San Jose State capitalized on two long scoring plays in the first quarter and made it stand up for a 13-7 win over the injury-riddled Webfoots. It marked the first football victory for the Spartans in eight tries against the Ducks.

Oregon played without the services of All-American halfback Mel Renfro and ace quarterback Bob Berry, although he did make a token appearance late in the game, as these two grid greats were sidelined with injuries suffered the previous week against Washington.

Webfoot backfield ranks were further depleted when right halfback Larry Hill went to the sidelines just six minutes into the game with a dislocated shoulder. Thus, Oregon played virtually the entire game with three-fourths of its classy "Firehouse Four" backfield out of action.

San Jose got on the scoreboard with 7:24 to play in the first quarter when speedy Jerry Colletto returned an Oregon punt 91 yards. Bob Paterson converted to give the Spartans a 7-0 lead.

Less than four minutes later, Dennis Parker picked off an errant Oregon pass and sprinted 75 yards to another Spartan touchdown. San Jose led 13-0 and had yet to make a first down.

The Ducks threatened just before halftime, moving to the Spartan 15-yard line before losing the ball on downs. At the intermission, Oregon owned a 12-0 first down edge and a wide 149-10 advantage in total offense, but the scoreboard showed San Jose in front 13-0.

The Ducks narrowed the gap in the third quarter when Dennis Keller sliced off tackle with 5:28 to play. Oregon had moved 86 yards in eight plays with Lu Bain's 12 and 47-yard gallops eating up much of the yardage.

Ken Berry, younger brother of Oregon quarterback Bob, piloted the Spartans through much of the game and wound up with five completions in ten passing attempts for 78 yards. In addition, he engineered a drive that used the final minutes of the fourth quarter and kept the ball away from the Ducks.

Bain was the game's top rusher with 82 yards, while H. D. Murphy picked up 65 and Keller was good for 63 yards.

Oregon combined its free-wheeling offense with a tenacious defense to rout West Virginia, 35-0. The Ducks scored all their points in the first half, then Coach Len Casanova played reserves virtually the entire second half as Oregon handed the Mountaineers their first shutout in 23 games.

The Webfoots scored late in the first quarter when halfback Dennis Keller powered over from three yards out to conclude an eight-play drive that carried 55 yards.

Then in the second quarter, the Ducks tallied four times and had a fifth touchdown called back because of a penalty. All-American halfback Mel Renfro opened second period scoring from the one-yard line after quarterback Bob Berry threw 36 yards to Dick Imwalle and 28 to Renfro.

Berry fired a 34-yard strike to Rich Schwab and Renfro contributed an 11-yard run before Berry picked up the third touchdown from a yard out. In all, the drive carried 81 yards in eight plays.

The amazing Berry teamed with Keller on a 59-yard scoring toss for the fourth touchdown, then halfback Monte Fitchett saw a 58-yard punt return touchdown sprint nullified by a clipping penalty.

Defensive halfback Ron Martin raced 38 yards with an intercepted pass for the final touchdown of the afternoon. Renfro displayed his great versatility by booting the extra point to conclude scoring.

With Berry completing 8 of 11 tosses for 227 yards, the Ducks rolled up 443 yards total offense. Imwalle, with four receptions for 78 yards, and Renfro, with three catches good for 67 yards, were his prime targets.

The pin-point passing of quarterback Pete Liske and a brand-new offense enabled Penn State to down Oregon 17-7 in the season opener for both teams. The Nittany Lions, always a Wing-T, balanced line team in the past, unveiled a new unbalanced attack featuring a split end in this season inaugural.

Liske was near-perfect as he completed 11 of 12 passes for 113 yards and both Penn State touchdowns. Don Caum, filling the split end role, was his favorite target, grabbing four tosses for 62 yards.

Penn State broke the scoring ice in the first quarter on an eight-yard pass from Liske to halfback Junior Powell. The payoff play came on fourth down and ended a 13 play march that carried 80 yards.

