

SCHEDULE QUICK FACTS NON-CONFERENCE

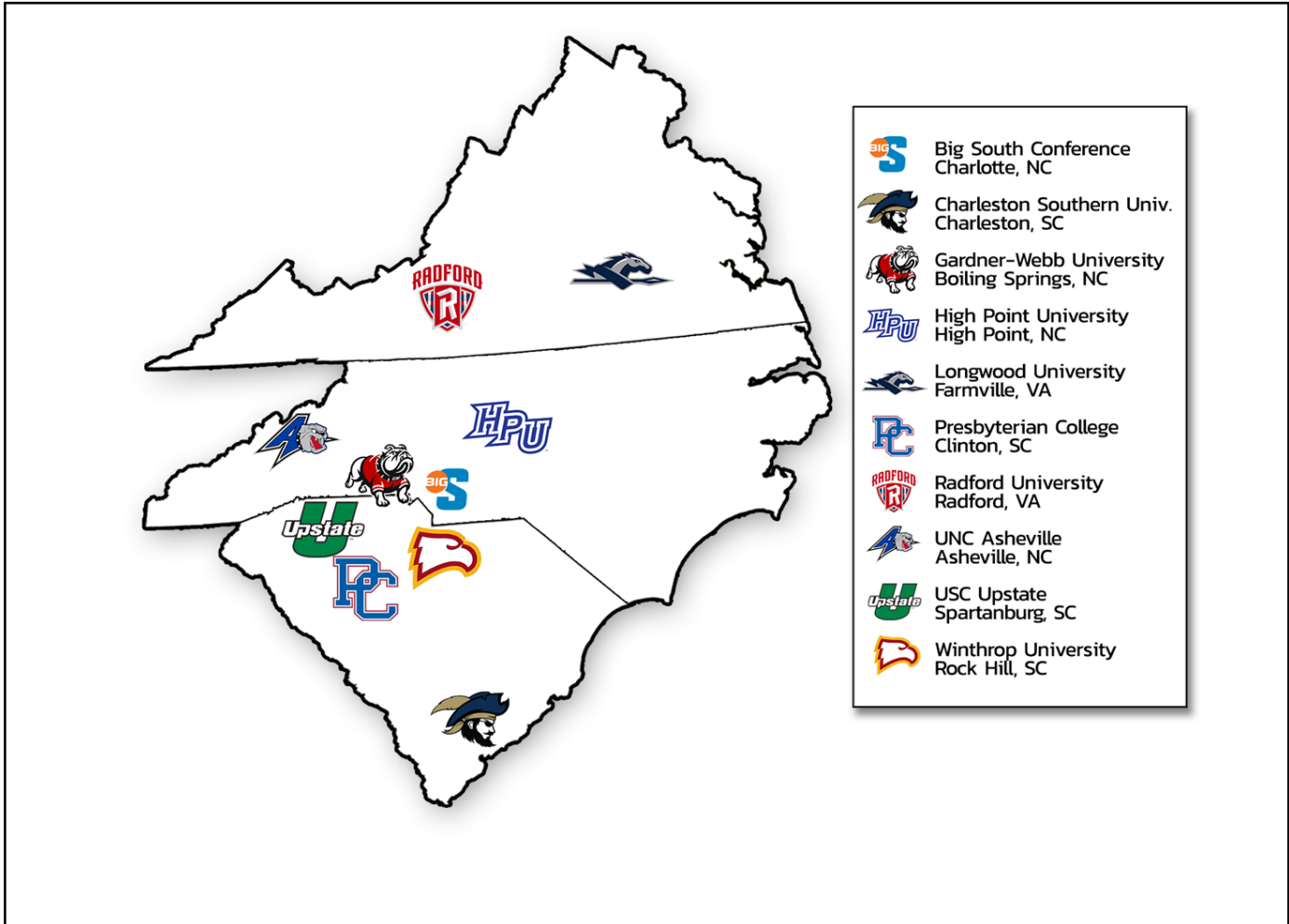
- Asheville is facing one of its most challenging non-conference schedules in recent years, with two opponents earning bids to the NCAA Tournament and two competing in the National Invitational Tournament last season. The Bulldogs have six home contests during the 2023 portion of their schedule.
- Asheville's season opener in Ann Arbor will be the Bulldogs' second time facing Michigan in program history. The Wolverines competed in the NIT last season and fell to Vanderbilt in the second round of the tournament.
- Asheville will welcome UNC Wilmington to Kimmel Arena for its home opener. This will be the two programs' eighth matchup, with the Seahawks holding a 6-1 advantage over the Bulldogs.
- Asheville will spend their Thanksgiving competing in the Northern Classic in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, playing three games in three days. The Bulldogs will open the Classic against Lipscomb on Nov. 24, followed by Wofford on Nov. 25, and Western Kentucky on Nov. 26.
- The Bulldogs will face Kennesaw State twice in December, first traveling to Kennesaw on Dec. 5 before hosting the Owls in Kimmel Arena on Dec. 23. Last season, Kennesaw claimed the ASUN Regular Season and Tournament Championships and went to the NCAA Tournament, facing Xavier and falling 72-67. In the final Mid Major Top 25 Collegeinsider.com poll, the Owls were listed at No. 14, while Asheville was listed at No. 21. The two teams will meet for the first time in program history on Dec. 5.
- Asheville will be competing in two neutral site games in December, first against Auburn in the Rocket City Classic presented by Akima at the Von Braun Center in Huntsville, Ala., and the second against Appalachian State at Catawba Valley Community College's Tarlton Complex in Hickory, N.C.

