About Upstate...

Why Spartans?...

The first athletic teams at USC Upstate were fielded in 1967. Called the Fighting Bantams, those early teams wore garnet and black and played their basketball games in a local junior high school gymnasium.

In 1970-71, the University took its first of two steps to distinguish itself from USC Columbia by changing the school colors from garnet and black to purple and white. A year later, the University changed its nickname to the Spartan Rifles in honor of a local militia unit that played an integral part in the Revolutionary War, winning an important victory at the Battle of Cowpens. Though the official nickname was the Spartan Rifles, the athletic teams were known as just the Rifles. The USCS athletic teams were known as the Rifles from 1971-2004.

In 2004, the University of South Carolina Board of Trustees passed a resolution to rename the University in Spartanburg as the University of South Carolina Upstate. In a move to help better brand the University and its image, the official nickname of the school was changed to the Spartans. The name continues to pay homage to the militia unit known as the Spartan Rifles, though the nickname has been modified to emphasize the first portion of the militia unit's name instead of the last part.

Though the name of the University and the nickname of its athletic teams have changed, the colors remain hunter green, white, and black. In 1979-80, the school colors were changed to green and white. Over the years, the original "Kelly" green has been transformed to the modern day "Hunter" green, and black has now been added as a complementary color.

Shay Slater is one of three All-Americans, along with Vanesa Flores and Heidi Gibbs, returning to lead USC Upstate in 2008. Slater scored a school record 70 runs in 2007.



Bill English

Bill English became USC Upstate's third sports information director on February 5, 2001. He is in his fifth year as Assistant Athletic Director for Media Relations after being promoted from sports information director in 2002.

English came to USC Upstate after serving as the assistant sports information director at Wofford College from 1997-2001.

English is a 1993 graduate of Wofford with a bachelor's degree in government. Upon graduation, he worked for one year in the sports department at the *Spartanburg Herald-Journal* where he was a writer covering high school football and basketball and college basketball.

English left the *Herald-Journal* to attend graduate school at Appalachian State where he served as a graduate assistant in the sports information office. Also working as a graduate assistant in the physical education department while working on his master's degree in sport management, he was inducted into the Alpha Epsilon Lambda graduate school national honor fraternity in 1996.

English is a member of CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America). He worked as the official scorer for the Greenville Braves, a former Double-A affiliate of the Atlanta Braves, in 2000.

A native of Washington Court House, Ohio, English moved to Spartanburg with his family in 1981.

Guistina comes to USC Upstate from Michigan State, where he served as an intern during the 2006-07 school year. At MSU, he handled all public relations efforts for the perennial top 25 women's basketball program, the Big Ten champion women's golf program and the women's soccer team.

Before Michigan State, Guistina spent two years as a graduate assistant at the University at Buffalo, where he worked with the women's soccer, wrestling and baseball programs for the Mid-American Conference school.

A 2004 graduate of Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove, Pa., Guistina was a three-year letterwinner as a pitcher on the Crusaders' baseball team.

Interview Policy

All interviews taking place other than on the day of a game with head coach Chris Hawkins and/or players must be arranged through the USC Upstate Media Relations Office. In order to avoid any deadline conflicts, it is recommended that the request be made two days in advance. It should be noted that player telephone numbers will not be given out under any circumstances. Any media members wishing to interview head coach Chris Hawkins or selected players following Spartan home games should see Bill English in the press box at the conclusion of the game. Head coach Chris Hawkins and selected players will be made available outside of the dugout area following a short cooling-off period.

Game Day Services

Weekly notes, rosters and final game statistics are provided at each home contest. Post-game interviews will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game. Upstate head coach Chris Hawkins and selected players will be on hand. The visiting coach and players are available upon request as well.

All members of the media should enter the Cyrril Stadium using the main sidewalk to the press box. Members of the media must show their press credentials at the ticket area. Directions to USC Upstate

From I-85 in either direction – Use Exit 72 on to U.S. 176 towards Spartanburg. Take the East Campus Boulevard exit. Go left at the end of the exit ramp onto East Campus Boulevard. The campus is on the left.

From I-26 in either direction – exit on to I-85 northbound, and follow the above directions. Using I-85 instead of Business I-85 is the preferable route.

From U.S. Hwy. 176/I-585 northbound – Take the East Campus Boulevard exit. Go right at the end of the exit ramp onto East Campus Boulevard. The campus is on the left.

From U.S. Hwy. 176/I-585 southbound – Take the East Campus Boulevard exit. Go left at the end of the exit ramp onto East Campus Boulevard. The campus is on the left.

From Business I-85 northbound – Use Exit 5-B, Milliken Road. Proceed along the frontage road parallel to Business I-85 to the Milliken Bridge over Business I-85, and turn left crossing over Business I-85. At the three-way STOP at the end of the bridge, continue straight onto North Campus Boulevard into campus

From Business I-85 southbound – Use Exit 6, SC 9. Proceed along the frontage road for approximately 1/2 mile being careful not to re-enter Business 85. Turn right at the Milliken Bridge and follow North Campus Boulevard to the campus.

Building Winners For Life

Dr. John Stockwell
 University Chancellor
 14th Year • Cedarville '66



Dr. John C. Stockwell has served as chancellor of the University of South Carolina Upstate since 1994, leading the University toward its vision as one of the leading metropolitan universities in the Southeast.

Under his leadership, the University has experienced outstanding growth in academic standards, campus development, curricula and public/private partnerships. Over the past ten years, enrollments have increased by thirty-five percent with over 4,800 students currently enrolled. The campus boasts a diverse student population with seventy nations represented in the University community and a minority enrollment of over than thirty percent.

Chancellor Stockwell is leading the University toward completion of a 10-year master plan, approved by the USC Board of Trustees in 1997, including multi-million dollar capital developments in classroom space, academic support facilities, housing, and athletics facilities. In addition, a number of campus beautification initiatives are underway and a \$60 million highway infrastructure project surrounding and intersecting the campus was recently finished.

Before coming to USC Upstate, Dr. Stockwell served as provost and interim chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Parkside. In earlier years, he served as dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at the State University of New York College at Cortland, as chair and professor of the Department of Speech and Theatre at Indiana State University, and as professor and director of theatre at California State University Northridge.

Dr. Stockwell earned his Ph.D. and Master's degrees in theatre at Bowling Green State University, and his bachelor's degree in speech and theatre from Cedarville College. He is also an alumnus of the Harvard University Institute for Educational Management.

He is the founding chair and current board member of Spartanburg's chapter of the Urban League of the Upstate. He serves, also, on the Board of the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce and on the Board of Governors of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce, together with a range of other civic and regional commitments.

John and his wife, Dr. Diane Vecchio, a professor of history at Furman University, have four grown children: Benjamin, Kelsea, Adrien and Cory and one granddaughter.

Mike Hall
 Director of Athletics
 14th Year • Liberty '81



Mike Hall is in his 14th year as the director of athletics at the University of South Carolina Upstate.

Since joining the Spartans program, Hall has been instrumental in making many improvements to the athletics department. Arguably his biggest accomplishment is leading the University from NCAA Division II to NCAA Division I membership and the Atlantic Sun Conference in 2007-08.

Hall oversaw the completion of the new Louis P. Howell Athletics Complex that already claims one of the top soccer and softball facilities in the Southeast. The Cleveland S. Harley Baseball Park is the newest jewel of the complex and the tennis facility has recently been upgraded with six additional tennis courts and a clubhouse. The total cost of the four projects exceeded \$5 million. In 1999-2000, Hall oversaw a \$2 million renovation to the G. B. Hodge Center. The renovations included a hospitality suite overlooking the gymnasium, concession area, weight room, official's locker rooms and offices for the athletic staff and coaches. In 2003, the men's and women's basketball and volleyball locker rooms were renovated.

Hall was instrumental in the development of the new County University Soccer Stadium, which opened in August of 2001, as well as five other soccer fields that are used by Spartanburg County as youth soccer facilities. Hall has used the facility to attract state and regional youth soccer events as well as the NCAA Division II Soccer Championships.

