ABOUT CORNELL

The Big Red are set to begin their 2024-25 season this weekend, having defeated the University of Toronto, 6-2, last Saturday in an exhibition contest in their only previous action.

Cornell is coming off a strong season a year ago, finishing with a 22-7-6 overall record and 12-6-4 mark in ECAC play. The Big Red reached the NCAA Tournament but were defeated by Denver in the Springfield Regional Final, 2-1.

The Big Red jump right into ECAC play following this weekend's series vs. NoDak, battling Yale and Brown next week at home.

Despite losing its top scorer last season, Cornell brings back nearly its entire roster in 2024-25, with 26 of 28 players returning. Junior forward **Dalton Bancroft** was one of three players named to the ECAC Preseason All-League Team after finishing with 12 goals and 19 assists last season. Fellow conference honoree **ian Shane** is back between the pipes after leading the nation in GAA.

CORNELL COACHING STAFF

Mike Schafer is in his 30th and final season as the head coach of the Cornell hockey program, entering the season with a whopping 542 career wins.

Schafer's staff includes associate head coach **Casey Jones** as well as assistant coaches **Sean Flanagan** and **Corey Leivermann**.

SERIES HISTORY

Friday marks the 11th all-time meeting between North Dakota and Cornell, with the series currently even at five wins apiece.

The teams have made a habit of seeing each other in the national tournament, having played in the 1967 and 1968 national semifinals and again the opening round of the 1997 tournament.

This weekend will be only the second trip to Ithaca in program history for UND, last doing so in Jan. 2010.

POLL POSITION

UND is sitting at No. 7 in the USA Hockey/The Rink Live Poll and jumped to No. 6 in the USCHO.com Poll, both of which were released on Monday.

Cornell is currently ranked No. 9 in the USCHO.com Poll and No. 8 in the USA Hockey/The Rink Live Poll.

LAST TIME OUT

No. 3 Boston University struck for a pair of power play goals and added a shorthanded goal to defeat No. 7 North Dakota, 4-3, on Saturday night from Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, N.D.

UND (3-2-0) settles for its second straight weekend split, both coming against ranked opponents, and suffers its first regulation loss at home since Oct. 20, 2023 vs. No. 1 Minnesota.

After winning the special teams battle last night, North Dakota couldn't replicate it in the series finale, as Boston University (4-1-0) struck twice on the power play and took the lead for good in the third period on a shorthanded goal to notch three of its four goals during special teams play.

NoDak received goals from **Caleb MacDonald** (1), **Cameron Berg** (3) and **Jake Livanavage** (1) while **Owen McLaughlin** dished out a pair of assists for the multi-point outing. Goaltender **T.J. Semptimphelter** finished with 24 saves on 28 shots in his first defeat as a Fighting Hawk.

SUCH A WIEBE!

Sophomore defenseman **Abram Wiebe** has shined on both the offensive and defensive side of the ice for UND this season.

The Vegas pick tallied his second multi-point game of the season already in the win over No. 3 BU, scoring a goal and adding an assist in the win before notching another assist in Saturday's finale.

Wiebe currently sits tied for second on the team with five points while also blocking eight shots and pacing the team with 23:36 of ice time per game.

DEPTH KILLS

UND's much-vaunted depth is on display through the opening month of the season, with multiple players finding the scoresheet.

Entering this weekend, 19 of the 22 skaters who have played in a game this season and recorded at least a point.

NoDak has also gotten scoring up-and-down its lineup, with all four forward lines combining for at least three goals but none having more than five.

NOT GETTING ANY EASIER

There will not be any easing into the 2024-25 season for UND, as the Fighting Hawks are expected to play a bevy of ranked opponents.

For the first time in program history, UND played all ranked teams in the opening month of the season (No. 13 Providence, No. 20 Minnesota State and No. 3 Boston University).

NoDak is closing out a stretch of four straight weekends against ranked opponents for the first time since the 2018-19 season. The Hawks went 5-2-0 in that stretch against No. 7 Minnesota State, No. 5 Minnesota, No. 16 Wisconsin and No. 19 Miami.

As of this week, 31 of UND's 35 scheduled games during the regular season will be against teams either ranked or receiving votes in the polls.

UND is 3-2-0 this season against ranked teams.

TOP-10 BACK-TO-BACK

It's back-to-back weekends against top-10 opponents for UND for the first time since February 2023.

UND finished 1-2-1 in that stretch against No. 4 Denver and No. 6 St. Cloud State.

It is the first back-to-back series against top-10 opponents out of conference since Oct. 2022 against No. 8 Quinnipiac and No. 1 Minnesota.

JAKE OF ALL TRADES

Senior forward **Jake Schmaltz** has been dominant on all ends of the ice so far this year, carving out a role as the 4C.

The assistant captain scored a goal and added an assist in the win over No. 3 Boston University on Friday for his first points of the season while also going a whopping 13-5 in the faceoff dot.

The senior followed it up with another stellar showing in the dot on Saturday, going 14-4 to finish the weekend at 27-9.

Schmaltz is currently 56-24 (70.0%) in the dot this season, placing him second nationally among skaters with over 40 wins.

ONE MORE SHIFT SUCCESS

Friday vs. No. 3 BU was headlined by the return of former UND great **Dixon Ward** for "One More Shift" prior to puck drop, with NoDak continuing the trend of playing strong in those games.

