The 2023-24 edition of the Gryphons field hockey team put together another impressive campaign, finishing the season 5-4-1 and in second place in the OUA West Division while outscoring opponents 26-17. The Gryphons had a tough start to the season, tying the season opener against the Queen's Gaels, losing their first match of the season against the Toronto Varsity Blues (2-5) and then losing the home opener against the York Lions (1-2) in a tightly contested match. The Gryphons bounced back and redeemed themselves by going on a 5-game winning streak winning all the games in a convincing manner against the McGill University Martlets (6-0), Western Mustangs (4-1), (4-3) and McMaster Marauders (5-2) and (3-1). The Gryphons lost the next two games against the Waterloo Warriors to end their regular season. The Gryphons qualified for the OUA Playoffs thanks to their impressive 5-game winning streak and were matched up against the Western Mustangs in the OUA Quarterfinals. The Guelph Gryphons field hockey team captured a 2-0 win over the Western Mustangs to advance to the OUA semifinal round. Third-year forward Delaney Jacklin scored two second half goals in an otherwise defensive battle to lead the Gryphons to the playoff victory. The Guelph Gryphons field hockey team saw their 2023 season come to close after suffering a 3-1 loss to the York Lions in the OUA semifinal round. Playing the U SPORTS No. 3-ranked Lions for the second consecutive year in the playoffs, the No. 5-ranked Gryphons surrendered a pair of goals in the opening 10 minutes and were unable to recover from the early Lions lead. In the 28th minute Elly Peters found Ella Rideout to cut the York lead in half but another score from the home team in the 46th minute would solidify the win for the Lions.

Abby Warriner, Elly Peters and Ella Rideout headlined the Gryphon performances in the 2023-24 season with the players being recognized for their contributions at both the provincial and national levels. Rookie Ella Rideout earned Rookie of the Year honors after demonstrating her versatility and reliability. Another gryphon midfielder who was recognized for their impressive season was Abby Warriner who was named a U SPORTS All-Canadian and OUA All-Star after using her combination of speed and endurance to establish herself as one of the best midfielders in the country. Elly Peters was earned OUA All Star honors as well as the OUA Outstanding Contributor award for contributing to her team majorly in and helping them win.

The 2022-23 edition of the Gryphons field hockey team put together another impressive campaign, finishing the season 7-1-2 and in first place in the OUA West Division while outscoring opponents 35-11. It took the team eight games before they suffered their first loss, a 3-0 defeat at the hands of the U of T Varsity Blues in the second last game of the season. Following the conclusion of the Gryphons regular season they earned a spot in the OUA playoffs where they hosted the York Lions in the OUA semifinals. Having previously played to a tie with the Lions in the regular season the two teams knew they would be in for a tightly contested match. In what proved to be a defensive battle the Lions would leave Guelph with a 1-0 victory thanks to a York score in the 28th minute. It marked the first time in 14 seasons that the gryphons had failed to make the Championship game.

Abby Warriner and Harper Griffin headlined the Gryphon performances in the 2022-23 season with both players being recognized for their contributions at both the provincial and national levels. Rookie forward/midfielder Harper Griffin earned OUA Rookie of the Year honors after demonstrating her versatility and reliability in the Gryphon midfield. The Gryphon field hockey team put together another strong season on 2021-22 as the defending championships following the cancellation of the 2020-21 season. With the OUA being reorganized into three divisions for the season the Gryphons took on the McMaster Marauders, Waterloo Warriors, and Western Mustangs. After a 5-1-2 regular season where the team outscored opponents 14-7 the Gryphons finished 1st in the OUA West to earn another postseason berth. In the OUA semi-final the Gryphons faced off against the Western Mustangs who they had previously beat twice in the regular season. The team improved to 3-0 against the Mustangs, defeating their rivals from London 3-1 to advance to the OUA Championship for the 14th consecutive season. The Gryphons took on a familiar foe in the Championship game as they took the trip to Toronto to take on the U of T Varsity Blues, the same team they defeated last season in the Gold Medal game. Unfortunately for the Gryphons, their 2021-22 season came to an end with a 3-0 loss to the Varsity Blues, earning them OUA Silver.

Arden Goddard-Despot highlighted the Gryphon award winners in 2021, with the first-year North Vancouver native being named the OUA Rookie of the Year in addition to earning U SPORTS All-Canadian and OUA All-Star status.

The Gryphon field hockey team put together a remarkable 2019 season, culminating with the 5th OUA title in program history as well as a silver medal at the U SPORTS Field Hockey Championships. The Gryphon field hockey team dominated throughout the 2019 regular season, finishing 1st in the OUA regular season standings with a record of 10-1-1, outscoring their opponents 54-11 in the process. In the playoffs, the Gryphons served as hosts of the 2019 OUA Field Hockey Championships with the conference championship tournament taking place on U of G soil at Varsity Field. The Gryphons booked a spot in the OUA title game thanks to convincing wins over McMaster and Waterloo. In the OUA Championship game, the Gryphons would meet up with the Toronto Varsity Blues with the OUA gold medal and a berth to nationals on the line. Standout senior Katherine MacMillan would cap her incredible U of G career by scoring the lone goal of the championship game, with Guelph winning 1-0 thanks to MacMillan's goal at the 40-minute mark. The win marked the Gryphons 5th OUA title in program history, and first since 2013.

