The Gryphons' cross-country program has become synonymous with success and there were early signs that Guelph would be in for another excellent season in 2018. The team opened the campaign by sweeping both the women's and men's titles at the Western International Invitational, with fourth-year man Mark Patton establishing a new course record en route to OUA Male Athlete of the Week honours in late September. The Gryphons would travel to Texas later in the season and the men came home with another team title amongst top NCAA competition at Texas A&M's Arturo Barrios Invitational. Guelph entered the OUA Championships in great shape and the women earned a silver medal thanks to Top 10 finishes from Hannah Woodhouse, Danielle Jossinet, Heather Petrick and Emma Hubbard. Patton placed second at the OUA meet, leading the Gryphon men to a bronze medal. But Guelph wasn't done and history would be made on a cold, windy day in Kingston at the U SPORTS Championships. Jossinet, a fourth-year veteran, battled her way to All-Canadian honours by placing fourth on a women's team that took Bronze. For fifth-year runner Connor Black, his final collegiate race was memorable. After missing the OUA Championships with a foot injury, Black showed an incredible kick down the stretch to finish his career with a gratifying gold medal and Athlete of the Year honours. That performance helped the Guelph men place second overall in the team competition.

OUA Championships: Men – champions, Women - bronze

U SPORTS Championships: Men – champions, Women - 5th

With their incomparable success, the Gryphons are the envy of U SPORTS programs across Canada. Head coach Dave Scott-Thomas, who swept the OUA men's and U SPORTS Coach of the Year awards, saw the talented members of his cross country team flex their muscles again in 2017. Guelph's men were led by fourth-year captain Connor Black, winning the H.R. Little Cup as the OUA champions for the 16th time in 19 years. Black took the individual gold in Windsor amongst a competitive field of 93 runners to help the Gryphons lift the banner yet again. Andrew Shepherd, Mark Patton and Mitchell Ubene were all named Second Team OUA All-Stars. The Guelph women were impressive throughout the season but had their incredible streak of 13 consecutive OUA championships snapped when they placed third for a bronze medal, behind the top two teams in U SPORTS, Queen's and Toronto. Danielle Jossinet, Sarah Wismer and Hannah Woodhouse were Second Team OUA All-stars.

The Gryphon men were far from done after the triumph in Windsor. At the U SPORTS championship meet held in Victoria, B.C., Guelph earned its 14th title in 19 years, with Black once again anchoring the group. The Human Kinetics major from Forest, ON navigated the muddy course in a time of 31:19, good for the silver medal, only four seconds behind Laval's two-time individual champion Yves Sikubwabo. Black was a First Team All-Canadian, while Patton made the Second Team. The women were dealt a harsh blow at Nationals when captain Charlotte Ward was forced to drop out of the race with an injury. Jossinet finished 10th among the 151 runners to earn Second Team All-Canadian honours, while helping the Gryphons to a fifth-place finish. The future of the Gryphon dynasty is secure considering that all 14 athletes who ran in Victoria are eligible to return for the 2018 season.

In 2016, the Gryphons women's cross country team continued their remarkable run of team championships at both the provincial and national levels. On Sunday, October 30th the OUA Cross Country Championships were hosted by U of T at Centennial Park in Etobicoke. The Gryphons dominated, claiming their 13th consecutive OUA title with a total of five Gryphon runners earning OUA All-Star status. At the CIS Championships in Quebec City, the Gryphons women's team won their 12th straight national title, setting a new CIS record for consecutive national titles (surpassing UBC's women's swim team who won 11 straight national titles from 1997-98 to 2007-08). Fourth year runner Katelyn Ayers was the first Gryphon to cross the finish line at the CIS Championships, earning a Bronze medal. Gryphons head coach Dave Scott-Thomas was named Coach of the Year on the women's side at both the OUA and CIS level.

On the men's side, the Gryphons fielded their youngest squad in 19 years at the OUA's. It was also the first time in 19 years that the men finished outside the top two teams at the provincial level. The men were led by three OUA All-Stars in Brayden Seneca (7th), Benjamin Workman (9th) and Mark Patton (11th). The Gryphons finished 3rd in the team standings behind Windsor and Western, as the Mustangs were able to finally put an end to Guelph's remarkable 11 consecutive OUA titles. At the CIS Championships in Quebec City, the Gryphons men's team finished 9th out of 21 schools in the team standings. Brayden Seneca was the first Gryphon to cross the finish line at nationals, finishing 23rd in the field.

