JAGUAR BASEBALL ON THE AIR

All South Alabama baseball games will be broadcast live on radio as part of the efforts of Jaguar Sports Properties on WNTM 710 AM in Mobile as well as on the iHeart Radio app.

ON-AIR TALENT

A new broadcasting crew will call South Alabama baseball action this spring, with games handled by J.D. Byars and Pat Greenwood.

J.D. Byars

Byars joined the South Alabama staff as Director of Broadcasting/Corporate Sales Executive in January 2014. In his role, he will be responsible for creating and producing radio and television broadcasts including events, coaches' shows and special projects, as well as creating and maintaining sponsorship packages for Jaguar Sports Properties.



Byars was the Director of Broadcasting & Corporate Sponsorships at North Alabama for last three-plus years, where his main duties included producing, engineering and serving as the play-by-play voice for over 90 Lion athletic events each season. In addition to creating and establishing UNA's radio network — which included all FM affiliates — and hiring and managing all on-air support staff, he created broadcast, signage, print promotion and web inventory for strategic sports sponsorship packages.

Byars began hosting weekly television coaches' shows for football and men's basketball in 2009; he also served as creative producer for the shows, brokering air time for the programs as well. He first started calling play-by-play action for Lion Athletics during the 1998-99 academic year.

Byars, who earned his degree in communications arts from UNA, and his wife Beverly have one son Jake and one daughter Stella Beth.

Pat Greenwood

Pat Greenwood began in March 2014 as South Alabama's Director of Multi-Media/Corporate Sales Executive. In addition to creating on-line producing video programming for the department's official site, www.usajaguars.com and www.jagnation.tv, Greenwood will support and participate in event and coaches' shows broadcasts. He will also create packages and maintain relationships with Jaguar Sports Properties sponsors.



Greenwood — a Mobile native — joined the staff after working at WPMI-TV since 1997. After starting at the local station as a sports reporter, he added duties as a weekday morning anchor until assuming the title of Sports Director in 1999. Greenwood earned several awards during his time in sports, first receiving accolades for the best Alabama Associated Press sports story in 1999. He was also selected the AP's Best Alabama Sportscaster in '01, was recognized for the organization's Best Sports Program two years later and was named the Best Sportscaster by the Mobile Press Club in '04.

He transitioned into news in 2007 as part of the "Local 15 Today" program that airs each weekday morning from 4:30-7 a.m.

Greenwood earned his degree from Loyola (La.) in 1994. He and his wife Stephanie have four children: Madeleine, Robert, Grace Anne and Mary Linda.

MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE

The South Alabama Athletic Media Relations Office is located in room 1209 of the Mitchell Center.

HOME CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

The South Alabama Athletic Media Relations Office will issue credentials to working press only. Passes for spouses, children or friends will not be issued. These credentials are non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of a credential will result in the credential being immediately revoked.

All credential requests should be made in writing by sports editors or directors of accredited media outlets on company letterhead. Requests should be made no later than 24 hours prior to the start of the desired contests. Approved credentials can be picked up at the front gate of Stanky Field.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only photographers shooting for accredited media outlets or for South Alabama Athletic Media Relations will be issued photo passes. Photographers are allowed to shoot from field level photo boxes and from the stands, provided they do not obstruct any views. Flash photography is not permitted.

PARKING

A limited number of parking spaces are reserved in the paved parking area.

GAMEDAY SERVICES

The South Alabama Athletic Media Relations staff will be available to assist all the media members covering Jaguar baseball. All customary gameday services will be available. All working media members will be provided with game notes, statistics, rosters and game programs prior to first pitch.

PRACTICES

The South Alabama Athletic Media Relations staff encourages coverage of Jaguar baseball outside of games. As a general rule, all practices are open to the media and public. Please contact the Athletic Media Relations Office to verify practice schedules and give notice of your attendance.

Interviews with student-athletes must be arranged in advance through the Athletic Media Relations Office. Players are generally available up to 15 minutes before and immediately following practice. Phone interviews are also available at night, but student-athlete phone numbers are not available under any circumstances.

Fifth overall season at USA



Mark Calvi became the fifth head coach in South Alabama baseball history at the conclusion of the 2011 season, after spending the year as associate head coach/head coach in waiting, and begins his fourth season as Jaguar head coach in 2015.

In just his second season at the helm, Calvi led the Jaguars to their 14th Sun Belt Conference championship and 25th NCAA Regional appearance after recording the program's first 40-plus win season since 2003 and was named the Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year and American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA)/Diamond South Central Region Coach of the Year.

Seven Jags earned all-conference honors in 2013, and Jordan Patterson was named the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year becoming just the sixth Jaguar in the program's history to earn the honor. Patterson and Kyle Bartsch also earned ABCA South/Central all-region honors. Bartsch, Patterson, Nolan Earley and Dylan Stamey were selected in the 2013 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. Patterson (4th round, 109th pick) became South Alabama's highest draftee since Adam Lind was taken by the Toronto Blue Jays in the third round of the 2004 MLB Draft.

In his first season at South Alabama, Calvi led the Jaguars to their highest Sun Belt Conference Tournament seed (No. 4) since the 2006 season. USA closed the 2012 campaign with consecutive wins over Western Kentucky and Florida Atlantic to close the SBC Championship.

Three Jaguars received all-conference honors in 2012: Whitt Dorsey (1st team, DH), Jordan Patterson (2nd team, OF) and Jarron Cito (2nd team, RHP). It marked the first time since the 2007 season that South Alabama placed three or more student-athletes on the all-conference team. Cito became the first Jaguar pitcher to earn all-conference honors since P.J. Walters in 2006.

The USA pitching staff increased its strikeout total by 70 (435) in 2012 – the highest team total since 2008 (427). South Alabama's 13 team saves were the most by a Jaguar staff since 2003 (15).

Calvi came to South Alabama from the University of South Carolina, where he served as pitching coach for six seasons. In 2010, Calvi's Gamecock pitching staff led USC to the national championship, ranking in the top 10 in earned run average (seventh, 3.45), strikeouts (sixth, 8.9) and hits allowed per nine innings (third, 7.48), after posting a 2.15 ERA in seven College World Series contests, which was nearly a point lower than the next best team in Omaha. The Gamecocks led the Southeastern Conference in ERA and innings pitched, but also allowed the fewest hits in the conference.

Calvi was named the recipient of the Eighth Annual Pitching Coach of the Year Award by Collegiate Baseball News in September 2010 for his efforts in helping lead the Gamecocks to the national title.

In his career, which spans 21 years at the collegiate level, including an 11-season stint at fellow Sun Belt Conference member Florida International, Calvi has worked with over 40 pitchers who have either been drafted or signed with Major League Baseball teams – that includes seven who have reached the majors - along with position players Jackie Bradley Jr. and Christian Walker.

In three of his six seasons at USC, Calvi’s pitching staffs finished with an ERA of below 4.00, and ranked in the top five in the SEC in the category four times during that stretch.

The Gamecocks ranked in the top 50 in ERA four times during Calvi’s six seasons, and also finished in the top 50 in hits allowed and strikeouts per nine innings each of his last three seasons.

During Calvi’s six seasons with the program, the Gamecocks reached an NCAA Regional every year, advanced to three Super Regionals and claimed the 2010 CWS title. USC posted an overall record of 262-140 (.668) during his tenure there. Additionally, three of his hurlers earned Freshman All-America honors while Blake Cooper, who Calvi helped end the year second in the country in wins (13) and 10th in strikeouts (126), was voted to multiple All-America squads in 2010.

Prior to joining the staff at South Carolina, Calvi was an assistant at FIU for 11 years. During his time with the Golden Panthers, they advanced to an NCAA Regional seven times while moving on to the 2001 Super Regional. His staff led the country in ERA in 1995 (2.40) – FIU’s 16 shutouts that spring are tied for the sixth-highest total in NCAA history – and ’99 (3.07), and in 1998 the Golden Panthers’ 675 strikeouts were tops in the nation. Calvi’s unit recorded an ERA that finished in the top 10 in the NCAA five times.

His efforts in Miami helped Joseph Burns pace the nation with a 1.20 ERA during the 1995 campaign, while a year later Evan Thomas led the country with 220 strikeouts – the latter is the fourth-highest figure ever in the NCAA. In all, Calvi produced eight All-Americans and 13 all-conference selections with the Golden Panthers.

Calvi was a three-year letterwinner as a catcher at Nova Southeastern, and after he earned his bachelor’s degree in secondary education, he signed a professional contract with the Seattle Mariners. Following a season in which he helped his team win the Northwest League championship, he worked for a year as a scout for the Mariners.

A native of Marco Island, Fla., Calvi and his wife Kaylie have one daughter, Taylor.

Bob Keller begins his fourth season as South Alabama pitching coach in 2015.

Keller helped lead South Alabama to its 14th Sun Belt Conference championship and 25th NCAA Regional appearance by helping the USA pitching staff post its lowest team ERA (4.19) since 2001 in his second season with the program in 2013. The Jags recorded 511 strikeouts – the most by a USA staff since the 2005 staff struck out 521 batters.

Under Keller, Kyle Bartsch became South Alabama's all-time saves leader and tied the single-season record with 12. Both Bartsch and right-hander Matt Bell were named second-team all-Sun Belt Conference in 2013.

That season, the South Alabama pitching staff led the Sun Belt in saves (22), and ranked second in ERA (4.19), innings pitched (560.1) and strikeouts (511). Bartsch and right-handed reliever Dylan Stamey were both selected in the 2013 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, becoming the first Jaguar pitchers to be drafted under Keller.

In his first season with the program in 2012, Keller helped right-hander Jarron Cito earn second-team all-Sun Belt Conference honors, marking the first time a Jaguar pitcher has been named all-conference since P.J. Walters in 2006. The USA pitching staff increased its strikeout total by 70 (435) in 2012 – the highest team total since 2008 (427). South Alabama's 13 team saves were the most by a Jaguar staff since 2003 (15).

In 2014, Keller helped southpaw Locke St. John reach the professional ranks when he was drafted by the Detroit Tigers in the MLB First-Year Player Draft.

Keller enters his 20th year of Division I coaching this season, and has participated in six NCAA Regional Tournaments and two Super Regionals. He has worked with 31 pitchers who have moved on to professional baseball.

Prior to arriving at South Alabama, Keller served as pitching coach at Dallas Baptist where he helped lead the Patriots to a 42-20 record and NCAA Super Regional in 2011. DBU won the Fort Worth Regional in Fort Worth, Texas, in 2011, advancing to Super Regional against California in Santa Clara, Calif.

Patriot right-handers Brandon Williamson and Chris Haney were each selected in the 20th round of the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. Williamson was taken by the Milwaukee Brewers after leading DBU in wins (10), strikeouts (71) and innings pitched (123). Haney was selected by the San Diego Padres after going 4-2 with 15 saves and a 2.17 ERA. His 15 saves tied for 10th nationally. He led the Patriots in appearances (32), and struck out 42 batters against just 13 walks. Two additional Patriot pitchers under Keller's tutelage were signed by the Oakland Athletics in 2012.

Prior to joining the DBU staff, Keller spent six seasons as the pitching coach at Michigan. In his time at Michigan, Keller had 18 pitchers earn all-Big Ten honors, and also had 16 pitchers go on to professional baseball – 10 of which were selected in the first 10 rounds of the draft. Keller saw four of those pitchers drafted in 2005, including Clayton Richard of the San Diego Padres, and three inside the first 10 rounds of the 2010 draft in his final year at Michigan.