Since the "One More Shift" promotion started in 2018-19, UND is now 7-1-0 in those games and has scored in the opening 3:31 in five of those games.

The Hawks will have another "One More Shift" game on Feb. 8 vs. Colorado College.

GOAL RUSH

UND has gotten into a habit of scoring goals in bunches so far this season.

The Hawks have scored multiple goals in under three minutes four times this season, including twice in the 7-2 win over No. 3 Boston University.

NoDak has also struck for two goals in under a minute twice this season (0:18 at Minnesota State, 0:34 vs. Bosotn University).

POWER UP!

It hasn't taken long for the power play to pick up where it left off last season, with UND sitting at 46.2% (6-for-13) through the first five games of the season to pace the nation.

The man advantage was critical in the series against No. 3 Boston University, with UND going 3-for-6 on the weekend.

UND has been on a tear in the 2024 calendar year, sitting at 28-for-86 (32.6%) with the man advantage.

FIRST ONE IN AWHILE

Saturday's 4-3 loss to No. 3 Boston University was a feeling that many haven't felt at Ralph Engelstad Arena in awhile -- a regulation loss.

It's the first regulation loss at home for UND in over a calendar year -- last coming on Oct. 20, 2023 vs. No. 1 Minnesota.

Since the beginning of 2023-24, UND is 20-2-0 in games decided in regulation at home.

BEANTOWN BEATDOWN

UND exploded offensively in the win over No. 3 Boston University, striking for seven goals in

the win.

It marks the largest margin of victory over BU since an 8-3 win on Jan. 25, 1986 and the most goals against the Terriers since also scoring eight on Mar. 16, 1990.

FIVE ASIDE

After getting shutout in last Saturday's loss at No. 20 Minnesota State, NoDak quickly put that in the rearview mirror in Friday's win over No. 3 BU.

The Hawks struck for five goals in the opening 13 minutes for the first five-goal period since last year's NCHC Quarterfinal Game 2 win over Miami.

It's also the most goals in a period against a ranked opponent since potting five in the opening stanza in a 9-1 win over No. 18 Omaha on Jan. 6, 2017.

BIG MARGINS

Friday's 7-2 win over No. 3 Boston University was rare company for UND, handing the green and white its largest margin of victory over a top-3 team in a long time.

It's the first win of five-or-more over a team ranked in the top-3 since a 6-1 Sioux win over No. 3 Minnesota on Jan. 10, 2009 in Grand Forks.

CAPTAIN LEADS THE WAY

Fifth year captain **Louis Jamernik V** has brought the offense through the opening four games of the season.

The Calgary, Alberta, native currently sits second on the team with five points and with two goals.

In the win over No. 3 BU, Jamernik V notched a goal and two assists for his first career game with three points.

UND is 19-1-1 when Jamernik V scores a goal in his career.

KUNZ, THERE IT IS!

Senior forward **Jackson Kunz** provided the offensive spark in Friday's win over No. 3 Boston University, potting two goals for the first time in his career.

The Grand Forks, N.D., native netted his first goals of the season in the victory, including his fourth-career power play tally, to give him five goals in his last eight games dating back to March 2024.

MAC ATTACK

Freshman forward **Mac Swanson** got his scoring account going in Friday's 7-2 win over

No. 3 Boston University.

The rookie dished out his first assist on the game's opening goal before notching his first-career goal just minutes later on the power play to make it 2-0.

FORT T.J.

Graduate student goaltender **T.J. Semptimphelter** has seemingly adjusted well to playing at UND so far this year.

The Arizona State transfer is 3-1-0 on the season with a 2.53 GAA and .906 save

percentage.

Semptimphelter had his best performance in the win over No. 3 Boston University, stopping a season-high 27 shots in the 7-2 victory.

RARE APPEARANCE

It's not very often that Boston University makes the trek to Grand Forks, with last weekend marking only the second trip since Ralph Engelstad Arena opened in 2001-02.

The Terriers last visited Grand Forks in Nov. 2012 in their only visit to REA. The previous time before that was Dec. 1996.

UND is now 7-2-1 all-time at home against BU.

HOCKEY EAST SUCCESS

Playing against the Hockey East has not been too worrisome for UND over the years, as the program holds a winning record against everyone but UMass (0-1-0) from the league.

After last weekend's series with BU, NoDak has the most wins against the Terriers (14) than any other team from the league.

UND is 80-51-13 all-time against the Hockey East.

GETTING GOING EARLY

UND was really good at getting off to strong starts last season, and has had some mixed results so far this year -- going 2-for-5 in that regard.

NoDak is 2-0-0 this season when scoring first and 1-2-0 when not.

CHECK, PLEASE!

When North Dakota holds a lead after two periods, you can practically guarantee a win for the green and white over the last few seasons.

UND is 106-7-3 since 2018-19 when leading after two.

The Hawks are off to a perfect start in 2024-25, sitting at 2-0-0.

FOUR SCORE

The 4-goal mark has proven to be the magic number over the years for North Dakota.

UND has been nearly unbeatable when scoring at least four goals, sitting at 94-6-3 since 2018-19 and a 2-0-0 mark this season.

HELD OFF THE BOARD

UND was held off the scoreboard in Saturday's loss at No. 20 Minnesota State, something that only happened once last season.