OUA Championship Results: Men & Women Gold Medalists

CIS Championship Results: Men Silver Medalists & Women Gold Medalists

For the 11th straight year, the Gryphons men's cross country team was crowned OUA Champions. Of those 11 provincial titles, never had there been one this close. The Gryphons finished just 1 point ahead of second place Windsor in what quickly became a three-school race for the title between Guelph, Windsor and McMaster all in the chase for an OUA banner. The Marauders ultimately finished with a bronze in the team standings, just 11 points back of Guelph. The Gryphons were led by Aaron Hendrikx (4th) and Tristan Woodfine (5th) at the OUA Championships, which were hosted by the University of Waterloo.

It would be the Gryphons turn to host when it came time for the CIS Championships. For the first time since 2005, somebody other than Guelph won the team title on the men's side. The Victoria Vikes ended the Gryphons streak of 9 straight CIS team titles. Despite the fact the Gryphons did not come out on top of the team standings, where they finished 2nd, the first athlete across the finish line was wearing red, black and gold. Aaron Hendrikx ended his Gryphon career by being named CIS Male Athlete of the Year. It marked the second time in his career that Hendrikx earned the title of individual champion at the CIS Cross Country Championships after also having accomplished the feat in 2013 at Western.

The women's cross country team continued their dynasty in 2015-16. The team tied a CIS record by winning their 11th straight CIS title this year, and now share the national record for most consecutive national titles with the UBC women's swimming team. The Gryphons didn't earn an individual medal at nationals, which was hosted in Guelph, but placed two runners in the top ten. Katrina Allison finished sixth and was named a First Team All-Canadian while Katelyn Ayers was eighth and named to the Second Team. At the OUA Championships the Gryphons earned their 12th straight conference banner. The individual battle at the front was very exciting as six athletes were battling for podium positions throughout the race. Katelyn Ayers finished fourth overall and Katrina Allison sixth. Both were named OUA First Team All-Stars. Danielle Jossinet took home OUA Rookie of the Year honours after being the first rookie to cross the line, finishing 10th overall and was also named a Second Team All-Star. Once again, head coach Dave Scott-Thomas was selected by his peers as the OUA Women's Coach of the Year.

The event overall was the first time the Gryphons played host to the CIS Cross Country championships in 11 years.

Championship Results: Men & Women OUA & CIS Gold Medalists

The dynasty continues. In 2014, the Gryphon men's and women's cross country teams completed their ninth consecutive team title sweep at the CIS Championships, which were held in St. John's, Newfoundland for the first time. The Gryphons also took home top spot in the individual competition for both men's and women's, with Ross Proudfoot and Carise Thompson being named Male and Female MVP's. The Gryphons had not swept all four CIS titles – individual and team – since 2011. With the result, the Gryphon women have now won 10 straight CIS Championships, while the men have taken home nine straight CIS banners.

In early October, the Gryphons travelled to Pennsylvania to take part in one of the premiere cross country events on the NCAA calendar in the Paul Short Run at Lehigh University. The Gryphons did not just hang with some of the best that the NCAA had to offer, they dominated. On the women's side, the Gryphons beat the fifth and sixth ranked NCAA teams (Georgetown & Florida State) by a combined 75 points while placing four athletes in the top seven finishers. Katrina Allison and Heather Petrick had silver and bronze medal showings, as both crossed the line in 19 minutes 58 seconds (both performances moved into the top ten all-time in the meet's 41-year history). The Gryphon men also had their best ever showing at the Paul Short Run, finishing second overall.

At the OUA Championships, the Gryphons swept both the team and individual titles with Ross Proudfoot and Heather Petrick leading the way. For the men, it marked their 10th straight OUA title. For the women, it marked their 11th straight OUA title. In Proudfoot's five years competing at the OUA Championships, he has won the individual title twice, finished second twice, and finished fifth in his rookie year.

