Nike Supports UNC Athletics

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Nike Inc. signed a new 10-year contract for Nike to be the exclusive supplier of athletic footwear, apparel and accessory products to the Tar Heels effective July 1, 2008. Nike provides the athletic department with shoes, uniforms, coaching gear, balls and other equipment. In addition to the apparel and equipment, which constitutes the majority of the value of the contract, Nike gives the University \$2 million for the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund. Chancellor Carol Folt has directed the funds to faculty support. Nike also provides support for team tours, travel and the hosting regular-season tournaments in several sports, including the 2013 Nike Carolina Classic at Fetzer Field August 30 and September 1. The athletic department also received \$1 million for signing the contract, with those funds having been used to overhaul lighting and sound at the Dean E. Smith Center.

From points north of Chapel Hill:

• Follow I-85 South toward Durham. At exit 174, stay in the left-hand lane to get on 15-501 South. Follow 15-501 South to the Highway 54 junction, where you will exit right, following signs for the UNC campus. Proceed up the hill into campus. The facilities will be on your left.

From points west of Chapel Hill:

• Take I-85 North to I-40 East. Follow I-40 East to exit 270, 15-501 South. Follow 15-501 South into Chapel Hill to the Highway 54 junction, where you will exit right, following signs for the UNC campus. Proceed up the hill into campus. The facilities will be on your left.

From points south of Chapel Hill:

• Take I-77 North to I-85 North to I-40 East. Follow I-40 East to exit 270, 15-501 South. Follow 15-501 South into Chapel Hill to the Highway 54 junction, where you will exit to the right, following signs for the UNC campus. Proceed up the hill into campus. The facilities will be on your left.

The University of North Carolina is home to some of the finest track & field facilities in the nation, and in 2018 those facilities are once again undergoing a transformation. As part of a larger, campus-wide infrasturcture overhall in 2017-18 that will see facilities upgraded for 12 sport programs, track and field is recieiving a state-of-the-art, dedicated complex that will provide the program with its own outdoor home.

The track & field complex will be located along Old Mason Farm Road near UNC Finley Golf Course and will include an eight-lane Beynon 400-meter track, a one-kilometer warm-up track, LED sport lighting, an LED video board, 500 seats for meet viewing and ample parking.

"With the completion of our new facility, like

many of the top programs in the country, we will have a facility dedicated to only track & field," says Head Coach Harlis Meaders. "The facility will allow us to host more home competitions and, once completely developed, help us to continue to attract some of the top prospects in the country."

During the indoor season, the Tar Heels call the Eddie Smith Field House home. Currently in its 17th season of use, the Eddie Smith Field House is one of the best of its kind in the country. Housed inside it are the Dick Taylor Track - a six-lane, 200-meter Mondo track, - and the John Pope Practice Field, which is used by the football team. The facility hosted its third ACC Indoor Championships in six years in 2008. It was completed in December 2001

and includes locker rooms, coaching offices and a 10-by-20 foot scoreboard.

Irwin Belk Track at Fetzer Field, the former home of North Carolina track and field, sat proudly as the centerpiece of the Carolina landscape and, owing to its top-notch quality, hosted many prestigious events. The ACC Outdoor Championships have come to Chapel Hill on a number of occasions, most recently in 2014. The track has also hosted the North Carolina High School Athletic Association track and field championships. In 1996, Carolina welcomed the U.S. Olympic Team to its facilities to train for the Atlanta Games.

The \$1.6 million construction project that renovated Irwin Belk Track to its pristine state was completed in October 1990 and dedicated on

April 6, 1991. The track received its name in honor of Irwin "Ike" Belk, a former letterman whose assistance made the vision of the facility a reality. Renovations included leveling of the field surface as well as installation of a new track, bleachers, lights, scoreboards, throwing circles and runways. Belk Track was an international-style track, which means the turns were European-style. The turns were wider than most American tracks, which meant broader curves and faster times, especially in the 200 and 400. In 2003, the track surface was renovated, and a new surface was installed It was updated once more in 2010. Several new pieces of equipment were also added in 2013-14, including new landing mats for the high jump and pole vault...

The list of world-class athletes that hold the facility records at UNC is as impressive as the facilities themselves. 1996 Olympic gold medalist Allen Johnson holds both the indoor 60-meter hurdles record and the outdoor 110-meter hurdles record. Erin Gilreath broke her own world record in the weight throw during the 2005 indoor season. Monique Hennagan, a two-time Olympic gold medalist in the 1,600-meter relay, holds the outdoor 400 record. Other Tar Heel Olympians who hold facility records include Shalane Flanagan (indoor 3,000), Crystal Cox (outdoor 200), Joan Nesbit (outdoor 5,000, outdoor 10,000) and Vikas Gowda (indoor discus).

The final facility that the Tar Heels use is the Ranson-Hamrick Cross Country Course. The course, which runs near Finley Golf Course, was dedicated on Sept. 13, 2003. Dale Ranson was the Carolina track coach from 1925-1963, and Gordon Hamrick was a letterman in both track and cross country.

Harlis Meaders • Seventh Season Head Coach & Director of Track & Field / Cross Country Throws

Harlis Meaders is in his seventh season as the head coach of the track and field and cross country programs. Meaders returned to coach at his alma mater in 2012 after an 18-year stint at Florida State that saw him rise to the program's associate head coach

in 2004 while coaching the throwers and coordinating recruiting operations.

"I'm extremely delighted to have the opportunity to reunite with the Carolina family," said Meaders in the summer of 2012, "I'm a product of North Carolina track and field. I was born and raised in this state and had the privilege to compete at the University of North Carolina. If you've ever worn the Carolina blue and white, you know how I feel. Carolina is an extremely special place and it's an honor to give back to the university and the community that has given so much to me."

Meaders' tenure at Carolina has been defined by excellence both in the oval and within the classroom. In 2017-18, 25 Tar Heels collectively earned 29 All-ACC accolades, four ACC titles, five All-America honors and a national title over the course of the cross country and track & field seasons. Nicole Greene was finally crowned an NCAA National Champion in the women's indoor high jump and received her third straight All-America nod. At the 2018

NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships, Kenny Selmon earned his highest NCAA finish, clocking a personal best 48.12 in the men's 400-meter hurdles for the runner-up spot and another first-team All-America nod. Four women - Caroline Alcorta, Morgan Ilse, Anna Keefer and Jill Shippee — also made the trip to Eugene, Ore. for their first ever NCAA Championships. Alcorta (10,000m), Keefer (long jump) and Shippee (hammer throw) all earned second-team All-America nods for their performances while Ilse finished an honorable mention All-America.

While the Heels found success in athletics, their

academic ventures were just as noteworthy. Led by Nicole Greene who was named the ACC Women's Indoor Scholar-Athlete of the Year, 48 members of the track & field and cross country teams were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. Additionally, eight individuals were recognized by the USTFCCCA and eight student-athletes earned nine spots on All-ACC Academic teams.

In throwing events, Meaders coached then-freshman Jill Shippee to her first ever NCAA Outdoor Championships. Shippee collected her first second-team All-America nod after earning second-team All-ACC honors at the ACC Outdoor Championships. Alex Cooke finished second in the weight throw to finish first-team All-ACC in indoors and Daniel McArthur had another second-team All-ACC performance.

The 2016-17 editions of the Carolina track & field and cross country teams exemplified the very best of what his student-athletes have accomplished. In competition, 17 Tar Heels earned a combined 29 All-ACC honors, two won ACC titles and six gained All-America distinctions. Kenny Selmon took home first-team All-America honors

after taking fourth in the 400-meter hurdles at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships by breaking a 22-year-old school record in the event. Nicole Greene finished fifth in the high jump at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships to also claim first-team All-America honors. Sarah Howard took home second-team All-America honors in the shot put, and RJ Alowonle (400H), Anna Eaton (pole vault) and Ceo Ways (400) were named honorable-mention All-America. Ten individuals and three relays established 17 new marks in the top five in the UNC record books.

For their efforts in the classroom in 2016-17, nine student-athletes were named Academic All-ACC, eight individuals and the women's team were honored by the USTFCCCA for their academic accomplishments, and 50 Tar Heels earned spots on the ACC Academic Honor Roll. RJ Alowlone, Emily Godwin and Sarah Howard were also recognized by CoSIDA with Academic All-District Honors, with Alowonle and Howard going on to be named Academic All-America.

In the throwing events for the Tar Heels in 2016-17, Meaders led senior Sarah Howard to second-team All-America honors in the shot put for the second time in her career. Howard also earned first-team All-ACC honors in the shot put at both conference championship meets and improved her mark that ranks second in Carolina history. Freshman Daniel McArthur took home second-team All-ACC honors

in the shot put from both conference meets and already has the second-best outdoor shot put throw in UNC History. Alex Cooke scored for Carolina at the indoor conference meet and moved up second in weight throw in the UNC record book.

