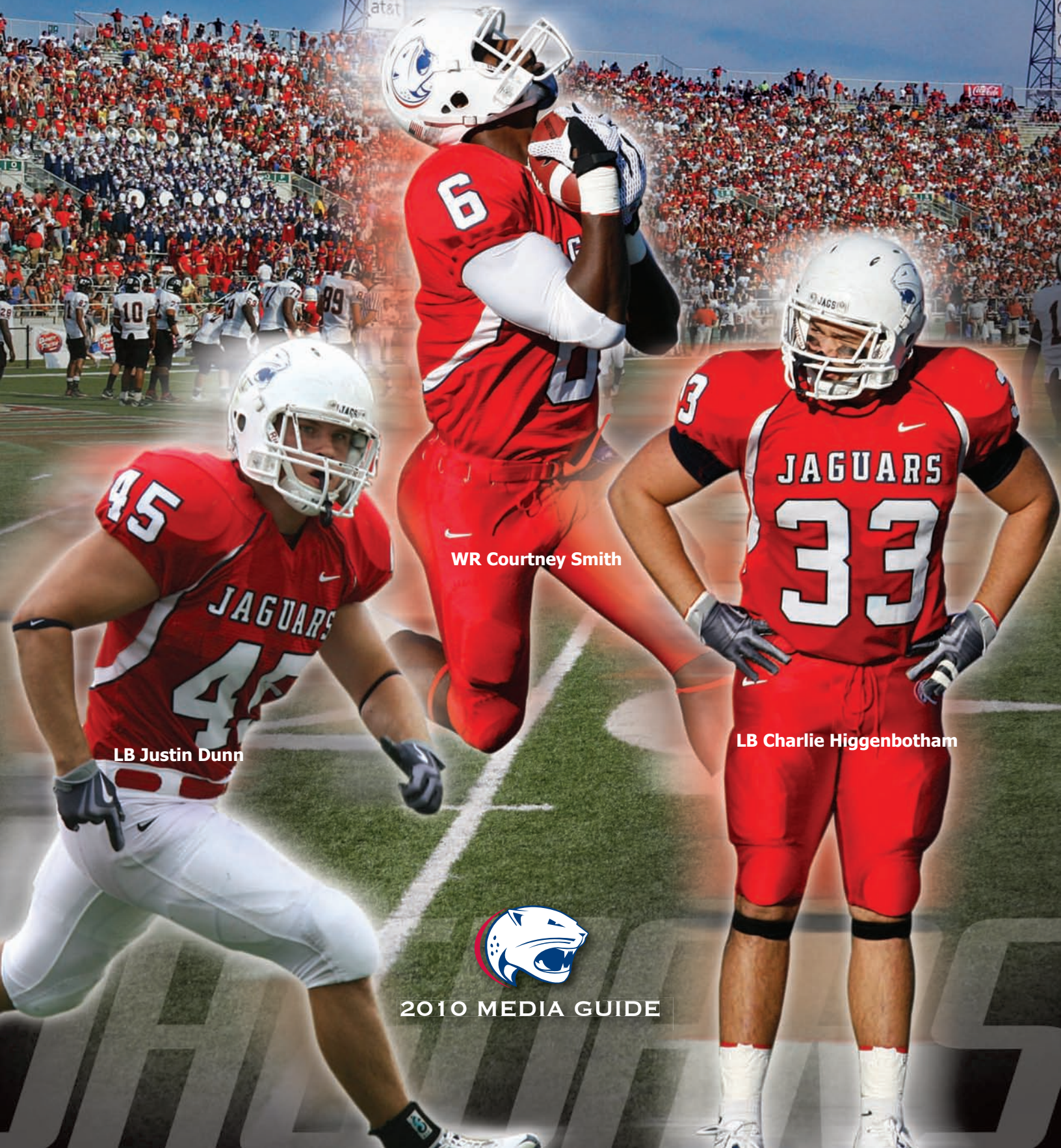

## ANTHONY MOSTELLA 1988-2010

On June 13, the University of South Alabama lost a member of the football program when Anthony Mostella passed away near his home of Oneonta, Ala.

Mostella, who would have been a senior this fall, was loved and respected by all his teammates and coaches, someone whose contributions to the program on the field were exceeded by what he was able to accomplish away from the game. Voted a team captain last season, Mostella — a running back who came to South Alabama in order to continue his relationship with head coach Joey Jones — displayed his selfless nature with his contributions on special teams and in the locker room while fellow teammates racked up more yardage running the ball.

He came to USA and Mobile after playing for Jones at Birmingham-Southern in 2007, sacrificing a season of collegiate eligibility in order to help build the Jaguar program by taking part in its first-ever spring practice in March and April of 2009. During that time he would establish himself not only as a leader, but as an ambassador for the program as it established its roots in the community.

The Jaguars will honor Mostella each fall as one member of the senior class will wear his No. 5 jersey for their final season.

### MEDIA INFORMATION

The 2010 South Alabama football media guide is designed to aid members of the media covering Jaguar football. We appreciate your coverage and if there is anything we can do to assist you, please contact the Assistant Athletic Director for Media Relations Brian Fremund at (251) 414-8032 or via e-mail at bfremond@usouthal.edu.

The Athletic Media Relations Office has certain policies and procedures that we ask for you to abide by while covering South Alabama. These are for the benefit of your needs and those of the student-athletes and coaches. We ask that you please respect these requests in order to maintain a good working atmosphere for all parties involved.

### MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE

The University of South Alabama Media Relations Office is located in Room 1105 of the HPELS Building located next to the Mitchell Center.

### HOME CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

The South Alabama Athletics Media Relations Office will issue credentials to WORKING press only. Passes for spouses, children or friends will not be issued. These credentials are non-transferable and any unauthorized use of a credential will result in the pass being immediately revoked.

All credential requests should be made in writing by sports editors or directors of accredited media outlets on company letterhead. Requests should be made no later than 24 hours prior to the start of the desired contest. Credentials can be picked up the day before an event in the Athletic Media Relations Office. Any credentials obtained after that time may be picked up at Media Will Call, which is located outside the lobby of the main offices on the west side of Ladd-Peebles Stadium. Media Will Call will be open approximately two hours before the start of the event.

Credential requests can be sent to the Athletic Media Relations Office at 1209 Mitchell Center, Mobile, AL 36688, faxed to (251) 460-7297 or e-mailed to Fremund.

### ROAD CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

Working members of the media who plan to cover South Alabama on the road are encouraged to make credential requests through the South Alabama Athletics Media Relations Office.

### VISITING RADIO

All visiting radio crews can make credential requests either through the South Alabama Athletic Media Relations Office or through their normal media relations contact. After the request is made, space will be reserved for the visiting broadcast team. Two courtesy lines are available for each team, while additional lines are available for a fee.

### PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only photographers shooting for accredited media outlets or for the South Alabama Athletic Media Relations Office will be issued photo credentials and be allowed on the field. Photographers are allowed to shoot from the 25-yard line through the goal line and along the end zones. No photographers are permitted to shoot inside the team bench area on either sideline. Flash photography is PROHIBITED at Ladd-Peebles Stadium.

### PARKING

Media parking will be available in the VIP section of the parking lot on the west side of Ladd-Peebles Stadium. News stations with uplink trucks MUST provide advance notice when bringing that equipment — satellite trucks will be parked inside the gate by the southwest corner of the stadium.

**GAMEDAY SERVICES**

The South Alabama Athletic Media Relations staff will be on hand to assist all media members covering Jaguar football. All customary gameday services will be available.

All working members of the media will be provided with game notes, current statistics, rosters and game programs prior to kickoff. Statistical updates and a play-by-play summary will also be provided at the end of each quarter and at halftime.

Power outlets, complementary telephone lines and a wireless Internet connection are available to all credentialed media members in the press box. The intent of the press box is to provide a working facility for the media, professional scouts and immediate game personnel. Family members, friends, guests and other non-credentialed people cannot be accommodated. Soft drinks, bottled water and a pregame meal will be available in the press box.

**PROFESSIONAL SCOUTS**

Professional scouts may request a single-game credential by submitting a written request on team letterhead to the South Alabama Athletic Media Relations Office.

**PRACTICES**

The South Alabama Athletic Media Relations staff encourages coverage of Jaguar football outside of games. As a general rule, all practices are open to the media and the public. There may be instances, however, when all or part of a practice session is closed. Please contact Fremund in advance if you are interested in conducting interviews and/or attending a practice session, so an escort can be made available.

**INTERVIEWS**

In-person interviews with members of the coaching staff and student-athletes can be arranged by calling or e-mailing Fremund. Interviews with student-athletes MUST be arranged in advance through the Athletic Media Relations Office. Players are generally available 30 minutes before practice and immediately following practice. Phone interviews are also available, but will be arranged around the student-athletes' class and practice schedules. Student-athletes' phone numbers are not available under any circumstance. All phone interview requests must be made 24 hours prior.

**POSTGAME INTERVIEWS**

After a 10-minute cooling off period, requested players and coaches will be made available to members of the media. The Jaguar locker room is CLOSED both at home and on the road. Requested players and coaches will be escorted by a South Alabama Athletic Media Relations staff member to the designated interview area in the lobby of the main offices on the west side of Ladd-Pebbles Stadium.

**GAME NOTES**

A set of game notes will be made available before each contest. A copy of these game notes will be placed on the USA Athletic Department web page at [www.usajaguars.com](http://www.usajaguars.com) before each game and can be downloaded from there. The game notes can also be e-mailed upon request.

**SOUTH ALABAMA FOOTBALL MEDIA COVERAGE****SOUTH ALABAMA RADIO NETWORK**

Once again this fall, WNSP 105.5 FM in Mobile will serve as the flagship radio station for the University of South Alabama football program. Games will also air on live on BAMA 106.1 FM in Jackson, Ala.

**Lee Shirvanian** (play-by-play), **Rick Cleveland** (analysis) and **Pat Greenwood** (sidelines/pre- and postgame/halftime) will all return for the second season as part of the broadcast team.

Shirvanian — who has been the voice of the Jag men's basketball and baseball for over 30 years — also is co-host of the "Morning Sportscenter" on WNSP. Since arriving in Mobile, he has been named the Mobile Sportscenter of the Year in 1985 while in '92 he received a South Alabama Athletics Hall of Fame award. Shirvanian also has experience covering Rutgers football and basketball, as well as professional teams in New York and Philadelphia.

Cleveland is the offensive line coach at UMS-Wright Preparatory School in Mobile, where he led the Bulldogs to the 2008 state 4A championship as well as the quarterfinals last year. He is entering his eighth season at the school, and fifth working with the varsity squad.

Greenwood is the longest-tenured member of the NBC 15 staff in Mobile, having worked at the television station since 1997. After becoming the station's Sports Director in 1999, he returned to news in September 2007. Greenwood was selected the Best Sportscenter by the Alabama AP in 2001, and was named the Best Sportscenter by the Mobile Press Club in '04. He also co-hosts an afternoon call-in radio show on WNSP during the week.

**SOUTH ALABAMA COACH'S SHOWS**

Head coach Joey Jones will have both weekly television and radio shows that air throughout the season.

The television show will be broadcast on UTV 44 in Mobile — taping will take place at the Delta Fish House on the Caudaway Thursdays at 11:45 a.m., and it will air on Saturdays at 10:30 a.m.

Shirvanian will host the hour-long radio show, which will be broadcast live on WNSP 105.5 FM as well as BAMA 106.1 FM in Jackson, every Tuesday at noon at Baumhower's Wings Restaurant in Mobile on Airport Boulevard.

No stranger to building programs from the ground up — at both the high school and collegiate level — University of South Alabama head coach Joey Jones is well on his way to helping Jaguar football make an impact well beyond the school's home city of Mobile.

