In compliance with the working code of the Football Writers Association of America, children, spouses, dates and pets are not permitted. Allegiant Stadium is a non-smoking facility, except for designated areas.
- Credentials will not be mailed – they must be picked up outside the Media Entrance of Allegiant Stadium beginning three hours before kickoff.

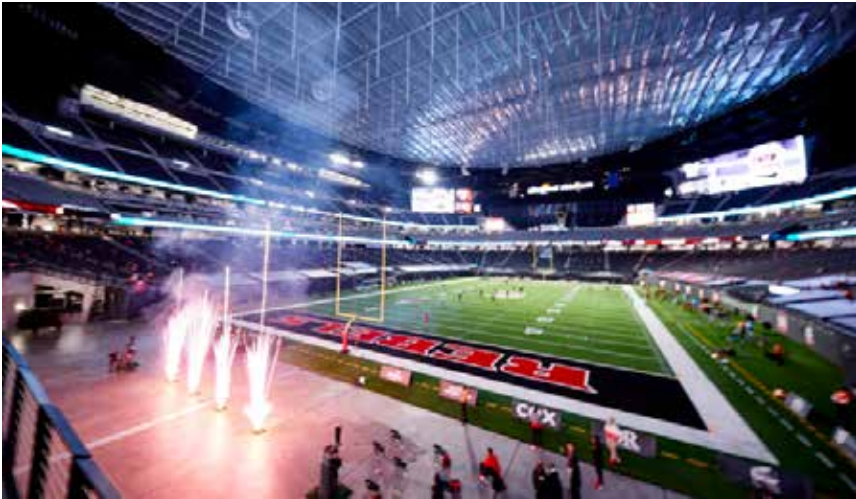

THIS IS THE MOUNTAIN WEST

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. With conference realignment sweeping the nation in recent years, the MW has been proactive in addressing membership changes. Boise State joined the Mountain West in 2011, followed by Fresno State and UNR in 2012. That's the same year that the University of Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Conference. On July 1, 2013, the Mountain West further expanded when San Jose State and Utah State joined, bringing to 11 the number of full-time member institutions and 12 football-playing members.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, Reno, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San Jose State add a West Coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean.

Mountain West members have participated in 121 bowl games under the league umbrella, including four appearances in BCS games and one CFP game. The MW has earned 94 postseason bids in men's basketball, with seven Sweet 16 appearances and one runnerup finish, as well as three NIT Final Four berths. MW women's basketball has tallied 84 postseason slots, including 40 NCAA bids, five Sweet 16 appearances and one Elite Eight berth since 2000. Wyoming took the MW's first WNIT championship in 2007 with a win over Wisconsin. In women's volleyball, the MW has had 48 NCAA bids with nine Sweet 16 berths and one Elite Eight appearance. The MW has produced 1,718 All-America selections among its 18 sponsored sports (men's swimming was discontinued as a Conference sport following the 2010-11 season) in the last 24 years. A total of 234 MW student-athletes have also earned Academic All-America accolades in that span. The Mountain West has sent at least 25 teams to NCAA postseason events in each of the past 24 years, capturing five team national championships and producing 52 individual national champions.

Entering the 2023 season, the MW has eight postseason opportunities, including a spot in a New Year's Six bowl (highest ranked non-autonomous 5 champion) - six primary bowl positions with the Los Angeles Bowl, Arizona Bowl, Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, New Mexico Bowl, Hawai'i Bowl and an ESPN Events-operated bowl, likely to be held in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex - and one secondary position. An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in five inaugural bowl games as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying FBS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and into the College Football Playoff (CFP) with Boise State's selection to the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

MW FOOTBALL IN THE POSTSEASON

The Mountain West accepted a league-record eight postseason bowl bids during the 2022 season. The conference has earned 121 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 66-52 all-time record in those contests. The MW has finished with a winning record in the postseason in nine of the last 17 years.

Mountain West teams went 5-1 during 2021 to capture the Bowl Challenge Cup for the fifth time overall. The MW is the only conference to win the trophy outright more than four times since the award's inception in 2002-03. The Bowl Challenge Cup was created by ESPN as a competition among the conferences in the FBS during the bowl season. In order to win the trophy, a conference must have the highest win percentage with a minimum of three teams participating in the postseason.

BATTLE FOR THE FREMONT CANNON

Trophy Helps Illustrate Importance of State Rivalry

Not simply a traveling trophy for the winner of the UNLV vs. UNR game, the Fremont Cannon is ever-present at the annual Battle for Nevada.

The tradition of awarding the cannon to the victors started more than five decades ago when the Rebels' first football coach, Bill Ireland, felt the young rivalry between the north and south schools could use a symbolic trophy to stimulate interest. The prize turned out to be a replica of the howitzer used by John C. Fremont, one of America's foremost trailblazers, as he headed west into Nevada in 1843. Legend has it that Fremont violated U.S. War Department rules by taking the cannon with him on his westward trek without permission and then abandoned the weapon in a Sierra-Nevada snowdrift.

Built by the Kennecott Copper Corp., Nevada Mines Division, the cannon was originally valued at more than \$10,000 and is considered one of the best, and heaviest, symbols of rivalry in college football. The Fremont is one of only two cannon prizes in all rivalry games, along with Illinois vs. Purdue. In 2014, the cannon was named the best rivalry trophy in all of college football by Yahoo! Sports.

The Wolf Pack held the cannon first because they had beaten the Rebels 30-28 in the initial game of the series in 1969. UNLV promptly won rights to the big gun in 1970 with a 42-30 home win and went on to dominate the series with eight wins in the next 11 games played. After UNR rebounded to win five straight games (1989-1993), UNLV regained the cannon in its Silver Anniversary Year in 1994.