BIG SOUTH CONFERENCE

- The men's team will play in the opposite location as the women's team on the same date, except for Jan. 27, when both teams will be playing at Charleston Southern, and on Feb. 17, when they both play at home.
- Asheville's first Big South game will be right after the New Year break, as the Bulldogs host USC Upstate on Jan. 3, kicking off the basketball portion of the Ingles I-26 Rivalry.
- Asheville will host High Point, who is hosting the 2023-24 Big South Basketball Championships, on Feb. 7.
- The Bulldogs face Charleston Southern on Feb. 17, which will be Homecoming.
- Asheville went undefeated last season at Kimmel Arena, going 13-0 and 9-0 in conference action.



BIG SOUTH CONFERENCE



Founded in 1983, the Big South Conference has been an exemplary leader in college athletics, dedicated to developing student-athletes through the pursuit of excellence in the classroom, community and field of play. The league's growing presence as an NCAA Division I athletic conference is made evident by its multitude of athletic accomplishments, innovative marketing and media partnerships, increased television packages and most importantly, its commitment to fostering the academic, personal, social, athletic and leadership development of its student-athletes. Comprised of 10 member institutions sharing a common geographic region and similar academic values and purposes, the Big South's remarkable history of achievement is characterized by the league's 19 championship sports and the profound academic and life successes of its more than 3,800 student-athletes. This has evolved into the conference's "Where Winners Are Made" mantra as part of a strategic emphasis on becoming the premiere non-FBS conference in the Southeast through its six Core Values of Academic Centrality; Athletic Excellence; Equity, Diversity & Inclusion; Integrity; Sportsmanship & Fair Play; and Student-Athlete Welfare. The Big South Conference has experienced numerous athletic and academic accomplishments in its 39-year history, including the following since 2000:

- Reached the NCAA "Sweet 16" in men's soccer, women's basketball, baseball and women's lacrosse
 - Four NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament wins

 - Three Top 24 finishes in the NCAA Women's Golf Championship since 2011
 - The No. 1 seed in the NCAA Baseball Regionals four times, including the national No. 4 seed in 2010

JANET R. CONE

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Janet R. Cone has served as UNC Asheville's Director of Athletics since 2004 and is presently serving as the President of the I-AAA Athletics Directors Association (ADA), is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics

(NACDA) Executive Committee, and is on the Board of Directors for the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. Since her arrival in Asheville, Cone has transformed Bulldogs Athletics into one of the premier NCAA Division I programs among mid-major universities. Bulldog teams have won over 30 Big South Conference Championships, and several student-athletes have earned recognition as All-Americans during Cone's tenure.

The Bulldogs have also succeeded academically as the graduation rate and grade point average for student-athletes are higher than the overall student body, a point of pride for our athletics program and distinctive among NCAA Division I schools. Community service is also a way of life for the Bulldogs, as Asheville annually engages in over 2,500 hours of service activities both as individuals and teams. Under Cone's leadership, UNC Asheville Athletics has proven it can deliver "Champions in Athletics and Leaders in Life."