Just 22 months after taking over the reins of the school's start-up football venture, Jones helped lead the Jags to an undefeated record in its first season of competition last fall. And not only did USA go 7-0 against a schedule that included four high-level prep programs, two top-20 junior colleges and a qualifier for the NCAA Division III play-offs, but it outscored the opposition 321-41 while never trailing at any point during the season.

The Jaguars' dominance was seen in all phases of the game in 2009. Defensively, they surrendered only 234 yards per contest, including just 61 on the ground as foes averaged less than two yards per carry. On offense, USA racked up just under 440 yards per outing led by a rushing attack that collected 267 yards per game and better than six per carry. Jag placekickers connected on 83 percent of their field-goal attempts, while the punting unit averaged 42 yards per kick.

Off the field, 18 individuals carried a 3.0 grade-point average or better last season, while 32 student-athletes recorded a 3.0 in at least one of two semesters during the 2009-10 academic year.

Following the announcement in December 2007 that the school was going to begin playing football, former USA Director of Athletics Joe Gottfried and the head coach search committee laid out their list of qualifications for the program's first-ever head coach which included three key qualities they desired. They wanted to find someone with collegiate experience, someone with ties to Alabama and the Mobile area, and someone with the youthful energy needed to start a program from scratch.

As the process continued further and further along, one name continued to rise back to the top — that of Jones.

Formerly the head coach at Birmingham-Southern and a native of Mobile, Jones was named as South Alabama's first head football coach on February 15, 2008, culminating a month-long search.

Jones, 47, returned to his hometown after two years at Birmingham-Southern, where he was hired in 2006 to restart the school's football program there. After spending a year overseeing administrative aspects of the program such as hiring assistant coaches, designing facilities and recruiting players for the Division III program, he led his 2007 squad of 126 freshmen to a 3-7 overall record, including a pair of wins over established junior-college programs.

Since coming to USA, he has put together a staff, recruited more than 65 scholarship players to the program and lent a hand in efforts to help the school raise funds for the program as well as construct a \$10 million field house on the west side of campus.

Success has followed Jones throughout his career, both as a coach and as a player. Before moving into the college ranks, he compiled an impressive 125-38 (76.7%) record in 13 years at the high school level, including a 10-year run at Birmingham's Mountain Brook High, where he was 101-27 (78.9%) from 1996-05.

After inheriting a program that had endured nine consecutive losing seasons, Jones directed the Spartans to the 1996 Class 6A state championship game, four region titles, two semifinal appearances and three quarterfinal appearances during his tenure.

In his second season with the Spartans, they won a postseason contest before falling in the second round in overtime, while his efforts helped MBHS reach the quarterfinals each of the next two falls. Jones

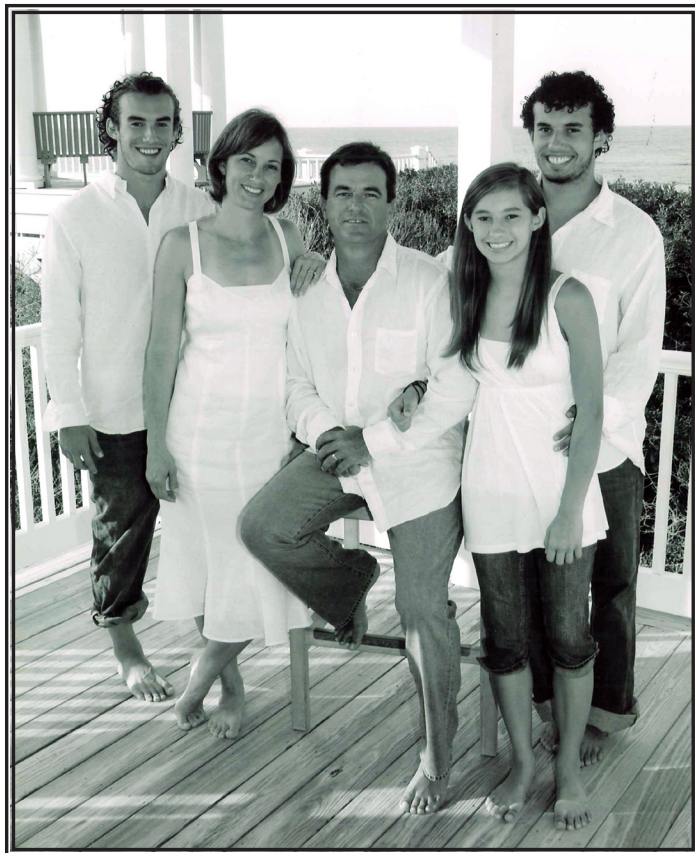


led the program to a first-round victory in the 2001 postseason before helping the school return to the state semifinals a year later. In 2003, the Spartans reached the quarterfinals of the state playoffs, while they would go on to reach the semifinals the next season and win another first-round game in Jones' final year leading the program.

Jones began his head coaching career at Dora High School, where he registered a 24-11 (68.6%) mark in three seasons (1991-93). It took just one year for him to lead the Bulldogs to postseason action, as they won a first round state 5A playoff contest before falling in overtime in 1992, while his efforts took the school to the quarterfinals the next season. From 1989-90, he served on the Briarwood Christian staff, helping the school to a berth in the quarterfinals of the state 3A playoffs his final year.

A 1989 graduate of Alabama with a degree in business administration, Jones became one of the most beloved Crimson Tide players during his tenure, which began under the tutelage of legendary coach Paul "Bear" Bryant. In Jones' four seasons in Tuscaloosa, the Tide compiled a record of 35-12-1 (74%), including two Cotton Bowl appearances. He finished his career with 71 receptions, 1,386 yards and 15 touchdowns, ranking fourth on the career touchdown receptions chart and seventh in career receiving yards. As a junior in 1982, Jones had eight TD receptions, which ranks tied for third in the UA single-season record book.

Jones earned all-Southeastern Conference honors as a senior after hauling in 31 receptions for 468 yards and five scores. He was later selected to Alabama's All-Decade Team for the 1980s and played pro-



fessionally with the Birmingham Stallions of the USFL and the NFL's Atlanta Falcons.

A Murphy High School product, Jones and his wife, Elise, have three children, Joe, Jr., (24), Jake (22) and Caroline (16).

Ron Antoine joined the South Alabama football coaching staff on the day before the program began spring practice in February. Antoine, who has been at Arkansas the last two seasons in multiple capacities, will work with wide receivers.

Last season, the Razorbacks finished 8-5 after defeating East Carolina 20-17 in overtime in the AutoZone

Liberty Bowl. UA — which finished tied for fourth in the Southeastern Conference West Division — ended the year by winning five of its last six outings. Included in the final record was a victory over No. 17 Auburn, while four of the program's five losses came to schools ranked in the top 20 at the time. In 2009, the Razorback offense set school season records for points, passing yards, touchdowns passing and total offense.

The Razorbacks' 2008 campaign — his first with the program — included wins over nationally ranked opponents Auburn and Tulsa.

Antoine's duties at Arkansas included assisting with running backs, fullbacks and tight ends, scouting the opposition, helping put together practice scripts and game plans, and evaluating and developing self scout reports. He also evaluated the performance of UA offensive players and assisted in recruiting.

The previous two years, Antoine coached running backs and assisted with special teams at Wofford. The Terriers won the 2007 Southern Conference championship, advancing to the quarterfinals of the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly NCAA Division I-AA) playoffs en route to a 9-4 finish. That fall, WC running backs ranked second in the nation with 2,899 yards and 32 touchdowns, while he helped Kevious Johnson earn first-team all-conference honors.

In his first season with the Terrier program, Antoine helped WC go 7-4 overall and 5-2 in the SoCon. WC averaged just under 30 points per game while two of its four losses were by only one touchdown at eventual FCS champion Appalachian State as well as at Football Bowl Subdivision and SEC member South Carolina.

While at Elon in 2005, he worked with wide receivers and slot backs. Under his direction, Michael Mayers collected 632 yards receiving — a total that still ranks among the top 10 on the school's season record list — on his way to becoming one of only three players in school history to record more than 2,000 receiving yards in a career. Antoine's other responsibilities with the Phoenix included assisting with special teams and monitoring the team's academic progress.

Antoine has served two stints on the staff at Ohio. He was a graduate assistant during the 1998 and '99 seasons before earning his master's degree in higher education in 2000, then returned as a full-time assistant from 2001-04.

Some of the program's accomplishments after Antoine returned to the school included finishing .500 in the Mid-America Conference (2002) as well as defeating Kentucky (2004). In his role working with wide receivers and coordinating the passing attack, several Bobcats recorded performances that made the school's top-10 lists for catches

and yards receiving in a game, and receiving and all-purpose yards in a career. Scott Mayle ended up second in OU history in receiving yards and fifth in all-purpose yards, while Chris Jackson's 12 receptions against Miami (Ohio) in 2004 were the second-highest total recorded in the program's record books.

In fact, Jackson's 39 catches that fall were most by an Ohio receiver since the 1991 campaign.

His other responsibilities with the school included scouting opponents, working with the kickoff return unit, monitoring the program's academic progress and serving as a liaison with the faculty on campus. While a full-time assistant at Ohio, Antoine worked with another mem-

ber of the Jaguar coaching staff, as USA offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Greg Gregory was at the school from 2001-03.

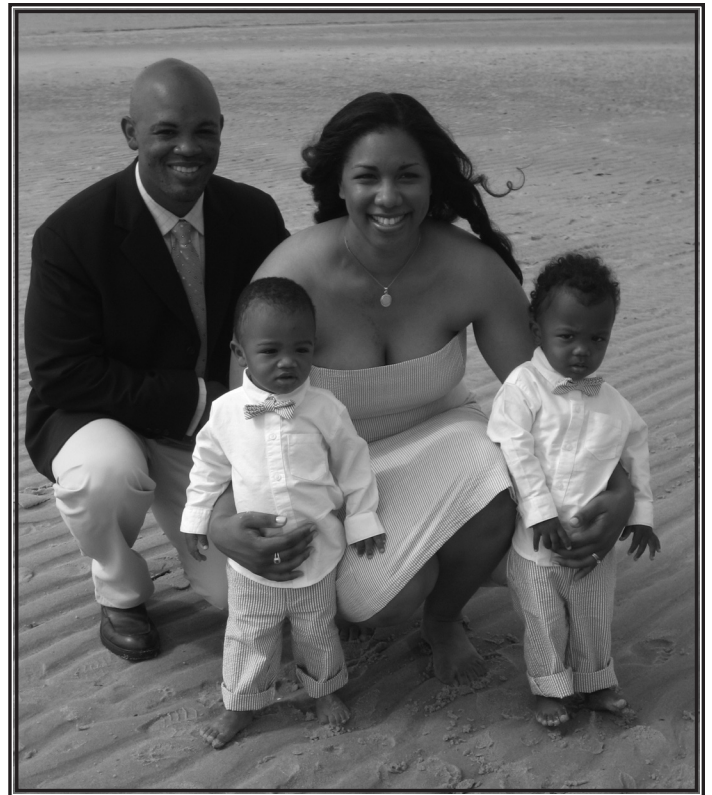
During Antoine's two years as a graduate assistant with the Bobcats, when his duties included coordinating the scout defense and special teams, and breaking down film, OU posted a 5-3 mark in MAC action each fall.

In between stints at Ohio, he was an assistant coach — his duties also included coordinating recruiting efforts off the field and the program's passing attack on it — at Fayetteville (N.C.) State during the 2000 campaign. His work with Bronco receivers helped Andregus Holmes earn all-Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association honors.