It's only the second time the Hawks have been shutout in the last 49 games and the first road blanking since a 0-0 tie at Colorado College on Feb. 25, 2023.

BERG-ER TIME

Senior forward **Cameron Berg** was one of six players named to the Preseason All-NCHC Team in September, earning the spot for the first time in his career following personal bests in goals, assists and points in 2023-24.

The West Fargo, N.D., native wasted no time getting his point production rolling this season, striking for a goal and an assist in the 5-2 win over No. 13 Providence to earn U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game MVP honors.

Berg has kept it rolling after the opening weekend, striking for a goal and an assist against No. 3 BU to give him the team lead in points (6) and goals (3).

CALL IT A COMEBACK

UND had to rally from behind in Friday's win over No. 20 Minnesota State, overcoming a 2-0 deficit in the third period.

It's the first two-goal, third period comeback for the Hawks since a 5-4 OT win Feb. 2, 2024 at Miami and the first against a ranked team since that wild, 7-5 triumph at No. 3 Denver on

Nickname History

The University of North Dakota boasts a proud history of varsity athletics nicknames. UND's first official athletics nickname was the "Flickertails," although its origin remains somewhat a mystery. The nickname made its first public appearance in a Grand Forks Herald account of UND's football loss to Minnesota on Oct. 8, 1904, 15 years after UND's first athletics contest was played. According to Lee Bohnet's A Century of UND Sports, "The author was not identified, but there is strong evidence the nickname was coined by a Minneapolis sportswriter who may have covered the game for the Herald. The writer lauded the fighting spirit of the North Dakota players."

In 1911, UND's student body officially adopted "Flickertails" as its athletics nickname. UND would remain known as the "Flickertails" (as well, unofficially, as the "Nodaks") for a third of a century, establishing an early athletics history.

In the fall of 1930, the university adopted the nickname "Sioux" for its varsity teams following a successful renaming campaign by the Dakota Student, UND's student newspaper. The word "Fighting" was later added, and UND would be known as the "Fighting Sioux" until the summer of 2012.

The university utilized several "Fighting Sioux" logos throughout the decades, perhaps most notably the green geometric logo introduced in 1976 and the most recent full-color logo was unveiled in 1999. The former was designed by an artist at the UND News Bureau, while the latter was created by noted Native American artist and UND alum Bennett Brien.

The University of North Dakota officially retired its longtime "Fighting Sioux" nickname and logo prior to the 2012-13 athletics season.

UND's varsity athletics teams operated without an official nickname, while the university continued the process of adopting the third official nickname in school history. During that time, the university's varsity athletics teams were referred to as "the University of North Dakota," "North Dakota," or "UND."

Former President Dr. Robert Kelley announced in mid-November 2015 that "Fighting Hawks" would be the University's new moniker. UND would win its eighth NCAA national title in that season with the Fighting Hawk logo making its first appearance in the following campaign.

RANKED, SPANKED!

UND got the opportunity to get its first ranked win out of the way, taking down No. 13 Providence to open the season.

It marks the first time opening the regular season against a ranked opponent since the 2008-09 Ice Breaker Tournament at No. 9 Boston University -- a 5-1 loss for UND.

You only have to go back another year to find the last time UND opened the season with a ranked team and won, with the Sioux rolling to a 6-0 victory over No. 3 Michigan State in the 2007 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game at the REA.

BOISVERT BEAUTY

Freshman forward **Sacha Boisvert** has gotten off to a blazing start in his collegiate career, potting multiple points in his first two games.

After scoring a goal and an assist in the win over No. 13 Providence, Boisvert dished out a pair of helpers just 18 seconds apart in the victory at No. 20 Minnesota State to give him four points in two games.

He becomes the second freshman in the last decade to have multiple points in each of his first two games, joining **Jake Schmaltz** in 2021-22.

WIL-KING

Senior forward **Carter Wilkie** notched his first goal in a UND uniform in Friday's win over No. 20 Minnesota State, scoring the game winner near the midway point of the third period.

Wilkie got his first point at Ralph Engelstad Arena with an assist on UND's second goal in the 7-2 win over No. 3 Boston University before adding another helper in Saturday's contest.

The RIT transfer now has 44 career goals and 114 points in his career.

GET BLOCKED!

UND picked up right where it left off last season when it comes to blocking shots, reaching double digits in three of the first five games of the season.

Unsurprisingly, UND is a perfect 3-0-0 when blocking at least 10 shots, with **Caleb MacDonald** leading all skaters with 10.

UND got a taste of its own medicine in Saturday's 3-0 loss to the Mavericks, with MSU blocking 34 shots compared to just seven for NoDak.

STANDING IN THE HALL OF FAME

The win over No. 13 Providence marked the 11th time that UND played in the annual U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game, improving to 8-3-0 since the game began counting as a regular season contest.

NoDak's win also snapped a two-game losing streak in the event, dropping the 2021 contest to Penn State and the 2022 version to Arizona State.

North Dakota continues to be dominant in the event at Ralph Engelstad Arena, improving to 6-1-0. The lone loss came on Oct. 5, 2001 against Minnesota -- the first game at REA.

HOME OPENER SUCCESS

Kicking off the season at home has also been kind to North Dakota since opening Ralph Engelstad Arena in 2001, with that trend continuing in the 5-2 win over No. 13 Providence.

Following the win, UND is now 21-2-1 in home openers at the REA, with the losses coming to Minnesota (2001) and Bemidji State (2014).