Keller's pitching staff finished in the top two of the Big Ten in overall team ERA three of his last four seasons. His staff led the Big Ten in wins and saves, and was second in strikeouts and third in overall team ERA (5.22) in 2010. In 2009, the Wolverines finished first with a 4.84 team ERA, while in 2008, his staff helped guide the Wolverines to the most wins in Big Ten history with a team ERA of 4.19. In 2006, All-Americans Chris Fetter, drafted by the San Diego Padres in 2009, and Zach Putnam, drafted by the Cleveland Indians in 2008 and now with the Colorado Rockies, led Keller's staff to a 2.91 ERA in the Big Ten. In 2010, Keller had three Michigan pitchers drafted in the first ten rounds.

Before his stint at Michigan, Keller spent three seasons as the pitching coach at Birmingham-Southern, under current University of Alabama Birmingham head coach, Brian Shoop. Under Keller's direction, the Panther pitching staff posted the best team ERA in the Big South Conference, and he worked with six pitchers taken in the draft. Keller's staff played an instrumental role in the Panther's 2004 season, in which they posted an impressive 47-18 record, won the Big South regular season title, and ranked 29th in the NCAA with a 3.82 ERA.

From 1995-2001, Keller served as an assistant coach at Georgia State, spending three seasons as the recruiting coordinator under head coach Mike Hurst.

Keller had an outstanding career as both a pitcher and outfielder at Biola University. A two-time NCCAA All-American, Keller held school records for RBI and doubles, and ranked second in hits and home runs upon graduation in 1992. In his first career start as a freshman, Keller threw a complete game victory against Texas Tech University.

Keller earned his Bachelor of Science in Physical Education while at Biola, and a Bachelor of Science in Kinesiology while at Georgia State. He and his wife, Jeannie, have two sons, Charles and Brady.

Alan Luckie enters his ninth season as an assistant coach at South Alabama in 2015. He works with USA infielders and baserunners, and also assists with Jaguar hitters. Additionally, Luckie works closely with the USA Dugout Club.

Luckie's infield defenses have put up impressive numbers through the years. The Jag defense has fielded at least .966 in each of his eight seasons, and the 2010 mark of .972 tied a single-season record at USA that was first posted by the 1992 Jags.

The Jaguars' 2008 mark of .969 was fourth-best in school history. The Jaguar defense also finished third in the nation by turning 68 double plays during the 2008 regular season.

In 2010, Luckie helped Jaguar second baseman Zach Grichor become the program's first Rawlings Gold Glove Award winner. Grichor committed just two errors in 311 chances to earn the honor. In 2011, Luckie helped freshman Logan Kirkland make a midseason switch from second base to shortstop, which resulted in Kirkland being named second-team Freshman All-American by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association and Baseball America.

In 2012, two Jaguar hitters – Whitt Dorsey (1st team) and Jordan Patterson (2nd team) – earned all-Sun Belt Conference honors after batting .337 and .323, respectively. South Alabama led the SBC in batting average (.306), slugging percentage (.452), on-base percentage (.389), runs scored (205), RBI (184), total bases (474), and tied for most hits (321) in league contests in 2012.

He helped guide the Jaguars to their 14th Sun Belt Conference championship and 25th NCAA Regional appearance in 2013. Luckie helped 2013 Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year Jordan Patterson – who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Colorado Rockies in the 2013 MLB Draft – make the transition from outfield to first base. Patterson went on to earn All-American honorable mention as well as first-team all-Sun Belt Conference and second-team American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) all-South/Central Region honors. Robby Campbell was named first-team all-SBC at second base, marking the first time a Jaguar middle infielder has been named all-conference since Brett Parker's first-team selection in 2003. Dustin Dalen was named first-team all-SBC as designated hitter after batting .330 with 11 doubles, a triple, a team-leading eight home runs, 43 RBI and 29 runs scored in 54 games.

In 2014, Cole Gleason earned second-team all-SBC honors after leading the team in 10 offensive categories. Gleason hit .381 with seven doubles, three homers, 29 RBI and 15 runs scored while posting a .976 OPS including a .454 on-base percentage in 28 Sun Belt contests.

Luckie came to USA at the start of the 2007 season after spending five seasons working with Stu Fuller at Fairhope High School. The Pirates either captured or tied for the regional championship crown in each of those five seasons. Those teams compiled a combined record of 127-65.

A graduate of Fairhope High School in 1980, Luckie went on to play two seasons at Faulkner State Community College before moving on to Spring Hill College, where he played for coach Steve Kittrell in 1983 and was an all-conference performer there in 1984. He graduated from Spring Hill in 1984.

Using opportunities from life-long friend and Florida Marlins Vice President of Player Personnel and Assistant General Manager, Dan Jennings, Luckie has garnered knowledge from several professional coaches including Jack McKeon, Jim Presley, Perry Hill, Bo Porter, Rich Donnelly and New York Yankees manager Joe Girardi.

A highly successful businessman involved heavily in the South Alabama community, Luckie brings a vast amount of experience both on and off the field to the Jaguar family.

He resides in Point Clear, Ala., with his wife Kerry. They have two daughters, Jenna and Kayla Ann.

Jerry Zulli enters his fourth season at South Alabama as hitting coach and recruiting coordinator in 2015.

As recruiting coordinator, Zulli has helped South Alabama land consecutive Collegiate Baseball top-50 recruiting classes the past three years, with the 2013 signing class ranked 29th in the nation by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper.

In 2013, under Zulli's guidance, Jordan Patterson was named the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year and first-team all-Sun Belt Conference as a utility player. Robby Campbell (2B) and Dustin Dalen (DH) were also named first-team all-SBC while Whitt Dorsey (C) and Nolan Earley earned second-team all-conference honors.

The Jaguars ranked second in the SBC in batting average (.300), hits (661) and on-base percentage (.390), and third in runs scored (426), RBI (388) and walks (258). In Sun Belt contests, USA led the league in triples (11), and ranked second in batting average (.312), slugging percentage (.452), on-base percentage (.395), runs scored (209), hits (337), RBI (195) and total bases (488).

At the NCAA Starkville Regional, Nick Zaharion earned all-tournament honors after hitting .375 with three RBI, two runs scored and two walks in three games.

In 2012, two Jaguar hitters – Whitt Dorsey (1st team) and Jordan Patterson (2nd team) – earned all-Sun Belt Conference honors after batting .337 and .323, respectively.

South Alabama led the SBC in batting average (.306), slugging percentage (.452), on-base percentage (.389), runs scored (205), RBI (184), total bases (474), and tied for most hits (321) in league contests in 2012.

Last season, Cole Gleason earned second-team all-SBC honors after leading the team in 10 offensive categories. Gleason hit .381 with seven doubles, three homers, 29 RBI and 15 runs scored while posting a .976 OPS including a .454 on-base percentage in 28 Sun Belt contests.

Zulli came to USA from Memphis where he helped the Tigers lead Conference USA in hitting in 2011 with a .309 team batting average, while also leading the league in on-base percentage (.394). The Tigers ranked in the top five in nearly every offensive statistical category, and finished second in doubles (117) and third in slugging percentage (.430) and sacrifice flies (35). Memphis ranked fourth in C-USA in runs scored (365), RBI (329), total bases (841) and tied for fourth in hits (604).

Shortstop Chad Zurcher was named the 2011 C-USA Player of the Year, and earned third-team All-American honors from several organizations, including the American Baseball Coaches Association and the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association. Zurcher led the nation in batting average (.443) and on-base percentage (.547).

In his seven seasons at Memphis, Zulli coached eight all-conference student-athletes who were honored 10 times. He helped lead the Tigers to 36 wins and an NCAA Regional appearance in 2007. In 2011, five Memphis student-athletes were taken in the MLB draft. In his seven seasons at Memphis, Zulli coached 12 student-athletes who were selected in the draft.

The new Stanky Field has one of the most impressive press boxes in the nation. Wireless internet access, as well as spacious work areas, can accommodate large numbers of media.

The second floor Stadium Club is a beautiful gathering place for South Alabama supporters. Air conditioned comfort, along with leather couches and chairs, make watching USA baseball a first-class experience. The USA Dugout Club hosts gatherings in the Stadium Club throughout the season.

Before the start of the 2011 season, Stanky Field took on further renovations with the addition of a new outfield wall, renovated dugouts and home plate collar. In addition to the new upgrades, the home and visitor bullpens were moved into foul territory down the outfield lines. Stanky Field will host the 2014 Sun Belt Conference Championship, which will mark the 11th time it has served as the site of the league's tournament.

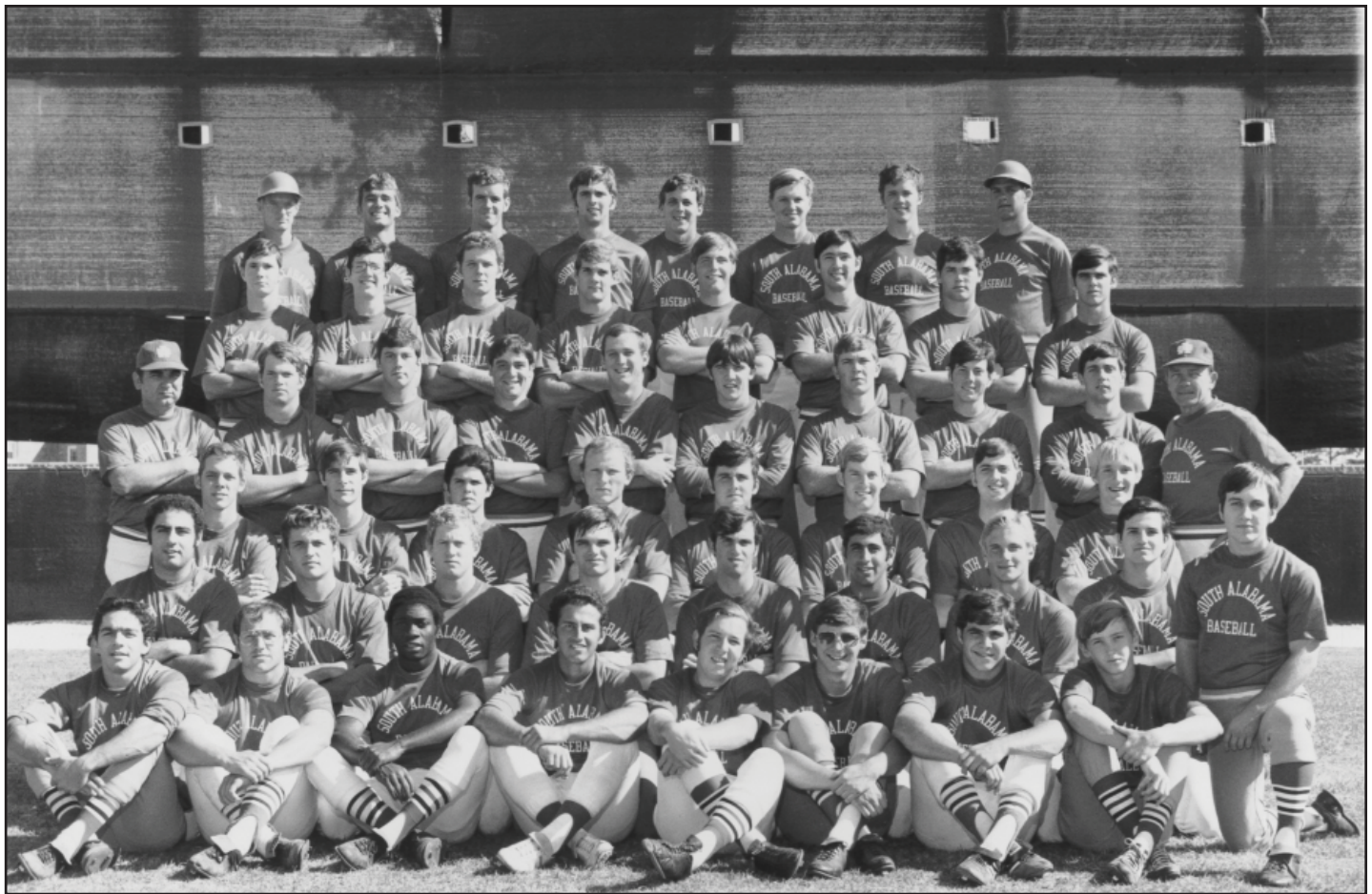


Ernie Rosseau (center) was named a first-team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association as an outfielder in 1973.

