina's quest for a 23rd national collegiate title in women's soccer fell just short as the Tar Heels fell to fifth-ranked Florida State 1-0 in the national championship game on Sunday, December 2, 2018. Before a crowd of 12,512 fans at Sahlen's Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park, the third-ranked Tar Heels saw their season end with a record of 21-4-2 while Florida State won its second NCAA championship and finished 20-4-3.

The only goal of the game came at the 59:53 as Dallas Dorosy scored her seventh goal of the season assisted by Deyna Castellanos. Castellanos served a ball from the right side that Dorosy slid onto with her shot deflecting off UNC defender Lotte Wubben-Moy and sneaking inside the right post. UNC goalkeeper Samantha Leshnak appeared to have Dorosy's

shot covered as she went to her right to smother it. But the deflection sent the ball into the right side instead and that ended up being the only goal of the game.

Both teams took eight shots in the game with FSU outshooting UNC 6-2 in the first half and the Tar Heels outshooting the Seminoles 6-2 in the second half. UNC finished with five corner kicks while the Seminoles had one corner kick.

Samantha Leshnak made two saves for Carolina and Caroline Jeffers had two saves for the Seminoles. UNC's shots on goal came 56 seconds into the game by Alex Kimball and at the 71:59 mark by Madison Schultz. Perhaps Carolina's best chance to score came at 35:50 when a header by Rachael Dorwart off a Lotte Wubben-Moy corner kick went just wide of the left post.

After Dorosy's goal, UNC did not allow another shot in the game but the Florida State defense buckled down, allowing UNC only four shots over the final 30:07 and not conceding a tying

goal.

Game Notes:

- Sunday's match marked the final game for 10 Tar Heel seniors, including starters Alex Kimball, Dorian Bailey, Julia Ashley and Samantha Leshnak. UNC returns 20 letter winners in 2019 and will add an 11-member recruiting class that will be announced at a later date.

- Dorian Bailey, Julia Ashley and sophomore defender Emily Fox were named to the All-Tournament Team at the College Cup.

- The loss was only the 14th in NCAA

Tournament history for the Tar Heels who are now 131-14-4 in the event. The Tar Heels are now 21-4 in NCAA Tournament championship games. The other losses were to George Mason in 1985, Florida in 1998 and Santa Clara in 2001.

- UNC is now 7-1 all-time in NCAA College Cup games played at Sahlen's Stadium at WakeMed Soccer park.

- The game marked the 12th successive game UNC has played in Cary. The Tar Heels will move into their spectacular new UNC Soccer & Lacrosse Stadium next August.

- Anson Dorrance will begin the 2019 campaign with an all-time women's soccer coaching record of 847-74-40. The 2018 season marked his 40th as head coach.

- UNC senior defender Julia Ashley finished the season as UNC's leading scorer with 22 points. She is the first defender in history to lead the Tar Heels in scoring.

- UNC's 21 wins were the most since Carolina finished 23-3-1 in 2009.

- In 961 games in its history, the Tar Heels have been shut out just 55 times.

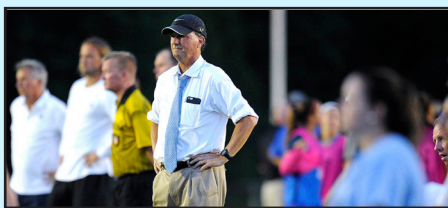


TAR HEELS ADVANCE TO 2018 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP GAME WITH OVERTIME WIN AGAINST GEORGETOWN:

It took 108 minutes but senior defender Julia Ashley scored off an assist by freshman forward Rachael Dorwart in double overtime to lift third-ranked North Carolina past second-ranked Georgetown 1-0 in the first NCAA College Cup semifinal match Friday night, November 30 before 10,439 fans at Sahlen's Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park.

North Carolina handed the Hoyas their first loss of the season as the Tar Heels advance to the NCAA championship game where it will play fifth-ranked Florida State Sunday at 1 p.m. at Sahlen's Stadium. The Seminoles defeated top-ranked Stanford, the defending national champion, 2-0, in Friday's second semifinal game.

The Tar Heel goal came on a counterattack after UNC defender Emily Fox chased



Head Coach Anson Dorrance
(40th year in 2018, 847-74-40 Overall, 22 National Championships) Head Coach Anson Dorrance finished his 40th season as the Tar Heels' head mentor in 2018. His teams have an all-time record of 847-74-40 (.902). Under Anson Dorrance, UNC has won 22 national championships, including 21 NCAA crowns and one AIAW title in his 40 years as head coach. UNC has won 21 outright regular-season ACC titles and shared another conference regular-season crown while capturing 21 ACC Tournament championships in his 40 years as head coach. During his tenure, Dorrance's teams are 209-26-11 in ACC regular-season games, 66-6-5 in ACC Tournament matches and 131-14-4 in NCAA Tournament games. UNC is 367-28-16 in home games in its history and 480-46-24 in games played on the road and at neutral sites. Under Dorrance, UNC has won 90.2 percent of its games overall, 87.2 percent of its ACC regular-season games, 89.0 percent of its ACC Tournament games, 89.3 percent of its NCAA Tournament games, 91.2 percent of its home games and 89.5 percent of its road and neutral site games. In the program's 40-year history, totaling 961 games, Carolina has shut out opponents 596 times and has been held scoreless in just 56 games. UNC has shutout its opponents in 62.0 of its all-time games.

dowa7ball on the end line after the Hoyas had made their first run deep into Carolina territory in the second overtime. Fox fed Ashley in the middle of the pitch and the senior defender started a brilliant counterattacking chance. Ashley fed freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto who returned the ball to Ashley. The senior tapped the ball to her right on to the foot of Dorwart who cleverly returned it to Ashley just inside the 18-yard box. One touch later Ashley buried her shot low into the left side past Georgetown goalkeeper Lauren Gallagher for the game-winner at 107:41.

In the first-ever meeting between the two teams, the Tar Heels improved to 21-3-2 on the season while the Hoyas suffered their first loss, dropping to 21-1-3. The first half arguably belonged to the Hoyas who outshot the Tar Heels 5-4 in the opening 45 minutes and had a 6-5 edge in corner kicks in the first period. But despite their slight edge statistically, the Hoyas put only one shot on frame in the first half, an effort by Kyra Carusa which was gobbled up by Samantha Leshnak at the 35:24 mark. Georgetown goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman, the United Soccer Coaches first-team All-America keeper, made two saves in the first half, stopping Dorian Bailey at 25:32 and

Rachael Dorwart at 42:58.

The game changed remarkably after intermission. In the second half, UNC outshot the Hoyas 8-4 while having a 7-0 edge in corner kick chances. In the first overtime, Carolina outshot Georgetown 3-0 while taking the only corner kick. And in the second overtime, the Tar Heels outshot the Hoyas 5-0 and had both corner kicks.

The Tar Heels pressed repeatedly in the second half with Schechtman making her third save of the game against Dorian Bailey in the 48th minute. In the 73rd minute, Fox had an opening from the 18-yard line but sent her shot high. The game then took a momentum swing in the 83rd minute when a shot by Dorian Bailey was blocked by the Georgetown defense. Schechtman ran to the end line to try to prevent a corner kick but fell awkwardly and had to leave the game. Lauren Gallagher came on in goal for Georgetown, playing in only her third career game.

Less than two minutes later, Madison Schultz was taken down in the penalty box and the Tar Heels were rewarded with a penalty kick but Gallagher soared to knock Taylor Otto's try from the 12-yard spot as the game remained tied at 0-0 with five and a half minutes to play.

Given the reprieve, the Hoyas got two shots from Caitlin Farrell in the final three minutes of play but neither try found the back of the net and the match went to overtime.

UNC had a chance to end it in the 93rd minute as Brianna Pinto was taken down just outside the penalty area. Dorian Bailey's free kick was blocked and her rebound effort went high. The Tar Heels also had a chance to end the game at 98:58 but Otto's open shot in the box sailed just wide of the left post.

The second overtime period clearly belonged to the Tar Heels and eventually they broke through for the game-winner. In the 102nd minute, Bailey's shot from close range was knocked down by Gallagher. The rebound bounced out to Schultz whose strike was cleared off the goal line at the last second by Georgetown's Meaghan Nally. On the ensuing corner kick, Ashley's header was saved by Gallagher before another shot by Schultz at 105:31 went wide left. It took just over two minutes after that for the Tar Heels to celebrate their victory as Ashley's sixth goal of the season ties her for the team lead with Brianna Pinto and Alessia Russo. She now has matched Russo's team-leading four game-winning goals in 2018.

UNC and Florida State will meet for the third time this season in the national final on Sunday. UNC won the regular-season meeting in Tallahassee on September 14 by a 1-0 score. The Seminoles defeated the Tar Heels 3-2 in the ACC Tournament championship game on November 4 on the same field at Sahlen's Stadium. Carolina leads the all-time series against the Seminoles 28-9-4.

FIVE FORMER TAR HEELS PLAY ON 2019 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP CHAMPION TEAM:

The United States won its fourth World Cup title in history on Sunday, July 7 as it defeated the Netherlands 2-0 in the championship game in Lyon, France. The USA has won World Cup titles in 1991, 1999, 2015 and 2019.

The winning U.S. Team featured five former Tar Heel players - forward Tobin Heath (UNC Class of 2010), forward Jessica McDonald

Heath and Dunn were starters on the 2019 U.S. World Cup team. Heath and Harris also won World Cup titles for the U.S. in 2015. Long, McDonald and Dunn all won World Cup titles for the first time.

Sarina Wiegman (UNC Class of 1993) was the head coach of the Dutch team that reached the World Cup final. Lucy Bronze (UNC Class of 2013) started at right back for the England team which finished fourth. She won the Silver Ball as the tournament's second most outstanding player. She also played for England in the World Cup in 2015.

Katie Bowen (UNC Class of 2016) played in her second World Cup for New Zealand. She also played for the Football Ferns in 2015).

RECORD 405 TAR HEELS NAMED TO 2018-19 ACC ACADEMIC HONOR ROLL: A record 405 North Carolina student-athletes were named to the Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll. It marks the fourth year in a row that UNC has established a new high and the first time that more than 400 Tar Heels have been named to the list.

The ACC Honor Roll is comprised of student-athletes who participated in a varsity-level sport and registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year. The conference recognized a record 4,769 student-athletes for their hard work in the classroom during the 2018-19 school year.

The number of UNC students honored for 2018-19 is more than half of Carolina's total number of student-athletes and is an improvement of more than 100 student-athletes over the past decade.

It's the seventh year in a row that more than 300 Tar Heel student-athletes have earned the recognition. The Tar Heels ranked fourth among conference schools in total number of student-athletes honored, second among public schools. Duke led the way with 519 honored, followed by Notre Dame (460) and Virginia (427) ahead of UNC.

Forty-two UNC student-athletes were honored for a fourth time. They included Dorian Bailey (women's soccer) and Nicole Crutchfield

BRONZE NAMED TO 2019 ENGLAND

WORLD CUP TEAM: Increase the number to seven for the number of former University of North Carolina women's soccer players headed to France in June to play for their countries in the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup. The England roster was named on May 6.

Lucy Bronze, who plays for England, became the seventh former Tar Heel named to a roster for the 2019 tournament which will be held in June and July in France. Bronze played for the Tar Heels in 2009, leading Carolina to a national championship that season. She played for England in the 2015 World Cup in Canada and was named to the All-Tournament Team at the event.

She has been a member of the England full national team since 2013 with 66 caps and six goals scored. She plays professionally for French club Olympique Lyon and plays primarily at right back. She won PFA Women's Player's Player of the Year awards in 2014 and 2017 and in 2018 she was tapped as the BBC Women's Footballer of the Year.

She previously played for Sunderland Women, Everton, Liverpool, Manchester City and the North Carolina Tar Heels.

Dorrance on Bridgette in 2018: Bridgette is having a fine soccer career at the University of North Carolina. She was an All-America as a freshman. She was our leading scorer as a sophomore. She is extraordinarily athletic. She possesses world class agility. She's got good speed and quickness. She has a good skill set. If she decides to commit herself to game she can write her ticket. Her key to becoming successful at the higher levels, because she'd like to have an invitation to the U23 National Team, will be based on her consistent ability to create goals and finish them, which will entirely be based on her time with the ball in the summer. She can play midfield but she will spend 80 percent of her time up top for us.

She was a valedictorian at Carrboro High School. Her academic status continues to impress. All of us, certainly myself, want her to be more of a leader. I want her to work her way on to the travel roster. As far as a young woman of character who takes her academics very seriously but is also going to contribute for us in practice, she is an absolute jewel and I love having her.

Dorrance on Julia in 2018: Julia is a coach's dream. She came in as a hard-working player and all she did was work even harder. She really wants to be the best. She's had opportunities now at the U23 level and I am very proud of her for that because her partner in the defense when she was growing up was a kid who was recruited by Stanford that for most of Julia's life that kid was considered a much better player. But Julia has worked herself to death and now Julia is on the U23 Team and this other kid is not. That's indicative of how hard Julia works. She's a fabulous leader. She's not afraid to hold people accountable which is very rare in women's athletics. Even the great players are reluctant to hold teammates responsible but I really respect Julia's strength as well as her leadership qualities, her heart, her hard-working nature and also her aerobic capacity. Her aerobic capacity is amongst the best in history at the University of North Carolina. I think she turned down a track scholarship at Duke to come here to play soccer for us and you can see the track star in her because she is absolutely relentless and so hard-working on the field. She's an absolute joy and I am so glad we have her for another season.

Dorrance on Dorian in 2018: Dorian Bailey along with Taylor Otto and Alessia Russo is up there as a potential team MVP. She made a huge jump this past season. Coming into our program she hadn't made a jump quality wise but what she did her freshman year was remarkable but then she got hurt. Before the Louisville game in her freshman year when she got hurt we were undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the country. She was why we were so good. Then she got hurt and our season basically just went downhill. In 2016, she did not have a great year. In fact, in 2016 she was starting for me early in the year and Annie Kingman put her on the bench. This past year she started out good but not great and she just got better and better and better while coming off the bench. She was essentially a starter who came off the bench because of the substitution rules in the first half. Dorian has the athletic and human character to embrace a role like that. After Emily Fox got hurt Dorian went into the starting lineup and she ended up with a phenomenal junior year to her credit. The three players who I would rank as the top three players on the team are Alessia Russo at forward, Dorian Bailey in midfield and Taylor Otto on defense. I think the team may have voted Alessia as the MVP last year but I would still put the three of them in the same category as the best players on the team. Dorian's qualities are that she is very good technically and very good tactically. Her issue at first in 2016 was certainly defensive presence. She has corrected a lot of that and it is still a concern but if she addresses that she could have just a wonderful senior year for us as one of our best players.

WORLD CUP ROSTER: Katie Bowen, a 2016 alumna of the University of North Carolina and decorated member of Tar Heel teams from 2012-15, was named to the New Zealand National Team that will compete in the 2019 Women's World Cup in France on April 30.

Bowen, an Auckland native, played four years at Carolina as a defender and midfielder. She helped lead the Tar Heels to the 2012 NCAA championship as a freshman.

This will be Bowen's second World Cup appearance for New Zealand. She was also on the 2015 team which played in the World Cup in Canada. Bowen also played for the Football Ferns, as the New Zealand women's national team is known, in the 2016 Olympic Games in Brazil.

Bowen is one of 23 players on the New Zealand World Cup Team. She currently plays for the Utah Royals of the National Women's Soccer League.

Bowen has a total of 59 caps all-time with the Football Ferns, scoring three international goals in her career as a defender.

TAR HEELS ANNOUNCE 2019 REGULAR

SEASON SCHEDULE: Head coach Anson Dorrance and the University of North Carolina women's soccer program announced the Tar Heels' 2019 schedule on April 30. The docket will feature eight home games at UNC's new Soccer Stadium on the Tar Heel campus in Chapel Hill as well as seven true road programs and three neutral site contests.

Carolina was 21-4-2 overall and 10-0 in the ACC in 2018. The Tar Heels won the ACC regular season title and was a finalist in both the ACC and NCAA Tournaments.

UNC will play host to Indiana on Thursday, August 22 at 6:30 p.m. in the first game in Carolina's sparkling new Soccer and Lacrosse Stadium which is located on the same spot as Fetzer Field which served as the team home from 1979-2016. On Sunday, August 25, UNC will host Duke in a regular-season non-conference game at the new facility with a start time of 6 p.m. Since Wake Forest is not in the normal 10-game ACC rotation for the Tar Heels in 2019, Carolina will host the Demon Deacons in a non-conference game at UNC Soccer Stadium on Thursday, September 12 at 7 p.m.

Other non-conference opponents include Washington and Portland in the Husky Invitational in Seattle, Wash., and LSU and UNLV in the Duke Nike Classic in Durham, N.C. Carolina's last non-conference game of the season will be played at Arkansas on Sunday,

Carolina's home opponents in ACC play will include NC State, Notre Dame, Clemson, Florida State and Virginia Tech. Last season, UNC played Clemson twice and faced Florida State and Virginia Tech three times each.

The road schedule in the conference for the Tar Heels will include Louisville, Duke, Pittsburgh, Boston College and Miami.

The 2019 ACC Tournament will feature quarterfinal games at campus sites followed by the semifinals on November 8 and the final on November 10 at WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, N.C.

The first four rounds of the 2019 NCAA Tournament will be played at campus sites in the 64-team tournament. The NCAA College Cup will be played at San Jose, California on December 6 for the semifinal games and December 8 for the championship game. This will mark the NCAA College Cup's fourth trip to San Jose. It was also played there in 1999, 2000 and 2016. Carolina has played in all three previous College Cups played in the California city.

ALL-ACC ACADEMIC TEAM: Seven Tar Heels earned spots on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Team for women's soccer, announced January 31 by the league office. Dorian Bailey, Rachael Dorwart, Emily

Fox, Morgan Goff, Rachel Jones, Brianna Pinto and Lotte Wubben-Moy were selected for the team, which takes into account both athletic and academic performance.

UNC, which won the ACC regular-season title and finished as the NCAA runner-up, led the league with seven selections.

Bailey, a midfielder from Mission, Kan., graduated from UNC in December with a degree in exercise and sport science.

Dorwart, a freshman forward from Mechanicsburg, Pa., is majoring in exercise and sport science.

Fox, a sophomore defender from Ashburn, Va., is majoring in global studies.

Goff, a junior defender from Dunn, N.C., is majoring English and comparative literature

Jones, a freshman forward from Lawrenceville, Ga., is majoring in public policy.

Pinto, a freshman midfielder from Durham, N.C., has not yet declared a major.

THREE TAR HEELS SELECTED IN 2019

NWSL DRAFT: Three members of the North Carolina women's soccer team were selected in the 2019 NWSL College Draft Thursday, January 10 at McCormick Place in Chicago. Defender Julia Ashley and midfielder Dorian Bailey were taken in the first round, with midfielder Alex Kimball tabbed in the fourth round.

Ashley, who had six goals and 10 assists as a senior, was the No. 6 overall pick to Sky Blue FC. A native of Verona, New Jersey, Ashley was a tri-captain for UNC who started all 27 games in 2018, earned second-team All-ACC honors and scored the game-winning goal in the College Cup win over Georgetown.

Bailey, a Mission, Kansas, product, was taken eighth overall by the Washington Spirit. A third-team All-ACC pick, Bailey also started all 27 games for the national runners-up and tallied five goals and three assists on the year.

A native of Chapel Hill, Kimball was picked with the fifth pick of the fourth round by Utah Royals FC. After missing the entire 2017 season due to injury, Kimball capped her Carolina career with four goals and two assists last fall.

HAMM NAMED WINNER OF PRESTIGIOUS 2019 NCAA SILVER ANNIVERSARY AWARD:

University of North Carolina women's soccer great Mia Hamm, UNC Class of 1994, was named a recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for 2019 on December 13, 2018. The Silver Anniversary Awards are given each year by the NCAA to recognize six distinguished former student-athletes on their 25th anniversary as college graduates.

