Nike Supports UNC Athletics

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Nike Inc. signed an additional 10-year contract for Nike to be the exclusive supplier of athletic footwear, apparel, and accessory products to the Tar Heels effective July 1, 2018. Nike provides the athletic department with shoes, uniforms, coaching gear, balls and other equipment. In addition to the apparel and equipment, which constitutes the majority of the value of the contract, Nike gives the University \$2 million for the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund. Chancellor Carol Folt has directed the funds to faculty support. Nike also provides support for team tours, travel and the hosting of regular-season tournaments in several sports. The athletic department also received \$1 million for signing the contract, with those funds having been used to overhaul lighting and sound at the Dean E. Smith Center.

PRESEASON CONVERSATION WITH UNC HEAD COACH JOE BRESCHI:

Fall Ball: The fall was one of our better falls. One of the biggest things we can point to is the addition of Kevin Unterstein to our coaching staff. He came here fresh off playing on the U.S. team which won the world championship in Israel.

So implementing a new defensive system to go along with coach David Metzbower's offensive system was a big plus for us this past fall. Also seeing the freshmen acclimate to the Carolina Way was pretty exciting for all of us. We spent four weeks, including weathering Hurricane Florence, as our guys got better every week in the weight room in the strength and conditioning area. We also had spent four weeks exploring every aspect of getting better on the field as well. We participated in two scrimmages. We matched up with High Point and we also faced off against Ohio State. It was exciting

of the semester as we head into the Christmas break was tremendous. The commitment of the seniors and their leadership is really shining through. The quality of the leadership from our captains Timmy Kelly and Justin Anderson is outstanding. They have really brought the team along. You can sense the hunger and the urgency of the veteran group that we haven't had in a couple of years.

The Strength of His Coaching Staff: David Metzbower has a tremendous pedigree of winning. His ability to coach the nuances of the game in his quiet tone gets the message across very effectively and the kids love him. They love to play for him. He designs very simple offenses. He's very technically sound in regards to how he teaches, for example emphasizing which hand the ball should be in, your stick should be in. He's very good at the subtleties of the game and he allows everybody to be involved and I think that's pretty cool with what he does. It helps the upperclassmen engage with the younger guys and that makes them good teachers. What David brings is a quiet confidence and a great personality that relates so well with the kids. His knowledge of the game is exceptional so I am thrilled to have him back for another year.

Kevin Unterstein is an enormous addition to the program in so many ways. Not only is he a World Team guy but he also plays in the professional leagues so there is instant respect there from the players. And of course he is a world gold medal winner. His knowledge of defense from coaching with Bill Tierney at Princeton and at Denver and being the defensive coordinator for seven years at Hofstra speaks to his experience in the college game. At Hofstra, his defenses always played with an edge, confidence, swagger and toughness. That famous Long Island presence on the defensive end of the field. He is just a tremendous person and relates so well to the players on the team. He brings a toughness and a physical presence to our defense. You could tell it in the kinds of drills he was introducing to the team in the fall. He brings an edge and a toughness to the defense in what he is going to expect from this team. We will be playing a physical style on defense and I think that is something we have needed. He adds a

different element and the kids love to play for him.

Matt Hudson, being relatively close in age to the players, has been a tremendous asset to the program. He's fun. He's energetic. He really relates well to the kids. He really has a reputation as being a caring individual for the guys in the locker room.

Keys To Consistency: I think the biggest thing for me in evaluating myself at the end of last year was gaining the confidence in my approach to invest in my offensive coordinator and invest in my defensive coordinator who are so good at their jobs and so consistent in what they do. This gives me the confidence to know they can clearly handle the sides of the ball they are in charge of. That allows me to see the big picture and that will allow us to be more consistent throughout the year.

Being consistent there allowed us to have a better fall. The kids were really seeing how important was to define ourselves and learn what we want to be in the long run. The ability to be consistent on both ends of the field and to be good in the middle of the field with special teams brings me back when I had a staff in place where I had a lot of confidence in my entire staff and I think that will bring us consistency throughout the season. It is important having guys you feel great about leading our young men. Time will tell but I love the direction in which we are going.

Schedule: Every year we play a daunting schedule. Playing in this conference and then also playing in our conference tournament is certainly a challenge. Keeping the consistent out of conference schedule including Denver, Maryland and Johns Hopkins give us some mainstays there and they are all three Top 10 programs. We are also playing another out of conference group which is solid. This games will help us be consistent and that is what we are looking for. We are playing eight home games and five road games. We'll get on the road early to play in a scrimmage at Jacksonville and we'll open the

season at Mercer.

Getting on the road to see how we approach things, prepare our bodies, get acclimated mentally - all those things will tell us alot about ourselves.

The guys have shown nothing but positivity throughout the fall and I am very pleased with how they have approached things. We certainly have the schedule in place to train us to be very good.

Intangibles:

The focus and the hunger I saw in the fall was something I have not seen since we were fighting for a national championship. Maybe it's because three classes have not achieved that. But maybe it's because of the consistency we've seen in practice.

They are really pushing themselves and the depth of this team is greater than most I've had. That has allowed for more competition at each position on the field.

It's allowed us to establish a standard of play in practice. We are stressing the details and I think our guys are assessing their own play and knowing whether they are at that level and what

they need to work on.

HEAD COACH JOE BRESCHI, 11TH SEASON

Joe Breschi's coaching philosophy is summed up in three words • FAMILY • ACA-DEMICS • LACROSSE.

Following the 2016 and 2017 campaigns, the words big winner were added to the resume. Breschi always had successful programs at Ohio State and UNC but on Memorial Day weekend 2016 he took the Tar Heel program to heights it had not achieved since 1991, the NCAA championship. The Tar Heels followed that up in 2017 with their second ACC Tournament championship since 2013 and a ninth successive trip to the

NCAA Tournament under Breschi's tutelage.

After a disappointing 2018 campaign that ended in a 7-7 record, Breschi will be looking to return Carolina to national prominence in 2019. In December 2018, he signed his first-ever long-term contract at Carolina, inking a deal with athletic director Bubba Cunningham for an additional five-year tenure.

Now in his 11th year as the head coach of Carolina's lacrosse program, Breschi has installed his philosophy at every level of the program and its outreach to alumni, student-athletes, their families and the Chapel Hill community. On the field, in the classroom and in the community, Carolina men's lacrosse is achieving at the highest levels and the credit for that goes to Breschi, one of the sharpest minds in collegiate coaching circles.

Breschi, a 1990 Carolina alumnus and former assistant coach for the Tar Heels, became the 12th head lacrosse coach in Carolina history on June 18, 2008. Breschi came to Chapel Hill from Ohio State where he had served as the head coach for the previous 11 seasons. Young men pursuing college lacrosse careers and college degrees want to play for a man with the character of Breschi. A solid recruiter, excellent tactician and tremendous communicator, Breschi and his staff know they have put the Tar Heel program on sound footing talent wise and the Tar Heel players have also achieved at high levels in the classroom while being community service leaders.

Carolina has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in nine of his 10 years as head coach. The 2017 team kept that streak alive after arriving at the ACC Tournament with a losing record but Carolina beat the top two teams in the NCAA RPI - Syracuse and Notre Dame - to win the conference title and advance to the Big Dance. In addition, Twenty-eight of the 51 players on the roster were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 2016-17.

The previous year's team went into the NCAA Tournament unseeded and with just an 8-6 regular season record, but over the course of three weekends in May, UNC beat four top seven national seeds, culminating with a 14-13 win over #1 Maryland in overtime in the title game. Carolina not only reached the Final Four for the first time since 1993, it won the national title for the first time since 1991. It did all this without a single player being named first-team All-America. Six Tar Heels were named All-ACC Academic and 24 players made the ACC Academic Honor Roll. UNC's team GPA in the spring semester was the highest in program history. In December 2016, Breschi was acknowledged for all those accolades by being named the U.S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association National Coach of the Year, the first Tar Heel coach to win the award since Dave Klarmann in 1991.

The 2015 team won 13 games, the seventh straight year UNC reached double digits in wins. Twenty Tar Heels were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. It was a record setting campaign for the Tar Heels who went 13-4, finished second in the ACC and reached the NCAA quarterfinals. Eight Tar Heels were named All-Americans, the most since the 1982 team. Offensively, the Tar Heels rewrote the Tar Heel record book, led by players like Joey Sankey, Jimmy Bitter, Chad Tutton and Luke Goldstock.

The 2013 Tar Heels won the ACC regular season, just as the 2016 team did, and also won the ACC tournament championship, the latter for the first time since 1996. Finishing at 13-4, UNC reached the NCAA quarterfinals and was ranked #1 in the USILA final regular season coaches poll for the first time since 1993. Eighteen Tar Heel lacrosse players were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, eight to the All-ACC Academic Team for men's lacrosse (for the second time in Breschi's tenure) and the Tar Heel program was one of three sports on campus to win an ACC Top Six For Service award from the conference. Senior attackman Marcus Holman was UNC's first Tewaaraton Trophy finalist since 2004 and Breschi notched his second ACC Coach of the Year honor.

In 2012, Carolina advanced to the ACC Tournament championship game for only the second time since 1996. The second half of the season was a strong one for the Tar Heels and Carolina featured one of the most improved offenses in the nation. Eighteen UNC players were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. In 2011, Carolina had the ACC Freshman of the Year for the second straight season while six UNC players were named All-America and three were tapped for All-ACC accolades. Fifteen Tar Heels were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and Carolina placed a school record eight players on the All-ACC Academic Team.

