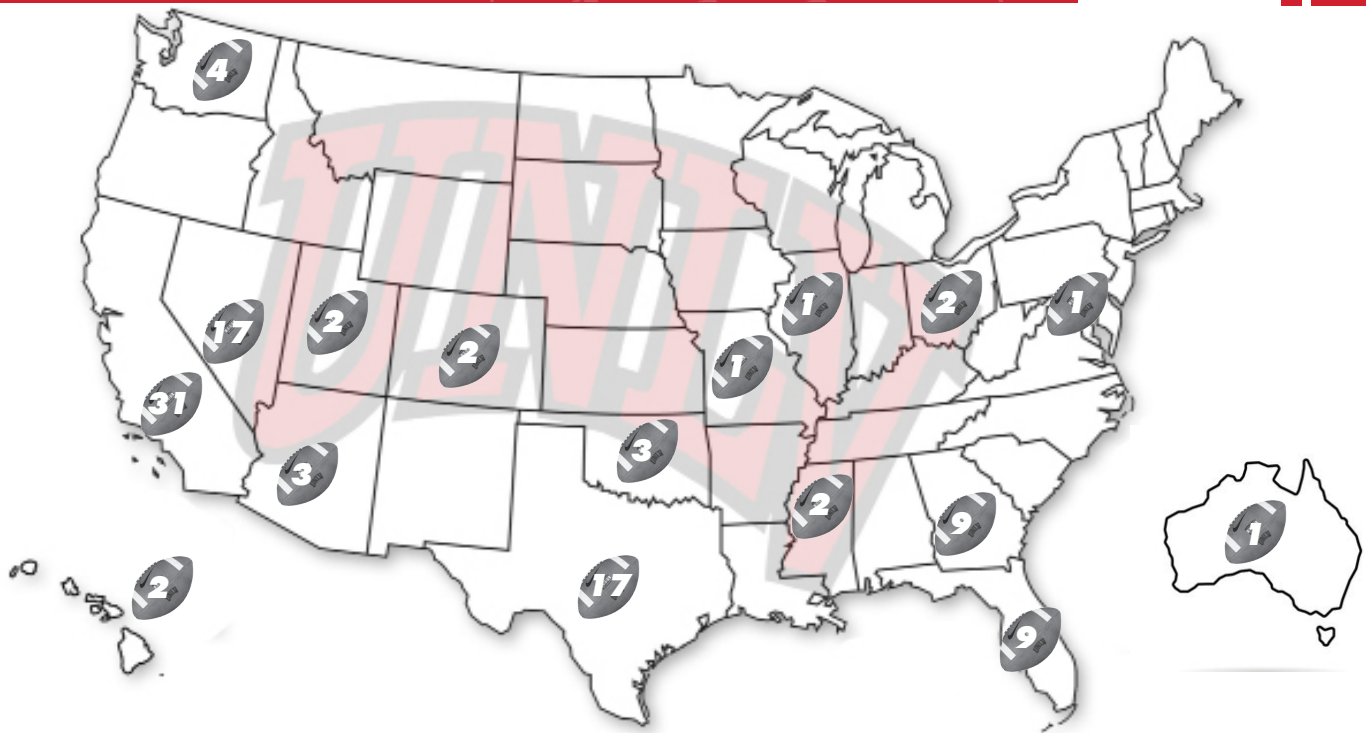

BATTLE FOR THE FREMONT CANNON

Trophy Helps Illustrate Importance of State Rivalry

Not simply a traveling trophy for the winner of the UNLV vs. UNR game, the Fremont Cannon is ever-present at the annual Battle for Nevada.

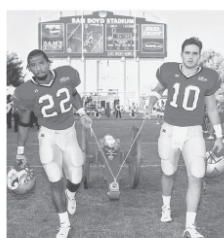
The tradition of awarding the cannon to the victors started more than five decades ago when the Rebels' first football coach, Bill Ireland, felt the young rivalry between the north and south schools could use a symbolic trophy to stimulate interest. The prize turned out to be a replica of the howitzer used by John C. Fremont, one of America's foremost trailblazers, as he headed west into Nevada in 1843. Legend has it that Fremont violated U.S. War Department rules by taking the cannon with him on his westward trek without permission and then abandoned the weapon in a Sierra-Nevada snowdrift.