That score held until the half, then Oregon roared out in the third quarter to earn a 7-7 standoff. Larry Hill reeled off a 54-yard gain before Mel Renfro boomed over from the one with 4:41 left in the third quarter. The drive went 80 yards in seven plays.

The Nittany Lions moved ahead to stay on the opening play of the fourth quarter when Ron Coates booted a 32-yard field goal to climax a 63-yard drive that lasted 11 plays.

The Ducks threatened to take the lead by moving to the Penn State 25 before losing the ball on downs midway in the quarter, then the winners secured the victory on a 40-yard scoring strike from Liske to Caum.

Hill was the game's top rusher with 91 yards in 11 attempts, while Gary Klingensmith with 85 yards and Tom Urbanik with 46 sparked the Penn State ground attack.

The explosive "Firehouse Four" backfield figured in every touchdown as Oregon tallied three times in the second quarter en route to a 41-21 thumping of Idaho.

Fullback Lu Bain skirted end for nine yards after guard Dave Wilcox recovered an Idaho fumble and the Ducks led 7-0 with 9:27 to play in the first quarter. The Vandals tied the score later in the same period when Gary Mires sneaked over from the one after they had moved that far in 17 plays from their own 29.

Oregon broke the game open in the second quarter with three touchdowns. Bain rambled around end for ten yards, quarterback slicker Bob Berry hit Rich Schwab for 39 yards and Berry teamed up with Renfro for 43 yards to account for the scoring.

The Webfoots widened their edge less than two minutes into the third quarter, moving 60 yards in six plays with Larry Hill scoring from four yards out. Hill added the final Webfoot touchdown in the fourth quarter when he rambled 35 yards with an intercepted pass.

Idaho scored again in the third quarter, when trailing 35-7, on Mike Monahan's 19-yard pass to Bill Scott and scored another six-pointer in the fourth chapter on Rich Naccarato's one-yard plunge.

Berry enjoyed a fine afternoon, completing nine of 11 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns, while Hill was Oregon's top ball carrier with 55 yards in five carries.

For Idaho, Naccarato picked up 64 yards in 18 rushing attempts and Monahan was true on six of nine pass attempts for 56 yards.

The Webfoots, getting superb performances from ace quarterback Bob Berry and All-American halfback Mel Renfro, methodically subdued Arizona 28-12 before a regional television audience.

The Ducks wasted little time getting on the scoreboard, securing six points the first time they gained possession of the ball. A 19-yard pass from Berry to end Rich Schwab ate up the final yardage in an eight-play drive that lasted 11 plays.

Coach Len Casanova's squad added another touchdown in the second quarter when Renfro scored from the three-yard line at the end of a 75-yard drive that lasted 11 plays.

An early third quarter touchdown put the Ducks in command with fullback Lu Bain doing the honors from three yards out. The Webfoots marched 65 yards in 12 plays with the second half kickoff to open up a 21-0 advantage.

Berry's one-yard plunge just 30 seconds into the fourth quarter put the game beyond recall. The Webfoots had moved 52 yards in nine plays for their final touchdown.

Arizona averted a shutout with two fourth-quarter touchdowns against Duck reserves. A fumble recovery at the Duck 20 by end Mike O'Mahoney led to the initial Wildcat touchdown, scored by Dave Knott from two yards out. A 14-yard pass from quarterback Bill Brechler to halfback Floyd Hudlow provided Arizona with its second touchdown and ended all scoring.

Berry was true on 13 of 18 passing attempts for 190 yards and one touchdown, while Renfro rambled through Arizona defenses for 113 yards in 12 attempts to spark an Oregon attack that accounted for 432 yards total offense.

Another typical Oregon-Washington football game, filled with action, excitement and suspense, was unfolded at Multnomah Stadium as the Huskies captured a 26-19 victory.

Injuries hampered Webfoot victory hopes with Mel Renfro on the sidelines from the middle of the third quarter on and quarterback Bob Berry battling on an injured knee the final three periods.