In 2010, Breschi led the Tar Heels to a 13-win season, matching the fourth most wins in a season in school history, and recording the most wins since 1993. Carolina grabbed a share of the ACC regular-season title for the

first time since 2003. Carolina opened the season with 10 straight wins, its longest winning streak since 1991. Breschi guided his team to the national lead in extra-man offense and he saw attackmen Billy Bitter and Marcus Holman be named the ACC Player of the Year and the ACC Freshman of the Year, the first time in 14 and 12 years, respectively, that UNC won those

ers to 128 academic All-Big Ten honors and 217 Ohio State Scholar-Athlete awards in his 11 seasons at Columbus. Breschi was a three-time GWLL coach of the year selection in 1999, 2003 and 2004.

In his first nine seasons at Carolina, he has had players earn 52 All-America citations and 30 All-ACC awards. Attackman Billy Bitter was named a first-team All-America in 2009, Carolina's first choice since 2005. He repeated as a first-team All-America in 2010. Ryan Flanagan earned first-team All-America accolades as well in 2010. He also was named the co-winner of the Schmeisser Memorial Cup from the USILA as the nation's top defenseman. It was UNC's first major USILA award winner in 14 years and its first Schmeisser Cup recipient in 19 seasons. In 2012, R.G. Keenan was the first Tar Heel midfielder to be named a first-team All-America since Jude Collins and Jason Wade in 1996. In 2013, Marcus Holman was both a first-team All-America, the ACC Offensive Player of the Year and a Tewaaron Trophy finalist.

Breschi was one of the finest lacrosse players in the history of the ACC while playing for UNC from 1987-90. He was an All-ACC selection in both 1989 and 1990 and was selected to play in the prestigious USILA North-South All-Star game in 1990. He was a first-team All-America pick on defense in 1990 and an honorable mention All-America in 1989. He was elected the sole team captain in 1990. Carolina has elected a single captain only three times since 1981 including Breschi's senior year.

After leading the Tar Heels his senior season to the NCAA semifinals and an ACC title, Breschi was selected as UNC's nominee for the 1990 Anthony J. McKeelin Award, given annually to the outstanding male athlete in the ACC. In 2002, Breschi was named to the prestigious ACC 50th Anniversary Men's Lacrosse Team, honoring the Top 50 players in league history. He was a member of U.S. National Teams that played in the World Lacrosse Games in 1994 and 1998. Breschi earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in communications from Carolina in 1990. He was a member of two U.S. National Teams (1994 and 1998).

After graduating from Carolina in 1990, Breschi coached at his alma mater for two seasons before going to Brown as an assistant coach from 1993-97. Breschi was an assistant at UNC for Dave Klarmann in 1991 and 1992 and was part of a staff that captured ACC titles both of those seasons as well as UNC's fourth NCAA title in 1991. UNC compiled a 28-3 record during Breschi's assistant coaching stint.

Success at North Carolina came not only as a coach for Breschi, but also as a player. Breschi and his wife Julie have five children, the late Michael Breschi, as well as four amazing daughters, Sam, 17, Abby, 15, Lucy, 13, and Emily, 12.

awards. Carolina's final poll ranking of No. 4 was its best since the 1996 campaign. For his efforts, Breschi was deservedly named the ACC Coach of the Year.

In his first year at Carolina in 2009, he led the Tar Heels to a 12-6 overall record and a spot in the NCAA quarterfinals. The Tar Heels won their first game in the ACC Tournament in 13 years and they fell just one goal shy of reaching their first Final Four in 16 years.

Breschi was the first UNC coach in history to have double digit win seasons in his first eight years as head coach before that streak was broken in 2017.

Breschi was an assistant coach at UNC and Brown University for seven seasons prior to his stint in Columbus with the Buckeyes and he has completed 28 seasons of collegiate coaching experience overall entering the 2019 campaign. In 2018, he earned his 200th overall collegiate coaching victory. Breschi has accomplished much in his life for a man a mere 50 years old.

A native of Baltimore and a 1986 alumnus of Loyola-Blakefield School, Breschi compiled a 92-63 record in his 11 years at OSU along with a 34-18 regular-season Great Western Lacrosse League mark. The Buckeyes shared GWLL regular-season titles in 1999, 2003 and 2008 and won the conference championship outright in 2004. The Buckeyes had seven winning seasons in Breschi's last eight years and made NCAA Tournament appearances in 2003, 2004 and 2008. Taking over a non-scholarship program in 1997, Breschi built the OSU program to prominence from scratch. Along the way, OSU had three double-figure winning seasons, going 10-3 in 1999, 12-4 in 2004 and 11-6 in 2008, when the program had its most significant wins in its history.

Immediately prior to moving to Chapel Hill, in Breschi's 11th season at OSU, the Buckeyes enjoyed their most successful campaign in history. Ohio State won its first NCAA Tournament game by defeating No. 8-seeded Cornell 15-7 in the NCAA first round on the Big Red's home field. The Buckeyes shared the GWLL regular-season title and reached the finals of the GWLL Tournament.

Four Buckeyes were named All-Americans in 2008, including second-team attackman Kevin Buchanan, who was also the fifth pick in the 2008 Major League Lacrosse draft. Four Buckeyes were GWLL first-team selections in 2008 and another four were second-team choices. He coached Ohio State play-



Michael R. Breschi Scholarship Fund

Since the Michael R. Breschi Scholarship fund was created, hundreds of contributions have come from more than half the states in the Union. The scholarship is awarded annually to an Ohio State lacrosse player – most likely a rising senior — who fits former head coach Joe Breschi's criteria.

"It was started in memory of Michael and what he meant to me and my family in the three and a half years that he was with us," Breschi said. "And it's a way to keep his memory alive in all of us, in the Ohio State program and in what I did at Ohio State. And it's a tribute to him and an opportunity to give to a young man who exemplifies the spirit of Michael."

Ohio State and North Carolina annually compete in a fall scrimmage in Baltimore, Md., to benefit the scholarship fund. ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH DAVID METZBOWER, 5TH SEASON



A veteran coach with more than a quarter century of experience on collegiate sidelines, David Metzbower was named in July 2014 as the offensive coordinator for the men's lacrosse program at UNC. He was promoted to associate head coach in 2017.

Within two years, the hiring of Metzbower proved extremely profitable to the Tar Heels' success on the field as a dynamic offense led Carolina on a post-season run that resulted in UNC's first NCAA championship since 1991 during the 2016 campaign. UNC followed that up by winning the ACC Tournament championship in 2017, just its second league title since 1996.

In beating four seeded opponents in the 2016 NCAA Tournament, Carolina scored in double digits in all four games including 13 goals against Notre Dame in the NCAA quarterfinals, 18 goals against Loyola in the NCAA semifinals and 14 goals against top-ranked Maryland in the NCAA championship game. The Tar Heels scored 31 goals in the 2017 ACC Tournament's two games against the top two teams in the nation in the NCAA RPI. All three starting attackmen were named to the All-ACC Tournament Team and Chris Cloutier was tapped as league tourney MVP. Cloutier finished his stellar career in 2018 as one of Carolina's all-time leading scorers and went on to be named the Major League Lacrosse Rookie of the Year for the Denver Outlaws.

In the fall of 2016, Metzbower was tapped as the NCAA Division I assistant coach of the year as named by the U.S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association. In 2016, UNC finished sixth in the nation in goals per game at 13.06 and the Tar Heels were fifth in man-up offense at .500. All three Tar Heel attackmen - Luke Goldstock, Steve Pontrello and Chris Cloutier - were named to the 2016 NCAA All-Tournament Team with Cloutier being tapped as the tournament's Most Outstanding Player.

In his first season as offensive coordinator, the Tar Heels averaged 14.35 goals per game in 2015 in reaching the NCAA quarterfinals, the team's best scoring average since 1996 with players like Joey Sankey, Jimmy Bitter, Chad Tutton and Luke Goldstock rewriting large portions of the Tar Heel record book. All four of those players earned All-America honors in 2015 including Tutton on the first team.

Metzbower joined the Carolina staff from Loyola University (Maryland) where he had served as an assistant coach and the Greyhounds' offensive coordinator since November 2012. In his two years on the staff at Loyola, the Greyhounds earned back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances and won the Patriot League regular-season and tournament championships in 2014. The Greyhounds went 26-7 in Metzbower's two years as an assistant coach to veteran Loyola mentor Charley Toomey.

Beginning in 1990, Metzbower spent 20 years as an assistant coach, offensive coordinator and goalkeeper coach at Princeton University, the final seven seasons as the Tigers' associate head coach. Metzbower helped

the Tigers win six NCAA Championships and 230 games during his tenure in New Jersey.

Originally from the Baltimore area and an alumnus of Loyola Blakefield High School, Metzbower graduated from the University of Delaware in 1986 after a standout career as an attackman.

After graduating from Delaware, Metzbower joined the Blue Hens' coaching staff and spent 1987-1989 on the sidelines in Newark.

In 1990, Metzbower joined the Princeton staff as the top assistant to new Tigers' head coach Bill Tierney and helped create dynamic offenses that averaged 181.6 goals per year over a 20-season span.