During the 2015-16 season, the track and field program performed well in the ACC and at the national level under the guidance of Meaders. Kenny Selmon earned first-team All-America honors, while Javonte Lipsey was named to the second team. At conference championships, 23 Tar Heels earned All-ACC honors and the men's 4x400 (Javonte Lipsey,

Kenny Selmon, Cory Nicholls and Ceo Ways) captured the title at the ACC Outdoor Track & Field Championships for the fourth consecutive year. Five student-athletes were named to the All-ACC Academic Team (Tory Kemp, Avana Story, Nicole Greene, Houston Summers and Javonte Lipsey) and 24 were on the 2015-16 ACC Academic Honor Roll.

In the throws for 2015-16, Meaders led Houston Summers, Avana Story and Zach Gray to All-ACC outdoor honors and Sarah Howard to All-ACC indoor honors. AJ Hicks qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships where he took first-team All-America honors after finishing sixth in the weight throw. AJ Hicks had a throw of 218-10, which increased his No. 3 all-time mark in UNC history. Story notched a 200-9 to take over second place in the UNC record book, while Alex Cooke threw a 181-8 to increase her No. 5 all-time mark.

The Tar Heels found success on the national level in 2014-15 with eight first-team All-Americas (Lizzy Whelan, Sean Sutton, Xenia Rahn [twice], Javonte Lipsey, Ceo Ways [twice] and Kenny Selmon). Additionally, AJ Hicks, Kenny Selmon, Javonte Lipsey and



Sarah Howard earned second-team All-America honors. The team hauled in 26 All-ACC honorees including ACC champions Xenia Rahn (pentathlon and heptathlon), Paul Haley (heptathlon) and the men's 4x400 relay (RJ Alowonle, Javonte Lipsey, Kenny Selmon and Ceo Ways). The team also excelled in the classroom with 46 individuals making the 2014-15 ACC Academic Honor Roll.

In the throws for 2014-15, Meaders coached AJ Hicks and Sarah Howard to second-team All-America honors. Hicks eclipsed the second place mark on the school's all-time list in the weight throw. He earned All-ACC honors for finishing third in the event and took 10th at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Howard earned second-team All-America honors in the shot put during the outdoor season.

During the 2013-14 track and field seasons, Meaders led the Tar Heel program to four ACC individual titles, a 4x400 conference championship and 19 All-ACC individuals. On the national level, 26 individuals and three relays qualified for the NCAA East Preliminary Round and 10 advanced to the NCAA National Championships. Five Tar Heels earned first-team All-America honors - RJ Alowonle (4x400, 400-meter hurdles), Sean Sutton (4x400), Javonte Lipsey (4x400), Ceo Ways (4x400) and Xenia Rahn (Heptathlon) - and seven were named second-team All-America - Isaac Presson (Mile, 5,000), Lizzy Whelan (1,500), Annie LeHardy (Mile, DMR), Cori Floyd (DMR), Lianne Farber (DMR), Javonte Lipsey (400-hurdles) and Sarah Howard (shot put). The Tar Heels also excelled in the classroom as 22 earned All-ACC Academic honors and 40 student-athletes were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll.

In the throws for 2013-14, Meaders coached the unit to several personal records and a few top-five school marks. Meaders guided AJ Hicks to an ACC Championship in the weight throw and ACC Indoor Field Event MVP honors. Sarah Howard threw a new personal record under his direction that ranked 10th among all NCAA athletes in 2014.

Meaders is a 1992 graduate who competed in the discus, shot put and 35-pound weight throw. While competing, he won back-to-back ACC outdoor titles in the discus in 1991 and 1992 as well as an indoor conference crown in the weight throw in 1992. Meaders was a high school All-America who became a NCAA and Olympic Trials qualifier while at UNC. He set the school record in discus with

a throw of 186-10 (56.95 meters), a mark that stood for 23 years, and now ranks second on the UNC all-time list. Meaders was also a captain on the 1992 track & field team that won the ACC outdoor title.

The Monroe, N.C., native began his coaching career at Western Carolina where he spent three years as an assistant coach while earning his master's degree in physical education. While there, Meaders also instructed courses in the physical education department. He coached several Western Carolina track and field athletes to multiple Southern Conference individual titles.

During his 18 years at Florida State, Meaders helped the Seminoles win the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association's NCAA Division I men's program of the year award for two consecutive years in 2011 and 2012. As the throws coach, Meaders guided 11 different Florida State throwers to 22 All-America honors and 22 ACC titles. The male and female athletes he coached established more than three-

quarters of the top-10 all-time school bests in the discus, javelin, shot put and weight throws during his tenure. In 2005, Meaders was named the East Regional Assistant Coach of the Year for his success with the Seminoles throwing corps.

Meaders also coached two-time NCAA Champion Garrett Johnson, who is widely considered the greatest student-athlete in Florida State school history. In the fall of 2005, Johnson was honored as the second Rhodes Scholar in school history as well as the first for a student-athlete. In the spring of 2005, Johnson claimed NCAA indoor and outdoor titles in the shot put for the Seminoles' first national championships in the event. Johnson also set school, conference and NCAA East Regional records that year. Johnson would go on to compete in the 2008 U.S. Olympic Trials, earning a ranking of 14th in the world.

Olympian Dorian Scott was also one of Meaders' stand-out student-athetles at Florida State. A native of Jamaica, he became the first Jamaican to ever reach the final of the men's shot put at an Olympics, throwing 66-6 (20.31 meters) to qualify, and ultimately finished 10th with a throw of 67-6 (20.61 meters) in London in 2012. Scott has an all-time best shot throw of 70-4 ½ (21.45 meters) which he set in March 2008 in Tallahassee, Fla.

In addition to leading student-athletes to competitive success, Meaders has also taught student-athletes who have gone on to become successful coaches: Gregg Jack is the throws coach at CSUN, David Price is the throws coach East Carolina, B.J. Linnenbrink is the associate head coach at Duke, Dorian Scott is an assistant coach at Florida State and Makiba Batten is an assistant coach at Wayne State. Karen Rademeyer is a former Meaders' pupil who also went on to coach.

Meaders also brought with him to Carolina a deep commitment to academic success. From 2007 to 2012, his student-athletes earned 19 Academic All-America honors. He was also the co-founder of R.E.A.L. Men (Reliable, Educated, Approachable Leaders), a leadership program at Florida State for male student-athletes. Along with his coaching duties at FSU, Meaders oversaw daily operations, including team travel and budget, as well as acting as the program's liaison with athletic department administration, compliance, facilities, admission, financial aid and the business office.

Grove-McDonough joins Carolina after a five-year stint as the head cross country and assistant men's and women's track and field coach at lowa State University. During her time with the Cyclones, she directed the training of all cross country and long distance events ranging from 800 meters to 10,000 meters.

Grove-McDonough also oversaw recruiting for the women's programs in her events.

The Minnesota graduate led the Iowa State women's cross country team to the last five NCAA Championships and even coached the 2014 roster to a runner-up finish. Her cross country program has won four of the past five Big 12 Conference Championships, and she has helped develop 11 All-America competitors across the cross country and indoor and outdoor track and field programs. Nine of her athletes achieved the coveted title of conference champions and two of her relays captured conference gold.

Academically, Grove-McDonough's programs at Iowa State excelled just as much in the classroom as on the course. For five consecutive years, her teams received USTFCCCA All-Academic recognition and the women's programs held the highest team GPA across all women's programs at the

university.

Prior to her position at Iowa State, Grove-McDonough held the same set of roles at the University of Connecticut beginning in October 2008. While with the Huskies, she led the women's cross country team to their first ever appearance at the NCAA Cross Country Championships and recorded an eighth-place finish at the 2012 NCAAs. Six of her athletes on the indoor and outdoor track and field teams achieved All-America status while 12 individuals and three relays qualified for both NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Grove-McDonough's athletes at Connecticut were also awarded All-Academic team honors by the USTFCCCA from 2009 to 2012.

Due to her success with her two previous universities, Grove-McDonough is a four-time Big 12 Conference Women's Cross Country Coach of the Year, a three-time USTFCCCA Midwest Region Cross Country Coach of the Year, and a two-time USTFCCCA Northeast Region Assistant Indoor Track and Field Coach of the Year. In 2012, she was named Big East Conference Coach of the Year and USTFCCCA Norteast Region Coach of the Year for cross country. The Big East also awarded the Connecticut indoor track and field coaching staff the honor of Coaching Staff of the Year in 2009.



Abigi Id-Deen · Second Season Assistant Coach Coordinator of Sprints, Hurdles & Relays

Abigi Id-Deen is in his second year as the the coordinator of men's and women's sprints, hurdles and relays. Prior to the 2018 season, Id-Deen joined Carolina with 13 years of coaching experience at the Division I level and 37 All-America student-athletes.