UND has also now gone an entire calendar year without dropping a game in regulation at home -- last coming on Oct. 20, 2023 against No. 1 Minnesota.

DJ, TURN IT UP!

Junior forward **Dylan James** broke through in a big way in the season opener vs. No. 13 Providence, potting a pair of goals for only the third time in his career.

James now has six multi-point games in his career.

LOTS OF FIRST TIMERS HERE!

Plenty of Fighting Hawks made their first appearances in the green and white on Saturday night vs. No. 13 Providence, with four notching their first point as a collegiate player.

Forward **Sacha Boisvert** sniped home his first-career goal and added an assist for a two-point night in his debut while forward **Cody Croal** notched his first point with an assist on Perron's tally.

Defensemen **EJ Emery** and **Andrew Strathmann** both also got on the scoresheet for the first time, each recording an assist in the win.

EXHIBITION WOES

UND did something it has not done in a long time against Augustana, dropping a preseason exhibition game for the first time since 1996-97.

That season did turn out pretty well for the program, however, as UND captured its sixth national title.

NoDak also lost a preseason exhibition in the 1979-80 season before winning a national title.

PENROSE CHAMPS!

North Dakota won its 21st conference crown last season, earning the sixth Penrose Cup in program history.

UND has won four of the last five NCHC regular season crowns, with the six overall titles serving as the most in the league's 11-year history entering 2024-25.

Head Coach **Brad Berry** won his fifth conference championship in nine years as the bench boss for NoDak, tying **Dean Blais** for the most league titles in program history.

BACK IN THE BIG DANCE

After a one year hiatus, North Dakota returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2023-24 for the 35th time in program history, which ranks fifth all-time.

The Fighting Hawks fell, 4-3, to Michigan in the regional semifinal round to extend the program's losing streak to three in the national tournament since 2020-21.

FLY ME TO ST. LOU

NoDak will set its sight on St. Louis, Mo. for its ultimate goal this season as the site of the 2025 NCAA Frozen Four.

UND is looking to reach the Frozen Four for the first time since capturing its eighth national crown in Tampa, Fla. during the 2015-16 season.

Overall, North Dakota has reached 22 NCAA Frozen Fours, tied for the fourth most in the nation.

NO BLAKER, NO GABER

UND will have to fill the shoes of two of its top scorers from last season, as **Jackson Blake** and **Riese Gaber** each signed professional contracts following the 2023-24 season.

Blake put together one of the best individual seasons in recent memory for UND, finishing with 22 goals and 38 assists for 60 points to earn NCHC Player of the Year, Forward of the Year, Hobey Baker Hat Trick Finalist and AHCA All-America First Team honors.

Gaber exits as one of the most consistent scorers over his four years, finishing with at least 10 goals each season and potting 18 a year ago.

GOALS APLENTY RETURN

Despite losing two scorers, UND brings a lot of offense back in 2024-25.

The Hawks return 84 total goals from last season, which ranks eighth nationally.

NoDak also brings back over 56 percent of its point total from a year ago (221).

HARD SKILL

North Dakota made it a point during the offseason to get bigger and stronger entering 2024-25, with one of the tallest and heaviest lineups in the nation.

UND ranks tied for eighth in the nation among tallest teams with an average height of 6-feet, 0.8-inches while ranking fourth nationally with an average weight of 193.5 pounds.

Only seven of UND's 26 players are under the

6-foot mark, with seven others towering over the 6-foot, 3-inches mark.

LIVIN' ON THE EDGE!

Sophomore defenseman **Jake Livanavage** joined Berg on the Preseason All-NCHC Team after a stellar rookie campaign with the green and white.

The Phoenix, Ariz., native led all UND defensemen and sat fifth overall on the team with 29 points in 40 games to earn All-NCHC Rookie and All-NCHC Honorable Mention honors.

He was also good in league games, tallying 18 points to rank second among rookie d-men and fifth among all conference blueliners.

Livanavage's 29 points tied him for fourth all-time and tops this century for points by a UND rookie defenseman.

200 STRONG!

Head Coach **Brad Berry** notched his 200th win last season against Miami.

He joined **Gino Gasparini** (392), **Dave Hakstol** (289) and **Dean Blais** (262) as the fourth UND coach to reach the 200-win mark at the school and the 98th in NCAA history.

Berry is currently third among active head coaches and 18th all-time with a .648 winning percentage.

REGULATION KINGS

Last season, UND was one of the nation's best in regulation games.

In games decided in 60 minutes, NoDak finished 23-7-0 including a 14-4-0 record in NCHC contests.

UND went 21 straight games without a regulation loss last season, matching the program record set in 2006-07.

STAYING OUT OF THE BOX

North Dakota wasn't forced to kill too many penalties last year, however, as the green and white were one of the best at staying out of the box.

UND was second nationally last season with 7.58 penalty minutes per game, sitting just behind Northeastern for the top spot in the country.

O-MAC ATTACK

Junior forward **Owen McLaughlin** racked up the points last season, finishing second on the team with 39.

McLaughlin had five games last season with at least three points while also potting a career-high 13 goals after just two as a rookie.

HOBIE TENDER

Sophomore goaltender **Hobie Hedquist** was called upon in emergency action a few times in 2023-24 and did not disappoint.