Built by the Kennecott Copper Corp., Nevada Mines Division, the cannon was originally valued at more than \$10,000 and is considered one of the best, and heaviest, symbols of rivalry in college football. The Fremont is one of only two cannon prizes in all rivalry games, along with Illinois vs. Purdue. In 2014, the cannon was named the best rivalry trophy in all of college football by Yahoo! Sports.

The Wolf Pack held the cannon first because they had beaten the Rebels 30-28 in the initial game of the series in 1969. UNLV promptly won rights to the big gun in 1970 with a 42-30 home win and went on to dominate the series with eight wins in the next 11 games played. After UNR rebounded to win five straight games (1989-1993), UNLV regained the cannon in its Silver Anniversary Year in 1994.

UNLV won two straight in the series after a dramatic come-from-behind 34-29 win at Sam Boyd Stadium in 2018 and a 33-30 thriller in Reno in 2019 that marked the coldest Cannon game and also the first to go to overtime. The Rebels won for a fourth-straight time last year, 42-17, to pull to 28-23 in the all-time series, which has been continuous since 1987.

The teams will meet again in Las Vegas to close the 2026 regular season on November 28 to decide who gets to keep the Cannon!



NINTH ISLAND SHOWDOWN

Sponsored by the California Hotel

In 2017, the UNLV and Hawai'i football programs jointly introduced a new annual rivalry game -- the Ninth Island Showdown. Sponsored by the California Hotel, the winner of this annual Mountain West matchup now gets rights to the Island Showdown Trophy, which includes both a pineapple -- a Vegas-style gold pineapple -- and a variation of the Welcome to Fabulous Las Vegas sign.

Las Vegas has earned the nickname "The Ninth Island" for its long-standing popularity with Hawaiian visitors and transplants. UNLV won the inaugural game 31-23 in 2017 at Sam Boyd Stadium in Las Vegas. After Hawai'i won three consecutive installments, UNLV has won three straight, including last fall's 38-10 victory over the Warriors to give it a 5-4 lead in the Island Showdown.

The beloved "Golden Pineapple" will be up for grabs again when the squads face off in Honolulu on September 5.