Last season, Coach Id-Deen worked with all sprinters, hurdlers and horizontal jumpers, making a huge impact on the Carolina record books. Cierra Dunston, McKinley McNeill, Dontavian Smith and Kenny Selmon all qualified for at least one ACC Indoor Championship final and each earned a spot among the top-five all-time marks at UNC. Brianna Duncan broke the school record in the 60-meter, clocking in at 7.29, before setting two more Carolina records in the outdoor season — a time of 11.27 in the 100 and 23.03 in the 200. Both the men's and women's outdoor 4x100 relays also ran times that rank in the top-five in the history of Carolina track & field and a number of athletes qualified for the NCAA East Preliminary Round. Anna Keefer won indoor ACC long jump title as a freshman and earned second-team All-America honors during outdoor season. Most notably, Id-Deen coached Kenny Selmon who went on to claim the NCAA runner-up title in the 400-meter hurdles after clocking in a new school record time of 48.12 at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Kenny also went on to win the USATF 400H title in Des Moines, Iowa,

A native of Staten Island, N.Y., raised in Arizona, Id-Deen most recently spent two years as an assistant coach for sprints at Tennessee from 2015-17 where he specialized in long sprints, hurdles and relays. With the Volunteers, Id-Deen coached 400-meter student-athletes Nathan Strother (45.07) and Felicia Majors (51.29) and two 4x400 teams to All-America honors in 2016. Also during the 2016 season, the Volunteer women broke the 4x400 school record on their way to winning the SEC Indoor Championship.

Under Id-Deen, freshman Ari Cordell ran 46.27 to become of a member of the United States Junior 4x400 team, which win the gold medal at the 2016 U-20 World Championships in Poland. He also coached freshman Brooklynn Broadwater to the seventh-fastest time in Tennessee history in the 400-meter hurdles when she finished in 58.20 at the 2017 NCAA East Preliminary Round.

Prior to Tennessee, Id-Deen spent nine years at George Mason, beginning his stint there as an assistant coach. In 2011, Id-Deen was promoted to associate head coach after guiding student-athletes to 10 All-America performances in the Patriot sprints and jumps and the men's team to Colonial Athletic Association titles in 2010 and 2011.

Following the promotion, Id-Deen earned the USTFCCCA Southeast

Region Assistant Coach of the Year Award after helping the Patriot men to their third consecutive CAA title. Eleven of his athletes qualified for the NCAA East Region Championships that year, with two moving on to the National Championships. Also in 2012, Id-Deen coached LaVell Handy to the Most Outstanding Field Performer Award at the CAA Championships. Handy qualified for the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships in the long jump and took part in the Olympic Trials at the end of the season.

In 2013, Id-Deen coached the Patriot men's 4x400-meter relay team to All-America honors at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Sprinter David Verburg was second-team All-America during the indoor season and earned first-team honors during the outdoor campaign in the 400. Verburg would go on to the USA Championships where his 400 time of 44.75 earned a place at the World Championships in Moscow, Russia. The women's 4x400 also picked up second-team All-America honors that season.

In 2014, the Patriot women's squad claimed the Atlantic 10 Indoor and Outdoor Championships. Three of Id-Deen's athletes seized individual titles at the A-10 Outdoor Championships, as did the men's and women's 4x400 relay teams.

In total, Id-Deen coached 21 All-America individuals, six All-America relays, 48 individual conference champions and 18 conference relay champions in his nine seasons at George Mason.

Prior to George Mason, Id-Deen spent two years as a member of the Univerist of Richmond's track and field staff, working primarily with the sprints, jumps and hurdle events. During his two-year tenure, his athletes broke 17 school records and earned five all-conference selections.

Id-Deen coached Richmond's Jessica Young to the World Junior Championships and five school records, including the 60, 200, and indoor 400, and outdoor 200 and 400. Young was the first female sprinter in Spider history to qualify for the NCAA Indoor Championships in the 400 and the NCAA East Regional Championships in the 200 and 400.

Before becoming a member of the Richmond staff, he served two years as a volunteer assistant at Phoenix College (Ariz.), primarily working with the sprints and jumps.

Id-Deen competed in track and field at Central Arizona College from 1997-99 prior to transferring to Arizona State. He set a long jump personal best of 24-06, ran the 200 meters in 21.32 and set a personal mark of 47.50 in the 400 meters. He graduated from ASU in 2002. He and his wife, Kia (formerly Kia Davis) were married in August of 2014; Kia is a 2008 Olympian for Liberia, where she holds six-national records.

Id-Deen is a USATF level I and II certified instructor in sprints, hurdles, jumps and combined events. He also holds USTFCCCA certification in advanced strength and conditioning.

Nicole Hudson · Seventh Season Assistant Coach Multis/High Jump

Nicole Hudson enters her seventh season as an assistant coach for the University of North Carolina. After serving as a coach for jumps, sprints, hurdles, and relays for five seasons, Hudson focused her efforts on multis and high jump beginning in 2017-18.

After two straight seasons of earning indoor All-America honors, Nicole Greene finally achieved the

ultimate goal under the guidance of Coach Hudson — the title of NCAA National Champion. Greene took first in the 2018 NCAA Indoor Championship high jump competition just weeks after claiming her first ACC Indoor title in the event.

In 2016-17, Hudson led Nicole Greene to the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships in the high jump. However, this year Greene finished fifth to earn first-team All-America honors. Greene also took second in the high jump at both ACC Championships and moved into the top-five in UNC history in the indoor high jump. Emily Godwin earned first-team All-ACC honors in the high jump by taking third at the indoor conference meet, while Alexis Gannon earned second-team honors in the triple jump. Cierra Dunston (400), Gannon (triple jump), Greene (high jump) and the women's 4x400 (Natisha Dixon, Jewel Christian, Dunston, McKinley McNeill) also qualified for the NCAA East Preliminary Round.

During the 2015-16 season, Hudson coached Nicole Greene to second-team All-America honors in the high jump at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships and All-ACC honors during both seasons, as well as a top-five outdoor jump in the UNC record books. Greene just barely missed qualifying for the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, as she cleared 5-9 ¼ to finish in 13th place. Emily Godwin also earned All-ACC honors and the women's 4x400 (Natisha Dixon, Jewel Christian, Kendra Douglas, Cierra Dunston) finished in sixth place at the ACC Outdoor Championships with a time of 3:40.22.

In 2014-15, Hudson guided Steve Dunbar to a third-place finish in the men's high jump at the ACC Outdoor Track and Field Championships earning All-ACC honors. Hudson also saw freshman Natisha Dixon finish seventh in the 100-meter hurdles at the conference championship while the 4x400 team placed ninth.

During her first season in 2013, Hudson helped guide six jumpers, two sprinters, two hurdlers and one relay to the NCAA East Preliminary with two Tar Heels advancing to the NCAA National Championships. In 2014, Hudson helped multiple Tar Heels reach personal records while guiding Philip Morris and Cori Floyd to the NCAA East Preliminary Round.

Hudson is a native North Carolinian, born in Goldsboro. Throughout her life she has maintained a passion for athletics and education. In high school she was a two-sport athlete for the Harnett Central Trojans, playing basketball and

competing in track and field. In her senior season she was selected to the All-Region team in basketball and was the 1988 NC 3A high jump state champion.

Hudson attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on a North Carolina Teaching Fellows Scholarship. While at UNC, she majored in mathematics education and was a member of the track and field team. During her collegiate track career she was a four-year letterwinner, a three-time ACC Champion, a two-time All-American and a 1992 Olympic Trials finalist in the heptathlon. She held the ACC record in the heptathlon for 15 years and held the UNC record in the event for 23 years.

After her graduation in 1992, Hudson spent nine years teaching and coaching in Georgia and North Carolina at Chattahoochee High School, Myers Park High School and Chapel Hill High School while continuing in her own athletic pursuits. In 1996 she was a finalist in the high jump at the U.S. Olympic Trials. In 2001, she began her graduate work at UNC in sport administration. After completing her masters' coursework and thesis titled, "The History and Significance of the Women's Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) Basketball Tournament," she became the Director of Training and Recruitment for Competitive Resources Group in Lawrenceville, Ga. During that time she conducted career development workshops for various colleges across the country. She also had an opportunity to work with professional sports leagues like the WNBA and the NBDL.

She returned to the classroom once again in 2004 and served as the head boys' and girls' track coach at Alpharetta High School in Georgia for eight years. In that time, the Raiders were 2006 Region 6AAAAA Runner-ups, 2007 Region 6AAAAA Champions, three-time Fulton County Champions (2006-08) and posted state championship team finishes of fourth, seventh and eighth place. The Raiders were mainstays of the Georgia State Track & Field Championships, and Hudson coached two-time Georgia state champion Dylan Hassett in the 3,200.

In 2011, Hudson joined the faculty of Eastside High School in Greenville, S.C. As an assistant cross country coach, she aided the Eagles in winning their first state championship. During the track and field season she coached the third-place high jump finisher, Katie Anderson, and the 2012 State 400-meter hurdles champion, Sydney Smith.

Hudson has coached numerous high school athletes who have gone on to compete at the collegiate level, including Drew Branch (University of Georgia), Dylan Hassett (William and Mary) Keturah Williams, (ETSU), Ama Larbi (Georgia Tech), Brandon Terry (Wake Forest), Breanna Radford (University of South Carolina), Daniel Jester (West Point) and Audris Williams (Murray State, who was named Rookie of the Year).



Kia Id-Deen • First Season Assistant Coach Sprints, Hurdles & Relays

Kia Id-Deen, a volunteer assistant coach during the 2018 season, joined the full-time coaching staff as an assistant coach for the 2018-19 seasons. In her new role, Id-Deen will oversee short sprints and hurdles for both the men's and women's teams.