Antoine was a four-year letterwinner at Colorado State from 1993-96, where he played wide receiver. Twice during his career the Rams won the Western Athletic Conference championship to earn a berth in the Holiday Bowl, highlighted by the program's 10-2 record his sophomore season — that fall, CSU defeated both nationally ranked Brigham Young and Arizona. As a junior, the Rams finished 8-4 with a victory over No. 21 Air Force, and they posted a 7-5 mark (three of those losses came against top-25 teams) his final year.

CSU would go on to reclaim the WAC title in 1997 when Antoine served as a student assistant coach, ending the season ranked 17th in the nation after picking up a 35-24 win over 19th-ranked Missouri in the Holiday Bowl. He would earn his degree in exercise and sport science from the school in '97.

Antoine's wife, Zenarae, is the recruiting coordinator for the women's basketball program at Arkansas. The couple's twin sons, Zachary and Xavier, turned one in January.

Former Prattville High School head coach Bill Clark — the third coach added to the South Alabama staff on March 3, 2008 — is in his second season and third year as the Jaguars' assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

In their first season on the field under Clark's direction, the Jags surrendered just 41 total points and 234 yards per game to finish the year 7-0. That included allowing no points in the opening quarter of any contest and 12 in the first half as USA never trailed during its inaugural season.

Clark's unit would give up 225 total yards or fewer in five straight games in the middle of the year, while in the season finale against Huntingdon (Ala.) College the Jags allowed a total of 236 yards to a unit that entered the contest leading the NCAA Division III level in the category in recording the program's second shutout of the season.

It was a balanced group that contributed to the unit's success, as nine individuals recorded at least 20 total stops and 17 ended the season with 10 or more tackles. USA sacked the opposing quarterback on 25 occasions in seven games and forced 23 turnovers after intercepting 14 passes and recovering nine fumbles.

Clark came to South Alabama after nine years as head coach of the two-time Alabama Class 6A champion Lions. His last two teams won 30 straight games, while the 2007 squad was ranked No. 2 in the nation in the *USA Today's* national high school poll. Following his final season at PHS, he was named the Alabama High School Athletic Association Coach of the Year and was also selected Schutt Southeast Regional Coach of the Year.

He first led the Lions to the state 6A playoffs in 2000, his second season guiding the program, where they lost by two points in the opening round. Clark earned his first postseason victory a year later, helping PHS advance to the quarterfinals before falling to the eventual state champions, which is where the Lions' season would end each of the next two falls.

Prattville made its first state championship game appearance under Clark in 2004, with the team allowing three touchdowns in four postseason contests leading up to the final including recording a pair of shutouts. The Lions advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2005 playoffs before dropping a two-point decision as well.

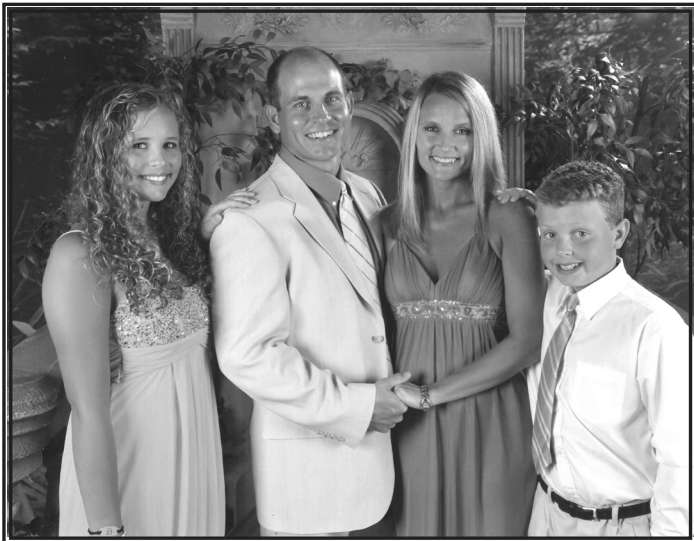
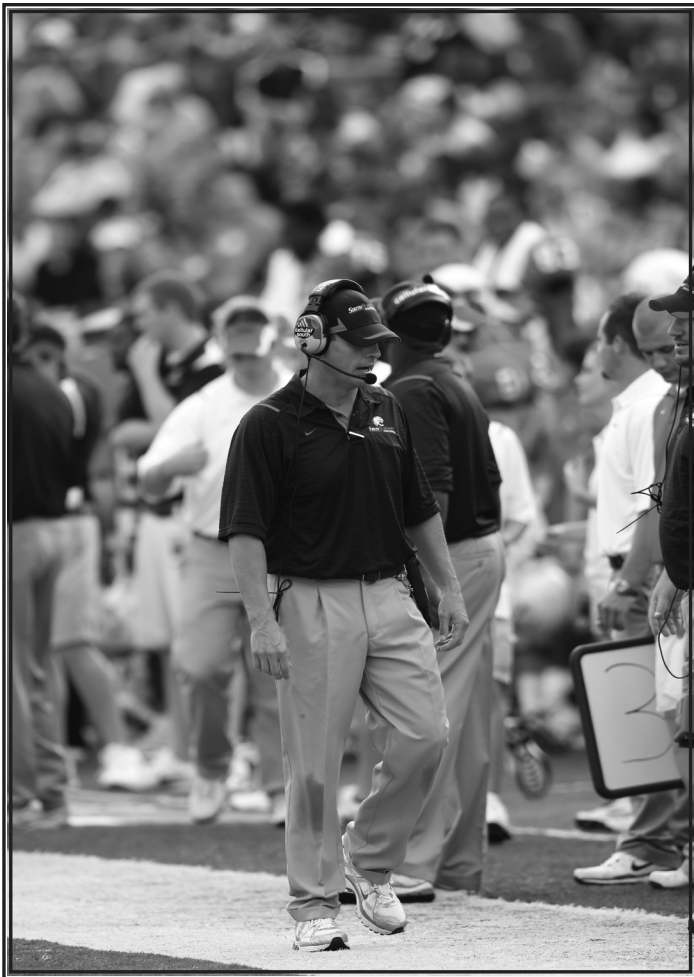
Clark posted a 107-11 (90.7%) overall record during his tenure, suffering his last regular-season loss during the second week of the 2002 season.

Clark served on the staff of the Alabama-Mississippi All-Star Classic three times, including as head coach in the summer of 2007. He also served as head coach in the 2004 North-South All-Star Game.

Following graduation from Jacksonville State in 1990 with a degree in physical education, Clark began his coaching career as an assistant at Piedmont High School.

There, he helped guide the Bulldogs to the state 3A playoffs in both of his seasons at the school, including reaching the quarterfinals his first fall. He later coached at Tuscaloosa County High School, Coffee County (Ga.) High School and Dothan High School — the the last stop before taking over at Prattville, he led DHS to back-to-back appearances in the state 6A playoffs, which included picking up a first-round victory in 1998.

Clark and his wife, Jennifer, have two children, Katie (15) and Jacob (13).

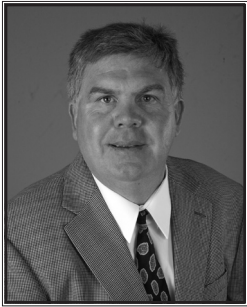

Kurt Crain, who joined the South Alabama staff in July of 2008, is beginning his second season working with Jaguar linebackers and his first as an associate head coach.

In the program's first season, inside linebackers Justin Dunn and Charlie Higgenbotham ranked first and third on the team with 40 and 26 total tackles, respectively, while helping the defense allow under 235 yards and seven points per outing. Dunn would pace the team in stops in each of its first four games, while fellow inside linebacker Enrique Williams — who would end up with 24 tackles to tie for fourth on the squad — accomplished the feat in two of the season's final three contests.

Bryson James would chip in 23 stops as Crain's unit accounted for 16½ tackles for loss while also forcing three fumbles.

Crain was an Associated Press All-American at linebacker at Auburn, helping lead the Tigers to a 19-3-2 (80%) mark, the 1987 Southeastern Conference championship and a pair of bowl berths — AU defeated Southern California in the Citrus Bowl his junior year before tying fourth-ranked Syracuse in the Sugar Bowl in his final collegiate appearance. The Tigers finished in the top 10 of the final AP rankings in each of those seasons, ending the 1986 campaign sixth while being voted seventh the following year.

Selected as team captain his senior season, Crain recorded team-leading totals with 168 tackles — still the second-highest figure on the AU season record charts — and five interceptions to add first-team all-SEC accolades to his All-America honors. He also was chosen first-team all-conference the previous fall as his 156 stops, which ranks fifth on the season record list, paced the team.

Crain finished his collegiate career with 324 tackles, four sacks and seven interceptions, and still holds school records with 19 solo stops and 26 total tackles in a 1986 contest against Georgia. And, Crain's 152 total assists still stand ninth on the school's all-time list.

He began his collegiate career at Memphis, earning a pair of letters. The Tigers went 11-9-2 during his tenure, picking up a pair of victories over Mississippi State, a 20-point defeat of Mississippi in his collegiate debut and a 17-17 tie against 17th-ranked Florida State his sophomore season.



Following his time on the Plains, Crain was drafted by the Houston Oilers. He played two seasons in the NFL, spending time with both the Oilers and the Green Bay Packers.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Auburn in the early '90s. Crain then moved on to Troy, where he coached linebackers during the 1991 season under Larry Blakeney. Crain then spent the 1992 campaign at Texas Christian with Pat Sullivan, coaching the outside linebackers. Following his stint with the Horned Frogs, Crain returned to his alma mater. While at Auburn, he coached the Tiger defensive line from 1993-95 and then moved to the outside linebackers in 1996 — AU was 36-9-1 (79.3%) during that stretch, finishing all four years ranked in the AP's final top-25 poll. That included ending his first season back with the program fourth in the country after going 11-0.

Before Crain arrived at USA, he had been hired as the defensive coordinator for the All-American Football League team in Birmingham, Ala.

Crain and his wife Susan have three children: sons Jacob (20), who is a student assistant with the USA football program, and Blain (16), and daughter Shelby (17).

Chuck Dunn is entering his second season working with USA's outside linebackers and assisting with the strength and conditioning program. Other responsibilities he has with the program include helping with academics as well as coordinating the school's walk-on program.

In the program's first season, a trio of players under Dunn's direction were key contributors to a defensive unit that gave up only 41 total points and 234 yards per contest as the Jaguars went 7-0 in their first-ever year of competition. Clifton Crews tied for fourth on the team with 24 stops, but led the Jags with seven tackles for loss and 3½ sacks (he also scored three touchdowns on interception and fumble returns), while Logan Bennett and Josh Chestang combined to add eight stops behind the line of scrimmage while each posting a double-digit tackle total on the year. Actually, Chestang ended the season second on the squad with three sacks.

He came to South Alabama after spending the previous six seasons as head strength and conditioning coach and linebackers coach at Prattville High School in Prattville, Ala. While with the Lions, Dunn was responsible for the strength and conditioning of 15 varsity sports.

During his six seasons at Prattville with fellow Jaguar assistant coaches Bill Clark and Duwan Walker, the Lions recorded an 83-4 (95.4%) overall record highlighted by capturing back-to-back Alabama High School Athletic Association 6A state titles as well as a No. 2 national ranking in the 2007 *USA Today* top-25 poll. During those two seasons, the Lions had an unblemished 31-0 record.

Actually, PHS advanced to at least the quarterfinals of the state 6A playoffs in each of his years on the staff, which included making the 2004 title contest.

He began his coaching career at Troy, where he served as a student assistant for three years (1994-96) working with the offensive line coach. The Trojans compiled a 31-7 (81.6%) mark in that span, advancing to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs each of those seasons. Troy finished 8-4 his first year, then improved to 11-1 the next fall — that was the first undefeated regular season in the school's history. In Dunn's final season as a student assistant, the Trojans posted a 12-2 overall record, won the Southland Football League championship with a 5-1 mark and advanced to the semifinals of the I-AA playoffs with victories over Florida A&M and Murray State.