Metzbower helped the Tigers win six NCAA championships, reach the NCAA semifinals 10 times and advance to the NCAA quarterfinals on 16 occasions. During Metzbower's tenure, the Tigers won 14 Ivy League titles while achieving a cumulative 230-65 record.

He helped develop the top five goal scorers in Princeton history and the top four in career points. His players included 22 All-Ivy League attackmen, seven Ivy League Players of the Year, 27 first-team All-Americans and 74 All-Ivy League first-team selections. Under Metzbower, Kevin Lowe (1994) and John Hess (1997) won the Lt. Col. J.L. Turnbull Award as the most outstanding attackman in Division I, and Josh Sims twice won the Lt. Donald McLaughlin Award as the top midfielder in NCAA Division I (1998 and 2000).

As Princeton's goalkeeper coach, he directed three players - Scott Baciagalupo (1992-1994), Trevor Tierney (2001) and Alex Hewitt (2006) - who won the Ensign C. Markland Kelly Award as the top NCAA Division I goalkeeper a combined five times.

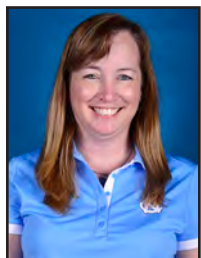
Metzbower left the Princeton program in June 2009 as associate head coach after turning down an offer to be the Tigers' head coach and served as an assistant coach at the Haverford School in 2010. He then served as head coach at Malvern Preparatory School in suburban Philadelphia for two years before moving to Loyola University in 2012.

He was inducted into the New Jersey Hall of Fame in 2009. That same year, he was tapped as the IMLCA Assistant Coach of the Year for Division I.

Metzbower and his wife, Mimi, have two children, a daughter, Jordan, a student at the University of Denver, and a son, Derek, a student at East Chapel Hill High School, and a lacrosse attackman in his own right.

Joe Breschi on David Metzbower: David Metzbower has a tremendous pedigree of winning. His ability to coach the nuances of the game in his quiet tone gets the message across very effectively and the kids love him. They love to play for him. He designs very simple offenses. He's very technically sound in regards to how he teaches, for example emphasizing which hand the ball should be in, your stick should be in. He's very good at the subtleties of the game and he allows everybody to be involved and I think that's pretty cool with what he does. It helps the upperclassmen engage with the younger guys and that makes them good teachers. What David brings is a quiet confidence and a great personality that relates so well with the kids. His knowledge of the game is exceptional so I am thrilled to have him back for another year.

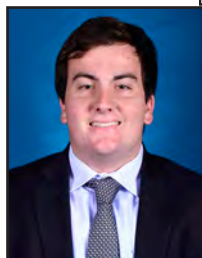

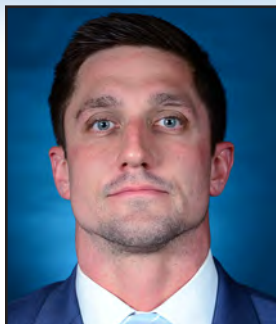

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR KEVIN UNTERSTEIN, 1ST SEASON



Kevin Unterstein, who spent the last eight seasons at Hofstra University, was named the defensive coordinator for the University of North Carolina men's lacrosse program in August 2018.

Unterstein spent eight years total on the Hofstra men's lacrosse staff including the past five years as associate head coach before moving to Carolina.

Recently, as a player, he was a member of the gold-medal winning United States Men's National Team that competed in the 2018 FIL World Championships in Israel as well as a member of the New York Lizards in Major League Lacrosse (MLL).

"I'm humbled and honored to have the opportunity to join the University of North Carolina men's lacrosse program. I'm truly looking forward to helping bring continued success to such a storied program," said Unterstein. "I want to thank head coach Joe Breschi, athletic director Bubba Cunningham, and the UNC administration for such an incredible opportunity. I'd also like to thank the athletics department and administration at Hofstra University for eight seasons with an amazing coaching staff under the direction of head coach Seth Tierney. I hope to contribute to the growth, continued achievements, and success of the UNC men's lacrosse program. I'm excited to help guide our student athletes in pursuit of academic and athletic excellence."

During his coaching tenure at Hofstra, he worked with the defense, the face-off specialists and the man-down unit. Virtually every year, those units put up some impressive numbers in the CAA and nationally. Last year, the Pride led the Colonial Athletic Association and was second in the nation in scoring defense with a 7.86 goals against average. In 2017, the Pride ranked second in the CAA and 14th in the nation in scoring defense, allowing 8.79 goals per game. In 2016, Hofstra led the conference in face-off winning percentage with a .541 mark while the defense was second in the conference and 13th in the nation allowing 8.53 goals per game. In 2015, Hofstra led the CAA and was eighth in the nation in scoring defense (8.44) and was second in the conference and sixth in the country in turnovers per contest (12.1). In 2013, the Pride ranked first in turnovers per game (11.36) and third in scoring defense (7.79 gpga). In 2011, the Pride led the nation in scoring defense (6.56 gpga) and ranked sixth in face-off winning percentage (.622) and turnover average (13.69).

"I'm thrilled to welcome Kevin, his wife Melissa and daughter Noa to the Carolina lacrosse family," said Tar Heel head coach Joe Breschi. "To add an impressive young defensive coordinator and face-off coach to the staff with a very strong resume both on and off the field, is extraordinary. Coming off winning the gold medal on the field with team USA this summer and a tremendous track record of coaching success at Hofstra, Kevin will bring a toughness and edge to our team defense."

A 2008 graduate of Hofstra with a degree in sociology, Unterstein enjoyed a stellar playing career as a short-stick defensive midfielder from 2005 through 2008. As a senior, he recorded a team-leading 70 ground balls while helping to guide the Pride to the CAA title and the NCAA Tournament. For his efforts, he was an All-CAA first team selection and was named the CAA Defensive Player of the Year and the CAA Championship Tournament Most Valuable Player. As a junior in 2007, Unterstein earned USILA All-America honorable mention honors and was named to the All-CAA second team as well as the All-CAA Tournament team. In 2006,

Kevin, his twin brother, Mike, and their older brother, Chris, combined to help lead Hofstra to a 17-2 record, a No. 2 national ranking and a No. 3 seed in the NCAA tournament. He was also named to the All-CAA Rookie Team as a freshman.

Following graduation in 2008, he became an assistant under Bill Tierney at Princeton in 2009, working with the defense and face-off specialists. He followed Tierney to Denver in 2010 to help coordinate the Pio-



neers' man-down unit and work specifically with the defensive midfielders and with assistant coach Trevor Tierney with the defense and the overall face-off game.

Unterstein has also played professionally in Major League Lacrosse, playing for the Long Island/New York Lizards in 2009, and 2012 through the present, and the Denver Outlaws in 2010 and 2011.

A native of Shoreham, N.Y., he was a high school All-America at Shoreham-Wading River High, where he was part of four Suffolk County championships and one state championship.

Unterstein and his wife Melissa are proud parents of a daughter, Noa, one year old, who was born in October 2017.

Joe Breschi On Kevin Unterstein: Kevin Unterstein is an enormous addition to the program in so many ways. Not only is he a World Team guy but he also plays in the professional leagues so there is instant respect there from the players. And of course he is a world gold medal winner. His knowledge of defense from coaching with Bill Tierney at Princeton and at Denver and being the defensive coordinator for seven years at Hofstra speaks to his experience in the college game. At Hofstra, his defenses always played with an edge, confidence, swagger and toughness. That famous Long Island presence on the defensive end of the field. He is just a tremendous person and relates so well to the players on the team. He brings a toughness and a physical presence to our defense. You could tell it in the kinds of drills he was introducing to the team in the fall. He brings an edge and a toughness to the defense in what he is going to expect from this team. We will be playing a physical style on defense and I think that is something we have needed. He adds a different element and the kids love to play for him.

VOL. ASST./DIR. OF OPERATIONS MATT HUDSON, 3RD SEASON



Matt Hudson joined the Tar Heel men's lacrosse program staff as the director of operations in the fall of 2016.

He added the duties as the program's volunteer assistant coach heading into the 2019 campaign. He will run the team's substitution box during the upcoming campaign.

In addition to being the director of operations, Hudson plays a key role in Carolina's social media efforts. In Hudson's first year on the staff, UNC won the ACC Tournament title while advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the ninth straight year.

He begins his third year on the staff in 2019.

Hudson arrived in Chapel Hill after three successful years coaching in the NCAA Division III ranks in New England. He served on the staff at Western New England University from August 2014-August 2016 and at Springfield College from September 2013-May 2014.

In two years with the Golden Bears of WNEU, Hudson helped lead the

squad to a 14-6 record in 2015 and a 15-4 mark in 2016. The 2015 team was the ECAC Division III championship squad while the 2016 unit captured the Commonwealth Coast Conference championship and advanced to the NCAA Division III Tournament.

In 2014, he worked with the lacrosse program at Springfield College, a season in which The Pride went 15-4 and captured the New England Athletic Conference title. The 2014 Springfield team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Division III Tournament.

Hudson is a 2012 alumnus of Springfield College where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Movement and Sports Studies with a minor in health studies. He was a four-year member of The Pride men's lacrosse team which captured four straight Pilgrim League championships from 2009-12 and advanced to the NCAA Division III Tournament each of those seasons.