To say conditions were difficult at the CIS Championships would be an understatement. With winds peaking around 110 km/h and sometimes hail-like conditions facing the athletes, the Gryphons were nevertheless able to run away and claim both the team and individual titles. Proudfoot took top spot in the men's 10-kilometre race with a time of 33:47.2. On the women's side, Carise Thompson, who was coming off second-place finishes each of the past two years, captured the women's gold medal in the six-kilometre event thanks to a time of 22 minutes and 42.2 seconds.

Dave Scott-Thomas was named male and female coach of the year for both the OUA and CIS. He has been named the CIS men's cross country coach of the year nine straight years. Overall, Scott-Thomas has been named CIS coach of the year 23 times (13 times on the men's side, 10 times on the women's).

2013-2014

Championship Results: Men & Women OUA & CIS Gold Medalists

The cross country teams continued to set records in the 2013 season claiming both the men's and women's OUA and CIS Team Championships. The women won their tenth OUA consecutive championship, with the men winning their ninth. At the national championships, the women's team earned their ninth and the men their eighth straight CIS banner. At the CIS Championships, the Gryphons tallied an incredible 13 All-Canadians, swept the rookie of the year awards and had three of the six individual medalists.

At the OUA Championships, the Gryphon men's team swept the podium. Aaron Hendrixx won his first OUA title, Ross Proudfoot grabbed the silver and Tristan Woodfine captured bronze. Andrew Nixon earned himself fourth overall, giving the Gryphons a sweep of the top four places while Christian Gravel placed ninth. Hendrixx was named the OUA MVP and Woodfine received the OUA rookie of the year award. At the CIS Championships, Hendrixx continued his domination, taking home the gold and CIS MVP honours. Rookie standout Woodfine earned a CIS silver and the rookie of the year award. Overall, the Gryphons easily captured the team title with a team score of 22 points, their second best total ever. Rounding out the top Gryphon finishes were Nixon (4th), Proudfoot (7th), Yves Sikubwabo (8th) and Gravel (13th). All six were named All-Canadians. Dave Scott-Thomas was named the CIS coach of the year.

For the women, Carise Thompson earned a bronze medal at the OUA Championships to lead the team. The Gryphons swept the next four spots with Madeline Yungblut finishing fourth, Heather Petrick (5th), Katrina Allison (6th) and Geneviève Lalonde (7th). Rounding out the scoring was Robyn Mildren securing a top ten finish placing ninth overall, while Joanna Brown finished 14th insuring all seven Gryphon runners received OUA all-star distinctions. Petrick was awarded the OUA rookie of the year award. At the CIS Championships, the Gryphons placed seven runners in the top 14 with Thompson taking home the silver medal. Rookie Petrick was fourth overall and named the CIS rookie of the year. Rounding out the rest of the Gryphon All-Canadians was Yungblut (7th), Lalonde (8th), (10th), Brown (12th) and Mildren (13th).

Championship Results: Men & Women OUA & CIS GOLD Medalists

The cross country teams continued to push forward in the record books after another memorable chapter to their legacy as they once again claimed both the men's and women's OUA and CIS Team Championships. Head Coach Dave Scott-Thomas was named CIS Coach of the Year for his contributions to both the men's and women's success.

The Gryphon men captured their seventh consecutive CIS team title to build on their CIS record. At the CIS Championships, the team closed the day with 2-3-4 finish in the 10km race. Ross Proudfoot (Sudbury, Ont.) led the Gryphon pack with a silver, four seconds ahead of teammate Aaron Hendrikk (Parkhill, Ont.) for the 2-3 finish. Defending CIS Champion, Aaron Nixon (Thunder Bay, Ont.) placed fourth and, with an impressive finish to his rookie year, Yves Sikubwabo (Ottawa, Ont.) was seventh place and became the fourth Gryphon to be named First Team All-Canadian. At the OUA Championships, the Gryphon men earned their eighth consecutive banner.

Aaron Hendrikk was sixth, these four Gryphons were recognized as OUA First Team All-Stars.