Upon his graduation from Troy, Dunn moved just down the road from the Trojan campus to Charles Henderson High School. While at CHHS (1997-99), Dunn served as an assistant coach responsible for the defensive backs.

After three seasons in the prep ranks, Dunn returned to the college profession when he served as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater beginning in 2000. Working with the Trojans under head coach Larry Blakeney, Dunn led the program's strongside linebackers for two years — the 2001 campaign was the season in which Troy made the jump to the NCAA Division I-A level. His efforts helped the school go 17-6 (73.9%) during that stretch, as the program went 7-0 to claim the SFL title and qualified for the NCAA I-AA playoffs his first year back.

Upon the completion of his graduate assistantship, Dunn joined the Prattville staff and coach Clark in June 2002.

Dunn is a 1997 graduate of Troy, earning his bachelor's degree in physical education and social work while minoring in sports recreation. He and his wife Wini has a two-year-old son, Gardner.

Greg Gregory is beginning his second season as South Alabama's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

After joining the staff just prior to the start of the program's first-ever spring practice, Gregory was able to implement a system that led to the Jaguars averaging 439 total yards and just under 46 points per contest.

And, as expected based on his prior experience before coming to Mobile, the Jag offense was a balanced unit that gained more than 170 yards per game both on the ground and through the air.

In its first-ever season of competition, USA recorded three games with at least 500 yards of total offense and scored more than 40 points on four occasions, including posting three outings with 50-plus points. Jaguar quarterbacks combined to complete 64.3 of their pass attempts for a total of 1,205 yards and 11 touchdowns, as all three individuals who saw significant game action were able to record a pass efficiency rating of higher than 170 points.

Gregory joined the program with 15 years of experience as an offensive coordinator at four schools, including a pair at South Florida after guiding the Bulls' unit for two years. And, he had experience as a head coach for two years since entering the profession as a graduate assistant in 1980.

Under Gregory's tutelage, USF quarterback Matt Grothe ranked among the top 30 in the nation in total offense after the 2007 and '08 seasons. Mike Ford and Ben Williams collected a combined total of 18 touchdowns in 2007, more than any duo in school history, and the Bulls produced record numbers in total offense yards (5,383) and yards per game (414.1) that fall while scoring an average of 34.7 points per outing.

The Bulls went 8-5 in 2008, picking up a win in the inaugural St. Petersburg Bowl, while recording a 9-4 finish to go along with a berth in the Brut Sun Bowl in his first season running the offense. Those two seasons remain the only ones in the program's history in which the offense has averaged more than 400 yards per outing. USF also advanced to the Meineke Car Care Bowl as well as the Papajohns.com Bowl during Gregory's tenure with the program, winning 32 contests during that stretch. He worked with tight ends his first two seasons with the program.

Prior to arriving at South Florida, Gregory was the offensive coordinator at Ohio from 2001-03. His efforts in 2002 helped the Bobcats average 32 points per outing in Mid-American Conference action, the school's highest figure in 25 years. In 2000, he was an offensive coordinator at Richmond — the Spiders won the Atlantic 10 championship with a 7-1 record, going 10-3 overall after defeating Youngstown State in the opening round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

Gregory was the head coach at Missouri Southern in 1998 and '99, guiding the Lions to a two-win improvement in his second season after inheriting a program that forfeited all its victories the year prior to his appointment.

He served as an assistant in several capacities at Army, beginning in 1982 when he was hired to work with Cadet receivers. Gregory moved to guide tight ends and was the junior varsity coach in 1984, beginning a two-season stint leading the program's running backs the next fall. In 1987, Gregory was shifted to quarterbacks coach, becoming offensive coordinator in 1989 before being promoted to associate head coach in '91.

During his 16 seasons at Army, the Cadets advanced to four bowl games — still the only ones in the program's 109-year history — while winning 93 contests. The USMA defeated Michigan State in the Cherry Bowl to wrap up an 8-3-1 record in 1984, his third season on the staff, following up a year later by going 9-3 after defeating Illinois in the Peach Bowl. Army put together another 9-3 campaign in 1988 that ended with a berth in the John Hancock Sun Bowl, while a 10-2 finish in 1996 after reaching the Poulan/Weed Eater Independence Bowl provided the most wins in program history.

His efforts also helped the Cadets claim 10 of 16 match-ups against Navy during that stretch.

Army led the nation in rushing four times while he was with the program. He coached Ron McAda — the only Cadet quarterback to be selected In the National Football League Draft — as well as running back Mike Mayweather, who would go on to rush for more than 4,000 yards in his career.

While coaching at Army, Gregory was a commissioned officer with the rank of captain from 1982-85 as well.

Gregory earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Richmond in 1980, lettering three times as a quarterback for the Spiders. Tommy Perry is entering his second season coaching South Alabama's running backs and coordinating the Jaguars' special teams units.

Five Jag running backs gained at least 100 yards in the program's inaugural season last fall, with the group accounting for almost 80 percent of USA's 267 yards per game on the ground. Brandon Ross led the group with 594 yards and 13 touchdowns, while Santuan McGee rushed for 350 yards and three scores to help the Jaguars average better than six yards per carry.

And his efforts helped the Jags excel on special teams play too. Scott Garber averaged 42 yards per punt with nine of 22 kicks downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line, and Erling Riis averaged just under 13 yards per punt return. The kick return unit gained nearly 30 yards per runback, while USA allowed opponents to average only 17 yards per kickoff return. And, Jaguar kickers combined to make 5-of-6 field-goal attempts while converting 40 extra points, with Michel Chapuseaux ending the season second on the team in scoring with 46 points.

Perry spent the three seasons prior to joining the Jag staff before the program's first-ever spring practice as a graduate assistant and then an intern on the staff at Alabama, working under both Nick Saban and Mike Shula. The Crimson Tide went undefeated in the regular season in the fall of 2008, advancing to the Southeastern Conference championship game as well as the Allstate Sugar Bowl. After posting a 12-2 record, the team was ranked sixth in both the final Associated Press and *USA Today* top-25 polls.

UA finished 7-6 the previous season, defeating Colorado 30-24 in the PetroSun Independence Bowl, while the Crimson Tide participated in the same postseason contest his first year as part of the program.

Perry began his coaching career as an assistant strength & conditioning coach at Texas in 2004, also serving as an academic advisor for the Longhorns. He became a linebacker and strength coach at Texas A&M-Commerce later that year, moving over to coach running backs and handle kickoff return duties in 2005 for the Lions. Three of his backs earned all-Lone Star Conference honors that year, including one who was named the Offensive Back of the Year after rushing for more than 1,000 yards in 10 games.

His responsibilities at TAMUC also included assisting with the program's recruiting in Northeast Texas and Northern California.

Perry has additional experience coaching at the professional level after working as a special teams assistant and head strength coach for NFL Europe's Amsterdam Admirals in 2006. That graduate the team posted a 7-3 mark and competed in the World Bowl.

A 2003 graduate of Texas A&M with a degree in English and history, Perry played two seasons — lettering in 2003 — for the Aggies as a fullback, inside linebacker and defensive end while also participating on various special teams units. He was one of four players on the team who served as the program's 12th man as a senior. He began his career as an inside linebacker at Tyler [Texas] Junior College.

Perry, who earned his master's degree in health & human performance from Texas A&M-Commerce 2005, is married to the former Angela Painter. The couple have one daughter, Joanna Rose (1).

### Mitch Rodrigue

Mitch Rodrigue, who has more than 20 years of coaching at the collegiate level, is entering his second season and third year on the South Alabama coaching staff working with offensive tackles and tight ends.

In the program's inaugural season, two of Rodrigue's tight ends played a vital role in helping the Jag offense average 439 yards and nearly 46 points per contest. In

addition to helping the run game with key blocks on the edge, Paul Bennett tied for second on the squad with six receptions for 79 yards, while Kevin Helms tied for fourth on the team after making five catches for 65 yards with a score.

Prior to his arrival a South Alabama, Rodrigue spent the previous nine seasons at Southern Miss, where he coached the offensive line (2003-07), tight ends (2000-02) and running backs (1999). During his tenure, he was a valuable member of the staff, not only on the field, but also as a recruiter, as he was named one of *Rivals.com* Top 10 recruiters from a non-BCS conference in 2006. That same season, Rodrigue's offensive line allowed just 10 sacks all season, ranking 18th nationally, while the Golden Eagles rushed for an average of 169.9 yards a game, which ranked first in Conference USA and 25th nationally. The unit also collected its first two All-Americans since the 1950s, with the naming of George Batiste and Travis Cooley to different squads, and led the Golden Eagles to a school-record 4,635 yards of total offense, over 2,000 yards rushing for the first time since 1987, and the school's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2002.

In 2005, Rodrigue guided the offensive line to another strong season, as the offense finished with 4,288 yards of total offense, the sixth-best performance in school history. The offensive line, led by all-Conference USA performers Batiste and Cooley, only allowed nine sacks that season, ranking 12th in the nation, and did not allow a sack in six games on the year.

In 2004, the offensive line, led by linemen Jeremy Parquet (second-team all-Conference USA) and Chris Clark (C-USA All-Freshman Team) was just as strong, surrendering only seven sacks for the season. Parquet was selected by the Kansas City Chiefs in

the NFL Draft.

During his first season leading the USM offensive line (2003), Rodrigue helped the Golden Eagles win their fourth Conference USA title and earn an invitation to the Liberty Bowl despite working with a unit that had lost three starters to the National Football League from the previous year. All Rodrigue did was have three players — Parquet (first-team), Jim Hicks (second-team) and Chris White (third-team) — garner all-league honors. Cooley was also named to the Conference USA All-Freshman team in 2002.

Before taking over as the offensive line coach in 2003, Rodrigue coached the running backs in 1999 and the tight ends from 2000-02. He also assisted with the offensive line during his initial stint at Southern Miss, serving as the program's graduate assistant in 1989 and 1990 under former head coach Curley Hallman. During his 11 seasons at USM, the Golden Eagles made eight bowl trips — participating in the GMAC Bowl (2000, '06), the New Orleans Bowl (2004, '05), the AXA Liberty Bowl (1999, 2003), the Papajohns.com Bowl (2007), the Houston Bowl (2002) and the All-American Bowl (1990).

A native of Thibodaux, La., Rodrigue also coached several seasons at Nicholls State (1993-98), serving as tight ends and offensive line coach as well as offensive coordinator during his time at his alma mater. While at NSU, Rodrigue helped the Colonels lead the Southland Conference in passing. In addition to his time as the Colonels' offensive coordinator, he also served at various times as recruiting coordinator and, after the resignation of Rick Rhoades in 1995, interim head coach. As offensive line coach, Rodrigue's linemen blocked for the school's first 1,000-yard rusher in 1996. Rodrigue was also a student assistant coach 1987-88.

Prior to his coaching stint at Nicholls State, Rodrigue worked for two seasons as an assistant coach at Pearl River (Miss.) Community College (1991-92) where he served as offensive line coach, as well as strength and conditioning coach.

Rodrigue played at Nicholls State and helped the Colonels reach the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in 1986, as well as win the 1984 Gulf Star Conference title. He also played one season at Copiah-Lincoln (Miss.) Community College prior to his career at Nicholls State, and was an all-district performer at Thibodaux High School.

Brian Turner is beginning his third year as South Alabama's defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator.

Eleven of Turner's players combined to account for 18 tackles behind the line of scrimmage, helping the Jaguar defense allow under 235 yards and seven points per game while going 7-0 in the school's inaugural season. Three USA defensive linemen — Anthony Taylor, Montavious Williams and Romelle Jones — paced the group after posting double-figure tackle totals last fall, with Taylor tying for fourth on the squad with four stops for loss.