"Matt Hudson, being relatively close in age to the players, has been a tremendous asset to the program. He's fun. He's energetic. He really relates well to the kids. He really has a reputation as being a caring individual for the guys in the locker room," says UNC head coach Joe Breschi.

CAROLINA

Bubba Cunningham, Director of Athletics



Shortly after beginning his tenure as Carolina's athletics director, Lawrence R. (Bubba) Cunningham helped create a new mission statement: "We educate and inspire through athletics." And that's just what UNC has done during his seven years in Chapel Hill.

Since Cunningham officially began his duties on November 14, 2011, Carolina has inspired in a myriad of ways. Among his many accomplishments are the implementation of a strategic plan for Carolina athletics; a partnership with Disney to enhance customer service and organizational practices; the development of the Student-Athlete Academic Initiative Working Group; a compliance review by an outside firm; a new student-

athlete degree completion program entitled Complete Carolina; a master plan for UNC's athletic facilities; and creation of The Rammys - an innovative end-of-the-year awards show popular with Carolina's student-athletes and staff. Cunningham, who was the President of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 2017-18, has Carolina positioned to have a voice in the on-going conversation about the future, whether it is in the state university system, the ACC or NCAA level. Cunningham is in his seventh year on the ACC Television Committee and has served on numerous NCAA committees over the last two decades.

In his first full year in Chapel Hill, Cunningham led a planning committee that worked with Dr. Paul Friga, associate professor of strategy and entrepreneurship at Carolina's Kenan-Flagler School of Business, to develop Carolina's strategic plan. From that process was the creation of the mission statement and the four core values for Carolina Athletics - Responsibility, Innovation, Service and Excellence. The strategic plan was updated again in 2017-18 after a blue ribbon committee worked on it in the previous school year.

Soon after the strategic plan was announced, Cunningham joined with then provost James W. Dean and other University officials to develop the Student-Athlete Academic Initiative Working Group, which was launched in fall 2013. That group spent several months developing a comprehensive approach to assessing and enhancing how the University provides academic support to student-athletes. The group has implemented a rigorous and transparent set of processes and metrics as part of an ongoing initiative. The objective is to ensure proper alignment with the University's academic mission, a goal that is consistent with Cunningham's strategic plan for the Department of Athletics.

In 2014, Cunningham announced the creation of Complete Carolina, an enhanced degree-completion program that honors former student-athletes' scholarships for life. The program provides financial support for degree completion, as well as academic advising and career counseling, to former student-athletes who return to complete their degrees at any time.

On the field, Carolina has achieved outstanding success under Cunningham's leadership. In each of his seven seasons, the Tar Heels have finished in the top 15 of the Learfield Director's Cup, including five top-10 finishes. During that same period, the number of UNC student-athletes on the ACC Academic Honor Roll has steadily increased and reached a University record 391 in 2017-18.

The University of North Carolina finished 13th in the final 2017-18 Learfield Directors' Cup standings, the Tar Heels' 11th top-five and 20th top-10 finish in the 25-year history of the award. UNC has been the highest-ranked Atlantic Coast Conference program in the year-end standings 18 times in the 25-year history of the award. The Learfield Directors Cup measures NCAA post-season competitive success and awards points in a maximum of 19 sports per school, four of which must be baseball, volleyball and men's and women's basketball.

Men's soccer, field hockey and women's lacrosse each tied for third place to earn 83 points apiece for the Tar Heels. Baseball's fifth-place performance at the College World Series accounted for 78 points and women's soccer, men's tennis and women's tennis tied for ninth to score 64 points apiece.

Men's golf (15th place), men's basketball (17th), wrestling (20th), women's indoor track and field (23rd), fencing (24th) and women's swimming and diving (25th) also placed in the top 25.

In addition, UNC won four ACC Championships in 2017-18 for the second year in a row. Carolina won its third straight women's lacrosse crown, second successive women's tennis title and it also won crowns in women's soccer and field hockey. UNC has now won 274 ACC crowns in its history. Amongst current league schools Virginia ranks second in history with 131 ACC titles. Maryland won 195 league titles before it left the league for the Big 10 in 2015.

The UNC women's athletics program captured the 2013 Capital One Cup, which is awarded to the best men's and women's Division I athletics programs in the country. For winning its first Capital One Cup, the Tar Heels earned \$200,000 toward student-athlete scholarships and a spot at the annual ESPY Awards show in Los Angeles.

Carolina student-athletes have excelled in the classroom as well. During the 2017-18 academic calendar, 391 student-athletes made the ACC Academic Honor Roll, which requires a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 for the year. It was the fourth-consecutive year more than 300 UNC student-athletes have earned the honor. That total was the most in school history, eclipsing the previous mark of 385 in 2016-17.

Cunningham is in his 17th year as a Division I director of athletics. He came to Chapel Hill after spending the previous six years as the director of athletics at the University of Tulsa. He also was the AD for three years from 2002-2005 at Ball State University. He was honored as the 2008-09 FBS Central Region Athletics Director of the Year, an award presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.

At Tulsa, Cunningham guided the Golden Hurricane through its initial move to Conference USA and spearheaded a \$60 million athletics initiative. Tulsa won 34 league championships in his tenure, more than any other school in Conference USA and the football program played in five bowl games in his last six years.

At Ball State, Cunningham led a program with 19 intercollegiate sports and a budget of \$12.4 million. In his final year, Ball State completed a \$12 million campaign to renovate the football stadium. In raising those funds, Cunningham secured the largest single gift in Ball State athletics history.

From 1988-2002, Cunningham worked in the athletics department at the University of Notre Dame. He served as Notre Dame's associate athletics director for finance and facilities from 1995-2000 and was the associate director of athletics for external affairs from 2000-02.

Cunningham earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration, both from Notre Dame, in 1984 and 1988, respectively. He played on the Irish golf team in 1982-83.

Cunningham also served on the Gatorade National Advisory Board and has been a featured speaker at numerous NACDA and I-A institute conferences.

Born in Flint, Mich., and raised in Naples, Fla., Cunningham and his wife, Tina, have four children: Matthew, Michael, John and Sarah.

Upcoming UNC Lacrosse & Soccer Stadium



Fetzer Field served as the long-time home of the Tar Heels' men's lacrosse program from 1949 through 2017. After more than eight decades of use the facility was razed at the close of the 2017 lacrosse season and a new UNC Lacrosse & Soccer Stadium is being built on the same site, opening during the 2019 calendar year (see conceptual of new UNC Lacrosse and Soccer Stadium above). The exact date of the opening of the stadium is still to be determined. UNC will start its home 2019 season at Kenan Stadium.

During the 2018 season, North Carolina men's lacrosse played its eight home games at Kenan Stadium, home of the Tar heel football team. Historically, dating back to the 1970s, Carolina used Kenan Stadium as a home field from time to time so acclimating for the 2018/2019 seasons was not be an issue for the latest editions of coach Joe Breschi's team.

At Fetzer Field, the North Carolina lacrosse program enjoyed one of the premier lacrosse domains in the nation and one of the best home field advantages in the sport. Fetzer Field was the home to five NCAA championship men's lacrosse teams at Carolina, 22 national championship women's soccer squads, two NCAA title winning men's soccer teams and two NCAA champion women's lacrosse squads.

The upcoming UNC Lacrosse and Soccer Stadium is just a part of the outstanding lacrosse facilities enjoyed by the UNC lacrosse program. Carolina's locker room facility in the Loudermilk Center for Excellence at

the Blue Zone, which opened in the fall of 2011, is a state of the art facility and arguably the finest facility of its kind in all of NCAA Division I lacrosse. It not only provides the Tar Heel program with a memorabilia area, coaches locker rooms, a film and team meeting room, locker room and laundry area, it also provides access to adjacent facilities for academic support and weight training in the same building.

Fetzer Field was originally built in 1935 and it underwent significant improvements in 1988. The facility was the host to NCAA men's lacrosse tournament games on numerous occasions, most recently in 2015. It began hosting men's track meets as far back as 1935.

Named for former Tar Heel athletic director and track coach Bob Fetzer, Fetzer Field was the home of Carolina soccer since 1947, the first year UNC sponsored a varsity men's soccer team, and Carolina men's lacrosse since 1949, the initial year for that varsity sports program. The women's soccer program was started in 1979 and the women's lacrosse program in 1996. All those sports called Fetzer Field home for their regular-season and post-season tournament games and all four sports are annually ranked among the Top 10 teams in the nation in their respective sports.

Located in the heart of the Carolina campus directly adjacent to Carmichael Arena on South Road (N.C. State Road 54), the facility was completed in 1935 as a Works Project Administration program during the tenure of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

Directions to UNC Lacrosse & Soccer Stadium

(Coming from Greensboro, N.C.) take I-85 North/I-40 East to Graham and exit on N.C. 54; go approximately 25 miles to Chapel Hill and take N.C. 54 bypass to Columbia Street exit; go North on Columbia Street to South Road (by Navy ROTC building), turn right and follow South Road to Carmichael Auditorium (field is behind Carmichael).

(Coming from Raleigh, N.C.) follow I-40 West to N.C. 54 at exit 273A; take N.C. 54 about 3 miles to Carmichael Auditorium area.

(Coming from Richmond, Va.) take I-85 South to Durham; a left exit onto U.S. 15-501 South; follow approximately 10 miles to Chapel Hill; pick up N.C. 54 business and follow to Carmichael Auditorium area.

