The Gryphons completed another championship winning season in 2022-23, their second in as many years and fifth in program history. The team opened the season with a hard-fought 38-31 victory over the Laurier Golden Hawks before going on to win their next three matches over the RMC Paladins, Trent Excalibur, and McMaster Marauders by a combined 156-31. In their fifth game of the regular season, they hosted the Queen's Gaels in a rematch of the 2021-22 gold medal game and with both teams undefeated the game would most likely decide home-field advantage for the OUA playoffs. The Gaels would avenge their championship loss and hand the Gryphons their first loss of the season with a 29-12 win. In their final regular season game, the Gryphons took down the Brock Badgers 28-22 and after finishing 3rd in the OUA they would take on the Badgers for the second time in as many weeks, this time in the OUA quarterfinals. In a back-and-forth affair the Gryphons narrowly defeated the Badgers 34-33 to advance to the semifinal round where they would take on the Western Mustangs. After taking down the Mustangs in London 36-24 the Gryphons set up a championship match with Wifrid Laurier after the Golden Hawks upset the Queen's Gaels in the semifinals. In a windy, snowy game at the Guelph Grass Rugby Pitch the Gryphons captured their fifth OUA title in program history with a 28-19 win.

At the Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship, the Gryphons opened the tournament with an incredible win over the Memorial Seahawks. On the final play of the game Brenden Black broke free and ran in a game-winning try to secure a 28-22 quarterfinal win. In the semifinal round the Gryphons took on the host UBC Thunderbirds. The Gryphons fell 37-17 to the eventual national champions. In the bronze medal game, the team once again edged out their opponent for a narrow victory, this time taking down the Trinity Western Spartans in a thrilling match. The win marked the first national podium finish for the Gryphons, after previously finishing fourth in 2017 and 2021.

The Gryphons opened their season at home with a bang with a steady defeat of the Waterloo Warriors 74-7. Riding high off this victory, they went on to complete a perfect 4-0 season. They headed into the OUA playoffs at the top seed in the West where they defeated the Brock Badgers in the West Division Final to advance to the OUA gold medal match. They came face to face once again with the Queen's Gaels, who defeated the Gryphons last season in the very same match to earn their third straight OUA championship. This year the Gryphs took their revenge and brought the Gaels streak to halt, defeating them 37-26 to capture the team's 4th championship banner. The Gryphons headed to the Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship as the No.2-seed where they began by defeating the Calgary Dinos in the Quarterfinal but lost to the Victoria Vikes in the Semifinals. The Gryphon's season ended with a 4th place finish in the Canadian University Men's Rugby Championships after falling to the Queens Gaels in their second post season match up. Collin Smibert led the way for the Gryphons and the OUA as the 1st place stats leader with 55 points. With more than 10 points separating him and the second-place player, the fourth-year winger was a key offensive addition to the team. Rookie Connor McKinney had an excellent first season as a Gryphon, placing 8th overall in the OUA with 20 points (tied with fellow flanker Max Goodwin). His impressive first season with the Gryphons earned him the title of OUA Rookie of the Year (the first since Brandon McLeod in 2014). He led all Gryphons with six tries and placed in the top three in team tackles, completes, breakdown turnovers and meters gained. Team Captain Aria Keshoofy returned for another successful campaign where he became only the second Gryphon ever to earn the Trillium award for the best all-around player (the first being Jeremy Wright in 2014).