And, in February each of the last two years, Turner's efforts have assisted the Jags in putting together signing classes of 20 or more student-athletes to help add to the talent level and depth in the program. That has included inking multiple players ranked among the best at their position by *Scout, Inc.*, as well as numerous individuals who have helped their high schools to state championships and deep postseason runs.

Before coming to Mobile, Turner had worked the previous five years on the coaching staff at Sun Belt Conference rival Troy. In addition to serving as recruiting coordinator, he spent his last season as coach of the defensive ends after working with the safeties in 2006. A guard and center for the Trojans in the mid-1990s, Turner previously worked with the offense, focusing primarily on tight ends and wide receivers.

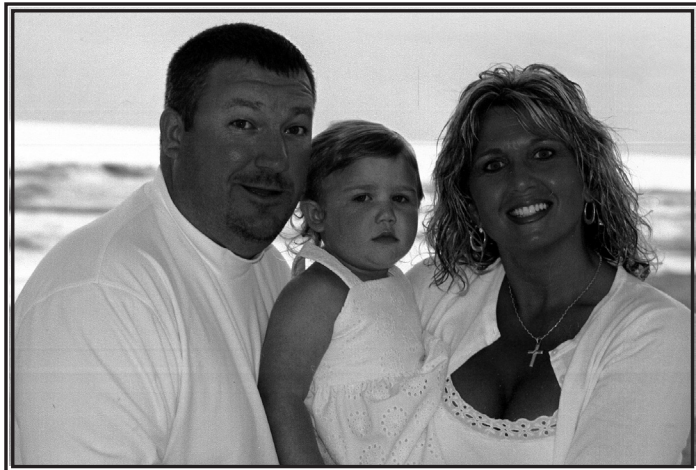
In five years with the program, Troy compiled a 33-27 (55%) mark overall while going 20-8 (71.4%) in Sun Belt action. The Trojans earned invitations to a pair of bowl games — they were an at-large participant in the 2004 Silicon Valley Bowl, and they defeated Rice 41-17 in the 2006 New Orleans Bowl after receiving the bid as SBC champion — while winning league titles in each of his last two years.

During Turner's playing career, the Trojans posted a 31-6-1 (82.9%) record, including the school's first perfect regular-season (11-0) in 1995. In 1993, Troy advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs with victories over Stephen F. Austin and McNeese State, while the 1994 and 1995 squads qualified for postseason play as well.

A native of Fort Meade, Fla., Turner began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Trojans from 1999-01. Troy recorded a winning record all three seasons, posting a 28-8 (77.8%) mark in that span including a 13-1 (92.9%) record in Southland Football League action. The Trojans won the conference championship in both 1999 and '00 before moving up to the NCAA Division I-A level his final year. Troy advanced to the quarterfinals of the playoffs his first season as a graduate assistant while participating in postseason play the following fall as well.

His first full-time appointment came in 2002, when he spent a year as offensive line coach at North Alabama before returning to Troy. Turner joined his brother John on the USA football staff, making South Alabama one of the few programs at the NCAA Division I-A (Football Bowl Subdivision) level with brothers patrolling the same sideline. Their father, Blaine, played football at University of Tampa and later coached at the high school level for 30 years, while their sister, Kristin, was a Tampa Bay Buccaneers cheerleader for five years.

Turner completed his bachelor's degree in social science in 2000. He is married to the former Kristi Jernigan, and has one daughter, Bryce (2).

Former Chattanooga offensive line coach John Turner joined the South Alabama coaching staff in March 2008, and is in his third year working with interior offensive linemen.

In the program's first-ever season, Turner's unit played a key role in helping the Jaguars average better than 45 points and nearly 440 yards per outing. The offensive line cleared the way for USA running backs to record an average of more than six yards per carry, while the passing game accounted for over 170 yards per contest as the group surrendered just seven sacks in seven games. Five Jag linemen recorded five knock-down blocks per game or more, including two — Jon Griffin and Chris Brunson — who paced the group with 55 and 53 pancakes, respectively.

A native of Fort Meade, Fla., Turner served as offensive line coach at UTC beginning in 2003 and was promoted to assistant head coach following the 2005 season. His line units surrendered less than a sack per game on average over his last three years and he produced a trio of all-Southern Conference selections — tackle Josh Shimpugh in 2005, guard Justin Matherson in 2006 and center Garrett Windham in '07.

Turner went to UTC after one season at Western Carolina. He has also had collegiate coaching stops at Clemson as a graduate assistant for Tommy Bowden in 2001 and at Auburn in 1997 and '98, when he was offensive line and special teams assistant under Terry Bowden. AU won the SEC West and defeated Clemson in the Peach Bowl his first year with the program, while Clemson went 7-5 and defeated Louisiana Tech 49-24 in the Humanitarian Bowl in his lone season with the program. CU spent eight weeks in the national rankings, with the highlight of its season a 47-44 overtime victory at then-No. 9 Georgia Tech.

A 1988 graduate of Jacksonville State with a degree in physical education, Turner was a standout offensive lineman for the Gamecocks in 1986 and 1987. JSU finished 5-4-1 in each of his two seasons as a letterwinner.

He began his coaching career immediately as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, working with a team that reached the NCAA Division II quarterfinals. The Gamecocks ended that season 10-2 overall, and they went 7-1 in Gulf South Conference play to tie for the league championship — JSU would defeat West Chester 63-24 for the school's first postseason victory in six years.

Turner also has ties to the high school ranks in the state, coaching at Daleville High School (1989-93), Dothan High School (1994-96) and UMS-Wright Prep (1999-00). In just his second season on the staff, Daleville High advanced to the second round of the state 4A playoffs before falling 27-21 in double overtime to the eventual runner-up. After a two-point loss in the second round to the same school the following fall — this time, the opposition would go on to earn the title — his DHS team won the state championship in 1992 and advanced to the state finals in 1993.

Dothan HS advanced to the state 6A playoffs in his final year on the staff as well, while his efforts helped UMS-Wright win a pair of postseason contests to make the quarterfinals of the 4A bracket in each of his two seasons with the school.

Turner has coaching in his heritage as his father, Blaine, is a retired head coach in the Florida high school ranks, while his brother Brian is also on the USA staff. Their sister, Kristin, is a former Pro Bowl cheerleader for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

While at Auburn, Turner earned his master's degree in physical education in 1998. He and his wife Kim have one son, Walker Wilson (3).

Duwan Walker enters his second season on the South Alabama staff working with defensive backs, and his third year with the program since his hiring in March 2008.

Members of Walker's secondary found multiple ways to contribute to a defensive unit that gave up less than 235 yards per game as well as just 41 total points as the

Jaguars finished their inaugural season 7-0. USA defensive backs accounted for all but one of the team's 14 interceptions — returning two of those for touchdowns — broke up seven other pass attempts, forced two fumbles and recovered another pair. Four members of Walker's unit posted at least 20 tackles, while another two reached double figures in the category.

Walker spent the previous nine years prior to his arrival in Mobile as an assistant at Prattville High School, where he coached under current USA defensive coordinator Bill Clark. At PHS, he worked for two years as defensive backs coach before being elevated to defensive coordinator in 2001. During that time, he helped the school advance to the state 6A playoffs on eight occasions, three state championship games and the state title in each of his last two seasons on the staff. Overall, the Lions would go 107-11 (90.7%) during his tenure with the program — that included winning every regular-season contest from the third week of the 2002 campaign through the end of his time at PHS.

The Lions first advanced to postseason action in his second year on the staff, and they picked up their first playoff victory during his tenure a year later after advancing to the quarterfinals before falling to the eventual state champions. PHS would again move on to the final eight in 2002 and '03, then made the state championship game for the first occasion while he was on the staff in 2004.

After another quarterfinal appearance the next fall, Walker helped guide the Lions to the state 6A championship in both 2006 and '07. They won 30 straight games during that span, finishing second in the country in the *USA Today's* national high school poll his last season with the school.

He gained his start in the coaching profession as a graduate assistant at Troy beginning in 1997, working with the defensive line for one season before helping defensive backs the next. In his second season on the staff, Walker helped the Trojans to an 8-4 finish and a berth in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs — that included going 5-2 in the Southland Football League.

A four-year letterman at Troy from 1992-95, Walker played as a true freshman, primarily on special teams. He spot-started at safety as a sophomore before moving into the No. 1 spot on the depth chart for his junior and senior seasons. During his time at Troy, the Trojans competed as an NCAA Division I-AA independent, reaching the semifinals of the playoffs in 1993 while also participating in the event in both 1994 and '95. The school

would go 41-7-1 (84.7%) overall during his career, winning 10 or more games while losing just once in three of those years.

Walker earned a bachelor's degree in human services with a double minor in psychology and biology from Troy in 1996, and he received his master's degree in counseling from the school in 2001. He and his wife Kaylyn have three children, Durelle (20), Christian (7) and Caden (5).

He would earn his master's degree from Mississippi State in physical education in 2007.

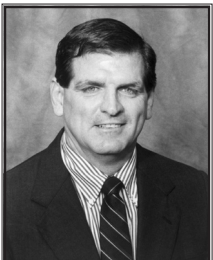

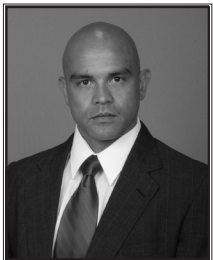

Brendt Bedsole enters his second season, and third year overall, as the director of operations for the South Alabama football program.

In his role handling day-to-days aspects of the program, Bedsole coordinates the budget, handles all aspects of travel and is the Jaguars' professional scout liaison. He also has responsibilities assisting with the scheduling of preseason camp and practices, the recruiting process, clinics and community relations projects.

Bedsole came to the program after working the previous two years at Hoover (Ala.) High School as a teacher and assistant football coach. In 2007, when Bedsole served on the Buccaneer football staff, HHS reached the quarterfinals of the state 6A playoffs.

Prior to his tenure at the high school level, Bedsole spent nine years as an assistant coach at four universities. He was an assistant at Samford during the 2005 and '06 seasons — the Bulldogs finished .500 in Ohio Valley Conference action his first year on the staff — while working at fellow OVC member Murray State the previous four falls. While at MSU, Bedsole handled a variety of responsibilities, including coaching tight ends, outside linebackers, free safeties, defensive ends, and he was the program's special teams coordinator. The Racers won 22 games during his tenure, which included advancing to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in 2002 after they tied for the league title with a 5-1 mark — MSU tied for second with a 6-2 OVC record in 2004 as well.

Dating back to his undergraduate days, Bedsole also served on Auburn's staff on three different occasions. He was a student assistant during the 1987 and '88 campaigns, later working as a graduate assistant in 1997 and again from 1999-00. In those five seasons, the Tigers played in the Sugar Bowl twice, the Florida Citrus Bowl and the Peach Bowl while compiling a 43-16-2 (72.1%) overall record and a 25-11-1 (68.9%) mark in the Southeastern Conference. AU won the league championship twice and added a pair of SEC West Division titles in his time with the program.

Bedsole also worked as an assistant at Trinity (Ala.) High School — serving as head junior varsity coach as well — in 1998.