The Humble Beginnings of a Vaunted Program

Lacrosse, a sport invented by Native Americans and played long before European settlers first visited the shores of North America, was first introduced at the University of North Carolina in 1937 on a club sport basis.

The first Carolina teams in the late 1930s used the football team's discarded helmets and cleats while team members bought their own gloves and sticks. The team played its home games on a field across the street from Woollen Gymnasium.

In those days, Carolina played in what was called the Dixie Lacrosse League with fellow league members Duke, Virginia, Washington & Lee, Loyola College of Maryland and the Washington Lacrosse Club from Baltimore. Albert C. Cornsweet, a 1929 graduate of Brown, coached the initial Carolina teams of the late 1930s.

Most of the players on those early lacrosse teams worked part-time jobs in order to stay in school. It was the heart of the Great Depression and most college students needed to supplement their incomes. There were some scholarship football players who competed in the sport as well. Rumor has it that Carolina football coach Ray Wolf made his players compete in lacrosse so they'd learn how to run. Wolf had an appreciation for the sport and wanted to use it to his advantage by helping keep his players in shape during the football off-season, knowing lacrosse players competed in a sport where participants ran and ran and then ran some more for good measure.

In the late 1940s, the athletic department hired Bill Darden as a member of the business office staff and he also began to coach the lacrosse team at UNC in his extra time. The athletic department, after a brief period of time, officially awarded varsity status to the sport and monogram awards were first granted beginning with the 1949 team, officially making it Carolina's initial varsity unit.

The school was admitted as a member of the U.S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) in 1950 during its second season as a varsity unit and has remained a member since that time. The 1951 team featured the program's first All-America player. Nick Sowell was named the first-team All-America goalie that year by the USILA.

After UNC soccer and lacrosse coach Alan Moore left Chapel Hill following the 1953 campaign, the 1954 squad was coached by George Good, a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps who was stationed in Chapel Hill as part of the Naval ROTC program. The 1954 team posted a disappointing 0-6 mark. After just a six-year period from 1949-54, the team's status as a varsity sport at Carolina came to an end. The athletic department at that time began to focus resources on other varsity sports. Recruiting high-level in-state talent was a major issue in trying to compete with league foes like Virginia and Maryland and there were no high school programs in North Carolina in the 1950s.

For a decade the men's lacrosse program at the University would be relegated to a different existence. A club team existed and played outside competition but was no longer recognized by the athletic department as a varsity program. By no means, however, was lacrosse permanently vanquished to the scrap heap. In fact, a strong club team competed on campus from 1954-64 and although varsity letters were not awarded, the players on that club squad kept lacrosse alive on the Chapel Hill campus and were key figures in setting the foundation for future greatness.

When Jim Tatum arrived on campus to coach football in the late 1950s, it was a simple gesture by him that helped Carolina maintain a strong presence on the club level. Tatum came to UNC from the University of Maryland, which had one of the nation's most dominant lacrosse teams at the time. Tatum agreed to provide funding for lacrosse equipment from the football budget in return for the club team's commitment to take all willing football players on the roster in the spring to keep them in shape.

The existence of the club team helped Tatum recruit Frank Riggs from Baltimore the next year and Riggs went on to be captain of the 1961 football team. He later played for the Mount Washington Lacrosse Club in Baltimore and served as presi-

dent of United States Lacrosse, the sports national governing body in Baltimore. Riggs recruited other football players to play on the club team. UNC quarterback Jack Cummings was a member of the club team from the outset. In its formative years, the club played varsity teams from Duke, Washington & Lee, Virginia and Colgate. Arthur Greenbaum, a member of the varsity team under coach Alan Moore in the early 1950s, initially coached the club team.

Permanent Varsity Status Granted to Lacrosse in 1964

Lacrosse was resurrected on a varsity athletic program level at Carolina in 1964. UNC wanted to add a varsity sport to improve Carolina's standing in the Carmichael Cup, the annual all-sports trophy in the ACC at that time. Maryland was dominating the Carmichael Cup standings and the Tar Heel administration was determined to give Carolina a better chance to win the award. Even if Carolina's initial intention was to improve the University's Carmichael Cup standing under then athletic director Chuck Erickson, which it certainly did, the move proved to be even more brilliant at a more important level as within 17 years of its return to campus the Heels became an NCAA title team.

The UNC program competed on the varsity level without awarding athletic scholarships for 10 years after reappearing on campus in varsity form beginning in 1964. Carolina upgraded the program with the awarding of scholarships after the hiring of head coach Paul Doty during the summer of 1973. The Tar Heels also transitioned from an NCAA small college program (the equivalent of what is now the NCAA Division II and III levels combined) to NCAA Division I status in 1974 with the awarding of those scholarships. Almost immediately the Tar Heels were competitive with the top teams in the nation. The 1974 team became the first squad eligible for an NCAA Division I bid and within just two seasons Carolina found itself in the tournament under Paul Doty's leadership.

Despite its rather brief history on campus in comparison to other UNC sports, which date back to the early decades of the 20th century or even the later decades of the 19th century, North Carolina lacrosse has been something very special in its time on campus from 1949-54 and 1964 to the present.

Since 1949 the all-time Tar Heel record stands at 494-303-2. Carolina recorded the 400th victory in school history when Coach Joe Breschi's Tar Heels defeated Lehigh 17-5 on February 20, 2010 at Fetzer Field. Tar Heel teams have won NCAA Division I national championships five times, earning crowns in 1981, 1982, 1986, 1991 and 2016. Carolina teams have also captured 13 Atlantic Coast Conference championships—including 11 in a period spanning just 16 seasons from 1981-96. Those championships were won in 1981, 1982, 1985, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1996. Carolina returned to the top of the heap in ACC play when the Tar Heels won the 2013 crown with a 16-13 championship game victory over Virginia. Four years later, the Tar Heels won the ACC Tournament title again, beating Syracuse and Notre Dame, the top two teams in the NCAA RPI, to claim the 2017 crown. Carolina beat Syracuse

by a single goal in the semifinal shootout and then dominated Notre Dame 14-10 in the championship contest.

The 1981 and 1982 teams won 26 games in succession, recording one of the longest winning streaks in collegiate lacrosse history and the longest winning streak in UNC history. Thirty-two times since first qualifying in 1976, the Tar Heels have competed in the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship. Only four schools (Johns Hopkins-46, Maryland-41, Virginia-38 and Syracuse-37) have played in the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Tournament more often than Carolina has.

Tremendous growth in the program occurred beginning in the late 1960s after the sport gained a foothold in Chapel Hill. After a pair of losing seasons in 1966 and 1967, Jim Bischoff coached the Tar Heels to a vastly improved 7-4 mark in 1968. In addition, at 25th in the final poll, Bischoff's 1968 team was the first Tar Heel squad to earn a post-season national ranking from the USILA.

Mueller Tutors the Likes of Kramer and Peterson

In 1969, Fred Mueller, a long-time professor in UNC's Department of Exercise and Sports Science and a former assistant football coach at UNC, began a successful four-year run as head coach. The 1970 Tar Heels ranked as Mueller's best team as they finished seventh in the country in the USILA poll with a 9-2 record and won the South Atlantic division championship of the USILA, the first division or conference title of any kind for UNC in the sport. That team would likely have been the first UNC squad to earn an NCAA Tournament bid but the first championship tournament sponsored by the NCAA came a year later in 1971.

Among Mueller's greatest players was Peter Kramer, who won the C. Markland Kelly, Jr., Memorial Cup as the nation's outstanding goalkeeper in 1969. Attackman Harper Peterson copped honors as a first-team All-America three times in his career and Kramer was a three-time honoree as well.

Ron Miller took over the lacrosse coaching reins on an interim basis for one season in 1973. Miller led the team to a 12-5 record in 1973. Those 12 wins stood as Carolina's school record for victories in a season until the 1982 national championship team broke the mark when it finished with a 14-0 ledger. The 12 wins were also matched by UNC's 12-0 record in 1981.

Carolina lacrosse entered a new era in 1973 when the program hired Paul Doty as the first full-time head coach in school history. That same year, the team was elevated to scholarship status with the first athletic grants-in-aid in the sport being

awarded during the 1974 season. Doty led UNC to national Top 10 rankings in both 1976 and 1977 and to UNC's first two NCAA Division I Tournament appearances those same two seasons. Another program milestone achieved under Doty's tutelage was Carolina's 13-10 regular-season win over Virginia during the 1976 season. It marked the first time Carolina had ever defeated either Maryland or Virginia as a varsity team, the two schools which had dominated ACC lacrosse since 1954. UNC's first win over Maryland would not come until 1981, however, during another head coach's tenure.

An Era of Excellence under Willie Scroggs

In 1978, UNC turned to the hotbed of college lacrosse, Johns Hopkins University, and hired the Blue Jays' top assistant coach, Willie Scroggs, as the Tar Heels' new head coach. It was a move that bore fruit for a dozen years and led to some glorious years for Carolina lacrosse. Scroggs retired from coaching at the end of the 1990 season to become a senior associate athletic director at UNC, ending an all-to-brief but brilliant coaching tenure. In 2013, Scroggs was recognized with the Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association's Creators of the Game Award and in 2016 he won the organization's Joseph R. "Frenchy" Julien Award presented to a member of the lacrosse community for outstanding and continuous service to the sport. Scroggs retired from his administrative role in the athletic department in the summer of 2014, ending a long and prosperous career as a Tar Heel that began in 1978. It was a brilliant 36-year tenure as a credit to Carolina athletics. He continues as the secretary and rules editor for the USILA during his retirement.