As a volunteer at Carolina, Kia Id-Deen (formerly Kia Davis) assisted with the development of all

sprinters and hurdlers, making a huge impact on the Carolina record books. Cierra Dunston, McKinley McNeill, Dontavian Smith and Kenny Selmon all qualified for at least one ACC Indoor Championship final and each earned a spot among the top-five all-time marks at UNC. Brianna Duncan broke the school record in the 60-meter, clocking in at 7.29, before setting two more Carolina records in the outdoor season — 100-meter with a time of 11.27 and 200-meter in 23.03. Both the men's and women's outdoor 4x100 relays also ran times that rank in the top-five in the history of Carolina track & field and a number of athletes qualified for the NCAA East Preliminary Round. Most notably, Id-Deen helped train Kenny Selmon who went on to claim the NCAA runner-up title in the 400-meter hurdles after clocking in a new school record time of 48.12 at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships.

Id-Deen found much coaching success at the collegiate and high school levels prior to coming to Carolina. She was the head boys and girls coach at Farragut High School in Farragut, Tenn., from 2015-17 and she spent the 2014 season at George Mason University as an assistant coach for sprints and hurdles with the Patriots. At George Mason, Id-Deen led student-athletes to personal bests and A-10 honors on the way to helping both the men and women to Atlantic-10 outdoor titles. She also coached the men's 4x100 to a conference championship.

From 2010-14, Id-Deen was the assistant head coach for sprints and hurdles

with the Pittsburgh Panthers. Under her counsel, Id-Deen led Panthers to Big East titles in the 200, 100 and 4x100 and helped Pittsburgh send two individuals to national championship meets. Id-Deen also guided the women's 4x100 to the NCAA Outdoor Championships in 2014, and helped the men's team win that same relay at the Big East Championships for the first time in 10 years. In her first season with the Panthers, Id-Deen guided the women's 4x100 team to a Big East record and NCAA Honorable Mention accolades.

Other highlights from her time with the Panthers include coaching Joshua Thompson to a spot on the 2012 USA World Junior Team after claiming a silver medal at the USA Junior Championships in the 110-meter hurdles as well as leading Cambrya Jones to three school records (indoor 200, 100, 200), second-team All-America honors, two Big East titles (100, 200), Big East Most Valuable Athlete honors and a spot on the USA NACAC U-23 team.

From 2007-09, Id-Deen was an assistant coach at Bethune-Cookman University where she helped produce numerous conference champions, NCAA Regional qualifiers, All-Americas and the first-ever NCAA Championships appearance for the BCU women.

A 2002 graduate of St. Augustine's College, Id-Deen was exceptional in sprints and hurdles. She won six NCAA Division II National Championships, claiming the 55-meter hurdles at the Indoor Championships and added top finishes in the 100-meter hurdles and the 200 at the Outdoor Championships. Id-Deen was also CIAA Conference Champion in both the 55-meter hurdles and the 200.

Id-Deen represented Liberia in the 2008 Olympic Games, competing in the 200 and 400. She was also a semifinalist at the 2008 World Indoor Championships in the 60-meter hurdles and a silver medalist at the 2006 World Indoor Championships with the USA $4x400\ squad.$



Bobby Lockhart · First Season Assistant Coach Cross Country & Distance

A renowned assistant coach at Oklahoma State and a standout runner at the University of Wisconsin, Bobby Lockhart has more than proven himself in the track & field and cross country spheres.

A native of Winchester, Va., Lockhart played a pivotal role in the Cowboys' success throughout his 10-year coaching career at Oklahoma State University. During his time at Oklahoma State,

the men's cross country team won three NCAA National Championship titles in 2009, 2010, and 2012 and two more top-three finishes in 2011 and 2013. The men's program also won the NCAA Midwest Regional Cross-Country Championships eight times between 2008-2016 and racked up nine-consecutive Big 12 Conference Championship titles during that same time period.

Throughout the years, Lockhart's men have completely dominated the OSU record books, taking over the top-10 in the indoor mile, all but one of the top-10 spots in the indoor 3000 and all but three spots in the 1500. Their success twice earned them a second-place finish in the USTFCCCA National Program of the Year standings and following the 2015-16 academic year, both the men and women found themselves among the top-10 programs in the rankings.

In 2015, Lockhart helped coach the women's cross country team to wins at both the NCAA Midwest Regional Cross Country Championships and the Big 12 Cross Country Championship before the team took seventh at the NCAA National Cross Country Championships.

The teams also found success during the track and field seasons with the men finishing sixth at the 2014 NCAA Indoor National Championships and eighth at 2013 NCAA Indoors in 2013 while also capturing two Big 12 Indoor Track & Field Championships in 2014 and 2016.

While his teams won title after title, Lockhart's student-athletes found just as much success as individual competitors. Having helped coach 103 distance runners to All-America honors and 73 distance runners to Big 12 titles, it comes as no surprise that Lockhart's middle distance training set Chad Noelle on the path to an NCAA Outdoor Championship title in the men's 1,500 in 2015. Oklahoma State had four more NCAA individual champions in the middle distance events during Lockhart's tenure, including Kaela Edwards in the 2016 indoor mile and Natalja Piliusina and German Fernandez in the 2013 and 2009 1500m competitions. Fernandez (2008 and 2011), Ryan Vail (2009), Girma Mecheso (2010), Kirubel Erassa (2014) and Vegard Oelstad (2015) were also crowned as Big 12 individual cross country champions.

Under Lockhart's decade at Oklahoma State, the men have managed ninestraight cross country titles, six regional titles and a plethora of recognitions. Middle-distance runner Josh Thompson earned three All-America honors for the first time in 20 years and Hassan Abdi won Big 12 Newcomer of the Year in 2017. Lockhart's guidance led Craig Nowak to the Indoor High-Point Award.

In 2016, Lockhart assisted coaching transfer Josh Thompson into a national contender, bringing his personal-best mile time down from 4:15 at the beginning of the season to 3:58.33. Thompson went on to win two Big 12 titles in his debut indoor season and anchored the distance medley relay team to the third-fastest time in NCAA history, as well as a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Thompson's breakout season under Lockhart earned him the USTFCCCA Midwest Region's Male Athlete of the Year award, as well as Big 12 Newcomer of the Year in Cross Country.

Cerake Geberkidane won two Big 12 titles at the 2016 Outdoor Championships which earned him Freshman of the Year honors. Geberkidane also won an indoor title in the 5,000 and took home all-conference honors at the Big 12 Cross Country Championships this season.

Academically, Lockhart's teams have shown just as much dedication to their studies. The men's cross country rosters have earned USTFCCCA Academic All-Americas honors in seven of the last eight years with the 2009 and 2012 teams being named USTFCCCA Scholar Team of the Year. The women's cross country program bested the men's streak by one and have now earned USTFCCCA Academic All-America honors for eight straight years.

An impactful competitor at Wisconsin and former national high school athlete of the year, Lockhart came to Stillwater from the University of Oklahoma, where he served as an assistant coach for the Sooners track and field/cross country program in 2007-08.

A 2007 graduate, Lockhart helped Wisconsin win a national cross country championship in 2005 after finishing runner-up for three consecutive years. He was also part of 11 Big Ten championship-winning cross country, indoor track and outdoor track teams.

Twice an NCAA All-American at Wisconsin, Lockhart earned the honor once in cross country and once in outdoor track (10,000-meter run). He was twice named to the All-Big Ten Conference Cross Country Team.

Bursting onto the scene as one of the nation's most talented high school distance runners, Lockhart was a member of Team USA at the 2002 World Cross Country Championships and was named a Nike Athlete of the Year after winning the two-mile run at the Nike Indoor Nationals and two-mile run at the Adidas Outdoor Classic. Lockhart was also runner-up at the 2001 Foot Locker National Cross Country Championships and won 19 state titles in Virginia, including a record four in cross country. He was inducted into the Virginia High School Hall of Fame in 2015.



Jeff Gorski • Second Season Volunteer Assistant Coach Javelin

Jeff Gorski, a 1977 Carolina graduate and threetime All-ACC performer in javelin, is a highlyrespected javelin instructor around the world having worked with elite athletes from high school national champions to Olympians.

Prior to volunteering for Carolina's 2017-18 season, Gorski was the javelin development

chair for The National Scholastic Athletic Foundation, where he coached and trained some of the most talented high school javelin athletes in the country from 2011-2017.

From 1999-03, Gorski served as the men's javelin development chair for USA Track & Field (later the USATF High Performance program), the highest-ranking individual event position at the national level.

That opportunity followed his success as an independently-contracted coach, during which time he notably worked with six-time U.S. javelin champion and 1992 and 1996 Olympian Tom Pukstys. Under Gorski's tutelage, Pukstys set six American records in the javelin and was ranked in the top 10 in the world for three years.

Gorski's first opportunity to coach the javelin came at Carolina, where he periodically worked from 1981-91 as an assistant coach, coaching many standout student-athletes including All-Americas Lynda Lipson, Sherrie MacKinney and Sean Murray. Gorski was also the throws coach for Meaders, who during his time at UNC won back-to-back ACC titles in the discus (1991-92), earned a conference crown in the weight throw in 1992, made the 1992 Olympic Trials

and set a Carolina discus record that stood for 23 years.