Not only did the '75 Jags set a still-standing school record with 52 wins, but they tied the 1972 team for the program's longest win streak at 19 games. USA opened the season with a 17-game win streak before surrendering its first loss of the year to Ohio at Jaguar Field. But the Jags rebounded with a 19-game win streak to capture wins in 36 of their first 37 contests. South Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the nation on April 7, 1975 by *Collegiate Baseball*, marking the second time in the program's 11-year history that the Jaguars reached the top spot in the national polls.

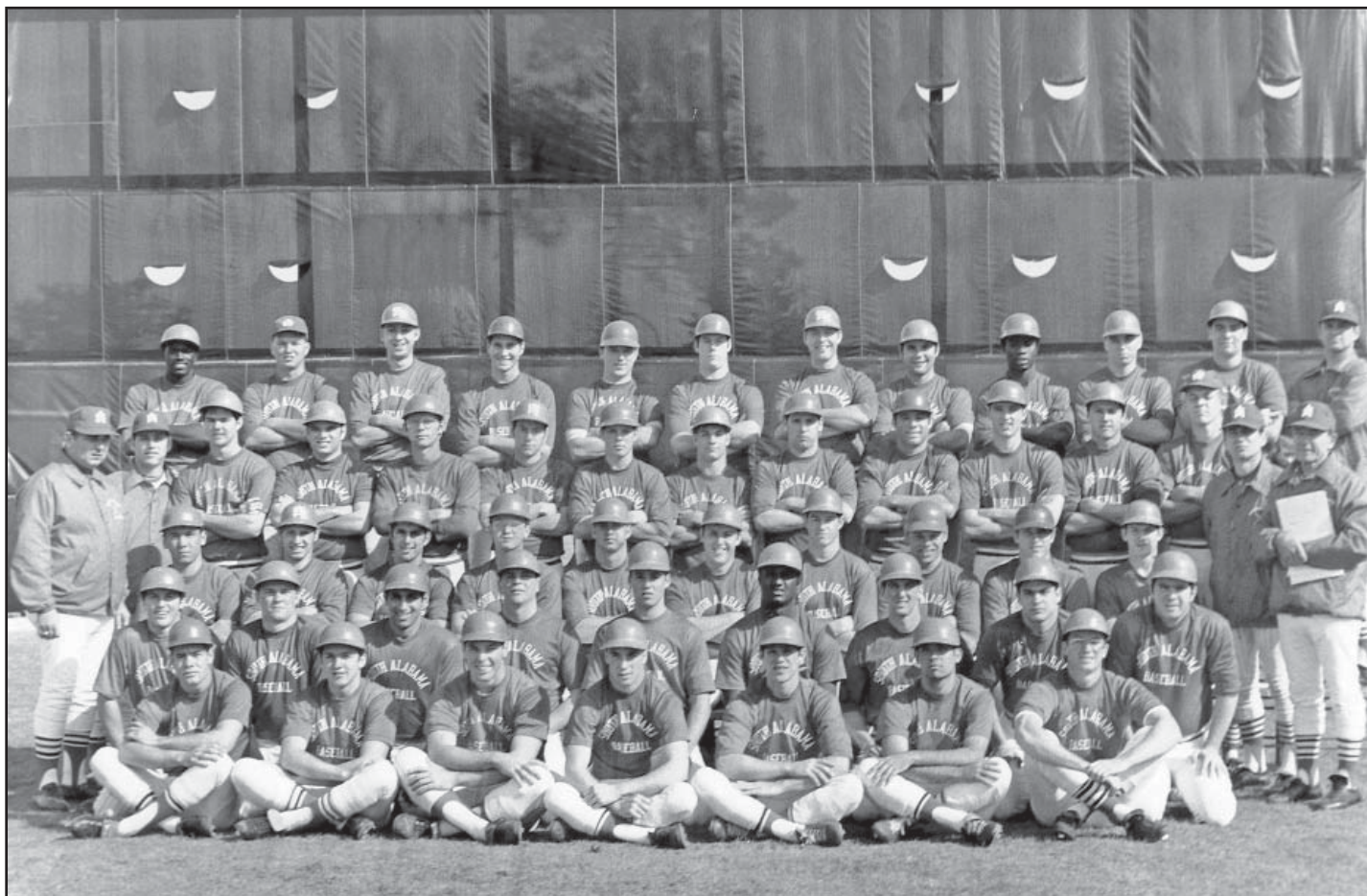

The 1984 season ushered in the Steve Kittrell era of South Alabama baseball, and the former Jaguar outfielder wasted no time picking up where Eddie Stanky left off in 1983. Lance Johnson set a then-NCAA record for stolen bases with 89 in the '84 season which still stands as the Jaguar single-season record. South Alabama finished Kittrell's first season ranked 11th in the final *Collegiate Baseball* poll.

Pete Coachman led the team in batting average (.430) and RBI (56), and earned all-Sun Belt Conference honors, along with Johnson, Van Graham and Mike Sassone. Mike Maksudian earned first-team all-SBC honors in '87 after leading the league in home runs (14), and leading the Jaguars in batting average (.407), homers and RBI (63). Brian Neveau, Dewayne Jones and Mike Mordecai were each named second-team all-SBC, while Mordecai was also honored as a first-team Freshman All-American by *Baseball America*. Maksudian signed as a free agent with the Chicago White Sox after the 1987 season, and later reached the major leagues as a member of the Toronto Blue Jays in 1992. Other members of the 1987 team that would go on to reach the major leagues were Mark Ettles, Luis Gonzalez and Mike Mordecai. Gonzalez and Mordecai each won a World Series title during their respective careers. Gonzalez was a five-time All-Star and had his number retired by the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2010.

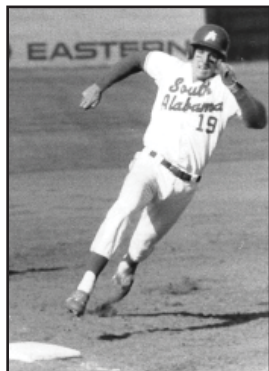

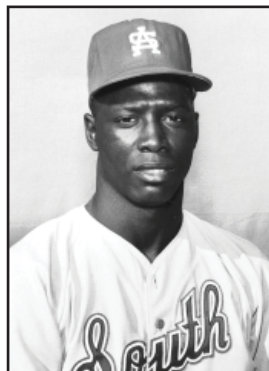

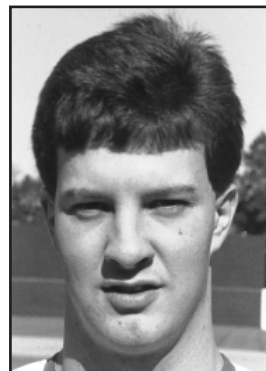

The Jaguars capped their regular season with a three-game sweep of Louisiana-Lafayette at Stanky Field before defeating the Ragin' Cajuns 9-3 in the opening round of the SBC Tournament in Beaumont, Texas. A 10-inning, one-run loss to Jacksonville and 10-7 loss to host Lamar followed to eliminate USA from the Sun Belt postseason tournament.

At one point in the season, South Alabama won nine consecutive SBC games, including back-to-back road sweeps of UALR and Western Kentucky.

USA won nine of its final 10 regular season games, including a three-game sweep of Louisiana-Lafayette to close SBC regular season play. Consecutive wins at the SBC Tournament in Jacksonville over New Orleans and Lamar set up a showdown between USA and JU which the Dolphins won by one run (7-6) in 10 innings. The Jaguars fell 4-2 to Lamar in their next game to be eliminated from the conference tournament.

Anderson, Marty Barnett and Allen Halley each signed a professional baseball contract at the end of the '95 season. Anderson went on to play 12 MLB seasons after first breaking into the big leagues with the Philadelphia Phillies in 1998.

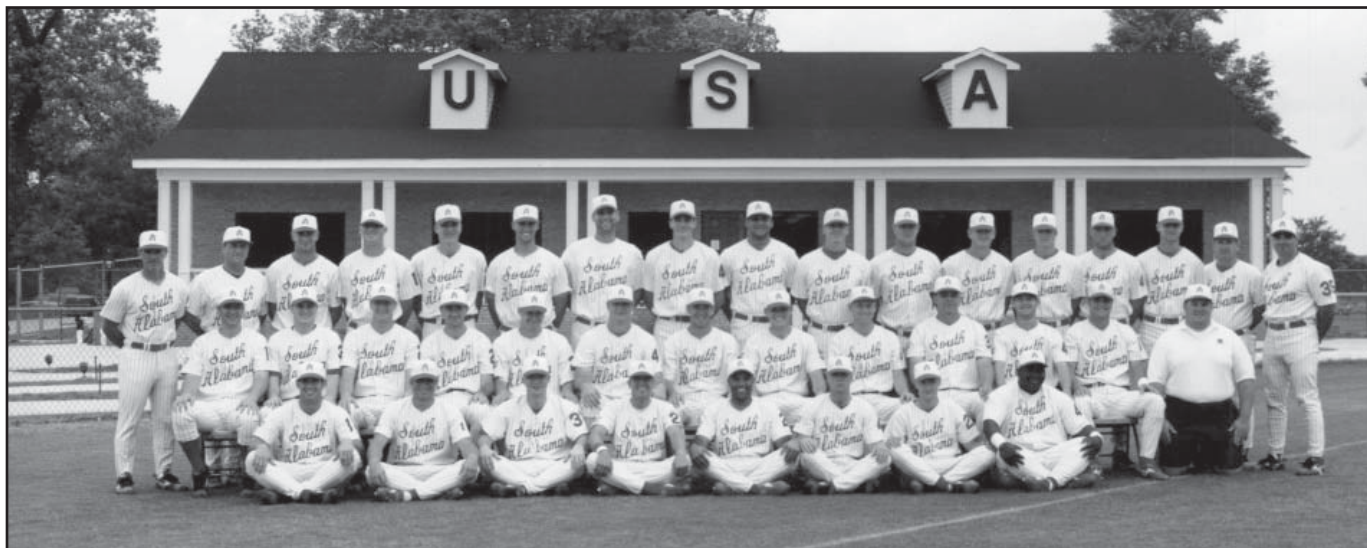

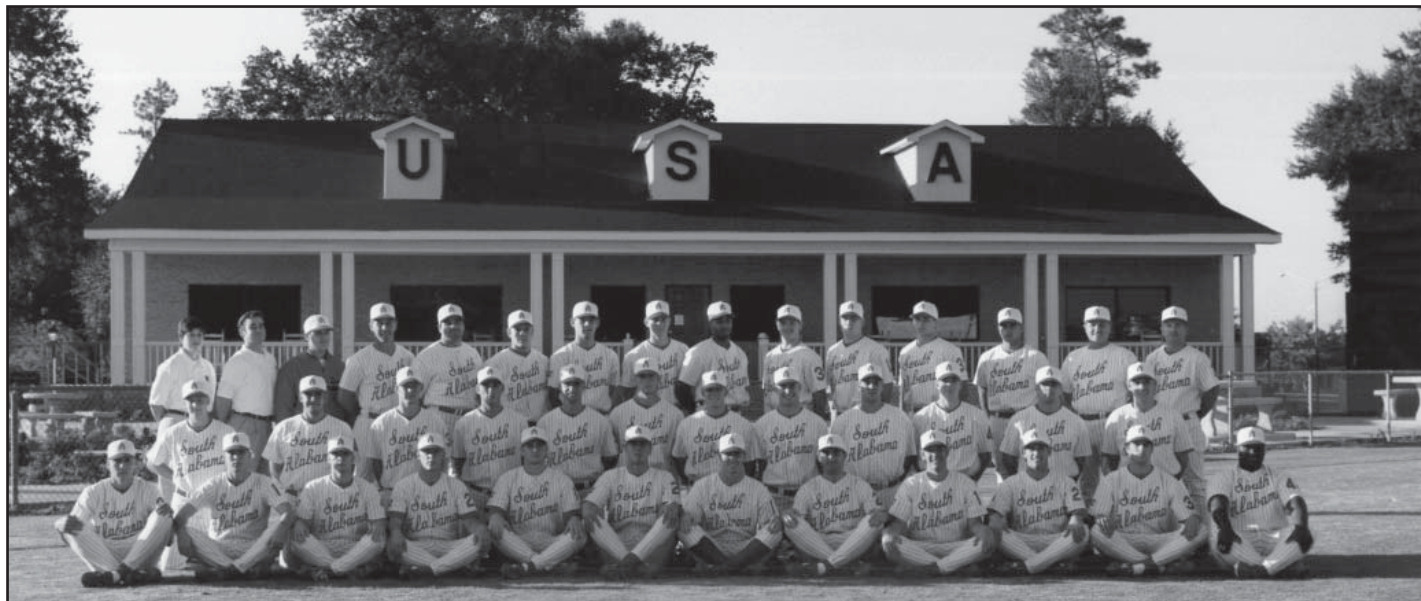

USA won its first five Sun Belt Conference series that consisted of three games (A 7-4 loss at Lamar served as the only conference matchup between the schools in '98), and dropped two of three games to Western Kentucky to mark their only conference series loss of the season.