UNLV won two straight in the series after a dramatic come-from-behind 34-29 win at Sam Boyd Stadium in 2018 and a 33-30 thriller in Reno in 2019 that marked the coldest Cannon game and also the first to go to overtime. The Rebels won last year's thrilling contest, 27-22, to close the season and pull to within 29-20 in the all-time series, which has been continuous since 1987.

The teams will meet again in Reno on Saturday, October 14 to decide who gets to keep the Cannon!



NINTH ISLAND SHOWDOWN

Sponsored by the California Hotel



In 2017, the UNLV and Hawai'i football programs jointly introduced a new annual rivalry game -- the Ninth Island Showdown. Sponsored by the California Hotel, the winner of this annual Mountain West matchup now gets rights to the Island Showdown Trophy, which includes both a pineapple -- a Vegas-style gold pineapple -- and a variation of the Welcome to Fabulous Las Vegas sign.

Las Vegas has earned the nickname "The Ninth Island" for its long-standing popularity with Hawaiian visitors and transplants. UNLV won the inaugural game 31-23 in 2017 at Sam Boyd Stadium in Las Vegas. After Hawai'i won three straight installments, UNLV took back the trophy in 2021 but then left it on the islands after falling to the Warriors 31-25 on the UH campus last November.

The "Golden Pineapple" will be up for grabs again when the squads face off in Las Vegas on September 30.

FERTITTA FOOTBALL COMPLEX



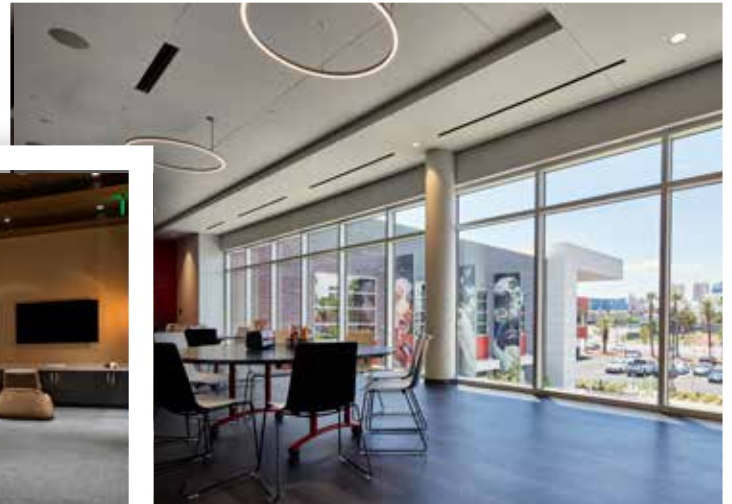
The Fertitta Football Complex, UNLV football's state-of-the-art training facility, opened in October 2019. On Sept. 13, 2016, the Fertitta Family pledged \$10 million toward the construction of the training center, marking the largest single gift in UNLV athletics history.

The 73,000-square-foot, two-level complex is located on campus in the north end of the team's practice area and overlooks two new practice fields at Bill "Wildcat" Morris Rebel Park. The Fertitta Football Complex serves as the day-to-day home of the program and includes an academic center, locker rooms, offices, meeting rooms, strength & conditioning center, media room, training table and nutrition bar, athletic training center, player lounge and a barber shop.

In the fall of 2019 the Rebels moved to a state-of-the-art Strength Center in the stunning Fertitta Football Complex. The 10,000-square foot area, which includes offices for Director of Strength and Condition Jeff Fish and his staff, exclusively serves the football program.

A well-appointed cardio station directly leads to two new practice fields at Bill "Wildcat" Morris Rebel Park.

Complete with a nutrition bar, the center is also just steps away from a full-service training table with seating up to 120 on the second floor.

Aside from staff offices, the largest area features stations to perform various treatments to student-athletes throughout the day.

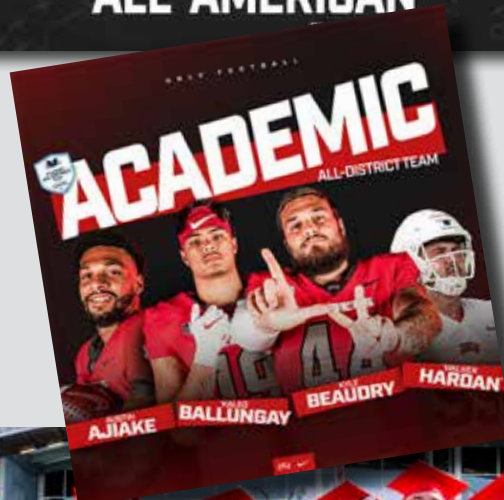
A separate rehab room flanks the main center and features a hydrotherapy room that includes whirlpools and plunge tanks.



Another impressive year in the classroom for the Rebels is in the books as a total of 33 UNLV football players – just shy of a program record -- earned spots on the Fall 2022 Academic All-Mountain West team. The Rebels' total tied for second among the 12 football teams in the conference. Academic advising for football has helped produce 365 such honorees since the school joined the Mountain West in 1999. In addition, 22 Rebel gridders last year earned spots on the UNLV Dean's Honor List and a program-record five football student-athletes earned entrance into the 2023 NFF Hampshire Honor Society.

REBEL FOURSOME MAKES PROGRAM HISTORY

UNLV football saw four of its players earn spots on the 2022 CSC Academic All-District Football Team, marking the first time more than three Rebels made the prestigious team in the same season. In fact, after never previously fielding an academic All-American, UNLV football recently boasted two in as many years as defensive lineman **Eliel Ehimare** was announced as a member of the team in 2021. After the 2020 season, all-time leading rusher **Charles Williams** became the first UNLV football player in history to be voted Academic All-America by CSC (formerly CoSIDA). Just one season later, Ehimare became the first defensive player from the Rebels to make the list, nabbing a spot on the second team and becoming the 33rd UNLV student-athlete overall to earn CSC Academic All-America.