Hall continues to work to enhance staff and coaching positions at USC Upstate. He has upgraded many positions from part-time to full-time status and expanded several assistant coaches' positions. He also continues to coordinate over 20 corporate sponsors for USC Upstate athletics.

A 1981 graduate of Liberty University, he went on to serve for 13 years as assistant athletics director for academics, compliance and golf coach at his alma mater. He also served as the Director of the Adult Education program in admissions and advising. He earned his master's degree in education from Lynchburg College. Hall and his wife Phyllis, a 1982 Liberty graduate, have three daughters, Mary, and Mandy and Courtney.

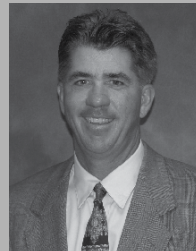

Sr. Woman Administrator • 10th Year
Lenoir-Rhyne '93



Tami Matheny is in her 10th year at USC Upstate and her sixth as associate athletic director.

Matheny was promoted from assistant athletics director in August 2002. She serves as the Senior Woman Administrator, a position she has held for eight years. She was promoted to assistant athletics director in December 2000. Matheny stepped

down as the head coach of the men's and women's tennis teams in 2003.

In addition to her administrative duties at USC Upstate, she has served as a member of the NCAA Division II Men's Tennis Mid-Atlantic Region committee and was the chair in 2005-06.

Matheny came to USC Upstate as the head tennis coach in 1998. During her five-year stint with the tennis programs, she elevated the programs to levels never before seen. In 2003, the women's team advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever and the men's team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, also a first for the program. Presently, she serves on the NCAA National Tennis Committee and was the interim chair of the South Atlantic Region last year.

Previously, she served as tennis professional at UNC Hospital and assistant pro at Tampa Yacht and Country Club. In 1998, she served as a productions assistant at the Lipton Tennis Tournament.

Matheny graduated from Lenoir-Rhyne College with a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1993, and earned a master's degree in sports administration from the University of North Carolina in 1999. She was named the 1993 NCAA Woman of the Year while at Lenoir-Rhyne.

Scott Larson

Associate AD/Compliance
2nd Year • Tulsa '98



Scott Larson is the first full-time compliance director at USC Upstate, coming onboard with the Spartans in January of 2007 as Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance. He was promoted to Associate AD for Compliance in the summer of 2007.

Larson has over nine years of compliance experience at the Division I level. Throughout his professional career, Larson has developed and implemented several programs to improve the compliance operations at the institutions where he has worked.

Larson came to USC Upstate from the University of Texas at El Paso where he served as Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance and Student Aid from 2005-06. He oversaw all aspects of the compliance program. In addition, he had oversight responsibilities for the women's tennis and rifle programs.

Chris Hawkins is in his 14th season as the head coach of the USC Upstate softball program.

Hawkins, a former standout on the USC Upstate baseball team, was inducted into the USC Upstate Athletics Hall of Fame in February of 2003 for his accomplishments as a player.

The winningest coach in the history of the softball program with 454 victories, Hawkins reached the 400-win milestone during the 2006 season. He has compiled a 454-218-1 career record, all at USC Upstate, and coached the Spartans to four consecutive NCAA Division II Tournament appearances. He ended his tenure in NCAA Division II ranked in the Top 25 among the winningest coaches in the history of NCAA Division II softball.

Hawkins will take an accomplished resume and a strong softball program to new ground in 2008 as the Spartans play their first season as a member of NCAA Division I and the Atlantic Sun Conference.

Hawkins guided the 2007 Spartans to a school record 47 wins and a 47-15 record. The year marked the fifth time in the history of the program that the team finished with 40 wins. Hawkins has coached four of the 40-win teams. The .758 winning percentage in 2007 ranks as the highest winning percentage in Hawkins' tenure as head coach. Three of his players earned All-America honors, the first time in school history the program has produced multiple All-Americans in a single season. He led the Spartans to a 41-18-1 record in 2006 and a third-straight appearance in the NCAA Division II Tournament.

Hawkins coached what was arguably the best season in the history of the program in 2005 as USC Upstate set a then-school record for wins, claiming a 46-15 record, breaking or tying 31 individual or team school records, and advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season. The Spartans advanced to the championship game of the South Atlantic Regional before falling to eventual national runner-up Kennesaw State. Under his guidance, Krista Altom earned First Team All-America honors, four players were named All-Region, four players were named to the Regional All-Tournament team and two players earned All-Conference honors.

In 2004, Hawkins guided the Spartans to a 38-16 record and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament, his first and the program's first since the 1992 squad advanced to the NCAA Regionals. He led USC Upstate to the final game of day two and eliminated perennial power North Florida from the South Atlantic Regional while placing three players on the South Atlantic Region team and two on the Regional All-Tournament squad.

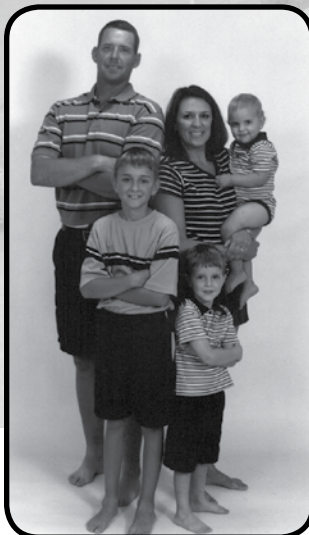
In 2002, Hawkins led USC Upstate to a 35-10 record, recording the best winning percentage (.778) in his stint at the helm of the program. The 2002 season improved upon a strong 34-12 year in 2001. In 1999, USC Upstate won a then-school record 41 games and was the first season that Hawkins' teams turned the corner, competing on a national level. The year marked the first time one of Hawkins' players earned All-America honors when Beth Bayer, now an Athletics Hall of Fame member, earned second team honors.

Hawkins built the foundation of the softball program from 1995-98. His teams combined for a 109-80 record in his first four seasons. He had seven All-Conference selections in his first four years as a head coach and his teams finished third in the Peach Belt Conference twice.

Hawkins began his coaching career as an assistant at the University under Mark Cooke during the 1989 softball season. He has coordinated several fastpitch softball camps across South Carolina for the past 18 years. He played fastpitch softball during the summers for Ehrhardt Motor Company for 11 years. The team competes in tournaments across the Southeast. In the summers of 1995-1997, Hawkins helped lead the team to the state men's fastpitch open division championship and finished eighth in the nation in 1996.

Hawkins, who graduated from USC Upstate in 1989 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, was a member of USC Upstate's first varsity baseball team in 1986. He led the NJCAA in strikeouts with 144 in 75 1/3 innings while at Anderson (S.C.) College in 1985. His career collegiate pitching record at Western Carolina (N.C.) University, Anderson and USC Upstate was 30-9 with 11 saves. Hawkins was drafted by the Atlanta Braves in 1985

and again by the Houston Astros in 1987. He played in the Astros' system in 1988 before a career-ending elbow injury forced an end to his professional playing career.

Hawkins has been active as a coach of summer travel ball. He coached for the Carolina Crush (Orange) 18U team and led the organization's 16U team to the Walnut Creek Classic tournament championship in Raleigh, NC, in the summer of 2003. Prior to his work with the Crush, he was the head coach of the Palmetto Power 18U Fast Pitch Traveling Team, a position he held for five years. The Power finished 5th in the nation in 1998. Hawkins has spoken across the country to coaches and athletes about motivation and work ethic.

As interim volleyball coach in 1994, Hawkins led USC Upstate to a 38-4 record and a second consecutive Peach Belt Conference title.

A native of Seneca, S.C., Hawkins and his wife, Anje, live in Moore with their sons; Kyle, Brooks, and Ryan. His sister-in-law, Amy (Parker) Reier was a member of the USC Upstate softball team from 1994-97, playing for Hawkins for three seasons.

Ciria Ochoa is in her second year as assistant softball coach at USC Upstate. Ochoa assists in all phases of the softball program with primary responsibilities as the pitching coach and coordinator of the strength and conditioning program.