He has coached elite javelin throwers from his Chapel Hill home since 1992, when Lipson and Murray came to him requesting additional training. Adding a weight room, 70′ javelin runway and other facilities, Gorski began to equip his property to serve and train top javelin high school, collegiate and post-collegiate athletes from around the U.S. In 2000, he founded Klub Keihas and began to officially run clinics and training camps for athletes and coaches to learn the basics of throws technique and training. The goal of Klub Keihas is to develop top athletes while teaching the skills to become future leaders and role models.

Gorski is a native of Clark, N.J., and has lived in Chapel Hill since 1981.

"It's exciting to have Coach Gorski rejoin the Carolina family," head coach Harlis Meaders said. "He is part of our history and is going to help us write the future of the program. Coach Gorski is an extremely decorated coach. He's probably one of the better javelin coaches in the country, and for him to volunteer his time to be part of our staff is really flattering. Coach Gorski of course coached me as a collegiate athlete and mentored me while I was here so it's great to have a father figure here to sort of help me guide the program too. I'm really excited about what he brings to the program. Even though he will be the senior coach on the staff, he is one of the most energetic coaches, highly animated, very colorful. He just loves what he does. He's got a great passion not only for the javelin, but a great passion for working with the kids. I think he's going to be a tremendous asset to everything we're trying to accomplish."

Kenny Selmon · First Season Volunteer Assistant Coach Sprints, Hurdles & Relays

After capturing a World Cup title in London, Kenny Selmon joins Carolina track & field once again, this time as a volunteer assistant coach. Selmon will also continue training with Coach Abigi Id-Deen as he starts his professional track career and his former coaches, now coworkers, are thrilled to see what he will bring to the team in his new roles.

The 2018 Athletics World Cup Champion and the 2018 USATF National Champion in the 400-meter hurdles, Selmon has plenty of experience to share with his former teammates and the freshmen athletes striving to achieve success at the highest levels. During his time at Carolina, Selmon qualified for four NCAA East Preliminary Rounds and five NCAA Championships while collecting five All-America accolades, 10 All-ACC honors and six spots in the UNC top-five all-time records.

Selmon repeatedly set the bar from the moment he stepped on campus up until his final race in a UNC singlet. At the end of his senior season, he earned a career-best NCAA runner-up finish in the 400-meter hurdles at the 2018 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Selmon clocked a new personal-best time of 48.12 in the final, one year after breaking a 22-year-old school record in the 2017 NCAA Outdoors. Selmon also captured his fourth and fifth conference titles at the 2018 ACC Outdoor Championships, cruising through the 400-meter hurdles and running a leg of the winning 4x400 relay.

Selmon earned two other top-five all-time marks in his final season. He ran

Carolina's fourth-fastest indoor 400 time of 46.63 and helped a second indoor 4x400 lineup go down in history with the fourth-fastest time of 3:07.57. Prior to those stellar performances, Selmon had earned two spots in the relay records during his freshman year — a third all-time ranking in both the indoor and outdoor 4x400 relays. Two years later in 2017, Selmon reunited with two of the members of the historic 2015 outdoor relay and anchored the 2017 4x400 relay whose time of 3:04.27 ranks second all-time at UNC.

As if winning conference titles and setting school records was not impressive enough, Selmon finished first in each of his 400H appearances in 2018 before the NCAA final.

Selmon began his international career well before taking the world 400H title in London, England. As a sophomore in college, he took 13th in the 400H semifinals at the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials with a time of 50.76. In 2015, Selmon won the 400H competition as captain of the USA Junior Track & Field Team and he was a silver medalist at the Pan-American Junior Athletics Championships.

Even in high school, the Mableton, Ga. native stood out, committing to Carolina as the No. 1 hurdler in his class. Selmon was a seven-time state champion and three-time All-America in the 400H. To top it all off, he captained the 2014 World Junior USA Team, earned the title of 400H national champion in in 2014 and earned bronze at the 2013 World Youth Championships in the 400H.

Bobby Hostler is in his first year as a volunteer assistant coach for the Carolina track & field team. With over a decade of experience for Wake County Public Schools, Hostler has more than proven himself both as a coach and trainer.

Hostler's career as a pole-vault trainer and coach began in 2006 at Millbrook High School in Raleigh,

N.C where he established the pole vault program. Just two years into his tenure, three of his pole vaulters swept the 2008 NCHSAA Indoor State Championships and finished first, second and third in the competition. In 2012, Hostler founded yet another pole vaulting program when his teaching career took him to Sanderson High School. Though he no longer taught at Millbrook, Hostler's prominence as a coach — and his emphasis on teamwork and unity — allowed him to oversee the pole vaulters at both Millbrook and Sanderson where he produced numerous conference, regional and state championship competitors.

As his program continued to gain momentum, Hostler found himself taking

in athletes from other Wake County high schools who did not have pole vaulting programs. To date, Hostler has produced a New Balance All-American, three NCHSAA state champions and nine top-three state finalists. Additionally, he has coached five regional champions, six conference champions, five high school record holders and 12 regional finalists. Five of his athletes also rank among the top 25 high school pole vaulters of all-time in the state of North Carolina.

As both an educator and coach, Hostler stresses the importance of academic

As both an educator and coach, Hostler stresses the importance of academic success. Hostler offers tutoring and study hall sessions to his student-athletes to ensure they thrive academically and keep the door open for taking their skills to the collegiate level.

Hostler is a graduate of Fayetteville State University where he ran cross-country and served as the team's captain. During his time at Chapel Hill High School, Hostler set multiple records and even won the pole vault competition at the 1991 North Carolina High School State Championships. Hostler lives in Raleigh, N.C. with his wife and daughter.

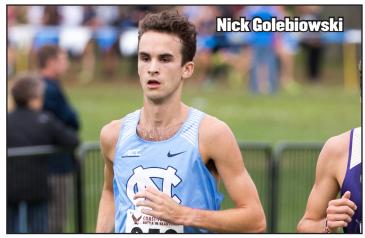












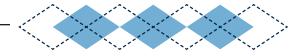

A Great Tradition

North Carolina's great tradition in track and field traces its roots back to 1900 when the men's team overwhelmed Davidson 125½ to 11½ team points in the first state championship at Horner's Park in Oxford.

In 1901, the Tar Heels won the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association meet in New Orleans, and in 1904 Carolina participated in its first Penn Relays. Carolina hosted its first dual meet in 1908 on what was then known as Lake Track, the state's first cinder track, built by Harry S. Lake in 1898.

The track and field program continued to grow and thrive in the 1920s under the expert tutelage of coach and athletic director Robert A. Fetzer. Along with one of his early protégés, Dale Ranson, Fetzer helped form the foundations for a golden era of Tar Heel track.

The Dixie Flyer

Galen "The Dixie Flyer" Elliott was one of the first track standouts to call Chapel Hill home. He turned in the nation's fastest time in the mile in 1926. He received All-America honors in 1927 and 1928, the first of a long list of Carolina performers to earn such national recognition. In 1928, Elliott also teamed up with Hoyt Pritchett, Minor Barkley and June Fisher to win the national championship in the 4xMile relay, marking the first national title in UNC track and field history. It would be 19 years until Jack Milne won the NCAA cross country title to become the second Carolina national champion.

Early Tar Heel Olympians

Williamson distinguished himself as Carolina's first-ever Olympian at the 1936 Berlin Games. He finished sixth in the 800 meters as part of the Jesse Owens-led American contingent, which dominated the field in Germany. "Chunk" Simmons, who competed in five different events for Carolina, was the bronze medalist in the decathlon at the 1948 London Olympics and the first Tar Heel to win an Olympic track medal. He repeated as bronze medalist four years later at the 1952 Helsinki Games to become UNC's first two-time Olympic medalist.

"Wild Bill" Albans

"Wild Bill" Albans, who won more blue ribbons and set more school and conference records than anyone else in Carolina track history, joined Simmons at the 1948 London Games to compete as a triple jumper. Albans then returned to Chapel Hill and led the Tar Heels to the 1949 Southern Conference indoor championship with five first-place finishes in sprinting, hurdling and jumping events. The next year he continued to prove his extreme athletic prowess, scoring more

points than any other competitor at the NCAA Championships. His national championship in the 220-yard low hurdles helped Carolina to a third-place national finish.



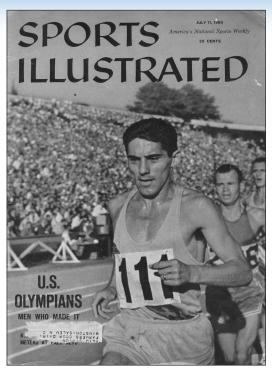
At the 1949 Penn Relays, Albans and teammates Jack Moody, Dick Taylor and Bob Morrow set an American and world record of 58.6 seconds in the shuttle hurdle relay. The Tar Heels' track and field team further enhanced their national standing the following year during the 1950 Penn Relays, when Bob Kirk won the javelin for the second consecutive year and the shuttle hurdles team of Albans, Moody, Morrow and Garrett Fitzgibbons repeated as champions.