The initial decision to pursue Scroggs was made by Tar Heel athletic director Bill Cobey whose philosophy was that a person needed to go to the best programs in the sport and recruit a top assistant coach or existing head coach in order to build winning programs.

Tar Heel teams were 121-37 during the Scroggs era and were invited to the NCAA Tournament 11 straight seasons from 1980 through 1990. In nine of Scroggs' 12 years, UNC made at least the NCAA Tournament semifinal round while the 1981, 1982 and 1986 squads won NCAA Division I championships. The Tar Heels were 17-8 in NCAA post-season play during his tenure. Scroggs' teams won ACC titles in 1981, 1982, 1985, 1988, 1989 and 1990, the latter two titles coming in the newly created ACC Tournament format. In addition, the 1982 team finished the season ranked No. 1 in the nation in the final USILA poll while the 1981 squad finished second in the USILA poll.

When Scroggs announced his retirement immediately after Carolina's NCAA semifinal loss to Syracuse in 1990, the University turned to coaching veteran Dave Klarmann, who had been the chief assistant coach to Scroggs for 11 seasons in Chapel Hill. The move paid off in instantaneous results. In Klarmann's first season at the helm of the Tar Heels, he led the team to a 16-0 record and the 1991 NCAA and ACC championships. That team also finished first in the USILA poll.

After an ACC championship and an appearance in the NCAA semifinals in 1992, the Tar Heels had another banner season the following year. In 1993, the Tar Heels again finished first in the USILA national coaches' poll, marking the second such regular season finish in Klarmann's coach-

ing tenure. Carolina also advanced to the NCAA championship game for the fifth time in history, dropping a 13-12 decision to Syracuse. In 1994, UNC won its seventh straight ACC crown. Carolina won the ACC title again in 1996 as Carolina routed Duke in the semifinals and upset eventual NCAA finalist Virginia to claim the crown behind a brilliant goalkeeping performance by Brooks Brown who won ACC Tournament MVP honors.

Klarmann resigned from his coaching position following the 2000 season after leading Carolina to five ACC championships in his tenure. In his last game as the Tar Heel head coach in 2000 he earned his 100th career victory as the Tar Heels defeated Lehigh. He has gone on to head coaching tenures at Radford and Mars Hill.

Carolina athletic director Dick Baddour then employed the same plan used by Cobey in 1978 and he went again to lacrosse powerhouse Johns Hopkins to find the new head coach for the Tar Heels, this time hiring the Blue Jays' two-year head coach, John Haus, to lead Carolina into the new millennium. The hiring of Haus proved worthwhile as the Carolina program returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2004 for the first time since 1998, winning its first NCAA game since 1993 in the process. Carolina again played in the NCAA Tournament in 2007, reaching the NCAA quarterfinal round for a second time in four seasons. The Tar Heels reached the NCAA Tournament again in 2008.

At the conclusion of the 2008 season, Haus announced his resignation and he became the director of lacrosse and head men's lacrosse coach at Lebanon Valley College in Annville, Pa., shortly thereafter. Baddour then hired Ohio State head coach Joe Breschi, a 1990 UNC alumnus, to lead the Tar Heel program. In Breschi's first season at the helm, the Tar Heels reached the NCAA quarterfinal round, won 12 games in a season for the first time since 1996 and won an ACC Tournament game for the first time in 13 years. The 2010 campaign was even more successful as the Tar Heels opened the season with 10 straight wins and finished 13-3 and ranked No. 4 in the nation. The 13 wins matched the fourth most in school history and the No. 4 poll ranking was the highest since 1996.

Breschi's teams advanced to NCAA Tournament play in each of his first nine years at the helm and again advanced to the ACC Tournament championship game in 2012. The 2013 season was a breakthrough year for the Tar Heels under Breschi as Carolina finished 13-4, winning 10 games in a row during the campaign. UNC advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals for the third time in Breschi's five years as head coach. Carolina won the ACC Tournament for the first time since 1996 at Kenan Stadium in Chapel Hill. UNC outlasted Duke 18-17 in the semifinals and defeated Virginia 16-13 in the championship contest in two of the most exciting games in tournament history. UNC also finished the regular season ranked #1 in the USILA coaches poll. The 2015 season saw the Tar Heels finish 13-4, place second in the ACC regular season, earn the NCAA Tournament's #3 seed and advance again to the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals. Eight Tar Heels were named All-Americans and Joey Sankey and Jimmy Bitter finished first and third in school scoring history.

Carolina returned again to the pinnacle of NCAA lacrosse in 2016 as a team which finished 8-6 in the regular season and went into the NCAA

Tournament unseeded downed four seeded teams in a row to capture Carolina's first national championship since 1991. In 2017, the Tar Heels captured their 13th ACC title in history, winning the conference crown by beating Syracuse 16-15 in the semifinals and Notre Dame 14-10 in the final. Attackman Chris Cloutier was named the 2016 NCAA Tournament MVP and the 2017 ACC Tournament MVP.

Stellar Play in the NCAA Tournament

In winning five NCAA championships since 1981, Carolina teams have been involved in some of the most exciting games in the tournament's 48-year history.

In 1981, UNC went through the regular season unbeaten and it was ranked No. 2 in the nation behind three-time defending national champion Johns Hopkins entering the tournament. The Tar Heels recorded lopsided wins over Syracuse and Navy in the first two rounds of the tournament before meeting the unbeaten Blue Jays in the national championship game at Princeton's Palmer Stadium. Before a crowd of 13,943 fans, UNC scored six straight goals in the second half to overcome a three-goal Johns Hopkins advantage as the Heels eventually triumphed by a 14-13 margin.

In 1982, the Tar Heels swept through the regular season unscathed again. In the NCAA Tournament, UNC routed Navy and Cornell, setting up a championship game rematch with Johns Hopkins. In a game dominated by the two teams' defenses, UNC beat the Blue Jays 7-5 behind five goals by junior attackman David Wingate and brilliant goalkeeping by Tom Sears who was the choice as that year's national player of the year.

Carolina's third NCAA championship came in 1986 and at the time it was the most unexpected of the quintet of crowns that have been won by UNC. The Tar Heels were seeded fifth going into the tournament. No team seeded lower than fourth had ever made the championship game prior to the 1986 season and none seeded lower than third had ever won the title. To this day, only four other teams seeded as low as fifth have won the NCAA crown in the history of the tournament. Ironically, in winning the championship, the Heels avenged all three regular-season losses in the exact same order in which they had lost to those teams earlier in the year. After a 12-10 quarterfinal win at Maryland, UNC headed to the first-ever NCAA men's lacrosse Final Four, an institution now embedded in the culture of the sport every Memorial Day weekend.

At Newark, Del., Carolina was well prepared for the semifinals and it avenged a 16-4 regular-season loss to two-time defending NCAA champion Johns Hopkins by beating the Blue Jays 10-9 in overtime. Carolina won the game on Mike Tumillo's goal off a Gary Seivold assist a little over

two minutes into the extra period. Two days later against Virginia, UNC and the Cavaliers traded the lead throughout the contest with neither team ever holding more than a two-goal advantage at any time. Another overtime period was required to settle the issue. Gary Seivold rolled the crease and scored an unassisted goal 1:50 into the extra session to give the title to Carolina.

Like the 1981 and 1982 teams, 1991's national championship team finished the season unbeaten. UNC opened NCAA Tournament play by defeating Loyola 11-9 in a hard fought game in the quarterfinals at Fetzer Field. Six days later, the Tar Heels handed Syracuse its first NCAA home playoff loss in history as Carolina routed the Orangemen 19-13 at the Carrier Dome. Two days later against Towson, Carolina led 11-4 at the half and was seemingly in control of the game. But Towson made a huge run in the second half and Carolina saw its lead shrink to a single goal in the fourth quarter before the Tar Heels pulled away to win the game handily by an 18-13 margin. The Tar Heel victory was led by senior attackman Dennis Goldstein, the National Player of the Year, who was the championship game's Most Valuable Player. Goldstein led UNC past Syracuse with four goals and he added four goals and four assists in the title game triumph against Towson.

In 2016, Carolina was unseeded for one of the few times in its history but it edged #6 seed Marquette 10-9 in Milwaukee in the first round before routing #3 seed Notre Dame 13-9 in the quarterfinal round in Columbus, Ohio to advance to Carolina's first Final Four in 23 seasons. Heading to Philadelphia as an underdog was the best scenario for Coach Joe Breschi's Tar Heels. In the semifinals, UNC jumped out to a 10-goal lead early in the second quarter at 12-2 and went on to beat #7 seed Loyola 18-13 behind sophomore attackman Chris Cloutier's school record and NCAA Tournament record tying nine goals. Two days later, UNC upset top-ranked Maryland 14-13 in overtime to win the national championship. Carolina trailed by two goals with less than four minutes to play but tallies by Luke Goldstock and Patrick Kelly less than a minute apart forced overtime. After weathering a man-down situation to start the extra period, Cloutier scored his fifth goal of the game with 1:39 to play in overtime to give the Tar Heels the win. Cloutier was named the Most Outstanding Player of the NCAA Tournament after scoring 19 goals, a new tournament record, in four games, including nine against Loyola in the semifinals and five against Maryland in the finals.