Under Ochoa's guidance, the 2007 Upstate pitching staff ranked third in the Peach Belt Conference with a 2.14 earned run average, with two of the three pitchers recording an ERA of under 2.00. The staff tossed 14 shutouts and 35 complete games, while picking up four saves on the year. The pitchers recorded 372 strikeouts in 403 innings pitched with opponents hitting just .221 against the three-arm rotation. Ochoa's pitchers earned Peach Belt Conference Pitcher of the Week honors on two occasions, as well as one hurler earning All-Peach Belt Conference honors.

Ochoa came to USC Upstate after serving as assistant coach at Lander University in 2005-06. Primarily the pitching coach at Lander, she also assisted with the outfielders and hitters and helped implement the strength and conditioning program for the Bearcats.

Prior to her time at Lander, Ochoa was the assistant coach at Yakima Valley Community College in Yakima, Wash., from 2004-05. She was the pitching coach and worked with the outfielders and hitters. In the spring of 2004, she served as the pitching coach at Selah High School in Selah, Wash. In addition to her coaching duties, she has been an instructor at summer youth softball camps since 2000.

Ochoa was a four-year letterwinner on the softball team at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, Wash. After beginning her career as a starting pitcher, a series of injuries relegated her to relief appearances. She holds the school's all-times saves and games finished records, is eighth in appearances, and 14th in wins. She owns the school's single-season record for saves with five in 2001 and ranks fourth on the single-season list with 25 appearances in 2001. In addition to her career on the field, she was a standout student, graduating with a 3.6 GPA and a bachelor's degree in elementary education. She was a member of the school's Dean's List and earned Academic All-District



honors. She earned a master's degree in Education Curriculum Instruction: Technology in 2007.

A native of Othello, Wash., she was a standout pitcher and outfielder at Othello High School. A four-year letterwinner, she was an All-State, All-Area, and All-League selection. She earned several team awards, including Most Valuable Player and the Coach's Award as well as serving as team captain. She was a solid student as well, earning membership into the National Honor Society and being selected *Who's Who Among American High School Students*.

Ashleigh Beck is in her first year assisting the softball program after spending the last four seasons playing first base for the Spartans.

Beck played in 214 games in her career at Upstate, starting 189 times at first base. She was a part-time starter as a freshman, then held the starting spot the last three seasons. She had a breakout year as a sophomore, finishing the season with a .295 batting average as a starter in 60 of the 61 games played by Upstate. She helped lead the Spartans to the championship game of the NCAA Southeast Regional at Kennesaw State and finished the tournament as the second-leading hitter in the regional.

Beck ranks second all-time with 1,266 putouts and third all-time with a .990 fielding percentage, having

committed just 13 errors in 1,320 chances. She also finished her career with 147 hits including 27 doubles and nine home runs. She collected 94 RBIs and 89 runs in her four years and stole 32 bases in 35 attempts.

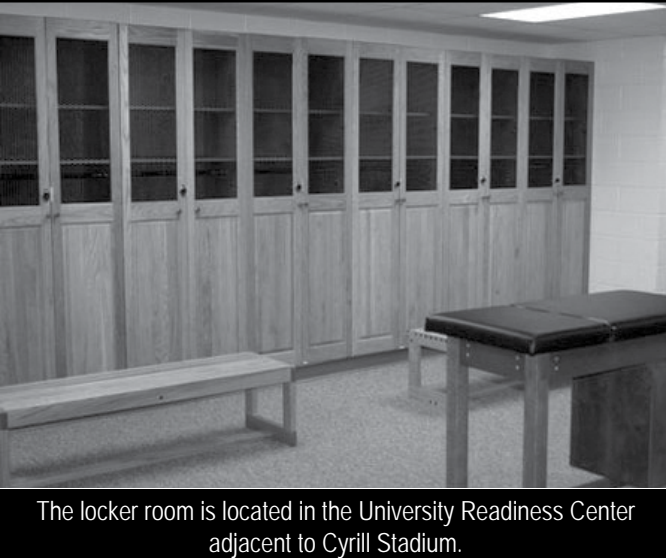

She hit .341 as a senior and earned honorable mention All-Area honors. USC Upstate has been fortunate to partner with individuals to create some of the more impressive athletic facilities in the region and, arguably, the nation. It goes without saying that the softball stadium is one such facility thanks to the efforts of Frank Cyrill.

Cyrill had a vision to create one of, if not the, best softball facilities in the South, regardless of NCAA divisional status. After several long hours of manual labor put in by Cyrill and head softball coach Chris Hawkins, along with the help of select other individuals and companies, Cyrill Stadium opened in 2002.

The stadium was constructed in stages as the field, dugouts, concrete seating area, and lights were installed first for the 2002 season. The press box was completed for the 2004 season, while stadium seating was completed in December of 2004. The result of Cyrill's vision and his commitment to the University is Cyrill Stadium, one of the best college softball stadiums in the region.

Cyrill Stadium has received numerous awards since its completion. The facility earned the 2006 NFCA/TURFACE National Field Maintenance Award and was named the Sports Turf Manager's 2006 College Softball Field of the Year. In December of 2003, Cyrill Stadium was honored with a regional TURFACE Field Maintenance Award.

2008 Season Preview

Four straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearances, three 40-win seasons in the last four years, three All-American selections a year ago and a coach who has won over 450 games in his career are lofty numbers put up by the USC Upstate softball program. That kind of resume is one of accomplishment for a program that is set to embark on an ambitious venture, reclassifying to NCAA Division I status as a member of the challenging A-Sun.

Upstate head coach **Chris Hawkins** enters his 14th season at the helm of the softball program. He has built the program into a perennial winner. Playing in what was considered one of the top Division II conferences in the country, the Spartans routinely finished in the upper half of the Peach Belt Conference throughout Hawkins' tenure as head coach. In recent years, though, Upstate took on the title of being a regional power and a player on the national scene. Hawkins will look to take that reputation, as well as the solid foundation he has established, into the Division I ranks and the A-Sun for the first time this year.

While the transition to Division I status is sure to include bumps in the road, Hawkins can enter the first season knowing he has experience and depth to play with this year. Eight starters return from last year's school record 47-win season, including All-Americans **Shay Slater**, **Vanesa Flores** and **Heidi Gibbs**. Slater led the Peach Belt Conference with a .454 batting average and a league record 70 runs. Flores was named the co-Player of the Year in the league and led the conference with 19 home runs. Gibbs hit .423, finishing second only to Slater for the league batting title.

Slater and Flores are both seniors and are joined by **Katie Adams** and **Tiffany Pitcher** as players playing their final season in a Spartan uniform. Adams, Pitcher and Slater have started since their freshmen season, while Flores is playing her second year with the program after transferring from Mt. San Antonio College in her native California. The four seniors are expected to set the tone on and off the field.

Amber Patterson, **Ana Mitchell** and hurler **Brittany Rice** are the other three starting players returning to the team this season, while **Melissa Lockey** and **Keri Sarratt** also played a key role on the team in 2007. With seven starting position players and one starting pitcher returning to the team, stability and familiarity with Hawkins' system should not be a problem. The newcomers have plenty of opportunities to learn from the upperclassmen and other returning players.

Hawkins added nine newcomers to the roster this season. The first Division I recruiting class is filled with talent and will enable Hawkins to put the best nine players out on the field each game while having plenty to call upon from the bench. Look for **Morgan Childers** to have the biggest impact of any of the newcomers. With just one pitcher returning to the team, Childers, who has a strong resume, is expected to step into a primary starting role.

Upstate opens the season against Division II teams Tusculum and West Virginia Wesleyan. The Spartans then play teams exclusively from Division I, playing its first D-I game at home against Winthrop. Winthrop is coached by former Upstate head coach Mark Cooke. The Spartans will travel to tournaments at Charlotte and North Carolina as well as taking on the likes of Furman, Coastal Carolina, UNC Wilmington, Charleston Southern and Presbyterian in their non-conference schedule. With Furman and Winthrop on the schedule, as well as facing preseason A-Sun favorite Stetson, Upstate will face three teams who earned a trip to the NCAA Division I Tournament in 2007.