Tar Heel Distance Domination

All-America middle distance runner Dave Scurlock competed from 1955-1959 and won three straight Atlantic Coast Conference indoor and outdoor half-mile championships and placed second in the

Harry Williamson is the first Tar Heel ever to represent UNC at the Olympics, competing at the 1936 Berlin Games where he finished sixth in the 800. 1955 NCAA outdoor championships. Another standout of the 1950s was distance runner Jim Beatty, who became the first man to ever break the indoor fourminute mile barrier with a blistering mark of 3:58.9. He completely dominated his events in the ACC, winning the conference indoor mile and twomile races three consecutive years and the outdoor mile title twice.

Beatty initially retired from running after college but returned to the sport under the guidance of legendary Hungarian coach Mihaly Igloi. Beatty made the 1960 Olympic Team in the 5,000 meters, but a foot injury

hampered him during his race. In 1962, he set three world records, including in the indoor mile and outdoor two mile. That same year, Beatty had a mind-blowing 16-day stretch during which he set American records in the 1,500, mile, 3,000, three mile and 5,000, helping him to become the first American to simultaneously hold records in all events from the 1,500 to the 5,000. Beatty was awarded the James A. Sullivan Award that year as the nation's top amateur athlete. He remains the only Tar Heel athlete ever to receive this illustrious award.

Coach Joe Hilton

Joe Hilton, an integral member of the Carolina staff since 1946, took the job as head coach in 1963. Hilton replaced Dale Ranson, who had been head coach since 1952 – but whose coaching and competing career at UNC dated back to the 1920s. Hilton guided the Tar Heel program until he retired in 1981, a 19-year run that saw an astounding 77 individual ACC champions, two national champions and five All-Americas.

Reggie McAfee

Reggie McAfee, a three-time All-America in his era, is the Carolina record-holder for the 880-yard and 300-meter runs. McAfee won the ACC outdoor mile championship twice and also won the indoor mile and the 100-yard dash. The runner-up in the mile at the 1972 and 1973 NCAA indoor championships, McAfee finished third in the indoor mile at the 1973 national meet. In the 1973 World University Games, McAfee placed second in the 1500

In 2013 McAfee was honored with the inaugural McAfee Mile at Carolina's Joe Hilton Outdoor Invitational. Junior Isaac Presson won the event in 4:02.22 just missing the 40th-anniversary mark of McAfee's sub-four minute mile.

Tony Waldrop

Another mile specialist, Tony Waldrop, stunned the track world by running 11 consecutive sub-four minute miles in competitive races. During the streak, Waldrop set the world record mark at 3:55.0 at the San Diego Games and later ran a personal record of 3:53.2 at the Penn Relays.

The incredible Waldrop won the 1973 indoor 1,000-yard run and the 1974 NCAA indoor mile championship, six ACC titles and a gold medal in the 1,500 at the Pan American Games. He received All-America honors in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. Waldrop was named the

1974 ACC Athlete of the Year and was honored by the NCAA for his academic performance. He also garnered the Patterson Medal, symbolic of the University's most outstanding senior athlete.

The Distance King

Ralph King, another member of Carolina's outstanding distance runner lineage, won four indoor and four outdoor ACC championships. The three-time All-America won the indoor mile title three times, the 1,500 and 5,000 twice each and the indoor two mile once. He also won the 1977 ACC cross country championship and owned the Penn Relays 5K record of 13:32.5 until 2003.

The Dennis Craddock Era

Dennis Craddock left Virginia for Chapel Hill in 1985, and the Tar Heel women's program took off to never look

back. Over a 27-year career with Carolina, Craddock coached his teams to an impressive trophy case of honors, championships and international success: 45 ACC Championship titles, 51 NCAA Championship performances by 31 Tar Heels including 20 national individual titles, and 23 Olympic appearances accounting for four gold and three bronze medals. The 45 ACC titles are more than any other coach in any sport in the history of the conference. He was voted the National Coach

of the Year in 1995 for men's indoor track and field. Craddock was also elected the ACC Coach of the Year 31 times in his career, 26 of which were during his tenure with the Tar Heels.

Under Craddock, Carolina was the first school to win the ACC "Triple Crown" -- first-place finishes in cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field in the same academic year. The Tar Heel women have won the trifecta twice, in the 1994-95 and 2003-04

Carolina's 20 national individual titles coached under Craddock include: Allen Johnson (1992, 55-meter hurdles); Ken Harnden (1995, 400-meter hurdles); Milton Campbell, Harnden, Tony McCall and Henry McKoy (1995, 4x400); Monique Hennagan (1996, 400 meters and 800 meters); Eric Bishop (1996 and 1997, high jump); Shalane Flanagan (2002 and 2003, cross country; 2003, 3000 meters); Laura Gerraughty (2003, 2004 indoors and outdoors and 2006 shot put); Vikas Gowda (2006, discus); Justin Ryncavage (2006 and 2007, javelin); Brie Felnagle (2007, 1,500 meters); and Felnagle, Tyra Johnson, Kaltenbach and Kloss (2007, distance medley relay).

Craddock was award the Priceless Gem from the UNC Athletic Department on October 27, 2012 following his retirement at the conclusion of the 2011-12 season. The award is among the highest given by the department and recognizes those who have given a lifetime of service, passion and commitment to Tar Heel athletics.

The U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association inducted Craddock into the Coaches' Hall of Fame in December 2013 for his career accomplishments.

A Family Affair

From 1986-90 the Tar Heels won five consecutive ACC decathlon championships, and all five titles belong to one family: brothers Kevin and Dennis McGorty accounted for the five conference titles. Kevin won the ACC decathlon from 1986-88, tying the then-conference record for most decathlon titles won and Dennis won two championships in 1989-90.

Allen Johnson

In 1992, Allen Johnson won the NCAA championship in the 55-meter indoor hurdles in a meet-record and Hoosier Dome-best 7.07 seconds. At the time, it was just the fourth individual national title in UNC track history. Johnson finished second at the NCAA Championships as a senior in both the 55-meter indoor hurdles and the 110-meter outdoor hurdles. He also set an ACC record in the long jump at the indoor championships when he sailed 26-8 1/2 to break the oldest existing conference record.

Tony McCall

Sprinter Tony McCall earned a pair of All-America honors as a freshman, as he was sixth in the 100 and seventh in the 200 at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. That was only the beginning. During his career from 1994-97, McCall earned All-America honors a remarkable 11 times. He also took home national championships in the 1,600-meter relay in 1995 and the 400-meter relay in 1996. McCall is still the fastest man in Carolina history. His record time of 10.08 in the 100 meters has stood since 1997, and his record time of 20.44 in the 200 has stood since 1995. During McCall's freshman year, the Tar Heels brought home the ACC outdoor title for the second time in three years in one of the most exciting finishes in history. The title was not secured until Ken Harnden held off a Florida State competitor down the backstretch in the 1,600-meter relay. Harnden edged the Seminole by a step and Carolina held on to beat Florida State by a mere four points to win the team title.

Two Titles in 1995

The 1995 season was one of the most successful in Tar Heel men's track history. Carolina claimed the ACC title both indoors and outdoors, tied for 11th place at the NCAA Indoor Championships and finished seventh at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. Harnden won the NCAA title in the 400-meter hurdles, the first NCAA outdoor crown by a Tar Heel since Albans in 1950. He also teamed up with Milton Campbell, Henry McKoy and McCall to win the NCAA indoor title in the 1,600-meter relay.

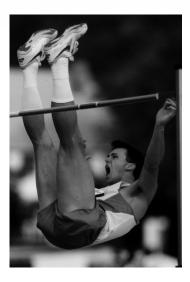


Coach Dennis Craddock was awarded the Priceless Gem by the UNC Athletic Department in October 2012. He is the most decorated coach in the ACC in any sport with a total 45 team titles for the league championships. Craddock was inducted into the USTFCCCA Coaches Hall of Fame in December 2013.



Milton Campbell

Milton Campbell was one of the leaders of the powerhouse teams of the mid-1990s, and is the most decorated man in Carolina track history in terms of All-America honors. Campbell finished his career a 13-time All-America, including six indoors and seven outdoors. Additionally, he was a member of two national champion relay teams and won nine ACC titles. Campbell went on to win the 400 at both the 2004 and 2006 National Indoor Championships.



Eric Bishop

After Tony Waldrop's two national titles in 1973 and 1974, it took 23 years before another Tar Heel man won multiple individual national championships. That man was high jumper Eric Bishop (left), who captured the outdoor high jump crown in 1996, then won the indoor event the following winter. Bishop's 10 points for the win in 1996 helped lead the men's team to a fourth place overall finish, still its best ever performance at the NCAA Championships.

Feats of Strength

Around the turn of the century, throwers dominated Carolina men's track and field. Allen Bradd was a two-time All-America in the shot

put, and won six ACC titles in the shot put and the hammer. Kestutis Celesius was a 2000 All-America in the javelin, finishing third at the NCAA Championships, the highest ever finish for a Tar Heel in that event. Sal Gigante was an All-America in the weight throw, and Ian Douglas won four ACC shot put titles.

A Title Worth the Wait

At the 2003 NCAA Indoor Championships, high jumper Adam Shunk jumped 7-2 1/2 to what he thought was a second place finish. Months later, however, just before the NCAA Outdoor Championships that year, the man who beat Shunk was ruled ineligible, and the title was justly awarded to the Tar Heel.