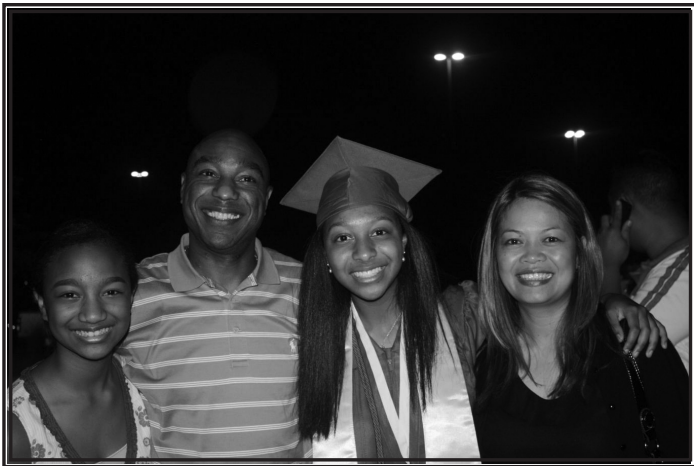
His responsibilities include filming, video exchange with Jaguar opponents, and editing practice/game footage for coaches and players to review. He is also responsible for managing and maintaining the program's

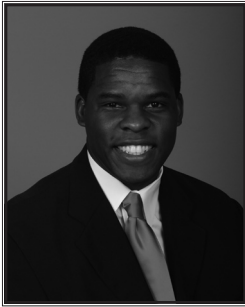

A native of Miami, Fields is a 1996 graduate of Miami Palmetto Senior High School. He is married to the former Mya Minor.

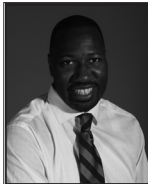

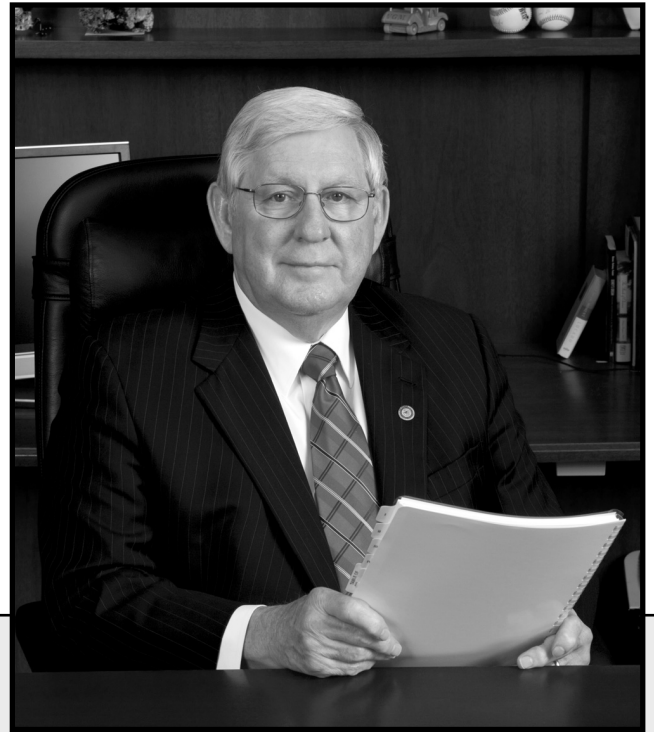


# PRESIDENT GORDON MOULTON

President Gordon Moulton took the helm of the University of South Alabama in 1998 and has led the University on a bold new course of service to Alabama and the nation in its key missions of teaching, research, service, and health care.

Moulton's career at the University spans more than 44 years and includes service as a faculty member, dean, and vice president. During his presidency, USA has seen its stock rise in every area by which higher education success is measured.

USA remains one of the fastest-growing universities in the state, with enrollment currently topping more than 15,000. The University has seen record freshman classes, and graduate school enrollment has increased by half over the last 10 years. Since its founding in 1963, USA has awarded more than 65,000 degrees and its graduates include 2,200 practicing physicians.



## *Under Moulton's leadership, the University has:*

- Created the Mitchell Cancer Institute – the first institute of its type in the upper Gulf Coast region providing the most advanced research and treatment possible.
- Established the USA Technology and Research Park, which is strengthening the Mobile area economy through academic-corporate partnerships to create and retain more than 600 high-technology jobs.
- Completed the University's first comprehensive fund-raising campaign, raising \$93.5 million from supporters, faculty, staff and alumni.
- Doubled sponsored research and public service programs, which spurs high-end job growth and advances in areas such as health care, environmental protection, and technology.
- Implemented a program to more than quadruple the number of academic scholarships at the University to more than 3,000.
- Improved campus life for students by renovating the running track, adding new intramural fields, constructing a campus transit system and a beautiful bell tower complex, building a state-of-the-art recreation center and dining facility, opening the Meisler Hall student services building, and adding scholarship football and marching band programs.
- Led more than \$460 million in campus construction and related projects, touching all areas of the University (see related University profile).

"Any progress the University makes is driven by the quality of its faculty and staff, the commitment of students, and the support of alumni and friends," said Moulton, who is a firm supporter of USA athletics and is seen regularly at athletic events.

"Athletics and marching band are important parts of the overall college experience. Their impact on the individual participants provides valuable life lessons in discipline,

tenacity, teamwork and leadership. They are also an important catalyst for campus unity and involvement, as well as vehicles through which people can stay connected to and interested in the development and improvement of the University over a lifetime."

Whether considering the hiring for the replacement of a coaching legend, the atmosphere on football game days at Ladd-Peebles Stadium or success in the classroom, it's easy to see that Director of Athletics Dr. Joel Erdmann has wasted little time in making an impact at the University of South Alabama.

Brought on in July 2009 after seven years as athletic director at Southeastern Louisiana and North Alabama, Erdmann — just the fourth person to serve in the role at USA — has accomplished all those things and more in his first year guiding the school's 17-sport program.

Immediately after arriving, Erdmann was a key figure on campus as the university made its final preparations for the first-ever season of football. The Jaguars would go 7-0 in the program's debut season, drawing more than 125,000 fans to Ladd-Peebles Stadium. Since the end of the year, Erdmann has spearheaded efforts to make improvements to the facility as well.

In preparing for the retirement of head baseball coach Steve Kittrell, who is entering his 28th season guiding the Jaguars with more than 1,000 career victories, Erdmann established a head coach in waiting position that he filled in July with Mark Calvi, an assistant on the staff of College World Series champion South Carolina. He has also reorganized the school's NCAA compliance staff and its structure.

Other facility improvements and projects that Erdmann has been a part of include a new scoreboards and speaker system in Jaguar Gym for the volleyball program this fall, a new outfield wall at Stanky Field that is expected to be in place for the 2011 campaign and a deck beyond the left-field

wall at softball's Jaguar Field.

Nearly 100 USA student-athletes were honored on the Sun Belt Conference Commissioner's List and Academic Honor Roll in Erdmann's first year, while over 160 individuals had a grade-point average of 3.0 or higher in at least one semester in 2009-10. And in competition, the men's golf team won the SBC title and competed at the NCAA Southeast Regional.

Erdmann, 47, came to USA from Southeastern Louisiana, where he guided a department comprised of 15 sports, 70 staff members and 320 student-athletes since May 2007. In competition, SLU won the 2009 Southland Conference All-Sports Trophy in men's sports while also recording the school's highest finish ever in the competition for the league's Commissioner's Cup.

Off the fields and courts, he reorganized the department's structure, creating divisions of student support services, external affairs and an expanded academic support program, and oversaw facility construction projects that included a football stadium club, suites and press box, a new strength and conditioning facility, a student-athlete academic success center, a Hall of Champions, Donor Wall of Recognition and improvements to the soccer and softball facilities. His efforts helped the school enhance its Academic Progress Rate (APR) and Graduation Success Rate (GSR) performance, while also landing a \$100,000 grant from the NCAA to renovate the student-athlete academic success center.

In addition to seeing ticket revenue in football, basketball and baseball increase his last year over the totals posted in 2007-08, Erdmann oversaw the sales of the football stadium club and suites, created a seating selection process and also modified the layout in the basketball arena to create premium courtside seats and enhance the seats available to students.

Erdmann was responsible for creating and monitoring the department's budgets, the Lion Athletic Association's budget as well as various development and foundation accounts, finishing the 2008 fiscal year in balance.

His first position guiding an athletic department began in August 2002 when he was named director of athletics at North Alabama. In five years with the institution, Erdmann oversaw a unit that made 19 NCAA Championships appearances highlighted by a title and a runner-up finish by the volleyball program, while recording its highest rankings ever in the NACDA United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup in 2003-0 and '04-05. The football squad advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs twice and the quarterfinals once while claiming a pair of GSC championships. The men's golf team won the region en route to finishing sixth in the country, with the men's basketball, baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis, and men's and women's cross country programs experiencing their best seasons in a decade as well.

In the classroom, not only did UNA record the highest graduation rate of any public four-year institution that plays football in the state, it posted seven of the top 10 semester departmental GPAs including the highest on record.

Erdmann was responsible for creating and managing a \$3.5 million budget for the athletic department. In addition to increasing every sport's operating budget for the first time since 1988, he helped build the cash reserve for athletics from \$17,000 to \$320,000. He also created and coordinated all departmental marketing and fundraising activities — Erdmann's efforts in those areas helped increase corporate giving by \$270,000 as well as membership numbers and donations to the UNA Sportsman's Club.

In his time at UNA, Erdmann helped negotiate and contract facility partnerships with the city of Florence for an \$800,000 softball field and stadium while overseeing improvements to the baseball locker room and grandstand as well as women's basketball and volleyball locker rooms. His efforts to renovate the basketball arena led to a refinished floor, new scoreboards, press row, lights, sound system and arena façade.

A member of the NCAA Division II Football Committee during the 2006-07 academic year, Erdmann also co-chaired the NCAA Division II Football Southeast Region Advisory Committee.

Erdmann first came to USA in 1991 to serve as a graduate assistant on the baseball staff. In addition to helping the Jaguars finish 44-16, advance to an NCAA Regional and win the SBC East Division title, he earned a master's degree in physical education.

He rejoined the USA staff in 1995 as an assistant baseball coach, a position he served in for two seasons. During that stretch, the Jags finished with a combined mark of 85-36 (70.2%), won the Sun Belt Conference championship both years, and advanced to an NCAA Regional each season — they would finish as the runner-up at the South I Region in Baton Rouge in 1997, ending the spring ranked as high as 15th in the final national polls.

Following the end of that campaign, Erdmann became an assistant to the athletic director. In that role, which he held until December 2000, he focused on game operations, compliance and special projects. He was the manager for the 2001 Sun Belt Basketball Tournament, which included 24 teams in the combined men's and women's event, as well as the league's baseball championships in 1998 and '00. Erdmann also coordinated game operations for men's and women's basketball, baseball, volleyball and soccer, which included directing numerous activities the first year the Mitchell Center opened.

In January 2001, he was promoted to assistant athletic director and executive director of the Jaguar Athletic Club. Erdmann coordinated all of the club's operations, amended the mission and membership criteria for the Board of Directors, realigned member benefits and modified giving levels, and enhanced communication through the creation of a quarterly newsletter.

A 1986 South Dakota State graduate with a degree in education, he began his career in athletics as an assistant baseball coach for an American Legion team while still a student. He began a four-year stint as an assistant coach at Pacific in 1987, working as a social science and physical education teacher in Stockton at the same time. He earned his doctorate from Florida State in 1995 in sports management/athletic administration, working as operations coordinator for the Tallahassee Convention and Visitors Bureau while completing the degree.

A native of Bismarck, N.D., Erdmann is married to the former Tina Milton. The couple has three dogs and a cat.

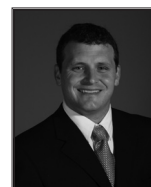

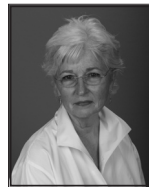

### Student Life

A broad-based academic support program is designed so that every South Alabama student-athlete excels in the classroom and remains on a steady course to graduation.