Upstate will also have to deal with a tough Atlantic Sun Conference, though the Spartans are familiar with at least two teams in the league. Kennesaw State and North Florida were once rivals of Upstate in the Peach Belt Conference. The two schools left for the Division I ranks and the A-Sun after the 2005 season. Kennesaw won the regular season A-Sun championship a year ago and is picked to finish second this season. North Florida is picked third in the conference this year. Their quick success should help bolster the mindset of the Spartans in their first year of D-I competition, though with Upstate being picked ninth in the A-Sun preseason poll, Upstate has a ways to go in garnering the respect that the program received as a Division II institution.

The University had the option of picking two programs to fast-track into eligibility for post-season play within two years. With the strong showing on a conference, regional and national level, the softball program was one of the two programs tapped by the school. Upstate will be eligible for postseason play in 2010, meaning this year's freshmen will be juniors when the Spartans can compete after regular season play. The foundation built in this first year of the program could go a long way in building toward postseason play in a short amount of time.

Upstate will enter the 2008 season with three pitchers vying for playing time in the circle. **Brittany Rice** (So., Chattanooga, Tenn.) is the only returning pitcher from last year's team and she is again expected to contribute greatly this season. She led the team with a 1.84 earned run average and was second with 17 wins and 136 strikeouts in 148 innings of work.

Morgan Childers (Fr., Kings Mountain, N.C.) was the 3A Western North Carolina Pitcher of the Year and an all-state selection. She led Kings Mountain High School to back-to-back state championships as a sophomore and junior and pitched the team to the state championship game as a senior. She is a tremendous talent who could easily move to the top of the rotation this season.

Kayla Short (Jr., Gastonia, N.C.) spent the first two seasons of her collegiate career at Walters State where she turned in a solid resume. She also was a standout high school pitcher at Ashbrook High School. She will be counted on heavily to log important innings this season.

Catcher

Four catchers will compete for playing time this season. Hawkins will have a tough decision on his hands deciding between returning starter **Tiffany Pitcher** and **Kim Brasil** for the starting spot. Both are strong defensive catchers, but also possess the ability to play other positions on the field. The person not starting may very well find a starting position elsewhere in the lineup.

Tiffany Pitcher (Sr., Greenville, S.C.) was an all-region player as a freshmen when she, Shay Slater and Katie Adams helped lead Upstate to the South Atlantic Regional championship game. She sits atop Upstate's all-time fielding percentage list, committing just four errors in three seasons with the Spartans.

Kim Brasil (Fr., Mississauga, Ontario) is an accomplished player having played for the Markham Jaguars the last three years. She helped lead the Jaguars to three straight Canadian Junior National Championships and was named the Offensive Player of the Tournament in the National Championships last August.

Vanesa Flores and **Jenna Torbert** will also push for playing time behind the plate. Flores (Sr., Chino, Calif.) started on a part-time basis last season. She hit 19 home runs with a .383 batting average en route to being named the co-Peach Belt Conference Player of the Year in 2007. Her offensive abilities are tremendous. When not behind the plate, she should have the starting position at designated player locked down.

Jenna Torbert (Fr., Denver, N.C.) is a talented newcomer who was an All-State player last year with North Lincoln High School. She has the talent to play at the D-I level and should receive a lot of knowledge playing behind three solid catchers her freshman season.

Infield

Ashleigh Beck no longer holds the starting position at first base for Upstate. Beck was a strong defensive player for the Spartans, starting at first in each of the last three seasons. She will turn the reigns over to either newcomer **Lauren Quevedo** or **Tiffany Pitcher**.

Lauren Quevedo (Fr., Wellington, Fla.) provides the infielders a solid target to throw to and possesses power on the offensive side of the plate. She has pure power and quick bat speed. How well she makes the transition to Division I pitching may be the deciding factor on whether or not she starts.

Tiffany Pitcher has been solid in getting repetitions at a new position. She is an extremely smart player who picks up things quickly and has made the transition to first base with ease. It should be no surprise if she is in the starting lineup at either first base or catcher.

Katie Adams (Sr., Mauldin, S.C.) is the second of three seniors who have started since their freshmen season at Upstate. She has had a lock on the position at second base since 2005 and should not let go of it this season. She was an all-region pick in 2006 and finished 2007 with a .340 batting average, good for fifth on the team.

Ana Mitchell and **Courtney Feldon** could battle throughout the season for the starting spot

at shortstop. Mitchell (So., Seneca, S.C.) was pressed into starting duty as a freshman last season and showed signs of being a very good shortstop. She had a very good fall season and is expected to continue her solid play throughout the year.

Feldon (Fr., Denver, N.C.) is a pure talent. She was an all-state selection and the 2A Western North Carolina Player of the Year as a senior at North Lincoln High School. She has strong defensive skills and possesses outstanding offensive abilities, hitting for average and power. She has also taken several repetitions at second base and is just as comfortable there as she is at shortstop.

Perhaps the biggest battle for playing time in the lineup is at third base where three players are vying for the starting spot.

Emily Monteith, Keri Sarratt and Sasha Stepaniuk have all had plenty of repetitions at third and the separation has simply not materialized. It could be a battle throughout the season with the most consistent hitter staking her claim to the spot.

Monteith (Fr., Clover, S.C.) was an All-State selection at Olympic High School in Charlotte, N.C. She is a tremendous defensive player who has seen an increase in her offensive production since coming to Upstate.

Sarratt (So., Gaffney, S.C.) also possesses strong defensive skills. She took over the starting position at third early last season, but a torn ACL ended her promising freshman season early. She has worked hard to return to the field this season and is nearing 100 percent in preseason workouts.

Stepaniuk (Fr., Mississauga, Ontario) is also a solid defensive player. She comes from a strong program with the Markham Jaguars, having spent one more season with the team than current teammate Kim Brasil. Stepaniuk helped lead the Jaguars to four straight Canadian Junior National Championships as the starting third baseman.

Outfield

Perhaps the strongest unit on the field lies in the outfield with three returning starters and plenty of quality depth to call upon.

Shay Slater (Sr., Anderson, S.C.) leads the way in the outfield. She earned All-America honors last season after hitting .454 and leading the Peach Belt Conference in several statistical categories, including setting a league record with 70 runs. In a long line of quality center fielders who have played in the program, she could be the best ever. She will be the starter in center field without discussion.

Heidi Gibbs (Jr., Florence, S.C.) is perhaps the best right fielder to ever play at Upstate. She finished second to Slater with a .423 batting average last season and earned All-America honors along the way. She simply gets on base and collects the big hit.

Amber Patterson (Jr., Lyman, S.C.) hit .413 last season en route to being named all-region. She led the team with 20 doubles and was second with 41 RBIs. A versatile player, she played three different positions for the Spartans last year, flourishing at all three.

Melissa Lockey (Jr., Holly Hill, S.C.) has produced potentially the top fall and preseason of anyone on the team. Her play has been so impressive, Hawkins will not hesitate to put her in the outfield. She has been used primarily as a pinch runner, finishing sixth in the Peach Belt Conference in stolen bases a year ago.

Courtney Tate (Fr., Kings Mountain, N.C.) is a solid player who was an all-region and all-area player at Kings Mountain High School last year. She possesses speed and is a heady player. She will provide depth in the outfield while serving as a key role player on the base paths.

Kim Brasil split time at catcher and in left field for the Markham Jaguars over the last three seasons. The versatility she, along with Patterson and Pitcher, gives to Hawkins will allow the veteran coach to move people around to put the best lineup on the field at any given time.

Having options with depth and talent is something Hawkins cherishes as the program moves to the Division I level as a member of the Atlantic Sun Conference.

Stacey Berrong

Stacey Berrong had the privilege of being the first USC Upstate softball player to be inducted into the Athletics Hall of Fame. Her academic success, career numbers, individual accomplishments, and leadership all played a factor in her selection.

Berrong made an immediate impact on the program as a freshman, finishing second in the nation with 20 home runs and breaking four single-season school records along the way. She finished the season with a school record 20 homers, 72 RBI, a .986 slugging percentage and a .540 on-base percentage, all records that still stand today. In addition, she remains atop the all-time career records list in five categories including 46 home runs, 215 RBI, 425 total bases, 87 walks and 486 assists. Her 20 home runs in 1996 stand as the Peach Belt Conference single-season home run record, while her 425 career total bases also ranks atop the Peach Belt's list.