The Guelph Gryphons rugby team came into the 2019 campaign with high aspirations to reach their 6th straight OUA Championship and 3rd straight Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship. The team started off on its winning ways by defeating Waterloo and Western. Similar to last year, the team suffered their only loss to Queen's. Continuing the theme from last year, the Gryphons won three straight to close out the year while outscoring their opponents 132-74 in that stretch. The focus was on the OUA playoffs which started with a home semi-final game against Trent. The Gryphons dominated their semi-final matchup and won 53-7. The gold medal final was a highly contested affair taking place on Queen's home field with Queen's coming out on top 28-17. With the OUA silver medal, the team booked their ticket to the Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship at Concordia. The Gryphons suffered a heart wrenching defeat to host Concordia 7-10 in the quarter-final round. After losing to Brock in the consolation semi-final, they would square off with UNB. Guelph would go on to win this game in decisive fashion 79-5 and finishing in 7th place. Coach Cory Hector has much to be proud of as his team produced 3 Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship All-Stars and 8 OUA All-Star nods. Guerschom Mukendi was the lone Gryphon to receive all-star nods from both the Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship and the OUA.

There was a noticeable fire among the Gryphon players at the team's offseason camp. An experienced side with several key fifth-year players had their sights set on reaching a fifth consecutive OUA championship match and Guelph was well on its way after winning its first four games of the OUA season without conceding more than 14 points in any of them. The Gryphons suffered their only regular season loss against the defending champion Queen's Gaels in the fifth match but rebounded to go 3-0 down the stretch, outscoring opponents by a combined total of 174-38. The real test for head coach Cory Hector and his talented side that included veterans like Kolby Francis, Kyle Lagasca, John Sheridan, Jordan Hofstra, and team MVP Marcello Wainwright, was still ahead. Guelph's season hung in the balance while trailing big to the Laurier Golden Hawks in the second half of their OUA semi-final matchup at Varsity Field. But the team produced 22 unanswered points, capped by an incredible effort from fifth-year lock Mac Kea, who touched down for the winning try in the dying minutes of the match for a 34-26 comeback victory. Guelph advanced to the final but could not contain a powerful Queen's Gaels team that repeated as OUA champions after a 48-10 win. The berth in the final earned the Gryphons a trip to the Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship but they couldn't get past the defending national champ UBC Thunderbirds in the first match of the tournament. Guelph fell to Concordia in the next game but ended the season on a high with a decisive 62-14 win over the UNB Ironmen in the fifth-place match. Wainwright, Kea, Andrew Douglas, and Riley DiNardo earned OUA All-Star honours.

There was a mix of elation and disappointment for the Gryphons, who entered the 2017 season as the reigning OUA champions. Guelph had several different faces on the team but was still the same nightmare for its OUA competition, boasting a combination of power and speed that helped pile up wins. The Gryphons, led by veterans like Marcello Wainwright, Kyle Lagasca, two-sport athlete Scott Simmonds, and breakout rookie fly half John Sheridan, came flying out of the gate, winning four straight matches before a setback in Kingston to the undefeated Queen's Gaels. The 34-26 loss gave head coach Cory Hector's team plenty of incentive to finish the season strong.

The Gryphons were essentially perfect down the stretch, outscoring Laurier, Trent and Western by a combined 152-0. Guelph defeated McMaster in an OUA semi-final, setting up a rematch with Queen's, again on the Dixon Field pitch in Kingston. The Gryphons weren't at their best and had to relinquish their OUA crown. In any other season, that would've been it, leaving the players a long time to ponder a disappointing loss. But Guelph was able to perform again as host of the inaugural Canadian University Men's Rugby Championship held over four days at Alumni Stadium. The Gryphons had an opportunity to play several of the side's more inexperienced players in the grueling format and they were up to the task. Guelph defeated UPEI 66-0 in the opener before taking part in an epic 11-11 tie with Victoria, one of the premier university rugby sides in the country. The Vikes advanced to the final against UBC because of a better point differential in the opening round, leaving Guelph to face its OUA foe McMaster in the bronze medal match. The Gryphons had nothing left in the tank after the Victoria match and lost to the Marauders. But the tournament kicked off a new era in men's university rugby and as coach Hector said, the Gryphons will now have something else to play for after the season ends.