Under Cone's leadership the Bulldogs achieved this unbelievable progress with the creation and implementation of the "More Wins, More Friends, and More Resources" and the "Believe. Achieve. Thrive." strategic plans. Recently, UNC Asheville Athletics partnered with Huron in the fall of 2022 to develop strategies and prioritize investments that will sustain and advance Bulldog Athletics. Out of this partnership came the latest strategic plan for the Bulldogs entitled "Dream Bigger. Achieve More"

"'Dream Bigger. Achieve More.' Is designed as a roadmap for the next five years, outlining key areas of focus and growth in developing our most valuable resource - our student-athlete," said Cone. "Bulldog Athletics and its student-athletes, coaches, and staff represent the very best of UNC Asheville and it is our belief that this strategic plan is the framework from which is successful NCAA Division I Athletics Program can thrive for years to come." As part of her focus on the overall success of Bulldog Student-Athletes, she recently spearheaded the creation of the "Be A Top Dog" program which is a holistic approach to student-athlete success. In 2021, Cone spearheaded the "Celebration on the Court" initiative, to tip off basketball season with proceeds going to Bulldog student-athletes of all sports.

In addition to her continual focus on student-athlete welfare and academic excellence, Cone has worked tirelessly to improve gender and racial equity and inclusion within Bulldog Athletics. Upon her arrival in Asheville, she spearheaded the "Our Turn to Play" luncheon to raise scholarship dollars for Bulldog women's sports and awareness of Title IX. Just a few years ago she announced the addition of women's golf as the 16th NCAA Division I athletics program at UNC Asheville. The revival of the women's swimming program in 2012-13 marked the first time that the athletics department had added a sport in 20 years.

Facilities improvement has also been a hallmark of Cone's leadership. Most notably, the construction of the Wilma M.

Sherrill Center and Kimmel Arena was completed during her tenure. In addition, an updated Athletic Facility Master Plan was completed in 2020, and a Capital Campaign is underway to construct an Outdoor Sports Complex that includes baseball, soccer, and track. The \$4.5M renovation and expansion of the Karl Strauss Track Facility is currently in progress.

Cone's professional commitments locally and nationally are impressive as well. She recently completed her five-year commitment to serving on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee that selects teams for March Madness and is presently serving on the NCAA I Men's College Basketball Summer Initiative Working Group.

Cone is a member of the Big South Conference Finance, Hall of Fame, Membership, Nominations, and Strategic Planning Committees. She is also a member of NACDA's Honors and Awards Committee and Learfield Directors' Cup Committee. Outside of her work at UNC Asheville, Cone helped establish the Asheville Buncombe Regional Sports Commission, was a former chair, and is serving as a founding member.

Cone was recently recognized for her outstanding community contributions at the annual WomanUP Awards ceremony hosted by the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, where she received the Suzanne DeFerie Lifetime Achievement Award, sponsored by First Bank. This award recognizes women who have distinguished themselves in business, leadership, and service throughout their careers. The Suzanne DeFerie Lifetime Achievement Award adds to a distinguished list of previous awards and recognitions. This past fall Samford University announced Cone as the winner of the 2023 John C. Pittman Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2019, Cone was honored with the I-AAA Athletics Directors Association (ADA) Builders' Award. In 2013, she was honored as one of just 28 Directors of Athletics to be named an Under Armour AD of the Year by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Prior to coming to Asheville, Cone served as the Associate Athletics Director for Samford. She also coached women's basketball at Samford, Saint Leo, Western Carolina and Mars Hill. Cone holds a bachelor's degree from Furman University and a master's degree from the University of South Carolina.

UNC Asheville recently extended Cone's contract through May of 2025.

MIKE MORRELL HEAD COACH, SIXTH SEASON

Milligan, 2005

Mike Morrell enters his sixth season at the helm of the UNC Asheville men's basketball program in 2023-24.

Morrell (pronunciation: more-ELL) is the seventh head coach in the history of UNC Asheville men's basketball. Considered one of the top assistants in all of college basketball, Morrell joined UNC Asheville from the University of Texas after a national search and was selected to lead the program on Wednesday, April 11, 2018. He is a native of Elizabethton, Tenn.

