GREENSBORO, N.C. – Daniel Mangarov appreciates the moment awaiting him and his UNC Greensboro (UNCG) men's soccer team on Tuesday when it hosts Clemson in a biggie.

As Mangarov prepares to step onto the pitch for one of the biggest games of his life, he can't help but reflect on where the journey started. Mangarov and his entire family were born in Bulgaria, a Balkan nation with diverse terrain encompassing the Black Sea coastline, a mountainous interior, and rivers.

Family is everything for Mangarov. He credits his parents, Todor and Minka along with his older brother, Plamen for fueling his love of soccer.

"My dad was a big influence because he is the main reason I am where I am today," Mangarov said. "He was working two jobs most of his life. He took time out of his days to go to the fields with me and help me train. My family wanted to move to the U.S. so that my brother and I had better opportunities to succeed.

"I've been playing soccer for about 15 years. I started playing when I was 4-years old. I began my journey when my family and I first moved to the United States from Bulgaria. My dad thought that he could relay his passion for soccer to me. I started training when I got to the United States."

uncgIt has paid off as Mangarov has blossomed into one of the most exciting players on the Spartan roster. He doesn't have the gaudy statistics. However, his fingerprints are on many of UNCG's offensive flurries. He has a solid combination of speed, power, and unique instincts that make the sophomore forward a fearsome force.


The computer science major who grew up in Atlanta played a key role last season in helping UNCG win the SoCon Tournament and qualify for the NCAA Tournament. Mangarov made 12 starts and finished with a pair of assists. His impact went deeper.

"I feel like I have an important role on and off the field for the UNCG men's soccer team," Mangarov said. "I've had a great time since the moment I got here, and everyone has been very supportive and helpful. It's always fun being around players and a coaching staff that does whatever it takes to be the best every day. We all support one another and push each other to be successful. It's fun when you have others that are willing to do whatever it takes to win and then celebrating every important moment with the team and staff."

He's been electric this season. He converted a penalty kick goal against Saint Joseph's on Sept. 5. Mangarov is one of 10 UNCG players who have scored at least one goal this season. While he was happy with his contributions as a freshman, Mangarov hasn't rested on his previous accomplishments. With his eyes on achieving his dream of playing professionally, Mangarov is committed to getting better each day.

"There are many areas that I feel like I've improved in from last year into this year and it took a lot of work," Mangarov said. "When I first came to UNCG, I knew that there were going to be players that were better than me. I made sure to work hard in training and show the coaches that I came here to fight for my spot on the team.

Going into this year, I knew we would have a better team with better players. During the summer, I trained with Atlanta United and had some training with the USL and first team, which helped me improve my game. I feel like I started this year strong, and the team has been doing very well. I'm happy."



In a lifetime filled with memorable experiences that include playing with the Arsenal Academy in London, playing with Hector Bellerin, training with the Atlanta United, and spending two years around the U.S. Men's National Team, Mangarov is pumped for the latest opportunity against second-ranked Clemson.

"Hosting one of the best college teams is something I am looking forward to," said Mangarov, whose hobbies include working out and listening to music. "It will be a crazy experience for all of us. Playing Clemson at home will be very exciting. The team has all been waiting for this moment. We always look forward to playing teams like Clemson because we believe we have what it takes to compete and win games against tough opponents.

"This is a big part of why I came to UNCG. I truly believe that we will be one of their toughest opponents this year. There shouldn't be any nerves leading into a game like this. We should all be confident and go out there as a team and compete to win."

No matter what happens, Mangarov is comforted by the fact that he knows his family will be with him.