The Silver Anniversary Awards were first given in 1973, when five distinguished former student-athletes were honored. In 1986, the number of annual honorees was increased to six. Hamm

will receive her award at the organization's annual convention in Orlando Fla., on January 23, 2019.

In order to be eligible, the nominee must be a college graduate and a varsity letter-winner at an NCAA member institution and must have achieved personal distinction since his or her graduation. The selection criteria are weighted 40 percent to the nominee's status as a prominent collegiate athlete and 60 percent to the nominee's career achievement.

"Mia's extraordinary exploits on the field are well documented and legendary but she is so much deeper than her athletic resume," says UNC women's soccer coach Anson Dorrance, who coached Hamm at the collegiate level from 1989-93. "Mia represented the best of selflessness and team above individual. She is so deserving of this honor."

Hamm will be honored with the other 1994 college graduates who are Silver Anniversary Award honorees – fencer Tim Cullen of Air Force, wrestler David Hirsch of Cornell, basketball player Lisa Leslie of USC, football player Heath Shuler of Tennessee and baseball player Jason Varitek of Georgia Tech.

ASHLEY & PINTO NAMED TO TOP

DRAWER SOCCER POST-SEASON TEAMS:

Senior defender Julia Ashley of Verona, N.J. and freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto of Durham, N.C., were honored with post-season awards by Top Drawer Soccer December 12.

Ashley was tapped for the Top Drawer Soccer Best XI first team while Pinto was selected for the Top Drawer Soccer Freshman Best XI squad.

Ashley started all 27 games for the NCAA finalist Tar Heels in 2018, leading UNC in scoring with 22 points, assists with 10 and minutes played with 2,404. She shared the team lead in goals with six and in game-winning goals with four.

After missing the opening game of the season while playing with the U.S. U20 National Team at the 2018 FIFA World Cup, Pinto played in all remaining 26 games, starting 25. She was Carolina's second-leading scorer with 20 points and was second on the team in assists with eight. She shared the Tar Heel team's lead in goals scored with six.

DORRANCE SIGNS CONTRACT

EXTENSION THROUGH 2023: Twenty-two

time national champion and Hall of Fame women's soccer coach Anson Dorrance has signed a five-year contract extension with the University of North Carolina, Director of Athletics Bubba Cunningham announced December 19, 2018. Dorrance, who recently led Carolina to the 2018 NCAA Tournament title game and two College Cup appearances in the past three years, is signed through 2023.

UNC has signed or is announcing:

- contracts and/or contract extensions with a dozen head coaches, including Dorrance's extension, which runs through the 2023 season;
- personal service contracts for head coaches with Nike;
- a 10-year extension with Nike;
- and a 12-year extension with Learfield Communications.

All of the contracts, and a licensing agreement and labor standards agreements with Nike, are available on GoHeels.com.

announce contracts and extensions for 12 head coaches, particularly when you have as accomplished a group as we are fortunate to work with here at Carolina," says Cunningham. "These 12 coaches include eight who have won 38 national championships, and are dedicated to winning in the classroom and our community.

"We're also pleased to highlight today the financial impact our partnerships with Nike and Learfield have on our ability to provide opportunities for nearly 800 student-athletes and the positive impact those relationships have on our campus as a whole."

Carolina's 10-year contract calls for Nike to remain the Tar Heels' exclusive supplier of athletic footwear and apparel through June 2028. It is the third extension of a partnership that began in 1993.

As part of the contract, a minimum of \$600,000 per year — at least \$6 million over the life of the contract — is guaranteed for licensing, which the University directs for need- and merit-based scholarships. That's more than doubling the licensing guarantee of the previous contract with Nike. In addition, the University will receive \$200,000 per year in retail product for non-athletic department use, and Nike will hire four student interns each year.

"We're pleased to continue this long-standing partnership with Nike, which goes well beyond the direct benefits it provides to nearly 800 student-athletes each year," says Chancellor Carol L. Folt. "This extension makes even more funds

and opportunities available to benefit our students in areas ranging from scholarships to internships and helps Carolina students across our campus."

In an accompanying "Agreement Regarding Labor Standards and Corporate Social Responsibility," the University and Nike also have again affirmed their commitment to fair labor practices.

Nike also has increased the amount of product — primarily uniforms, shoes and practice gear — it provides to Carolina Athletics. Additional funds will be used to support women's sports initiatives, contracts and travel for international competition. All told, the value of the Nike contract exceeds \$10 million per year.

"This contract isn't just about supplying uniforms and equipment, but also about supporting student scholarships, internships and opportunities for the University of North Carolina," says Cunningham. "We are proud to extend our relationship with Nike and pleased that this agreement will help so many students."

Carolina also extended its multi-media rights partnership with Learfield through June 2029. The Jefferson City, Mo.-based company has managed UNC's radio broadcasts, coaches' shows, digital media productions and venue signage since 1999. The 12-year contract has an average guaranteed value of \$12.6 million per year.

"Our partnership with Learfield is an important part of our organizational culture, and we are excited about the continued ideas and opportunities this agreement will bring to

"I am looking forward to this mutual commitment to the future of the North Carolina women's soccer program between the University and myself," said Dorrance. "I feel as energized as I have ever been coming off a tremendous 2018 season and I look forward into moving into our new stadium next fall. Our program continues to succeed at the highest level and my staff has a huge role in that. We are already looking forward to the 2019 campaign."

Dorrance recently completed his 40th season as the Tar Heels' head mentor. His teams have an all-time record of 847-74-40 (.903). Under Dorrance, UNC has won 22 national championships, including 21 NCAA crowns and one AIAW title in his 40 years as head coach. UNC has won 21 outright regular-season ACC titles and shared another conference regular-season crown while capturing 21 ACC Tournament championships in his 40 years as head coach.

During his tenure, Dorrance's teams are 209-26-11 in ACC regular-season games, 66-6-5 in ACC Tournament matches and 131-14-4 in NCAA Tournament games. UNC is 367-28-16 in home games in its history and 480-46-24 in games played on the road and at neutral sites. Under Dorrance, UNC has won 90.3 percent of its games overall, 87.2 percent of its ACC regular-season games, 89.0 percent of its ACC Tournament games, 89.8 percent of its NCAA Tournament games, 91.2 percent of its home games and 89.6 percent of its road and neutral site games. In the program's 40-year history, totaling 961 games, Carolina has shut

out opponents 596 times and has been held scoreless in just 56 games. UNC has shutout its opponents in 62.0 of its all-time games.

Dorrance is one of five UNC head coaches who have (or will have) personal service contracts with Nike, along with Roy Williams (men's basketball), Mike Fox (baseball) and Sylvia Hatchell (women's basketball). Mack Brown (football) will also sign a personal service contract with Nike.

The University's contracts with Brown, Fox, Hatchell and Williams also include compensation that originated from Learfield for work with Carolina's multi-media rightsholder. The Nike contracts and compensation from Learfield are approved by Chancellor Carol Folt and Cunningham.

In addition to signing a contract extension with Dorrance, Cunningham is announcing contract extensions for Williams, Fox, Jenny Levy (women's lacrosse), Brian Kalbas (women's tennis), Sam Paul (men's tennis) and Carlos Somoano (men's soccer), who each re-signed through 2023; Coleman Scott (wrestling) re-signed through 2021; and Karen Shelton (field hockey) re-signed through 2020.

Also, Joe Breschi (men's lacrosse), Donna Papa (softball) and Joe Sagula (volleyball) signed multi-year contracts for the first time; each signed five-year contracts through 2023.

The 12 coaches who signed new contracts or extensions, which were also approved by the Board of Trustees, have a combined 276 years of experience as head coaches at Carolina.

I am very excited to have a goalkeeper of her caliber coming in. She's wonderful in the air, just like someone rebounding a basketball. She can read the flight of a ball. Her hands are good. She's a coach's dream and I am hoping she comes back at the level she was at when she got injured last year because if she does she's going to have a wonderful season for us.

FOUR TAR HEELS CALLED INTO ROSTERS FOR U.S. U20 FRIENDLIES: The United States Under-20 Women's National Team will begin its new cycle as 20 players come together for the 2018 Women's Nike International Friendlies. The announcement was made December 5, 2018.

The 20-player roster for the event includes four Tar Heel players. Two of them - goalkeeper Claudia Dickey of Charlotte, N.C. and midfielder Brianna Pinto of Durham, N.C. - just completed their freshman seasons at UNC, leading UNC to a 21-4-2 record, an ACC regular season championship and finalist positions in the ACC Tournament and NCAA Tournament.

Two more members of the team signed National Letters of Intent with Carolina last month and will join the Tar Heel team in 2019. They are both defenders who play for the North Carolina Courage Academy - Maycee Bell, a native of Wichita, Kan., and Tori Hansen, who hails from Raleigh, N.C.

This year's tournament will feature three teams - France and China PR along with the USA. The U.S. will take on France on Dec. 7 and China PR on Dec. 9, with both games set to kick off at 6:30 p.m. ET. China will face France on Dec. 11 at 3 p.m. ET. All the matches will take place at the Premier Sports Campus and the USA's two games will be streamed live on ussoccer.com, Facebook, Twitter and YouTube.

Keri Sarver will coach the U.S. team and has called up a mixture of college and youth club players who were born in 2000, 2001 and 2002. Players born on or after January 1, 2000 are age-eligible for the 2020 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup.

Two players return from the USA's 2018 FIFA U-20 WWC team: midfielder Brianna Pinto and forward Alexa Spaanstra. Pinto has earned 25 caps and scored three goals for the U-20s, while Spaanstra has made four appearances and netted once last cycle.

Both players just completed stellar freshman college campaigns at North Carolina and Virginia, respectively. Pinto helped the Tar Heels to the 2018 College Cup Final, scoring six goals and adding eight assists alongside U-20 WNT goalkeeper Claudia Dickey, while Spaanstra led UVA in scoring with nine goals and also notched six assists playing on the front line for the Cavaliers with U-20 teammate Rebecca Jarrett.

In 2018, seven players on the roster saw time with the U.S. U-18 WNT, nine logged minutes with the U.S. U-19 WNT and four took the field with the U.S. U-17 WNT, but no players on this roster were on the USA's 2018 U-17 Women's World Cup Team.

THREE TAR HEELS NAMED UNITED SOCCER COACHES ALL-AMERICAS IN

2018: Three members of the University of North Carolina's women's soccer team were named November 29 to the All-America Teams named by United Soccer Coaches, formerly the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Sophomore forward Alessia Russo of Kent, England was named to the first-team squad while senior defender Julia Ashley (Verona, N.J.) and sophomore midfielder Taylor Otto (Apex, N.C.) were named to the third team.

Russo is the first Tar Heel named to the first-team All-America Team since Crystal Dunn in 2013.

All three players were named earlier this week to the United Soccer Coaches All-Atlantic Region Team first-team squad.

RUSSO NAMED HERMANN TROPHY

SEMIFINALIST: United Soccer Coaches has announced the 15 women's semifinalists for the 2018 MAC Hermann Trophy, based on voting by NCAA Division I soccer coaches. Amongst the 15 women's semifinalists is University of North Carolina sophomore forward Alessia Russo from Kent, England.

Below are bullet points highlighting Russo's sophomore campaign, which unfortunately ended when she suffered a broken leg against Wake Forest on October 25.

Sophomore Year (2018): Was injured early in second half against Wake Forest, breaking a leg in 50th minute • had surgery on October 29 as is out the remainder of the campaign • 2018 ACC Offensive Player of the Year • first-team All-ACC selection • United Soccer Coaches first-team All-Atlantic Region selection • semifinalist for 2018 Hermann Trophy • named to England roster for U20 World Cup which was held in August 2018 in France • played on an England team which won bronze medal there • was slated to go to England in November for a National Team call up but that was cancelled due to her injury • named to preseason All-ACC Team • tapped for 45-member MAC Hermann Trophy Watch List • a Soccer America preseason Best XI selection • returned to lineup against Providence, playing 37 minutes and assisting on Julia Ashley's game-winning goal • started at left wing against Marquette, playing 46 minutes • played in 14 games overall, starting 13 times and playing 867 minutes overall • tied for team lead in goals with six, tied for third on team in points with 16 and leads UNC in game-winning goals with four • 10 of her 15 career goals have been game-winning goals • six of nine goals as a freshman were game-winners and four of her six goals in her sophomore year also were • played 80 minutes at Florida State, assisting on Rachel Jones' game-winning goal in 29th minute • scored game-winning goal against Pittsburgh in 17th minute and assisted on Brianna Pinto's second-half goal against the Panthers • named ACC Offensive Player of the Week on October 2, 2018 • scored game-tying goal on a 28-yard direct free kick against the Louisville on September 29 • then scored game-winning goal against the Cardinals less than four minutes later on a breakaway • was spectacular in 2-1 win at Notre Dame, playing 75 minutes • scored the opening goal of the game just 22 seconds into the match against the Fighting Irish and then assisted on Taylor Otto's game-winning tally in the 86th minute • tallied the game-

winning goal against Virginia Tech in the 22nd minute of play • scored the game-winning goal against #11 Boston College in the sixth minute.

The MAC Hermann Trophy, presented by World Wide Technology, is the most coveted individual honor in NCAA Division I soccer and has been awarded annually since 1967. Most recently, Andi Sullivan (Stanford) received the award for outstanding intercollegiate performance during her senior seasons in 2017.

Three women's finalists will be named on Dec. 7 in conjunction with the Men's College Cup semifinals in Santa Barbara, Calif. The 2018 MAC Hermann Trophy banquet will be held at the historic Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis on Jan. 4, 2019 to formally announce this year's winners.

CAROLINA IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT:

Carolina is the only school in the country that has played in all 37 NCAA Tournaments. In the 37 tournaments, UNC has an all-time record of 131-14-4. That is an amazing winning percentage of 89.6 percent. Carolina has won 21 NCAA Tournaments, finished second four times and placed third on three occasions. After the tie against UCLA in the 2018 quarterfinals, UNC is a rather astounding 27-1-2 all-time in NCAA quarterfinal matches. It's only loss in a quarterfinal match came against UCLA in 2013 by a 1-0 score in double overtime at Fetzer Field in Chapel Hill. The only other time UNC failed to get through a quarterfinal game was 2005 when the Tar Heels fell to Florida State 5-4 on penalty kicks after a 1-1 tie against the Seminoles at Fetzer Field.

SIX TAR HEELS NAMED ALL-ACC: Six UNC players were named to the 2018 All-Atlantic Coast Conference Team. First-team honorees included sophomore forward Alessia Russo, sophomore midfielder Taylor Otto, freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto and sophomore defender Emily Fox. Senior defender Julia Ashley was named second-team All-ACC and senior midfielder Dorian Bailey was named third-team All-ACC.

Forward Rachel Jones and midfielder Brianna Pinto were named to the ACC's All-Freshman Team.

The four first-team All-ACC selections were the most for the Tar Heel program since four UNC players were tapped first-team all-conference in 2008.

RUSSO NAMED ACC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR:

North Carolina sophomore forward Alessia Russo of Kent, England was named the ACC Offensive Player of the Year in 2018. She is amongst UNC's leading scorers with 16 points on six goals and four assists. Russo earned this award despite playing in only 14 games this season. She missed the first four games of the year while playing with England in the U20 FIFA World Cup in France where her side won a bronze medal. Her season was then cut short when she broke her right leg in the second half of Carolina's game against Wake Forest on October 25.

Russo was the first Tar Heel to be named the ACC Offensive Player of the Year since Crystal Dunn in 2013.

Rachel Jones, Freshman, Midfielder, Lawrenceville, Ga.

Dorrance on Rachel in 2018: Jones will challenge to start at the 9, the center forward position even though we return a starter there in Zoe Redei. Rachel Jones could play that role. She can also play in the midfield. She will be different from every player on the roster. She is a very creative presence with a Caribbean island feel and flair which is a really positive sort of creativity platform which I think makes her unique. I also think she has the potential to score goals and create chances so I really like having her on the roster. Like Brianna Pinto and Rachael Dorwart she has the opportunity to challenge to start for us as a freshman.

Alex Kimball, Redshirt Senior Forward, Chapel Hill, N.C.

Dorrance on Alex in 2018: Alex has solved her hip issues which made it impossible for her to play last year. She will compete for time as a reserve up top or if we play the semi flatback 1-3-4-3 she could also be a reserve at flank midfield. She has good pace. She has a good vertical leap. She's good in the air. She is very dense so she survives collisions and she has no issues with collisions. She is a very physical player with the potential to contribute in a very positive way entirely based on what she is able to commit this summer to her own development.

Senior Year (2018): With Alessia Russo going out with a broken leg on October 25, she moved into the starting lineup at center forward • came off bench in second half against Wake Forest, playing best half of her career according to head coach Anson Dorrance • started at center forward against Virginia Tech in ACC Tournament quarterfinals, logging a season-high 66 minutes • took a team-high seven shots in the game and scored the game-winning goal in the third minute, finishing on her own rebound • played in all 27 games during the season, assuming multiple roles on left side of pitch on defense and in the midfield and totaling 994 minutes • then started coming off bench to play at center forward in middle of ACC season • started versus Illinois and played 62 minutes at left back in that game • logged 994 minutes overall in 27 games, including 10 starts • scored her first goal of the season in 35th minute at Syracuse, giving the Tar Heels a 3-1 lead in an eventual 7-1 victory • assisted on game-winning goal by Zoe Redei in 2-0 victory over Miami • scored her third goal of the year in ACC championship game against Florida State • in the NCAA Tournament third round against Virginia Tech, she both scored and assisted, tallying the game-winning goal in the 8th minute and assisting on Brianna Pinto's insurance goal in the 49th minute • finished the season with four goals and two assists for 10 points • was drafted in the fourth round of the 2019 NWSL Draft by the Utah Royals • made Utah's 2019 NWSL opening day roster.

Dorrance on Annie in 2018: Annie Kingman, we haven't seen her in a while because of the injury she had in the fall of 2017. We wanted to shut her down so she could come back and have a great senior year. She's in our MAC program, our master's of accounting program here at UNC, as she finishes her last year of eligibility. She has huge promise because now she's playing without pain. We've actually seen her a couple of times. She's playing with a full skill set and looks wonderful. She will challenge to start at the 10 or the

8 or the 6 like she did in 2016 when we got to the Final Four basically on her back. So we will return now to compete with all these young kids that are also trying to fight for the 10, the 6 or the 8.

Graduate Student Year (2018): Elected team tri-captain, second straight year as a captain • tapped as a 2018-19 Tar Heel Scholar Athlete • 2018-19 member of UNC Student-Athlete Advisory Council • starter at beginning of year for Carolina at attacking midfield position • started first six games, playing 340 minutes in those contests • played a season-high 80 minutes versus Texas • assisted on game-tying goal by Brooke Bingham in 51st minute against Fighting Illini in season opener by delivering a perfect corner kick • was injured just 17 minutes into Marquette game, missing remainder of match against Golden Eagles • missed the next five games with an injury but returned to play 30 minutes off bench against Louisville • played 36 minutes at Notre Dame and 42 minutes at Syracuse, increasing her role off the bench • assisted on final goal of game versus Syracuse in 7-1 win • assumed key role in midfield off bench over past third of the season • played in 22 matches overall, starting six times and playing 898 minutes • assisted on Rachael Dorwart's game-winning goal in ACC Tournament semifinals against Clemson • scored her first goal of the season against Kansas in NCAA second round, the game-winning tally in the 42nd minute on a header off a corner kick.