Mateo Sossah

Carolina's domination of the men's multis events returned in Frenchnational Mateo Sossah. He won the ACC decathlon title four times from 2008-11 and the ACC heptathlon once, accounting him five combined events titles -- the most by any male in the conference. Sossah finished in the top-10 at the NCAA Championships for the heptathlon twice and the decathlon four times. Sossah was a two-time runner-up in the NCAA Outdoor Championships to future Olympic gold-medalist and worldrecord holder Ashton Eaton of Oregon.

Sossah holds the UNC record for the decathlon 8,044 making him the first Tar Heel to ever break the 8,000-point mark. He broke the mark at the 2009 NCAA Championship.

Sossah was a winner of the ACC Post-Graduate Academic Scholarship, which he is using in his native country while continuing to compete in multis events. Sossah was a 2011 recipient of the Patterson Medal, Carolina's most prestigious award given to student-athletes for this athletic accomplishments, sportsmanship and leadership successes.

Kenny Selmon

Over the course of his four years at Carolina, Kenny Selmon embodied the true spirit of a Tar Heel student-athlete.

A five-time All-America, five-time ACC Champion, and 14-time All-ACC competitor, Selmon wrapped up his NCAA Outdoor Championship career with a personal-best run in the men's 400-meter hurdles. The fourth-fastest time of 2018 in the world, his mark of 48.12 gave the senior his highest NCAA Outdoor finish (second place) and set a new UNC record

in the event. Earlier in the year, Selmon had earned the title of 2018 USTFCCCA Southeast Regional Athlete of the Year. He also competed in the 2016 Olympic Trials and placed 13th in the 400-meter hurdles as just a sophomore. The business administration major received All-ACC Academic honors in both his final indoor and outdoor track seasons.

Soon after his last NCAA competition, Selmon finally captured that coveted title of national champion at the USA Track and Field Outdoor Championships, earning him a spot on Team USA. His remarkable finish to his decorated collegiate career was enough to convince the university



to award him the Patterson Medal, the most prestigious athletic honor at the University of North Carolina.

Selmon swapped his Carolina blue singlet for the red, white, and blue before heading off to London, England for the 2018 Athletics World Cup where Selmon became the world champion in the men's 400-meter hurdles after a photo finish.

The Carolina record holder in the men's 400-meter hurdles and fourth all-time in the men's indoor 400 meters, Selmon was also a member of four different relays (two outdoor 4x400 and two indoor 4x400) that rank among the top five in UNC's all-time records.

Tar Heel Women Enter the Fray

The Carolina women's program was formed in 1975 and has steadily improved to the point where it stands today: one of the elite track and field teams in the country on a yearly basis.

The first women's All-America arrived in 1981 as long jumper Lisa Staton placed seventh at the AIAW indoor nationals. Karen Stevenson set 14 school records and excelled in the classroom, as well. She was a two-time recipient of the Jim Tatum Award for her athletic and academic leadership. As well, Stevenson was a Morehead Scholar, Phi Beta Kappa graduate and became the first black woman to receive a Rhodes Scholarship.

All-America Times Three

Joan Nesbit was one of the greatest distance runners in Carolina history. At one point she held the school record in all four major distance events - the 1,500, 3,000, 5,000 and 10,000. She was the first Tar Heel woman to earn All-America honors in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. She also took ACC titles in the 3,000 and the 10,000 in 1984.

Kim Austin

From 1986-1990, Kim Austin had one of the greatest careers in Carolina and ACC history. She was a six-time All-America and an eight-time ACC champion in the triple jump and the 55- and 100-meter hurdles. During that time, Austin's teams won six ACC team titles and had a top-10 finish at the NCAA Indoor Championships in 1989. By the end of her career, she had established three ACC meet records and two school records.

Kendra Mackey

Kendra Mackey was one of the greatest sprinters in school history. An eight-time All-America, Mackey earned honors individually in the 200 and was a member of All-America 400- and 1,600-meter relay teams. Mackey



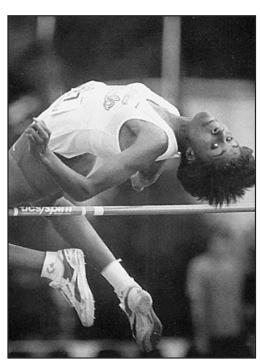
won 13 individual and relay ACC titles and still ranks in the Carolina top five in five different events, including the 100 meters, an event in which she still possesses the record.

Couch Takes Patterson Medal

Sharon Couch became the first Tar Heel women's track student-athlete to win the coveted Patterson Medal, awarded to the University's most outstanding senior athlete. Couch won eight ACC titles on her way to claiming MVP honors at three ACC Championships. She placed third in the long jump at the U.S. Olympic Trials in June 1992 to become Carolina's first female track Olympian, taking sixth place at the Barcelona Games. Couch would again reach the Olympics in 2000, this time as a 100-meter hurdler.

Waller Wows 'Em

High jumper Tisha Waller rewrote the record book during the 1991 season. Waller won both the indoor and outdoor ACC Championships, finished second at both of the NCAA meets and set ACC records both

indoors and outdoors. Waller leaped 6-4 two consecutive weeks indoors and cleared 6-3 1/2 at Texas in the spring.

The South Boston, Va., native also set the meet record at the prestigious Penn Relays and placed third at the TAC (now USA Track and Field) National Championships. Waller's school indoor and outdoor records still stand. as does her ACC outdoor record. She would end her career with five All-America honors and was the first Carolina woman ever to win an international medal at the 1991 World University Games.

Tar Heels Throw, Hurdle to Success in Early Nineties

Carolina swept the ACC Championships in 1993 and 1994 behind a pair of All-Americas. Thrower Lynda Lipson established an ACC record in the discus and was a three-time All-America in the discus and javelin. She also finished in the top eight overall at the USA Track and Field Championships in both events, a rare and impressive throwing double. Lipson's teammate Ayo Atterberry was a four-time All-America, scoring in the NCAA meet three times as a hurdler and once in the 400-meter relay.

Best Team in History?

During the 1994-95 school year, Carolina produced what was arguably the greatest women's track team in ACC history. That team was the first in league history to win the ACC Triple Crown - titles in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. Only the 2003-04 version of the Tar Heels has done it since. The legendary team was led by three future Olympians - LaTasha Colander, Monique Hennagan and Marion Jones. Carolina dominated both the indoor and outdoor ACC meets, winning the indoor meet by a whopping 104 points and the outdoor meet by a similarly staggering 81 points.

First (And Second) Women's Title

Since its launch in 1975, the Carolina women's track and field team compiled a number of great feats in its first two decades. However, for the first 21 years of the program's existence, it had failed to win an NCAA title. That stigma was shattered in a big way in 1996 when Monique Hennagan won not one but two national championships. During the indoor season, she took the 400 meters title and then followed that up with the 800 crown in the outdoor season. Hennagan collected seven All-America honors in her career and represented the United States in both the 2000 and 2004 Olympics, winning gold in the 1,600-meter relay in 2000.

Colander Stellar Indoors

LaTasha Colander, who joined Hennagan on the 2000 and 2004 Olympic teams, finished her career with more indoor All-America honors than any other student-athlete in Carolina history. She would collect eight in total, including three in the 55-meter hurdles. She was named the Most Outstanding Performer at the 1995, 1997 and 1998 ACC Indoor Championships, as well as the 1997 outdoor event. Colander was also a four-time outdoor All-America, including back-to-back honors in the 100-meter hurdles in 1995 and 1996.

Jones and Moore Jump To Glory

North Carolina established itself as a women's jump powerhouse in the nineties behind the incomparable efforts of Marion Jones and Tyra Moore. Jones was twice a long jump All-America and won a pair of ACC titles in the event. Moore was a seven-time All-America in the long jump and triple jump, and a five-time ACC champion.

Christopher and Gamble Carry the Torch

Where Jones and Moore left off, LaShonda Christopher and Nicole Gamble picked right back up. From 1996-1999, the duo owned the jumping events in the ACC. Christopher would finish with six ACC titles, Gamble with eight. Christopher earned 12 All-America honors to 13 for Gamble, two of the highest totals in school history. The crowning achievement for the Tar Heel jumpers came in 1999, when Nicole Gamble was the NCAA champion in the indoor triple jump.

ACC 50th Anniversary Celebration

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Atlantic Coast Conference, the league chose the all-time greatest performers in each sport, as well as a list of the 50 Greatest Athletes in ACC history. UNC dominated the lists, and the storied Tar Heel track and field program played a big part in that domination.

North Carolina sported a combined 63 selections from men's and women's indoor track, outdoor track and cross country teams. The Tar Heels also had three track stars named to the 50 Greatest Athletes on the all-sports list. Jim Beatty made the list on the men's side, while Monique Hennagan and Marion Jones were honored on the women's side.

Shalane Flanagan

Flanagan won four straight ACC cross country titles and led the team to four consecutive NCAA berths, helping establish Carolina as a veritable distance force. In 2002, she became the first UNC cross country national champion in 55 years and the first woman to ever accomplish the feat. Before her arrival, no Tar Heel had ever finished higher than 15th - Flanagan finished in the top four three times. In 2003, she became only the third woman in history to defend her NCAA cross country crown, concluding her cross country career as a four-time All-America.