A Bevy of All-America Selections and USILA Award Winners



In 2015 Joey Sankey became the second Tar Heel lacrosse player to win the Patterson Medal as UNC's outstanding senior athlete.

Over the past 40 seasons, UNC players have earned 183 All-America accolades and 113 All-Atlantic Coast Conference citations.

Twelve Tar Heels have been named ACC Players of the Year — attackman Michael Burnett in 1981, goalkeeper Tom Sears in 1982, defenseman Randy Cox in 1984, attackman Mac Ford in 1985, defenseman Graham Harden in 1991, defenseman Alex Martin in 1992, midfielder Ryan Wade in both 1993 and 1994, midfielder Jason Wade in 1996, attackman Billy Bitter in 2010, attackman Marcus Holman in 2013 and defenseman Austin Pifani in 2017.

Scroggs was tapped as ACC Coach of the Year in 1988 and Klarmann won the same honor in 1991, 1993, 1994 and 1996. Current head coach Joe Breschi earned the award in 2010 and 2013. In 1989, midfielder Jim Buczek was named as the ACC Freshman of the Year. Attackman Jeff Sonke won the same award in 1998 and attackman Marcus Holman and Nicky Galasso won the award in back-to-back years in 2010 and 2011. Nine ACC Tournament Most Valuable Players have been Tar Heels — attackman Michael Thomas in 1989, defenseman Joe Breschi in 1990, attackman Dennis Goldstein in 1991, attackman John Webster in 1992, attackman Dan Levy in 1993, goalkeeper Rocco D'Andrea in 1994, goalkeeper Brooks Brown in 1996, attackman Marcus Holman in 2013 and attackman Chris Cloutier in 2017.

Carolina has had at least one first-team All-America selection in 24 of 40 seasons since 1979. In 1981, 1991 and 1993, UNC had three first-team selections and the 1984, 1985, 1992, 1996, 2004, 2010 and 2015 squads had two each. In 1982, five of the 11 players named to the first-team All-America squad were Tar Heels, a rather astounding feat. In 2015, UNC had the most overall All-America selections (eight) in a single season since the 1982 team.

Peter Kramer started Carolina's long list of USILA award winners when he won the C. Markland Kelly, Jr. Memorial Cup as the nation's top goalie in 1969. In 1981 and 1982, Tom Sears won the Kelly Award as the nation's outstanding goalkeeper. In 1982, he also captured the Enners Award as the National Player of the Year and the Brine Award as the most outstanding player in the NCAA championship game.

A year later, in 1983, Peter Voelkel won the McLaughlin Award as the nation's outstanding midfielder. In 1984, Tom Haus won the first of his three Schmeisser Cups as the nation's outstanding defensive player. He went on to win the Schmeisser Cup again in 1986 and 1987. In 1986, Haus was also tapped for the Enners Award as National Player of the Year. Gary Seivold's two-goal, two-assist effort in the 1986 NCAA championship game win earned him the Brine Award as the game's Most Valuable Player.

Carolina added to that jackpot of top awards during the 1991 season. The USILA tapped Goldstein as the National Player of the Year as well as the MVP of the NCAA championship game after scoring four goals and adding four assists in the 18-13 victory over Towson. Graham Harden captured the Schmeisser Cup as the top defenseman in the nation and Andy Piazza became the first Tar Heel to win the Kelly Award as the nation's top goalie since Sears won the honor in 1982.

In 1992, Jim Buczek won the McLaughlin Award as the nation's top midfielder. A year later, the USILA honored Ryan Wade as the top midfielder in America. Ryan Wade's younger brother, Jason Wade, won the McLaughlin Award as the nation's top midfielder performer in 1996.

In 2010, Ryan Flanagan became the first Tar Heel in 14 years to win one of the USILA's top individual awards. The junior defenseman won the Schmeisser Memorial Cup as the nation's top defender. He was the first Tar Heel to capture the Schmeisser Cup since 1991. In 2016, Joe Breschi was tapped as the USILA's National Coach of the Year while David Metzbower was tapped as the National Assistant Coach of the Year. Sophomore Chris Cloutier won the Brine Award as the Most Outstanding Player of the NCAA Tournament after scoring five goals in UNC's 14-13 overtime victory over #1 Maryland. Cloutier finished with 19 goals in the four NCAA Tournament games, including

nine in the NCAA semifinals versus Loyola. The 19th goal won the NCAA title game in overtime against heavily favored Maryland.

Scroggs was named National Coach of the Year in 1981 by the USILA and he was an assistant coach for the U.S. team that won the title at the 1982 World Lacrosse Games in Baltimore. Sears was the starting goalkeeper for that U.S. team and was named the All-World goalie. Midfielder Joey Seivold, '87, and defenseman Randy Cox, '84, both played on the U.S. team that won the title at the 1986 World Lacrosse Games in Toronto. Three other Tar Heels, Steve Stenersen, '82, Peter Voelkel, '83, and Mac Ford, '85, were alternates on that team.

Mac Ford went on to play on the U.S. team that earned the title at the 1990 World Lacrosse Games in Perth, Australia. He was named the top attackman in the tournament. UNC midfielder Robin Cornish, a Perth native, competed in the 1990 World Games as a middle on the Aussie squad. Carolina sent two representatives to the 1994 World Lacrosse Games in Manchester, England as the Americans won yet again. UNC defenseman Joe Breschi, '90, and midfielder Ryan Wade, '94, played major roles for the U.S. team. The World Lacrosse Games returned to the United States again in 1998 and both Breschi and Wade made return engagements as members of the American team. In the summer of 2005, four Tar Heel players were invited to the U.S. National Team tryouts for the 2006 World Lacrosse Championship. The quartet included goalkeeper Billy Daye, '93, attackman Jeff Sonke, '01, attackman Jed Prossner, '05, and defenseman Stephen McEluff, '06. Two Tar Heels were in contention for roster spots for the 2014 U.S. Team for the World Lacrosse Games — attackman Marcus Holman, '13, and midfielder Ben Hunt, '09. Hunt was a finalist for the team and Holman made the squad where he was a part-time starter in the attack unit. UNC alumnus Richie Meade, '76, coached the U.S. Team in the World Lacrosse Games at Denver, Colo. in the summer of 2014. The U.S. team advanced to the championship game before falling to Canada in the finals.

In the summer of 2016, two current Tar Heel

juniors - attackman Timmy Kelly and defenseman Jack Rowlett - played for the U.S. Team which won the U19 World Championship in Canada. Sophomore goalkeeper Jack Pezzulla was an alternate on the team.

Marcus Holman was named to the U.S. Team which played in the 2018 World Lacrosse Games in Israel as he appeared in back-to-back World Championships for the U.S. Team. The American team won the gold medal and it also included current UNC assistant coach Kevin Unterstein.

A Legacy of Great Players

In 1979, defenseman Ralph "Rip" Davy, who passed away at just 51 years old in 2008, became the first Tar Heel to be named a first-team All-America under coach Willie Scroggs. Midfielder Kevin Griswold earned similar honors a year later and was a key player on the 1981 and '82 NCAA title-winning Carolina teams. Defenseman Gary Burns, '82, was named to All-America teams on three occasions and now works for the Educational Foundation, raising funds for Carolina athletic scholarships and facilities. Midfielder Doug Hall was a hero of the 1981 NCAA championship game victory, scoring three goals, and he was a first-team All-America that season.

Jeff Homire, another midfielder, was a first-team All-America in 1982. Chris Walker, '87, was a three-time All-America selection on defense. He played much of his career with the talented Boyd Harden, a first-team All-America in 1988. The brothers Seivold, Joey a midfielder and Gary an attackman, both of whom graduated in 1987,

won USILA All-America honors each of their four years while wearing the Carolina Blue and White. Another standout defenseman was Joe Breschi, who led Tar Heel teams to the NCAA semifinals in both 1989 and '90 after a two-year absence from championship weekend and is now in his 11th year as head coach of the Tar Heels.

In 1993, the Tar Heels said good-bye to a quartet of outstanding talents. Attackman John Webster left Carolina amongst the career leaders in goals (109), assists (79) and points (188). Midfielder Donnie McNichol had a team-leading 109 ground balls in 1993. In addition, his .740 face-off percentage established a school record for a single season. Defense- men Alex Martin and Greg Paradine were also spectacular players of the early 1990s. Both were first-team All-America choices. The 1996 senior class included the likes of first-team All-America midfielders Jude Collins and Jason Wade. Attackman Jeff Sonke was a second-team choice in 2000 and 2001 on attack.

Jed Prossner earned first-team All-America honors in 2004, the first UNC attackman to win them since Dennis Goldstein in 1991. Ronnie Staines was a first-team All-America on defense in 2004, the first Tar Heel defender since Greg Paradine and Alex Martin won first-team accolades on defense in 1993. Prossner went on to be named a first-team All-America attackman again in 2005, being so honored despite a 5-8 UNC record. Prossner was only the third Tar Heel attackman in history to win first-team All-America in two or more years, joining Harper Peterson and Michael Burnett. In 2010, Billy Bitter became the third UNC attackman in history to win first-team All-America honors twice.