Samantha Leshnak, Senior, Goalkeeper, Liberty Township, Ohio:

Dorrance on Samantha in 2018: Samantha Leshnak was a spectacular goal stopper and shot stopper for us last fall. She had a wonderful season for us until the Princeton game. Her issues are not shot stopping, they are not bravery, she has no issues with that and her courage and that sort of thing. Her challenge is decision making so basically she needs to know what to do when she gets the ball and she is really not there with that. If she gets better at that she will have a long and successful professional career.

Senior Year (2018): UNC's starting goalkeeper • did not allow a goal in 1,119 minutes and 23 seconds from Texas game on August 22 before conceding in first half of ACC final against Florida State on November 4 • that is the longest individual scoreless streak by a single Tar Heel goalkeeper in history • she passed previous records for scoreless successive minutes set by Anne Sherow in 1987 and Lori Walker in 1989 • began the season alternating halves in goal for Tar Heels with freshman Claudia Dickey • had eight solo shutouts and a 15-2-1 goalkeeper record • had a save percentage of .822, making 37 saves and allowing only eight goals • that was the 16th best save percentage in a season for any Tar Heel goalkeeper in history • allowed only eight goals all season - one each against Illinois, Texas and Florida State (NCAA), two against UCLA and three against Florida State • made five saves against UCF, one short of career high set against Duke in 2017 season opener • also had five saves against Penn State last year • made four saves in first half of game at Stanford • posted first solo shutout of year in win at #2 Florida State • posted solo shutouts against Virginia Tech, Boston College, Wake Forest in the regular season, against Virginia Tech and against Clemson in the ACC Tournament as well as against Virginia Tech and Georgetown in the NCAA Tournament • made spectacular saves on the third and fourth penalty kicks by UCLA in the NCAA quarterfinals, allowing the Tar Heels to advance past the Bruins 4-2 • she was only the third Tar Heel goalkeeper in history to win a penalty kick shootout, joining U.S. National Team goalkeeper Ashlyn Harris against Virginia in 2007 ACC Tournament and Bryane Heaberlin against Baylor in 2012 NCAA Tournament • her six saves versus UCLA in NCAA quarterfinals matched her career high in a game previously set against Duke in her junior year.

Mary Elliott McCabe, Freshman, Midfielder, Charlotte, N.C.

Dorrance on Mary Elliott in 2018: Mary Elliott McCabe had a phenomenal senior year at Charlotte Latin School. I think she broke all their scoring records. She's a really good athlete who we can play anywhere up top or in the flank in midfield. She's athletic and has the ability to score some goals. It's important to us for her to continue to improve because with our depth her challenge will be to make the travel roster. With her commitment, she could steal some time as a reserve striker or a reserve flank midfielder. Her athletic quality and her ability to create and score goals are her two strengths.

Freshman Year (2018): Came off bench in midfield and defense for UNC • saw some minutes at the right back and left back positions as well as in midfield • played season-high 36 minutes against Marquette when she played both in midfield and at right back and 291 minutes in 16 games overall • assisted on Madison Schultz's game-winning goal against the Fighting Illini in the season opener • also assisted on a goal by Zoe Redei in the 81st minute at Syracuse, playing 33 minutes versus the Orange • qualified for 2018-19 ACC Academic Honor Roll.

DORRANCE EARNS COACH OF THE YEAR AWARD: Anson Dorrance was voted the 2018 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year. This was the 11th time he has won the award and the first time since 2008.

TAR HEEL COACHING STAFF HONORED BY UNITED SOCCER COACHES: The University of North Carolina men's coaching staff has been named the Atlantic Region Coaching Staff of the Year as named by United Soccer Coaches. The Tar Heel coaching staff is headed by Anson Dorrance. His assistant

coaches are Bill Palladino, Chris Ducar and Damon Nahas.

FOUR TAR HEELS NAMED TO ALL-REGION TEAM: The United Soccer Coaches tapped its All-Atlantic Region Team for 2018 on Monday, November 26. The first-team included senior

defender Julia Ashley, sophomore midfielder Taylor Otto and sophomore forward Alessia Russo. Freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto was named to the USC second-team All-Atlantic Region squad.

FOX EARNS FIRST NATIONAL TEAM

CAPS: On November 8, UNC sophomore defender Emily Fox started in the U.S. Women's National Team's 1-0 victory over Portugal in Lisbon. It was her first national team cap and in the process, she became the 59th Tar Heel player in history to be capped with the USWNT. Former Tar Heel Jessica McDonald, Class of 2011, earned her second ever national team cap in the game and she scored the game-winning goal against Portugal. Crystal Dunn, UNC Class of 2014, also started for the U.S. in the game.

Fox started again on November 13 against Scotland, earning her second cap as the U.S. defeated Scotland 1-0. Former Tar Heels Ashlyn Harris and Crystal Dunn also started for the Americans against Scotland and former UNC players Jessica McDonald and Allie Long played in the game as reserves.

UNC DOWNS WAKE FOREST TO FINISH ACC REGULAR SEASON WITH PERFECT RECORD:

Junior forward Madison Schultz's flair for the dramatic returned to benefit the third-ranked North Carolina women's soccer team on October 25 as the Tar Heels defeated Wake Forest 1-0 at WakeMed Soccer Park to finish the 2018 ACC regular season schedule undefeated and untied, the first time Carolina had accomplished that feat since 2006 when UNC also finished 10-0-0.

The 10 ACC regular-season victories in 2018 equaled the most in school history by the Tar Heels. They also won 10 games in 2006 (10-0-0) and in 2013 (10-3-0).

In 2018, UNC won its 22nd ACC regular season championship (21 outright and one shared). In 2018, Carolina won its first outright conference regular-season crown since 2010. UNC had shared the regular-season crown with Florida State in 2014.

CAROLINA IN THE RPI: The North Carolina women's soccer team finished the 2019 season ranked No. 4 in the NCAA RPI, the leading indicator of potential post-season bids, seedings and strength of schedule.

In the process, Carolina received the second #1 seed in the NCAA Tournament in the lower right portion of the bracket.

Based on the final RPI, the Tar Heels also played against one of the nation's most difficult schedules in 2018.

UNC has played 2018 games against #2 Stanford, #1 Florida State (three times), #3 Georgetown, #7 UCLA, #12 Santa Clara, #17 Texas, #20 Kansas, #28 Boston College, #30 Wake Forest, #48 Ohio State, #32 Virginia Tech (three times), #55 Clemson (twice), #50 Illinois, #47 Providence and #52 Louisville among teams which finished in the Top 64 in the NCAA RPI.

Carolina finished 12-4-2 against teams which made the NCAA Tournament field in 2018.

Georgetown is the #4 RPI in the country entering the College Cup. The end of the regular season RPI had Stanford at #1, Florida State at #2, North Carolina at #3 and

Georgetown at #4.

ASHLEY NAMED SENIOR CLASS AWARD

FINALIST: Twenty NCAA® men's and women's soccer student-athletes who excel both on and off the field were selected as finalists in October for the 2018 Senior CLASS Award® in collegiate soccer. Among those 20 were Alex Comsia of the Tar Heel men's team and Julia Ashley of the North Carolina women's team, making North Carolina the only school with two finalists.

To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence: community, classroom, character and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School®, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

The finalists were chosen by a selection committee from the list of 30 men's candidates and 30 women's candidates announced in September. Nationwide fan voting began immediately to help select the winner, and fans are encouraged to vote on the Senior CLASS Award website through November 18, 2018. Fan votes will be combined with media and Division I head coaches' votes to determine the winner. The Senior CLASS Award winners will be announced during the 2018 NCAA Men's and Women's College Cup® championships later this fall.

UNC EARNS TEAM ACADEMIC AWARD

FROM UNITED SOCCER COACHES: United Soccer Coaches announced on October 6th the Team Academic Award winners at the high school and collegiate levels to recognize exemplary performance in the classroom during the 2017-18 academic year. The University of North Carolina women's soccer team, coached by Anson Dorrance, was amongst the 484 women's programs nationwide to earn the award.

The College Team Academic Award recipients

are active members of the United Soccer Coaches College Services Program with a composite grade point average of 3.0 or better on a 4.0 scale for all players on the roster.

A total of 773 college teams (289 men, 484 women) earned the Team Academic Award, including 191 schools who had both their men's and women's programs among the recipients. At the high school level, 309 teams (105 boys, 204 girls) were honored with the Team Academic Award, including 30 schools earning recognition for both their boys' and girls' programs.

United Soccer Coaches annually celebrates the academic achievements of high school and college soccer teams whose student-athletes collectively demonstrate a commitment to excellence in their studies over the course of a full academic year.

In 27 games this season, UNC has scored 57 goals, passed for 72 assists and accounted for 186 points overall.

The 57 goals have been scored by 16 different players with Alessia Russo, Julia Ashley and Brianna Pinto leading the way with six goals.

Nineteen players have accounted for the 72 assists, led by Julia Ashley's 10 assists.

The 186 points have been accounted for by 21 different players with Julia Ashley leading the way with 22 points.

CONGRATULATIONS NORTH CAROLINA

COURAGE: The entire state of North Carolina celebrated the victory by the North Carolina Courage in the 2018 National Women's Soccer League championship game on September 22, 2018. The Courage defeated the home standing Portland Thorns 3-0 in the championship game.

Four members of the 2018 Courage are Carolina alumnae - Heather O'Reilly, Class of 2007, Merritt Mathias, Class of 2012, Jessica McDonald, Class of 2011, and Crystal Dunn, Class of 2014.

McDonald was named the Most Valuable Player of the NWSL championship game after scoring two goals in the 3-0 victory over Portland.

NWSL BEST XI HONOREES: Three former University of North Carolina players were named to the Best XI squads for 2018 as named by the National Women's Soccer League.

Portland Thorns FC midfielder Tobin Heath and North Carolina Courage forward Crystal Dunn were both named to the first team while North Carolina Courage defender Merritt Mathias was named to the second team.

The University of North Carolina had two representatives on the women's 45-member watch list. The Tar Heel duo is senior defender Julia Ashley of Verona, N.J., who is now in her fourth year as a starter at right back for the Tar Heels, and sophomore forward Alessia Russo of Kent, England, who was the 2017 ACC

Freshman of the Year and Most Valuable Player of the 2017 ACC Tournament. Russo was recently named the 2018 ACC Offensive Player of the Year.

On Tuesday, November 27, Russo was named a Hermann Trophy semifinalist.

The MAC Hermann Trophy, presented by World Wide Technology, is the most prestigious individual award in college soccer and is presented annually to the most outstanding male and female players of the year. This year's

winners will be announced Friday, Jan. 4, 2019 at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis.

The MAC Hermann Trophy Watch Lists are compiled by members of the United Soccer Coaches Men's and Women's NCAA Division I All-America Committees. Fifteen semifinalists will be named for both the men's and women's MAC Hermann Trophy near the end of the college season based on voting by NCAA Division I coaches and from those candidates, three finalists will ultimately be placed on the

ballot for the coveted award.

TRIO OF TAR HEELS COMPETE IN FIFA U20 WORLD CUP: A total of three current University of North Carolina women's soccer players competed at the 2018 FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup held Aug. 5-24 in the Brittany region of northwestern France.

Sophomore midfielder Emily Fox and freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto represented the U.S. team at the competition. The American side went 1-1-1 in group play but did not advance to the quarterfinal round. Fox and Pinto flew home from France and rejoined their teammates for practice on Wednesday, August 15, playing against Ohio State on August 19.

Sophomore forward Alessia Russo competed for the British side which won its group. England defeated the Netherlands 2-1 in the quarterfinal round on Monday, August 20. After falling to Japan in the semifinals, the English defeated France in penalty kicks for the bronze medal. Russo rejoined Carolina for its game against Providence on August 30.

Fox also played on the U.S. U20 Team two years ago in 2016 when she was a high school senior. That squad also included current UNC players Jessie Scarpa, a redshirt senior forward, and Taylor Otto, a redshirt sophomore forward.

RECORD NUMBER OF TAR HEELS NAMED TO ACC ACADEMIC HONOR ROLL IN 2017-18: For the third year in a row and the fifth time in the past six years, a record number of Tar Heels earned spots on the Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll for the 2017-18 school year. North Carolina placed 391 student-athletes, an all-time high, on the ACC's 62nd-annual honor roll. It was the sixth year in a row that more than 300 Tar Heel student-athletes earned the recognition.

The ACC Honor Roll is comprised of student-athletes who participated in a varsity-level sport and registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year. UNC's record total marked an improvement of six over last year, when the Tar Heels had an all-time high of 385 students honored. The number of UNC students honored for 2017-18 is roughly half of Carolina's total number of student-athletes and is an improvement of more than 100 student-athletes over the past decade.

Tar Heel women's soccer players included on the 2017-18 ACC Academic Honor Roll included freshman Miah Araba, junior Dorian Bailey, senior Megan Buckingham, sophomore Natalie Chandler, senior Cannon Clough, junior Nicole Crutchfield, freshman Emily Fox, sophomore Morgan Goff, junior Megan Joyner, senior Annie Kingman, junior Kate Morris, freshman Taylor Otto, sophomore Zoe Redei, senior Frances Reuland, junior Jessie Scarpa, freshman Laura Sparling, sophomore Abby Staker, senior Maya Worth and freshman Lotte Wubben-Moy.

TRIO OF TAR HEELS NAMED ALL-ACC ACADEMIC FOR 2017-18: Three North Carolina women's soccer players were named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Team, announced February 1, 2018 by the league. Tar Heels named to the squad, which recognizes combined academic and athletic performance, were senior Megan Buckingham and juniors Julia Ashley and Dorian Bailey.

Buckingham, from Novi, Mich., graduated

in December 2017 with a major in media and journalism. She was named to the All-ACC Academic Team for the second year in a row.

Ashley is from Verona, N.J., and Bailey is from Mission, Kan. Both are majoring in exercise and sport science and are currently seniors at UNC.

To be considered for the All-ACC Academic team, conference student-athletes must have a minimum 3.0 grade point average for the fall semester, as well as a cumulative 3.0 over the course of their college careers.

CONSISTENCY, STATISTICAL ANOMALY OR JUST VERY GOOD?: North Carolina enters finished the 2018 season with an all-time winning percentage of .902 dating back to the program's first year in 1979.

The fact is that UNC's program under the direction of head coach Anson Dorrance has been remarkably consistent in his 40 years as head coach regardless of where or when the Tar Heels took the pitch.

Under Dorrance, UNC has won 90.2 percent of its games overall, 87.2 percent of its ACC regular-season games, 89.0 percent of its ACC Tournament games, 89.6 percent of its NCAA Tournament games, 91.3 percent of its home games and 89.6 percent of its road and neutral site games.

TAR HEELS ELECT TEAM CAPTAINS: The North Carolina women's soccer team elected three players as team captains for the 2018 campaign. The captains are graduate student and midfielder Annie Kingman of Woodside, Calif., senior defender Julia Ashley of Verona, N.J. and redshirt sophomore midfielder Taylor Otto of Apex, N.C.

DORRANCE EARNS 800TH WIN: On Sunday, October 9, 2016, the University of North Carolina women's soccer program achieved a pair of monumental milestones in program history - the program's 800th victory in its 900th game.

The North Carolina women's soccer program began as a varsity team in the 1979 season. The Tar Heels played the program's 900th game on October 9, 2016 when Carolina rallied past Wake Forest 2-1 at Fetzer Field.

In the process, head coach Anson Dorrance earned his 800th career victory as the head coach of the Tar Heels' women's soccer team as the symmetry lined up perfectly.

JUST FOUR TIMES SINCE 1986: Carolina's 3-0 setback at USC on September 11, 2016 marked only the fourth loss for the Tar Heels by a margin of more than one goal since the 1985 season, a campaign which ended with a 2-0 loss

to George Mason in the NCAA Tournament final.

Carolina has played 813 games since the start of the 1986 season, losing by more than one goal just four times. That streak traces back to the opening game of the 1986 season against George Mason, a 3-3 tie.

After losing to George Mason 2-0 in the 1985 NCAA Tournament championship game, the Tar Heels went 25 years without losing a game by more than one goal before that streak ended in 2010.

Since 1986, UNC has only lost four games by more than one goal. Two of those four losses have come against Virginia. The Tar Heels fell to Notre Dame 4-1 on November 20, 2010, lost to Virginia 2-0 on October 20, 2013, was upended by Virginia 2-0 on November 7, 2014 and lost to USC 3-0 on September 11, 2016.

DID YOU KNOW...: North Carolina would have to lose its next 783 games in a row for head coach Anson Dorrance to have a .500 coaching winning percentage in his career at the helm of the Tar Heels.

UNC enters the 2019 regular season with an all-time record of 847-74-40. Dorrance has coached the Tar Heels in all 961 of their games all-time.

SHUTOUTS ARE INFREQUENT: UNC's 1-0 loss against Florida State on December 2, 2018 was only the 56th time the Tar Heels have been shut out in their history. Altogether, UNC has played 961 matches since 1979.

The Tar Heels have been blanked on the scoreboard in only 5.8 percent of the games they have played in during their history. Carolina has suffered 42 shutout losses in its history. The Tar Heels have also played 14 scoreless ties in their history.

Only five times in UNC history have the Tar Heels been shutout in back-to-back games in the same season.

That happened against Portland and Florida in 2012, against Notre Dame and Florida State in 2013, against UCLA and Pepperdine in 2014, against Florida State and Duke in 2015 and against USC and NC State in 2016.

TAR HEELS IN THE ACC: Parity arrived in the Atlantic Coast Conference many years ago and yet the Tar Heels have lost only 26 ACC regular-season games since league play began in 1987.

The Tar Heels are 209-26-11 all-time in ACC regular-season matches. The Tar Heels earned their 200th all-time ACC regular season victory on September 14, 2018 when they won at Florida State 1-0.

UNC has averaged just 0.81 ACC regular-season losses a year in the 32 years of league play.

In the middle of the 2015 season, the Tar Heels had a three-match ACC regular-season losing streak, the first time that had happened in history.

Prior to that streak, UNC had fallen in back-to-back ACC games just four times in history.

The four occasions were September 18, 2013 home versus Notre Dame (0-1) and September 21, 2013 at Florida State (0-1); October 23, 2011 at Virginia Tech (0-1) and October 27, 2011 at Maryland (1-2 in overtime); October 22, 2009 at Florida State (2-3 in two overtimes) and October 25, 2009 at Miami (0-1); October 17, 2000 at Florida State (2-3 in double overtime)

Dorrance on Alessia in 2019: Alessia is just a godsend. I mean just when we needed someone to be a game changer she comes into the program last year. She comes from a background where pro teams were trying to sign her out of high school. But she decided not to sign a pro contract coming out of high school and to come to an American college because that is what her brother did. He decided to run track at the University of Missouri so the Russo family already had a very good experience with one of their kids coming to an American college and enjoying life and I think Alessia has felt the same thing. She scored some of the most spectacular goals I have ever seen, certainly for a freshman, and she is one reason we had such a remarkable 2017 season. Her ability to beat people off the dribble is legendary. Her ability back to goal is very good. Her capacity to score from distance is phenomenal. Her strike with her right foot is similar to what you would see from a men's player. I really feel like her achievements last season were absolutely wonderful. She was fully deserving of her All-American honor. Her performances were at times breathtaking.

Jessie Scarpa, Redshirt Senior, Forward, Lakeland, Fla.:

Dorrance on Jessie in 2018: For Jessie Scarpa, bless her heart, it is one catastrophic injury issue after another and I am just hoping she can get out there and give us 15 minutes a half of her at her best and at her best she is extraordinary. I still have hopes that she can return to form and eventually make the Canadian full team roster. Her mother is Canadian and I genuinely feel that if Jessie does all the right things and has a little bit of good luck, certainly to balance off the bad luck she's had, she could be an elite professional. She could make the Canadian full team roster and I still think some of her best soccer years are ahead of her. I am hoping this year can be a bridge between all of her injuries and a successful professional career.