USA won its first two games of the SBC Tournament by a combined score of 26-3, knocking off Jacksonville 16-2 to open the tournament and defeating Arkansas State 10-1 in the second game. But consecutive losses to Louisiana-Lafayette and New Orleans eliminated the Jaguars from the league's tournament. South Alabama opened the '98 NCAA South I Regional in Clemson, S.C., with a 2-1 win over Virginia Commonwealth. A 2-1 win in 16 innings over host Clemson put the Jags in a winner's bracket matchup with Southern California, who defeated USA 3-2. South Alabama stayed alive in the Regional with a 6-0 shutout over Virginia Commonwealth, but fell to USC 4-3 in the final game of the Regional to end the season and another shot at advancing to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. 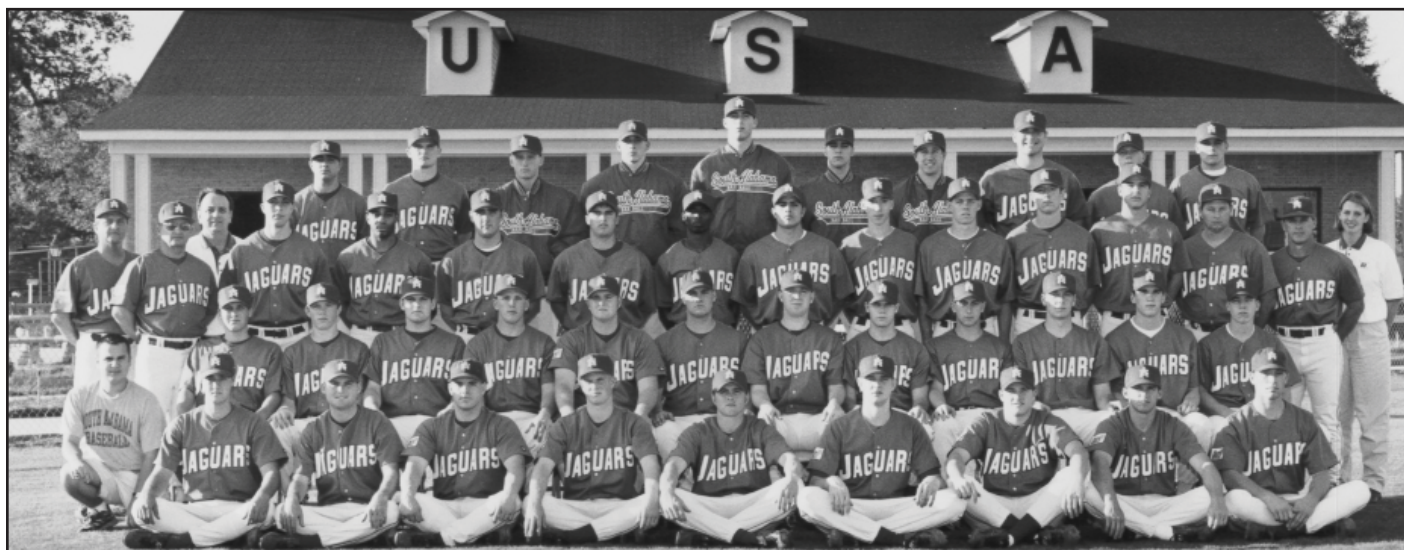

The 2001 season brought the return of the Sun Belt Conference championship to South Alabama, as well as the school's 20th NCAA Regional appearance. 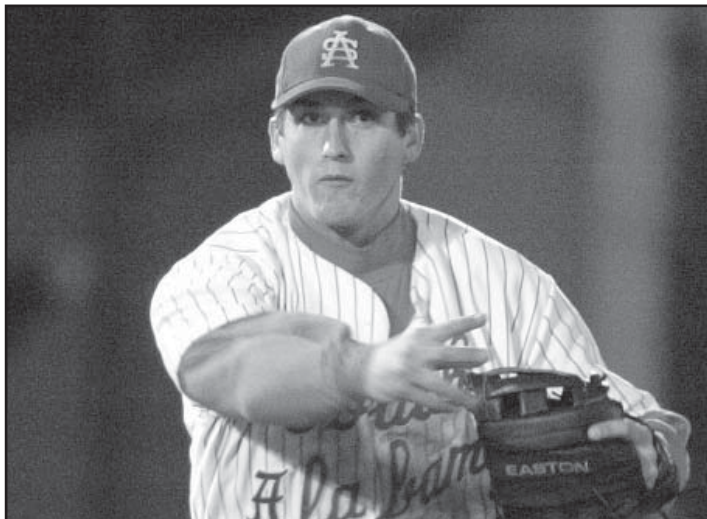

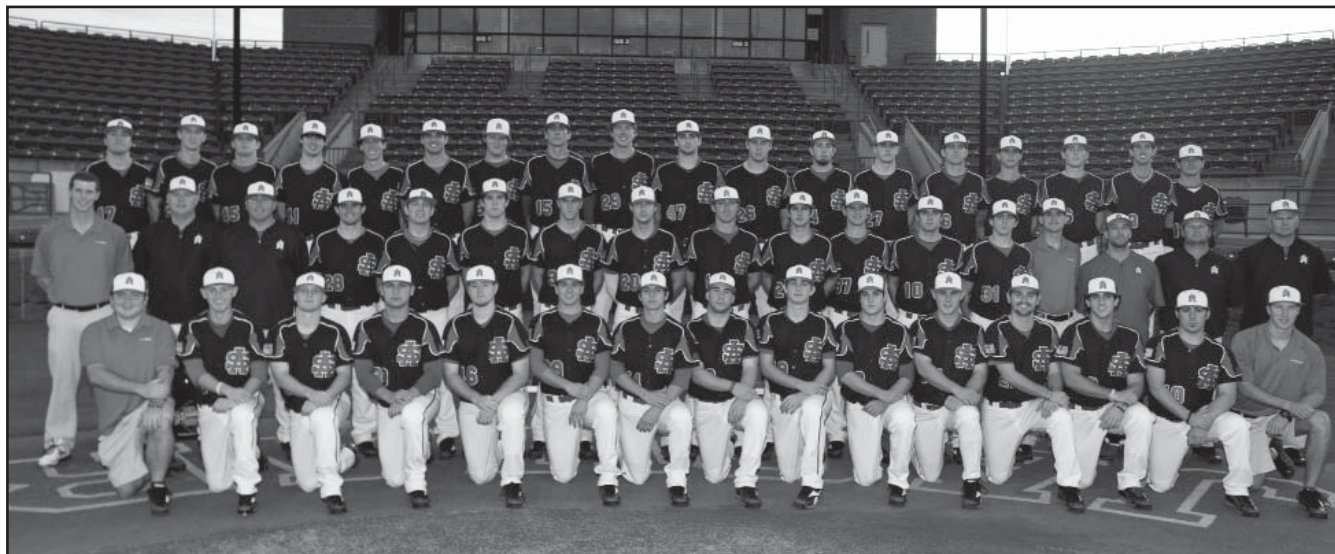

The Mark Calvi era at South Alabama began with his first season in 2012, but it was in his sophomore campaign that the Jaguars returned to prominence nationally as well as in the Sun Belt Conference. South Alabama captured the program's 14th SBC title in 2013, which it shared with Troy, and advanced to the NCAA Postseason for the 25th time in school history.

USA opened the season with a nine-game win streak and won 13 of its first 15 games of the year. Consistent play at home and on the road in conference play helped the Jags capture series wins in eight of their 10 league series. South Alabama opened the SBC Tournament in Lafayette, La., as the No. 2 seed and defeated UALR 10-2. Louisiana-Lafayette knocked off the Jags 9-2 in the winner's bracket, but USA rebounded with a 7-6 win over Florida International. ULL eliminated the Jaguars from the conference tournament the next day with a 12-2 win. But after finishing the regular season with a 40-16 record, USA received an at-large bid to compete in the NCAA Starkville (Miss.) Regional.

The Jags opened the Regional with a 9-4 win over Mercer to set up a rematch from the regular season with host Mississippi State. The Bulldogs defeated USA 6-2 and went on to earn a national runner-up finish after falling to UCLA in the College World Series championship series. South Alabama was eliminated one day later after getting shut out by Central Arkansas 3-0. USA finished the year ranked 30th in the final National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association poll.

Jordan Patterson was named the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year, and became the program's 26th student-athlete to earn All-American honors when *College Baseball Insider* named him a third-team All-American. Patterson, Robby Campbell (2B) and Dustin Dalken (DH) earned first-team all-SBC honors, while Kyle Bartsch (P), Matt Bell (P), Whitt Dorsey (C) and Nolan Earley (OF) were voted second-team all-conference. Calvi was named the SBC Coach of the Year, and was later voted as the South/Central Region Coach of the Year by the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA). Patterson and Bartsch were each named second-team all-South/Central Region by the ABCA. Outfielder Jeff DeBlieux led the nation with 10 triples. Bartsch, Earley, Patterson and right-hander Dylan Stamey each signed professional contracts at the end of the 2013 season.

(1969-79, 1981-83)

- Led South Alabama to five NCAA Regional appearances and two Sun Belt Conference championships.
- Produced three first-team All-Americans and two first-round draft picks in the MLB Draft.
- Led USA to a school-record 52 wins in 1975.
- Helped the Jaguars reach No. 1 in the national polls twice.
- Second-winningest coach in Jaguar history.
- Inducted into the USA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989.

Eddie Stanky took over a South Alabama baseball program in 1969 that was still in an infancy stage after former head coach and athletic directory Mel Lucas started the program in 1965. Stanky, a four-time Major League Baseball All-Star, participated in three MLB World Series with the Dodgers, Braves and Giants, and was named the Major League Manager of the Year by *The Sporting News* in 1952 as skipper of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Stanky made an immediate impact at South Alabama, first by leading the program to its highest win-total (19) in a single season. In his fourth year at the helm, Stanky led the Jaguars to their first-ever NCAA Regional appearance where USA won three games at the District 3 Regional at Gastonia, N.C. He led the Jags to a second consecutive appearance in 1973, and added two additional NCAA Regional banners later in the decade in '75 and '77. The 1975 team set a still-standing school record with 52 wins. Stanky led the program to a No. 1 national ranking twice (1972, '75) during his 14-year career.