The Gryphon women captured their eighth consecutive CIS team title. At the CIS Championships, the Gryphons placed six runners in the top ten including an impressive 1-2 finish. Andrea Seccafien (Guelph, Ont.) claimed her first CIS title; just over six seconds ahead of teammate Carise Thompson (Lynden, Ont.). With an impressive third place finish, Madeline Yungblut claimed bronze as well as recognition as the OUA's Rookie of the Year. Championship Results: Men & Women OUA & CIS Gold Medalists

The Gryphon cross country team added another memorable chapter to their ever growing legacy, once again claiming both the men's and women's OUA and CIS Team Championships.

The Gryphon men captured their sixth consecutive CIS team title, a CIS record. At the CIS championships, the team finished the 10-km race with a championship-low 20 points, including a 1-2 finish. Andrew Nixon (Thunder Bay, ON) won the individual title with a time of 31:42.8, six seconds faster than teammate, Alex Genest (Lac-aux-Sables, QC) with a time of 31:48.6. Ross Proudfoot (Sudbury, ON) clocked in at 31:59.1 to take the fourth spot, Aaron Hendriks (Parkhill, ON) claimed sixth with a time of 32:15.4 and Allan Brett (Ottawa, ON) rounded out the top ten in the seventh spot with a time of 32:22.6. All five were named First Team All-Canadians. Nixon was awarded CIS Athlete of the Year while Hendriks captured the CIS Rookie of the Year title. At the OUA Championships, the Gryphon men earned their seventh consecutive banner for Guelph in Ottawa, ON. Nixon led the team with a time of 30:51.8 and was named the OUA MVP. Finishing just two seconds behind Nixon, was teammate and 2010 OUA Rookie of the Year, Proudfoot who bettered last year's fourth place finish with second place in a time of 30:53.9, while Genest finished fourth and Hendriks placed sixth. Hendriks's performance was enough to earn him OUA Rookie of the Year and he was the first rookie under 21 years of age and in his first year of eligibility to cross the finish line with a time of 31:15.0. All six men were recognized as First Team All-Stars along with Allan Brett (Ottawa, ON) who placed seventh. Tommy Lecours (Quebec City, QC) finished twelfth and was named a Second Team All-Star.

The Gryphon women won their eighth OUA team title and their seventh consecutive CIS team title. At the CIS Championships in the women's five-kilometre event, the Gryphons placed five runners in the top 10 to finish with 31 points. Genevieve Lalonde (Moncton, NB) once again led the Gryphon squad to victory and finished first overall with a time of 18:00.04. Carise Thompson (Lynden, ON) placed fourth with a time of 18:16.5, Lydia Frost (St. Andrews, ON) placed seventh clocking 18:29.5. All three were named First Team All-Canadians. Lindsay Furtado (Brampton, ON) came in tenth with a time of 18:37.5, close behind was Andrea Seccafien (Guelph, ON) 18:39.7 and Nadine Frost (St. Andrews) with a time of 18:40.4. Rounding out the top 14 was Joanna Brown (Carp, ON) with a time of 18:47.3. All four women were named Second Team All-Canadians. At the OUA Championships, the Gryphons won the team title for the eighth straight season. They were led by Lalonde who was second with a time of 17:46.1, Seccafien was third with 17:49.7, and rounding out the top finishers was Thompson in fifth. All three were First Team OUA All-Stars. Rookie Joanna Brown was named OUA Rookie of the Year after a 15th place finish.

The Gryphon cross country team added another illustrious chapter to their ever growing legacy, once again winning both the men's and women's OUA and CIS banners.

The Gryphon men captured their fifth consecutive CIS men's team title and ninth crown in 12 years. At the CIS Championships, the team finished the 10-km race with 24 points finishing 1-2-4-6-11. Kyle Boorsma (Guelph, Ont.) won the individual title with a time of 31:53.0. Boorsma led four Gryphons in the top six as teammate Alex Genest (Lac-aux-Sables, Que.) was second, Allan Brett (Ottawa, Ont.) fourth, and rookie Ross Proudfoot (Sudbury, Ont.) sixth. Second-year Andrew Nixon (Thunder Bay, Ont.) rounded out the Gryphon scorers with his 11th place finish. All five were named All-Canadian. Proudfoot was awarded the CIS Rookie of the Year and Boorsma captured MVP honours. At the OUA Championships, the Gryphon men earned their sixth consecutive banner for Guelph, as the Gryphons hosted the OUA Championships. The Gryphons swept the medal podium and had five of the top six runners. Alex Genest led the team in a time of 30:30.5 and was named the men's OUA MVP. Finishing nine seconds behind Genest was teammate Kyle Boorsma who won back-to-back OUA silvers. Allan Brett (Ottawa), the two-time defending OUA champion finished third, while first year Ross Proudfoot was fourth and was named the OUA men's Rookie of the Year. Andrew Nixon rounded out the top five finishers in sixth place. All five were named OUA first-team all-stars. Tommy Mosher (Toronto, Ont.) finished 14th and was named a second-team All-Star.

