The 2022-23 season saw the Gryphons women's lacrosse team return to the OUA playoffs after improving on their overall record in the regular season. With the regular season returning to the standard format following the shortened 2021-22 season the Gryphons posted a 6-6 record and headed into the post season on a two game win streak. In the OUA Championship Tournament the Gryphons took on the Western Mustangs and Brock Badgers in pool play. After suffering a hard-fought 6-2 loss to the Mustangs the Gryphons bounced back in a big way, taking down the Badgers 18-0 to finish pool play with a 1-1 record. After qualifying for the OUA semifinals the Gryphons took on the Queens Gaels for a right to play in the championships game. After a pair of early goals and strong first quarter the Gaels held a 5-0 lead before the Gryphons would find the back of the net and cut the lead to 5-2 heading into the half. Following the break, the eventual 2022-23 OUA Champion Gaels returned to their first quarter form, closing out the game with five unanswered goals to earn a 10-2 win. In the bronze medal game the team faced off against a familiar foe in the Western Mustangs but after trawling early the Gryphons would fall 11-5 to narrowly miss the podium for the second consecutive season and finish 4th overall. Rachel McConvey was named as the lone OUA All-Star from the team after impressing in the postseason with a 6-goal performance against the Brock Badgers and 7 total goals in four games.

The 2021-22 season saw the Gryphons women's lacrosse team battle to their best OUA playoff finish since 2013. In her first season with the team, head coach Samantha Yurechuk improved the team's result by four places from last year's 8th place to 4th. This year saw a reduction in the number of regular season games while the OUA playoffs introduced a round robin format. The postseason was tough out of the gate for the Gryphs as they matched up against last season's defending OUA champions, the Trent Excalibur. In their first game against Trent this season, the Excalibur came out of the gate strong to take an early lead, eventually claiming a 12-5 victory. Game two of the round robin was a must win situation for the Gryphons as they faced off against the Laurier Golden Hawks. Despite losing both their matchups against the Hawks this season, the Gryphons pulled through to capture a 9-7 win to advance to the OUA semifinals. It was a memorable victory as they seized their first win over Laurier since 2012. The round robin tournament would end in a three-way tie, between Guelph, Ontario Tech and Toronto, with the Gryphons advancing due to a one goal difference in the goal differential tiebreaker. It was a tough defeat at the hands of the Queen's Gaels (22-1) that pushed the Gryphons into the bronze medal match against the Western Mustangs. Rookies Emma Tobin and Megan Latoski each provided two goals for the team alongside third-year Jade Barko. Despite their best efforts, the team fell 9-6 to the Mustangs in the OUA bronze medal match. Goalkeeper Shayla Larson was awarded the title of Guelph Player of the Game for each OUA postseason match.

The Gryphons came storming out of the gates with two decisive wins over UOIT and York, outscoring the opponents by a combined total of 30-2 on the opening day of the OUA season. But it was an 11-9 loss to the perennial powerhouse Laurier Golden Hawks that gave Guelph the belief that they were able to compete with the best teams in the conference. The Gryphons secured consecutive wins over McMaster and Brock on Oct. 6 before closing out the season with a challenging pair of games against the conference-leading Queen's Gaels and the Trent Excalibur. Guelph's 8-6 loss to Trent was a preview of the OUA quarter-final and despite putting up a good fight, the Gryphons were knocked out of the championship side of the bracket by the same 8-6 scoreline. Guelph rebounded with a solid 4-2 win over Brock in the consolation semi before dropping the consolation final to Western 7-5. Fourth-year defender Carly Stephens, one of the most intimidating and competitive players in the OUA, won team MVP honours.

The victories dried up from there in a month to forget. But head coach Staci Morris regrouped the team and her players had a fantastic final weekend of the regular season, surprising the third-place Laurier Golden Hawks 14-3 before hammering UOIT 15-3 the following day. That gave the Gryphons some momentum heading into the OUA playoffs, which they maintained in a convincing 13-3 win in the opener against York. Second-year players Erin Murray and Susanna Cross starred in that outing, scoring four goals each. Guelph lost to the Queen's Gaels in the OUA quarter-final and then fell to Trent in the consolation round. But the Gryphons ended their season as it began, with a strong 5-3 win over McMaster in the seventh-place game.

In 2014 the Gryphons women's lacrosse team got off to a slow start with just one win in their first five games. However, they would follow that up with back-to-back wins, first over McMaster, then an 11-10 victory over OUA semifinalists UOIT. The Gryphons would win three of their final five games to head into the OUA Championship tournament with some momentum. They would open the postseason with a dominating 18-1 victory over the York Lions, however, a loss in their next game to the University of Toronto Varsity Blues would eliminate the Gryphons from medal contention (snapping their streak of three straight seasons with a medal – all of which were silver). In the fifth place game, the Gryphons would fall just short against the Queen's Gaels, losing 10-9. A 12-11 victory over Trent would secure a 7th place finish for the Gryphons.

Defender Katelynn Brzezinski was the lone Gryphon selected to the OUA All-Star team as she received a spot on the OUA's First-Team (marking the third time in her career she was named an OUA All-Star).