Redshirt Senior Year (2018): Was cleared to play on West Coast trip after missing first six games of season coming off two significant knee injuries (MCL and ACL) in 2017 • saw action against both Santa Clara and Stanford • has totaled 162 minutes in nine games after also seeing action against Clemson, Louisville, Notre Dame, Syracuse, Virginia Tech, Boston College and Miami • recorded her first points of the season while playing 21 minutes in match at Syracuse • assisted on Brianna Pinto's goal in the 69th minute and then scored her first goal of the year in 85th minute on a rebound of an Annie Kingman shot • named to 2018-19 ACC Academic Honor Roll • 2018-19 Tar Heel Scholar Athlete honoree • inducted into Chi Alpha Sigma academic honorary society.

and October 27, 2000 at Wake Forest (0-1).

Remarkably, in four of the past nine seasons, UNC had a losing record in ACC play at one point in the campaign. The Tar Heels started the 2010 season 0-1 in the ACC, the 2012 season 1-2-1 in the ACC, the 2013 season 1-2 in the ACC and the 2016 season 0-1 in the ACC. The only other time in history when UNC had a losing record in ACC regular-season play in its history was 2002 when the Tar Heels lost their season opener to NC State.

A RARE HOME LOSS FOR CAROLINA:

Carolina's 2-1 loss against Princeton at WakeMed Soccer Park on November 19, 2018 was just the 28th home loss in Carolina history and just the third home loss in the last four seasons combined (2015-18). Carolina went 8-1 at home in 2015 and was 10-1 at home in 2016 after ending with a 1-0 win over Clemson on November 20, 2016. Carolina was 6-1-2 at home in 2017. In 2018, UNC has recorded a 10-0-1 record in home games.

IN THE ACC REGULAR SEASON: In its last 52 ACC regular season games, UNC is now 42-5-5, a winning percentage of 85.6 percent.

The Tar Heels had a 17-game ACC unbeaten streak ended at Louisville on October 8, 2015 that had stretched from late in the 2013 season into midway through the 2015 campaign.

The Tar Heels won their last three ACC games of the 2013 season, went 9-0-1 in 2014 and finished 7-3 in the conference in 2015. UNC was 6-2-2 in the league the following year and finished 8-0-2 in 2017. Carolina finished the 2018 season with a perfect 10-0-0 ACC regular-season mark.

Prior to falling at Louisville in 2015, Carolina's last ACC regular season loss had come on October 20, 2013 when Virginia beat the Tar Heels 2-0 at Fetzer Field.

Carolina's three ACC regular season losses in 2015, however, were not a first. UNC fell

three times in ACC regular-season play in 2000, 2009, 2011, 2012 and 2013. In three of those five seasons UNC ended up winning the NCAA championship (2000, 2009, 2012).

Nevertheless, 42 wins, just five losses and five ties in UNC's last 52 regular season ACC games is a remarkable accomplishment given the parity in the league at this point.

TAR HEELS IN ACC OPENERS:

North Carolina lost to NC State 1-0 in its ACC opener for the 2016 season on September 16, 2016. It was only the fourth loss in an ACC opener for the Tar Heels in their history.

Carolina won its 2017 ACC opener 1-0 at Florida State and again won its 2018 ACC opener against Florida State with another 1-0 win in Tallahassee. The Tar Heels are 26-4-1 overall in conference openers after winning at Florida State on September 14 of this season.

Carolina's losses in ACC openers came at home against NC State 1-0 on September 16, 2016, at Maryland 2-1 on September 13, 2012, against Boston College in Chapel Hill 3-2 on September 23, 2010 and at NC State 2-1 on September 10, 2002. UNC also tied its ACC opener at NC State 1-1 on September 20, 1988.

TAR HEELS IN THE CAROLINA NIKE

CLASSIC: On the opening weekend of the 2018 season, Carolina swept a pair of games in the Carolina Nike Classic as the Tar Heels beat Illinois 3-1 and Ohio State 2-0.

UNC has now hosted a version of the Carolina Nike Classic, under the current name or the names of other title sponsors, since the initial event in 1980 – a total of 27 times.

Carolina has a 49-3-2 record in its early season tournaments at home. The only losses were to Penn State in 1999, to Notre Dame in 2008 and to Stanford in 2014 with ties against Stanford in 2010 and Florida in 2012.

Carolina played a single game to open the 2017 weekend against Duke in Cary, N.C. but it

was not part of a formal Nike Classic.

CAROLINA IN SEASON OPENERS:

Carolina has a record of 33-5-2 all-time in season openers after beating Illinois 3-1 on August 16. The only losses were in 1983 vs. Connecticut (road), 2006 vs. Texas A&M (road), 2007 vs. South Carolina (home), 2012 vs. Portland (road) and 2014 vs. Stanford (home) and there were ties in 1985 vs. George Mason (home) and 2002 vs. Nebraska (road).

UNC IN HOME OPENERS:

North Carolina has a record of 35-2-3 in home openers all-time after beating Illinois 3-1 on August 16.

The only losses came to South Carolina 1-0 in 2007 and to Stanford 1-0 in overtime in 2014 and the ties were against George Mason in 1985, against Stanford in 2010 and against Florida in 2012.

BINGHAM NAMED ACC DEFENSIVE

PLAYER OF THE WEEK: North Carolina sophomore defender Brooke Bingham shared the ACC Defensive Player of the Week honor with Florida State's Natalia Kuikka. The award was announced on October 23, 2018.

Bingham played all 180 minutes in a pair of ACC shutouts for the Tar Heels, one of only two UNC players to play all 90 minutes in both matches last week. She led a stout defensive effort that blanked high-scoring Boston College 1-0 on Thursday and then helped the Tar Heels limit Miami to just two shots in a 2-0 win on Sunday. With the two wins, UNC clinched its first outright ACC regular-season championship since 2010 and its 22nd ACC regular-season championship overall (21 outright, one shared).

After wins over Boston College and Miami, senior defender Julia Ashley was named to the Top Drawer Soccer National Team of the Week for the third time in 2018.

RUSSO NAMED ACC OFFENSIVE PLAYER

OF THE WEEK AFTER WIN OVER CARDS:

North Carolina sophomore forward Alessia Russo has been named the Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Soccer Offensive Player of the Week, and Virginia Tech junior goalkeeper Mandy McGlynn is this week's ACC Defensive Player of the Week. The awards were announced Tuesday by the ACC Office in Greensboro.

In a battle of ACC unbeaten teams, Russo scored five unanswered goals to beat Louisville 5-1, ending the Cardinals' four-game winning streak. After Louisville took the lead on a breakaway goal in the sixth minute, Russo tied the game in the 16th minute on a 28-yard direct free kick. Just 3:20 later, she split two defenders perfectly and scored on a fast break to give the Tar Heels the lead for good in the 20th minute. Later in the first half, Russo dribbled deep into the box and was taken down by the Louisville defense. Taylor Otto scored on the ensuing penalty kick, giving the Tar Heels a 4-1 lead that would never be challenged.

THREE TAR HEEL ALUMNAE PLAY FOR U.S. IN CONCACAF CHAMPIONSHIPS:

U.S. Women's National Team head coach Jill Ellis named 20 players to the roster for the 2018 Concacaf Women's Championship that was contested from October 4-17 at three venues across the United States, including WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, N.C. This group included three alumnae from the University of North Carolina's famed program - goalkeeper Ashlyn Harris, Class of 2010, defender Crystal Dunn, Class of 2014, and forward Tobin Heath, Class of 2010.

The 2018 Concacaf Women's Championship featured eight countries divided into two groups of four with each group's top two finishers advancing from round robin play to the semifinals. The two finalists and the winner of the third-place match will qualify directly to the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup in France. The fourth-place finisher will earn a spot in a two-game playoff against Argentina, which finished third in South America qualifying, for a final berth to the tournament. The U.S. won the 2018 CONCACAF championship with a win over Canada in the final game.

Harris is one of two goalkeepers named to the 20-person squad. She played on NCAA championship teams at Carolina in 2006, 2008 and 2009. Harris plays for the Orlando Pride of the National Women's Soccer League and has 17 caps with the U.S. National Team.

Dunn plays for North Carolina Courage of the NWSL and has 69 caps with the U.S. National Team, while scoring 23 goals for her country. Dunn was the consensus National Player of the Year at Carolina on the team that won the 2012 NCAA championship.

Heath, who plays for the NWSL's Portland Thorns, has 138 caps with the U.S. National Team and has scored 21 goals for her nation in her career. She played on NCAA championship teams at UNC in 2006, 2008 and 2009.

The USA opens its qualifying tournament on October 4 against Mexico at 7:30 p.m. ET, faces Panama on October 7 at 5 p.m. ET and then finishes the group stage against Trinidad and Tobago on October 10 at 7:30 p.m. ET. All the USA's Group A matches will be played in Cary, N.C. at Sahlen's Stadium at WakeMed

Soccer Park, home of the NWSL regular season champion North Carolina Courage.

JONES & OTTO NAMED ACC PLAYERS

OF THE WEEK: Following a 1-0 win at No. 2 Florida State, North Carolina freshman forward Rachel Jones has been named this week's Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Soccer Offensive Player of the Week, while her teammate, redshirt sophomore midfielder Taylor Otto is this week's ACC Defensive Player of the Week.

Jones scored her first career goal in her first career start to lead No. 6 North Carolina to a 1-0 upset at No. 2 Florida State, handing the Seminoles their first loss of the season. Jones broke through the Florida State back line to finish from 15 yards out at the 28:24 mark to lift the Tar Heels to their third successive win over the Seminoles and their second straight 1-0 regular-season win in Tallahassee in the past two years.

Jones was also named to the Top Drawer Soccer National Team of the Week on Monday, September 17.

Otto, starting just her second game at the holding midfielder position, led a stellar defensive effort in Carolina's upset win at No. 2 Florida State. The UNC defense held Florida State to just eight shots overall, including only two in second half, zero shots on goal in the match and only three corner kicks. Otto also assisted on Rachel Jones' game-winning goal in the 29th minute of the game.

ASHLEY NAMED NATIONAL PLAYER OF

THE WEEK: University of North Carolina senior Julia Ashley has been named the National Player of the Week by Top Drawer Soccer. The period covered Ashley's appearances in games from August 27, 2018 through September 2, 2018.

This marked Ashley's second appearance this year on the Top Drawer Soccer National Team of the Week. The senior defender from Verona, N.J., also appeared on the team that was named on August 20, 2018.

In wins over Providence 1-0 and Marquette 4-0 last week, Ashley led a defense that allowed only 11 shots combined in the two games and just one corner kick. UNC has shut out its last three opponents and has not allowed a goal in almost 379 minutes.

Ashley scored the game-winning goal in the win over Providence, the second game-winning tally of her career. She also had the game-winner as a junior against Virginia Tech. Against Marquette she assisted on Zoe Redei's second goal of the game and then scored a goal of her own in the 36th minute.

Her two goals in four days equaled her career total from her first three years combined.

GREEN & BUCKINGHAM COMPETE FOR

U.S. U23 NATIONAL TEAM: Two former outstanding University of North Carolina women's soccer players - Summer Green and Megan Buckingham - were amongst the 23 players competing with the United States Women's U-23 Team at the Nordic Tournament in Norway in late August and early September. The tournament is taking place after the start of the college season but during the FIFA window, the USA is taking a team with 22 pros -- 12 NWSL and 10 European-based players -- and

one collegian.

"For the first time in the history of our U-23 women's national team, we will be taking a roster consisting almost entirely of professional players," said U.S. head coach B.J. Snow. "This is an exciting step in the evolution of this team but more importantly provides us a great indicator as to where women's soccer is heading in our country."

Buckingham, who graduated from Carolina last December, played at Carolina from 2014-17. She was the ACC Freshman of the Year in 2014. She plays defense for Fimleikafélag Hafnarfjarðar, Iceland. Summer Green played at Carolina from 2012-15 after enrolling at Carolina at age 16 in the fall of 2012. She is a veteran of multiple youth national teams. She played on Carolina's 2012 NCAA Championship team and now is on the roster of the NWSL Red Stars.

400TH HOME GAME: The North Carolina Tar Heels played their 400th home game in school history on Wednesday, August 22 when they took on the Texas Longhorns at Finley Fields South.

Carolina has lost only three home games since the start of the 2015 campaign, falling against Duke in 2015, NC State in 2016 and Princeton in 2017. Always remarkable at home, the Tar Heels have righted the ship in home matches over the past four seasons after losing 13 games at home over a five-year span from 2010-14.

ASHLEY NAMED ACC DEFENDER OF THE

WEEK: North Carolina senior defender Julia Ashley and Virginia Tech junior goalkeeper Mandy McGlynn shared ACC Defensive Player of the Week honors on August 21, 2018 while Louisville freshman forward Maisie Whitsett was named this week's Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Soccer Offensive Player of the Week.

Ashley led a stout Tar Heel defense on the opening weekend of the season as North Carolina downed Illinois, 3-1 and No. 23 Ohio State 2-0 to capture North Carolina head coach Anson Dorrance's 1,000th career victory. In the two games combined the UNC defense limited their opponents to just seven total shots, including just four on goal, and three corner kick opportunities.

Ashley was also named to the Top Drawer Soccer National Team of the Week on August 21 and again on August 28.

WELCOMING ALUMNAE COACHES TO

CHAPEL HILL: North Carolina's first four home games were played against teams coached by Tar Heel alumnae who played for coach Anson Dorrance at Carolina.

Illinois is coached by Janet Rayfield, UNC Class of 1983. She is currently in her 17th season as the head coach of the Fighting Illini. Rayfield lettered on the first four UNC teams, winning national championships in 1981 and 1982. To this day, Rayfield ranks third in career points at Carolina with 223 and second in career goals in UNC history with 93.

The Ohio State Buckeyes are coached by Lori

Dorrance on Madison in 2018: Madison Schultz technically and tactically is one of the best players on our roster. As she solves her fitness conundrum it will dictate her role on the team. If she had the will of a Julia Ashley she would be one of the best players in the country. Her challenge is to have her self-discipline catch up with her technical and tactical quality.

Dorrance on Sydney in 2018: Sydney Spruill is one of the best defensive forwards I've ever coached. That's a compliment. What Sydney does so wonderfully is that she is incredibly quick and fast and she's very brave. She really makes a big difference on the field in how hard she works for her teammates and I love her heart and what she does and if she spends time this summer organizing her skill set and committing herself to time with the ball she could also become an elite player. I'm very excited about the quality of her freshman year and her future if she decides to organize her time well in the summer.

Sophomore Year (2018): Started first two games of year at left wing, playing 62 minutes against Illinois and 22 minutes against Ohio State • missed three games due to injury before returning to roster against Kansas in NCAA second round • that injury came just as she was playing her best minutes of the season • has played in 24 games overall, totaling 518 minutes • earned first point of year with an assist on a goal by Zoe Redei in 34th minute against Marquette • scored her first goal of the season, adding an insurance tally in the 59th minute against Miami

Abby Staker, Junior, Defender, Cary, N.C.

Dorrance on Staker in 2018: Abby Staker was an academic stalwart coming in from Cary Academy. Several years ago, I got the opportunity to speak at Cary Academy and its valedictorian also spoke and I was thinking to myself what am I doing here. Those were the smartest collection of kids I've ever seen. They certainly didn't need me to go over there to be a

commencement speaker. Well Abby Staker is that kind of young woman. She an absolute scholar in the most positive sense. It's a privilege for the University of North Carolina to have this young woman here studying for her degree. Her challenge is to make the travel roster. Abby could play anywhere on the left side. Right now, we are primarily using her as a left back. Abby's scholarship and her character are just off the charts and I love having her on my roster.

Junior Year (2018): Member of UNC Student-Athlete Advisory Council • saw first action of year with 10-minute stint against Marquette • also played 12 minutes off the bench against Howard and 11 minutes against Kansas • played in three games overall, totaling 33 minutes • qualified as a 2018-19 Tar Heel Scholar Athlete • earned a 4.0 grade point average in fall semester 2018.

Lotte Wubben-Moy, Sophomore, Defender, London, England

Dorrance on Lotte in 2018: Lotte is a great leader and a tremendous citizen. Like Alessia Russo, Lotte could have signed a professional contract at Arsenal which is one of the top clubs in the world coming out of high school but she decided to give that up to come play college soccer at the University of North Carolina. She had an absolutely fabulous freshman year and she has the potential to obviously be an elite player for us. Her greatest strengths are her leadership, her tactical understanding of the game and her technical platforms. For her to get to her potential, she has to invest a little bit more in her athletic platform. But she checks all the other boxes. She is a conscientious student. She's a responsible citizen. She is a wonderful young woman and I am so glad she is here playing for me.

Sophomore Year (2018): Starting right center back for the Tar Heels in the 4-3-3 formation • rarely if ever comes off the field • played every minute of every game this season in which she started • missed three successive games at midseason (Notre Dame, Syracuse, Virginia Tech) due to a concussion • returned to lineup against Boston College • played all 90 minutes in wins over Illinois and Ohio State • also played all 110 minutes in overtime game against Texas and all 90 minutes in contest against UCF • played 90 minutes each in wins over Providence and Marquette • played 90 minutes against Santa Clara and 92 minutes against Stanford • also played all 90 minutes in win at FSU and in wins against Pittsburgh, Clemson and Louisville • she was the only Tar Heel to have played all 1102 minutes so far this season prior to missing three games at midseason • returned to the lineup against Boston College, coming off the bench to play 56 minutes • then started against Miami, playing all 90 minutes in 2-0 win over Miami and went all 90 minutes against Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Clemson, Florida State, Howard, Kansas and Virginia Tech (NCAA third round) • went all 110 minutes in a stout defensive effort against explosive UCLA in the NCAA quarterfinals and played all 198 minutes for the Tar Heels in the 2018 NCAA College Cup • ranked third on the team in minutes played behind Julia Ashley and Brooke Bingham despite missing the entirety of three games • altogether played 2,186 minutes in 24 games • earned her first point of her career when she assisted on a goal by Julia Ashley in the 36th minute of the 4-0 win over Marquette • assisted on game-tying goal by Brianna Pinto in 78th minute of game at Stanford • also assisted on a goal by Bridgette Andrzejewski against Howard • tied for fourth on team in assists with five • against Kansas in NCAA second round, she assisted on Annie Kingman's goal in the 42nd minute that was the game-winner in a 4-1 win • assisted on Julia Ashley's goal in third minute of NCAA quarterfinal game against UCLA • named to 2018 All-ACC Academic Women's Soccer Team • qualified for the 2018-19 ACC Academic Honor Roll • shared the team's strength and conditioning award with Morgan Goff as the squad's most improved performer.

Walker-Hock, who is now in her 22nd season as the head coach in Columbus. Walker lettered at Carolina from 1989-91, winning NCAA titles each of those seasons. Walker ranks second in career save percentage at UNC at .902 and she is fifth in career goals against average at 0.42.

UNC hosted Texas on Wednesday, August 22 and UCF on Sunday, August 26. The Longhorns are coach by Angela Kelly, UNC Class of 1995. Kelly was a first-team All-America midfielder at Carolina in 1994 and she played on four NCAA championship teams as a Tar Heel, losing only one game in her career. Kelly is in her seventh season as the head coach at Texas.

UCF is coached by Tiffany Roberts Sahaydak who is now in her sixth season as the head

coach of the Knights. Roberts played at Carolina from 1995-98, winning national championships in 1996 and 1997. She was a first-team All-America in 1996 and 1998. She won a gold medal at the 1996 Olympic Games and she was also a member of the U.S. team which won the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup.

TAR HEELS RANKED SIXTH IN

PRESEASON USC COACHES POLL: North Carolina began the 2018 season ranked sixth in the nation by the United Soccer Coaches, third in the nation by Top Drawer Soccer and fourth in the nation by Soccer America.