He is immortalized just outside the front gates of the Jaguars' home stadium - Stanky Field - with a life-size bronze statue, along with some of his personal memorabilia encased in a display in the stadium club at Stanky Field.

Stanky was elected to the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame and named the Mobile Citizen of the Year in 1977. He was inducted into the USA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989, and later had his number 12 retired by the school.

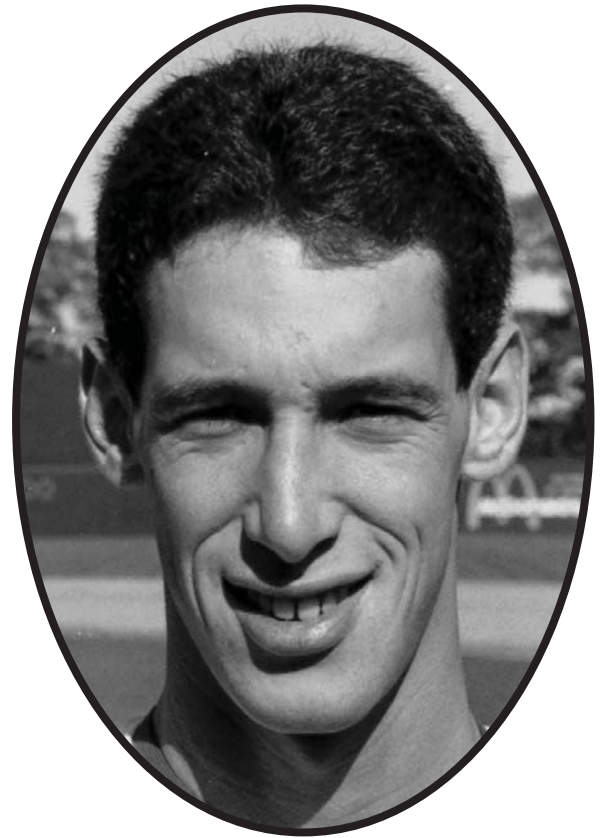

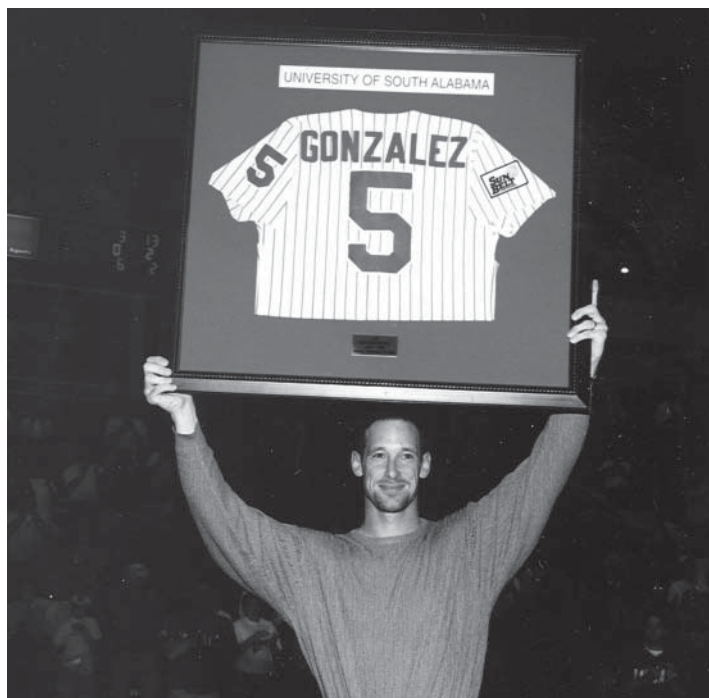
Luis Gonzalez holds the distinction as the first and only Jaguar player to have his number retired by the program. The Tampa, Fla., native played in all but one game during his three-year Jaguar career. He made an immediate impact at South Alabama, earning Freshman All-American honors in 1986. He was named a first-team All-American in 1988 after posting a still-standing Jaguar record of 80 RBI.

Gonzalez was drafted in the fourth round of the 1988 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft by the Houston Astros where he played from 1990-94 before being traded to the Chicago Cubs in June 1995. After a season-and-a-half with the Cubs, Gonzalez signed as a free agent with the Detroit Tigers for the 1998 season, but was traded a year later to the Arizona Diamondbacks for Karim Garcia.

The sweet-swinging left-hander would go on to establish himself as arguably the greatest player in Diamondbacks' history, and is the franchise's all-time leader in nearly every offensive category. In eight seasons in Arizona, Gonzalez hit .298 with 310 doubles, 27 triples, 224 home runs and 774 RBI, and was a five-time National League All-Star. He finished third in the NL MVP ballot in 2001 — the same season he delivered a walk-off single against the New York Yankees in Game 7 of the 2001 World Series off of MLB's career saves leader Mariano Rivera.

The Diamondbacks honored Gonzalez on Aug. 7, 2010, by retiring his number in a pre-game ceremony at Chase Field. He signed as a free agent with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2006, and retired in 2007 as a member of the Florida Marlins.

South Alabama honored Gonzalez by inducting him into the USA Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999, and retired his number in 2001 following his World Series heroics.

Freese had a breakout year in 2011, specifically in the Cardinals' World Series run, where he set new single-season postseason records for RBI (21) and total bases (50), and tied the record for hits (25) and doubles (8) en route to earning MVP honors in both the National League Championship Series and the World Series, becoming just the sixth player in MLB history to do so. In 2012, he was selected as a National League All-Star after hitting .294 with 14 doubles, one triple, 13 homers and 51 RBI before the break.

Freese opened the 2010 season as the starting third baseman for the St. Louis Cardinals after playing just four seasons of minor league ball. He batted .296 with four home runs and 36 RBI in his first full season with the Cardinals. At the conclusion of the 2013 season, Freese was traded to the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim where he was reunited with former St. Louis teammate Albert Pujols.



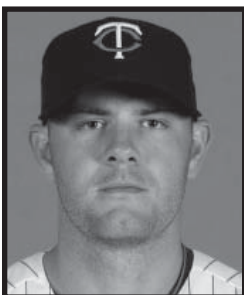

Lind completed his ninth season with the Toronto Blue Jays in 2014 after being drafted by the club in the 2004 First-Year Player Draft. In 2009, he batted .305 with 93 runs scored, 35 home runs and led the team with 46 doubles and 114 RBI, and won the Edgar Martinez Award, which is awarded to the most outstanding designated hitter. He also earned the 2009 American League Silver Slugger Award as designated hitter. On Opening Day in 2009, Lind drove in six runs against Detroit, which stands as a Blue Jay Opening Day record. He was named American League Player of the Week for the week ending Sept. 6. Lind was a third-round draft pick (83rd overall) in the 2003 First-Year Player Draft, and in 2006, was named the Blue Jays' Minor League Player of the Year. He won three Webster awards, which is awarded annually to the top player from each Blue Jays minor league club. After the 2014 season, Lind was traded by the Blue Jays to the Milwaukee Brewers.

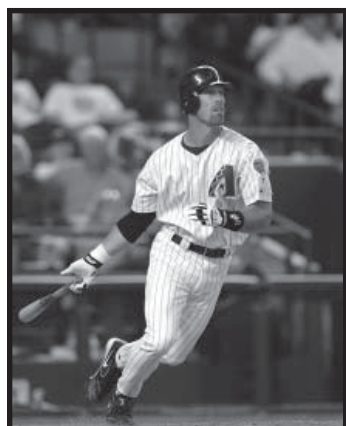

Walters was called up to the Major Leagues by the St. Louis Cardinals in the middle of the 2009 season and made eight appearances, including one start. He recorded his first career win on May 27 against the San Diego Padres, tossing five shutout innings with four strikeouts. The right-hander went 2-0 last season, earning wins in his first and last start on the season. Walters had started 20 of 21 games he pitched in for the club's Triple A affiliate in Memphis, going 8-10 with a 4.54 ERA and 113 strikeouts in 121 innings. The right-hander was traded to the Toronto Blue Jays during the 2011 season, and signed a minor-league contract with the Minnesota Twins during the offseason. The right-hander won two games with the Twins in 2012 after battling injury throughout the season. Walters signed with the Kansas City Royals in the 2013 offseason, and then had his contract purchased by the Blue Jays in May of 2014 while with the Royals. 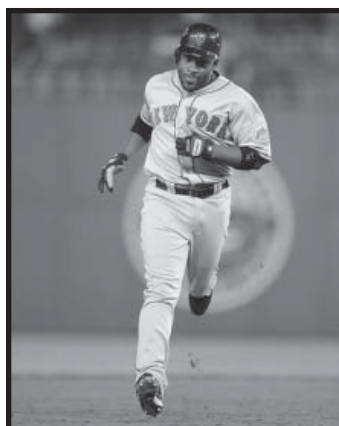

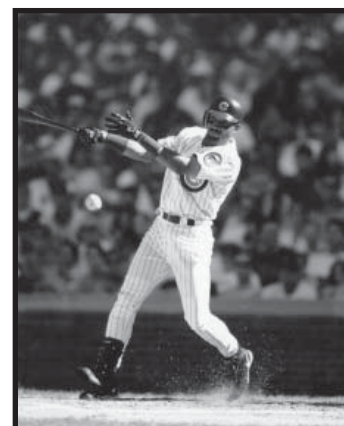

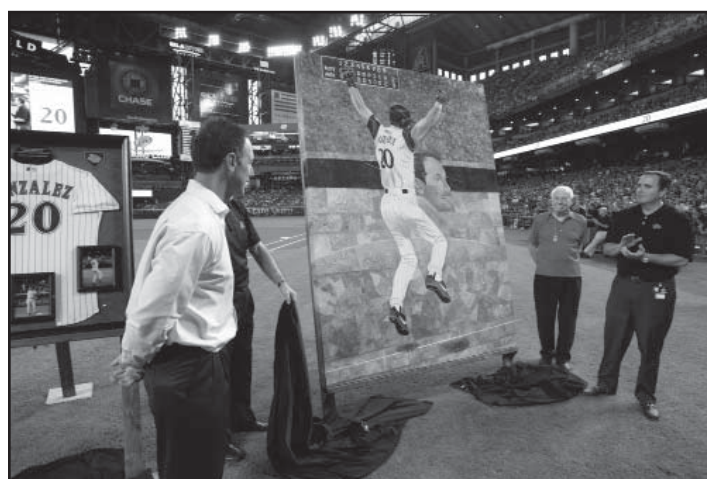
DIAMONDBACKS HONOR GONZALEZ, RETIRE SLUGGER'S NUMBER

In August 2010, the Arizona Diamondbacks retired former Jaguar standout Luis Gonzalez's number (20), making him the first player in the organization's history to have such an honor bestowed upon him. In eight seasons with the Diamondbacks, Gonzalez batted .298 with 224 home runs and 774 RBI. He the organization's all-time leader in hits (1,337), doubles (310), runs scored (780), home runs (224), RBI (774), total bases (2,373), base on balls (650), on-base percentage (.391) and slugging percentage (.529).

Gonzalez was a five-time All-Star with Arizona, and was awarded the 2001 Silver Slugger Award the same year he delivered his infamous walk-off single in game seven of the 2001 World Series off of New York Yankees closer Mariano Rivera, which gave the Diamondbacks their first-ever world championship.

He led the National League in hits (206) in 1999, and finished second in batting average at .336, but produced, undoubtedly, the best year of his career in 2001 when he batted .325 with a career-best 57 home runs and 142 RBI, and finished third in the National League Most Valuable Player voting. That season, Gonzalez also set career highs in triples (7), runs scored (128), slugging percentage (.688) and on-base percentage (.429).