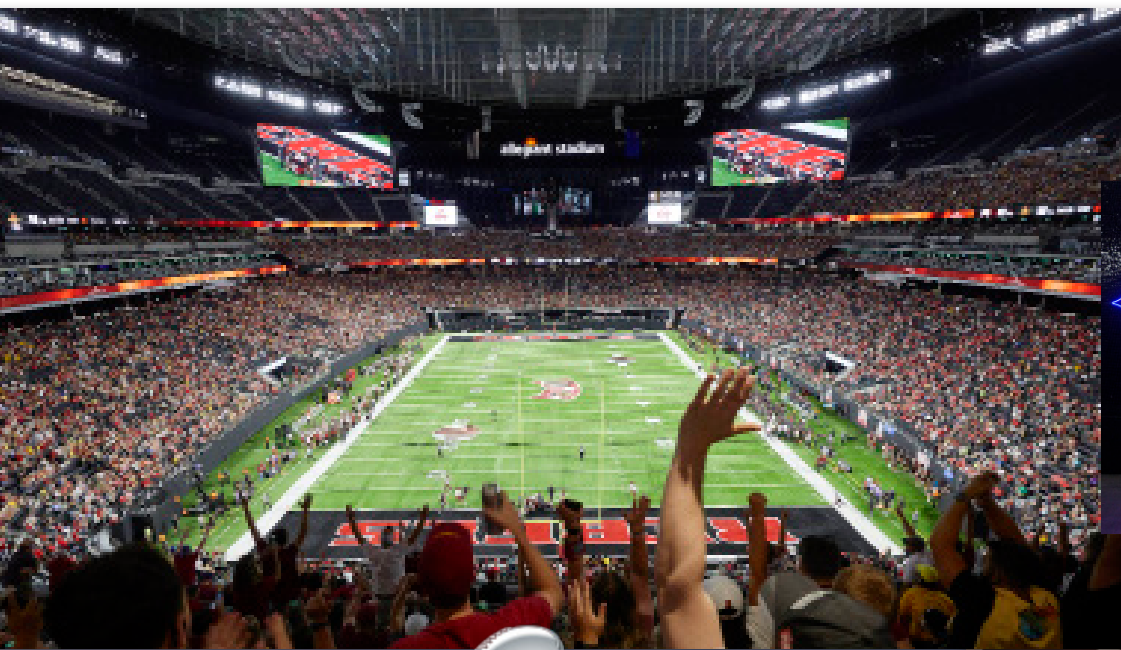

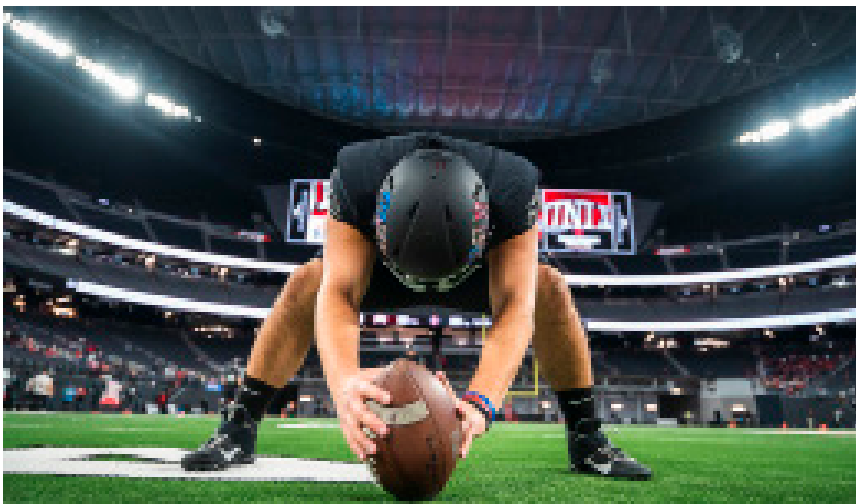
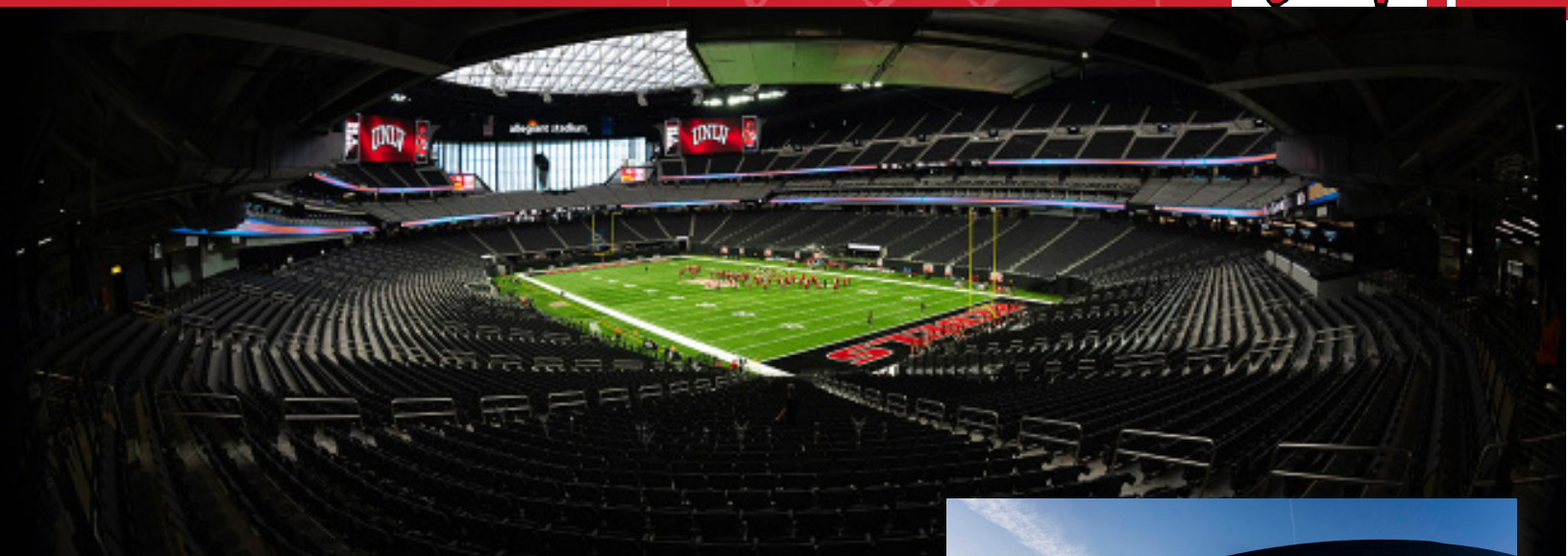