2016-2017

Season Record: 8-0 (1st in OUA)

In 2016, the Gryphons were crowned OUA Champions in men's rugby for the first time since 1998. After a perfect 8-0 regular season, the Gryphons defeated McMaster 31-8 in the semi-finals to earn a spot in the OUA championship game for a third straight year. And for a third straight year, the Queen's Gaels were the opponent. After falling just short versus Queen's in each of the previous two years in the OUA Final, the 2016 matchup would see the Gryphons get the best of their long-time rivals with a dramatic 25-24 victory. With the score tied at 17-17 at the end of regulation, two extra time periods were needed to find a winner. The two teams remained deadlocked at 24-24 after the two extra halves of play. A third period of sudden-death overtime was scoreless. That meant the OUA Championship would be decided by a dropkick shootout with each team choosing five players to kick. In the end, it would be Guelph's Mark Perrin providing the heroics on the Gryphons home field by splitting the uprights in the 2nd round of dropkicks to give the Gryphons the Turner Trophy for just the third time in school history.

Fifth year senior Eric Howard became just the second player in school history to be named OUA MVP during the regular season but was unavailable for the playoffs as he was touring with Team Canada in Europe. Cory Hector, in his first year as head coach, was named OUA Coach of the Year. The Gryphons had a total of six players named OUA All-Stars, the most of any school.

2015-2016

Season Record: 7-1 (1st in OUA)

Playoff Record: 1-1 (beat McMaster in semi's, lost to Queen's in OUA Final)

The Gryphons matched a school record by posting a 7-1 record during the regular season. The first of those seven wins was the most impressive as the Gryphons opened their 2015 regular season with a 35-28 victory over perennial power Queen's. That victory marked the Gryphons first win over the Gaels since 1998.

After defeating McMaster in an OUA semi-final, the Gryphons earned the right to host the three-time defending Turner Trophy champion Queen's Gaels in what was a re-match of the 2014 OUA Final. The match was played on U of G's campus (Varsity Field) in front of a huge crowd. The Gryphons, who were trying to win their first OUA title in Men's Rugby since 1998, and just the third in school history (with the other coming in 1974), ultimately fell just short as they lost 24-23 to the Gaels.

The silver medal marked the Gryphons fifth straight season in which they earned an OUA medal. A total of six Gryphons were named OUA All-Stars while head coach Darrell Devine was named OUA Coach of the Year for the third time in this his 9th season as head coach of the Gryphons.

For a fourth straight season, the Gryphons men's rugby team took home a medal. After three consecutive bronze medal finishes, this time around it was silver as the Gryphons fell just short in the OUA Final versus the Queen's Gaels.

The men's rugby team matched the school record for most wins in the regular season by going an impressive 7-1 (the 2012-2013 team also posted a 7-1 regular season record). A four match win streak to start the season saw the Gryphons outscore their opponents by an astonishing total of 221-14. A 33-17 loss to the defending champions Queen's would then be followed up with three more wins heading into the post-season.

After earning a bye in the first round of the playoffs, the Gryphons played host to the Brock Badgers in an OUA semi-final showdown. The match was played at Alumni Stadium and saw the Gryphons come up with their strongest defensive performance of the season. The result was an 18-0 shutout over the Badgers. While points were hard to come by, fourth year man Martin Damianoff electrified the crowd with a highlight reel 50-metre sprint for a try to

give the Gryphons an early lead. Joe Newman also converted a pair of penalty kicks on the day. As a result of the 18-0 victory, the Gryphons earned a spot in the OUA Final.

In the OUA championship match, the Gryphons would go up against two-time defending champion Queen's. The Gryphons got off to a fast start, jumping out to a 16-0 lead 30 minutes into the match thanks in part to tries from Alexander Charest-Pekeski and Eric Howard. However, the Gaels were able to respond with a strong second half in which they scored 29 unanswered points on the way to a 32-23 victory.

The Gryphons had a five players named OUA All-Starts (Eric Charest-Pekeski, Jeremy Wright, Joe Newman, Eric Howard and Byron Boville), as well as two major award winners (All-Around Player – Jeremy Wright, OUA Rookie of the Year – Brandon McLeod).