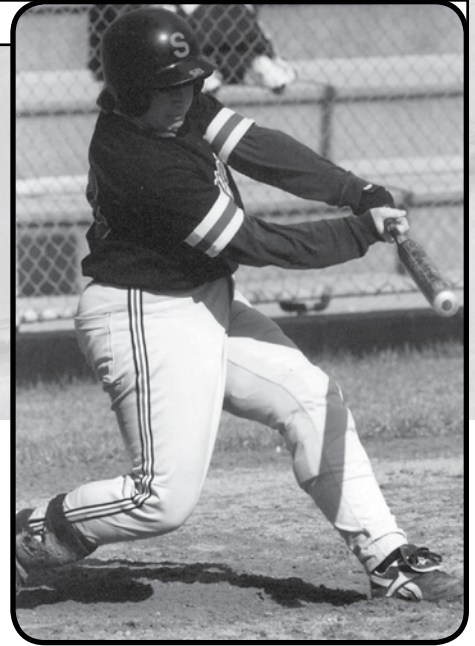
Berrong's performance throughout her career was noticed by the Peach Belt Conference as she received All-Conference honors all four years of her career, the only Spartan to earn All-Conference honors for four years. She was also a first team All-Region selection in 1997 and 1999 and earned Peach Belt Conference Player of the Week honors four times in 1996. Berrong made her name known nationally as well. In addition to ranking second in the nation

in home runs as a freshman and earning a spot in *Sports Illustrated's* "Faces In the Crowd" section in 1996, she finished the 1999 season ranked among the nation's leaders in four statistical categories. She finished 19th in the country with a .779 slugging percentage, 28th with 12 home runs, 28th with 57 RBI and 40th with a .426 batting average.

While Berrong clearly excelled on the playing field, she was also a standout student. She was a member of the Peach Belt Conference Presidential Academic Honor Roll.

Beth Bayer

Beth Bayer is the second member of the softball program to be inducted into the USC Upstate Athletics Hall of Fame.

Bayer was a two-year member of the then-Lady Rifles, playing from 1999-2000 and spent four total seasons with the program as an assistant coach for two years after exhausting her eligibility. She led the team to a 41-14 record in 1999, establishing a new school record for wins. The 2000 squad finished with a 38-11 record.

Bayer played in and started 96 games in her career. She finished her two years with a .408 batting average with 126 hits including 19 doubles, nine triples, and 28 home runs. She tallied 100 RBIs, 104 runs scored and stole 79 bases.

At the time she finished her playing career, Bayer owned three career and four single-season school records. She currently owns the all-time slugging percentage record with a .799 percentage and ranks second all-time with 28 stolen bases and third 79 stolen bases. She ranks fourth all-time with 100 RBIs and fifth with a .408 career batting average. It should be noted that every player listed above her on all career record lists played for three or more seasons at the University, while Bayer's marks were achieved in just two seasons. Bayer's name appears 13 times on the single-season record book lists. Her 140 total bases remain a school record.

Bayer was a highly decorated student-athlete, earn-

ing All-Conference honors in 1999 and 2000, All-Region honors in 1999 and 2000, and third-team All-America honors in 2000. Upon completion of her playing career, Bayer remained with the program for two seasons as an assistant coach, helping the Spartans to a 60-34 record from 2001-02.

USC UPSTATE

Now in its 40th year, USC Upstate continues striving toward its vision to become one of the Southeast's leading "metropolitan" universities — a university which acknowledges as its fundamental reason for being its relationship to its surrounding cities, their connecting corridors and expanding populations. It aims to be recognized nationally among its peer metropolitan institutions for its excellence in education and commitment to its students, for its involvement in the Upstate, for its operational and managerial effectiveness, for its civility and common purpose, and for the clarity and integrity of its mission. As a senior comprehensive public institution of the University of South Carolina, the University's primary responsibilities are to offer baccalaureate education to the citizens of the Upstate of South Carolina and to offer selected master's degrees in response to regional demand.

ABOUT UPSTATE

- USC Upstate is among the fastest growing universities in the State, now employing 650 full and part-time faculty and staff and enrolling 4,800 students, reflecting the diversity of Upstate South Carolina.
- The Susan Jacobs Arboretum features a 300-seat amphitheatre, a meandering creek lined with stones and boulders, lighted walkways and foliage indigenous to the area among its 12 acres.
- From its founding, the University opened its doors to all races. Today, with a minority enrollment exceeding 30 percent and faculty representation increased to 14 percent, the institution is widely regarded as a leading example of interracial cooperation, cultural pluralism, equal opportunity, access and equity.
- Of the University's 4,800 enrolled students, 71 nations are represented among the student body, reflecting the Upstate's international character.
- The implementation of a 10-year, \$150 million master plan that focuses on the development of the northern segment of the Spartanburg campus has dramatically increased classroom space, academic support facilities, parking and roadways, housing and athletic/recreational facilities.
- Forty years after its founding, USC Upstate boasts an alumni base of more than 16,500, of which 80 percent of these graduates remain in the Upstate to build their lives and careers.



Building A Metropolitan University

Since its founding, USC Upstate has grown from a small, two-year campus into one of the leading metropolitan universities in the Southeast. This growth has been a direct response to the needs of the Upstate — a tradition that began with the University's creation. The University has expanded well beyond nursing to include 40 bachelor's programs in the liberal arts, sciences, business, informatics, teacher education and nursing. Master's programs are offered in education.

In 1994, the University moved to the graduate level, with master's degree programs in elementary education and early childhood education. The University began offering degree programs in special education - visual impairment, nonprofit administration, information and management systems, and graphic design in 2002. In 2005, the Metropolitan Studies Institute was founded to coordinate interdisciplinary initiatives across the USC Upstate campus that focus on urban and metropolitan issues. The Institute also leads collaborative activities between the University and organizations, institutions, and businesses in the community.

Master Planning

New infrastructure is being created for a highly visible entrance, providing easier, faster and safer accessibility to campus, improved traffic flow, expansion of existing roads and creation of new roads.

A one-of-a-kind partnership between the South Carolina Army National Guard and USC Upstate resulted in a shared new facility for the 228th Signal Brigade and the University. The \$7 million facility has 55,000 square feet and is situated on a 12-acre site. The University is provided with additional classroom space, special events locations, hospitality rooms for the County University Soccer Stadium, locker rooms for athletic teams and additional support facilities for the Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex.

The Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex, one of the Southeast's top sports venues, includes the County University Soccer Stadium, Spartanburg County Youth Soccer Fields, Cleveland S. Harley Baseball Park, Cyrill Softball Stadium and a tennis complex. With the development of the Complex, all athletic venues are now housed on campus, creating a greater sense of a campus community.

