Season Record: 10-4-2 (2nd in OUA West)

Playoff Record: 3-2 (OUA champions, lost to Montreal in U SPORTS quarter-final, lost to Manitoba in U SPORTS consolation semi-final)

To win a first ever OUA championship is an incredible accomplishment. To do it in the manner that the 2017 Gryphons did is the stuff of legends. Guelph began a new era with first-year head coach Shayne Campbell taking over the reins of the program. And the Gryphons quickly established themselves as a force in the OUA, jumping out to a 3-0-1 start without conceding a single goal. Guelph was certainly tough to score on, although as the season wore on, Campbell's players experienced their own offensive drought, which proved costly in a three-match stretch of two losses and a scoreless draw. The re-emergence of striker Victoria Hinchliffe, the 2016 conference Rookie of the Year and an OUA West First-team all-star, was critical to a rebound. The Guelph native found her scoring stroke and the side closed the season winning three of four matches. They showed dominance in a 5-0 win over Laurier in the OUA quarter-final, but the real tests were ahead. Guelph went down a goal on two occasions in the OUA semi-final against the UOIT Ridgebacks, who were playing on their home pitch. Hinchliffe rescued the Gryphons each time with dramatic equalizers, before eventually slotting home the winning penalty kick after extra time had solved nothing. In the final against Western, a team that had overwhelmed Guelph in a late-season 5-2 win, the Gryphons trailed again on a first-half strike. Third-year forward Hayley Howes scored the biggest goal of her career to equalize in the second half and after extra time ended goalless, kicks loomed again. Goalkeeper Libby Brenneman was heroic saving Western's first two attempts and Hinchliffe again accounted for the final kick, securing the Gryphons a banner to remember, the first OUA title in program history. By nationals, the exhausted Guelph side had nothing left. They conceded a cruel extra-time winner to Montreal before bowing out to Manitoba in the consolation round. It didn't put damper on what was the best Gryphon season ever.

2016-2017

Season Record: 9-2-5 (3rd in OUA West)

Playoff Results: 1-1 (beat Laurier in preliminary round, lost to Western in OUA Quarterfinals)

The women's soccer team set a school record for wins (9) in a season en route to finishing 3rd in the OUA West Division. In the OUA playoffs, the Gryphons would get past Laurier in a penalty shootout in the preliminary round, before falling to Western in the OUA Quarterfinals in a match that also was decided by penalties.

The Gryphons 2016 performance is even more impressive considering the Gryphs were fielding one of the youngest squads in the conference. Leading the way amongst this group of promising youth was rookie forward Victoria Hinchliffe who became the first Gryphons women's soccer player to be named OUA West Rookie of the Year. Hinchliffe, who also earned the title of OUA West First Team All-Star, finished the regular season with 9 goals in 16 games, making her the OUA's 5th-leading scorer. In total, the Gryphons had four players named OUA West All-Stars while head coach Randy Ragan was named OUA West Coach of the Year.

In 16 games played during the regular season, the Gryphons conceded just 6 goals, tying them with York for the fewest amount of goals allowed in the conference. Third year goalkeeper Libby Brenneman led the country with 10 shutouts during the regular season. In 7 games played on home soil during the regular season, Brenneman did not allow a single goal.

Playoff Results: 1-1 (lost to York in the OUA quarter-finals)

The women's soccer team finished out their regular season with a 6-10 record and earned themselves a spot in the OUA playoffs. Last year the Gryphons lost 3-0 to Western in an OUA Quarter-Final game, however this year's squad ensured the season would continue beyond their post-season trip to London. The Gryphons left London with a 1-0 victory over the No. 7 Mustangs in the opening round of the playoffs. The game's lone goal was scored by Ann-Carolyn Lang in the 11th minute. Unfortunately, the team saw their 2015 season come to an end following a 3-0 loss to the No. 2 ranked York Lions in the OUA Quarter-Final matchup.

Second year centre-back Stephanie Moore was named an OUA Second-Team All-Star despite the fact that she was forced to miss the second half of the season due to injury. Moore was a reliable force at the backline for the Gryphons and also possesses the ability to join the attack and is more than comfortable on the ball. Second-year Andrea Cimino also earned a spot on the OUA West Second Team following a season in which her coaches described her as one of the most reliable and consistent players on the pitch.

Veteran midfielder, Courtney Whiteside led the team in scoring with six goals on the year while Krista Lopoyda tallied a total of four and two game winners. The net minding duties were split between Holly Miller (1.30GAA; .780SV%) and Liz Brenneman (1.57GAA; .711SV%).

2014-2015

Playoff Record: 1-1 (beat Windsor in 1st round of OUA playoffs, lost to Western in OUA ¼)

The women's soccer team posted a 7-8-1 record during the regular season, good for fifth in the OUA West Division. As the record would indicate, it was an up-and-down regular season ride for a young Gryphons team in 2014-2015. The season started with a pair of shutout wins over Waterloo and Brock. That was followed by a five-game losing streak in which the Gryphons played some of the top ranked teams in the country extremely close, including losing to the then No. 5 York Lions 1-0. Breanna Hall finished the regular season as the Gryphons top scorer with 10, followed by Jacqueline Goulart with eight. Courtney Whiteside and Kristina Strojic each scored five goals on the season.

In the OUA playoffs, the Gryphons travelled to Windsor to face the Lancers. After a scoreless 90 minutes, the Lancers took a 1-0 lead in extra time. In the 119th minute, Guelph answered on a goal from Breanna Hall. That sent the game to a penalty shootout. After failing to score on their first penalty kick, each of the Gryphons next five players all converted from the spot. A save from Elizabeth Brenneman sealed the victory and moved the Gryphons on to the OUA quarterfinals where they faced Western.

Against the Mustangs, the Gryphons headed to extra time scoreless. This time however, the Gryphons fell short as Western scored three times in extra time to win 3-0.

Defender Sarah Magalhaes was the Gryphons lone OUA All-Star selection as she was named to the OUA West Divisions' Second Team.