Morrell, the 2022-23 Big South Coach of the Year, guided the Bulldogs to one of the best seasons in program history in 2022-23. Asheville not only posted a school record 27 wins on the season but also captured both the Big South Regular Season and Tournament Championships. It marks Asheville's fourth outright regular season championship and eighth overall. The tournament title for the Bulldogs is their sixth in program history and with it earned the Big South's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, their first appearance since 2016.

The Bulldogs' 27 victories are tied for the fourth-most in Division I men's basketball and the most by any Division I school in the State of North Carolina. Furthermore, Morrell's 2022-23 Bulldogs matched the school record with 16 Big South regular season victories and set a new single-season program record with 25 wins against Division I opponents. Additionally, Morrell led Asheville to an 18-2 record during the 2023 calendar year. For his work, Morrell was named a finalist for the Hugh Durham Coach of the Year award, which goes to the top coach in mid-major college basketball.

During the 2021-22 campaign, Morrell led the Bulldogs to their first postseason appearance in four seasons as they were invited to compete in the College Basketball Invitational. At the Invitational, the Bulldogs tallied their first postseason win at the event, toppling Stephen F. Austin, 80-68. Asheville also got out to a fast 10-5 start to the season, which was the program's best start since 2015-16.

The Bulldogs also went 9-6 (.600 winning percentage) against non-Big South foes marking its best non-conference performance in terms of winning percentage since 2007-08.

Some individual standouts for Asheville in 2021-22 included Drew Pember being named the Big South's Defensive Player of the Year after ranking 10th in the country with 93 blocks. Pember's 93 blocks were the second-most ever by a Bulldog in a single season and helped him gain NABC All-District Second Team honors as well. LJ Thorpe earned All-Big South Honorable Mention honors for the third straight season, while Coty Jude garnered All-Academic team honors.

Morrell guided the Bulldogs to a strong 10-10, 9-5 Big South record in the unprecedented season that was 2020-21. Despite not being able to compete for 30 days down the stretch of the season due to COVID-19, Asheville's 9-5 mark in the Big South was its sixth-best win percentage (.643) in the last 15 seasons. The Bulldogs were able to earn a first-round bye in the 2021 Big South Tournament, hosting a quarterfinal matchup for the first time since 2018. Asheville's nine conference wins also made them one of just four schools within the Big South to post a combined winning record against conference foes over the course of the 2019-20 and 2020-21 seasons.

Morrell coached Tajion Jones (Second Team) and LJ Thorpe (Honorable Mention) to Big South honors, while Jones also garnered NABC All-District 3 Second Team recognition. Additionally, Coty Jude was named to the Big South All-Academic Team. While the condensed season had its share of memorable moments and wins, no victory shined brighter than the Bulldogs' 57-55 win at Winthrop on January 29, when Asheville knocked off the previously unbeaten Eagles and snapped the nation's longest win streak (21 games) in the process.

Morrell oversaw one of the biggest turnarounds in Division I men's basketball during the 2019-20 season. The Bulldogs improved by 11 victories from his first season at the helm, tied for the third-largest improvement that season, and were one of just four teams in the nation to increase its win total by double digits.

The Bulldogs returned 83.6 percent of their minutes played from the season before, but still ranked inside the Top 15 all season among youngest teams according to Ken Pomeroy, as the starting lineup consisted of all sophomores. Asheville was one of just two teams in the country to use the same starting lineup the entire season, and all five starters averaged double-digits in scoring.

With consistency and experience, the Bulldogs improved their record from 4-27 to 15-16, including an 8-10 mark in Big South Conference play. The Bulldogs entered the season predicted to finish ninth in the league standings, but ended the year in a tie for fifth: the largest jump in predicted finish in the conference.

Morrell coached two All-Big South performers, as sophomore DeVon Baker was named to the second-team while redshirt sophomore LJ Thorpe earned honorable mention recognition. Redshirt junior Jax Levitch was named to the All-Academic Team.

After a first season with eight freshman learning the ropes of collegiate basketball, Morrell truly began to establish his desired style of play in Year Two. The Bulldogs played aggressive pressure defense, and led the Big South and ranked in the Top 25 nationally in turnover margin (plus-5.2), turnovers forced per game (16.9), total steals (250) and steals per game (8.3).