UNLV and its student-athletes are committed to success both on and off the fields of play. Rebel players have the opportunity to become more involved members of the Southern Nevada community. Through interaction with charitable organizations, local schools, hospitals and various youth events, the Rebels have become increasingly positive role models. Each year, the athletics department's effort in Nevada Reading Week translates into dozens of area schools being visited by nearly a 100 athletes, coaches and staff. The football program also takes part in the department's Rebels Give Back initiative that sees UNLV's coaches, staff and student-athletes spread throughout the city to give involved with more than a dozen community partners.



UNLV BOASTS FOUR ALL-TIME COMMUNITY SERVICE ALL-AMERICANS

UNLV wide receiver Casey Flair was one of only 11 players in the nation named to the 2007 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Division I-A Good Works Team. The Alaska native became the fourth Rebel in six years selected to the prestigious collection of student-athletes that has been honored for its performance off the field since 1991. Former UNLV lineman **Tony Terrell** (Lawndale, CA) was the program's first-ever honoree in 2002 and two-time All-American safety **Jamaal Brimmer** (Las Vegas) earned the nod in 2004. Las Vegas native **Leon Moore** was honored in 2005. Nominated by their school's sports information directors and voted on by an AFCA committee, successful candidates must be heavily involved in working for charity and/or service to their community.

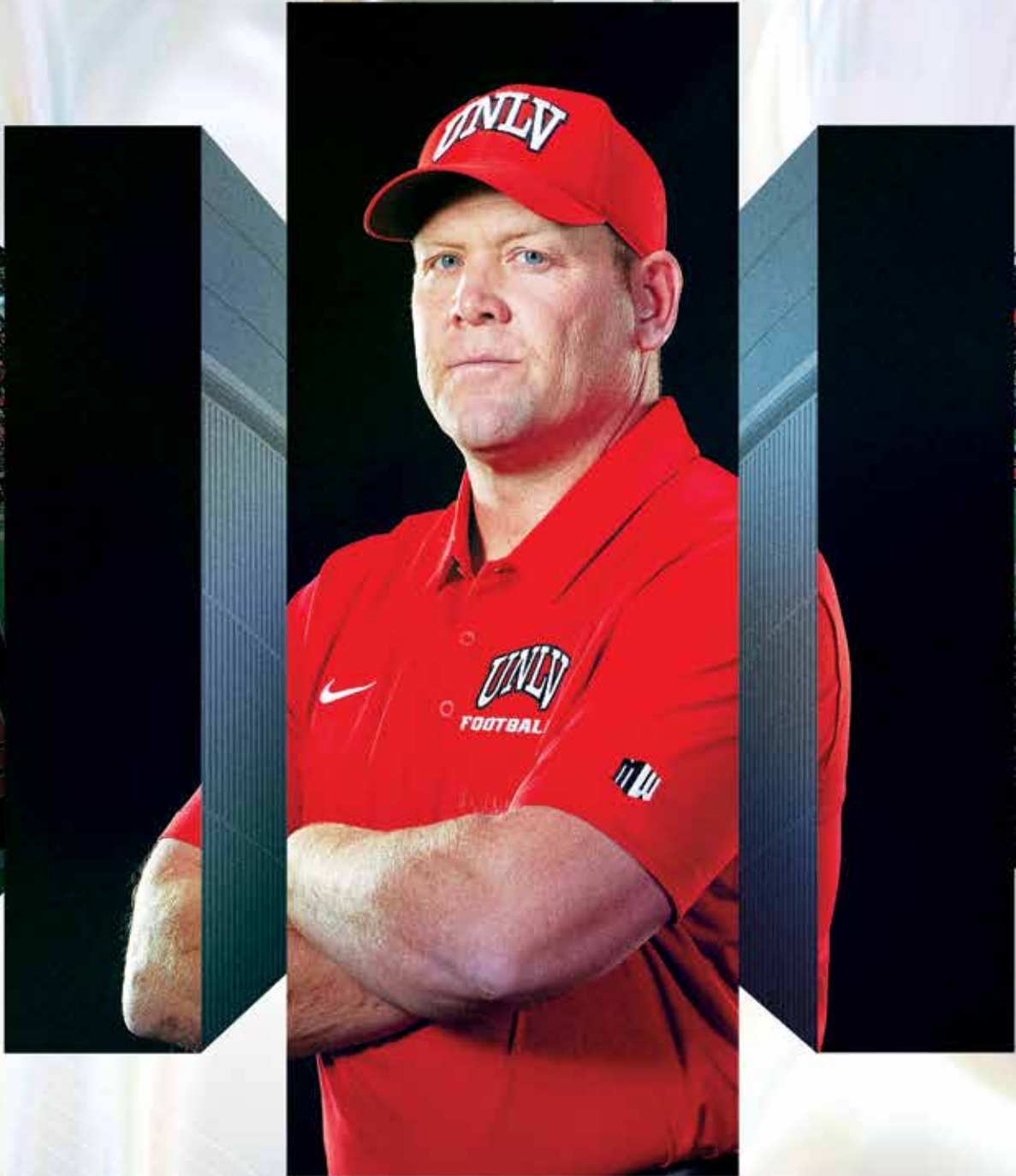

A former head coach in the SEC and one of the nation's top coordinators, Barry Odom was named the new head coach of UNLV's football program on Dec. 6, 2022.

Odom came to UNLV after finishing his third season at the University of Arkansas, serving as associate head coach, defensive coordinator and safeties coach for the Razorbacks.

"My family and I would like to thank President Whitfield, Athletics Director Erick Harper and the administrative team for the opportunity to be the head football coach of the UNLV Rebels," said Odom. "I'm honored and excited to begin developing a relationship with our student-athletes and provide them a great foundation for success in every area of their lives.

"I believe in the vision and plan that President Whitfield and Mr. Harper have for the UNLV Athletics Department. That alignment piece is critical and together we will achieve great success. This city is founded on opportunity and we look forward to this opportunity to lead this program and engage with this amazing community and Rebels everywhere."