The Fertitta Football Complex, UNLV football's state-of-the-art training facility, opened in October 2019 -- three years after the Fertitta Family pledged \$10 million toward the construction of the training center, marking the largest single gift in the school's athletics history.

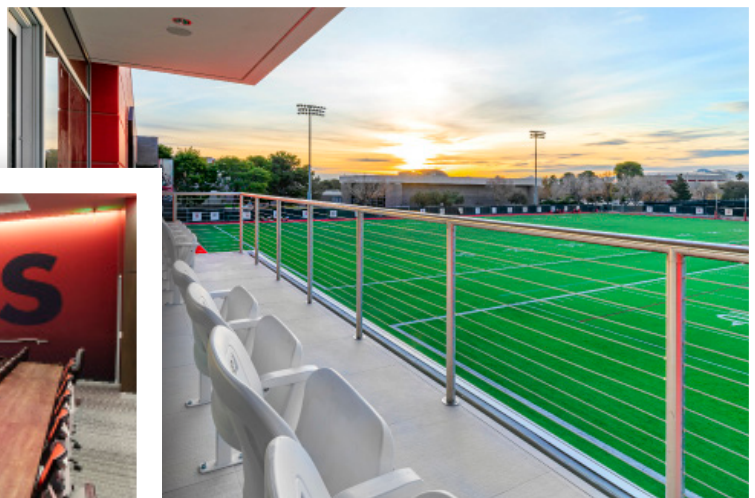
The 73,000-square-foot, two-level complex is located on campus in the north end of the team's practice area and overlooks two new practice fields at Bill "Wildcat" Morris Rebel Park. The Fertitta Football Complex serves as the day-to-day home of the program and includes an academic center, locker rooms, offices, meeting rooms, strength & conditioning center, elite recovery center, training table and nutrition bar, athletic training center and a barber shop.

The football training staff is located in a state-of-the-art Sports Medicine Center inside the \$35 million Fertitta Football Complex.

Aside from staff offices, the largest area features stations to perform various treatments to student-athletes throughout the day.

A separate rehab room flanks the main center and features a hydrotherapy room that includes whirlpools and plunge tanks.



Another milestone year in the classroom for the Rebels in 2025-26 as a record total of 42 UNLV football players earned spots on the Fall 2025 Academic All-Mountain West team. In fact, Academic Advising for Football has helped produce exactly 482 such honorees since the school joined the Mountain West in 1999. In addition, more than 50 Rebel gridders last year earned spots on the UNLV Dean's Honor List and a program-record 17 football student-athletes earned entrance into the 2026 NFF Hampshire Honor Society.