The Bulldogs finished fourth nationally in turnover margin, and led the nation in the statistic for a period during the season. Under Morrell's direction, redshirt sophomore Lavar Batts, Jr. led the Big South in steals, and three other players - Baker, Thorpe and Trent Stephney - all ranked inside the Top 15 in the conference in steals. No other team had more than two players in the Top 15.

The Bulldogs also were much improved on the offensive end, as four players - Baker, Thorpe, Tajion Jones and Batts - all ranked inside the Top 16 in the Big South in scoring. No other team in the league had more than two in the Top 16.

In addition to those four, Coty Jude also averaged 10 points per game, and he moved into the Top 10 all-time at Asheville in career 3-pointers, as he is tied for ninth with 140.

Following the 2019-20 season, ESPN named Morrell as one of its Top 40 coaches under 40 years old, citing the Bulldogs' 11-game turnaround.

Morrell coached the youngest team in NCAA Division I in his first season in charge of the UNC Asheville men's basketball program. The Bulldogs finished the season with 76 percent of their minutes being played by freshmen. Over 90 percent of UNC Asheville's overall minutes on the year were played by underclassmen.

Despite their youth, Morrell's Bulldogs were able to sweep the season series from USC Upstate and Asheville was the only team in the country during the regular season to have four freshmen score 20 or more points in a single game. UNC Asheville's DeVon Baker was chosen to the Big South All-Freshman Team, while lone senior Donovan Gilmore was tabbed to the All-Academic Team.

Named the top recruiter in the country under the age of 35 in 2015 by ESPN prior to his arrival at UNC Asheville, Morrell helped coach a team to the NCAA Tournament in nine of his 11 years at the NCAA Division I level as an assistant coach.

As the primary recruiting coordinator at Texas, Morrell helped sign two top-5 and one top-20 class.

Morrell spent most of his coaching career working with current Marquette head coach Shaka Smart.

In addition to working with him at Texas from 2015-2018, Morrell spent 2011-2015 on Smart's staff at VCU.

During Morrell's four seasons at VCU (2011-15), the Rams posted an overall record of 108-35 (.755) and made four NCAA Tournament appearances. VCU was ranked in the final Associated Press poll in the 2012-13 (No. 25), 2013-14 (No. 24) and 2014-15 (No. 25) seasons.

At Texas, the Longhorns advanced to the NCAA Tournament in both the 2015-16 seasons and the 2017-18 seasons.

In its first full recruiting cycle in Austin, the Texas coaching staff that Morrell was on pulled in a four-man freshman group that ranked as the No. 5 recruiting class in the nation by Scout. All four freshman signees were ranked among the top-100 players nationally by Scout (Jarrett Allen, No. 15; James Banks, No. 49; Andrew Jones, No. 19; Jacob Young, No. 87).

The 2016-17 season at Texas for Morrell was highlighted by the development of freshman Jarrett Allen, who was selected as the No. 22 pick by the Brooklyn Nets in the 2017 NBA Draft. Allen earned All-Big 12 Conference third-team and Big 12 All-Newcomer Team accolades. He also claimed a spot on the 10-person USBWA All-District VII Team and the five-person NABC All-District 8 second-team.

During its second recruiting cycle, the Texas staff signed a five-man freshman class that ranked as the No. 5 recruiting class in the country by Rivals. All five freshmen signees were ranked among the top-80 players nationally by one of the three major recruiting services (Mohamed Bamba, No. 2 Rivals; Matt Coleman, No. 29 ESPN; Jase Febres, No. 47 Scout; Jericho Sims, No. 51 Scout; Royce Hamm Jr., No. 80 ESPN).

Morrell has extensive ties to the Carolinas.

In fact, before joining Smart's staff at VCU, he spent the 2010-11 season on Barclay Radebaugh's staff at Charleston Southern.

Prior to his time at Charleston Southern, Morrell was on staff at Clemson under head coach Oliver Purnell. He served as a graduate assistant in 2007-08 before moving into the Director of Basketball Operations position at Clemson in the 2008-09 and 2009-10 seasons. The Tigers advanced to the NCAA Tournament in all three of his seasons on staff.