Before moving to Fayetteville, Odom spent four seasons as head coach at the University of Missouri, including taking two of his teams to bowl games and finishing at .500 or better three times en route to building an overall record of 25-25 from 2016-19. His 2018 Missouri squad finished the regular season ranked 23rd in the College Football Playoff poll.

"Coach Odom knows what it takes to compete and win on college football's biggest stages, and we're thrilled that he's bringing his incredible talent, work ethic, and commitment to success to UNLV," said Whitfield. "We have high expectations for UNLV Football, and Coach Odom is a proven leader who will help elevate our program to new levels of success. It's a great pleasure to welcome the Odom family to our university and Las Vegas."

Odom, 46, became the 13th head coach in UNLV football history but the first with previous head coaching experience on the FBS level since College Football Hall of Famer John Robinson led the Rebels from 1999-2004.

"We could not be more excited to welcome Barry Odom and his family to UNLV," said Harper. "We had a tremendous amount of interest in this head coaching position and Coach Odom checked every box, including having experience successfully leading a program at the highest level of this sport. He is unanimously well-respected around the country and is the right person at the right time for the Rebels as this program, this department and this university continue to ascend as part of the Sports and Entertainment Capital of the World here in Las Vegas."

Under Odom's leadership, Missouri ended the 2019 regular season as one of the nation's top defenses, ranking 14th nationally and third in the SEC in total defense (312.0 YPG) and 17th in the FBS with just 19.4 points allowed per game. Mizzou was particularly strong against

the pass, ranking sixth in the nation and second in the SEC with just 179.3 YPG. Linebacker Nick Bolton led the way, making a league-leading 107 tackles and earning First Team All-SEC.

In 2018, Odom became just the fourth coach in Missouri history to lead the Tigers to a bowl game in two of his first three seasons when Mizzou earned a berth in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl. That Tiger team finished strong for the second year in a row, going 4-0 in November, including a 38-17 win at No. 11 Florida that was Missouri's largest road win over a ranked opponent since 2008. His 2017 team won six straight to finish the regular season 7-5 and earn a trip to the Texas Bowl.

Before being elevated to head coach, Odom returned to Missouri in 2015 as the program's defensive coordinator and helped the Tigers rank ninth nationally in total defense, allowing just 302 yards per game. That defense became Mizzou's first to rank inside the nation's Top 10 since the NCAA started keeping defensive stats in 1978. The same unit ranked seventh nationally in scoring defense (16.2 PPG) and pass defense (169.2 YPG).

Odom's recent work at Arkansas under head coach Sam Pittman included helping 2022's squad earn a bid to the Liberty Bowl one season after the Razorbacks defeated Penn State in the Outback Bowl and earned a final AP ranking of 24. His 2021 defense allowed just 22.9 PPG – 12 fewer per game than in 2020 and the fewest for an Arkansas defense since 2014 – and allowed 84 fewer yards of total defense. That Hogs' secondary gave up just 214.2 yards per game as cornerback Montaric Brown led the league with five interceptions to earn First Team All-SEC and Third Team All-America honors. The run defense also evolved to allow just 153.9 yards per game, the fewest for Arkansas since 2015. Burlsworth Trophy winner Grant Morgan led a trio of linebackers that all notched 100+ tackles. Bumper Pool's team-best 125 stops earned him Second Team All-SEC accolades to go along with Third Team All-America honors.

Under Odom's watch, the Hogs' 18 takeaways during the 2020 campaign ranked 25th nationally. Arkansas' 13 interceptions were second most in the SEC and 13th most in the FBS. Morgan earned First Team All-SEC and Walter Camp Second Team All-America honors after leading the nation in tackles per game.

In between his stints at Missouri, Odom earned his first defensive coordinator job at Memphis in 2012, transforming the Tigers into a defensive power. In 2014, his defense ranked fifth nationally in scoring defense (17.1 PPG) and 22nd nationally in total defense (343.3 YPG) to help the Tigers go 10-3. That marked an incredible turnaround for a Memphis team that ranked 117th prior to his arrival. The program improved defensively each year under Odom, rising from 50th nationally in total defense in 2012 to 39th in 2013 to 22nd in his final year.

Odom began his coaching career in 2000 as an assistant coach at his prep alma mater, Ada High School in Oklahoma before taking over as head

coach at Rock Bridge High School in Missouri for two seasons. In 2003 he returned to Columbia as a graduate assistant on the staff of Gary Pinkel, the man he would eventually succeed as head coach of Missouri 13 years later.

Born in Lawton, Oklahoma, and raised in Maysville, Oklahoma, Odom lettered four times as a linebacker at Missouri from 1996-99, making two trips to bowl games and serving as team captain during his senior season. He ended his career ranked in the school's all-time top 10 with 362 tackles.

Odom graduated from Missouri in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in education and earned his master's in education from the school in 2004. He and his wife Tia have two sons, JT and Garyt, and a daughter, Anna. JT is a freshman linebacker at UNLV in 2023.

Del Alexander was announced as UNLV's wide receivers coach on Jan. 2, 2023. Alexander is a familiar name to longtime Rebel fans as he was a member of two previous UNLV staffs before going on to coach two decades in the Big Ten, Pac-12 and ACC, as well as Notre Dame. In total, he has coached in 17 bowl games, including four

trips to the Rose Bowl and two College Football Playoff berths.

Alexander returned to Las Vegas after coaching the receivers at Georgia Tech in 2022. Previous to that he spent five seasons as wide receivers coach at Notre Dame (2017-21), helping the Fighting Irish to a bowl game every year, including a pair of CFP appearances. While in South Bend, four wideouts under his tutelage were selected in the NFL Draft, including second-round pick Chase Claypool (2020) and third-round selection Miles Boykin (2019).