TRIO MAKES UNLV ACADEMIC HISTORY

UNLV linebacker **Jackson Woodard** made history in January 2024, becoming the first-ever Rebel football player named First Team Academic All-America® by College Sports Communicators (CSC, formerly CoSIDA). One year later he did it again and was joined by teammates **Ricky White III** and **Jalen Catalon** to make UNLV the only program with three First-Teamers. Remarkably, after never having an academic All-American, UNLV football under Associate AD for Academic Services **David Wedley** has earned six in the last six years. Following the 2020 season, all-time leading rusher **Charles Williams** became the first UNLV football player in history voted Academic All-America by the CSC, making the second team. Just one season later, lineman **Eliel Ehimare** became the first defensive player from the Rebels to make the list, also on the second team. With Woodard now a repeat honoree, White and Catalon become the 14th and 15th UNLV student-athletes from any sport to earn a spot on the national first team.

The football program also takes part in the department's Rebels Give Back initiative that sees UNLV's coaches, staff and student-athletes spread throughout the city to give involved with more than a dozen community partners.



UNLV BOASTS FOUR ALL-TIME COMMUNITY SERVICE ALL-AMERICANS

UNLV wide receiver Casey Flair was one of only 11 players in the nation named to the 2007 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Division I-A Good Works Team. The Alaska native became the fourth Rebel in six years selected to the prestigious collection of student-athletes that has been honored for its performance off the field since 1991. Former UNLV lineman Tony Terrell (Lawndale, CA) was the program's first-ever honoree in 2002 and two-time All-American safety Jamaal Brimmer (Las Vegas) earned the nod in 2004. Las Vegas native Leon Moore was honored in 2005. Nominated by their school's sports information directors and voted on by an AFCA committee, successful candidates must be heavily involved in working for charity and/or service to their community.



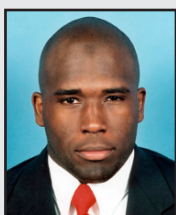

UNLV football made a historic hire on Dec. 12, 2024, as longtime SEC head coach Dan Mullen was appointed the new head coach of the Rebel football program by Director of Athletics Erick Harper.

A 103-game winner at the University of Florida and Mississippi State University, Mullen returned to the sidelines in Las Vegas after spending the previous three seasons as an ESPN college football analyst and proceeded to win more games in his first season in Las Vegas than anyone in school history. In fact, his debut season at UNLV earned him the honor of being named the national FWAAs Steve Spurrier First-Year Head Coach of the Year.

The 14th head coach in UNLV history, Mullen brought with him to the desert nearly three decades of coaching experience, including 13 as a head man. He spent nine years at the helm of MSU and a combined eight years at Florida, first as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach and returning to Gainesville to lead the program from 2018-21.

After coaching UNLV to a 10-4 mark and first-place regular-season finish in the Mountain West in 2025, Mullen headed into his second fall in the Scarlet & Gray with a 113-65 overall record and a 7-4 bowl game mark. His winning percentage in bowl games (.636) ties him for the 22nd-best such mark in college football history and he has seen 76 players under his guidance drafted in the NFL.

Additionally, Mullen was one of 28 names making up the 2025 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Watch List after guiding the Rebels to their first 6-0 start since 1974 and defeating every non-conference opponent in the same season for the first time ever. UNLV, which made a bowl trip for the third consecutive season for the first time ever, scored at least 29 points in every regular-season game en route to a top seed in the Mountain West Championship game. It marked the fifth time he has been on a Bryant Award watch list during his career.

"I am very excited to be a part of the UNLV family," said Mullen when hired by UNLV in 2024. "My expectation is to keep that excitement and momentum alive and produce a team for the University, the City of Las Vegas and the State of Nevada that is going to compete for championships on a regular basis. Our program will make the university proud and benefit

our student-athletes equally both on and off the field. I look forward to creating excitement for all UNLV Athletics and our goal is to be the premier program in the Mountain West."