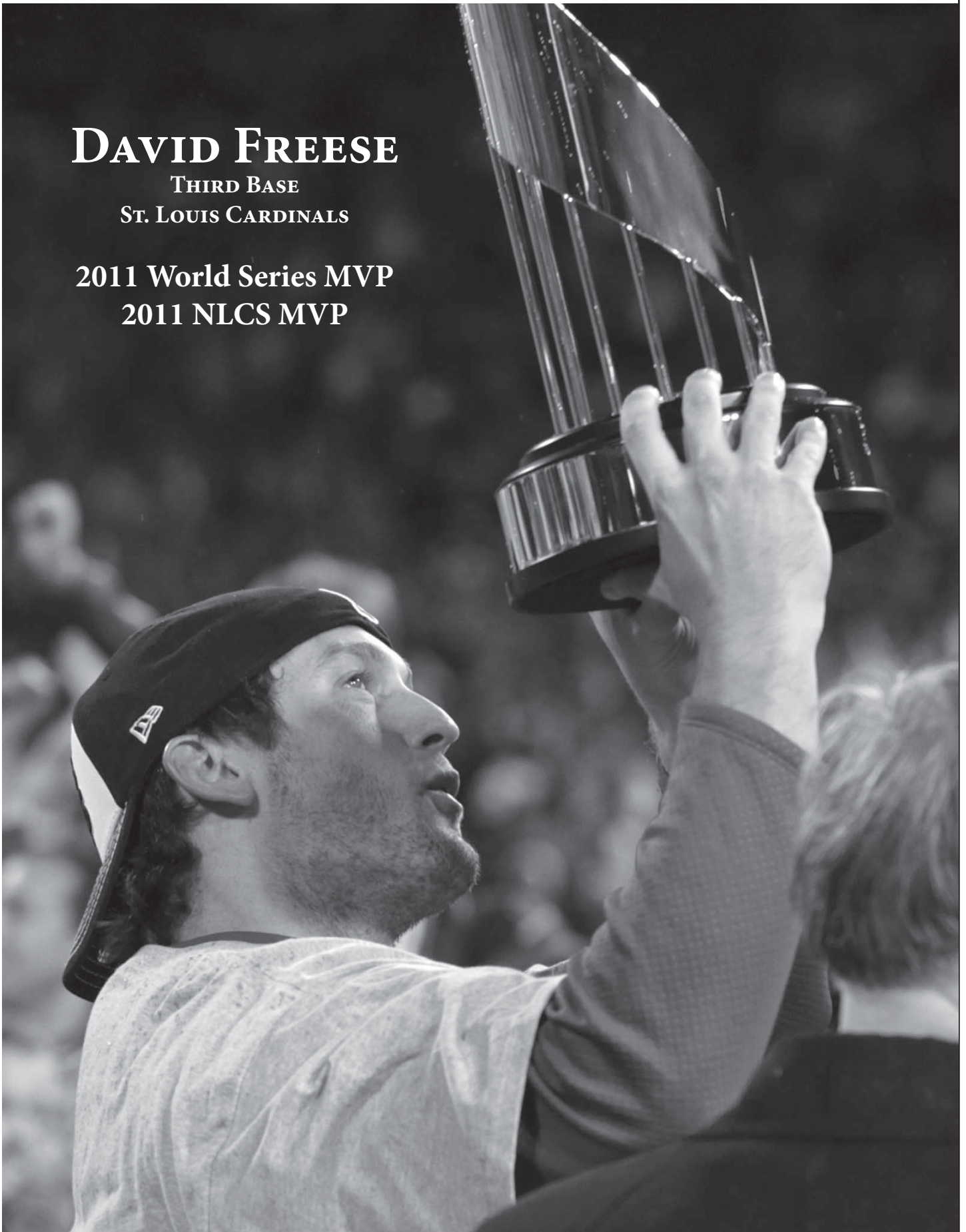
Gonzalez, who lettered at South Alabama from 1986-88 and earned All-American honors in 1988, holds single-season records for RBI (80) and games played (70) at South Alabama, which he produced in 1988 and '87, respectively. In 1988, he led the Jaguars in home runs with 16. Gonzalez had his No. 5 at South Alabama retired in 2001, and was inducted into the USA Hall of Fame in 1999.

Former South Alabama slugger David Freese etched his name in Major League Baseball postseason history during the 2011 playoffs. Freese, an All-American and the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year in 2006, set single-season postseason records in RBI (21) and total bases (50), and tied records for hits (25) and doubles (8).

Down to his last strike with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning and St. Louis facing elimination in Game 6 of the World Series, Freese hit a two-run, game-tying triple off of Texas closer Neftali Feliz.

Two innings later, Freese cemented his place in Cardinal postseason lore when he led off the bottom of the 11th inning with a walk-off home run to center field to force a seventh and deciding game.

St. Louis clinched the Series with a win in Game 7 and Freese was named the Most Valuable Player, becoming the first former Jaguar to earn the honor, after hitting .348 with three doubles, a triple, home run and seven RBI.

In the National League Championship Series, in which the Cardinals defeated the Milwaukee Brewers, Freese was named MVP after hitting .545 with three homers, nine RBI and seven runs scored in six games.

In 18 postseason games in 2011, Freese batted .397 with eight doubles, one triple, five homers and 21 RBI while posting a 1.258 OPS.

Freese was a two-year letterwinner at South Alabama (2005-06), and helped lead the Jaguars to two consecutive NCAA Regional appearances and the 2005 Sun Belt Conference Tournament championship.

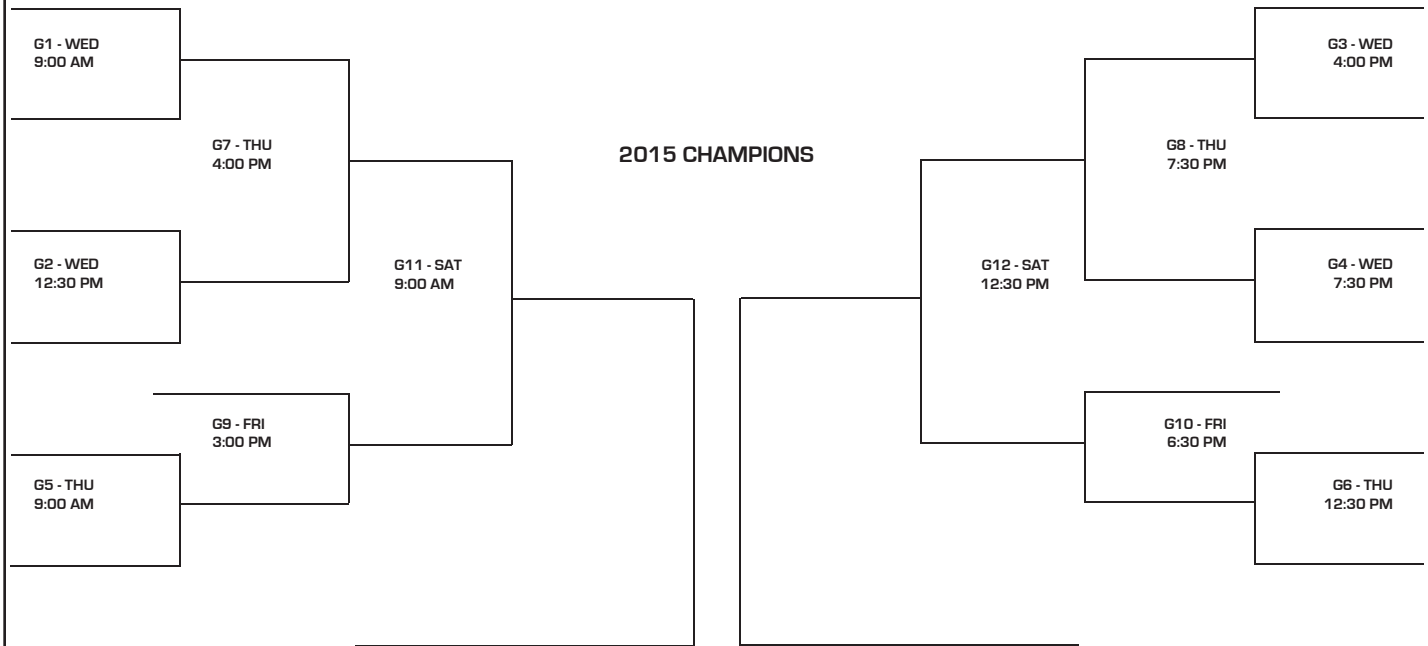

Dr. Tony G. Waldrop was named president of the University of South Alabama on February 6, 2014, following a vote by the University's board of trustees.

An accomplished researcher, teacher and administrator in higher education for more than 30 years, Waldrop was selected from an initial field of more than 130 candidates from across the country. Waldrop succeeded the late Gordon Moulton, who retired in 2013 after 15 years as president.

Prior to joining USA, Waldrop served four years as provost and executive vice president at the University of Central Florida, with previous stints as vice chancellor for research and economic development at the University of North Carolina and vice chancellor for research at the University of Illinois. Waldrop has a bachelor's degree in political science, a master's in physical education and a Ph.D. in physiology, all from the University of North Carolina.

"The University of South Alabama delivers a quality education for students, serves the health needs of the central

Gulf Coast and is an economic driver for Mobile and the surrounding regions. I am thrilled to have the opportunity to join USA at this exciting juncture," said Waldrop. "The people of the University are unified in their energy and dedication to providing an outstanding, affordable education. I am proud to become part of the team."

Waldrop enrolled in 1970 at the University of North Carolina as a John Motley Morehead Scholar – now the Morehead-Cain Scholarship Program – one of the oldest, most prestigious merit scholarship programs in the United States. Waldrop also attained athletic success at North Carolina, winning two NCAA championships as a mile runner on the track and field team and, in 1974, setting a world record for the indoor mile, three minutes and 55 seconds.

After earning his bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees at North Carolina, he continued his training at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas in 1982 as a Research Fellow in the Cardiopulmonary Division, receiving a National Institutes of Health Postdoctoral Fellowship at the Moss Heart Center.

In 1986, he joined the faculty in the Department of Physiology and Biophysics at the University of Illinois, advancing in progressively greater areas of responsibility and earning the school's Arnold O. Beckman Research Award, and recognition as a University Scholar and an American Heart Association Established Investigator.

Waldrop returned to his alma mater in 2001 as the University of North Carolina's vice chancellor for research and economic development and as a professor in the Department of Cell and Molecular Physiology. Nine years later, he was named provost and executive vice president at Central Florida.

Waldrop is a native of Columbus, N.C., and is married to Dr. Julee Waldrop, who holds a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree from Duke University. She has been a professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago, the University of North Carolina and the University of Central Florida. She is a published clinician and researcher and is also an accomplished triathlete. They have two sons, Cabe and Dallas.

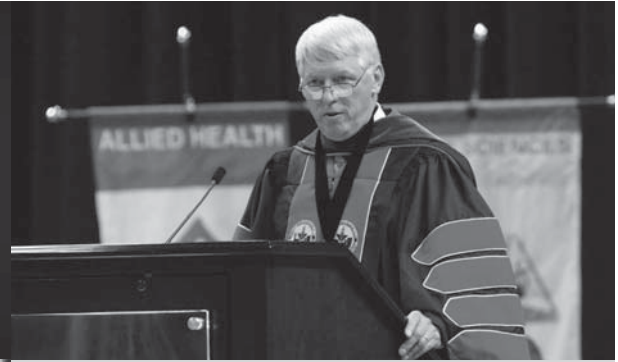

Dr. Joel Erdmann enters his sixth year as Director of Athletics at the University of South Alabama with the aim of continuing to shape the Jaguar athletic program among the best not only in the Sun Belt Conference, but in the region and nationally as well.