Prior to Notre Dame, Alexander spent five years at Arizona State (2012-16), including four seasons as passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach and one season as tight ends coach. During his stint in Tempe, the Sun Devils made three bowl games and had two NFL Draft picks, including third-round selection Jaelen Strong (2015).

Before joining the staff at ASU, Alexander coached wide receivers for five seasons at Wisconsin (2007-11), helping guide the Badgers to two Big Ten Championships and five bowl appearances (including back-to-back Rose Bowls in 2010-11). Wisconsin's offense rewrote the program's record book with Alexander on staff, passing for a school-record 3,280 yards in 2011.

Alexander's career also included stops as running backs coach/assistant special teams coordinator at San Diego (2005-06) and recruiting coordinator/wide receivers at Oregon State (2003-04).

His first UNLV stint came in 1998 under head coach Jeff Horton before leaving for one season as a senior offensive assistant for running backs in the NFL with the San Diego Chargers. Alexander returned to Las Vegas under Hall of Fame coach John Robinson as passing game coordinator/wide receivers/quarterbacks (2000-01) and wide receivers/quarterbacks (2002) for the Rebels.

He began his career at USC as an assistant video coordinator (1995) before coaching tight ends as a graduate assistant (1996-97).

Alexander played wide receiver for one season at West Los Angeles College in 1992 before finishing his career at USC (1993-94). Him and his wife, Star, have three sons: JD, Jalen and Drew. JD Alexander lettered for the Rebels as a linebacker and a special teams performer in 2018-19.

Akeem Davis, a former NFL player who was hired Dec. 23, 2022, came to Las Vegas after three seasons as co-defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Austin Peay State University, including both the spring and fall seasons for the ASUN Conference program in 2021.

In 2022, two of Davis' DBs earned all-conference honors, including Third Team All-American Demetries Ford, as APSU grabbed 13 interceptions. In fall of 2021, the Governors ranked second in the FCS with 19 interceptions and fifth in pass efficiency defense. That season, Davis coached two consensus All-Americans in Johnathon Edwards and Conference Defensive Player of the Year Koby Perry.

Prior to his time in Clarksville, Tennessee, Davis was a member of the Southern Miss coaching staff for four years beginning as a defensive graduate assistant for the 2017 season. He was elevated to USM's cornerbacks coach in 2019 and then moved to oversee the Golden Eagles' running backs before the 2020 season when he coached Frank Gore Jr. to Second Team All-Conference USA honors.

Davis was an undrafted free agent signee by the NFL's Washington Commanders in 2014 and spent parts of three seasons on the active roster at Washington, New Orleans, Seattle, Indianapolis and Jacksonville. He played 21 games in the NFL, finishing with 11 tackles and a forced fumble.

The NFL Network documented Davis' journey from undrafted free agent to making a 53-man NFL roster in its "Undrafted" series. Off the field, Davis established the AD47 Football Leadership Academy. AD47 is a free, one-day football skills camp dedicated to implementing the "Five Pillars" core curriculum of Character, Leadership, Discipline, Follow-through, and Grit. The academy is sanctioned and insured by the NFL Foundation and run in partnership with USA Football through the FUNdamentals program.

Cornell Ford joined UNLV on Dec. 23, 2022, after spending the last two seasons coaching cornerbacks at his alma mater Toledo. He previously coached for the Rockets for seven seasons under former head coach Gary Pinkel and spent 19 seasons as an assistant at Missouri under Pinkel and then as assistant

head coach and running backs coach under Barry Odom when he led the Mizzou program from 2016-19. An accomplished line coach who has spent time in the Pac-12, SEC and Mountain West, Ricky Logo was announced as a member of Barry Odom's staff on Dec. 28, 2022.

Logo came to Las Vegas after finishing a season coaching the defensive line on head coach Terry Bowden's staff at ULM. Prior to joining the Warhawks, Logo was at Washington State in 2020-21 as defensive tackles coach for head coach Nick Rolovich. In his first season in Pullman, the Wazzu defense produced four All-Pac-12 selections, led the league with eight forced fumbles and was fourth in rush defense (154.8), a 30-yard improvement from the previous season. Logo worked the 2018-19 seasons coaching the defensive line for Rolovich at Hawai'i, helping UH to back-to-back bowl games including a 10-5 mark and Hawaii Bowl win over BYU in 2019. Logo tutored four All-Mountain West selections his last two seasons in Honolulu and saw the 2018 defense tally 30 sacks, the most for UH in seven years.

Prior to Hawai'i, he worked three seasons at Colorado State (2015-17) as defensive line coach, helping lead the Rams to three bowl appearances. Prior to moving to Fort Collins, Logo coached the defensive line at Houston (2012-14), helping the Cougars to a 2014 Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl victory, and worked one season at Furman University.

Logo coached four seasons in the SEC at Vanderbilt (2007-10) and was part of a staff that led the Commodores to their first winning season since 1982. Logo also worked five seasons at Troy University, two as co-defensive coordinator where he coached a pair of future NFL All-Pro linemen in Osi Umenyiora (New York Giants) and Demarcus Ware (Dallas Cowboys). Logo began his coaching career at Tennessee-Chattanooga in 1995 where he spent six seasons as the Mocs' defensive line coach before being promoted to defensive coordinator for one season in 2001. He spent one season at Western Carolina (2002), where he also assumed the title as assistant head coach.

Logo played nose tackle at North Carolina State, helping the Wolfpack to four consecutive bowl games. As a senior in 1992, he was named team captain, earned All-ACC and Third Team All-America honors and played in the Hula Bowl, the Japan All-Star Game and the East-West Shrine Game. Now heading into his third season overseeing the team's tight ends, he was originally hired to be the program's first-ever

offensive analyst in 2020.

During his first season in Las Vegas Longshore was responsible for optimizing learning systems within the program, assisting with game plan development and using analytics to create favorable strategic advantages in all phases of the game.