Mullen compiled an overall 34-15 mark in Gainesville over four years and led UF to national prominence in just his first season. He and the Gators took the next step in his second and third seasons with an SEC Championship Game appearance to highlight the 2020 campaign. Registering an 11-2 record in 2019, Mullen and the Gators finished at No. 6 in the final Associated Press Poll, their highest finish since 2009 at No. 3. The year prior, Mullen led Florida to a 10-3 record to become the second coach in Gator history to post a top-10 finish in his first full season at the helm.



The Mullens returned to Gainesville in February 2026 to receive the Steve Spurrier First-Year Coach Award. Voted on by the FWAA, the national annual honor goes to the coach who excels during their first season at the helm of an FBS program.

HEAD COACH DAN MULLEN



On the national stage, Mullen became the first head coach in FBS history to win BCS/New Year's Six bowl games in both of his first two seasons with a program. He guided Florida to three consecutive bowl games (2018 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, 2019 Capital One Orange Bowl and 2020 Goodyear Cotton Bowl). The 2020 offense was among the most prolific in the country. The Gators led the nation in passing offense for only the second time in program history, as they averaged 378.6 yards per game (ranked fourth in SEC history). Florida finished the season ranked ninth nationally in total offense (509.8 yards per game).

Mullen took over an unranked Florida program in 2018 and the Gators achieved their second-largest turnaround in school history in terms of wins (six). Mullen, who served four seasons (2005-08) as the Gators' offensive coordinator, played a major role in the program winning two SEC and BCS National Titles (2006, 2008), spent nine seasons overseeing the Mississippi State program from 2009-17 before returning to Gainesville.

In 2014, Mullen was honored as the National College Football Coach of the Year by the Maxwell Football Club. He also garnered honors as the SEC Coach of the Year in the same season. His tenure with the Bulldogs saw the program ascend to a No. 1 ranking during the regular-season and play in a school-record eight consecutive bowl games.

As the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at UF prior to joining MSU in 2009, Mullen helped produce a Heisman Trophy, Davey O'Brien and Maxwell Award-winning quarterback (Tim Tebow), along with a Rimington Trophy finalist (Mike Degory) and a Biletnikoff Award semifinalist (Chad Jackson).

Player development has been a key to Mullen's coaching career successes. Mullen had 26 Bulldogs chosen in the NFL Draft. Dak Prescott became the highest-drafted MSU quarterback in modern NFL Draft history, going in the fourth round in 2016 to the Dallas Cowboys. Prescott joined the following QBs tutored by Mullen, who were selected in the NFL Draft: Josh Harris (Bowling Green), Omar Jacobs (Bowling Green), Alex Smith (Utah) and Tim Tebow (Florida).

Before heading to Gainesville for the first time, Mullen coached in the Mountain West as the quarterback coach for former MW-member Utah with head coach Urban Meyer, with whom he had spent 10 seasons. While coaching the Ute quarterbacks, Mullen helped develop NFL standout Alex Smith - the first overall selection in the 2005 Draft. The 2004 season culminated with Smith earning National Player of the Year honors from The Sporting News and Sports Illustrated, while also becoming the Utes' first-ever Heisman Trophy finalist.

Prior to his time in Salt Lake City, Mullen served as quarterbacks coach at Bowling Green for two seasons, helping the Falcons record 6,627 yards of total offense with 81 touchdowns during that span. Mullen spent two years before his time at Bowling Green as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame, and before that assisted with Syracuse's 1998 Big East championship and Orange Bowl run.

Mullen was born April 27, 1972, in Manchester, New Hampshire. He earned a bachelor's degree in exercise and sport science from Ursinus College in 1994 and a master's in education from Wagner College in 1996. A two-year starter at tight end for Ursinus College in Collegeville, Pennsylvania, Mullen earned First Team All-Centennial Conference honors as a senior and was inducted into the Bears Hall of Fame in 2017.

He is married to the former Megan West and the couple has two children, son Canon and daughter Breeelyn.