Carolina has seven regular season matches scheduled against teams in the USC (formerly

National Soccer Coaches Association of America) preseason poll. That includes a match at Stanford, the defending NCAA champion and recipient of 34 of the 35 first-place votes in the poll. The other first-place vote went to 2017 NCAA runner-up UCLA.

On August 21, the first regular season polls appeared with UNC ranked #4 by United Soccer Coaches, #4 by Soccer America and #3 by Top Drawer Soccer.

On August 28, Carolina moved up to #3 in the United Soccer Coaches poll while remaining #3 in the Top Drawer Soccer poll and dropping to sixth in the Soccer America poll after the tie against Texas.

On September 4, UNC moved up to #2 in the United Soccer Coaches poll as well as the Top Drawer soccer ranking. The Tar Heels also moved up one spot in the Soccer America poll to fifth.

After dropping two games on the West Coast, UNC fell in all three national polls on September 11.

Going into the NCAA Tournament College Cup, UNC is currently ranked #3 by United Soccer Coaches, #3 by Soccer America and #5 by Top Drawer Soccer.

TAR HEELS FAVORED TO WIN 2018 ACC REGULAR SEASON CHAMPIONSHIP:

Defending Atlantic Coast Conference champion North Carolina is the preseason favorite to

win another conference title in a vote of the league's 14 head coaches. The ACC Office in Greensboro released the preseason poll on August 6.

The 21-time ACC champion Tar Heels received four first-place votes and 183 points, followed by Florida State (five first-place votes, 174 points), Virginia (two first-place votes, 173 points) and Duke (three first-place votes, 151 points). Duke won last year's regular season championship at 10-0 while North Carolina finished second at 8-0-2. The second-seeded Tar Heels defeated the top-seeded Blue Devils 1-0 in the 2017 ACC Tournament championship game in Charleston, S.C.

In the 2018 preseason balloting, NC State placed fifth in the voting, followed by Clemson, Notre Dame, Wake Forest and Louisville. Boston College placed 10th followed by Virginia Tech, Syracuse, Miami and Pitt.

North Carolina sophomore forward Alessia Russo was named to the 2018 preseason All-ACC women's soccer team. She was first-team All-ACC last year as well as the co-Freshman of the Year in the conference and the Most Valuable Player of the 2017 ACC women's soccer tournament.

ACC women's soccer teams will kick off the 2018 season on Thursday, Aug. 16. The top eight teams in the final league standings will advance to the ACC Championship, which will get underway with quarterfinal matches at campus sites on Sunday, Oct. 28. The semifinals and final are scheduled for Nov. 2 and Nov. 4 at WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, N.C.

TAR HEEL ALUMNA PARLOW CHOSEN FOR NATIONAL SOCCER HALL OF FAME:

The U.S. Soccer National Hall of Fame announced May 31 that Cindy Parlow, UNC Class of 1999, has been selected for induction in the Hall's 2018 class. She was formally inducted into the class on Saturday, October 20.

Parlow played at Carolina from 1995-98. She was a three-time National Player of the Year selection, two-time NCAA champion and

two-time College Sports Information Directors of America Academic All-America during her career. She played on the U.S. National Team for nine years, retiring in 2004 after winning the 1999 World Cup championship and 1996 and 2004 Olympic gold medals. Since 2005 she has been a successful coach on the collegiate, professional and club level with stops all across the United States

After starting for four years at forward for the Tar Heels from 1995-98, the midfielder was a key player on the U.S. Women's National Team during a remarkable stretch of years in which the program was establishing itself as a one of the best in the world. She was the youngest member of the Olympic gold medal-winning team in 1996 and also played at the 2000 Summer Games when the U.S. won a silver medal. Most notably though, she was a part of the team that would win the 1999 FIFA World Cup and scored two goals in that historic tournament, including the first in a 2-0 semifinal victory against Brazil in front of 73,123 fans at the old Stanford Stadium.

Parlow served as the head coach of the Portland Thorns in 2013. She led the Thorns to the inaugural National Women's Soccer League title that year after serving as an assistant coach at Carolina from 2006-12.

When she wrapped up her international career in 2004, Parlow had played for the USA 158 times. Prior to that, she scored 68 goals for the Tar Heels which she led to back-to-back national championships in 1996 and 1997 and won the Herrmann Trophy as the nation's top player in 1997 and 1998. She was also named the 1998 U.S. Soccer Young Female of the Year.

Parlow had a decorated history with the U.S. Women's National Team. She retired as the squad's fifth all-time leading scorer during an era in which she helped the U.S. women win the World Cup in 1999 and claim third place in 2003. Her 158 caps and 75 goals also earned her two Olympic gold medals and a silver medal and, to this day, she remains the youngest soccer player, male or female, to win an Olympic gold medal and a World Cup.

Parlow also served on the coaching staff for the U.S. U-14 & U-15 Girls' National Teams from 2010-2013.

FOURTEEN TAR HEELS ON NWSL

OPENING DAY ROSTERS IN 2018: The National Women's Soccer League, the premier professional league for women's soccer in the United States, opened its fifth season of operation with games in late March 2018. The University of North Carolina's women's soccer program was well represented as 14 former Tar Heels were on opening day rosters for the league this year. UNC was also represented by 14 players on opening day rosters in 2017. Sixteen players were on opening day rosters in 2016. A 15th Tar Heel joined the league later in the 2018 when 2007 Tar Heel alumna Heather O'Reilly became a member of the Carolina Courage of the NWSL after playing in England for two years.

Coach Anson Dorrance's Tar Heel program continues to be one of the best pipelines for players to earn roster spots in the league. THREE TAR HEEL PLAYERS CHOSEN IN

2018 NWSL DRAFT: January 18, 2018 was the annual draft day for the National Women's Soccer League and it was good news for a trio of Tar Heel seniors who had filed for the draft.

All three Tar Heels were chosen between the 24th and 32nd selections in the draft amongst the overall picks.

Midfielder Megan Buckingham was chosen in the third round of the draft by the Chicago Red Stars, the closest franchise to her Novi, Michigan home. Buckingham was the 24th pick overall.

Midfielder Abby Elinsky was selected in the third round of the draft by the Houston Dash of the NWSL. She was the 30th pick overall in the draft. Elinsky, a native of Cleveland, Ohio, played three years at Carolina after transferring from Illinois.

Midfielder Joanna Boyles was also picked in the draft. A fifth-year senior at Carolina in 2017, Boyles missed the 2016 season with an ACL tear but came back to have a tremendous senior year in 2017. Boyles was chosen by the Boston Breakers in the fourth round as the 32nd pick overall.

The 2018 NWSL season begins in March. Three of the four Tar Heels who registered for the draft were selected by NWSL teams.

DORRANCE INDUCTED INTO USC HALL OF

FAME: North Carolina women's soccer coach Anson Dorrance and former U.S. men's national team coach Bruce Arena, two of the country's most successful soccer coaches, became the newest members of the United Soccer Coaches Hall of Fame on January 19, 2018. Both individuals were inducted as the Class of 2018 during the annual Awards Banquet at the United Soccer Coaches Convention inside the Pennsylvania Convention Center in downtown Philadelphia.

Dorrance had recently completed his 41st season of overall coaching at the University of North Carolina. He has led the Tar Heels' women's soccer program to 22 national championships, becoming the first coach in NCAA history to win 20 titles in a single sport. In addition to 172 wins as the UNC men's soccer coach for 12 seasons from 1977-88, Dorrance has amassed 826 wins – the most by any coach in college soccer history – in 39 seasons since founding the women's soccer program at his alma mater in 1979. U.S. Soccer hired Dorrance to simultaneously lead the United States Women's National Team from 1986-1994 and

under Dorrance's direction, the U.S. won the first FIFA Women's World Cup in 1991.

Altogether, Dorrance has coached Tar Heel teams to 998 wins beginning in September 1977 when he started coaching the men's squad through the end of the 2017 women's campaign. From 1986-88, he simultaneously coached the women's team at Carolina, the men's team at Carolina and the U.S. Women's National Team for three years.

A member of United Soccer Coaches since 1975, Dorrance is a six-time national Coach of the Year honoree on the women's side and a one-time honoree on the men's side. He has received numerous other accolades from the United Soccer Coaches: 1992 Honorary All-American, 2001 Mike Berticelli Excellence in Coaching Education Award, 2006 Women's Soccer Award of Excellence, 2006 Bill Jeffrey College Long-Term Service Award and the 2010 Honor Award. In addition, Dorrance was inducted into the National Soccer Hall of Fame in 2008 and received the prestigious Werner Fricker Builder Award from U.S. Soccer in 2017.

The United Soccer Coaches Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to honor achievement in coaching, work on behalf of the association and lifetime contributions to the game of soccer. Each year, up to three inductees are elected into the association's Hall of Fame based on selections made through balloting of the Hall of Fame Committee. CONGRATS TO TIFF: As North Carolina begins to start its 2018 season with four successive games against teams coached by Tar Heel alumnae, a shout out is in order for Tiffany Roberts Sahaydak who last season became the first Tar Heel to defeat her mentor Anson Dorrance in a head-to-head encounter.

North Carolina lost for only the 68th time in its 39-year women's soccer history on Friday, August 25 when UCF came from behind to defeat the Tar Heels 2-1 in double overtime at Orlando, Fla.

Roberts was an All-America midfielder at Carolina, playing for the Tar Heels from 1995-98 and winning NCAA titles in 1996 and 1997. She graduated from Carolina in the Class of 1999.

17 ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAS SINCE 2005:

On November 26, 2013, UNC junior defender Caitlin Ball of Chapel Hill, N.C. was chosen as a first-team Academic All-America by Capital One and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

UNC has had 17 selections for the Capital One Academic All-America first, second and third teams since 2005.

Carolina also had seven women's soccer players named Academic All-Americans from 1983-2001, giving the program 24 selections since the Academic All-America program began in 1983. Academic All-Americans were chosen for women's soccer in an at-large pool from 1983-2004. In 2005, a specific women's soccer academic All-America Team was selected by Capital One and CoSIDA.

O'REILLY JUST SECOND TAR HEEL

EVER INDUCTED IN CoSIDA ACADEMIC

AMERICA HALL OF FAME: Four distinguished professionals, all standout collegiate scholar-athletes, were inducted as the newest members of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America® Hall of Fame. This year's class of inductees includes University of North Carolina women's soccer standout Heather O'Reilly (2003-06) who led Carolina to a pair of NCAA championships and was the CoSIDA Women's Soccer Academic All-America of the Year in her senior season in 2006.

Created in 1988, the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame recognizes former Academic All-Americans who received a college degree at least 10 years ago, have achieved lifetime success in their professional careers, and are committed to philanthropic causes.

This year's 2017 inductees into the Academic All-America Hall of Fame were:

- Heather O'Reilly, University of North Carolina women's soccer standout who helped UNC earn two NCAA titles and went on to international success with the U.S. National Team, winning three Olympic gold medals and a FIFA world championship;

- Dr. Stacey Johnson, a two-time national champion and four-time All-America fencer at San Jose State University and a 1980 U.S. Olympian;

- Rachel Price Bell, PhD, an All-America volleyball standout at the University of North Alabama who was twice selected as the top female student-athlete in the Gulf South Conference;

- Stephanie White, Purdue University women's basketball standout and the 1999 national Player of the Year when she led the Boilermakers to the 1999 NCAA championship who went on to star in the WNBA before turning to coaching professionally and at the collegiate level.

The four new inductees joined the prestigious 142-members Academic All-America® Hall of Fame this June. They were inducted into the Academic All-America® Hall of Fame at CoSIDA's annual convention in Orlando, Fla. on Sunday, June 11th during the organization's annual Hall of Fame Ceremony at the World Center Marriott. The CoSIDA convention was held in conjunction with the annual National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics

(NACDA) and Affiliates Convention for a fifth straight year.

O'Reilly became the second UNC student-athlete to be inducted into the Academic All-America Hall of Fame, joining Tar Heel swimmer Sue Walsh, Class of 1984, who was inducted in 2002.

"In our 2017 Academic All-America Hall of Fame class, we recognize four women who made major contributions to their respective collegiate sports and who continue to make significant impact in their professional careers," said Andy Seeley, UCF Assistant Athletic Director for Communications and current CoSIDA president. "As undergraduates, they excelled at the highest levels in their respective sports while also being committed to obtaining extraordinary academic success."

The June 11th Hall of Fame induction ceremony featured ESPN's Rece Davis as emcee and legendary broadcaster Dick Enberg, the ambassador of the Academic All-America® program, as special guest and presenter. At that time, the 2016 Dick Enberg Award recipient, former Ole Miss chancellor Dr. Robert Khayat, was also recognized.

"We are so pleased to announce this year's Academic All-America Hall of Fame class. For so many of us involved with CoSIDA, this annual induction celebration has truly become a special evening honoring amazing individuals with wonderful and heartfelt stories of great accomplishment as both students, athletes and citizens within their communities," noted Bernie Cafarelli, American Athletic Conference Associate Commissioner for Communications/ External Affairs and chair of the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame committee. "Their stories have a lasting impact on those who attend the event each year. On behalf of the Academic All-America committee, we are proud to welcome another distinguished group into the Academic All-America Hall of Fame."

The biographical information on this year's Academic All-America® Hall of Fame induction class is listed below.

Heather O'Reilly – University of North Carolina, '07, Soccer

A 2015 World Cup champion as a midfielder for the U.S. National Women's Soccer Team. Three-time USA Olympic gold medalist (2004, 2008, 2012). Three-time World Cup medalist. Two-time NCAA national champion while starring for the University of North Carolina soccer program.

That is the illustrious resume of O'Reilly, who began her international soccer career at the early age of 17 in 2002. That year, Heather earned her first cap with the United States Women's National Team (WSWNT). In 2004, during her sophomore year at North Carolina, her soccer dreams became a reality when she was named the youngest member of the 2004 Olympic Team.

O'Reilly was an education major at UNC, where she played forward for the Tar Heels from 2003 through 2006. She appeared in 97 matches, scoring 59 goals and assisting on 49 others. She helped lead the powerhouse UNC squad to national championships in 2003 and 2006. In her final three seasons, she was an All-America first-team selection, following her consensus national freshman of the year honor in 2003. A two-time Academic All-America in 2005 (second team) and 2006 (first team),

O'Reilly was awarded a distinctive NCAA Today's Top VIII Award following her senior year. In 2006, O'Reilly's No. 20 jersey was retired by the UNC program.

O'Reilly is one of the world's most capped soccer stars with over 200 international appearances to her name. She is also the eighth most capped player in USWNT history.

In September of 2016, O'Reilly announced her retirement from the Women's National Team after 15 years, and retired on September 15 after a friendly match against Thailand, held in Columbus, Ohio.

She signed with the Arsenal Ladies Football Club in London on January 18th, 2017. O'Reilly previously played professionally for FC Kansas City and Boston Breakers of the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) and the Sky Blue FC of Women's Professional Soccer (WPS).

RALLYING FROM A TWO-GOAL DEFICIT:

North Carolina rallied from a 2-0 halftime deficit to defeat Notre Dame on September 20, 2014 in South Bend, Ind.

The Tar Heels came back from a two-goal deficit to win for the first time since September 1, 2006 when UNC trailed Connecticut 2-0 at halftime but rallied to win 3-2 in regulation at New Haven, Conn.

Carolina has played 959 matches in its history. There have been only 25 games in that time in which the Tar Heels have ever trailed by more than a single goal in a game. That's 2.5 percent of the matches Carolina has played in history.

The Notre Dame comeback marked the fifth time UNC has rallied from two goals down to win. The Tar Heels have accomplished the feat against Santa Clara in 1993, Duke in 1999, NC State in 2003, Connecticut in 2006 and Notre Dame in 2014.

2018 VICTORY REPORTS

TAR HEELS ADVANCE TO COLLEGE CUP WITH EPIC SHOOTOUT ADVANCEMENT

PAST UCLA: Senior goalkeeper Samantha Leshnak equaled a career high with six saves and then went on to save two more shots in a penalty kick shootout as the third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team advanced to the 2018 NCAA College Cup, downing fourth-ranked UCLA 4-2 in penalty kicks after the teams tied 2-2 through 110 minutes of regulation and overtime.

The NCAA quarterfinal game was played before an overflow crowd of 904 fans at WakeMed Soccer Park's Koka Booth Stadium.

North Carolina is now 20-3-2 on the season and will advance to play second-ranked and undefeated Georgetown next Friday at Sahlen's Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park in the 2018 NCAA College Cup semifinals. All four of the #1 seeds have advanced to the College Cup with UNC meeting Georgetown at 5 p.m. Friday and defending national champion Stanford playing Florida State at 7:30 p.m. Friday in national semifinal meetings. UCLA saw its season end with a record of 17-3-2.

Goals by Julia Ashley in the third minute and Dorian Bailey in the 53rd minute put the Tar Heels up 2-0 in the match before UCLA's Hallie Mace scored a pair of goals just 53 seconds apart to tie the game at 2-2 with 32:57 left in regulation.

Neither team was able to score again before the match went to penalty kicks where Tar Heels Annie Kingman, Taylor Otto, Rachel Jones and Claudia Dickey all made their kicks from the mark while Leshnak saved penalty kicks by Julia Hernandez and Canadian National Team member Jessie Fleming in the third and fourth rounds.

Leshnak's heroics made her only the third goalkeeper in UNC history to prevail in a penalty kick shootout as Carolina is now 3-5 all-time in shootouts. Previous UNC goalkeepers to win penalty kick shootouts were Ashlyn Harris 4-2 in the ACC Tournament semifinals against Virginia in 2007 and Bryane Heaberlin 4-2 in the NCAA Tournament third round against Baylor in 2012.

Leshnak's six official saves in the game matched her career high of six set against Duke on August 18, 2017 in a 2-1 overtime win at WakeMed Soccer Park.

The Tar Heels and the Bruins both took seven shots in the first half which ended with UNC on top 1-0. North Carolina pounced quickly for a goal in just the third minute of play. After a shot by Dorian Bailey was blocked over the end line, Lotte Wubben-Moy delivered a picture-perfect corner kick from the right side into the center of the box where Julia Ashley headed it home for a 1-0 lead. It was senior tri-captain Ashley's fifth goal of the season and the official time of the goal was 2:26.

Carolina took five of the first six shots of the game and UCLA goalkeeper Teagan Micah made her only save of the half on a shot by Bailey at 16:07. At 21:57, the Bruins almost got an equalizer from Hallie Mace but Leshnak tipped it off the cross bar and then she gobbled up a header by Olivia Athens 19 seconds later to keep the Tar Heels on top. Leshnak's third save of the half came against U.S. Youth National Team player Ashley Sanchez at 35:21.

Carolina increased its lead to 2-0 at 52:04 of the match on Dorian Bailey's fifth goal of the season. Emily Fox had fed a ball down the left side that Madison Schultz gathered in. Her shot from the left side of the box was punched out by Micah but it fell directly to Bailey near the top of the box and she finished into the lower right 90 of the frame for a 2-0 UNC lead.

UNC's lead would be short-lived however. After Micah made her second save of the second half on Alex Kimball at 55:42, UCLA scored on a breakaway on the counter attack. Ashley Sanchez fed a splendid pass forward to Mace who scored on the breakaway from a tough angle into the right-side netting. It was her eighth goal of the season and the official time was 56:10. Just 53 seconds later the Bruins got the equalizer on a goal by Mace, her ninth of the campaign, as she tapped home a cross near the left post that came from the right side of the pitch by the Bruins' Delanie Sheehan.

The Bruins would outshoot the Tar Heels 9-5 in the second half but Leshnak made three saves later in the half to keep the game level. She stopped Olivia Athens at 62:14, Julia Hernandez at 79:07 and Ashley Sanchez at 81:03.

When the game went to overtime, momentum shifted back to UNC as the Tar Heels outshot the Bruins 3-0 in the first overtime period and 4-1 in the second overtime session. Micah made one save in the first overtime period, stopping an effort by Rachel Jones at 91:19. Madison Schultz almost ended the game in the

second overtime period but she hit the crossbar with a shot from distance at 103:46 and then sent a shot just wide at 107:30.