The Gryphon women earned their sixth consecutive CIS team title. Rachel Cliff (Vancouver, B.C.) led the Gryphons contingent and finished second overall with a time of 17:50.0. Genevieve Lalonde (Moncton, N.B.) earned her first ever CIS medal, finishing third with a time of 18:14.0. The Gryphons had an incredible six of their seven competitors obtain All-Canadian status. Jessica Vanhie (Ailsa Craig, Ont.) finished 10th, Lindsay Furtado (Brampton, Ont.) was 11th and Emily Driedger (Georgetown, Ont.) was 14th and was also named the Rookie of the Year. At the OUA Championships, the Gryphon women won their seventh straight title. The team was led by Rachel Cliff and Courtney Laurie (North York, Ont.), finishing second and third respectively. Rookie Emily Driedger and Genevieve Lalonde were fifth and sixth respectively. Driedger was named the OUA Rookie of the Year and the top seven finishers were named OUA first-team all-stars. Championship Results: Men & Women OUA & CIS Gold Medalists

The 2009 edition of Gryphon cross country had a magical run which saw the Gryphons win both the men's and women's OUA and CIS banners. The Gryphons proved they are in a class of their own, having won both CIS team titles for a record fourth straight year. Guelph became the most successful cross country program in CIS history with the most CIS banners captured by a single school, with 15.

The Gryphon men earned their fourth consecutive CIS banner. Overall it is Guelph's ninth men's title, tying a CIS all-time record for most first-place finishes. At the National Championships, the Gryphons cruised through the race with three runners among the first five to cross the finish line and were named First Team All-Canadians, including individual champion Matt Brunsting (Stirling, ON) who won for the second straight season, silver medalist Kyle Boorsma (Guelph, ON) and Allan Brett (Ottawa, ON) who finished fifth. Individual honours were awarded to Brunsting as the CIS Athlete of the Year and Dave Scott-Thomas was named the CIS Men's Coach of the Year for the fourth straight season. At the OUA Championships, the Gryphons earned their fifth consecutive banner and swept the medal podium. Two time individual champion Allan Brett took the first place spot, while Kyle Boorsma and Matt Brunsting finished second and third respectively. Overall the Gryphons finished with five of the top six runners and earned a total of six OUA all-star honours. In addition Allan Brett was named the OUA MVP while Dave Scott Thomas was named the OUA Men's Coach of the Year for the fifth straight season.

The Gryphon women's squad won its fifth straight CIS team title and also entered the history books becoming the first team to earn five championship banners in a row. The team finished with a 57-point tally blowing away the competition as Toronto was second at 144 points. Leading the way for Guelph once again was Lindsay Carson (Cambridge, ON) with a silver medal finish, which earned her first team All-Canadian honours. Rachel Cliff and Genevieve Lalonde finished eighth and ninth respectively and were named second team All-Canadians. Lalonde was also named the CIS Women's Rookie of the Year and Dave Scott-Thomas earned his fifth straight Women's CIS Coach of the Year award. At the OUA Championships, the women's team won their sixth consecutive title, setting an OUA record for most consecutive wins. Three Gryphons finished in the top five including Rachel Cliff, Courtney Laurie and Genevieve Lalonde who finished third, fourth and fifth respectively and earned OUA first team all-star honours. Lalonde was named the OUA Women's Rookie of the Year. Dave Scott Thomas was named the OUA Women's Coach of the Year.