Morrell began his coaching career on staff at King College in Bristol, Tenn. in 2005-06 and 2006-07. The Tornado won the 2007 Appalachian Athletic Conference Tournament and advanced to the NAIA National Tournament first round. They posted an overall record of 23-11. He also served as the head coach of the golf team at King.

Born Aug. 22, 1982, Morrell was a two-sport standout at Milligan College where he was an 1,000-point scorer for the men's basketball program. A three-year starter, Morrell helped the Buffaloes earn a spot in the NAIA National Tournament as a freshman in 2000-01. A two-time all-league selection in golf, Morrell, who earned his bachelor's degree in history in 2005, led Milligan golf to the conference championship in 2003.

NEIL DIXON ASSISTANT COACH, FIFTH SEASON West Virginia, 2006

Neil Dixon is in his fifth season as an assistant coach on head coach Mike Morrell's staff. Dixon was hired by the Bulldogs on July 3, 2019.

In his fourth season in Asheville, Dixon helped the Bulldogs to one of their best seasons in school history. Asheville not only posted a school record 27 wins on the season but also captured both the Big South Regular Season and Tournament Championships. It marks Asheville's fourth outright regular season championship and eighth overall. The tournament title for the Bulldogs is their sixth in program history and with it earned the Big South's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, their first appearance since 2016.

The Bulldogs' 27 victories were tied for the fourth-most in Division I men's basketball and were tied for the most by any Division I school in the State of North Carolina. Furthermore, the 2022-23 Bulldogs matched the school record with 16 Big South regular season victories and set a new single-season program record with 25 wins against Division I opponents. Additionally, Asheville went 18-2 record during the 2023 calendar year.

Dixon coached Drew Pember and Tajion Jones to All-Big South First Team honors. Pember became the first player in Big South history to be named the Preseason Player of the Year, Player of the Year, Defensive Player of the Year, and Tournament MVP in the same season. Pember also scored a school record 48 points in a game vs. Presbyterian in late January. The 48 points were the most by any Division I player this season. He was also named to the Lou Henson All-America Team. Jones, meanwhile, became UNC Asheville's all-time leading scorer and all-time leader in 3-pointers made. Off the court, Fletcher Abee was named to the College Sports Communicators Academic All-District Team and to the Division I-AAA ADA Scholar-Athlete Team.

Four Bulldogs - Baker, Thorpe, Tajion Jones and Lavar Batts, Jr. - ranked inside the Top 16 in the conference in scoring. The Bulldogs were the only team with more than two in the Top 16.

Dixon joined the UNC Asheville men's basketball program after spending the previous six seasons, including the last four as head coach, at Louisburg College of the National Junior College Athletic Association.

A native of Lewisburg, W. Va., Dixon compiled an incredibly impressive record of 101-34 (.749) in his four seasons at the helm of the NJCAA program in Louisburg, N.C. Dixon coached three All-Americans during his time in charge of Louisburg.

In his first season in charge at Louisburg in 2015-16, Dixon guided the Hurricanes to the NJCAA national tournament for the first time since the 2012-13 season. The Hurricanes won the NJCAA Region X regular season and conference tournament titles.

Dixon helped the 2016-17 Hurricanes to a 30-5 overall record. Louisburg finished the season as national runner-ups, falling in the NJCAA national title game. Dixon was tabbed as the Region X Coach of the Year.

Louisburg once again won the region regular season and tournament championships in finishing with 28 victories in the 2017-18 season.

Prior to coming to Louisburg as an assistant for the 2013-14 season, Dixon made one-year assistant coaching stops at Fairmont State and West Virginia Tech. He was also an assistant basketball coach for three seasons at Greenbrier East High School in Lewisburg, W. Va.

As an assistant coach at Louisburg, Dixon worked for former Bulldog student-athlete and Head of Basketball Operations (2000-02) Mark Vander-slice, who is currently the head coach at NCAA Division II USC Aiken.

Dixon graduated from West Virginia University in 2006 with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education and again in 2008 with a Master of Science in Athletic Coaching.

In 2012, Dixon married Gabrielle, and the couple has two sons, Rhett and Wells.