The academic support program, coordinated by the Athletic Academic Services Office, assists student-athletes in their pursuit of a degree at South Alabama. The program promotes initiative, independence and success in achieving educational and personal goals.

The average GPA for Student-athletes is a 2.82. Graduation rates for student-athletes are between 82 and 88 percent. For the last completed term in the Spring of 2009, 91 USA student-athletes were named to the Sun Belt Conference Commissioner's List and Academic Honor Roll. South Alabama Student-Athletes have repeatedly exceeded the campus-wide GPA dating back to fall, 1988.

The Athletic Academic Advisory Staff consist of Assistant Athletic Director for Academic Services Linda Pereira, Elizabeth Wood, Patricia Johnson, Yolanda Steele and 25 tutors.

The South Alabama academic support program includes the following:

### Athletic Academic Center

The Athletic Academic Center, a facility dedicated entirely to the athletic academic advising program, gives South Alabama student athletes the opportunity to achieve their full potential academically.

Features of the center include a group study room with carrels, tables, computers, laser printers and a group tutoring room. The center is open Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. to accommodate the extended schedule of student-athletes.

Located conveniently in the HPELS Building, between the Athletic Business Office and Jaguar Gymnasium, the facility was financed by QMS, the former Mobile-based laser printer manufacturer.

### Admissions Tracking

The Athletic Academic Advising Staff works with the coaching staff and the admissions office to facilitate the admission of incoming South Alabama student-athletes. This process recognizes and minimizes problems associated with the certification of student-athletes' initial eligibility.

### Midterm Grade Reports

While student-athletes are encouraged to make personal contact with their instructors regarding their academic progress, the academic advising staff initiates progress reports twice during each term. The reports provide information concerning each student-athlete's academic progress.

### Monitoring of Academic Progress

A student-athlete's academic progress is constantly monitored by the academic advising staff, as well as the registrar's office, in matters relating to NCAA standards for academic progress. Progress is also reviewed by the student-athlete's college regarding compliance with the college's standards for academic good standing.

### Specialized Tutoring

Tutoring is available to all student-athletes on an individual or group basis in a wide variety of subjects.

### Study Skills/Time Management

While life as a student-athlete is exciting, challenging and stimulating, it can also be overwhelming. The academic advising staff helps student-athletes make a smooth transition from high school to college-level study skills. The staff works one-on-one with student-athletes in developing study skills, memory skills, reading comprehension, exam strategies, time management and note-taking skills.

### Scholar Athlete Recognition

Academic achievement is promoted and recognized by the Athletic Department. The annual award program includes the President's Award, the Shirley Holt Memorial Scholarship Award, the Auralia Crowell Freshman Achievement Award and the Perseverance Award. The Sun Belt Conference has an awards program that includes the Men's and Women's Postgraduate Scholarship Award, Sun Belt Medallions and the Commissioner's All-Academic list. Numerous NCAA scholarship awards are also available to South Alabama student-athletes.

### Fifth-Year Aid

A fifth-year aid program is available to qualified student-athletes to assist them in completing their undergraduate degrees. Student-athletes who have completed for at least two years may apply for fifth-year aid in the spring of their fourth year.

The Student Advisory Committee is a group of student-athletes who are given an opportunity to voice their opinions to the athletic department administration. Each varsity sport elects representatives and these individuals are kept informed of athletic department policies and any changes in policy; provide feedback from the student-athletes on department policy; make suggestions and introduce new ideas and concerns from the student-athlete standpoint; and increase the student-athletes' awareness of campus resources. In addition, they are involved in the substance abuse program as peer helpers.

### Career Planning

The athletic academic advisors, in conjunction with on-campus resources, can help student-athletes identify their interests and aptitudes, and explore college degree programs and related careers. Resource materials are provided to assist student-athletes in production of resumes and application letters in preparation for job interviews.

The academic advising staff refers student-athletes to services offered by the University of South Alabama. They include:

#### What Can A Booster Do?

- Provide employment for prospective or currently enrolled student-athletes during permissible periods.
- Attend junior high, high school, or junior college athletic events without contacting a prospect or their family members.
- Send newspaper clippings, video tapes, or similar information about promising prospects in your area to the appropriate USA coaching staff.
- Offer assistance to a USA coach recruiting in your city. It is permissible to provide a car or a plane to the coach for transportation or to suggest people to contact for information.
- Invite a team or individual student-athlete to dinner at your home. These meals can only be provided on an occasional basis, however, they provide an excellent opportunity to get to know our fine student-athlete better. Arrangements for these activities should be made through the head coach for the sport.

#### What Is An Extra Benefit?

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or representative of the institution's athletics interest to provide a prospective or enrolled student-athlete or their family and friends a benefit that is not expressly authorized by NCAA regulations. Some benefits that a booster is prohibited from providing are listed below:

- Gifts of clothing or equipment
- Free or reduced-cost housing or services
- Cash or like items or the co-signing of loans
- Employment arrangement for a prospect's relative or close friends
- Rentals or purchases of any type

In addition, there are other services that cannot be provided to an enrolled student-athlete by a booster or a member of the South Alabama Athletic Department staff. These include:

- The use of an automobile
- Room, board, or transportation costs incurred by friends or family visiting the USA campus for any reason
- Providing payment or someone to work associated with school projects (i.e., typing data processing, copying services)
- Free medical or professional services for which a fee is normally charged
- Providing a student-athlete or their friends or relatives free use of a telephone for long distance calls
- Use of personal funds to entertain student-athletes, their friends, or relatives

The NCAA stipulates that once you have become an "athletics representative" you retain that identity forever, even if you no longer contribute to or are involved with the athletics program.

A representative may not provide any inducements to a prospect (or the prospect's family or friends) to attend the University nor may a representative provide any extra benefits to an enrolled student-athlete (or the student-athlete's family or friends.)



**Daniel McCarthy**  
**Director of Compliance**

Daniel McCarthy became the Assistant Compliance Director at the University of South Alabama in December 2008, and was promoted to his current position of Director of Compliance in March the following year.

McCarthy was the Assistant Director of Athletics for Compliance at Richmond since February 2005, where he monitored the school's operations in an effort to operate within all NCAA rules and regulations. In addition to helping develop departmental policies and procedures, McCarthy was UR's liaison to the NCAA Eligibility Center, the Office of Admissions, the University Registrar and the Financial Aid Office. He also coordinated the school's prospective student-athlete admission process as well as the eligibility certification process, monitored Title IX compliance and helped administer the NCAA Special Assistance Fund.

He began his career as a compliance and operations intern at Auburn in August 2002, and after a year was hired at the Compliance Coordinator at Mercer.

McCarthy earned his bachelor's degree from Huntingdon (Ala.) College in 2001, adding a master's degree from Georgia a year later. He and his wife Amanda have two children, Drew (5) and Ella (3).



**Sherry Kennemer**  
**Associate Director of Compliance**

Sherry Kennemer joined South Alabama's staff as Associate Director of Compliance in June 2010. In her role, she will be responsible for compiling and monitoring the school's NCAA Academic Progress Rate figures, while also verifying certification of initial and continuing eligibility of student-athletes, overseeing financial aid awards for selected programs, administering transfer waivers and other eligibility documents regarding transfer students and monitoring the admission process for prospective student-athletes.

She comes to USA after spending three years at Southeastern Louisiana, which included serving as Associate Athletic Director for Compliance and Senior Woman Administrator her final two. Kennemer began her administrative career in 1994 at North Alabama, handling responsibilities regarding compliance, academic support and Title IX in positions that included Compliance Coordinator, Senior Woman Administrator, Academic Support Services Coordinator and Title IX Coordinator. She joined the school's staff in 1992 as women's tennis and cross country coach, although she was a graduate assistant at UNA the previous year.

While at UNA, Kennemer coordinated the school's NCAA Self Study in 2004-05, and also was the chair of the Division II Men's and Women's Tennis Committee in 2002-03.

She is a 1990 graduate of UNA with a bachelor's degree in physical education, and she added a master's degree in the same field two years later. Kennemer originally hails from Cullman, Ala.

The University of South Alabama Health System, from its beginning, has played a central role in Mobile's medical history, and today continues this long tradition of excellence in education, research, and medical care.

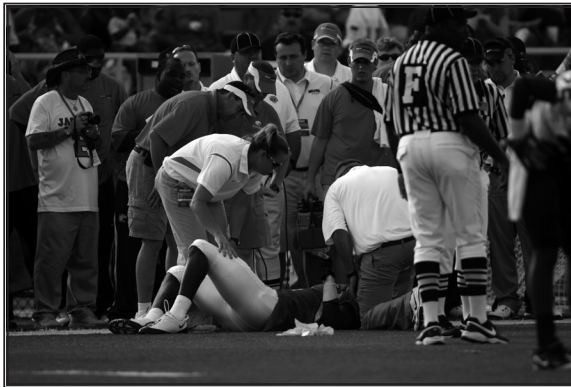
Comprised of the USA Hospitals, and the private practice of academic physicians affiliated with the USA College of Medicine, the USA Health System provides patients with many unique and innovative services.

Orthopedic surgeon Albert Pearsall, M.D., and family practitioner Michael Linder, M.D., serve as USA's team physicians and are available on campus in the training room on a weekly basis. Dr. Pearsall lettered in football at Northwestern and completed an orthopedic sports medicine fellowship at Duke. He is assisted by orthopedic resident Dr. Timothy Frerichs. Dr. Linder is a graduate of the Tennessee medical school and came to USA after serving 12 years as the Director of Medicine at Alabama-Huntsville. He is assisted by Family Practice/Sports Medicine fellow Dr. Brian Bettencourt and Dr. Andy Harcourt. The Department of Athletics can draw upon the extensive list of specialists within the USA Health Services Foundation, if needed.

The athletic training staff includes Assistant Athletic Director of Sports Medicine Jinni Frisbey, MEd, ATC. Frisbey came to South Alabama in 2007 after spending the previous 11 years at the University of Mobile. Frisbey is assisted by Matthew Brown, M.S., ATC, Lori DeLong, PhD, ATC, Chad Stefano, M.S., ATC and Tommy Kopec, M.S., ATC.

The remainder of the staff is made up of graduate assistants Megan Harper, ATC, Juliet Huang, M.S., ATC, Danykia Perine, ATC, Karla Phillips, ATC, Darla Marrs, and Stephen Payne.

The main athletic training facility — located in the Health, Physical Education and Leisure Services Building (also home to Jaguar Gymnasium) — covers 2,730 square feet and offers a variety of therapeutic modalities and treatment rooms. The training facility in the football fieldhouse covers 3,800 square feet including hydroworx plunge systems. Additional athletic training facilities are located at Stanky Field Baseball Clubhouse and the Mitchell Center.

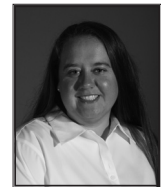

The Sun Belt Conference enters its 35th season in 2010-2011 with several constants evident during the over three decade span of the league. Success, progress, and academic excellence have always been at the core of the league and in the second decade of the 21st century those constants could not be more clear.

The Sun Belt Conference was founded on August 4, 1976 with New Orleans, South Alabama, Georgia State, Jacksonville, North Carolina-Charlotte and South Florida participating in four men's sports: basketball, golf, soccer and tennis.

With the onset of the 21st century the Sun Belt Conference began sponsoring football at the Division I-A level (now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision) in 2001 and generated an automatic bowl tie-in for its conference champion in the New Orleans Bowl.

Prior to the 2001 season only Louisiana-Lafayette had competed at the Division I-A level for the entirety of its program's history. New members North Texas, Middle Tennessee and New Mexico State would take on the task of maturing into I-A programs along with Arkansas State and football only members Idaho and Louisiana-Monroe.