The Men's Cross Country team won both the OUA and CIS banners this year. They were ranked No. 1 in the CIS in all seven polls this season. At the OUA Championships, the team left with their fourth consecutive banner. Allan Brett (Ottawa, ON) and Matt Brunsting (Sterling, ON) collected the top two podium positions, with Brett claiming the race with a time of 33:23.3 and Brunsting three seconds behind (33:36.9). Joe Brunsting (Sterling, ON) rounded out the OUA All-Stars in seventh place. These three were named as OUA First Team All-Stars. Teammates Derek Snider (9th), Rob Jackson (10th), John Parrott (11th) and Josh Roundell (13th) earned Second Team All-Star honours. In addition to the seven OUA All-Star awards, Allan Brett was named the OUA MVP, while Rob Jackson was named the OUA Rookie of the Year and Dave Scott Thomas was named the OUA Coach of the Year for the fourth straight season. Meanwhile, Angus Macaulay (Guelph, Ont.) and Joseph Brunsting (Stirling, Ont.) were 9th and 10th respectively and were named Second Team All-Stars. Dave Scott-Thomas was awarded the OUA Coach of the Year for the second straight season. At the CIS Championships, the team entered the record books sweeping the 2007 men's and women's titles becoming the first school in CIS history to return home with double gold in consecutive years. Guelph placed three runners in the top ten, with Matthew Brunsting (Stirling, Ont.) just missing the podium in fourth place, Kyle Boorsma and Joseph Brunsting were 7th and 10th, respectively. Boorsma and Matthew Brunsting earned First Team All-Canadians and Joseph Brunsting made Second Team. Dave Scott-Thomas was named the CIS Men's Coach of the Year for the second straight season.

They won their second straight OUA title and sixth overall OUA title in the last ten years. The team dominated the provincial championships placing all five of their scoring runners in the top seven finishers, all of who garnered OUA All-Star status. Leading the team across the finish line was Steve Koziarski who finished second while team captain Greg Hutchinson captured the bronze medal. Rounding out the top Gryphons were Brendan Hunt (4th), Matt Brunsting (5th) and Kyle Boorsma (7th). To cap off their season, they captured the team title at the CIS Championships in Quebec City. The CIS banner was the first since the Gryphons' four-year title-run from 1999-2002. 2001-2002

2001 marked the first time in 13 years that the University of Guelph had hosted the OUA Cross Country Championships. Furthermore, it was the last year of competition for many of the runners who have built the Gryphon powerhouse. In front of the hometown crowd, Guelph was impressive capturing the Men's and Women's title for the third straight year. The Gryphons grabbed 4 of 6 individual medals and 8 All-Star spots. Michaela McClure took top honours as she won the gold medal and was named the OUA MVP for the season. Leslie Carson and Kristina Rody also had powerful runs taking the bronze and 4th spots. On the Men's side, Steve Bendo, Reid Coolsaet and Taylor Murphy brought home silver, bronze and 4th place finishes. Dave Scott-Thomas was selected OUA Male Coach of the Year. At the CIS Championships, the Gryphons capped off an extraordinary meet with six All-Canadian selections; one individual medallist, a 4th place and a National team finish; two qualifiers for the World University Cross Country Championships and the Men's CIS Coach of the Year Honours. In one of the tightest team finishes in the CIS's history, only 9 points separated the 2nd to 5th place teams, the female Gryphons tied for 3rd but finished 4th on a tiebreaker. McClure garnered the bronze for First Team All-Canadian status and qualified to represent Canada at the World University Championships in Spain. Rody, the team captain, was Guelph's first 3-time All-Canadian woman with a 9th place finish. With an experienced crew, the Men brought home their third straight national title. Reid Coolsaet had a stunning run for 4th place overall, earned First Team All-Canadian honours and also qualified for the World University Championships. Steve Bendo, Taylor Murphy and Mark Vollmer were named Second Team All-Canadians.

It was a rare day at the OUA Championships when so many Guelph runners hit a major race so well. OUA MVP, Steve Bendo, captured the gold (for his second individual title in 3 years) while Reid Coolsaet grabbed the silver and Taylor Murphy, the bronze en route to the team title. In fact, the Gryphs boasted an OUA record for the largest margin of victory (over McMaster by 67 points) and the OUA record for lowest point total ever, 19, beating the score of 20 set by Ottawa in the mid-80's. Six of the top 9 finishers were Gryphons. At the CIAU's, the Gryphons were by far the dominant school repeating as national champions.