The Heron Lake, Minn., native was the first UND freshman goaltender to start 5-0-0 in his career since **Jordan Parise** won his first eight starts in 2003-04.

He was also the first freshman to start a playoff game at UND since **Zane McIntyre** did so in the 2012-13 season, starting both games of the NCHC Quarterfinals and the NCHC Frozen Faceoff Semifinal vs. Omaha.

Hedquist finished last season with a 5-1-0 record, with a 2.51 GAA and .905 save

percentage in six starts.

RETURNING D-MEN

After becoming the first team in Division I men's college hockey history to return zero defenseman in 2023-24, UND is set to bring back four blueliners this season.

Sophomores **Jake Livanavage**, **Abram Wiebe** and **Tanner Komzak** as well as junior **Bennett Zmolek** all return while four newcomers are set to take the ice in the green and white for the first time.

It marks the first time since 2017-18 with no seniors or graduate students on defense for UND.

FROM SUN TO SNOW

Graduate student goaltender **T.J. Semptimphelter** is set to join UND between the pipes this season after spending the last two years with NCHC newcomer Arizona State.

The Marlton, N.J., native left ASU as one of the best goaltenders in the school's history, finishing second in program history in appearances (61), starts (60), minutes played (3453:44), wins (30), saves (1,603) and goals against average (2.72) while his eight shutouts are tied for first and his .911 save percentage is third.

Last season, Semptimphelter posted a 16-5-4 mark, 2.52 goals against average, a .908 save percentage and three shutouts between the pipes to help the Sun Devils set a new program record with 24 wins on the campaign. He matched the program's all-time shutout record in a win over Colorado College, stopping 38 shots in a 2-0 victory at Ed Robson Arena.

CARTER'S WORLD

Senior forward **Carter Wilkie** will play his final year of collegiate hockey at North Dakota following three successful years at RIT.

Wilkie put up 111 points on 43 goals and 68 assists with the Tigers to exit as the program's eighth all-time scorer. He was the fourth-fastest Tiger to hit 100 points, doing so in just 107 games. He also became only the third RIT player to score 40 points in back-to-back seasons to earn two straight All-AHA First Team honors.

Wilkie helped the Tigers reach the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2016 last season, pacing the team with 41 points while also finishing second nationally with 566 faceoff victories.

BIG MAC

Sophomore defenseman **Caleb MacDonald**

is the final transfer to join UND this season, coming to Grand Forks after one season with Alaska.

MacDonald skated in 31 games and paced all rookies with 14 points on four goals and 10 helpers last season with the Nanooks.

He was particularly good against NCHC foes, potting five points (2G, 3A) in five games against North Dakota, Denver and St. Cloud State, including his first multi-goal game at the Ralph against UND.

On the defensive end, MacDonald finished tied for third on the team with 28 blocked shots, including a career-high five against North Dakota, while also sitting second on the squad with a plus-13 rating.

FIRST ROUND FINDS

It was quite the celebration for North Dakota at the 2024 NHL Draft in Las Vegas earlier this year, with two incoming rookies hearing their names called in the first round.

Forward **Sacha Boisvert** was selected 18th overall by Chicago and defenseman **EJ Emery** followed at 30th overall by the New York Rangers to become the first pair of UND players taken in the first round since **Derek Forbort** and **Brock Nelson** in 2010.

UND has only had multiple first round selections in the same draft class four times in its history.

SACHA BOY!

Incoming freshman forward **Sacha Boisvert** headlines a talented group of freshman coming to North Dakota this season.

He is coming off a stellar campaign with the Muskegon Lumberjacks in the USHL, scoring 36 goals and tallying 68 points in 61 games. The 36 goals were the most by a UND-bound player from the USHL since **Jason Gregoire** had 37 in 2007-08.

Boisvert is the first native of Québec to play hockey at North Dakota.

EMERY SHUTS IT DOWN

Fellow incoming rookie **EJ Emery** has carved out a role of being a shutdown defender during his junior days.

The Compton, Calif., native starred for the U.S. National Under-18 Team last season, potting 16 assists in 61 games while often being matched up against the opponent's top line.

Emery finished with a plus-54 rating over all of his competition in 2023-24 and represented the United States at the 2024 IIHF U-18 World Championships in Finland, winning silver.

LITTLE MAC

Rookie forward **Mac Swanson** put together a dominant 2023-24 campaign for the USHL's Fargo Force, garnering multiple accolades.

Swanson finished with 77 points in 55 games to rank third among all skaters in the USHL while his 51 assists led everyone in the league to help Fargo win both the regular season and postseason crowns.

His 77 points are tied for the most points by an incoming UND recruit in the USHL in the last 20 years and earned USHL Player of the Year, Forward of the Year, All-USHL First Team and USHL Clark Cup Playoff MVP honors.

He was also named the Dave Tyler Junior Player of the Year by USA Hockey.

YOUNG GUNS

UND is set to bring in eight freshman in 2024-25, with five playing up front and three manning the backend.

Joining Boisvert and Swanson up front are **Cody Croal**, **Cade Littler** and **Dalton Andrew** while **Jayden Jubenvill** and **Andrew Strathmann** are on defense with Emery.

BAKER'S DOZEN

UND's roster features 13 NHL draft picks, which sits tied for second in the nation and tops in the NCHC with Denver.