Her success, however, was not limited only to the outdoor trails. She earned 10 All-America honors in just three years of indoor and outdoor track. In 2003, she became a dual national indoor champion, winning the 3,000 meters then teaming up to triumph in the distance medley relay. Flanagan was an All-America at every distance from the 1,500 to the 5,000.

After redshirting the indoor and outdoor seasons in 2004, she decided to turn professional just weeks before the U.S. Olympic Trials. In her first race as a professional, Flanagan took third in the 5,000 meters, earning a spot on the Olympic team and a trip to the 2004 Athens Games. She has continued to be an international cross country, indoor and outdoor distance mainstay on the international circuit competing in multiple IAAF World Championships. Flanagan also competed at the 2008, 2012 and 2016 Olympics, winning a silver in Beijing in 2008 in the 10,000. She owns American records in the indoor 3,000, indoor 5,000 and 15K road race, and she has also placed top-10 in the Olympic marathon twice with a sixth-place finish coming in Rio de Janeiro.



Shalane Flanagan set four individual UNC records and helped set four relay records, she was a two-time NCAA cross country champion, a 10-time All-American and a two-time indoor track national champion.

Flanagan finished her Carolina career as the most decorated distance athlete in school history and one of the most decorated in the ACC and NCAA. She was named the NCAA Cross Country Athlete of the Year three times, helped set an American record in the distance medley relay and established four individual school records. She capped her stellar career by winning the Patterson Medal, the highest honor bestowed on a student-athlete at UNC.

In early November of 2017, Flanagan captured the awe of all Americans when she became the first American woman in 40 years to win the New York City Marathon in 2:26:53. The victory puts Flanagan up with some of the top professional athletes to ever come out of Carolina, joining the ranks of athletes like Michael Jordan and Mia Hamm who have left Chapel Hill and gone on to be among the very best in their discipline.

Alice Schmidt

Alice Schmidt's career as a standout on both the track and the cross country course culminated in a second-straight Patterson Medal for a female student-athlete from the track and field program. One of the greatest middle distance runners in ACC history, Schmidt became the first Tar Heel woman since Nicole Gamble to win an outdoor national championship, taking the 800 meter crown in 2002. Then, in 2003, she did something no Carolina woman had ever done in Tar Heel track and field history - she became a national champion for a second time in the same event, winning the 800 in a school- and ACC-record time of 2:01.16.

That 800 title actually marked Schmidt's third NCAA title, as she earlier teamed up with Flanagan, Anissa Gainey and Erin Donohue to take the distance medley relay title. Schmidt finished her career as an 11-time All-America.

She won six ACC titles, including the indoor 800 three times and the outdoor 800 twice. She was a multiple Penn Relays champion, a member of the American-record-setting distance medley relay team that finished second at the 2002 NCAA Championships, and twice earned All-ACC honors for her cross country performances.

Schmidt also thrived in the classroom. She was awarded CoSIDA Academic All-America honors for the 2003-04 school year and was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll four times.

Schmidt has continued her athletic success post-graduation, competing in multiple international competitions including the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Games.

Laura Gerraughty

Gerraughty came to UNC from Nashua, N.H., with quite a lofty reputation from her high school days. Suffice it to say she more than lived up to that billing, graduating from Carolina as one of the top Tar Heel performers of all time – regardless of sport – and indeed leaving a legacy on the ACC unlike anyone before her.

The numbers are undeniably staggering. She won four NCAA titles – in 2003 (outdoor shot put), 2004 (indoor and outdoor shot put) and 2006 (outdoor shot put). She earned 10 All-America honors and won a remarkable 13 Atlantic Coast Conference individual event championships. A member of the 2004 United States Olympic Team, Gerraughty set UNC records in five events and was the all-time collegiate record-holder in the indoor shot put until 2013.

Additionally, Gerraughty was named MVP of the 2006 ACC Championships after winning three throws events (discus, shot and hammer). She also was named 2006 Southeast Region Track and Field Athlete of the Year and won the shot at the prestigious Penn Relays for the fourth time, a feat only five women have ever accomplished at that meet.

The field of competition was not the only place Gerraughty excelled, though; the biology major was a first-team Academic All-America three times and received the ACC's Jim and Pat Thacker postgraduate scholarship. She also became the third straight woman from the track and field program to win UNC's illustrious Patterson Medal, following Shalane Flanagan and Alice Schmidt, respectively.

"In 40 years of coaching, I've never had a person, student and athlete combination like Laura," said UNC track and field coach Dennis Craddock. "She was an Olympian as a college student, won NCAA titles and set a national record, was a tremendous student and leader, and an even better person and friend. She did everything we ever asked of her and more."

Olympic Tradition Unlike Any Other

The Carolina Olympic tradition has existed for more than 70 years. Harry Williamson was the first Tar Heel Olympian, competing in the 800 meters at the 1936 Berlin Games. Though overshadowed by Olympic

teammate Jesse Owens that year, Williamson finished sixth and gave birth to what would fast become a rich and storied history.

Four years later, Floyd "Chunk" Simmons became the first Carolina track medalist, taking bronze in the decathlon. In Helsinki in 1952, Simmons again won bronze, as American decathletes swept the competition for the "World's Greatest Athlete".

Despite the abundance of great athletes who called Chapel Hill home over the next four decades, it would be 44 years before a Tar Heel brought an Olympic medal back to UNC. In 1996, Allen Johnson triumphed in the 110-meter hurdles, setting off what would become the "golden" age for Carolina athletes in the Olympics.

Carolina's International Connections

Much of the Olympic success connected to former Carolina track athletes has occurred under the flag of the United States. In fact, all six medalists have won while competing for the American team. However, UNC has produced a number of Olympians that have proudly represented other nations.

The 1996 Atlanta Games featured two international stars - Eddie Neufville of Liberia and Ken Harnden of Zimbabwe. Neufville competed in the 400-meter relay, while Harnden ran the 400-meter hurdles, an event in which he won the NCAA title while at Carolina. Dominic Demeritte of the Bahamas and Nadine Faustin joined Neufville and Harnden at the 2000 Sydney Games. They ran in the 200 and 100-meter hurdles, respectively. One of the biggest moments in Demeritte's career came when he was crowned the 2004 Indoor World Champion in the 200 in Budapest. Faustin, the national record holder in five different events for the Republic of Haiti, was crowned the Central America and Caribbean Games gold medal winner in the 100-meter hurdles in 2005. Both Demeritte and Faustin competed in the 2004 Olympic Games where Faustin advanced to the semi-finals in the 100-meter hurdles and Demeritte advanced to the quarter-finals in the 200. Faustin also competed in the 2008 Beijing Games.

Another Tar Heel, Vikas Gowda, competed in the Olympics while still in school. Gowda, then a junior at Carolina, competed in the discus for his home nation of India in 2004 Athens Games. Gowda has gone on to compete in the 2008 Beijing Games, the 2012 London Games and the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Games. In April 2012, he tossed a world-leading mark of 217-5 in the discus at the Old Style Discus Challenge in Norman, Okla.



Carolina has a multitude of Olympians, but the 2004 UNC team had three athletes compete in the Athens Games -- Shalane Flanagan, Vikas Gowda and Laura Gerraughty.

A New Home

As UNC eagerly awaits the completion of their new outdoor track & field complex, forty-one individuals, including seven Tar Heels, and four relays will forever have their names etched in the history of Carolina track & field.

The estimated \$15.7 million project will provide student-athletes with brand new running surfacse and throwing fields to develop their performance. The new outdoor track & field complex will feature a 400-meter, eight-lane track by Benyon and a one-kilometer warm-up track, 500 seats for meet viewing, LED sport lighting and an LED video scoreboard.

Neighboring the track and field facility will be two synthethic practice fields for the Carolina soccer and lacrosse teams.

The new outdoor track & field complex is set to be completed mid-2019

ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM for STUDENT-ATHLETES

The Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes (ASPSA) reports directly to the Office of the Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost and is uniquely positioned to collaborate with faculty, the Department of Athletics and the campus community to support student-athletes as they excel in the classroom and compete in athletics. The ASPSA helps student-athletes explore their academic interests and abilities as well as provides numerous academic services including tutoring, secondary academic and career advising, assistance with University and NCAA eligibility, and coordination of academic honors and awards. In addition to the Director/Assistant Provost, the ASPSA staff includes 12 academic counselors. three learning specialists, and an office manager.

ASPSA staff work together to guide and support student-athletes throughout their career at Carolina, beginning with an introduction to academics at UNC during the recruiting process through graduation and beyond. All incoming student-athletes, as well as those in need of more intensive academic support, participate in the My Academic Plan (MAP) program. Academic counselors and learning specialists work with each student-athlete to customize his or her MAP based on academic preparedness, course schedule, and individual need.



The Academic Support Program is housed in the Loudermilk Center for Excellence, a 150,000-square-foot facility that serves all of Carolina's nearly 800 student-athletes across 28 varsity sports. The Loudermilk Center's largest feature is the John W. Pope Student-Athlete Academic Support Center. This facility provides classrooms for teaching and tutoring, study lounges, office space and a computer lab.

The floor also includes offices for the Student-Athlete Development program, which guides students in personal development, leadership development and career development.