Following their win in the OUA title game, the Gryphons advanced to the 2019 U SPORTS Field Hockey Championships. For nationals, the Gryphons would head west to Victoria, BC to face the Canada West champion Victoria Vikes in a best-two-of-three series with the winner claiming the title of U SPORTS Champions. The Gryphons would fall just short of capturing the first national title in school history, with the Vikes winning 3-0 and 3-1 to sweep the best-of-three series, sending the Gryphons home with national silver medals.

Katherine MacMillan highlighted the Gryphon award winners in 2019, with the Kitchener native being named the recipient of the Liz Hoffman Award as the U SPORTS Player of the Year (marking just the 5th time in program history that a Gryphon field hockey player was named national player of the year).

The Gryphons went into the 2018 season with plenty of motivation after falling just short of an OUA championship the previous year. Guelph proved to be a formidable team again, especially with the return of talented forward Katherine MacMillan, who missed the entire 2017 season with a serious knee injury. MacMillan showed no ill effects, leading the team with 16 goals, which ranked her second in the OUA. With MacMillan joining veterans Rebecca Plouffe and eventual team MVP Rudi Ballard, Guelph was one of the top squads in the conference again, allowing just 11 goals en route to a 7-3-2 record. The Gryphons knew their biggest test would come at the OUA Championship and they were clinical in the opening round with a 3-0 win over Western. Guelph needed a dramatic 2-1 shootout win to eliminate the rival Toronto varsity Blues, who had beaten the Gryphons twice during the regular season. The OUA Final was a rematch from 2017 as Guelph took on the reigning champion York Lions. The Gryphons battled but were unable to generate the necessary offence, falling 1-0 to York. MacMillan and Plouffe were named U SPORTS All-Canadians.

The Gryphons field hockey team faced obstacles before the 2017 OUA regular season even got under way. Already having lost key players from the previous year, head coach Michelle Turley entered the new campaign without her star forward Katherine MacMillan, who unfortunately suffered a devastating ACL tear in the exhibition season. But Guelph's players adapted quickly, and new players emerged, like second-year midfielder Kayla Magarelli, converted to forward, who seamlessly stepped into a goal-scoring role. The Gryphons used a blend of sound defence and their excellent passing skills to win two and tie two in the first four games, conceding just one goal. They took their only defeat of the regular season on September 24, a stinging 3-1 loss to first-place York. But Guelph rolled through the rest of the

schedule, recording shutouts in five of the last seven games to head into the postseason on a roll. Magarelli scored a hat trick in the playoff opener against Waterloo, an 11-0 win, before Olivia Finch and Alexa Corrado came through with a pair of early goals in a 2-0 win over rival Toronto in the semi-final. That set up a rubber match with the Lions, who Guelph beat 1-0 three weeks after that lone loss. York took leads twice, but the courageous Gryphons answered both times, including a clutch Magarelli goal that tied the match 2-2. But the dream of a fifth OUA banner ended when York star Jaslan Stirling notched the championship-winning goal in the second half, despite the Gryphons dominating the second half and doing everything they could to find a late equalizer.

Magarelli recorded 14 goals on the season, ranking her 2nd amongst the OUA leading scorers. Guelph's goaltenders combined for a .53 goal against average, second best in the league by one goal. For the seventh time in program history, and the second time in as many seasons, a Gryphon, Rebecca Plouffe, earned OUA Player of the Year honours. Plouffe also earned the distinction of OUA All-Star and U SPORTS All-Canadian.

In 2016, the Gryphons field hockey team featured an explosive offense that led the OUA in scoring with 55 goals in 12 games during the regular season en route to finishing 2nd in the standings with a 9-1-2 (wins-losses-ties) record. Third year forward Olivia Lane was the OUA's leading scorer with 17 goals and became the sixth player in U of G history to be named OUA MVP. At the OUA Championship tournament in London, the Gryphons rolled past McGill 10-0 in the quarter-finals. In the semi-finals, Olivia Lane's goal in the 59th minute would be enough to get the Gryphons past Western 1-0 to book a spot in the OUA finals as well as a berth to nationals. In the OUA Final, the Gryphons squared off against longtime rivals – the University of Toronto Varsity Blues. The meeting marked the 10th time in the last 12 years that these two schools had squared off in the OUA gold medal game. With the game tied at 2-2, U of T would score with just three minutes remaining to claim their third straight OUA banner. At nationals, hosted by U of T, the Gryphons would go 0-3 during round robin play before falling 2-0 to the Varsity Blues in the CIS Bronze medal game.