The teams advanced to a penalty kick shootout, UNC's first in an NCAA game since beating Baylor on PKs in 2012. The Bruins replaced Micah in goal for the shootout with Lauren Brzykcy. Annie Kingman made the opening effort in the shootout for UNC and Hallie Mace answered that goal. In the second round, Taylor Otto made her PK and Sunny Dunphy successfully converted for the Bruins. In the third round, freshman Rachel Jones converted for Carolina and Leshnak then extended to her left and knocked away Julia Hernandez's effort for the Bruins. In the fourth round, UNC backup goalkeeper and freshman Claudia Dickey buried her shot. That set up Leshnak's tremendous save, this time going to her right, to knock down Fleming's chance at keeping the Bruins alive.

UNC's trip to this week's College Cup will be the 28th in school history and the third in this decade (2012, 2016, 2018). UNC is now 130-13-4 all-time in NCAA matches dating to the first tournament in 1982.

The Tar Heels will play undefeated Georgetown, the nation's #2 ranked team, in the NCAA semifinals next Friday at WakeMed Soccer Park.

CAROLINA BLANKS VIRGINIA TECH FOR THIRD TIME THIS SEASON: For the second time in three weeks, senior forward Alex Kimball scored in the opening minutes to power the third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team to a victory over Virginia Tech. Kimball scored the game-winner Sunday at the 7:28 mark to lead UNC to a 3-0 victory over the Hokies in the NCAA Tournament third round before 632 fans at WakeMed Soccer Park's Koka Booth Stadium.

UNC improved to 20-3-1 with the victory and it will now host an NCAA quarterfinal game next Saturday at 5 p.m. at WakeMed Soccer Park. The Tar Heels will play either UCLA or NC State who meet in the third round Sunday night at 9 p.m. EST in Los Angeles.

Virginia Tech lost to Carolina for the third time this season and the Hokies saw their season end at 11-8-3. The 20 victories are the most for Carolina in a season since the 2013 team finished with a 20-5 record.

In the regular season meeting, UNC won at Virginia Tech 2-0 on October 13. Fifteen days later, the two teams met in the quarterfinal round of the ACC Tournament with the Tar Heels prevailing 2-0 in Cary.

In the latter game, Alex Kimball moved into the starting lineup at center forward just three days after 2018 ACC Offensive Player of the Year Alessia Russo had broken her right leg against Wake Forest. Kimball came up big in that start, scoring in the third minute of play in the eventual 2-0 victory.

Kimball replicated the feat Sunday, scoring the game-winning goal and her fourth goal of the season at the 7:28 mark. Senior Julia Ashley sent a pass from the right side of the pitch that junior forward Bridgette Andrzejewski headed back to the near post, keeping the ball alive so Kimball could run on to the loose ball and head it home for a 1-0 Tar Heel lead.

Carolina went on to finish with a shot edge of 9-1 in the first half but Mandy McGlynn made

two saves in the opening half to prevent UNC from growing its lead.

UNC would go on to score twice in the opening 11 minutes of the second half to put the game away. Alex Kimball got behind the Virginia Tech defense and shot from the left side of the box only to see her effort knocked down by McGlynn. Brianna Pinto was right there, however, to tap the rebound into the back of the net and the Tar Heels increased their lead to 2-0 at 48:01.

A third goal at 55:38 finished off whatever suspense remained in the encounter as a nifty set of passes resulted in Dorian Bailey's fourth goal of the season from about eight yards out in the left side of the penalty area. The goal finished off the passing combination deep in Hokie territory with Brianna Pinto being credited with the primary assist and Madison Schultz also assisting on the tally.

The Tar Heels outshot the Hokies 16-3 in the match, including a 7-2 edge in shots on goal. UNC took all eight corner kicks in the game. Samantha Leshnak earned the solo shutout in goal for the Tar Heels as she made two saves. McGlynn finished with four saves and three goals allowed in 90 minutes of play.

UNC improved to 17-2 all-time against the Hokies and has now won nine in a row in the series against Virginia Tech, including shutouts in the last five victories.

UNC LAUNCHES GOAL DELUGE IN

ELIMINATING JAYHAWKS: Julia Ashley had a career-high three assists and Rachael Dorwart recorded the first multi-goal game of her career as the third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team defeated Kansas 4-1 in the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament second round Friday night at WakeMed Soccer Park's Koka Booth Stadium.

With the victory, the Tar Heels improved to 19-3-1 on the season and they will play Virginia Tech for the third time this season on Sunday in the NCAA Tournament third round at 1 p.m. at WakeMed Soccer Park. Kansas saw its season come to an end Friday with a mark of 12-6-3.

The Tar Heels opened the scoring in the 12th minute and then broke the game open with two goals just 2:22 apart late in the first half en route to the victory. Ashley had never had more than a single assist in any game in her career prior to Friday before notching three assists against the Jayhawks. She is the second player to have three assists in a game this year for Carolina, joining Brianna Pinto, who had three at Syracuse on October 7.

Dorwart scored the third and fourth goals of the game for the Tar Heels on Friday night, giving her five goals on the season and four goals in the past four contests. After scoring in the season opener against Illinois on August 16, she did not score again until notching the game-winner against Clemson in the ACC Tournament semifinals on November 2. She also scored against Howard in the NCAA Tournament first round before scoring twice on Friday.

UNC outshot the Jayhawks 18-7 in the game and it had an 8-2 edge in corner kicks. The foul-filled game featured 15 fouls against the Jayhawks and 10 infractions against Carolina.

UNC almost took an early lead on a shot by Madison Schultz at the 2:56 mark which skimmed off the cross bar. The Tar Heels then opened the scoring at 11:13 on Brianna Pinto's fifth goal of the season. Pinto headed home a cross from Julia Ashley from the right side, finding the lower right portion of the goal past Kansas goalkeeper Sarah Peters.

Carolina almost doubled its lead at the 30-minute mark when Dorian Bailey's direct free kick from distance was denied by the left post. Peters made three first-half saves for the Jayhawks, keeping their deficit at a single goal before the Tar Heels broke through with a pair of goals in the first half. UNC scored at 41:10 on a header by Annie Kingman, her first goal of the season. Lotte Wubben-Moy's corner kick from the right side of the pitch found Julia Ashley in the box and the senior defender redirected the ball across the frame to Kingman who was positioned just inside the right post for the put-away.

It took the Tar Heels just over two minutes to make their lead 3-0. At 43:32, Brianna Pinto intercepted a pass in the midfield and threaded a ball through the Kansas defense to Dorwart who found herself 1v1 against Peters, producing a clean finish for a 3-0 Tar Heel advantage.

Carolina made the score 4-0 at 65:26 on Dorwart's second goal of the game as she finished from inside the six-yard line into the left corner. Julia Ashley made a deep run into the right corner and served a ball into the box that Ru Mucherera knocked down, feeding Dorwart for the tally.

Kansas got on the board at the 81:48 mark on Katie McClure's 11th goal of the season. She scored on a breakaway after taking a pass from Grace Hagan with McClure finishing with a low shot to the right of UNC goalkeeper Claudia Dickey who played the final 17:42 in goal in relief of starter Samantha Leshnak.

In the first game Friday, Virginia Tech defeated Arkansas 1-0 in double overtime. The Hokies scored the game-winning goal at 106:43 on a header by Jordan Hemmen off a corner kick by Emily Gray. Virginia Tech improved to 11-7-3 with the win while Arkansas saw its season end at 14-5-4.

UNC will face the Hokies Sunday for the third time this season. Carolina beat the Hokies 2-0 in the regular season meeting in Blacksburg and downed Virginia Tech 2-0 in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals in Cary.

TAR HEELS ADVANCE PAST HOWARD IN NCAA TOURNAMENT FIRST ROUND:

Bridgette Andrzejewski came off the bench to score a pair of goals and Julia Ashley had a goal and an assist as third-ranked North Carolina defeated Howard 4-0 in the first round of the 2018 NCAA Tournament November 10 at WakeMed Soccer Park.

A crowd of 617 fans was on hand at Koka Booth Stadium to see the Tar Heels improve to 18-3-1 on the season while Howard finished its campaign at 12-7-2. UNC will play host to Kansas next Friday in the NCAA Tournament second round at Koka Booth Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park at a time yet to be determined.

The 18 wins by Carolina this year are the most since Carolina recorded 20 victories in 2013.

Bridgette Andrzejewski had the sixth brace of her career in leading the Tar Heels to victory

and her first two-goal game since she tallied twice in a 4-1 win at Boston College on October 14, 2017. Julia Ashley and Rachael Dorwart had the other Carolina goals Saturday and five different Tar Heels had assists, including a pair by Brianna Pinto.

UNC outshot the Bison 26-1 in the game, including an edge of 11-0 in shots on goal. The Tar Heels had eight corner kicks in comparison to zero for the Bison. Both teams played two goalkeepers. Samantha Leshnak played the first half for Carolina and Claudia Dickey played the second 45 minutes. Alayah Hightower played 82:29 in goal for Howard, making six saves and allowing four goals. Mackenzie Diotte played the final 7:31 in goal for the Bison, making one save.

The Tar Heels took the lead in the 17th minute as Julia Ashley scored the game-winning goal, directing a shot from 22 yards out in the center of the pitch into the upper right corner of the frame. It was her fourth goal of her senior season.

UNC doubled its lead in the 35th minute on the first of two goals by Andrzejewski. Morgan Goff sent a ball down the left sideline that Brianna Pinto gathered in. Pinto sent a perfect cross from the left corner to the far post where Andrzejewski volleyed the ball home for her fourth goal of the season.

North Carolina extended its lead to 3-0 at 44:04. Lotte Wubben-Moy's corner kick from the left side was headed by Julia Ashley toward the left post where Andrzejewski was Johnny-on-the spot to redirect home her second goal of the game. The goal came just 8:50 after she had doubled the Tar Heel lead and it was her fifth tally of the campaign.

North Carolina finished off the scoring at 72:53 when freshman Rachael Dorwart got behind the Bison defense and poked the ball past Hightower and into the lower right part of the frame. Three UNC freshmen combined to produce the goal as Brianna Pinto sent a ball forward from midfield to Rachel Jones who then threaded a pass through the Bison defense for the finish from Dorwart.

Carolina played all 22 players dressed for the game with every player seeing at least 12 minutes of action.

DORWART'S GOAL LIFTS UNC PAST

CLEMSON IN ACC SEMIFINAL: Three Tar Heel substitutes combined to produce the game-winning goal as the third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team defeated 23rd-ranked Clemson 1-0 November 2 in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament semifinals at Sahlen's Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park. A crowd of 2,092 fans was on hand to see the Tar Heels prevail against the Tigers by a 1-0 score for the second time this season. UNC also beat the Tigers by a 1-0 margin in the regular-season meeting in Clemson.

The game marked the sixth time in the last seven meetings between the two teams in which the Tar Heels have prevailed by a single goal and in the other meeting in that time the two squads fought to a 1-1 tie.

North Carolina improved to 17-2-1 on the season with the victory while Clemson fell to 12-8 with the loss.

UNC will play seventh-ranked Florida State in

the ACC Tournament final on Sunday at 12 noon in a match to be nationally televised on ESPN. The Seminoles defeated 11th-ranked Virginia 3-1 in Friday's other semifinal game.

The Tar Heels played brilliantly in the first half, outshooting the Tigers 8-1 and taking all seven corner kicks in the game to that point. But the Tar Heels had nothing to show for it on the scoreboard.

The second half was more even statistically with Clemson outshooting Carolina 3-2 in the second 45 minutes and both teams taking two corner kicks. But it took just one moment of brilliance by a trio of Tar Heels to produce the goal that sent Carolina to its third successive ACC Tournament championship game appearance after a string of six straight years in which UNC was unable to get to the final game.

The goal came at the 64:46 mark of the match off the foot of freshman forward Rachael Dorwart. Senior Annie Kingman won a ball in the midfield and sent a pass down the left side to freshman forward Rachel Jones who dribbled along the end line. Jones crossed from the left side to Dorwart on the near post and the freshman from Pennsylvania redirected the ball past Clemson goalkeeper Sandy MacIver for the game-winner.

It was Dorwart's second goal of the season and her first since she scored in the season opener against Illinois on August 16. Jones and Kingman each recorded their third assists of the season on the play.

The Tar Heels pressured the Clemson goal early and often in the game. Bridgette Andrzejewski sent a header just high at 7:12 of the game. Just less than two minutes later, Madison Schultz sent a cross from the left side which Andrzejewski headed off the cross bar. The ball fell to Alex Kimball who sent her effort to score on the rebound just wide of the left post. UNC took the next five shots of the first half including a shot from distance by Annie Kingman at 28:46 that went just wide to the right. Clemson would get its first shot of the match with four seconds left in the first half as Grace Wagner's effort sailed wide.

After UNC took the lead in the 65th minute, Clemson almost got the equalizer in the 70th minute. After a corner kick by the Tigers, Kimber Haley took a shot from distance that clanged off the cross bar and Dani Antieau's rebound shot was cleared off the goal line by a Tar Heel defender.

The Tar Heels were able to ride out the rest of the match with a strong defensive effort, setting up a meeting with the Seminoles in the final match. In the regular season meeting, UNC defeated Florida State 1-0 on September 14 in Tallahassee.

UNC outshot the Tigers 10-4 in the match and had an edge in corner kicks 9-2. Samantha Leshnak went the whole way in goal for the Tar Heels, improving her goalkeeper record to 11-0 and earning her sixth solo shutout of the campaign. Sandy MacIver played the whole way in goal for Clemson and made one save.

CAROLINA ADVANCES TO ACC SEMIFINALS WITH SHUTOUT WIN OVER VIRGINIA TECH:

Goals by Alex Kimball and Dorian Bailey and another stout defensive effort led the third-ranked North Carolina women's soccer team to a 2-0 victory Sunday afternoon in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament at

WakeMed Soccer Park.

With their 11th successive victory, the Tar Heels improved to 16-2-1 on the season and they will play Clemson next Friday in the ACC Tournament semifinals at WakeMed Soccer Park at 5:30 p.m. The other semifinal game will feature Virginia versus Florida State at 8 p.m. Both games will be televised nationally on ACC Network Extra.

UNC posted its fifth successive clean sheet and has not allowed a goal since the first half of a 7-1 win at Syracuse on October 7. Samantha Leshnak played the whole way in goal for the Tar Heels and in the process posted her fifth solo shutout of the campaign.

Carolina outshot Virginia Tech (9-7-3) by a 20-3 margin overall and a 10-0 difference in shots on goal. Carolina had seven corner kicks in the game to three by the Hokies.

UNC scored early and late in moving to 3-0 all-time in ACC Tournament matches against the Hokies. UNC's first goal came at 2:20 off the foot of Alex Kimball, a redshirt senior from Chapel Hill. Kimball was starting just her second game of the year and her first as a forward in lieu of Carolina's leading scorer Alessia Russo, who suffered a broken leg last Thursday in UNC's 1-0 win over Wake Forest in the regular-season finale.

Kimball made the most of her chance to step in and help the Tar Heels as she played 66 minutes and notched her second goal of the campaign and first game-winner. Kimball slipped a ball to Bridgette Andrzejewski on a fast break and the junior forward from Maryland nutmegged a Virginia Tech defender with her pass back to Kimball, freeing Kimball past the Hokies' defensive line. Kimball's initial shot from just inside the box was knocked down by Hokies' goalkeeper Mandy McGlynn but Kimball immediately pounced on her own rebound and buried it in the back of the net for a 1-0 margin.

UNC would go on to dominate possession throughout the game but McGlynn, a U.S. U20 National Team goalkeeper, kept UNC at bay for much of the match with eight saves. A teammate of UNC players Brianna Pinto and Emily Fox at the U20 World Cup in France, McGlynn was at her best at the 81:50 mark when she laid out to her left to stop a rebound shot by Dorian Bailey that seemed destined for the back of the net.

That save kept the Hokies in the match but seven minutes later Bailey made the play to make sure there would be no Virginia Tech comeback at the end. Bailey intercepted a clearance by McGlynn about 40 yards from goal, beat two Virginia Tech defenders on the dribble and shot from 15 yards out left-footed, beating McGlynn into the lower right part of the goal for her third goal of the season. Bailey also scored the insurance goal in a 2-0 win over the Hokies in the regular season in Blacksburg on October 13.

With the Tar Heels' bench thinned by injuries, Tar Heel head coach still made liberal use of his bench as all six UNC reserves who played in the game saw 24 minutes or more of action.

Friday's game against Clemson will be the second between the two teams this season. UNC beat the Tigers in the regular season 1-0 on September 23 in Clemson, S.C.

UNC improved to 16-2 all-time against the Hokies and has now won eight in a row in the series against Virginia Tech, including shutouts

in the last four victories.

UNC DOWNS WAKE FOREST TO FINISH ACC REGULAR SEASON WITH PERFECT RECORD:

Junior forward Madison Schultz's flair for the dramatic returned to benefit the third-ranked North Carolina women's soccer team on October 25 as the Tar Heels defeated Wake Forest 1-0 at WakeMed Soccer Park to finish the 2018 ACC regular season schedule undefeated and untied, the first time Carolina has accomplished that feat since 2006.

Schultz headed home the game-winning goal in the 74th minute to provide the Tar Heels with the winning margin in a hard-fought defensive battle in which the Demon Deacons held Carolina to a season-low seven shots.

The junior from Edmonds, Wash., held her line and split a pair of Wake Forest defenders to deliver a header from 12 yards that found the right side of the goal past Demon Deacon goalkeeper Nonie Frishette. Annie Kingman tackled the ball away from a Demon Deacon defender moments earlier and Taylor Otto sent a short pass to Julia Ashley who then launched a perfect cross into the box to Schultz.

Schultz was starting for the first time in the season as Rachel Jones was nursing an injury. Her game-winning goal was her second of the season and seventh of her career. Her other game-winning tally came in the season opener against Illinois on August 16. It was two years ago that she scored five goals, all game-winners, beginning with the final game of the 2016 ACC regular season against Florida State. She went on to score the game-winning tallies against Virginia in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals, against Liberty in the NCAA first round, against Kansas in the NCAA second round and against South Carolina in the NCAA quarterfinals. Altogether, seven of her 10 career goals have been game-winning tallies as she has delivered at the most opportune times in her career.

With the win, UNC finished the regular season on a 10-game winning streak, notching a 15-2-1 overall mark and a perfect 10-0 ledger in ACC play. Wake Forest saw its two-match winning streak end and the Demon Deacons conclude the regular season at 8-8-1 overall and 4-6 in the ACC.

The 10 ACC wins equal the most UNC has recorded in a single season in history. It also won 10 league matches in 2006 and 2013. The 10-0-0 mark is the first time since 2006 that Carolina has finished undefeated and untied in ACC regular season play. UNC was also 10-0-0 that season.

The game was very even statistically. UNC outshot the Demon Deacons 7-5, including a 4-2 edge in shots on goal. The Tar Heels had three corner kicks to two for the Demon Deacons. Nonie Frishette played the entire 90 minutes in goal for Wake Forest, making three saves while allowing one goal. Senior Samantha Leshnak went the whole way in goal for the Tar Heels, making two saves and recording her fourth solo shutout of the season.

Carolina outshot the Demon Deacons 4-1 in the first half and had three excellent chances to take the lead. Frishette made outstanding saves on a pair of shots by Alessia Russo at 15:58 in a one-on-one situation after a Wake Forest turnover and again at 35:37, forcing a corner kick. After a foul by Wake Forest in the 42nd

minute of play, Lotte Wubben-Moy served a ball into the middle of the penalty box that bounced around before being cleared off the end line at the very last second by a Demon Deacon defender for a corner kick.