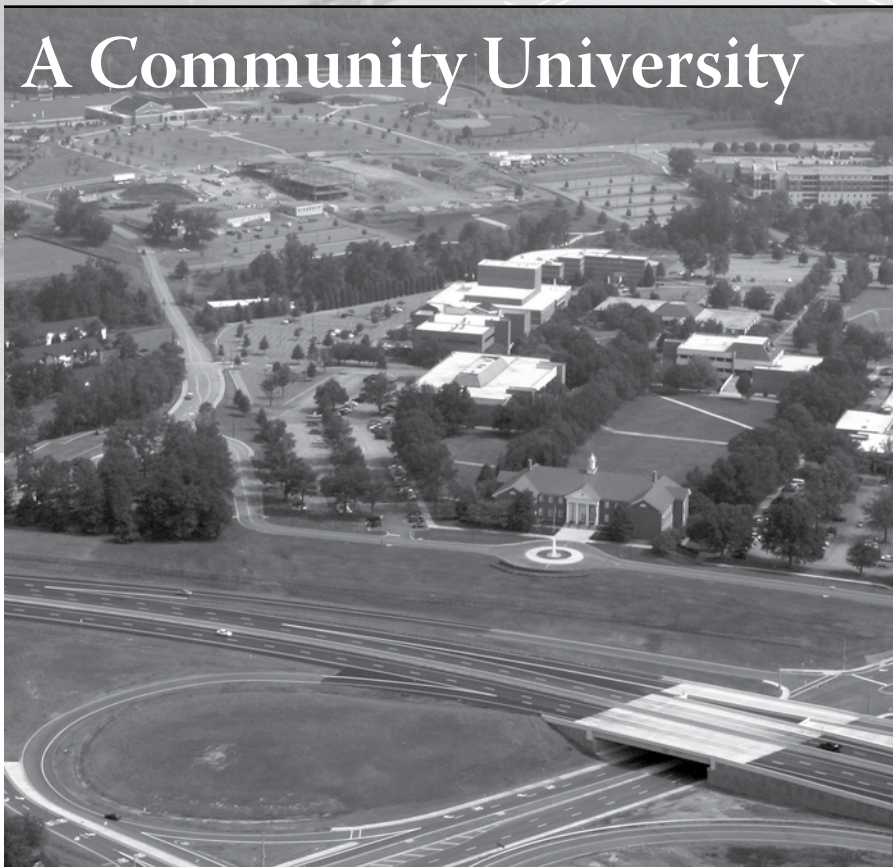
The Palmetto House, a new suite-style residence hall that houses 350 freshmen students, opened on Jan. 7, 2004. This \$15.5 million project is a four-story, L-shaped building consisting of single and double occupancy rooms, computer labs, open areas, laundry facilities, postal center and housing management offices. The co-educational 105,000 square-foot facility contributes to the sense of campus community and provides students with a rich living and learning environment.

In addition to numerous construction projects, a number of beautification initiatives to enhance the physical environment of the campus are underway. The Susan Jacobs Arboretum features a 300-seat amphitheatre, a meandering creek lined with stones and boulders, lighted walkways and foliage indigenous to the area among its 12 acres. A place of serene natural beauty ideal for various activities, the Arboretum serves as the center of gravity for campus life and student activities and provides a place for relaxation, for the enjoyment and advancement of academic studies.

Construction is currently underway on the Health Education Complex, a 150,000-square-foot building that will house the Mary Black School of Nursing, School of Education, Enrollment Services and Bookstore. Additionally a Wellness/Fitness Center — including a pool, racquetball and basketball courts, running track, climbing wall and aerobics facilities — will provide first-rate recreation, exercise and instructional and research opportunities for the campus community.

USC Upstate's main campus in Spartanburg will continue to grow, particularly given its residential freshman through senior student population and with the forthcoming construction of the Library and additional housing.

USC Upstate Athletes will benefit from the newest member of the athletic department, the Acceleration Sports Institute. Located on the first floor in the Steadman-Hawkins Clinic of the Carolinas building, ASI has joined in partnership with Upstate athletics to provide strength and conditioning services to all Spartan athletic teams. Headed by Darren Cady, Matthew Rollins, Jim Ellis, and former major league pitcher Darren Holmes, the Spartans weight training and conditioning services are greatly enhanced by the programs written by hall of fame strength and conditioning coaches Barry Rubin and Al Miller.

This elite program utilizes a periodized resistance training regimen to increase strength, power, flexibility, and reaction. Within the training philosophy, plyometrics, speed/agility drills, and reactionary drills are utilized in conjunction with the resistance program to insure reduced injury potential.

Metabolic conditioning is specific to the demands of each sport and allows the athlete to "break through" the fatigue barrier to improved performance. The elite program is technically designed to hone the body into a sport specific tool.



NCAA COMPLIANCE

Guide To NCAA Rules For Alumni, Faculty And Friends

"Institutional control" of athletics is a fundamental requirement of NCAA legislation. As such, the USC Upstate is responsible for ensuring that members of the faculty and staff, coaches, student-athletes, alumni, donors, boosters and friends of the institution comply with all applicable NCAA rules. The information below is intended to provide a basic overview of NCAA rules governing USC Upstate alumni, faculty and friends. Because of the complexity of the rules, the following does not include all applicable situations and should not be relied upon exclusively. USC Upstate appreciates your interest and support but reminds you that an inappropriate contact or an inadvertent action on your part can jeopardize the eligibility of a prospective or enrolled student-athlete and the university. If you have specific questions, please contact the Athletics Department's Compliance Office at (864) 503-5793.

Compliance with NCAA rules is of the highest priority for our athletics program and institution. Even the best-intentioned action on your part may be a violation of NCAA rules. Please remember to ASK before you ACT.

You Are Considered A "Representative Of USC Upstate's Athletics Interests" (i.e., a booster) if you:

- Have ever made any type of financial or in-kind contribution to the athletics department, to a specific sport program, or to an athletics booster organization, including purchasing season tickets to athletics events.
- Are or have been a member of any organization or agency promoting USC Upstate athletics.
- Have ever helped to arrange or have provided employment for an enrolled student-athlete, a prospective student-athlete, or their parents or relatives.
- Have ever assisted in any manner in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- Have ever provided benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families.
- Have otherwise promoted the institution's athletics program in any manner.

Once you become a booster, you retain that status FOREVER!

Boosters Are Permitted To:

- Notify our coaches about prospects that may be strong additions to our teams.
- Attend high school or two-year college athletic contests or other events where prospects compete, however, boosters may not contact the prospect or the prospect's relatives.
- Continue existing friendships with families of prospects, but boosters may not attempt to recruit the prospect.
- Employ a prospect after they have graduated from high school or a two-year college.
- Boosters MAY provide enrolled student-athletes with an occasional home meal, provided the meal takes place at the booster's home and NOT at a local establishment. The meal may be catered and must be limited to infrequent or special occasions. The Compliance Office must approve all such meals.

A prospective student-athlete (a prospect) is:

any person who has begun classes for the ninth grade. A prospective student-athlete remains a prospect even after he or she has signed a National Letter of Intent or accepts an offer of financial aid to attend USC Upstate. The prospect remains a prospect until they report for the first day of classes for a regular term (fall or spring), they participate in a regular squad practice or competition, or they officially register and enroll and attend classes during the summer prior to initial enrollment and receive institutional athletics aid.

Boosters Are Prohibited From:

- Contacting a prospect in person on or off our campus.
- Writing or telephoning a prospect or a member of the prospect's family.
- Making arrangements for a prospect or the prospect's relatives or friends, to receive money or financial aid of any kind.
- Providing transportation for a prospect or the prospect's relatives or friends to visit our campus.
- Providing free tickets or tickets at a reduced cost for prospects or the prospect's relatives or friends to attend an athletic event.
- Entertaining high school, preparatory school or community college coaches.

Rules Governing Contacts With And Benefits For Student-Athletes

NCAA legislation expressly prohibits university supporters from providing "extra benefits" to enrolled student-athletes or their families. An extra benefit is any special arrangement to provide a student-athlete or his/her family a benefit not authorized by NCAA legislation. In general, boosters may not provide anything or make special arrangements for student-athletes or their families that are not available to the general student population.

Prohibited "Extra Benefits" Include, But Are Not Limited To:

- Providing cash or loans in any amount.
- Signing or co-signing for a loan or guarantee of bond.
- Use of an automobile or other personal property (e.g., boats, summer homes, stereos).
- Gifts of any kind, including birthday cards, flowers, holiday gifts and gifts of clothing or equipment.
- Any tangible items, including merchandise.
- Free or reduced-cost services, rentals, or purchases (e.g., car repairs, legal services, haircuts, meals at local restaurants).
- Purchasing complimentary admissions from a student-athlete.
- Providing an honorarium to a student-athlete for a speaking engagement.
- Providing typing services or other costs associated with school projects or reports.

Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex

The Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex is located in the northern section of the campus and includes the County University Soccer Stadium, Spartanburg County Youth Soccer Fields, Cleveland S. Harley Baseball Park, Cyrill Softball Stadium and Tennis Complex.