The Jags' 17 sport programs recorded 95.5 points to finish second in the Vic Bubas Cup standings, recognizing the league's top overall school in competition, for the school's highest finish in more than 10 years after placing second among the 10 members of the SBC. The women's soccer team earned its first-ever league tournament championship and NCAA Tournament berth, highlighting a performance in which USA finished in the top half of the standings in 12 sports, while the Jaguar men's golf and softball squads returned to an NCAA Regional for the second and third consecutive seasons, respectively. That included second-place performances by the softball, men's and women's tennis, men's golf and men's outdoor track and field teams in the spring.

USA's athletic success last year also included the Jag football team which, competing for the first time as a full NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision member, went 4-3 in Sun Belt action to tie for third place while winning six contests overall to qualify for a postseason bowl as well as the Jaguar volleyball team, which set a school record with nine conference victories en route to earning the fifth seed at the league tournament.

The department not only had 72 current and former student-athletes earn their degrees during the last year, but saw 100 individuals make the Dean's List following the spring semester, the most ever. Overall, 189 student-athletes recorded a grade-point average of 3.0 or better in the spring, with 10 sport programs carrying a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher.

During the 2012-13 academic year, USA won multiple Sun Belt Conference championships for the first time in six years with the baseball team claiming the regular-season title and the softball squad winning the league tournament for the second straight spring; those two programs, along with the men's golf team, all participated in NCAA postseason play to close out the year. The Jaguars' 115.5 points recorded in the Vic Bubas Cup standings were the most the school has posted since the 2000-01 season.

Additionally, the Jag men's basketball team competed in a national postseason tournament for the first time in five seasons after posting the second-best record in the SBC during the year.

In an effort to assist the school to create a better game day atmosphere as well as to help the coaching staff in recruiting, Erdmann has spearheaded numerous efforts to improve athletic facilities. Under his direction, Ladd-Peebles Stadium — home of the Jag football team — underwent a makeover after the program's initial season that saw increased signage both in and out of the facility, and a cleaner interior with new paint in the stands; new turf was installed at the facility prior to the start of the 2013 campaign. Baseball now has a new outfield wall and bullpens at Stanky Field as well as decks for baseball alumni in the left field corner near the clubhouse and fans in right-center field, while the field and dugouts have undergone renovations as well. A pair of projects have highlighted recognition of past baseball teams and student-athletes; the Jaguar Baseball Ring of Honor was dedicated in May 2012, while the previous offseason signage was added to the building's façade.

Softball's Jaguar Field underwent a complete makeover throughout the spring of 2014, with the stadium now able to hold 1,000 individuals in permanent stands. The upgrade included new dugouts and press box facility as well, with a new covered hitting facility down the left-field line and a deck beyond the left-field fence. His efforts helped spearhead the development of a suite for the men's and women's golf teams, which includes a hitting bay and practice putting green along with locker rooms and office space, and new office and locker rooms for the men's and women's track programs. New bleachers were installed at The Cage — home of the Jaguar soccer squad — while volleyball had a new scoreboard and speaker system installed in Jaguar Gym prior to the 2012 campaign.

He has also restructured the athletic department staff, adding personnel in the areas of academic services and NCAA compliance, and helped the school make the transition on the diamond from the 28-year career of the legendary Steve Kittrell to Mark Calvi, an assistant on the staff of 2010 College World Series champion South Carolina, who is now the school's head baseball coach. In the spring of 2013, Erdmann also hired Matthew Graves — who was part of a staff that led Butler to back-to-back appearances in the NCAA Tournament championship game — to guide the men's basketball program; he has been responsible for selecting five of USA's 12 current head coaches.

In addition, Erdmann just completed the second of a five-year term on the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee, with duties including helping to select and seed the field for the NCAA Tournament as well as assist in site administration.

Erdmann, 51, came to USA in July 2009 from Southeastern Louisiana with seven years of experience as an athletic director at Southeastern Louisiana and North Alabama. At SLU, he guided a department comprised of 15 sports, 70 staff members and 320 student-athletes since May 2007. In competition, SLU won the 2009 Southland Conference All-Sports Trophy in men's sports while also recording the school's highest finish ever in the competition for the league's Commissioner's Cup.

Off the fields and courts, he reorganized the department's structure, creating divisions of student support services, external affairs and an expanded academic support program, and oversaw facility construction projects that included a football stadium club, suites and press box, a new strength and conditioning facility, a student-athlete academic success center, a Hall of Champions, Donor Wall of Recognition and improvements to the soccer and softball facilities. His efforts helped the school enhance its Academic Progress Rate (APR) and Graduation Success Rate (GSR) performance, while also landing a \$100,000 grant from the NCAA to renovate the student-athlete academic success center.

In addition to seeing ticket revenue in football, basketball and baseball increase his last year over the totals posted in 2007-08, Erdmann oversaw the sales of the football stadium club and suites, created a seating selection process and also modified the layout in the basketball arena to create premium courtside seats and enhance the seats available to students.

Erdmann was responsible for creating and monitoring the department's budgets, the Lion Athletic Association's budget as well as various development and foundation accounts, finishing the 2008 fiscal year in balance.

His first position guiding an athletic department began in August 2002 when he was named director of athletics at North Alabama. In five years with the institution, Erdmann oversaw a unit that made 19 NCAA Championships appearances highlighted by a title and a runner-up finish by the volleyball program, while recording its highest rankings ever in the NACDA United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup in 2003-04 and '04-05. The football squad advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs twice and the quarterfinals once while claiming a pair of GSC championships. The men's golf team won the region en route to finishing sixth in the country, with the men's basketball, baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis, and men's and women's cross country programs experiencing their best seasons in a decade as well.

In the classroom, not only did UNA record the highest graduation rate of any public four-year institution that plays football in the state, it posted seven of the top 10 semester departmental GPAs including the highest on record.

Erdmann was responsible for creating and managing a \$3.5 million budget for the athletic department. In addition to increasing every sport's operating budget for the first time since 1988, he helped build the cash reserve for athletics from \$17,000 to \$320,000. He also created and coordinated all departmental marketing and fundraising activities — Erdmann's efforts in those areas helped increase corporate giving by \$270,000 as well as membership numbers and donations to the UNA Sportsman's Club.

In his time at UNA, Erdmann helped negotiate and contract facility partnerships with the city of Florence for an \$800,000 softball field and stadium while overseeing improvements to the baseball locker room and grandstand as well as women's basketball and volleyball locker rooms. His efforts to renovate the basketball arena led to a refinished floor, new scoreboards, press row, lights, sound system and arena façade.

A member of the NCAA Division II Football Committee during the 2006-07 academic year, Erdmann also co-chaired the NCAA Division II Football Southeast Region Advisory Committee.

Erdmann first came to USA in 1991 to serve as a graduate assistant on the baseball staff. In addition to helping the Jaguars finish 44-16, advance to an NCAA Regional and win the SBC East Division title, he earned a master's degree in physical education.

He returned to USA in 1995 as an assistant professor in the department of Health, Physical Education and Leisure Studies (HPELS) and an assistant baseball coach, a position he served in for two seasons. During that stretch, the Jags finished with a combined mark of 85-36 (70.2%), won the Sun Belt Conference championship both years, and advanced to an NCAA Regional each season — they would finish as the runner-up at the South I Region in Baton Rouge in 1997, ending the spring ranked as high as 15th in the final national polls.

Following the end of that campaign, Erdmann maintained his teaching position in the department of HPELS and became an assistant to the athletic director. In that role, which he held until December 2000, he focused on game operations, compliance and special projects. He was the manager for the 2001 Sun Belt Basketball Tournament, which included 24 teams in the combined men's and women's event, as well as the league's baseball championships in 1998 and '00. Erdmann also coordinated game operations for men's and women's basketball, baseball, volleyball and soccer, which included directing numerous activities the first year the Mitchell Center opened. During this time frame he also earned tenure and was promoted to Associate Professor in HPELS.

In January 2001, he was promoted to assistant athletic director and executive director of the Jaguar Athletic Club. Erdmann coordinated all of the club's operations, amended the mission and membership criteria for the Board of Directors, realigned member benefits and modified giving levels, and enhanced communication through the creation of a quarterly newsletter.

A 1986 South Dakota State graduate with a degree in education, he began his career in athletics as an assistant baseball coach for an American Legion team while still a student. He began a four-year stint as an assistant coach at Pacific in 1987, working as a social science and physical education teacher in Stockton at the same time. He earned his doctorate from Florida State in 1995 in sports management/athletic administration, working as operations coordinator for the Tallahassee Convention and Visitors Bureau while completing the degree.

A native of Bismarck, N.D., Erdmann is married to the former Tina Milton. The couple has three dogs and a cat.

Purpose

The University of South Alabama's Student-Athlete Academic Services Office is committed to providing a comprehensive program that emphasizes the development of academic, personal, and professional success for our student-athlete population. We strive to create an environment that fosters the highest standards of integrity, academic support and performance while providing the resources necessary for our student-athletes to achieve their academic potential and prepare them for life after college athletics.

Facilities/Resources

The Student-Athlete Academic Services office is housed in the Academic Support Center. This 4,500 square-foot facility includes staff offices, private tutor rooms, study tables and carrels, and a computer lab with 28 computers.



Academic support programming available to student-athletes includes, but is not limited to:

- **Advisement** — the Student-Athlete Academic Services staff assists student-athletes with planning their class schedules and deciding on a degree program that will suit their needs. Equipped with an in-depth knowledge of both the University's various academic programs and the NCAA's requirements for maintaining academic eligibility, the athletic counselors are able to provide our student-athletes with a unique combination of support that enables their academic growth and ensures their progress toward graduation.
- **Tutorial Assistance** — the Student-Athlete Academic Services Office employs approximately 50 tutors a year from a wide variety of academic disciplines. Our tutors are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach to assist student-athletes with subject comprehension and study skills.
- **Supervised Study Hall** — the Student-Athlete Academic Services Office conducts a monitored study program designed to provide student-athletes with organized study and tutoring time in an environment conducive to successful learning. Study Hall is required for all freshmen, first-year transfers, student-athletes with a cumulative GPA below a 2.60, and any student-athlete who the coaching staff and/or the sport-specific athletic counselor believe would benefit from the experience.
- **Progress Reporting** — the Student-Athlete Academic Services staff utilizes contemporary web-based technology to proactively gather in-term progress report information from University faculty members. This allows our staff to monitor a student-athlete's academic profile throughout the semester and stay abreast of situations where a student-athlete may be struggling and/or underperforming.

Study Skills/Time Management

While life as a student-athlete is exciting, challenging and stimulating, it can also be overwhelming. The athletic academic services staff helps student-athletes make a smooth transition from high school to college-level study skills. The staff works one-on-one with student-athletes in developing study skills, memory skills, reading comprehension, exam strategies, time management and note-taking skills.

Are you a booster of South Alabama Athletics?

Pursuant to NCAA rules, you are considered a booster of South Alabama Athletics if you:

- Have ever participated in or been a member of an agency or organization promoting South Alabama Athletics.
- Have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department.
- Have ever assisted or been asked to assist in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- Have ever provided employment to a student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete.
- Have otherwise promoted South Alabama Athletics in any manner.

Booster DOs and DON'Ts

DOs

- You may attend games where prospective student-athletes are competing, provided no contact is made with the prospects or his/her parents.
- You may continue normal contact with any prospective student-athlete with which you have a pre-established relationship.
- You may notify members of the South Alabama coaching staff about any outstanding prospective student-athletes.
- With athletics department approval, you may provide an occasional family meal to a student-athlete(s) provided the meal takes place at your home.
- You may accept telephone calls initiated by a prospective student-athlete provided the call is not for recruiting purposes and all questions about South Alabama athletics are referred to the athletics department.