Leshnak made one save in each half for Carolina. Wake Forest took four of the first five shots of the second half, but UNC defense clamped down and denied the Deacs a shot in the final 18:32 of the match.

The game was the final regular season home game for Tar Heel seniors Nicole Crutchfield, Dorian Bailey, Megan Joyner, Annie Kingman, Sydney Wooten, Alex Kimball, Samantha Leshnak, Julia Ashley, Kate Morris, Jessie Scarpa and Maggie Bill.

UNC BEATS MIAMI TO EARN ACC

REGULAR SEASON TITLE: Goals by reserve strikers Zoe Redei and Sydney Spruill lifted the third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team to a 2-0 victory over Miami on October 25 before an overflow crowd of 932 fans at Koka Booth Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park.

The victory was the ninth in a row for head coach Anson Dorrance's Tar Heels who improved to 14-2-1 on the season overall and a perfect 9-0 in ACC play. The Hurricanes fell to 5-9-3 overall and 2-6-1 in ACC play.

The win by Carolina clinches the 2018 Atlantic Coast Conference regular season championship for the Tar Heels with one game left to play in the campaign. UNC has notched 22 ACC regular season crowns since league play began in 1987. Twenty-one of those titles have been outright championships, the last of which came in 2010 when Carolina finished 8-2 in the league. UNC shared the regular-season crown in 2014 when both UNC and Florida State finished 9-0-1 in conference play, including a 1-1 tie between the two teams at Fetzer Field.

UNC dominated every aspect of Sunday's match against the Hurricanes. UNC outshot the Canes 36-2 overall and 19-0 in shots on goal. Carolina also had nine corner kicks to one for Miami.

Carolina outshot the Canes 13-0 in the first half with seven of the Tar Heel shots being saved by Miami goalkeeper Phallon Tullis-Joyce. UNC almost took the lead in the 16th minute of play as Alessia Russo got behind the Miami defense only to see her scoring effort clang off the right post. UNC continued to press the entire half and finally broke through on the 11th shot of the first half. UNC striker reserves Alex Kimball played a give-and-go deep in Miami's end of the field before Redei scored at the 40:20 mark for her fourth goal of the season. Redei sent a shot from the right side of the box that sailed over Tullis-Joyce, hit the left post and bounded into the back of the net for a 1-0 Tar Heel lead.

UNC went on to outshoot the Hurricanes 23-2 in the second half, averaging a shot every two minutes. The Tar Heels got separation at the 58:15 mark on Sydney Spruill's first goal of the season and the second of her career. Bridgette Andrzejewski eluded a pair of Miami defenders on the right side of the box and then sent a nifty cross through the box to Spruill who powered a shot from 12 yards out into the upper left side of the goal, making it 2-0 Tar Heels.

Claudia Dickey and Samantha Leshnak each played 45 minutes in goal for Carolina,

combining on a solo shutout and not being required to make a save. Dickey's goalkeeper record improved to 6-2-1 in the process. Phallon Tullis-Joyce made 17 saves for Miami which is a new school record for the Hurricanes. The previous record was 14 saves made by Vikki Alonzo, also against UNC, on November 2, 2008.

Next up for the Tar Heels will be a match against Wake Forest at 6 p.m. on Thursday at Koka Booth Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park. The game will be nationally televised on ACC Network Extra. It will be Senior Night for the Tar Heels with 11 players currently in their fourth or fifth years in the program being honored in pre-match ceremonies.

UNC has also now clinched home field advantage for the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament. The Tar Heels will face the tournament's #8 seed next Sunday at 1 p.m. at Koka Booth Stadium at WakeMed Soccer Park in a match to be televised nationally on ACC Network Extra.

TAR HEELS DOWN EAGLES BEHIND

RUSSO'S EARLY GOAL: Third-ranked North Carolina and 11th-ranked Boston College competed in what seemed like a post-season atmosphere Thursday afternoon at WakeMed Soccer Park with the Tar Heels prevailing 1-0 and in the process inching closer to clinching its first undisputed conference regular-season championship since 2010.

Alessia Russo scored off a turnover just 5:18 into the match and it held up for the game-winner in a match in which both teams threatened the add to the scoreboard up to the final whistle.

With the win, UNC has now won eight straight matches and it needs one more win to clinch the ACC regular-season championship outright. The Tar Heels are now 13-2-1 overall and 8-0-0 in the league. Boston College lost for only the second time this season and is now 13-2-1 overall and 5-2-1 in the league.

UNC's last undisputed ACC crown was 2010 when the Tar Heels finished league play 8-2. In 2014, UNC shared the conference regular-season crown with a 9-0-1 mark.

The Tar Heels scored the game-winning goal at 5:18 of the match as Alessia Russo notched her team-leading sixth goal of the season. Boston College goalkeeper Alexis Bryant mishit her goal kick and Russo ran on to the ball about 28 yards from the goal, dribbled into the box and finished craftily into the lower right corner as Bryant came out to cut down the angle.

Moments later Samantha Leshnak made a save on a shot by Sam Coffey, one of only two shots by BC that was on frame in the match despite the fact the Eagles took 12 shots overall. Both teams attacked each others' goal frames with gusto for the remainder of the half with BC taking six first half shots and North Carolina taking eight. At 17:35, Olivia Vaughn almost earned the equalizer as her shot from in the box on the left side clanged off the cross bar. Her rebound eight seconds later was blocked as UNC dodged a bullet and held on to its lead.

In the second half, the Tar Heels had seven shots on goal to six for BC. In the second half, despite being constantly peppered, Leshnak had to make only one save officially, stopping a shot by Jenna Bike just three minutes into the second half. Bryant made two second-half saves on

shots by Russo and another on an attempt by Rachel Jones. Carolina was eventually able to celebrate its victory after a last gasp effort by the Eagles' Kayla Duran flew high of the goal with 21 seconds to play.

Altogether, UNC outshot the Eagles 15-12, including a margin of 5-2 in shots on goal. The Tar Heels had eight corner kicks in the match in comparison to two for the Eagles. UNC was charged with 10 fouls and Carolina just six.

Alexis Bryant played all 90 minutes in goal for BC, making four saves and allowing just the one goal. She is now 13-2-1 on the season. Samantha Leshnak improved her goalkeeper record to 8-0-0 overall, playing all 90 minutes and making two saves. She now has three solo shutouts this season.

UNC improved to 18-1 overall against Boston College and has won seven straight games in the series. This was the fifth time in those seven games that Carolina has prevailed by a 1-0 margin.

CAROLINA WINS AT VIRGINIA TECH FOR SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR: Goals by Alessia Russo and Dorian Bailey powered the University of North Carolina's women's soccer team to a 2-0 victory over Virginia Tech October 13 at Thompson Field. The victory was the seventh in a row for Coach Anson Dorrance's team and lifted the Tar Heels to 12-2-1 on the season and 7-0 in the ACC.

Carolina remains in control of its own fate in the ACC regular-season race as the Tar Heels now finish their regular-season with three successive home games at WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, N.C. UNC will play host to Boston College Thursday at 3 p.m., Miami on October 21 at 1 p.m. and Wake Forest on October 25 at 6 p.m. in Cary.

UNC emerged with its seventh successive win over Virginia Tech following wins by the Hokies in Blacksburg in 2009 and 2011. The Tar Heels are 15-2 all-time against Virginia Tech, including a 7-2 mark in games played in Blacksburg.

UNC finished with a 13-6 edges in shots in the game and the Tar Heels took five corner kicks to one for the Hokies.

The game-winning goal for the Tar Heels came at the 21:19 mark of the match as Alessia Russo finished from the top of the box into the lower right corner past Hokie goalkeeper Mandy McGlynn. It was Russo's fifth goal of the season. She was assisted on the goal by both Bridgette Andrzejewski who sent a nice pass forward to spring Russo free and by Julia Ashley who served a free kick to Andrzejewski after a foul on the Hokies.

The Tar Heels added an insurance goal at the 80:35 mark of the match off the foot of Dorian Bailey who notched her second score of the season. Bailey finished inside the box past McGlynn after taking a nifty through ball from Rachel Jones. Morgan Goff had the secondary assist on the goal.

McGlynn went the entire way in goal for Virginia Tech and made four saves while allowing two goals. Samantha Leshnak went the entire way in goal for the Tar Heels and made two saves while posting her second solo shutout of the season.

Carolina handed Virginia Tech its first loss at home all season. The Hokies are now 5-1-1 this season in Blacksburg. The Hokies are 7-5-3 overall this season and 3-4 in the ACC.

SEVEN GOAL SCORERS LEAD TAR HEELS

PAST ORANGE: Brianna Pinto assisted on the first two goals of the game and added an insurance goal in the 69th minute to boost the UNC lead to three goals as the third-ranked North Carolina women's soccer team defeated Syracuse 7-1 on October 7 at the SU Soccer Stadium.

Carolina improved to 11-2-1 with the victory and is now 6-0 in the ACC. Syracuse is 3-11 and 0-6 in conference play. Carolina has won six in a row with four ACC regular season contests remaining.

Altogether, Pinto finished with five points in the game as she assisted on the Tar Heels' goal in the 79th minute as well. Seven different Tar Heels scored goals – Bridgette Andrzejewski, Brianna Pinto, Morgan Goff, Julia Ashley, Jessie Scarpa, Zoe Redei and Alex Kimball. Pinto had three assists in the game and Taylor Otto added a pair of assists for Carolina.

Carolina opened the scoring at the 4:52 mark as Bridgette Andrzejewski headed home her third goal of the season off a brilliant free kick by Brianna Pinto. After a foul on the Orange, Pinto took a free kick from about 30 yards out and she put it right on the top of the head of Andrzejewski who finished across frame into the right side of the goal.

UNC doubled its lead at 24:04 on Julia Ashley's third goal of the season with Pinto again assisting. Pinto took a corner kick from the right side and sent it on a rope to Ashley who was positioned just inside the left post. Ashley headed the ball into the roof of the goal for a 2-0 Tar Heel lead.

After Meghan Root scored for Syracuse at the 27:12 mark off an assist by Kate Hostage, UNC answered with its third goal of the game. Alex Kimball finished from 10 yards out in the center of the box off assists by Rachel Dorwart and Taylor Otto with the official time of the goal being 34:07.

The Tar Heels scored three goals after the midway point of the second half to break the game wide open. UNC tallied four goals in a span of less than 16 minutes from the 69th minute to the 85th minute to turn a 3-1 lead into a 7-1 final.

At 68:54, Brianna Pinto scored off an assist by Jessie Scarpa to make it 4-1. Scarpa made a nice run into the deep right corner and fed Pinto who was on the doorstep just outside three yards for the putaway. Pinto redirected the ball into the back of the goal to make it 4-1 Tar Heels.

At 78:44, Morgan Goff tallied her first goal of the season, finishing a series of passes off a corner kick. Annie Kingman took the corner kick from the left side and found Brianna Pinto's head in the middle of the box. Pinto sent it on to Taylor Otto on the right end line. Otto sent it back into the center of the box for a nifty finish by Goff.

The Tar Heels added to their lead at 80:23 on Zoe Redei's third goal of the season, assisted by Mary Elliott McCabe. It was the second assist of the year for McCabe. McCabe beat defenders on the right side of the box and centered to Redei for the putaway.

Carolina's final goal came at 84:35 as Jessie Scarpa scored her first goal of the year, tallying on a rebound shot after Annie Kingman's initial shot off a free kick was initially saved by SU

goalkeeper Jordan Harris.

UNC outshot the Orange 29-5 in the game, including an 18-1 edge in shots on goal. UNC had seven corner kicks to one for the Orange.

LATE GOAL BY OTTO SECURES WIN

AT NOTRE DAME: Taylor Otto scored on a rebound at the 85:39 mark of the match to lift third-ranked North Carolina to a 2-1 victory over Notre Dame in ACC women's soccer action at Alumni Stadium on October 4.

With the win, the Tar Heels remain the only unbeaten and untied team in ACC play, improving to 10-2-1 overall and 5-0 in the conference with their fifth straight win. Notre Dame is now 6-7 overall and 2-3 in the ACC. Carolina now leads the all-time series between the two teams 18-7-3.

Since the Fighting Irish joined the league in 2013, Notre Dame had scored first in each of the previous regular-season meetings between the two teams. But Carolina ended that streak by scoring 22 seconds into the match as Alessia Russo scored her fourth goal of the season off a perfect cross from the deep left corner by Emily Fox. Rachel Jones also assisted on the goal.

After a foul on Notre Dame in the ninth minute, Brianna Pinto served a brilliant ball into the penalty area that Morgan Goff almost headed inside the right post only to see Brooke Littman make a fingertip save. It was one of two saves on the night for Littman. The other save for the Notre Dame keeper came in the 32nd minute on another header by Goff off a corner kick.

After the Tar Heels took four of the first six shots of the game, Notre Dame started finding its stride and eventually produced an equalizer at 10:30 on Karin Muya's third goal of the season, assisted by Sabrina Flores and Alexis Martellamothe. A header by Martellamothe found Flores who slipped the ball through to Muya who finished past UNC starting goalkeeper Claudia Dickey into the left side of the goal frame.

Notre Dame outshot the Tar Heels 7-6 in the first half and Dickey made four saves in the 45-minute period, matching her career high for saves in a game set earlier this season against Texas.

The second half was titled more in the direction of North Carolina as UNC outshot the Fighting Irish 9-3 after halftime. But of the 12 shots in the second half, only two were on frame between the two squads. In the 67th minute, Notre Dame almost scored on a header off a corner kick but the scoring effort by Martellamothe was punched out of harm's way by UNC senior goalkeeper Samantha Leshnak, who came on in the second half and played at a high level for the Tar Heels, helping the UNC defense limit Notre Dame to only three shots after halftime.

Despite peppering the Notre Dame goal with shots in the second half, Carolina was not able to get a shot on goal until the 86th minute and it proved to be the game-winning tally. Alessia Russo's shot at the top of the box was blocked by Notre Dame's Rachel Heard. But Taylor Otto made a tremendous run to take the rebound in stride, beating the Notre Dame defender to the ball and finishing from 10 yards out at 85:39 past Littman.

Carolina successfully killed off the final four minutes of the game to emerge victorious before a crowd of 733 fans.

TAR HEELS BEAT CARDINALS IN BATTLE OF ACC UNBEATENS SEPTEMBER 29:

Sophomores Alessia Russo and Taylor Otto each scored a pair of goals to spark the North Carolina women's soccer team offensively as the Tar Heels defeated Louisville 5-1 Saturday afternoon, September 29 at WakeMed Soccer Park.

Heading into the game both the Cardinals and the Tar Heels were undefeated in ACC play and neither team had allowed a goal in a conference match. But all that went out the window in the early stages of the match. After Louisville scored on a counter attack in the sixth minute, the Tar Heels answered with two goals just 3:20 apart in the 16th and 20th minutes en route to scoring the final five goals of the game.

With the win, Carolina improved to 9-2-1 overall and 4-0 in the ACC. The Tar Heels are now the only unbeaten and untied team in league play as the ACC season heads into its midway point. Louisville saw its four-game winning streak come to an end and the Cardinals are now 9-2 overall and 3-1 in the league.

The five goals were the most scored by the Tar Heels in a game since September 30, 2017 when UNC beat Syracuse 7-0 at WakeMed Soccer Park. Louisville had allowed only six goals this season in its first 10 games but surrendered five goals in the first 49 minutes of Saturday's match, all in a span of less than 35 minutes.

UNC controlled play off the opening whistle with Alessia Russo sending a curling shot off the cross bar at 1:34 of the match. Just over three minutes later, the Cardinals capitalized on a Tar Heel turnover at midfield as Brooklyn Rivers gathered in a ball on the right sideline and quickly shifted fields to an open Emina Ekic, who dribbled in on a breakaway to score from 15 yards out in the left side of the box. Ekic sent the ball into the right side of the goal past UNC starting goalkeeper Claudia Dickey.

About seven minutes later, Louisville had an enormous opportunity to go up two goals. On a scramble off a corner kick, Ekic found herself alone in the center part of the field about 20 yards out. Her strike hit the cross bar's upper right corner before bouncing off Dickey and over the end line for another corner kick.

Given the reprieve, the Tar Heels took full advantage and dominated the rest of the first half, outshooting the Cardinals 10-5 in the opening 45 minutes. In the 16th minute, UNC midfielder Taylor Otto was fouled about 26 yards away from goal in the center of the pitch. Alessia Russo stepped up and drove her direct free kick past the wall and into the lower right part of the frame off the fingertips of Louisville goalkeeper Gabrielle Kouzelos for her second goal of the year.

Less than four minutes later, UNC seized the lead for good on the niftiest goal of the day. Brooke Bingham sent a ball from the defensive end that Dorian Bailey headed toward the Cardinals' goal and into the path of Russo. The sophomore forward from England split two defenders and finished from inside the box past the Louisville keeper, going far post for her third goal of the season. It also proved to be the game-winning goal.

The Tar Heels made it 3-1 at the 28:59 mark of the match off a corner kick. Lotte Wubben-

Moy's delivery went through the box to Julia Ashley who one-touched it to Taylor Otto on the end line to the right of the goal. Otto sent a low cross to Dorian Bailey who finished from in close in the center of the box for her first goal of the season.

At the 33:11 mark, Russo was taken down in the penalty box, rewarding Carolina with just its second penalty kick of the season. Taylor Otto stepped to the spot and delivered into the left side of the frame for her third goal of the campaign.

Carolina was rewarded another penalty kick with at the 48:44 mark after Bridgette Andrzejewski was fouled in the penalty box. Otto again converted, finishing with authority inside the right post to make the final margin 5-1.

The Tar Heels were able to play 26 players in the game with both Annie Kingman and Maggie Bill returning from injuries to play as reserves. In addition, Kasey Parker saw five minutes of playing time, seeing her first action after being sidelined by injuries since midway through the 2016 season.

UNC finished with a 13-8 advantages in shots on goal. That included an 8-3 advantage in shots on frame. The Tar Heels had six corner kicks to three for the Cardinals.

Kouzelos played all 90 minutes in goal for Louisville, making four saves while allowing five goals. Dickey and Samantha Leshnak each played one half for the Tar Heels. Leshnak made a pair of saves for UNC.

The win was the first ever for Carolina over Louisville. The series is now tied at 1-1-1 since the first game in the series in 2015.

CAROLINA GRABS KEY ACC ROAD

WIN OVER CLEMSON: The fifth-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team remained unbeaten in the Atlantic Coast Conference as it defeated Clemson 1-0 Sunday afternoon at Historic Riggs Field before a crowd of 571. Both teams had gone into the match undefeated in the ACC and the Tar Heels prevailed on a first half goal by Rachel Jones to improve to 8-2-1 overall and 3-0 in the ACC. Clemson fell to 7-4 overall and 2-1 in league play.

As Sunday closed, UNC, Louisville and Boston College remained the only undefeated teams in ACC play and the Tar Heels have upcoming home games with both of those teams.

Both teams' defenses were at their best in what has annually become a close-knit game. In the last six meetings between the two teams, UNC has five one-goal wins and the other match ended in a 1-1 tie in a regular season meeting at Clemson.

The only goal of the game came at 24:59 when Rachel Jones took the ball away from a Tiger defender, dribbled into the box and expertly finished into the right side of the frame from 15 yards out past Clemson goalkeeper Sandy MacIver. It was Jones' second goal of the season and her second game-winning tally. She also scored in the first half of UNC's 1-0 win at Florida State nine days ago.

Claudia Dickey had made a key save early in the half for the Tar Heels at 8:23 of the match to keep the game deadlocked. Off a long throw in by Sam Staab that found the head of Dani Antieau just yards away from the goal Dickey smothered Antieau's header, keeping it from

going over the line by just inches. Clemson's other best chance came in the 51st minutes when a shot by Mariana Speckmaier was deflected by a Tar Heel defender before going off the left post.