With its development, all athletic venues are now housed on campus creating a greater sense of a campus community. The Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex is one of the Southeast's top sports venues and it also acts as a catalyst for student recruitment and will attract a greater number of students and the public to athletic events.

The Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex is the home to six of the eight outdoor athletic programs currently offered at the institution – men's and women's soccer, baseball, softball, and men's and women's tennis. Cyrill Stadium, the home of the softball program, earned the NFCA/TURFACE National Field Maintenance Award for 2006 and was named the 2005 Field of the Year in South Carolina. The total cost of the athletic complex exceeded \$6 million and followed a \$2.5 million expansion and renovation of the Hodge Center, home to the volleyball and men's and women's basketball programs. Planning and design of a track and field complex and golf practice facility is underway.

FACILITIES



The USC Upstate Tennis Complex is a lighted, 12-court facility. Completed fully in 2005, the facility was home to four NCAA Tournaments and two Peach Belt Conference Championships.



Cleveland S. Harley Baseball Park opened in 2004. The stadium was officially dedicated with a ceremony honoring Cleveland Harley on March 18, 2005.



County University Soccer Stadium was the first facility completed at the Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex and is home to both the men's and women's soccer teams.



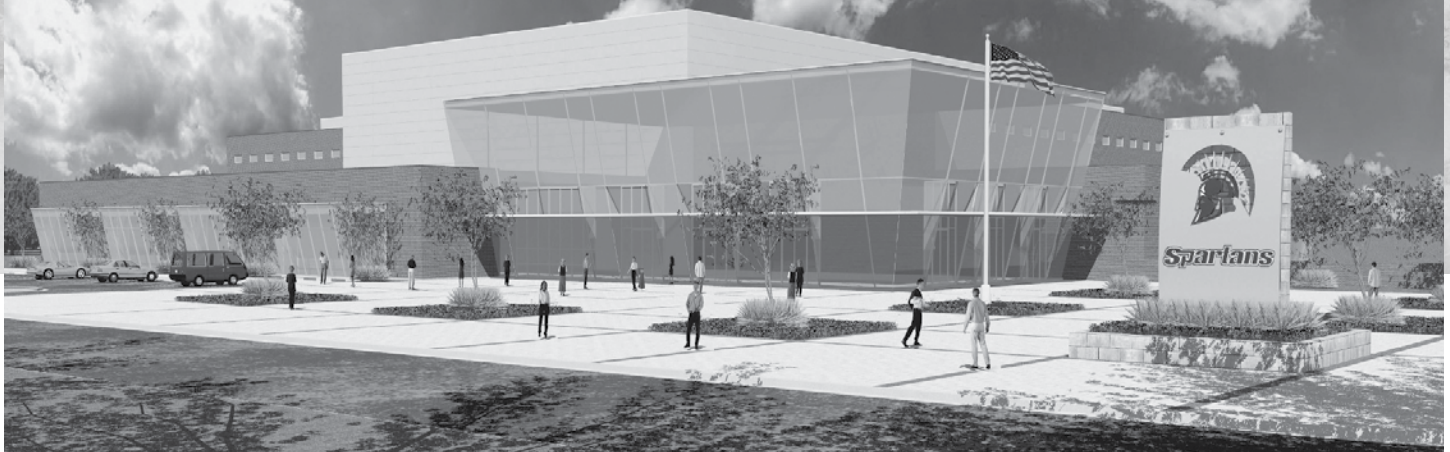
Construction of a new softball field was made possible by a generous gift from Frank Cyrill. The press box makes the facility one of the finest college softball facilities in the Southeast.



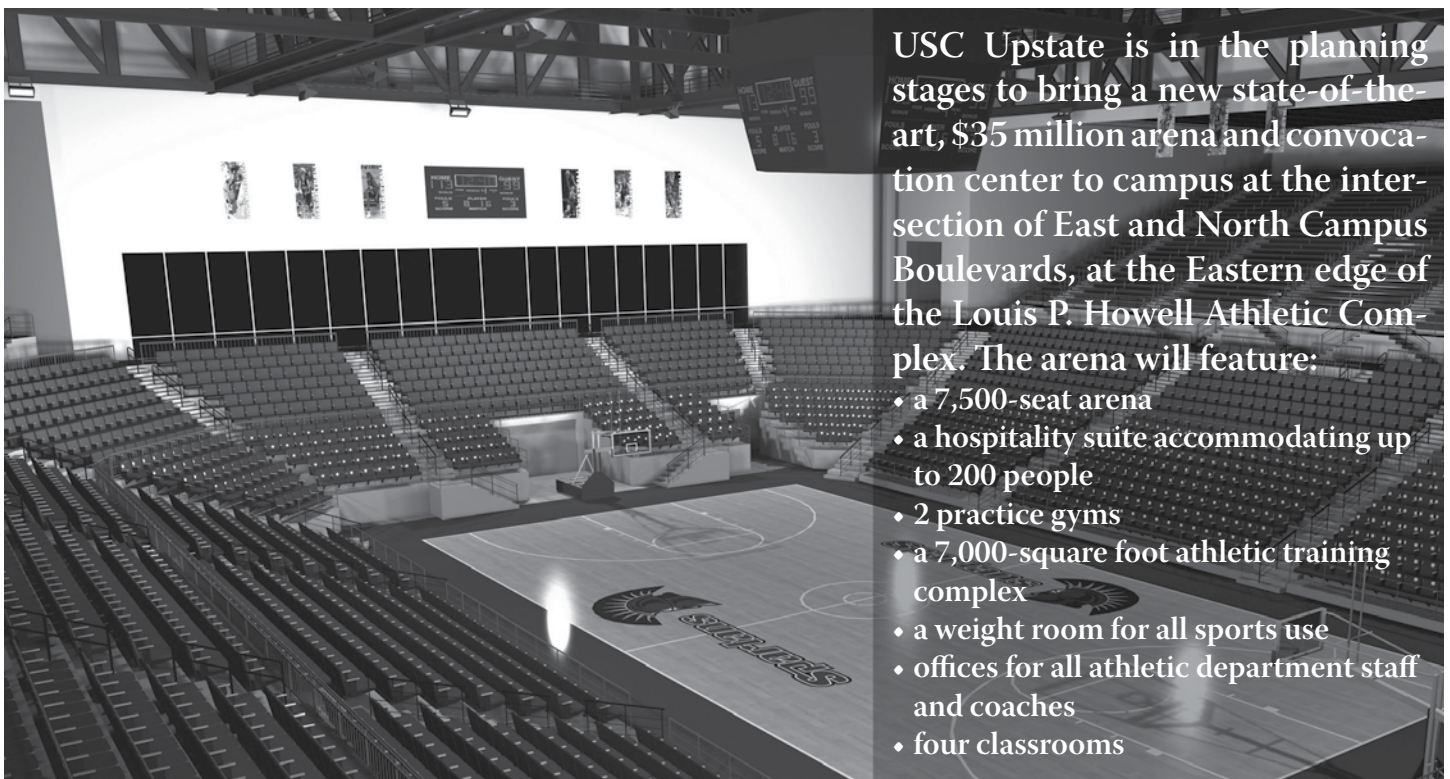
G.B. Hodge Center

THE USC UPSTATE CONVOCAATION CENTER



USC Upstate is in the planning stages to bring a new state-of-the-art, \$35 million arena and convocation center to campus at the intersection of East and North Campus Boulevards, at the Eastern edge of the Louis P. Howell Athletic Complex. The arena will feature:

- a 7,500-seat arena
- a hospitality suite accommodating up to 200 people
- 2 practice gyms
- a 7,000-square foot athletic training complex

USC UPSTATE + ATLANTIC SUN CONFERENCE A WINNING COMBINATION

The 2007-08 season will mark the first season that the University of South Carolina Upstate will compete in the Atlantic Sun Conference and the first in the school’s history at the Division I level.

Atlantic Sun History

Founded on Sept. 19, 1978, the Atlantic Sun Conference has operated for more than a quarter century in the ever-changing landscape of intercollegiate athletics with a consistent commitment to its Constitutional Mission to “assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports.”