The conference's automatic berth into the New Orleans Bowl gave the league credibility, but wins would be needed to show that the league could contend at the highest level of the game. North Texas carried that responsibility well in the early years of Sun Belt Conference football. The Mean Green would represent the league for four consecutive seasons in the New Orleans Bowl.

One of the first shining moments in Sun Belt football history came in the second New Orleans Bowl in 2002 when North Texas defeated Conference USA co-champion Cincinnati 24-19.

More memorable moments would soon follow, but not before the league's membership took on additional changes. Utah State joined the league briefly as a football playing member but departed along with Idaho and New Mexico State following the 2004 season. Troy joined the league as a football only member in 2004 and would join as an all-sports member soon thereafter. Florida Atlantic joined initially as a football only member in 2005 and would also enter competition in all sports a couple of years later. FIU, a league member since the late 1990s, began competition in football in 2005 and WKU, a longtime league member, began competition in 2009. Louisiana-Monroe, a founding member of the football league, would join as all-sports member as well.

As the Sun Belt Conference evolved with new members and new found success – the league earned two bowl berths for the first time in 2004 – the state of the Football Bowl Subdivision would also evolve. The Sun Belt Conference entered the ranks of the Bowl Championship Series when the BCS restructured prior to the 2006 season.

The Sun Belt Conference now found itself as one of 31 NCAA conferences that sponsor multiple sports, but the league was now one of only 11 to participate in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS).

With that lofty standing, expectations for the Sun Belt Conference are as high as ever and the league and its member institutions have consistently delivered in the past few years.

Because of its status as a member of the Football Bowl Subdivision coalition, the Sun Belt Conference has a permanent seat on the NCAA's 18-member Board of Directors. As a result, the conference has a crucial voice on some of the most pressing issues in college athletics and will always have a role in the implementation of any future NCAA legislation and guidelines.

The conference continues to utilize television to grow and promote the league and its member institutions. The Sun Belt Conference signed a new multi-year agreement with ESPN, Inc. in January of 2009 that will result in unprecedented national coverage for the league. Additionally, ESPN televised the conference's men's basketball championship game for the 30th straight season in 2010, marking its longest affiliation with any conference in the country.

The conference's regional television partnership with Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast (CSS) and Cox Sports Television (CST) enables live telecasts of Sun Belt events to reach millions of households. The addition of volleyball, baseball and softball to the conference's television package has resulted in more national and regional television exposure for the league than at any time in its history.

The Sun Belt Conference has also partnered with JumpTV Sports, Inc. to deliver a full-service, customized, public and premium website to provide fans with a broad range of real-time information and content about the conference's athletic teams. The Sun Belt is one of the few conferences in the nation to provide video highlights and features on its website from each of the league's respective championships. This technology serves as a great recruiting tool for schools by enabling anyone in the world with internet access to view the conference's championship events.

Success has been easy to find in recent years.

Over the last four seasons the Sun Belt Conference has represented itself well in the football postseason. In fact the Sun Belt Conference boasts a winning record of 4-3 in its seven bowl appearances in the last four seasons. With Middle Tennessee's victory in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl, the Sun Belt Conference has now won four bowl games in its last seven appearances.

Since 2005 football season, the first year after conference realignment, the Sun Belt Conference ranks 6th out of 11 conferences in composite bowl game winning percentage. The Sun Belt Conference set an all-time league high for players selected in the NFL Draft in 2010 with seven total players selected - topping the previous record of five in 2007.

The world has taken notice of the Sun Belt Conference as well. Proof of that comes as the league now has two automatic tie-ins to postseason bowl games. The R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl recently extended its agreements with the Sun Belt Conference ensuring that a Sun Belt team will play in that bowl game through 2013 (the league has sent a team to that game every year since the game's inception in 2001). The Sun Belt Conference also signed an agreement this past offseason with the GMAC Bowl, played annually in Mobile, Alabama, that will ensure a Sun Belt team plays in that bowl game through 2013. The league also has secondary tie-ins with the Little Caesar's Pizza Bowl, the St. Petersburg Bowl and the PapaJohns.com Bowl.

There has been no shortage of success in the league's other sports as well in recent years.

The Sun Belt Conference has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Baseball Tournament for 22 consecutive seasons. Since 2000 the Sun Belt Conference has sent three teams to the NCAA Tournament in a season six times - that is six times in the last decade that the Sun Belt has been worthy of having three teams in the NCAA Tournament.

In women's basketball, Sun Belt Conference ranked in the top half of the final league RPI rankings for the 2009-10 season - making it the 12th consecutive season that the Sun Belt Conference has placed in the top half of league RPI. Most impressively in six of those 12 seasons, Sun Belt Conference women's basketball has placed in the national top 10 for RPI. The Sun Belt Conference has also sent multiple teams to the Women's NCAA Basketball Championship in two of the last four seasons. This past season UALR and Middle Tennessee both represented the league in the NCAA postseason.

Men's basketball has seen noted highlights as well in recent years, with none greater than Ty Rodger's magical last second three-point shot as WKU defeated No. 5 seed Drake in the first round of the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship in 2008. The Hilltoppers would go on to reach the Sweet 16 that season and followed up with a trip to the second round the following year. South Alabama also reached the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship in 2008 as the Jaguars qualified for an at-large bid.

One of the nation's all-time greatest softball programs resides in the Sun Belt Conference as Louisiana-Lafayette has advanced to the NCAA Women's College World Series on five occasions. Most recently, the Ragin' Cajuns played in the annuals WCWS in 2008.

The Denver women's golf team has been among the nation's best for a number of years as well. The Pioneers held a national ranking throughout the entire 2009 season and capped the year with its first-ever regional championship, winning the NCAA East Regional at the Mark Bostick Golf Course in Gainesville, Fla. Denver came away with a top-five finish in the national competition, taking fifth place at the 2009 NCAA National Championship.

Each of the 19 sports has seen numerous team and individual accomplishments, but in the realm of academic excellence nearly every Sun Belt Conference school is currently graduating its student-athletes at a rate higher than its respective school's student body.

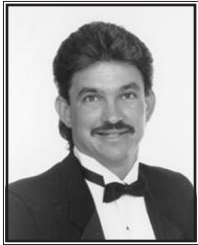
For the third consecutive year Sun Belt Conference student-athletes topped the previous year's record number of Commissioner's List and Academic Honor Roll awards winners. 1,700 Sun Belt student-athletes earned a GPA over 3.0 for the previous school year and were named to either the Sun Belt Academic Honor Roll or Sun Belt Commissioner's List.

Sun Belt schools combined to have 756 student-athletes land on the Commissioner's List, which honors all student-athletes recording a 3.5 GPA or better during the 2008-09 academic year. The league also had a total of 944 student-athletes named to the Academic Honor Roll, which is awarded to those maintaining a 3.0-3.49 GPA.

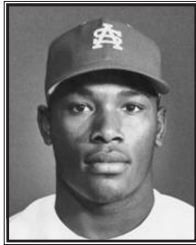
The total of 1,700 student-athletes that were honored tops the previous highs of 1,503 set during the 2007-08 school year and 1,429 for the 2006-07 school year.

Prominent Sun Belt alumni include former United States Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice (Denver), NFL Hall of Fame football player "Mean" Joe Greene (North Texas), Florida Marlins All-Star baseball player Luis Gonzalez (South Alabama), Boston Red Sox baseball player Mike Lowell (MLB All-Star and 2007 MLB World Series MVP, FIU), former member of the United States Senate and House of Representatives John Breaux (Louisiana-Lafayette), country music superstar Tim McGraw (Louisiana-Monroe), and actor Andy Garcia (FIU).

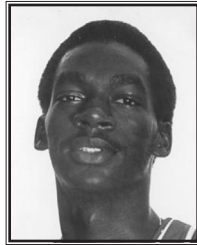
The conference's first 34 years have also produced numerous individual national champions along with Olympic track medalists including Earl Bell, Tom Hill and Al Joyner (Arkansas State), Hollis Conway (Louisiana-Lafayette), and Tayna Lawrence (FIU). Old Dominion's Anne Donovan, who received the Naismith Trophy recognizing the nation's top women's basketball player in 1983, helped the United States win the Olympic gold medal in 1984 and helped the Lady Monarchs capture the national championship in 1985.

When the University of South Alabama's Board of Trustees voted to establish the school's football program in December 2007, one of the immediate benefits was that the Jaguars already had a home lined up. Ladd-Peebles Stadium, located near the heart of downtown Mobile, has been hosting football games since 1948.

Since the announcement that USA will use the facility for its home contests, the stadium has undergone numerous renovations that includes the addition of 11 suites that currently makes the capacity 38,888.

In their first-ever season, the Jaguars posted a 7-0 mark at the stadium, outscoring the opposition 321-41 while averaging better than 18,000 fans per contest. That included drawing nearly 27,000 for the program's debut on Sept. 5 — a 30-13 victory over Hargrave (Va.) Military Academy — as well as a crowd of more than 23,000 for the season finale against Huntingdon (Ala.) College.

Alabama played Vanderbilt in the first event at the stadium, then known as Ernest F. Ladd Memorial Stadium. Since that time, the facility has hosted hundreds of football games at the high school and collegiate levels, and has featured such Mobilians as JaMarcus Russell, Chris Samuels and Richard Todd.

Currently, in addition to being home of the Jags, Ladd-Peebles Stadium plays host annually to the GMAC Bowl, the Under Armour Senior Bowl and the Gulf Coast Classic. The GMAC Bowl — which celebrated its 11th anniversary in January when Central Michigan defeated Troy 44-41 in double overtime — has seen such highlights as a 64-61 double overtime victory in which Marshall overcame a 30-point halftime deficit to defeat East Carolina in 2001 in the highest-scoring bowl game ever played and Miami (Ohio)'s win over Louisville in 2003 in which future Super Bowl Most Valuable Player Ben Roethlisberger threw for 376 yards and four first-half touchdowns.

The game has also featured such players as LaDainian Tomlinson of Texas Christian, Marshall's Byron Leftwich and Memphis' DeAngelo Williams, who would all go on to star in the National Football League. Gary Patterson coached his first game at TCU in the GMAC Bowl, while John L. Smith led Louisville to the event before becoming head coach at Michigan State.

The Senior Bowl, which brings approximately 100 of the top collegiate players to Mobile each January, moved to the Port City in 1951. The contest has featured some of the game's best players, with 34 going on to earn induction into the NFL's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Included in that group is Terry Bradshaw, Frank Gifford, Joe Greene, Dan Marino, Joe Namath and Walter Payton, while current league stars Donovan McNabb, Tomlinson and Brian Urlacher have also participated in the event.

Ladd-Peebles Stadium has been the stage for not just many of the city's top athletic moments, but also entertainment. Ed Sullivan once graced the stage at the facility, while Jimmy Buffett — a native of Mobile — performed in front of thousands of fans. The debt-free facility, which has a replacement value in the neighborhood of \$50 million, is the fourth-largest stadium in the state and the largest outdoor facility located on the Gulf Coast from New Orleans to Tallahassee.





- Completed in August 2009, the football fieldhouse was constructed in approximately one year
- The building — which covers 49,000 square feet — includes a locker room, players' lounge, weight room and training room as well as the Jim and Frances Yance Coaches Suite, which includes the main foyer, coaches' offices, reception and administrative offices
- The 8,000 square-foot weight room includes state-of-the-art equipment
- A 40-meter four-lane covered track is located outside the weight room
- The 120 individual player lockers — which will have each player's name illuminated above — include a secure area to lock valuables as well as fans to dry out shoulder pads and cleats
- There will be more than 10 Sony Bravia 52-inch flat screen televisions throughout the building, including one in the players' lounge and two in the weight room
- The players' lounge also has a built-in dry bar with an area to keep all refreshments refrigerated