Damon Magazu is one of two holdovers from the previous staff to serve under new head coach Barry Odom in 2023, having completed his third season coaching in the Rebel defensive secondary last fall.

In 2022, his safeties helped UNLV finish 10th in the nation during the regular season with 15 total interceptions, which was the most for the program since 2012. He also tutored Jonathan Baldwin, who won Mountain West Defensive Player of the Week after the season-ending victory over UNR.

Magazu came to Las Vegas in 2020 after spending the previous two seasons at Oklahoma where he helped coach the Sooner secondary as a graduate assistant. In his two seasons in Norman, the Sooners twice won the Big 12 Championship, extending their streak to five straight conference titles, and made back-to-back appearances in the College Football Playoff.

Prior to Oklahoma, Magazu was a defensive GA at his alma mater, East Carolina, where he was a standout defensive back. His distinguished playing career, which began in 2010, included appearances in 50 games, 37 starts, 265 tackles and 11 interceptions. He was a two-time All-Conference USA selection who earned the program's defensive player-of-the-year award in 2013, was a Rock Roggeman Heart-of-the-Pirate Award honoree and recipient of the 2014 National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Bill Dooley Chapter Outstanding Scholar Athlete Award.

Brennan Marion was announced as UNLV's new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on Jan. 10, 2023. One of the nation's most highly regarded assistants, Marion is the architect of the innovative "Go-Go Offense" and brought experience as offensive coordinator at

two previous schools.

Marion came to campus from the University of Texas where he served the 2022 season as the passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach. The Longhorns finished with a top 25 scoring offense (34.5 PPG) while Marion tutored Big 12 Conference receiving touchdowns leader Xavier Worthy, who was named second team all-league after finding the end zone nine times as a sophomore.

Before moving to Austin, Marion coached 2021 Biletnikoff Award winner Jordan Addison at the University of Pittsburgh. The nation's top wideout was a consensus first team All-American after setting a school single-season record with 100 catches for 1,593 yards and an FBS-leading 17 touchdowns. He would become a first round NFL Draft pick by the Minnesota Vikings. Marion was a part of a Panther staff that produced one of the nation's most explosive offenses, serving as wide receivers coach for an attack that ranked among the nation's top eight in scoring (41.4 PPG/4th), total offense (486.6 YPG/8th) and passing offense (337.4 YPG/8th). Pitt finished with an 11-3 record, its first-ever ACC Championship, a No. 12 final regular-season ranking and a berth in the New Year's Six Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl.

UNLV marks Marion's second stop in the Mountain West as he served as wide receivers coach at the University of Hawaii in 2020. On the islands, he oversaw the development of All-MW receiver Calvin Turner who was named the New Mexico Bowl Most Outstanding Offensive Player after compiling 252 all-purpose yards and scoring two touchdowns in the Rainbow Warriors' 28-14 win over Houston.

In 2019, Marion was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at William & Mary, where he dramatically improved the Tribe's production in every major statistical category. William & Mary nearly doubled its scoring average while its total offensive output increased by almost 100 yards per contest.

Marion's first Division I coaching opportunity came at Howard University, where he posted two exceptional seasons (2017-18) as the Bisons' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In 2017, quarterback Caylin Newton was named the MEAC Rookie of the Year after becoming the first freshman in conference history to surpass 3,000 yards of total offense (3,185). Marion's offense sparked Howard to a 7-4 record in 2017, including a memorable 43-40 win over UNLV at Sam Boyd Stadium in the season opener.

In 2016, Marion coached the running backs at Oklahoma Baptist University. Under his guidance, Isaiah Mallory rushed for a school-record 1,083 yards en route to first team All-National Christian College Athletic Association honors.

Marion, who earned prestigious invitations to the NFL Quarterback Coaching Summit and AFCA 35 Under 35 Leadership Institute, spent the 2015 season in the Pac-12 Conference as an offensive quality control assistant at Arizona State.

A 2009 graduate of Tulsa, Marion was a record-setting receiver for the Golden Hurricane. In two seasons at Tulsa (2007-08), he compiled 2,356 yards on 82 receptions with 19 touchdowns. He was a two-time All-Conference USA selection and the 2007 C-USA Newcomer of the Year. Marion set NCAA records for yards per catch in both a season (31.9 in 2007) and a career (28.7).

Prior to Tulsa, he was a standout at De Anza College. In 2006, he led California's junior colleges with 1,196 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns on 60 receptions. Following his collegiate playing career, Marion signed free agent contracts with the NFL's Miami Dolphins, as well as the Canadian Football League's Montreal Alouettes.

A native of Greensburg, Pennsylvania, Marion was a four-year letterman in three different sports (football, basketball and track) at Greensburg Salem High School. Marion has two children, Mariah and Brennan.

MIKE SCHERER

Mike Scherer was announced as UNLV's program's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach on Jan. 5, 2023.

Scherer (SHEER) came to Las Vegas fresh from helping Arkansas win the AutoZone Liberty Bowl over Kansas. As the Razorbacks

linebacker coach, he served as interim defensive coordinator for head coach Sam Pittman after Odom's departure for UNLV in early December 2022.

Scherer spent the previous two seasons as an assistant coach for the SEC school.

In his two seasons overseeing the Razorback linebackers, Scherer produced sometimes stunning results from his position group. In 2022, the Hogs featured AP First Team All-American Drew Sanders, who is projected as a first round NFL Draft pick after becoming the program's first-ever Butkus Award finalist. In 12 games, Sanders led Arkansas in tackles (103), tackles-for-loss (13.5), sacks (9.5) and forced fumbles (3). The First Team All-SEC linebacker joined Khalil Mack of Buffalo (2013) as the only two FBS players since 2000 to post 100 or more total tackles, at least 13 TFL, nine sacks, three forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and an interception in the same season. This year's LB group also featured All-SEC performer Bumper Pool, who finished as the school's career leader with 441 total tackles, as well as Freshman All-America team member Chris "Pooh" Paul.