Prossner, who was the second overall pick in the 2005 Major Lacrosse League draft, also won All-ACC honors in 2005 for the third straight year. No Tar Heel had made the All-ACC team three years in a row since 1983 when Peter Voelkel did so. Billy Bitter followed that up by being named All-ACC three straight years from 2009-11 and Joey Sankey was named All-ACC three years in a row from 2013-15.

Prossner and fellow 2005 senior Mike McCall finished their careers as two of the most prolific goal scorers in Carolina history. Prossner scored 113 goals to rank No. 2 in UNC history while McCall scored 102 goals to move him into a tie for No. 6 on the career chart. Prossner was also the first lacrosse player in history to win the Patterson Medal as UNC's top senior male athlete. He was joined as a Patterson Medal winner by Joey Sankey in 2015. Senior goalkeeper Paul Spellman also broke the UNC career record for saves in 2005, smashing the mark that had stood since 1983 when Tom Sears established it.

Marcus Holman, '13, was a Tewaaraton Trophy finalist in his senior year, joining Prossner (2004) as the only two Tar Heels to be named finalists. In 2019, Tommy Sears, Class of 1983, was named a Tewaaraton Foundation legend, the first Tar Heel so named. Holman was ACC Player of the Year and ACC Tournament MVP as a senior when he broke Bruce Ledwith's 40-year-old record for career points.

The Senior Class of 2015 was an impressive cadre, including first-team All-Americans Chad Tutton and Ryan

Kilpatrick, second teamers Jimmy Bitter and Joey Sankey and third teamer Jake Bailey. Sankey finished as UNC's all-time leading scorer and Bitter ended up third, flanking Holman in the standings. Bitter finished as the second-leading goal scorer in UNC history and Sankey ranked third. Tutton was the most prolific midfield goal scorer in Tar Heel history, finishing ninth overall in career goals.

Most recently, the senior class of 2018 included attackman Chris Cloutier, hero of the 2016 NCAA Tournament, who was named the 2018 Major League Lacrosse Rookie of the Year.

15 Tar Heels Named to ACC Top 50 Team

Seven Tar Heels have been inducted into the U.S. Lacrosse Hall of Fame—former head coach Willie Scroggs in 2003, three-time national defenseman of the year Tom Haus in 2005, star goalkeeper Tom Sears in 2007, a pair of dynamic attackmen in 2010 — Michael Burnett and Mac Ford — midfielder Ryan Wade in 2013 and midfielder Peter Voelkel in 2014.

In 2002, when the ACC announced its Top 50 players in each sport to celebrate a half century of the league's existence, 15 Tar Heel players were tapped amongst the Top 50.

This group included defenseman Joe Breschi, '90, midfielder Jim Buczek, '92, attackman Michael Burnett, '83, defenseman Randy Cox, '84, attackman Mac Ford, '85, attackman Dennis Goldstein, '91, midfielder Kevin Griswold, '82, defenseman Graham Harden, '91, defenseman Tom Haus, '87, attackman Harper Peterson, '70, goalkeeper Tom Sears, '83, midfielder Joey Seivold, '87, midfielder Peter Voelkel, '83, midfielder Jason Wade, '96, and midfielder Ryan Wade, '94.

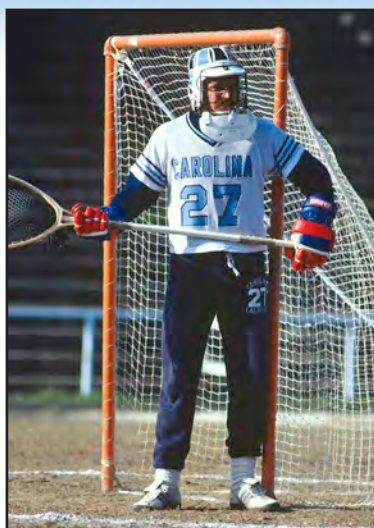

ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM for STUDENT-ATHLETES

The Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes (ASPSA) reports directly to the Office of the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost and is uniquely positioned to collaborate with faculty, the Department of Athletics and the campus community to support student-athletes as they excel in the classroom and compete in athletics. The ASPSA helps student-athletes explore their academic interests and abilities as well as provides numerous academic services including tutoring, secondary academic and career advising, assistance with University and NCAA eligibility, and coordination of academic honors and awards. In addition to the Director/Assistant Provost, the ASPSA staff includes 12 academic counselors, three learning specialists, and an office manager.

ASPSA staff work together to guide and support student-athletes throughout their career at Carolina, beginning with an introduction to academics at UNC during the recruiting process through graduation and beyond. All incoming student-athletes, as well as those in need of more intensive academic support, participate in the My Academic Plan (MAP) program. Academic counselors and learning specialists work with each student-athlete to customize his or her MAP based on academic preparedness, course schedule, and individual need.



The Academic Support Program is housed in the Loudermilk Center for Excellence, a 150,000-square-foot facility that serves all of Carolina's nearly 800 student-athletes across 28 varsity sports. The Loudermilk Center's largest feature is the John W. Pope Student-Athlete Academic Support Center. This facility provides classrooms for teaching and tutoring, study lounges, office space and a computer lab.

The floor also includes offices for the Student-Athlete Development program, which guides students in personal development, leadership development and career development.

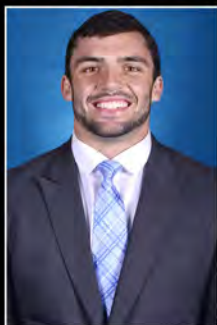

Carolina **NAVIGATE** helps first-year student-athlete navigate the Carolina CREED Statement.

Carolina **ACCELERATE** helps participants to accelerate their leadership development process and leadership efforts.

Carolina **INCUBATE** helps participants to incubate the leadership experience in a safe, controlled environment.

Carolina **ACTIVATE** helps participants to activate the resources to co-lead the team with fellow leaders and coaches.

Carolina **CULTIVATE** develops participants as mentors. The program helps participants to cultivate the first-year experience for participants in Carolina NAVIGATE.

The Leadership Academy collaborates often with campus partners. Tar Heels visit the UNC Hospitals Aircare team to learn about leadership under pressure.

The Richard A. Baddour Carolina Leadership Academy develops world-class leaders for a lifetime of service and success. In 2004, its launch marked the first leadership development program in collegiate athletics, and in the intervening years, it has prided itself on being the premier leadership development program in collegiate athletics. It was the first and continues to stand as the best of its kind.

Programming is based upon descriptive and applied frameworks. A descriptive framework describes how student-athletes progress through the programming. It is a leadership depth chart and pipeline. An applied leadership framework provides a language and an architecture with which to speak about leadership. UNC features an applied framework which is unique to Carolina and uniquely Carolina. The frameworks showcases the interdependence of leading self and leading with others.

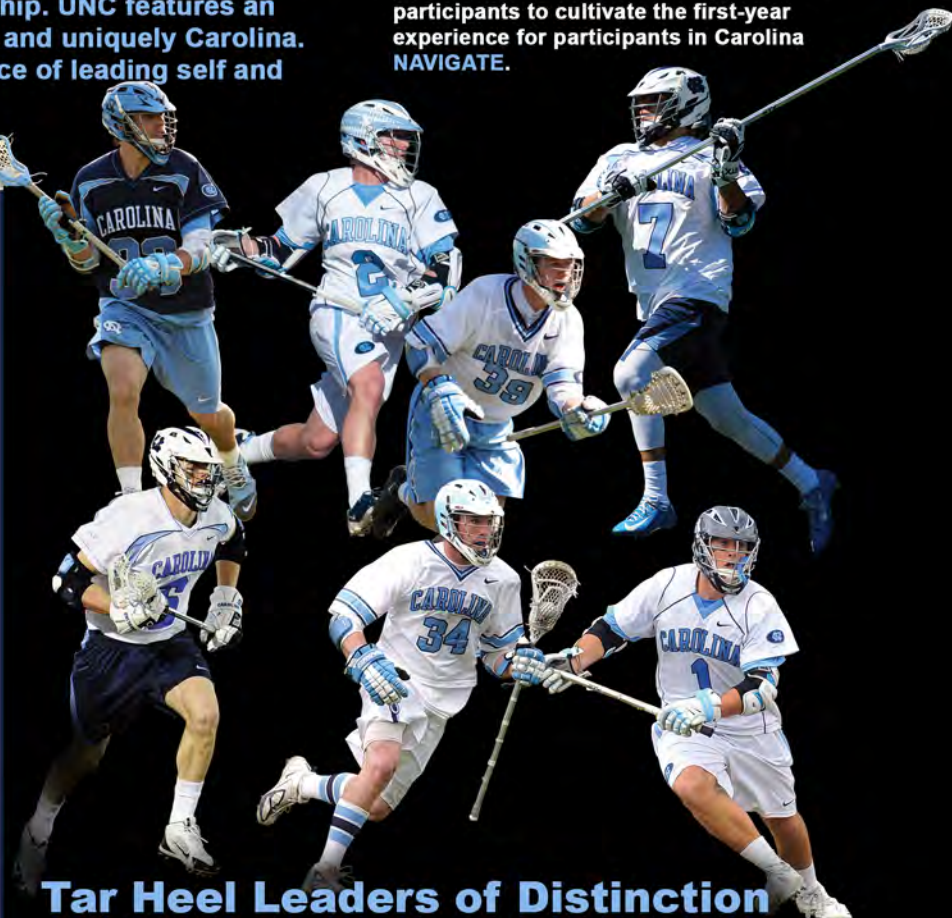