DON'Ts

- You may not provide a prospective or enrolled student-athlete with any material benefits.
- You may not make in-person recruiting contact, initiate telephone calls to, or establish written correspondence with a prospective student-athlete.
- You may not use a student-athlete's name, picture or appearance to advertise the use of a commercial product.
- You may not make a recruiting presentation to a group of prospective student-athletes.

The University of South Alabama is committed and obligated to the principle of institutional control in operating its athletics program in a manner that is consistent with the letter and the spirit of the NCAA, Sun Belt Conference and the University rules and regulations. As the University strives for academic and athletic excellence, we must always seek the highest standard of ethical conduct. Involvement with our athletics program is critical to its success however, we must emphasize that any inappropriate, even inadvertent, activity could jeopardize the eligibility of our current or prospective student-athletes and the compliance of the University with NCAA regulations.

The Office of Athletic Compliance functions as the University's compliance program to coordinate, monitor and verify compliance with all NCAA requirements, and to educate the various constituencies of the University and the athletics community regarding NCAA regulations. If you have questions regarding NCAA rules and regulations, especially those relating to interactions between representatives and prospective and currently enrolled student-athletes, please contact the Office of Athletic Compliance. Don't be afraid to ask! South Alabama athletics programs want and need your support; and, in addition, we need your full cooperation to ensure that the Jaguars win the right way, both on and off the field.

Important Terms & Definitions

Prospective Student-Athletes – A prospective student-athlete is a person who has started classes for the ninth grade (seventh grade in sport of men's basketball), regardless of his/her athletics ability. A prospective student-athlete is also any student who is enrolled at a two-year college or at a four-year institution other than South Alabama. A prospective student-athlete remains a prospect (even if he/she signs a National Letter of Intent) until he/she begins classes during a regular academic term or reports for official practice immediately prior to the start of classes or officially registers and enrolls and attends classes during the summer prior to initial enrollment.

Recruiting – Any solicitation of a prospective student-athlete for the purpose of securing their enrollment at South Alabama. All recruiting must be done by authorized athletics department personnel. NCAA rules specifically prohibit boosters from recruiting prospective student-athletes.

Official Visit – A visit to a college campus paid in whole or in part by the college. Official visits can be no longer than 48 hours. A prospective student-athlete is limited to 5 official visits (one per university).

Unofficial Visit – A visit made to a college campus at the prospective student-athletes expense. The college may provide three complimentary admissions to a home athletic contest. There is no limit on the number of unofficial visits a prospective student-athlete can make.

Recruiting Contact – Any face-to-face off-campus encounter between a prospective student-athlete, their parents, relatives or legal guardians and an institutional staff member or athletics representative; if the conversation goes beyond a greeting.

Recruiting Evaluation – Any off-campus activity designed to assess a prospective student-athletes academic qualifications or athletics ability.

Extra Benefit – The NCAA defines an extra benefit as any special arrangement by an institution employee or a representative of the institution's athletics interests ("booster") to provide a student-athlete, or a student-athlete's relative or friend, a benefit that is not generally available to other University of South Alabama students and their relatives, or is not expressly authorized by the NCAA legislation.

The prevention and treatment of injuries is an important facet of the intercollegiate athletic program at the University of South Alabama. With a medical school and some of the finest healthcare facilities already a part of the University, the department maintains some of the best health-care options available for its student-athletes.

The University of South Alabama Health System, from its beginning, has played a central role in Mobile's medical history, and today continues this long tradition of excellence in education, research, and medical care.

Comprised of the USA Hospitals, and the private practice of academic physicians affiliated with the USA College of Medicine, the USA Health System provides patients with many unique and innovative services.

The intercollegiate athletic department is fortunate to utilize the expertise of Orthopedic surgeon Albert Pearsall, M.D., and Primary Care Sports Medicine practitioner Andy Harcourt, M.D. Dr. Pearsall lettered in football at Northwestern and completed an orthopedic sports medicine fellowship at Duke. Dr. Harcourt completed his undergraduate studies at Southern Methodist, and completed his medical degree from Oklahoma; he is proficient in diagnostic musculoskeletal ultrasound. Dr. William "Bo" Barber will serve as the Primary Care Sports Medicine fellowship physician for 2014-2015. The Department of Athletics can draw upon the extensive list of specialists within the South Alabama Health Services Foundation, if needed, and are fortunate to utilize the expertise of Emergency Medical Services from volunteers: Scotty McArthur, Charlie Erwin, Steve White, Ronnie Morgan and Jason Brooks, Dr. George Burroughs — Chiropractor and Dr. Justin Southall provide valuable volunteer services to the athletic sports medicine area.

The Sports Medicine staff is led by Assistant Athletic Director-Sports Medicine/Senior Woman Administrator Jinni Frisbey, MEd, ATC. Frisbey came to South Alabama in 2007 after spending the previous 11 years at the University of Mobile. Frisbey is assisted by Matthew Brown, MS, ATC, Chad Stefano, MS, ATC, Karla Beasley, MS, ATC, Megan Harper, MS, ATC, CKTP, Christopher McDonald, MS, ATC, PES, Caleb Forehand, MS, ATC, CSCS, and Joshua Logan, MS, ATC.

The remainder of the staff is made up of sports medicine graduate interns Ashley Brower, BS, ATC, Wendy Trinh, BS, ATC, and Trinity Lambeth, BS, ATC.

One of the main athletic training facilities — located in the Health, Physical Education and Leisure Services Building (also home to Jaguar Gymnasium) — covers 2,730 square feet and offers a variety of therapeutic modalities and treatment rooms. The athletic training facility in the football fieldhouse covers 3,800 square feet including hydroworx plunge systems. Additional athletic training facilities are located at the Stanky Field Baseball Club House, the Mitchell Center, the Soccer/Softball complex, and The Track and Field facility.

PHILOSOPHY

Power

Power is what separates good athletes from the great, and the great from the legendary. Power is maximized by producing large amounts of force in the shortest amount of time possible. Force is the product of mass and acceleration. Therefore we do not simply move barbells and other weighted resistances, but we move them as fast as possible. This type of training quickly equates to success in every competition.

Speed, Agility, Quickness

An athlete's sport-specific speed is dependent upon their linear speed, lateral speed, and ability to change directions. Optimal training methods are used to develop linear speed, while at the same time emphasizing deceleration and change of direction drills. A quick burst of speed or an athletic change of direction is often the difference between victory and defeat. Jag Power methodology will allow South Alabama athletes to continue to run away from the competition.

Character Development

A complete athlete possesses amazing physical ability, and enriches the lives of all others they come in contact with. Our athletes must learn from the coaching staff, and we from them, so that we all may develop into better men and women of the world. Injury Prevention

An injury can destroy an athlete's psyche and possibly their career. Strength and speed means little on the sideline and in the training room. It is therefore of primary importance to incorporate functional pre-habilitation movements into programs to prevent these injuries before they can occur. Stable joints and dynamic flexibility combine to create a strong and durable athlete.

Rest and Recovery

Proper active and passive recovery techniques are integral to an athlete's success. It is during rest periods that an athlete rebuilds the cells and systems of the body and makes positive physiological adaptations. Without adequate rest intervals, a strength and speed program will yield little results. Proper recuperation is essential to ensure that every athlete comes back stronger and faster, day in and day out.

The Sun Belt Conference mantra "Together We Rise" exemplifies what has quickly become America's most up-and-coming collegiate athletics conference.

Founded in 1976, the Sun Belt has adapted and evolved in its nearly 40 year existence. The league was originally formed as a home for some of the nation's premier mid-major basketball teams and it wasn't until a number of changes and the demand for a higher national profile that the league began sponsoring football in 2001. Because of this decision to move the league in to the group of football playing conferences, the Sun Belt Conference has a permanent seat on the NCAA's 18-member Board of Directors. As a result, the conference has a crucial voice on some of the most pressing issues in college athletics.

With the 2014-15 year marking the debut of the College Football Playoff (CFP) the Sun Belt continues to find itself among the 10 premier college football conferences and the new system is guaranteed universal access based on performance – there are no automatic qualifiers for the playoff system. Additionally, the CFP will mean that a spot among the premier bowl games of college football will be guaranteed to the highest-ranked champion from the other "Group of Five" conferences: the Sun Belt Conference, American Athletic Conference, Mountain West Conference, Mid-American Conference and Conference USA.

With the College Football Playoff included with the league's other bowl arrangements, the Sun Belt Conference is tied to seven total bowl games. The R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl, the GoDaddy Bowl, the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl, the Cure Bowl (debuting in 2015) all guarantee a home for a bowl eligible Sun Belt Conference team each year. And beginning with the 2016 season, the Sun Belt is also part of a rotation of conferences that will send a team to the Bahamas Bowl and the Miami Beach Bowl.

The influx of bowl game opportunities comes at a time when the Sun Belt Conference is breaking win records year after year and the league is continually exceeding expectations.

The Sun Belt's 21 non-conference football wins in the 2013 season was a new record for the league - eclipsing the mark of 19 set the year prior. Additionally of note for the league's non-conference win total was that the Sun Belt fared well against its peer opponents in the non-AQ BCS ranks. The Sun Belt finished a combined 8-1 against members of Conference-USA (4-1), the Mid-American Conference (3-0) and the Mountain West Conference (1-0). The Sun Belt also had the best overall non-conference win percentage when comparing the four non-AQ conferences.

The 2013 football season also saw two teams take home bowl championship trophies, as UL Lafayette won its third consecutive R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl and Arkansas State won its second consecutive GoDaddy Bowl.

Of course, football wasn't the only sport that has seen recent success and all of the league's sports have contributed to the "Rise" of the Sun Belt Conference.

In men's basketball, league newcomer Georgia State put together one of the best conference performances in league history in winning the 2013-14 Sun Belt regular season championship. UL Lafayette captured the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament in what was one of the most thrilling finishes to the Sun Belt championship game in recent memory.

An influx of young coaches mixed with proven veterans makes both Sun Belt men's and women's basketball an exciting brand with vast potential.

The Sun Belt Conference Men's and Women's Basketball Championships were played in the hometown of the Sun Belt at Lakefront Arena this past March in what was the first of a three year deal that will have Sun Belt hoops in the "Big Easy" each March.

Baseball and softball continue to be among the league's standard-bearers for success as each continues to send teams on deep postseason runs and teams are easy to find in the national polls.

In baseball, UL Lafayette held a unanimous No. 1 national ranking during the 2014 season and hosted a NCAA Tournament Regional and Super Regional. Not to be outdone, the UL Lafayette softball team also hosted the NCAA Tournament rounds and qualified for the 2014 edition of the Women's College World Series.

In recent years as many as four Sun Belt teams have advanced to the baseball postseason in a single year, while as many as three Sun Belt softball teams have accomplished that feat.

While the accomplishments of the Sun Belt's student-athletes and coaches deserve great praise, so to do the league's administrators who have helped set the tone for the future of the conference.

"We have never been as strong as we are now academically and financially and I believe we are getting stronger all the time athletically," former Sun Belt Conference President and Troy University Chancellor Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr. said recently. "I truly believe that the best is yet to come."

The Sun Belt Conference's membership consists of 11 football members for 2014 – Appalachian State, Arkansas State, Georgia Southern, Georgia State, Idaho, UL Lafayette, UL Monroe, New Mexico State, South Alabama, Texas State and Troy. UALR and UT Arlington compete in all-sports as non-football members while Idaho and New Mexico State are football only members.

Prominent Sun Belt alumni include Lyndon B. Johnson, former President of the United States (Texas State), former All-Star baseball player Luis Gonzalez (South Alabama), former member of the United States Senate and House of Representatives John Breaux (UL Lafayette), country music superstar Tim McGraw (UL Monroe), CEO of Duck Commander and Buck Commander Willie Robertson (UL Monroe) and DeMarcus Ware, an All-Pro NFL linebacker (Troy).