Ted Gumbart became the league’s fourth full-time commissioner when he took over the reigns in May of 2007. The A-Sun office has been in Macon, Ga., since April of 1992, after relocating from Athens.

Academic Excellence

The Atlantic Sun Conference continues to prove that it excels both athletically and academically. In 2005-06, more than 50 percent of the conference’s student-athletes who participated during the season earned all-academic honors. For the spring season alone, 52.2 percent of student-athletes in the A-Sun were honored, as compared to 50.0 percent during the fall, giving the conference a 51.4 percent total.

Athletic Excellence

The A-Sun has continually matched its classroom achievement with success on the playing fields. Over the past nine years, the A-Sun has posted NCAA wins in each of the team sports that it sponsors. For the eight-straight season the A-Sun advanced multiple teams to the NCAA Baseball Championship, with tournament champion Jacksonville and regular season champion Stetson receiving bids in 2007. East Tennessee State made it to the NCAA Men’s Golf Championship for the second straight year. The A-Sun received multiple postseason berths in men’s basketball for the fourth time in six seasons as Belmont made their second straight NCAA Championship appearance and ETSU earned an NIT bid. The women’s programs matched the men as Belmont earned an NCAA bid and ETSU made the WNIT field.

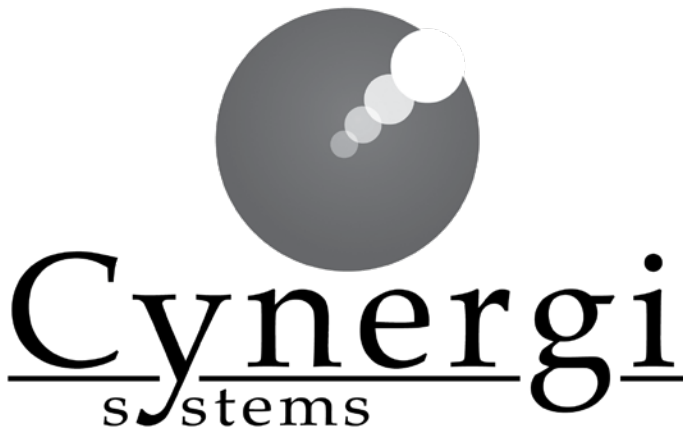

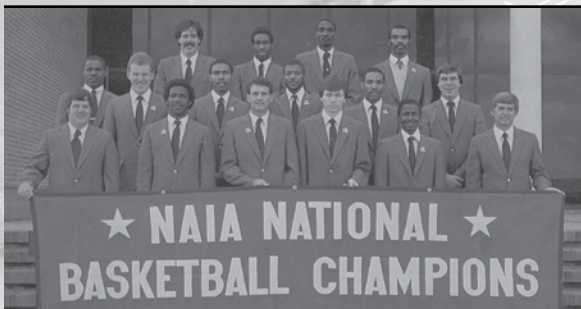

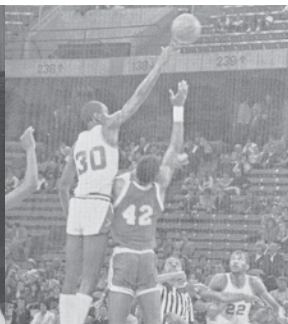

SPARTAN SUCCESS

A GROWING TRADITION

USC Upstate boasts a widely successful athletics program, one that has achieved tremendous success both on the playing fields and in the classroom. From the early days as a two-year institution, through the years as the university became a four-year institution and a member of the NAIA in the 1970s and continuing through the 1980s, continuing through membership in NCAA Division II, and on to the present as the University embarks on its membership in NCAA Division I, USC Upstate athletics has a proud history of success.

The men's basketball program claimed the 1982 NAIA National Championship and the university's other athletic teams built a strong foundation. With the desire to compete in the nation's highest quality sports organization, USC Upstate moved its athletic teams to the NCAA and Division II status in 1990. Since the move, USC Upstate has made 31 appearances in NCAA Tournaments, won 21 Peach Belt Conference regular season championships and 18 Peach Belt Conference Tournament titles and its student-athletes have received 27 All-America and 198 All-Conference honors.

Off the field, USC Upstate athletics has also enjoyed tremendous success. Two of its student-athletes have been named the NCAA Woman of the Year for South Carolina and two student-athletes have won the university's Earl Gordon Service Medal for exemplary community service. The athletics department averages more than 60 selections to the Peach Belt Conference Presidential Academic Honor Roll awarded to students with a 3.0 or better grade point average. The GPA's of the student-athletes have continued to improve in each of the last eight semesters. In the fall of 2005 alone, more than half of the university's 170 student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better and every team GPA was above a 2.7. Committed to diversity, the athletics department has received the university Tapestry Award for Diversity four times.

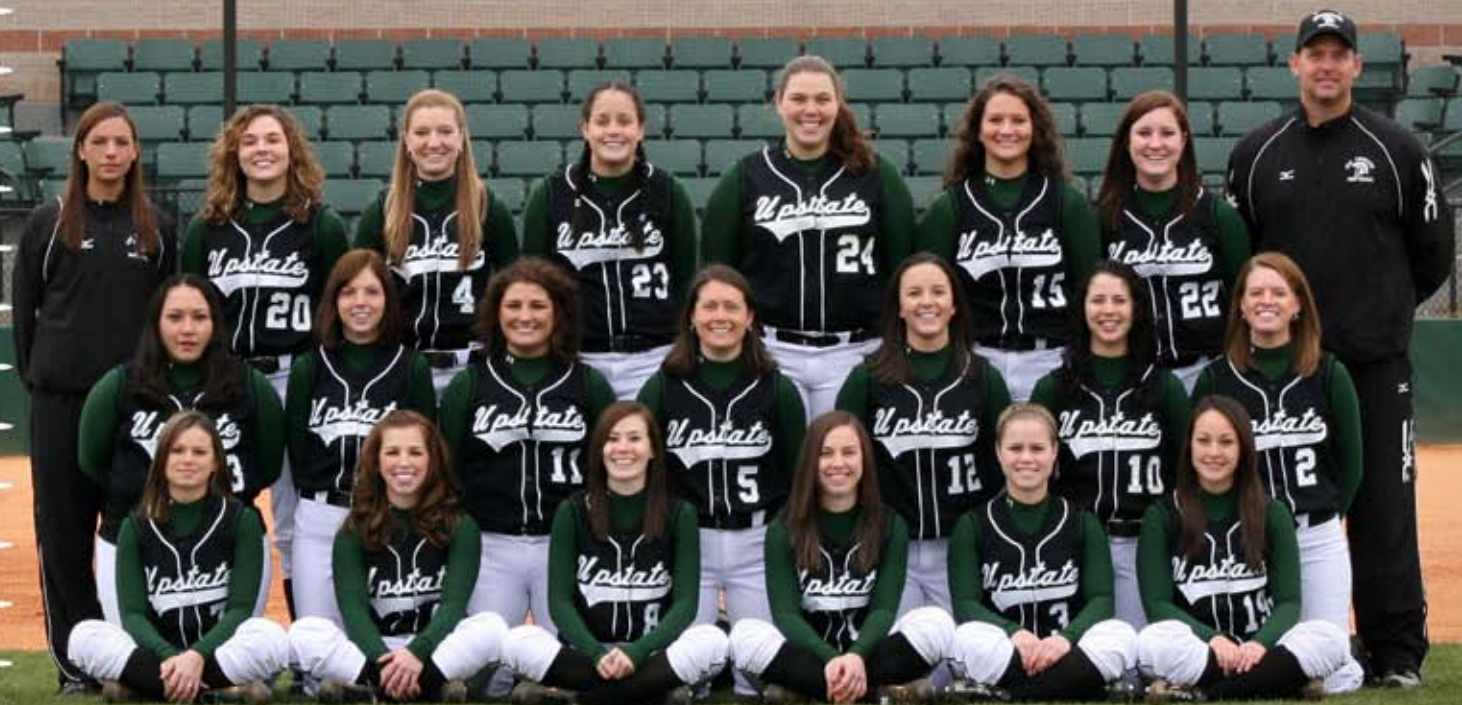