During his first year overseeing the position in 2021, Scherer produced one of the best linebacker corps in recent memory. Grant Morgan would win the Burlsworth Trophy and Pool led the team and ranked third in the SEC in total tackles with a career-best 125 stops. Morgan and Pool teamed up with Hayden Henry to complete a tackling trio with all three making 100-plus tackles and giving Arkansas half of the top six tacklers in the conference. Scherer's linebackers helped improve an Arkansas defense that allowed 84 yards less in 2021 than 2020, including 39 fewer yards per game rushing, and shaved 12 points per game off the team's average compared to the previous campaign.

Initially serving as a defensive analyst under Odom in 2020, Scherer first stepped into an on-field coaching role for a game week that fall when Odom served as head coach during Pittman's absence due to Covid-19.

Scherer began his coaching career in 2019 as a graduate assistant at Missouri under then-head coach Odom before both moved to Fayetteville.

A native of St. Louis, Scherer played linebacker at Mizzou from 2012-16, totaling 266 tackles, 17 TFL, one sack and one interception, seeing action in 38 games over his four-year career. A knee injury limited him to seven games as a senior after posting back-to-back seasons of 90-plus tackles to rank second on the team each season.

Scherer graduated with a bachelor's degree in business from Missouri in 2016.

JAMES SHIBEST

Special Teams Coordinator

James Shibest was named special teams coordinator on Dec. 22, 2022. Shibest (“SHE-best”) is widely considered one of the sport’s top special teams minds, having won the Special Teams Coordinator of the Year award at two previous stops. A veteran of the FBS level, he also served four seasons as head coach at junior-college powerhouse Butler Community

College, winning the NJCAA national title his last two campaigns in Kansas.

Shibest most recently served as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Virginia Tech of the ACC (2016-21). He moved to Blacksburg after four seasons in the same capacity at Memphis (2012-15). Before that, Shibest spent more than a decade coaching in the SEC, directing the special teams and tight ends for Ole Miss (2008-11) after eight years on staff at his alma mater, Arkansas (2000-07). His extensive resume includes helping 15 different teams reach a bowl game.

Shibest was named the 2017 FootballScoop.com Special Teams Coach of the Year after the Hokies’ special teams enjoyed a phenomenal season, tying for the FBS lead with five blocked punts and tying for second in the nation with eight total blocked kicks. Virginia Tech led all Power Five squads by permitting 335 combined punt and kickoff return yards while the Hokies’ punt return team ranked second among FBS squads with 413 punt return yards in 2017, including a pair of TDs.

Under Shibest, punter Oscar Bradburn finished his career at Virginia Tech owning the school’s career record (43.5 avg.) and the 2019 Ray Guy Award semifinalist also set a single-season school record with a 46.5-yard average.

At Memphis, Shibest mentored the American Athletic Conference’s Special Teams Player of the Year three consecutive seasons. Kicker Jake Elliott earned the honor in both 2014 and ’15 while punter Tom Hornsey shared the award in 2013 before being named winner of the Ray Guy Award, which is annually given to college football’s best punter. With Elliott being named one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Place-Kicker Award, Memphis was the only school that fall with a semifinalist for both marquee special teams awards.

During his time at Ole Miss, Shibest’s special teams were highlighted by an NCAA statistical champion, four All-SEC honorees and two freshman award winners.

In his first season with the Rebels in 2008, he was honored as the Special Teams Coordinator of the Year by FootballScoop.com.

Shibest was a member of Houston Nutt’s Arkansas staff for eight seasons, where he coached special teams and had stints tutoring tight ends (2000-01, 2006-07) and receivers (2002-05). With the Razorbacks in 2007, Shibest coached SEC Special Teams Player of the Year Felix Jones, who was selected to the Walter Camp and Rivals.com All-American first team as a return specialist.

Shibest joined the Razorbacks in 2000 after a highly successful four-year stint as head coach at Butler County CC where he led the Grizzlies to a four-year record of 34-10 and back-to-back national titles (1998-99), earning NJCAA Coach of the Year accolades both seasons.

Shibest began his career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma State, coaching receivers in 1990 and running backs in 1991. In 1992, he began his ascent through the junior college coaching ranks as offensive coordinator at Independence (KS) Community College. After coaching the Independence defensive secondary in 1993, Shibest embarked on a two-year tenure as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks/receivers coach at Garden City (KS) CC.

A native of Houston, Texas, Shibest was a prep All-America receiver at MacArthur High School before posting a standout collegiate career as a receiver at Arkansas, earning All-Southwest Conference honors in 1984 and 1986. He amassed a then school-record 1,920 receiving yards on 97 receptions, including 10 touchdowns for the Razorbacks.

Shibest earned his bachelor’s degree in business from Arkansas in 1988. He and his wife, Dianna, are the parents of James John III and Jordyn Grace.

A veteran at his position, Vance Vice was announced as UNLV's offensive line coach on Dec. 28, 2022. He most recently spent six seasons at Virginia Tech from 2016-21 as the Hokies produced three of their top four seasons for total offense over the past 25 years during his tenure. In fact, under Vice in 2020, Virginia

Tech set a school record with 5.58 rushing yards per carry. The Hokies led the ACC that season by averaging 240.1 rushing YPG, the program's best mark since 2000, highlighted by Khalil Herbert's 1,182 rushing yards. Vice also tutored future NFL First Round Draft Pick Christian Darrisaw, who was selected 23rd overall out of Va Tech by the Minnesota Vikings in 2021.

Before moving to Blacksburg, Vice also coached under Justin Fuente at the University of Memphis for four seasons (2012-15). In 2014, the Tigers scored a school-record 471 points and led the American Athletic Conference with a 36.2 scoring average. He was part of a staff that led Memphis to what tied for the ninth-best turnaround all-time as the AAC champion Tigers posted their first 10-win season since 1938. The 10-3 Tigers won their final six league games to win the AAC championship and went on to down BYU in the inaugural Miami Beach Bowl.