UND's 13 draft picks include: forwards **Cameron Berg** (NYI), **Sacha Boisvert** (CHI), **Dylan James** (DET), **Jackson Kunz** (VAN), **Cade Littler** (CGY), **Owen McLaughlin** (PHI), **Jayden Perron** (CAR), **Jake Schmaltz** (BOS), **Ben Strinden** (NSH) and **Mac Swanson** (PIT) as well as defensemen **EJ Emery** (NYR), **Andrew Strathmann** (CBJ) and **Abram Wiebe** (VGK).

UND has had at least one player taken in each NHL Entry Draft since 1999.

MIDWESTERN HOSTS

North Dakota will be the host school for the 2026 NCAA Frozen Four in Las Vegas, Nev., (T-Mobile Arena) and the 2025 NCAA Regional at SCHEELS Arena (Fargo, N.D.), announced by the NCAA. This adds to UND's long resume of hosting NCAA events.

North Dakota has previously hosted NCAA Regionals in 2015, 2017, 2019, 2021 and 2023 at SCHEELS Arena, 2006 at Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks and 2018 at Denny Sanford PREMIER Center in Sioux Falls, S.D., in the past 18 years.

LOCAL FLAVOR ON REPEAT

The state of North Dakota is well represented on the roster this season, with five players suiting up from the Peace Garden State.

Goaltender **Kaleb Johnson** and forwards **Dane Montgomery** and **Jackson Kunz** all hail from Grand Forks, forward **Ben Strinden** is from Fargo and forward **Cameron Berg** is from West Fargo.

UND has had at least five players from North Dakota on its roster for the last four seasons.

CAPTAIN LOUIS

Fifth year forward **Louis Jamernik V** was voted team captain for the 2024-25 season.

Jamernik V, who served as an assistant captain in 2023-24, has been a model of consistency in the lineup over his entire career with North Dakota, appearing in 135 of the possible 137 games during his time – including a current streak of 89 consecutive contests.

He has recorded double digit point totals in each of his last two seasons while also sitting second on the team in faceoff victories and near the top among forwards in blocked shots.

Over his four seasons, the Calgary, Alberta, native has 21 goals and 33 assists for 54 points. He is a three-time AHCA Academic All-America Scholar, NCHC Distinguished Scholar-Athlete and NCHC All-Academic Team member as a commercial aviation major.

LEADERSHIP GROUP NAMED

Four others will join Jamernik V as part of the leadership group, with **Jake Schmaltz**, **Cameron Berg**, **Jackson Kunz** and **Bennett Zmolek** all donning the "A" as assistant captains.

Schmaltz will wear a letter for the second straight year while Berg, Kunz and Zmolek earned the honor for the first time in their collegiate careers.

Kunz and Berg are also believed to be the first pair of North Dakotans to serve as captains together for the first time since 1987-88 (Steve Johnson, Scott Dub).

ATTENDANCE LEADERS...AGAIN

UND can once again boast the title of best fans in college hockey, as the program paced the country in multiple attendance categories.

For the 10th straight year, UND and Ralph Engelstad Arena led the nation in average attendance with a total of 11,612 per game while also sitting atop the total attendance number for the 13th straight year with 278,677 total fans.

UND was one of only six programs to average at over 100 percent capacity, finishing with 20 sellout crowds in 24 home contests. The 278,677 total attendance number is the fifth highest in NCAA history and the highest in Ralph Engelstad Arena history since the building opened in 2001-02.

UND finished 19-4-1 at home last season and has not lost a game in regulation during the 2024 calendar year.

NCHC NEWBIES

For the first time in the league's history, the National Collegiate Hockey Conference has expanded prior to the 2024-25 season, as Arizona State officially became the ninth full-time member of the league.

With the new change, the league announced an updated scheduling model that will take place during the 2024-25 and 2025-26 seasons with teams being grouped into pods of three for a guaranteed home and away series.

UND is partnered with Minnesota Duluth and St. Cloud State.

The league also announced an updated postseason format to begin this season, with only eight teams qualifying. The 2025 NCHC Tournament will start with best-of-three quarterfinal series from March 14-16, with the top four seeds hosting the bottom four seeds, like in years past. The 2025 NCHC postseason will also be the conference's last crowning a champion at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn., with the final neutral-site NCHC Frozen Faceoff set for March 21-22.

Starting in 2026, the NCHC will move its entire postseason to campus sites before welcoming St. Thomas a league member in 2026-27.

As his 10th year at the helm of North Dakota begins in 2024-25, head coach Brad Berry has put his own distinct stamp on a program already steeped in tradition and success. Berry has guided his alma mater to a 209-106-33 (.648) record in his nine seasons with nine winning seasons, five NCAA Tournament appearances (2016, 2017, 2021, 2022, 2024), a national championship (2016) and one of the best seasons in school history that got cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2019-20.

On Feb. 3, 2024, Berry became the fourth UND coach to reach the 200-win mark at the school following a victory over Miami. He currently ranks behind only Gino Gasparini (392), Dave Hakstol (289) and Dean Blais (262) for the most wins as a bench boss at North Dakota.