Renfro still managed 48 yards in nine rushing attempts and the courageous Berry fired 12 completions in 26 attempts for 223 yards and all three Oregon touchdowns. Washington's ground game was keyed by rampaging fullback Junior Coffey, good for 110 yards in 30 carries, and quarterback Bill Douglas, who threw nine completions in 12 attempts for 135 yards and a pair of six-pointers.

Washington drew first blood in the opening quarter when Coffey powered over from a yard out, but the Webfoots evened matters later in the same period on Berry's six-yard pass to end Dick Imwalle.

The Huskies forged a 13-12 halftime lead on Douglas' 29-yard pass to end Al Libke and Jim Norton's successful placekick. Berry hit Imwalle for 47 yards just 1:32 before the intermission, but the extra point try was no good.

Oregon grabbed a temporary lead in the third quarter on Berry's 28-yard toss to Rich Schwab, only to see Washington pull even at 19-19 on a ten-yard scoring pass from Douglas to halfback Dave Kopay.

Washington scored the only touchdown of the fourth quarter when Coffey climaxed a 13-play drive that carried 58 yards by going over from four yards out. Norton's extra point gave the Huskies their 26-19 final margin. Berry, however, had one last shot left and he drove the Ducks the length of the field before Kopay jarred Dennis Keller loose from a 16-yard completion seconds before the final gun. On this drive, Berry completed four passes for 54 yards.

Oregon combined six Stanford fumble losses and 513 yards of its own total offense to whip the Indians 36-7, the seventh straight time the Ducks have downed the Palo Alto squad.

Quarterback Bob Berry moved into the spotlight in this game, completing 12 of 23 passes for 216 yards and two touchdowns. Reserve signal-caller Doug Post also performed with distinction, hitting 4-8 for 54 yards and a touchdown on his passing and rushing for 73 yards, before suffering a knee injury which sidelined him for the season.

Dick Imwalle, playing in his home area, was Berry's favorite target, grabbing seven passes for 99 yards from his tight end spot.

Stanford fumble losses led directly to a pair of first quarter touchdowns for the Ducks. Berry did the damage, firing a 17-yard scoring pass to end Paul Bursleson and an eight-yard payoff pitch to Mel Renfro. Berry also accounted for the third Duck touchdown with a one-yard plunge in the second quarter.

Stanford's only retaliation was a three-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter from quarterback Clark Weaver to halfback Dick Ragsdale after the Indians had moved 71 yards in 12 plays.

Buck Corey's third quarter field goal from 25 yards out, Post's ten-yard pass to end Ray Palm and Post's one-yard sneak took care of the Webfoots' second half scoring.

Oregon bounced back from its loss to San Jose State with a 21-7 triumph over Washington State that signalled the start of the Ducks' season-concluding four-game winning streak.

Quarterback Bob Berry and All-American halfback Mel Renfro, both returning to the lineup after missing a week with injuries, provided the offensive spark. Berry completed ten of 20 passes for 147 yards and two touchdowns and Renfro sprinted for 65 yards in six carries.

WSU got on the scoreboard first on a 38-yard pass from Dave Mathieson to Tom Kelley in the second quarter and when Clete Baltes booted the extra point, the Cougars owned a 7-0 lead.

It didn't last long as the Ducks scored with the ensuing kickoff, moving 46 yards in seven plays after a fine return by Lu Bain. A four-yard run off the reverse by H. D. Murphy accounted for the six points and Buck Corey kicked his first three conversions to earn Oregon a 7-7 standoff.

The Webfoots moved into a 14-7 halftime lead on Berry's 17 yard toss to split end Rich Schwab, who concluded the day with five receptions for 85 yards. A fumble recovery by Mark Richards led to the touchdown.

Berry and Schwab teamed up again for the final touchdown, this one covering 30 yards after Oliver McKinney had pounced on a WSU fumble on the Cougar 35.