WOODY TAYLOR ASSISTANT COACH, FIFTH SEASON Eckerd College, 2013

Woody Taylor will begin his fifth season as an assistant coach on Head Coach Mike Morrell's staff in 2023-24. Taylor was hired to the staff on Thursday, August 15, 2019.

Asheville not only posted a school record 27 wins on the season but also captured both the Big South Regular Season and Tournament Championships. It marks Asheville's fourth outright regular season championship and eighth overall. The tournament title for the Bulldogs is their sixth in program history and with it earned the Big South's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, their first appearance since 2016.

The Bulldogs established their identity as a pressure defense squad, leading the Big South and ranking Top 25 nationally in turnover margin (plus-5.2), turnovers forced per game (16.9), total steals (250) and steals per game (8.3).

In addition to the defensive successes, the Bulldogs also vastly improved their offense, averaging 15.1 points per game more than the previous year. All five starters averaged in double digits scoring and four players - Baker, Thorpe, Tajion Jones and Lavar Batts, Jr. - all ranked inside the Top 16 in the Big South in scoring. No other team had more than two players in the Top 16.

Taylor joined the Bulldogs staff after two seasons as an assistant coach at Bethune-Cookman, where he helped usher in unprecedented success for the Wildcats' program. During the 2017-18 season - his first with the Wildcats - the team went 12-4 in MEAC play and earned a share of the regular-season conference title for just the second time in program history.

During their regular season championship, the Wildcats broke numerous school records, including scoring (2622 points and 81.9 per-game), free throws (575), attempts (820), rebounds (1346), rebounding average (42.1 and second nationally behind UNC) and assists (501).

Two of Taylor's pupils earned postseason recognition as Brandon Tabb was named MEAC Player of the Year, while Soufiyane Diakite took home the conference's Defensive Player of the Year Award. Additionally, Shawntrez Davis and Isaiah Bailey earned All-MEAC honors, along with Tabb and Diakite.

In his second season, Taylor coached another MEAC Defensive Player of the Year, as Cletrell Pope took home the hardware after setting a MEAC single-season record with 22 double-doubles during the 2018-19 season, leading the nation with 4.32 rebounds per game. Pope led the MEAC and ranked 13th nationally with 7.84 defensive rebounds per game and hauled in 12.2 boards per game to rank third in the country.

In addition to Pope who earned First-Team All-MEAC honors, Taylor also coached Second-Team selection Malik Maitland and Davis, who earned Third-Team recognition.

Prior to his time at Bethune-Cookman, Taylor served as associate head coach at Salem (WV) International University during the 2016-17 season.

Taylor spent the three prior seasons at Marshall, where he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 2013. His core responsibilities included breaking down film, creating scouting reports, on-campus recruiting and player development.

Taylor earned a promotion during the 2015-16 season to interim assistant coach under head coach Dan D'Antoni. The Thundering Herd offense soared to new heights, averaging 86 points per game, which was tied for second nationally. The Herd obliterated school records in points scored (2,838) and 3-point field goals made (322) that year.

Before he took to the coaching ranks, Taylor had a standout career as a point guard for Eckerd College in St. Petersburg, Florida, from 2009-13. He helped lead his team to three-consecutive 20-victory seasons, and appearances in the NCAA Division II Tournament as a junior and senior. Upon graduation, he ranked fifth in Eckerd history in games played, sixth in assists and seventh in free throw percentage and steals.

Although the IVY League did not compete in 2020-21 due to COVID-19, Levine gained valuable experience as a part of Jim Engles' staff.

Prior to his time at Columbia, Levine was a part of the Virginia Commonwealth University staff, beginning as a graduate assistant in 2015 and working his way up to video coordinator in 2017-18. Levine played a crucial role in video, scouting and recruiting for the Rams, helping VCU go 94-43 with three NCAA Tournament appearances during that time.

During the summer of 2018, Levine gained valuable experience, serving as the head coach of Ram Nation, a team comprised mainly of VCU alumni, in The Basketball Tournament. The native of Highland Mills, New York, guided the squad to the quarterfinals of the event.

As an undergraduate student, Levine worked for the Cornell men's basketball program from 2013-15 while studying at nearby Ithaca College. Levine graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 2015, earning his master's degree from the VCU Center for Sport Leadership in 2017.