Once again tasked with a roster that featured more newcomers (14) than returners (12) in 2023-24, Berry returned the Fighting Hawks to the top of the NCHC standings with a 26-12-2 overall record and a 15-8-1 mark in NCHC play to advance to the NCAA Tournament once again. NoDak captured its sixth Penrose Cup as NCHC regular season champions and fourth in the last five seasons under Berry, becoming the first team in NCHC history to go over half of the league schedule without losing a conference game in regulation (16 straight). Multiple players garnered All-NCHC honors, headlined by sophomore Jackson Blake earning the NCHC's Player of the Year and Forward of the Year awards while also becoming the third Hobey Baker Award Hat Trick Finalist under Berry (Jordan Kawaguchi - 2020, Shane Pinto - 2021) as well as AHCA/CCM All-America West First Team selection.

Berry recorded his eighth straight winning season in 2022-23, guiding the program to an 18-15-6 overall record and another appearance in the NCHC Frozen Faceoff Semifinals following the first conference quarterfinal road win since 1995. UND captured seven wins over ranked opponents, including a thrilling overtime victory at top-ranked Minnesota in October. Three players earned All-NCHC selections, with Jackson Blake winning the league's rookie of the year award and Chris Jandric earning a spot on the first team. Ethan Frisch was also honored as the NCHC Senior Scholar-Athlete of the Year, presented to the league's top senior for his performances on-and-off the ice.

Tasked with the most newcomers the program had seen since 1973, Berry guided North Dakota to a similar position, the top of the NCHC standings in 2021-22. For an unprecedented third straight year, the Fighting Hawks captured the Penrose Cup as league champions, the first team to accomplish that feat in NCHC history and the second time in UND history winning three consecutive (1997-99). North Dakota finished with a 24-14-1 record and a 17-6-1 mark in NCHC play to return to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight season.

Berry won his third straight NCHC Herb Brooks Coach of the Year award in 2021-22, had four players earn All-NCHC honors, two selected to the all-rookie teams and Jake Sanderson selected to the AHCA/CCM All-American West First Team. UND captured three individual NCHC honors, with Ethan Frisch, Connor Ford and Mark Senden all earning recognitions. Goaltender Zach Driscoll was also named the winner of the Senior CLASS Award, presented to the top senior student-athlete in the sport, marking the second straight year a Fighting Hawk has won the award.

Navigating one of the oddest seasons in memory in 2020-21, Berry helped the Fighting Hawks return to the NCAA Tournament with a vengeance. UND posted a 22-6-1 record, despite playing only seven games at home, on its way to a second straight National Collegiate Hockey Conference regular season title and became the first team in NCHC history to win both the regular season and postseason title. The Hawks advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the

first time since 2017, earning the No.1 overall seed. UND rolled past American International in the regional semifinals before battling Minnesota Duluth to the longest game in NCAA Tournament history, dropping a 3-2 thriller in five overtimes.

A season that started in a pod at Omaha during the month of December, UND faced every challenge thrown its way to capture multiple individual awards. Six players earned All-NCHC status while sophomore Shane Pinto became the first player in conference history to be unanimously named player of the year. The forward was also named a Hobey Baker Award Hat Trick finalist, the second straight year a UND player has been a finalist, joining teammates Jordan Kawaguchi and Matt Kiersted as All-Americans.

Berry was named a finalist for Spencer Penrose AHCA National Coach of the Year Award, a honor that he won the year prior, while repeating his NCHC Herb Brooks Coach of the Year selection.

Jordan Kawaguchi followed up his junior season with a sparkling senior year, serving as team captain and being selected as the 2020-21 Senior CLASS Award® winner in NCAA® Division I men's hockey. The award, chosen by a nationwide vote of Division I men's hockey coaches, national hockey media, and fans, is given annually to the most outstanding senior student-athlete in Division I men's hockey. He became the first student-athlete at North Dakota to earn the award.

The 2019-20 Fighting Hawks rolled off a school-record 18-1-0 mark at home on the way to a 26-5-4 overall campaign. UND captured the National Collegiate Hockey Conference's regular season title, its third in the last six seasons and second under Berry. A postseason that was viewed with tons of optimism was cut short with North Dakota holding the top spot in the NCAA PairWise Rankings before the conference tournaments-- and eventually the entire rest of the season-- was canceled.

It was a season that began with little fanfare as zero UND players were on

preseason all-conference teams and the Hawks were picked to finish fourth in the NCHC. But, North Dakota used a much-improved power play, a standout duo in the net, an influx of new talent and a Hobey Baker Award Hat Trick finalist to turn in one of the most exciting seasons in UND's esteemed history.

Junior Jordan Kawaguchi burst upon the national scene and became the USCHO.com National Player of the Year, finishing second in the country in points (15-30-45) and leading North Dakota in clutch situations with 13 game-winning points. Junior Peter Thome won the league's goals-against average title, recording a slim 1.37 GAA with a 7-3-1 mark while sophomore Adam Scheel won 19 games with a 2.07 GAA. Freshman Shane Pinto and fellow newcomer senior transfer Westin Michaud injected some instant offense, tying for the team lead with 16 goals during the magical campaign.

Berry was named the Spencer Penrose AHCA Award co-winner along with National Coach of the Year honors from College Hockey News and USCHO.com. He also was named the NCHC Herb Brooks Coach of the Year, the second of his career.

He began his head-coaching career in 2015-16 by leading UND to its eighth NCAA championship, becoming the first person in the history of NCAA Division I men's hockey to win a national title in his first year behind the bench.

In 2016-17, Berry guided the defending national champions to the program's 15th straight NCAA Tournament berth, the second-longest streak in the history of the sport.