Mathieson and Kelley were WSU's leading offensive performers. Mathieson completed 12 of 29 passes for 198 yards, while Kelley grabbed five aerials for 139 yards.

An amazing eleventh hour comeback earned Oregon a 28-22 win over Indiana in one of the most thrilling football games in Webfoot history. The man of the hour was daring quarterback Bob Berry, who drove the Ducks the length of the field in a little over a minute to turn certain defeat into victory.

The Webfoots were nursing a slim 21-19 lead late in the fourth quarter when the Hoosiers marched 80 yards in 14 plays to grab the advantage at 22-21 on Tom Nowatzke's 26-yard field goal.

Just 1:37 remained to play when the Ducks put the ball in play on their own 25 after the kickoff. It took the gritty Berry only six plays to engineer the winning touchdown, which came with 11 seconds to play on a 29-yard pass to H. D. Murphy. Buck Corey added the anti-climatic extra-point to give the Ducks their final 28-22 margin.

Indiana jumped to a 13-0 lead on Nowatzke's 48-yard gallop with an intercepted pass in the first quarter and Richie Badar's ten-yard sweep in the second quarter. It appeared the Ducks might be shut out at the intermission, but guard Ron Jones forced a bad punt with a great rush and on the first ensuing play Berry drilled a 21-yard touchdown pass to end Dick Imwalle.

The Ducks moved ahead 14-13 in the third period on two tremendous individual plays by All-American halfback Mel Renfro. He got the touchdown on a four-yard charge at tackle and added the two-point conversion at the same spot. On the conversion, his path was blocked at the five-yard line, but this great athlete broad jumped into the end zone.

Back came the Hoosiers to grab a 19-14 edge as Badar dove the final yard of a 66-yard march that lasted nine plays. Oregon regained the lead when halfback Larry Hill grabbed a swing pass from Berry and raced 37 yards into the end zone. Corey's extra-point put Oregon in front 21-19.

Then came Nowatzke's apparent game-winning field goal followed by Berry's 29-yard clincher to Murphy.

Renfro played his finest game of the season, gaining 81 yards in 16 rushing attempts and grabbing five passes for 76 yards. Berry hit 13 of 20 passes for 214 yards. Indiana's offense was keyed to Badar, who completed nine of 13 tosses for 164 yards.

Bob Berry was at his phenomenal best as the Webfoots trounced traditional rival Oregon State 31-14 in a game delayed one week by the death of President Kennedy.

Berry completed 18 of 26 passes while establishing school single game records for passing yardage with 249 yards and total offense with 272 yards. He received great assistance from halfback Dennis Keller, pressed into starting duty when a freak accident sidelined All-American Mel Renfro, and halfback H. D. Murphy.

Keller took over primary rushing chores and rambled for 79 yards in 12 carries, while Murphy intercepted two passes that set up Oregon touchdowns and caught four passes himself, one a 29-yarder for a touchdown.

After a scoreless first quarter, Herm Meister, subbing for regular conversion specialist Buck Corey, booted a 22 yard field goal to give the Ducks a 3-0 edge. Then Murphy went to work on pass defense. He swiped an errant Beaver toss and returned it 26 yards to the Oregon State 34.

From there, the Ducks covered the distance in four plays with Berry tabbing five yards to end Corky Sullivan for the six points. Murphy's second theft set up another Webfoot touchdown just before the half ended. Lu Bain sped four yards around left end to give the Ducks a 17-0 intermission bulge. At the half, Oregon owned a 14-2 first down edge and had outgained the Beavers 208 to 42 yards.

Bain's 13-yard charge at right end with 6:15 left in the third quarter and Berry's 29-yard toss to Murphy less than two minutes later, after a pass interception by Sullivan, concluded Duck scoring.

Oregon State got on the scoreboard in the final period against Webfoot reserves with Cliff Watkins scoring from six yards out and Marv Crowston going over from the Oregon three-yard line.