Before moving to Memphis, Vice spent three seasons as the offensive line coach at ULM (2009-11), four years in the same role at Utah State (2005-08) and five seasons at Illinois State (2000-04) where he was promoted to assistant head coach his final two seasons with the Redbirds. Vice started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Georgia from 1990-91, before working at Hart County (Georgia) High School from 1992-95. He returned to the collegiate level from 1996-98, coaching tight ends at Clemson before spending one year (1999) at Murray State as the offensive line coach.

Vice was a defensive lineman and tight end at Oklahoma State and made three bowl trips with the Cowboys. The three-time All-Big Eight academic selection graduated from OSU in 1990 with a degree in secondary education. He earned a master's degree in education administration from Georgia in 1993 and an education specialist degree from Clemson in 1999. He and his wife, Kerry, have two daughters, Savannah and Sydni, and a son, Brock.

A former longtime NFL and NBA strength and conditioning coach, Jeff Fish returned to college football with the Rebels in 2023.

Fish was in private business in the sports performance world for the last half-decade after serving as the Director of Performance and

Head of Strength and Conditioning for the NBA's Phoenix Suns from 2017-18. Previous to that, Fish ran his own elite performance facility and served as a consultant after spending nearly a decade in the NFL, working as the Director of Athletic Performance for the Atlanta Falcons from 2008-12 and the Head Strength & Conditioning Coach for the then-Oakland Raiders from 2004-07.

Before returning to the professional level, Fish worked at the University of Missouri serving as Director of Strength & Conditioning for the Tiger athletics department from 2001-03. From 1998-2000, he was an assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs in his first NFL stint. Previous collegiate stops as a director came at Tulsa (1995-97) and Kent State (1994-95) after he was an assistant at Clemson from 1991-93.

Fish, who has developed four of his assistants into head NFL strength coaches and three others who would be voted an NCAA Strength & Conditioning Coach of the Year, holds the distinction of being the first Director of Performance named on both the NFL and NBA levels.

The only NFL strength and conditioning coach to be a member of the NIKE advisory board from 2012-14, the native of Ithaca, New York, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at Western Michigan from 1989-91.

A collegiate wide receiver at Western Carolina from 1986-88, Fish also played one season as a shortstop on the Catamount baseball squad. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from WCU in 1989 and his master of science in exercise science from Western Michigan in 1991.

a defensive graduate assistant coach for LSU in the SEC.



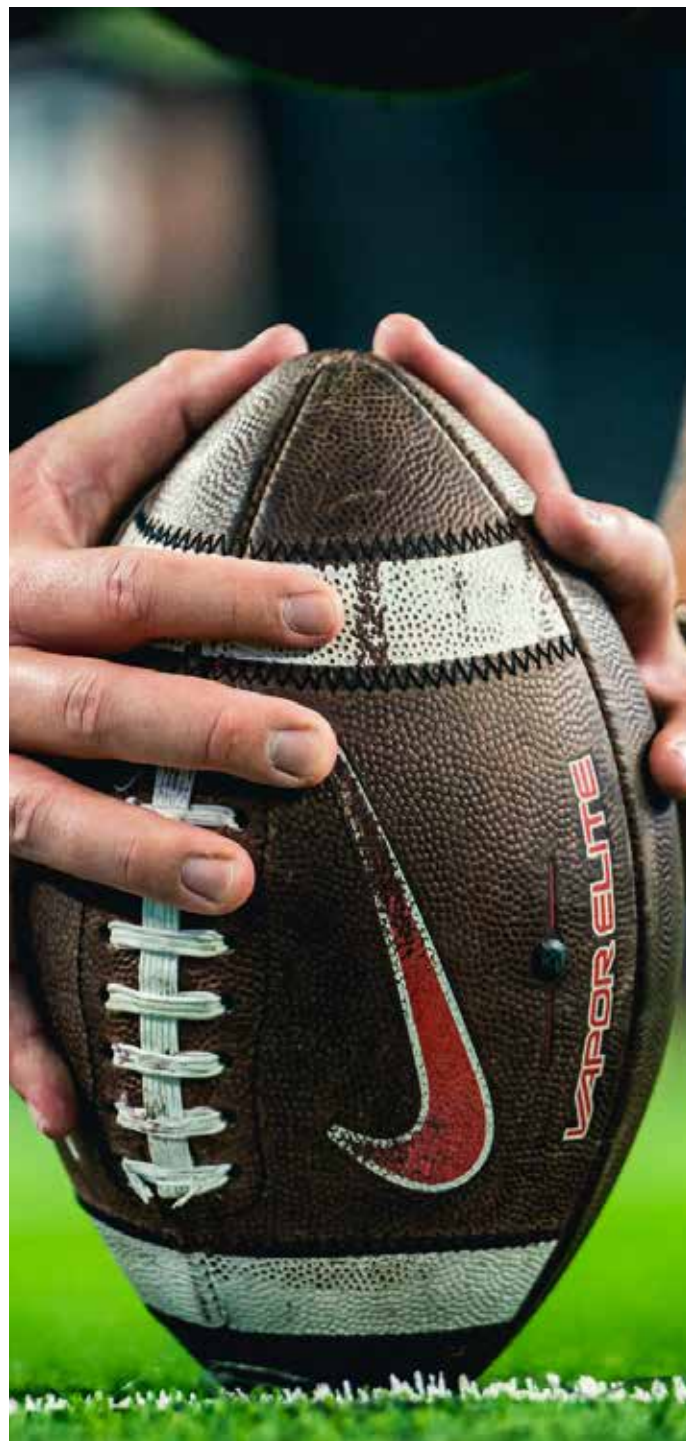
KENNETH MERCHANT