UNC finished with an 11-6 edge in total shots and a 3-2 margin in shots on goal. UNC had five corner kicks in the game, compared to one for the Tigers.

MacIver played the whole way in goal for Clemson, making two saves. Dickey played the first half for Carolina in goal and Samantha Leshnak played the second half. Each made one save.

With the win, the Tar Heels improved their all-time record against the Tigers to 32-1-1.

TAR HEELS DOWN PITT 3-0 TO IMPROVE TO 2-0 IN ACC:

The fifth-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team scored a pair of goals in the opening 22 minutes of the game and went on to roll past the Pittsburgh Panthers 3-0 Thursday night before a crowd of 310 fans at WakeMed Soccer Park.

The game was moved to Cary after the Tar Heels' 2018 home at Finley Fields South was under significant flood water early in the week in the aftermath of Hurricane Florence.

Sophomore striker Alessia Russo scored her first goal of the season, a game-winner, and also added an assist in the Tar Heel triumph as Carolina improved to 7-2-1 overall and 2-0 in the ACC. Sophomore defender Emily Fox and senior midfielder Dorian Bailey each had two assists in the victory and junior forward Bridgette Andrzejewski and freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto each scored goals for the Tar Heels.

UNC finished with a 24-1 edge in shots against the Panthers, who fell to 4-4-1 overall and 0-2 in the ACC. UNC had all three corner kicks in the game. Both teams played two goalkeepers. Claudia Dickey made her first career start for the Tar Heels, making one save, and Samantha Leshnak played the second half, combining with Dickey on the shutout. Twelve of UNC's 24 shots were on frame. Amaia Pena played the first half in goal for Pitt and made four saves while allowing two goals. Katherine Robinson played the second half for the Panthers and made five saves while allowing Carolina's third goal.

The Tar Heels opened the scoring at the 16:36 mark of the game as Russo tallied her first goal of the season. Dorian Bailey sent a ball from the end line on the left side of the pitch into the middle of the box where the English youth international player tapped in the cross from close range to put Carolina ahead.

It took the Tar Heels just a little over five minutes to double their lead. The goal came on a header by Bridgette Andrzejewski, her second tally of the season, at the 21:53 mark. Bailey again served the primary assist from the left side of the pitch after taking a brilliant through ball from Emily Fox.

UNC went on to outshoot the Panthers by a 12-1 margin in the first half but Pena made a couple of key stops to keep the Tar Heels from extending their lead. In the 52nd minute of the game, the Tar Heels got the insurance goal they needed for separation. Brianna Pinto tallied her third goal of the season at 51:50 with a finish from the top of the 18-yard penalty box after a series of nifty passes set her up. Both Fox and

Russo were credited with assists on the goal.

Carolina kept firing away at the Panthers' goal, but five second-half saves by Robinson kept the final score at 3-0.

Altogether, UNC head coach Anson Dorrance played a deep bench and had 22 players overall on the pitch. Twenty-one of the 22 Tar Heels who played in the game logged 18 or more minutes.

Carolina will next be in action on Sunday with a 1 p.m. game at Clemson at Historic Riggs Field. It will be a battle to remain atop the ACC standings as both the Tar Heels and the Tigers go into the game at 2-0 in the ACC. The Tigers will be playing their third straight conference home game after springing a 1-0 double overtime upset on fourth-ranked Virginia Thursday night. In their previous game the Tigers had beaten Miami 2-1 in overtime. Sunday's game will be televised nationally on ACC Network Extra.

UNC improved to 4-0 all-time against Pittsburgh with the win on Thursday. Three of Carolina's all-time wins against the Panthers have come via shutout.

FIRST CAREER GOAL BY JONES SPARKS TAR HEELS PAST #2 FSU: Freshman forward Rachel Jones scored her first career goal in the 29th minute of play and that was just enough to lift the sixth-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team past second-ranked Florida State Friday night before a crowd of 3,146 fans at the Seminole Soccer Complex.

After dropping games at Santa Clara and Stanford last weekend, UNC broke a two-match losing streak and improved to 6-2-1 overall and 1-0 in the ACC. Florida State, which trailed for the first time all season, fell to 7-1-1 overall and 0-1 in the ACC. The Tar Heels return to action Thursday against Pittsburgh at 4 p.m. at Finley Fields South in their ACC home opener. The match will be nationally televised on ACC Network Extra.

Carolina has now won its last three meetings against the Seminoles, including 1-0 regular-season wins in each of the past two seasons in Tallahassee.

UNC outshot the Seminoles 12-8 and held the Seminoles without a shot on goal. UNC had just three shots on goal in the game as just three of the 20 shots combined between the two teams were on frame.

The only goal of the game came at 28:24 when sophomore midfielder Taylor Otto send a ball from the Tar Heels' defensive end on to the foot of sophomore striker Alessia Russo. The English youth national team player dribbled down the middle of the pitch and found Rachel Jones on the left side of the penalty area and the freshman from Georgia finished from 15 yards out into the lower right corner of the goal.

Florida State's best chance to score in the game came in the sixth minute off a corner kick. Anna Patten got herself free at the near post but her header went wide from short range. In the 19th minute, a nifty passing combination got the Tar Heels into the penalty area against FSU goalkeeper Brooke Bollinger but Bridgette Andrzejewski's volley went wide right of the goal.

The Tar Heels had the next three shots of the game and broke through at 28:24 with the goal by Jones. FSU then had the last four shots of the first half but the first three were not on frame

and the last was blocked.

In the second half, the Tar Heel defense clamped down, limiting the Seminoles to just two shots, neither on goal. The Seminoles had a shot a minute into the second half and then took their final shot in the 75th minute.

UNC pressed to get an insurance goal, outshooting FSU 8-2 in the final 45 minutes. Alessia Russo forced a save by Bollinger in the 56th minute and Morgan Goff's header off a corner kick was saved by Bollinger at the 68:46 mark.

UNC has now won its last three meetings between the two teams and it is now 4-0-1 in its last five meetings against Florida State. That follows a seven-game span in which Florida State went 6-0-1 against the Tar Heels from 2011 through 2015. Carolina is now 28-8-4 all-time against the Seminoles. FSU has the most wins by any team against Carolina, earning eight wins. UNC has lost just 72 matches since the varsity program started in 1979.

RESERVES POWER TAR HEELS PAST MARQUETTE AT DUKE NIKE CLASSIC:

The third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team notched three goals in a span of 9:34 late in the first half Sunday, September 2, going on to post a clean sheet in a 4-0 victory over Marquette at the Duke Nike Classic at Koskinen Stadium.

Junior striker Zoe Redei recorded a brace in a span of just over eight minutes, matching her goal total for the 2017 season in the process. Senior defender Julia Ashley had a goal and an assist in the match and junior forward Madison Schultz recorded her second goal of the season as the Tar Heels got three of their four goals off the bench.

UNC's defense ended with its third successive clean sheet and Carolina has not allowed a goal since the 1:10 mark of the match against Texas on August 22. UNC has not been scored on in the past 378 minutes and 50 seconds.

Carolina had struggled with finishing in its previous three games – a 1-1 tie with Texas and 1-0 wins over UCF and Providence. But Sunday against the Golden Eagles, a flurry late in the first half saw the Tar Heels light up the scoreboard.

After Carolina made six substitutions at a water break at the 25:16 mark, UNC scored just 13 seconds later off the foot of Redei, who had missed the first four games of the season with a leg injury before playing 10 minutes in Thursday's win over Providence. Julia Ashley launched a pass from midfield to Redei who pushed it out wide to the right side to Bridgette Andrzejewski. The junior forward from Maryland returned the ball to Redei, whose run left her wide open in the middle of the penalty box for a one touch into the lower left side of the goal.

It did not take long before Redei found the back of the net again. Ashley again initiated the play with a pass to Sydney Spruill at the top of the 18-yard box. Spruill outfought two Golden Eagle players for the play and sent the ball to a wide open Redei in the right side of the box. Redei finished almost identically to her previous goal and at 33:35, UNC had doubles its lead to 2-0.

It took less than a minute and a half for Carolina to add to that lead. After a foul on the Golden Eagles, sophomore defender Lotte Wubben-Moy delivered a long serve from 40

yards out perfectly to the head of Ashley who finished for her second goal in four days at the 35:03 mark. Ashley has now doubled her career goal total in the past two games (she had two goals in 2017) while Wubben-Moy earned her first career point with the assist on Ashley's goal.

Carolina finished off the scoring at 71:20 as junior striker Madison Schultz notched her second goal of the year. Ru Mucherera initiated the play with a throw in from the left side. Morgan Goff held off her defender with her back to the goal and tapped the ball to Schultz who finished from the left side just inside the 18-yard box into the right side of the goal after finding space to free herself up.

The Tar Heels outshot the Golden Eagles 26-4, including a 12-0 edge in shots on goal. Maddy Henry of Marquette made all eight saves in the game, playing the first 81:58 for the Golden Eagles in goal.

UNC head coach Anson Dorrance played 27 players in the game with all of them seeing at least 10 minutes of action. Senior Megan Joyner, junior Abby Staker and sophomores Miah Araba and Natalie Chandler all saw their first game action of the 2018 season.

TAR HEELS OUTLAST FRIARS 1-0 ON

ASHLEY'S GOAL: Senior defender Julia Ashley scored the second game-winning goal of her career to lift the third-ranked University of North Carolina women's soccer team to a 1-0 win over Providence College Thursday afternoon at Koskinen Stadium in a game played as part of the 2018 Duke Nike Classic.

The Tar Heels outshot the Friars 19-8 in the match and had a 12-1 edge in corner kicks but they had trouble finishing their chances against a Providence team that had not allowed a goal in its first three matches.

The only goal of the game came at the 39:43 mark of the match. Sophomore forward Alessia Russo, playing in her first game of the year after returning to the team from the FIFA U20 World Cup in France where she was playing for the English side that won the bronze medal, set up the goal by striking a shot from distance. Providence goalkeeper Shelby Hogan knocked down Russo's post but was unable to corral it at the right post. Ashley, UNC's fourth-year starting right back, took off on a dead sprint from the top of the box, pounced on the ball and finished inside the right post for her third career goal. It was her second game-winning goal. She also had one against Virginia Tech last year.

The game was played in 93 degree temperatures and UNC head coach Anson Dorrance played 23 players to keep the Tar Heels fresh. Every one of those 23 players competed for at least 10 minutes and 18 players were on the pitch for at least 22 minutes.

UNC played two goalkeepers. Samantha Leshnak played the opening 45 minutes and was credited with the win. She made Carolina's only save of the game as just one of seven Providence shots were on frame. Claudia Dickey played the second half for Carolina. Shelby Hogan played the whole way for Providence, making six saves.

Carolina led in shots on goal 8-1.

TAR HEELS BOUNCE BACK INTO WIN

COLUMN AGAINST UCF: After playing 21st-ranked Texas to a 1-1 tie on August 22, coach Anson Dorrance's Tar Heels returned to the win

column against the UCF Knights on Sunday, August 26.

In a statistically even game, Taylor Otto's first half goal proved to be the difference as fourth-ranked North Carolina defeated 23rd-ranked UCF 1-0 in women's soccer action at Finley Fields South before a crowd of 844 sun-drenched fans Sunday afternoon.

The match finished off four home games in 10 days for the Tar Heels, all against teams coached by UNC alumnae. The Knights are coached by Tiffany Roberts Sahaydak, UNC Class of 1999. The Knights played in tough luck over the weekend in Chapel Hill, falling to Texas 2-1 in overtime Friday and 1-0 to the Tar Heels Sunday.

Carolina improved to 3-0-1 on the season while the Knights go back to Orlando 0-2. It was 366 days ago in Orlando that UCF defeated the Tar Heels 2-1 in double overtime in Orlando. In the process, Roberts Sahaydak became the first UNC alumna coach to defeat Tar Heel head coach Anson Dorrance in a head-to-head matchup.

In last year's match, UNC outshot the Knights but lost. The script was flipped on Sunday as the Knights outshot the Tar Heels 17-16, including 12-10 in the first half. UNC finished with a 7-6 edge in corner kicks.

The only goal of the game came at 15:08 as sophomore forward Taylor Otto scored for the second straight game. She also scored in last Wednesday's game against Texas, earning the Tar Heels a 1-1 tie in the game with the Longhorns after Carolina had fallen behind in the second minute of the game.

Otto scored her goal Sunday as she tapped in a rebound in the 16th minute after an initial shot by freshman midfielder Rachael Dorwart was blocked.

UCF took 17 shots in the game, including eight by Stefanie Sanders and six by Dina Orschmann. UNC's 16 shots were distributed amongst nine players with Dorwart and Bridgette Andrzejewski each taking four shots.

Both teams struggled with keeping their shots on frame. UNC placed seven of its 16 shots on goal while just six of 17 UCF shot efforts were on frame. Nevertheless, UNC improved its on frame percentage from last Wednesday when just six of 20 shots against Texas were on goal.

Samantha Leshnak played the first half in goal for the Tar Heels and made five saves while freshman Claudia Dickey played the second half and made one save. Leshnak's five saves were one short of her career high of six set against Duke in the 2017 season opener, a 2-1 overtime win for UNC. She also had five saves in a 1-0 loss at Penn State last season. Vera Varis played all 90 minutes in goal for the Knights, making five saves.

TAR HEELS DOWN BUCKEYES FOR DORRANCE'S 1,000TH OVERALL COLLEGIATE VICTORY:

The University of North Carolina women's soccer team scored a workmanlike 2-0 victory over the 23rd-ranked Ohio State Buckeyes on August 19, 2018 before a crowd of 732 fans at Finley Fields South.

With the win, which improved the 2018 Tar Heels to 2-0, Carolina rewarded head coach Anson Dorrance with his 1,000th overall collegiate coaching win. Dorrance coached the Tar Heel men's team to 172 wins over 12 seasons from 1977 through 1988. Sunday's win

over Ohio State, which fell to 0-2, gave him 828 collegiate women's wins. Dorrance founded the Tar Heel program in 1979 and is now in his 40th season as its head coach.

North Carolina (ranked #3 by Top Drawer Soccer, #4 by Soccer America, #6 by United Soccer Coaches) opened its season with a pair of wins over teams coached by Tar Heel alumnae. On Thursday, UNC defeated Illinois 3-1, coached by 1983 UNC alumna Janet Rayfield, the first-ever scholarship women's soccer player at Carolina. On Sunday, UNC beat Ohio State which is coached by 1992 alumna Lori Walker-Hock, now in her 22nd season in Columbus. Walker-Hock won three national championships at Carolina and Rayfield won two.

On Sunday, UNC scored late in the first half on the first career goal by freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto and then added a second-half tally by junior forward Bridgette Andrzejewski while posting a clean sheet and turning in a suffocating effort on the defensive end.

UNC ended with a 23-4 edge in shots, including a 12-3 margin in shots on goal. The shot margin in the second half was a startling 16-0. UNC took all seven corner kicks in the game. Carolina split goalkeeping duties with Samantha Leshnak going the first 45 minutes and making three saves. Claudia Dickey played the second half and did not face a shot. Devon Kerr went the whole way in goal for Ohio State, making eight saves. Ohio State defenders also made a pair of saves on shots that would otherwise have been UNC goals.

In the 37th minute, UNC freshman Rachel Jones got behind the Ohio State defense and was dribbling in on goal before being tripped up and fouled just outside the penalty area. Freshman midfielder Brianna Pinto stepped up and bent a shot from 20 yards out into the upper right corner of the goal for her first career goal. Pinto, whose father Hassan was recruited to play at Carolina while Dorrance was the men's coach and whose mother played softball at UNC, had rejoined the Tar Heels last Wednesday after playing with the U.S. U20 National Team at the FIFA World Cup in France.

Carolina added an insurance goal in the 58th minute on a brilliant header inside the right post by Bridgette Andrzejewski. Emily Fox, who also played with Pinto in France at the U20 World Cup for the U.S., helped set up the goal. Fox started at left back for Carolina Sunday and early in the second half she controlled the ball on the end line before centering it to redshirt sophomore forward Taylor Otto in the middle of the box. The center forward redirected the ball to the far post and Andrzejewski was there for the nifty put away. She became the fifth different Tar Heel to score in two games for UNC.

The two goals would be all UNC needed on the afternoon as Dorrance played a deep bench with 21 players seeing action and 20 team members playing at least 22 minutes.

HEELS OPEN WITH WIN OVER ILLINOIS:

The University of North Carolina women's soccer team rallied with three goals in the second half to defeat the Illinois Fighting Illini on August 16 by a 3-1 score at Finley Field South.

The game was the season opener for both teams and featured a classic coaching matchup between UNC's Anson Dorrance and Illinois' Janet Rayfield. Dorrance is currently in his 42nd

year of coaching service at Carolina and the win over the Illini on Thursday was the 999th of his distinguished career. Dorrance won 172 games while coaching the UNC men's team from 1977-88 for 12 seasons. He has now won 827 games as the Tar Heel women's head coach with a program he founded in 1979. Rayfield, in her 17th season at Illinois, was Carolina's first women's soccer scholarship recipient, playing four years as a Tar Heel from 1979-82 and winning a pair of national championships. Even to this day, 36 years after leaving campus, Rayfield ranks second in career goals as a Tar Heel behind only Mia Hamm while standing third in career points.

UNC, ranked sixth by the United Soccer Coaches, fourth by Soccer America and third by Top Drawer Soccer, played a deep lineup Thursday and it eventually paid fruit as Carolina rallied for the win, outscoring the Illini 3-0 in the second half and outshooting Illinois 12-1 after halftime.

Carolina came out of the gate on fire, pressuring the Illinois goal with gusto from the start. Jaelyn Cunningham, who had six saves on the day for Illinois, made a sprawling save on a shot by Alex Kimball at the seven-minute mark. On the ensuing corner kick, freshman Rachael Dorwart hit the cross bar. At 14:38, Tar Heel forward Sydney Spruill hit the cross bar again as UNC took the first seven shots of the game.

It was Illinois that scored first, however, against the run of play at the 18:55 mark. Illinois midfielder Hope Breslin thread a perfect through ball past a pair of Tar Heel defenders and forward Kelly Maday ran on to it to score from the top of the 18-yard box. UNC goalkeeper Samantha Leshnak was able to get a hand on the shot but was unable to keep the ball from reaching the back of the net.

Carolina had an excellent shot at tying the game in the 31st minute, again off a corner kick by Annie Kingman. Taylor Otto had a shot in the box that was cleared away by the Illini defense, keeping the Tar Heels off the scoreboard in the first half.

The second half would be a different story, however, as a shot by Illinois' Makena Silber 31 seconds into the period would be the last shot attempt of the game for the U of I.

In the 51st minute, Carolina earned the equalizer as sophomore defender Brooke Bingham scored her first career goal on a header off a corner kick by graduate student Annie Kingman. Dorrance then subbed in five players in the 62nd minute and just six plus minutes later three of them combined on the game-winning goal.

UNC almost took the lead in the 67th minute off a Julia Ashley corner kick. Ru Mucherera's header was cleared off the line at the very last instant by a defender and on the redirect Cunningham stopped a shot from close range by UNC's Mary Elliott McCabe.

Just over two minutes later, a trio of Tar Heel substitutes combined on the game-winner. Taylor Otto fed Mary Elliott McCabe who touched the ball on to senior Nicole Crutchfield. The ball was sent on to junior Madison Schultz who one-touched a volley into the lower left corner from inside the penalty area. The goal came at 68:41 of the match.

Carolina added an insurance goal at 73:28 of the match. Senior defender Julia Ashley sent a

cross from the right sideline that found the head of freshman Rachael Dorwart for a putaway into the lower left side on a single bounce.

Carolina finished with an edge of 21-3 in total shots and 11-1 in shots on goal. The Tar Heels had nine corner kicks to three for Illinois.