The Gryphons field hockey team posted an impressive 11-1 regular season record and earned their second straight OUA silver medal after falling just short in a 4-3 OUA Final to the Toronto Varsity Blues. En route to the final, the Gryphons defeated the Waterloo Warriors 4-0 in the semi-finals.

The OUA silver qualified the team for their ninth consecutive appearance at the CIS Championships. After being on the short end against their archrivals from Toronto in the OUA Championships, the Gryphons came back in fiery style to defeat the Varsity Blues 4-2 in the bronze-medal match of the CIS Championships, hosted in Victoria.

A pair of veteran Gryphons earned national and provincial recognition. Fifth year senior and team captain Allison Chute was named a CIS All-Canadian and OUA All-Star after leading the conference with 20 goals in 12 games. Fifth-year midfielder and captain Erin Houle was also named a CIS AllCanadian and OUA All-Star after scoring four goals in 11 games, dominating the game with her stick skills and strong playmaking abilities.

Bench boss Michelle Turley was named the OUA Coach of the Year, in her 12th season as head coach, this is the second time in her career she received the award. Rounding out the conference awards was Moon Weijens who was named an OUA All-Star in just her first year with the team.

Despite a disappointing 0-4 record at the CIS Championship, both Allison Chute and Daniela Jelec were named to the tournament All-Star team. The Gryphons' only two regular season losses came to the undefeated Varsity Blues, both by just one goal.

The field hockey team finished another successful year with a 9-1-2 regular season record to finish second in the OUA and earn a bye in the playoffs, advancing directly to the semifinal game. The Gryphons defeated Western 4-1 in the semi's and then earned an OUA championship title with a 4-1 victory over Waterloo. At the CIS Championships, the Gryphons went 2-2. Guelph lost their first game to the Victoria Vikes with a 3-0 final, and then dropped their second game to the UBC Thunderbirds with a 7-1 score. The team was eventually able to shut out the Waterloo Warriors 5-0 to cap off their round robin play and then defeat Waterloo again 6-0 in the bronze medal game to bring home their fourth straight CIS bronze medal.

Third-year midfielder Erin Houle was named an OUA all-star and CIS All-Canadian with four goals from the midfield position during the regular season to finish second in team scoring. Fifth-year forward Amy Wise led the Gryphons in scoring with six goals and clocked major minutes, starting in all 12 games and was also named an OUA all-star. Houle and Wise were also CIS tournament all-stars.

The Gryphon women's field hockey team had another very successful season. The team won its second consecutive OUA Championship and earned a CIS bronze medal. For the first time ever, the Gryphons were able to play at home on the University of Guelph's new artificial turf field.

The Gryphons earned a first-round bye in the OUA playoffs after a 13-1 regular season record. The team continued its scoring prowess amassing 85 goals in league play to set a new Guelph scoring record. In the OUA semi final, the Gryphons defeated the Western Mustangs 6-4. At the OUA Championships which were hosted by York, the Gryphons successfully defended its title defeating the Toronto Varsity Blues in the gold medal game 3-2. The CIS Championships were hosted by the University of Guelph for the first time in the program's history and the Gryphons entered the tournament as the number one seed. At the championships, the Gryphons went 3-1 in round robin action with losses to UBC (1-0), Victoria (2-1) and Toronto (4-1) before defeating the Waterloo Warriors 5-2 to get into the bronze medal game. In the bronze medal game, the Gryphons defeated the Victoria Vikes with an impressive 3-0 victory.

In the semi finals, Guelph blanked the York Lions 5-0 to advance to the championship game and earn a berth to the national championships. In the final, the Gryphons took back the OUA Field Hockey title defeating the defending champion Toronto Blues 1-0. At the CIS Championships, the Gryphons settled for a fourth place finish with a 1-3-1 record. One of the highlights was the huge 5-2 victory over Toronto. The seven-goal affair was the highestscoring game at the CIS Championship since the 2003 semi final.

Brienne Stairs (Kitchener, ON) received a First Team OUA All-Star, First Team All-Canadian, OUA and CIS Player of the Year honours as the cornerstone of scoring for Guelph with 30 goals during the regular season while sister, Tegan made quite an impression with seven goals and was recognized as an Second Team OUA All-Star and the OUA Rookie of the Year. Krissy Wishart (Hamilton, ON) who amassed 10 goals and 12 assists earned First Team OUA All-Star and First Team All-Canadian for the 5th consecutive year. Angela Lancaster (Burlington, ON) who recorded 7 goals was named a First Team OUA All-Star and Second Team All-Canadian.

The Gryphons soared to No. 1 in the OUA in a couple of different respects, including the standings. Over the course of 14 games, the defensive unit with the help of goalkeepers Dorothy Marcy (Oliver, BC) and Kaye McLagan (Mitchell, ON), allowed just 10 goals into their house, the fewest of all OUA teams.