Berry has also continued UND's reputation for developing professional hockey players, churning out more than two dozen such players in just five years, including 12 who have already played in the National Hockey League heading into the 2020-2021 season: Brock Boeser (Vancouver), Drake Caggiula (Chicago), Rhett Gardner (Dallas), Shane Gersich (Washington), Luke Johnson (Minnesota), Tyson Jost (Colorado), Paul LaDue (LA Kings), Austin Poganski (St. Louis), Tucker Poolman (Winnipeg), Nick Schmaltz (Arizona), Troy Stecher (Vancouver) and Christian Wolanin (Ottawa).

A former NHL defenseman himself, Berry masterfully guided his alma mater to the program's eighth national title in his debut season of 2015-16, bringing to a halt a 16-year drought for the storied program. Berry and the Fighting Hawks went 34-6-4, establishing a team record for most wins by a rookie head coach, and their .818 winning percentage was the second best in program history.

Berry also led UND to its second straight Penrose Cup as National Collegiate Hockey Conference regular-season champion, resulting in NCHC Herb Brooks Coach of the Year honors. He also garnered national coach of the year honors from U.S. College Hockey Online (USCHO) and was one of eight finalists for the Spencer Penrose Award, given to the American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA) Coach of the Year.

Four of Berry's players – forwards Boeser and Caggiula, defenseman Stecher, and goaltender Cam Johnson – earned All-America honors, joining UND's 1986-87 team as the only entries in school history to boast four All-Americans.

Following the season, eight players signed pro contracts: Caggiula, Stecher, LaDue, Schmaltz (Chicago Blackhawks), Keaton Thompson (Anaheim Ducks), Luke Johnson (Chicago Blackhawks), Bryn Chyzik (AHL's Rockford IceHogs), and Coltyn Sanderson (ECHL's Orlando Solar Bears).

UND has also thrived in the classroom under Berry, placing 19 players on the NCHC Academic All-Conference Team for the third consecutive season in 2019-20, including a team-record 12 being named to the NCHC Scholar-Athlete Team. In his tenure, Berry's teams have boasted a whopping 93 NCHC All-Academic Team members.

Berry was named head coach at North Dakota on May 18, 2015, becoming the 16th head coach in program history and the sixth former UND player to take the helm.

Berry had recently completed his ninth season as an assistant coach at UND in 2014-15. He served two stints in that role, first from 2000-01 through 2005-06 and again from 2012-13 through 2014-15. He also previously spent time as an assistant coach with the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets (2010-12) and the AHL's Manitoba Moose (2006-08).

During his nine years on the UND staff, Berry helped lead the program to eight NCAA Tournament appearances, five NCAA Frozen Four berths (2014-15, 2013-14, 2005-06, 2004-05 and 2000-01), three regular season conference titles (2014-15, 2003-04 and 2000-01), and one conference tournament championship (2005-06).

Berry oversaw the team's defensemen during both of his stints at UND and routinely produced blue line units that ranked among the conference national leaders, both offensively and defensively. In each of the last two seasons, UND led the nation in both points and points per game by defensemen. At the other end of the ice, UND allowed a league-low 2.24 goals against per game in 2014-15 and ranked among the top three in the conference in that category in five of Berry's last six seasons with the program.

Before returning to UND prior to the 2012-13 season, Berry spent two years (2010-12) as an assistant coach with the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets. Prior to that, Berry founded The Hockey Academy in Grand Forks, which focuses on developing and training youth hockey players within Grand Forks and surrounding areas. During that time (2008-10), he doubled as a part-time scout with the NHL's Vancouver Canucks.

Berry was an assistant coach with the Manitoba Moose from 2006-08 and helped lead the Vancouver Canucks AHL affiliate to a playoff appearance in each of his two years, including a North Division title in 2006-07.

At every stop during his career, Berry has enhanced his reputation as a coach who develops National Hockey League defensemen. Eleven of his former UND pupils have reached NHL rosters, including two-time Stanley Cup champion Matt Greene of the Los Angeles Kings. While with the AHL's Manitoba Moose, Berry mentored future Vancouver Canucks stalwart Alexander Edler. During his two years with the Blue Jackets, Berry coached the likes of James Wisniewski, Mike Commodore, Marc Methot, Jack Johnson, Kris Russell, Anton Stralman, Fedor Tyutin, and Rostislav Klesla.

Berry himself was a standout defenseman as a player, first at UND where he collected 74 points (12 goals, 62 assists) in 112 games from 1983-86 under legendary head coach John "Gino" Gasparini. Berry also won a gold medal with Canada at the 1985 IIHF World Junior Hockey Championship.

A second-round draft pick (29th overall) of the Winnipeg Jets in 1983, Berry went on to play in 241 NHL games over eight years, including stints with Winnipeg, Minnesota and Dallas. His professional playing career also included stops in the Swedish Elite League and the International Hockey League (IHL). While with the IHL's Michigan K-Wings, Berry was a three-time IHL All-Star and was named the K-Wings' Defenseman of the Year three times.

After his playing career ended, Berry was a professional scout with the 1999-2000 Dallas Stars team that advanced to the Stanley Cup Finals.

A native of Bashaw, Alberta, Berry's family includes his wife, Suzanne, daughters, Brianna and Brooke, and son, Bauer.
